## Direct Tax Election Set For NHUHS

### May 20 Date for Voters to Decide School Needs

An election May 20 will be held in an effort to solve the excessive growth problem at Newport Harbor Union High School, the Board of Trustees announced today. It will take place concurrent with the regular school election of trustees. Hoped for is a new high school in the Costa Mesa area, as favored by District Superintendent Sidney Davidson. Davidson said he favored this solution over expansion of the present site.

Indications are a pay-as-you-go method to finance the required building program will be submitted to the people, permitting a direct tax levy for construction purposes, rather than a bond issue. It was pointed out building expense to the district would be between 25 and 33 1/2 per cent lower if this direct tax method were used.

#### WANT 70 ACRES

In a statement of policy approved by the trustees during a Monday meeting, the board declared it would pursue "vigorously" its request for 70 acres of land on the old Santa Ana Army Air Base.

The jury and spectators in the crowded courtroom in the Harry Lehman-Charles E. (Red) Devine trial in Superior Court Tuesday rose to their feet in excitement when the opposing attorneys engaged in fistcuffs.

Chatterton twice grabbed the book back from Chula and leaped to his feet and poked the defense attorney. Judge Kenneth Thompson's gavel quelled the excitement.

### CONTROL OF LANDLORDS Easter Week Rental Law Presented City Council

An ordinance to prevent overcrowding of rental accommodations during the annual Easter Week influx was passed to second reading Monday night by City Council. It could be adopted at Monday's adjourned meeting set for 9 a.m.

The ordinance requires a special license for "all persons, firms or corporations, whether owners, lessees, occupants or agents acting on their own behalf or on the behalf of others who rent, lease or sub-lease living quarters from the 10 days prior to Easter to the 21 days following Easter Sunday for 15 days or less to any tenant or occupant."

#### \$10 LICENSE FEE

The applicant for a license must pay \$10 for the instrument on making application, the money to be used to defray cost of investigation and inspection of the proposed rental premises. The license applicants and persons renting from them must agree in writing that during occupancy covered, such premises or living quarters shall be subject to reasonable inspection.

### Mesa Homes Tax Wrangle Set Jan. 21

A Freedom Homes committee of at least four persons is meeting in the tract tomorrow night to set up the order for a mass protest meeting scheduled for Everett Rea School at 7:30 p.m., Jan. 21, the News-Press learned today.

The mass meeting is being held in an effort to find out why many home purchasers received notification during recent weeks that monthly payments had to be increased from 25 cents to \$17 to cover taxes.

Main reason for complaint from the home purchasers in the tract has been the apparent inequities in the monthly increases. "Where I received a \$17 monthly payment increase, my neighbor around the corner had his payments increased by only 25 cents," had been the gist of complaints heard by the News-Press.

### Many Fine Jewels in Mantz Loot

Among the list of \$15,000 worth of jewelry and other valuables spirited out of the Paul Mantz home in May, 1952 by three burglary suspects are many choice items.

Included in the list made at the time of the burglary are a yellow gold cigar case set with 22 round diamonds, \$1000; a gold identification bracelet set with diamonds and rubies, \$1200; a solitaire ring with diamonds, \$1500; one pair of earrings set with diamonds, rubies and emeralds, \$800.

Also listed were several watches including a calendar watch, split second pocket watch chronograph watch and others.

A gold medallion engraved "From Amelia Earhart" was also taken. A collection of guns, some very old, and two powder horns, one of bone and the other of brass were also stolen. Many of the items of jewelry were personalized with the initials "P. M."

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### 5 Booked by Local Cops; Job Pulled 3 Years Ago

The \$15,000 burglary of world-famous Paul Mantz' home here May 11, 1952, today was announced as solved with arrest of two former local youths now of Placentia, two Brea men and a Fullerton resident. Their arrests and partial recovery of Mantz' belongings reportedly smashed a county-wide burglary ring, after nearly three years' intensive investigation.

Det. Sgts. V. I. McManigal and LeRoy Johnson, Newport Beach, said Richard Albert Duran, 19, of 1205 1/2 E. Chapman, Fullerton and Lloyd Alvin Phillips, 33, of 502 Union Place, Brea, were in jail on charges of receiving property stolen from the noted aviator's East Bay Front home, Balboa Island.

#### BURGLARY COUNTS

Booked on straight "burglary" charges are Charles Fredrick Printz, 23, of 309 W. Elm, Brea and twin brothers, Thomas and Jerry Hansen, both 23, formerly Newport Ocean Front, now of 6052 S. Placentia Ave., Placentia. All but Phillips, who some months ago was tried, McManigal said, on the same charge in connection with a \$100,000 burglary case, have admitted burglary and receiving charges lodged. Phillips' case ended with a hung jury.

All five men are held in Newport Beach city jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond. Their arraignment is due late today or tomorrow morning.

#### SATISFIED BY RESULT

Source of satisfaction to McManigal and Newport Beach police Chief John Upson is the burglars' confession they looted the Mantz home of rare guns, jewelry, clothing, diamonds, liquor and articles whose list runs 20 inches of single space typing. Chief Upson was a detective sergeant when he and McManigal worked the Mantz case and on the assumption they could not then prove that the Hansen brothers and Printz were the burglars.

