\$600,000 Tracts for Mesa Bared

Tobias Discloses Plans for 5 and 10-acre Sites

What is expected to develop into a \$600,000 subdivision containing 60 homes will be started this week in Costa Mesa, it was announced exclusively to the News-Press today by Realtor W. A. Tobias and associates.

The new subdivision is located between Victoria and Hamilton Sts. near Placentia Ave. Work will start on 5 acres of land which was purchased from Mazet and Larabee of Balboa Island.

At the same time, Tobias revealed, engineering work is now being done on an adjoining ten acres in the same vicinity.

RIDDERHOF LANDSLIDE

Victorious Councilman Thumps Perrow, Blodgett

Heavily favored, Stanley Ridderhof, Newport Heights, was an easy winner in Tuesday's special councilmanic election, receiving 1211 votes over the 640 cast for Harry Blodgett and 629 for William G. Perrow, both Corona del Mar. The 2480 votes were a 26.4 percent fragment of the 9443 registered voters.

Observers noted Perrow's defeat as a rejection of the Harbor Citizens League choice in this particular election. Previous elections have seen League candidates do much better.

Ridderhof, in a statement to the News-Press, said:

"I am extremely honored and gratified at the magnificent support Newport Beach voters gave my candidacy for City Council. In future months while it is my privilege to be their representative, I shall pursue the task their confidence has given me with deep humility and a great sense of responsibility. I was deeply honored by the support of those who believed in me. I will do my utmost to justify their confidence."

Perrow beat Ridderhof and Blodgett in Consolidated Precincts A and B where he received heavy majorities. In the other five, however, Ridderhof held commanding majorities.

Woodward Named Assistant to School Superintendent

Business Manager Thomas Woodward was promoted Tuesday night to Assistant District Superintendent and Business Manager of the Newport Beach Elementary District by the Board of Trustees.

Woodward was employed by the district last March. The board also voted him a \$50 raise on the new contract which was written to June 30, 1955 so that subsequent contracts will be on a fiscal year.

Superintendent Roy W. Andersen told the board he is expecting to hear momentarily from the State Division of Architects with an approval on the drawings for additions to Horace Ensign and Harbor View schools. The board hopes to open bid on the two jobs at the Jan. 4 board meeting.

Approval of tentative plans on the new school was given to Architect Philmer Ellerbroek who will send them immediately to the state for tentative approval. "We want to have the plans ready for bid not later than July and commence building in August," Ellerbroek said.

Horvath Couple, Robinson and Long Beach Man Face Charges

Narcotic charges were brought against three Newport Harbor youths and a Long Beach insurance adjuster yesterday after police arrested three of the four Monday night.

Archie Horvath, 20 and his wife, Janadeane Kaye Horvath, 18, of 511 Fullerton Ave., were arrested by police close to midnight. Horvath was charged with illegal possession of heroin, a felony. His wife was charged with being addicted to the unlawful use of narcotics, a misdemeanor.

PLEADS GUILTY

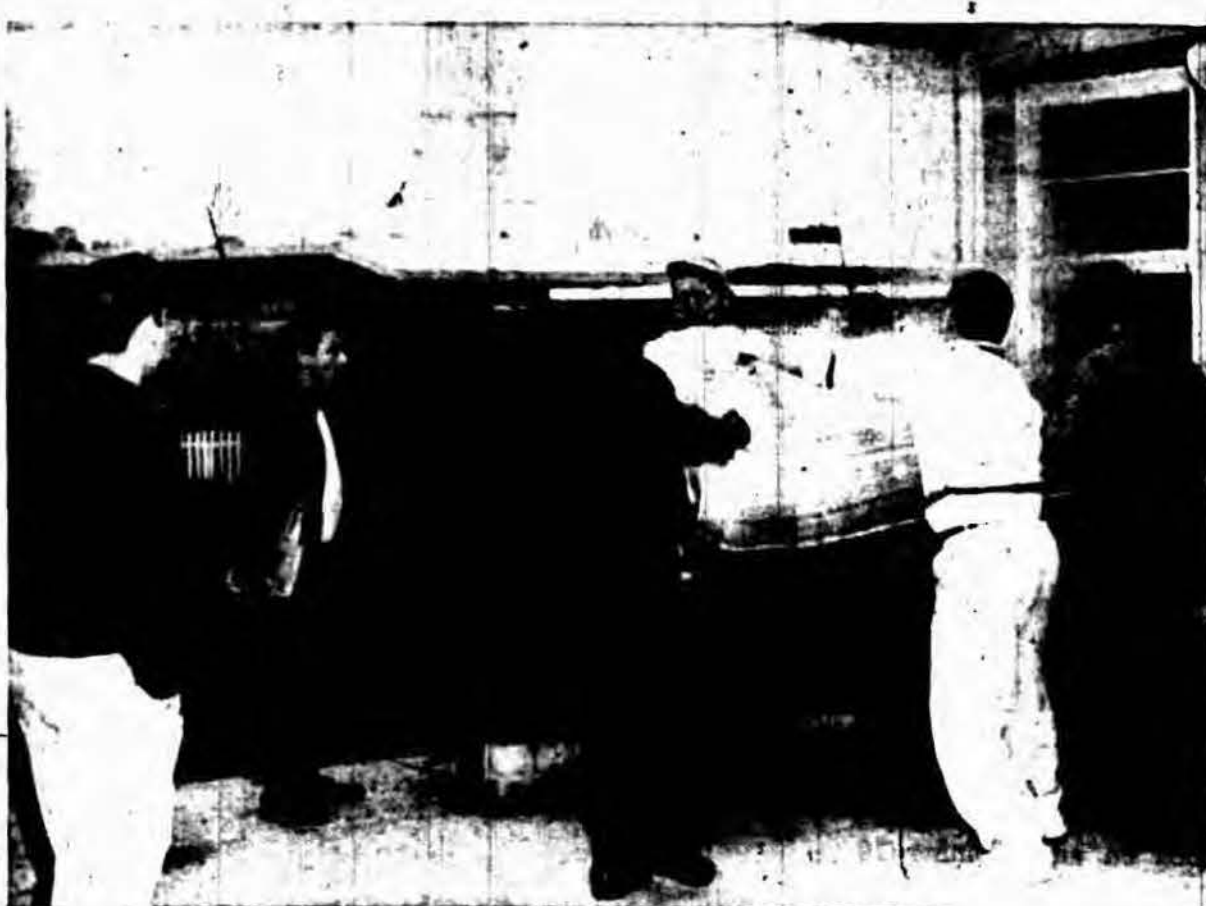

ELDRED CASE GOES INTO FOURTH DAY; ROY GREENLEAF ON STAND

The fourth day of the A. G. Eldred trial got under way today when Miss Maude Moore, retired Santa Ana school teacher, returned to the stand. She was questioned at length yesterday on her dealings with the Eldred Co.

