

TeWinkle Resigns City Council Post

Pioneer Mesa Civic Head to Quit Job on Jan. 1

Charles W. TeWinkle, first mayor of Costa Mesa when the city incorporated in 1953, today submitted a letter of resignation to members of the Mesa City Council. If accepted, the resignation will be effective Jan. 1, 1956.

The reason TeWinkle gave for tendering his resignation "is that I cannot continue to devote the necessary time and energy which the position demands if duties of councilman are to be performed properly. The building program and city annexations require hours of work for which I am unable to find time."

TeWinkle said it was with regret that he tendered his resignation. But he promised, "I shall continue to take an interest in the municipal affairs of the city."

EARLY RESIDENT

TeWinkle located in Harper, which later became Costa Mesa, 35 years ago, becoming owner of a general store in January, 1920. Apple growing was then the main Mesa interest. TeWinkle Hardware grew along with the community and the owner became one of the town's leading citizens.

He served as postmaster for several years. He helped organize the Southern California Hardware Dealers Association, serving as an officer and director. For 10 years he was board chairman for Southwest Hardware Company.

A director of the local chamber of commerce in the early years, TeWinkle served with the first group of men who laid the ground-

work for the Harbor District. He was a member of the original Costa Mesa Park Board.

FORMED MESA BANK

TeWinkle led formation of the Costa Mesa Bank in 1947, serving as president for three years and continuing as board chairman. He is a director of the Newport Balboa Savings and Loan Association.

OCC GETS \$510,000 NEW BUILDING PERMIT

Rock, Gravel Strike Delaying Construction of Science Unit

Orange Coast College last week took out a \$510,000 Costa Mesa city building permit for construction of the new science buildings on the junior college campus — but the Southern California rock and gravel strike is delaying start of actual construction, it was revealed today.

Officially, college spokesmen disclose, construction of the palatial science structure has started. Workmen are shoveling dirt around and getting ready under direction of M. J. Brock and Son, contractors.

But where college authorities hoped to have the building ready for use in September of 1956, they now consider they'll be lucky to have it ready for business in February of 1957. There is a 300-day working schedule on the building.

The half-million dollar structure is designed to take care of all the science and chemistry needs of 2500 students, it was announced, containing three classrooms in addition to necessary laboratories. Square footage of the new Orange Coast College addition is 20,000.

In appreciation of her appearance at their opening ceremony, Mayor Hill will be presented a birthday cake by the local Scouts. The ceremony for opening the lot and honoring the mayor has become an annual tradition.

General supervision of the lot will be provided by parents of Scouts and parishioners of the church under the chairmanship of Robert Blair. The Scouts have made the lot ready for sales. The Cub Scout Pack 81 will follow through on clean-up. Free use of the property has been arranged by the Irvine Foundation. Electricity is provided by a nearby Mobilgas service station. The Newport Harbor Optimist Club

will provide signs and assist with supervision. The lot will be open from 8:30 a. m. until 9 p. m. from Dec. 10 through Dec. 22.

Forrest Owen Passes; Rites Set Saturday

One of Costa Mesa's most prominent citizens, Forrest Owen, 82, of 2067 Newport Ave., died Monday night in Los Angeles Presbyterian Hospital. He was a personal friend of Chief Justice Earl Warren.

Owen, a retired railroad man, was an early secretary of the Costa Mesa Chamber of Commerce and was one of the original members of the Fairview County Water District. He was also on the original committee formed to organize the Costa Mesa Sanitary District and has been its only secretary to date.

The civic leader died after an illness of several weeks. He was native of Ohio.

Owen was a member of the granderie and California state grade of the Eagles for 20 years and was also past president of the Bakersfield lodge.

Survivors include his wife, Etta, of the home address. A resident of the Harbor area for 25 years, Owen was for many years Costa Mesa's representative on the Associated Chambers of Commerce of Orange County and the Orange County Coast Association.

CITY HALL IMPASSE

2-2 Mesa Council Vote Blocks Architect Fees

A two "for" and two "against" vote of Costa Mesa City Council Monday resulted in an impasse on a resolution to approve \$8000 in architects' fees for the construction of a new city hall at the corner of Pomona Ave. and W. 19th St.

Councilmen Charles W. TeWinkle and Alvin Pinkley maintained it was too soon to approve any

sort of fees until the final cost of the building is determined. Architects' fees are computed at 8 per cent of the total cost of the building. It is believed the final cost of the structure will be about \$100,000 but some estimates are as low as \$70,000.

City Attorney Don Dungan assured them that a revised resolution could be passed on at a later date if the cost was lower but the councilmen voted against the measure anyway.

Approving it "to avoid any unnecessary delays" were acting mayor Bruce W. Martin and Councilman Bert Smith. Because of the impasse, due to the absence of Mayor Claire Nelson who had the deciding vote, the measure was set aside.

A rough sketch on the new city hall will probably be presented by Architects Willard T. Jordan of Costa Mesa and Land, Pieger, Blarock and Hougan of Corona del Mar in about 10 days. A preliminary cost estimate will probably be determined then.

By nearly a 2 to 1 majority voters here yesterday rejected a proposed city charter amendment which would have changed councilmanic elections to a Ward System. The vote against the proposition was 1824 compared to a "Yes" vote of 939, not counting absentee ballots, the city clerk reported. This gave the "No" voters a 885 majority.

Out of 7930 registered voters, the total of 2764 casting ballots amounted to about a 35 per cent turnout at the polls, which with intermittent rains yesterday, was a little heavier vote than some had expected. Percentage-wise it was 1.776 to 1 against the amendment.

SMITH LOSES
Former Councilman Andrew W. Smith, originator of the move to amend the charter, saw his own Precinct 16 defeat the proposed amendment by a count of 112 to 108—a four vote majority.

Had the proposed amendment carried local voters would have chosen their council members from the districts in which they lived, thus a Balboa Island candidate, running in his district, would have been voted for by only those residing in his district. The proposition having been defeated, Newport Beach voters will continue to nominate council candidates from the respective seven councilmanic districts but the winners will be chosen by the city-at-large.

The fact that last election saw some council candidates win in the districts which had nominated them but lose in the over-all city count, engendered some support

for the charter amendment apparently. This was one of the main battle cries which Smith and the Harbor Citizens League had used in arguments against the present nominee in the district and elect at large system.

MAYOR HILL HAPPY
Lido Isle's Precinct 9 afforded Madam Mayor Dora Hill great pleasure with a total "No" vote of 219, compared to an 18 "yes" tally. At the last minute she had issued her statement to the News-Press, endorsing the present election method.

The "Yes" vote carried in only four of the 17 consolidated precincts. The precincts favoring the amendment were Nos. 1, 10, 11 and 15. Geographically, those precincts, listed in order are West Newport, the last three all in Corona del Mar.

Supporters of the present charter had feared a light vote would allow the League's and Smith's forces to put across the proposed amendment with relatively no trouble. A heavy Corona del Mar vote, some thought, would spell ruin for the present method of electing council members.

'SKILL' GAMES REFERRED TO MESA POLICE, COUNSEL
"Skill" games, subject of a recent hassle in Newport Beach before they were approved by a split city council vote, came before Costa Mesa City Council Monday night and were immediately referred to the city attorney and chief of police for study.

Four amusement companies in the county have proposed to establish 30 skill game machines in various cafes and bars throughout the city. They will reportedly take the place of the pin balls banned after Jan. 1 when the present permits expire.

When the new ordinance eliminating the pin balls was passed early in November, it was claimed the machines were being outdated because cash payoffs were being made.

Skill games, termed "kissing cousins" to the pin balls, would also be coin-operated and would consist of shuffle-alley, shuffleboard, pool game and tele-quiz among others.

Applicants are the Orange County Music Co., six games; Beach Amusement Co., four games; Newport-Balboa Music Co., four games, and Santa Ana Novelty Co., 16 games.

MESA CESSPOOL LEAKAGE HEALTH THREAT CLAIMED

City Manager Coffey Appointed to Work with District, Tract

Cesspools installed in a new tract in Costa Mesa as a temporary measure until sewers were provided through a pending bond issue have overflowed and threatened to create a serious health problem, it was claimed at Monday's Mesa city council meeting.

City councilmen learned of the problem from City Manager George Coffey Monday night when he suggested a closer check be made of tentative maps submitted by subdividers. Coffey added that the city engineer should be appointed a liaison officer between the Costa Mesa Sanitary District and the subdividers.

Dave Bidnick collected high point honors for the Pirates with 20 points, followed by Ezra Van Horn with 19 and Jeddy Young with 18.

Eddie Pope pitched 17 points through the netting against Torrance for game high point position. Pope also paced the local floor game, aided by Gary Green and Paul Lorentzen.

The Sailor junior varsity team dropped its first game of the season to Torrance JVs, 34-31, after three straight triumphs. Jerry Kemper of the Tars was high point producer with 15.

