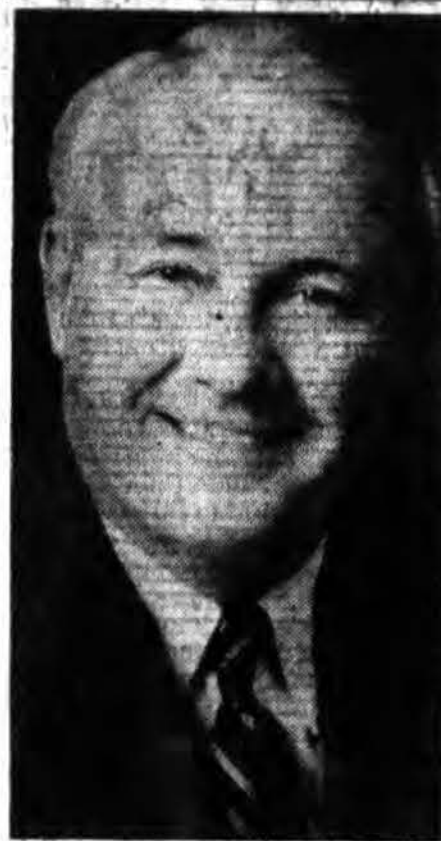

## Carpenter Seeking U.S. Seat

State Sen. Dennis E. Carpenter (R-Newport Beach) announced Friday that he will seek the U.S. Senate seat held by Democrat John Tunney in 1976.

"I have every intention of seeking the nomination," Carpenter told a luncheon gathering of Orange County newsmen. "I've been spending what free time I have going around the state 'kicking tires' to get my name known a little better," said the former state and county Republican Party chief. "That isn't easy because this is a big state."

Carpenter said his first and perhaps biggest battle will be in the Republican primary election. Several Republican candidates have either declared their intention to run or let it be known they may.

"Under no circumstances in my wildest dreams did I think no other Republicans would run in the primary," Carpenter said. "A good primary is important to people like me without a lot of name identification."

Carpenter said he doesn't expect a "bloody" primary but thinks there will be brisk competition among the front runners. The other GOP names most commonly mentioned are former White House aide Robert Finch who is a declared candidate and Pepperdine University President William Banowsky and Rep. Barry Goldwater, Jr. (R-Van Nuys).

"Finch is the best known, Banowsky is the best speaker, Goldwater is the best looking and I'm the best candidate," Carpenter quipped.

Carpenter said Tunney won't be easy to beat because he is an incumbent Democrat.

"He's vulnerable because he hasn't done anything but he won't be easy," Carpenter said.

# Terrorist Bomb Blasts Oil Firm

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A terrorist bomb ripped the 21st floor of a Standard Oil Co. of California office building Friday night while President Ford spoke at a hotel five blocks away, police said. There were no reports of injuries.

Ford was finishing a speech to a group of industrial and economic leaders when the bomb went off, but authorities said there was no indication the blast was related to Ford's day-long visit here.

The President left the hotel about 15 minutes after the explosion en route to the airport where he departed for his Easter vacation retreat at Palm Springs.

"It looked like a very powerful device," said Police Capt. Ed Laherty. "There was extensive damage to the 21st floor. It buckled walls."

A spokesman for Standard Oil, Dale Basye, said the explosive had been placed in a women's restroom.

Laherty said a preliminary search of several other floors failed to turn up additional explosives.

The San Francisco Police

Department was alerted to the impending explosion when an unidentified woman called the switchboard about 9 p.m. (PDT). She said a terrorist group calling itself the Red Guerrilla Family placed the device in the building. The caller did not mention Ford, police said.

Thirty-seven employees were evacuated from the building, at 555 Market St. in the heart of the city's financial district, and the explosion occurred about 9:35 p.m., police said.

A second call to the police switchboard about 9:40 p.m. said another bomb would go off on the 15th floor of the building at 10 p.m. No explosion occurred, but the search continued at the cordoned-off skyscraper.

Police said at first that the explosion had taken place on the 15th floor of the structure.

## 5th Suspect In Jewelry Heist Held

A bargain basement offer for sale of costly turquoise and silver Navajo Indian jewelry led to the jailing Friday of a fifth suspect in the \$100,000 holdup of a native American crafts shop in Costa Mesa two weeks ago.

The case was broken beginning Thursday afternoon in Anaheim, following a tip by an unidentified merchant that he had been offered the prized items at low prices.

Anaheim detectives were told \$50,000 worth of rings, bracelets and squash blossom necklaces were being offered at \$16,000 and began probing recent jewelry theft teletype reports.

A rendezvous to examine the merchandise led to the arrest of three suspects at the scene and two more Thursday night and Friday.

Charged with armed robbery and possession of stolen property are:

Costa Mesa Police Detective Sgt. Sam Cordeiro said that items recovered with the series of arrests have been identified as those taken from Navajo Trading, 2432 Newport Blvd., two weeks ago.

"We think we've recovered about three-fourths of it," he explained.

A Chicano male and his female companion armed with weapons and walkie-talkies entered the store March 19 and handcuffed

## Malpractice Suit Nets \$55,000

REDWOOD CITY (UPI) — In what may be a landmark decision involving malpractice by orthodontists, a jury has awarded \$55,000 to a young woman who claimed dental work caused her so much discomfort she could not eat normally.

Alyson Clark, 20, Menlo Park, a junior at the University of Redlands, won the award in San Mateo County Superior Court against Dr. William Laughlin, an orthodontist with offices in Menlo Park.

Dr. Shirl Fox, a Palo Alto dentist who was codefendant, was exonerated by the jury in Judge Frank Blum's courtroom.

Miss Clark sued for \$500,000 for negligence against the two dental practitioners. Her award of \$55,000 will cover \$1,500 in fees she paid to Dr. Laughlin, about \$7,000 to have her dental work corrected, and the remainder for "pain and suffering," according to her attorney, Robert Schulz of Palo Alto.

The plaintiff went to Dr. Laughlin when she was 14 for correction of a malocclusion, or bite problem. During the next five years the orthodontist he performed caused more malocclusion, not less, Schulz said. The result was pressure and irritation at the joint where the jawbone and skull come together.

Miss Clark suffered increasing pain and could not open her mouth wide enough to eat many normal foods, the attorney said.

## Lending a Hand Coast Couple Aids Viet Vet

Lester and Laurel Fasig of Leisure World in Laguna Hills would rather spend their money helping people than on liquor and tobacco.

They got the chance to help again this week when they learned of the plight of a Watsonville man whose Vietnamese wife and two children were stranded in Saigon.

"When they heard a television report that Randy Carson planned to sell one of his eyes in desperation to raise the money to rescue his family, they didn't wait long to act."

"We called the television station and told them to contact the young man immediately," Mrs. Fasig, 60, said.

Then they jumped in their camper and headed for Watsonville to give Carson—a man they had never met—the \$3,500 he needed to fly to Vietnam and bring his family back.

"If you've got to do something, you have to grab the bull by the horns and do it," said Fasig, 77.

"He was beside himself," Mrs. Fasig said. "Time was of the essence, so we figured we had to do what we could."

Young Carson, 28, left Vietnam last October, but left his pregnant wife and three-year-old son in Saigon. He hoped to call for them as soon as he found a job.

He has not found a job and was living with his mother in Watsonville when the Vietnam situation worsened. He became desperate.

Last week, his wife bore the second child, a son, which the couple named Patrick for one of Carson's friends killed in Vietnam.

