## 'Filthy show' is protested

The 29th District of the American Legion has gone on record protesting what it describes as "2 hours of solid filth" presented on the UCI campus by the San Francisco Mime Troupe last May 6.

The letter of protest is signed by Fred Beck, 29th District commander, and Sherman Hart, counter-subversive chairman for the 29th District. Mr. Beck is past commander of Newport Harbor Legion Post 291, and Mr. Hart is presently serving as 291 commander.

(Editor's note: The affidavit mentioned in the following letter describes the Mime Troupe presentation in Campus Hall at UCI. The obscenity is too shocking to be printed in a newspaper.)

Here is the text of the letter from the Legion:

"Attached is Mrs. James Kniep's affidavit of an incredibly obscene performance by a professional troupe before a mixed audience of several hundred, principally young people, on the University of California Irvine Campus. Our attorney holds like affidavits given by additional witnesses to this same performance.

"Chancellor Aldrich of Irvine Campus admitted to two reliable people that he knew in advance that this show contained obscene material. Further, I understand the same show was previously given on the Berkeley and Davis Campuses, and possibly others.

"The issue is simply whether these several performances should have been permitted on University property supported by your taxes — and not whether equally obscene shows can be seen in the tenderloin districts of large cities.

"Judge for yourself whether these performances, containing two hours of solid filth, were the easily foreseeable consequence of the University's hesitancy to deal firmly with the 'Free Speech' and 'Filthy Speech' movement at Berkeley a couple of years ago.

"You are heavily taxed to build these campuses and to pay University salaries. If you like such flagrant obscenity, then raise no objection and rest assured it will continue as you desire — and probably touch State College campuses if it hasn't already. If you disapprove, there is a way to stop it.

"WHAT CAN WE DO?????

"The only kind of protest the UC Administration... will heed is the threat to curtail the appropriation for each campus, annually made by the Legislature. Never forget it's your tax money they appropriate.

"Candidates for state senator and assemblyman are now campaigning for your votes in November. When they speak at your neighborhood meetings demand that they commit themselves on the following issues: Will or won't they

promise to reduce sharply the legislative appropriation for any University or State College campus which permits flagrant obscenity?

"If the chancellors claim they are in doubt about what constitutes flagrant obscenity they can easily learn from their district or city attorney. Local ordinances have long existed, as you well know.

"Remind whoever bleats 'Censorship!' that it's only because the UC Administration has demonstrated it's own incapability of exer-

## Balboa program is recommended

The Newport Beach parks, beaches and recreation commission voted Tuesday evening to recommend approval of a \$4,767 beautification program for the Balboa Peninsula Point.

The project, which now goes to the City Council, includes:

- Hanging blue and white sailboat decals above street signs on the Peninsula Point.

- Replanting the G St. planter.

- Constructing a large planter at the intersection of E. Balboa Blvd. and Miramar Dr., with smaller planters at the end of Bay St., on B St., F St. and I St., and at 8 locations along Ocean Blvd.

- Erecting a retaining wall between M St. and N St. beach to keep the sand from blowing across Balboa Blvd.

- Placing 25 additional blue and white trash cans, stamped with a sailboat decal, in the Peninsula area.

- Money for the project comes from a special fund set up by the city in 1957, when sections of city street on the Peninsula were abandoned and sold to property owners.

- A restriction on the special fund requires that all of the money be spent on projects east of Main St.

- In 1962 a portion of the \$28,000 special fund was spent to build a Peninsula Park between A and B streets on the ocean front.

Primarily an agricultural school consisting of the raising of pigs, cows and crops on the campus, Lahaina is also a boarding school, academic school, and vocational school, located on a hill overlooking pineapple and sugar cane fields and the old whaling port of Lahaina, which was made the capital of Hawaii

## CATARACT

Q. Is there any medical treatment for cataract?

A. The only recommended method of treatment for senile cataract is surgical. The objective of any cataract operation is to remove the clouded or defective lens. Cataract surgery, usually conducted under local anesthesia, is highly successful, with good results being reported in over 90 per cent of cases.

## FOOD POISONING

Q. What is the difference between food poisoning and ptomaine poisoning?

A. True food poisoning (enterotoxicosis) results from eating food in which bacteria have produced a toxin or poisonous substance. (Intestinal infection may also be caused by food containing live bacteria, which multiply and produce disease.) Many years ago food poisoning was thought to be due to harmful products ("Ptomaines") produced by bacterial action on the proteins in decomposing food. This theory is no longer accepted because modern refrigeration has virtually eliminated decomposition and because specific toxins or poisons produced by contaminating bacteria in food can now be identified.





