United Fund, Dystrophy Groups Clash

A smoldering dispute between the Newport Beach United Fund and the Orange County Chapter of the Muscular Dystrophy Assn. broke into the open today.

United Fund leaders are trying to block a Newport fund raising campaign by the dystrophy aid organization, and in turn, dystrophy association officials counter-charged that Newport UF has cut their allocation of funds to ribbons.

First evidence of the dispute came to light after James F. Penney, chairman of the Newport United Fund, filed a protest with the City Council. Penney asked that the Muscular Dystrophy Assn. be denied an exempt city license to conduct a fund raising drive here.

The City Council will hear the case Tuesday night.

Demand On Piers

Permits for piers and slips in Newport Beach should be issued if owners permit repairs, city officials said today.

Newport Beach Councilman James R. Stoddard, member of the Joint Harbor Committee, told the four member recommendation group he will discuss the proposed clamp-down with the city council Tuesday night.

Deficient conditions of several piers and slips in the harbor were revealed as the committee reviewed requests of eight persons to transfer pier ownership.

Fog Leaves Area With Dim View

Burned out electric lines run-down batteries and burned out coastal area residents came out this morning's fog with a dim view of such regular fall happenings.

The burned-out electric lines—caused by the foggy dampness soaked power transformers and caused shorts that cut off juice in homes in the west Newport Beach area—started at 1:20 a.m. and lasted, in a few cases, until about 6 a.m.

The fog, in one instance, caused a short that set a cross arm of a power pole on fire. Several "hot" wires fell to the ground, but were cut off before further damage occurred.

The run-down batteries were mostly the aftermath of drivers who turned on their lights on the way to work in the thick fog from blanketing the area. They forgot to turn off the lights and only remembered when they tried to start the cars later in the day.

The fog slowed traffic, closed the Los Angeles International Airport and halted water traffic in the bay area and off shore.

The fog moved in about midnight and moved out about 9 a.m.

More of the same—but not quite so dense—may be expected in the next three days, weather bureau officials reported.

Rock: 2 Flee

A 26-foot cabin cruiser owned by an Orange County resident went aground on the rocks at 5:37 p.m. yesterday near Long Beach, but the two occupants escaped without injury, U.S. Coast Guard officials reported today.

Coast Guard spokesmen identified those aboard the vessel "Horny Toad" as owner Thomas R. Young, 1321 Puente St., Brea, and the operator, David Christianson of Downey.

Both men escaped to the breakwater and were taken off by a Coast Guard vessel. The Horny Toad ended up 2,000 yards from the east end of the Long Beach breakwater on the outside. It was awash with its stern resting on the bottom.

Leisure World Plan Opposed

EL TORO—The command of Marine Corps Air Station west of the Mississippi has protested to the California Real Estate Commission the development of two residential areas within the approach pattern to El Toro Marine Air Station.

Maj. Gen. Avery R. Kier said Wednesday he hoped Commissioner Wynn R. Savage would include in information to prospective purchasers of property in Leisure World and an adjoining subdivision the fact that the areas are subjected to high noise levels from jet aircraft coming into the base.

Subdividers are required by law to make a full disclosure to prospects of any facts which might influence their purchase—the presence or lack of water or sewage facilities, the distance to schools and stores and the condition of terrain.

CHALLENGE ACTION

A representative of Louis Farramore who proposes to build 600 single-family homes between Ross Cortez's 1,500-acre Moulton Ranch property and El Toro last week challenged the right of the county Planning Commission to deny Savage of its findings concerning the noise to which the dwellers would be subjected.

County Counsel George Holden in a formal opinion today held that the commission had that right and that duty. Gen. Kier had already been tipped to this means of alerting the public and had written Savage on Tuesday.

Gen. Kier was forced to delay his scheduled Wednesday test after what has been a very vigorous campaign.

New Meeting Due On Cost of Barrier

A deadlock on dividing local costs of a \$4.2 million beach erosion control program apparently continues today between Newport Beach and other agencies.

Newport city councilmen are scheduled to meet with County Supervisor Warren and federal state and local authorities tomorrow at 3 p.m. in a second discussion in the attempt to iron out a split in local contributions of \$200,000 for the beach program.

Mayor Charles E. Hart of Newport yesterday forwarded a city council resolution to Warner, which declared that the Harbor City still opposes the sandtrap breakwater program.

County's Tallies Complete

Complete returns from all of Orange County's 171 precincts today affirmed the election victories of Congressman James E. E. Robert Badham and Alton E. Allen.

Republican E. E. of Santa Ana, a veteran of 10 years in Congress, bettered his Democratic opponent, Burton Shamsky, 34-year-old Solano Beach attorney, by a margin of slightly better than two points.

Incumbent Harry M. Nelson today conceded defeat in one of the closest and most hotly contested races for county supervisor from the 5th District in county election history.

Nelson, Costa Mesa's business manager, lost his supervisorial seat to retired Laguna Beach banking executive Alton E. Allen by a scant 52 ballots.

Final returns from all of the 5th District precincts this morning gave 21,940 votes to Allen and 21,388 to Nelson, with most repeating the primary election performance that resulted in Tuesday's runoff.

No close was the balloting in Tuesday's election, neither contestant would claim victory nor concede defeat until the complete, official tally was announced today.

From the beginning of balloting Tuesday night, it was virtually impossible to forecast the outcome of a second battle that seldom saw Allen and Nelson separated by more than 100 to 200 votes.

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State's 'Big A' Gone

GOP Era Said Ended

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—California's election ended a once high-riding Republican era and brought prospects of a complete reshaping of the state's political makeup.

Richard M. Nixon's retirement by the voters wrote off the last of the Republican Big 4 that once commanded national attention.

Many factors contributed to Nixon's downfall, but the returns re-electing Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown were decisive.

Here's how it stood today in nearly complete returns

from 31,148 of 31,820 precincts. Brown, 2,921,000. Nixon, 2,591,029.

The results solidified Democratic control of the big state and confronted the Republicans with an almost certain scramble to take over the GOP state organization.

Brown will have the strongest majority his party has ever had in both houses of the Legislature. Democrats also won a 25-13 share of the newly enlarged Congressional delegation. They retained all their incumbents in state office.

The Republicans will be

forced to start all over again. Gone from the scene are Earl Warren, three-time governor who has been on the U.S. Supreme Court since 1953, former Sen. William F. Knowland, unsuccessful candidate for governor in 1958, former Gov. Goodwin J. Knight, another 1958 election casualty, and now Nixon.

There's every expectation that conservative Assemblyman Joseph C. Shell of Los Angeles will challenge party moderates who have managed to hold the GOP state ma-

Isle Bridge Gets OK On Plan

Harbor Island's proposed new bridge plan cleared the Joint Harbor Committee Wednesday as the joint city-county group recommended approval to the Newport Beach City Council.

Plans for the one-lane span come before city council Tuesday night.

There were no objections from the Joint Harbor Committee, which is composed of two representatives of the city council and two representatives of the Harbor Commission. Approval was routine, although members made it subject to approval from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

The new bridge is 150 feet long approximately the same length as the existing structure which city officials have threatened to condemn.

The old bridge will continue to carry traffic while construction on the new reinforced concrete bridge is under way adjacent to it, according to a spokesman for Boyle Engineering of Santa Ana, which did the engineering design.

Approximately 15 feet above the water, the new single-lane bridge with a walkway is designed 15 feet wide, said A. M. Fickes, consulting engineer for Boyle.

If Army engineer approval is routine as expected, the project, estimated to cost anywhere between \$40,000 and \$60,000, could go to bid shortly after the first of the year, Fickes estimated.

Residents on the private island plan to pay for the new facility through assessment of the 30 property owners.

Rafferty To Probe Schools

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Dr. Max Rafferty, newly elected state superintendent of public instruction, says he'll name a committee to examine the State Department of Education.

Rafferty, an outspoken foe of progressive education, won the post after a spirited election battle with Dr. Ralph Richardson.

He said a four or five-man blue ribbon committee of educators would provide him with expert advice and informal guidelines for eventual reorganization of the department.

He indicated Dr. Lloyd N. Morrisett, emeritus professor of education at UCLA, and Dr. Emory Stoops, professor of education at USC, would be asked to serve on the committee.

The Rafferty-Richardson contest was the second hottest in the California election campaign, next to the race for governor.

They debated face to face more than 40 times in the battle over educational concepts.

Richardson contended the California school system is good but not good enough. He pledged to improve it.

Rafferty labeled the system as 35th in the nation and promised to overhaul it.

Rafferty drew most of his backing from conservative elements, Richardson from liberals.

Newport's chief librarian also urged local patrons to use library facilities as an information center on a year-around basis.

Last month, she said, the library's reference department answered 1,117 questions of patrons.

SANTA ANA—The Bank of Santa Ana was robbed at the closing hour late Wednesday by two gunmen who escaped with \$11,417.

Mrs. James E. (Burke) Harrington, defeated Democratic candidate for the state Assembly, said Wednesday she will not run for elective office again.

Although Mrs. Harrington, a Corona del Mar housewife, lost her bid for Orange County's 71st Assembly District seat by a 2-1 margin to Republican Robert E. Radham, she was far from gloomy about her defeat.

She ran ahead of the Democratic state ticket in the rock-riddled Republican district.

In fact, her showing was good enough to win a \$50 election bond from her band.

He wagered she would garner less than 36,000 votes in Tuesday's election. She received slightly more than 36,300.

Mrs. Harrington said she probably will buy a new hat with her winnings.

She added that she does not intend to retire from politics altogether but will be available to campaign for future Democratic candidates in Orange County.

SANTA ANA—Election of Richard T. Hanna of Fullerton to Congress marks the first time since Orange County was founded that it has sent a Democrat to Washington.

Orange County was carved out of Los Angeles County in 1889 and it has been traditionally a Republican stronghold for 73 years.

In recent years, the face of the west county has changed from agriculture to industry. Where farmers generally vote Republican, factory workers line up with the Democrats.

The 34th Congressional District, which was carved out of the old 28th district, had a registration of 115,847 Democrats and 89,810 Republicans.

Heavy Fighting Again Along Indian Border

Rocky Still Man To Beat

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York was still viewed in Republican circles today as the man to beat for the 1964 presidential nomination despite his weakened showing in Tuesday's election.

This was one conclusion reached by politicians trying to measure the fallout from the 1962 election with its patchwork pattern of victories and defeats for the two parties. Other preliminary findings

President Kennedy will find more Democrats friendly to the New Frontier in the 88th Congress next year despite the loss of four Democratic seats in the House. The Democrats gained three of four Senate seats.

Democratic leaders called the result a vote of confidence in the Kennedy Administration. GOP National Chairman William F. Miller said his party had taken a long stride toward putting a two-party system in the South and had successfully tested revitalized Republican organizations in Northern industrial states.

Individual candidates who won or lost cited an assortment of local issues and strength or weakness in party organization to explain the results.

The Cuban crisis was variously regarded as a meaningless factor in the election outcome or as a significant contribution to Democratic victories. There was no doubt that Kennedy's Cuba policy of the previous two weeks had damaged the Democrats.

The Republicans made an unimpressive showing in the Congressional elections, since the minority party normally gains House and Senate seats in off-year elections when the presidency is not at stake.

However, the GOP did broaden its base of power to prepare for 1964 by reelecting Rockefeller in New York and displacing Democratic governors in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Michigan.

Massachusetts Recount Due

BOSTON (UPI) — Democrat Endicott Peabody's victory margin over Republican Gov. John A. Volpe in Massachusetts' gubernatorial race dwindled further today and a recount seemed certain.

Complete unofficial returns gave Peabody, former Harvard all-America football star, a razor-thin 3,491 edge in the more than 2 million votes cast.

A state-wide retabulation by United Press International last night had given Peabody a 4,059 vote margin. But corrections reported this morning in the vote in three communities—Fall River, Kinton and Sudbury—produced the new figure.

The complete unofficial count was Peabody 1,051,347; Volpe 1,047,856.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz today announced an agreement has been reached to end the seven-day old strike against the New York Daily News.

Terms of the settlement must be approved by members of the Daily News unit of the New York Newspaper Guild (AFL-CIO).

A statement by Wirtz was read to newsmen by John W. Leslie, deputy assistant secretary of labor shortly before 4:30 a.m. It followed a marathon negotiating session at a Manhattan Hotel.

The statement said: "The union has received a proposal from Secretary Wirtz and the federal mediators which it ratified by the guild will be accepted by the Daily News. It has been further agreed that the contents of the proposal will not be made public until presented to the membership of the News unit."

F. M. Flynn, president and publisher of the Daily News, left the hotel and commented that he hoped the News would resume publication at the earliest possible moment.

"We are very pleased with the way things are going up to now," Flynn said.