"He himself was wounded three times and now he's limited

only to office work. But he can't find a job and so his family is going to have to move in with his mother," Mrs. Fasig said.

The Fasigs were pleased to discover that Carson doesn't drink or smoke and was "an exceptionally nice boy."

He was "just flabbergasted" by their offer, they said.

"Helping people is kind of our religion," Fasig said. Since retiring from a restaurant business in Long Beach several years ago, they have helped several other families in need.

"We never spent our money on liquor or tobacco," Fasig said. "We figure, it's better to spend it this way."

The Fasigs drove Carson from Watsonville to San Francisco early Thursday morning, in time to get him to the necessary offices when they opened at 8 a.m.

They helped him arrange his visa, renew his passport, get some required shots and buy his plane ticket. While there, their contribution attracted the attention of other people.

A Huntington Beach woman was injured Friday when the car in which she was riding collided with a moving van.

Police said fire rescue personnel worked about 20 minutes to free her from the wreckage. She had head injuries and possibly a fractured ankle, police said.

A witness at the accident scene, at Bluebird Lane and Robinwood Drive, also was treated at the hospital after she apparently went into traumatic shock, officers said.

Paramedics at first feared Sandra Franklin, 31, had suffered a heart attack, but they later said she apparently went into shock. Her address was not available.

Mrs. Cresci was a passenger in a car driven by her son, Anthony, 21, of the same address.

Police said the Cresci car collided at about 7:07 a.m. with a moving van driven by Gerald Dee Neve, 25, of 5152 Skylark Drive, Huntington Beach.

Cresci and another passenger, Ethel Yuppa, of 16191 Melody Lane, were treated for injuries and released. Neve was not injured, according to police accounts.

## C5 Crash Remains Mystery

SAIGON (UPI) — U.S. officials today said there was no indication of sabotage in the crash of a giant cargo plane that killed more than 150 persons, most of them Vietnamese war orphans bound for new homes in America.

"I'm trying to knock down this sabotage story," a U.S. embassy spokesman said. "We have absolutely no indication of any sabotage whatsoever."

A Pentagon spokesman said every possibility would be looked into, but added, "At this time it is inappropriate to speculate on the cause" of the crash, which killed at least 178 of the 319 persons aboard.

The plane, a huge Air Force C5 Galaxy, plunged into a ricefield, broke into three pieces and burst into flames a mile from the runway Friday as it tried to make an emergency landing at Tan Son Nhut airfield.

South Vietnamese military sources said three militiamen on the ground were killed when the plane plunged into a muddy ricefield in an area partly controlled by the Viet Cong.

Officials said the plane was climbing at an altitude of 23,000 feet 40 miles from Saigon when two big "clamshell" doors at the rear of the plane blew off.

The doors were large enough for three jeeps to drive through abreast, and when they were gone the air pressure inside

## Rush to Help Vietnamese Jams Phones

WASHINGTON (UPI) — So many people called a special toll-free number to offer help or inquire about South Vietnamese refugees that the system became overloaded and officials had to change the number.

The Agency for International Development, which set up the phone service, said it tied up all the toll-free facilities of the East Coast Telephone System. The new number is 800 368-1180.

It is intended for persons who want to offer assistance to refugees. Personnel will refer callers to organizations through which they can give money or other help.

Aid requested that the number not be used for inquiries about adopting orphans. The agency said Americans interested in adopting Vietnamese children should contact local welfare and adoption agencies. The orphans now being brought to the United States already have been placed in American homes.

## Radio Mentor Killed Packard Bell Founder, 3 Others on Boat

Willard Bell, 69, a Balboa Island resident and founder of Packard Bell Electronics, died with three other men Thursday when Bell's Newport Beach-based sportfisher Cinco sank off the coast of Baja California.

The other three victims were identified by the U.S. Coast Guard as John Blaney of Fountain Valley; Raymond Fannett of Los Angeles; and Ted Peacock of Long Beach.

There bodies were to have been flown out of Baja California and back to the U.S. Friday for autopsies today.

Bell and several older brothers began their firm by making coin-operated radios in a West Hollywood store front plant in

1926. The firm grew to international size, then became a division of Teledyne. Bell retired from the business in 1960.

The four bodies were found floating in lifejackets shortly after 9 a.m. Thursday, about three miles off the beach from Frailes Bay, 39 miles northeast of Cabo San Lucas.

A U.S. fishing boat found them floating near the splintered wreckage of Bell's 36-foot, motor-powered sportfisher, according to the U.S. Coast Guard.

The bodies were first taken to a small Mexican port, San Jose, then were to be flown out in a plane chartered by Bell's youngest son, Terry, 28.

Bell and Fannett were the only

crew members on board when the 30-year-old Cinco left Newport Harbor Feb. 23 for the fishing trip. The others joined them in Cabo San Lucas.

Bell's wife, Hazel, was en route to Cabo San Lucas Thursday and did not learn about the sinking until she arrived in the Baja California port.

The sportfisher was powered by twin diesels which ruled out the possibility of fire or explosion, according to the Coast Guard.

The crew of the Pez Espada who found the bodies said all were in their life jackets and the bodies appeared to be in good condition. There were also no signs of fire on board the Cinco, they said.

# Ford Asks Extension of Jobless Pay

President Ford says he will ask Congress to extend until the end of 1976 a supplemental benefits program that entitles most workers to as much as 65 weeks of unemployment compensation.

Ford, on a working vacation in California, told a meeting of the San Francisco Bay Area Council Friday night that his request for

an 18-month extension of the program would be sent to Capitol Hill next week. Without congressional action, the program would expire June 30.

Although he made no direct mention of government statistics issued earlier in the day showing that nationwide unemployment climbed to 8.7 percent, Ford emphasized jobless benefits in his speech.

He said he also was recommending improvements in aid to the 12 million persons in the workforce not regularly covered by unemployment insurance. He proposed to extend the present one-year temporary program for such persons to the end of 1976 and extend the benefit period from 26 to 39 weeks.

The President added that "in the expectation that the economy

will show improvement before the year is out, I am going to ask that these extended programs have a built-in procedure to reduce or terminate the program when the unemployment rate decreases to a specified level." He did not say what that level might be.

"The procedures will concentrate the limited resources in those areas experiencing the

greatest unemployment," he said.

Meanwhile, the unemployment picture in the nation's auto industry brightened a bit Friday, as manufacturers announced that worker layoffs will decline by 21,000 next week and that all but three car and truck assembly plants will be in operation.

Of the industry's 712,000 blue collar workers, 215,930 will be on

layoff next week, the lowest number since the week of March 10. A total of 237,153 workers were on furlough this week.

And the Federal Reserve Board reported that consumers, spurred by a last chance to take advantage of automobile price rebates, increased their indebtedness in February for the first time in four months.

Result: We had my ring from Peking in less than four days, thanks to a telephone call halfway around the world and jet air travel.

It made me wonder about The Good Old American Way when it comes to carrying the mail.

**I WAS REMINDED** of this again recently when forced to pay a \$2 late charge on a monthly payment which had been mailed here on the Orange Coast.

It took 12 days to travel five blocks.

## Signs of Panic

### Rumors Outlawed As Tension Mounts

**SAIGON (UPI)**—The military commander of Saigon threatened today to arrest any resident spreading rumors or attempting to leave Vietnam illegally. U.S. officials warned of possible anti-American outbursts.

Lt. Gen. Nguyen Van Minh, who has vowed to defend Saigon and keep the city calm, banned both evacuation of the capital and the entrance of war refugees into Saigon, government spokesmen said.

