

# 6.7% Pay Increase Urged for Newport Beach

### 392 City Workers Affected

Annual Cost: \$240,000

Pay increases average 6.7 per cent for 392 Newport Beach city employees — the first major salary hike for municipal workers in 18 months — will be recommended to the City Council Monday night.

The boost, if approved, will increase the city's annual \$2.9 million payroll by \$240,000. If made effective Jan. 2, the cost will be \$120,000 for the remainder of the current fiscal year.

City officials said today that the spread in recommended pay hikes ranges from 5 per cent up to 25 per cent for three lucky municipal workers.

Major salary gains are in the offering for Newport policemen and firemen.

Leading police pay now is \$680 monthly in Santa Ana.

Firemen, too, are scheduled for major gains in pay and hours. They currently work 72 hours per week at a top scale of \$620 per month. Newport's top firemen pay is recommended to go to \$651 monthly for 67 hours on duty in the normal 24-hour shifts for firemen.

Much of the final work in drafting the pay hike recommendations was accomplished by City Manager Robert Coop prior to his leaving today to become new manager of Phoenix.

CONFIDENT

"I am confident the City Council will act favorably on these long-studied recommendations," Coop told employees Thursday night during a banquet in his honor.

Councilman James B. Stoddard, who headed the council's salary study committee with Doreen Marshall and Lindsley Parsons, also expressed confidence of full council approval Monday night.

"We believe this is a giant step in the right direction for the city," Stoddard declared. The last general salary boost for municipal workers came in June of 1963.

The addition of half-a-step in pay boost for policemen was credited to work of the

## Rightists Endorse School Candidates

FULLERTON — A right-wing political organization Tuesday will make a bold attempt to take control of the state's newest and largest junior college district being organized here.

Before an estimated 180,000 voters is the proposed merger of the 51-year-old Fullerton Junior College District with the fledgling North Orange County Junior College District. Voters also will select trustees to govern the new district.

The California Republican Assembly (CRA) seeks to win all seven seats on the new district's board of trustees. The CRA is a voluntary organization.

FIRST TIME  
County school officials said the entry of the CRA into the campaign marks the first time in recent Orange County history that a partisan political group has openly backed a slate of candidates in a local board election.

Many school authorities admit they are worried about the injection of partisan politics into the junior college election. They fear the idea

might open a Pandora's box when regular school board elections roll around next April.

School elections in California traditionally are conducted on a non-partisan basis.

Others, not directly connected with schools, contend the ultra-conservative CRA is out to capture the new junior college district for its own political ends and will attempt to grab control of school boards elsewhere in the county next spring.

GOP DISAPPROVAL

The eight chapters which make up what is called the Northern Orange County Junior College District Council of the CRA have drawn a slap on the wrist from Dennis Carpenter of Costa Mesa, chairman of the Orange County Republican Central Committee. Carpenter has disavowed the organization's promotion of school board candidates, pointing out that such action is in conflict with the policy of official state and county Republican organizations.

He urged all north county voters, Republican and Democrat alike, to cast their ballots for their favorite candidates on the basis of experience and qualification for the election. (See TRUSTEES, Page 8)

## Police Investigating Death of Yachtsman

Investigation is continuing today on circumstances surrounding the death of 60-year-old Newport Beach yachtsman Leyden Lewis Scott, whose body was found Thursday floating in Lido Channel.

The Orange County Coroner's office attributed the death to drowning. No evidence of foul play was found in either the autopsy or investigation to date, according to Newport detective Ed Lobess.

Mr. Scott's body was discovered at 12:30 p.m. by fishermen George Morris, 37, Carillo, and Hugh Craig, 40, Carillo, as they were cruising

up Lido Channel after a fishing trip at sea.

The victim's 32-foot vintage sailboat, Kyquott, well-known in the harbor for many years, is moored on the channel at Slip 49-A, Lido Yacht Anchorage. Neighbors said Mr. Scott lived aboard.

Orange County Harbor Department officers recovered the body, which was fully clothed in black pants, light blue sweater, blue jacket and tan oxford shoes.

Mr. Scott's wristwatch had stopped at 1:11. Coroner's investigators theorize he died in

## Salinger to Quit Senate Giving Seat to Murphy

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Democrat Pierre Salinger resigned his U.S. Senate seat today, effective Dec. 31, and said Republican Sen-elect George Murphy will be appointed to fill it.

Salinger, whom California Gov. Edmund G. Brown appointed last Aug. 5 to fill the unexpired term of the late Sen. Clair Engle, D-Calif., said today at a news conference he had been elected a vice president of National General Corp., which operates theaters, among other enterprises.

Salinger, 39, said the appointment of Murphy, 62, is assured.

"Gov. Brown has told me he will... appoint Sen-elect

George Murphy to my post," Salinger said.

Salinger's announcement followed a morning meeting of National General Corp.'s directors, who named the former press secretary of Presidents Kennedy and Johnson an officer in their organization.

Departing Newport Beach City Manager Robert Coop was showered with gifts and good wishes from city officials and his old employees Thursday night at a banquet attended by more than 100 municipal workers at Balboa Pavilion.

He was given a deluxe attache case, giant postcard signed by all employees and a set of cuff links formed in jetties with port and starboard red and green jewels from the Municipal Employees Association.

On behalf of the entire city, Mayor Paul J. Gruber presented Coop with a bronze plaque and proclamation lauding his service to Newport. Coop leaves Friday to become city manager of Phoenix. He is being honored at a civic luncheon today.

FINE GROUP

Responding, Coop declared, "I cannot thank you all enough. I know that this city crew is going to continue moving forward and that it will move well."

"I've never known a finer group of people to work with. It's been pleasant, and you know your jobs."

Even in leaving, the city manager said he had to cite advances due in the city, such as the pending salary increases for employees, the new lifeguard headquarters and the reconstruction of Jamboree Road.

"There is no end for the future of Newport Beach," he declared.

Other gifts included a set of serving trays for Mrs. Coop. Employees Association gifts were presented by Charles Zimmerman, vice president, and Maxine McAlpine, secretary to the manager. Councilman James B. Stoddard served as master of ceremonies.

In addition to Mayor Gruber and Stoddard, other councilmen present included Doreen Marshall and Lindsley Parsons. All city commissions were represented.

Coop concluded his remarks by quipping, "Now, in the future when it gets too hot in Phoenix, I'm going to be one of those summer visitors you can worry about on the beach."

## Russ Order Star Boat

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — A San Diego boat builder said today the Soviet Union has asked him to build a Star Class sailboat, possibly for the Star Class world championships slated for Newport Beach next August.

Carl Eichenlaub Jr. said the State Department has not cleared the final order yet.

Russia captured the Gold Medal in the Star Class in 1960 Olympic games, but was shut out at Tokyo this year in all five classes of sailing competition.

## Kerr Rumor Unconfirmed By Johnson

WASHINGTON (UPI) —

President Johnson today was described as "quite happy" with Anthony J. Celebrezze as Health, Education and Welfare Secretary and does not expect him to leave.

White House Press Secretary George E. Reedy was asked at a news conference about reports that Celebrezze would be replaced by Clark Kerr, president of the University of California. (See story, Page 6.)

Reedy said he knew of no impending change in the job.

"He's (the President) quite happy with Mr. Celebrezze and can't conceive of any reason for him leaving unless there is a better position for him, or some personal reason, and we know of none," Reedy said.

He also recalled that Johnson had asked all cabinet members to stay. He said there was no change in that policy.

The question of Celebrezze's status came up after persistent reports that Kerr was to see the President about the possibility of joining the cabinet. Reedy said he knew of no such meeting today.

## Congo Rebels Slay 14 More Hostages

LEOPOLDVILLE (UPI) —

Congolese rebels have killed 14 more whites, including an American nun, it was reported today.

The disclosure of the new massacres increased to 110 the total number of whites killed after Belgian paratroopers staged their rescue mission to Stanleyville and Paulis two weeks ago.

Refugees arriving from the embattled North brought word of the latest killings, which included 10 Belgian men and women at Mungbere. Earlier reports said two nuns, a novice and a Dutch priest were slain at Isangli.

One of the nuns was identified as an American, Sister Marie Antoinette. Her name before she became a nun was reported to have been Donnicou.

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## Gardner Assigned To Juvenile Bench

SANTA ANA — Superior Judge Robert Gardner of Corona del Mar, who has gained national renown for his ideas on juvenile problems, once more has been selected to preside over Orange County Juvenile Court.

Presiding Judge Raymond Thompson announced the assignment of Judge Gardner to Department 13 at the same time he instructed Judge William Murray to handle the criminal calendar, where Judge Gardner has sat for the last year.

Gardner was appointed to the bench in 1947 by Gov. Earl Warren. He was then the youngest Superior Court judge in the country. He will be 82 years old on Dec. 27.

Some novel and effective punishments have been instituted by Gardner during his years on the juvenile bench. One of these was the banning of youthful offenders who are surfers from going near the water as a condition of probation.

## Airport Data Sought By Huntington Beach

Expansion of Meadowlark Airport to provide an adequate regional air facility serving West Orange County is being explored by the City Council, Councilman Jake Stewart revealed today.

The council has asked the Orange County Airport Commission to provide the city with all data on the local airport assembled to date, and requested that additional studies be made as soon as possible.

Present plans, as outlined by the commission last month, include extension of the Meadowlark 1,900-foot runway 1,500 feet south toward the Pacific Ocean, Stewart said.

The airport, bounded by Warner Avenue on the south,

Hell Avenue on the north, and Graham Street and Bolsa Chica Road on the east and west, recently was annexed to Huntington Beach.

The commission's tentative plans call for the realignment of Warner Avenue, moving it about a quarter mile south beginning in the vicinity of Graham and connecting with the present straight line approach to Pacific Coast Highway at Los Patos Drive.

The present study conclusions call for a buffer, flyover zone between Los Patos and Coast Highway, Stewart said. This would eliminate any construction of homes and apartments in this "green belt."

He said he understood the Bolsa Chica corporations, which are developing the 2,000-acre area along Coast Highway, had tentatively agreed to this plan.

"This would create a green belt at the south terminus of the Meadowlark runway and eliminate battles similar to those concerning the expansion of the Orange County Airport, and the El Toro Marine Air Facility," Stewart noted.

## Engineer Will Preside

LOS ANGELES — Assistant State Highway Engineer Jacob Dekema today was named presiding officer for a Dec. 18 public hearing here to consider a modified alignment for the adopted Pacific Coast Freeway route in the Malibu area.

The California Highway Commission has ordered study of adjusting the adopted alignment between Transcan and Zuma canyons. The hearing is set for 9 a.m. at State Building One, 217 W. 1st St., room 115, in Los Angeles.

## CM Death Probe Continues

Costa Mesa police conducted an investigation today to determine the nature of the complaint to be sought against Earl Roy Holder, suspected of beating a Costa Mesa woman to death in her apartment Wednesday night.

Capt. Jack Iverson said he will confer with the district attorney's office today. Iverson said he wanted to speak to the pathologist on the case before deciding the nature of the complaint.

The 37-year-old welder, who worked for the Flexible Metal Hose Co., 777 W. 18th St., was arrested Wednesday night on suspicion of the fatal beating of Mrs. Lucille Frances Davis, whose body was found at her apartment, 794 W. 18th St.

### HARD BLOW

Holder, who lives at 2132 Sterling Ave., told police he discovered the 43-year-old divorcee's body when he returned to her apartment at 6 p.m. Wednesday. She died of a hard blow to the back of the head, an autopsy showed.

Holder, paroled last June from Folsom Prison, has spent all but a few months of the last 14 years in jail.

Mrs. Davis, the mother of three children, had been divorced six months from Harvey Davis, 42, of 609 Plumer St. Services for her have been tentatively set for 10 a.m. Monday in Pacific View Memorial Park.

A Corona del Mar driver was in fair condition at Hoag Presbyterian Hospital today after his auto was hit from behind Thursday night on Balboa Island by a motorist who was held on drunk in public charges.

The victim, David Rowland Stewart, 32, of 2714 Jasmine Ave., suffered severe whiplash injuries to his neck and back, according to Hoag spokesmen.

Booked was Edgar L. Rafferty, 41, of 2170 E. Ocean Front, Balboa. Rafferty, a contractor, was given sobriety tests on the accident scene at the corner of Park and Sapphire avenues. The crash occurred at 6:47 p.m.

During the accident investigation, officers twice warned one spectator away from the scene. Police reported later that the man, Perry, was in the front of a departing police car, forcing Officer Gary Chung to a screeching panic stop.

Snow, of 518 S. Bay Front, Balboa Island, also was booked on drunk in public charges.

## Allen's Tactics Come Under Fire

SANTA ANA — A new assault upon the operational tactics of Police Chief Edward J. Allen impended today.

It stemmed from statements made before the city personnel board that Chief Allen in 1961 had ordered certain members of the Santa Ana City Council followed and observed.