McManigal unfolded a tale involving nearly three years' intensive investigation of the seemingly "perfect" burglary, telling how efforts were redoubled six months ago. First physical evidence of the

## BULOT WILL ENGINEER HALECREST ANNEXATION

Development has started on the proposed 740-acre Halecrest annexation to Costa Mesa. Francis H. Bulot, Consulting Engineers, Inc., has been retained by the Hale Company of Garden Grove to do the engineering work on its 176-acre portion of the project.

Results of a public hearing in Newport Justice Court before Costa Mesa City Council, Jan. 24, will determine if the annexation, largest in the history of the new city will be made. The approximately 2 square miles of land bears an assessed valuation of \$1,500,000. The strip extends from the present city limits of Costa Mesa just north of Wilson St., approximately 2 miles inland to Gialer St. The property is bounded on the east by Fairview Ave., and on the west by Harbor Blvd. Included in the strip annexation is a great expanse of vacant land, the entire Orange Coast College Campus and the Hale property.

The strip annexation would abut on the east the property of the Orange County Fair Grounds and the Southern California Bible College. On the west it would reach the easterly boundary of the Fairview State Hospital which is now abutting.

### DIVIDES 618 LOTS

The Bulot Company engineers will plan and design complete water, sewer and drainage systems for the Hale subdivision which has been divided into 618 lots, according to Robert C. Bulot, vice-president and general manager of the firm. With offices in Costa Mesa, Los Angeles and Pasadena, the Bulot organization has a 40-year record of achievement in the public works field.

"Drainage of the area has been termed by some 'a major problem' but our preliminary study of the land, plus our knowledge and ex-

perience in Orange County, indicates that this problem can be overcome," Bulot said.

"Costa Mesa City Council called for the hearing Dec. 20 when a petition proposing the annexation was received, signed by the Hale Company and Orange Coast College. The two land owners represent one-fourth of the land involved in the proposed Halecrest annexation. All the proposed annexation is within the Newport Harbor Union High School District, Costa Mesa Union School District and Orange Coast Junior College District. Adjacent to the strip of land to be annexed is the so-called Whittier property of the Santa Ana Army Air base which has again been declared surplus by the government. Last week the Santa Ana city school board asked for 30 acres for a high school site. All property in the annexation and in the Whittier area is seaward of the proposed Sepulveda (San Diego) Freeway.

**ENGINEERS' MAP**  
Accompanying the petition for annexation was a map drawn by the South Bay Engineers of Santa Ana showing city limits of Costa Mesa would extend to Gialer Ave., between Harbor Blvd., and Fairview Road. Gialer at this point will become the Sepulveda Freeway. The Bulot staff started work on the project for the Hale Co. subdivision this week. No date for completion has been announced. The builders plan construction of 166 of a total of 618 houses on the tract at Baker Ave. and College St., starting Feb. 1.

Written protests from any of the 11 property owners in the Halecrest area will be considered by the Costa Mesa Council at the meeting Jan. 24. Should final approval be given the annexation, it will be the third addition to the city limits since Costa Mesa incorporated.

## USAF ASKED TO ACT ON HIGH SCHOOL SITE

### Dodge Letter Urges Land Be Released for Building

An appeal for the youth of the Harbor area was made in a letter dispatched Tuesday to Harold E. Talbott, Secretary of the Air Force, by Donald J. Dodge, president of the Newport Harbor High School District Board of Trustees.

In behalf of the boys and girls of the Harbor area, Dodge strongly urged release by the USAF of 70 acres of land required for construction of a new high school in the Costa Mesa area. Dodge pointed out the land was needed due to "the rapid increase in population and school enrollments in this area and also by the fact that speculators and subdividers have acquired every suitable site other than the Air Base."

**CROWDED CONDITIONS**  
Dodge stated that crowded conditions at Harbor High had greatly reduced educational opportunities. His letter concluded, "There can be no stronger defense than an intelligent and loyal young America for which we work so ardently."

The letter informed Secretary Talbott: "Special circumstances which have contributed to the rapid increase in school enrollment in this area are, the Armed Forces located at El Toro Marine Base, the Santa Ana Lighter Than Air Facility and the fact that a large number of the in-coming residents are employees of the Douglas Aircraft and other defense establishments."

Dodge told the Air Force Secretary a May election for the raising of funds with which to build a new high school has been called since "the trustees of this district face a crisis in providing adequate educational facilities." Dodge emphasized: "It is of paramount importance that a site for the new high school be designated at the earliest possible moment."

The letter, written by Dodge, reviewed circumstances of the Santa Ana Army Air Base. The Air Force has title to some 400 acres of land there. The land was acquired from the Army Engineers in July, 1954, for the purpose of building a government-owned nuclear research laboratory and industrial plants to aid in aircraft production.

**PLANT ABANDONED**  
Dodge said the high school board had been informed the intent of the Air Force was to have the North American Aviation Co. manufacture jet-propelled engines. However, according to a statement from Congressman Utt and newspaper stories, arrangements have been made for the project to locate in Canoga Park.

"Thus," Dodge wrote the secretary, "insofar as we are able to ascertain, after zealous inquiry, the land in the Santa Ana Army Air Base appears to be unencumbered for any immediate project of the Air Force."