ORDINANCE NO. 1178  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE  
CITY OF NEWPORT BEACH  
AMENDING CERTAIN SECTIONS  
OF, AND ADDING  
CERTAIN SECTIONS TO,  
CHAPTER 5.44 OF TITLE 5  
OF THE NEWPORT BEACH  
MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING  
TO COMMUNITY ANTENNA  
TELEVISION SYSTEMS

The City Council of the City of Newport Beach does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 5.44.010 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read:

**"5.44.010 Definitions."**

For the purpose of this chapter, the following terms, phrases, words and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory.

(a) CITY. The term "City" shall mean the City of Newport Beach in its present incorporated form or in any later recognized, consolidated, enlarged or reincorporated form.

(b) COUNCIL. The term "Council" shall mean the present governing body of the City, or any future board constituting the legislative body of the City.

(c) PERSON. The term "person" shall mean any individual, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.

(d) GRANTEE. The term "grantee" shall mean the person, firm or corporation to whom or which a franchise under this chapter is granted by the Council, and the lawful successor or assignee of said person, firm or corporation.

(e) COMMUNITY ANTENNA TELEVISION. The term "Community Antenna Television System" or "CATV" system shall mean a system of antennae, coaxial cables, wave guides, poles, wires, underground conduits, manholes and other conductors, equipment or facilities designed, constructed or used for the purpose of providing television, radio or other service by cable through its facilities as herein contemplated. CATV shall not mean or include the transmission of any special program or event for which a separate and distinct charge is made to the subscriber in the manner commonly known and referred to as pay television.

(f) SUBSCRIBERS. The term "subscribers" shall mean any person or entity receiving for any purpose the CATV service of the grantee herein.

(g) GROSS ANNUAL RECEIPTS. The term "gross annual receipts" shall mean any and all compensation in the form of gross rental and/or service receipts, including initial installation charges, received directly or indirectly from subscribers or users in payment for CATV services received within the City.

Gross annual receipts shall not include any taxes on services furnished by the grantee imposed directly on any subscriber or used by any city, state or other governmental unit and collected by the grantee for such governmental unit.

(h) FRANCHISE AREA. The term "franchise area" shall mean the territory within the City through which grantee shall be authorized to construct, maintain and operate its system and shall include any enlargements thereof and additions thereto."

SECTION 2. Section 5.44.030 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read:

**"5.44.030 Uses Permitted."** Any franchise granted pursuant to the provisions of this chapter shall authorize and permit the grantee to engage in the business of operating and providing a CATV system in the City of Newport Beach and for that purpose to erect, install, construct, operate, repair, replace, reconstruct, maintain and retain in, on, over, under, upon, across and along any public highway, street, alley, public way or public place, such poles, wires, cables, conductors, ducts, conduits, vaults, manholes, amplifiers, appliances, attachments and other property as may be necessary and appropriate to the CATV system, and, in addition, so to use, operate and provide similar facilities on properties rented or leased from other persons, firms or corporations including, but not limited to, a public utility or other grantee franchised or permitted to do business in the City of Newport Beach.

The grantee shall have the authority to promulgate such rules, regulations, terms and conditions governing the conduct of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable it to exercise its rights and perform its obligations under the franchise, and to insure an uninterrupted service to each and all of its customers; provided, however, that such rules, regulations, terms and conditions shall not be in conflict with the provisions hereof or of the laws of the City of Newport Beach, the State of California or the United States of America.

The grantee shall have authority to trim trees upon and overhanging streets, alleys, sidewalks and public places of the City so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coming in contact with the wires and cables of grantee, all trimming to be done under the supervision and direction of the City and at the expense of grantee."

SECTION 3. Section 5.44.035 is added to the Newport Beach Municipal Code to read:

**"5.44.035 Regulation of Rates and Services."** The City Council shall at all times and from time to time during the term of any franchise granted hereunder have the power to and shall adopt and enforce, and grantee shall conform to, rules and regulations of the Council governing and establishing reasonable rules, regu-

lations, and standards of performance pertaining to the system of grantee.

