'Filthy show' is protested

The 29th District of the American Legion has gone on record protesting what it describes as "2 hours of solid filth" presented on the UCI campus by the San Francisco Mime Troupe last May 6.

The letter of protest is signed by Fred Beck, 29th District commander, and Sherman Hart, counter-subversive chairman for the 29th District. Mr. Beck is past commander of Newport Harbor Legion Post 291, and Mr. Hart is presently serving as 291 commander.

(Editor's note: The affidavit mentioned in the following letter describes the Mime Troupe presentation in Campus Hall at UCI. The obscenity is too shocking to be printed in a newspaper.)

Here is the text of the letter from the Legion: "Attached is Mrs. James Knip's affidavit of an incredibly obscene performance by a professional troupe before a mixed audience of several hundred, principally young people, on the University of California Irvine Campus. Our attorney holds like affidavits given by additional witnesses to this same performance.

"Chancellor Aldrich of Irvine Campus admitted to two reliable people that he knew in advance that this show contained obscene material. Further, I understand the same show was previously given on the Berkeley and Davis Campuses, and possibly others.

"The issue is simply whether these several performances should have been permitted on University property supported by your taxes — and not whether equally obscene shows can be seen in the tenderloin districts of large cities.

"Judge for yourself whether these performances, containing two hours of solid filth, were the easily foreseeable consequence of the University's hesitancy to deal firmly with the 'Free Speech' and 'Filthy Speech' movement at Berkeley a couple of years ago.

"You are heavily taxed to build these campuses and to pay University salaries. If you like such flagrant obscenity, then raise no objection and rest assured it will continue as you desire — and probably touch State College campuses if it hasn't already. If you disapprove, there is a way to stop it.

"WHAT CAN WE DO????? "The only kind of protest the UC Administration... will heed is the threat to curtail the appropriation for each campus, annually made by the Legislature. Never forget it's your tax money they appropriate.

"Candidates for state senator and assemblyman are now campaigning for your votes in November. When they speak at your neighborhood meetings demand that they commit themselves on the following issues: Will or won't they

promise to reduce sharply the legislative appropriation for any University or State College campus which permits flagrant obscenity?

"If the chancellors claim they are in doubt about what constitutes flagrant obscenity they can easily learn from their district or city attorney. Local ordinances have long existed, as you well know.

"Remind whoever bleats 'Censorship!' that it's only because the UC Administration has demonstrated its own incapability of exer-

SCHOOL BONDS DEFEATED; TAX OVER-RIDE IS OK'D

NEW POLICE HQ URGED

A bigger police headquarters building is needed, Police Chief Jim Glavas of Newport Beach said Monday at the monthly meeting of the Newport Harbor Chamber of Commerce directors at Barron's restaurant.

"We are crowded and cramped in our present building," he said. "We could increase our effectiveness in a new structure.

A bond issue may be required to finance a new building, he added.

Chief Glavas made this plea for bigger facilities at the conclusion of his report on police activities of the past year. He noted that crime was down 3% in 1965 from the year before in Newport Beach, based on statistics on 7 major offenses. There was an 8.6% increase throughout California and 13.9% in the nation during the same period, he stated.

The chief said that the downward trend is continuing this year in Newport Beach, noting a further reduction of 1½% as of August.

"There has been an improved compliance with the law during the last 8 months," he said. "But there is one sad feature — an increase in assaults of police officers by those who are being arrested."

Commenting on the surfboard licensing law, he had personal misgivings when the law was enacted, but now finds that the effect has been excellent. "Thefts of surfboards has been cut 50% and the registration has helped in the recovery and return of stolen boards," he said.

The chief's review of the year also included these comments: Criminal abatement procedure has been an effective instrument in dealing with loud parties and disturbances. Malicious mischief cases are down 7%. Addition of uniformed patrol has improved the tight control of beaches. Harbor patrolling by boat has been very effective in curtailing beach incidents. Traffic control on the whole has been good. The Penin-

School site action delayed

Newport-Mesa Unified School District board members voted Tuesday evening to withhold authorization of condemnation proceedings for a school in East Bluff. They also delayed action on a contract with Raub, Bein, Frost and Associates for engineering studies for street improvements, sewage and a pumping station at Bayside Drive, for the school site.