Newport Harbor Union High School, anticipating this land would be returned to Surplus,

made a full application for the 70-acre site March 9, 1953, prior to the Air Force acquisition, he wrote. The district was assured that once this land is in "surplus" Harbor High's application would be processed and the site granted to the district.

**NO MORE DELAY**  
Dodge informed Secretary Talbott: "Congressman Utt and Senator Kuchel thus far have informed us of several dates by which time the decision of the Air Force would be made. Each time there has been an added delay . . . we now strongly urge and will deeply appreciate it if you will cooperate with our request."

## Flying Discs Pay Return County Call

Flying saucers or meteorites were reported over the Orange area Tuesday night.

Although Orange police received only one call, the Santa Ana switchboard was flooded with calls as residents in the northern Santa Ana area reported seeing what many described as "two fire-balls" traveling from south to north.

One observer, Jerry Hayes, Orange, said the two brilliant objects flew over at about 6 p.m. Tuesday and faded out within about five seconds of their first sighting.

Though many reported the objects as "possibly flying saucers," according to police, Herb Barr of Garden Grove, tower operator at the Orange County Airport who was on duty at the time, said he listed the objects as meteorites. Barr, a trained aircraft observer with 12 years experience, said he first sighted a single object at about 1000 feet elevation, proceeding from southwest to northeast coming from about the vicinity of Newport Beach.

He added the meteorite split in two as it passed within about half a mile of the tower and immediately went out.

## County Bond Issue Gets State Okay

Acting Governor Harold J. Powers signed Senate Bill 20 by Senator John H. Murdy today. The bill provides that the board of supervisors may call a new election on a bond issue for the Orange County Flood Control District.

The legislation had to be passed because there was some money left in a fund from a previous bond issue but not enough to accomplish projects planned. The bill permits utilization of former funds as well as those to be voted.

**FIRST BILL**

This was the first bill to clear the legislature and to be signed by the acting governor.

Assembly LeRoy Lyon and Earl W. Stanley both guided the bill on its passage through the lower house.

Under the flood control act as it existed prior to this bill the law provides that whenever bonds had been issued and the proceeds thereof expended, then the board of supervisors might by a four-fifths vote determine that another bond issue was needed as provided in the act. The situation in the district of Orange County was that a \$2,500,000 issue of 1937 for the Prado Basin project and others contemplated federal participation and part of the work was completed. Roughly \$300,000 of the bond issue remained unexpended.

**SUM INADEQUATE**

That sum cannot be spent because the amount is inadequate to complete the remaining projects. Costs of work and lack of federal funds for participation account for the shortage.

The fund was frozen therefore and legislation had to be passed permitting the county to call bond election to augment the monies and complete their projects.

## Suit Filed on Mesa Builders for \$6728

Alleging they were unpaid for work done on a Orange County subdivision, L. J. March and Russell Moore today brought suit against Mesa Builders and Equipment Co. and Garden Grove Estates for \$6728 in Superior Court.

The plaintiffs, doing business as March-Moore Construction Co., claim they furnished materials and performed work on foundations of a 69-building tract erected by the defendants.

The plaintiffs, subcontractors in the tract, say they entered into an agreement with the defendants April 1, 1954. They claim they have upheld their end of the bargain, but the defendants haven't. They ask foreclosure of a mechanic's lien on the subdivision.

were nabbed in a housing tract building in county territory near Fullerton; Phillips, arrested in his commercial garage, Brea, Tuesday at 5:15 p.m.

Until all men were booked, grilled by investigators and additional work to recover Mantz's belongings was well along, the case was kept under wraps.

"We talked to loads of people but holding off the arrests until we were able to find more physical evidence implicating the suspects," McManigal said. Hopes are high to make full recovery of Mantz's guns. Some of the jewelry has been broken up and stones are missing, McManigal said.

**OUT OF STATE**

In some instances, Mantz's belongings have been taken out of state and as far north as San Francisco, he added.

So far as the burglary, the three suspects admit breaking the front door of the Mantz former home at 301 East Bay Front, then ransacking the place in from 30 to 60 minutes of some of his most prized possessions. After the burglary, Mantz sold his home, moved to his locally moored motor sailing yacht, *Pez Espada*. Presently, he is overseas making motion pictures in which he does the hazardous flying for which he is famous.

Following several hours' intensive interrogation, McManigal and Johnson said the three burglars admitted breaking in the home, saying they had been drinking, were just driving around the Harbor, trying to find a party, then found themselves in Mantz home carrying out loot.

**PLACENTIA HIDE-OUT**

Once they had packed the goods out of his home, they drove around in one of the Hansens' cars, then went to Placentia where they hid it in an undisclosed spot, they told police. They "split the stuff," McManigal said, with Printz admitting he took most of the guns while the Hansens received the balance.

Duran led them to his mother's home in Placentia where officers recovered a quantity of jewelry and watches hidden there. While Phillips was involved in the recent trial on receiving stolen goods, McManigal said, he turned over a 300 Magnum rifle to officers, saying he bought it from a man he didn't know and had seen only twice and not since the purchase. The gun later was identified by Mantz.