Miss Moore maintains Eldred refused to give her and her mother, Mrs. Maggie Moore, trust deeds which they thought they were purchasing.

Eldred is charged with three counts of grand theft in connection with trust deed transactions. He was indicted by the grand jury. The trial recessed yesterday afternoon until Monday morning.

He assertedly unlawfully took \$5000 from Lizzie Ritter of Santa Ana, \$3313 from Maggie Moore of Santa Ana and \$2800 from Mr. and Mrs. Everett Hughes of Anaheim. All were trust deed transactions. The deals occurred in August, 1953.

In the first day of testimony on Monday, Roy F. Greenleaf Jr., local Realtor, general contractor and president of the Costa Mesa Savings and Loan Association, testified to business relations with Eldred.

Greenleaf said the corporation had 11 apartments on East Side St., Santa Ana, with the Inglewood Federal Savings and Loan Co., holding a first trust deed on the duplexes. He said he had no discussions with Eldred on selling second trust deeds on the property.

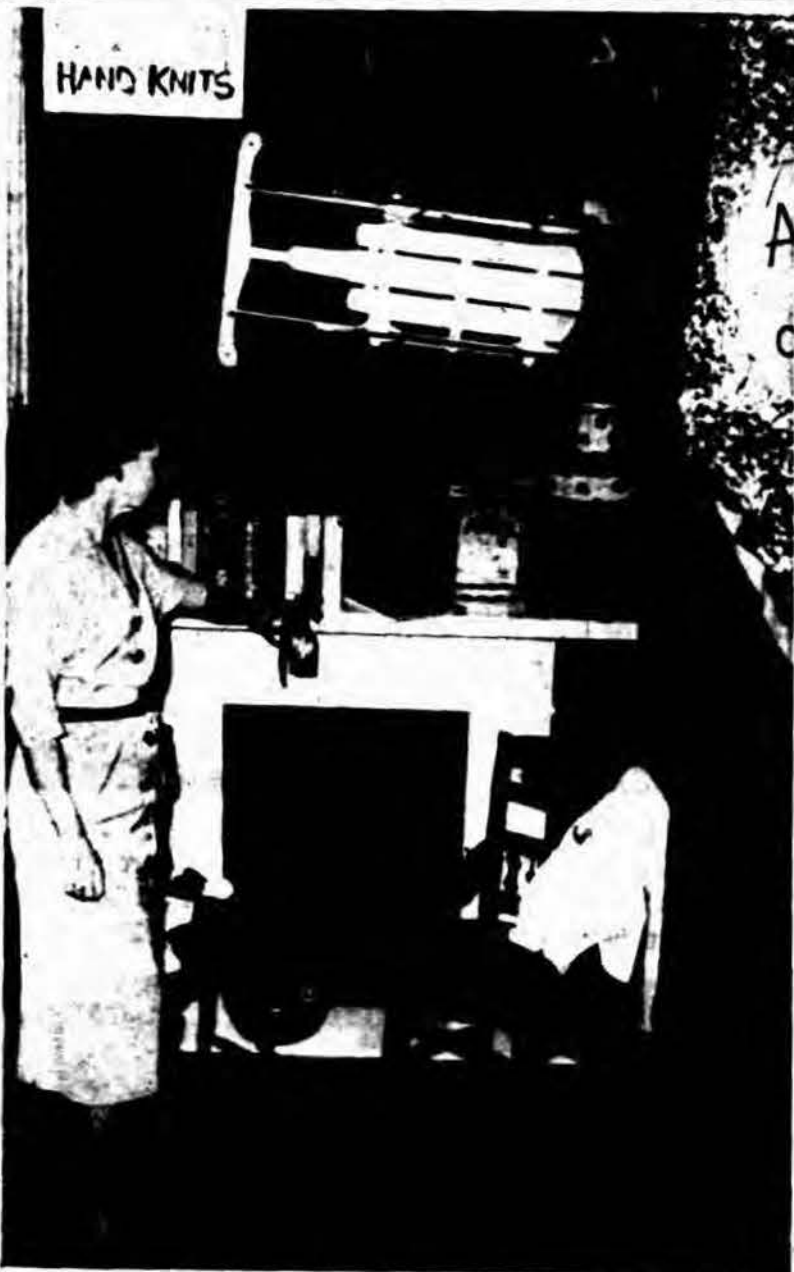

Mesa Street Improvement District Hearing Jan. 17

Initial steps were taken toward establishment of an improvement district on Rochester St. from Santa Ana to Tustin Ave. during City Council meeting in Costa Mesa this week.

The district would pay the cost of grading, paving, curbs and gutters and removal of a house which blocks one end of the street. If approved, nine-year bonds bearing an interest rate of 6 per cent would be employed. Estimated cost of the project was \$21,000.

A hearing of protests against the proposed district will be held by the council at 7:30 p.m. Jan. 17. Objections must be presented in writing to City Clerk Arlie Swartz.

Plans and specifications for the district as submitted by City Engineer R. L. Patterson were also approved by the board.

In other business handled by the council Monday night, an ordinance was approved granting the Edison Company a franchise to distribute electricity to the Mesa public. Accepted was a \$1000 bond from the company for the franchise.

An ordinance amending subdivision regulations was adopted, giving the City Planning Commission discretion when two to four parcels of land are divided. In such cases, the planners can require improvements to conform with neighborhood standards. The commission can also take bonds for one year to the city so that improvements need not be made immediately.

F. D. Owen was reappointed to represent Costa Mesa as trustee on the Orange County Mosquito Abatement district. The council was notified his term would expire Dec. 31.

School crossing guards, scheduled for termination Tuesday, were rehired through Dec. 17.

A request by Chief Art McKenzie for a three-pronged safety driving campaign during President Eisenhower's "S-D Day" Dec. 15 was approved for the Mesa area. McKenzie will employ public address systems, stencil slogans such as "Keep Alive in '55" on

Lots of Work for New Council

We were pleased to see Newport Beach voters elected Stanley Ridderhof to City Council by such a thumping majority. That aspect of the election was significant, its only deplorable feature being the light vote cast. However, such a vote does not reflect on the candidates, rather on the average citizen's lack of interest in special elections.

Now that Ridderhof is "in" and his taking office a mere formality, the council can return to its basic purpose of running the city and with a five-member body to do the job.

Many important problems remain to be accomplished by the council. In a city which has such continuous growth as Newport Beach lack of problems is the exception rather than the rule.

Possibly this election's light vote was caused by the fact we will all vote for seven new councilmen this spring after the City Charter is approved formally by the state legislature. But this "lame duck" side of city government should not be construed as time for the council to be inactive.

We all are interested in building Newport Harbor. To better this, Southern California's choicest seaside city, is a job we must all undertake. We look forward to the council dropping previous rancors that might have occurred when the four members could not agree on appointment of a member to fill the seat left vacant by resignation of Norman Miller.