Nehru Pledges Victory

NEW DELHI (UPI) — Heavy fighting has broken out between Indian troops and the invading Communist Chinese on two sectors of the northeastern front. It was announced officially today.

A defense ministry spokesman said that in one engagement in the western area of the North East Frontier Agency (NEFA) near the town of Jang "some Chinese were killed."

In the eastern portion of the NEFA near the Burma border continuous fighting was reported, with at least 15 Chinese killed or wounded in one clash.

The report of the new fighting came shortly after Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru told a cheering parliament that India has accepted the challenge of the Red invasion.

"With all its consequences" and would not negotiate with Peiping until its forces were driven or pulled out of the high mountain border regions.

The new clashes marked the first serious outbreak of fighting in the undeclared border war since Oct. 28 when the Chinese took Damchok and the Jara La Pass in Ladakh in the northwestern portion of the 2,500-mile front.

The spokesman said sniper fire still was being exchanged near the administrative center of Walong in the extreme eastern NEFA area when the last report was received last night.

He said all the fighting occurred yesterday and today. In the vicinity of Walong, he reported five separate outbreaks of fighting.

In one, he said the "Chinese attacked one of our positions in the outskirts of Walong in the early hours of yesterday morning. Our troops successfully repulsed the attack."

Test Ban Said K's Big Aim

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev today appeared to have turned his Berlin showdown to a new campaign to conclude a nuclear test ban agreement with the West.

In his first encounter with Western correspondents since the Cuban crisis, Khrushchev last night disclosed that Soviet nuclear tests will stop Nov. 20.

He also rejected the idea of a summit meeting, hunted at friction with Cuba and indicated that he had no deadline at present for a Berlin settlement.

Alternately cheerful and short-tempered, he made his remarks in an hour-long series of toasts and conversations at a Kremlin reception on the 45th anniversary of the Russian revolution.

Khrushchev said that with the current Soviet testing series ending, "I think it's a good time" for East and West to conclude a test ban agreement. The United States announced Sunday it has ended its tests.

"The positions of the U.S.A. and the U.S.S.R. are very close together," Khrushchev said.

But he added that when the current stage of Soviet testing was finished, his scientists would keep working on future experiments, and he was skeptical that the United States had stopped testing for good.

When President Kennedy said United States tests had ended we didn't have a sigh of relief because they will start up again," the premier said.

U.S. Envoy Insulted

Minister to Bulgaria Quits Reception

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP) — U.S. Minister Eugene Anderson walked out of a Soviet reception Wednesday night after Bulgarian President Dimitar Ganev accused the United States of piratical action against Cuba.

Ganev made the accusation in an address during the Soviet Embassy's reception in honor of the 48th anniversary of the Bolshevik Revolution. It was attended by Sofia's diplomatic corps and chief delegates to the Bulgarian Communist party congress now being held here.

The guests also included Soviet chief ideologist Mikhail Suslov and Blas Roca, former secretary general of the Cuban Communist party.

Ganev spoke after Soviet Ambassador Georgi A. Denisov addressed the

guests. Denisov made a passing reference to American imperialism before launching into the familiar Soviet line that Premier Khrushchev saved the world from war by withdrawing Soviet missiles from Cuba.

Ganev said the United States had violated all international laws in trying "to put up the blockade around small but heroic Cuba, in beginning piratical action and in openly preparing an armed attack on revolutionary Cuba."

"I think we had better leave," said Mrs. Anderson to her American interpreter. They started out.

Bulgarian government officials rushed over in an attempt to smooth things over, diplomatic informants said, but Mrs. Anderson would have none of it.

The Bulgarian press did not mention the incident today.

Both Sides Cheer At Election Results

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrats and Republicans alike found something to cheer about today in the make-up of the new 88th Congress that will convene on Jan. 9.

For the Democrats, the big talking point was that they had not suffered the big losses that usually befall the party in power in an off-year election.

President Kennedy said in a statement issued by the White House that he was heartened by the outcome of Tuesday's elections and was certain Congress would meet its responsibilities "in a progressive and vigorous manner."

Republicans failed to make the gains they had hoped for in congressional races, but the GOP national chairman, William F. Miller, said he did not see in this in any way an endorsement of the New Frontier and its programs.

The new line-up in the Senate will be 68 Democrats and 32 Republicans. This lifts the Democratic majority to the highest peak since they won 69 seats in the 1938 election.

They had a 64.36 margin in the outgoing Congress. In the House where 435 seats were at stake this year, the Democrats captured 258 and the Republicans 176 and the Democrats were leading in one undecided race in Alaska. If the Democrats win this they will have a hefty majority of 83.

Even so, the Democratic majority will be less than it was in the 87th Congress when there were 437 house seats and the Democrats held 263 and the Republicans 174.

Population Rise

OTTAWA (UPI) — Canada's population is nearing the 19-million mark. The Bureau of Statistics said Wednesday population has increased by 445,000 to an estimated total of 18,683,000 since the last census of June, 1961.

Former First Lady, Eleanor Roosevelt Dies

NEW YORK (AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, a first lady whose stature grew from the White House to the world, died in her Manhattan apartment Wednesday night.

The 78-year-old widow of the nation's 32nd president and niece of the 26th president had suffered from what the family described as "a complicated type of anemia" for two and a half years.

Her health failed rapidly during the last six weeks, accelerated by non-contagious tuberculosis which was not proved until Oct. 25.

Her physicians, expecting heart failure, were with her at the end, along with three of her five living children. Two sons were en route by plane from distant points in the nation. Nineteen grandchildren and four great-grandchildren also survive her.

GREAT LADIES

"One of the great ladies in the history of this country has passed from the scene," said President Kennedy. "Her loss will be deeply felt by all those who admired her tireless idealism or benefitted from her good works and counsel."

Leaders of the nation and the world joined in expressing sorrow and loss.

"I have lost an inspiration," said U.N. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson, the only person outside of the family to visit Mrs. Roosevelt during the final weeks of her illness. He went by her invitation.

"She would rather light candles than curse the darkness," Stevenson said, "and her glow has warmed the world."

Private funeral services will be held at St. James Episcopal Church in Hyde Park, N.Y., north of New York City on the Hudson River, at 2 p.m. Saturday.

BURIAL SET

She will be buried in the rose garden of the family estate at Hyde Park beside her husband, "in accordance with the joint wishes," the family said. His simple gravestone already bears her name and the year of her birth, 1884.

Those at the interment service, in addition to family will include representatives from the U.S. government, the United Nations, and the state of New York, as well as close friends of Mrs. Roosevelt. The announcement said President Kennedy will

attend. So will former President Harry S. Truman and his wife.

A memorial service at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City is being planned for sometime within the next two weeks.

The family gave permission for an autopsy, but its purpose was not made clear. Eight years ago, Mrs. Roosevelt willed her eyes to an eye bank.

FOUGHT ILLNESS

Mrs. Roosevelt fought her illness with the same vigor with which she had pursued a career which took her to the far corners of the world.

She was often on the go—shuttling around the world on one errand or another, both public and private. She lectured far and wide and was known to the public in many lands.

Her travels were often the subject of good natured humor. They also brought barbed criticism from many who disliked her or her husband or both of them.

Only after her death did the family disclose that her illness was discovered two and a half years ago. Initially treatment permitted her to continue writing, speaking and holding her own.

IN HOSPITAL

But last July, the anemia worsened and she entered the hospital for a series of tests. She left the hospital and went to Hyde Park for a rest, then to Campobello Island where she had tirelessly helped her husband to recover from polio 40 years ago and resume his career despite the crippling handicap.

She reentered the hospital Sept. 26 and was moved to her apartment three weeks later, at her request.

Mrs. Roosevelt died exactly 30 years after the first election of her husband to the presidency.

She campaigned with him through four successful bids for the presidency and served as the political eyes and ears for her physically handicapped mate.

Although having expressed a wish for "freedom from public notice" upon leaving the White House, Mrs. Roosevelt moved on to even wider fame.

SERVED TRUMAN

She helped organize the United Nations and served President Truman, her husband's successor, as a United States representative to the United Nations.

Lester B. Pearson, the Canadian statesman then president of the U.N. General Assembly, said in Ottawa Wednesday night.

"She was one of the great women of our time and her contribution toward progress in her own country was only equaled by her contribution to all good international causes."

Mrs. Roosevelt never learned the results of the elections of Tuesday, in which her son James returned to Congress as a Democratic representa-

Mikoyan Actions Unknown

MIAMI (UPI)—An apparent Havana radio blackout since Tuesday on activities of Soviet envoy Anastas Mikoyan continued today.

The Cuban propaganda transmitter flooded the air waves with reports of "popular celebrations" of the 45th anniversary of the Soviet revolution, but there was no mention of Mikoyan.

In Havana, informed sources said Mikoyan's special plane had been seen parked outside the terminal at the International Airport yesterday, strengthening speculation he may be planning to return home soon.

One broadcast said Premier Fidel Castro, his brother Raul and President Osvaldo Dorticos attended a reception at the Russian embassy last night marking the Soviet anniversary. But there was no mention of Mikoyan.

Another broadcast said the central committee of the Soviet Communist Party sent a message of greetings to Mikoyan and to the Cuban people expressing Russian solidarity with the Castro government.

As far as the outside world is concerned the last reported meeting between Mikoyan and Castro apparently was on Monday.

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Estes Given Eight Years

TYLER, Tex. (AP)—A jury convicted bankrupt promoter Billie Sol Estes of swindling and set his sentence at eight years in the State Penitentiary Wednesday.

The verdict, reached after the 11 men and one woman deliberated 2 hours and 8 minutes, ended a 17-day trial on state charges growing out of a transaction involving a mortgage on liquid fertilizer tanks. The state said the tanks did not exist.

Estes, 37, faces state anti-trust charges, accusing him of fixing the price of liquid fertilizer. Also pending against him are federal charges of fraud, conspiracy and perjury in connection with \$22 million in loans obtained on fertilizer tanks.

Asked for comment on the verdict, Estes replied: "What can you say?"

U.S. Plans Moon Blasts

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Scientists are planning to set off explosions on the moon to find out what it's made of, at least to a depth of 500 feet.

The explosives and devices to record the shock-wave reflections from various materials in the lunar crust may be sent to the moon aboard an upcoming unmanned Surveyor spacecraft, or the experiment may be delayed until men land on the moon.

Francis E. Lechner of California Institute of Technology's seismological laboratory and Dr. Robert L. Kovach of Caltech's jet propulsion laboratory said Wednesday they are developing a 50-pound moon-blast package for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Present plans call for Surveyor spacecraft to carry vehicles to move around and sample materials on the moon's surface. The blast device would be an additional package.

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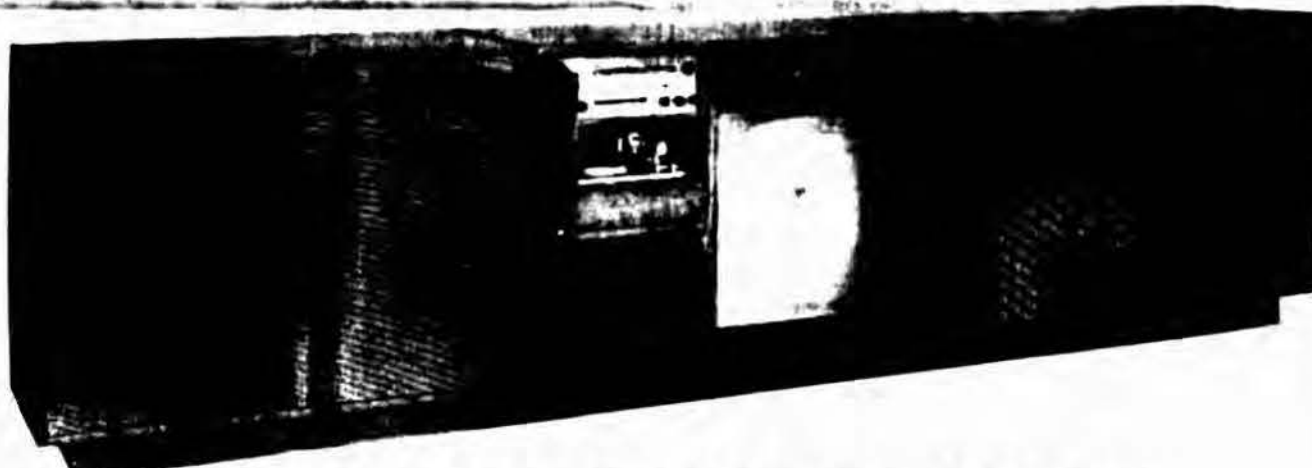