One of the councilmen was Dale H. Heinly, prominent local attorney who is no longer a member of the council.

Heinly has been in constant attendance at hearings of the personnel board which for three weeks has been listening to testimony concerning the appeal of Capt. Frederick Hopper from his dismissal by Allen on Nov. 6.

### ARGUMENT

Thursday night as Allen was leaving the council chambers, Heinly called him to one side. A heated argument ensued. Allen's words could not be overheard, but Heinly's could.

"I've always warned you and Thornton (City Manager Carl Thornton) before I've thrown a punch," said Heinly.

"For five years, at least five times a year, I told the city manager and yourself that you had a problem in the police department and that you'd better investigate."

Heinly was asked today if he cared to elaborate on the conversation with Allen. He referred to statements about council members being followed, allegedly on the orders of Allen.

### WITNESSES

"I will have witnesses at any time and at any place, as long as they can testify under oath," he said. "I will insist that they be placed under the polygraph (lie detector)."

"Does that include Allen and Thornton?" he was asked.

"Certainly it does," he replied. He declined to reveal his plans.

At the same time he went out of his way to speak of his high regard for members of the police department generally.

"Without doubt we have the best qualified men in the country in our department," said Heinly. "It has the possibility of the greatest in the country. Nothing I say is to be considered derogatory about the police officers themselves."

At the hearing itself Thursday night, Capt. Hopper made

his first appearance in the witness chair. He outlined a philosophy that went something along these lines:

"If there is any dirty linen in the police department, the department itself should wash it."

Hopper was fired by Chief Allen for, among other things, investigating Allen on city time, with a city car and, allegedly, without permission.

"I felt that Chief Allen would even applaud my investigation unless he had done something wrong," Hopper declared.

### WORKING

He said he went to Hollywood to find out who was paid for working in the movie, "The Story of a Policeman," at the suggestion of a district attorney's investigator. Chief Allen has said he was paid \$800 for "experting" the television film.

"Investigator Joel Hayes advised me on Oct. 21 that it would be passing the buck to give the investigation to the district attorney's office," Hopper testified.

"They (Hayes and another district attorney's investigator) advised me that this could be a case of theft or just a gratuity."

Capt. Hopper was fired along with Lt. Loran Norton from the department by Allen for making the investigation and on charges of harassing the chief. Allen charged misconduct and insubordination.

The personnel hearing board must decide whether to uphold Allen's firing of Capt. Hopper or to uphold Hopper's appeal and reinstate him to the force.

The hearing of Lt. Norton's appeal was scheduled for 7:30 p.m. today at city hall, but will be continued until the completion of the Hopper inquiry.

Hopper indicated Thursday that he stumbled onto the situation when discussing with the chief the matter of giving officer Clifford Haydo a reward for capturing a pair of bank bandits.

"I didn't believe he (Allen) kept any of those checks. I believed he had turned them in to Carl Thornton for the city general fund," said Hopper.

Wolper Productions, a Hollywood company that made the television film, paid Allen \$800 in three checks for the chief's part in the movie. Allen gave \$250 to the Police Benevolence Assn. and kept the rest himself.

Hopper explained, "I believe it would be wrong for any policeman to profit from an expenditure of city funds."

The city of Santa Ana paid many policemen for overtime work while participating in making the 1962 movie.

"I wanted to know who had paid what to whom and under what agreement," Hopper said in explaining his reason for going on with the investigation.

Attorney Garvin Shallenberger accused Hopper of accepting money for teaching at Santa Ana City College, claiming it would be a similar situation to Allen receiving money for the film.

Hopper denied the accusation and explained that he did receive payment for teaching six hours of a police science class at Fullerton Junior College six years ago.

"I was off duty at the time the money was not paid by the city of Santa Ana and it was with the full permission of the chief of police," Hopper added.

the early morning hours Thursday. The yachtsman also carried identification showing him a retired U.S. Navy lieutenant commander. His wallet contained \$21.

Detective Lobess said police are continuing efforts to trace Mr. Scott's movements just prior to his death. His sailboat was found in neat order, although the cabin was unlocked and maintenance materials were still out on the dock.

Mr. Scott is survived by two sons, Charles B. Scott of Arcadia, and Forsyth Robert Scott. Funeral services are pending at Baltz Mortuary, Corona del Mar.

City Civil Service Board. They recommended the boost after salary surveys had been completed.

"We felt it was high time that the city recognized the special difficulties faced by our policemen here," commented board Chairman James Devine, who is also Orange County assistant district attorney.

In the spread on pay boosts, only four employees are left with no increase. They are one laborer, one custodian, one planning aide and an engineering aide.

Thirty employees get 2.5 per cent increases. Another 161 would be boosted 5 per cent; 60 go up 7.5 per cent; 111 about half policemen, would be hiked 10 per cent.

Twenty-five other workers are due greater percentage increases.

## District to Study Raise for Teachers

Newport Harbor Union High School District trustees will huddle Jan. 12 on a proposal for extra pay for teachers who undertake extra assignments.

Board members, anticipating a marathon session on the issue, agreed to a meeting time of 4 p.m. The discussion may carry over into the regular monthly board meeting slated for 7:30 p.m. that day.

Supt. Max Russell asked that the "equity pay" subject be taken up by trustees. "I feel this should be discussed as soon as possible now that we have a full board," he advised. "This is very urgent and very important to the district."

As proposed by faculty representatives, "equity pay" would compensate instructors for handling such extra-curricular assignments as speech, music and drama coaching, chaperoning, time-keeping, ticket-selling and serving as advisors for on-campus student groups.

If trustees reach a decision on the proposal, it may be a squeaker. Six months ago the board split 3-2 on a vote to leave the subject open for discussion during the 1964-65 school year. Then-board president Eugene O'Rourke and current president Mrs. Zoe Rae Barlow voted unsuccessfully against taking action this year.

O'Rourke and Mrs. Barlow said at the time that the newly-adopted school budget wouldn't permit more money for teachers. They pointed out that instructors had just received across-the-board pay hikes of \$200 a year.

Trustees Earl Peterson, John Nettel and Donald Dungan voted last June to keep the issue alive. Dungan has since quit the board and been replaced by Selim S. "Bud" Franklin.

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## Youth Guilty In Burglary On Lido Isle

SANTA ANA—George R. Unwin, 18, of Lido Isle, pleaded guilty today to a charge of second degree burglary in the \$3,000 jewel theft at the home of Briggs Cunningham, famed yachtsman and sportsman.

The youth appeared in Superior Court with an attorney as ordered by the court, and immediately entered the plea of a lesser charge. He was originally charged with first degree burglary.

Clifford W. Chapman, 20, of 666 Broadway, Costa Mesa, pleaded guilty to a like charge a week ago.

Judge Robert Gardner will pronounce sentence on the pair Dec. 23. Penalty for second degree burglary is one to 15 years.

The jewels taken in the robbery were found shortly after the robbery in a vacant lot.

## Tshombe Calls Off NY Trip

ROME (UPI) — Congolese Premier Moise Tshombe has called off a trip to New York to plead his government's case before the United Nations Security Council, Congolese sources said today.

Tshombe had been scheduled to fly to New York tomorrow to charge in the U.N. that other African nations were supplying military aid to the rebels in the Congo.

No reason was given for the change in plans. Congolese sources said the Premier probably would travel elsewhere in Europe. Diplomatic sources said he might fly home to Leopoldville from Brussels.

Hundreds of Communist-led demonstrators clashed with truncheon-wielding police yesterday, protesting the arrival of the controversial African leader. Communists have denounced Tshombe as a puppet of the imperialists.

One hundred and sixteen persons were detained by police. Twenty-five police agents and scores of demonstrators — including eight left-wing members of parliament — were injured.

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## 'Black vs. White' Belgians Refute African Charges

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — Belgium warned the Security Council today that African states critical of American and Belgian intervention in the Congo have been trying "to separate Africa from Europe and perhaps even pit the black man against the white."

Belgian Foreign Minister Paul-Henri Spaak launched an attack on the African complainants against his country when the Congo debate resumed in the council today. "I assure you I have not come here to sit in the dock," he said. "I have spent two evil days of my life here and by exercising great effort over myself I have suffered through a torrent of eloquence."

Spaak accused African foreign ministers who had preceded him in the debate of deliberately injecting racism into the Congo crisis.

"We knew we would provoke speeches which we have so often heard on colonialism, neo-colonialism and imperialism," he said.

"But beyond these statements I have glimpsed something much more serious. It appeared to me that in those speeches there seemed a scarcely disguised will to separate Africa from Europe and perhaps even pit the black man against the white. This is a twofold danger and this is the true seriousness that underlines what we have heard so far."

Spaak challenged Foreign Minister Charles-David Ganao of Congo (Brazzaville) to produce evidence to support his charges that American-Belgian intervention in Stanleyville had been "premeditated" and "designed to wipe out the entire population of the region."

## Singer Sam Cooke Shot Outside Motel

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Sam Cooke, a popular singer with the teen-age set, was shot and killed today by the manager of a motel when he kicked in the door of her apartment, police reported.

The 29-year-old Negro recording star was struck with a bullet in the chest.

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## Pentagon Plan Said Due Soon

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Reserve Officers Association today urged President Johnson to block a plan for a major shakeup in the nation's 800,000-man civilian military forces.

Reports circulated that the Pentagon would make public the plan tomorrow.

The ROA represents 45,000 to 50,000 civilian reserve officers outside the National Guard. It said in a telegram to President Johnson that the shakeup "threatens real national danger."

The ROA asked that action "be held up until fuller investigation can be made and public hearings held."

The shakeup reportedly would add 100,000 or more men to the strength of the Army National Guard and the Air National Guard. Other reserve organizations would be reduced to little more than an individual manpower pool of potential fillers and replacements for top-priority guard units.

Informed sources said Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara was planning to announce tomorrow his reserve consolidation and cut-back plans, aimed at saving \$100 million a year.

McNamara, sources said, also is prepared to announce new restrictions against travel abroad by congressmen and their staffs in military planes and at government expense.

The ROA telegram to Johnson was signed by Rear Adm. Edgar H. Reeder as president and Col. John T. Carlton as executive secretary.

The wire said the shakeup and reduction would involve "destruction of morale, with long-term dangerous effects on reserve readiness."

A top congressional leader on military matters already has served notice that he will hold hearings on the plan whether or not it is put into effect without congressional endorsement.

Rep. F. Edward Hebert, D-La., chairman of the House subcommittee on reserve and national guard affairs, insisted that Congress has the right to pass judgment on any such major plans involving reserve forces.

## Bethlehem Stamp Tells Yule Story

BETHLEHEM, Ky. (AP) — The Bethlehem Post Office cancels Christmas mail with a special mark showing the Three Wise Men following the Star of Bethlehem.

Its popularity is reflected in the thousands of cards sent from nearly every state to Bethlehem for remailing. The postmaster, Mrs. Lee Payton, normally mans the office alone but will add five workers for the holiday rush. Last year, she estimates, the volume was about 75,000 pieces, only 500 local mail.

Bethlehem, population 250, is in Henry County about 40 miles northeast of Louisville.

## Rocket Test Proves Big Success for U.S.

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The Atlas-Centaur space rocket registered a much-needed test flight success today, hurling its two-ton Centaur second stage and metal model of a moonship into a precise orbit around

the earth. The orbit, a circular path 103 miles high, is the course the Centaur stage must achieve on future unmanned moon and planetary launchings.

The success was the second in four test flights for the Atlas-Centaur. It heralded a possible end to problems which have harassed the rocket and have put it about three years behind schedule. Continued success might enable it to plant a Project Surveyor spacecraft on the moon late next year.

Packed in the Centaur's nose today was a 2,100-pound chunk of metal with the same weight and center of mass as the Surveyor. It was rigged with instruments to measure vibrations and temperatures, but was not to separate from the Centaur stage.

The 112-foot tall booster rode away from Cape Kennedy at 9:25 a.m. EST on the power generated by the first stage Atlas. The Centaur upper stage, burning high-energy liquid hydrogen, fired for 5½ minutes and drilled itself into the planned orbit.

This was the third successful space launching at Cape Kennedy in four days.

## Yugos Tito Still Plans To Remain

BELGRADE (UPI) — President Tito said today he would continue as Yugoslav Communist Party leader.

Reports had circulated at the eighth Yugoslav Communist Congress being held here that the 72-year-old leader would step down. He has rheumatism and a reputed heart condition.

At his first news conference with foreign reporters in more than seven years, Tito was asked if he had selected a successor to be secretary-general of the Yugoslav Communist League.

"If I am re-elected tomorrow, I will accept," he said with a smile. "Otherwise I would be a deserter, for I am in good health and have the necessary vitality to go on."

The former partisan leader looked fit and ruddy as he appeared before newsmen today.

