## Site Hinted in Back Bay

The Ensign learned this week that the Lockheed Aircraft Corp. may soon establish a major electronics research center in the Back Bay area of Newport Beach. The location is described as a 200-acre site near the Orange County Airport, partially within the city limits of Newport.

This would make the development comparable to the Aeronutronic Systems Inc., Ford Motor Co. subsidiary already developing a major test center on 100 acres inland from Corona del Mar, with an option on 100 more acres.

The City of Newport Beach has already been asked for information on sewerage facilities in the Back Bay near Palisades Rd. This week the city sent a formal request to the Sanitation District to hook on to the line there.

## Big Tract in CDM Delayed

O. Z. Robertson's subdivision just above Corona del Mar is being held up pending the completion of a master plan for streets by the Irvine Co.

The Newport Beach City Council withheld action on the tentative map of the tract until a street plan is prepared for the area from MacArthur Blvd. all the way beyond Corona Highlands.

Annexation of the St. James Day School site, along Fifth Ave. between Narcissus Ave. and Jasmine Ave., also is being held up by the street planning.

A Youth Council to act on Harbor Area youth problems was organized Tuesday evening under the sponsorship of the Newport Harbor Community Council of the Volunteer Bureau.

## That Decision on Restrooms Plagues City

A Council committee reported 2 likely locations for restrooms on the Irvine Terrace park Monday evening, but the proposals received hostile treatment.

Councilman Charles Hart said that No. 1 choice was in the ravine near Seadrift Dr. and Sabrina Ter. No. 2 choice was near Coast Hwy. at the northeasterly corner of the park.

George Weedon and Mrs. Roy Hallberg, Irvine Terrace residents, both declared that the No. 1 site was one of the most undesirable spots.

Let the residents decide, said the Council, and the decision was referred to the Irvine Terrace Home Owners Assn.

## CDM Beach Path Okayed

Persistence won out for Mrs. James Harrington Monday evening, although she wasn't present at the Newport Council meeting for the moment of her triumph.

Council instructed Public Works Director Bert Webb to bulldoze a pathway down to the Corona del Mar beach from the top of Inspiration Point at a cost not to exceed \$2,000. Mr. Webb said there would be no paving, because it would be slippery, and no steps, just a slope with about 25 per cent incline. Previous estimates had ranged up to \$15,000. Mrs. Harrington, who sparkplugged the drive for the pathway, called on 2 neighbors, Harry Heisler and Ernie Nelson, to come up with a less costly solution. The graded pathway was their suggestion.

## Hearing Is Set On \$3 Million City Budget

City Manager Robert Shelton submitted a \$3,062,194 proposed budget for 1959-60 to the Newport Beach City Council Monday evening. A public hearing was set for the June 8 meeting.

The total is a 2.7% increase over the estimated total of \$2,982,727 for the current fiscal year, which ends June 30.

"If the Council approves the level of expenditure contained in the budget, the present \$1.10 total tax rate will be required," Mr. Shelton said. The final tax rate will depend on the outcome of next Tuesday's refuse charge election and on decisions on capital improvements.

Income for 1959-60 is estimated at \$3,191,285, a 4 1/4% increase over the current year.

## Suicide Try Is Reported

Mrs. Ruth Brandt, 40, of 1425 Santanella Ter., Irvine Terrace, attempted to commit suicide Sunday, when at 3 p.m. she swallowed 98 phenobarbital tablets.

She was rushed to Hoag Hospital an hour and a half later. After successful emergency treatment, Mrs. Brandt told police that she has been under a doctor's care for the past 4 years due to hypertension.

She is married to Elbert Brandt, and is the mother of one daughter, Joan Spears, 19, and 2 sons, John, 21, and Elbert, 17. She said she has been happily married for 24 years.

## Jordan Tract Finally OK'd

The Newport Beach City Council gave final approval Monday evening to Irving Jordan's multiple dwelling development of the Corona Highlands land fronting on Coast Hwy.

