## Niguel's Porter Admits Watergate Lie

### No Jurisdiction?

### State Challenged In Popeil Case

The preliminary hearing for Eloise Popeil and Daniel Ayers was suspended for one week today as defense attorneys filed a motion for dismissal of murder conspiracy charges on grounds that the state has no jurisdiction in the case.

Long Beach Municipal Court Judge Charles Litwin gave prosecuting attorney Charles Sheldon one week to file a brief countering the claim by the trio of defense attorneys that there is no jurisdiction in California because the object of the conspiracy is in another state.

Mrs. Popeil of Newport Beach and Ayers, a Santa Ana resident, are accused by police of hiring two men to kill her multi-millionaire husband, Samuel Popeil of Chicago.

Phil Petty and Robert Green, attorneys for Mrs. Popeil and John Yzuriaga gave a short brief on their motion to Judge Litwin today.

According to Sheldon, the trio has cited two cases—one involving abortion and the other a murder in Switzerland—in which charges were dropped for lack of jurisdiction.

Judge Litwin suspended the hearing approximately one hour after the resumption of testimony from Bob Peeler, one of the men allegedly hired to kill Popeil.

Contents of that testimony like that of the two previous witnesses remains a secret today as the result of two motions from defense attorneys.

When the hearing into the charges of conspiracy to commit murder against the pair opened Thursday, Mrs. Popeil and Ayers waived their rights to a public hearing and the court was barred to the public and press.

Late Friday a further avenue of information was closed when defense attorneys Petty and Green successfully sought an order to seal the transcript of the hearing.

Long Beach Municipal Court Judge

Litwin ordered the transcript sealed until Tuesday but Green said they will attempt to get a Los Angeles Superior Court order to continue the seal some time this week.

The hearing is expected to conclude today and Petty said there were likely to be some "interesting developments" but he did not specify what those developments would be.

### Caspers Asks 'Task Force' For Airport

Orange County Supervisor Ronald Caspers will ask fellow board members Tuesday to approve a six-month study of Ontario International Airport as the answer to county air transit needs.

In a report prepared for the board but released today, Caspers said he is convinced jet traffic has no place in Orange County and the current traffic is already almost too much to control.

He said despite all efforts to control jet traffic, curfew violations, noise and other problems persist and have triggered huge lawsuits against the county.

"I do not believe there is another location for a jet airport within the geographic bounds of Orange County," Caspers said.

"Therefore, my office has been investigating the possibility of the use of Ontario to meet the growing jet air transportation needs of Orange County."

Caspers, who vowed in his recent state of the county address to pursue the Ontario plan, said the existing county jetport was never built to handle its current flight load.

"Orange County Airport was not originally designed for jet traffic and there is an obvious difference in the manner which the two jet operators conduct operations at the facility," Caspers said.

He said that while Air California has complied with curfews, exhaust reduction (See AIRPORT, Page 2)

## Pastors Back 'Throat' Duo

Eleven local ministers have signed a statement opposing the proposed recall of two trustees in the Huntington Beach Union High School District in the "Deep Throat" controversy.

The recall movement is directed against Trustees Dennis Mangers and Ron Shenkman because some parents feel they did not respond properly when it was learned the x-rated sex film had been shown last summer during

a district administrators' conference in San Diego.

Both trustees will appear in Superior Court Wednesday seeking a court order to prevent recall backers from circulating petitions.

The ministers who signed a statement against the recall movement are all active members of the Huntington Beach Fountain Valley Ministerial Association.

The Rev. James DeLange, pastor of the Faith Lutheran Church and president of the association, said the signatures

were obtained over the weekend as a result of considerable discussion about the "Deep Throat" incident.

The statement reads: "The showing of the 'Deep Throat' film... was a most unfortunate and regrettable incident and we express our strong protest against this kind of activity."

"We believe it to be both proper and to be expected that the district Board of Trustees should take appropriate action to correct this kind (See 'THROAT,' Page 2)

### Sentencing Postponed For Now

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Herbert L. "Bart" Porter of Laguna Niguel, who told the Senate Watergate Committee he kept quiet for fear he would be accused of "not being a team player," pleaded guilty today to one count of lying to the FBI about the scandal.

U.S. District Judge William B. Bryant let Porter go free without bond and postponed sentencing until the court gets a probation report.

At Bryant's request, a prosecuting attorney described briefly what he would have sought to prove in court had there been a trial. Bryant asked Porter if he had any "quarrel" with the government's statement, and Porter said he did not.

The statement related what Porter told the Senate committee in June — that Porter told the FBI on July 19, 1972 that he had a conversation with Jeb Stuart Magruder, deputy director of President Nixon's re-election campaign, about plans to use \$100,000 to finance protection for campaign speakers.

"There was no such conversation and the government is ready to prove it," the prosecuting attorney said.

The actual use of the money was not mentioned during the brief court proceeding, but it was understood that Porter's conversation with Magruder dealt with \$100,000 passed to G. Gordon Liddy to finance the Watergate break-in.

Porter's plea in effect waived a right to jury trial. After getting Porter's assurance that he understood this, Bryant asked him, "Do you understand (See PORTER, Page 2)

# Nixon Asks \$13.6 Billion Veterans' Package

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon today proposed cost-of-living increases in veterans' pensions and an 8 percent boost in GI benefits as part of a \$13.6 billion legislative package for veterans.

Nixon also urged that Congress restore Nov. 11 as Veterans Day, repealing part of a 1968 law which switched the holiday to the fourth Monday in October.

The proposals were contained in a special message to Congress, one of a series Nixon is sending to Capitol Hill before his State of the Union address Wednesday night.

At a White House briefing, Veterans Administrator Donald Johnson said the

\$13.6 billion being sought by Nixon is \$400 million more than is being spent this year.

Most of the increase is ticketed for medical programs, he said. Even with the proposed boost in monthly checks for veterans under the GI bill, VA spending for education is expected to decline from \$3.2 billion this year to \$2.6 billion for next year because of declining enrollment in the program, Johnson said.

The Administration also is proposing, Johnson said, that a veterans cemetery be designated in each of the 10 standard federal regions and that Arlington Cemetery near Washington be expanded.

The President said his administration is preparing legislation to grant the 2.4 million persons receiving veterans pensions the same type of automatic cost-of-living increases available to Social Security recipients.

He also said the veterans pension program should be restructured to assure that the neediest pensioners will receive at least as much as adult welfare recipients.

Nixon said the 8 percent increase in education benefits he is seeking will supply an extra \$200 million in aid for the more than two million taking advantage of the GI bill education and

training allowances. The increase is needed, he said, "to keep pace with inflation."

Legislation is pending in both House and Senate to provide for a 13.6 percent increase.

The President reported that the Veterans Administration is embarking on the greatest program of hospital construction in its history.

He said a record \$276 million is being sought in fiscal 1975 which begins next July 1 for hospital construction, and that his budget will provide funds to hire an additional 7,600 medical personnel.

In addition to the medical, education

and pension benefits, Nixon said America should "repay her debts to the men and women who have served her well," by setting aside certain days to commemorate their service.

One such day was Sunday, the first anniversary of the Vietnam cease-fire, which Nixon proclaimed as National MIA Awareness Day. Another is March 29, the first anniversary of the return of prisoners of war, which is being designated Vietnam Veterans Day.

He said there also is Veterans Day, which for decades was observed on Nov. 11, the anniversary of the World War I armistice day.

The 1968 legislation switching Veterans

Day to the Fourth Monday of each October — part of the so-called "Monday holiday" law — "has stirred considerable confusion and not a small amount of resentment," he said.

Thirty-one state legislatures enacted resolutions declaring that Nov. 11 will be the official Veterans Day in their jurisdictions, Nixon said, and all major veterans organizations are seeking to return to the Nov. 11 date.

He urged Congress to repeal the 1968 change in the Veterans Day observance "in view of the confusion which has arisen and in view especially of the position taken by the veterans themselves."

and takeoff patterns, Hughes Airwest has not.

In his report Caspers lists 16 separate occasions between Dec. 27 and Jan. 7 that Airwest departures or arrivals violated the 10 p.m. curfew at the airport.

One of the arrivals was at 3:08 a.m., he said. Airport Director Robert Bresnahan confirmed today that violations are occurring all the time, but that most are within a few minutes and can be explained by the airlines.

"Even though Air Cal is not as late as Airwest, they do have some violations," Bresnahan said. "But there is always something such as the weather or mechanical problems that cause it."

Bresnahan said Air Cal has a curfew clause in its lease allowing the county to crack down after the airline is given 30 days to correct the problem. But he said Airwest operates on a month to month pact which has no curfew limit in it.

"If these violations continue to be a problem a drastic step might be necessary such as closing the airport at 10 p.m. and turning off the lights," Bresnahan said.

In Caspers' report to the board he said Orange County Airport may have moved into the number one position in the nation in total takeoffs and landings, ahead of Chicago's O'Hare Airport.

He said the fuel crisis may have caused the switch in position since Orange County continues to set flight records with 632,000 runway movements in 1973.

Caspers also said in his report his contacts with the Marines over use of Camp Pendleton met with dismal rejection and that the possible use of the Chino Hills for a new airport is also an apparent impossibility.

"While the Ontario idea may provide a real answer to the airport question, it also warrants investigation because of its superior possibility for actualization in contrast to the proposal for Chino Hills, which has been designated as an open space preserve," Caspers said.

Caspers said a task force for the study could consist of both county staff members who would explore all avenues of airport use, including such things as rapid transit links between Orange County and Ontario.

## Standard Oil Gains Reported

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — Standard Oil Co. of Ohio, the nation's 16th largest oil company, has reported a 24 percent gain in earnings for 1973.

The company also reported Sunday a 40 percent decline in earnings for the final three months of 1973 as compared to the same period a year earlier.

But the company indicated that a change in inventory accounting methods for its subsidiary, BP Oil, distorted the comparison. Without the change, the company said, its fourth quarter report would have shown \$9 million more in profits than it did.

the penalty?"

"I believe it is five years or \$10,000 or both," Porter said.

Bryant then read the charge and asked Porter how he pleaded.

"I plead guilty, your honor," Porter said.

Porter, former scheduling director for the committee for the Re-election of the President, told the Watergate committee that Magruder asked him to perjure himself.

To do otherwise, Porter said Magruder told him, "could be very embarrassing to the President of the United States," to former Attorney General John N. Mitchell, and to H. R. Haldeman, Nixon's former chief of staff.

Porter also told the committee he kept quiet about his Watergate role for months out of intense loyalty to Nixon and "probably because of the fear of group pressure that would ensue — of not being a team player."

Porter proudly told the Senate Watergate committee that he campaigned for Nixon as a boy of 8 and testified that "Watergate had 'a most devastating effect on my personal life' — which he defined exclusively in material terms of getting fired and losing a new home.

In remarks to reporters last week, Porter spoke of losing his "bright future ... and all the rest of the things that I had been working for 12 years to get or that I thought I had."

Porter wound up working at the White House in part because of his friendship with White House press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler at USC.

## Suspect in Rape Held by Police

### In Laguna Beach

Laguna Beach police today are holding a 23-year-old man on suspicion of assault with intent to commit rape and strong arm robbery after a practical nurse working in an exclusive residential area was attacked this morning.

Sgt. David Avers said the man was arrested near the home where he at first assisted the nurse moving some articles, and then forced his attentions on her, assertedly as payment for his efforts.

The 24-year-old nurse was choked and thrown to the floor in the attack. The man assertedly took \$1.75 from her purse and left.

The woman called the fire department which relayed the call to police who searched the area but were unable to find anyone.

Later she called again saying the man had returned. Police responded again to the home and the man was found hiding at a neighbor's yard, police said.

## Rebels Bomb Capital

PHNOM PENH (UPI) — Communist rebel gunners bombarded Phnom Penh for the fourth consecutive day today, hitting the capital, a refugee camp and an area near Pochentong Airport with artillery, rockets and recoilless rifle fire. Five persons were reported killed today and 28 wounded, bringing the casualty toll to 89 killed and 220 wounded, and making the attacks the worst the capital has undergone in four years.

Picquelle, 39, faces a charge of manufacturing counterfeit currency and his roommate Sam Warren, 33, a printer, a charge of aiding and abetting the sale of counterfeit money.

Warren, at whose home on 2234A Pacific Avenue the agents claim to have found \$100,000 of the counterfeit currency, will also appear in court Feb. 14.

Scheduled to appear for preliminary hearing Feb. 12 on charges they possessed \$57,000 of counterfeit money are Arthur F. Dorner Jr., 38, and Carol Ann Green, 37, both of 6906 1/2 Oceanfront, Newport Beach.

The couple was arrested by Secret Service agents last Wednesday in a Costa Mesa parking lot while allegedly carrying a shopping bag stuffed with bogus bills.

A spokesman for the Los Angeles office of the Secret Service said the four persons were set free on personal recognizance bonds, which means they were not required to post bail but are subject to fines ranging from \$1,500 to \$10,000 if they fail to appear in court.

Secret Service agents concluded their one week investigation into the alleged counterfeiting racket Thursday with a nighttime raid on Picquelle's print shop at 688 W. Baker St.

There they claim to have uncovered the plates and negatives allegedly used to turn out bogus \$20's and \$50's which appeared on the Orange Coast, in San Diego and Arizona early in December.

About \$7,000 worth of the money was passed, according to the allegations of the Secret Service.

## Suspect Seized In 'Bag Murders'

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — William P. Hanson, 24, a delivery service employee and psychiatrist's son, has been arrested in what police describe as two "paper bag" murders here.

Police said Sunday that Hanson was arrested Saturday at the home of his father, Dr. Karl H. Hanson, and booked for investigation of the slayings of Lorenzo Carniglia, 70, on Oct. 16, and Ara Kuznezow, 54, on Dec. 20.

Kuznezow was killed by a man who hid his weapon in a paper bag, police said. Both were slain within three blocks of each other in daylight by a killer described by witnesses as a young man with long blond hair who fled in a white van.

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## Just Playing

### Priest Denies Satan's Role

SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — An Episcopal Priest says that a playful poltergeist — not the malevolent Prince of Darkness — probably bedeviled a suburban family into seeking a Roman Catholic exorcism.

The Rev. Richard Byfield told his congregation at St. Elizabeth's Episcopal Church Sunday that the bizarre happenings at the Daly City household were beneath the dignity of Satan himself.

"The whole thing might be blasphemous if it weren't just plain funny," he said.

To perform solemn rites of exorcism is "like aiming 20-inch guns at mosquitoes," said Byfield, a student of the occult, and former assistant to the late Bishop James Pike who was fascinated by the supernatural.

Byfield referred to the recent report by the Catholic Church that the ritual had been performed to save the husband, his wife and young son from mysterious choking sensations, flying objects and small fires.

# Protest Quartet Held by Police

WASHINGTON (UPI) — In a mock antiwar protest, four "newsmen" who asked tough questions of "President Nixon" were arrested by "policemen" who playfully tied their hands in front of the White House.

Then the real U.S. park police showed up and the four were really arrested.

The demonstration was one in a weekend of protest on the first anniversary of the signing of Vietnam peace accords which included a "drive-in" by about 200 relatives and friends of servicemen still listed as missing in southeast Asia and an "Ignoble Peace Prize" presented in absentia to Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger by actress Jane Fonda.

The American Friends Service

Committee said Sunday that 56,755 Vietnamese have been killed in the year since the cease-fire began and charged the United States with fostering major violations.

Two followers of the Rev. Phillip Berrigan dressed as President Nixon and South Vietnamese President Nguyen van Thieu held Sunday's mock news conference. Some participants asked critical questions and phony police backed the men up to the White House fence and tied their hands.

At that moment, the park police arrived and asked for the group's demonstration permit. A member said it didn't have one. The rope was replaced by handcuffs and the four were hustled away in a police van, charged with unlawful assembly and demonstrating without a permit.

They were identified as Dr. Charles L. Radol, 57, Colorado Springs, Colo.; the Rev. Edward J. Murphy, 36, New York City; Sal Scalfidi, 21, Jersey City, N.J.; and Lee Kolms, 38, Weehawken, N.J.

During the arrests, two vans and two campers circled the White House.

The campers were driven by a POW-MIA group which says it has been trying to see Nixon since July. Spokesman George Brooks said the campers could circle "for as many days, weeks, months as necessary" until Nixon tells them whether the 1,315 men still in Southeast Asia are dead or held captive.

More than 100 persons, including many children, held a peaceful candlelight vigil Sunday evening in support of the group.

The vans were driven by a religious organization, "National Prayer and Fast for the Watergate Crisis." It asked forgiveness for the President and sang "God Bless America" on a public address system and carried signs saying "God Loves Nixon."

Miss Fonda and about 250 rain-soaked demonstrators tried Saturday to give the prize — a large wooden plaque with a 20-millimeter machine gun bullet above a typed citation — to Kissinger at the State Department. Kissinger, a Nobel laureate, was in New York and a guard said, "No one's here to present it to the good doctor."

## Woman Detained 9 Months Gets Pregnancy Tests

MORRISTOWN, N.J. (UPI) — The judge in the murder trial of Joanne Chesimard, 25, ordered doctors to give a medical report today on the Black Liberation Army activist, who was said to be pregnant. Mrs. Chesimard has been in jail for nine months.

Sheriff Arnold B. Ladd said Sunday "she sure as hell didn't get that way" in his Morris County jail, noting that he has not allowed conjugal visits between Mrs. Chesimard and her husband, who lives in New York City.

Mrs. Chesimard was previously held in the women's jail in New York City while on trial for federal bank robbery charges. During that trial, she and a co-defendant, Freddie Hilton, were removed because of several outbursts and locked in a room adjoining the courtroom. The case ended in a mistrial.

In New Jersey, Mrs. Chesimard is on trial with Clark Squire, 36, on charges of slaying a state trooper during a shootout with black activists last May.

Two gynecologists and a another physician who examined Mrs. Chesimard Friday, after she complained of being ill, were ordered to report to Middlesex County Judge John E. Bachman today on her condition.

Jury selection was halted Friday when Mrs. Chesimard said she was ill. One of her attorneys, Evelyn Williams of New York, said she expected her client's condition to delay the start of testimony.

## 'Joy of Sex' Seller Cleared

MACON, Ga. (AP) — Obscenity charges against Macon bookseller Kendrick Moffett Jr., who was arrested for selling the book "The Joy of Sex," have been dropped.

The action came after State Court Judge J. Taylor Phillips granted a motion to suppress the prosecution's main evidence, the confiscation of the book by Macon police.

He said the confiscation violated Moffett's rights. He said judicial determination of obscenity must be made and a warrant issued before such an arrest can be made legally.

## Uganda Chief Bans Wearing of Wigs

KAMPALA (UPI) — President Idi Amin of Uganda banned the wearing of wigs in government offices and at public functions today because he said he did not want Ugandans to wear the hair of dead imperialists or of Africans killed by imperialists.

Those wishing to wear wigs in private life are free to do so, he said. No member of his family is to wear a wig or she will cease to be his family member.

# Tax Claim Called Legal

## Nixon Attorney Says Deed Signed Before Cutoff

SACRAMENTO (AP) — President Nixon complied fully with the law in claiming massive tax deductions for the gift of his vice presidential papers, his tax lawyer contends.