B and C games with Torrance, scheduled for the local gym yesterday afternoon, were postponed until tomorrow afternoon at 2:45. The varsity takes on California here at 7 p. m. Friday.

Housewives in a new tract between Victoria and Hamilton Sts., west of Placentia Ave. have protested to the Orange County Health officer of unsanitary conditions in the area.

DENY ACCUSATIONS

A spokesman for Dixie and Colgrove, subdividers of the tract, denied the cesspools had not been dug deep enough. Most of the complaints were from families that abused their cesspools by dumping too much water into them at one time, he said.

Coffey said the company put in the subdivision with the understanding the area would develop faster than it has. Cesspools were put in for about six months use, he said, and there have been delays beyond that.

Now, he said, it looks as if there will be a further delay of three or four months. A bond issue to install sewers in the tract will come up for a vote next February, Coffey pointed out. But even then it looks as if the irate housewives will have to put up with their problem beyond that because of natural delays in construction following the passage of such a bond issue.

PUMP OUT POOLS

Meanwhile, it was suggested to Coffey, maybe it would be a good idea if faulty cesspools were pumped out when overflow problems developed.

Council members, headed by acting mayor Bruce W. Martin, approved Coffey's suggestions unanimously.

DAIRY CITY PETITIONS TO CLERK

SANTA ANA, (OCNS) — The county board of supervisors yesterday referred petitions for the proposed sixth class Dairy City to the county clerk to test their sufficiency, but ordered the clerk to turn down a Los Alamitos incorporation move.

Supervisors told Clerk B. J. Smith to refuse the request of Los Alamitos proponents for permission to circulate a notice of intention to incorporate.

Reason for the denial was based on the fact that the board lost jurisdiction after Dairy City filed its incorporation petitions. Los Alamitos and Dairy City boundaries overlapped.

Dairy City boundaries roughly are Cerritos Ave. on the south, Bloomfield Ave. on the west, Holder St. on the east and Lincoln Ave. on the north.

Oil Firms Protest County Sanitation Tax on Wells

SANTA ANA, (OCNS) — Can the county collect taxes on oil wells that are surfaced in county sanitation district No. 13 but grounded outside the district in the ocean's floor?

Counsel Paul Ottoson of the Southwest Exploration and Signal Oil Companies say it can't. County Counsel Joel Ogle isn't sure.

Ottoson addressed the board of supervisors yesterday afternoon and said he would pay approximately \$65,000 in taxes on offshore oil producing well at Huntington Beach under protest.

Ottoson claims his clients have been unfairly taxed in 1952-53, 1954-55 and the upcoming year. The two signal leases mineral rights have an assessed value, according to Assessor Hugh Plumb, of \$80,000. The Southwest mineral rights have been assessed at approximately \$19,000,000.

The wells are located opposite Huntington Beach and "Tin Can Beach."

Ottoson contends the oil production is going on outside the sanitation district's boundary which is high tide line.

Ogle said loss of the tax revenue would be a serious blow to the district which has entered into contracts based on the returns. Ogle was instructed to study the matter and make a report to the board.

TREGASKIS PAIR BACK FROM EUROPEAN JAUNT

Writer, Photographer Comment on Contrast of Two Nations

By LEONARD SARGEANT

The Richard Tregaskis — he's the author of Guadalcanal Diary, you know — are back home from one of those flying trips to other parts of the world.

Recovering from travel weariness in their Costa Mesa home at 2185 State St. Walton and "Richie" Tregaskis have once again taken up the thread of normal American life they interrupted two months ago to go to Germany and England on a special assignment for Nation's Business magazine.

Tregaskis contracted to write and his wife to photograph an article relating to the investment of American capital in Germany and Britain.

CHANGE OF PACE

The assignment seems far removed from those he handled as a war correspondent for International News Service in the Pacific and European theaters which resulted in Guadalcanal Diary and later Invasion Diary on the Italian campaign. Stronger Than Fear, a war novel, and Seven Leagues to Paradise, based on a trip around the world he made in 1949.

It was this later book incidentally which determined Tregaskis to settle in the Newport Harbor area. "There are many places in the world that have a Mediterranean climate in addition to Newport Harbor," he said, "but they don't all have the benefits of American civilization such as good water and clean living."

Although Tregaskis had been to Europe during the war and right after the peace, his present trip, he said, was a revelation.

The trip was an outgrowth of a similar trip he made for Nation's Business to the Far East for a report on the investment of American capital in Japan.

GREAT CONTRAST

The economic report on England and Germany revealed a "terrific contrast" between the two countries although they are about the same size, have approximately the same population, and are both highly industrialized, he said.

"Although Germany has had only \$3½ billion of American capital invested there compared to \$8 billion in Britain, they have been building up so fast they have become a real menace to British exports," he explained.

For example, he continued, automobiles have been the mainstay of British foreign exchange. Yet, last year, Britain exported only 400,000 cars compared to Germany's up and coming 382,000. And German cars are becoming more popular every year, especially in Scandinavia and the United

States, he added. The U.S. bought more of the German Volkswagens last year than all of the British makes combined, Tregaskis declared.

MORE CONTRAST

The 6-ft., 5-in., former war correspondent, while admitting he is part English himself, said the British oppose American progressive ideas while the Germans embrace them. Germany — severely bombed during the war — is rebuilding rapidly especially with new hotels for tourists. England, in contrast is building no new hotels, he points out.

Another reason why West Germany's production is 120 per cent above the peak year of the whole of Hitler's Germany, he claims, is automation.

New machinery and equipment, much of it supplied by America, has been able to do what old fashion hand methods are unable to do in other countries.

LOW INCOME TAX

Still another reason, he said, is the low income tax, especially in the lower brackets. Now, all German workers want to work overtime. This attitude further boosts production.

Tregaskis was able to make a quick trip by automobile through East Berlin, accompanied by Joe Singer, an International News Service correspondent from California. There they found the usual unprogressiveness of a strangled economy. During the trip they were tailed by secret police.

She shares Tregaskis' opinion about Germany, especially when she was able to pick up some excellent camera accessories there at a fraction of the cost of the American product.

Her Costa Mesa home is still new to her. The much-traveled Tregaskis have occupied their pleasant stucco cottage only about two months of the year they have owned it.

Tregaskis was able to work a little during the European trip on a novel he is writing as well as sandwich in another assignment for Sports Illustrated. And just hitting the book stalls is the new Landmark children's edition of Guadalcanal Diary. As for travel, the writer-photographer team has no trips planned for the future. They hope to be able to stay home for awhile.

The gaffodil is a most satisfactory bulb for it is sure to bloom and to increase in numbers year after year and what is more the bulb flower's worst enemy, the gopher, won't harm the gaffodil because of its bitter taste.

The other major bulb flowers, the iris, tuberous begonias, dahlias, and lilies, will surely please your green thumb friends too. If you'd like to make a rather unusual presentation of bulb flowers you might assemble a collection of early-flowering little bulbs, suggest the California Association of Nurserymen, such as the fragrant narcissus, the crocus, freesia, hyacinth or the muscari (grape hyacinth).

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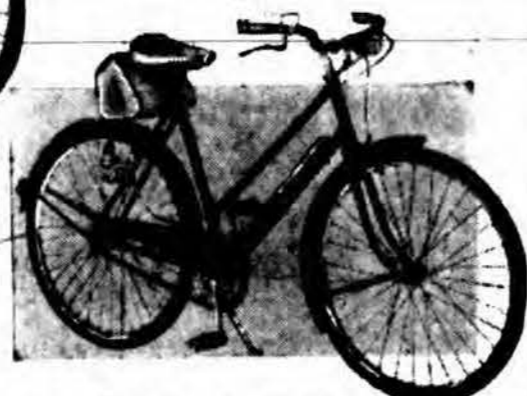

Christian Science Church Dedication Here Dec. 11

Dedication of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Newport Beach and its adjacent reading room and nursery structure will be held Dec. 11 at two services, the board of directors announced today.

"We rejoice and are grateful to God for this day—our Dedication Day," the directors declared. In the Christian Science movement no church or its structures can be dedicated until debt free.

Dedication services will be held at 11 a. m. and 3 p. m., Sunday, Dec. 11, in the church edifice.

Christian Science had its beginning in the Newport Harbor area when a small group of students of Christian Science held meetings in private homes and in the Balboa Theatre on Main St. from 1916 to 1920. Later meetings were held in the Pavilion and the Women's Civic League room.

SOCIETY STARTED

In 1921 a society was organized with a membership of 16. This group was recognized by The Mother Church in 1922. The same year saw a Sunday School started. On July 4, 1923 Wednesday evening meetings were added and a year later the reading room was opened.

During 1923 three lots were acquired on Balboa Blvd. near the public library and during that

year a bungalow-type church was built. The first service was held in April, 1924 and the following year the society became a church, being recognized by The Mother Church under its present name.

This organization was incorporated under laws of the State of California in December, 1926.

