## PRINCIPALS REASSIGNED

Supt. John W. Nicoll of the Newport-Mesa unified school district announces plans to reassign a number of elementary and middle school principals for the 1974-75 school year.

"These reassignments will be recommended to the board at our March 19 meeting," Dr. Nicoll said. "They represent a condition of our policy of transferring administrators from one school to another, and from one level of instruction to another. All of the principals involved have agreed to the changes, and welcome the opportunity to work with new students, new staffs, and new parent communities."

The transfers include:

Principal Mel Everhart from Woodland to Bay View elementary school, Costa Mesa.

Principal Wendell Rice from Rea middle school to Killybrooke elementary, Costa Mesa.

Principal Bill Kappele from Bay View to Mariners elementary, Harbor Highlands.

Principal Al Zeldman from Killybrooke to Newport elementary, Central Newport.

Principal Les Ferguson from Canyon (which is being converted to a TMR school next year) to Eastbluff elementary for one-year assignment. He will replace Bob Francy, who will be on sabbatical leave during the next school year.

Principal T. J. Farris from Corona del Mar elementary to Mesa Verde elementary, Costa Mesa.

Principal Ralph Freitag from Mariners elementary to Davis middle school, Costa Mesa.

Principal John McGowan from TeWinkle middle to Kaiser middle school, Costa Mesa.

Principal Lew Fannon from Mesa Verde elementary to Rea middle school, Costa Mesa.

Principal Werner Carlson from Davis middle to TeWinkle middle school, Costa Mesa.

Al O'Leary, presently principal at Newport elementary, and Elvin Hutchinson, now at Kaiser middle school, have announced plans to retire at the end of the current school year.

## Oil damage suit filed

A West Newport couple who were awakened one morning last October by an oil well in their house are suing the city of Newport Beach.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Neel filed suit last Thursday seeking more than \$200,000 in damages. The court action follows a claim filed in January and routinely denied by the city.

The Neels and another family living in one of their apartment buildings at 211-213 42nd St. woke up early the morning of Oct. 6 to find that an old capped oil well under the property had blown its top and was spewing oil into the homes.

Mr. Neel says the city was negligent. He bought the property from the city in 1944 and claims that city officials knew then that the old oil well was not properly capped.

## DANIEL ELLSBERG TO TALK APRIL 8 AT UCI

Daniel Ellsberg, center of the controversial Pentagon papers affair, will speak at UC Irvine Crawford hall at 8 p.m., April 8, on "Political trials in America." Ellsberg is preparing for trial on charges of espionage, treason, embezzlement and theft, brought against him by the federal government following his release of a secret Pentagon study on Indochina and the Vietnam War.

## RON WRIGHT TO TALK

The Conservative Lunch Club will present radio commentator Ron Wright in a talk on regional government Monday noon, March 18, at the Saddleback Inn, Santa Ana. He will discuss President Nixon's vice, patriotic, veteran, and executive order establishing 10 character-building programs, each directed to a regional council.

## DISTRICT 1 CANDIDATES ANSWER QUESTIONNAIRE

This is the first in a series revealing Newport City Council candidates' answers to a list of questions submitted to them by the Ensign. This week, we are printing answers from candidates for the 1st District. Voters are reminded that, no matter where they live in Newport, they vote for one candidate from each of the 4 districts being contested in the April 9 election.

Incumbent Howard Rogers has served 2 terms on the City Council. He is currently vice-mayor. He lives on Balboa Peninsula Point. He is a sales representative for a firm that builds computers and business machines.

Marguerite (Peg) Forgit is also a long-time resident. She has been active in Zonta Club, assisting the Senior Citizens Club and other civic affairs. She and her husband have operated Forgit hardware store in Central Newport for many years. They live over the store.

Here are both candidates' answers to our questions:

\* TRAFFIC -- WHAT SPECIFIC ACTIONS, IF ANY, WOULD YOU TAKE TO CHANGE THE LOCAL TRAFFIC SITUATION? (5TH AVE. BYPASS, MACARTHUR-COAST HWY., DOVER INTERSECTION, 2ND UPPER BAY CROSSING, PRESENT BAY CROSSING, ETC.)

HOWARD ROGERS: With the information I have now, the re-routing of Coast Hwy. is an open invitation for a freeway and should not be considered. The interchange proposed for MacArthur and Coast Hwy. is part of the scheme to keep the freeway option open. There is an urgent need to accommodate traffic on the bay crossing and Dover Dr. intersection. This must be pushed forward with the State of California, which holds the key to timing and funds.

PEG FORGIT: Leave Coast Hwy. alone in Corona del Mar. No interchange at MacArthur and Coast Hwy. A new, wider bridge where the highway crosses the bay, but NO second crossing further north. Establish a free right turn off Coast Hwy. onto Dover and re-route Bay Shores traffic entering the highway. Re-route Coast Hwy. behind Newport Shores and dead-end the present road there. Stop Corona del Mar freeway from entering the city limits. If the Irvine Co. wants a super-road to their undeveloped Bonita Canyon property, let them build one and call it the Bonita Canyon Freeway -- don't stick the taxpayers with the \$40 million tab.

## HIGH RISE CONDOS OK'D

Four 16-story condominium towers proposed for Newport Center got the green light Monday night from Newport City Council.

The buildings will have 245 luxury units. The architect told Councilmen they will probably be occupied by 515 people, very few children, and have underground parking for 150 cars.

Before okaying the project the Council insisted that the Irvine Co. agree to pay at least half the cost of a traffic signal at Santa Barbara Dr. and Jamboree Rd. to handle the traffic increase generated by the development.

A San Diego-based firm will build the project at the corner of a proposed extension of Santa Barbara Dr. and Sam Clemente

Dr. in the northwestern section of Newport Center.

Paul Ryckoff was the only councilman who objected to the development. He claimed that the environmental impact report accompanying the tentative tract map was insufficient, and that the "cumulative effect of so many high-density developments in Newport Beach is much too great."

Vice-Mayor Howard Rogers insisted on the traffic light financing agreement.