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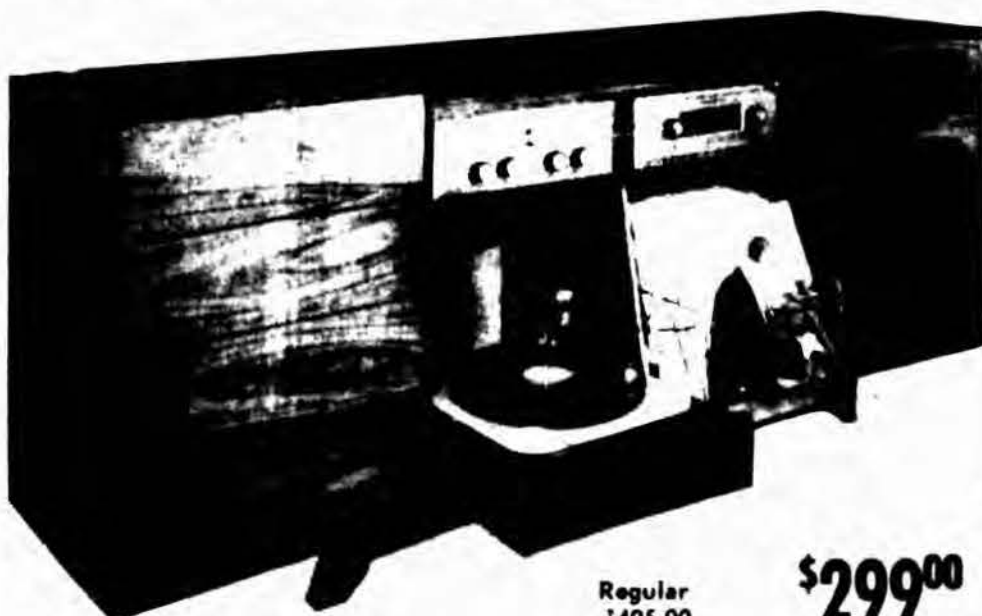

Nixon Shows Anger At Last Press Meet

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Richard M. Nixon as angry and distraught as he has ever been in public, met reporters in what he called his final news conference — and accused segments of the press of utterly failing to give him a fair shake.

Newsmen thought the Republican gubernatorial candidate had called the conference Wednesday to concede victory to Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown, Nixon did that, but he kept talking. "As I leave you," Nixon told reporters coldly, "I want you to know just how much you're going to be missed."

"You won't have Nixon to kick around any more because, gentlemen, this is my last press conference," Nixon was endorsed by some 75 per cent of the California daily newspapers that took sides in the turbulent gubernatorial campaign. But he said many of his statements had been ignored by the press.

NO COMPLAINTS
"I have no complaints about the press coverage," Nixon said early in his statement. But it turned out he had plenty.

Samples
"I am proud of the fact I defended my opponent's patriotism. You gentlemen didn't report it, but I am proud that I did that."

"As I leave the press, all I can say is this: For 16 years, ever since the Alger Hiss case, you've had a lot of fun, that you've had an opportunity to attack me and I think I have given as good as I can take."

"It was carried right up to the last day of the campaign. I made a talk on television, a talk in which I made a flub."

"I said I was running for governor of the United States. The Los Angeles Times dutifully reported that. Mr. Brown the last day made a flub. He said 'I hope everybody wins, that you vote the straight Democratic ticket, including Sen. Kuchel (a Republican).' The Los Angeles Times did not report that."

BE FAIRER
The Times endorsed Nixon. "And I can only say thank God for television and radio for keeping the newspapers a little more honest."

"Among the great newspapers in this country that people say I should be concerned about are the Louisville Courier-Journal, the New York Post, the Milwaukee Journal and the Fresno and the Sacramento Bee."

"I would hope that in the future, as a result of this campaign, that perhaps they (the newspapers) would try

at least simply, to see what both candidates say is reported, that, if they have questions, to ask the same questions of the other candidate."

"I hope that what I have said today will at least make television, radio and the press first recognize the great responsibility they have to report all the news and second to recognize that they have a right and a responsibility, if they are against a candidate — give him the shaft."

"But also recognize, if they give him the shaft — put one lonely reporter on the campaign who will report what the candidate says, now and then. Thank you, gentlemen, and good day."

NOT EVERYONE
The former vice president made it clear his indictment was not directed at all reporters.

"There is one reporter here," he said, "who has religiously, when he was covering me — and incidentally, this is no reflection on the others because some of you, you know, weren't bothered. One reporter, Carl Greenberg — he's the only reporter on the Los Angeles Times, that fits this thing, who wrote every word that I said, wrote it fairly, wrote it objectively."

"I don't mean that others didn't have a right to do it differently, when he was covering me — and incidentally, whatever feelings he had, felt that he had an obligation to report the facts as he saw them."

Nixon also defended the right of editorial expression. "I can only say that the great metropolitan newspapers in this field have a right to take any position they want to on the editorial page. But on the other news page they also have a right to have reporters cover — men who have strong feelings — whether they're for or against a candidate, but the responsibility also is to put a few Greenbergs on a candidate they happen to be against."

FAIR COVERAGE
"Whether they are against him on the editorial page or just philosophically deep down a fellow who at least will report what the man said. That's all anybody can ask."

Gov. Brown said his campaign received very fair coverage.

The press has treated me fairly," Brown said. "I'm almost afraid to say that because my opponent might say this is evidence of special treatment (from the press)."

Of Nixon's news conference Brown said, "I think Mr. Nixon took the defeat a little

bit hard. In retrospect, he'll feel differently."

At his news conference, Nixon said this of his future.

"Well, my plans are to go home. I've got to get acquainted with my family again. My plans, incidentally, are, from a political standpoint, of course, to take a holiday. It will be a long holiday."

"I don't say this with any sadness. I couldn't feel, frankly, more proud of my staff for the campaign they helped me to put on."

Publisher Otis Chandler of the Los Angeles Times said his paper has supported Nixon in all his campaigns and "we continue today to believe that he was the best qualified candidate for governor, as we said in our endorsement editorial of Oct. 21."

TWO PAPERS

The Sacramento and Fresno Bees, two other papers mentioned by Nixon, are members of the McClatchy group. Myron V. DePew, assistant to the McClatchy editor, said, "We can't make any comment. We'd like to know what in the world he was getting at."

Norman E. Isaacs, executive editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal, said

"Mr. Nixon seems to make the necessary distinction between editorial endorsement and news coverage. On this we agree. We agree that newspapers ought to take editorial positions. We agree that they should report what a candidate has to say. This is what we have done — report what the candidates have had to say, including untruths they have had to say about our newspapers."

GOP Needs New Leader

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — California Republicans were searching for a new leader today following the abdication of that responsibility by Richard M. Nixon.

The list of possible nominees is lengthy, but there was no general agreement among GOP powers that any one of the candidates will be able to step into the role immediately.

In conceding the gubernatorial election to Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown yesterday, Nixon made it clear that he is stepping down both as a state and national leader of his party.

Looking at the national picture, Nixon predicted that new leadership will come from Republican governors elected Tuesday in New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan and Ohio.

As for California, the 49-year-old former vice president had this to say:

"I look for the Republican party to be revitalized in California under new leadership, not mine. I feel no bitterness. Our party needs a new birth of spirit in California and we must carry California in 1964 if we are to carry the nation."

Campaign Over

Brown Planning Desert Holiday

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Gov. Edmund G. Brown was back behind his desk in the state capitol today, assured of the same seat for the next four years, and trying to get enough paperwork done to take off on a post-campaign vacation this weekend.

The governor on returning to the capitol last night expressed sharp disagreement with his defeated Republican opponent, Richard M. Nixon, on statements made by the former vice president yesterday. Brown also said the public had not seen the last of Nixon.

"I got no satisfaction from retiring Mr. Nixon," Brown said last night. "He is still a public figure."

"I think we'll hear more from him in the political arena, but where I can't tell you."

The governor watched a rerun on television of Nixon's concession speech and became irate when Nixon said he himself had not let personal considerations enter into the race.

"I think he was awfully rough on me," Brown said. "He almost called me a Communist several times. He called me an ignoramus. He said he wouldn't talk about my family, but he did. I certainly think personal considerations did enter into the race and it was one of the roughest campaigns of my life."

Brown also disagreed with Nixon's contention that press coverage of the campaign had been unfair.

He said he found that the papers were fairer this year than any year since I have

been in politics." He specifically cited the San Francisco Chronicle, the Los Angeles Times, and the McClatchy and Hearst papers.

"Mr. Nixon took the defeat a little bit hard," he told newsmen. "I think in retrospect he'll feel a little differently."

Brown said that after clearing up the backlog of work he and his wife, Bernice, would leave tomorrow or Saturday for a vacation in Palm Springs.

Wyckoff Party OK'd for Ballot

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The Prohibition Party in California won enough votes in Tuesday's election to remain on the state ballot.

The Prohibition candidate for governor, Robert L. Wyckoff, had 44,894 votes in late returns — far more than the

one-fifteenth of one per cent of registered voters required.

Wyckoff said the party would ask the 1965 legislature to change its name from Prohibition to American Party. The new party program stresses conservation instead of prohibition.

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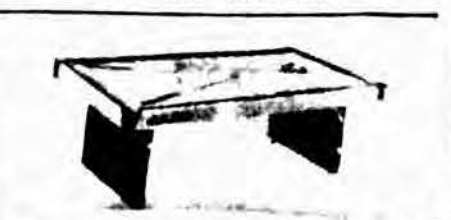

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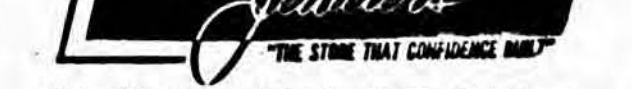

The Nov. 15 heavyweight "elimination" bout matching Archie Moore and Cassius Clay has been called many things by men who derive intense pleasure from assembling words, among these — "The Battle of the Orators," "The Run for the Pros," "Archie's Last Stand," etc., ad nauseum.

Some have even suggested that Adlai Stevenson lobby for the U.N. Building instead of the Los Angeles Sports Arena, where the fight will be held, and hire George Jessel as the referee.

As a preliminary to the 12-

round display, the two principals will warm up on a television show this evening in a Daniel Webster-Henry Clay type of exhibition, with very little bloodshed anticipated.

Archie Moore, the elder of the two by some 25 years, is a philosopher in baggy trunks who is alleged to be part mongoose. He lives in a salt mine in San Diego and his sole means of subsistence is a concoction of snake oil, which Clay, Moore claims, will have need of after the fight.

Ancient Archie, as he is known to his stockbroker

friends, is 40 years of age, going on 50, a gladiator who has been around for more than 200 bouts and has knocked out at least 100 opponents in his time.

Moore decided his Spartan-like existence in the mines should be complemented by music, and recently moved to Los Angeles to train to the rhythm of Buddy Collette's jazz band in Jake Shugrue's gymnasium.

Cassius Marcellus Clay is a silver tongued Demosthenes-William Jennings Bryant all rolled into one, with a little Joe Louis thrown in to make it clear that he is a boxer

rather than a scantily clad comedian.

The slugger from Louisville, Ky., is a craftsman with words who uses his poetic license to predict a flattening of Moore in the fourth round.

Clay, who will not attain the ripe old age of 21 until Jan. 21, is undefeated as a professional, exudes a remarkable amount of confidence. He is also certain that the fight game should be reserved as the exclusive domain of the younger set.

"That old man should retire, and I'm going to help him make a decision. I'll

knock out that old man in the fourth, and," he added, "if I should slip up before that I'll just have to hold him up until the fourth."

"I'm good," said the young sprout with a larger reach than Sonny Liston.

Statistics would seem to agree with this statement, as Clay remains unbeaten as a pro and was Olympic champion in 1960.

He is training at the Main Street Gym in L.A. and keeping trim on the hides of his brother Rudy and another chap by the name of Monroe Rattliff.

Marcellus, as he is to very

few people, is backed by a syndicate composed of Louisville millionaires. He is not hurting for money at the present.

For all his brashness and braggadocio, Clay is sincere in his beliefs that he will be the youngest heavyweight champion of the world. He is a public-relations man of no small repute, admitting that he talks for publicity's sake.

Like Moore, who has amassed quite a collection of fables, Clay is a good spinner of yarns.

"I was down in Florida working as the sparring partner for Ingemar Johansson,

when one day he said, 'Let's go five.'"

"So in the first round I let him have a couple of good ones, and then the second I really pisted him. He said, 'Cassius, I'm a little tired today, let's knock it off.'"

"I had dressed and was getting ready to go outside when a couple of tough-looking guys came up and grabbed both my arms."

"One of them said, 'Look, punk, you trying to spoil a \$4 million investment?'"

"Needless to say, I was fired right there," Clay added with a beaming smile.

International Golf

U.S. Team Picked In Double Tournery

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — The United States tandem of Sam Snead and Arnold Palmer was favored today as two-man teams from 34 nations teed off in the first round of the International Trophy and Canada Cup golf tournament.