## Guiana Crisis Grows

### Jagan Won't Quit Office

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana (AP) — British Guiana headed into a governmental crisis today as Premier Cheddi Jagan said he would not resign. Gov. Sir Richard Luyt consulted with London to determine how the Marxist leader could be forced out.

"I will not resign," Jagan told a news conference. "The British government will have to force me out."

Luyt asked London for an order permitting him to summon the new legislative assembly without the premier's consent. Some sources close to the governor said Jagan's tenure would end with the calling of the assembly.

### EXPERTS

However, some experts on the South American colony's constitution said there were ambiguities that create a doubt whether Jagan's tenure would end automatically or whether his resignation is required.

Traditionally, premiers resign when defeated in elections. But Jagan charged fraud in the vote Monday which cost him his majority in the assembly. His decision not to resign was backed by a vote of the executive committee of his People's Progressive Party.

Luyt held separate meetings with Jagan and two opposition leaders, Forbes Burnham of the People's National Congress and Peter D'Aguilar of the United Force.

Burnham, who is expected to succeed Jagan, announced Thursday that he and D'Aguilar had agreed to form a coalition government. Jagan's party won the most seats — 24 — in Monday's election. But the National Congress with 22 and United Force with 7 would have a five-vote majority as a coalition.

### REMOVAL

Jagan was believed attempting to use his forced removal from office to discredit the incoming regime and possibly provoke a fresh outburst of racial violence. Meanwhile, he and his wife, the former Janet Rosenberg of Chicago, moved out of the premier's residence.

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## 2 Nuns Killed

# 42 More Saved From Rebel Mob

LEOPOLDVILLE. The Congo (UPI) — Mercenary-led troops have rescued another 42 white survivors in rebel-held territory, authorities said today. But they also learned of the murder of two more nuns, including an American.

News of the latest killings of an American nun identified only as Sister Marie Antoinette and a Belgian nun named Sister Marie Francoise, brought to 97 the number of whites executed by rebels since Belgian paratroopers landed in Stanleyville on a rescue mission Nov. 24.

Sister Marie Antoinette's name had not appeared so far on lists of Americans believed missing in rebel-controlled territory.

The bodies of the two nuns were thrown into the Congo River by "simba" rebel warriors, the sources said.

The 42 survivors were rescued yesterday by a mercenary patrol at Isangi and Yangambi on the Congo River about 63 miles from Stanleyville, they said.

The mercenaries who reached Isangi by river barge found only one white priest there. But they discovered the others later at the agricultural research station at Yangambi, where they had been taken by rebels after the Stanleyville paratrooper operation. Earlier reports had placed the number saved at 59.

An official government announcement said, meanwhile, that six Belgian nationals were missing from the Isangi plantation of the Busira Lomami Company.

A plane carrying 60 whites liberated at Nianara in the north was expected to arrive in Leopoldville from Pauls this afternoon.

## Humphrey To Handle Civil Rights

WASHINGTON (AP) —

President Johnson says he will make Vice President-elect Hubert H. Humphrey responsible for coordinating and pressing government programs that are dedicated to the goal of equal opportunity.

This announcement Thursday night to the Urban League was accompanied by a Johnson pledge to make the emancipation of Negroes "a fact" and a promise that he will be content with "nothing less than the full assimilation of more than 20 million Negroes into American life."

In both instances Johnson drew sustained applause.

Urban League Executive Director Whitney Young told the President that Negroes trust him, believe in him and 95 per cent of them voted for him.

The six government groups whose activities Johnson said Humphrey has agreed to coordinate were listed by the President as the Justice Department's civil rights division, the Civil Rights Commission, the President's Committee on Equal Opportunity in Housing, the Community Relations Service, the soon-to-be created Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and the President's Committee on Equal Opportunity in Employment.

When Johnson was vice president he headed the employment opportunity group. Whether Humphrey will become its chairman is up in the air — as is the status of the committee at the time of transition to operations under the new civil rights law.

## Star's Home Robbed, Loss At \$11,500

BEVERLY HILLS (UPI) — Burglars tonight stole an estimated \$11,550 worth of furs, jewelry and cash from the home of actress Carroll Baker.

Police said items taken included two fur coats valued at \$10,000 and costume jewelry worth an estimated \$1,500. A petty cash box was rifled and \$50 was missing, officers reported.

Investigators said the burglary occurred while the actress, her husband, movie director Jack Garfein, and their two children were out to dinner. The family nurse and two housekeepers also accompanied them to dinner.

Police said the actress reported that a \$75,000 diamond necklace was overlooked by the burglars, who ransacked the upper floor rooms of the house scattering clothing and papers about in their search for valuables.

## Indonesians To Pay for Mob Damage

JAKARTA. Indonesia (UPI) — The Indonesian government promised today to pay for repairs to two American libraries sacked by mobs demonstrating against the U.S.-Belgian rescue mission in the Congo.

It was unclear, however, whether the U.S. Information Service library in Surabaya, attacked last Monday, and another in Jogjakarta would be allowed to reopen.

The second ransacked USIS library is located in Jakarta, the capital.

U.S. Ambassador Howard P. Jones obtained President Sukarno's pledge to pay damages during an interview with him today.

Last Wednesday in Washington, U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk criticized countries in which mobs attacked American installations with government's "acquiescence." These incidents also have occurred in other countries, however, and Rusk did not name Indonesia.

# Nikita Publicly Criticized

MOSCOW (UPI) — Former Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev today was publicly criticized by name for the first time since he was ousted from office eight weeks ago.

A high Soviet economic official told the final session of the Russian parliament, the Supreme Soviet, that Khrushchev was guilty of passing off goals and production targets as "reality itself."

Until today the men who sacked Khrushchev had condemned him for one-man rule and "hare-brained" scheming, but had carefully refrained from naming him in speech or print.

But Konstantin Belyak, chairman of the economic council of the central "black earth" region in the Ukraine, broke the silence at the Kremlin meeting.

"Thanks to the incorrect practices cultivated by Khrushchev, desired results were passed off as reality itself," Belyak told the assembled delegates.

He made the remark as the Supreme Soviet prepared to put its ceremonial stamp of approval on Russia's "peace budget" for 1965.

The 1,378 delegates streamed into the Kremlin to finish debating the largest budget in Soviet peacetime history, presented to them Wednesday by Premier Alexei Kosygin.

It calls for expenditures of

99.4 billion rubles (\$110.4 billion) and revenues of 99.6 billion rubles (\$110.7 billion). Next year's defense spending will account for 12.9 per cent of total expenditures compared to 14.6 per cent this year.

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## Sen. Cannon Finally Wins

CARSON CITY, Nev. (UPI) — Sen. Howard Cannon, D-Nev., has officially won his bid for re-election.

The Nevada state supreme court yesterday refused to consider an election contest petition of his GOP opponent in last November's election, Lt. Gov. Paul Laxalt.

Laxalt conceded defeat to Cannon minutes after the unanimous decision and said he would not appeal the case to the U.S. Senate.

Cannon, who will begin his second term Jan. 3, had been certified winner by 48 votes Nov. 25.

# Irvine Preparing Industrial Parcels

SANTA ANA — The Irvine Company is preparing development of three large land parcels adjoining Orange County Airport for industrial use, and the Board of Supervisors will conduct a public hearing on rezoning petitions next Wednesday.

The 700 acres, which has been transferred to Irvine Industrial Complex, a wholly owned subsidiary, presently is zoned for agricultural use.

It is proposed that the land be rezoned to planned community with one 20-acre parcel on Red Hill Avenue south-east of Barranca Road being placed in a light industrial district.

The property involved is bounded generally by Newport Freeway on the west, Barranca Road on the north, Jamboree Road on the east and the Corona del Mar Freeway on the south.

**PLAN OKAYED**  
The County Planning Commission, in approving the rezoning change, was of the opinion that the plan represents a means of establishing the most desirable uses and land use relationships around the County Airport Facility. The contemplated development was revealed by

Charles S. Thomas, Irvine Company president, in early September when the 100th anniversary of the founding of the 88,256-acre holding was observed.

The Irvine Industrial Complex was formed to sell and lease land and build industrial facilities. New rail trackage will be extended into the area to provide joint rail service by Santa Fe and Southern Pacific.

One portion will be developed as the University Industrial Park, where multi-acre sites will be available for research and production facilities.

The 78-acre Birch Tract, adjacent to the airport, already is fully leased to smaller industries.

Also included is 300 acres known as Airport Industrial Park, which lies on the west side of the airport.

The Irvine Ranch already houses a significant variety of industries — Philco's Aeronautics Division, Collins Radio's Information Science Center, Astropower Laboratories of Douglas Aircraft's Missiles and Space Systems Division, Edler Industries, Sta-High Corporation and Dana Labs, Inc.

# Murdy to Attend Senate Caucus

It is still Sen. John A. Murdy Jr. of Orange County, and although he did not run for re-election, he's still filling the role.

Would splitting the state into two provide an answer? "The north would be happy to divide the state, but it has second thoughts when it realizes the greatest percentage of revenue comes from Southern California," said Murdy with a chuckle.

He admitted that his departure from the Sacramento scene after 12 years is a personal wrench. "I made a lot of friends in Sacramento during my tenure," said Murdy. "In a way, I hate to leave, but I made my decision a year ago to retire and devote more time to my private affairs and enjoy some leisure time with my family without the pressure of public life."

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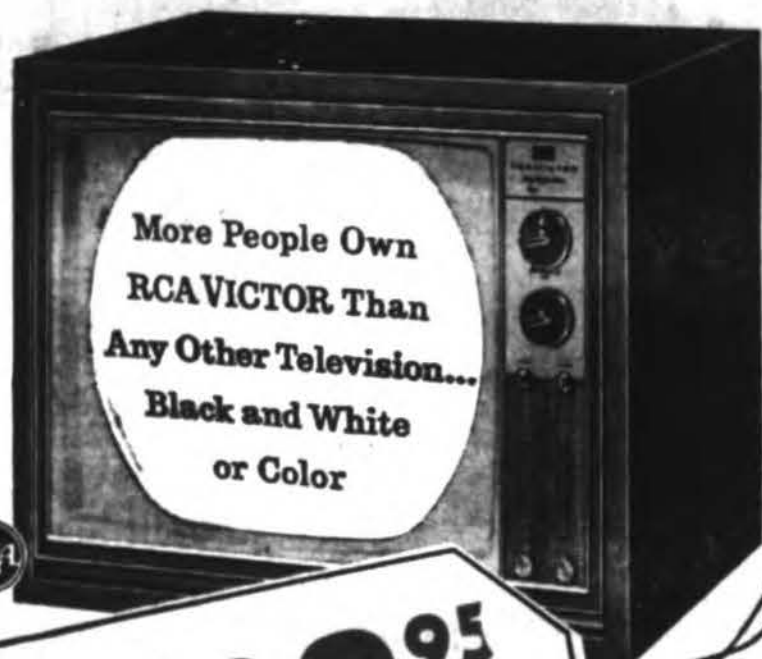

# Calm Prevails at Berkeley, But Storm May Be Brewing



BERKELEY (UPI) — A relative calm prevailed on the strife-torn University of California's Berkeley campus today, but there were indications that it may be the calm before a storm between students and the administration. Leaders of the militant "Free Speech Movement," which won the backing of the university faculty, claimed victory in the dispute which has kept the campus in an uproar for two months and spread out across the nation to rally support at other universities. However, there were indications that the situation still

was in a state of flux. The developments included: — The Sacramento Union said in this morning's edition that University President Clark Kerr has decided to accept a post in President Johnson's cabinet. A spokesman for Kerr said only that the university leader was "out of town and unavailable for comment." — The board of regents hinted that it may overrule the academic senate proposal for ending the dispute. The Senate, representing all 1,500 full-time faculty members, called for unlimited free speech and the right to advocate any cause whatsoever on the campus. This essentially was about the student demonstrators' demands. — Several state legislators indicated they will call for action as a result of the university turmoil when the state's governing body meets early next year. — The Sacramento Union, said reports recently "circulated freely" that President Johnson asked Kerr to become Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare in his new administration. (See Story, Page 4) — "Kerr didn't exactly want the job three weeks ago, but now he does, according to reliable sources," the Union said. — Meanwhile, the board of regents served notice on faculty members and students alike that the regents, and not the academic senate, run the university. — Regents Chairman Edward W. Carter of Los Angeles said the board would consider the whole matter of student disorders directly at its meeting Dec. 18.