"Those who disseminate false information may be put under house arrest," a statement issued by Minh's capital military district office said. The office enforces security in the Saigon area.

Residents of Saigon have shown signs of panic for the past week. Today there were long lines again in front of all locally owned banks in the capital as depositors withdrew all their money.

Airlines reported all flights out of Saigon booked for more than a

week, with long standby lists for every flight.

U.S. officials meanwhile said they feared an anti-American backlash because of President Nguyen Van Thieu's speech to the nation Friday night.

### Lawyers Offer Adoption Aid

Free legal services for adoption proceedings will be offered by the Orange County Bar Association's family law section to county residents adopting Vietnamese orphans.

A spokesman for the bar association said Friday the association's executive committee has approved the offer of free legal help.

The family law division will not help parents find children or children find parents, but will offer its services for court proceedings when they are needed, the spokesman added.

tion of the news media and they told the story to the nationwide press.

At 7 p.m. Thursday, Carson was on his way and is scheduled to arrive in Saigon sometime today (Saturday).

"We told him to get out of Vietnam as fast as he could," Mrs. Fasig said. "We advised him to take any plane out—even if it was to Hong Kong or Bangkok."

Since the story of Carson's plight and his promise to sell an eye if he couldn't raise the plane fare, money has been coming in from across the U.S. and Canada.

"Anything that anybody can do should be done," Mrs. Fasig said. "The way we look at it, those Vietnamese children are human beings too. Many of the orphans are half-American, and you have to take care of your own."

To the Fasigs, Randy Carson, a troubled man they had never met, and his waiting family, became their own.

dropped instantly.

This apparently set up a powerful suction effect that swept an emergency side door back through the plane and out into the tail, damaging the hydraulic controls.

The pilot, Capt. Dennis Traynor, said he could not control the rudder, elevators, or flaps on the tail, but was able to keep limited control and turned the plane back over the coastal town of Vung Tau.

At 2,000 feet he discovered it was going down too fast. He tried to increase power and regain altitude but the giant craft plunged into swamp five miles north of downtown Saigon.

It touched down, bounced across a stream, hit the ground again, caught fire, lost its wings and came to a rest in a rice paddy.

The crash came within minutes after taking off from Tan Son Nhut with the first of 2,000 orphans President Ford had announced would be brought to the United States as part of "Operation Babylift."

Responding to questions about troubles in the ranks of the GOP, Carpenter said he thinks voter disaffection has spread to politics in general, not just one party.

"The people are cynical now and not easy to sway," Carpenter said. "The parties per se are not the things attracting voters but carefully selected candidates."

"The Republican Party had a disaster last year and I'd be a fool not to admit it," he said. "But the key is not how the people voted but the fact that 56 percent didn't vote at all. They must be brought back into the system."

Carpenter said the GOP in Orange County, longtime party stronghold, has been disoriented and its structure physically weakened by the Watergate scandal. But he said its new leaders are gradually pulling the party out of its tailspin.

clerks Julie Cook and Hana Fish.

## NY Suspect Held

### Extortion Try Foiled by FBI

**NEW YORK (AP)**—A man described as a would-be bank extortionist set off an explosive device Friday as police and the FBI closed in on him in front of Macy's department store.

One FBI agent suffered minor facial burns in the capture of the man in Herald Square, one of the world's busiest crossroads. A bomb squad official said the device consisted of a maze of wires and detonators, but that there were no high explosives.

The FBI identified the man as Edward Williams about 30, of Paterson, N.J.

Target of the extortion attempt was the Bankers Trust Co. Authorities said the man first demanded \$200,000 then scaled down the amount to \$61,000.

Police said Williams entered an uptown Fifth Avenue branch of Bankers Trust about 10 a.m., told officials he had planted a bomb in the bank and was carrying a second bomb in a suitcase. He demanded \$200,000, then walked out of the bank without waiting for a reply.

Later, according to authorities, the same man showed up at a Bankers Trust branch in the Empire State building at Fifth Avenue and 34th street, one block east of Herald Square.

Again, he demanded \$200,000 but walked out after the manager said it would take some time to assemble the cash.

However, about 1 p.m. the manager of the Empire State branch received a telephone call from the man, who said he had decided to settle for \$6,000. The manager arranged a rendezvous at Macy's, on a corner of Sixth Avenue and 34th street.

Authorities had been notified earlier. Detective Thomas Hallinan approached the corner carrying a package with Bankers Trust markings on the outside and was approached by Williams.

Then fellow-policemen and FBI agents jumped the man. At the same time, a suitcase the man was carrying started to fizzle and erupt in flames. One FBI agent suffered minor burns before the fire died out.

Police said Williams was being charged with bank robbery, extortion, possession of an explosive and possession of a weapon.

### Ford Choice For Interior Post Assailed

**SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)**—Conservationists have launched their attack against President Ford's nomination of former Wyoming Gov. Stanley K. Hathaway as Secretary of Interior by charging he will "sell off every oil and coal field in sight."

"It looks like the President has picked a man who is committed to pushing energy development at all costs, regardless of environmental consequences," Michael McCloskey, executive director of the Sierra Club, said. "Hathaway undoubtedly will rush to sell off every oil and coal field in sight, while cutting every environmental corner he can."

But Hathaway said some "very hard decisions have to be made" to achieve energy self-sufficiency.

### Nixon Tape Sale Nixed By Sirica

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica refused Friday to allow broadcasting and sale of phonograph records of the White House Watergate tapes.

He denied an application by the television networks and a record company to reproduce tapes

played at the recent Watergate cover-up trial, saying:

"Marketing of the tapes would probably involve mass merchandising techniques designed to generate excitement and an air of ridicule to stimulate sales."

### Orphan Protest

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)**—A group of professors and relief workers Friday condemned the Vietnam orphan airlift as immoral and said it amounted to "kidnaping children who are the future of Vietnam."

"Instead of airlifting children out, we should be airlifting supplies in, to help rebuild a society we had so much hand in destroying," said Robert McAfee Brown, humanities professor at Stanford University.

### Cambodian Strafing

**PHNOM PENH (UPI)**—Cambodian government pilots today reported destroying part of an insurgent flotilla of up to 100 sampans moving north in an apparent attempt to bolster Communist forces besieging Phnom Penh.

### King Killing

**MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI)**—Civil rights leader Rev. Jesse Jackson told marchers observing the seventh anniversary of the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Friday he believes the CIA and the FBI were involved in the assassination.

Jackson said he will make a personal appeal to attorney general Edward Levi to reopen the investigation of the murder.

## Candied Caper Surprise Inside? Agents

**CHICAGO (UPI)**—A shipping foreman who allegedly tried to sell \$47,000 worth of stolen Cracker Jacks was in for a much bigger surprise than the usual toys found in the boxes of candy-coated popcorn and peanuts.

William Parilli, 34, Chicago, Friday was arrested and charged with felony theft after he allegedly sold 1,300 cases — each containing 144 boxes of Cracker Jacks — to undercover agents for \$8,900.

The Cook County state's attorneys office said hot Cracker Jacks probably could be sold to Mafia-operated theaters.

Authorities said they were tipped to the hot Cracker Jack sales when a security agent for Cracker Jacks' parent company, Borden Inc., told them he had noticed a continuing loss of the candy at the firm's Bedford Park plant.