Not only was Uncle Sam the choice for the team title, but Snead and Palmer also were picked to battle it out for the individual championship.

Although suffering from a painful right foot, Snead

showed he was ready to defend the championship he won last year by shooting a final practice round 65 over the 6,746-yard Jockey Club course with its par of 34-36-70. He had previous practice rounds of 67 and 64—the latter tying the competitive course record.

Palmer did not do too well in his tuneup rounds, shooting a two over par 72 in his final workout as he continued to scatter his irons.

The U.S. stars will be paired against the Japanese team of Torsichi Nakamura and Tadashi Kitta in the first of the four 18-hole rounds today.

FIRST OFF
First off the tee were the Argentine team of Roberto De Vincenzo and Fidel De Luca and the Canadian pair of George Knudson and Alvie Johnson.

Argentina, along with Ireland, Australia, Wales, England, and Spain, were regarded as the chief threats to the defending U.S. team. For dark horses a lot of golfing fans singled out Canada and Japan with Puerto Rico also ranking in that category.

Tagged to give Snead and Palmer a battle for the individual title were Dai Rees of Wales, Gary Player of South Africa and Peter Thomson and Kel Nagle of Australia.

"But all of them and the rest of us will all be out of luck if Snead keeps on shooting the way he has," observed bespectacled Knudson of the Canadian team.

"Some of us can compete if he shoots 67 or 68 but when he shoots 64 and 65 he is in a class by himself."

SNEAD COMPLAINS
Although happy with his practice rounds, Snead complained that his right foot "really starts hurting after I play nine holes." He has the foot tightly bandaged to help relieve the pain of a pinched nerve between the second and third toes.

"It's really tough walking that back nine," Snead said, "but don't worry, I'll be in there. I'm not going to let pain stop me."

Despite his 31-34 yesterday, Snead carded three bogeys. "They were inexcusable," Snead said. "I hope I have them all out of my system."

"I'm not doing anything very well, although my driving hasn't been too bad," Palmer said.

He went out to the practice tee for an hour after finishing play and said he would be ready to go today.

Truce Proposed Cousy Touch In AAU Strife

NEW YORK (UPI) — The conduct of sports has recent U.S. government has proposed a truce in the sports war between the National Amateur Athletic Union (N.A.A.U.) and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (N.C.A.A.). The N.A.A.U. has threatened to allow the best American athletes to compete in the 1964 Olympic Games in Tokyo, it was learned today.

One source insisted that the truce, which would last until Nov. 1, 1964, has been agreed upon after a high-level meeting in Washington within the past month.

However, Donald Hull, executive director of the A.A.U. Amateur Athletic Union, while admitting that the truce had been "proposed," said agreement had not been reached but indicated it still is under consideration.

At stake in the dispute between the A.A.U. and the N.C.A.A. (National Collegiate Athletic Association) is control of amateur sports competition in this country.

This time, the A.A.U. is recognized by the various international federations which rule the various sports as the governing body of amateur athletics in the United States.

The A.A.U. is the only body now empowered to certify U.S. athletes for international competition, such as the Olympic Games.

However, the N.C.A.A. has been out of the A.A.U. since 1954.

Cousy Touch

Cousy dropped in a field goal and a free throw in the last 11 seconds Wednesday night for the key points in Boston's 106-105 National Basketball Association triumph over Cincinnati.

Los Angeles swept past San Francisco 132-108 and New York handed St. Louis its first home loss of the season 122-112 in the other games.

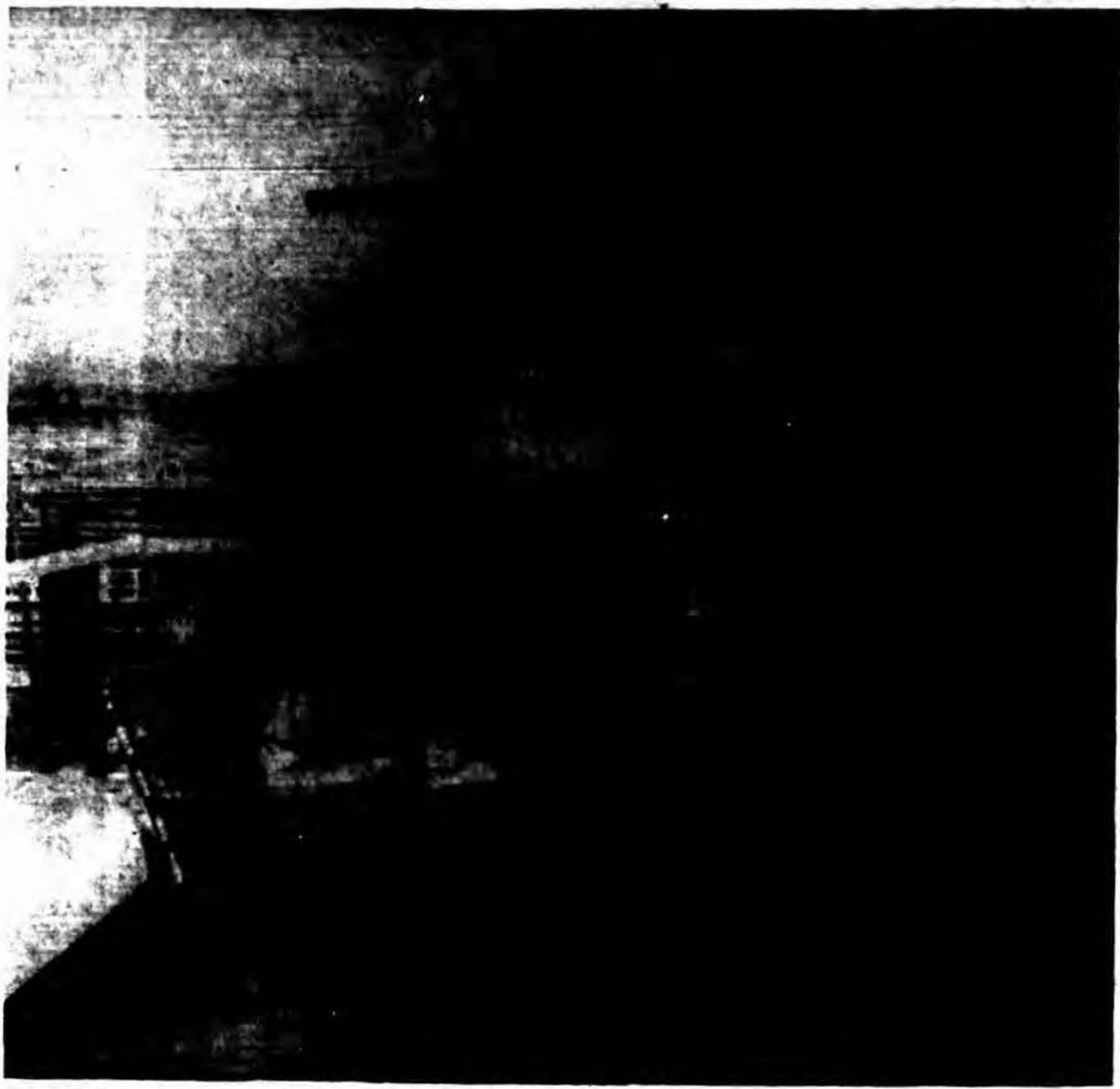

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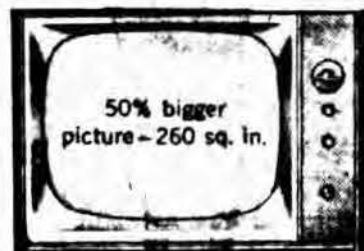

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Coast's Red Tide Invasion Thickest of Many Years

TERMINAL ISLAND (UPI) could walk all day without finding the way out. John Steinbeck called it "vermillion" and told all about it in a book.

But to the fishermen of Southern California it's the "red tide" and they could do without it, thank you.

The year 1962 could very well become the worst in recent years for the red tide. It has been hanging on longer than usual and it's been around a long time.

John Fitch, research director for the California Department of Fish and Game, describes the tide this way: "It's like walking in the middle of a huge fog bank. A person in an airplane could tell you where the edge is but if you're in the middle you

Long Beach. One of the reasons for this doubtless was Southern California's Indian Summer weather.

Fitch said that it's unusual for the animals to congregate in a bay. Usually they're in the open ocean and drift four or five miles a day.

But when they do get in a bay, they can't drift anymore so they stay — and grow.

That's what happened in Los Alamitos bay.

DARK WATER

The red tide came in, the water stayed warm, they grew fast and began to choke off the bay.

Fitch said that he dived into six feet of water and found the tide so thick it cut off the sunlight and made it dark. "The water is soupy," he said.

The plant begins to use oxygen, dies and sinks to the bottom and uses more oxygen in a disintegration process.

What happens next is well typified by the Alamitos Bay incident.

Fish began to die of suffocation—white sea bass, perch, sting rays, flounders.

"They're caught in the middle and there aren't any signs to show them the way out," said Fitch.

"We've had nothing worse than this year's invasion," said Fitch. "There's nothing we can do to get rid of them except wait for them to go."

"It's not surprising to have a fish kill like this. It's bad but certainly not a major disaster."

NOT ONLY PLACE

Fitch said that the Alamitos Bay fish kill probably amounted to a couple of tons on its worst day, certainly not in the millions of fish as one report had it.

And Los Alamitos isn't the only place the red tide has struck this year. It's just the most spectacular.

For about a month, it has been relatively thick from Long Beach south to Dana Point. There are times when it spreads as far north as Monterey Bay.

Although it's not as spectacular as the rust-colored red tide, there's also a green tide. Sometimes, there's a blue tide, too.

Migraine Hereditary, Medic Says

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — If parents suffer from migraine headaches there is a 70 per cent chance their children will have the same ailment, a University of Illinois physician has stated.

Dr. Adrian M. Ostfeld, associate professor of preventive medicine, discussed "Management of the Patient with a Headache" at the recent meeting of the American Academy of Otolaryngology.

Ostfeld said migraine headaches are hereditary, while tension headaches generally arise from psychological causes. Migraine headaches are easily recognized because they occur primarily on one side of the head and often may be accompanied by nausea and eye or nose irritation.

About 10 per cent of the population suffers from migraine headaches. If both parents have migraine headaches, there is a 70 per cent chance that their child will also have headaches," he said.

If only one parent suffers from migraine headaches, there is a 45 per cent chance that offspring will have them.

"If neither parent has migraine headaches but there is a history of them in the family, the odds drop to 25 per cent," Ostfeld said.

Ostfeld said that four out of five cases of migraine headache can be successfully treated with the drug ergotamine tartrate and drugs are under development to prevent migraine attacks on a day-to-day basis.

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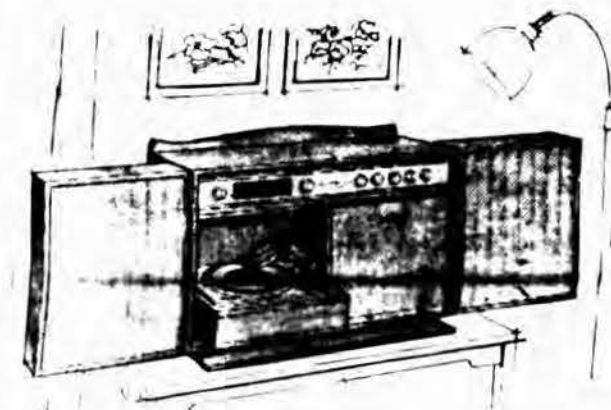
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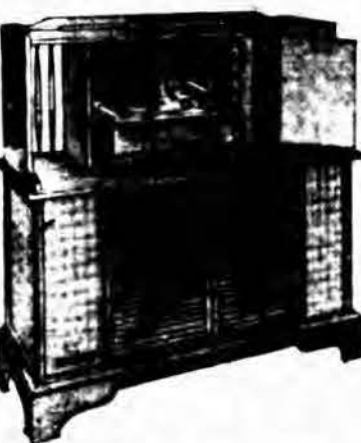


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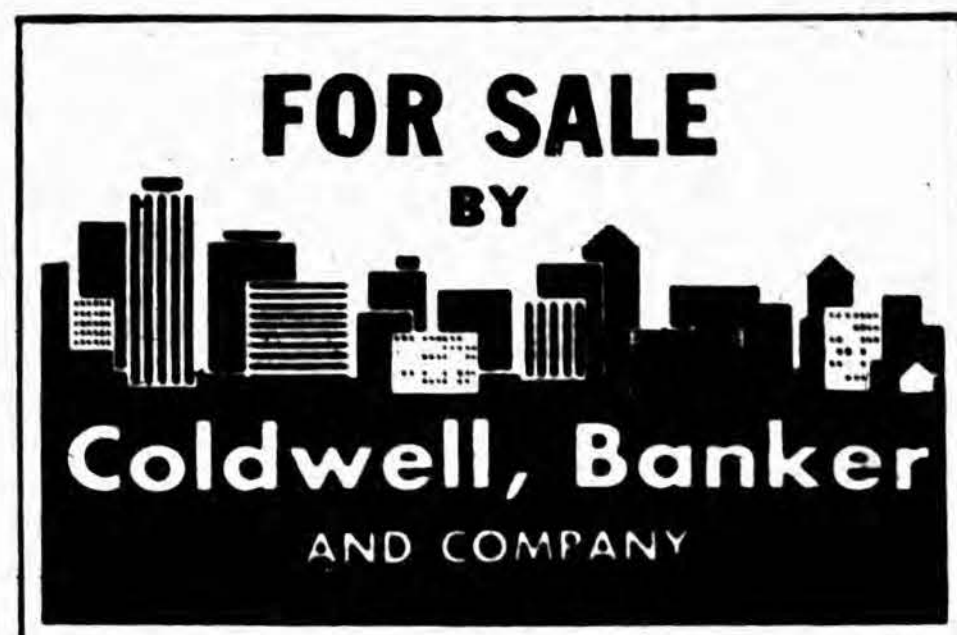

It was a day for dramatic four-alarm fire calls in Newport Beach Tuesday, but there was more smoke from fire engine exhaust than at the scenes of possible catastrophe.

