Hubbard Innocent of Delinquency Rap, Court Rules

Dismissed Thursday without the presentation of a defense in his behalf was the charge against William Wallace Hubbard, 41, 2531 Vista Drive, Newport Beach. Hubbard was charged with 'contributing to the delinquency of a minor' when he was arrested July 31. He posted \$2500 bail for release.

A 15-year-old runaway boy from Los Angeles, whom Hubbard befriended when the boy was hitch hiking, gave a story to sheriff's officers and his father, Hubbard's arrest resulted.

When the charge and testimony was presented in Superior Court, Thursday, and the State had completed its 'case,' a move for dismissal was made by attorneys Frank Linnell and Don Harwood. The case was dismissed without the necessity of any defense being made on order of Judge Franklin G. West.

Hubbard at all times had professed innocence of any wrong doing and expressed the opinion that the youngster had fabricated a story for his own purpose because of his running away from home. The court dismissal bears him out.

Pleading guilty to charges of drunk driving and hit-run property damage, Louis Cass, 62, of 2100 East Bay Front, Balboa, on Monday was fined \$250 in City Court by Judge Frank Linnell.

5th Grader Finds Live Depth Bomb

It looked like treasure trove when Gordon Hand, fifth grade student at the Newport school and son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Hand, 3602 West Ocean Front, found a long cylindrical object on the beach Sunday at 9:17 a. m. and took it proudly home.

But it was a live depth bomb and was loaded with three pounds of TNT.

Gordon's father called police officers Jack Price and Ed Bates, who in turn asked for an expert from the Navy and Ammunition Net Depot at Seal Beach to come and take the thing away.

That was at 12:07 p. m. Half an hour later, Hand was tired of having the thing around and called the Coast Guard, then buried the bomb in sand in the front yard.

The bomb was of aluminum or dural, painted yellow. It was two feet long and three inches across. The firing pin had been pulled out by the firing mechanism and it was ready to explode but had not done so. At 2:30 p. m. Lt. J. T. Revis of the Net Depot arrived and took the bomb to the depot to find out why it had not exploded.

Board Promises Library for CDM

If the proposed \$985,000 school bond issue election is approved Jan. 18 by the necessary two-thirds majority, the new elementary school to be built on a parcel of land north of Corona del Mar will contain space for a new public branch library for Corona del Mar.

This decision was made Tuesday night by the elementary school board of trustees at their regular monthly meeting. A classroom will be donated to the city library, if it can be arranged. A library would pay for utilities used on a separate meter basis.

Needy Children Aid Shows Small Change in County

Aid to needy children in Orange County showed relatively little change during the first five months of the present fiscal year. California Taxpayers' association said today.

During November, 1951, there were 1,397 needy children on the rolls of the county, compared with 1,454 for July, first month of the current fiscal year.

Total aid paid to needy children in the county during November reached \$59,645, compared with \$58,901 for July.

Average aid paid per child for November was \$42.70, slightly above the \$40.51 average aid per child for July, 1951.

Throughout the state, the number of needy children receiving aid during November was a little more than 2 per cent less than for July, with 137,076 on the rolls for November, compared with 140,047 for July, 1951. Going back four years, there were only 31,348 needy children on rolls throughout the state.

Total aid paid to needy children in California reached \$6,867,241 for November, compared with \$6,834,221 for July, 1951. For July, 1947, the total was \$1,327,596.

Average aid paid per child in California was \$50.10 for November, somewhat higher than the \$48.80 statewide average for July, 1951. Average aid paid in July, 1947, was \$52.35.

"The levelling off in the aid to needy children rolls during the first five months of this fiscal year, reverses the skyrocketing upward trend which followed liberalization of the aid to needy children laws, particularly at the 1949 legislative sessions," the association said.

"Constructive action by the 1951 legislature to strengthen and tighten the administration of this aid to the needy program, including a change in statement of legislative intent from 'liberally construed' to 'with due consideration for the needs of the applicants and safeguarding of public funds,' is a major reason for this healthy levelling off in the number of children on the rolls," the association declared.

RAIN, WINDS PELT CITY; DAMAGE LOW

Accompanied by winds of 25 to 25 miles per hour, 1.21 inches of rain pelted the Harbor area Saturday night, flooding streets, soaking the soil but doing little damage. A few limbs were blown off trees and Edison Co. wires were broken high on a pole at 111-25th St., at 1:30 p. m. on Saturday. Company employees repaired the line.