Mr. Jordan told the Ensign that grading on the project will start in about 30 days, and the first of the 24 triplexes would be completed in the fall.

## Jordan and Severin Join Forces Again

Irving Jordan announced this week that Nels Severin is associated with him in the development of the highway frontage of Corona Highlands, for which final approval was given Monday evening by the Newport Beach City Council.

These 2 developers and builders, who are neighbors in Irvine Terrace, were associated in the prize-winning Lido Sands project in West Newport. Mr. Severin is the immediate past president of the National Association of Home Builders.

## Helms and Good Humor Run into Road Block

The Helms Bakery truck and the Good Humor wagon are on uncertain ground in the City of Newport Beach.

This became apparent Monday evening when Helms Bakeries requested permission to vend bakery goods on streets in this city and to use the Helms whistle, "confined to a bare minimum."

Councilmen remarked that the city ordinance prohibits the use of vending noises on public streets.

Councilman Charles Hart said the city laws must be upheld, but since some vendors render a real public service, he recommended amending the law to allow the sale of dairy and bakery products.

Attorney Galvin Keene, representing a Good Humor vendor, wanted to know if the Council was about to consider some action to prohibit selling on city streets.

Mayor James Stoddard replied, "The law probably prohibits your client from selling on the street, and definitely prohibits bells and whistles. Perhaps the present law outlaws the milk man too."

"It's time to apply for licenses again," Mr. Keene said. "Will my client be denied a license?" "That's up to the city manager," said the mayor. "It's his job to see if applicants are operating within the law."

City Manager Robert Shelton, reporting on another case, stated bluntly as follows: "Unless directed otherwise, present licenses for such businesses will be allowed to expire June 30."

He was reporting on the request of youthful Bruce Nott of Newport Heights, who at the previous Council meeting asked for permission to sell baked goods from a truck at street ends to folks on the beaches. Bruce opined that if his request were refused, then other street vendors should be denied licenses too.

The matter now rests in the laps of the council's business license committee. Councilman Hart's suggestion for amending the city code was referred to that committee, which is headed by Mr. Hart.

## Rare Striped Bass Is Caught Here by 8-Year-Old Angler

Benjie Burton, of 27 N. Narcissa Dr., Portuguese Bend, is 8 years old and is not a bit bigger than you would expect him to be. Like most 8-year-old boys, he likes to fish.

Last Saturday his parents, who keep their boat at the Newport Harbor Yacht Landing on Bay Shores, brought Benjie with them for a family cruise around the harbor.

His dad, Wally Burton, formerly a resident of Corona del Mar, was getting the boat ready, but Benjie couldn't wait to wet his line. He baited up with a live minnow that someone on a nearby boat had given him and proceeded to fish from the slip. Pretty soon, Benjie had a bite, and a big one. He hooked the fish, too, on the little No. 6 hook he had tied to his 20-pound test monofilament line.

It was a monster fish on that line. It was almost a miracle, that fish—for it was a whopping striped bass, caught only very rarely in waters so far south.

AND—over at the Balboa Angling Club, it balanced the scales at 22 pounds, 2 ounces! It was 40 inches long, almost as long as Benjie is tall, and had a girth of 20 1/2 inches.

**• VOTE "NO" AND SAVE MONEY**

You folks are going to the polls next Tuesday to decide an important issue of principle. Vote "NO" to uphold the sound principle of paying your fair share for what you use.

As in all matters of principle, the result in the long run is for the benefit of all if the correct decision is made. The long range effect of retaining the trash and garbage collection charge will be to reduce the cost of this service for everybody. How else can you keep a sharp eye on spending except by getting an itemized account of the costs? The refuse charge does exactly that. And the result is more care in putting out your trash and garbage cans, and greater efficiency for the city crews.

Vote "NO" next Tuesday, and help keep our taxes down.