There is much work to be done in the city by its council. When Councilman Ridderhof is sworn in and the full council thereby renewed, it's a fine time for all council members and the citizens to take new interest in government of Newport Beach, our favorite city.

for meat production to the changing conditions of demand. He finds that, "In the long run such price controls result in meat prices being higher than they would have been without the controls."

The free market, governed as it is by the natural law of supply and demand, is the only kind of market that brings maximum benefits to all concerned.

Your Part in 'S-D' Day

If all American motorists would join in observing all the rules and regulations for proper driving for a single day, they would learn how safe the streets and highways of our country can be.

Well, on Dec. 15 they are invited — yes, urged — to do just that. Dec. 15, as you probably know, has been designated as Safe Driving Day by President Eisenhower's Action Committee for Traffic Safety.

It should not be looked upon as just "another day." It isn't. It is one of the relatively few observances that has significance for virtually every American. There is hardly a village or hamlet in America, however remote, which today is without a motor car. And where there are cars, there are statistics — appalling statistics for the nation as a whole — on the traffic casualties.

To say that "accidents will happen" — as if we had nothing whatever to say about it — or to assume the fatalistic attitude that we're either going to get hurt or killed or come through unscathed no matter how we act is superstition of the rankest kind.

It hardly need be said that certainly the great majority of mishaps occur to those who are reckless in one way or another. It is the elimination of this recklessness which the traffic safety group is striving to achieve.

So, if we ALL cooperate in this effort for just one day — Dec. 15 — the results might well be so remarkable as to inspire us to make safe driving a habit every day of the year.

The Final Grim Tally

The fate of 13 fliers held as "spies" by Red China is of terrible moment to all Americans. Yet it is but a climactic highlight to the whole grim tragedy of the Korean war.

The Defense Department has just closed the books, except for possible minor revisions later, on American casualties in that conflict. On the last sad page, the names of 4735 servicemen who met with an unknown fate were transferred from the missing list to the roll of those presumed dead.

The sum up: Dead, 33,629; wounded, 103,284; captured or missing but subsequently returned to military control, 5133.

Over thirty-three thousand dead! That is more than a fourth of the American death toll—126,000—in World War I. That is almost a third of the 110,000 Americans who died to save the Union in the Civil War!

Yet Korea was not even termed a "war" — only a "police action." Korea, unlike America's other wars, was fought to no definite end. It unified nothing. It rectified nothing. It settled nothing. The points at issue still remain in a state of truce.

All that is certain is the list of irrevocable tragedy — 33,629 young Americans dead.

The Case for the Free Market

Professor E. J. Working of the Department of Agricultural Economics of the University of Illinois has just completed a special study of meat prices over the years. His findings are of very direct interest to both consumers and producers.

"Meat prices are constantly changing and price may truly be said to depend upon the conditions of supply and demand in the short run as well as in the long run," Dr. Working states. "In the light of present circumstances it may seem almost unbelievable that 20 years ago, at a time when our per capita consumption of meat was approaching its lowest level, it became a part of our national agricultural policy to restrict the production of meat animals. While reducing production tended to increase income through raising prices, it tended to have the opposite effect through reducing the amount which farmers had to sell. Then, too, the program was clearly bad for consumers and for workers and management of the meat industry."

His study also has some interesting things to say about our most recent experiment with livestock controls and direct price controls on meat. These, he points out, failed to deal with the fundamental cause of high meat prices. They interfered with the normal action of prices in helping to adjust our changing resources

Sacramento Sidelight

SACRAMENTO. — (CNS) — Persons interested in the subject of unemployment insurance chiseling, which has received wide publicity over a period of years yet apparently goes on unabated, are looking forward to two sub-committee meetings of the assembly finance and insurance committee here December 14 and 15.

The first meeting will be the sub-committee on fraudulent and improper unemployment insurance payments, headed by Assemblyman Gordon Fleury, of Sacramento. It was this committee before which extensive frauds were exposed by William A. Burkett, who represented a group of employers, and who subsequently was named director of the department of employment.

Burkett admits freely that the frauds on the part of chiseling workers have not decreased appreciably, although he has through

better organization of the department itself, virtually eliminated fraudulent payments for which the department itself was responsible.

GREATER PENALTIES
The question now, as explained by Burkett, is how to tie up the unemployment insurance act to make chiseling harder and penalties for chiseling greater. The department has worked out a series of bills, some of which at least will be considered by the Fleury committee.

Difficulty has been experienced in the past, however, in tightening up penalties, as in almost every session of the legislature since unemployment insurance started in 1935, the issue has become a major battle between the employer and labor lobbyists. Some things have been accomplished, but the employer group feels that the tightening up program has not been nearly as great as it should be.

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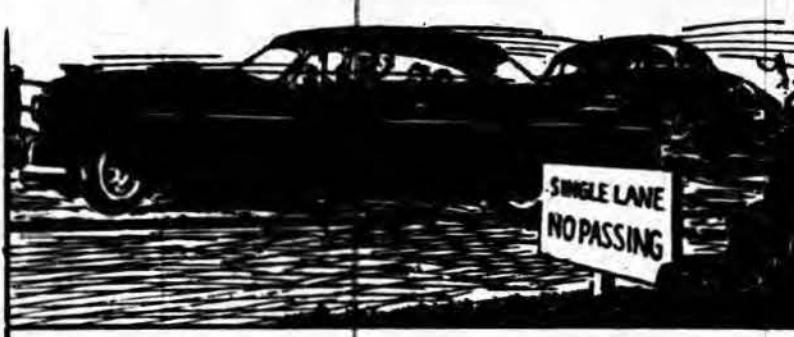

BRUSH COUNTRY JOURNAL

(Ed. Note — This column by Horace Parker will deal with the little-known historical facts he has dredged up in his many trips into the back country in recent years.)

We spent Thanksgiving where the Jeep thumbs its nose at the Cadillac; where the trite phrase "a blanket of stars" is an actuality; where Mother Earth went Impressionistic; where the natives argue whether there is one or two R's in the town's name; and where we had the most delightful vacation of all times.

Borego Valley or Borrego Springs depending on which "camp" you are in was at its best during the Thanksgiving week. While there was fog and smog along the coast the desert was warm and balmy by day, cool and clear at night. Away from street lights and television we went to bed at dark and rose at sunup, something we hadn't done for years.

JEOP SUPPLIED

Through the efforts of Ben Reddick, David Olmsted secretary of the Roads to Romance Association and the cooperation of Jack Benson, Realtor, valley booster and owner of the Benson Tours, a Jeep station wagon was at our disposal during our entire visit. Because Jack knew that Karl Bennis, one of the old-timers in the valley, was to be our constant companion he dispensed with a driver and we were on our own. To really see the desert the Jeep is a "must" because you are not following roads but rather desert washes and rocky canyons in order to get to the points of interest.