**PA KETTLE DIES**  
Actor Percy Kilbride  
LOS ANGELES (AP)—Veteran actor Percy Kilbride, 76, the Pa Kettle of the movies, died early today at Chase Sanitarium. He was injured in an auto accident Sept. 21 and underwent brain surgery at Good Samaritan Hospital in Hollywood Nov. 11. Dr. Barkley Noble said Kilbride died at 12:45 a.m. of hardening of the arteries in the brain and terminal pneumonia. The doctor said he notified Kilbride's sister, Mrs. John L. Crowley of Los Angeles Thursday that her brother was failing fast. Fame came in his later years to the hawk-nosed comedian with the sing-song voice. He appeared in 800 stage roles, then made his movie debut in 1942. His roles were minor until he and Marjorie Main played a farm couple in "The Egg and I" in 1947. The characters were lifted from the film and became the basis of the "Ma and Pa Kettle" series. They were immensely popular at the box office, and Kilbride and Miss Main were boosted from character roles to starring parts. Kilbride was 61 when the series began. The Kettle films made a fortune for the studio, but Kilbride never struck it rich. Work was brief, taxes took too much and he was one-cast as the back-country farmer. He retired at 65, lived large on Social Security, and spent much time walking Hollywood Boulevard. A bachelor, he lived alone in a modest apartment. On Sept. 17, he and an actor friend, Frank Belmont, 73, were hit by a car as they were crossing a Hollywood intersection. Belmont was killed. At first it was thought Kilbride escaped with minor head injuries.

## Mrs. Miller Civil Rights Said Violated

SAN BERNARDINO (AP)—An attorney for Mrs. Lucille M. Miller says his client's civil rights were violated when sheriff's officers questioned her about her husband's death without her attorneys present. Mrs. Miller, charged with murder in the death Oct. 8 of her husband, Dr. Gordon Miller, is in county jail awaiting a new trial. A judge called a mistrial Monday because he said adverse newspaper publicity made it impossible for her to obtain a fair trial. Attorney Edward P. Foley said Thursday that sheriff's officers quizzed Mrs. Miller Tuesday night. "There has been nothing but a complete denial of this woman's constitutional rights," Foley said.

## 'Bad Blood' Between Twins?

PASADENA (UPI) — Family services were held this afternoon at All Saints Episcopal Church for Todd Nicholson, whose wealthy brother, Timothy, faces a murder charge for his death. Yesterday, a woman whose marriage to Timothy was annulled, told newsmen there had been "bad blood" between the twins over her. In a newspaper interview, Mrs. Patricia Nicholson, 27, a statuesque brunette and former model, said that she had stopped dating Todd to go with Timothy and that this turned brother against brother. Mrs. Nicholson said Todd never stopped trying to see her, even after she married Timothy in 1961. Sheriff's investigators, who said they had questioned Mrs. Nicholson, indicated there was no known link between her and the twins since last September, when she moved to set aside the annulment. The marriage of Patricia and Timothy was annulled in April of 1962 at Santa Barbara, at the request of Timothy's mother because he was only 19. Mrs. Nicholson said in the interview that the twins both had "temper like volcanoes that erupted over the slightest thing." Her statements contrasted with remarks by others who knew the twins and said they were extremely close. Mrs. Nicholson recalled that she first met Todd in 1960 in Santa Barbara, and dated him three or four times a week for three months. She said she met Timothy after he was discharged from the Marines and had mistaken him for Todd. She said she even had dated him under the misconception.

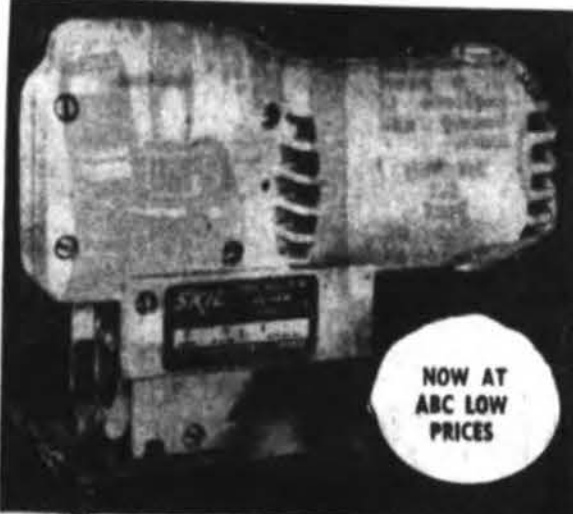

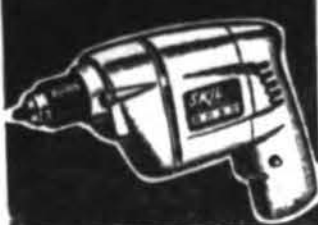

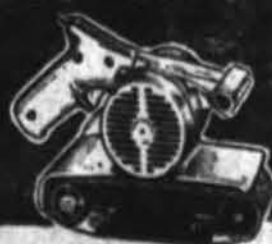

# 2.5 Million French Workers Strike, Bringing Chaos, Discomfort Everywhere

PARIS (UPI) — An estimated 2.5 million public service workers walked off their jobs today, bringing chaos and discomfort to Frenchmen across the nation. Some postal workers and employees of commuter rail-ways serving Paris jumped the gun by walking off their jobs last night. By this morning the paralyzing strike held the nation in the grip of the most devastating labor trouble in years. Early automobile commuters groped in rainy gloom through unlighted streets. Collisions at intersections were frequent, both in Paris and other cities. Some pedestrians, nearly invisible in the drizzle, darted through traffic carrying flashlights to signal oncoming cars. By 8 a.m., there were 20 accidents in the Paris area alone. At least 15 persons were injured, including one policeman knocked down by a car as he tried to direct traffic in the semi-darkness. Garbage piled up, mail lay undelivered and families sat alone to cold meals in unlighted homes. Industry was crippled with many plants shutting down for the day because they could not operate without gas or electricity. Other factories on the 19 bus lines serving Paris could not get to their jobs on the subway. The ministry of transport marshalled 400 army trucks to provide substitute service on the 19 bus lines serving Paris.

### First Lady Confident, Happy

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Lady Bird Johnson began her second year in the White House with a new confidence and happiness.

She became the 32nd First Lady of the land in the wake of an event which sent waves of shocked horror through the world — the assassination Nov. 22, 1963, of John F. Kennedy.

In those early days in the White House she felt she was walking in another person's shoes. At first she seemed almost to tiptoe through the great mansion. But with her husband's smashing Nov. 3 election victory the dark-eyed First Lady suddenly seemed to feel that the prize was the Johnsons' in their own right.

No president's wife ever campaigned more vigorously for her husband. The Lady Bird whistle stops by train and plane were unique in U.S. political history. Her example spurred other political wives to get out on

the hustings.

Mrs. Johnson, normally a halting speaker, achieved eloquence in moments of heckling during her Southern tour that would have put any politician to the test.

She stood up under the booing and demanded her right to speak, evoking the admiration of a nation. A many-faceted person, she seems shy and reserved but is strong as steel in moments of crisis.

No one was ever better prepared to be First Lady than Mrs. Johnson. She has been on the Washington scene since she came here 26 years ago with Johnson, then a freshman congressman. During the years of Johnson's vice presidency, she often filled in as hostess for her predecessor, Jacqueline Kennedy.

In short, she knew the ropes. Almost more than any other President's wife in recent times, she shares her husband's interests and is by his side on almost all

public occasions. She does not see life in the White House as a "splendid misery." She enjoys every minute of it.

They are a closely knit family. The moment Johnson reaches the family quarters he calls out, "Where's Bird?" She is a calming influence on her sometime outspoken spouse. During the campaign she sent up little notes "You're speaking too long."

Mrs. Johnson is an organized hostess. She can give a party on short notice — a necessity in view of her husband's hospitable nature. A "can do" woman herself, she gives luncheons honoring what she calls "women doers" who are making unique contributions to the country.

With the start of the drive on poverty, she became the president's eyes and ears, making trips to Kentucky and West Virginia to see first hand the conditions of the destitute and uneducated.

She has friends everywhere who would do anything for Lady Bird. They have rallied to her side many times as she has to theirs. When the Johnsons' long-time friend and aide, Walter Jenkins, collapsed under a morals arrest exposure, the First Lady was the first to speak out in sympathy for him and his family.

Mrs. Johnson is 51 but looks much younger. Admirers often exclaim, "Why, she's much prettier than her pictures."

She has never been too clothes conscious. But sud-

denly she finds she has to be. The public has a probing eye. Sometimes she doesn't trust her own taste, having always chosen her costumes for practicality and travel.

She has asked Robin Duke, wife of the State Department's protocol chief and a model, to help her outfit herself for the inauguration where she will be constantly on parade.

Mrs. Johnson keeps a slim figure despite the fact that good food is the hallmark of her entertaining. Home to her is LBJ Ranch in Texas and she is a walking chamber of commerce for her native state and for the South.

"I want you to like my Texas," she says.

She is a permissive mother and showers affection on her daughters Luci, 17 and Lynda, 20. They are apt to bounce into her room even when she has guests to hug and kiss her and to tell her the latest happenings.

"There are just four of us," is a line she likes to quote from Luci when viewing the life of the First Family.

In the next four years she is expected to do a lot of traveling and has set a pace of "seeing America first." Her rubber raft trip down the Snake River caught the imagination of the country and showed her to be a woman who loves nature and the outdoors.

When she moved into the White House a year ago, Mrs. Johnson said that her role must "emerge in deeds not words."

She is busy making her forecast come true.

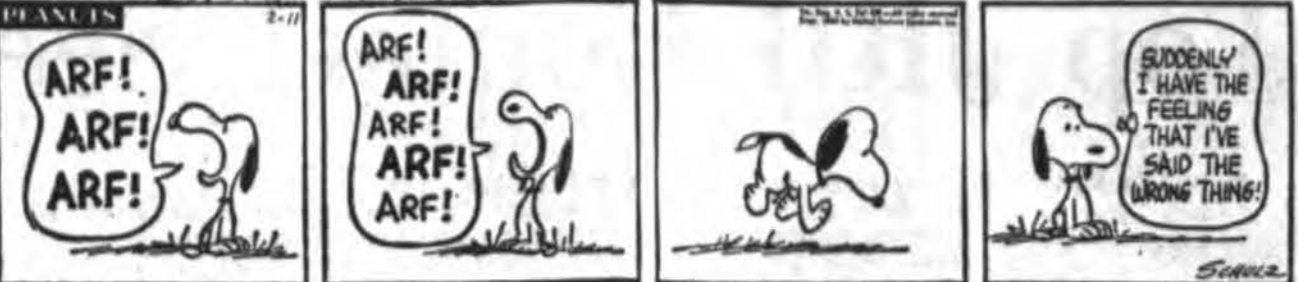

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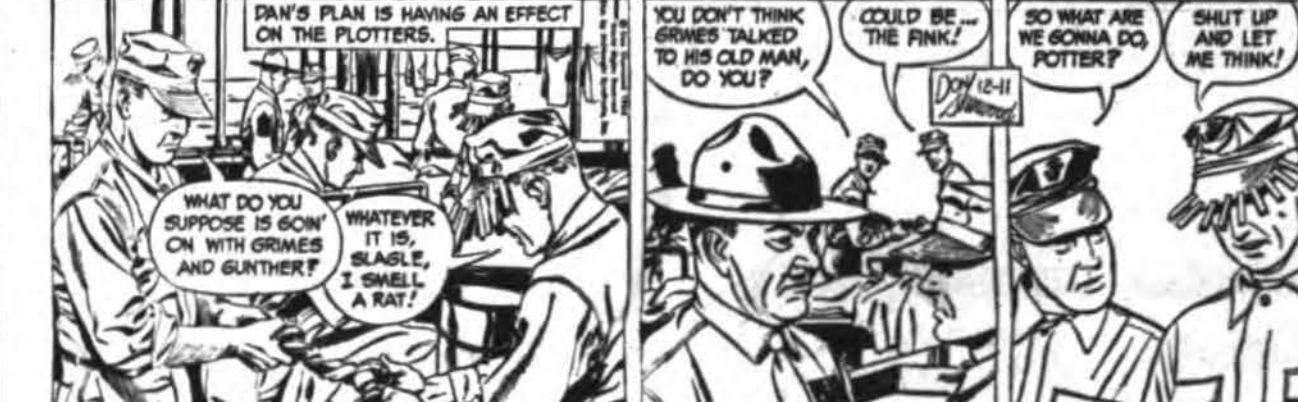

At the risk of being accused of rousing dead dogs I feel it my duty to inform the world the Pacific Coast will not be represented by the strongest available bodies in the New Year's Day football event termed the Rose Bowl.

The suspicion here being that sentiment rather than logic was used in selecting Oregon State to encounter Michigan at Pasadena. Considering the events of recent weeks, it would appear from my vantage point that the most capable team on this coast resides at the University of Southern California.

Not that USC's triumph over the Notre Dame crowd was enough to qualify the Trojans for a Rose Bowl appearance, but the fact remains that the Men of Troy are better at the gridiron sport than Oregon State.

And the AAWU or Big Six or whatever it is called went on record midway in the campaign as saying, "We'll pick the best team for the Rose Bowl, no matter who wins the championship."

The way SC performed against Notre Dame, recognized far and wide as the number one college football squad in existence, leads one to the belief that John McKay's marauders are capable of whipping anyone—including Michigan.