His amendment to the motion okaying the tentative map called for the 50 per cent signal cost donation by Irvine. The amendment passed 4-3, with Councilmen Croul, Kyma and Store opposed.

The West Newport meeting starts at 7:30 p.m. and will be open to the public. Other homeowner groups in that part of town are co-sponsoring the event.

Next Thursday morning, the Newport Harbor-Costa Mesa Board of Realtors will present a candidates forum at the Balboa Bay Club. The public is invited. Tickets will be \$1 at the door, and the meeting starts at 8 a.m. Coffee and rolls will be served.

Next Wednesday morning, the Newport Harbor Chamber of Commerce will host a Town Hall meeting at the Balboa Bay Club. The public is invited to the \$3 breakfast, beginning at 7:30. Reservations may be made by calling the Chamber at 644-8211. A few seats will still be available without reservation, according to a Chamber spokesman.

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# 5TH BYPASS KILLED, CANYON ROUTE OK'D

No 5th Ave. bypass road, no restriction of Coast Hwy. parking in Corona del Mar, and no big interchange at the south end of MacArthur Blvd. These were the key decisions Monday night as the Newport Beach City Council formally adopted a long-range traffic circulation plan.

A packed, emotion-charged spectator section burst into applause as the Council voted 6-1 to adopt the traffic plan as part of the city's overall general plan of development.

Only Corona del Mar Councilman Richard Croul opposed the move.

Proponents of the controversial re-routing of Coast Hwy.

through the old freeway corridor paralleling CDM's 5th Ave. either sat silently or didn't bother to come to the final showdown over the issue. Conspicuous by their absence or silence were the Newport Harbor Chamber of Commerce, the Irvine Co., a petition group headed by businesswoman Chris Hopper, and the Irvine Terrace and Cameo homeowner groups, all of whom said they favored the bypass road.

The night belonged to Wallace Calderhead, Gerard Van Hoven, J. R. Blakemore, Calvin McLaughlin, the Corona del Mar Chamber of Commerce, and Harbor View Hills and CDM homeowner organizations.

Paul Hummel, president of the CDM Civic Assn., and a leader in the anti-bypass fight, celebrated a birthday the same day.

Councilmen heard 10 speakers against the bypass road, and only 2 in favor. Several other

speakers reminded the Council that there were other parts of the traffic plan, but most of the rhetoric and the emotion were spent on the bypass.

"It makes no sense to keep the bypass issue open -- kill it tonight," urged Mr. Van Hoven, a Harbor View Hills resident and a member of the anti-bypass petition committee. "The people just won't accept it."

"Though the people thought they had put the freeway issue to rest, it keeps coming back with more heads, like the Symphonies snake," said Roy Giordano, 626 Seward Rd., Corona Highlands.

"If the Coast Hwy. crowds up a bit, motorists, being sensible people, will take other routes," claimed Mr. McLaughlin, another petition committee member. He claimed that traffic increase projections by a consultant hired by the city are based on national averages that don't apply to Corona del Mar residents, who, he said, "earn an average of \$23,000 annually per family, and who don't want freeways in front of their \$80,000 and \$100,000 homes."

Developer Jerry Hill, 404 Iris Ave., a former president of the Corona del Mar Civic Assn., was one of 2 speakers who fought the tide of opinion. He criticized the bypass fighters for pointing to a Bonita Canyon routing of Corona del Mar Freeway as an alternative to the 5th Ave. plan.

"How far away is the Bonita Canyon solution?" he asked. "If we end up removing parking from the Coast Hwy., who buys the lots for off-street parking? You know and I know that someday, when they can't get an ambulance through Corona del Mar, we're going to have to open up that highway."

Councilman Croul reminded the bypass fighters, "when we were getting rid of the Pacific Coast Freeway, the pitch was to find some alternative solutions to our traffic problem. People all over town have been asking us to find solutions. We paid \$85,000 for a report that tells us of our traffic deficiencies and suggests some solutions. A Bonita Canyon route might not be ready by 1990. We are faced with the dilemma of finding solutions to traffic problems without disturbing certain parts of town."

Alan Schwalbe, 2860 Alta Vista Dr., East Bluff, summed up the philosophy of the Council's ultimate decision: "Those of us who own homes don't want freeways near them."

The Council wanted to make several changes to the traffic plan submitted by the Planning Commission. But, when City Attorney Dennis O'Neill cautioned that "substantial changes will mean you have to send the plan back to the Planning Commission again," councilmen took a different tack. After deleting all references to the removal of Coast Hwy. parking and the MacArthur-Coast Hwy. interchange, they voted on the entire package.

Later, they okayed a message to the Planning Commission asking that planners consider downgrading a proposed Blison Ave. arterial road, that would connect East Bluff with Corona del Mar freeway, to a secondary road status. They also asked planners to reconsider the proposed widening of Irvine Ave. between 18th St. and Cliff Dr., Newport Heights. These changes would be made later, as amendments to the traffic plan.

Several speakers pleaded for retention of the curbside parking along Coast Hwy. in Corona del Mar. But, Helen Kieron, 3201 4th Ave., Corona del Mar, asked, "Is Coast Hwy. going to be a highway or a parking lot? Why does a businessman get to use public property for a parking lot? Homeowners have to provide off-street parking for tenants. Why shouldn't businessmen do the same?"

Pet shop owner Frank Jordan said businessmen "need parking spaces in front of their stores to stay in business."

Mr. Calderhead, who spearheaded a petition campaign that got almost 5,000 names opposing the bypass, was "relaxing and feeling wonderful" Tuesday at his home at 712 Iris Ave., Corona del Mar, as he celebrated his birthday.

"I'm as old as I feel, and today I feel like 40. I don't have any enemies or any fights to fight today," he told the Ensign.

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## BERT MILLS, NB PIONEER, DEAD AT 92

Bert Mills, pioneer Newport Beach resident, native son of Orange County and busy at his ranch to the final week of his life, succumbed Sunday at age 92 in South Coast community hospital, South Laguna.

About a week before, he had suffered a broken hip at a fall at his stables in Fountain Valley, where he bred, trained and sold Arabian horses. He was taken to South Coast hospital but failed to rally from the effects of the injury.