Actually for the casual desert visitor, the Benson Tours are most economical, for Jeep and driver it averages about \$6 per hour plus tax and there is room for six people. Mr. Benson has the concession for tours throughout the 400,000 acres of the Anza State Park and points of interest are myriad and the tough little Jeep can get to most of them.

PREFERS OLD NAMES

One of the most awe-inspiring trips can be made by Jeep in about two hours and although I have made the trip to "Highpoint and the Badlands" a number of times I couldn't resist doing it again. Here again we have the struggle between the old and new in the valley, the new name for the Highpoint is Font's Point, and the Badlands are called the Painted Desert—I prefer the older names and I'll tell you the story.

Frank Clark, early pioneer and cattleman in the Borego Valley, was a real wanderer of the desert and like all desert people he kept his eye out for water. An Indian on the Santa Rosa Reservation high in the San Jacinto mountains told Frank that he knew where

there was water in the Badlands. Frank told him he would give him \$10 to show him. So one day down the trail from the mountains came the Indian wearing his yucca-fiber moccasins.

NO WATER FOUND

Up the canyon they went that leads to Highpoint, and even after a most diligent search no water was found. However, the Indian did show Frank the Highpoint which was without doubt the first time a white man had looked from its awesome height. Frank was so impressed with the sight, he felt that he was more than repaid for the \$10 spent even though they didn't find water. Even now one can see the dim outline of a branch of the main Indian trail ending at the highpoint where aboriginal sentries once searched the desert for enemies. Frank showed the spot to Karl Bennis and Karl thinks that probably he was the second whiteman to look down on the rugged badlands.

Two old prospector friends of Karl's and mine in Temecula, Charley McVicar and Charley Carstensen many years ago made a trip through the badlands over the old Indian trail running about east to west. In one of the canyons they came upon five human skeletons, plus the skeletons of mules and the remains of pack saddles. Later they took Karl back to try and find the spot but instead of starting on the trail at its beginning they tried to find it where it emerges from the badlands and without success. These old Indian trails are faint in outline and unless one is actually following them they are hard to pick up at random. Rumor has it that these skeletons were from one of the later parties in search of the lost Plegier mine.

We had relatives along who had seen the badlands in the Dakotas and they said that our Borego Badlands were more awe-inspiring than the Dakotas. One of these days why don't you get a party of six together, call Jack Benson at Borrego Springs, reserve a Jeep and take a trip you will long remember ranking along with a view of the Grand Canyon and for only a fraction of the cost and time?

INTRAMURAL PLAY IS SUCCESSFUL AT CLUB

'Basketball Takes Spotlight from Football; Interest High

As basketball takes over the spotlight of interest in the hearts and minds of the many members of the Harbor Boys' Club at Costa Mesa, one point stands out — each boy will be placed on a team.

All in all team sports included in the Boys' Club program, first consideration is given to the many and the heart of the athletic program is the intramural aspect — competition between teams of local boys in a comparative class.

GRID SEASON ENDS

Last week saw the conclusion of the most successful season of flag football in the history of the local club. Spirited competition marked play right down to the finish in the fifth grade league which had 78 boys signed up for the six teams.

The sixth grade championship was played last Saturday with John Hughes leading his "Hughes Heroes" to a 26-13 win over Fred McGavran's "Mugs." While the rules of flag football call for only

six men, a special local variation allowed up to nine boys to play on each team at one time — thus allowed all boys to play the full game and eliminate substitution problems.

In sixth grade play there were six teams with over 60 boys playing each week. Of the 48 games scheduled in intramural play, only one game was lost by forfeit and that was because the captain gave his team the wrong information on playing time. The responsibility of getting the teams ready and calling the plays was left to the captains.

The Boys' Club formed a fifth

grade team, sixth grade team and a seventh and eighth grade team to meet the challenge of neighboring towns in flag football. The teams were selected from the intramural leagues and no boy was allowed to participate on the all star team if he missed his scheduled intramural game — unless he was ill. (The last exception was inserted to keep the boys from playing intramural ball when they should be treating a cold or other important matters.)

While the element of competition was lost in letting all boys play instead of making the teams

field only six players, it was felt that this would be restored in the battle for positions on the team.

The boys were told to try their best and to prove by action rather than accusation. They also had a chance to make the all star team at any point during the season and were urged to prove their worth if they felt left out when the original selection was made.

Another value found in a good intramural program is the "all-stars" have to learn to work with the others. They must play with them and are instructed to aid the other players in learning new skills. Appreciation of team members and the knowledge that mistakes are not made on purpose are important lessons learned in intramural play.

While an all-star is generally an outstanding player on his intramural team, he is just one of the boys on the all-star team and must learn what it is like to follow as well as to lead.

Actually the two types of play, intramural and interclub, complement each other and aid in turning out better athletes, sports and consequently better boys.

BASKETBALL STARTS
Last week saw the organization of six seventh grade basketball teams and four eighth grade teams for intramural play. This week organization of fourth and fifth graders was slated for Tuesday, sixth graders started Wednesday, high schoolers, Wednesday night, and final organization of seventh and eighth graders will take place this afternoon.

As in all sports (and in the entire club program) every boy will be given an opportunity to play. In basketball we cannot guarantee each boy a first string position but we can guarantee that the boy will get to play on a team.

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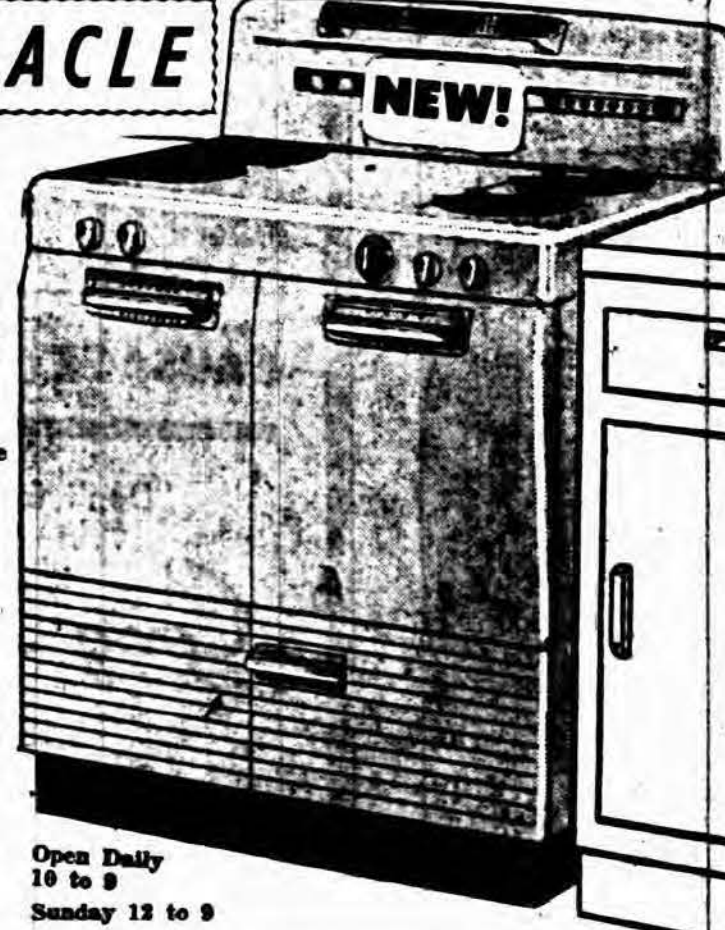

Police said Bernice Pearl Swanson, 37, of 2516 Fairway Drive, Costa Mesa, driver of the car involved, was not held.