But Southern Cal supporters are way off base when they scream about Oregon State whipping a bunch of non-entries, like for instance, Idaho. Idaho, for my money, could whip UCLA and/or Texas A&M nine times out of 10. These are reportedly the tough types of foes which toppled before SC's onslaught.

The Black Bandits from Benton County also disposed of teams like Oregon, Syracuse and Washington. The latter will be remembered as the team which allowed SC players to watch television on January 1 rather than perform in the flesh.

PASADENA — What could easily go down in history as the finest Junior Rose Bowl of them all looms directly on the horizon today as both Long Beach City College and Cameron College of Lawton, Okla. wait anxiously for Saturday's showdown in the famed Rose Bowl here.

A record crowd of nearly 60,000 is anticipated for the 1 p.m. kickoff in the Arroyo Seco saucer.

Long Beach, ranked number one in the nation, and Cameron, number two, both carry impressive credentials into the long awaited contest.

Coach Jim Stangeland's Vikings outscored rivals 320-82 while winning nine straight games and the Metropolitan Conference title this year.

Cameron coach Lester (Bear) Jensen isn't overawed by the Long Beach record, however, and with good reason. His Aggies also won nine in a row and

outpointed foes 421-87.

Stangeland, the winningest coach in jaycee football with a 49-14-2 record, has piloted a pair of previous national championship clubs and yet he flatly describes this year's outfit as, "The best I've ever had."

One big reason for Long Beach's overwhelming success this year is halfback Marv Motley. Motley has been incredible on occasion — carrying the ball 139 times for 1,064 yards and 12 touchdowns. And when he's not totting the mail,

he's catching it — 10 times for 282 yards and another four scores.

Then there's Earl McCulloch, Elwood Stewart and Greg Barton, making the Vikings potent in all directions offensively.

Cameron isn't without some good ones of its own, however, with Fred Cheek, the nation's leading scorer, and Vernon Moore heading the parade. Cheek and Moore both earned All-American laurels as did Motley and lineman Frank Convertini of Long Beach.

Cheek scored 134 points during the season while gaining 726 yards in 85 carries. Moore only scored 60 counters, but he racked up 988 yards in the 126 times he packed the pigskin.

Cameron, basically a ball control outfit, utilizes a bone-crushing running game spiced with a few long passes. Aggie quarterback Tom Croft passed only 41 times all season and completed 18 of them. Still nine of his pitches went for scores as he gained 452

yards via the overhead lanes.

## U.S. Takes Lashing For Olympic System

## U.S. Labeled As 'Gutless' By Connelly

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Olga Connolly, three-time Olympian, tore into U.S. Olympic training and recruiting Thursday, saying, "It's time we showed some plain guts!"

The former Czechoslovakian and American discus star told a suburban Culver City Rotary luncheon it was time America stopped using "its lily-white approach to Olympic preparedness" and learned something from other countries.

"Because Harold (husband Harold Connolly, world record holder in hammer throw) and I are now retired I can afford to speak," she said.

Her first target was what she called the "one-sided" U.S. approach to the Olympics.

"An athlete qualifies for the Olympics and the first thing he's told is to 'go over there and beat the Russians,'" she said. "There is very little consideration given to the real struggle and financial burden an athlete must go through to even attempt to make the team."

Olga, who competed for her native Czechoslovakia in 1956 and for the United States in 1960 and 1964, also criticized the American financial treatment of athletes.

"When I was attending medical school here in 1955 and 1956, I was receiving a monthly check from Czechoslovakia which was more than my mother made in a month working 48 hours a week as a secretary."

"Many European countries pay their top six performers in each event outright, and give bonuses to those who win their events or set records," she continued.

"Some Scandinavian countries pay their top athletes \$100 to \$200 per meet, strictly under-the-table. Even the lesser athletes get \$10 to \$15 for expenses," Olga said.

Then she turned to the United States.

"Here, the athletes usually have to quit their jobs to train and their wives become the breadwinners, coaches and timers. So grateful were two of this year's Olympians that they each borrowed \$1,000 to pay their wives' expenses to Tokyo," she said.

"It's time we showed some plain guts, enough guts to sit down with the other competing nations and say, 'All right fellows, what are you doing for your athletes and what are we doing for ours?'"

## Hawks Gaining On Sinking LA

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The St. Louis Hawks came to Los Angeles last night to catch up some ground on the Los Angeles Lakers. The Hawks left today — nearly caught up.

St. Louis handed the Lakers a 95-91 defeat in a game which threatened to be a runaway until Hawk star Bob Pettit was injured and forced to leave the game. The victory moved St. Louis to within half a game of the Lakers in the National Basketball Association's Western Division race.

It marked the third straight time this season St. Louis has topped the league-leading Lakers.

Pettit was injured midway in the third period when he drove for a layup and was upended by Los Angeles forward Rudy LaRusso. Pettit, the top NBS scorer in history, fell to the floor. He suffered a minor head cut which required three stitches to close and a minor back injury. Hospital x-rays proved negative and Pettit was released.

When the Hawk star was hurt, St. Louis held a 15-point lead. Len Wilkins was responsible for most of it as he finished the night with 30 points and gave the Lakers fits.

But the loss of Pettit made the Hawks vulnerable and Los Angeles began to close the gap and pulled to 93-91 with 12 seconds remaining to play. Hawks guard Charlie Barnhill then dumped in the decisive basket on a crafty out-of-bounds play.

Laker guard Jerry West took the high point honors with 34 points. LaRusso followed with 21. Absent from the scoring was Laker captain Elgin Baylor who sat out the game with an injured hamstring muscle.

## No License For Williams

HOUSTON (UPI) — Cleveland (Big Cat) Williams faced a new hurdle today on the road to the heavyweight boxing championship, but there was also an expected bright spot.

Texas Boxing Commissioner Charles King, acting in Austin, Tex., on his own initiative and without a hearing, suspended Williams' license indefinitely for a shooting scrape Nov. 28 involving the boxer and a highway patrolman.

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# Juliet's 'Irma'

## Jolly Good Fun

Irma La Douce came back to life again in Orange County Tuesday evening with the glamorous, leggy Juliet Prowse giving no quarter to her movie counterpart, Shirley MacLaine.

This is a re-run at Melodyland Theatre in Anaheim brought on because the South African dancing star, Prowse, played to standing room there last September.

It was not SRO Tuesday evening, but it was a highly entertaining performance despite certain flaws. For one, the legitimate theater version of "Irma" is better adapted to proscenium than center stage. For another, the show in this form needs topflight narration throughout for full audience understanding of the action.

Robert Ellenstein, who essays the narrator role with many other flourishes as a mime and on-stage boomer, does well. But more narration is clearly needed, especially for theatre-goers having their first exposure to this bit of lively, spicy dancing, singing and acting.

One first nighter on this second Melodyland run who

has seen "Irma" in New York, London and Paris, said, "This cast is superb. No dancing actress has done the job better anywhere than Prowse. And the support is outstanding."

"They have the handicap of in-the-round for this particular show, which is better adapted to proscenium theatre, but they also take advantage of certain effects which aren't possible except in-the-round. Those touches from the aisles during scene changes are great."

No doubt about it, Miss Prowse can dance, eccentric or any other kind, and when she takes stage center with six derby-hatted men in support, the result is rhythm and joy.

Ron Humann, a charming young man who plays a love-sick law student in counterpoint to Ellenstein's philosophic Parisian barkeep, has lots of snap and vigor but leaves something to be desired in voice. He came through better in the second act than in the first on opening night, so perhaps judgment should be withheld until the production settles down.

"Irma" is not noted for outstanding song hits but several numbers are first rate and memorable. "Language of Love" is one of these. "There Is Only One Paris for That" is another.

Apart from the music, which is good, watching Juliet Prowse play the naive young French tart and her equally naive young lover, a glib law student, is good fun in the book of anyone not submerged in the Puritan ethic from 300 years ago. It is life as it is, glorified with music and dancing and acting lines written for fun.

One example of the latter: "Too many cooks spoil the broth!"

There are a lot of good reasons for seeing this David Thmar-directed show, especially for the person who likes and supports good legitimate theatre at every opportunity. But the best in this case is that it's just good fun, the kind of show one simply sits back and enjoys, looking for no serious message, just fun.

## When It's Bad Check

The Audubon Society might classify the bird as a short-billed money grabber or a green-backed purse biter. Store owners have other names for the species, some unprintable.

Although names and physical appearance can differ greatly, the species has many common traits. They are present at all times but infrequently seen or put in captivity.

They prey on sales people and thrive during the holiday shopping season. They are seldom noticed but they leave proof of their visits—gouges in sales profits.

### CHECK PASSERS

The bird is the bad check passer and Huntington Beach Detective Mel Remington has issued a warning to all merchants to take extra precautions during the Christmas rush to avoid the birds' sneak attacks.

An added danger to businesses is expected to be prevalent during the month, Remington said. Police have received information that altered money orders may be used in the area. The method is not a new one, Remington said, but it is becoming more widespread. Denominations on the orders are changed to turn small purchases into big profits.

### MONEY ORDERS

Passers of bad checks and altered money orders take advantage of busy shopping periods, when clerks are more inclined to rush.

"If merchants will take time to get positive identification before cashing checks

or money orders," Remington says, "their profits will be greater."

The best way to stop the bad check artist is to prevent him from cashing them, Remington says. Only a small amount of money lost by merchants in this manner is ever recovered, the detective said.

Money orders compound the difficulty because they are practically impossible to check and slow to return, he adds.

### PRECAUTIONS

An average of 60 bad checks per month are cashed in Huntington Beach, according to police records. Approximately 350 have been received since June 1 and the holiday season will probably boost that figure considerably, Remington says.

Detective Remington suggests some steps which can be taken to cut down on the number of bad checks and money orders passed:

—Take time to establish positive identification, even during busy sales periods.

—Be especially careful on checks which are cashed for amounts greater than the actual purchase. Check passers are seldom interested in the merchandise, Remington said. They much prefer cash.

### LIQUOR STORES

—Watch for payroll checks from out-of-town firms.

—Know your endorser on payroll and other second-party checks.

Check passing rings concentrate mainly on liquor stores and large markets, where large sums of money are readily available, according to Remington. But they are apt to hit any kind of store or business.

A little extra time establishing the validity of a check or money order can save a lot of time, trouble and, most important, dollars, Remington concludes.

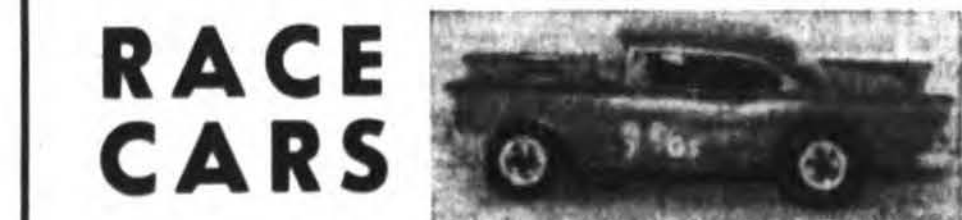

# New Pressures at UC

Agitation and disorders practiced at the University of California, Berkeley, by a small minority of students has now, in effect, been condoned and supported by 824 of the 935 faculty members who voted in the Academic Senate.

The key point is whether students shall have the freedom to advocate any political action, including illegal acts, on campus. Present rules of the university permit political solicitation and recruitment but not advocacy of illegal acts.

Also at issue as a result of the faculty's Academic Senate recommendations is the question of who shall deal with future illegal acts by student advocates of political causes. The faculty would take this right away from the legally-authorized university administrators, despite the fact the faculty has no responsibility for administration.

The university's Board of Regents will meet a week from today to consider these and other aspects of the controversy. The atmosphere will be one of pressure and intimidation, not just from irresponsible students and off-campus agitators, but now also from faculty members who seem to take a very narrow view of their own responsibility and that of the University.

Fortunately for the University of California, its Board of Regents, who represent the people of the state, are well insulated from political pressure. One of the wisest provisions in the state constitution, faulty as that document is in many other respects, is the one covering board membership.

Sixteen of the 24 regents are appointed for 16-year terms. Two are appointed every two years by the governor, thereby preventing any "packing" of the board. Eight ex-officio members with full voting rights complete the roster. These include the governor, lieutenant governor, state superintendent of public instruction, state agriculture board president, state Assembly speaker,

er, the university president, the alumni association president and the president of the Mechanics Institute in San Francisco.

The pressures upon this group are such that their rejection of the faculty resolution could bring on more on-campus disorder after the holidays. And this conceivably could cause the university to close its doors, thereby harming the great majority of students who are at Berkeley for a broad education, not to agitate illegally for a phony cause.

The odds seem heavily in favor of the board's refusing to revise anything under blackmail pressure. The farthest it might be expected to go would be to appoint a committee to study the whole question of on-campus political advocacy — including the advocating of illegal acts short of a conspiracy to commit them.