He had made his home for years in Balboa Coves with his daughter, Miss Lorna Mills, president of Laguna Federal Savings & Loan Assn. He is survived also by another daughter, Mrs. Luther Robertson of Malibu Beach. His wife preceded him in death in 1957.

Bert (James Herbert) Mills was born in 1881, the son of the Rev. and Mrs. David Mills. He farmed on the Bixby ranch, Imperial Valley and at Prado in Santa Ana Canyon. From 1932 to 1957 he operated sport-fishing boats from the 19th St. landing in Central Newport.

He was a member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Services were held Tuesday at Waverly Church, with David Carmichael as officiant. Interment was in Fairhaven Memorial Park, directed by Smith & Tutthill Mortuary.

## CM mayors to alternate

In an unprecedented move Tuesday night, Costa Mesa's City Council failed to pick a mayor for the next 2 years, choosing instead to have 2 veteran councilmen who have already held the job split the duties over the next 2 years.

Bob Wilson will be mayor until next April, then he will be replaced by Alvin Pinkley, who will hold the job until April, 1976.

Norma Hertzog, newly-elected councilwoman who unseated veteran Willard Johnson, was seated as the new Council held its organizational meeting.

Voting in a closed executive session, councilmen apparently couldn't choose between Mr. Wilson and Mr. Pinkley, so compromised by splitting the usual 2-year mayor's term between them.

Mr. Wilson served as mayor from 1964 to 1966 and from 1970 to 1972.

Mr. Pinkley, a councilman since 1954, was mayor in 1962-64 and again in 1968-1970.

Jack Hammett, outgoing mayor who was elected to another Council term in last week's city election, was picked as vice-mayor for a 2-year term.

## UPPER NEWPORT BAY POLLUTION CLAIMED

Contaminated water is flowing into Upper Newport Bay from San Diego Creek at a rate of from 2 to 4 million gallons daily, the Newport Harbor Chamber of Commerce charged this week.

Assistant Chamber manager Larry Miller fired off a letter to the city-county joint harbor committee in Newport and asked the committee to investigate.

Diluted sewage, lead, zinc, mercury, cadmium and chromium were found in water samples taken by a member of the chamber's Marine Division, Mr. Miller said. The water sample was taken in San Diego Creek in Irvine.

## GAL STREAKERS CAUGHT

The "streaking" had hit both Newport Beach high schools this week.

On Monday, a lone male streaker shot across the

Corona del Mar high school campus during lunch hour. The 11th-grader was later suspended from school for 5 days.

Tuesday, 2 boys, fully

clothed, ran across the CDM campus, carrying a naked mannekin.

Yesterday at 10 a.m., a visiting streaking team of 4 girls from Newport Harbor high dashed across the CDM campus. Vice principal Betty Townsend streaked after them as an accomplice drove them away. Mrs. Townsend, driving a fast foreign sports car, caught up with the girls and delivered them to Harbor high, where assistant principal Jack King said parent conferences would be held the following morning before a disciplinary decision is made.

HER TOPIC IS DRUGS

Miss Yuan Moun-Ru, who escaped from a Red Chinese labor camp in 1969, will speak at noon Thursday, March 21, at the Newport Harbor Lunch-club meeting in the Airport Inn. She will discuss the communist drug traffic, about which she has testified before a congressional committee.

Disclosure law eased

Newport city officials were told Monday by their lawyer that they need not comply with a new state law that requires them to reveal all of their sources of income.

City Attorney Dennis O'Neill told city councilmen that follow-up legislation signed last week by Governor Reagan exempts professional people such as lawyers, doctors and realtors from naming clients.

"Although the new rules don't go into effect until next January," said Mr. O'Neill, "the fact that they have been signed into law should release you from any liability."

Local elected and appointed officials are required to file an annual statement during the first half of April revealing all sources of income during the past year.

Under some interpretations of the Moscone law, professional people in public office would have to name each client and how much he paid. Under the follow-up legislation, also sponsored by Sen. Moscone, clients would not have to be named. The follow-up rules were introduced as emergency legislation, to take immediate effect before this year's April 15 financial disclosure filing deadline. However, the bill failed to get the needed two-thirds majority in the State Assembly, so it won't become law until next January.

Mr. O'Neill admitted Tuesday that his opinion is at odds with that of Secretary of State Edmund Brown, Jr., and other state officials, who have insisted on having all income identified by name.

"But I, and other city attorneys, as well as the League of California Cities, have maintained all along that 'generic' income -- naming of income sources without the names of people -- was the real intent of the law," Mr. O'Neill explained.

Meanwhile, a Nevada County Superior Court judge ruled last week that, because of the original law's name-listing requirements, it is unconstitutional. His ruling applies only in Nevada County.

STUDENT, INSTRUCTOR  
DIE IN PLANE CRASH

A light plane crashed near the end of Orange County Airport's runway Monday, killing 2 Anaheim men.

The small Cessna apparently lost power on take-off and nosed into the runway at 11:15 near Palmdale Rd. and Campus Dr. Student pilot David Mellor, 27, was killed instantly. His instructor, David Johnson, 26, died en route to a Tustin hospital. The plane belonged to a private flying school at the airport.

\* LETTER FROM EDITOR

I am mighty sensitive about stories concerning the coastal freeway and the long and successful fight to keep it out of our wonderful community. So I am prompted to comment on the "Freeway Follies" reported by Al Forgit in his Ensign advertisement of Feb. 28. I can testify to the fact that before the Freeway Fighters were organized in 1969, there was no one fighting the freeway except the Ensign newspaper and a faithful few who did not waver from their objectives during the long battle.

Going all the way back to the 1950's, we faced the super-powerful freeway promoters -- including the Irvine Company, the Newport Harbor Chamber of Commerce, all members of the Newport Beach City Council, the Costa Mesa City Council, the Orange County officialdom, the Sacramento lobby, the Costa Mesa Daily Pilot, and also publisher Ben Reddick and his

Newport Harbor News Press. There was an attempt to pull the wool over the eyes of the anti-freeway alarmists by coming up with the semantical deception of an "inland route." And where do you suppose that "inland" freeway was to go? Right through the homes in Newport Heights, along 15th Street or 16th Street, through 2 school campuses and one church, coming back to the Coast Hwy. alignment on the other side of the Upper Bay, and then right through the heart of Corona del Mar, along that now-famous Fifth Ave. corridor.