Frank DeMarco, a Newport Beach attorney, said the original deed transferring the papers to the National Archives actually was signed in Los Angeles on April 21, 1969, by Edward L. Morgan, then deputy counsel to the President.

That was well before the July 25, 1969, cutoff for that type of massive tax deduction.

The deed now on file is a substitute that was not signed until April 1970, DeMarco acknowledged.

But DeMarco said the signing of the deed was a formality that had no bearing on the eligibility for Nixon tax deductions that total \$482,000 so far.

Asked if he was convinced the entire procedure met all legal deadlines and requirements, DeMarco said: "Yes, sir, absolutely."

The timing of the gift and the paperwork involved are under investigation by the Internal Revenue Service and Congress' Joint Committee on Internal Revenue.

They are attempting to determine if Nixon met all requirements for the deduction before the July 25, 1969, cutoff.

DeMarco said the critical fact is the actual delivery of the papers to the archives, on March 27, 1969, four months before the deduction cutoff.

"The gift stands or falls on the delivery. Tax law does not require a deed. This deed had nothing to do with the tax return," DeMarco said in a telephone interview from his home Saturday.

DeMarco had refused to comment publicly on the issue until Secretary of State Edmund G. Brown Jr. said Friday he had evidence the deed on file with the archives was "backdated" by a full year.

"Now, I feel it is only proper to comment on this," DeMarco said.

DeMarco acknowledged that the deed on file in Washington is not the original but was drafted and signed in April,

1970, but dated April 21, 1969.

The deed was retyped, signed and notarized as a cleanup procedure, DeMarco said.

"In my legal opinion, that is not a backdating," said DeMarco, law partner of Herbert Kalmbach of Newport Beach, Nixon fundraiser and personal attorney to the President.

Of the original deed, DeMarco said, "Ed Morgan was here in Los Angeles April 21, 1969. He did at that time sign the chattel deed."

Morgan said recently he was "98 percent sure" he signed the original

deed but declined to say without qualification that he did.

Brown said the original deed cannot be located.

One reason the new deed was drafted is that the original did not contain an inventory of the papers, DeMarco said.

He also said the only document required by the Internal Revenue Service to substantiate such a deduction is an appraisal of the papers. DeMarco said "I had the appraisal in my left hand when I signed the tax return with the right."

## Inca Design for Nixon Library Greeted Coolly

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A proposal to design the Richard Nixon library after an ancient Inca city has met with a cool reception.

Leonard K. Firestone, president of the Richard Nixon Foundation, a tax-free corporation formed to build the library, called it "weird" Friday.

A spokesman for Economic Research Associates of Los Angeles, which recommended that the library be located near the University of California at Irvine in Orange County, laughed at the theme.

The proposal to build the Inca replica in Seattle was made by Wayne Field, a stockholder with the President's brother, Edward Nixon, in the Seattle Kings football enterprise.

The suggested design calls for a five-story edifice for the library with living quarters for the Nixon family on the top floor.

Edward Nixon, 43, lives in Lynwood, Wash., and owns 3 percent of the Seattle Kings group seeking a professional football franchise. He is a trustee of the Nixon foundation. The proposed

design was sent to Firestone.

"From the pictures, it looks a little weird," Firestone said. "Mrs. Nixon has indicated that she would want it simple. I doubt if this design would meet with the Nixon's approval."

Firestone said the foundation had paid some architects to "put something together" in the way of designs. But he added, "We probably won't be getting around to fund raising or the design until the President is out of office."

Firestone said there had been no decision as to the site, but that the foundation "had hoped to get land from the Irvine Co." in Orange County.

A spokesman for the Economic Research Associates scoffed at the Incan design idea but said that if admission is charged it "should be a tremendous drawing card for the Nixon library."

Field owns Rembrandt, Inc., of Edwina, Minn., operator of a group of health-care retirement homes and granite works. He has said that he wanted the library in Seattle "because of our deep esteem for the President and our friendship with his brother, Ed."

## Chief's Crusade To Catch Killers Thwarted So Far

DALLAS (UPI) — A round-the-clock manhunt for persons responsible for a wave of grocery robbery-killings failed today to fulfill Police Chief Donald Byrd's mandate to "have those bastards in jail by Monday morning."

Byrd mobilized a crew of 100 plainclothes officers Friday after the ninth robbery-shooting and told them to go "full blast after the bunch responsible."

They were told to search apartment house parking areas and streets in search of a distinctive old model car used in the Friday incident that resulted in the fifth death since Jan. 4.

Meanwhile, owners and clerks of small convenience groceries — the type which has almost exclusively been the target of the gunmen — admittedly are living scared. Some are taking extra precautions.

"I admit it's got us all shook up," said one owner in the South Dallas black neighborhood which has been hit three of the nine times.

"We stay pretty busy, except maybe late at night," he said. "We now have two men working at all times. At night, one stands at the back of the store where he can be seen. He holds a double barrel shotgun."

Forrest Vance Fuller, 45, the ninth person shot in the wave of drive-in grocery store killings, remained in critical condition today. He was shot in the head by two men who took the cash register from the store and drove away in a 1967 faded canary yellow Chevrolet.

The car is distinctive, with pieces of chrome missing from its side, rust visible on parts of the car, and a hammered-out look to the trunk. Police stopped all cars remotely answering the description during the weekend, but without success.

The robbery-murders began Jan. 4. They have occurred in predominantly black neighborhoods and all nine of the victims were white.

"I'm just sick and tired of people being needlessly killed," Chief Byrd said. "I've mobilized the whole department and told my homicide investigators they have all the resources they need to stop these senseless killings."

## Delay Sought In Houston Deaths Trial

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — About 80 persons, many of them newsmen, are to testify at a hearing on a motion by defense lawyers seeking a delay of Elmer Wayne Henley's trial in the Texas mass murders case.

The hearing on the continuance motion begins today. Defense attorney Will Gray says he wants the delay of the 17-year-old Henley's trial to allow what he terms massive and prejudicial publicity time to die down.

Gray said Friday that he plans to question the newsmen who gave them a statement by another defendant in the case. The statement by David Owen Brooks, 18, accuses Henley of killing some of the 27 teenage youths whose bodies were found in graves in and near here.

Gray said he would move immediately for a change of venue if he were unable to gain a continuance.

"There's no way we can try this case here at this time," Gray said.

He added that he favors El Paso, Tex. as a trial site because "that's just about the farthest you can get in the state from Houston."

Dist. Atty. Carol Vance said he won't oppose moving the trial and would be happy in any metropolitan area.

The decision on a change of venue rests with State District Court Judge William Hatten, who also must decide whether to suppress oral and written statements Henley made to police officers after his arrest Aug. 8.

Henley was arrested after he telephoned police in neighboring Pasadena and told them he shot and killed Dean A. Corli, 33. A grand jury later ruled the shooting of Corli was in self-defense.

Police say Corli was the leader of a homosexual murder-torture ring.

## Male Prostitute, 78, Arrested

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — District Atty. Harl Hass says a prostitution charge against a 78-year-old man will be dropped after he completes 40 hours of community service work, assisting people with reading problems.

Haas said that Murray V. Griffith was the first man charged in Portland under a new state law making it illegal for a man to accept money for sexual activity.

Griffith was cited in October after a female police officer said he accepted \$50 from her.

## Israelis Leave Desert

# 97-day Siege Lifted

**SUEZ, Egypt (AP)** — Israel's invasion forces lifted the 97-day siege of Suez City today, surrendered 300 square miles of Egyptian territory to the United Nations and freed Egypt's encircled 3rd Army.

**SCORES OF** Israeli half-tracks rolled out of Suez City toward canal bridges to the eastern bank. The vehicles were filled with singing, clapping soldiers.

"We are going home," the Israelis sang in Hebrew — to the tune of "This Land is Your Land, this land is my land."

They raised their fingers in V-for-victory signals and waved captured Egyptian flags. Some armored cars were painted with "Good-bye Africa."

In a midday ceremony, the Israelis formally handed control of the city at the southern gateway to the Suez Canal to the U.N. Emergency Force.

U.N. troops immediately began taking control of Suez — with the 15,000 civilian inhabitants — and the southern invasion zone, holding it for at least six hours.

## Luxury Auto Kills Lottery Prize Winner

**NILES, Mich. (AP)** — A Niles man has been found dead in the luxury automobile he bought with the first \$20,000 installment of his \$200,000 Michigan Lottery winnings.

Police ruled that the death of Fred B. Marshall, 55, was accidental, pending completion of laboratory tests. Officials said they believe he died of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Marshall's death was discovered shortly after noon Saturday when his wife noticed the garage door part way open, police said.

Officers said they found Marshall with one foot out of the car as if he had been trying to get out. The garage was filled with exhaust fumes, but the car was not running though the ignition switch was on, police said.

Marshall's oldest daughter, Betty Gray, said her father often spent hours in the new Cadillac — he "loved it so much" — listening to the tape deck or watching the auto's color television.

The car also was equipped with a bar and refrigerator.

Marshall, plant manager for the A-Can X-Ray Co. here, won the prize May 3, 1973. Lottery officials said the remaining nine installments of \$20,000 would be paid to Marshall's estate.

Mrs. Gray said the family would decide whether to keep the auto after the funeral Tuesday.

## Demonstrators Hurl Tomatoes At Laird, Ford

**PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP)** — Demonstrators hurled eggs and tomatoes at presidential adviser Melvin R. Laird when he arrived with Vice President Gerald R. Ford to receive an award.

Neither Laird nor Ford was hit by the approximately 15 eggs, tomatoes and other objects that were thrown by about a dozen of the estimated 150 demonstrators chanting anti-Laird slogans Sunday on the Providence College campus.

Laird and Ford expressed no reaction to the incident and made no mention of it later in speeches.

Moments after the throwing incident, another group of about 100 warmly applauded the two just outside the college's Alumni Hall.

## Fighting Still Bloody Year After Viet Accord

**SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)** — Heavy fighting was reported today on the first anniversary of the cease-fire that was supposed to end the Vietnam War but didn't.

The South Vietnamese command claimed that 62 Viet Cong were killed in three battles 45 to 110 miles southwest of Saigon in the Mekong Delta. Government losses were put at 15 dead and 10 wounded.

Neither the government nor the Viet Cong held any special ceremonies to mark the anniversary of the peace agreement which secured the release of American prisoners of war held by the Communists and paved the way for the withdrawal of American troops from Vietnam.

### 10 Days Left

**SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP)** — With their recovery ship on station and time growing short, Skylab 3's astronauts are plotting the last 10 days of their marathon space journey.

"We're getting that short-timer attitude now," commander Gerald P. Carr of Santa Ana told mission control over the weekend.

Medical experiments have priority as Carr, William R. Pogue and Edward

But even before then, soldiers had started pulling apart positions and bunkers, reeling in hundreds of miles of communications wires and digging up or marking nearly a million mines, Israeli officers said.

The disengagement is to be completed within 40 days from Friday. Although the final positions remain secret, it is understood that Israeli forces will pull back to a lightly armed line about 12 miles east of the canal, with the main Israeli defenses at a line near the strategic Giddi and Mitla passes about 20 miles back.

U.N. peacekeeping forces will take up positions between the Israeli lines and Egyptian forces east of the canal. The Egyptians also are understood to have pledged to thin out their forces east of the canal.

## Cyprus Mourns Grivas

### 75-year-old Guerilla Succumbs at Southern Hideout

**NICOSIA (UPI)** — Cyprus today honored in death the man who until Sunday was sought as Public Enemy No. 1.

The cabinet ordered three days of mourning for guerrilla Gen. George Grivas and President Archbishop Makarios declared an amnesty for his followers.

Grivas, who fought side-by-side with Makarios to win Cyprus independence from Britain but broke with him over the issue of union with Greece, died Sunday at the age of 75 in a hideout in the southern port city of Limassol.

**MAKARIOS DECLARED** an amnesty for Grivas' guerrillas who in 1971

renewed the underground battle for Enosis (union with Greece).

A government spokesman said all schools would be closed and flags would fly at half staff on public buildings during three days of official mourning.

The body of the late warrior will lie in state in Nicosia's church of Phaneromeni, where Cypriots under Archbishop Makarios on Aug. 15, 1954 took an oath to fight until death for Enosis.

Makarios, who became president after the island gained its independence from Britain in 1960, abandoned the struggle for Enosis. This was one of the terms set by Britain, Turkey and Greece for agreement on independence.

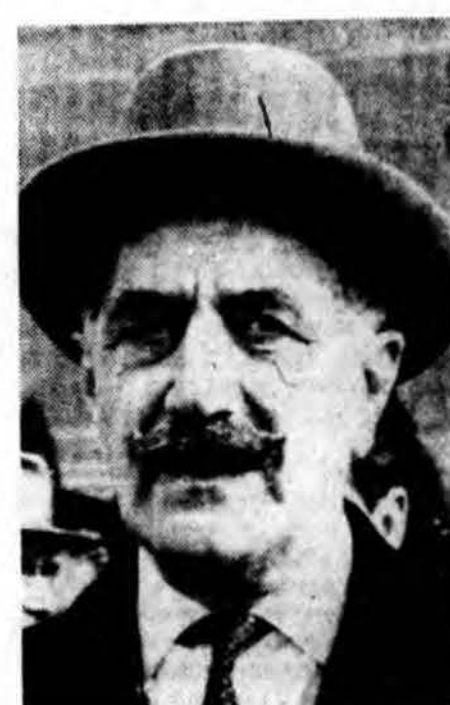
Grivas' body will be moved to the historic Nicosia church from Limassol, where it was kept in the home of a close Grivas supporter, later today. It will not be taken to the Greek embassy as earlier announced, the spokesman said.

**A GREEK EMBASSY** official said Ambassador Efsthios Lagakos went to Limassol today to discuss funeral arrangements with Grivas' supporters.

"In Cyprus, schools will be closed and flags will fly half-mast until Wednesday, when the body, which will lie in state, will be flown to Greece for burial," Foreign Minister Yannis Christofides said in Athens.

Hundreds of students in the Cypriot capital of Nicosia staged a procession this morning with marchers carrying pictures of the dead leader, whose code name, Digenis, was taken from an ancient Greek hero.

Despite government resentment over his recent commando struggle against

Makarios, local newspapers framed stories of Grivas' death in black and displayed large pictures of the guerrilla chief.

Grivas' death left the future of Eoka, the "second government" on this Mediterranean island, in doubt despite guerrilla vows to keep on fighting for Enosis.

"BEFORE HIS death, Gen. Grivas named a successor who has now assumed leadership of the struggle, which will continue until his aim has been achieved," the statement said.

# More Trucker Violence; Driver Shot, Two Beaten

Violence flared again early today in Ohio and Pennsylvania after independent trucker groups rejected a federal proposal and voted to continue their protest of high fuel costs and low freight rates.

Most of the violence occurred in Ohio. One trucker was shot at Akron, two were beaten at Warren, one rig was burned and at least 15 were damaged.

**AT LEAST FIVE** men were arrested on varied charges in connection with attempts to halt truckers on highways, many of whom have refused to join the dissident groups which began a shutdown last week or have scheduled one to start Thursday.

About 2,000 truckers met in Akron Sunday. The owner-operators, represented by the Council of Independent Truckers, said the government peace offerings were too vague. Frank Rynn, president of the council, said the truckers will continue their protest until more concrete proposals are made.

In the meantime, the violence continued.

Dennis Nickles, 30, of Casey, Ill., was hospitalized Sunday in Akron with a bullet wound in his right shoulder. The Mason-Dixon tank truck driver told police he was eastbound on Interstate 76 west of Youngstown Sunday when his rig was struck twice by bullets. One slug went through the windshield and struck him.

Edward Falconer, 37, of Waterford, Pa., was hospitalized today in Warren with injuries suffered when he and his partner were beaten, police said. Falconer said five men stopped his

bakery truck, pulled him and his partner from the cab and beat them.

**IN SOUTHWESTERN** Pennsylvania, state police in Washington County said one trucker was arrested during the night for obstructing highways.

The windshields of two tractor-trailers were broken in incidents along Interstate 70 also in Washington County. One of the trucks was attacked as it rolled along the interstate, police said.

State police in Beaver County reported three incidents in which trucks were either forced off the road or hit by missiles.

At their meeting Sunday, the Ohio truckers rejected a 6 percent increase in the freight rate granted earlier this month because it was too low.

Leonard Fleet, attorney for the group, said he received the government's proposal at a meeting in Florida last week with W.J. Usery, Jr., a member of the Federal Mediation Service and a White House aide.

Neither Fleet nor Rynn would disclose details of the offer, but said they would return to Washington this week.

### Bing Released

BURLINGAME (UPI) — Bing Crosby, wearing his soft felt hat at a jaunty angle, strolled out of the hospital Sunday, two weeks after surgery for removal of a lung abscess.

Doctors forecast a complete recovery and said the operation would have no effect on the 68-year-old crooner's voice. "Bing will have the same melodious voice," said Dr. Stanley Hanfling, his personal physician. Crosby had been hospitalized since New Year's Eve for a stubborn lung ailment thought to be caused by a rare African fungus disease he picked up while on a safari.

### Funeral Today

SACRAMENTO (AP) — A private Navy funeral was scheduled at Mather Air Force Base today for Cmdr. Robert J. Schweitzer, a prisoner of war for five years in North Vietnam.

The date is exactly one year from the time his family received word he would be released after five years imprisonment.

Schweitzer, 41, was killed late Thursday when the car he was driving hit a guardrail and flipped end over end near Auburn.

## Legislator Bills State for Tour

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Sen. Randolph Collier, dean of the legislature, belatedly has billed the state \$2,665 for a two-week European tour last fall with his wife and infant daughter.

Collier's bills raised to \$7,748 the total state bills for the taxpayer-paid trip for himself and his two aides.

The tour officially was described as a study of timber taxation in Scandinavia. But a fellow senator has termed the resultant report as "not worth filing."

Collier, (D-Yreka), asked the state to pay all but \$5 per day of his family's joint lodging costs at several expensive hotels, including a \$50-a-day hotel apartment in London across from Hyde Park.

HOWEVER, the state controller's office will ask Collier to personally pay at least \$10 a day of the family's lodging cost before his expense claim is approved, the Riverside Press-Enterprise reported.

A similar \$10 charge was deducted by Mrs. Helen Winslow, the senator's administrative assistant, from her daily hotel bills to cover her husband's share of the

double-room charge on the tour.

In claims filed last month, Mrs. Winslow listed expenses of \$2,653 and Robert Hampton, another Collier aide, charged the state \$2,400.

The two aides, as well as Collier, flew first-class at \$1,685 each, despite a legislative policy that restricts staff travel to coach class.

Collier's wife and child spent the first week of the trip in the Park Lane Hotel in London, with Collier, 71, joining them for three days which were charged to the state with only a \$5 per day deduction.

HIS WIFE, Barbara, 35, and their eight-month-old daughter, Natasha, accompanied the senator to expensive hotels in Helsinki and Munich the second week, with again only a \$5 deduction from daily hotel rates of up to \$63.

Collier claimed \$23.72 for taxi fare from his Stockholm hotel to the city's airport. He said he lost the voucher for the item. He also billed the state \$48.05 for two telephone calls from Munich to his Sacramento residence.