(b) At the time of the granting of any franchise hereunder, the City Council shall establish or approve all rates and charges allowable to grantee, including but not limited to all such rates and charges for installation of equipment, service charges for all classifications of service, including additional connections at one location and any other rates or charges of grantee to subscribers, and no such rates or charges shall be changed at any time after the granting of a franchise, except by authority of the Council, and upon written request of the grantee; provided, that prior to authorizing the change of any rates or charges of grantee to subscribers, at any time after the granting of such franchise, the Council shall first pass its resolution of intention to do so, describing and stating any rates or charges to be changed.

(c) CITY. The term "City" shall mean the City of Newport Beach in its present incorporated form or in any later recognized, consolidated, enlarged or reincorporated form.

(d) COUNCIL. The term "Council" shall mean the present governing body of the City, or any future board constituting the legislative body of the City.

(e) PERSON. The term "person" shall mean any individual, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.

(f) GRANTEE. The term "grantee" shall mean the person, firm or corporation to whom or which a franchise under this chapter is granted by the Council, and the lawful successor or assignee of said person, firm or corporation.

(g) COMMUNITY ANTENNA TELEVISION. The term "Community Antenna Television System" or "CATV" system shall mean a system of antennae, coaxial cables, wave guides, poles, wires, underground conduits, manholes and other conductors, equipment or facilities designed, constructed or used for the purpose of providing television, radio or other service by cable through its facilities as herein contemplated. CATV shall not mean or include the transmission of any special program or event for which a separate and distinct charge is made to the subscriber in the manner commonly known and referred to as pay television.

(h) SUBSCRIBERS. The term "subscribers" shall mean any person or entity receiving for any purpose the CATV service of the grantee herein.

(i) GROSS ANNUAL RECEIPTS. The term "gross annual receipts" shall mean any and all compensation in the form of gross rental and/or service receipts, including initial installation charges, received directly or indirectly from subscribers or users in payment for CATV services received within the City.

Gross annual receipts shall not include any taxes on services furnished by the grantee imposed directly on any subscriber or used by any city, state or other governmental unit and collected by the grantee for such governmental unit.

(j) FRANCHISE AREA. The term "franchise area" shall mean the territory within the City through which grantee shall be authorized to construct, maintain and operate its system and shall include any enlargements thereof and additions thereto."

SECTION 2. Section 5.44.030 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read:

**"5.44.030 Uses Permitted."** Any franchise granted pursuant to this chapter shall be for a term of not less than ten (10) years nor more than twenty (20) years following the date of acceptance of such franchise by the grantee or renewal thereof. Any such franchise may be terminated prior to its date of expiration by the City Council in the event that said Council shall have found, after thirty (30) days' notice of proposed termination and public hearing, that (a) the grantee has failed to comply with any provision of this chapter or of the franchise issued to the grantee hereunder, there shall be recoverable jointly and severally from the grantee any damages or loss suffered by the City as a result thereof, including the full amount of any compensation, indemnification, or cost of removal or abandonment of any property of the grantee as prescribed hereby which may be in default, plus a reasonable allowance for attorney's fees and costs, up to the full amount of the bond, said condition to be a continuing obligation for the duration of such franchise or any renewal thereof, and thereafter until the grantee has liquidated all of its obligations with the City that may have arisen from the acceptance of said franchise by the grantee or from its exercise of any privilege therein granted. The bond shall provide that thirty (30) days' prior written notice of intention not to renew, cancellation, or material change, be given to the City.

(k) ANNUAL FRANCHISE FEE. The grantee of any franchise under this chapter shall pay annually to the City during the life of such franchise a fixed percentage of the gross receipts of the grantee derived from subscribers within the City. Such percentage shall be at least 3% and shall be established by the City Council for the life of the franchise by specifying such percentage in the ordinance granting the franchise.

The grantee shall file with the City, within thirty (30) days after the expiration of any calendar year during which such franchise is in force, a financial statement prepared by a certified public accountant showing in detail the gross annual receipts, as defined herein, of grantee, its successors and assigns, during the preceding calendar year.

(l) BOND FOR PROTECTION OF SUBSCRIBERS. The grantee shall, concurrently with the filing of an acceptance of a franchise granted under this Chapter, file with the City Clerk and shall thereafter during the entire term of such franchise maintain full force and effect a corporate surety bond or other adequate surety agreement in a form approved by the City Attorney in the amount of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), conditioned that in the event such grantee shall fail to comply with any provision of this chapter, term or condition of its franchise, or limit the liability of the grantee under any franchise issued hereunder or for damages, either to the full amount of the bond or otherwise.