It also seems likely that the regents will agree with Gov. Edmund G. Brown in his decision not to grant amnesty to the 768 students and some 40 other demonstrators arrested last week. Brown said, "It should be clear . . . that in a society governed by law, a decision to defy the law must include a decision to accept the consequences. I have considered the question of amnesty carefully and my decision is final. I will not intervene."

Gov. Brown deserves strong commendation for the unhesitating and decisive way he has acted to uphold the law in the student disorders. So does Dist. Atty. Frank Coakley of Alameda County in his announced decision to go to trial if the defendants plead not guilty.

Next week, we would hope, the Board of Regents will stand firmly for the doctrine that the university — administration, faculty and students — must continue to accept reasonable responsibility for student conduct on the campus; and in doing perhaps remove some of the tarnish from a great university's reputation.



## Everyday Problems

### MDs Are Human Too

Many physicians still are reluctant to recognize and treat effectively psychological problems in their patients. Even though psychiatric subjects were a part of his basic and clinical training during medical school, internship and residency, the bias of the average doctor toward physical treatment was fairly well fixed by the time he was graduated. Not that he is unaware of the importance of emotional factors in his patients' illnesses; he just seems to be more interested in something else.

THIS IS unfortunate, since three out of 10 mentally troubled patients turn to their family doctors for help. Even more unfortunate is the attitude of most physicians towards emotional and mental problems in themselves. For doctors usually will not seek psychiatric help for themselves or for members of their own family until symptoms of disordered behavior become so severe that an acute breakdown is imminent. Further, doctors are reluctant to do anything about urging a disturbed colleague to get professional help.

A PROMINENT physician told me recently: "Even though I know I need psychiatric help for emotional conflicts that seem to stem from my early childhood, I wouldn't dare tell even my closest friends, particularly other M.D.s, that I am in psychotherapy. For most of them, knowing only my professional and public image, would poo-poo the whole idea." Yet this doctor, a highly regarded specialist, and his family have made enormous progress during several months of therapy in resolving their potentially serious difficulties.

TWO MAYO CLINIC psychiatrists recently reported that 93 physicians had been hospitalized for mental disease in their institution between July, 1956 and July, 1963. This represented one physician for each 64 admissions — "a highly disproportionate ratio when one considers their representation in the population."

A much larger number of M.D.'s were seen as psychiatric outpatients during that same period. Commenting on psychiatric illness in doctors, the Mayo Clinic specialists said: "There is a need for physicians to exercise enlightened compassion with regard to mental illness in their fellow physicians. In the close fraternal ties of the profession, serious emotional illness in a physician soon becomes apparent to all."

YET MANY physicians are reticent about referring a colleague for psychiatric treatment. Instead, they tend to be overly protective or cold and callous — attitudes which doctors condemn in the laity, since many conditions, if untreated, progress to an acute decompensation. Most of the physician patients at Mayo Clinic were admitted voluntarily because of family pressure or their own awareness of gross impairment in their

ability to function professionally. Many drug-addicted physicians were admitted because of the threat of federal action or loss of license to practice medicine.

DOCTORS dedicate their lives to helping others. But doctors are human beings too, subject to the same frailties as their patients. Under the stress of medical practice, as well as the problems of their own family life and everyday living in this atomic age, emotional and mental illnesses do occur in physicians just as they do in lawyers and engineers and psychologists, or individuals in any kind of work.

Since modern medicine emphasizes the prevention of disease and serious maladies, the early recognition and treatment of mental and emotional illnesses is just as essential as the treatment of the incipient symptoms of heart disease, ulcer, or cancer. In those of us who are physicians, as well as in all of our patients!

## Sacramento Report

### Attack on Billboards?

Gov. Edmund G. Brown's conference on good design, held in Sacramento this week, appears to have much to commend it. At least, the idea of spreading the gospel of good design may take root and produce some results in a hundred years or more.

Although the conference was somewhat vague on specifics in good design, the general idea that there should be good design throughout the state, in architecture, free ways, landscaping, furniture, printing, etc., seemed to get across. People with artistic intuition have known this for a long time, and those who know nothing of the arts easily can recognize the overall difference between good and bad design.

THE GOVERNOR and several of the speakers at the conference mentioned the hodge-podge created by lack of planning, by clashing neon signs and billboards.

It might follow that the conference is being used as a method of attacking billboards throughout the state, especially those which are out of place, and offensive to some eyes.

The governor long has been opposed to out-of-place billboards, and said at the conference he hopes municipalities will regulate them. So far, he has been unable to get a satisfactory bill through the Legislature to establish state-wide control over this advertising medium.

BY AND LARGE, billboard concerns have attempted to comply with good design both in locating the advertising, and in

presenting the message to the public.

But there are some government agencies, and some legislators that think the billboards should go.

What they fail to recognize is the fact that the people who use the billboards usually are the people who pay the taxes to support the government. These people have goods and services to sell, and in the normal course of events are faced with the necessity of advising the people who buy these goods and services. Billboards are one medium.

THE GOVERNMENT, which has no goods and services to sell, wants to hamper the private entrepreneur in carrying the message to the public. Government, which never meets a payroll except with the taxpayer's money, and never pays a tax out of its revenue, takes upon itself the obligation of guiding the hand that feeds it.

All of which brings us back to the question of whether the promotion of good design by the government is going to be used to foster a series of mandatory laws controlling outdoor advertising, or whether it will be used as a matter of education and consciousness of the fundamentals of dignified presentation of the products which contribute to the economic welfare of the state.

GOOD DESIGN in fact, is a matter of individual appreciation. If enough people agree on a design, it is good. And as thinking changes over the years as to what is good and what is bad, no doubt a hodge-podge will exist for all time.

### Aiding a Warmonger

The Johnson administration is "turning the other cheek" to the latest anti-U.S. outrage in Indonesia, and is continuing unchanged the multi-million dollar aid program there.

Under carefully undisclosed provisions of this program, large quantities of military equipment are being shipped to this warmongering southeast Asian country.

IT'S PART of an extraordinary counter-insurgency plan we are financing there.

In ignoring last week's sacking and burning of a 27,000-book U.S. Information Service library in Jakarta, this week's similar pillage of the U.S.I.S. library in Surabaya and the Sukarno regime's insolent refusal to apologize or compensate for this officially-instigated mob violence, the administration is adhering to previous policy. It did the same thing earlier this year after Sukarno insultingly proclaimed, "To hell with U.S. aid."

WHEN THE SENATE retaliated by overwhelmingly voting 62 to 28 to bar more aid to Indonesia, the President personally high-pressed a Senate-House conference committee to discard this ban in their closed-door deliberations. Senators Milward Simpson, R-Wyo., and Wayne Morse, D-Ore., vehemently protested, but got nowhere.

As a consequence, Indonesia is getting \$10 million this fiscal year in an unannounced three-year counter-insurgency aid program totaling \$61,667,000. In fiscal 1963, \$36,667,000 was spent for this purpose, in fiscal 1964, \$15 million.

This financing is from the budget of the Agency for International Development (AID), which administers economic aid. The money is being spent to support the Indonesian armed forces, national police and para-military units, including a newly-equipped mobile brigade — Mobrig.

THE LATTER is a 23,500-man force whose function is to quell uprisings and revolts, and to help the regular police control riots. Mobrig is also used to train guerrillas — for raids in Malaysia, which Sukarno has repeatedly announced he is determined to "destroy."

President Johnson is officially committed to support Malaysia with military equipment and other aid.

HEADING the hush-hush counter-insurgency program is one of the President's top foreign policy trouble-shooters, Under-Secretary of State Har-

man. Assisting him is Michael Forrestal, member of the White House staff and son of the late James Forrestal, defense secretary in the Truman administration.

Other ironic inconsistencies in the Indonesian aid program include \$1,418,000 for school libraries in that country — whose government stood idly by while officially-instigated mobs

sacked the two U.S.I.S. libraries; extensive improvement of harbor and dock facilities — used by Indonesian guerrillas to invade Malaysia; and improvement of the "operational efficiency and safety of domestic and international commercial air traffic" in and out of Jakarta — where Soviet military and commercial planes land.

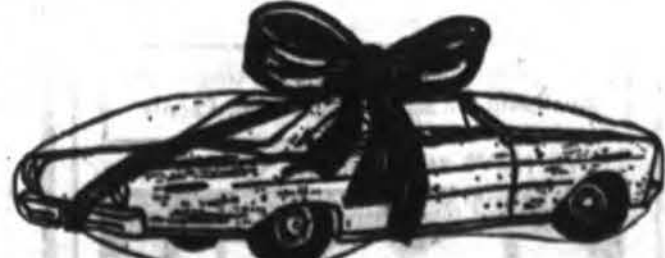

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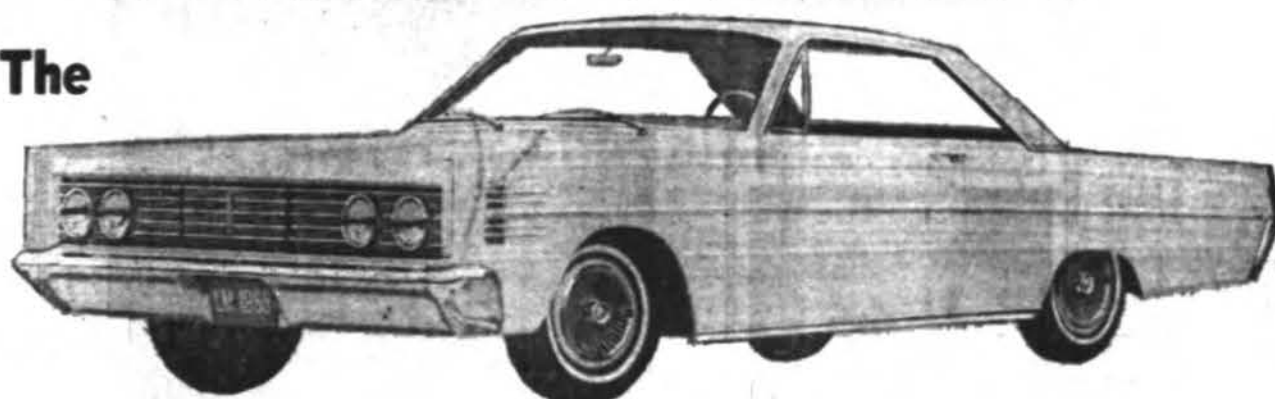

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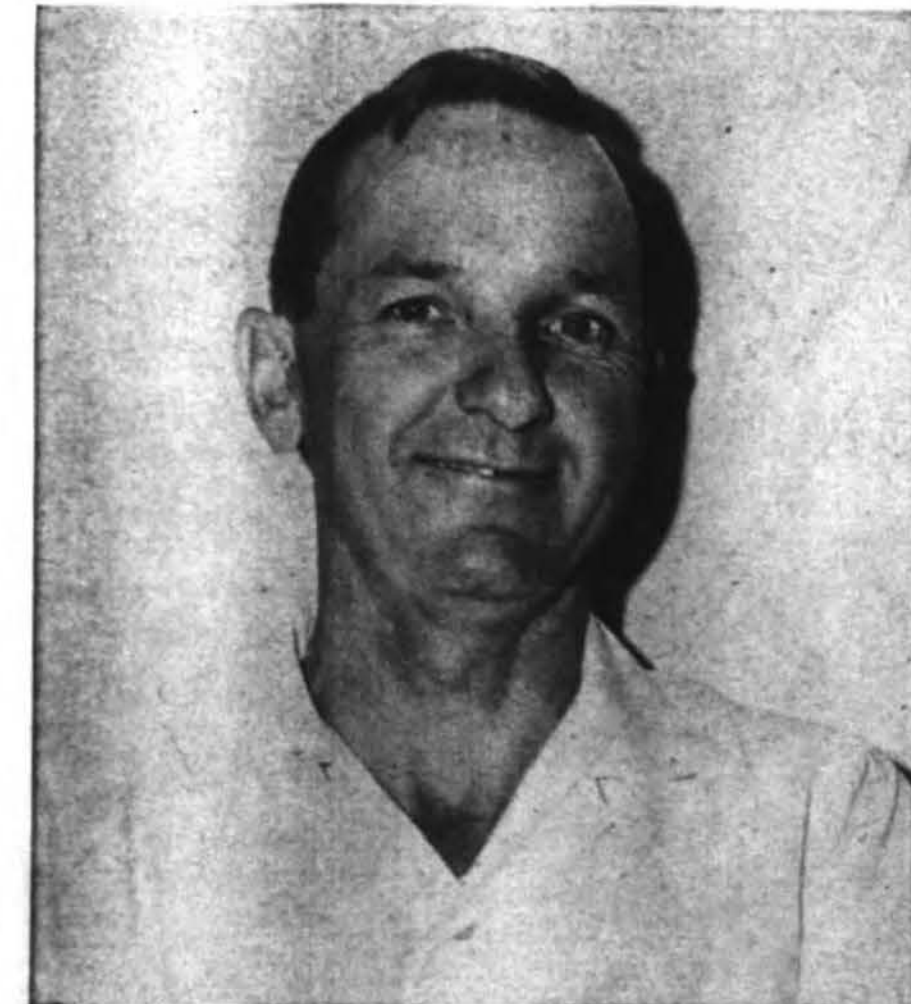
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## Meet The People . . .