Board member Roderick H. MacMillan moved for postponement of any action on the school site. He asked for more time to make further studies of the site.

Lloyd E. Blanpied Jr., in his first comment as a new board member, moved to empower Supt. Leland Newcomer to confer with the engineering firm, instead of awarding contracts to do studies of the 3 off site developments at the proposed school site.

Mr. Blanpied pointed to 3 undesirable parts of the engineering agreements: "There is no program of commencement of their services; 10 days after the job is completed, the District must pay the bill or a 10% fee is added; and if the District should default

Bond vote is 59% yes

Voters in the Newport-Mesa Unified School District Tuesday, Sept. 20, turned down a \$11.8 million school bond measure and approved a 41-cent school tax override proposal.

The total voter turnout for the school bond measure was 10,176 in favor (59%) and 7,040 opposed. A two-thirds majority, 66 2/3%, was required for approval.

The defeated school bond measure would have provided money for a 916,000 square foot district service building complex, a continuation high school facility, renovation of Newport Harbor High School and 2 elementary schools, 1 of them in the "C" area, north of Corona del Mar.

The approved tax override proposal vote was 9,095 in favor and 8,082 opposed. A simple majority vote was required for approval.

Affect of the override will not be felt until next year. At that time 24¢ will be added to the base tax bill. This will provide for a smoothing out of some inequalities in programs and services which have resulted from the recent unification. The full 41 cents will be on the tax bill for 1969-70. James W. Peyton, school board president, said the failure of the school bond measure is a reflection of the times.

"There is a taxpayer revolt all over the state," he said. "And schools, which is the last place where people have any say, are the target."

Supt. Leland Newcomer said yesterday that he plans to introduce 3 possible alternatives to school board members to handle the classroom shortage which he expects next year as a result of the school bond failure.

"There are 3 ways to handle overcrowding," he said. "You can have double sessions; you can overcrowd classrooms; or, and I prefer this way, you can go to a split session."

"A split session would start some students at 7 a.m. and some at 11 a.m. This would be only for the junior and high schools. The result would be that parents would not know when their children were getting out; but it would ease our bussing problem.

"We are now attempting to handle all students at once. We wouldn't have to do this if we were in a split session."

J. EDGAR HOOVER OFFERS TIMELY COMMENT

"Faith and Freedom" is a timely article in the August issue of "The King's Business," a monthly magazine of the Bible Institute of Los Angeles. The author is J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Here are important excerpts:

By J. Edgar Hoover

TODAY, our priceless heritage of freedom is under relentless attacks both at home and abroad. In the jungles and rice fields of Southeast Asia, Americans in uniform maintain a constant vigil against the Communist hordes of a modern-day Genghis Khan to whom no commodity is cheaper than human life.

In Europe and the Near East, our country's patience and determination are constantly strained by the taunts and provocations of Iron Curtain slave masters who talk of peace while clandestinely plotting to spread their godless creed of Utopia-in-chains.

Throughout Central and South America, we have had to erect guard posts of freedom against the sinister efforts of Communist henchmen to spread the malignant cancer of Marxism across the Western Hemisphere. Not only have we seen the results of their treachery in Cuba, but the Dominican Republic could be a Marxist satellite today were it not for the fast action taken by a courageous President and alert Americans to thwart a Communist take-over there earlier this year.

The Communists speak of peace, but peace at an exorbitant and heart-rending price—submission to Communist domination.

YET, in country after country, there still remain the legions of uninformed, misinformed and politically naive who are the non-Communist dupes and fellow travelers whom the Communists rely upon to carry forward their programs for world domination.

We find these dupes in shocking abundance here in our own United States where Gus Hall, the Moscow-trained General Secretary of the Communist Party, USA, boasted to newsmen last fall that there are approximately 100,000 Americans within the Party's influence. About 10 per cent of them, he said, are dues-paying members. The remainder he described as close sympathizers.

These sympathizers include growing numbers of young people because the major target of Communist propaganda and exploitation in the United States today is the Nation's youth.

Today, as never before, the Communists are confident of their ability to win recruits among this country's youth. That is why the Party has placed such intense emphasis upon its campus speech program—a program that has seen skilled hucksters of atheism and treason appear at scores of colleges and universities from New York to California, without objection by the authorities of those institutions of higher learning and often with positive encouragement by members of the faculties of such universities.