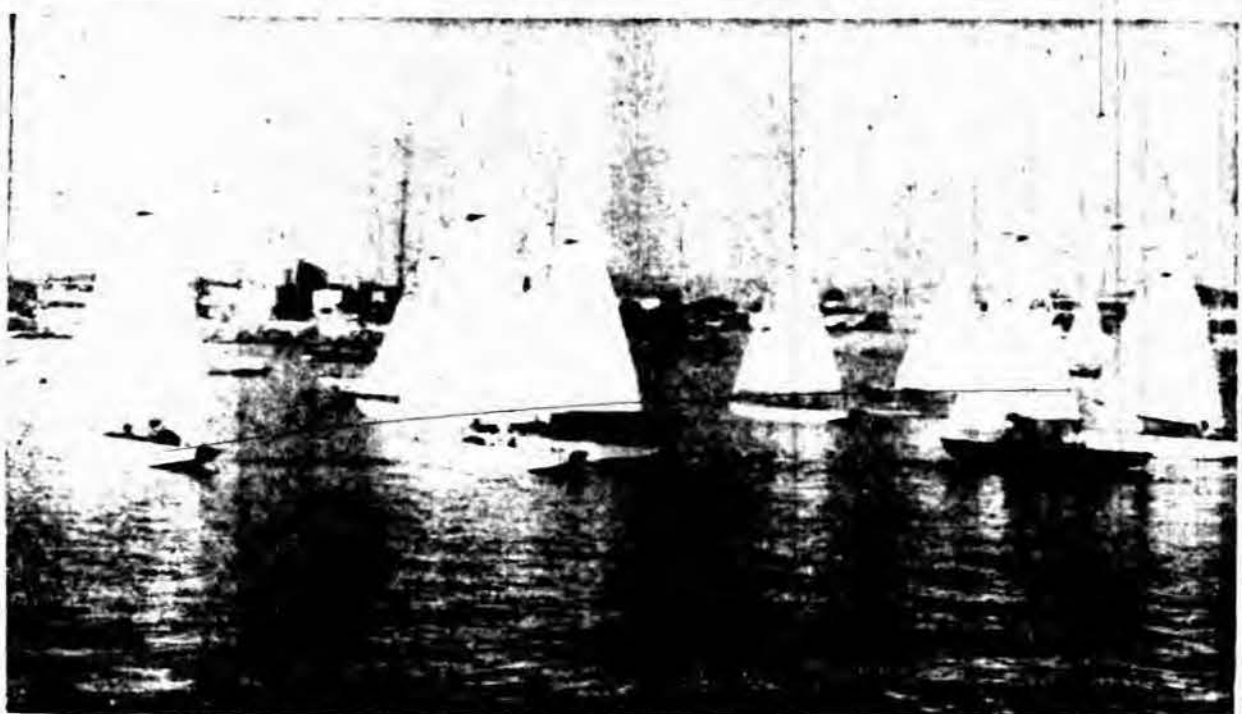

QUASH DENIED

Lehman and Devine Plead Not Guilty

SANTA ANA (OCNS) — After hearing their motions to quash a two-count grand jury indictment denied by Superior Court Judge Robert Gardner last week, union representatives Harry Lehman and Charles E. (Red) Devine pleaded innocent on both charges. Judge Gardner set 9:30 a. m. Jan. 3, as jury trial date for them. Gardner also overruled demurrers filed on behalf of both defendants by attorneys James Monroe and George Chula. Seeing both their motions go down the drain, Chula and Monroe battled to get certain "surplusage" matter stricken from the record. Gardner rejected this too, making it a bad day all around for the defendants.

NEWPORTERS NAMED
Devine and Lehman are charged with the conspiracy to ask or receive a bribe from a public official and conspiracy to commit grand theft. They assertedly offered to obtain on-sale general liquor licenses for Roger Early and Al Wedderspoon of Newport Beach for a figure in excess of the regular state price.

The attorneys argued insufficient evidence had been given in the grand jury indictment. They contended the defendants couldn't be tried under section 68 of the penal code. The attorneys claimed the naming of a John Doe and Richard Roe as co-conspirators with Lehman and Devine will not hold up in court.

Superior Court Judge Stanley Mosk held this is true when he tossed out a similar charge against Sam L. and his son, Sam E. Collins.

TRIAL WITH COLLINES
The defense attorneys also argued the statute of limitations ruled out several alleged overt acts on the part of the defendants. Both Devine and Lehman are free on bail. They are slated to go on trial with the Collinses Jan. 10 on a three-pronged grand jury indictment. They are accused of the unlawful taking of \$10,000 from Mrs. Ella Duplax, Tustin bar owner, formerly of Corona del Mar, in return for getting an on-sale liquor license for her place.

WOMEN'S SECTION OF COUNTY JAIL TOURED

'Hair-pulling' Infrequently Enlivens Life Behind Bars

By GAIL BAUER — The women's section of the Orange County Jail has a capacity of 24. The walls are light green, with bars separating the interior. But life behind those iron bars isn't as bad as it could be in the Orange County Jail. The Santa Ana institution is one of the top ranking prisons in the United States.

Singing and laughter came from behind the bars of the women's section as Matron Mildred Carothers showed me through the third-floor, women's section. The inmates were going happily about their duties, some singing, some sewing, others sleeping, talking or doing fancy work. They seemed very content.

TALK OVER WOMEN

The women live in cells just like the male prisoners. However, they have a central corridor recreation room in which to meet. Mrs. Carothers has brownish-gray hair and a very soft, understanding voice. We sat down and talked about the women and why some of them were in there. "Most of them get along pretty good," Mrs. Carothers said, "Once they get accustomed to their surroundings."

Women from all over Orange County are serving their time in the jail, she explained. Sentences range from one day to a year.

Women with greater sentences are not confined in the jail, but go to the Corona Institute for Women — a state penitentiary. Some of the charges for which the Orange County jail inmates are confined are: burglary, prostitution, violation of federal law, and intoxication. The greatest member of "guests" are confined for intoxication.