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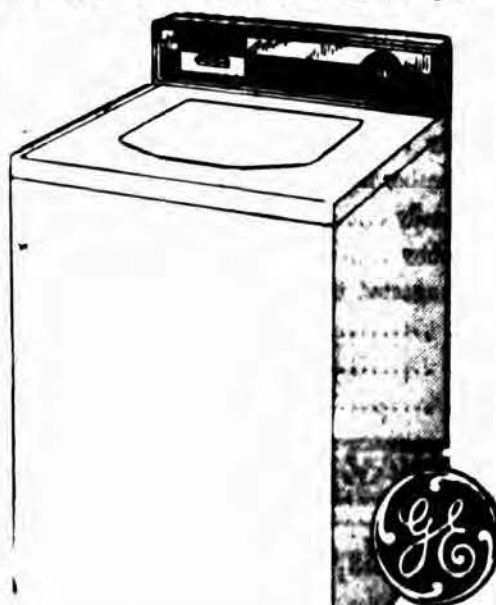

County Free of Rabies

No rabies cases have been reported in Newport Beach or elsewhere in Orange County, although an outbreak of the disease has erupted in the San Diego area, local animal control officers said today.

Newport Humane Officer Ray Johnson said his city has had no known case of rabies since the countywide outbreak of six years ago.

In San Diego County, officials reported that 20 animals have died of rabies in their area since Sept. 4.

Dr. Robert H. Haight, Orange County veterinary officer and livestock inspector, confirmed Johnson's report on the absence of rabies here. Dr. Haight said that the last outbreak of rabies in Orange County came in 1956, when about 40 known cases in animals were reported to his office.

"We are keeping a close watch on the situation," the veterinary officer cautioned, "because of the flareup in our neighboring county."

Haight studies all "bite" incidents reported to his office and is currently investigating between 50 and 100 bite cases across the county each day.

He warned that the usual heavy flow of travel between Orange and San Diego counties, coupled with the impossibility of controlling wild animals or bats, could pose a threat of spreading the disease to Orange County.

In the wake of the San Diego outbreak, Dr. Edward Russell, Orange County Health Dept. director, reminded residents of rabies control rules for domestic animals.

Russell said dog owners should assure their pets have anti-rabies vaccinations. Animals observed behaving in an unusual manner should be reported immediately to humane officers or the county health department, Dr. Russell advised.

The San Diego outbreak reportedly started from a rabid dog brought across the border from Tijuana. Mexican officials fear they may have to destroy 20,000 stray dogs to stem the epidemic.

Boat Renter Wins Suit

Judge Dreizen ruled that Gilbert was entitled to no other money damages from the Dunes. Southland News Service SANTA ANA — Newport Dunes, Inc., must pay \$12,500 to A. S. Gilbert for breaching his exclusive rights to make boat repairs of a minor nature on upper Newport Bay, according to an order signed by Superior Judge Samuel Dreizen.

Gilbert claimed he was given a sublease and a contract from Newport Dunes for boat rentals in 1959, but that the operator of the amusement park failed to obtain approval from the Board of Supervisors.

Subsequently, the Dunes erected two fences which isolated his boat rental business from the public.

OWENSBORO, Ky. (UPI) — You may have a small fortune lying around your house in the form of General Electric advertising postal cards hanging on line cords of repaired radios and television sets.

They are standard government two-cent printed postal cards which were "over-printed" by the Chicago Post Office when the postage rate rose to three cents in 1958 and now worth up to \$250 to stamp collectors.

Blood Sampling Held Inadvisable

Southland News Service SANTA ANA — The Orange County Board of Supervisors should not order county hospital doctors to take blood samples from accident victims solely upon the request of law enforcement officials, the board was advised by the county counsel Tuesday.

The board ordered County Counsel George F. Holden's opinion received and filed, with copies to be sent to the California Highway Patrol, which requested the supervisors' consideration of such an order.

"We conclude that there is no authority for the physician to act without the victim's consent and that no change in the existing policy is required," Holden said in his report.

He added that the California Highway Patrol "could employ persons with sufficient medical skill for this purpose if it so desires."

CHP Commissioner Bradford F. Crittenden had asked supervisors to set some policy that would allow law enforcement officials requests that samples be taken to be honored by the hospital.

Society must not be prevented from seeking to combat this hazard to the safety of the public," Crittenden said in his letter to the board. He termed the taking of samples a method of determining the cause of traffic accidents.

Holden said he sympathizes with the problem of "confusing the alarming holocaust upon the nation's highways, but we must also await clear authority before the rule is altered that physicians to not practice medicine without consent."

Holden also said that although a 1957 Supreme Court decision allowed blood taken against a person's will to be admissible evidence in court, the person taking it might be held criminally or civilly liable for illegal search and seizure of the person while obtaining the sample.

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — A meeting of U.S. and Mexican health authorities has been suggested for Nov. 16 or 17 in the face of a rabies outbreak here of epidemic proportions.

Dr. J. B. Askew, San Diego City-County Health director, yesterday called for the meeting to plan strategy against the disease. Officials yesterday confirmed the 18th case of rabies in animals for the last eight weeks in the San Diego-Tijuana, Mexico, area.

Ten of the rabid animals, most of them dogs, have been found in San Diego County and eight in Tijuana. It was not known how many persons have been exposed to the infected animals.

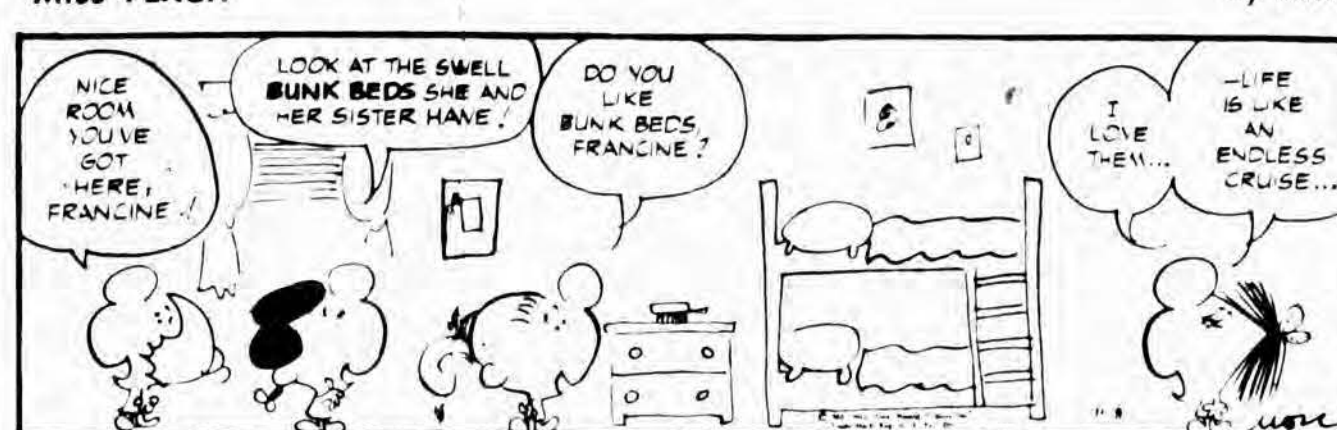

Asian Flu Siege Feared

The Surgeon General's Advisory Committee on Influenza has warned that a high incidence of "Asian" influenza may be expected in this country during the winter of 1962-1963. Prediction of the time of appearance, the magnitude of the outbreak and of the type of prevailing virus cannot be made with absolute accuracy. Nevertheless, there are two principal reasons for expecting influenza this year. These are:

1. Asian influenza has not occurred in this country since 1950 and historically epidemics caused by Type A viruses tend to recur with great regularity every two or three years.

2. During this past year, sharp outbreaks of Asian influenza occurred in Europe and in the Far East.

No one can predict just how serious the outbreak will be, but all physicians have been alerted and have adequate supplies of influenza vaccine in readiness.

In the average healthy person, Asian flu produces four or five days of illness just like any other type of influenza. But in older people and those with certain chronic diseases, the flu virus can be deadly. In the five years since Asian flu first appeared in the United States it has contributed to the deaths of 90,000 Americans. Usually flu itself is not a killer, but it weakens the body's defenses against other diseases.

Especially vulnerable are the following "high risk" groups:

1. Persons of all ages who suffer from chronic debilitating diseases, especially rheumatic heart disease, other cardiovascular disorders such as arteriosclerotic heart disease, chronic lung disease, diabetes and Addison's disease.

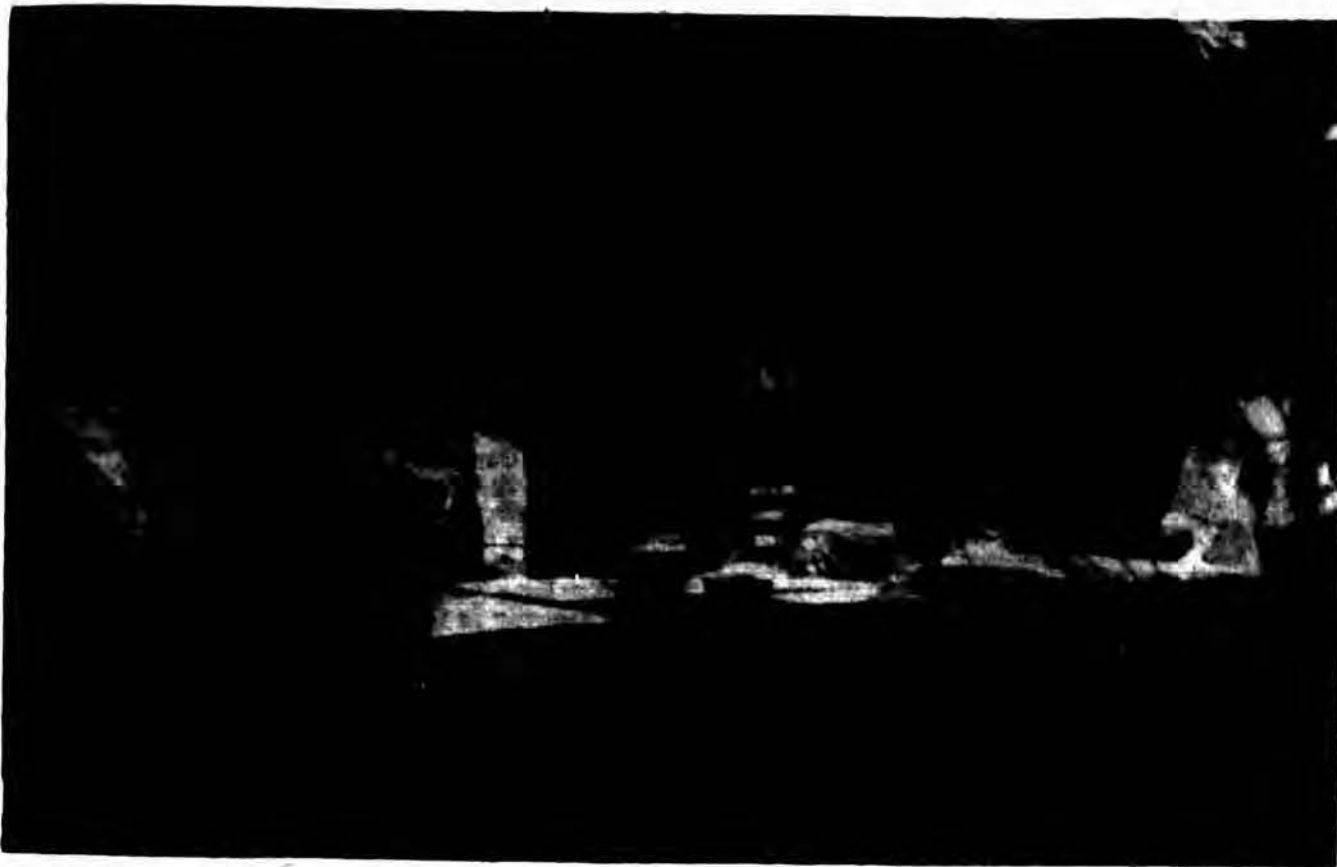
2. Pregnant women and 3. Persons in older age groups — those over 65 and particularly over 85 years of age.