THE COMMUNIST movement, Communist regimes, and those who knowingly support them are really ultrareactionary. They are the worst enemies of freedom and social justice.

Our university professors and students would serve their country and professions with fruitful distinction if they were to study this historic development and become not only academic but dynamic fighters against the Communist drive to dominate the world and impose on mankind the Soviet system of tyranny.

It is one of the glaring contradictions of our day that the same Communist spokesmen who are so glib-tongued in their appearances before groups of college students immediately lose their voices when placed under oath in a court of law or before a Committee of Congress.

I have also become increasingly concerned about the influence wielded upon the impressionable minds of our youth by some so-called educators.

Civil disobedience is not, and must not become, an accepted norm of behavior in a society of free men. It leads to anarchy and pre-empts all possibility of rational discussion or appeal.

No longer can respectable citizens complacently stand by while celebrity status is accorded those sick minds and corrupt souls who tamper with and ridicule our orderly processes of government under law.

What has happened to the civic pride, the righteous indignation, of otherwise respectable citizens who turn their backs on helpless victims of beatings, robberies and sex crimes? The incredibly indifferent attitude of these people is exacting a heavy toll. It has helped to turn the streets and parks of many cities into virtual jungles of fear where, according to a recent survey, nearly one half of the residents are afraid to walk alone at night.

Despite the continuing efforts of some self-professed "experts" to minimize the crime problem, the undeniable fact remains that crime is increasing—in both numbers and intensity—at an alarming rate. It is growing six times as fast as our expanding population.

Today, the onslaught continues—with five serious offenses being recorded every minute. There is a vicious crime of violence—a murder, forcible rape or assault to kill—every 2½ minutes; a robbery, every five minutes; a burglary, every 28 seconds; and 52 automobiles are stolen every hour.

TODAY, there is a most urgent need for Americans to rededicate themselves to the strong moral principles upon which our Nation was founded.

Faith dominated the atmosphere at Independence Hall in Philadelphia where the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution were framed.

Faith is our mainstay in the ideological struggle now raging between the camps of godless Communism and human freedom.

America will continue to progress in dignity and freedom so long as our people cherish liberty and justice and truth and honor God.

Faith in God. That is the fortress of free men.

Movies now feature lesbianism (*The Group*) child molestation (*The Monk*), and bare breasts (*The Pawnbroker*). Unlike in the olden days—ten years ago—the sinners aren't punished, they're gratified.

In the movie *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* there are eleven "God-damns," seven "bastards," two "sons of bitches," along with "several" "f--- you's" and "hump the bastards."

A favorite occupational hazard while waiting for planes in airports is to browse the newstand counters to see what's new in pornography. Today I picked up a magazine which carried an article called "Renewed Vigor." It described the sex play which "stands" provide the loss of the first virginity. From the other virginity barriers which should be broken—every conceivable kind of sexual contact between male and female, then between the same sexes, and then on a group basis.

The newstands are filled with incredible

unforgivable filth. Why don't we do something about it? Why don't we demand that our legislators get legislation passed to remove pornography from government property? Why don't we boycott all stores which sell pornography?

One night recently a Nashville, Tenn. police sergeant—a courageous Christian, family man—became afraid of "Virginia Woolf" and arrested the theater manager and closed the movie. The judge threw the case out of court; the movie manager is suing the policeman for \$50,000; the movie is a sell-out and "that crazy cop" may be lucky to escape a mental institution. Even many who are sympathetic say: "He didn't go about it right. He should have reported to his superiors."

That's a laugh. In Nashville, four blocks from police headquarters and the mayor's office is a strip called "The Alley," wide open for gambling, strip tease, drinks over the counter (illegal here) and you-name-it. The Alley pays off somebody handsomely, while the mayor proclaims that the thing doesn't exist and the newspapers take the pornographic advertisements of all the illegal establishments and promote an "open town" to attract conventions.

What's the answer? It's in II Chronicles 7:14: "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from Heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land."



STATE ROUNDUP

Now that the general election campaign is well underway, most candidates for public office may soon expect to receive questionnaires regarding their position on certain issues, and invitations to speak or debate, from the League of Women Voters.