**• STAND ON YOUR OWN FEET**

Here's a personal tip to the Newport Harbor Chamber of Commerce: Why not drop the efforts to get city tax funds for Chamber projects, and stand on your own feet? The constant angling for tax money is undermining the gumption and self reliance of the Chamber, and dimming the enthusiasm for rallying in support of the Chamber.

The Newport Chamber can learn a lesson from its own Tourist Council, which is enterprisingly going about the task of raising its own money for promoting year-round business. The Corona del Mar Chamber directors (who are on record against asking for any tax money from the city) have commended the Tourist Council for its ingenuity and initiative with a resolution urging everyone to attend the Council's dinner-dance next Wednesday evening at the Jamaica Inn. Such enterprise deserves support.

Editor, Newport Harbor ENSIGN:

I believe the signers of the petition for initiative ordinance No. 878 HAVE BEEN MISLED! Surely they do not wish their taxes raised. They should have the facts and if they do they will vote NO at the special election June 2.

Why should we help pay the cost of trash disposal of those firms that create tons and tons of trash, yet pay only a portion of its cost under the UNMEASURED system? No measurable service to any home or business should be on your tax bill. The present plan of being billed only for the service rendered is the most equitable yet devised and in effect in 17 of 21 cities in Orange County.

If the voters force the trash collection charge on your property tax bill, then it would be just as logical to include your water service bill—a system long since discontinued here as an inequitable charge. Now you pay

only for the water used. Industry does the same. Why not pay only for the trash collected from your home? Industry should pay for ALL trash removed from their place of business.

Every home owner should be willing to pay for the small amount of trash picked up weekly from his residence, which cost in most instances is less than you would pay through your tax bill. Furthermore if this charge is placed on your property tax bill it will continue indefinitely, even though you close up your residence for any reason, or sublet or rent your property or have no trash to remove.

Your tax rate, on an annual basis, has been reduced to offset the service charge collected from all users, much or little. If you kill the present system, then your tax bill will go up to pay for the service, not only from your home but also to help pay for the service rendered the business houses where they create tons of waste material. Under the previous system the large user paid only a token amount of the cost. Do you wish again to add a part of his cost to your tax bill?

Were the signers told that their signature would force a special election at a cost of over \$5,000 to the tax payers, whereas the same question in the same form could be submitted in less than one year, in a regular election with no extra cost?

Were they led to believe their overall tax charge would be reduced if they signed? From personal experience I think the solicitation was very unfairly presented.

I will vote against Initiative Ordinance No. 878.

**ORDINANCE NO. 879**  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NEWPORT BEACH AMENDING SECTIONS 6101, 6301 AND 6302 OF THE NEWPORT BEACH MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO BUSINESS LICENSES AND PERMITS FOR CLOSING OUT SALES.

The City Council of the City of Newport Beach does ordain as follows:

**SECTION 1:** Section 6101 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read:

"SECTION 6101. License Required. Except when operating under a permit issued pursuant to Chapter 3 of this Article, no person, either for himself or any other person, shall operate any business specified in this Article, in the City, without first having obtained a license from the City to do so, or without complying with any and all regulations of such business contained in this Article; and the carrying on of any such business without first having obtained a license from the City to do so, or without complying with any and all regulations of such business contained in this Article, shall constitute a separate violation of this Article for each and every day that such business is so carried on."

**SECTION 2:** Section 6301 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read:

"SECTION 6301. Application. (a) Every person carrying on a sale as specified in Section 6300 of this Chapter shall make a written application to the City for a permit so to do. Said application shall be signed and sworn to by said applicant, and shall state all the facts in regard to the contemplated sale, the period of time during which said sale shall be held, said period not to exceed three (3) months, together with a statement that no goods, wares and merchandise have been purchased or received during the period of thirty (30) days immediately preceding the date of such application for the purpose of adding same to that in stock for sale, and the reason for such sale. The application shall be accompanied by an inventory of goods, showing the actual purchase price, the names of persons from whom such goods were obtained, the date of purchase, the date of delivery of such goods, and all details necessary to identify fully the goods to be sold. (b) The Director of Finance shall accept and file said application and shall endorse thereon the date such permit is granted or refused. (c) No person shall make a false statement in such application. (d) The applicant shall submit with his application a corporate surety bond payable to the City of Newport Beach in the penal sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000), conditioned upon compliance with the provisions of this Chapter."