Balboa Island in particular "was awash" according to residents. An additional .16 of an inch on Sunday and Monday brought the storm total to 1.51 as of 5 a. m. yesterday. Rainfall for the season is now 7.94. No damage was reported to boats.

At Corona del Mar, Officer Dale Montgomery at 10:30 p. m., Saturday asked for street barricades near the All-American market where water was several feet deep and one car was stalled. Later in the night a tree blew down at 101-A and Narcissus Ave.

It was "turn about" on Saturday morning for A. C. Bussey of Corona del Mar when he was notified his home at Arlington was flooded.

TRANSFER CO. NOW CONNECTED WITH FLYING TIGER LINE

Providing local connection with the Flying Tigers Lines, international air freight carriers based at Lockheed Air Terminal, Burbank, the Balboa Transfer Co. is now sending freight over 10 lbs. from here, G. C. Bennett, co-owner, announced today.

He said that freight delivered by 3:30 p. m. at his warehouse will leave Burbank by air the same day. Air freight rates are comparable to air express rates, it was stated.

LEAGUE OF CIVIC ASSOCIATIONS VOTE IN FAVOR OF BONDS

Council to Hear Federal Housing Plan, Protest

City Council last night was slated to hear a report by City Manager John J. Sailors regarding availability of federal funds for redevelopment of certain "substandard" dwelling areas in Newport Beach.

The council also was expected to receive a resolution against the possible use of federal monies from the Newport Harbor Board of Realtors' board of directors. The directors met yesterday morning and passed a resolution opposing the federal fund's use.

According to Raymond A. Voigt, field representative of the Federal Housing and Home Financing Agency, who recently outlined his office's program to Sailors, Newport Beach could qualify for \$64,260 or possibly \$137,700. This must be sought by the city by filing a request for a capital grant reservation. First, the council must adopt a resolution, asking for the monies.

About 918 homes here were considered substandard in the 1940 census, Voigt told Sailors. Later figures are not available.

Possibility that the two-for-one matching funds (federal to city) necessary could be provided by Newport's expenses on improvement of Balboa Blvd. will be investigated by Voigt.

Under the federal plan, the city would form a housing authority. The land to be redeveloped would have to be acquired, existing structures demolished, the properties cleared and then turned over to private interests for new construction.

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REALTORS OKAY BOND ISSUE; TO DISCUSS 'SLUM CLEARANCE'

The Newport Harbor Board of Realtors held their regular breakfast meeting Thursday at which time they voted 20 to 5 to endorse the school bond issue which is to be voted on Friday. It was brought out at this meeting that if so desired the proposed auditorium could be left out should the school board so decide, even though the bonds were voted.

Some seemed to think that the scarcity of materials might hinder the completion of the auditorium as it would require steel which is in short supply. The school class rooms are a "must" now as many children are going half days and a lot of new residents are coming in now and the

population is steadily increasing, it was stated.

Next Thursday the board will discuss the question of asking for federal aid in the so-called slum clearance proposal and it seems likely that the aid will be turned down as the general opinion appears to be that this city can survive without hollering for help from Uncle Sam.

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VOTING AREAS FOR BOND ISSUE ARE REVEALED

Need to clarify areas for voting on the school bond issue Jan. 18 by precinct number and description was expressed today by Mrs. E. C. Morgenroth, co-chairman of the citizen's committee for schools.

Voting will take place Friday at the three grammar schools in the Newport district. Voters in precincts 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 8, 11, 17, 18 and 19 will vote at the Newport Beach grammar school. These precinct numbers include the entire Balboa peninsula, the Newport school side of Coast highway down to the Santa Ana river bridge, and Lido Isle.

Voters registered in precincts 6, 7, 10, 12, 13, 14, 16, 21, 22 and 23 will vote at the Corona del Mar school poll. This includes Balboa Island, Harbor Island, Beacon Bay and Corona del Mar.

A description of precincts 9, 15 and 20 includes Bay Shores, Bay Shore Camp, Newport Heights and Cliff Haven subdivision (Costa Mesa precinct 2). Voters will go to the Horace Ensign school.

At an election campaign committee meeting this morning at the Horace Ensign school, workers reported on telephone and transportation activities, stated Mrs. Morgenroth. Members of the Newport Beach elementary schools PTA, the Woman's Civic League, and the Young Republicans club are among the volunteers aiding the bond issue campaign.