## Pot Proposal Pales

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Blank petitions and a depleted war chest are hampering efforts to place a marijuana decriminalization initiative on the November ballot, organizers say.

"Most of our supporters seem to think that because we made it in 1972 we can qualify again this year without any difficulty. That isn't so," says Fran McDermott of Marijuana Reform League.

A well-financed and stronger-backed proposal to remove criminal penalties for private growth, possession and use of marijuana was defeated by California voters in 1972.

after persons began soliciting signatures — supporters had hoped for 325,000 signed supporters, Miss McDermott said in a weekend interview.

"We are having difficulties but I think we can still pull it out of the bag," she said.

"We have not been getting the kind of support that we did in 1972 for Prop. 19, the marijuana initiative," she said. "People do not realize that unless we can get a massive influx of signatures in the next several weeks we will not get on the ballot."

The 1972 campaign was backed with \$50,000 in contributions mostly from Amorphia, a San Francisco-based marijuana law reform

group. This year, the campaign's war chest totals only about \$30,000, and Amorphia, with its own financial problems, has been handcuffed in providing financial assistance, Miss McDermott said.

She said the group will try to emphasize its dire need of assistance in half-page ads in some metropolitan newspapers, beginning this week.

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## 3 Die in Collision Of Two Light Planes

LAKE ELSINORE (AP) — A glider pilot who cut loose at the last second was the only survivor after two single-engine planes slammed together in an explosion and fiery crash that killed three persons, officials say.

The victims were identified by a Riverside County deputy coroner as John Sohus, 52, his wife, Maxine, 51, both of Pasadena, and James W. Bradshaw, 21, Canoga Park.

Witnesses reported Bradshaw's plane, a Super Cub 150, had the glider under tow at 1,200 feet and was climbing for altitude Sunday shortly after takeoff near Lake Elsinore.

The thunderous explosion was heard by hundreds at the lake, officials reported.

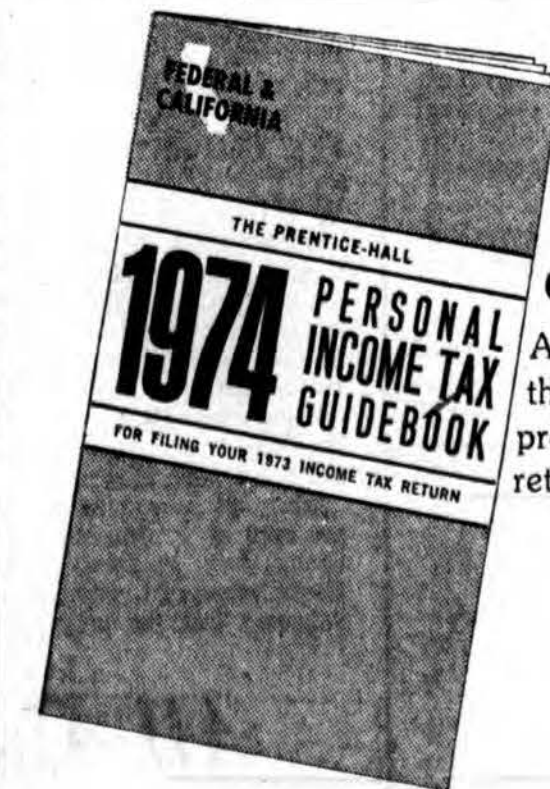
Firemen said nearly 2,000 onlookers swarmed to the crash site and got in their way as they attempted to probe wreckage to look for survivors.

The wreckage was centered on a vacant lot near Skyway Airport. A coroner's spokesman said the bodies were burned beyond recognition.

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# Freeway Dilemma

Supervisors last week prudently turned aside a last-ditch move by Irvine, Costa Mesa and Newport Beach to divert federal urban development funds to pay for the stalled Corona del Mar Freeway.

The freeway hit a snag when the state withdrew \$7 million in gas tax money that was to pay for the first section.

The cities reasoned that some other financial commitment had to be found before a deadline arrives this week requiring environmental impact studies for all new freeway construction.

The money they wanted was part of a total of up to \$30 million that county and city governments will get over the next three years from Uncle Sam to develop advanced transit systems.

Whether or not one freeway construction project is proper use of this special federal money is questionable. The main point that should be made is that the approach was too hasty and spurred by desperation to beat a deadline.

The Corona del Mar Freeway remains Orange County's No. 1 transportation project and should not have been deleted from the Department of Transportation's budget.

With virtually every force in the county behind the project, the state should reinstate the program. Most freeway programs in the state are under attack and this is one everyone agrees is needed — and soon.

## Candor: Phase II

Phase I of President Nixon's Operation Candor foundered on the shoals of the 18-minute tape erasure. Now we seem to be moving into Phase II.

This involves provocative statements from outside the White House implying that certain mysterious documents exist that could clear the President of Watergate involvement if he would only release them.

The first volley was fired by Senate minority leader

Hugh Scott (R-Pa.) who referred on a national television program to seeing documents which "seem to me to exculpate the President." The documents allegedly contain summaries of conversations between the President and John Dean which refute Dean's testimony.

Scott's remarks were followed up by Vice President Gerald Ford who said he too is convinced, on the basis of the same documents, that the President had no prior knowledge of Watergate and took no part in the cover-up.

Ford, however, admits he hasn't seen the documents and was basing his statement on conversations with the President.

Both Scott and Ford maintain the President cannot release the mysterious documents because their publication might jeopardize pending legal action against persons involved in Watergate. However, Judge John Sirica ruled last November that President Nixon was free to release as much Watergate material as he wished.

Meanwhile a panel of the Committee for Economic Development finds that, "Public cynicism concerning the conduct of the Presidency is at an all-time low."

Small wonder.

## UCI's True Friend

Orange County and UC Irvine lost a staunch friend and supporter last week with the death, at 82, of Edward J. "Brick" Power.

Long active in the UC Berkeley Alumni Association, Power, who had become an Orange County leader, headed up the citizens' committee that convinced UC Regents to locate a new campus at Irvine.

When the campus became a reality, he remained active until the end with the Friends of UCI and the UCI Foundation.

His record of accomplishment for community good is an education in itself.

# Columnist Recounts Plumbers' Efforts to Silence Him

WASHINGTON — It has been reported on the front pages that President Nixon's Keystone Kops, otherwise known as the plumbers, sought in late 1971 to plug our White House leaks.

We have endured innumerable indignities, it's true, from the grim men charged with safeguarding Mr. Nixon's secrets.

As early as 1970, his chief Prussian guard, H.R. Haldeman, ordered White House gumshoe Jack Sullivan to investigate us. Thereafter, the FBI and the Pentagon's security force joined in the search for our sources. They grabbed the wrong man, who was exonerated by a grand jury in early 1971.

LATER THAT year, the plumbers were unleashed upon us. They used lie detectors, tapped telephones and staked out suspected sources. They learned little

about our operation, but they discovered the Joint Chiefs were spying on Henry Kissinger.

Still the intrepid plumbers never let up. They inscribed my name, according to the New York Times, on a wallboard in their basement sanctum.

THIS INSPIRED the two most celebrated plumbers, presumably, to set forth on a mini-Mission Impossible in early 1972 to counteract our ITT stories.

G. Gordon Liddy, according to sworn Watergate testimony, spirited ITT's Dita Beard off to Denver. E. Howard Hunt, wearing a preposterous reddish wig, paid a subsequent midnight call upon Mrs. Beard in a Denver hospital and gave her instructions what her sworn testimony should be.

At one point, Liddy misinterpreted a remark made by Jeb Stuart Magruder and thought he was supposed to kill me. Happily, Magruder straightened out the misunderstanding in time.

Robert Mardian, then the assistant attorney general in charge of internal

security, also got into the act. He placed my house under surveillance and ordered his gumshoes to tail me until my nine children located the stake-out spots and chased the agents away with cameras.

DURING THIS period, ITT retained Intel, the famed private detective agency, to join the pack of probers on our trail. The Justice Department quietly cooperated with this private ITT investigation.

Finally, the White House sent word to the Justice Department to make a criminal case against us. The law-and-order boys obligingly cast about for a crime to pin on us. They decided to try to nail us for conspiring with the Indian militants, who had stolen government documents.

The FBI learned from an informant

that I was supposed to pick up some documents from the Indians.

A trap was laid and eight FBI men waited to pounce upon me. But instead, my associate Les Whitten walked into the trap. Unimpressed, a grand jury refused to indict anyone.

If the foregoing seems like comic opera, it has its ominous overtones. The White House went to extreme lengths, however slapstick the results may have been, to obstruct our investigative reporting. These excesses were authorized in the name of national security.

INSIDERS have now listed for us the stories that most upset the White House. We'll let you judge whether these stories endangered national security:

— We reported on March 24, 1971, that the Pentagon had prepared detailed plans for bombing North Vietnam and mining Haiphong harbors. This was at a time when the White House claimed to be winding down the Vietnam War.

— Six days later, in the face of

official denials that American ground troops were operating inside Cambodia and Laos, we cited secret messages giving the exact number of Americans who had been killed during the incursions.

— On August 6, 1971, we revealed that a \$100,000 cash contribution had been delivered by billionaire Howard Hughes' aide, Richard Danner, to President Nixon's pal, Bebe Rebozo.

— WE PUBLISHED a number of stories, beginning on February 16, 1972, tying the President's nephew, Donald A. Nixon, with the slippery international financier Robert Vesco.

— We linked ex-Attorney General John Mitchell to the Watergate case for the first time, disputing his claim that he had no advance knowledge of the Watergate espionage.

— On October 3, 1972, we broke the first story that public funds had been used to improve President Nixon's San Clemente estate, including \$13,500 for a new heating system.

— We revealed on January 15, 1973, that the four Cubans who broke into the Watergate were offered regular \$1,000-a-month payments if they would plead guilty and keep their mouths shut.

— We published the first direct documentation of the Watergate charges on April 2, 1973. This was Watergate wiretapper James McCord's secret memo to the Senate Watergate Committee.

— WE BEGAN publishing on April 16, 1973, excerpts from the secret transcripts of the Watergate grand jury. At this time, President Nixon still hoped to bottle up the scandal inside the grand jury, which was under the jurisdiction of then-Attorney General Richard Kleindienst.

We wrote many more columns, most notably the India-Pakistan and ITT stories, which upset the White House mightily. But the President's real concern, we suggest, was over his political security, not national security.

## Dangerous Predicament For U.S. Defense Funds

WASHINGTON — The Nixon administration will press Congress to let defense spending soar a staggering \$8 billion over a year ago, but even that increase will fail to match Soviet military gains.

The defense budget for fiscal year 1975, beginning July 1, was decided on last week amid typical confusion at the Nixon White House. It calls for spending at least \$87 billion — far more than expected.

Yet, that astronomical figure is almost wholly the result of inflation, military pay increases voted by Congress and special aid to Israel during the Yom Kippur war. It does not even pretend to solve U.S. problems in the race with Moscow for technological supremacy.

NOTHING could more dismally underline the dangerous predicament of U.S. defense today. Thanks to the crushing burden of the all-volunteer armed services, military pay makes up an ever-larger percentage of the budget. Thus, the grim prospect: rising defense spending that fails to prevent dangerous Soviet superiority in weaponry.

What further complicates this are vagaries of federal budgeting. While the anti-defense bloc in Congress boasts of a \$2 billion-plus cut in the Pentagon budget, that cut affects authorizations for future years only. In truth, the

\$79 billion listed for defense in fiscal year 1974, ending June 30, actually climbed to \$80 billion.

This confused none other than Roy Ash, President Nixon's imperious budget chief. Desperately trying to control ballooning spending, Ash took \$77 billion (the \$79 billion estimate for fiscal 1974 minus the \$2 billion cut) as his starting defense figure, aiming to keep the fiscal 1975 projection around \$80 billion.

SCREAMS of outrage came from the Pentagon, aided no little by domestic counselor Melvin R. Laird. The former Secretary of Defense, leaving the Nixon administration for good Feb. 1, as a parting gesture convinced the budget-makers that \$87 billion is really a bare-bones minimum.

The arithmetic is grim but simple. Taking the real fiscal 1974 spending figure—\$80 billion—as the starting point, more than \$5 billion must be added for inflation and the inexorable salary demands of the all-volunteer army, plus \$1.5 billion for the Yom Kippur war. The grand total of around \$87 billion has now been accepted at the White House.

BUT THAT TOTAL, the Joint Chiefs of Staff believe, will not prevent the Soviet Union from overtaking the U.S. in conventional arms in the late 1970s. It would limit research and development spending to one-half the Kremlin's and provides ship construction funds far less than Russia's.

But the needed increases for research and development seem unattainable on Capitol Hill, partly because the overall federal budget, including a variety of new, high-cost welfare programs, has become so gargantuan. Moreover, the anti-defense bloc in Congress remains formidable.

Finally, there is President Nixon. Fighting against the energy crisis and for his political survival, he shows neither desire nor ability to lead any crusade for national defense. That's why, the \$87 billion defense budget—carrying deadly-dangerous portents for the future—is the most that can be expected.

## Nixon Mannerisms Sometimes Confusing Would Tapes Be Misinterpreted?

WASHINGTON — An "informed source" has told the Associated Press that White House tapes exculpating President Nixon are not being released, and from another source comes the reason why.

The tapes are subject to a different interpretation by those who are not

familiar with President Nixon's habits in dealing with subordinates, nor his general style in mentally exploring problems with them.

Tentative feelers, the "drawing out" of those who advise him, the airing of impractical ideas, snap judgments, personalized comments all figure in the much vaunted Nixon decision-making process which is less orderly than advertised. Nixon is also given to the kind of off-hand remarks to which Harry S. Truman was addicted, but delivered in an awkward way robbing them of their pungency.

At the time the White House was thinking of making public summaries of the tapes, it was reasoned that people who do not understand Nixon's style could not comprehend the raw material. But now it has apparently been concluded that they would distrust the summaries and use them merely to show the reason why the full tapes, subject to misunderstanding, should be released.

THE SAME thing applies to those tapes which are going before the Grand Jury. How could grand jurors without legal training and no knowledge of Nixon's methods of exploring problems, his intonation of voice or his attitudes toward subordinates, come to any reasonable conclusion on the basis of the raw tapes?, it is asked.

When it is pointed out that it is the duty of a prosecutor to guide the Grand Jury in such matters, White House informants return to their earlier judgment that the prosecuting staff is

strongly prejudiced without even realizing it.

THE SALIENT point is that former White House counsel John Dean, the accuser of Nixon, has gotten mixed up on what Nixon knew when, confusing one meeting with another, and defeating his own story that the President knew of the Watergate cover-up prior to March 21, 1973.

It can be surmised that the trouble is that this is more apparent to those who comprehend Nixon's style — his drawing out of Dean on one occasion, for example — than the actual words on the tapes could convey to someone disposed to think otherwise.

But if the White House version is to be accepted, the suspicion is created that Dean might be subject to perjury charges, from which he has not been given immunity in his guilty plea deal with former prosecutor Archibald Cox.

IF THAT is the case, and it is also the case that a reasonable premise can be laid that the tapes do exculpate Nixon, at least in part, they ought to be released publicly, however subject to misinterpretation.

A couple of possible conclusions present themselves. Nixon may not yet fully comprehend the fix he is in. He may believe that the maneuvering on

his impeachment will cause it to fall of its own weight, or that if he continues to hang tough the charges against his subordinates will be reduced in severity. Once the fates of John Ehrlichman and H. R. Haldeman have been settled, the President's room for maneuver may expand. His own defense can be more flexible.

These are rationalizations by those who believe, like Sen. Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, that Nixon is holding something back which would work in his favor but for inexplicable reasons is not disclosed.

If that is true, and the impeachment-resignation idea still has been permitted to go so far as to become a 50-50 question in the public consciousness, then somebody has terribly misjudged the requirements for public disclosure.

THAT LEAVES the possibility that public disclosure — "letting it all hang out," as Senator Scott says — would not work in the President's favor but against him.

Unfortunately, that is the impression which has been left on the public mind, and it is very late in the game for "informed sources" saying there is proof that the President is not guilty to surface.

## Soviets Find Oil Weapon

The following observations on Russia's discovery of oil as a weapon to estrange Western Europe from the U.S. originated in L'Express of Paris, and were reprinted in the International Herald Tribune.

What looms highest over the horizon of the new year is that the Soviet empire has found—finally, after searching for 55 years—a real means of conquest. For a number of decades (until about 1960) Communism depended on the deterioration of capitalism and on the economic superiority of Socialism to win the great historic confrontation. But it had to abandon that plan.

Later, it relied on its Spartan ability to consecrate its resources toward building a military supremacy: megaton hydrogen bombs, Berlin blockade, rockets in Cuba, space breakthrough, etc.

But the Soviet empire also had to give up this form of conquest. The United States was always able to up the ante. To give birth to new inventions and to maintain the equilibrium.

But now there is the oil weapon. It is a revolution in the balance of power. What neither political ideology nor military efforts could accomplish, the systematic and selective use, if controlled and unlimited, of the price of energy can do: the breakup of liberal, parliamentary nations, their estrangement from the United States and their submission.

# Less Strict Airport Noise Standards on Appear on Horizon

Southern California airport operators expect that within a year they'll finally have a solid handle on the problem that has been the bane of their lives — jet noise.

Not that they're planning on a true "Whisperjet." Nothing has succeeded in quieting the planes completely.

BUT AFTER years of study, the Federal Aviation Administration and the Environmental Protection Agency within months are due to hand down uniform noise level standards for the nation's airports.

When they come, the standards will cause a sigh of relief from the Southland's airport managers, who have been caught between airfield-area residents wanting less noise and the airlines, who want no changes.

For the last year, the operators tried unsuccessfully to contend with state

rules finally are issued, they'll probably be a boon to the Los Angeles Airport Commission in other ways than just alleviating problems with noise-measuring devices.

For one thing, they'll provide a yardstick to measure the impact of the proposed Palmdale Intercontinental Airport on the surrounding Antelope Valley area. Construction there has been held up more than a

year because of a Sierra Club lawsuit forcing a thorough environmental impact study of the project.

Solid sound standards would remove much of the speculation about how much noise is permissible from that study.

IN ADDITION, they would provide the airport commissioners, who also operate Ontario International

Airport, a firmer basis for deciding whether to expand Ontario's load.

There is likely to be new pressure on them to do just that.

Much of it will come from Orange County, where Supervisor Ronald Caspers says he's given up on his plan to try to construct a major new airport on vacant land at the Camp Pendleton Marine Corps base.

Instead, Caspers says, he wants to move Orange County Airport's jet operations to Ontario, where there have so far been no major jet noise hassles.

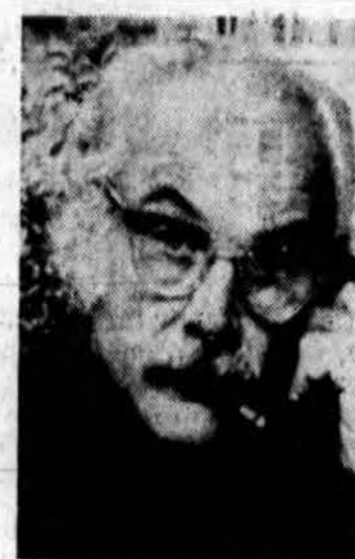
BUT SUCH disputes are likely to come along with the additional traffic, if Caspers succeeds in shifting it there.