The "inland route" boys never deviated from that bulldozed target in Corona del Mar. I can painfully remember the futile talks with the mayors of Newport Beach and Costa Mesa and with Publisher Reddick on behalf of the real freeway fighters -- we who stood firm for a real inland route, back of the Upper Bay, where there was then almost no development, and down-coast along what we now know so well as the Bonita-Coyote Canyon corridor, and bypassing Laguna Beach also on the inland side.

That 16th Street (or 15th Street) freeway route remained the prime goal of the local freeway promoters -- aiming a dagger straight at the heart of Corona del Mar -- just as the present talk about a Fifth Avenue expressway and the interchange at MacArthur Blvd. is a maneuver to over-ride the will of the local residents and to revive the freeway threat.

When the Freeway Fighters were formally organized, they knew full well that the only plan that could win community-wide support -- throughout both Newport Beach and Corona del Mar -- was the goal that we long-time fighters had been pushing for so long: NO FREEWAY TO DESTROY OUR CITY. An alternate plan was suggested, just as we had urged before -- the Newport Beach City Council, a truly inland route, across the Costa Mesa City Council, the Orange County officialdom, the Sacramento lobby, the Costa Mesa Daily Pilot, and also publisher Ben Reddick and his

1971 -- and an aroused populace expressed their opinion decisively, a 5 to 1 margin for killing the coastal freeway route and for requiring approval by the local voters for any future freeway or expressway in our city.

That's where the matter stands now. We are ready to man the barricades on moment's notice if the fight has to be fought again.

HOWARD ROGERS: Reduced. Eliminate Hughes Air West because they refuse to abide by noise abatement procedures. Legal action and pressure on the Orange County Board of Supervisors for ultimate removal of jet flights to some other location; i.e., El Toro, Chino Hills, Camp Pendleton, or Ontario.

PEG FORGIT: Jet traffic should NOT be increased. Airlines using the airport should pay a "noise tax" based on the amount of noise they make. This would give them even more incentive to find more ways to reduce noise. Keep night flights at an absolute minimum. Keep the city involved in studies seeking new jetport facilities. DON'T shut down the airport -- that would be idiotic.

\* COST OF GOVERNMENT -- WHAT SPECIFIC STEPS WOULD YOU TAKE TO RAISE OR LOWER TAXES AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT COSTS?

HOWARD ROGERS: Senate Bill 90 controls the tax rate. However, assessed value continues to climb and taxes increase. It is incumbent upon elected representatives to control costs of government to a level that will provide service acceptable to the people without frills or giveaways.

PEG FORGIT: Taxes should be lowered to reflect steadily-increasing assessments. The city manager should be told BEFORE budget studies start to estimate revenues based upon various tax rates. The City Council should then set a tentative tax rate and tell the city manager to prepare a budget that stays within that rate. Families and businesses adjust spending according to known income. Why shouldn't government do the same? Over-spending by government is a basic cause of our country's economic problems. As an experienced businesswoman and bookkeeper, I would go to work on this problem right away. No deficit spending.

\* POPULATION DENSITY -- WHAT CONTROLS, IF ANY, DO YOU FAVOR ON POPULATION AND BUILDING DENSITIES? WHAT PRESENT CONTROLS, IF ANY, WOULD YOU LIKE TO REMOVE?

HOWARD ROGERS: The residential development standards would appear to provide reasonable density control with reasonable architectural freedom to retain the charm of the older parts of the city.

PEG FORGIT: Our general plan and development standards are sufficient. I would remove any restriction that would keep old-time residents from developing their property under the same rules that existed when they bought it. But, I'm against developers who come in and buy up those lots, jam in huge duplex "boxes," then take the money and run. I also believe that the parking restrictions required by the Coastal Commission are too tough on small property owners.

\* REGIONAL GOVERNMENT -- WHAT FUNCTIONS DO YOU CONSIDER REGIONAL IN NATURE, THAT COULD NOT BEST BE HANDLED BY LOCAL GOVERNMENT, AND WHAT FUNCTION, IF ANY, SHOULD REGIONAL GOVERNMENT PLAY IN OUR POLITICAL LIFE?

HOWARD ROGERS: Regional government only hamstrings local control. The municipal elected council is the closest to the people and any layer of regional government only dilutes the voice of the people.

PEG FORGIT: Anything that can be done by local government will usually be done best on that level. The only function that regional governments should have is to help local governments live with each other, by providing a clearing-house for mutual problems and a forum for local governments to deal with each other.

\* POLICE -- DO YOU FAVOR CURRENT POLICE HELICOPTER PATROL POLICIES? IF NOT, WHAT CHANGE WOULD YOU MAKE? DO YOU FAVOR THE PLAN, WHICH WOULD BE FINANCED PRIMARILY BY FEDERAL FUNDS, TO HOOK UP A POLICE ALARM SYSTEM WITH HOMES AND BUSINESSES, UTILIZING LOCAL TV CABLES?

HOWARD ROGERS: I do favor the police helicopter program and present policies in its regard. Higher flights could reduce annoying noise levels. Federal funds carefully selected to avoid "strings" are desirable.

PEG FORGIT: I am in favor of the police helicopter as a life-saving, crime-fighting police tool. However, better judgment should be used in flight scheduling so that the peace of residents is not disturbed. People who want an alarm hookup with police headquarters should be able to do so through private businesses that specialize in such work. There is no reason for taxpayers who don't want such a system to pay for it. Federal taxpayers definitely SHOULD NOT pay for any of the cost of sophisticated alarm systems, if you want an alarm, buy one!

## The Birch Log

### Restoring Educational Excellence

By John F. McManus

Belmont, Massachusetts -- In the view of many present-day educators, excellence in their profession is equated with high cost. But the average parent of today's schoolchildren senses that all is not well in our nation's schools. Mom and Dad's only measuring rod is the progress of their children and they just aren't happy with what the schools are producing.