BUY LIDO LOTS

During 1941 the church members decided to buy lots more centrally located. They purchased four lots at Via Lido and Oporto. These lots were exchanged subsequently at the request of the Griffith Co. for four lots at the present location. In 1944 the Balboa Blvd. property was sold and services were held in Lido Theatre.

The new church building was begun in April, 1947 and first service was held there Feb. 29, 1948. Then on Feb. 1, 1954 a new reading room building was opened for use adjoining the present church.

With dedication services now forthcoming, the directors of the church stated, "We are grateful to all our friends who have so generously aided in making this dedication possible; also for the gift of our organ and to the Cornish Foundation for the donation to our building fund."

ASSOCIATION TO AIR HAGERMAN BIRTHDAY GIFT DEDUCTION DEAL

Mesa Boys' Natal Community Party Sparks Protest to State

SANTA ANA (OCNS) — A special delegation of Orange County members of the Muscular Dystrophy Association will travel to Sacramento next month to appeal to the state officials for relaxation of the gift-welfare rules.

The delegation will plead on behalf of Mrs. Wilhella Hagerman of Costa Mesa and some 35 other families concerned with muscular dystrophy in Orange County.

FINDS WITHHELD

According to officials of the organization, the gift-welfare rules for the Hagerman family of Mesa, California, have been withheld by the state as the result of a lavish birthday party given for little Johnny Hagerman last August.

Orange County residents gave the 13-year-old muscular dystrophy victim hundreds of gifts when they learned the youth, and his equally doomed 15-year-old brother, Johnny, had never had a birthday party. The Marine Corps band from Ft. Ord entertained the two crippled lads from the boy's first year. Entertainers by the score appeared with cakes and presents. Both boys were believed doomed by the dread disease.

Little Johnny died just two weeks after attending his first party. An older brother of the two lads had died earlier from the same dread disease.

DOUGLAS WARNING

Orange County Welfare Chief Douglas O. Douglas, in a warning to county residents prior to the party, said the value of gifts received by the Hagerman family would be deducted from the group's monthly welfare check of \$129, the entire substance of the family. Douglas later said the law which authorized the deduction was the federal law, but California man James H. Utt reported from Washington that such laws were local.

Douglas then denied that any deduction would be made. But even so, wary donors of such items as a television set, wheel chairs and other gifts, "loaned" the items to the Hagerman youths, instead of giving them to the family.

Later, it was learned, a considerable amount of money was taken from what muscular dystrophy officials said were "a number of Mrs. Hagerman's welfare checks." A certain amount, also, was deducted because of the death of little Johnny.

NATIONAL ACTION

The incident of Thomas warning was reported nationally, and resulted in a bill presented on the floor of the house of representatives by Congressman James A. Roosevelt. The bill was jointly authored and presented on the floor of the senate by Sen. Estes Kefauver. However, Orange County muscular dystrophy officials reportedly want joint California action to prevent re-occurrence of the "deductions" from gifts received by muscular dystrophy victims.

Officials pointed out that the value of items such as beds, oxygen equipment and wheel chairs unless provided by the state or county — is deducted from welfare checks if they are given by donors to an ill youth.

MDAA officials said the group will make up a car caravan to Sacramento to plead for relaxation of the welfare laws.

Santa Ana Hospital Clears 2 Doctors of All Charges

Reinstate Pair to Surgical Status After OCNS Exclusive

SANTA ANA, Dec. 7. (OCNS) — Two Santa Ana doctors have been cleared of all charges leveled against them by the executive committee of the Santa Ana Community Hospital. However, hospital officials stated today that the two physicians would not be allowed to work without supervision, even though they were reinstated to surgical status.

EXCLUSIVE STORY

The Quasi-reinstatement was made after exclusive OCNS revelation of the suspension of the two doctors last week.

The information was learned following meeting of the executive committee of the public-subscription-supported institution. The two doctors, one with 26 years service at the hospital — had been reduced to an almost non-surgical status when the committee, headed by Dr. Raymond Brandt, of Santa Ana, leveled charges against them. The committee still refused to make public what the charges against the two surgeons were, stating that their discussions were "privileged." Hospital officials likened the "privilege" to a business firm looking into internal problems. When it was pointed out that Santa Ana Community Hospital was not a business, but a public institution, hospital officials still stated they felt the (items under discussion should not be revealed.

"The meetings are so confidential," a hospital spokesman said, "that even the hospital administrator is not allowed inside."

The hospital spokesman did not give any reason for the "supervision" of the two men, but emphasized "a review of the cases showed nothing serious had taken place."

The hospital said the charges against the two men were leveled through the surgical and tissue committee of the hospital.

However, last week, OCNS learned the combined committees completely cleared the two physicians of charges. But, the executive committee at first refused to act on the suggestion of the two groups that charges against the two men be dropped. 'Cradle of Conquerors' in Review by Haarstad

William Haarstad, Orange Coast College librarian, reviews "Cradle of Conquerors, Siberia" by Erwin Lessner.

Here, at last, is a definite history of the vast territory known as Siberia. Over 700 pages have been used to tell the story of the impact on history that has been dealt by Siberian conquerors. Violence has been the key word in Siberian history with such stormy characters as Attila the Hun, Djenghis Khan, and Tamerlane spreading blood and destruction from China to Europe.

Along with the terror and violence perpetrated by these men are the many strange creeds and sub-human practices of these wild nomads of the desert. The Mongol religious practice termed Shamanism is graphically explained by the author along with many other Siberian cults. The lasting

influence of Siberian invasions in Europe is continually noted in the work with sound, logical reasoning behind the observations.

From reading the book it is apparent that Djenghis Khan (sometimes known as Genghis Khan) is considered by the author as being the greatest of the conquerors. The life of Genghis Khan (or ruler of the universe) is adequately covered in the book.

The violence of the early Siberian conquerors is noted as affecting the political outlook of those later Russian emperors Lenin and Stalin.

The Author's monumental work takes the reader up to 1920, which for all practical purposes is the present hour. Highly recommended for students of Oriental history as well as the general reader interested in an area of history somewhat forgotten by historians.

into a 325° F. oven. You don't need to cover it, baste it, or watch it during cooking. Using a meat thermometer, cook until the internal temperature of the roast reaches 160° F. or that's about 28 minutes per pound for a medium done roast. (A rare roast should reach 140° F., well-done 170° F.)

Cuts of beef that are good for roasting are standing and rolled rib roasts, whole or half tenderloins, and high quality rump roasts.

- 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs or fine cracker crumbs
- 1 carrot, grated

Mash liver sausage and mix in remaining ingredients, except carrot. Form into small balls and roll in carrot. (Dry carrot thoroughly before grating.) 18 balls.

Here is another recipe using cold cuts as a base. It is especially good as a potato chip or cracker dip.

COLD CUTS

- Sliced luncheon meat
- 1 3-ounce package cream cheese
- 1/4 cup cream or evaporated milk
- 2 tablespoons minced parsley
- 1 tablespoon prepared mustard

Grind enough luncheon meat to yield 1 cup. Soften cream cheese with a fork, add milk, and blend until smooth. Combine with meat, parsley, and mustard. Spread on crackers or serve as a dip. Makes about 1 cup.

- 4 to 5 slices bacon
- 1 3-ounce package cream cheese
- 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