"The only place where there could be a noise problem at Ontario would be to the west

of the airport under the takeoff pattern," said a Los Angeles Airport Commission spokesman.

"But the denser the traffic, the greater the noise and the protests."

SINCE THE airports have had problems with even the monitoring system they now must have, the coming federal regulations should at least simplify things.

standards much tougher than the federal ones are expected to be.

PART OF THEIR lack of success in meeting state standards has been caused by troubles with noise monitoring devices the state required them to set up. No doubt, their failure is also due to the lack of an effective state enforcement agency.

"We just can't get the monitoring system to work," says a spokesman for Los Angeles International Airport. "It's too complex and so we really don't know the exact noise levels here."

One place where noise monitoring devices have worked well is the much-smaller Orange County Airport. The problem there is that the noise levels — which have sparked \$175 million worth of lawsuits — clearly exceed the state standards.

NEARBY RESIDENTS are incensed that despite this finding, nothing has been done to enforce the state standards. Representing those residents, the city of Newport Beach went to court last year, forcing the state Department of Aeronautics to schedule a hearing on the matter for next month.

At the hearing, the airport management will seek a waiver from the state rules. If no waiver is granted, Orange County Airport conceivably could be forced either to shut down or to buy up some \$7 million worth of nearby residential property.

But when federal standards are issued, much of Orange County Airport's problem may disappear, even though the noise won't. That's because the U.S. Supreme Court ruled last year in a case involving noise at Hollywood-Burbank Airport that federal regulations pre-empt state and local airport standards.

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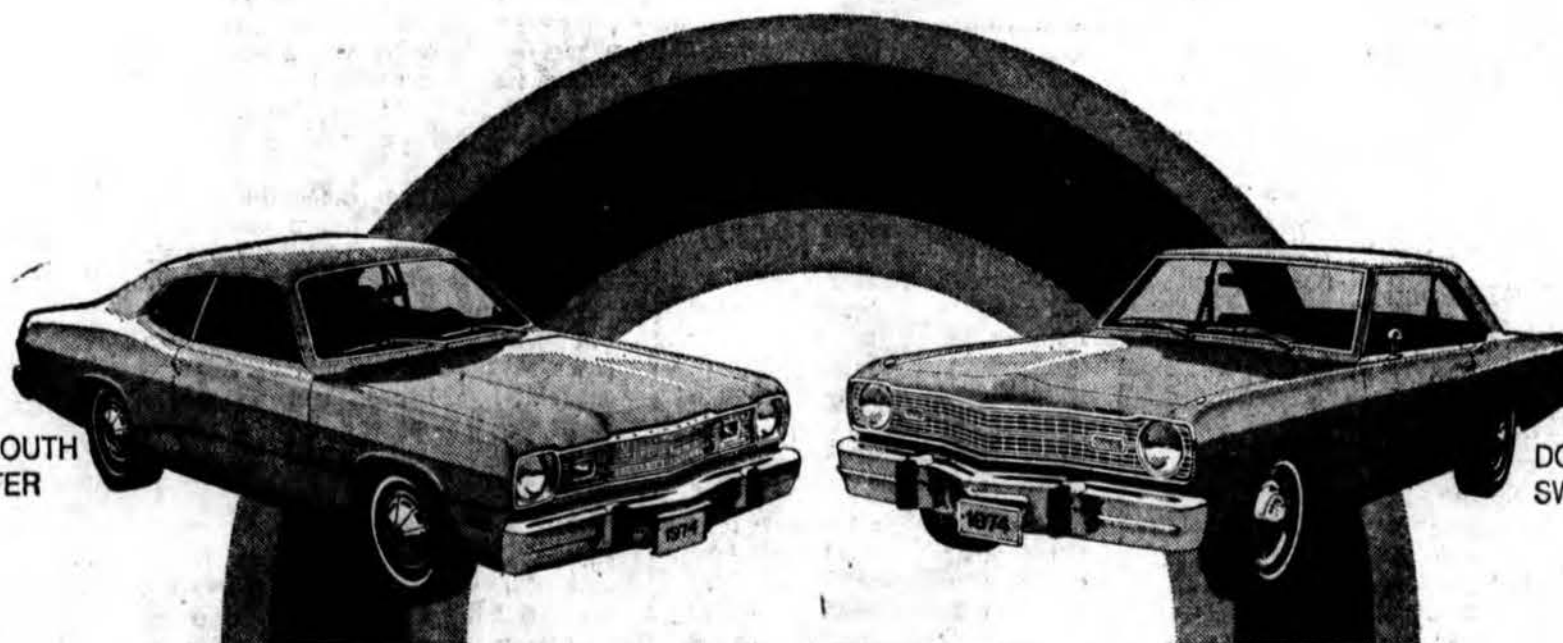

## Law Would Drive A Man to Drink

HOLBROOK, Ariz. (AP) — The local drunks here apparently aren't too happy about a new state law which redefines public intoxication as an illness rather than a crime.

Police Chief Jim Carroll believes. Since the state law went into effect Jan. 1, he said, the jail in this small northern Arizona community is getting a lot of walk-in business.

"A LARGE NUMBER of our regulars are staggering in, wanting to sleep it off here," he said.

To get around arresting them, Carroll said his officers simply list them as "sleepers" and give them a bunk.

But the new system has one drawback.

"SLEEPERS ARE turned out in the morning, and so some of these guys are not eating as good as they used to when they'd get picked up and were here a day or two," Carroll said.

Under the new state law, public drunks are to be taken to rehabilitation centers for treatment, if one is available. Under no conditions can they be arrested and placed in jail on a public intoxication charge.

My authority on this subject is a press release quoting a family financial adviser whose name, appropriately, is Penny Scott.

"IF THE CHILD observes that parents are constantly concerned and worried about

money and perhaps fighting about it quite a bit, he perceives that money is a constant, nagging problem and something that causes unhappiness.

"That's certainly getting a child off to a bad start and it can have a bad influence of the rest of his life," Miss Scott says.

You said a mouthful, Miss Scott.

Too many parents because of embarrassment or absentmindedness, neglect to tell their children the facts of money.

THE CHILD THEN picks up the information by hanging around banks and other places likely to give him a sordid view of finance.

Worst yet, some parents cop-

out with whimsical explanations about where money comes from. They may tell a child they found their money under a cabbage leaf, which causes confusion in later life.

Consider, for example, the reluctance of many political candidates to make public disclosures about personal finances and campaign contributions.

THEIR RETICENCE creates the impression they have something to hide. Nine times out of 10, however, it's just a case of excessive shyness.

Having been told in childhood that money is found under a cabbage leaf, they developed a physiological block when it is handed to them in plain manila envelopes.

This hangup also may manifest itself when they are filling out tax returns, causing them to minimize their income.

THE PERCENTAGE of adults who have monetary hangups can only be estimated.

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but it obviously is way up there.

Surveys show 67.2 percent of all married women east of the Rockies have "unsatisfactory" precenary relations with their husbands.

MANY WIVES fake it, pretending to enjoy joint checking accounts when

actually they are frustrated and unfulfilled. Small wonder that so many of them have extramarital fiscal affairs.

It doesn't have to be that way. When a child's natural curiosity about money is answered with simple, straightforward information, it all seems true and good and beautiful.

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# Increase Mileage Driving Lessons By 'Featherfoot'

DETROIT (AP) — Paul Prior's engineering pals at Chevrolet have called him "featherfoot" for years, but in these days of gasoline shortages there is envy in their voices.

Prior, 48, a project engineer, has devoted most of his adult life to helping drivers get better mileage from their cars.

"I'M CONVINCED drivers of all makes can achieve better mileage if they observe a few basic principles," said Prior, who helped train Chevy drivers for competition in oil company sponsored economy runs. Drivers competed against each other to determine which driver and car turned in the best fuel economy.

"More economical driving only takes practice," Prior said. "Basically, you have to practice being smooth, avoid hard starts and avoid unnecessary throttle movements.

"Of course the car should be tuned, with good tire pressure and wheel alignment."

To prove his point, Prior put an AP newsman behind the wheel of a 1974 Impala

and had him drive a 39-mile route of suburban roads.

A FLOW METER recorded the exact amount of gasoline used.

The normally lightfooted reporter got 12.02 miles per gallon.

Then Prior held a brief seminar on gas-saving driving, gave the reporter a few minutes practice and took him around the course again.

This time the reporter got the help of a vacuum gauge, which shows when the car is using excess power — and gas.

The reporter got 1.18 more miles per gallon the second time around.

Drivers can do nonmechanical things to help achieve better mileage, too.

"Timing stop lights so you catch a majority of greens helps," Prior said. "Don't accelerate going up hills and observe all speed limits and you'll save gas, too."

SOME DRIVERS Prior has taken around the course have realized as much as a three miles per gallon improvement.

"The average driver drives 12,000 miles a year," Prior said. "If he got 12 m.p.g. he'd burn 1,000 gallons. But if he could get 14 m.p.g. he'd only burn 857 gallons.

"At 50 cents a gallon, which we're paying today, that's a savings of \$71.50 a year," he said.

## Taxpayers: Channel 50 Has Answer

## Ice Cream's Kosher Rabbi OK's Cold Stuff at Wife's Urging

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The rabbi's wife knew what she wanted, so now San Francisco's ice cream-loving Orthodox Jews are finding their favorite confection "strictly kosher."

But they'll have to suffer along deprived of rocky road, chocolate chip and tutti frutti. And the cones are out, too.

After ice-creamless years of frustration, the Union of Congregations has given the kosher seal of approval to 25 flavors available at Uncle Gaylord's Old Fashioned Ice Cream parlors.

BECAUSE A rabbi's wife simply loves ice cream.

"I'm just crazy about it," said Dinah Schick. "I was so frustrated that I kept asking my husband, 'Isn't there a kosher ice cream?'"

Her husband, Rabbi Michael Schick, who certifies products as kosher, told her there was no ice cream in San Francisco that complied with the strict Jewish dietary laws.

Commercial ice creams available here contain

preservatives, emulsifiers, stabilizers, chemicals, gelatins, artificial flavorings or artificial colorings which can be made with animal derivatives.

TO BE KOSHER, meat must be killed in a prescribed fashion and certified by a rabbi. Since there was no way to guarantee that manufacturers weren't including non-kosher animal derivatives in ice cream, it was impossible to give the kosher seal to any commercial ice cream.

Undaunted, Mrs. Schick pressed on, hunting a solution to her ice cream cravings. Several months ago she found one. She heard about Uncle Gaylord's and learned that except for three flavors, his ice cream contained no additives.

An excited Mrs. Schick passed the news to her husband and soon afterward, Rabbi Schick made a thorough inspection of the company's manufacturing equipment, ice cream ingredients and premises.

## In Collisions Study Claims Small Autos 'Hurt More'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A new highway safety study says your chances of getting seriously injured or killed in a collision between two small cars are two times greater

drivers of subcompact cars who use seatbelts "fared as badly in crashes as unbelted drivers in full sized cars."

The studies were conducted by the University of North Carolina's Highway Research Center and published today by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, an independent safety research organization.

Crash data was compiled on 162,000 1966-1970 model cars and 17,000 drivers, both belted and unbelted in full size and subcompact 1970-72 models.

Results of the like-size car crashes showed that "chances of injury and death increased with decreasing vehicle weight. Chances of severe injury and death increase especially rapidly in the cars weighing less than 3,000 pounds," the study said.

## BART Ends Rohr Bid For Trains

OAKLAND (UPI) — The Bay Area Rapid Transit District has told Rohr manufacturers of the system's transit cars, it will not accept any more new trains because too many defects were found in the present ones.

"We just said, 'no more,'" said William Rhine, BART chief electrical engineer.

Rhine said it has decided to refuse the new cars after it was determined the seats in the last 29 cars did not meet safety requirements.

Rohr, a Chula Vista firm, has delivered 279 cars, and BART is to get 150 more.

BART officials said that last week 64 trains out of 177 sent into service from the South Hayward yard broke down.

Meanwhile, BART officials warned the system would go under in about a year unless \$13 million in operating subsidies were received.

The board said it had approved a unanimous resolution to federal and state officials that said the legislation creating BART provided that "insofar as practicable" fares were to pay all operating costs.

The board said it had determined that it "is not practicable to raise fares sufficiently to cover all BART costs enumerated in the act,"

## What to Do While Waiting Health Plan on Way

With President Nixon's introduction of his 1974 liberalized version of a national health insurance program, the U.S. will inch a bit closer to a system to protect us from the catastrophic costs of a serious, prolonged or terminal illness or accident.

No matter how much progress is made this year, though, it will be a long time before we join most of the world's nations in passing legislation to help families surmount the enormous financial as well as emotional burdens of disease, accident and death.

AND THERE is no certainty whatsoever today whether the legislation finally passed will be a variation of the proposals of Nixon or those of Sens. Kennedy (D-Mass.), Javits (R-N.Y.) or many others in or out of Congress.

In the meantime, what do you do about health insurance?

(1) Hold onto any old disability policy you might have if your health is impaired. If you want to expand your disability insurance, keep your old policy and supplement it — but do not replace it, because it undoubtedly carries a lower premium reflecting your younger age when you bought it. If your health is good, you may be able to get cheaper coverage, even though you are now older.

(2) CHECK WHETHER the policy you are considering is what is known as "non-cancellable guaranteed renewable." Under this type of policy, your premiums can't

be raised unless they are raised for all policyholders in your classification.

(3) Check whether the policy has a conversion privilege, so that you can, if necessary, transfer your coverage to an individual basis — if, say, you leave an employer group for a new job, or you leave your family's contract in order to be married, etc. — without having restrictive waiting periods imposed on you.

(4) At the same time, be sure to check whether any refund is owed to you on your previous policy.

(5) INVESTIGATE carefully how maternity benefits are paid, if you are a single woman and plan to remain so; important changes are being made in response to changing attitudes about morals and sex discrimination. Many more plans, for instance, are providing payments for unmarried women, including maternity benefits for babies born out of wedlock.

(6) Don't waste your money carrying duplicate coverage. It's possible you'll be able to collect on both policies — and maybe even make a profit on an illness — but many insurers are coordinating their payments to prevent this. Usually, one policy, the first or primary one, is given preference by the company and the second policy will pay only that part of the medical bill not covered by the first.

(7) CHECK INTO your coverage for mental illness, for health insurance coverage for this illness is becoming much more readily available. Also, many Blue Cross policyholders have some mental illness coverage, although it is sharply limited

in most cases.

(8) Look into a little-known benefit now available in some disability insurance policies called "income insurance for the breadwinner's wife." This covers the cost of household help if the wife becomes ill or disabled.

(9) While this may not be your problem, it's a disease widespread enough for you to become aware that many insurance companies include alcoholics in their rehabilitation programs and will provide personal medical and social aid, often sending the alcoholic to a specialized rehabilitation center.

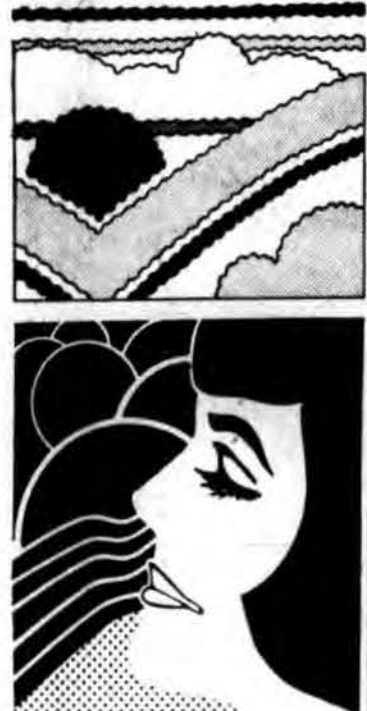
AND EVEN THOSE insurers that do not pay for such specialized treatment almost always cover treatment for alcoholism in their hospital and disability policies.

(10) Note at what age your policy covers your children. Children should be covered from birth and not, as some policies state, from the age of two weeks. It's the first two weeks in the life of your baby that very often are the most expensive medically.

(11) If you pay your own premiums directly, save money by paying on an annual or quarterly rather than monthly basis.

(12) AND IMPORTANT as it is to know just what is covered under your health insurance, it's even more important to know what is excluded from coverage. Knowing what's excluded won't help you pay for the condition if it arises, but at least you won't be hit by the blow at the worst possible time — when you're flat on your back. And you might be able to arrange for the coverage elsewhere.

## Nun Asks Female Priests

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Jesus Christ wasn't a male chauvinist, so male leaders of the Roman Catholic Church shouldn't be either, says an outspoken nun who wants women to become eligible for the priesthood.

Sister Albertus Magnus McGrath says the church should heed "the remarkable fairness and balance Jesus showed in dealing with women and his freedom to rise above the male chauvinism in his culture."

THE REMARKS of the sister, a Dominican nun and chairman of the history department at Chicago's Rosary College, were made in an article published in a nationally distributed Catholic magazine, the "St. Anthony Messenger."

Contending that "women should have an equal claim to the priesthood," she pointed out that Jesus preached and practiced "equality of treatment" for men and women. She said Jesus "men-related miracles and parables were paralleled with regularity with miracles and parables relating to women."

"Christ loved women," she said. "He befriended them, he cured them, he was served very intimately by women."

"I THINK HE gave a kind of emancipation proclamation to Martha and to all women when he said, in effect, 'Fine, housework's okay, but that's not the end and limit of your being. Mary has chosen the better part.' The better part is for the rest of us women, too — which is not generally what we have been taught."

"I think that women are bound then to follow what Christ gave them," she added. "They must learn to be courageous enough to stand firm, to fight for recognition of their equal human dignity, their equal human worth, their equal right to follow the vocation to which they feel they are called in the church. I think for women not to do this is a betrayal of the dignity and the gifts that God gave them."

Joan Carlson met Jamie last August. The pair lead different lives, but have become fast friends.

Joan, an attractive blonde, lives in Huntington Beach. A graduate of California State University, Long Beach with a BA in vocal music, she sings professionally and teaches piano.

Jamie, age 7, is a client in Fairview State Child Physical and Social Development Program. She is a chatty, affectionate child who enjoys the attention she receives.

Neither can walk—each because of a birth defect—but the pair are quite mobile in their wheelchairs.

Joan and Jamie met through Dr. Jean Carlin, chief of professional education at Fairview and a member of the UCI Medical School staff in psychiatry.

**ROLE MODEL**  
"Joan is serving as a role model for Jamie," Dr. Carlin explained. "There are no role models among the hospital staff for her. They are all ambulatory."

Jamie had been the center of attention on Ward 9 until some of the other clients began to learn to walk. Jamie began to question her loss of attention.

"When she asked 'What about me?' I thought she was asking a lot of things," Dr. Carlin said. "Why don't I get the attention? Don't you like me anymore? and how am I different?"

"I first met Joan when she sang at the graduation ceremonies for Long Beach State. I told her about Jamie and asked if she'd be interested in working with her."

"At first," Miss Carlson said, "I'd come for about half an hour. Now I usually stay three hours."