#### The "New Math" Under Attack

About a year ago, a chemist offered a dime to his daughter and to any of her fourth-grade classmates who could supply the answer to a simple multiplication problem -- 8 times 9. None of the children won the dime. He then examined his daughter's textbook and by the time he'd reached page four, he found that he was unable to answer any of the questions.

Justifiably upset, he took the book to work and found that none of his colleagues -- many with advanced degrees and broad experience in higher mathematics -- could fathom fourth-grade "new math." Now bordering on anger, he began a personal crusade against this latest educational novelty and its promoters. For, although his daughter had received the highest possible grades and was quite proficient in the "new math," she couldn't multiply, and even had difficulty with simple addition.

#### Parents Sue School District

In California, the parents of an eighteen-year-old high school graduate recently sued their school district for \$500,000 because their son is barely able to read. The suit charges the school system with fraud and malpractice evidenced by the young man's inability to complete even a simple employment application.

Educators throughout the United States are carefully watching the progress of this suit because they admit that a conviction could result in as many as 200,000 similar suits across the nation.

#### S.A.T. Scores Continue To Drop

Last January, the College Entrance Examination

Board confirmed that scores in the nationwide Scholastic Aptitude Test (S.A.T.) have been falling for over a decade -- down an average of 33 points on the verbal test and 21 on the math portion.

The S.A.T. is taken annually by over one million high school students. The average math scores (graded on a scale from 200 to 800) dropped steadily from 502 in 1962-63, to 481 last year. The average verbal score fell from 478 to 445 in the same ten-year period.

#### The Cause Of The Trouble

As long as government involvement in education increases, educational decline will continue. Such a downward trend is the inevitable result of government edicts which compel everyone to finance public schools and which require universal attendance. In reality, they are not "public" schools. They are government schools.

Nor are they local government schools. Federal aid to education has converted state-run systems into federal systems. Simultaneously, many formerly independent or church-related schools have seen their own excellence destroyed by pressure from government and by their own "monkey-see, monkey-do" copying of the worst of the modern innovations.

Simply stated, there is practically no competition in education today. The combination of near-total government monopoly, compulsory taxation, and compulsory attendance has brought all education down to the lowest common denominator.

#### What Should Be Done?

For starters, we recommend an end to federal involvement in education, an end to compulsory taxation for schools and an end to compulsory attendance laws. Such moves would instill a new vitality into education at every level -- from the parent who would gladly pay for the resulting excellence, to the teacher who would rather teach than babysit, and to the student who finds himself bored to death in today's caverns of mediocrity.

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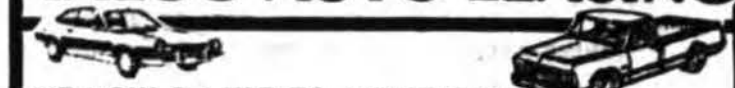

What the test does tell the driver is just how good his driving habits are relative to low gasoline consumption. The figures for all speeds, plus a "floored accelerator" consumption test, are averaged to give the driver an accurate measure of just how well he is taking advantage of the car's potential. This Mustang rated 20.0 miles per gallon at 30 miles per hour, 19.0 at 40, 18.0 at 50, 13.0 at 60, and 6.7 under the floored accelerator test for an average of 15.6 miles per gallon. The owner of the Mustang reports 13.6 miles per gallon under all-city, start and stop driving conditions, indicating a normal difference between test and actual driving results plus good owner driving habits. The free test, for Ford products only, will continue through March 22.

# One I Could Not Side-step

by BILL GLASS

A native of Tezakana, Texas, Bill Glass was All-America football player at Baylor University in 1951. He played defensive end for the 1964 world champion Cleveland Browns professional team, and is with them again this season. Before coming to Cleveland in 1962, he played for four years with the Detroit Lions. Mr. Glass lives with his wife, Mavis, and three children in Waco.

If I wanted to find out what kind of game American football was, I wouldn't wander out to a vacant lot to watch some kids kick a ball around. I'd hunt up a good team and watch it play. I'd watch the Cleveland Browns!

In the same way, if I were out to discover what Christianity is, I would look at Jesus Christ himself, and I would find the best Christian example I could. So we Christians have to be sure that the image we portray is such that others will know that Christianity is the greatest thing going.

Everything in life is insignificant when compared to accepting the most important challenge the world has ever known: to stand for Christ. And that is no small potatoes.

I am thrilled that so many amateur and professional athletes today are coming to stand for Jesus Christ in an unashamed way. Because they are often in the spotlight, and because young people look up to them, they have a great opportunity to present Christ.

They have also a responsibility, for the athlete must not be a phony. Neither should he be a moral policeman, slapping people on the wrist and passing out "do's" and "don'ts." Nothing is more repulsive than a legalistic Christian who has sunk to the narrow feeling that Christianity is only what he does or does not do. Christianity is not just leaving out things. It is not just following a moral code. Christianity is knowing Jesus Christ in your heart. Our witness will be contagious if we represent a relationship to the living person of Christ.

## GREAT FILM DAY OF THE UNIVERSE

One of the most painful episodes of a football player's life is reviewing game films. You might have thought you played a fine game, but the camera doesn't lie. The coaches are eager to point out your mistakes very vividly, and to say, "Let's run it back." So they run the film back and say, "Let's see if he does it right this time." But it's the same film! Oh, it's amazing how great these coaches are!

Now, on the Great Film Day of the Universe, the Master Coach is going to sit in judgment on all the world. And how tragic it is going to be when people tell that Master Coach why they never accepted the greatest challenge the world has ever known. And why didn't they? Because they found there were Christians who were phony about standing for Christ! It would be laughable if it were not so sad.

Jim Ray Smith was All-Professional five times with the Cleveland Browns. The Detroit coaches called him the best line blocker in the league. Jim is a highly respected player, and he always unashamedly stands for Christ—not negatively or in an argumentative way, but wholeheartedly and genuinely.