**MANTZ IDENTIFIED**

When Printz was picked up by Van Nuys police who found the gun in his pocket, this subsequently was identified by Mantz's son, McManigal said. Most of Mantz' clothing has been destroyed, he reported.

George Chula, attorney, told local police he will represent Printz, McManigal said, while an Anaheim lawyer is believed to be retained by another suspect.

## Murdy, Stanley Go Into Fast Action in State Legislature

State representatives from the Harbor area went into fast legislative action this session.

A bill by Senator John Murdy was the first one approved by the State Senate. It is one enabling Orange County to place its \$30 million flood control bond issue on ballot.

Bills introduced in the lower house Tuesday included a measure by Earl W. Stanley and 60 co-authors permitting use of radar evidence in prosecuting speeders.

Also introduced was a bill by Vincent Thomas, San Pedro, allocating 80 per cent of tidelands oil revenues to the state's general fund, 25 per cent to state beaches and 25 per cent to state parks.

Senator Murdy has been named vice-chairman of the standing committee on agriculture. He will also serve on the labor and water resources committees this year.

## Commission Denies Mesa Rezoning Plan

Costa Mesa City Planning Commission Monday night denied the long debated 18th St. rezoning application to change from an R-1 residential district to a C-1 business district.

At the same time, the commission agreed to inform Costa Mesa City Council by letter that a proposed substitute rezoning plan and map would soon be submitted.

specification by members of the fire and police departments and any state or county law enforcement agency.

Multiple rental units (being already licensed) are excluded where they consist of three or more living quarters.

Persons violating any provision of the ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, conviction of which shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$50 or by imprisonment in jail of not more than six months or by both.

**\$500 FINE OR JAIL**

"Each such person shall be guilty of a separate offense for each and every day during any portion of which any violation of any provision of this ordinance is committed, continued, or permitted by such person and shall be punishable accordingly."

The ordinance takes precedence over other local laws of lesser restriction upon persons, premises or personal property.

The board warned this may later become necessary.

## EDITORIALS

### On Keeping Records Public

Freedom of information bills will be presented at this session of your state legislature. A measure, AB 27, by Assemblyman Frank Luckel, San Diego, would make it a misdemeanor punishable by not more than \$500 fine for any public officials, state or local, to refuse a citizen's request to inspect any public record. It also declares any citizen's right to see such records unless they have been declared confidential by law.

Now this is a worthy piece of legislation in any legislative chamber. But we can't understand why it should be necessary.

"To us, reared in the American tradition that public records are just that and open to any citizens, it seems a sad commentary that we must keep re-affirming our rights as citizens. With the Constitution of the United States, plus those of the several states, as our guides, why should such measures be needed?"

Partly, we think, it is because our nation, our state, county and city over the years have been infiltrated by politicians who think they know what's best for you and me — how much we should be told, when and how.

This, of course, is the most dangerous type of thinking. The public's right to know is as vital as freedom of worship, freedom of speech or the press. They are all interlocked.

Yet since our nation was founded, hundreds of political office holders have been caught in attempts to defraud the citizenry of its right to inspect public records. Complexities of our over-governed society have added red tape by the thousands of miles and hundreds of little bureaucracies have mushroomed to wind the tape according to their rules and regulations.

Although we do not understand why such additional legislative safeguards as proposed by Assemblyman Luckel should be needed, we will support them as they bulwark our right to inspect our own public records. May they never be closed!

### Banning Secret State Meets

Comes now Assemblyman Sheridan N. Hegland, La Mesa, with a bill before the state legislature, No. 18, which would ban secret meetings of any state agency including legislative committee. So far so good.

But AB 18 also would allow "executive sessions" of such agencies when they deal with the hiring and firing of personnel or the purchase of real estate.

That last paragraph certainly bears scrutiny. Why shouldn't such "executive sessions" be open to the pub-

lic? Why shouldn't purchase of real estate deals be public when public monies are committed to the sales?

Normally, hiring and firing of business personnel is private. But we can see where hiring and firing of state employees might well need to be done in public session, particularly when employment of state workers is a matter of getting the best persons for the job and when their dismissals are a matter of politics.

As to real estate deals by the state, it can be argued there is no reason to let private land or building owners known in advance where state agencies will buy or how much 'lest the ones to benefit be tempted to raise their prices. The state still can condemn real estate and usually obtain it at a fair price.

We call to mind recent newstories in which private interests have been flayed for their deals on office buildings with the state. Had the deals been made in public session where objections could have been made promptly, the state would not be faced years later with red-faced attempts at explaining why too much money was spent the wrong way.

There is no reason why public business generally cannot be transacted in the pure, clean air of open meetings.

### Figures Prove Business Good

Continued healthy business increase in Orange County during the third quarter of 1954 is reported by California State Board of Equalization figures just released. They show Orange County business, judged from taxable sales reports, increased 5.93 per cent over the third quarter of 1953.

Now this might not look big by itself. But take a look at Los Angeles County, the giant marketing area. It was up only .97 per cent over the 1953 quarter under study. Orange County's taxable sales hike business-wise was exceeded only by 11 counties of the 59 counties in California.

This means something to businessmen. We are in the top bracket of the state and the way Newport Harbor and the county are booming ahead, the outlook is for even greater activity.