"Jamie needed someone to copy, to look up to, to want to be like," Dr. Carlin explained. "Joan will make Jamie do things the rest of us might not have asked of her."

Explained the volunteer, "I can ask her to do things because I know she can do them. I've encountered many of the problems she will have to face and from my own experience I can help her."

## EMPHASIZE POSITIVE

"Too often," added Dr. Carlin, "when a child has some kind of limitation, we underestimate his capabilities, concentrating on what they can't do rather than what they are capable of doing."

"Who could better be a model for the kind of a person Jamie can grow up to be than Joan?"

Each Friday Joan drives to Costa Mesa to visit with Jamie. On the rare occasions she can't make it to Fairview, she calls Jamie for a long telephone conversation.

Joan's visits offer an opportunity to introduce Jamie to a lot of everyday things she misses in the facility. And, Joan can be an example for what Jamie may be able to do as she grows older. Jamie's father visits regularly but the staff feel she needs a female model with whom to identify as well.

"I've even taken her out to the parking lot to see the manual controls in my car," she said.

Since August the pair have developed remarkable communication. On a recent visit a discussion of Jamie's favorite television program, *Bowling for Dollars*, led to a description of Joan's bowling experiences and the suggestion that perhaps soon Jamie could try it.

## VERBALIZATION

Joan noted that the pair "do a lot of talking" to help improve Jamie's verbalization and encourage her to more original communication rather than repeating what others said. Joan's work has aided the staff in working with Jamie.

Jamie described the usual schedule for Joan's visits herself.

"First," she said, "we go to visit Dr. Carlin. Then we go for a drink. Then, we go to wash our dirty hands." The latter is not that simple when you realize the pair have to maneuver two wheelchairs through a double set of doors to reach restroom facilities.

"But," said Jamie, "I hold the door for her and then she holds it for me and she goes through and I go through." The pair face other obstacles like reaching too high elevator buttons.

"But Jamie is learning a lot of things she can do."

Joan has brought along photographs of friends and places she's been, describing them all for Jamie. She's also helped hospital staff work on improving the use of Jamie's left hand.

## DOING PUZZLES

"We're going to start on a jigsaw puzzle soon."

Joan added, "there are a lot of things that happen that a doctor probably won't even think about. And, there are a lot of things any child takes time to understand, and every little girl needs someone to identify with, to want to be like."

If Joan comes late in the day Friday Jamie will be waiting with the question, "Why didn't you come sooner?"

The friendship is definitely mutual.

"I've really become attached to Jamie. I only came for a half hour at first, now it's more like three hours. I think of things to do with her all the time. I love making her happy, getting her excited about things."

"I don't try to structure anything, but when a subject comes up I encourage her to talk about it."

Enid Lathrop, director of volunteer services at Fairview, added that "normalization" is something emphasized with all volunteers at the facility.

"These children can miss some of the everyday things, so we try to encourage the volunteers to bring as much of the community and everyday things with them as possible."

There is a place, she said, for all kinds of volunteers at the facility.

"We have had retarded persons work as volunteers. One boy even joined the staff as an employee after his volunteer work," said Mrs. Lathrop.

"We're looking for qualities that match the job."

Dr. Carlin sees many possibilities for handicapped persons to do volunteer work.

"There are many situations in which a handicapped child could benefit from a friendship with a role model—as with Joan and Jamie."

With the success of their relationship, the idea might just catch on.

## Involvement in Government Backed

Patricia Reilly Hitt, fresh from a week's trip to Washington, D. C. will speak in the Laguna Moulton Playhouse Thursday, Jan. 31, on a subject she knows well: the potentialities of women in government and business.

This talk for Queen of Hearts Guild, Children's Hospital of Orange County will be her first major public address in her home town of Laguna Beach since she retired in April from her post of assistant secretary for community and field services in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Mrs. Hitt, the first woman appointed to serve in the Nixon Administration, now is a member of the President's Commission on White House Fellows.

As one of 15 commission members she helps select the 15-18 young people who serve as fellows in the Administration each year.

### MOST PRESTIGIOUS

"It is the most prestigious citizen involvement there is," she commented in her Laguna home.

Fellows are selected from a large group of applicants in a wide range of fields. They must be between the ages of 21 and 35 and must have achieved in their chosen fields.

The recent meeting of the commission was a prelude to the May meeting when the finalists will be selected during four days of screening.

This membership is the only federal commitment she currently has, Mrs. Hitt said.

The fellows, she explained, are assigned to federal agencies and departments such as Commerce, HEW and HUD. They work closely with cabinet heads and top staff members in each department.

"The purpose is for what will be the coming leaders in this country to get an intimate knowledge of the workings of the Federal government," Mrs. Hitt added.

### THREE CALIFORNIANS

The Californians on the commission beside herself are Milton Friedman, a Stanford University economist, and Dr.

Glen Campbell, a member of the Stanford Institute of War and Peace.

Members are drawn from all walks of life and there are educators, scientists and businessmen.

Of the fellows she said, "They're brilliant but they're practical. They are very well rounded. Every fellow is involved in community service in his home area."

Their year in Washington includes a trip abroad to meet with heads of state in several countries.

Commenting about Watergate Mrs. Hitt said, "I will be glad to see this resolved. I feel very strongly it should now go to the courts. Let's get back to business."

"There is no doubt that all the all-consuming interest in Watergate has slowed down the workings of government. We need to get back to the business at hand."

### PREDICTS BENEFITS

"Whatever the disposition made, in the long run our political system will benefit in reform."

Mrs. Hitt, who began her career in

politics as a volunteer working in President Nixon's first campaign for the House of Representatives in 1946, was the first woman to co-chair a national presidential campaign for either party.

She received a Los Angeles Times Woman-of-the-year award in 1969 and the Theta Sigma Phi Woman in the News award that same year.

Since she has stepped down from her cabinet position, Mrs. Hitt has served as a consultant for the Department of Defense and now is redecorating her historic Laguna home and "still unwinding."

"I'm not the least bit bored yet," she commented. "I'm not ready to return to a highly structured day."

"I know the time will come when I will be wanting something, but I just don't know what it will be yet. I'm not sure I want to do just volunteer work."

Mrs. Hitt also is retaining her "own personal deep interest in the Spanish-speaking minority" and will "continue to speak out on their behalf."

DEAR ANN LANDERS: If anyone can wake up the men in this world, it's you. Please try. I, and thousands more like me are desperate.

I am a single woman in my early 30s, longing for male companionship. I've had exactly three dates in my life. That's not a record I'm proud of, but those are the facts. I'm average-looking, five-foot-one and weigh 110 pounds. The problem is that I am in a wheelchair.

I had polio when I was a child but I've gone through college and now have a very good position with an insurance company. I've never met a person I couldn't get along with. Some people just require more patience than others.

I have many male friends—and that's the problem. They are just friends.

Why can't the men I meet understand that just because I'm in a wheelchair I am no less a woman? I have the same feelings, hopes and dreams of other women, and a great capacity to love. I'm not asking for myself, Ann.

There are thousands of us, just waiting for the chance to be wonderful sweethearts and wives. We can do almost everything other girls can do. We just can't walk, is all. Please, Ann, print this letter and ask them to give us a chance. — UNFULFILLED

DEAR FRIEND: I know some marvelously complete wives in

wheelchairs. One is Mrs. Cyrus Eaton in Ohio and one other is Mrs. John Burns, the wife of the Governor of Hawaii.

Beatrice Burns is an active and energetic mother. She entertains beautifully and presides over one of the busiest and most elegant mansions in the world.

Mrs. Burns has represented her husband and his state when he was unable to be present, and she has done it effec-

tively. Both Anne Eaton and Beatrice Burns have proven that a wife in a wheelchair can run rings around many wives with two perfectly good legs.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: The Philadelphia Inquirer's head on your column read, "Moses Led People to a Land With No Oil."

Your reader asked, "Which are smarter, Jews or Gentiles?" I found

your reply not only sarcastic, but bigoted. What's more, you didn't answer the question. # Evert Claims Surface Aided Win Over King

Billy Jean King's tennis game didn't improve enough in one day, and steady Chris Evert played like steady Chris Evert.

The result was a somewhat surprising 6-3, 6-1 victory for Miss Evert in the finals of the women's professional tennis tournament at Mission Viejo Sunday. It was worth first-prize money of \$10,000 and an automobile for Miss Evert, while Mrs. King collected \$5,000.

A turn-away crowd of 4,616 saw Miss Evert take just over an hour to down Mrs. King, who experienced the same kind of problems with her game that had nearly caused her to lose in Saturday's semifinals. That is — she had trouble with ground strokes, couldn't place overheads as well as she wanted, and didn't have a strong serve for much of the match.

"It wasn't a case of me doing anything well, it was more a matter of what Billie Jean did wrong," the 19-year-old Miss Evert said after the match.

"I felt good today, and felt that if I played well I'd give her a good match. I pretty much played my game, and she made the errors."

Beginning with the sixth game of the first set, Miss Evert broke Mrs. King's serve six straight times, while holding her own serve all but once. Appropriately, the match ended with Miss Evert breaking serve thanks to a double-fault and three errors by Mrs. King, the final a backhand which was long.

Miss Evert said the surface of the Mission Viejo courts may have been a big factor in her ability to break serve.

"At San Francisco (where she lost to Mrs. King last week) her serves stayed down, but with the surface here they seemed to come up more and

it was easier for me to put them away," she said.

Mrs. King, who struggled to defeat Nancy Gunter in Saturday's semifinals said her playing level had been down all week, even though she was fresh from a peak performance in San Francisco.

"Knowing what you want to do and doing it are two different things. I wasn't doing anything right today," Mrs. King said.

"I couldn't keep the ball in play to get to the net, and I even missed some easy ones when I did get up to it," Mrs. King said.

"Even my overheads, I couldn't put any angle on."

"I was hitting them all too straight, which makes it look like Chris is running them down. If I put the right angle on them, there's no way she can get to them."

"And I didn't get any of my first serves in either."

The proof of Mrs. King's words was especially evident in the critical eighth game of the first set. Having just broken serve to pull to 3-4 in games, Mrs. King took a 30-0 advantage on her own serve.

A forehand and a backhand error after good returns by Miss Evert brought the game back to deuce, and Mrs. King eventually lost it when she hit a forehand into the net and came up short with a drop shot. Both of the final two points came when Miss Evert

jumped on relatively weak second services.

Miss Evert's game, meanwhile, didn't waver from the strong baseline performance she showed from the opening round on. Her trademark two-handed backhand was deadly accurate, and she was able to keep Mrs. King off balance with well-placed lobs.

Mrs. King attributed that consistency to Miss Evert's baseline style.

"Generally, baseline players at 17 are what they'll be for years to come," Mrs. King said. "What you see now is the way Chris will play for the rest of her life. She's going to be tough throughout her career."

Except for the singles match, Australians grabbed the final-day spotlight. Kerry Melville downed Leslie Hunt (who replaced an injured Nancy Gunter) for the singles consolation championship 8-6.

Mrs. King was upset over an incident in her doubles loss.

Mrs. King and Miss Evert, teammates Sunday in the doubles match, lost 7-6, 6-4 to Australians Lesley Hunt and Kerry Harris after umpire Dick Baron asked Mrs. King what she thought of a linesman's call on a previous point.

The question came as Mrs. King was about to serve, leading 3-1 in the second set. After Mrs. King's reply Baron changed a call against her to let ball, but Mrs. King was visibly upset and lost service in the game.

## West Good For 2 Years, Says Sharman

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Los Angeles Lakers coach Bill Sharman doesn't think Jerry West should quit, but West apparently isn't sure.

"As for any retirement talk, I think Jerry can play another two years if he can avoid injuries and get in shape. This was the best game he's played since he's been back," Sharman said after West scored 18 points in the Lakers' 99-92 National Basketball Association victory over the Milwaukee Bucks Sunday night.

"He was quicker and penetrating even though his shooting wasn't as good as it usually is."

West was upset about his shooting — eight for 21 — as the Lakers reeled off 10 straight points late in the fourth period to overcome an 89-87 Milwaukee lead and end a seven-game Bucks winning string.

"I didn't get as tired as I have recently, but I wasn't shooting as well and I made some mistakes — like bad judgment," he said. "I just try to play as well as I can know how."

"My biggest concern is that I'm not 100 percent physically (fit) and I'll wake up tomorrow and my stomach will be sore. As I said, I'm very critical of my play and, if I'm not playing to the standards I've set for myself, it's hard for me to accept."

Bucks coach Larry Costello said Milwaukee was hurt by Kareem Abdul-Jabbar's missed dunk shot just before the Lakers 10-point blitz.

"We missed too many wide open shots and didn't play a smart game. We blew it more than Los Angeles won it," he said. "The shot that really hurt was when Kareem missed a dunk when we had an 89-87 lead with 6:51 to play."

## Quax Ousted From Games For Talking to Newsmen

CHRISTCHURCH, New Zealand (AP) — Dick Quax, one of New Zealand's top track stars, was expelled from the athletes' village at the Commonwealth Games today because of a newspaper article in which he accused Kenyan runners of rough tactics.

It appeared as a move to cool the smoldering ill feeling which followed last Friday's 10,000 meters race. David Bedford of England, the world record holder, was beaten into fourth place and accused the Kenyans of pushing him and pulling at his shorts as he ran.

## Laver Maintains Hex In Matches With Ashe

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — You have to admire Arthur Ashe's optimism. He elected to receive first against Corona del Mar's Rod Laver in Sunday's final of the \$100,000 U.S. professional tennis tournament. That's like kicking off to the Miami Dolphins.

"I always elect to receive," said Ashe. "It gives me the extra serve in a tie breaker." Yes, Arthur, but first you have to get to a tie breaker.

The 35-year-old Laver served three quick aces in the first game of the first set and went on to beat Ashe, 6-1, 6-4, 3-6, 6-4, to earn the \$15,000 first prize. Ashe consoled himself with \$7,000.

"If you don't think those early aces didn't have an effect on the eventual outcome, keep in mind that Ashe started the match with some doubts as to his ability to beat Laver."

Ashe remarked Saturday after reaching the finals of the initial 1974 World Championship Tennis (WCT) competition that he felt he knew how to beat Laver, but was concerned if he had the skills to carry out his game plan.

You can understand Ashe's doubts. He had met Laver 17 times and lost them all.

"I don't know why I always beat Arthur," said Laver. "It's just one of those things. Maybe it's because we have similar type games. There is no real reason."

The 30-year-old Ashe admits that he thinks of a possible jinx, but claims it has no effect on his game.

"Yeah, I think about it, but it's not because he's beaten me but because he's a hell of a player," Ashe said after his 18th consecutive loss to Laver. "I go out there thinking that any of them, Stan Smith, Newcombe, Laver, Ken Rosewall, can blow me out if I don't play well."

Laver, who is making a comeback after suffering a back injury last year,

rates his game now on a par with the style that made him tennis' first million dollar winner. He said he has his rhythm, and the back injury is gone.

Laver finished second last year in the WCT standings. He was runnerup to Smith with a 37-7 record after leading the field the previous two years. He lost to Smith in the semifinals of the championship play in Dallas. What bothered the Aussie even more was that he appeared to have lost his super confidence.

"This is a great satisfaction winning the first tournament," he said after demolishing Ashe. "It's satisfying confidence-wise, point-wise, money-wise, anything-wise."

Laver said he's not really interested in regaining his top ranking. He indicated he would not play enough this year to qualify for that honor. He expressed a desire simply to play tennis in the Laver style and to win money.

"Money is a pretty good reason for playing until they find something else isn't it?" he asked.

Laver won the first set from Ashe handily, twice breaking the American's service. He broke through Ashe in the seventh game of the second set and went on to take a two set lead in the best of five match. Ashe rallied to win the third set as Laver lost his only service of the match in the fourth game.

NEW YORK (AP) — "It'll be no contest. I'm going to do what I should have done last time," a cocky, bombastic Muhammad Ali, the 8-5 favorite, predicted as he prepared for tonight's do-or-die 12-round rematch with Joe Frazier.

A sullen and introspective Frazier, declining any prefight interviews, couldn't hold back a growl as he left the ring after Sunday's formal weigh-in.

"I'll shut his trap for good," he whispered huskily into the ear of a friend.

The fight at Madison Square is a sequel to the celebrated Fight of the Century on March 8, 1971, matching

then two champions who had never lost a bout, and it will be almost as rich.

The Garden is a \$1 million sellout, with its 20,400 seats priced at between \$20 and \$100. The soul people, resplendent in minis and glistening jewelry, have moved in for the occasion.

Bob Arum, Ali's lawyer and head of Top Rank, Inc., predicts that a billion people throughout the world will see the fight on closed television, live and delayed.

Arum said the fight could gross \$18 million, with \$9 million to be distributed among the two principals and Top Rank. Ali and Frazier, fighting under an \$850,000 guarantee, thus could collect \$3 million each.

They received \$2.5 million for the first fight, won by Frazier on a decision. Ali, who had been idle for more than three years was overweight at 215 pounds, slow and out of shape.

Nevertheless, he put up a strong fight, punishing the then recognized heavyweight champion so badly that Frazier required hospitalization. Ali had a blood vessel ruptured in his jaw.

"Somebody counted while looking at the movie and said I hit Joe 992 times," Ali boasted. "He takes a lot of punishment. He just knows one way to fight — that is, move forward with arms swinging."

Several hundred ring buffs and assorted characters who seem to enjoy proximity with muscled gladiators turned out for Sunday's weigh-in, which was sold to live television.

Posters proclaiming Ali "champion of the world" were hawked at \$1 a throw. Several young ladies were passing out handbills inviting people to attend the Muhammad Ali victory party after the fight at a New York hotel.

Sammy Davis Jr., and Lionel Hampton were listed on the bill. Tickets were being sold for \$10 each.

"I am stronger than I have ever been. I'll be dancing and moving. I predict no contest," Ali says. "I'll fight the way I shoulda fought the first time."

### Fittipaldi Sails

SAO PAULO, Brazil — Switzerland's Clay Regazzoni, a second place finisher himself, called Brazilian driver Emerson Fittipaldi's victory in the Brazilian Grand Prix Sunday "inevitable."

"He was driving at full speed and looked really unbeatable today."

"I was very happy with second place," continued the over-all leader of the standings of the 1974 Formula 1 season. "I wanted to finish the first, but the way Fittipaldi was driving, I thought it wiser to keep second place."

Pressed in the early going, Fittipaldi, spurred on by fans from his native Sao Paulo, seized the front spot on the 14th lap and stayed there to win, in a race shortened by rain with nine laps remaining.

Regazzoni, in a Ferrari, was clocked in 1:24:50.63, while Belgium's Jackie Ickx was third in 1:22:06.80, while finishing only 31 laps.

## 10-Foot Miss Saves Nichols At San Diego

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Big Bobby Nichols escaped with a victory he didn't expect when little Rod Curl missed a 10-foot birdie putt on the final hole of the San Diego Open golf tournament Sunday.

"I'm surprised to win," Nichols admitted after his three-under-par 69 had given him a one-stroke victory over the 5-foot-5 Curl, a three quarters Wintu Indian who was seeking his first professional triumph.

The Vanguard grapplers have run up an 11-1 dual meet record to date and face a tough Biola squad in La Mirada Tuesday.