Many legislators or candidates for legislative office whose consistent purpose is to limit the growth and power of government no longer respond to any requests or invitations from the League of Women Voters. I shall not respond to any of them, my reasons follow.

Personal experience with legislative lobbying by the League of Women Voters and study of the activities and organizational structure of the League has convinced me that it is committed to enlarging the size and power of centralized government. In pursuit of this goal, the League's National Board recommends policy and endorses legislation with no meaningful attempt to ascertain the views of local members.

The League's National Board also drafts the questionnaires directed to legislative candidates. The obviously loaded questions invariably assume that problems exist in nearly every area of American life which only bigger government and higher taxes can "solve."

The League of Women Voters and its members certainly have a right to agitate for more government. But any fair-minded person must strongly object to such agitation under the guise of non-partisanship and objectivity.

In practice, the League of Women Voters is about as non-partisan and objective as the Americans for Democratic Action. Its "educational materials" consistently ignore or ridicule the thoughtful conviction of millions of Americans who believe that government must be restrained and taxes cut. The League's materials have little or nothing to say about the goals and tactics of international communism.

Here in California, the League of Women Voters has campaigned actively against the Liberty Amendment, which would eliminate the federal personal income tax, and against Proposition 13, which was intended to protect every owner's right to sell or rent his property to persons of his own choice. No fair hearing was ever given by the League to supporters of these two measures, nor due consideration to their arguments.

"D Day," Sept. 24.

Dr. Carl McIntire, broadcasting on the 20th Century Reformation Hour Tuesday morning, announced that it will be "D Day" in Harrisburg, the capitol of Pennsylvania, this Saturday. On that occasion, he has expressed the hope that 30,000 believers in religious freedom will gather to give a present day demonstration of the principles on which the State, and the United States, for that matter was founded.

The war against religious intolerance which William Penn waged years ago, will be reincarnated in the current fight against Resolution No. 160 passed by the Pennsylvania Legislature, which censured Dr. McIntire, his ministry, and the American Council of Christian Churches, of which he is the acknowledged leader.

A build-up for "D Day" was to be accomplished on Tuesday of this week, by a 7½ hour marathon radio broadcast over the New Jersey radio station, WJUR and dedicated to the perpetuation of religious freedom. This, it was hoped, would be featured by trans-Atlantic telephone message to be delivered by Mrs. Paisley, wife of Rev. Paisley, who with two companion ministers, is held in jail in Belfast, Ireland, on a charge of taking part in an unlawful assembly. This charge, according to Dr. McIntire, has been denied, the real reasons being that the prisoners had advocated religious freedom.

Of historical interest was to be the address by Mrs. Carl McIntire, relating the fight carried on in England by William Penn, in the course of which he was im-

prisoned on several occasions. On one of these occasions, he wrote the famous religious treatise: "The Great Faith of Liberty of Conscience."

Concerning this presentation, Dr. McIntire said, "All you would have to do would be to change a few names and you would set the modern stage for the present-day fight against religious intolerance right here in the State of Pennsylvania."

These two outstanding programs are the high points of a series of "cow pasture" rallies conducted throughout the State of Pennsylvania, in which Dr. McIntire has brought home to the people in the pews current examples of religious intolerance and religious persecution.

He has cited two other areas in which Christians are being persecuted. One is in India, where thousands of believers have been shut out from their churches because they chose to withdraw from participation in the One-World Church movement. He took up their cause and carried the fight to churches in high places in England, hoping to make it possible for the churches to be reopened.

The other area is in Ireland, where 3 ministers now are in prison for opposing religious intolerance. One of them is Rev. Paisley, whom Dr. McIntire visited

in jail during his recent trip to Europe.

Dr. McIntire has told his radio audiences that "there is a time to pray and a time to fight," now being the time to fight for a continuance of religious liberty for which our forefathers fought when they laid the foundations for our nation.

"D Day" will be marked by three "D's": Dedication to the cause of freedom to worship and freedom to pray; Demonstration of the desire to fight for the cause; and Decision to carry the fight to a final victory.

Dr. McIntire offers for this week a packet containing a "Short History of Puritanism," which will be sent those who write to him, care of 20th Century Reformation Hour, Collingswood, New Jersey, 08108. He is to be heard over KBBJ (fm), 107.5 at 7:00 a.m., and over XEMO (860) at 11:00 a.m., Mondays to Fridays.