SEPARATE JUVENILES

The juvenile tank is separate from the adult cells. That is only for the under-age offenders. It has two bunks, but it is seldom full. Once in a while, a girl who is too old in actions for the Juvenile Home is kept in the 12x15-foot barred room.

One of the women, we'll call her "Lucy"—was convicted recently on charges of forgery. Lucy will spend the next 60 days in jail doing something like this:

At 5:30 a. m. each day, she gets up and straightens her bunk and cell. At 7:30 she has breakfast, consisting of coffee, toast, cereal or gravy with meat in it or fruit. All their meals are well balanced. After breakfast, she helps with the wiping off of the prison bars and general dusing.

The rest of the day is free to her own use. She often reads, sews, chats with other inmates or has a serious talk with the matron on her life. The matron often at-

tempted to explain why Lucy committed the crime, which caused her to be behind bars.

At 11:30 Lucy has lunch. A brief rest is the usual after-lunch schedule. Taking a blanket out on the sun porch is one of the favorite past-times of the girls.

At 4 o'clock the final meal is served, and as far as Lucy is concerned the monotonous day is almost over. Often in the evenings, a group of women will start singing and harmonizing an old favorite. They have no television but a large radio often blares forth.

Once in a while, a sarcastic remark born of boredom is made to one of the other women, and a little hair-pulling ensues. "But," as Mrs. Carothers stated, "I just let them argue it out, — unless a fight starts. You can't bottle up your feelings forever."

VISITING DAYS

The women are allowed visitors — from 9-11 on Thursdays for the federal prisoners; and 9-11 on Saturdays for the others. Visitors cannot bring the prisoners food except coffee and tea.

The girls are treated the same as men. They are allowed \$5 a week for candy and cigarettes. But the money must be spent on jail-furnished supplies. Thread and cloth with which to sew can be brought by friends. The women also mend the men's clothes, besides their own. The girls wear white uniforms and surplus Women Marine uniforms. The white ones are worn only when they go to the hospital and on Sundays.

Lucy isn't the happiest girl in the world. Being in jail is a life of boredom and misery—the iron bars that surround her constantly admonishing her for the deed which brought her inside the walls.

As Mrs. Carothers said, "They have plenty of time to think things over."

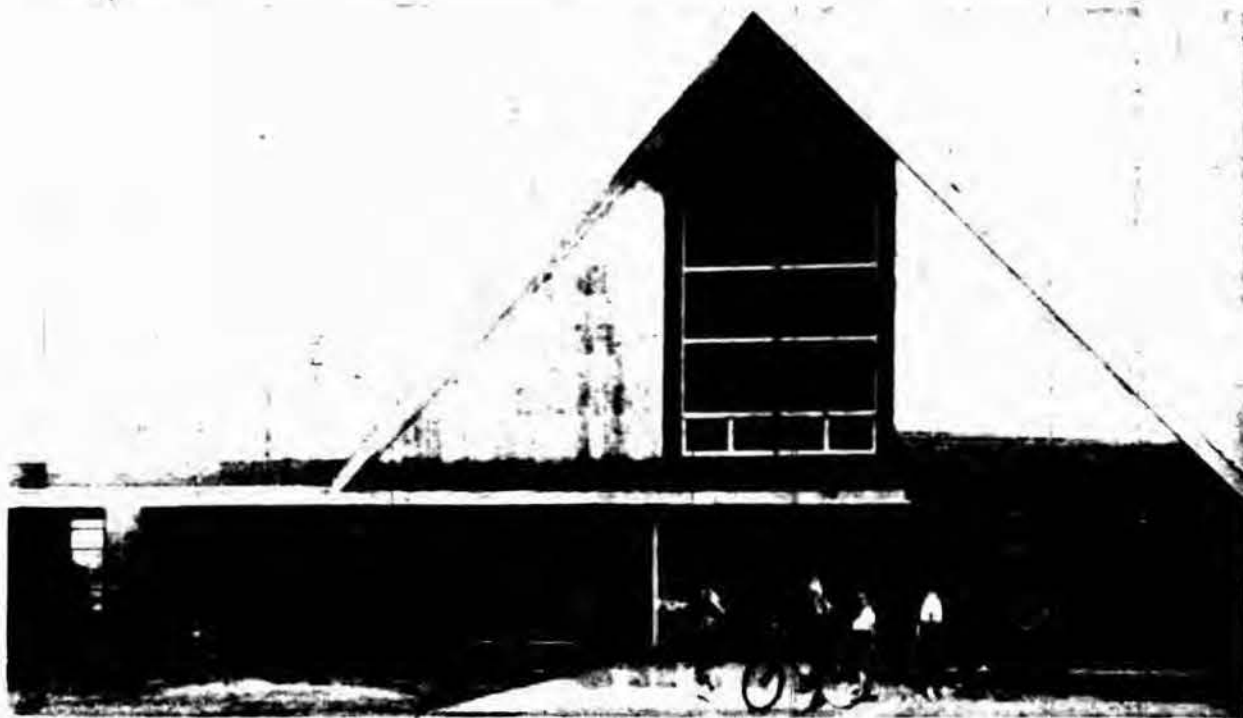
The Sanctuary Choir under direction of Mrs. Lewis Kidder will provide the special ministry of music.