## Pro Prospect Versatile Maras Two-sport Star

When the NCAA recently voted to allow professional athletes in one sport to participate in another on the college level as an amateur, it started wheels to turning in the minds of many young men across the nation.

UC Irvine's Jerry Maras is no different from his counterparts in this respect although he admits he isn't thinking too seriously about quitting school before graduation.

The NCAA has an agreement with professional baseball whereby no undergraduate below the age of 21 can be drafted or sign a contract while in school.

Jerry's birthday isn't until September and he will miss the June baseball draft but other possibilities pose an interesting dilemma for the young pitcher and cage star.

His birthday will come before start of the fall semester at UCI and he could sit out the school year and await the free agent draft in January. He could then return to school the following year and play basketball.

Or, he could enroll in school and play basketball during the fall quarter. If he was drafted in January and signed, he could finish the winter quarter and the cage season before reporting to baseball even if he had signed.

"I've never been drafted by baseball and I don't know if anybody wants me," he says. "A lot would depend on what kind of a deal I could make to sign a pro contract."

Undoubtedly the pros know of his ability as a pitcher. The 6-6 right-hander posted a 9-3 record with a fancy 1.60 e.r.a. and six shutouts last season for Gary Adams' NCAA college division champions.

"I would like to know about my abilities in basketball and if I have any chance of playing pro in the ABA. I've never really been given an analysis of my chances of playing pro basketball and I might want

to do that instead of baseball if the opportunity arose."

In his own mind, Maras may have been overlooked by both baseball and basketball scouts.

But such isn't the case off his record in both sports. He is the leading scorer for coach Tim Tift's cage squad with a 17.2 average and nine rebounds is also tops.

But all of this is in the future and Maras must first finish the basketball season at UCI then move to the diamond during the spring.

His future is bright, indeed. Regardless of which sport he chooses. Or which one chooses him.

How does he compare the two sports in which he excels?

"Baseball is a lot easier but it isn't as satisfying to me. In basketball you have to do more things. There are more areas in which you can be good or bad."

"In baseball you pitch, bat or field and that's it. In basketball you shoot, run, play defense, dribble, rebound and a lot of other things."

What does he like best about basketball?

"Winning. If I score 30 points and we lose it isn't nearly as satisfying as scoring 15 points and winning. I'd rather be a contributor to a winning team."

Then he left the door wide open for basketball scouts to knock.

And by the end of this season, Fair intends to have the pictures to prove it.

"I'm going to take films of Dave shooting and use them as a teaching tool for future teams. As far as pure form, hand release and follow through, Dave has it all."

"He's the only player I've ever given the green light to shoot at any time. I'd never mess with his shooting."

In a three-year varsity starting career, the 6-1 Kiesselbach has provided ample reinforcement for his coach's laissez-faire policy.

Kiesselbach averaged eight points per game as a sophomore, 10 per game last season and is currently scoring at a 14.0 clip this season.

He scored 41 points in three games to lead Laguna Beach to the championship in its own tournament in 1972 and was named tourney most valuable player. In the same tournament this season he scored 51 points in four games to lead the Artists to the championship game, and was named to the all-tournament team.

He hit seven straight baskets to open a game against Brea last season and has strung together three or four in a row to open games on several occasions.

He has maintained a 48 percent field goal shooting accuracy through the last two years and has hit 75 percent of his free throws. The latter figure leaves him in second place for free throw accuracy on the all-time list of Laguna Beach players.

By maintaining his current scoring pace, Kiesselbach will top Bob Henderson's 641 career points to rank fifth in Laguna Beach history. A notable accomplishment in light of the balanced-scoring teams he has played on.

"Our offense is based on getting every player an equal number of shots. We never point to give the ball to one man," Fair points out. "Since

I've been here the most any one player has averaged is 12 per game, and Dave will probably top that this year."

It used to be that shooting was about all Fair expected from Kiesselbach, but as the only returning starter for the Artists, Kiesselbach's responsibilities have increased measurably this season.

"He has had to learn to play post and inside defense plus rebounding this year. We have to count on him a lot more," says Fair. "Fundamentally, Dave is a sound defensive player, and though he's not blessed with great quickness he works hard at it and probably understands the concepts of our man-to-man better than anyone on the team."

"In the past, his problem has been that he's not aggressive enough. Dave's a mild mannered, quiet person by nature," says Fair. "We've been working hard to improve his strength so he can dictate what happens on the court rather than be dictated to."

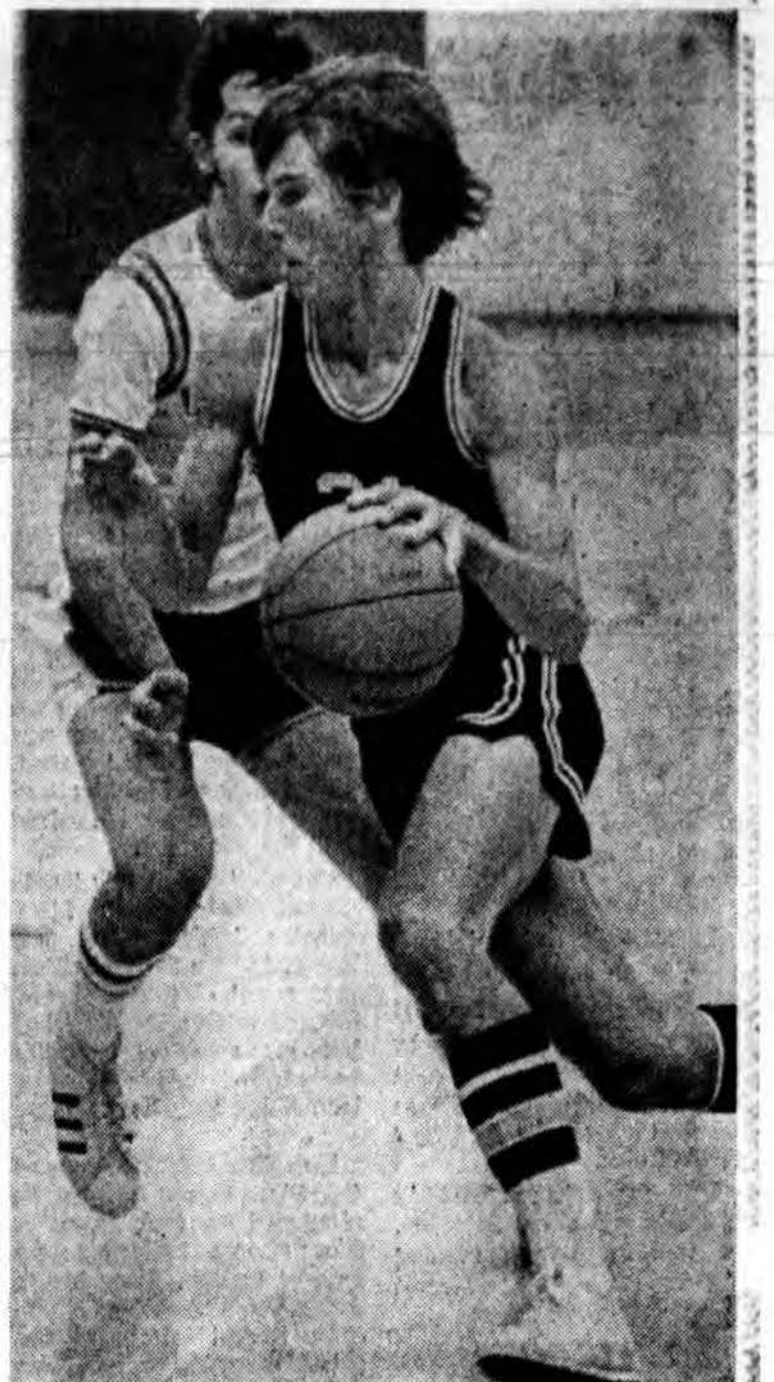

# Protest Costs Argyle Campbell Cup Bid

## Balboa Pilot Wins 3 out of 4 Races

Argyle Campbell of Balboa Yacht Club, lost his bid for a third try at the Congressional Cup by the width of a mast.

The young former two-time winner of Long Beach Yacht Club's prestigious match racing series, won all four of his races off Long Beach Saturday and Sunday, but was thrown out of one on a "mast abeam" protest by Barney Flam, Alamitos Bay Yacht Club.

IN SUNDAY'S deciding race, Flam sewed up his bid for the 10th spot on the 1974 Congressional Cup roster by coming from behind to beat Chuck Kober of Long Beach Yacht Club on the final beat to the finish.

With Campbell's disqualification on Saturday, he was faced with winning

both of Sunday's races and Flam would have had to lose both his matches. But Flam's victory over Kober cinched the berth and the committee called off the final race as it would have been meaningless.

IT APPEARED for awhile Sunday that Campbell would pull off the victory. Flam was forced off the line at the start, giving Kober a healthy lead which he managed to hold until the final beat.

Campbell and Randy Smyth started their match five minutes behind Flam and Kober, but by the end of the first round of the windward-leeward course Campbell had left his own opponent far behind and had overhauled both Kober and Flam.

KOBER'S MISUSE came on the final beat when he attempted to tack to cover Flam who was taking his stern on port tack. Kober tacked a little too soon and Flam came back to starboard and sailed over Kober who was desperately trying to come about again to cover.

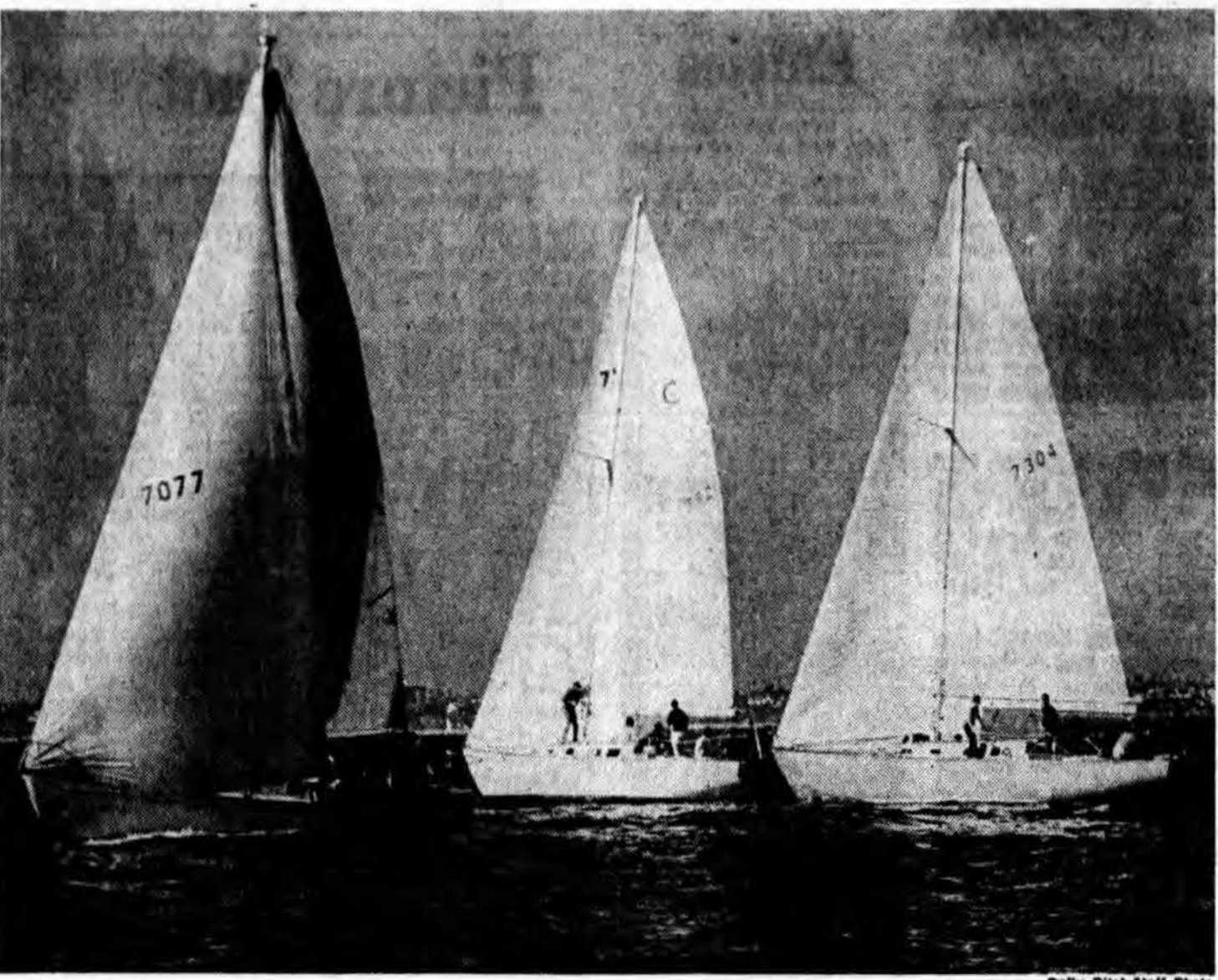
Flam's protest of Campbell came in the third race Saturday as Campbell attempted to pass him to weather. Flam attempted to luff him off but Campbell moved up to what he judged to be "mast abeam" (the windward yacht's helm abeam of the leeward yacht's mast) which would have terminated Flam's luffing rights.

BUT FLAM and his crew contended that Campbell's boat had not attained mast-abeam and lodged a protest. The protest was upheld.

Some pre-race excitement and near tragedy occurred in the starting area Sunday when a small cabin cruiser with five persons aboard exploded and burned while returning to port.

Master of Insult  
Jack Carter Can Best Don Rickles

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Bob Hope and Jack Benny built their careers poking fun at themselves, but today's comedians are finding success with the barb, the insult, the riposte and caustic observation.

Among this school's best practitioners is Jack Carter, a man who looks as if he would punch his fairy godmother in the mouth.

When Carter looses a barrage of invective even Don Rickles heads for cover. The Salvation Army, the tooth fairy and motherhood are not safe from his acid comment.

Thus Carter is finding the roast shows a bonanza.

HE HAS appeared on eight Dean Martin shows, bowling over the likes of Bobby Riggs, Carroll O'Connor, Joe Namath, Ed McMahon, Jack Benny and Tony Randall. He is usually the last and most devastating of the roasters on each show. Carter blasts the other roasters as well as the honored guest.

"Audiences like a roast because it gives them a chance to see their heroes picked on," said Carter. "They get a chance to relate to the humor."

"But we're running out of celebrities to insult. They're talking about dressing an actor up as George Washington and roasting him on Dean's show before the end of the season. But I don't know if that will work."

"Anyhow, we'd run out of historical figures in time and end up doing Nero and a bunch of violin jokes."

CARTER'S FIRST participation in a public roast took place in 1954 when Ed Sullivan was raked over the coals, but it never went on the tube because producer Nat Hiken refused to allow the

sponsor to censor it.

"Not that it was all that rough," Carter said. "Anything goes at a stag roast. I get 20-30 invitations to appear at roasts. I accept about half of them. Every fund-raising event is now another insult derby."

"A comedian has to exercise some taste and restraint, and it doesn't always work out that way. Sometimes the guest of honor is insulted."

"One time when I was being roasted about eight years ago at the Walford the insults got so heavy my mother and father got up and walked out. I ran after them, telling them the roasters were my friends. They still didn't like it. George

Jessel gets furious when other comedians pick on him.

"MRS. MARTIN Luther King walked out of one roast when Redd Foxx got too dirty. But that's the way Redd works."

"The only guest who got upset with me was Jack Valenti, the movie czar. I made some comments about his height. He's short. And his background. He's an Italian from Texas. He didn't care for that."

"But what really burned him up was my kidding him about the movie rating systems. I said some movies were rated 'X' but his movie rated him a 'Z.' When he got to the microphone he tried to shoot me down."

Carter believes insult humor goes back to the dawn of man. The one-line gag that rips a person's character, appearance, taste or ego usually leaves the victim helpless — unless he is also a comedian.

"I like a good roast because it pierces a guy's defenses," Carter concluded.