While business was below the third quarter 1953 level in 39 counties, it was ahead of that period in 19 counties. Napa County held top honors with a 19.67 per cent increase.

It's good news to all of us that Orange County is in the van of progress. We had a good idea this was the case from other indications but it's always pleasant to have our beliefs supported by official records of the state which lifts them from business tax returns.

shapes the interests and aspirations of every American."

Likewise, paragraph nine is an outstanding declaration. Again I quote, because these fundamentals are too important to be forgotten for one minute:

"It is not a struggle merely of economic theories, or of forms of government, or of military power. At issue is the true nature of man. Either man is the creature whom the Psalmist described as 'a little lower than the angels,' crowned with glory and honor, holding 'dominion over the works' of his Creator; OR man is a soulless, animated machine to be enslaved, used and consumed by the state for its own glorification."

Later on I quote further: "Let the general good be our yardstick on every great issue of our time."

However, you cannot denounce socialism and then recommend legislation that leads directly to it. You cannot denounce socialism and propose socialist programs. You cannot recommend cooperation between the Executive and Legislative branches of our government, and then propose legislation that would destroy the Legislative branch of that government. Each of these inconsistencies was apparent upon close examination, and I shall deal with each as the special messages come along.

PERSONAL ITEMS

As this is my first report on the new session of Congress, I should bring you up to date on one or two items. Due to the fact that Mrs. Ut's mother is seriously ill, Charlene did not accompany me to Washington, but expects to be here within a week or two.

I left California the day after Christmas and drove East the southern route, going by way of El Paso and Augusta, Georgia. That was fortunate as the travelers using Highway 66 through Amarillo and Oklahoma City were snow-bound for some time. I arrived here after five days of hard driving. It is 2975 miles from home to here via the south, some 300 miles further than the diagonal route.

RESIDENT ADDRESS

Our resident address here will still be 200 C St., S. E., and our office address is Room 322, Old House Office Building. Your requests, comments, and criticisms are invited at either place. Our home phone here is Lincoln 3-6484, and the office phone is National 8-3120. Robert Grier is still my Executive Secretary, and Mrs. Ann Woodward remains as Office Secretary. The rest of the office staff includes Mrs. Jean Bradley and Mrs. Dolly Coker. They are all highly trained and efficient, and join me in inviting you to visit us and to avail yourselves of the facilities of the office.

Wednesday was the opening day, and the organization of Congress was in accordance with the election returns of last Nov. 2. New Chairmen will take over all committees, which will have a majority of from one to five Democrats on each. The Ways and Means Committee will drop five Republicans and take unto itself five Democrats. As I was among the last five, I will not hold my assignment on this Committee, but expect to return to it as soon as there is a vacancy as I hold my seniority on the Committee notwithstanding a temporary eclipse.

COMMITTEE HOPES

I shall seek an assignment on the Agricultural Committee, however that seems remote as I see no vacancy at present. Agriculture is a rough assignment for any Californian, because that Committee is in control of Southern and Midwestern members in whose districts are grown only the basic crops of wheat, corn, tobacco, cotton and peanuts which are the support crops with controlled acreage. Although these crops represent only 20 per cent of American agriculture, they receive 80 per cent of the attention of the Committee, and I would chafe under these circumstances.

If I do not land on Agriculture, I expect to go on Interior and Insular Affairs. It is important that California have as many members on this Committee as possible, as it deals with reclamation and water conservation, and our interest in Colorado River water must be protected.

## SCENE AT THE CAPITOL

SACRAMENTO (CNS) — Another battle in the California legislature to assure freedom of information to the people of this state is shaping up with the introduction of several bills on the subject.

Assemblyman Frank Luckel of San Diego, has re-introduced his bill providing that every citizen has a right to inspect and take a copy of any public writing, except as otherwise provided by statute and his new measure has added to it a provision in which a public official who refuses to permit such inspection is guilty of a misdemeanor.

PROVIDER PENALTY

The offense on the part of a public official would be punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500.

With this added provision, this is the same bill that Luckel introduced during the 1953 session, which passed the legislature and was pocket-vetted by then-governor Earl Warren. With Governor Goodwin W. Knight's attitude toward freedom of information, legislators have hopes that an act of this type will become law, this year. Knight has announced that he favors a free flow of information to the public and that his administration will be conducted on a "show-case" basis.

Assemblyman Sheridan N. Hegland, La Mesa, also from San

Diego county, a former publisher, has introduced AB 18, which bans secret meetings by any state agency, including legislative committees, except in proceedings against personnel or real estate acquisition.

Hegland's bill is somewhat similar to legislation that originally was proposed by Assemblyman Ralph Brown, Stanislaus County at the 1953 session. The provisions in Brown's bill against secret state agency meetings were written out after representatives of certain state agencies appeared before committees hearing the measures and protested such laws.

Brown, however, did secure passage and had written into law a measure prohibiting secret meetings of local government agencies, such as boards of supervisors and city councils.

Brown said that during the bill introductory period of this session, he will have further legislation along the same lines. It is highly probable that the legislation of the three assemblymen will be similar in some instances and that eventually, they will get together and work out an over-all bill which will cover every phase of the subject.