Asian influenza can be prevented in most instances by

vaccination which should be done as soon as possible. Since a two weeks' delay generally occurs before peak antibody levels are reached, it is highly desirable that immunization be completed before an epidemic develops.

Persons previously immunized with flu vaccine require only a single "booster" injection.

The question has been asked: "Can Salin oral polio vaccine be administered in conjunction with Asian influenza vaccine?" The answer is Yes, the two vaccines may be given simultaneously or in sequence, without lessening the effectiveness of either.

Why Pay?

The Newport Beach City Council this week refused to allocate funds to an ambitious \$4.2 million beach erosion control program along Orange County's coastline.

In view of the record to date, we must agree with the city council as it acted in the interest of our taxpayers who would ultimately foot the bill. The program, interlarded in a multiplicity of governmental agencies on all levels, has been plagued by a tragic sequence of vagaries and theories, compounded by little assurance of ultimate benefit to Newport Beach.

This is a double tragedy. Washed-out beaches in the Surfside-Huntington Beach area do need a crash program for sand replenishment. Secondly, some observers might be tempted to characterize Newport's fund denial as a move to obstruct or delay aid to its coastal neighbors.

This is unfair. Consider Newport's role in the program: The city is asked to approve a rock mound breakwater, 2,600 feet long off its beachfront, with no precise knowledge of ultimate effect on local beaches, tides, surf or aesthetic values.

Sand would be trapped behind the breakwater. Yet there are only vague promises of financing in perpetuity to dredge this collected sand, or how local beachlines would be pinpointed prior to dredging, or even if the five-year removal period would be adequate.

There is no assurance Newport could lay claim to any collected sand should the city's own beaches begin suffering erosion.

Despite these loose ends and others, it was suggested that Newport allocate more than \$126,000 to the program.

Little wonder the city council reacted as it did.

Class Idea in Decline

The late Samuel Gompers and other labor movement pioneers, both good men and rogues, must be restless in their graves over the changes going on in the minds of young workers across the nation.

A large part of our new generation of workers knows little and cares less about the march of labor in this country. They simply do not identify with the labor movement and want no part of it.

Most recent evidence of this came in the plant elections in six divisions of North American Aviation in cities located from California to Ohio. Walter Reuther's United Auto Workers' union lost across the board on the union shop issue.

If North American's thousands of employees had given a two-thirds majority vote in favor, then all plant workers would have had to join the UAW. Soon after being hired. That they would thus have been required to pay \$5 a month in union dues seems not to have been an important factor in the negative vote.

Victor Riesel, who writes on labor for many newspapers, reports that Reuther hired the highly-regarded opinion sampling firm, Louis Harris and Associates, to find out what the outcome would be in advance, and why. This firm is President Kennedy's "official" poll taker

and has cued the President into highly successful strategies to win votes.

They couldn't help Reuther in his search for union votes, however. But they did tell him what the new generation of workers thinks about unions. Reuther learned that they know next to nothing of the militant sit-down strikes of the 1930s or the rise of the CIO.

The Harris organization found that they do know about the McJannet Committee investigations. They know the story of Jimmy Hoffa and they don't like it. They tend to lump all organized labor together, the good with the bad.

Labor's mass strikes and jurisdictional rows with other unions leave them cold. They refuse to identify. They appear not to want to become part of any union. Many of them just don't think of themselves as "labor." And herein lies the key to the change.

The new generation is better educated for many more highly skilled jobs. Class ideology is not for them. In North American's case, the work and the name have changed from aircraft to aerospace. Their employees and those of many non-space-age industries are making it clear once more that nothing is so constant as change.

Whiz Kids Take Note

The Soviet Union's master plan for burying the United States by a nuclear "first strike" was written for the use of key Russian leaders. But the Kremlin shares Hitler's arrogance (when he published "Mein Kampf") and believes that most Americans will either ignore or misunderstand it.

Comrade Khrushchev follows the Leninist doctrine thrown off balance and weakened by blowing hot and cold on disarmament. Berlin nuclear bans and other propaganda measures. Meanwhile, he hopes, the Red Army will catch up to the United States in nuclear weapons. When it has gained a lead, it will toss all treaties and commitments out the window and unleash its H-bombs. The Soviet blueprint, a 450-page document smuggled across the Iron Curtain, makes it clear that Communist strategists do not expect to be in a position to launch their atomic blitz for another eight to ten years.

THE EIGHT-to-ten years predicted by the Soviets as the time necessary for them to gain the lead in nuclear weaponry can be stretched to 20 or 30 years, or forever. By constantly building up our own nuclear power, we can force the Soviet Union to strain its sagging economic resources to the breaking point as it attempts to outdistance us. Between January and June of this year a special armed services subcommittee, headed by Senator John Stennis, of Mississippi, took more than 2,500,000 words of testimony. The committee was created after charges by Senator Strom Thurmond, of South Carolina, that the nation's military leaders were being muzzle-

draw comment from the Senator, who earlier in the year appeared to some to consider the General a political asset.

The report, from a solid committee of highly respected senators, based on hearings across six months and the consideration of 2,500,000 words of testimony, is reassuring. There was not the slightest shred of evidence of being soft on communism or of any weakness or lack of integrity in the military.

INTELLIGENCE reports now explain Fidel Castro by saying that in late 1959 or early 1960 Soviet agents promised to make him the "Nasser" of Latin America. They tempted him with a story of Russian penetration into Latin America in which he, Castro, would be the symbol and the projector of revolutions which would make him the dominant man in all Central and South America.

They shrewdly approached him when his revolution was beyond his capacity to finance and administer. The Soviets began to have more and more influence. Those who had fought, and endured, with Castro in the Sierra Madre Mountains and who passionately believed in him, gradually were put aside. They were jailed, exiled, or killed.

A NOTEBOOK kept on a summer visit to Cuba in 1959 recalls the mood of that time — not too many weeks after the flight of the butcher Batista. There was a tremendous wave of hope and enthusiasm for the Castro promises of free elections, land reform, and education.

One of the Western hemisphere's most respected economists was, and is, Felipe Pazos. In July 1959, he was president of the Bank of Cuba. Cuba that week had taken over some of the large cattle ranches.

Fidel, said Banker Pazos, is at once our greatest asset and our major liability. He reminds me of a combination of Jean Jacques Rousseau and Moses. He has the toughness to say "Let my people go." But like Rousseau, he lacks the will or the capacity to attend to the details of government.

"We had planned to move carefully," said the banker Pazos. "We had not expected to take over the cattle business. We were so innocent we did not understand its operations. We did not know that many of those in the cattle business to feed cattle for sale as oxen or what is called vealings. These do not have large pastures. They sell to the butcher. Those in the latter group quit having herds of oxen. Those with the oxen and goat and feed were not so innocent. There was a danger of moving at a moment's notice, but a decision to take over the cattle industry was made. It is difficult to get Fidel's ear. I assure you he will listen. We are a revolution, but we will not move radically."

Within a year Felipe Pazos had learned the bitter truth. Castro had betrayed him and the revolution. Today he works against Castro from another country.

Senator Thurmond (I did not have a somewhat different opinion) agreed with his original free world ally. He concluded that the partnership played a role in the overthrow of the Batista regime.

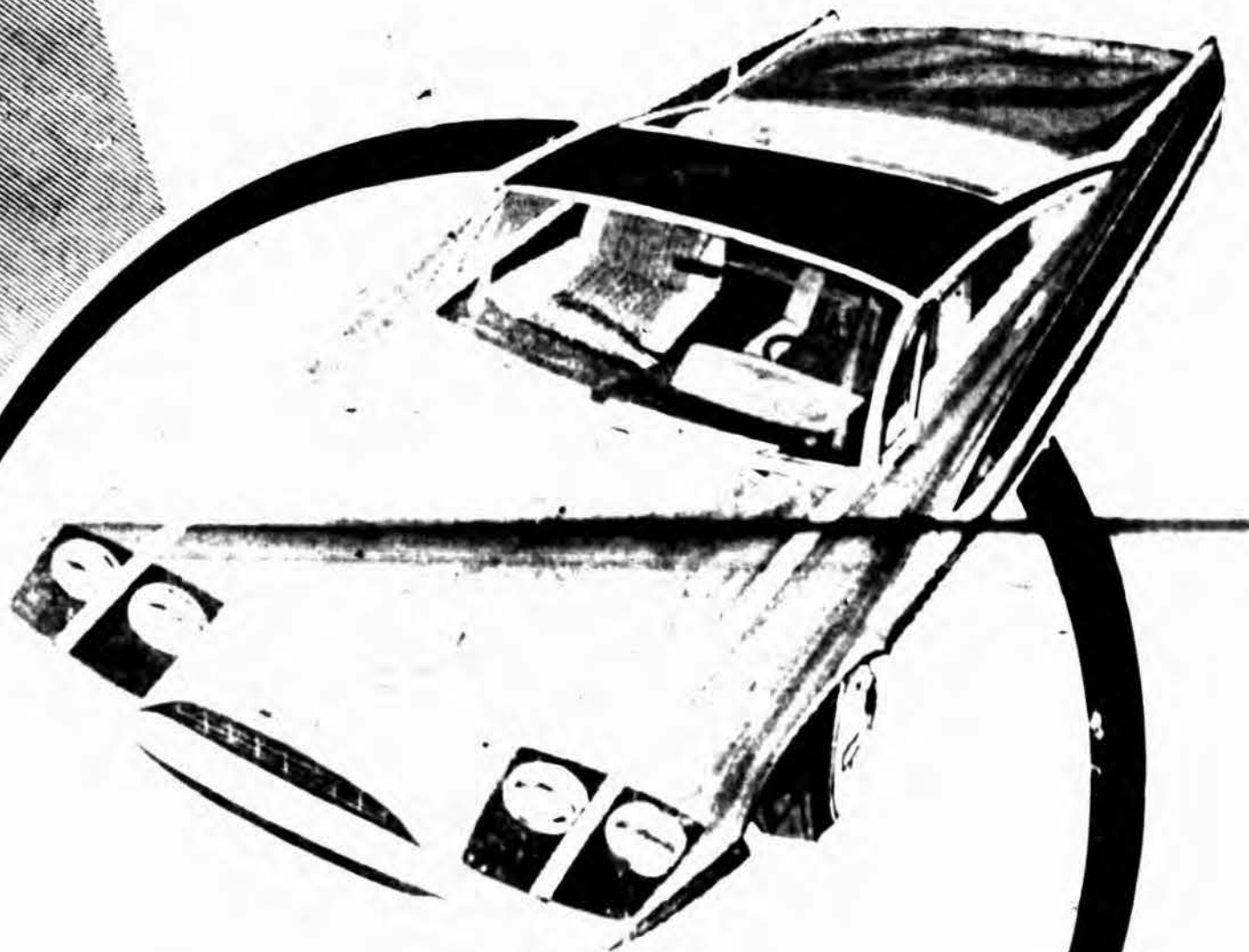

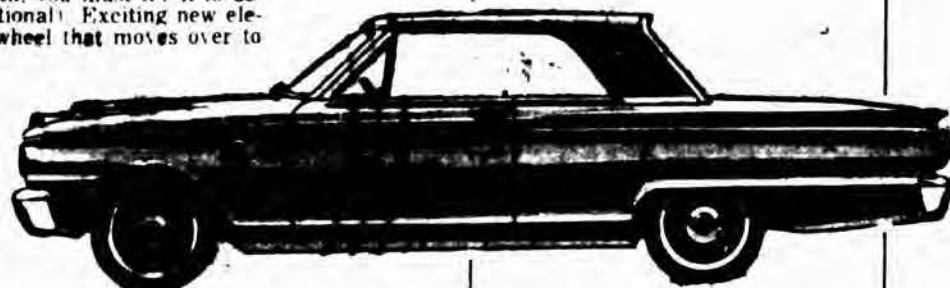

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Volks Getting Popular

LOS ANGELES—Ten years ago there were few takers for Volkswagen dealerships, particularly among people who knew much about the automobile business. While events proved the experts wrong—U.S. registrations of Volkswagens rose from 601 in 1952 to 177,308 in 1961—the odds were on their side.