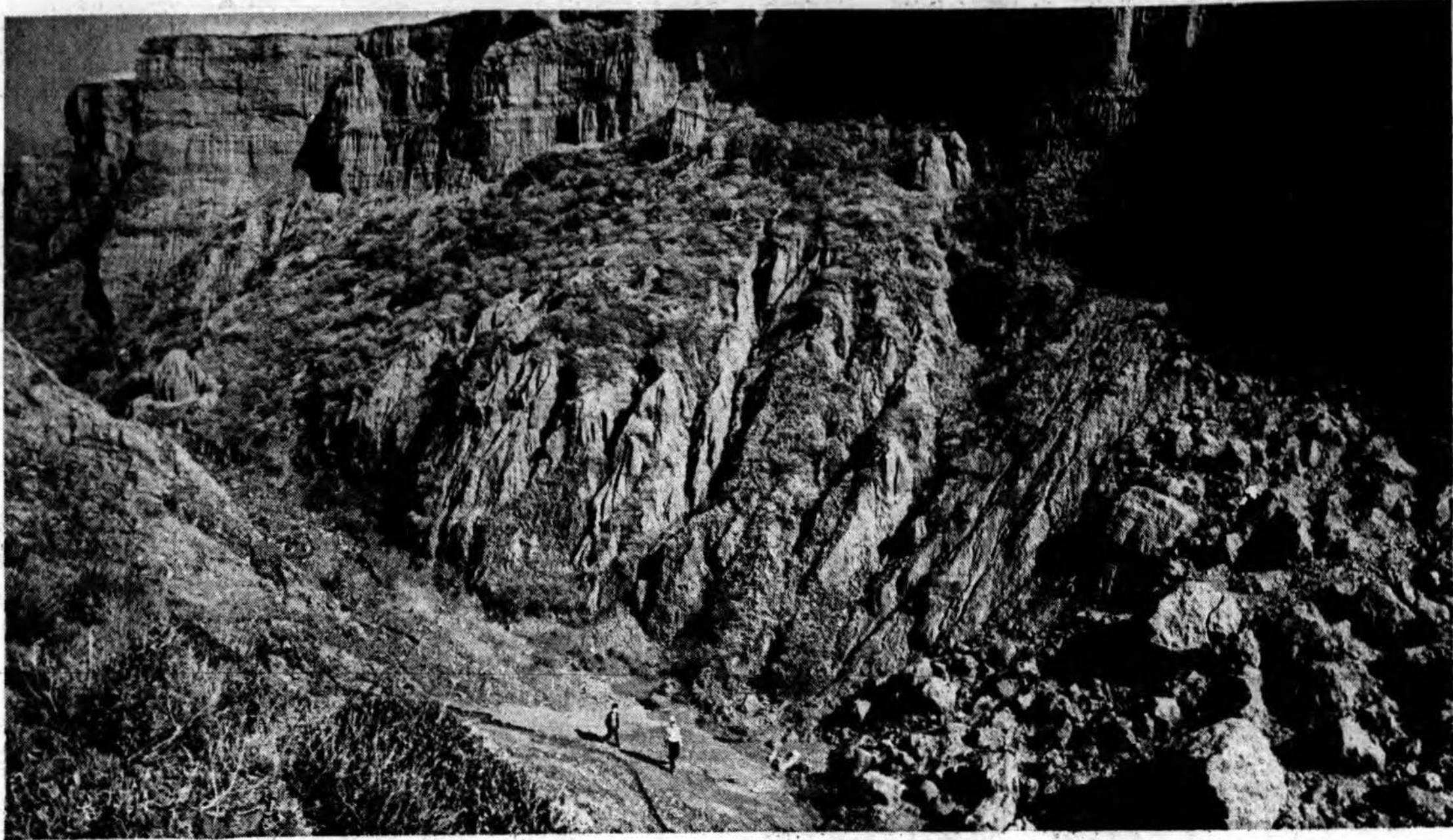
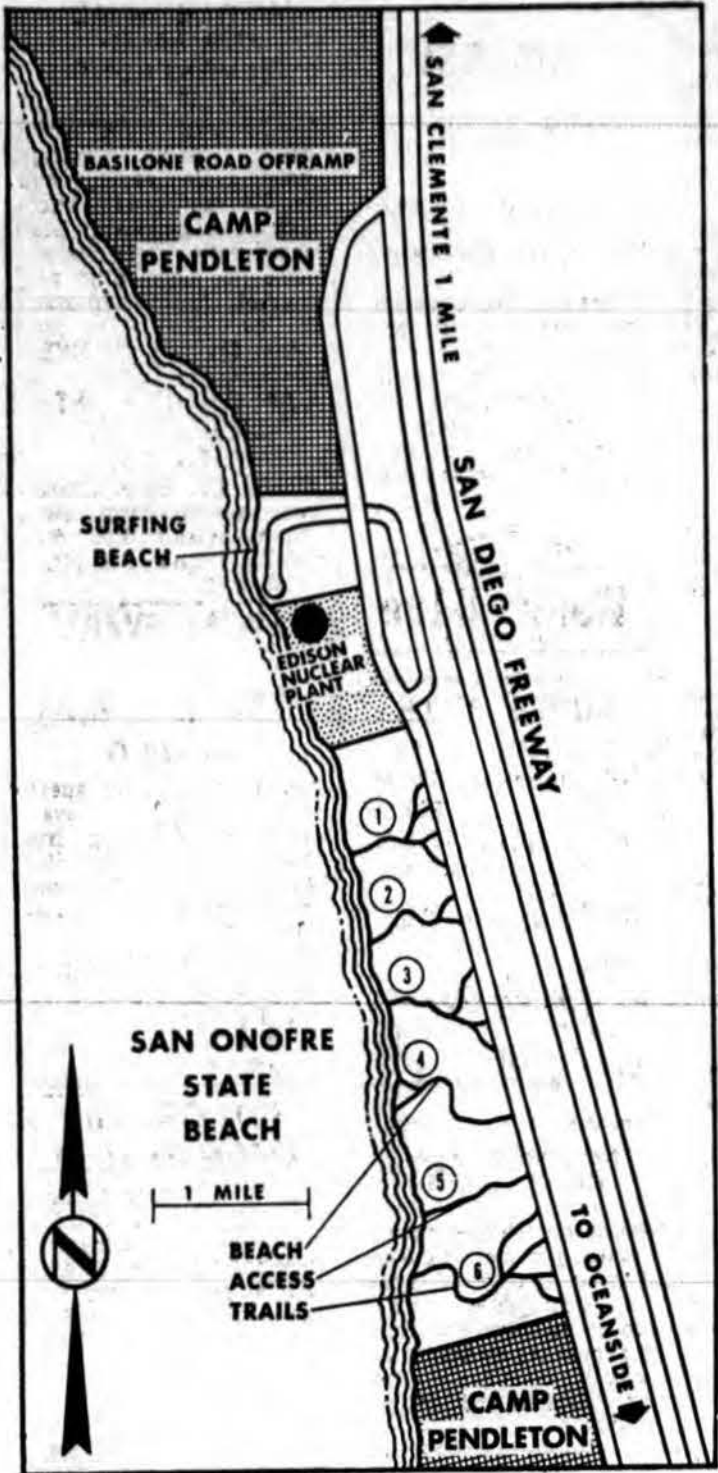

One of the newest additions to the California State Park system features miles of deserted beach backed by a tangled wilderness of spectacular cliffs and canyons — and it's right here on the Orange Coast just a mile south of the Western White House and the city of San Clemente.

**THE SAN ONOFRE** State Beach was originally part of Camp Pendleton until President Nixon prevailed upon the Marine Corps to transfer the four mile beach front property to the state.

It was officially opened to the public during Easter vacation in 1971 and, since then, it has become increasingly popular with both day visitors and overnight campers.

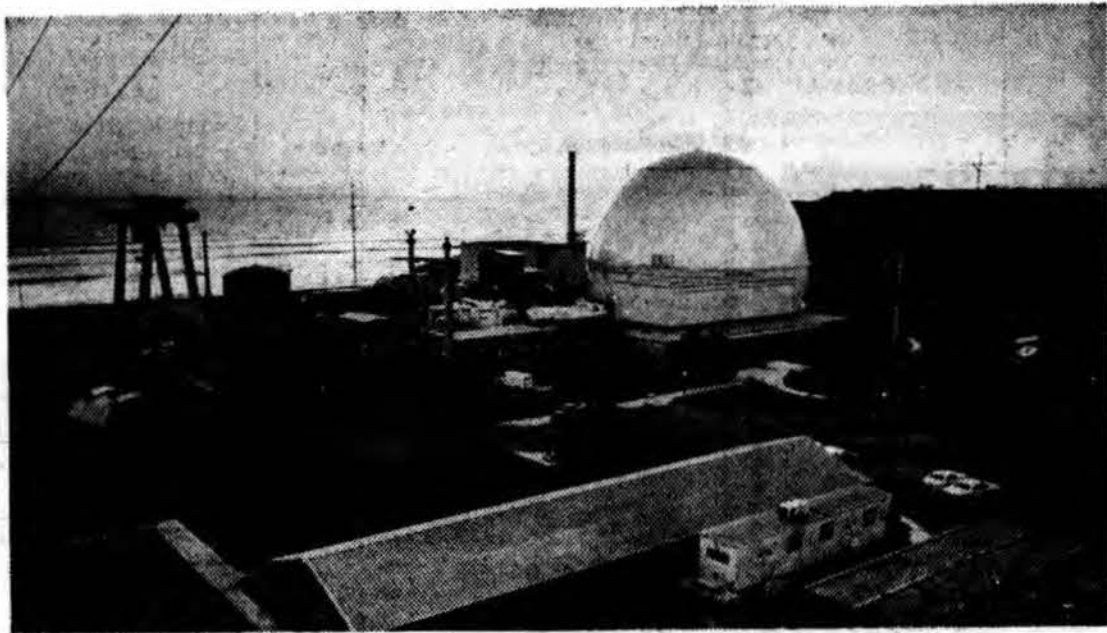
Last year's attendance was over 200,000 with crowds of up to 7,000 on weekends in July and August.

**IT IS IN THE** winter, however that Orange Coast residents may find their new beach most enjoyable. The state rangers report that on a typical sunny winter weekend, they receive between 50 and 100 visitors and most of them head for the surfing beach. That leaves miles of nearly empty beach and canyon for those who prefer to enjoy nature in solitude.

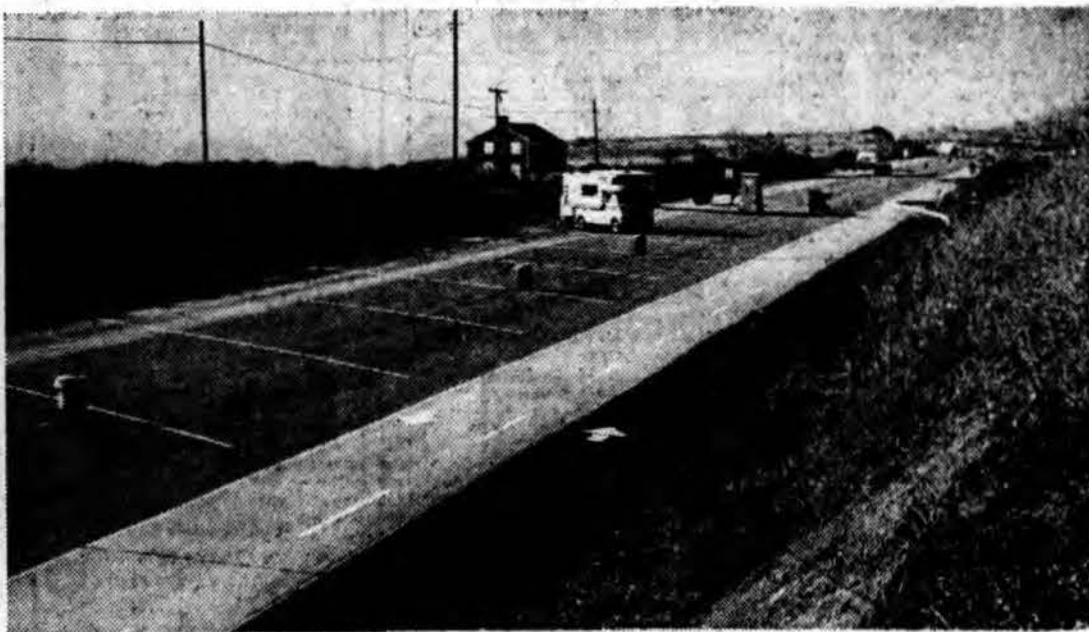

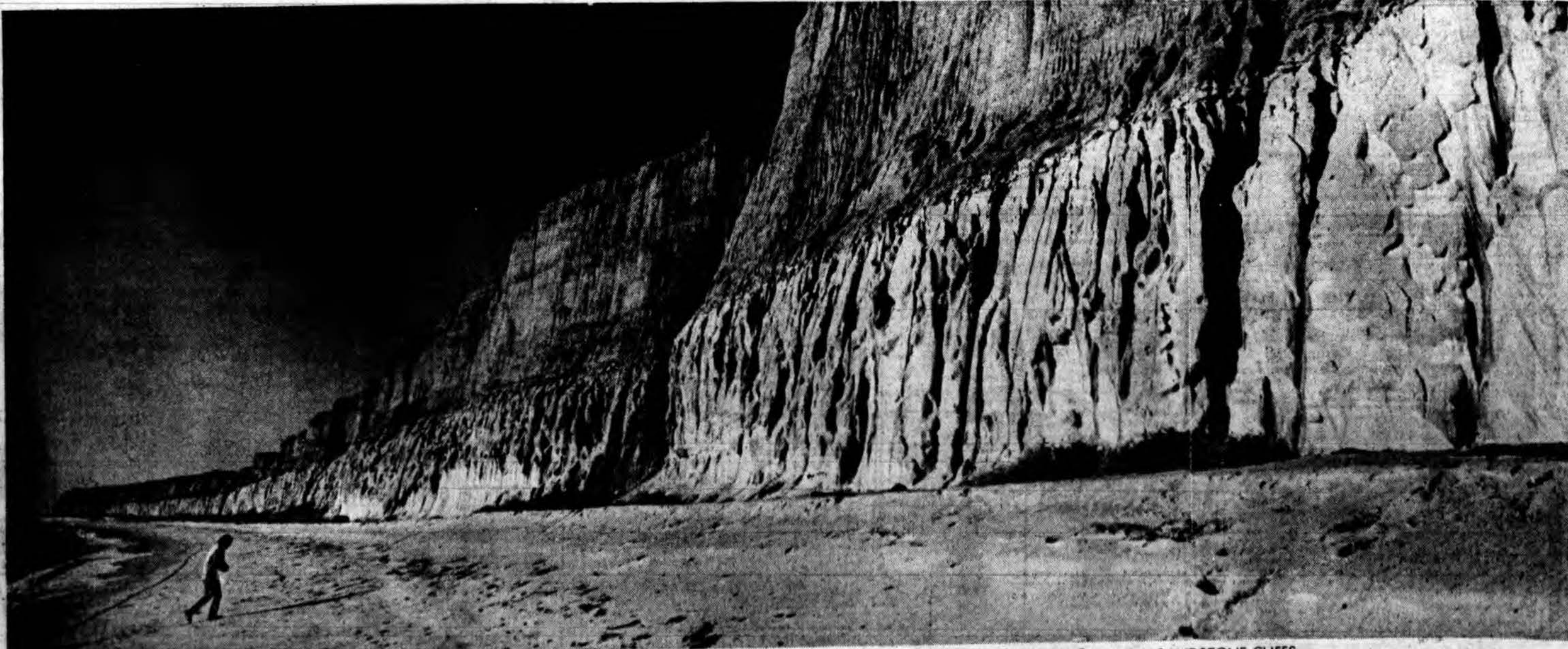
NORTH PORTION OF BEACH FRONTAGE FAVORED BY SURFERS—AND WADERS

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# Avco Plans Drastic Revamp of Two Projects

Avco Community Developers is proposing a drastic revamping in size and design of two major Laguna Niguel projects.

The two housing tracts have been the subject of lengthy controversy and dispute before the regional and state coastal commissions for months.

One tract, 7479, oceanside of Pacific Coast Highway near Crown Valley Parkway, is now being proposed for 900 units.

The project near Salt Creek Beach was originally designed at 7,690 units. It was denied by the Regional Commission even when cut down to 1,218 units and has been held up by the state commission.

The second tract, 7885, inland of Pacific Coast Highway near Niguel Shores Road, would have about the same number of units as originally proposed 917 — under the new compromise.

The state commission reversed a regional approval of that project.

But Avco officials have now agreed to move a commercial site off Pacific Coast Highway to Niguel Shores and

Stonehill Drive, which meets some of the objections by local residents.

The ocean-side tract under the new plan would also include a public promenade on the bluff top instead of housing and would increase access to a grassy park and the beach below, a regional commissioner said today.

The South Coast Regional Zone Conservation Commission today debated

whether to reconsider Avco's renewed request without requiring another permit application.

The commission discussed adopting specific procedures on reconsideration which could accommodate Avco's projects.

Speaking against this action were Ina Bliss of the League of Women Voters in Irvine and Dale Secord of the Orange

County Environmental Coalition.

Secord accused the commission of "eroding the public's right to have a full public hearing on each permit. The case of Avco is no different than the case of San Onofre (nuclear power plant) before the state commission. "You're only expediting matters," Secord charged, "for a special interest group."

## Smell Irks Dana Point Trailerites

Residents of a Dana Point mobile home park with a smelly next-door neighbor are petitioning in an attempt to force an end to morning and evening odors which assertedly, "make life unbearable."

Three pages of signatures from residents of Dana Point Marina Mobile Home Estates have gone to directors of the South East Regional Reclamation Authority (Serra) and the city of San Juan Capistrano because of odors from the expanded waste treatment plant along the shore of San Juan Creek.

Although residents for years have put up with heavy odors from adjacent sewage plants, their ire these days stems from promises of relief that never came.

Originally, the source of the sewage aromas was the small, overloaded Dana Point Sanitary District plant along Del Obispo Road, but that facility has been shut down for months.

Since the plant was shut down, a large vinyl bubble filled with ozone has trapped odors coming from idle sludge tanks.

The new culprit, the residents insist, is the plant which once belonged to

## San Juan Panel Faces City Park Staff Report

The report was compiled as ammunition in the battle for passage of a 15-cent-maximum parks tax override in the March 5 municipal election.

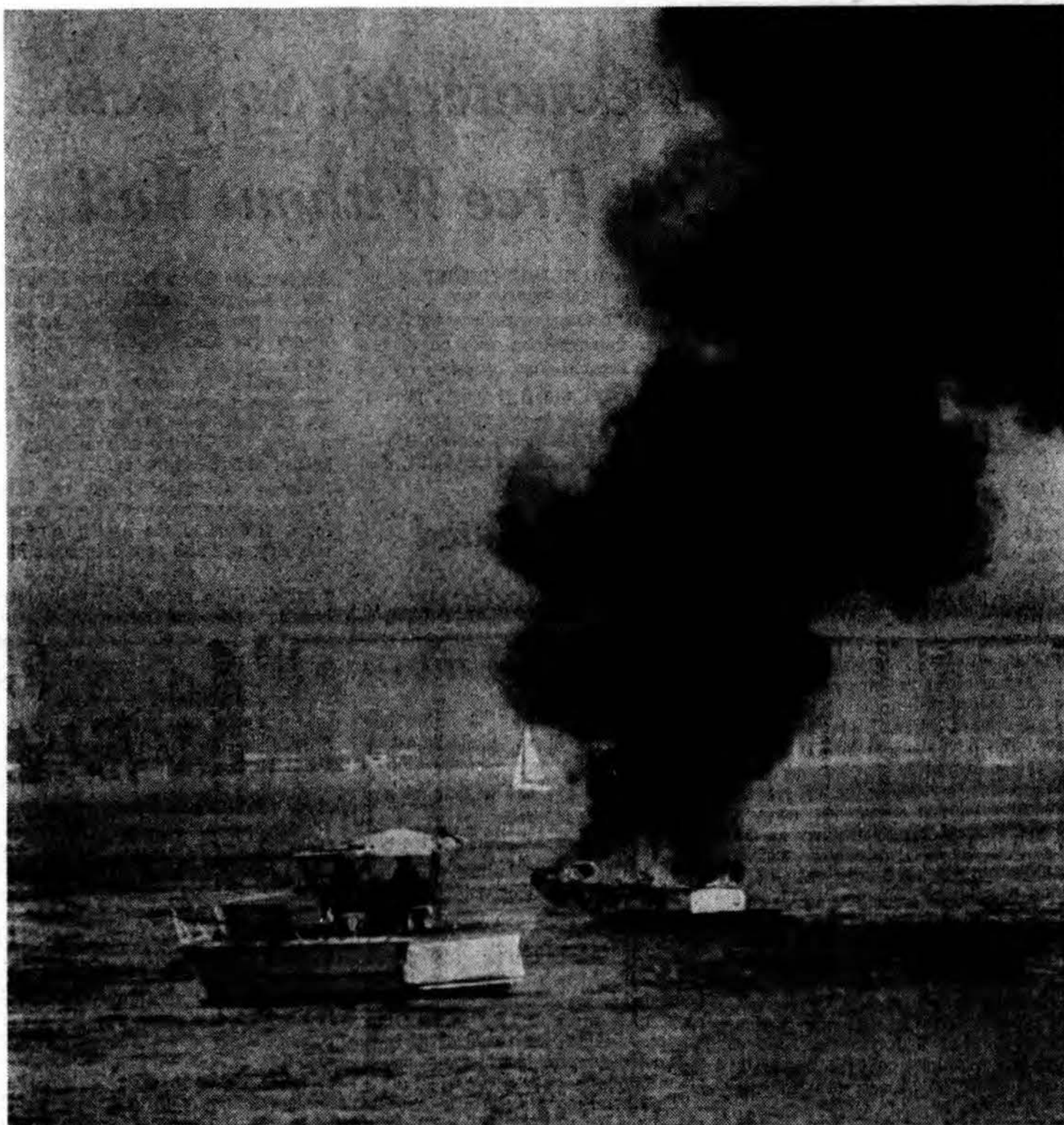
It shows that despite more than 20 acres of dedicated parks lands in the city, the only major recreation areas are at school playgrounds maintained by the Capistrano Unified School District.