## BRUSH COUNTRY JOURNAL

By HORACE PARKER

(Ed. Note — This column by Horace Parker will deal with the little-known historical facts he has dredged up in his many trips into the back country in recent years.)

The early horsemen, Mexican and Indian, were among the greatest horsemen the world has ever known. Stories of their prowess on horseback are almost unbelievable. In the "Worthington letters" reposing in the Huntington Library and written in the late 1870s and early 1880s about life around Temecula is an interesting passage on Indian horsemanship.

This letter was written by Dr. Worthington from Temecula on Sept. 4, 1881: "There was a beautiful display of horsemanship. The young Indians rode bare-back, without bridle and seemed able to do almost anything. I threw a silver dollar in the sand — several started for it full tilt; one of them leaped over and caught it up with his teeth, his horse at full speed!"

BULL FIGHTS BRUTAL

"The bull fights were very disgusting and brutal. Three or four Indians bare-back rode wild horses. A huge bull was let loose into the corral and on one of his horns was tied a \$20 gold coin. The object was to take it off. After infuriating the animal with red shawls one of the Indians suddenly rode up to the bull and in making a pass to catch the gold piece he missed — but not before the bull had ripped open the horse's bowels and pitched both horse and rider high in the air. A great many horses and Indians are every year killed or seriously injured in these barbarous amusements."

This bull fight was held in the corral in back of the Pala Asistencia and even today one may see the remains of the old adobe walls.

PRIDE IN HANDS

As a kid in Temecula I can remember the pride with which the Indians and cowpunchers held soft hands and small feet. Most punchers of that era wore gloves in order to keep their hands callous free — the mark of the horseman. Also I have seen them in the Burnham store trying on shoes. If their feet fit in a size 8 shoe you could rest assured they would try to force it into a 7. I have seen both Mr. Burnham and puncher pulling away at the shoes until they finally forced them on. As he walked out of the store he looked like an ostrich walking on eggs. Within 24 hours, a sharp knife had slit the shoes at strategic points and the vain "poke" could at least walk around.

## WASHINGTON REPORT

By Your Congressman JAMES B. UTT

The State of the Union message was delivered on the sixth of January. Most of you have read excerpts from it and commentaries upon it. However, it should not seem too repetitious if I give some personal impressions.

It is always a high-point of the session. The visitors' galleries are full long before the hour. The press gallery is overflowing. Mrs. Eisenhower and Mrs. Nixon sit in the West Gallery and draw great applause upon entering. Mrs. John Eisenhower sits with her famous mother-in-law. The ambassadors file under a strict order of protocol to rank. Likewise, the Cabinet with the Secretary of State first and Mrs. Hobby, Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare last, as that was the last Cabinet office created. A section is reserved for the Senators and at 12:30 p.m. the President is escorted into the Chamber by three ranking members of each House. Vice-President Nixon takes his position beside the Speaker of the House.

RESPECT LACKING

At this point I cannot refrain from making what I consider a justified criticism of some of the press. It is limited to not more than 10 per cent, but casts a reflection upon the whole group. When the President of the United States enters the Chamber every one stands out of respect to that high office. The only ones not standing were some 15 correspondents in the press gallery. Some of them may have been foreign cor-

respondents, but that is no excuse. Perhaps they like to show their independence and immunity to civil courtesy. However, they do no honor to themselves and discredit the craft of which they are members. I do not always agree with the new Speaker of the House, Mr. Sam Rayburn, but I hope I shall always give him the respect to which he and the office he holds are entitled.

As to the message itself. The President showed a keener insight into the economic and political life of this country than he did two years ago. His military concept, of course, is always exceptional. His message was a blueprint of special messages to follow. He laid down some fundamental concepts which are not debatable, and he set some goals toward which we all wish to move. Some of the avenues by which these goals should be reached are not consistent with the fundamentals set forth. These I shall discuss at some length as the special messages come along.

AMERICANISM

The second paragraph of the President's message should never be overlooked, and I quote it: "At the outset, I believe it would be well to remind ourselves of this great fundamental in our national life: our common belief that every human being is divine, endowed with dignity and worth and inalienable rights. This faith, with its corollary — that to grow them may have been foreign cor-

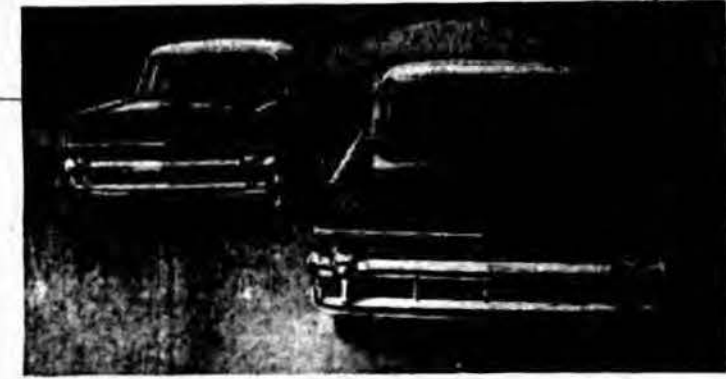

The same three charges against Lehman, Devine and the Collinses were made by the grand jury in the Duplex case.