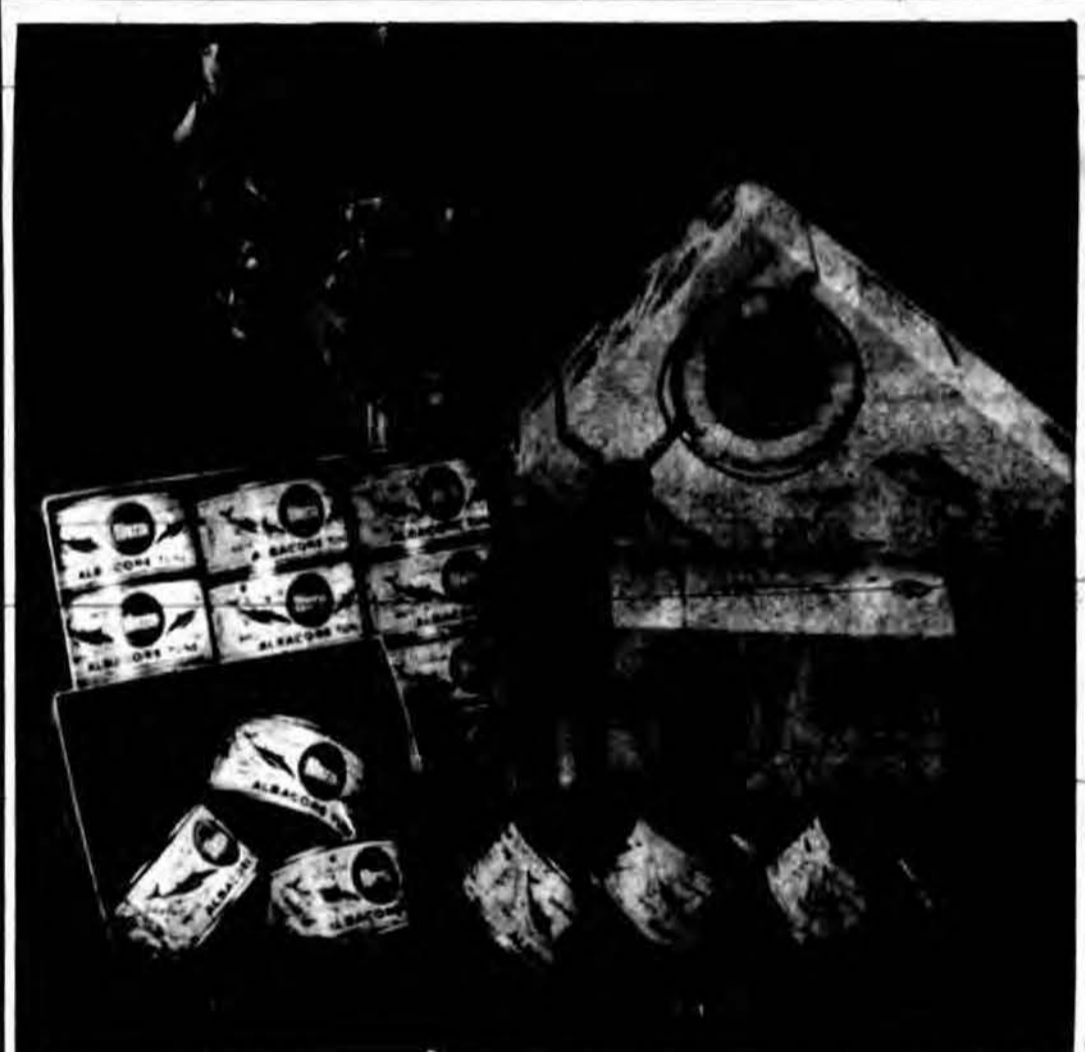

EDITORIALS

Booming Mesa Area Growth Shows More Costs to Come

Our neighbors in Costa Mesa and its immediate county environs are in for some tall growth in rapid fashion, according to figures compiled by Everett Rea, Mesa union school district superintendent. The figures are enough to give any civic leader charged with orderly growth of an area statistical nightmares.

Look at this for size: Rea reports there are now under construction some 1300 new homes while the Costa Mesa Building Department, he says, has 2990 applications for new residences before it. Add the two figures together and you get a total of 4290 new homes.

Then multiply a population factor of 3.5 times the 4290 and your product is 15,015 new residents the Mesa and its surrounding county areas will possess as soon as the homes are sold and occupied. This is enough to stagger any planner, school official or civic leader.

In the same breath Rea reported the new homes under way or on order, he mentioned that two new elementary schools are planned, one in the area between Palisades Road and Mesa Drive and the continuation of Orchard Drive, while its twin will be built next to Orange Coast College.

The veteran Mesa schools superintendent declared before these new "back-to-back" type school buildings are finished they will be needed badly, they will be full when they are opened and will not solve the problem of housing and teaching the children still expected to come as the new residences are occupied.

Clearly the most intelligent planning for growth is needed, not only by the schools but all other civic facets. Parks, streets, curbs, sewer connections,—the myriad things which make a complete home area must be planned for ahead of time by Costa Mesa officials and their county counterparts.

Costa Mesa is seeing what is sometimes referred to in national magazine articles as the "plight of the suburbs." Several articles have been published, showing what this newspaper has been reporting for several years.

As we have pointed out in previous editorials, building a new community or adding a tremendous "shot" of population to an existing town in quite an expensive matter. Someone must pay for all the "house-keeping" services of a newly created community no matter whether it's in a city or the county.

In the case of the City of Costa Mesa we see a thriving community, incorporated a little over two years ago, struggling to get set up financially as a municipality. Then, along come a few large subdivisions. The new owners want to be annexed to the Mesa so they will get city services—services which the Mesa already is paying to create, maintain or extend.

As you can see, a financial snowball is the result for the taxpayers, many of whom do not realize when they buy property what their eventual tax bills will tally. Were the municipal cost all, the problem would be serious enough in this day of high taxation.

But when you see thousands of new residents' children wanting to go to school—then you see more fiscal problems and construction costs, not to mention the added administrative and faculty costs.

We cannot blame the potential new residents for wanting to live in the Costa Mesa area which has so much to offer its population. We can only offer our best wishes to the Mesa school officials and city officials that they can devise sound plans for absorbing the anticipated onrush of new population.

One of the soundest methods we know is for cities and school districts to insist the subdividers of the new housing areas provide free school sites and free parks. This could be achieved by the City of Costa Mesa and Orange County officials making acceptance of subdivision plans and maps contingent upon these sites being amply provided in advance.

Finally, the new residents of these areas should agree upon annexation to the City of Costa Mesa to assume their share of the bonded indebtedness and the various taxes imposed on those residents already occupying homes. Only through such a plan of sharing the high cost of new area development can the municipi-

pality and/or school districts involved manage to swallow the large bite of sudden population increase.

The time is far gone when much of this could have been done but there is no time like the present to start.

All-time High

There was a time when it seemed that the days of the newspaper might be numbered. What with radio and television cutting into the available advertising dollars it was feared that newspapers' share might be reduced to the point where the dailies and weeklies might have to give up. But editors, publishers and newspaper advertising managers are sleeping better now (if they ever lost much sleep.)

National newspaper advertising lineages hit a new all-time high for the first nine months of 1955 showing a whopping jump of 64.5 per cent in automobile advertising in September over the corresponding month of last year. By Jan. 1, next, total newspaper advertising revenue for the year should exceed \$3 billion, the greatest sum, by far, ever invested in any advertising medium.

Total national advertising for the first three quarters of 1955 was nearly 12 per cent above 1954. Retail ads were approximately 7 per cent greater and classified advertising close to 17 per cent higher in volume.

What does all this signify? Why simply that there's nothing like your local newspaper for getting an advertising message across. The figures — and the results — speak for themselves.

SCENE AT THE CAPITOL

SACRAMENTO (CNS) — Last week in Sacramento was marked by tremendous progress in development of California's major road system when the state division of highways opened bids on a series of four construction projects in Solano and Contra Costa counties.

The projects involve a parallel bridge across Carquinez Straits, and approaches. Four days were taken to open all the bids, the total approximated some \$30 million.

The division, however, hit a snag on one of the bids — for the superstructure of the new bridge. American Bridge Division of U. S. Steel corporation, San Francisco, tendered the low bid of \$9,523,960.48, but Phil Murphy, of Judson Pacific Murphy Corporation protested, declaring that the American Bridge division did not have a contractor's state license.

FIRST CHECK: Highway officials revealed that a license existed, and the protest was held invalid. However, later Murphy announced he intends to seek an injunction against award of the bid, and this caused the highway division to check further with the contractor's state license bureau.

The bureau, in turn, referred the case to the attorney general to determine whether the license applied in the instant case. Highway officials called attention to the fact that the bids must be awarded and the contracts signed by December 9, and pointed out that some serious delays may result unless a ruling is forthcoming immediately from the attorney general's office.

RECREATIONAL SITES: An assembly interim sub-committee, headed by Frank Belotti, Eureka, met with officials of the state division of beaches and parks to discuss future recreational areas around new reservoirs created by dams under construction. The meeting co-incided with publicity given a transaction in which a private firm acquired one of the choice acreages around Polson reservoir, for development purposes. Newton B. Drury, chief of the division, told the committee that his staff has not as yet completed a five-year plan for the state legislature, and refused to announce a list of recommended park projects for future development, stating his division must first present its recommendations to the state park commission before it can make them public.

Drury did say, however, that the division has more than 350 park sites proposed, and that only half that number can be included in its recommendations.

WATER HEARINGS: Another assembly interim committee held hearings on water problems, and Assemblyman Caspar Weinberger announced that plans are under way to ask the governor to include a new state department of water in his call for a special session next March.

INTEGRATION REJECTED: California state employees rejected 43,203 of 12,859, a plan whereby the California State Retirement system would have been integrated with the federal old age and survivors insurance program. The plan had been approved by the state, and also the board of directors of the California State Employees Association, which refused advertising from opponents of the plan last fall.

SURPLUS ANNOUNCED: State Controller Robert C. Kirkwood announced that the state's general fund closed the fiscal year, June 30, 1955, with a surplus of \$75,488,908. This figure, he said, was \$13 million higher than previous estimates of the surplus. At the 1955 session of the legislature, the governor asked for new and increased taxes which had the request being granted by the legislature, would have amounted to approximately \$70 million. However, the governor's request was made at a time when it appeared that there would be a deficit instead of a large surplus at the close of the fiscal year. Income has increased to the point where another request for new or increased taxes is not expected next March when the legislature enters its budget session.