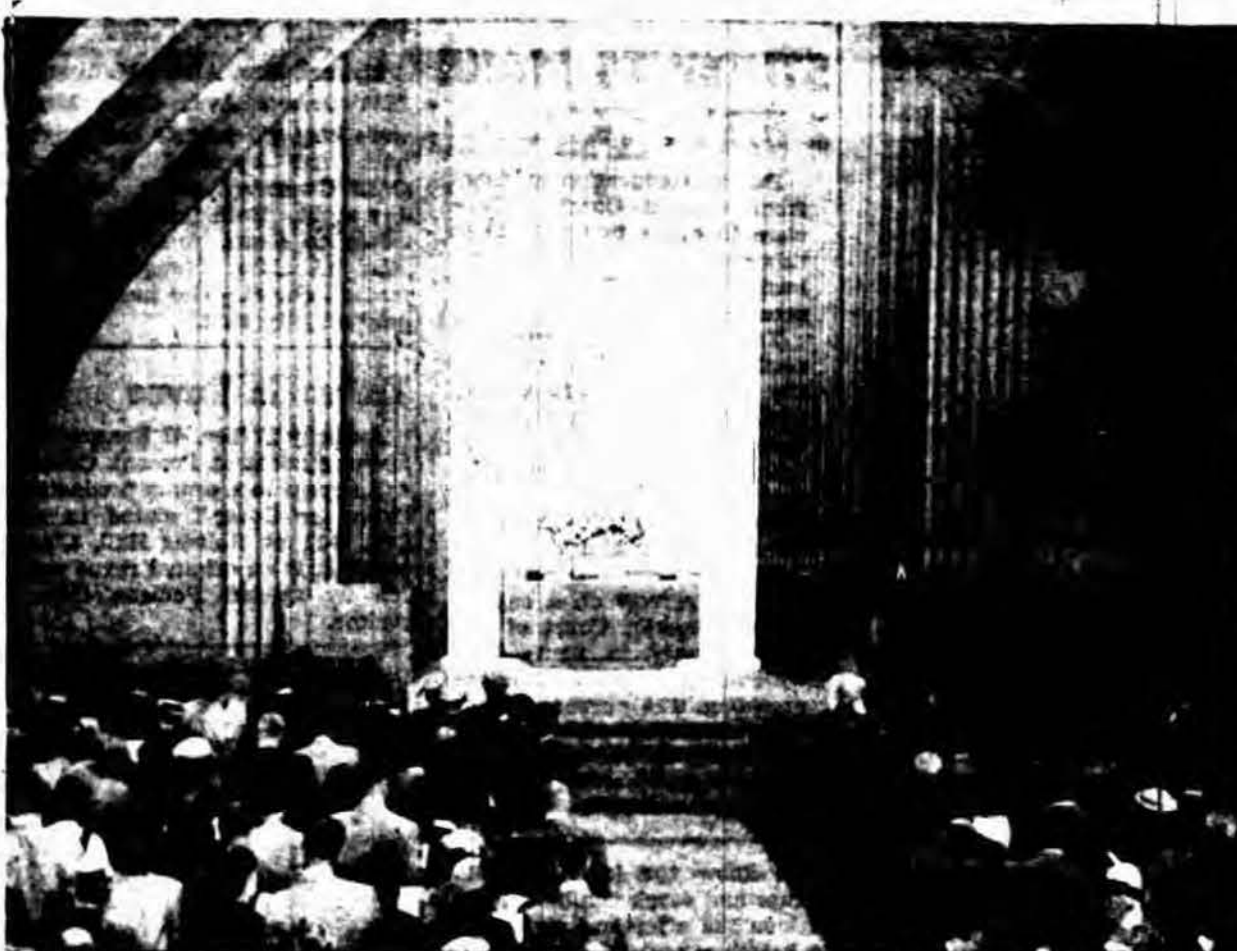
Along with the five choirs of

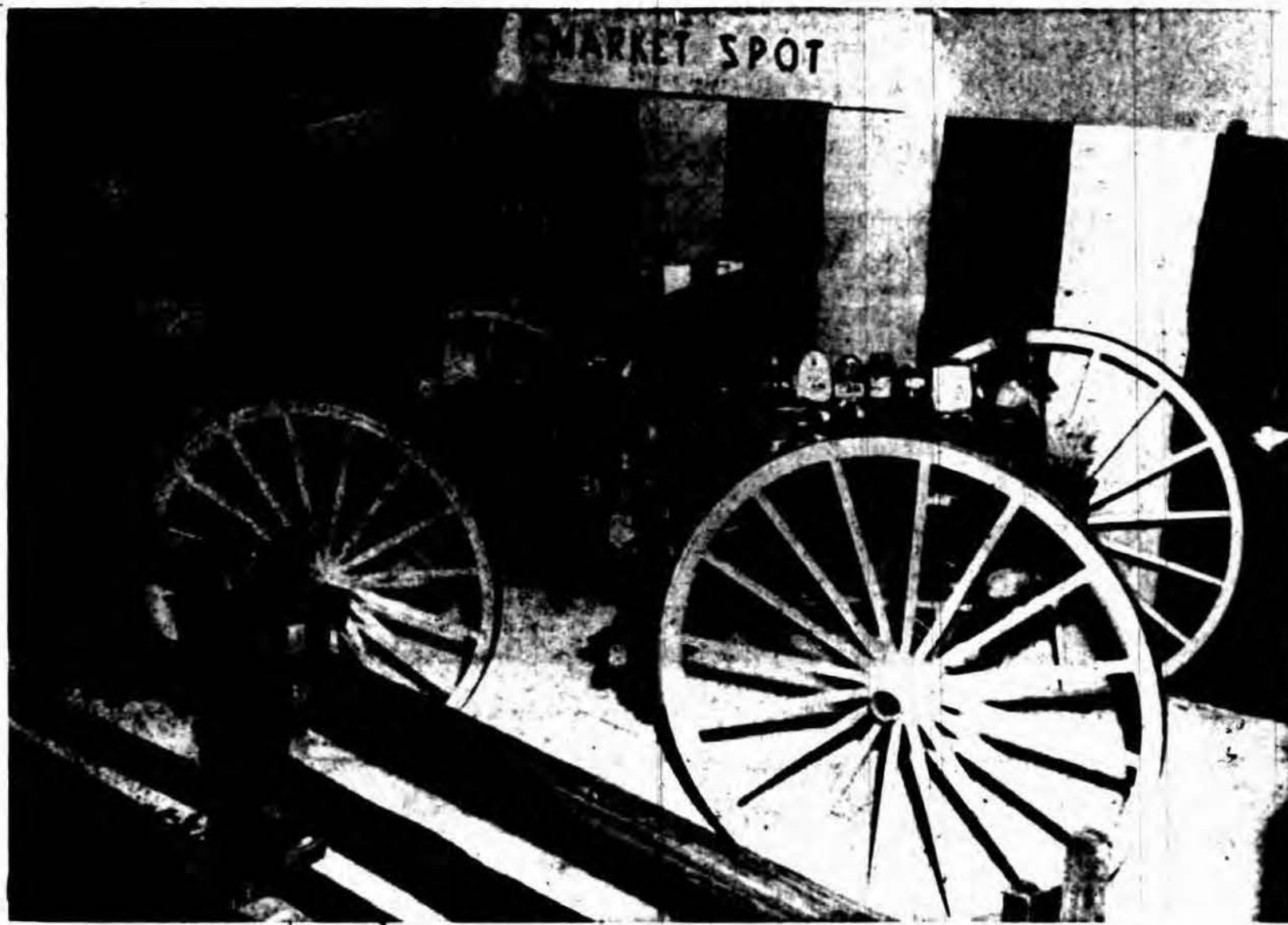

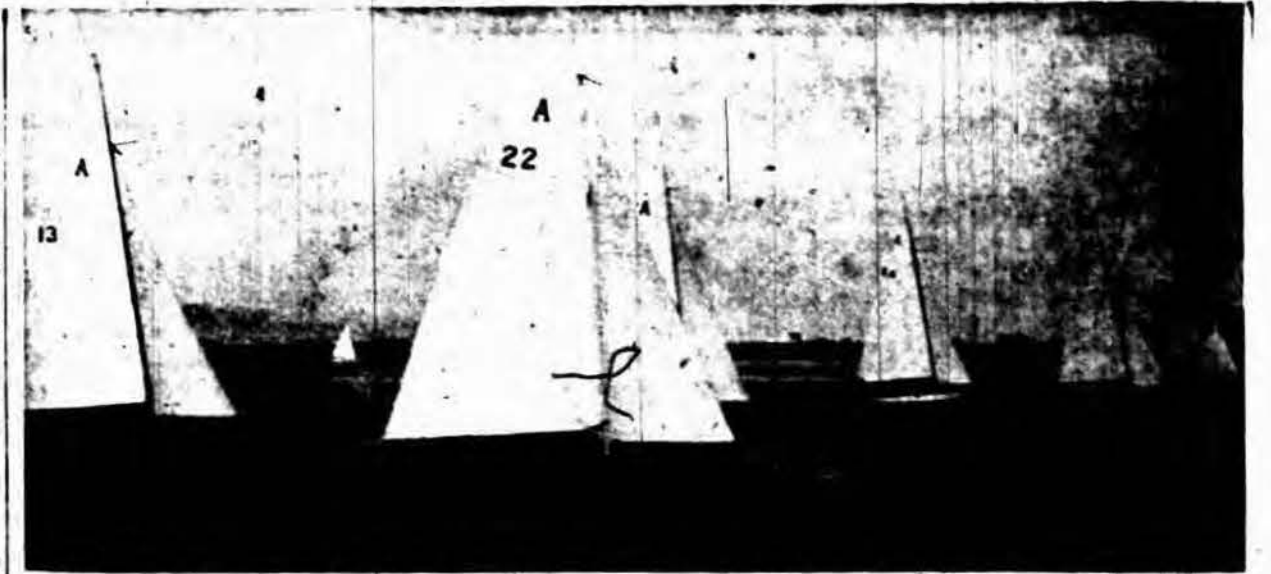

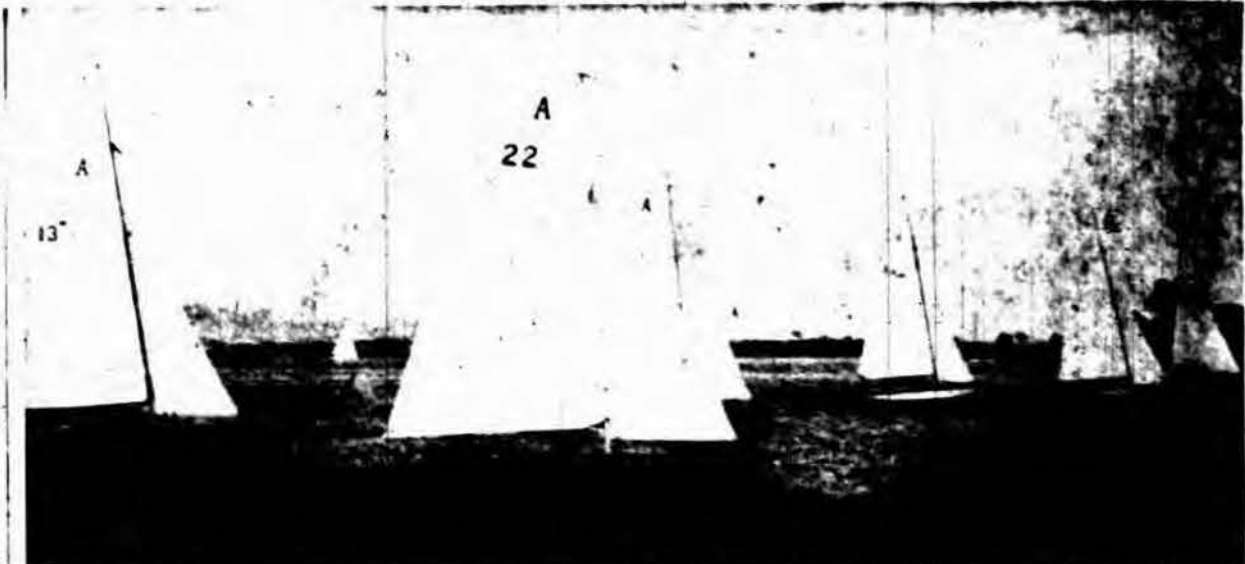
Irvine, Macco Get Garage Approval

Drive Under Way Here; Courage, Misfortune of Harborites Cited

Typical of the unfortunate families suffering from muscular dystrophy in the Harbor area is that of Mrs. Willella Hagerman, 443A E. 16th St., Costa Mesa.

Three of her four sons have been victims of the disease. One of them, David, died as a result of the affliction at the age of 13 when he fell from a chair.

CARES FOR SONS

Today, Mrs. Hagerman, a registered nurse, has to depend on state welfare. She is unable to work for she must stay home to care for muscular dystrophy victims, John, 14, and Thomas, 12. Divorced from her husband, Mrs. Hagerman has been on welfare for more than two years due to the ravages of the disease among her sons.