Judge West ordered Sam L. Collins, former Orange County district attorney and speaker of the State Assembly; his son Sam E. Collins, Fullerton attorney; Harry Lehman, culinary union representative, and Charles E. (Red) Devine, Central Labor Council secretary to trial Feb. 21 on three counts.

The quartet was slated to go on trial today but the current Lehman-Drive conspiracy trial has forced the vacation of the Jan. 10 date.

Judge West also reset a retrial scheduled for the Collinses Jan. 31. He set the trial down for March 14.

Lehman, Devine and the Collinses are accused of the unlawful taking of \$10,000 from Mrs. Ella Louis Duplex (Counselman) for getting an on-sale general liquor license for her Tustin bar.

The Collins duo also is scheduled to trial on the allegation it took \$7500 from George Underwood of Buena Park in getting an on-sale liquor license for his tavern. A previous trial in Superior Court on the Underwood indictment ended in a hung jury.

WRIT INDICATED. Atty. Lloyd Verry of Fullerton indicated this afternoon he and Atty. Charles Carr intend to carry a writ of prohibition demand to the State Supreme Court in the Duplex indictment.

The District Court of Appeals in San Bernardino this week refused to grant the writ of prohibition. The defendants asserted their alleged co-conspirators were not specifically named. They contended it was necessary to do so in the criminal indictment.

Superior Court Judge Stanley Mosk went along with the Collins argument in the Underwood trial when he tossed out the first charge against them—conspiracy to commit the crime of asking or receiving a bribe by an administrative officer of the state. The jury was hung on two other counts—conspiracy to commit grand theft and grand theft.

### Letter Asks Purchase of Six Lots Owned by Gas Company

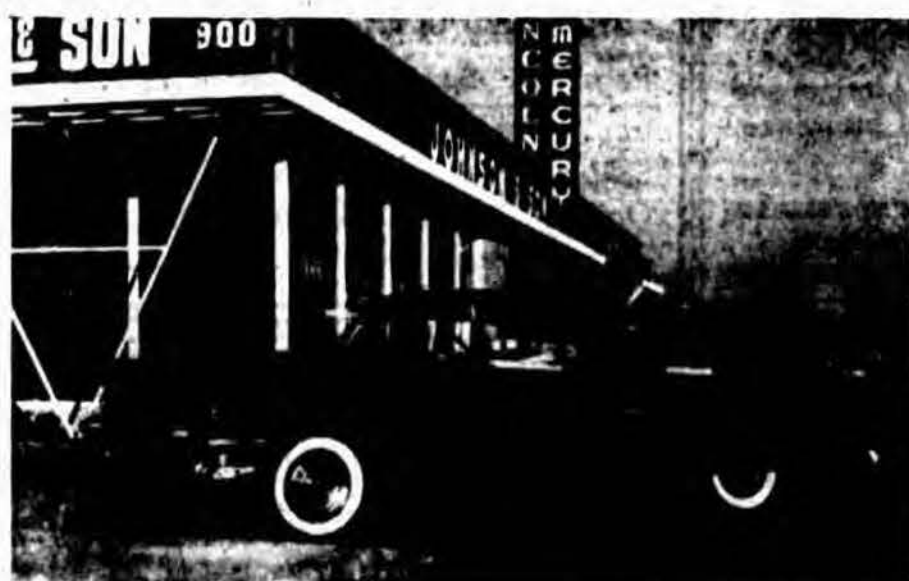

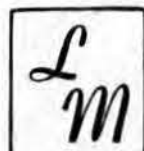

## Boyd to Fly East for Power Squadron Meet

Robert L. Boyd, Commander of the California District of the United States Power Squadron will fly to New York today to attend the annual National Squadron Conference at the Hotel Sheraton-Astor, Jan. 14 and 15. Boyd, who is a Past Commander of Balboa Squadron, will represent the eight California Squadrons making up District 13 of the 18 Districts into which the 166 Squadrons are divided.

There are now 23,000 members in the United States Power Squadrons, a non-profit and volunteer national education organization, founded in 1914. One thousand members are enrolled in the California district, which includes Squadrons in Balboa, Long Beach, San Diego, Santa Monica, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Santa Barbara and Oakland.

Guest officers from the Canadian Power Squadrons, will attend the conference, along with top ranking U. S. Navy, Coast Guard and Merchant Marine officers. The Power Squadrons do not have any official connection with any government agency but do have the cooperation of all.

## ALL OVER NATION

The United States Power Squadrons are scattered across the United States, from Coast to Coast and are also represented in Alaska, Hawaiian Islands and the Canal Zone. Kenneth B. Champ of Findley, O., heads the slate of officers to be placed before the National Conference. Champ, the incumbent chief Commander, has held office during the past year and is expected to be re-elected.

Balboa Power Squadron is further represented at the District level, by George Fox, a local member, who is District Secretary, and by Leon Ware, Lido Isle, who is District Public Relations Officer. William Thompson, also a Balboa member, is a member of the national communications committee and James Stoddard is a member of the national junior navigator committee. From Balboa area Past District Commanders include Harry Ashton and Harold Tracy.

ORANGE (OCNS) — The Orange County squad of California Highway Patrol spent a busy year in 1954, with patrolmen traveling 630,260 miles on rural roads and highways as they reduced traffic fatalities 49 under the total of 1953.