Institute Head to Direct Youth Work Camp

President Richard Silverthorn of the Spanish American Institute in Gardena has been named director of the 1952 Methodist youth work camp and reconstruction project to be held in Germany. The scholarships are available for outstanding Methodist young people from Southern California and Arizona.

This will be the fifth year that the project has been carried on. Rev. Owen Geer of the Fullerton Methodist church was director in 1949, and Rev. Thomas Ray Pen-dell of Christ Church by the Sea in 1950.

New Leaders for Christ Church IYF

Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Remley of Balboa have taken over the Intermediate Youth Fellowship at Christ Church by the Sea as the new counselors. They will meet the group of 7th and 8th graders each Sunday evening at 6:30 in Goodell hall.

State Gas Taxes May Be Deducted

Motorists were reminded today by the Automobile Club of Southern California that sums paid for state gasoline taxes may be deducted in filing 1951 Federal income tax returns.

The deduction covers the California gasoline tax of 4 1/2 cents a gallon paid since Jan. 1, 1951. Federal gasoline taxes are not deductible.

Motorists without accurate records of the amount of gasoline purchased during 1951 may justify a deduction based on a record of miles traveled divided by the average number of miles the car runs per gallon.

The burden of proving this deduction is placed on the taxpayer. Where the gasoline tax deduction is estimated, taxpayers should have evidence to prove miles traveled and gasoline consumption per mile.

Motorists with oil company credit cards can easily determine the amount of gas tax paid during 1951.

Other deductible items are: Retail sales or use taxes paid on purchase of automobiles and accessories; registration, vehicle license, operator and chauffeur license fees; personal property and municipal taxes; amounts paid for interest on auto loans and losses or damages to vehicles not compensated for by insurance or otherwise.

DELINQUENT TAXES TOTAL \$883,510

Delinquent state income taxes assessed by the State Franchise Tax Board up to Jan. 1 totaled \$883,510.12, John J. Campbell, Executive Officer, reported to State Controller Thomas H. Kuchel, Chairman of the Board.

Campbell said the Board is well on its way toward assessing \$1,000,000 as predicted last July when the Board started checking income tax returns against employer wage reports to determine delinquencies.

Actually, the State has added \$550,931.09 to the General Fund as a result of the check, assessed \$292,579.03; processed 67,617 of 100,000 delinquencies, and has 21,622 taxpayers to canvass. The returns are for 1949.

Campbell advised Kuchel that the canvass will be completed about the end of February.

NEWPORT GETS \$15,250 FROM LICENSE FEES

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 14.—Thomas H. Kuchel, State Controller, today announced apportionment of \$18,173,262 to cities and counties of the state.

The apportionment for Orange county totaled \$185,594.77, Kuchel said. City apportionments within the county gave Newport Beach \$15,250.54.

The funds represent the Motor Vehicle License Fee, better known as the "in lieu" tax, for the period June 1 to Nov. 30, 1951.

Fifty per cent of the funds, or \$9,066,631 went to the 306 incorporated cities of the state, and a like amount to 58 counties. Allocation, Kuchel said, is based on population figures of the 1950 census, with correction for annexations made during the period.

Per capita rate, according to the Controller, is slightly under \$1.26 for cities, and 86 cents for counties.

During the collection period, a total of \$19,469,830 was paid to the State for "in lieu" taxes, that is, taxes on vehicles which previously were collected by cities and counties.

From the amount collected, \$481,562 was deducted for interest on State Highway bonds; \$814,589 for support of the Motor Vehicle Department and \$417 for a legislative claim.

The "in lieu" tax is assessed by the state at the rate of \$2.00 per hundred market value of the vehicle.

Employers Reminded to File Returns

Deadline for filing California unemployment insurance wage reports and contribution returns for the fourth quarter of 1951 is Thursday, Jan. 31, 1952, R. C. Hiatt, auditor in charge for the State Department of Employment in Santa Ana, said today.

"I want to remind employers that reporting requirements under the California Unemployment Insurance Act have not been changed and that contributions by both employers and wage earners should be made on the first \$3,000 of wages paid to an individual by each employer during a calendar year."

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LECTURER SAYS PROBLEMS ARE SOLVED BY UNDERSTANDING AND APPLICATION OF GOD'S POWER

Solution of individual and world problems of health and peace is a present opportunity through the scientific understanding and application of God's power and the work of the most vital research in the world today, Mrs. Emma Louise Garrett of San Francisco, Calif., said here Saturday night.