Investigators finally arranged to buy some \$47,000 in Cracker Jacks from Parilli, who is shipping for them at the Bedford Park plant. Police said on Friday, Parilli loaded the Cracker Jacks onto a trailer, accepted the \$8,900, and then ran toward an adjoining marshmallow factory when police revealed their identity.

"We were concerned that he might try to throw the money into one of the vats of marshmallows," an investigator said.

## And Kim Makes Four Valley Family 'Grateful' for Vietnamese Child

Duong Kim Le Marchitello helped make world news Wednesday when she flew from war-torn Vietnam on a World Airways cargo plane.

But dressed in pink ruffles in her new Fountain Valley home Friday, the two-month-old girl was interested only in eating and sleeping.

The war orphan, found abandoned at birth, also was getting acquainted with her new mother, Maria Marchitello and her new

sister, Marisa, 2.

But Kim has yet to meet her father, Dan, a Secret Service agent. He was called to New York because his mother is seriously ill.

"He left at noon Thursday and Kim arrived at 8 that night," Mrs. Marchitello explained. "We are just so grateful," she continued.

Mrs. Marchitello said her husband telephoned this morning and told her about the tragic crash of a U.S. plane carrying other orphans.

"Kim could have been on that plane."

The Marchitellos, unable to have a second child of their own, started checking with adoption agencies.

"There is a five-year waiting list for American children under three," Mrs. Marchitello said, "so we started looking into foreign adoptions."

When Kim arrived Thursday night, the couple still had not completed all the "red tape" involved.

"We just went for our first interview Wednesday," Mrs. Marchitello said. A few hours later, they learned their new daughter was on the way.

The state Department of Health still has to complete a home study before the couple's adoption can be completed.

"They told us Wednesday it would be two or three months before we could send for her," the young mother said. "I thought to myself, 'I don't think we have two or three months.'"

The couple had been sending money for Kim's support since she was found abandoned shortly after birth.

If the World Airways plane hadn't taken the children out of the country Wednesday, without permission, "we might never have gotten Kim," her mother said. "There ought to be more people like that."

"We took her to the pediatrician this morning, and she is in perfect health," Mrs. Marchitello continued.

Then Marisa came in carrying a blanket for her sister and bringing along a doll.

"Mommy, mommy Kim needs a bottle," the brown-eyed youngster insisted.

So both mother and daughter worked together to feed the new member of their family.

## Hughes Plane Gets Reprieve From Blades

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Dismantling of the largest aircraft ever built—Howard Hughes' famed "Spruce Goose"—has been postponed for one year following widespread public protest over the dissection plan, officials said Friday.

Officials of Hughes' Summa Corp., owners of the huge eight-engine sea plane, and the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., said the decision was made jointly following a general outpouring of mail and other protests from around the country.

Summa donated 50-feet of the craft's wing to the Smithsonian last February and the firm planned to cut the rest of the historic plane into pieces for display at museums throughout the country.

The craft—officially designated the HK1—has a 320-foot wingspan, some 100 feet longer than Lockheed's giant C5 cargo plane, the world's largest operational aircraft. The Goose's engines once developed over 280,000 horsepower.

The airplane was actually built of birch plywood during World War II at a time when metal was scarce.

A 14-year-old Huntington Beach boy was in stable condition in a hospital today after he fell off the fender of a moving car and was run over Thursday.

Police said Michael Alan Dorrel, 21372 Pensacola Circle, and a companion jumped onto a car driven by Jodie Ayn Newman, 16, of 1731 Labrador Drive, Costa Mesa.

She told officers she asked them to get off, and when she hit the brakes, Dorrel fell beneath the wheels. The accident occurred at 5:15 p.m. at Pensacola and Peppertree Drive, police said.

The youth is being treated at Pacifica Hospital in Huntington Beach.

## Carpenter Bill

# Public Employee Harbor Strike Opposed Waters

A state constitutional amendment that would deny public employees the right to strike has been introduced by State Sen. Dennis Carpenter (R-Newport Beach).

In a Santa Ana press conference Friday, Carpenter defended his proposal and sharply criticized other pending state legislation that would:

— Give public employees the right to strike

— Provide for mandatory binding arbitration in public employee labor disputes

— Set up a closed union shop for public employees.

"I am opposed to this legislation because it affects public convenience and safety," Carpenter said. "We cannot allow public employees the same choice as those in private enterprise."

Carpenter said a long strike by teachers, for example, could do irreparable harm to the learning process of young children.

"And can you imagine with crime the way it is today the police saying 'Sorry, buddy, we can't help you because we're out on strike.'"

On the matter of compulsory binding arbitration, Carpenter said too much power over the pocketbook would be placed in the hands of an arbitration panel.

"That panel could decide what amount of tax dollars would be needed to get the employees back on the job," Carpenter said. "Who elected the arbitrator that he can come in and raise tax rates without giving local officials the right to vote on them."

And the Newport Beach legislator said a closed shop concept for public employees "goes too far."

"Under this concept, you can only hire who is sent to you from the union hall," Carpenter said.

"I can't imagine that in police and education particularly," he added.

Carpenter also touched on several other bills he has authored or co-authored during the current session of the legislature.

"I am the lead author of Senate Bill 397 on the medical malpractice issue," he said.

The bill would establish a workman's compensation-type of panel for doctors and patients, sets up degrees of negligence and

"hacks attorney's fees."

Carpenter said the current state of affairs give patients a "guaranteed health system that we can't afford."

On other matters, the Senator:

— Said he thinks the bill authorizing UC Irvine's purchase of Orange County Medical Center will have a tough time in the legislature and a tougher time clearing Gov. Edmund G. Brown, Jr.

— Said he has introduced legislation to repeal the state's fair trade laws and put the marketplace on a more competitive footing.

Officials of the Huntington Harbour Homeowners Association have gone to court in a bid to prevent what they claim are the plans of two couples to make structural additions to their homes.

Named as defendants in the Orange County Superior Court action filed by the association are Jack O. Horn and Theodore N. Brown and Kenneth J. and Dorothy J. Bourguignon.

## Threatened Valley Teachers Keep Jobs

Fifty-four teachers in the Fountain Valley School District, who were told earlier they might lose their jobs next year, have been rehired by the school board.

The group includes untenured teachers as well as all 20 music teachers, all 10 district psychologists and two community school program coordinators.

About 130 parents attended a school board meeting two weeks ago asking that the music program continue.

The teachers, along with about

Specialists with the California Department of Fish and Game will arrive in Newport Beach April 10 with 5,000 new finned citizens to join the fish population of Newport Harbor.

Billed as the second stocking in as many years of striped bass in the harbor, the planting will involve the introduction of fish raised from eggs in a hatchery in Northern California.

The second planting follows studies which have proven that the species prized by anglers is capable of surviving and thriving in the harbor.

Several catches of the fish from the first planting have been reported and the fish have shown good growth rates and general health, spokesmen said.

The stocking is but one part of a growing program which calls for stocking 20,000 stripers in Southern California coastal waters this year and next.

The latest proposed plant in Newport Beach Harbor will raise the total of young bass in the harbor to 12,500.

If the program takes and the species establishes strongly in the harbor, anglers will find a fighting new species to try for.

In Northern California fresh and salt water areas, stripers have become a prized catch.

The striped-bass program is one of two active experiments by the DFG related to introducing new sportfish to Orange Coast waters.

100 other district employees, were notified of their possible layoff after a 67-cent tax override failed by fewer than 150 votes March 4.

## Home Gardeners

Get Booklet  
On Organics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Home gardeners, particularly those who are spading up backyards for the first time, might want to look a little more closely at "organic" methods of growing vegetables and what the term means.