Americans have begun to fight and they are proud of it. Dr. Steuart McBirnie, the Voice of Americanism, broadcasts over KIEV (870) at 8:45 a.m., and over XEMO (860) at 10:09 a.m. and 7:15 Mondays to Saturdays, with the 10:00 a.m. broadcast moved ahead to 9:30 a.m. on Saturdays.

MEDICARE COSTS COME HOME TO ROOST

Speaking as the number two man in Great Society, Vice President Hubert Humphrey told Americans not to look to Washington "for everything" the other day. In a speech the vice president called for a revitalization of local and state government and a rekindling of the inventive spark of private enterprise. Good words... conservative words... but they were uttered at the same time that his Administration was deeply embroiled in Big Government, harassment of private enterprise, and the penalizing of the private individual.

Perhaps these words were spoken to offset in a way the effect of a recent speech read—politicians read a lot of speeches they haven't written—by the vice president in which he gave verbal support to rioting in the name of civil rights and in which he said that he still had within him enough sparkle for one more good revolution. However, the ordinary American who is sponsoring the so-called Medicare program has had some disquieting moments with the disclosure that Medicare is working all ends against the middle.

Medicare, true to the predictions of some "extremists" in the medical profession a few years ago, is just another method of taking funds from one group and giving those funds (or the benefits therefrom) to someone else. Locally, it has been noted that hospital charges have been boosted. Outragedly, the increase went to the nurses who have been asking for a salary increase for some time. In reality, much of the money has been diverted in an effort to make up for a disturbing deficit in the Medicare program. For example, where some privately-paid health insurance programs pay the hospital on a formula of cost plus six per cent, Medicare has arbitrarily established a formula of cost MINUS 13 per cent. Meanwhile, the ratio of over-65 patients has risen markedly.

The results of all this are: 1. Hospitals actually lose money on Medicare patients; 2. Non-Medicare patients must pay more for hospital care to balance the hospital Medicare losses; 3. Nurses must work harder, handle more patients, while receiving a small increase; 4. Non-Medicare patients are receiving less nursing care for a higher per-day charge; 5. Medicare patients acquire a higher degree of dependency upon the federal government, supposedly the source of the Medicare funds; 6. Funds coming from Social Security for Medicare sponsorship jeopardize the future Social Security benefits of the full-pay non-Medicare patients.

Medicare is a form of Socialized Medicine and like all forms of socialism, it robs one segment of society in order to buy the votes of another—usually numerically larger—segment of society. In California, it has brought a rise in hospital costs and charges, an increase passed on to non-Medicare patients at a time when they need a little consideration instead of an increase in charges.

Someone has written that government can give away only what it already has taken from you or someone else. Isn't it about time for a change?

Savings-Loan nears
its 30th anniversary

Newport Balboa Savings and Loan Assn. is preparing to observe its 30th anniversary.

It was on Oct. 21, 1936, that the pioneer firm was founded by Paul A. Palmer, now chairman of the board, and Miss Agnes Blomquist, now president.

Three other members of the original board of directors of 30 years ago are still serving on the board — Joseph A. Beek, Walter S. Spicer, and Ralph P. Maskey.

Death has claimed the other 2 founding members of the firm—publisher Samuel A. Meyer and hardware store owner Charles W. TeWinkle.

The association was capitalized at \$13,500 when it opened for business in 1936. Now, assets are in excess of \$100 million.

Mr. Palmer relates that the firm might never have been organized if it were not for the fact that funds for property improvement and home building were scarce in Orange County during the thirties. He says that it was because of this fact, and because of the founders' faith in the future of the Harbor Area that the association was formed and money was made available to pioneer the development of the community.

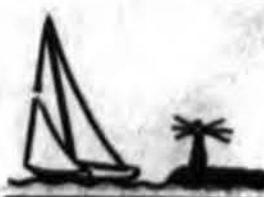

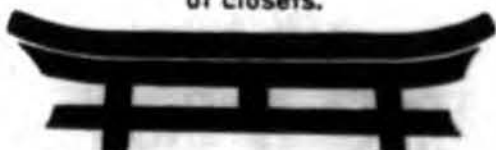

Lopez answered the police by crawling out a window on the opposite side of the room and running east on 31st St., with officers Smith and Hudson yelling for him to stop.