But Jim was sort of retiring, and found it difficult to get a person to understand exactly how to be rightly related to Christ and God and how to take the step. But he got the ball rolling. Then when I went to Cleveland in a trade, I had a most wonderful privilege. Within the first month in training camp, Jim Ray

would knock on my door and bring in his friends he had been working with for quite a while. "Bill," they would say, "I've been talking to Jim, and I would like to know what it really is to be a Christian." They were seeking me out, not I them. And I was able to point three of the players on our team to Jesus Christ.

## SUNDAY MORNING BIBLE 'Huddles'

The same sort of progress is being made throughout the National Football League. Buddy Dial, offensive end, started a Sunday morning devotional study at both Pittsburgh and Dallas. Even the coaches came. At Baltimore Ray Berry, the great end, and linebacker Don Shinnick organized a Sunday morning meeting among the Colt players. In each case there were 20 to 25 players turning out each week.

In our Friday night study and prayer group we get together and rewrite a passage of Scripture in our own words and then give the summary of the passage to the group. Then we discuss what the passage really means to us in our lives, and talk about what it is to live for Jesus Christ on the ball club. It all started for me when I was 16 years old, in high school in Corpus Christi, Texas. I came face to face with one whom I could not side-step. It was something like the situation created by a trap block on the football field. Picture me playing defensive end for the Browns. I charge across the line and no one hits me. Right away I know something is wrong. Invariably, when I glance to the inside I see a big trap blocker coming at me at top speed.

Here he comes, about 260 pounds of pulling guard, his teeth gritted. I know it is his intention to run over me. I can't describe it to you unless you have been stalled on a railroad track at midnight, and have looked up and seen the headlight of the train bobbing back and forth. That's what his teeth look like to me.

## I HAD TO FACE HIM SQUARELY

There are several things I can do. I can side-step him to the outside. But if I do he just bumps me a little bit further, and the back cuts to the inside. And it may mean six points! Or, I can side-step the blocker to the inside, but then he cuts me in and the back cuts to the outside. And again he makes a lot of yards.

No, my only hope is the most difficult, the most bone-shaking thing of all. That is to face the big guard head-on, right in the middle. That is not comfortable, nor, if I am honest, is it the thing I want to do. But it is the only way to stop a trap play. And so it was when I was a high school boy, I faced one whom I could not side-step. He said to me, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." I wanted to side-step him and say, "You don't understand, sir. I'm a good guy. I'm a church member." But all of my self-righteousness was so much ashes; and to side-step him meant to go to my own oblivion and destruction. And I knew it.

So I had to face him squarely and tell him one of two things. Either he was the way to God or he was not. Either he was the biggest liar who ever lived, or he was God's Son. So I faced him, and worshiped him, and made his way my way. I said to him, "By God's Grace, I will stand for you."

And the stretch and the reach for the hem of his garment is somehow making me a bigger person. It is a wonderful experience.

## TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

The Apostle Paul uses three wonderful phrases in Romans 1: "I am debtor" (Ver. 14), "I am ready" (Ver. 15), and "I am not ashamed" (Ver. 16).

As God's appointed apostle to the Gentiles, Paul declared: "I AM DEBTOR both to the Greeks and to the barbarians; both to the wise, and to the unwise."

The gospel now was no longer to be confined to Israel, but was to go to all nations, and Paul felt himself a debtor to proclaim it, first because God had appointed him to do so, and second because he held in his hands that which would save the lost. He was morally obligated—and so are Christians today.

Notice: the Apostle did not say, "I am debtor, but" and then begin to give a thousand excuses, as so many Christians do. He said: "I am debtor...SO..." and his fidelity to his call is seen as he adds: "So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the gospel" (Ver. 15).

Oh, that the millions of Christians today would join Paul and say: "I AM READY to preach the gospel with all that is in me."

But in Verse 16, the Apostle explains why he was ready to put his all into proclaiming the gospel to the Gentiles:

"For I AM NOT ASHAMED of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; unto the Jew first and also to the Gentile."

Many thousands of Jews had already come to trust Christ as Savior, but the good news of Christ's finished work of redemption was—and is—"the power of God unto salvation to EVERY ONE that believeth."

Surely there is no other way. None of the pagan religions can give the assurance of salvation. They all represent efforts to find or earn salvation. Only the gospel, the good news of our Lord's payment for sin can give us the knowledge, the assurance and the joy of salvation from sin.

### Saul Anointed King

I Samuel, Chapters 8-10  
Key Verse: Fear God. Honor the king (1 Peter 2:17).

God bade Samuel warn the people that the king who should come would cause them to suffer and cry out. He also bade him warn them that when they did so cry the Lord would not hear them.

He responded to the request of the people. He gave them a king—but He gave him to them in His anger, and took him away finally in His wrath.

"I gave thee a king in mine anger, and took him away in my wrath" (Hosea 13:11).

He answered the prayer but He added judgment thereto.

This warning against Saul is a half veiled, typical prophecy concerning a day to come when the Jews having returned to Jerusalem and rebuilt the temple, a king will rise over them and fiercely persecute them until they shall be in anguish of soul.

This king has many names.

He is called the Assyrian—the Rod of God's anger.

"O Assyrian, the rod of mine anger, and the staff in their hand is mine indignation" (Isa. 10:5).

He is King of Babylon. He will defy himself. He will set himself up as God. He will establish his throne on the mount of congregation—on "the sides of the north" (Isa. 14:14).

"The sides of the north," is an expression used to describe Jerusalem and its situation.

"Beautiful for situation, the joy of the whole earth, is mount Zion, on the sides of the north, the city of the great King" (Psa. 48:2).

The King of Babylon therefore will be the blasphemous king of Israel who will come and seat himself in the temple that shall be rebuilt at Jerusalem, and seating himself there, declare that he is the highest expression of humanity, and as there is nothing in the universe above man, that he is himself the true and only God for men.

He is called the King of Babylon because he will first arise there, and rebuilding the ancient city, make it the great commercial center of the Eastern world. The picture of restored Babylon is to be found in the 18th chapter of the Revelation.

This man is also called the King of fierce countenance.


"And in the latter time of their kingdom, when the transgressors are come to the full, a king of fierce countenance, and understanding dark sentences, shall stand up" (Dan. 8:23).