Such healing rests upon the fact of God's allness and of the divine mind as the sole cause of every real effect, Mrs. Garrett told a large local audience. She said it is brought about through the systematic, demonstrable understanding of the Science of Divine Truth, as taught in Christian Science.

She spoke under the auspices of First Church of Christ Scientist, Newport Beach in the church edifice, 3303 Via Lido. She is on an extensive lecture tour as a member of the Christian Science Board of Lectureship, Mr. Alan Dartford of Balboa introduced her.

Formerly an official of a large research foundation, Mrs. Garrett spoke on the topic: "Christian Science: The Science of Changeless Being."

She described spiritual understanding as the great need of the hour. "Spiritual understanding is the primal, practical and ultimate factor necessary in order to deal successfully with those suggestions which seem to project themselves as domestic inharmonies, business complexities, wars, and the forecasting of war among nations."

Mrs. Garrett described the operation of Christian healing as understood and practiced in Christian Science and illustrated how its Christian metaphysics are related to humanity's needs.

She described this religion as the "Science of Truth," and said it is necessary for those who practice it to act and think scientifically.

"The scientific method or process of its practice is research, a search directed to the discernment of truth, and it is this discernment of the truth about God and man which restores and regenerates the human understanding and produces the change which is seen outwardly as healing, the lecturer explained.

The ability and power to subdue material conditions lies in a proper grasp of spiritual cause and effect, she went on. She said Christian Science teaches that God, the divine mind, is the sole and infinite cause and man is the idea expressing this mind.

"The efforts of the world's best thinkers to find a solution to present day problems will meet with greater success when they turn to the major premise of God's allness," she went on.

Friendly relations between individuals and nations, she said, "are in direct ratio to the understanding of this changeless oneness of God and man wherein is the oneness of God includes the essential oneness of man under the law of brotherhood."

The starting point of true prayer is the recognition of God as the only cause and of man as the effect of this one cause, she declared. Prayer in Christian Science is the spiritual understanding or scientific thinking based upon a fixed and eternal principle, entirely apart from conjecture, an understanding that is the very presence, the very activity of God, mind. Such prayer, she said, "awakens thought to the realities that are."

She quoted the description of prayer by Mary Baker Eddy, the

discovered and founder of Christian Science: "It makes new and scientific discoveries of God, of His goodness and power. It shows us more clearly than we saw before, what we already have and are; and most of all, it shows us what God is."

"The healing of organic and functional disease by prayer in Christian Science is not mysterious, she maintained. It can be summarized as 'Truth appearing and error disappearing.'"

"What appears as the healing of the body is in reality the redemption or transformation of the consciousness."

This healing, the lecturer went on, conforms to the practice of Jesus, whose correct view of man's sacred and divine relationship to the great first cause "unveiled man's original purity and integrity where, for instance, to spiritual ignorance, ten lepers or a withered hand appeared."

Understanding of God as eternal principle and of the "inviolable oneness of God and man," as demonstrated by Jesus, is the key to health as it is to solution of social, economic and political problems, she said.

Saying that through scientific prayer every phase of human life is purified and uplifted, Mrs. Garrett explained how it confers a sense of permanent friendship far beyond what mortal sense can devise. In such prayer, she said, we seek the unfolding of the real God and find in that unfoldment ourselves. "Thus we discover our own, draw them to us and demonstrate here on earth the miracle of perfect friendship."

If every individual in this and other lands would persistently annihilate suspicion and strife in his own thinking, world peace indeed would be established, she said. "As the great law of spiritual cause and effect is learned and understood individually, we come consciously into scientific relationship with God and with one another."

Is it not apparent that world peace cannot be forced; that it cannot be bought? Peace will crown our efforts when the scientific basis of brotherhood is universally acknowledged and lived.

Mrs. Garrett also dealt with education as viewed from the standpoint of Christian Science. "Education in Christian Science is a spiritual revaluation of human life. Its task is to reorient the individual to enable him to take a richer and more significant view of his experience, to place him above the not within the system of his beliefs," she said. Christian Science is not so much a special interest separated from other interests as it is a method of transforming all our interest.

She added: "The effect of Christian Science is to broaden the interests and sympathies of people regarding their daily occupation or long with it — to lift thought out of the monotony and drudgery which are the common lot; to train habits of judgment and of appreciation of value; to carry on the struggle for human excellence in our day and generation; to temper passion with wisdom; to temper passion with wisdom; to temper passion with wisdom; to temper passion with wisdom."