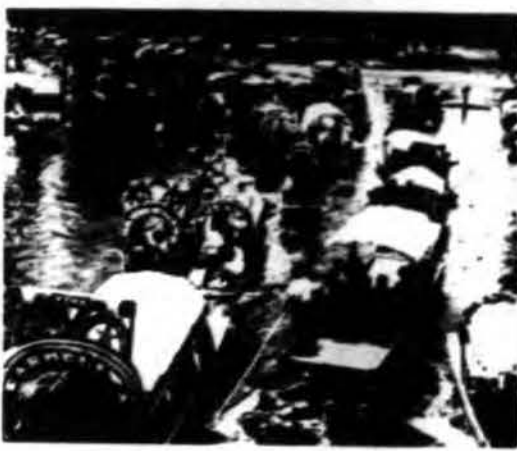

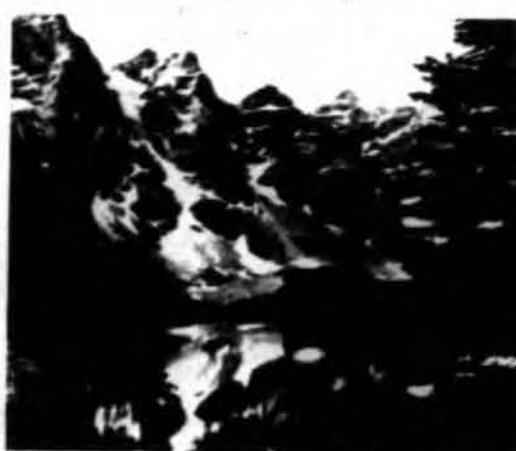

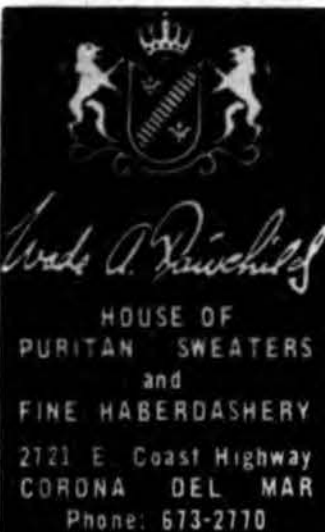
Sears aids Clinic

CATARACT

Q. Is there any medical treatment for cataract?

A. The only recommended method of treatment for senile cataract is surgical. The objective of any cataract operation is to remove the clouded or defective lens. Cataract surgery, usually conducted under local anesthesia, is highly successful, with good results being reported in over 90 per cent of cases.

FOOD POISONING

Q. What is the difference between food poisoning and ptomaine poisoning?

A. True food poisoning (enterotoxigenesis) results from eating food in which bacteria have produced a toxin or poisonous substance. (Intestinal infection may also be caused by food containing live bacteria, which multiply and produce disease.) Many years ago food poisoning was thought to be due to harmful products ("ptomaines") produced by bacterial action on the proteins in decomposing food. This theory is no longer accepted because modern refrigeration has virtually eliminated decomposition and because specific toxins or poisons produced by contaminating bacteria in food can now be identified.

ORDINANCE NO. 1179 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NEWPORT BEACH REPEALING SECTION 3.08.030 OF, AND ADDING A NEW SECTION 3.08.030 TO, THE NEWPORT BEACH MUNICIPAL CODE TRANSFERRING PROPERTY TAX DUTIES TO THE COUNTY.

PREAMBLE: WHEREAS, on the 29th day of September, 1952, the City Council of the City of Newport Beach adopted Ordinance No. 674 providing for the transfer to the County of Orange of the assessment, equalization and collection of City property taxes by which Section 2602 was added to the 1949 Newport Beach Municipal Code and was subsequently re-codified in the 1966 Municipal Code as Section 3.08.030; and

WHEREAS, at the time Ordinance No. 674 was adopted, the City of Newport Beach was a general law city; and

WHEREAS, on January 7, 1955, the City of Newport Beach became a chartered city in accordance with the provisions of Section 8 of Article 11 of the Constitution of the State of California; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 674 was adopted pursuant to the authority for transfer of city tax functions as provided in Article 1, Chapter 2, Division 1, Title 5, of the Government Code of the State of California; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to utilize the alternative method for transfer by chartered cities of city tax functions to a county as provided in said Article 2 by repealing Section 2602 added to the 1949 Newport Beach Municipal Code by Ordinance No. 674, as re-codified in the 1966 Municipal Code as Section 3.08.030, and enacting a new

LEGAL NOTICE

Section 3.08.030 transferring said city tax functions pursuant to the authority of said Article 2;

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Newport Beach does ordain as follows: SECTION 1. Section 3.08.030 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is repealed.