The Agriculture Department has several handy publications which can help explain what organic farming — and that includes gardening — is all about. Chances are the USDA

explanations will not settle arguments, but they do offer scientific information which can be understood by novices as well as experts.

One of the newest publications is a 52-page bulletin called "The Effect of Soils and Fertilizers on Human and Animal Nutrition." It was published this month by the department's Agricultural Research Service and the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with Cornell University's experiment station.

IN IT, experts explain that a basic function of all plants is that they convert sunlight, water and essential elements into materials used in their growth. For purposes of discussion, organic materials in the soil are those of animal and plant origin. Inorganic sources generally are the commercially prepared fertilizers.

"In the plant, and in the body of the human or animal that eats the plant, these essential nutrient elements have the same effect, regardless of whether they were added to the soil in the form of organic fertilizers or as inorganic chemical fertilizers," the booklet says.

The pamphlet on soils and fertilizers can be ordered for 80 cents per copy from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D.C. 20402.

Enjoy Azaleas  
For Half Year

By careful selection, the California gardener can enjoy color from Azaleas for half the year. This may seem incredible to those whose experience with this free-flowering family is limited, but it's the truth.

Indicative of the Azalea family's willingness to perform under growing conditions in the Golden State, is the fact that many Belgian Indica varieties show color as early as September or October reaching their blooming peak just before the holidays.

As the early birds begin to fade, they are joined by other Belgian Indicas which put on a lovely New Year's show of color to be joined in short order by magnificent Rutherfordian hybrids, then Kurume varieties, then the Southern Indicas.

And, that doesn't complete the list. Before the above evergreen varieties have completed flowering, the deciduous Mollis hybrids break their winter's rest with a brilliant burst of color. By this time, it is late spring or early summer when the last blooms fall.

AZALEAS ARE favorite landscape shrubs throughout the state. They are also on the top of the list in the florist trade, but that's a tribute to their beauty and

not an indication that they have to be grown under greenhouse conditions to thrive.

The deciduous Mollis hybrids are found mostly in Northern California. The evergreen varieties do well in all areas, including Inland Valley gardens. Here, Azaleas should be protected from hot summer sun.

Prime consideration for growing Azaleas is to provide good drainage. Your nurseryman can recommend a planter mix for such acid loving plants as Azaleas. This organic matter will provide the best environment for the shallow-rooted plants. The composition of the material aids in retaining moisture. Azaleas want to be kept moist — but not soggy.

Most Azaleas prefer shade or part shade; the so-called Sun Azaleas (Southern Indicas) will tolerate a fair share more sun, but they aren't recommended for planting in lieu of a sun-loving landscape shrub.

PLANTS — Last week we talked about freeway daisies which turned out to be osteospermum. This week we are going to talk about marguerite daisies which turn out to be chrysanthemum frutescens. Daisies in general are confusing because the word daisy really describes a type of flower rather than a classification of plants. Consequently, we have commonly called gloriosa daisies, african daisies, transvaal daisies, etc. all of which are called daisies but all of which belong to different families.

The plant we are talking about today is the good-old-fashioned symbol-of-summer daisy, the marguerite. This is the one with pale yellow or white or pink petals radiating outward from a sun yellow center, the flower that has graced countless floral arrangements from lovers' handfuls of posies to bridal bouquets, from empty soup cans to crystal vases. The marguerite is the world champion cut flower and in fact benefits greatly from the periodic light pruning of flower cutting.

Marguerites planted in the spring (now) grow at an incredible rate. They require a full sun exposure, generous watering and good drainage. They make excellent borders in big gardens or colorful background plants in small gardens. Marguerites thrive in containers of all types. Although marguerites are a perennial plant, they should generally be replaced every two to three years because they tend to become woody at the base and less responsive after pruning.

Marguerites are available in four sizes at Rogers Gardens: pony paks, quarts, gallons and five gallons. Your choice of size should depend on your pocket book and your patience. Whatever size you choose, you can count on an abundance of spring and summer blooms.

PRODUCTS — Sphagnum moss is such a part of our operation at Rogers Gardens that many of us take it for granted that everyone knows what it is and the uses it has. Sphagnum (pronounced like space rather than sphere) moss is a stringy green and brown moss that grows wild in the forests of Oregon and Washington where we gather it and ship it to Rogers Gardens in bales. Here it is transferred into plastic bags each of which holds 1150 cubic inches (or about the size of a small pillow) and sells for \$3.25.

We use sphagnum moss in great quantities to lime our wire baskets so that they will hold soil and plants and retain moisture. One bag will just line a 14 inch basket. Similarly we sell lots of bags of moss to customers who are making their own baskets. Sphagnum moss can also be used with indoor plants to dress up exposed dirt, in air layering, in terrariums and in countless other garden chores.

From time to time there have been sphagnum moss shortages, so Rogers has stockpiled a big supply. Consequently we have been offering sphagnum moss at 20% below our normal price.

Her appearance at the luncheon marked the beginning of a formal campaign to involve citizens throughout Newport Beach. She said later that she plans to speak before other civic groups in coming months.

"EVEN IF ITS PRIMARY EFFECT is in Corona del Mar, traffic is backed up on Coast Highway and affects all of Newport Beach," she said, explaining her reason for the broader effort.

In about three months, the city's Planning Commission and City Council will take another look at the general plan as it relates to Pacific Coast Highway in Corona del Mar.

"Before then, I'd like people to get involved and decide which alternative they would like to see put into effect," she said.

The alternatives are diverse ways of diverting

## Privacy Law Protects You

**Data Banks  
May See  
Withdrawals**

Painstaking research and four years' effort finally have furnished the American public with its first comprehensive picture of the vast record-keeping system the U.S. government maintains. It contains personal data on millions of Americans.

Federal agencies have at least 858 data banks, or record systems, nearly 90 percent of them already computerized, and these contain at least one and a quarter billion records on individual Americans.

Describing this vast array of records, former Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr. (D-N.C.), who headed an ad hoc Senate group that probed into the matter, said:

"THESE 858 data banks vary a great deal in size and type. They contain all sorts of data — from Civil Service personnel records to an inventory of electrical power users' household appliances computerized by the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Information about 200,000 gun owners and two million coin collectors is kept on Treasury Department computers. An Army general has computerized his protocol lists. The Air Force military personnel."

THE HUGE task of protecting this information from misuse currently is under way among federal agencies, as a result of the Privacy Act of 1974, passed in the waning days of the 93rd Congress and signed by President Ford on Jan. 1.

It is generally agreed that the new law, which also establishes a study commission, barely scratches the surface of the body of laws and regulations likely to be enacted to regulate the collection, maintenance and privacy of the data.

Privacy, as a public policy issue, has been developing over the last decade. The year 1974 was eyed as crucial because it tended to bring to a close years of

intensive study by experts and the Congress and launched a period of experimental legislation and regulation. Many states also are getting into the act.

While computers and their mass appetite have caused some alarm, mainly out of fear of bureaucratic control of personal information, the issue is looked upon as one of men and basic freedoms.

The new privacy law, which will require many months to implement, broadly seeks to:

- Safeguard individual privacy by protecting individuals against misuse of federal records.

- Provide individuals with access to records concerning themselves for the purpose of ascertaining their accuracy and fairness.

Federal agencies will be required to notify individuals of their rights when information is sought, to publish yearly notices of the existence and character of their record-keeping systems —

in effect, outlawing secret systems — to establish rules for access to records, and to keep their data up-to-date.