**SECTION 3:** Section 6302 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read:  
"SECTION 6302. Permit Fee. (a) Every person carrying on a sale as specified in Section 6300 of this Chapter shall pay a permit fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50) for a period of one month in advance. If, at any time during the said one month period, a sworn application shall be filed with the City making it appear that all of the goods in the original inventory have not been sold, accompanied by an inventory of what remains, showing actual purchase price, a supplemental permit may be issued, at the discretion of the City Council, upon compliance by the applicant with the requirements of the original permit, and upon the payment of an additional permit fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50) per month to continue in effect for an additional period not exceeding two (2) months. (b) A permit issued under the provisions of this Chapter shall be valid only for the inventoried goods. (c) A permit issued under the provisions of this Chapter shall not be transferable. (d) A person being issued a permit under the provisions of this Chapter shall at the time the permit is issued surrender the business license issued to him for the business being discontinued. (e) A permit issued under the provisions of this Chapter is subject to immediate revocation by the City Manager upon a determination by him that the permittee is operating contrary to or has violated any provision of this Chapter. The decision of the City Manager may be appealed to the City Council, and its decision is final. A permit issued under the provisions of this Chapter may be revoked and may thereafter be reinstated by the City Council in accordance with the procedure for revocation and reinstatement of business licenses set out in Section 6111 of this Code."

# New Closing-Out Sale Ordinance Is Adopted

The Newport Beach City Council gave final approval Monday evening to Ordinance 879, which allows businesses to hold closing out sales without paying a high license fee.

Under this new ordinance, the merchant surrenders his business license and takes out a special permit for \$50 for 30 days, renewable for 2 additional 30-day periods at \$50 each. The merchant must submit an inventory of goods and must post a \$1,000 surety bond to guarantee compliance with the ordinance.

The old ordinance called for \$25 a day for 30 days, payable in advance a total of \$750.

The Council also:

• Agreed to share in the cost of traffic signals at the Irvine Ave. intersection with Westcliff Dr.-17th St., at the request of the Costa Mesa City Council. Each city will pay \$5,040.

• Directed the city manager to make a survey to determine if traffic signals are needed at 32nd St. and Newport Blvd., near the Newport Beach City Hall.

• Designated the city manager as the city's agent in obtaining housing and land use data block by block when the federal census is taken next year. This additional information will cost the city \$1,500.

• Authorized the purchase of up to date aerial maps for \$450.

• Assigned the \$26.10 outstanding 1957 water account of Francis McEachen to the Retail Merchants Credit Assn. for probable litigation for collection.

• Called for bids, to be opened June 18, for storm drainage improvements on Balboa Blvd. and 26th St., West Newport.

• Awarded the contract for street lighting improvements on Irvine Ave., Mariners Dr. and Dover Dr., in the Harbor Highlands-Westcliff area, to E. D. Johnson Co. on the low bid of \$9,018.

• Awarded the contract to remove weeds from vacant lots to

Watts and Smith at the cost of \$1,727.50.

• Approved first reading of Ordinance 882, rezoning the Corona del Mar beach park to unclassified.

• Requested the county to amend the master plan of shoreline development to include underwater lots near the Corona del Mar beach so these lots can be purchased by the state for development of "Pirate Cove" as a still water bathing beach.

• Authorized the expenditure of \$600 to paint and plaster public restrooms in Balboa.

• Rejected all bids for police building wing because the square foot cost of \$22-\$24 was considered excessive; called for new plans for frame and stucco construction, rather than Class A. Bids will be called for the third time. O. Z. Robertson was declared low bidder in the second bidding with \$107,888 after James Ray was allowed to withdraw his \$99,387 bid because of a \$10,000 error.