First to agree with this is Samuel Weill Jr., executive vice president of Competition Motors Distributors, Inc., Volkswagen distributor for Southern California, Arizona, and Southern Nevada.

In 1953, John von Neumann, president of Competition Motors, and I canvassed Southern California car dealers, almost door-to-door, trying to get them to take on VW. The ones who didn't laugh at us looked at us as if we were crazy.

"You couldn't blame them," Weill says. "Everything about our deal was wrong. Cars were getting bigger, not smaller. The public was going for ornamentation, not Plain-Jane styling. Our car was funny-looking and built backwards, with the engine air-cooled, yet—in the back instead of the front."

"But maybe the greatest sin of all was that we couldn't even guarantee a supply of cars. There wasn't any Volkswagen organization in the United States, and we—Competition Motors—weren't official distributors. All we had was a letter from the Volkswagen factory permitting us to sell cars until a distributor for the area has been named. On the strength of this letter, von Neumann abandoned the two-car garage we had been working from on Ventura Boulevard and leased a larger building on Vine Street."

Most of the few Volkswagens Competition Motors brought to the West Coast came in overland from East Coast ports, a long, slow, and expensive procedure. Von Neumann and Weill saw to it that as many people as possible got a chance to drive the cars, and this turned out to be the route which led to the formation of a dealer organization.

"Very often, a man would drive a VW over a weekend, then come in Monday morning and ask for a dealership. Few had ever been in the car business before, and their backgrounds were astonishing. Among them was a Swedish masseur, a retired attorney, a building contractor, numerous gas station operators, and a sprinkling of housewives."

"Most of the dealers we picked up by this route had two things in common. Lots of enthusiasm, and nothing to unlearn. This last point was important, because the Volkswagens had to be sold differently from other cars. People who were interested in buying VW's were too knowledgeable to stand for high-balling or low-balling or other kinds of pressure selling. Salesmen had to learn to ease off and let the car sell itself. That wasn't too difficult, because most buyers who came in had driven Volkswagens and were pre-sold."

"Not all of the early dealers survived, but most of them did—and that's why today you find a dealership being run by an ex-school principal, a band leader, women, a rancher, an ex-dress-salesman, and so on."

The big turn-around in the dealership situation began to take place in 1955, Weill says. "Applications from established dealers began to come in, in healthy numbers. By then we were an official distributorship; there was a guaranteed continuous supply of cars—not all we could sell, but enough to support a nucleus of dealers, and the odd-looking Volkswagens no longer a complete oddity to the public. The sales nationally that year reached 28,907 sedans—plus 2,021 trucks."

Dodge introduced a longer, roomier, standard-size entry in the low-price car market today.

The new Dodge is built on a 119-inch wheelbase and is six inches longer than last year's models. The Dodge line offers a choice of 24 different models in three series.

Both the popular-price Dodge and its compact companion, the 1963 Dart, will be

shown to the public at dealers' showrooms on October 2. Dodge General Manager Byron J. Nichols said the new Dodge, the compact Dart and the luxury-line Dodge 880 — to be introduced in December — will give motorists the widest selection of cars in the company's 49-year history.

"We have increased the size of the Dodge, given it greater performance capabilities, lengthened its poten-

tial life and reduced its servicing requirements," Nichols said. "We have done this, especially, to permit its owners to take full advantage of our nation's fast-growing network of fine highways and freeways."

"Owners of 1963 Dodges will be able to travel longer distances more rapidly, with maximum safety and in greater comfort."

Further, we believe that

the 1963 Dodge has been engineered and styled so that it meets completely the needs and desires of a majority of the American car buyers."

MORE ROOM

Nichols said the bigger dimensions of the new Dodge make possible substantial increases in passenger roominess and comfort, and in trunk space. Leg room for back seat passengers, for example, has been expanded by nearly two inches and knee clearance by nearly one and one-half inches. Trunk space has been increased by more than 10 per cent.

While the Dodge is larger,

less than 45 pounds of weight have been added and its favorable power-to-weight ratio has been maintained, Nichols said. The 119-inch wheelbase Dodge is offered in three series: the lowest-price "330," the middle-line "440," and the deluxe Polara.

Eight sedan and station wagon models are in the 330 series; eight sedan, hardtop and station wagon models in the 440 series; and six sedan, hardtop and convertible models in the Polara series.

In addition, there are two high-performance sports models — the Polara 900 two-door hardtop and convertible. Both have bucket seats and

convenience consoles. The Dodge for '63 also offers a wide choice of engines, including a 225-cubic-inch Slant Six and a family of V-8s with displacements ranging from 218 to 363 cubic inches.

A spirited 363-cubic-inch "eight" is standard on the new Polara 900, successor to the 1962 model which was

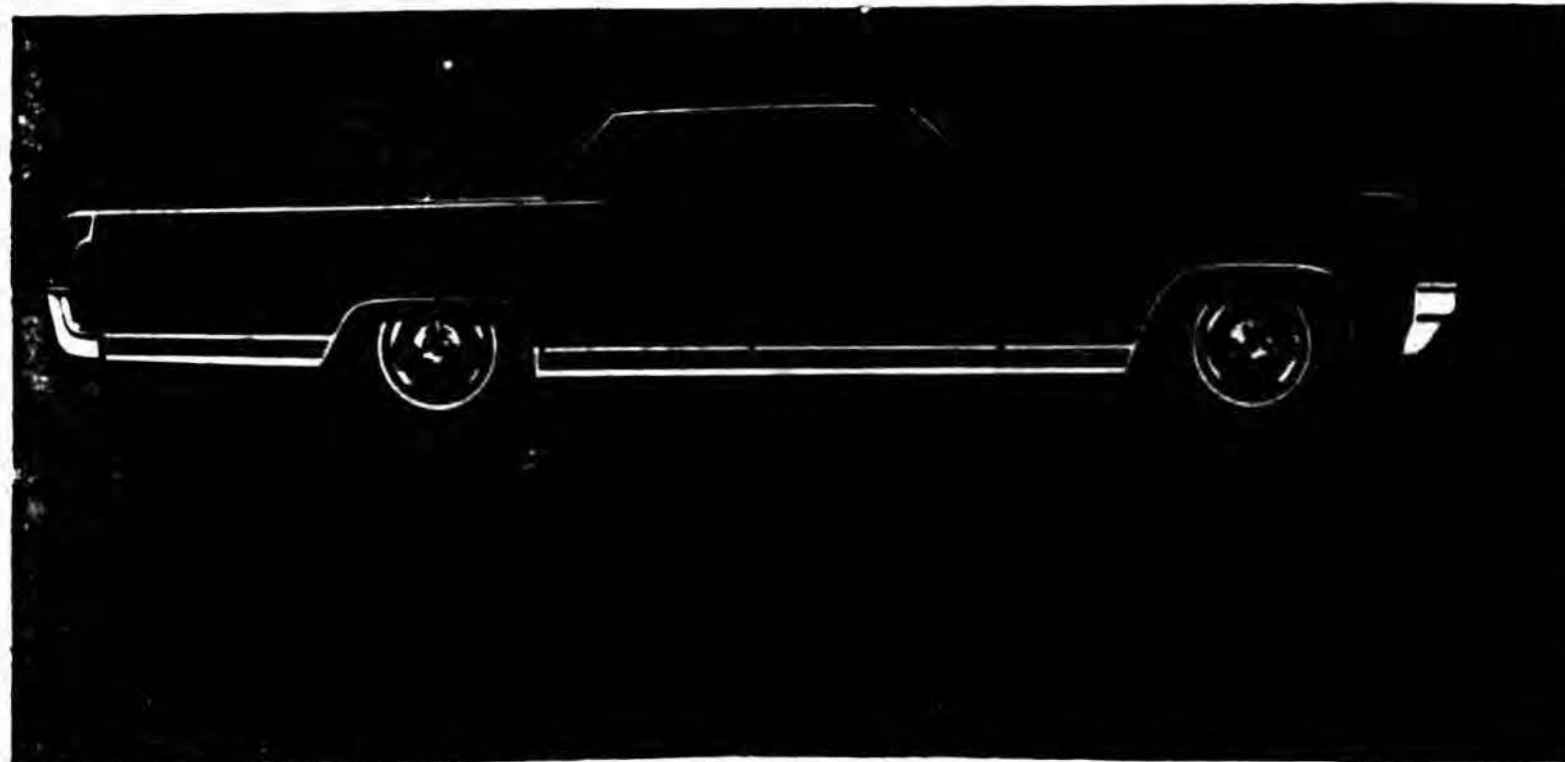

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Most Cars Get Two-Ply Tires

DETROIT (UPI) — The American auto industry plans to equip about 80 per cent of its 1963 models with two-ply tires.

And that is quite a change in a short period of time. None of the 1960 models used two-ply tires as original equipment.

The trend is still continuing and it is quite possible that all the 1964 models will be equipped with the new tire, according to forecasts by Goodyear.

The concept behind the new tires is this: Four plies of rubber-coated tire cord in the tire body have been replaced by two plies of giant-sized cord with no loss of basic strength.

Walter Lee, director of tire research at Goodyear said the benefits of the two-ply are that "you have a tire that is more flexible and in which the cords

work together better, causing the tire to absorb less power as it rolls and consequently building up less heat."

Lee said the more flexible tire offers a smoother, softer ride; reduced rolling resistance means better fuel economy, and less heat build-up makes for durability at high speed.

Although the changeover to two-ply tires has been fast by industry standards none of the customary testing procedure was eliminated. Rubber companies making the tires said they tested them for millions of miles before putting them on sale.

Testing was also conducted by the auto manufacturers. By the 1961 model year, the auto firms had tested only the smaller sizes and equipped many of their compact cars with them, Lee said.