NEW JUDICIARY CHAIRMAN: Speaker L. H. "ABE" Lincoln of the assembly, announced last week that he had appointed H. Allen Smith, assemblyman from Los Angeles, to the important post of chairman of the assembly's judiciary committee. The post was vacated when Gordon Fleury, Sacramento, was appointed to the superior court bench of that county. Smith was the chief contender against Lincoln for the speakership at the opening of the 1955 session, and generally has been thought to be in opposition to some of the Lincoln policies in the assembly. Appointment of one such opponent to an important job of this kind is something new in politics around the state Capitol, and admittedly gave some of Lincoln's friends a shock.

DRY CHRISTMAS: A round the state Capitol at least, the prospect is for a dry Christmas for state employees. First, Russell S. Munro, director of the department of alcoholic beverage control, warned his employees that they are not to accept gifts from firms or individuals doing business with the state. In the past, it has been the custom for liquor houses to provide a few bottles for Christmas parties. Then Governor Goodwin J. Knight followed this up with a ban on Christmas party liquor in offices around the state Capitol. The governor indicated it would be just too bad if a state employee became intoxicated at a party in a state office, and then happened to be involved in an automobile accident on the way home.

RAY BARRIER: An extensive report covering seven suggested barriers for San Francisco Bay, any one of which could produce more fresh water, was submitted to the water project authority by the state division of water resources. The report included the controversial Reber plan, which has been promoted by some factions for several years. It indicated that none of the plans would conserve more than a couple of million acre feet of water a year, which was in direct contrast to claims that some 33 million acre feet per year could be utilized through construction of a bay barrier.

COURT DECISIONS: The state supreme court ruled on some seven cases of housing projects within or constructed for military use, and leased from the government for rental to military personnel. The companies leasing sought virtually tax free properties, but the supreme court sent the cases back to the superior court and instructed that they be remanded to county board of equalization for further hearing.



A Wee Bit of Comfort

AFFAIRS OF STATE

SACRAMENTO (CNS) — Whether the California State Employees Association has made a correct decision in rejecting integration of the state employees retirement system with the federal old age and survivors insurance program is a question that only time can answer.

But in any event, the employees did assert their independence of the board of directors of their association in the final vote, and demonstrated that at least, they have minds of their own in deciding fundamental issues.

The vote for rejection of the plan, according to Secretary of State Frank M. Jordan, was 43-203 against, and 12,859 for integration. The poll was conducted by mail, and approximately 70,000 state employees were qualified to vote on the issue.

"RAILROAD" CHARGED: Many state employees concede that one of the things which helped kill off the merger was the apparent attempt of not only the board of directors of the employee association, but also the state itself to railroad the consolidation of the two retirement systems.

The board resolved in favor of the plan, and the state employee paper refused advertising presented by some of the opponents of the plan which outlined the disadvantages. This face was exposed by "Affairs of State" last fall, and as a result many letters came to the office decrying the board's tactics.

The state itself apparently was in favor of the integration, due to the fact that it would have meant considerable savings in the payment of the state's share of employee retirement.

During the battle, several officials nearing retirement, including A. D. Edmonston, state engineer, retired before the balloting. They contended they would be money ahead to quit before any integration became effective, because under the state system there is no limitation on the amount of money they could earn after retiring. Under the federal system, there is a limitation.

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FULL PAY, NEW JOB: Thus, a state engineer for example, could draw full retirement, and at the same time, have a full-time job with a private firm if he so desired.

Another item that helped kill the integration plan was the fact that many women who work for the state plan to hold their jobs only for short terms.

The retirement contributions build up to considerable amounts, and this is looked upon in many cases as a savings account by the state employee. Under the plan submitted for integration, the worker upon quitting the state job, could not draw all of her contributions from the fund, as she can under the state system. That part of the contribution required by the federal government is a permanent contribution, and cannot be returned to the contributor until he reaches retirement age, or dies, when his family obtains benefits.

MAY BE RE-EXAMINED: The action of the state employees, however, is not irrevocable. After a few years pass, it can be brought up again and another poll held, if the state, or the employees think it is advisable to determine whether or not they want consolidation with the federal system. Admittedly, there are advantages and disadvantages on both sides, but the permissive law still is in effect.

Sacramento Sidelight

SACRAMENTO (CNS) — Apparently, there still is too much time between adoption of a state budget and the concluding budget period, as shown by the report of State Controller Robert C. Kirkwood. The report revealed a state surplus in the general fund of \$76,488,908 as of June 30, 1955, a figure more than \$13 million above even the revised estimates of surplus made during the latter part of July.

The annual budget, of course, allows for better computation than did the biennial budgets under which the state operated before the constitution was changed to provide for a yearly session of the legislature, and the adoption of a budget in the spring for the subsequent fiscal year.

But here is how the time lapses, in which there are continual changing business conditions and consequent changes in state revenue, work.

SCANNING BUDGET: For approximately a month now, the state department of finance, and the legislative auditor, have been scanning the 1956-57 state budget. This means that most of the state departments, which prepare their own budgets, started in this work last summer. In other words, the departments start preparation of a budget almost at the same time their current budget goes into effect, or a year ahead of the effective date.

After the department finishes padding its individual budget, the department of finance, and the legislative auditor attempt to cut it down to size. This takes from one to three months. The fact that the finance director and legislative auditor, as well as the legislature do a rather cursory job of cutting down on the departments is shown by the fact

contained in the controller's report, that the departments retained some \$10,000,000 to the state's general fund at the close of the 1955 fiscal year.

ARGUMENTS DIE: Following approval of the budget by the department of finance and the legislative budget committee it goes to the state legislature, where in March of next year, it will be argued. The arguments usually are limited to matters of policy, such as child care centers, water or whatever happens to be the big issue of the moment. The legislature itself does not generally go into the departmental budgets, leaving these details to finance and the budget committee.

The budget will be passed by the legislature during the latter days of March, and three months will elapse before it goes into effect, which is enough time for major changes in revenue estimates to occur.

Meanwhile, outside of estimates, there is no accurate figure on which to base expenditures, or to determine the revenues. This can permit a surplus to pile up, as it did in 1954-55, or business conditions can cause major decreases in revenue, which fortunately have not occurred for many years.

NO SERIOUS PROBLEM: Admittedly, as long as the surplus piles up, the situation causes no serious problem. Actually, the surplus the last fiscal year is less than 5 per cent of the total outlay, which is not a large figure compared to a billion and a half expenditure.

Just how a more facile system could be worked out, to permit more current financial operations is a problem which as yet has not been solved. Yet it remains a problem to plague the state's financiers.

THE CAPITOL WEEK

SACRAMENTO (U.P.) — A new estimate placing California's population at 13,035,000 highlights the growing importance of the state in national politics.

The continued growth of the state, estimated by the Department of Finance as a 23 per cent gain since the last federal census in 1950 — means that California after 1960 will have the second largest delegation in the U. S. House of Representatives.

There also will be a corresponding hike in electoral college votes and in the voting strength of the state's delegations to the presidential nominating conventions.

STEADY GROWTH: By 1960, California's population will far outstrip Pennsylvania and will be pushing New York state for the lead.

The Department of Finance's estimate is that four years hence California will have a population of 15,055,000, a gain of close to 5,000,000 in ten years.

At the present time, California has 30 seats in the House of Representatives, the same number as Pennsylvania, but 13 less than New York's 43.

However, New York lost two seats in the last reapportionment in 1950 from what it had ten years before and Pennsylvania dropped from 33 seats down to its present 30. During that same 10 year period, California jumped from 23 seats to 30.

INCREASE SEATS: When the 1960 official census is made, representation in the lower house will be reshuffled. California should pick up at least six seats, possibly seven and has an outside chance to gain eight places.

New York is unlikely to gain. Pennsylvania will be lucky to hold its own on the basis of present population trends. That will put California in a key position in Congress and a party standpoint, of control of the state legislature five years hence.

For it is the legislature which reapportions the congressional district boundaries after each of-

ficial census. And the party in control of the legislature, be it Republican or Democratic in 1960, will have the whip hand in setting up the new districts.

RAM THROUGH: After the 1950 census, Republican majorities in both the state senate and assembly drew up and rammed through the reapportionment bill over strenuous but ineffectual objections from Democrats.

Democrats charged the majority party gerrymandered some districts particularly in San Francisco and Los Angeles counties so that Republican candidates would have a better chance of gaining representation. Republicans, naturally, denied the charge.

The fact is that before reapportionment, when California had only 23 seats, Republicans held 13 of them, Democrats 10.

After the 1951 reapportionment bill and the 1952 election when 30 seats were at stake, Republicans boosted their holdings to 19 seats while Democrats picked up only one net seat for a total of 11.

MOOT POINT: How much of that Republican gain could be attributed to the voting magnetism of President Eisenhower, to the strength and weakness of the rival congressional candidates or to the reapportionment bill itself is a moot point.

The growth of California will not be reflected in voting strength at next year's Democratic presidential nominating convention but California undoubtedly will wield more numerical power in the 1960 convention.