(m) BOND FOR PROTECTION OF FRANCHISEE. The grantee shall file with the City, within thirty (30) days after the expiration of any calendar year during which such franchise is in force, a financial statement prepared by a certified public accountant showing in detail the gross annual receipts, as defined herein, of grantee, its successors and assigns, during the preceding calendar year.

(n) PROCEDURE FOR ADOPTING RULES AND REGULATIONS. The City Council may adopt rules or regulations or amend, modify, delete or otherwise change such rules and regulations previously adopted in the following manner:

1. The City Council shall pass a resolution of intention describing the rules or regulations to be adopted, amended, modified, deleted or otherwise changed and set a day, hour and place for public hearing. Such resolution shall direct the City Clerk to publish the same at least once within fifteen (15) days of the passage thereof.

2. The City Clerk shall cause such resolution to be published at least once in the official newspaper of the City and shall cause a copy of same to be mailed or delivered to any grantee not less than ten (10) days prior to the time fixed for hearing.

3. At the time for public hearing or at any adjournment thereof, the City Council shall proceed to hear and pass upon such evidence, comments and objections as may be presented. Thereafter, the City Council, by its resolution, may adopt, amend, modify, delete, or otherwise change said rules and regulations.

SECTION 11. Section 5.44.172 is added to the Newport Beach Municipal Code to read:

**"5.44.172 Application Fee."** Each application shall be accompanied by an application fee in the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00), which shall be used by the City to cover the costs of studying, investigating and processing such application.

SECTION 12. Section 5.44.173 is added to the Newport Beach Municipal Code to read:

**"5.44.173 Effect of Annexations."** (a) In the event any new territory shall be annexed to the City which is contiguous to only one franchise area in the City, such new territory shall become, by operation of law, a part of said franchise area immediately upon the completion of such annexation.

(b) The system shall be installed using all band equipment capable of passing the VHF and FM spectrum, and it shall have the further capability of converting UHF

than twenty percent (20%) of its gross profits during said period."

SECTION 6. Section 5.44.080 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read:

**"5.44.080 Permits, Licenses and Services."** (a) Within thirty (30) days after acceptance of any franchise by the grantee, the grantee shall proceed with due diligence to obtain all necessary permits and authorizations which are required in the conduct of its business, including but not limited to any utility joint use attachment agreements, microwave carrier leases, and any other permits, licenses, and authorizations to be granted by duly constituted regulatory agencies having jurisdiction over the operation of CATV systems, or their associated microwave transmission facilities.

(b) Within ninety (90) days after obtaining all necessary permits, licenses and authorizations, grantee shall commence construction and installation of the CATV system.

(c) Within one hundred eighty (180) days after the commencement of construction and installation of the system, grantee shall proceed to render service to subscribers, and the completion of the construction and installation shall be pursued with reasonable diligence to the end that service shall be made available to all potential subscribers throughout the entire franchise area within such time and upon such conditions as shall be determined by the City Council.

(d) Failure to do any of the foregoing shall be grounds for termination of the franchise.

(e) The City Manager may extend the time for obtaining necessary permits and authorizations and for beginning construction and installation for additional periods in the event the grantee, acting in good faith, experiences delays by reason of circumstances beyond his control."

SECTION 7. Section 5.44.120 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read:

**"5.44.120 Surety Bonds."** (a) BOND FOR PROTECTION OF CATV. The grantee shall, concurrently with the filing of an acceptance of award of the franchise granted under this chapter, file with the City Clerk and at all times thereafter maintain in full force and effect for the term of such franchise or renewal thereof, at grantee's sole expense, a corporate surety bond in a company approved by, and in a form to be approved by, the City Attorney, in the amount of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), renewable annually, and conditioned upon the faithful performance of grantee, and upon the further condition that in the event grantee shall fail to comply with any one or more of the provisions of this chapter or of the franchise issued to the grantee hereunder, there shall be recoverable jointly and severally from the grantee any damages or loss suffered by the City as a result thereof, including the full amount of any compensation, indemnification, or cost of removal or abandonment of any property of the grantee as prescribed hereby which may be in default, plus a reasonable allowance for attorney's fees and costs, up to the full amount of the bond, said condition to be a continuing obligation for the duration of such franchise or any renewal thereof, and thereafter until the grantee has liquidated all of its obligations with the City that may have arisen from the acceptance of said franchise by the grantee or from its exercise of any privilege therein granted.