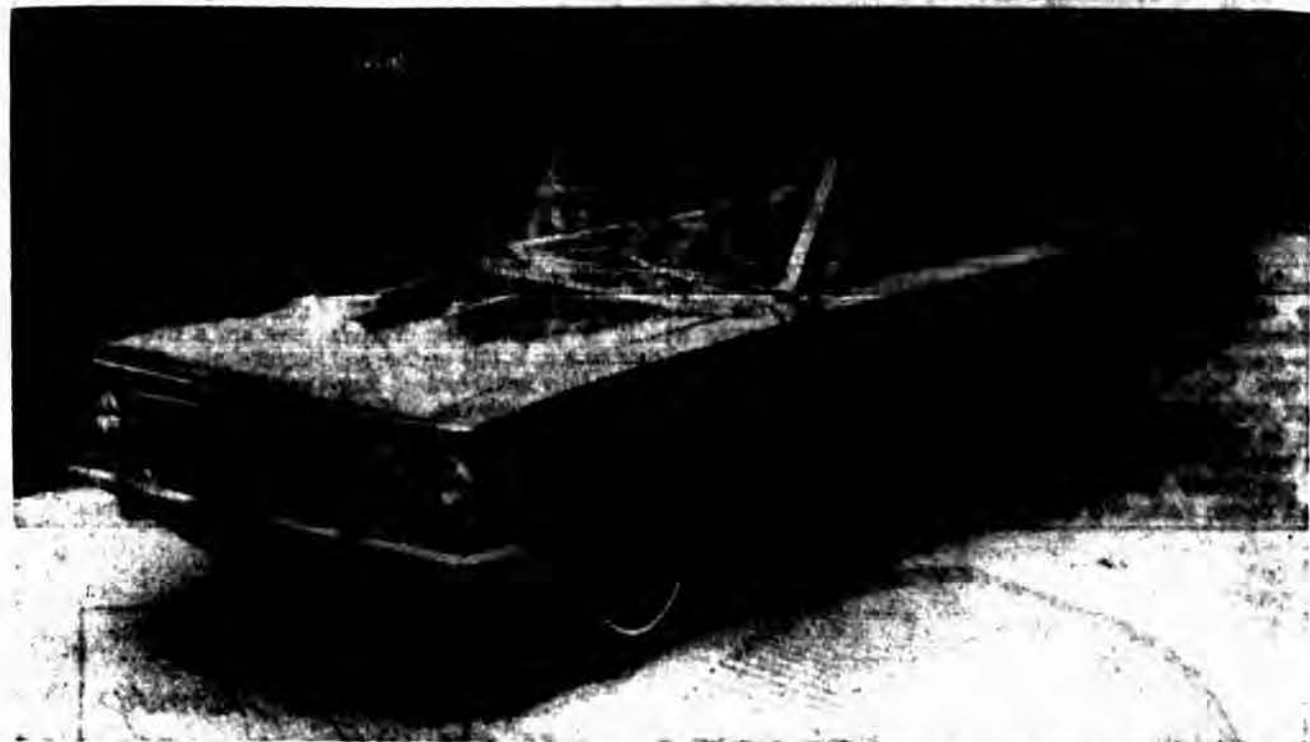

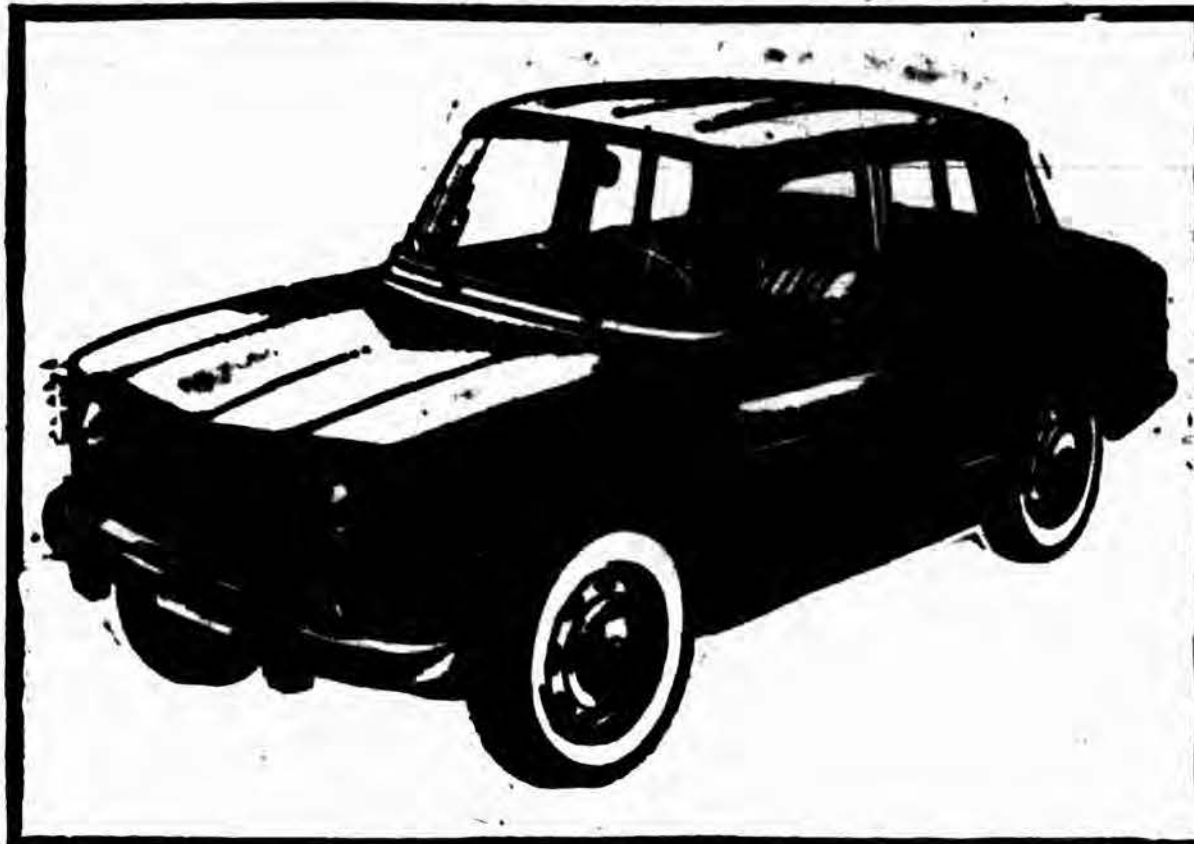

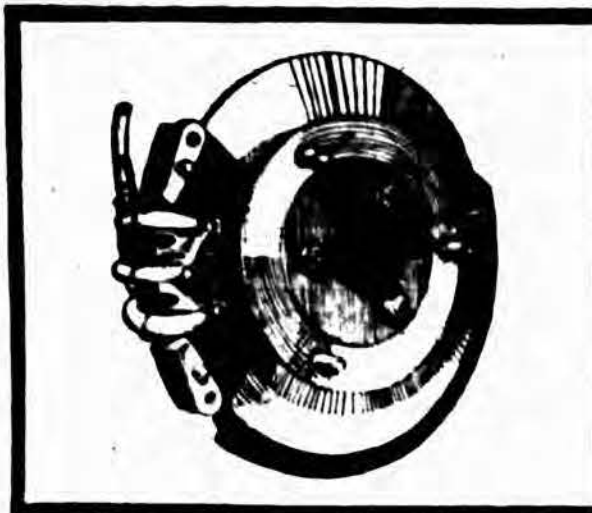

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Service Seldom

Six-Month Interval Stressed by Comet

By DICK JOHNSON

The owner of a 1963 Mercury Comet will make on the average more trips to his dentist than to his Lincoln-Mercury dealer for routine service during the next three years.

According to statistics provided by the American Dental Association, the average American will visit his dentist on nearly eight occasions during the next 36 months.

The same American will drive his new Comet about 36,000 miles and will make, under normal driving conditions, a total of only six stops for maintenance and service.

Newly developed manufacturing techniques, improved components and materials, and new high detergent oils have slashed the time and cost of Comet maintenance to a fraction of what it was just three years ago. Ben D. Mills, Lincoln Mercury Division general manager and Ford vice president, said.

INTERVALS

A comparison of recommended service intervals between the new Comet and its 1959 counterpart indicates the advances made in maintenance requirements for the 1963 model.

Major lubrication stops have been extended from 1,000 to 36,000 miles with 6,000 miles between minor lube. The owner of a new Comet can anticipate, on the average, 68 per cent fewer hours on the service rack during his first three years — or 36,000 miles — of ownership.

A replaceable fuel filter element also is sufficient for 36,000 miles. New front wheel bearings require cleaning and packing only every 24,000 miles compared with 12,000 miles in 1959.

High detergent, factory installed engine oil and a new,

improved oil filter combine to eliminate the traditional 1,000 mile checkup. Six months or 6,000 miles will have elapsed before the new car buyer returns his Comet to the dealership for servicing.

BRAKES

New self-adjusting brakes are designed to last longer, and other electrical, transmission, and engine adjustments normally requiring attention at 1,000 miles have been set ahead to 6,000 miles.

"We have set our sights on reducing the time and expense of auto maintenance to an absolute minimum," Mr. Mills said. "The engineering advances embodied in the 1963 Comet represent a significant step in that direction."

Improved quality and manufacturing methods contribute to the extended maintenance features on the new model. Engines are run under their own power at the factory using a special break-in oil and filter which clears the engine of minute metallic particles and other foreign matter. Premium quality engine oil and a 6,000 mile oil filter are then substituted prior to delivery.

IDLE SPEED

Engine idle speed is adjusted three times before delivery to the purchaser, and improved distributor points reduce the need for distributor adjustments. To the customer, this means fewer engine tune-ups after purchasing the car. Factory installed radiator coolant protects to 35 degrees below zero and inhibits rust for two years or 36,000 miles, whichever occurs first. Hydraulic valve lifters on the new model require no adjustment.

Modern technology continues to make auto maintenance, like dentistry, less and less painful.

Most in History

Corvette Very Different

The most dramatic changes in the 10-year history of the Chevrolet Corvette have been made in the 1963 models which are now on sale.

For the first time since its introduction in 1953, both body and chassis of America's only production sports car have been completely restyled and re-engineered.

Major 1963 innovation is the addition of a second model Corvette — an exciting "fast-back" sport coupe for customers desiring closed car comfort with sports car appeal.

Besides the sport coupe,

Corvette will again offer the convertible model with optional hardtop attachment. Both models will have identical front end styling.

Both will be known as the "Sting Ray" — a name introduced on a recent Corvette experimental car. Their sleek fiberglass bodies — a construction pioneered by Corvette 10 years ago — were wind tunnel tested for aerodynamic efficiency.

In its 10th anniversary year, Corvette is broadening its base of customer appeal.

To the sports car enthusiast, it offers a host of mechanical improvements, including a completely new chassis, four-wheel independent suspension, self-adjusting brakes and improved steering.

To the customer who would like to drive a sports car but also wishes to retain the driving conveniences to which he has become accustomed, Corvette offers in 1963 for the first time optional power steering, power brakes and air-conditioning.

A dramatic feature on both models is retractable headlights. Invisible until the driver presses a switch, the power-operated twin headlights swing up from the leading edge of the airfoil-shaped front end. A second switch turns them on.

The 1963 Corvettes are two inches lower and four inches shorter in wheelbase than the 1962 models. Over-all height is 49.8 inches, wheelbase is 98 inches, over-all length is 175.3 inches and the weight of the sport coupe is 3015 pounds while weight of the convertible is 3037 pounds.

Mechanical features include — The completely new chassis has a new stronger frame. The rear axle differential is fixed to the frame, reducing unsprung weight and minimizing the floor tunnel height.

The 4-wheel independent suspension includes a new coil suspension in front with control arms and linkage designed to match Corvette's new lower center of gravity. In the rear, a transverse leaf spring and new tubular, jointed axle shafts keep rear wheels nearly vertical. Rugged control arms absorb both

braking and driving forces, allowing the rear spring to act as a pure cushioning unit.

Weight distribution puts more weight on the rear. For the first time in modern American history, a front engine car carries more weight on the rear wheels than on the front, giving better rear wheel traction.

The self-adjusting brakes have 18 per cent greater bonded lining area with sintered-metallic facings available at extra cost. Cast aluminum wheels with knock-off hubs are available as an option.

The steering wheel is adjustable at the dealership to the driver's personal preference. There is new ball-race steering gear and relay-type linkage with built-in hydraulic damper which isolates road shock.

A wide variety of Corvette engines will continue to be offered with horsepower ranging from 250 to 360. There is a new fuel injection system on the 360 h.p. Ramjet Fuel Injection V-8. Delcotron generators are standard equipment.

Three-speed, four-speed and Powerglide transmission with floor-mounted controls are available plus a wide range of power train options, including positraction axles.

The fiberglass bodies of the two Corvette models have more steel reinforcing members than in any previous Corvette. Despite their aerodynamic form, they have greater interior room and better visibility. Both models have generous luggage space immediately behind the passengers.

THUNDERBIRD — the finest quality car ever produced by Ford Division, incorporates more than 2,500 engineering and design changes for 1963. Although the Thunderbird body was already noted for rigidity, almost 80 pounds of reinforcement have been added to give an even more solid feel for 1963. Other Thunderbird features for extra comfort and convenience include 100,000 mile or three year major chassis lubrication and 6000 mile minor lube interval, a new, quieter, longer life exhaust system, new hydraulically-powered windshield wiper motor, new circuit breakers built into the power windows and elimination of the traditional 1,000-mile inspection.

The 1963 Thunderbird continues the styling integrity and progressive improvement that led to sales of 405,000 Thunderbirds since the car's introduction in 1954.

FALCON — emphasizes sports appeal with five new

models, new styling and a host of new features for 1963. New models, all in the sporty Futura series, include a four-door sedan and two convertibles. The sports flavor is reflected in a new Thunderbird-type roof for all sedans.

Falcon offers fifteen different performance levels through various engine, transmission and rear axle combinations.

An electrically-powered top is styled to give the Futura convertible a sleek silhouette. Bucket seats and sports console are standard on the Futura Sports Convertible.

Engineering improvements for 1963 include a rugged front suspension assembly, new engine mounts, single-speed electric windshield wipers and the extended lubrication features found on all Ford Division products except Falcon Club Wagons and Buses.

FAIRLANE — offers two completely new hardtops and three new station wagons in the pace-setting middle-weight line for 1963.

The two new hardtop models capture the Thunderbird spirit with a lower profile, sleek thin roofline and smartly styled over-all appearance. Newly-designed

bucket seats, a full-length console and luxury car appointments express a sporty feeling of fun on wheels. A complete range of economy and performance is offered by 21 different combinations of performance, from the 170-cubic-inch 6-cylinder to the 260 Challenger V-8. The new Fairlane wagon line of three models includes the Squire with simulated exterior wood paneling.

GALAXIE — is described as "the most service-free standard-size American car ever offered" and features completely new styling, a new high economy V-8 engine, new 36,000-mile major lubrication interval and 6000 mile minor lubrication interval, and a new, \$10-million, soft-riding "compliance link" suspension.

New features include crank-operated vent windows, extra thick seat cushions, paddle-type door handles and optional Thunderbird-type swing-away steering column. An entirely new three-speed manual shift, fully synchromesh transmission is standard on all 1963 Galaxie models. Tandem windshield wiper blades giving greater area coverage and self-centering door latches are also included in 1963 Galaxies.



PACE SETTING — For 1963, Ford's Fairlane sedan series includes the 4-door Fairlane 500 sedan (top photo). All 1963 Fairlanes incorporate many new engineering features, highlighted by elimination of the 1,000-mile inspection. 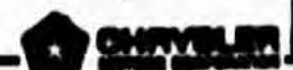