The Hagerman family is only one of those who can benefit from the present fund-raising drive underway by the Muscular Dystrophy Association of America. The Newport Beach Fire Department, along with fire departments all over the country is cooperating in the collection of donations, it has been announced by Fire Chief R. J. Briscoe.

FIREMEN AID

Every household in the Harbor area will receive mail information regarding muscular dystrophy and the association drive, Briscoe said.

Donations may be mailed or taken to the fire station, where a receipt can be given for income tax purposes if made in person.

Mrs. Hagerman said one of her sons, Frank, 18, is normal. The youth is a freshman at Orange Coast College. He graduated from Newport Harbor High School last year.

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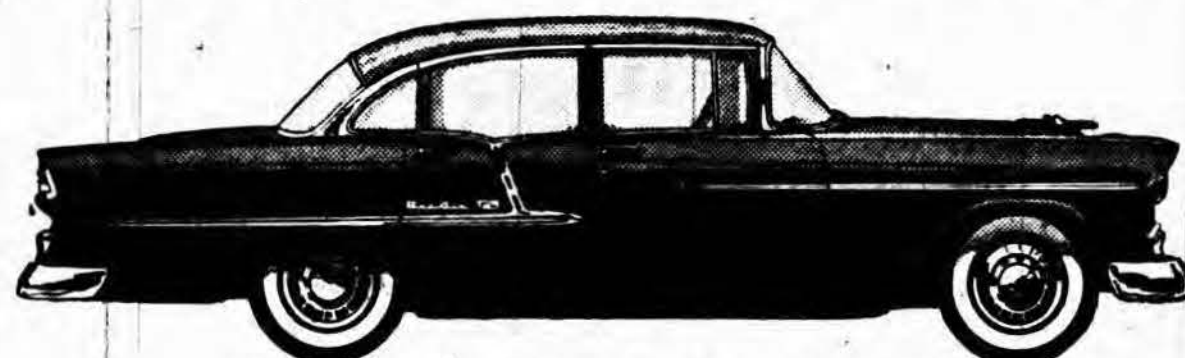