He is the King that does according to his own will. He is the wilful King.

## RESURRECTION OF OLD TESTAMENT SAINTS

Q. Please explain the resurrection of the Old Testament saints and where they fit into the first resurrection.

A. The doctrine of the resurrection is only in very vague and general terms in the Old Testament. The reason is clear: these matters did not demand clarity until the resurrection of Christ. Please see I Peter 1:3; Psalm 16:10; Isaiah 26:8; 26:19; Hosea 13:14. These all speak of resurrection, but in very general terms, so that the time element is entirely lacking. The passage that is central on the resurrection of Old Testament saints is found in Daniel 12:1. Please notice that it is preceded by an indication of the Great Tribulation. Then verse 2 shows that the resurrection is subsequent to that time of trouble. Thus we can be certain that they are raised prior to the reign of Christ on earth. As far as the New Testament is concerned, there are those who feel that the Old Testament saints are included in the statement in Revelation 20:4. They must be because if the resurrection were later, they would not be in the resurrection of the righteous. Thus this position harmonizes the Scripture on the subject of resurrection. Christ's resurrection came first, and He is the first-fruits. Then come all New Testament saints. Finally Old Testament saints and martyred saints of the Great Tribulation conclude the stages of the first resurrection.

## SATAN'S FALL FROM HEAVEN

Q. When was Satan cast out of Heaven?

A. This apparently occurred before the creation of Adam and Eve. We read of this event in Isaiah 14:12-17 and Ezekiel 28:14-19. It appears that Satan originally was an angel creature.

to his will; and he shall exalt himself, and magnify himself above every god, and shall speak marvellous things against the God of gods, and shall prosper till the indignation be accomplished: for that that is determined shall be done" (Dan. 11:36).

Daniel speaks of him as the "little horn" that arises among the "ten horns" of the fourth beast of his vision.

"After this I saw in the night visions, and behold a fourth beast, dreadful and terrible, and strong exceedingly; and it had great iron teeth: it devoured and brake in pieces, and stamped the residue with the feet of it: and it was diverse from all the beasts that were before it; and it had ten horns."

"I considered the horns, and, behold, there came up among them another little horn, before whom there were three of the first horns plucked up by the roots: and, behold, in this horn were eyes like the eyes of man, and a mouth speaking great things" (Dan. 7:7-8).

Daniel explains these ten horns to be 10 kings. The little or the eleventh horn will be the king who shall first subdue three kings and then reign over them all.

"Then I would know the truth of the fourth beast, which was diverse from all the others, exceeding dreadful, whose teeth were of iron, and his nails of brass; which devoured, brake in pieces, and stamped the residue with his feet."

"And of the ten horns that were in his head, and of the other which came up, and before whom three fell; even of that horn that had eyes, and a mouth that spake very great things, whose look was more stout than his fellows."

"I beheld, and the same horn made war with the saints, and prevailed against them" (Dan. 7:19ff.).

In heaven originally the devil was "the anointed cherub," "Lucifer, son of the morning," until iniquity was found in him. Some day he will be consigned to eternal and everlasting punishment in hell or the lake of fire with all of his followers (Rev. 20:10-15). Jesus said as recorded in Luke 10:18, "I beheld Satan as lightning fall from heaven" and this took place long, long before Jesus came to earth. It is a wonderful proof of Christ pre-existent deity that He should have been present when this occurred.

Q. Please tell me the steps to being saved.

Read in the Gospels how the Lord Jesus Christ came into the world, died for our sins, rose from the grave, and returned to Heaven. He took our place, died in our room and stead, received the penalty which we deserved, will save us from hell—if we will allow Him to be our Saviour. Ours is a "done," not a "do-it-yourself" religion. Fill your heart and mind with verses such as John 1:12; John 3:16-17; John 3:36; John 5:24; Acts 16:31; Romans 3:23; Romans 6:23; Romans 10:9-10; Revelation 3:20. And obey His invitation—"Come"—Matthew 11:28-30; Revelation 22:17.

## "SEEING" GOD

Q. I am very puzzled about what seems to me a contradiction in the Bible. In John 1:18 we read, "No man hath seen God at any time" yet

in Exodus 24:10 it is stated, "They saw the God of Israel." Other passages too seem to indicate that men did see Him.

A. In replying to this important question, I wish to quote from Dr. R. A. Torrey in his valuable book, *Difficulties and Alleged Errors in the Bible*: "God the Father, in His eternal essence, is invisible (unseeable) (1 Tim. 1:17). No man hath seen Him nor can we see Him (1 Tim. 6:16). He is Spirit, not form (John 4:23, 24) so John tells us that 'No man hath seen God at any time. The only begotten Son, which is in the bosom of the Father, he hath declared him.' This invisible, unseeable God is unfolded to us, interpreted to us in the words and person of Jesus Himself. So fully is He declared, that Jesus could say: 'He that hath seen me hath seen the Father' (John 14:9)."

"This essentially invisible God has been pleased to manifest Himself again and again in bodily form. Moses and the 70 elders saw such a manifestation (or Theophany) when they were in the mount; Isaiah saw Him in the temple (Isa. 6:1). Jesus was the crowning manifestation: 'In him dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily' (or in bodily form). The time is coming when all the pure in heart (the truly saved) shall behold God permanently manifested in bodily form (Matt. 5:8). The form in which Jesus existed in His pre-existent state was the form of God (Phil. 2:6, margin). The Greek word translated *form* in this passage means 'the form by which a person or thing strikes the vision—the external appearance.' So we are clearly taught that the external appearance of Jesus in His pre-existent form was the external appearance of God, that is, that the invisible God, who is Spirit in His essential essence, manifests Himself in an external visible form."