### Wanted To Grow With City

Huntington Beach in 1959 was a quiet community of around 7,000 people, but Bill Hartge saw it as a city about to enter a rapid growing period. He was working then for the Orange County Flood Control District.

"I quit my job and went to work for the city of Huntington Beach as an assistant design engineer," Hartge recalls. "I knew the city was going to grow and I wanted to grow with it." Today he is Chief Engineer and Deputy Director of Public Works.

It has proved a good move for Hartge. He finds his work interesting, he is living near the water as he has done most all his life and he met Jana. They were married this year and he is thrilled with his ready made family. Jana and her 15-year-old son and 17-year-old daughter by a previous marriage are all as athletically minded as Hartge. Most any Sunday will find the four of them on the tennis courts or out in their Cregar 24 sailboat.

Hartge, the youngest in a family of eleven children, was born and raised in Maryland on the Chesapeake Bay. His father owned a boatyard and he was introduced to sailing about the time he started to walk. "Every one in our family shared the same interest in sailing," Hartge commented. "There were always several members of our family entered in almost every race on the Bay. Between my brothers and uncles it wasn't uncommon for them to finish first, second and third in a race." Hartge has enough trophies of his own to fill a whole wall in his home. In the East he raced a Chesapeake 20 which is a centerboard boat similar to a Star boat. The first boat he owned out here was a Lehman 12, but he sold it before he moved from West Newport to Huntington Beach three years ago.

In 1941 Hartge entered the University of Maryland to study civil engineering, but World War II interrupted his studies. He joined the Naval Air Force and served as a dive bomber pilot. When the war ended he returned to college for his degree. His first job after graduation was with the Beach Erosion Board, a division of the United States Engineers. His first assignment was in Southern California—one look and he knew he wanted to make it home.

His work on the Beach erosion studies has convinced him that the flood control dams built to remedy problems inland are a major cause of loss of sand on our Southern California beaches. "These dams, which do a fine job in the locations where they were built, are preventing the free flow of soil and sand out to the ocean," Hartge said. "There is not enough erosion material being washed down from the hills to replenish the sand being worn away yearly from our shoreline. That is why new measures are being developed to remedy the situation."

A major part of Hartge's job at present is involved with the large planning program being conducted by the city of Huntington Beach. Its 26 square mile area won't grow much larger in area, Hartge believes, but the population growth has been estimated at nearly 140,000 by 1969.

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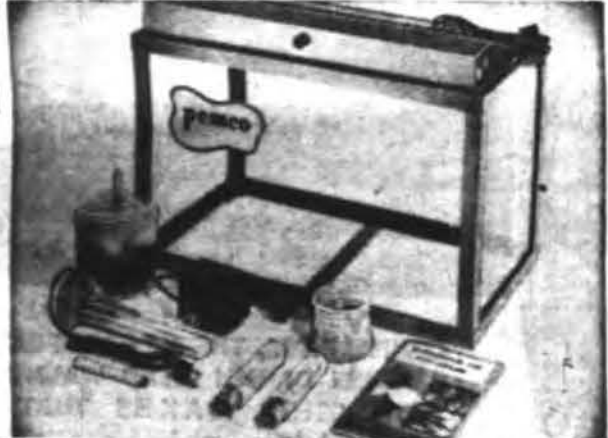
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## Garden Notes



Holly

This is a fitting time of year to talk about hollies. There are more varieties of holly available for home planting than most people realize.

The most traditional looking holly is the English holly, *Ilex aquifolium*. It has the typical dark green spiny leaves and red berries. English holly is a fairly large shrub growing six to ten feet high. It prefers at least partial shade.

In olden times you needed a male and female plant in order to get berries on the female plant. Most varieties available now are self-fertile — they have flowers of both sexes on one plant — and each plant will have berries whether planted singly or in groups.

There is also a variegated variety of English holly called Silver Queen. This self-fertile variety has green leaves that are margined with white. The new growth is reddish in color giving the plant a delightful three colored effect. The growth habit of Silver Queen is much the same as the regular English holly.

The Chinese hollies are best grown in the sun. The regular Chinese holly, *Ilex cornuta*, has fewer spines than that of English holly, and the Burford variety is virtually spineless. Besides being sun hardy, these hollies are lower growing than the English holly. The Chinese hollies are self-fertile and bear great quantities of large red berries.

Another very good holly is *Ilex aquipernyi* 'Brilliant.' This holly has a typical leaf slightly smaller than that of the English holly. It is sun hardy and grows compactly from six to eight feet. As the variety name, 'Brilliant,' indicates, the holly bears great masses of bright red berries. It is self-fertile.

There are two varieties of holly that are low growing and can be used as foreground shrubs. The dwarf Chinese holly, 'Rotunda,' has leaves very much like the English holly but only grows two feet high. It does not have any berries.

The other dwarf holly is Dwarf Yaupon. This one looks the least like holly of any in the group, but it makes a splendid low growing shrub. Its small leaves are closely knit and the shrub grows only a foot or a foot and a half high. It is self-fertile.

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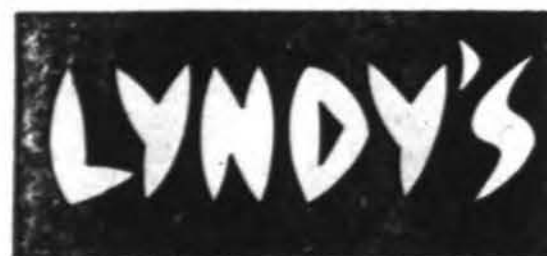

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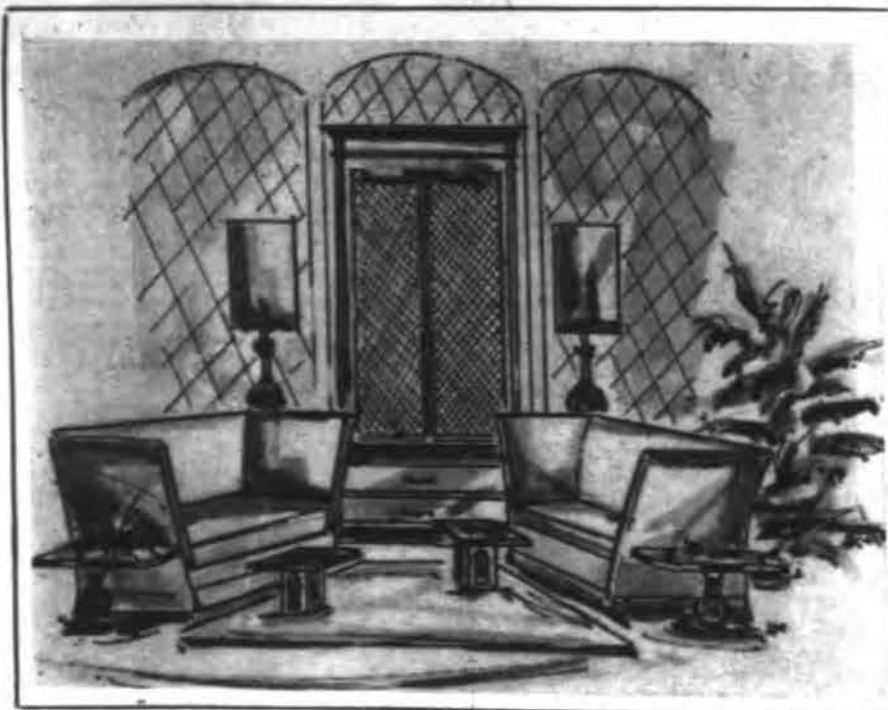

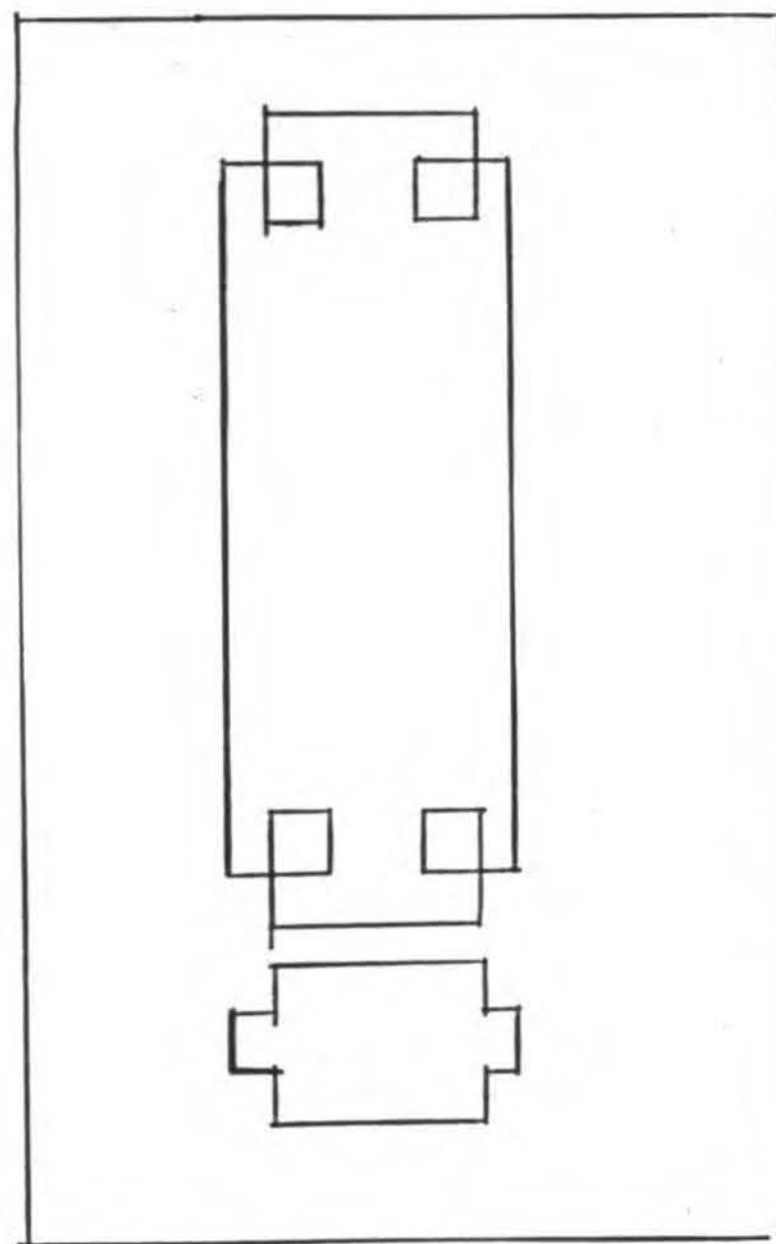
QUESTION: Is it correct to use a decorative roller shade on a window that has a valance and drapery?

L.K., Garden Grove

ANSWER: Yes, as long as the texture of the roller shade does not compete with the drapery, this technique can be most effective.

QUESTION: Our entry floor is travertine vinyl, the walls are painted olive green. There is a small console and mirror, oriental, on one wall. Can you suggest what can be done to the remaining three walls. Wallpaper? Pictures? Mirrors?

ANSWER: Repeat the travertine vinyl flooring on the walls in a panel design. Use a molding of plain vinyl in the metallic gold. See sketch.

Mr. Previn needs no introduction to American audiences. He is also a composer and conductor and an Academy Award winner for his motion picture scores; his latest score is "My Fair Lady."

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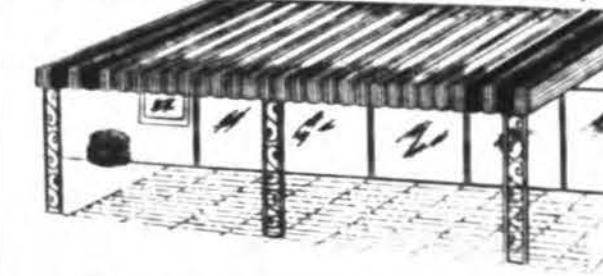
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## Juliet Prowse Returns To Melodyland Theatre

## Desk Plan Avoids Unwanted Wall Murals



### Simple Plans and Materials

Preschool children have a natural tendency toward artistic expression. The usual medium is crayons, and more often than not the project is an ambitious mural roughly three feet high and approximately as long as the living room wall.

One way to save the wallpaper, and walls is to turn the child's natural, untamed inclinations into a healthy, non-destructive kind of expression.

The American Plywood Association has added a new toddler's desk to its inventory of do-it-yourself plans and the little desk can go a long way toward helping parents save both the wallpaper and the child's natural interest in drawing. At the same time, use of the desk can help form good work and study habits early.