THE ACT ALSO imposes a moratorium on federal, state and local governments denying benefits to individuals because of their refusal to disclose their social security numbers, unless the disclosure is required by federal statute.

Agencies that request an individual to disclose his social security number must inform the individual if the disclosure is mandatory or voluntary and what uses will be made of it.

The use of the social security number as a universal identifier also is to be brought under controls, in keeping with overall objectives of the individual's right to privacy.

## Modern Living Depends on Energy Innovations

SACRAMENTO — At the current rate of increase in the use of electrical and natural gas power in the state, it will be but a short time before we will have only two alternatives to cutting power to our cities.

Those two alternatives, in terms of the resources immediately available to us, are coal and nuclear energy. There are a number of factors that must be considered before California as a state, as well as the United States as a nation, commits itself to any new direction, or combination of directions in energy.

The safety of the environment, the economic impact on society and the capability of utilities to provide adequate power in the face of ever increasing power consumption by a growing population are among those factors.

COAL, AS IT is currently used for the generation of electricity, contributes greatly to air pollution. With rare exceptions, coal is buried deep in the earth, and coal mining is one of the most dangerous occupations in the country. In the last 75 years, more than 100,000 coal miners have died while mining coal from the ground.

The count of miners who suffer from black lung disease easily goes into the millions.

The only way that the coal industry could increase production enough to meet the growing demands of utilities would be through strip mining. The practice of strip mining is probably the most destructive force that could be applied to any portion of the earth's surface. And no matter how much production is stepped up, the source is a finite one.

It goes unsaid that the atmosphere would suffer greatly from a giant increase in the use of coal for generating electricity. One enormous benefit of

nuclear power, as opposed to coal, is that it is made of entirely new type of fuel that need not be mined in quantities that destroy large sections of the earth's surface. It produces enough heat to generate many times more kilowatts of electricity, pound for pound, than coal and does not leave tons of unburned hydrocarbons in the air.

In terms of safety to the population, it cannot be denied that a greater risk is involved in the use of nuclear power than is involved in less productive types of energy. Reactor accidents and radioactive waste disposal are very real things and they must be dealt with by all the technology

that man can muster.

Disputes remain as to the ability of science to safely transport and store nuclear waste. In the spotlight of opposition is Ralph Nader, a consumer advocate, who doesn't trust man's ability to provide protection for himself from the ominous power of the atom.

HE STATES that "The underlying point is that no society should rest its energy future in a fragile nuclear fission basket when the risk of accident and sabotage are at a point of catastrophic consequences unparalleled in the history of mankind."

The Atomic Energy Com-

mission, and most notably its chairperson, Dixy Ray, maintains Nader's case is based on "inaccuracies and innuendo."

Even giving the benefit of the doubt to Ralph Nader, who is probably not totally in the dark, it seems that a society in the energy situation we are in would turn its efforts to addressing the problems of nuclear fission safety and of radioactive waste disposal.

It is only through a concerted effort to bring into play the very best forms of energy we have at our disposal that we will be able to continue in the type of environment to which we have become accustomed.

## Church Criticizes Corporations

The long struggle waged by many church people against the war in Vietnam has had at least some fallout — a growing skepticism about the role large corporations play in both American and international life.

During the years of the United States' most intense involvement in Indochina such groups as Clergy and Laity Concerned and the American Friends Service Committee became first aware and then concerned about the role such corporations as Dow Chemical and Honeywell played in supporting the war, by the manufacture of munitions or weapons-related material for the war effort.

This concern also dovetailed with other issues that were being raised in the churches, such as the role American corporations were

playing in aiding white-minority rule in South Africa and Rhodesia.

THE RESULT was the formation of "conscience coalitions," voting church investment proxies at corporate stockholders' meeting for resolutions aimed at changing a firm's policy with regard to weapons manufacture and overseas investment.

The movement did not end with the move of direct American involvement in Vietnam.

Several churches have already announced that they will be voting proxies at this spring's round of shareholder meetings, and the Friends and CALC are involved in an ambitious lobbying and protest campaign against the B1 bomber.

For Mike Riesch and other members of the Corporate Action

Project, however, such actions by themselves are not enough.

"We're trying to go beyond the ideology of the antiwar movement and ask the question of what the economy should really be about," he said.

ACCORDING to Riesch, the Corporate Action Project is trying to serve "as a resource center for a whole network of activist groups."

"Corporate capitalism is at a dead end," he said, adding that people are looking for economic institutions that "fill a community need and that people can participate in and have some control over."

As a resource group, the CAP had as its first major project the publication of the "Corporate Action Guide," a 100-page-plus

booklet analyzing the rise and impact of corporate power and suggesting ways local groups can investigate the role of corporations in their local communities.

The guide looks at the role of corporations in America on a global scale and also goes inside corporations to explain how policies are created and implemented.

In addition it looks at the possibilities and strategies for developing opposition to corporate policies, how such a campaign might be carried out, and the subject of alternatives to present capitalist corporations.

IN ADDITION to being a resource organization for church groups still concerned about corporate activities, the CAP is also interested in trying to bring church groups and organized labor closer together.

"They're both victims of the corporate power structure," Riesch said.

At this point, the project has not been able to find a lot of funding and is existing primarily on the proceeds of sales of the corporate action guide.

But Riesch has faith that the churches, whose concern about the corporate role in America has not diminished with the passing of Vietnam, need and will support a center like the Corporate Action Project.

## Letters From Ellie

Dear Ellie,

I have seen pictures where prairie dogs look as if they were really kissing each other. Why do they do this?

Dear Lynn

Prairie dogs are very social animals and have a variety of interesting characteristics such as "kissing."

Prairie dog "towns" which are now becoming scarce, can have populations numbering over 1000. Each burrow, usually marked by a mound of earth to prevent flooding in the wet season, houses a family unit consisting generally of a male, three females and an assortment of young.

Young prairie dogs are well cared for. They often visit other burrows and are taken in and treated as members of the family, frequently spending the night. Babies are nursed by any mother, and all the infants are groomed and nuzzled affectionately by any male.

These animals live in a highly social organization. Those who happen to be standing near burrow mounds act as sentinels and if they see danger approaching, utter sharp, dog-like barks. On hearing this warning, every other prairie dog rushes for cover.

On quiet warm days, they flatten themselves like rugs and bask in the sun near their mounds. There is much "kissing" among friends as they go about grazing, exploring or mound repairing. The young exchange kisses; adults kiss the little ones

and other adults. The kissing seems to be a form of greeting and a means of identifying friends.

Prairie dogs belong to the order Rodentia and are most closely related to marmots and chipmunks. They are strict herbivores, eating only grasses and seeds. Like all such small plant-eaters, they form an important link in the food chain and support dozens of flesh-eating animals such as the coyote, fox and wolf as well as birds of prey.

**ANSWER TO LAST WEEK'S QUESTION:** What is the largest living snake? Incredible lengths have been reported for the giant snakes, and this is understandable since even small snakes crawling in the grass look larger than they really are. The current record seems to favor an anaconda at nearly 30 feet. This giant snake is mostly aquatic but can climb trees and often takes refuge among the branches along rivers. It is native to the northern parts of South America. The Reticulated python is generally considered to be the second largest.

**QUESTION:** Most mammals' hair grows from the head toward the tail. When we stroke a pet animal, we move our hands in this direction because of the way the hair grows. What mammal has hair growing in the opposite direction, from tail to head?