• Adopted Resolution 5008 ordering the improvement of Margaret Dr. in the block across from Harbor High School, called for bids, to be turned in by 10:30 a.m. Thursday, June 18.

• Instructed the city manager to prepare a memo on the steps to be followed to complete the widening of Margaret Dr. through the block, going through a portion of John Vogel's property near the center of the block.

• Authorized the filing of a petition by Cliff Haven residents with the Newport Heights Irrigation District for exclusion from that district. The city has worked out arrangements for taking Cliff Haven into the city water system.

## Widow's Right Not to Sell Her Property Upheld by City

Mrs. Marcella Black's right to be stubborn about holding on to her property was upheld Monday evening by the Newport Beach City Council.  
 Mrs. Black, a widow, had protested the Planning Commission approval of new setback lines at 31st St. and Lafayette Ave., designed for widening the entrance to Lido Peninsula.  
 Through her attorney, Max Hurwitz, she said the street widening would take away almost half of her property at the northeast corner of the intersection.  
 "This is forcing her to sell her property," Mr. Hurwitz said. "She should have the right to hold on to it. George Buccola (who is building a multi-story apartment on the peninsula) is negotiating to buy the property, and that is not a concern of the Council."  
 John Curci, part owner of Lido Peninsula, said that very fair offers had been made to Mrs. Black, including trading properties, but she has refused to sell. "She has nuisance value, and that's all," said Mr. Curci.  
 Councilman Hans Lorenz said he had been told of efforts to buy property at the intersection for widening the street. He said the property owners were told that if they would not be willing to sell, the city would be asked to condemn their property.  
 Mayor James Stoddard remarked that it is Mrs. Black's constitutional right not to sell.  
 The Council unanimously overruled the Planning Commission decision.

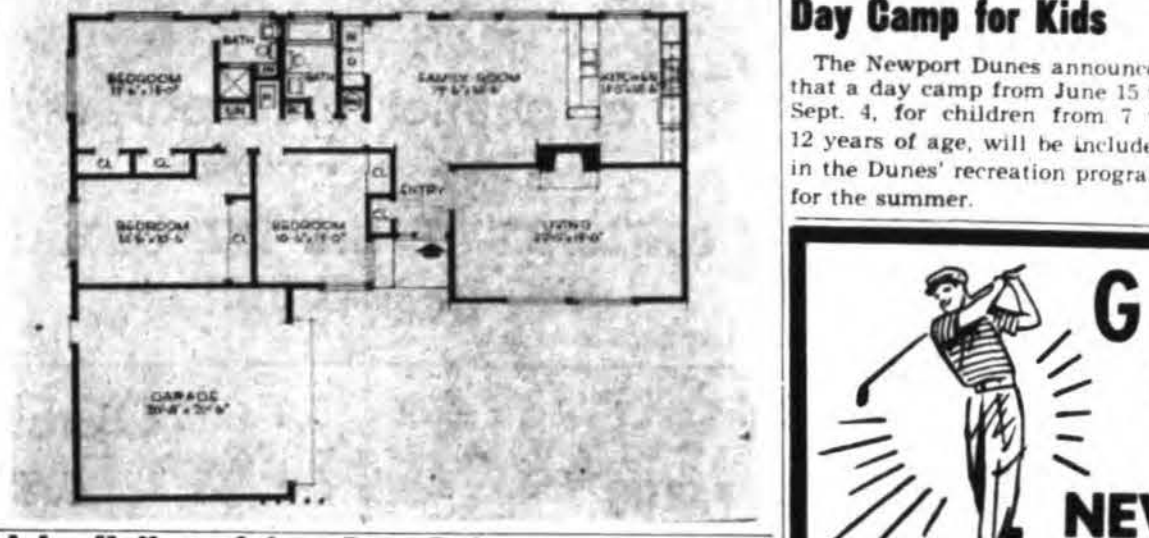