California Democrats had 68 votes in 1952 and party leaders last week announced the state would have the same number of votes in the 1956 convention in Chicago.

Republican allotments for individual states have not yet been announced but there have been rumors that California will get more in 1956 than the 70 convention votes it had in Chicago in 1952.

NO COMMENT

WASHINGTON — The furor among Democratic presidential aspirants over the "moderation" mentioned, but not espoused, by Adlai Stevenson is providing the Republicans with considerable amusement.

They have two possible explanations for the anti-Stevenson attack by Governor Harriman of New York and others: (1) They are seeking to discredit Mr. Stevenson and to promote their own candidacy; or (2) They read only newspaper headlines mentioning "moderation" and did not bother to read the text of the out-and-out New Deal speech.

In fact, it followed the New Deal line so closely that even "give-em-hell" Harry Truman called it "the best New Deal speech I ever heard him make."

Here are some of the high points of Mr. Stevenson's program of "moderation" for the nation.

Increased defense spending, which already totals a staggering \$24,000,000,000 annually. More foreign aid which already has soared to a total of \$1,000,000,000 over the past ten years — \$4,000,000,000 in grants and \$11,000,000,000 as loans.

More federal development of public power for various areas — To be paid for by taxpayers everywhere — and to compete with the private power companies.

And a host of other proposals for increased spending which would cost untold billions of dollars.

Of course this is the philosophy of Big Spending by Big Government — which means inflation and a cheaper dollar — as well as more control from Washington over the people's lives.

SHUTS EYES: One Republican commented that Mr. Stevenson also shut his eyes to economic realities

when he accused the Republicans "of helping only the large corporations, with the pious hope that something will trickle down to the rest of us."

This Republican explained that even if Mr. Stevenson were correct, which he was not, he should have called the result a torrent rather than a trickle. The Republican then proceeded to point out that the largest number of persons in history were working for the highest wages they ever had and were enjoying the highest standard of living ever known anywhere.

This Republican also wondered how Mr. Stevenson could argue convincingly that Mr. Eisenhower's foreign policy was a failure (and that the Democrats should be returned to power to handle foreign policy) when the nation was at war in Korea when Mr. Eisenhower took over from the Democrats — and now is at peace.

STILL PUZZLE: The Republican analyst is still puzzling over one statement in Mr. Stevenson's speech — "That 'nothing fails like success.' Thus far, the Republican says he has not attained even a glimmer of comprehension — and even went so far as to assert that if a serious Mr. Stevenson is going to talk like that it would be vastly better for him to get out his Joe Miller pipe book and try to be funny again."

However, there is pretty general agreement that the nomination will go to Mr. Stevenson — barring some blooper on his part or a decisive defeat in one or more state preferential primaries.

Indications are that he will get off to a good start in the Minnesota primary where the leading Democrats have lined up substantial support. If everything goes as planned it could result in the choice of Senator Humphrey for the Vice Presidential Nomination.

Dec. 9-15 'Bill of Rights' Week Proclaimed by Knight

SACRAMENTO (CNS) — Governor Goodwin J. Knight has proclaimed the period from Dec. 9 through 15 as Bill of Rights Week in California in commemoration of their adoption 164 years ago.

The governor's proclamation read in part: "The traditional rights and freedoms we enjoy as citizens of this Republic have their foundations in the liberties and responsibilities enumerated in these initial amendments to our Constitution.

American Bill of Rights' these first ten amendments guarantee to such of our basic rights as impose upon all of us certain obligations to do all within our power to sustain and strengthen our cherished heritage.

"Since our nation is engaged in a determined effort to maintain and safeguard the essential liberties of humanity so seriously threatened by tyranny and oppression, I firmly believe it is important that all Americans enthusiastically renew their resolution to accept and practice the principles set forth in their Bill of Rights."

SENIOR CLASS PLAY CHARMS BIG AUDIENCE

**Freshness of Dramatic Theme,
Novel Staging Aid Production**

"The Remarkable Incident at Carson Corners," given as the Newport Harbor Union High School senior play, charmed a capacity audience Friday night with its freshness of dramatic theme, originality of staging, and high caliber of acting.

The curtain rose on an austere stage without setting or decor; at the left were 12 empty chairs in three rows, while a table and chairs at right, and two rows of chairs center stage made up the remaining props.

FILE INTO THEATRE

In an intriguing entrance members of the cast, costumed as Carson Corners' leading citizens filed down the auditorium aisles, talking in low tones and eliciting approving shushes from a few in the audience who mistook the actors and actresses for inconsiderate late-comers. The mystery cleared when the cast took their places on the stage to serve as members of a jury in a unique murder trial conducted by Carson Corners' high school students.

The trial proceeded in a blending of flashbacks and onrushing action that produced marvels of costume changing, lighting effects and noiseless conveyance and removal of props. Some difficulty in hearing lines and a few ill-chosen laughs from naive members in the audience dimmed the opening moments, but from the middle of the first act, the pro-

jection of lines were excellent.

MOVING PORTRAYAL

Derry Noga, with his accent, halting speech and marvelous pantomime, gave a moving portrayal of the bewildered janitor accused of murder, Steve Watcher as Dr. Caldwell accounted for some fine scenes with the winning resonance of his voice and his sincerity in portraying emotions of guilt and remorse. Gavran Mauer made well-meaning Mr. Rogers tremendously convincing with fine enunciation and naturalness, while Mike Mehaud as the high school principal revealed that rare possession, a quiet and low-pitched voice that carried to the last row of the balcony, and gave maturity and dignity to his interpretation. Heather Liddle, in the role of Mrs. Woodbridge, also possessed a voice of beautiful modulation and clarity.

CHOICE ROLE

Clipped speech and clever timing made Dennis Harwood's arrogant, money-mad "big businessman" one of the play's choice roles. As his high-voiced, society-minded wife, Beverly Stafford showed exceptional flair, while Margie Stoval in the role of the bereaved mother was most sympathetic and effective.

Under Director Robert Wentz's tutelage, the emotional maturity and depth displayed by Harbor's young stars lifted the acting in general into a "real-life" dimen-

sion that was truly gratifying. Dennis Henderson's performance was a shining example of this quality of maturity. His second and third act closing speeches were dramatic gems of sincerity, and showed a deeply intelligent grasp of all the implications of the play. His voice and gesture projected emotions of humility and pain with an impact that sharply underscored the play's final message: "All of us, because we're too tired or too lazy or don't care, put off doing things we should have done, things we scream at our kids for not doing . . . We've got to live for each other . . . We have to learn to be better people."

OTHERS EXCELLENT

David Grant, Sue Nissen, and Pat Kelter captured the affections of the audience with their brightness and charm of their interpretations. Mary Haynes as the counsel for defense displayed an intelligent, sensitive feeling for her lines and a finely-shaded inflection. Rod Calderhead and Darrel Hartshorn as student judge and prosecuting attorney respectively interpreted these roles—with vigor and dramatic fire. Sherry Inloe as witty, absent-minded Miss Frank gave the role exceptional conviction.

Tim Niquette gave a relaxed, adroit performance as the debonair, golf-playing building inspector, and Darrel Sherrill, Norma Heffner, and Lucille Taylor as other members of the jury were excellent in minor roles. In the remaining student roles Carlton Dawson and Mike Bartlett were appealingly natural while Ray Daniel, Carol King, Tiny Snowden and Kayla Hurst handled brief roles with much skill. 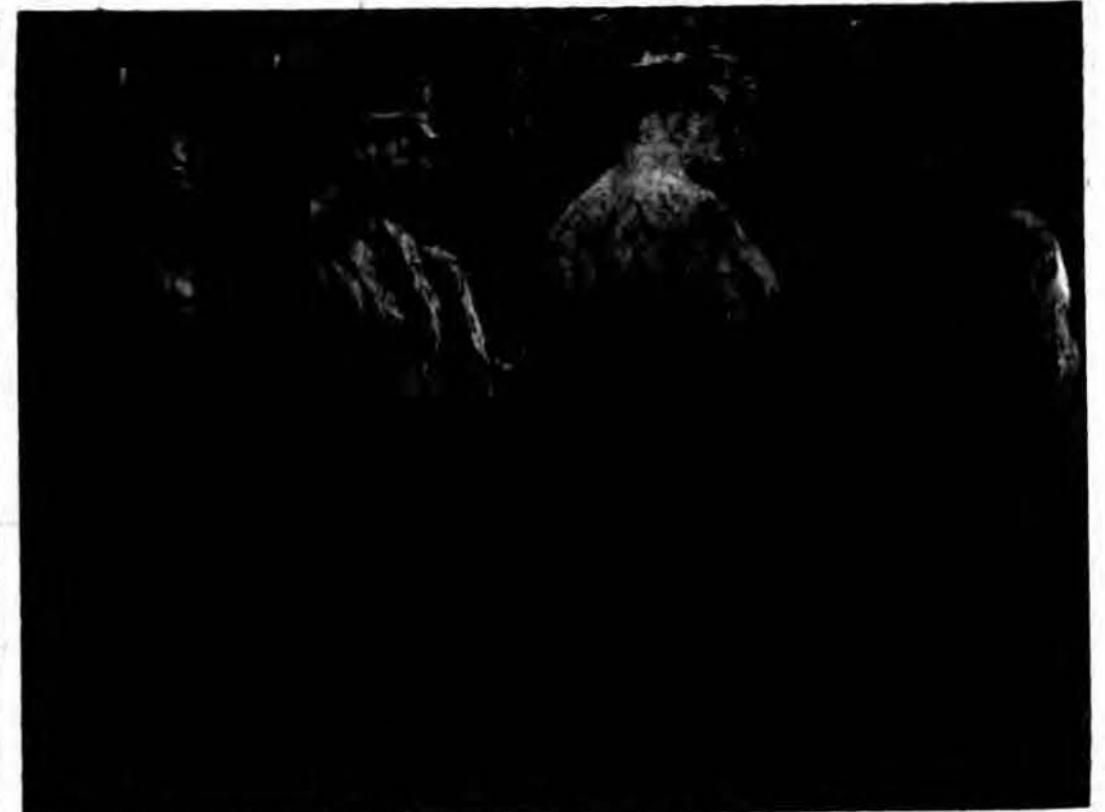