Andy sends a complete 20-volume set of the Merit Students Encyclopedia to Jerome Chisom, age 11, of San Diego, Calif., for his question:

### HOW LONG CAN A BEAVER HOLD HIS BREATH UNDERWATER?

A few weeks ago, a busy beaver appeared in Andy's column to explain why he builds a dam. But one good question always leads to another. So here appears for a return engagement to explain how long he can remain submerged as he commutes to and from his building projects.

The remarkable beaver, as we know, is an air-breathing mammal who takes to the water to protect himself from his more frisky foes. Naturally he must come up for air and therefore can remain submerged only as long as he can hold his breath. Experts in animal behavior report that he can stay below as long as 15 minutes.

**USUALLY IT TAKES** but a couple of minutes to swim from the bank of his private pool to his island home. Often he makes this trip with his nose, eyes and ears above the water level. After all, no hungry bobcat is likely to pursue him into the water. However, the base of his clever dam is below the water level. Constant repair work is needed to keep his elaborate irrigation system in shape.

For this work, which never ends, the busy beaver must be able to dive and stay below for long periods of time. A human



must wear some sort of diving equipment or come up for air every couple of minutes or so. A beaver has special built-in diving equipment that enables him to work underwater for perhaps a quarter of an hour.

**THE BIG PROBLEM** is to keep the water from trickling into his furry little ears and down his nostrils into his lungs. It is solved with two pairs of muscular valves that immediately close up tightly when his head is submerged. They stay closed until he surfaces. Then his ear valves open to catch sounds in the neighborhood, and his nose valves open to exhale stale air and fill up with a fresh breath.

Working with a team of relatives, he fells trees with his chisel-type teeth, cuts them into movable sections and builds canals to raft the pieces to his dam site. Then down he dives, dragging his lumber. Using his clever clawed fingers, he adds mud and stones to anchor the

pieces in place.

Some people claim that a beaver uses his flat scaly tail to pat the pieces into his sturdy dam. Not so. His tail is a rudder to steer him when he swims and dives, though sometimes he flicks it to gain underwater speed. He also uses it to prop himself up when he fells trees. Sometimes he smacks in on the surface with a splash that resounds a mile through the woods. This is an alarm signal to warn his relatives that an enemy is prowling the neighborhood.

Andy sends a 7-volume set of the Chronicles of Narnia to Sarah Ruckeb, age 10, of Minneapolis, Minn., for her question:

### CAN WE TELL THE MALE FROM THE FEMALE HUMMINGBIRD?

The ruby-throated hummingbird is the one that returns to nest in Minnesota. Both the male and the female wear glistening green feathers on their backs and wings. But only the male bird has that ruby-red throat. The female's throat is soft milky white. In other hummingbird families, almost always the male wears more brilliant colors than the female—and in some cases the female's plumage is quite drab.

## Gator Gone, Another Sighted

**JACKSONVILLE BEACH, Fla. (UPI)** — The alligator is gone, but residents are still on the lookout for a relative.

The eight-foot gator that has lived in a drainage ditch near San Pablo Elementary School for more than two years was finally captured this week, trucked to a remote area north of Jacksonville Beach and set free.

"I'm very relieved that the gator has gone to live somewhere else and I'm hopeful there are no more," said Marilyn Duncan, principal at the school.

Mrs. Duncan said she had been worried that the reptile posed a danger to the 600 children attending the school.

She said she was told about two weeks ago that the big alligator had been sighted with a second one, possibly a relative, about

The commission previously had set elaborate traps to catch the eight-footer, but children sprung the traps and ruined them. At least three unsuccessful attempts were made to lasso the alligator.

downcoast traffic on the overburdened Pacific Coast Highway onto other routes.

**EXPLAINING THAT THE MATTER** of traffic is "highly emotional" in Newport Beach, Mrs. Kuehn said that there are numerous myths and misconceptions about the different proposals.

One alternative is a Bonita-Coyote Canyon route, which would take traffic off the highway and move it further inland until it is south of Corona del Mar.

"Many people believe that route is already proposed to Cal Trans (the agency responsible for State roads)," she said.

"But, that's an absolute myth. I've talked to the Cal Trans people and it hasn't been formally proposed yet. And, it takes a minimum of 20 years to get a road built after it has been proposed," she said.

**MRS. KUEHN ADDED THAT** although the Bonita Canyon route appears to be a viable

alternative for Newport Beach, the city of Irvine has already expressed its strong disapproval.

She said Newport Beach residents must speak up to the different groups studying the alternatives, such as the South East Orange County Circulation Study Committee, in support of routes that would benefit Newport.

Another alternative is a Fifth Avenue bypass, which would divert traffic from the highway and on to a Fifth Avenue boulevard inland of the current thoroughfare.

That alternative has been an emotionally-charged issue in Newport, but the councilwoman maintained that it still is probably the best solution at this time.

**IT HAS ALREADY BEEN** proposed, and would take about eight years to be completed if everyone agrees to the plan, as opposed to the 20 years needed for the Bonita Canyon route.

"It's important that we study all these alternatives. But what's even more important, is to keep this from deteriorating into another emotional battle," she warned.

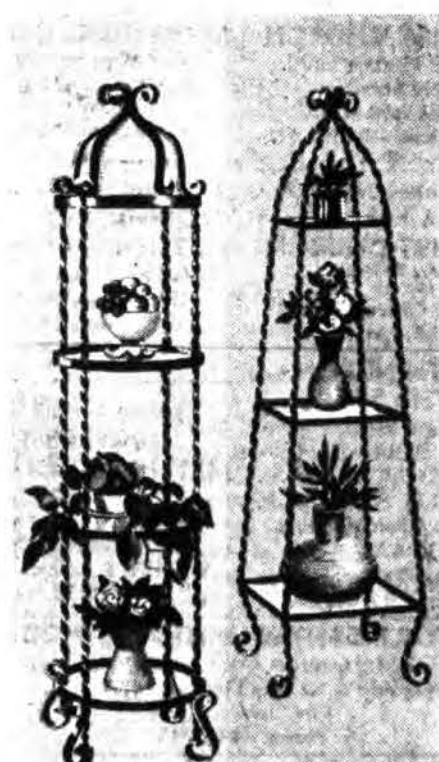

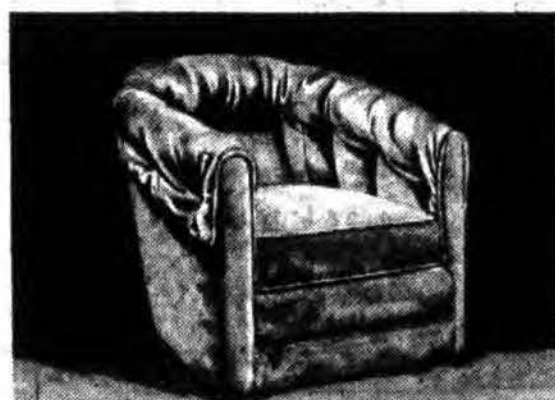

## Another OCC Javelin Star

### Brown Latest Hokanson Product

When Orange Coast College sophomore Jim Brown had a javelin throw of 200-5 a week ago, it came as no surprise to Pirates assistant track and field coach Fred Hokanson—despite the fact it bettered Brown's lifetime best by 13 feet.

Hokanson, in his sixth season as OCC's field events coach, has had four 200-foot javelin throwers in five seasons—and he's developed every one.

Since the javelin is not a high school event, all of Hokanson's athletes have had to start from scratch.