## Weekly Bible School Lesson

## Messiah's Ministry Isaiah 42:1-17

(Continued from last week)

"[Verses] 1-4. The Messiah-Servant is presented as the tender Prophet (a passage applied to the Lord Jesus in Matt. 12:18-20). Clearly the Servant is now an individual rather than the nation of Israel as a whole. God would be *delight* [ed] or 'well pleased' with him (cf. Matt. 3:17). As the Chosen One, he was to be the federal Head of God's elect people. He [the Servant] would be especially empowered by the Holy Spirit (cf. Isa. 11:2). Avoiding all ostentation or self-display, he [the Servant] would carry on a quiet and unassuming ministry (even though multitudes, as we now know, would flock to him out in the fields and hills). Tenderly he [the Servant] would avoid crushing the bruised reed (v. 3), i.e., the contrite sinner, or extinguishing the feeble testimony of the weakest believer. He [the Servant] would have a ministry to all nations, bringing to them judgment (in vv. 1, 4 *misphat* implies the standards or principles of divine holiness and truth—the true faith of the Gospel).

"[Verses] 5-9. God's twofold mission for his Servant would be: (a) to fulfill his covenant promises to Israel; (b) to bring the light of revelation to the Gentiles. The Creator and Sustainer of life would undertake to uphold and support the Servant in his earthly mission (v. 6). The Servant's Gospel would operate to free all believers from the prison house of sin (v. 7). All the glory for accurately predicting coming events is to be kept by God alone. He [God] will not share it with gods invented by men." (cf. Gleason L. Archer, Jr., "Isaiah" in *The Wycliffe Bible Commentary*, 1962, p. 638.)

## A NEW SONG TO THE LORD

In Isaiah 42:10-17 we read: "Sing unto the Lord a new song, and his praise from the end of the earth, ye that go down to the sea, and all that is therein; the isles, and the inhabitants thereof. Let the wilderness and the cities thereof lift up their voice, the villages that Kedar doth inhabit: let the inhabitants of the rock sing, let them shout from the top of the mountains. Let them give glory unto the Lord, and declare his praise in the islands. The Lord shall go forth as a mighty man, he shall stir up jealousy like a man of war: he shall cry, yea, roar; he shall prevail against his enemies. I have long time holden my peace; I have been still, and re-

frained myself: now will I cry like a travelling woman; I will destroy and devour at once. I will make waste mountains and hills, and dry up all their herbs; and I will make the rivers islands, and I will dry up the pools. And I will bring the blind by a way that they knew not; I will lead them in paths that they have not known: I will make darkness light before them, and crooked things straight. These things will I do unto them, and not forsake them. They shall be turned back, they shall be greatly ashamed, that trust in graven images, that say to the molten images, Ye are our gods."

These verses (10-17) present a new song to the Lord. See also Psalms 96 and 98. "As a result of the vision of the Servant of Jehovah, and of His relationship to Jehovah, the prophet immediately broke forth into a song of confidence, in which he called upon the whole earth to give glory to Jehovah. His appeal is universal. The song must ascend from the end of the earth, and all must take part therein; both such as go down to the sea, and all that is therein; both the islands, and those who dwell thereon. The wilderness, the cities, and the villages of the lands beyond the holy land are to join in the anthem, with the inhabitants of Sela, which is the rock. The song is to be that which ascribes the glory to Jehovah, and the reason is that He is going forth upon a campaign in which He will be victorious over His enemies. The prophetic word now changes into the actual language of Jehovah in which, speaking in the abiding tense of His own existence [v. 14], He declares that His passion, long restrained in patience, is now to become active in power. All that was said concerning the method of the Servant of God is now spoken by God as of Himself. He [the Lord] has long time holden His peace, been still, and refrained Himself in the method of grace which does not 'cry, nor lift up, nor cause His voice to be heard in the street' [cf. v. 2]. Now the method will change, and He [the Lord] will cry out. He will gasp and pant, will make waste mountains and hills, and will proceed, as the song of the prophet has declared, as a mighty man for the establishment of judgment. The issue of this activity of His passion will be the establishment of peace. The needy will find succour; the blind, that is His failing people, will yet be led into the realization of His original purpose."

A diesel-driven electric power system will provide emergency lighting and power to elevators and fire pumps in case of power failure. The building will also have its own backup water supply, a subterranean 12,000-gallon reservoir.  
William L. Perera Associates architects of Newport Beach designed the building. C. L. Peck Construction, Los Angeles, is general contractor.

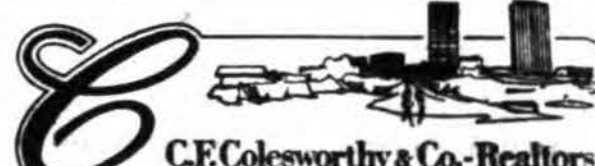

# WHERE DO OLD CITY MANAGERS GO?

Newport Beach is in the very odd position of having a paid lobbyist as chairman of a citizens committee which is supposed to give unbiased advice to the City Council. Mr. Robert Shelton, former city manager, former city councilman, and now a lobbyist for the Irvine Co., is chairman of our citizens committee to study designs for the proposed Bay Bridge that would replace the present span. He was appointed by Councilman Richard Croul. Each of our 7 councilmen appointed one member to the committee.

This isn't right. When a man is paid to represent the viewpoint of a company, he shouldn't be expected to be without bias in his views.

Here's some background on Mr. Shelton. After he served here as city manager and on the Council, he became the land management man for a big outfit with huge land holdings in the Santa Monica hills. After the city of Los Angeles spent \$12 million of taxpayers' money to study the feasibility of building a freeway along Mulholland Drive, directly to the land company's holdings, Councilman Bernardi decided one day that the whole project smelled, and convinced fellow councilmen to unanimously scrap the whole thing.

Now, Mr. Shelton can be seen around City Hall quite often. He also appears frequently for the Irvine Co. in Sacramento. Some folks say he was very active in trying to ram that ugly Pacific Coast Freeway down our throats. Now, Irvine wants the Coast Highway re-routed through the same old traffic corridor through Corona del Mar.

We'd better wise up. There should be a city law requiring lobbyists to register. And a lobbyist appearing before the City Council, or any other city agency, should have to identify himself as such, and publicly say who is paying him to appear. And all lobbyists should be kept out of official or semi-official city positions.

You can't legislate honesty, but you can use legislation to force questionable practices out into the open. We don't need paid lobbyists telling us what to do in City Hall. With so many former city employees working for Irvine and hobnobbing with our city people, Irvine should build us a new city hall free.