SECTION 2. A new Section 3.08.030 is added to the Newport Beach Municipal Code to read: "3.08.030 Property Tax Duties Transferred to County. Pursuant to the provisions of Article 2, Chapter 2, Division 1, Title 5, of the Government Code of the State of California, the City of Newport Beach hereby elects that the following duties be performed by the appropriate officers of Orange County:

(a) The assessment of City property for City taxes.

(b) The equalization and correction of the assessment of City taxes.

(c) The collection, payment, and enforcement of the City taxes, including delinquent taxes.

(d) The redemption of property from sale or other penalty for nonpayment of City taxes.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be published once in the official newspaper of the City, and the same shall be effective 30 days after the date of its adoption.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Newport Beach held on the 22nd day of August, 1966, and was adopted on the 12th day of September, 1966, by the following vote, to-wit:

When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular number include the plural number. The word 'shall' is always mandatory and not merely directory."

The term 'gross annual receipts' shall mean any and all compensation in the form of gross rental and/or service receipts, including initial installation charges, received directly or indirectly from subscribers or users in payment for CATV services received within the City.

Gross annual receipts shall not include any taxes on services furnished by the grantee imposed directly on any subscriber or used by any city, state or other governmental unit and collected by the grantee for such governmental unit.

(h) FRANCHISE AREA. The term 'franchise area' shall mean the territory within the City throughout which grantee shall be authorized to construct, maintain and operate its system and shall include any enlargements thereof and additions thereto.

SECTION 2. Section 5.44.030 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read:

"5.44.030 Uses Permitted. Any franchise granted pursuant to the provisions of this chapter shall authorize and permit the grantee to engage in the business of operating and providing a CATV system in the City of Newport Beach and for that purpose to erect, install, construct, operate, repair, replace, reconstruct, maintain and retain in, on, over, under, upon, across and along any public highway, street, alley, public way or public place, such poles, wires, cables, conduits, ducts, rods, poles, masts, manholes, amplifiers, appliances, attachments and other property as may be necessary and appurtenant to the CATV system; and, in addition, to use, operate and provide similar facilities on properties rented or leased from other persons, firms or corporations including, but not limited to, a public utility or other person, firm or corporation, or to lease, sublease or permit to do business in the City of Newport Beach.

The grantee shall have the authority to promulgate such rules, regulations, terms and conditions governing the conduct of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable it to exercise its rights and perform its obligations under the franchise, and to insure an uninterrupted service to each and all of its customers; provided, however, that such rules, regulations, terms and conditions shall not be in conflict with the provisions hereof or of the laws of the City of Newport Beach, the State of California or the United States of America.

The grantee shall have authority to trim trees upon and overhanging streets, alleys, sidewalks and public places of the City so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coming in contact with the wires and cables of grantee, all trimming to be done under the supervision and direction of the City, and at the expense of grantee."

SECTION 3. Section 5.44.035 is added to the Newport Beach Municipal Code to read:

"5.44.035 Regulation of Rates and Fees. (a) The City Council shall at all times and from time to time during the term of any franchise granted hereunder have the power to and shall adopt and enforce, and grantee shall conform to, rules and regulations of the Council governing and establishing reasonable rates, regu-

lations, and standards of performance pertaining to the system of grantee.