HORSE RACE LOOT EYED

More Funds for County Fair Discussed by Board Members

GARDEN GROVE (OCNS) — Alternate means of raising additional funds for the Orange County Fair were discussed by fair board members and the agricultural committee of the associated chambers of commerce here Nov. 29.

The agricultural committee also recommended to the board of directors of the Associated Chambers of Commerce that Willis Mitchell and Ralph Maskey be reappointed to the fair board when their terms expire in January.

Frank Crane and Clay Kellogg represented the fair board in the discussion. The subject of horse racing during the fair was discussed and Crane presented the facts that of the 70 fairs in the state, only 14 are in Southern California. Of the state funds for the fairs, which are derived from the pari-mutuel betting at the race track, over 70

per cent comes from Southern California but less than 20 per cent of it is returned to the Southern California fairs.

Crane pointed out that the Ma-

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ajority of the state senators are from Northern California, thereby hindering the possibility of changing legislation to give more money to local events.

It was also pointed out that the racing commission will not allocate racing days until facilities are available but the Orange County Fair board does not have the money to construct the tract.

Crane said the fair board has asked the Atty. General's office for information regarding the correct procedure in obtaining the necessary funds.

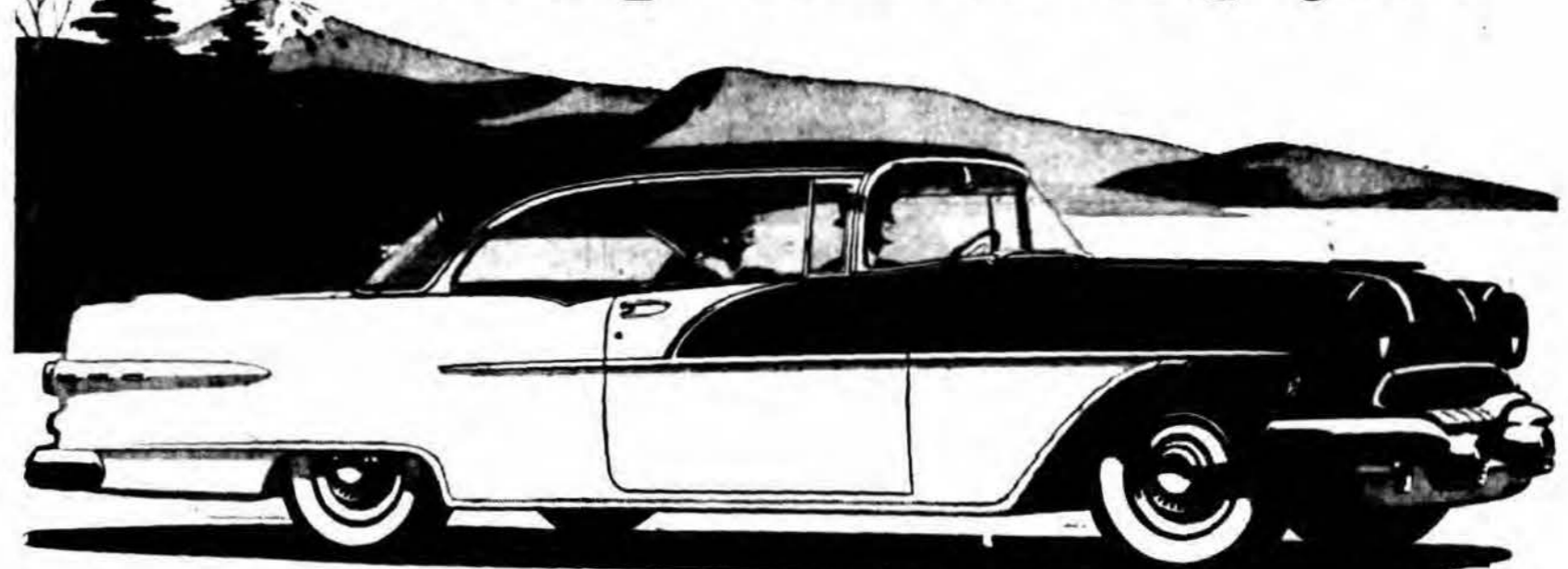

Part of this money must be used, he said, toward the high cost of storing plans and records over the years.

SANTA ANA, — S. D. Caplan yesterday was denied permission to establish a dairy on the south side of Gisler Ave. adjacent to the east bank of the Santa Ana River. The county board of supervisors acted on the request, upholding the county planning commission's recommendation.

OCC Traffic Lights Denied by Councilmen

Because only one of the signals would have been within the Costa Mesa city limits and the other three were denied by the county, it looks today as if Orange Coast College students will have to do without traffic lights at the Harbor Blvd-Adams St. intersection.

Mesa councilmen, at the suggestion of City Manager George Coffey, declined to approve the request instigated by students themselves at the college, declaring it was not right for the city to assume all the cost of signals for a "private roadway," as they termed it.

There was no discussion made of a request for an amber warning light at Fairview Road and Adams St., also requested by the students.

The action took place following a survey of the intersection made by the County Road Department last week. Officials there felt the traffic at the intersection did not warrant expenditure of county funds for signal lights, according to a letter received later by Police Chief Art McKenzie.

Palmer of Newport Balboa Savings and Loan Association told his staff members at a recent breakfast meeting.

"Leaders in the savings and loan business from every part of the United States feel that the tightening of credit which we are now experiencing will be a healthy thing for our economy in the long run," Palmer said. "In their carefully considered opinion, the rate of home building in 1956 will continue high, perhaps setting an all-time record."

Palmer said that as he talked to association executives from New York, Chicago, Boston and many western cities, he found a general spirit of optimism and progressive planning for the future. "Leaders in the industry," he said, "are looking ahead to years of expanding business based on a peacetime economy with adequate preparations for any emergency." California Senator Knowland was a convention speaker.

Desert Lures with Sun, Sand

With the local cold weather, most travelers' fancy turns to the warm, dry desert regions and ours took us recently to Wickenburg, Ariz., considered the guest ranch capital of the world. For the 375 mile trip from Newport we drove through Santa Ana Canyon Freeway to Riverside, Beaumont, Banning and into Indio's San Souci Restaurant for a fine dinner.

From Indio, Highway 60 is a straight high-speed course and we sped swiftly onward. We wheeled through Desert Center and across the Colorado at Blythe and now we were in Arizona.

About two miles short of Wickenburg we took a right turn to Rancho de Los Caballeros. Our welcome was as warm as the Arizona sunshine when we were met by the rancho's managers, Dallas and Edie Gant.

Los Cab (as the locals call the rancho) is a real, functioning cattle ranch with many thousands of purebreds ruminating on the range. For the guests, the accommodations are deluxe. There is a low, rambling ranch house and fine bungalows with the added comfort of radiant floor heating. There is a fine stable of horses for riding, a grand pool for swimming and all-day sunshine for relaxing absorption.

We also took the short trip into Wickenburg which boasts that its population is composed of 2500 of the "happiest and friendliest people in the world." There are, beside Los Cab, four other dude ranches within a radius of five miles of Wickenburg—the Slash Bar-K, the Remuda, the K-L Bar and the Monte Vista.

While high-heeling in our Western boots in Wickenburg, we met a Los Angeles friend, Bill Massie and his nice wife Dee. Massie is an authority on the area.

Among the points of interest he indicated was Wickenburg's upside-down river. The Hassayampa courses through the center of town. On the surface, it is as dry as a week-old wishbone; underground it is a good-sized stream.