Carefully scaled to pre-school children, the desk can be made just the right height for children in the 2½ to 5-year-old range. It has a work surface that's plenty big enough for broad, untrained brushstrokes. The desk top was designed to accommodate the over-sized crayons toddlers use and to take the giant-size coloring books that pre-schoolers need to develop eye-muscle coordination.

Another key feature: The desk is simple to build with a few hand tools and a half sheet of five-eighths inch plywood. The only materials needed in addition to the panel of plywood are finish nails, glue, two sets of nuts and bolts, four washers, and some paint. The desk can easily be built in a day.

## Children and Parents Both Like Scooter Toy Box

### Takes Little Time to Build

Here is a present for the children in your family that is also a boon to parents. It is a toy storage and scooter combination that is a lot of fun to play with and almost as much fun to use as a storage box for those miscellaneous things such as bottlecaps, yo-yos, and marbles that children like to collect.

The project is easy to build. It takes a single sheet of half-inch plywood. The job can be done with a hand saw, keyhole saw, hammer and screw driver. A power saber-saw makes the work faster and easier. The wheels for the little truck are furniture casters, or they can be fabricated with metal rods threaded on both ends for axles and four plywood discs. Bolts and washers will secure the discs to the axles.

The sides of the scooter can be decorated with decals or hand-painted lettering and symbols to identify the indoor vehicle as a milk truck, mail wagon, ice cream cart, or whatever the child will find most appealing.

The truck is essentially a plywood box and takes very little time to build. The materials required include a sheet of plywood, finish nails and glue, a section of piano hinge, four furniture casters and a drawer pull.

## Sternwheeler 'Mansion Belle' Ready For Charter

An authentic Mississippi riverboat, the plush, 90-foot-long "Mansion Belle," has been added to the fun and recreational facilities to be found on the Southern California coast-line.

Berthed at the Fisherman's Wharf on the Marina del Rey, between Venice and Playa del Rey, the "Belle" is a genuine sternwheeler of the type that used to ply the Mississippi River in the day of Mark Twain. Not a sea-going vessel, she cruises only the calm, smooth waters of the Marina, her propulsion coming from a paddle 20 feet wide and 10 feet high, driven by a powerful, modern diesel-electric system.

The "Mansion Belle" is a Party Boat, available by charter only for all types of gala occasions — weddings, anniversaries, cocktail parties, buffet lunches and dinners, business, club and sorority meetings — in short, fun gatherings of every description.

Accommodating up to 224 people, the "Mansion Belle" can be chartered if there is a minimum of 75 persons. Charges are set at so much per passenger, plus food and drinks. The "Belle" can be chartered by the afternoon, evening, or for a limited cruise.

There are two spacious glass enclosed salons, on the upper and lower decks, with a bar in each, and a parquet dance floor in the upper salon. The entire boat is richly decorated in a style reminiscent of Civil War days with thick, inch-deep carpets, plenty of gilt paint and curliques paneling.

Refurbishing costs came to well over \$150,000 to put the "Belle" in action.

Captain Carl Shirk, who holds a full master's license, pilots and captains the sternwheeler which carries a permanent crew of five seasoned deckhands.

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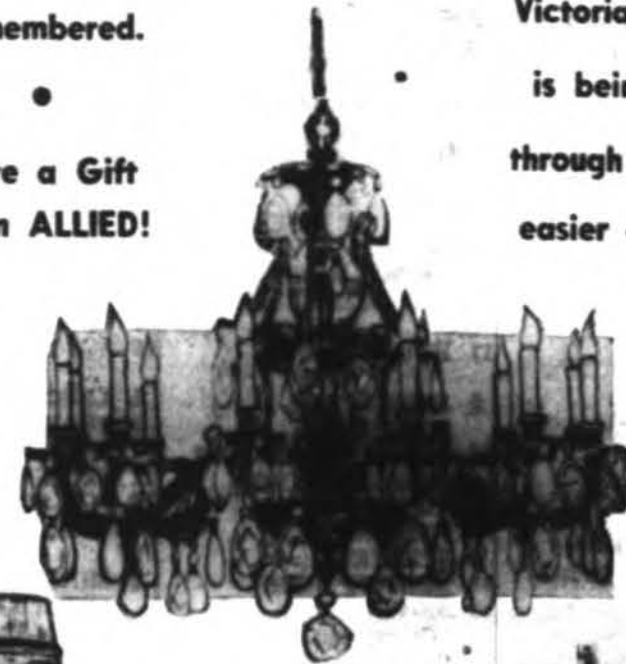

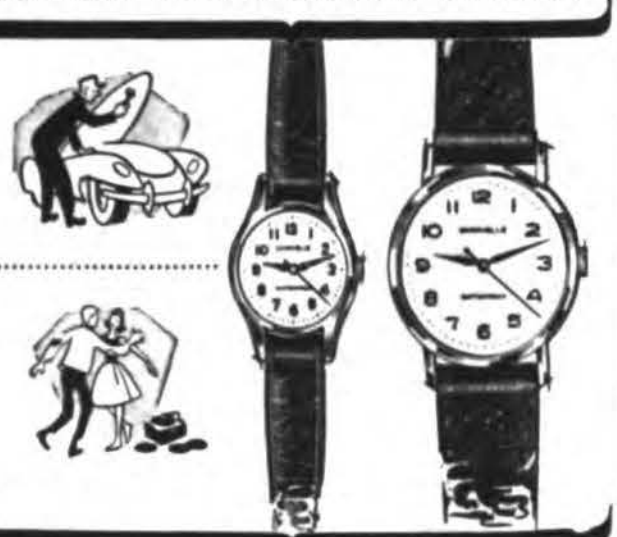

# Nobel Prize Awards on Channel 7

For the first time, the Nobel Prize awards and ceremonies will be shown on American television. The hour-long special, which will present the eight 1964 winners of the world's highest award, is scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 12, at 7:30 p.m. on Channel 7. The winners include three Americans, two Russians, a German, a Frenchman, and an English woman.

Climaxed by the formal pomp of the award presentations at Stockholm's Concert hall, the program narrated and written by commentator Alistair Cooke will recount the story of how the awards were started in 1901 by a legacy from millionaire Alfred Nobel. Some of the outstanding Nobel winners over the years, from Theodore Roosevelt to Marconi and Einstein, will be seen. For the first time, the secret deliberations of the learned scholars who choose the winners will be heard, in part.

In-depth interviews with the 1964 Nobel winners and graphic demonstrations of their accomplishments will be spotlighted. Actual presentation of the awards in Stockholm by the King of Sweden and in Oslo by Norway's Parliament will follow. Ceremonies will be filmed by cameramen wearing white ties and tails, along with the audience of 1,000.

The two American winners in physics and medicine, Dr. Charles Townes of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Dr. Konrad Bloch of Harvard University, will receive their gold Nobel medals and diplomas from Sweden's King Gustav Adolf. The Nobel Peace Prize awarded to the Rev. Martin Luther King of Atlanta will be presented the same day in Oslo. Dr. King will get \$53,000 in Nobel prize money, while the two U.S. science winners will share the prize money in their fields with a German and two Russians.

Dr. Townes won half of the Nobel physics prize—two Russians getting the other half—for devising the maser and laser (short for microwave and light amplification of stimulated emission of radiation) which became a basic tool in developing the Telstar communications satellite which allows a million phone conversations to ride a light beam.

The maser idea also was used to help surgeons perform delicate eye operations, to develop a beam of light that cuts through steel, and to measure the temperature of distant planets accurately. Co-winners with Dr. Townes are two Russian physicists, Dr. Aleksandr Prokhorov and Dr. Nikolay Basov, who will be interviewed by Alistair Cooke.

The other U.S. scientific winner, Dr. Bloch, also will be interviewed and will explain his research on the nature of cholesterol, suspected cause of heart disease, which won him a Nobel prize in medicine along with Dr. Feodor Lynen of Germany, who also will be heard.

In the 63 years of Nobel awards, the U.S. has won the most prizes of any nation in medicine and physiology, a total of 28, while Germany has taken the award 10 times and Britain 15 times.

An English woman, Dr. Dorothy Crowfoot Hodgkin, who won the chemistry prize for X-ray studies of the molecular structure of vitamins and penicillin to allow their manufacture synthetically, will be interviewed in Ghana for the Nobel show. Now teaching at the University of Ghana, she is the third woman ever to win the Nobel Prize in chemistry, the others being Marie Curie and her daughter, Irene Joliot Curie, for their studies on radium and radiation.

The 1964 Nobel Prize winner in literature, famed French author and philosopher Jean-Paul Sartre, has refused to accept the \$53,000 prize because he believes a writer should express himself only through "written words," but he will still be honored in the Nobel ceremonies in Stockholm. Host Alistair Cooke plans an interview with the French novelist-playwright in Paris to explain his rejection of the Nobel honor, given 11 times to French compared to six each for the U.S. and Britain. The one Russian who has won the Nobel award in literature, Boris Pasternak, first accepted but then was compelled by Soviet officials to reject the prize.

Actually the first man to reject a Nobel prize was Theodore Roosevelt, who won the peace prize for helping to settle the Russo-Japanese War and

turned it down because he felt no one should be honored for making peace.

In narrating the Nobel television program, host Alistair Cooke will emphasize the human elements involved, seeking to capture the excitement of Nobel Week in Stockholm when many social functions are planned.

"While capturing the pomp and majesty of the Nobel spectacle at the ceremonies, we want essentially to picture the human drama of the greatest honor our civilization can bestow on the achievements of man," declares producer Walter Schwimmer. "The Nobel Prizes have always been front page news all over the civilized world, yet in the past the lay public has not been privileged to meet the Nobel laureates, to see and hear them intimately as personalities who reflect the touch of greatness."

"There have been newsreel shots of the Nobel Prizes seen before but no television program has ever reported in depth on the background of the Nobel Prizes and the winners of the highest honor any man can achieve."

To produce the show Schwimmer had to get special permission from the Nobel Foundation to go into the private sessions at the Royal Academy of Science in Stockholm to film deliberations of professors choosing the winners. Working first through the Swedish embassy and then making a personal trip to Stockholm, Schwimmer finally won full cooperation for his projected program.

Alistair Cooke was chosen as writer, host and narrator for the show based on his similar role in the popular Omnibus program of some years back, which won an Emmy award. For Cooke, who is U.S. correspondent of the Manchester Guardian, the program represents "a thing of joy, a delight to do." Cooke in interviewing Dr. Bloch at Harvard was enjoying a homecoming since he was graduate student there 30 years ago. Born in Manchester, he first came to the U.S. on a Yale fellowship and stayed to become a U.S. citizen in 1941. He has been chief U.S. correspondent for the Manchester Guardian since 1948 and a commentator on U.S. affairs for the British Broadcasting Co.

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## Eyewitnesses Back Up Story of 'Great War'

Since a great deal of World War I is not recorded on film or in documents, the gap had to be filled by eyewitnesses.

"The human reaction," says Tony Essex, who produces the series with Gordon Watkins, "is as important as the event. The war was fought by people, not machines, and our aim was a complete picture of what the war was like, not merely a statement of what happened."

The producers went on a campaign to get all the eyewitnesses available. Using the national newspapers and selected television and radio announcements, they asked anyone who had fought in the war and who had vivid recollections of certain aspects of it to contact them. Then they sat back and waited for the mail to pour in.

And pour in it did. The British Broadcasting Co. Television headquarters received more than 50,000 letters, mostly in shaky handwriting. Tony Essex and Julia Cave, researcher, read every one of them and replied to the hundreds that sounded promising.

"We couldn't acknowledge all," Tony says, "or we would have paid out some \$2,100 for postage alone. But every letter was read and considered on its merits."

Most of the letters were on three subjects, the Battle of Ypres, the use of gas and the Battles of the Somme. There were also recollections of the idyllic summer of 1915 when the Germans were busy on the Eastern front and there was a breathing spell to get out of the trenches, smoke and drink wine. But there were also bitter memories of Paschendaele, the nightmare of the British Army.

The letters were far from great literature, but in many cases they shed new light on situations which were previously vague. The longest letter ran 172 handwritten pages, the shortest was a blunt 13 words.

There were some surprising coincidences. For instance, BBC researchers traced and interviewed the man who drove the first tank into a French village. On the way he asked directions of a British corporal. BBC-TV, quite independently, found the corporal.

Seven witnesses were found who spoke of the significant naval battle of Jutland, among them was one of the two survivors of the ill-fated cruiser "Indefatigable."

Eyewitness reports are only part of "The Great War" series. The average is ten minutes of eyewitness interviews per program, though some episodes have more scope than others.

Even some of the rejects are interesting, like the letter from a rifleman who went through the bloody fighting at Ypres:

"Nothing vivid happened. It was just hold on to what you have got." Succinctly put, this was the theme of the war.

"The Great War" series is telecast on Channel 11, each Thursday night from 9:30 to 10:00 p.m.