(b) At the time of the granting of any franchise hereunder, the City Council shall establish, or approve all rates and charges payable to grantee, including but not limited to, all such rates and charges for installation of equipment, service charges for all classifications of service, including additional connections at one location and any other rates or charges of grantee to subscribers; and no such rates or charges shall be changed at any time after the granting of a franchise, except by authority of the Council, and upon written request of the grantee; provided, that prior to authorizing the change of any rates or charges of grantee to subscribers, at any time after the granting of such franchise, the Council shall first pass its resolution of intent to do so, describing and stating any rates or charges to be changed, the reasons of the Council therefor, fixing a day, hour and place certain when and where any persons having an interest therein may appear before the Council and be heard and directing the City Clerk to publish said resolution at least once, within fifteen (15) days of the passage thereof. The City Clerk shall cause such resolution to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the City, and the same shall be published and a copy thereof shall be mailed to any grantee hereunder ten (10) days prior to the date specified for hearing thereon. At the time set for such hearing, or at any adjournment thereof, the Council shall proceed to hear and pass on all presentations made before it, and the decision of the Council thereon shall be final and conclusive.

The Council shall find that the changing of rates or charges of grantee to subscribers will not be detrimental or injurious to the best interests and welfare of the subscribers and of the City, then the Council may, by resolution, authorize the change of any rates or charges of grantee to subscribers as shall be deemed reasonable by the Council in the premises; and such resolution shall thereupon become a part of any franchise granted hereunder and affected thereby."

SECTION 4. Section 5.44.040 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read:

"5.44.040 Duration of Franchise. Any franchise granted by the City Council pursuant to this chapter shall be for a term of not more than ten (10) years nor more than twenty (20) years following the date of acceptance of such franchise by the grantee or renewal thereof. Any such franchise may be terminated prior to its date of expiration by the City Council in the event that said Council shall have found, after thirty (30) days' notice of proposed termination and public hearing, that (a) the grantee has failed to comply with any provision of this chapter, or has, by act or omission, violated any term or condition of its franchise or permit issued under this chapter; or (b) any provision of this chapter has become invalid or unenforceable, and the Council further finds that such provision constitutes a substantial material to the grant of said franchise; or (c) the City acquires the CATV property of grantee."

SECTION 5. Section 5.44.050 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read:

"5.44.050 Franchise Payments. (a) ACCEPTANCE FEE. The grantee under any franchise granted pursuant to this chapter shall pay to the City upon acceptance of such franchise a fee certain in an amount to be determined or approved by the City Council.

(b) ANNUAL FRANCHISE FEE. The grantee of any franchise under this chapter shall pay annually to the City during the life of the franchise a fixed percentage of the gross receipts of the grantee derived from subscribers within the City. Such percentage shall be at least 3% and shall be established by the City Council for the life of the franchise by specifying such percentage in the ordinance granting the franchise.

The grantee shall file with the City within thirty (30) days after the expiration of any calendar year during which such franchise is in force, a financial statement prepared by a certified public accountant showing in detail the gross annual receipts, as defined herein, of grantee, its successors and assigns, during the preceding calendar year. It shall be the duty of grantee to pay to the City within ten (10) days after the time for filing such statement, any unpaid balance for the calendar year covered by such statement.

In the event that the above payment is not received by the City within the specified time, grantee shall pay to the City a penalty of two percent (2%) per month on the unpaid balance in addition thereto.

In any year or portion thereof of commencing at the conclusion of the first year that service is provided during which payments to grantee for installation and services amount to less than Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500) per month, grantee shall pay to the City a minimum amount of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month.

The flare was taken from among several which were in a file cabinet in the garage.

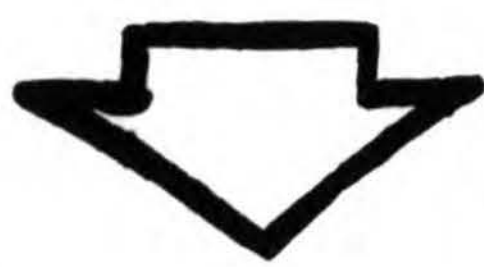

Mrs. Comer believes the theft occurred between June 15 and July 1.

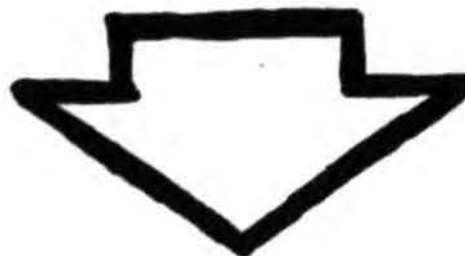