Randy Cantrell was the first to go over 200 at OCC, setting a record of 212-4 before the '72 season was completed. He later had a best of 228-0 at UC Santa Barbara.

The same season football star Alvin White had a best of 204-6.

Tony Ciarelli followed in 1973 and '74 and now holds the school record (225-9). He's now throwing 235-0 for the University of Hawaii.

All were of a special breed, says Hokanson.

"The javelin thrower has to be an athlete with a super arm. He doesn't have to be big necessarily, but we do look for a youngster with good shoulder strength."

"For instance, Brown is on-

ly 170 pounds, but he has an extremely quick arm and he's a very hard worker. He's not a big person, yet he's leading the South Coast Conference in the javelin and has the fourth best mark in the state," says Hokanson.

A UC Santa Barbara graduate, Hokanson had a best of 192 feet while throwing the javelin in college. His knowledge of the field events is rated high, but he tends to play down his role in the past successes of OCC javelin throwers.

"I enjoy the field events and I enjoy coaching them. I have enthusiasm and I try to be positive with the athletes. But you need the good athlete. If you can get good athletes, you can turn them into good throwers," says Hokanson.

Brown, a Corona del Mar High graduate, will be favored to win his specialty later this month when the Pirates host the conference meet.

Brown's chief competition could come from yet another

budding 200-foot thrower—teammate Jerry Althouse.

Althouse, a freshman who prepped at Tustin High, then went into the military, has thrown 181-0 officially—but has a practice toss of 190 feet.

"He has real potential to be a 200-foot thrower," says Hokanson.

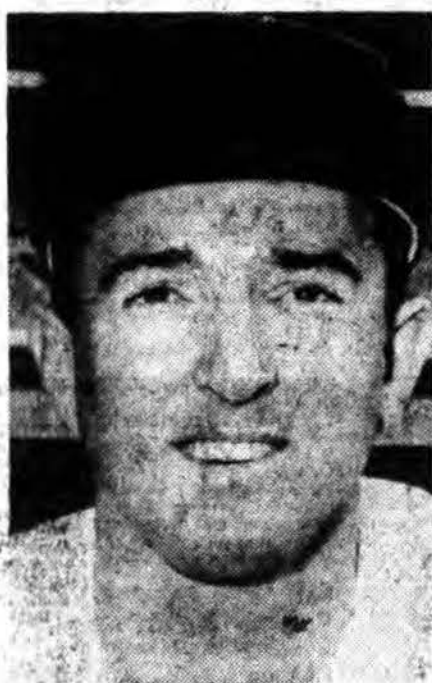

## Kings Get Goring For Playoffs

INGLEWOOD (AP) — Center Butch Goring, the Los Angeles Kings' leading goal scorer before a skate blade slashed across his right eye a month ago, returned to practice with the team Friday and said he hoped to play in the National Hockey League playoffs.

The Kings host the California Seals tonight.

Goring was skating behind Denis Potvin of the New York Islanders here March 6 when Potvin's skate hit Goring as he bent down.

The blow broke the eye's orbit, the structure that holds the eyeball in place, requiring surgery to rebuild the area.

"I still have a little double vision, but the eye itself is fine, there's nothing permanently wrong," Goring said after his first workout with his teammates since the accident. "It's not the eye that's the problem, the biggest thing is getting back into shape."

Goring, dripping with sweat, took a long swig on a cold drink and puffed for air.

"Look at me, you can see I'm way out of shape," he said.

A shoulder injury in training camp forced Goring, the team's top scorer last season, to miss the first seven games of the year. He didn't return to the lineup fulltime until the 22nd game.

In 43 full games this season, Goring scored 25 goals and had 28 assists. Including limited action, he has a total of 27 goals and 59 points, giving him an average of more than a point a game.

Besides getting back in condition, Goring said, "I'll have to get my timing back to be effective."

The Kings open the playoffs in Los Angeles Tuesday night, probably against Toronto, and Goring said he hopes to play.

## Court Dismisses Case After Nudity Survey

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI) — Nude dancing does not violate the standards of most residents who participated in a poll released by Oklahoma City University's Business Research Center.

The poll was paid for by an attorney for Jim Cole, Scorpio Club owner charged with allowing nude dancing at his club. The charge was dismissed and he was released.

The OCU surveyors said they asked 84 men and 84 women if adults should have the right to see nude dancing in taverns if they choose, although they might not be interested themselves. A total of 137 said they would approve and 29 said they disagreed.

Asked if nude dancing behind closed doors would offend them, 106 said no and 58 said yes.

Twenty would not disapprove of a nude act of sexual intercourse in a display window, but 145 would be offended.

Nude dancing imitating sexual intercourse would be obscene to 119 and 38 would not be offended.

The City Council of the City of Costa Mesa further finds and declares that the health, safety, and welfare of the public require said property development standards in said district.  
Accordingly, the following section is added, by amendment to Title 13, Article 14, being Section 13-206 which shall read as follows:  
SECTION 2: "Sec 13-206  
PROPERTY DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS  
1) UNDERGROUND UTILITIES:  
For all new construction, all utilities shall be installed underground on the building site in accordance with the existing utility regulations, and tariffs on file with the California Public Utilities Commission.  
The Planning Commission may waive the requirement of undergrounding whenever such installation is determined by the Planning Commission to be not practically feasible. Provided, however, that any required termination facilities on the structure and conduit, at least to the outer wall, at a point designated by the serving utility, shall be furnished and installed to facilitate future connection to an underground system.  
2) USES UNDER ROOF:  
a) Permitted uses shall be conducted under roof.  
b) OUTDOOR STORAGE:  
All outdoor storage is prohibited unless approved as a conditional use according to procedures prescribed elsewhere in this ordinance.  
c) LOT SIZE:  
A. Minimum Lot Area - 12,000 square feet.  
B. Minimum Lot Width - 67 feet.  
Any legal lot for which a deed was on record in the office of the County Recorder of Orange County on the date of adoption of this Ordinance may be used as a building site.  
d) LANDSCAPING:  
All required landscaping, abutting a public right of way shall be landscaped, (except for walks and driveways which are excepted or encroached upon the required landscaping area). There shall be a minimum of ten foot setback from the proposed right of way as shown on the Master Plan of Highways.  
(A) A landscape plan (including planting material specifications) shall be submitted to the Planning Department. Approval of landscape plans shall be under the jurisdiction of the Planning Department.  
(B) All required landscaping shall be separated from paved areas by six (6) inch high Portland cement concrete curbing and shall be provided with automatic sprinkler facilities, which shall be maintained in an operative condition.  
(C) One tree (15 gallon minimum size) shall be installed per 200 square feet of landscaped area.  
(D) Parking lots shall be broken up with planters. These planters shall be at least ten percent (10%) of the paved areas. The minimum size planter shall be twenty five (25) square feet. No credit will be allowed for the requirement for the landscaping of the setback landscape planter.  
(E) Every site on which landscaping is required, according to this ordinance, shall be landscaped according to plans approved as specified herein and maintained hereafter in a sightly and well-kept condition, irrigated periodically, trimmed, cultivated, vegetation replaced as needed and cuttings and leaf droppings removed as often as necessary to insure a neat and orderly appearance.  
SECTION 3: This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect thirty (30) days from and after its passage and before the expiration of fifteen (15) days after its passage, shall be published once in the Orange Coast Daily Pilot, a newspaper of general circulation printed and published in the City of Costa Mesa, together with the names of the members of the City Council voting for and against same.
