Background

- » The City of Newport Beach currently has 14 California native trees or native cultivars listed on its Parkway Tree Designation List.
- » Customers may choose any tree from the List that fits their parkway width.
- » There are many benefits in planting California native trees as opposed to non-native ornamentals, including:
 - > Natives are typically more acclimated to our Southern California climate.
 - > Generally, will use less water at maturity since many are found in non-irrigated, arid habitats.
 - > Can provide habitat for local fauna, including birds and butterflies.
 - > Provides the community with a link beyond the urban forest, to our local State and National Parks.