Capt. Herbert W. Null, commander of the Orange County group, pointed out the reduction in fatality figures came as more cars were registered in the county and heavier traffic filled the roads.

2315 ACCIDENTS  
Patrolmen investigated 2315 accidents during the year, of which 70 were fatal accidents with 79 persons killed; 1073 injury accidents with 1907 persons injured; and 1172 property damage accidents.

The patrol also made 10,495 arrests during the year, 837 of which followed accident investigations with 159 arrests for drunk driving. Twenty-nine felony arrests included nine for car theft, seven for drunk driving with injury, four for hit and run driving with injury, three for manslaughter, five for narcotics violation and one for armed robbery. Patrolmen also made two arrests for sex offenses.

33 CARS RECOVERED  
During the year the patrol recovered 33 stolen cars, made 28 safety speeches, inspected 200 school buses and licensed 400 school bus drivers.

A crew of two officers from the Newport Beach Police department will be sent to Harbor area schools in the next two or three weeks to aid youngsters in bicycle registration. It was announced today by Capt. Harry Lacey.

The men will visit Horace Ensign School Saturday, Jan. 15 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. On Saturday, Jan. 22 they will visit Corona del Mar School during the same hours. Newport Elementary School will be visited Saturday, Jan. 29 the same hours.

Children are asked to bring their bicycles and 50 cents to one of the schools on the above dates. A letter of explanation is being distributed to parents through the schools, Lacey said.

### Taxable County Sales Up 5.93%

SACRAMENTO, (CNS) — The state board of equalization reported today that the volume of business subject to sales tax in California set a new record during the third quarter of 1954.

Taxable sales in Orange county amounted to \$85,512,000 for the third quarter, an increase of 5.93 per cent over the corresponding period of 1953.

Tax officials measured the sales exchange at over \$3,800,000,000—the highest July through September figure in the state's history, six-tenths of one per cent higher than the previous record set in 1953.

Transactions during the period yielded \$114,426,630 to the state, the board reported, however, that tax returns of \$328,419,000 for the first nine months of 1954 were lagging \$8 million behind those for the same period of 1953.

Consumption of gasoline in the United States reached 49,467,100,000 gallons during 1953, reports the National Automobile Club.

### OCC Trustees Adopt New Plan for 12 Major Sports

The Board of Trustees of Orange Coast College at their last regular meeting approved a program of intercollegiate athletics including 12 major sports. The sports to receive this recognition are football, basketball, baseball, track, wrestling, tennis, water polo, cross country, swimming, sailing, crew and golf.

This decision by the board establishes a program of sports of such breadth that few colleges can match. It has been consistently the policy of Orange Coast to provide competition in sports for the greatest possible number of students.

Major sports at Coast College are given recognition by awards and through financial backing. Those winning a letter in a sport for the first time receive a monogram. Earning a second letter in a given sport entitles one to a jacket.

During the past seven years of existence of Orange Coast College, the competitive sports program has gradually grown to include a large number of activities. Because of this growth, the Board of Athletic Control asked the Board of Trustees to make a decision on sports to receive major emphasis and recognition. The trustees indicated that if there was a necessity to reduce expenditures because of the broad program of athletics, first-cuts should be made in transportation costs for long trips.

## RECTOR'S SERVICE ENRICHES HARBOR

A small mission in a sandlot at the entrance to Lido Isle has grown into a strong, consecrated church in seven years under the hand of the Rev. Paul Moore Wheeler, rector of St. James Episcopal Church.

He has given freely of himself in Newport Harbor to become respected and loved for his spiritual leadership and civic endeavors as well as for his church guidance.

Although his leaving of the Harbor area will be a loss to all, his understanding of humanity and strength of character will long remain a heritage of the community. Mr. Wheeler recently announced his resignation as rector of St. James to become rector of St. Clements of Honolulu, effective Feb. 1.

He came to Newport Harbor Nov. 1 in 1947 as a vicar to find a tiny and young mission of only 60 families. Through courage and faith he built the membership of St. James to 564 families.

Progressively through the years, a cloister was added, the church enlarged, a parish house built, a rectory purchased, a two-story education building constructed and property acquired in Costa Mesa for expansion of the church and school.

Growth of the St. James Day School over the past three years followed the pattern of the determined development of the church. In 1952 the school was opened with only the first three grades and prayers of hope. Leadership and perseverance saw the parochial school grow to include kindergarten through sixth grade the following year. This year the school progressed to encompass the seventh and eighth grades with over 100 students.

The hearts of many in Newport Harbor are full with the mixed emotions of sorrow at his leaving and a pride for richness of the way of life with which he has endowed those who know and love him.

## Newport Police Activity for 1954 Shows Increase

A total of 13,143 calls was answered by the Newport Beach police department in 1954, according to a report compiled by Capt. Harry Lacey. This is an increase of 1983 calls over 1953 business, he said.

Of the total, 894 arrests were made, of which 122 were for felony counts. There were 280 felonies reported in 1954, an increase of 119 over 1953.

Newport Beach had its poorest year in many for traffic fatalities, Lacey said, with five deaths occurring on city streets. Only one death occurred in 1953. Ninety-five accident-injuries were reported.