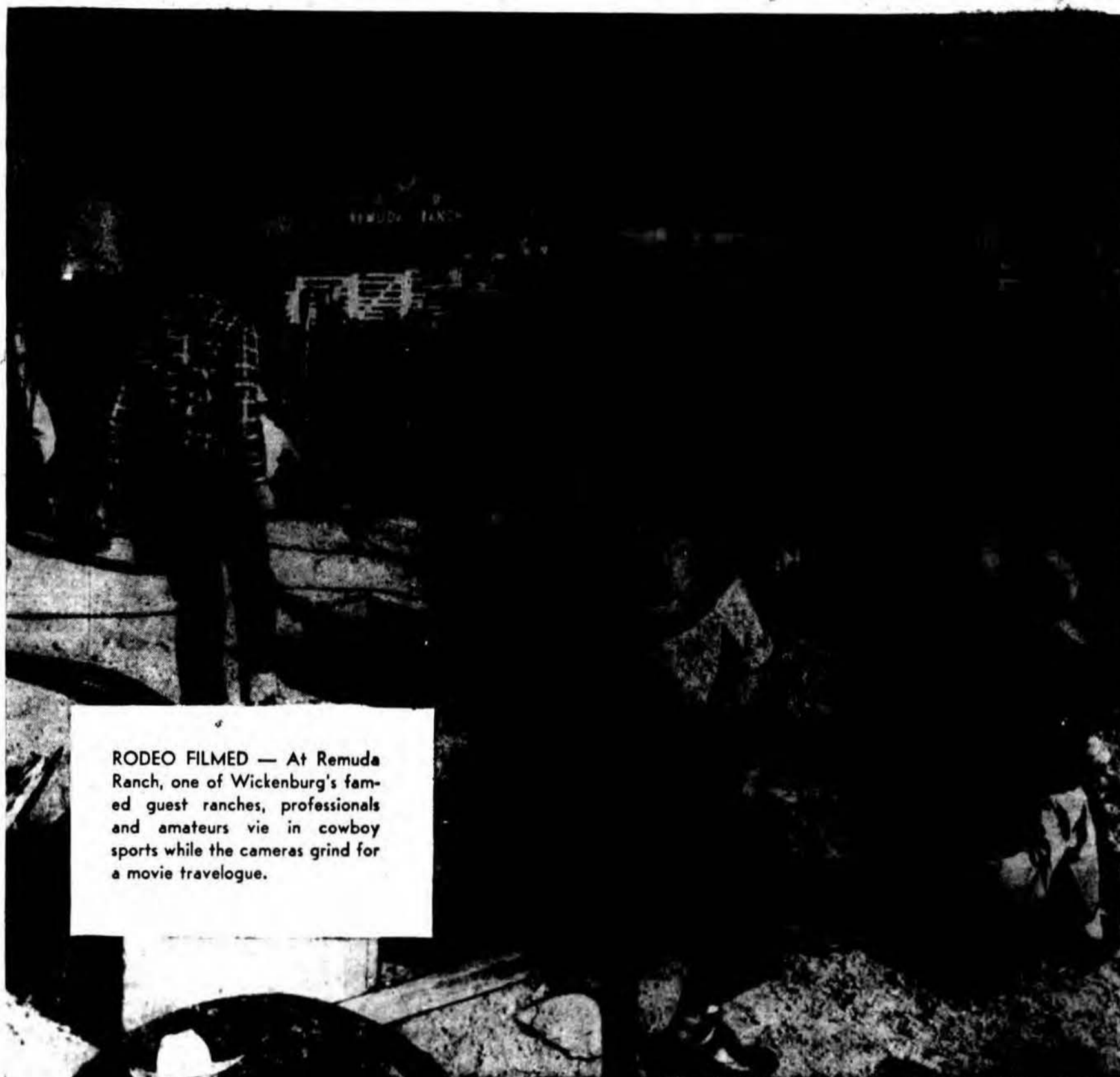
Posted on the Hassayampa's bridge is a sign reading: "No Fishing From This Bridge." This, of course, is a standing town joke. Wickenburg is no come-lately Western town. It was founded by Henry Wickenburg in 1863 when he panned out gold from the (then) right-side-up Hassayampa.

Gold seekers made the town the base camp for their prospecting operations in the surrounding hills. One of the most successful discoveries was the famous Vulture Mine from which miners picked out more than \$10,000,000 in gold.

Once a month each of the guest ranches has a rodeo featuring both professional and amateur cowboys. In the evening, the natives and the dudes quake the boards with square dancing.

Sunday morning, after church services, is devoted to a "breakfast ride" into the desert. Forty-eight of us, following a five-mile trek, were more than ready for the ranch-hand size breakfast prepared by Mrs. Gant and Foreman Frank Allen.

In a skillet (larger than a manhole cover) 180 eggs were scrambled after the frying of 20 pounds of bacon. With toast and tankards of coffee, it was a tremendous breakfast. Incidentally, the trekkers will probably be in the movies soon. Paramount Studios shot reels for a flicker travelogue.

As it must for all week-ends—Sunday evening comes and we had to leave for home. Travel to and from Wickenburg (which is 56 miles westerly from Phoenix) is a leisurely eight-hour drive either way. Many do it in a safe seven and a half hours.

Those who prefer the swiftness of the airways can go from Los Angeles to the Los Cab ranch in a little more than one and a half hours. A 2800-ft. landing strip, enough to handle any two-engine plane, is on the ranch range. Just telephone ahead and a station wagon will be waiting.

Strike Hurts Total State Tuna Tonnage

SACRAMENTO, (U.P.) - The state Department of Fish and Game reports tuna fishing and canning activities were light during October. A few plants at San Diego, Monterey and San Francisco received and processed imported and U.S.-caught tuna. Los Angeles and Long Beach plants did not operate due to the cannery workers' strike.

Albacore deliveries at Terminal Island went into freezers and fresh fish channels. The fishing was off northern Baja California, and from 100 to 150 miles west and southwest of the Farallone Island went into freezers and Francisco area were shipped to Oregon. Sardine fishing in southern waters produced 11,500 tons, of which about 9,000 tons were trucked to the Monterey area. About 500 tons were landed in Monterey, and the balance were processed at Santa Barbara, Port Huene and Oxnard. Mackerel, both Pacific and Jack, were reported abundant, with about 600 tons being trucked to the Monterey area.

Scudder Found Beaten, Bleeding

Costa Mesa police are looking for the man who beat up Rowlett G. Scudder, 36, of 444 E. Costa Mesa St. at 1:15 a. m. Saturday and left him bleeding and covered with mud in an alley in the 1800 block of Newport Blvd. Police said Scudder was bleeding from his nose and mouth and was covered over his body with numerous bruises and contusions. He was taken in an unconscious condition to Hoag Hospital. Officers said Scudder was also highly intoxicated.

Sacramento Sidelight

SACRAMENTO, (OCNS)—Once again, it has been rather clearly demonstrated that the setting aside of a particular "day" for safe-driving is not the answer to the growing traffic slaughter problem in California or the nation, for that matter.

California traffic deaths increased 200 per cent on "S-D Day", which was Thursday, Dec. 1, from three last year to nine this year. In the nation, there were 65 deaths, compared to 51 a year ago.

The designation of "S-D Day", which is the initial for safe-driving day, of course is merely an attempt on the part of well-meaning people to obtain publicity, and draw the attention of the nation's motorists to the need for driving safety.

MISSISSIPPI PROBLEM As laudable an enterprise as this is, it still does not strike at the heart of the nation's traffic problem, insofar as deaths and accidents are concerned.

Government officials who have had long and close connection with the problems of accident generally agree that the laws pertaining to issuance of driver's licenses are not strong enough to permit even reasonably close supervision over who drives an automobile and who is prohibited from driving.

And then there is the enforcement problem, for many people who do not even have a driver's license, are on the highways, sometimes endangering the lives of others who are well qualified to handle an automobile.

Consequently, it is the contention of some officials that more emphasis should be placed on the issuance of a driver's license, and that it should be made a matter of serious procedure rather than the passage of what amounts to a simple examination, and in some instances, a driving test. Now, a driver's license costs only 50 cents a year. With some six and a half million people holding licenses, it obviously is impossible for the issuing agency, the state department of motor vehicles, to inaugurate a proper examination and give proper driving tests. The department has done the best it can with the money on which it has had to operate, but it isn't big enough or widespread enough to do the proper job.

COMPARE LICENSES Compare the issuance of an automobile driver's license with that of an airplane pilot. The pilot must not only be in good physical shape, but also must have definite knowledge of the art of handling an airplane, know something of meteorology and have many other accomplishments which are not applied to the driver of an automobile. Yet the pilot endangers far less lives than the driver of an automobile, say on a trip between San Francisco and Los Angeles.

The reason, probably, that so little attention is paid to the driver's license is that people in this generation grew up with the idea that driving a car was a right and not a privilege, a theory which was comparatively recently blasted by the supreme court of the state.

But no matter how great the enforcement, and how much of a check there is on drivers,