The city's finance department prepared the survey of existing city parks as well as future needs. The report shows that Marco Forster Junior High School and the old Capistrano high campuses provide most of the fields where local residents find recreation.

But in each case involving city-owned land facilities are "almost nonexistent," the report said.

The override could raise an initial

## Ontario Airport Study Pushed by Supervisor

Orange County Supervisor Ronald Caspers will ask fellow board members Tuesday to approve a six-month study of Ontario International Airport as the answer to county air transit needs.

In a report prepared for the board but released today, Caspers said he is convinced jet traffic has no place in Orange County and the current traffic is already almost too much to control.

He said despite all efforts to control jet traffic, curfew violations, noise and other problems persist and have triggered huge lawsuits against the county.

"I do not believe there is another location for a jet airport within the geographic bounds of Orange County," Caspers said.

"Therefore, my office has been investigating the possibility of the use of Ontario to meet the growing jet air transportation needs of Orange County."

Caspers, who vowed in his recent state of the county address to pursue the Ontario plan, said the existing county

jetport was never built to handle its current flight load.

"Orange County Airport was not originally designed for jet traffic and there is an obvious difference in the manner which the two jet operators conduct operations at the facility," Caspers said.

## Admits Lies To FBI On Scandal

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Herbert L. "Bart" Porter of Laguna Niguel, who told the Senate Watergate Committee he kept quiet for fear he would be accused of "not being a team player," pleaded guilty today to one count of lying to the FBI about the scandal.

U.S. District Judge William B. Bryant let Porter go free without bond and postponed sentencing until the court gets a probation report.

At Byrant's request, a prosecuting attorney described briefly what he would have sought to prove in court had there been a trial. Byrant asked Porter if he had any "quarrel" with the government's statement, and Porter said he did not.

The statement related what Porter told the Senate committee in June — that Porter told the FBI on July 19, 1972 that he had a conversation with Jeb Stuart Magruder, deputy director of President Nixon's re-election campaign, about plans to use \$100,000 to finance protection for campaign speakers.

"There was no such conversation and the government is ready to prove it," the prosecuting attorney said.

The actual use of the money was not mentioned during the brief court proceeding, but it was understood that Porter's conversation with Magruder dealt with \$100,000 passed to G. Gordon Liddy to finance the Watergate break-in.

Porter's plea in effect waived a right to jury trial. After getting Porter's assurance that he understood this, Bryant asked him, "Do you understand the penalty?"

"I believe it is five years or \$10,000 or both," Porter said.

Bryant then read the charge and asked Porter how he pleaded.

"I plead guilty, your honor," Porter said.

Porter, former scheduling director for the committee for the Re-election of the President, told the Watergate committee that Magruder asked him to perjure himself.

To do otherwise, Porter said Magruder told him, "could be very embarrassing to the President of the United States," to former Attorney General John N. Mitchell, and to H. R. Haldeman, Nixon's former chief of staff.

Porter also told the committee he kept quiet about his Watergate role for months out of intense loyalty to Nixon and "probably because of the

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## Chopper Down Crashes, Burns Near School

A helicopter crashed at mid-day today in a Westminster street near John Marshall Elementary School. No children were injured in the incident but spectators feared for the lives of the aircraft occupants.

A school employee said, "I don't see how anyone could have gotten out of that alive. It's just burning something awful."

"There are police and firemen all over the place," the witness said. The witness said it appeared two persons were aboard.

The school, at 15791 Bushard St., Westminster, was not damaged in the incident.

Precise information on the type of helicopter was unavailable. "It is burning too hard to tell, witnesses said."

Shortly after the mid-day crash, ambulances arrived and an official from the Orange County Coroner's Office was dispatched to the Westminster scene.

Westminster police were declining to issue any specific information pending a formal report from the scene. But then indicated they did not believe the downed craft was either a military or police model.

"As near as we can determine, we believe it is civilian," she said.

Orange County Airport Tower reported that two civilian helicopters took off this morning and only one has returned.

A spokesman for the tower said a transient craft had used the Santa Ana training school pad this morning.

"No records of transient helicopters are kept by us and there's no way of knowing who might have been flying it," the tower spokesman said.



# President Proposes Vet Boosts

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon today proposed cost-of-living increases in veterans' pensions and an 8 percent boost in GI benefits as part of a \$13.6 billion legislative package for veterans.

Nixon also urged that Congress restore Nov. 11 as Veterans Day, repealing part of a 1968 law which switched the holiday to the fourth Monday in October.

The proposals were contained in a special message to Congress, one of a series Nixon is sending to Capitol Hill before his State of the Union address Wednesday night.

At a White House briefing, Veterans Administrator Donald Johnson said the \$13.6 billion being sought by Nixon is \$400 million more than is being spent this year.

Most of the increase is ticketed for medical programs, he said. Even with the proposed boost in monthly checks for veterans under the GI bill, VA spending for education is expected to decline from \$3.2 billion this year to \$2.6 billion for next year because of declining enrollment in the program, Johnson said.

The Administration also is proposing, Johnson said, that a veterans cemetery be designated in each of the 10 standard federal regions and that Arlington Cemetery near Washington be expanded.

The President said his administration is preparing legislation to grant the 2.4 million persons receiving veterans pensions the same type of automatic cost-of-living increases available to Social Security recipients.

He also said the veterans pension program should be restructured to assure that the neediest pensioners will receive at least as much as adult welfare recipients.

Nixon said the 8 percent increase in education benefits he is seeking will supply an extra \$200 million in aid for the more than two million taking advantage of the GI bill education and training allowances. The increase is needed, he said, "to keep pace with inflation."

Legislation is pending in both House and Senate to provide for a 13.6 percent increase.

The President reported that the Veterans Administration is embarking on the greatest program of hospital construction in its history.

He said a record \$276 million is being sought in fiscal 1975 which begins next July 1 for hospital construction, and that his budget will provide funds to hire an additional 7,600 medical personnel.

In addition to the medical, education and pension benefits, Nixon said America should "repay her debts to the men and women who have served her well," by setting aside certain days to commemorate their service.

One such day was Sunday, the first anniversary of the Vietnam cease-fire, which Nixon proclaimed as National MIA Awareness Day. Another is March 29, the first anniversary of the return of prisoners of war, which is being designated Vietnam Veterans Day.

He said there also is Veterans Day, which for decades was observed on Nov. 11, the anniversary of the World War I armistice day.

The 1968 legislation switching Veterans Day to the Fourth Monday of each October — part of the so-called "Monday holiday" law — "has stirred considerable confusion and not a small amount of resentment," he said.

Thirty-one state legislatures enacted resolutions declaring that Nov. 11 will be the official Veterans Day in their jurisdictions, Nixon said, and all major veterans organizations are seeking to return to the Nov. 11 date.

He urged Congress to repeal the 1968 change in the Veterans Day observance "in view of the confusion which has arisen and in view especially of the position taken by the veterans themselves."

has not.

In his report Caspers lists 16 separate occasions between Dec. 27 and Jan. 7 that Airwest departures or arrivals violated the 10 p.m. curfew at the airport.

One of the arrivals was at 3:08 a.m., he said. Airport Director Robert Bresnahan confirmed today that violations are occurring all the time, but that most are within a few minutes and can be explained by the airlines.

"Even though Air Cal is not as late as Airwest, they do have some violations," Bresnahan said. "But there is always something such as the weather or mechanical problems that cause it."

Bresnahan said Air Cal has a curfew clause in its lease allowing the county to crack down after the airline is given 30 days to correct the problem. But he said Airwest operates on a month to month pact which has no curfew limit in it.

"If these violations continue to be a problem a drastic step might be necessary such as closing the airport at 10 p.m. and turning off the lights," Bresnahan said.

In Caspers' report to the board he said Orange County Airport may have moved into the number one position in the nation in total takeoffs and landings, ahead of Chicago's O'Hare Airport.

He said the fuel crisis may have caused the switch in position since Orange County continues to set flight records with 632,000 runway movements in 1973.

Caspers also said in his report his contacts with the Marines over use of Camp Pendleton met with dismal rejection and that the possible use of the Chino Hills for a new airport is also an apparent impossibility.

"While the Ontario idea may provide a real answer to the airport question, it also warrants investigation because of its superior possibility for actualization in contrast to the proposal for Chino Hills, which has been designated as an open space preserve," Caspers said.

Caspers said a task force for the study could consist of both county staff members who would explore all avenues of airport use, including such things as rapid transit links between Orange County and Ontario.

\$60,000 a year for the development of city parks. A special citizen's committee already has begun a campaign for passage of the measure by simple majority.

Besides tonight's information item on the parks tax, these issues are included in the agenda for the 7 p.m. council session:

— Award of the maintenance contract for the landscaped areas of the city's only developed parks, Bonito and Four Oaks. The city plans to hire a private contractor to provide mowing and other maintenance services for the turf areas.

## 4 Counterfeit Suspects Set Free Without Bail

All four persons arrested by the Secret Service in connection with an alleged \$500,000 counterfeiting operation on the Orange Coast are free today, pending their appearance in federal court.

Preliminary hearing is scheduled Feb. 14 at the U.S. Magistrate Court, Los

Angeles, for Kenneth Albert Picquelle, owner of Aloha Instant Printing in Costa Mesa, where U.S. agents allege the funny money was cranked out with an offset press.

Picquelle, 39, faces a charge of manufacturing counterfeit currency and his roommate Sam Warren, 33, a printer, a charge of aiding and abetting the sale of counterfeit money.

Warren, at whose home on 2234A Pacific Avenue the agents claim to have found \$100,000 of the counterfeit currency, will also appear in court Feb. 14.

Scheduled to appear for preliminary hearing Feb. 12 on charges they possessed \$57,000 of counterfeit money are Arthur F. Dornier Jr., 38, and Carol Ann Green, 37, both of 6906 1/2 Oceanfront, Newport Beach.

The couple was arrested by Secret Service agents last Wednesday in a Costa Mesa parking lot while allegedly carrying a shopping bag stuffed with bogus bills.

A spokesman for the Los Angeles office of the Secret Service said the four persons were set free on personal recognizance bonds, which means they were not required to post bail but are subject to fines ranging from \$1,500 to \$10,000 if they fail to appear in court.

Secret Service agents concluded their one week investigation into the alleged counterfeiting racket Thursday with a nighttime raid on Picquelle's print shop at 688 W. Baker St.

There they claim to have uncovered the plates and negatives allegedly used to turn out bogus \$20's and \$50's which appeared on the Orange Coast, in San Diego and Arizona early in December.

About \$7,000 worth of the money was passed, according to the allegations of the Secret Service.

# State Challenged In Popeil Case

The preliminary hearing for Eloise Popeil and Daniel Ayers was suspended for one week today as defense attorneys filed a motion for dismissal of murder conspiracy charges on grounds that the state has no jurisdiction in the case.

Long Beach Municipal Court Judge Charles Litwin gave prosecuting attorney Charles Sheldon one week to file a brief countering the claim by the trio of defense attorneys that there is no jurisdiction in California because the object of the conspiracy is in another state.

Mrs. Popeil of Newport Beach and Ayers, a Santa Ana resident, are accused by police of hiring two men to kill her multi-millionaire husband, Samuel Popeil of Chicago.

Phil Petty and Robert Green, attorneys for Mrs. Popeil and John Yzurdiaga gave a short brief on their motion to Judge Litwin today.

According to Sheldon, the trio has cited two cases — one involving abortion and the other a murder in Switzerland — in which charges were dropped for lack of jurisdiction.

Judge Litwin suspended the hearing approximately one hour after the resumption of testimony from Bob Peeler, one of the men allegedly hired to kill Popeil.

Contents of that testimony like that of the two previous witnesses remains a secret today as the result of two motions from defense attorneys.

When the hearing into the charges of conspiracy to commit murder against the pair opened Thursday, Mrs. Popeil and Ayers waived their rights to a public hearing and the court was barred to the public and press.

Late Friday a further avenue of information was closed when defense attorneys Petty and Green successfully sought an order to seal the transcript of the hearing.

Long Beach Municipal Court Judge Litwin ordered the transcript sealed until Tuesday but Green said they will attempt

to get a Los Angeles Superior Court order to continue the seal some time this week.

## Court Evicts Daily Pilot News Reporter

A Daily Pilot reporter was ordered to leave the courtroom today as final arguments got under way in the Orange County Superior Court child molest trial of Joseph Reitano of Costa Mesa.

Judge Herbert Herlinds' bailiff, Deputy Jim Hill, escorted the newsmen from the courtroom with the explanation that the proceedings are now closed to both press and public.

The deputy's further explanation was that Reitano, 60, of 7845 Anaheim Ave., faces possible retaliation from fellow inmates in county jail if details of his trial are published in any newspaper.

Hill assured the newsmen that he would convey his vigorous objections to Judge Herlinds when the jurist calls a break in the trial.

It is expected that the case against Reitano, now in its seventh week, will go the jury later today with completion of final arguments.

Reitano was indicted by the Grand Jury on multiple acts of sex perversion, sodomy and lewd conduct with children under 14 years of age after complaints were made to Costa Mesa police by the parents of four children — two 11-year-old girls, a 10-year-old girl and her 8-year-old brother.

All four reportedly have testified about the alleged incidents that led to the filing of 18 felony counts against the defendant.

It is alleged that Reitano gave one victim money before engaging with the child in lewd conduct and on another occasion ran a pornographic movie in the presence of another female victim.

Reitano, who has earlier been involved in several court actions stemming from his alleged distribution of pornographic books and movies, is being held in custody during his trial with bail set at \$25,000.

## Alien Arrests Up as Planting Season Begins

The beginning of the planting season in California's agricultural area also has brought a traditional increase in arrests of illegal aliens, officials at the San Onofre Border Patrol station said today.

Weekend detentions of aliens and alleged smugglers began increasing on Saturday and reached even higher levels Sunday, when 175 immigrants were arrested at the permanent checkpoint.

Spokesman for the patrol said the weekend rush of arrests is expected to signal the beginning of yet another siege of increased immigration.

They added that totals at other roadblocks throughout Southern California also were up over the weekend. Another common arrest point is along Highway 395 in the Temecula area.

Many immigrants also are returning to their old jobs after taking time off for the holidays to be with their families in Mexico, spokesmen said.

Although the arrest totals are up at the Onofre checkpoint, one side-effect of the operation — seizures of contraband narcotics — have slowed down.

No narcotics shipping has been noted in recent days at the station, officers said.

Late last year directors of the Capistrano Beach Chamber of Commerce voiced objections when the odors were heavy in the commercial sections of the village.

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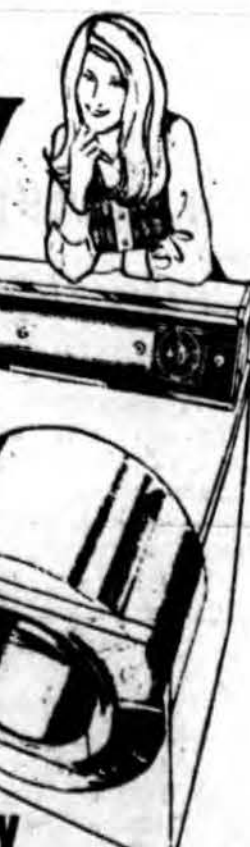

## Nun Asks Female Priests

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Jesus Christ wasn't a male chauvinist, so male leaders of the Roman Catholic Church shouldn't be either, says an outspoken nun who wants women to become eligible for the priesthood.

Sister Albertus Magnus McGrath says the church should heed "the remarkable fairness and balance Jesus showed in dealing with women and his freedom to rise above the male chauvinism in his culture."

THE REMARKS of the sister, a Dominican nun and chairman of the history department at Chicago's Rosary College, were made in an article published in a nationally distributed Catholic magazine, the "St. Anthony Messenger."

Contending that "women should have an equal claim to the priesthood," she pointed out that Jesus preached and practiced "equality of treatment" for men and women. She said Jesus' "men-related miracles and parables were paralleled with regularity with miracles and parables relating to women."

"Christ loved women," she said. "He befriended them, he cured them, he was served very intimately by women."

"I THINK HE gave a kind of emancipation proclamation to Martha and to all women when he said, in effect, 'Fine, housework's okay, but that's not the end and limit of your being. Mary has chosen the better part.' The better part is for the rest of us women, too — which is not generally what we have been taught."

"I think that women are bound then to follow what Christ gave them," she added. "They must learn to be courageous enough to stand firm, to fight for recognition of their equal human dignity, their equal human worth, their equal right to follow the vocation to which they feel they are called in the church. I think for women not to do this is a betrayal of the dignity and the gifts that God gave them."

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## Avco Plans Drastic Revamp of Two Projects

Avco Community Developers is proposing a drastic revamping in size and design of two major Laguna Niguel projects.

The two housing tracts have been the subject of lengthy controversy and dispute before the regional and state coastal commissions for months.

One tract, 7479, oceanside of Pacific Coast Highway near Crown Valley Parkway, is now being proposed for 900 units.

The project near Salt Creek Beach was originally designed at 7,690 units. It was denied by the Regional Commission even when cut down to 1,218 units and has been held up by the state commission.

The second tract, 7885, inland of Pacific Coast Highway near Niguel Shores Road, would have about the same number of units as originally proposed 917 — under the new compromise.

The state commission reversed a regional approval of that project.

But Avco officials have now agreed to move a commercial site off Pacific Coast Highway to Niguel Shores and

Stonehill Drive, which meets some of the objections by local residents.

The ocean-side tract under the new plan would also include a public promenade on the bluff top instead of housing and would increase access to a grassy park and the beach below, a regional commissioner said today.

The South Coast Regional Zone Conservation Commission today debated

whether to reconsider Avco's renewed request without requiring another permit application.

The commission discussed adopting specific procedures on reconsideration which could accommodate Avco's projects.

Speaking against this action were Ina Bliss of the League of Women Voters in Irvine and Dale Secord of the Orange

County Environmental Coalition.

Secord accused the commission of "eroding the public's right to have a full public hearing on each permit. The case of Avco is no different than the case of San Onofre (nuclear power plant) before the state commission. "You're only expediting matters," Secord charged, "for a special interest group."

Hano points out that the buildings to be torn down have been judged "architectural rarities" and as such require an EIR before razing.

Several Lagunans also have protested the demolition on social grounds charging that the savings and loan evicted long-time elderly residents from the Casa Mandigo and will be tearing down needed low-cost housing in order to construct a parking lot.

### Police Review Laguna Citizen Parking Gripe

Laguna Beach Police Chief Frank Schopen has confirmed that his department is reviewing citizen complaints of police action citing cars parked the wrong way on narrow Laguna residential streets.

In a letter to the city council, Troy Peters of 1121 Coast View Drive charges that although residents of his street have historically parked helter-skelter on the road, citations were given recently in what he called a campaign to line the city coffers.

Peters charges shortly after midnight on Jan. 24, "while most decent law respecting members of this seaside community were sleeping, patrol cars swept through outlying residential streets, some deadend, and some substandard, issuing 50 or more parking citations without any previous warning to citizens."

Peters said that the citations were written for parking on the wrong side of the street (facing the wrong way). He said the area is not posted no parking.

The chief said he was looking into the complaints and could not confirm the number of tickets issued.

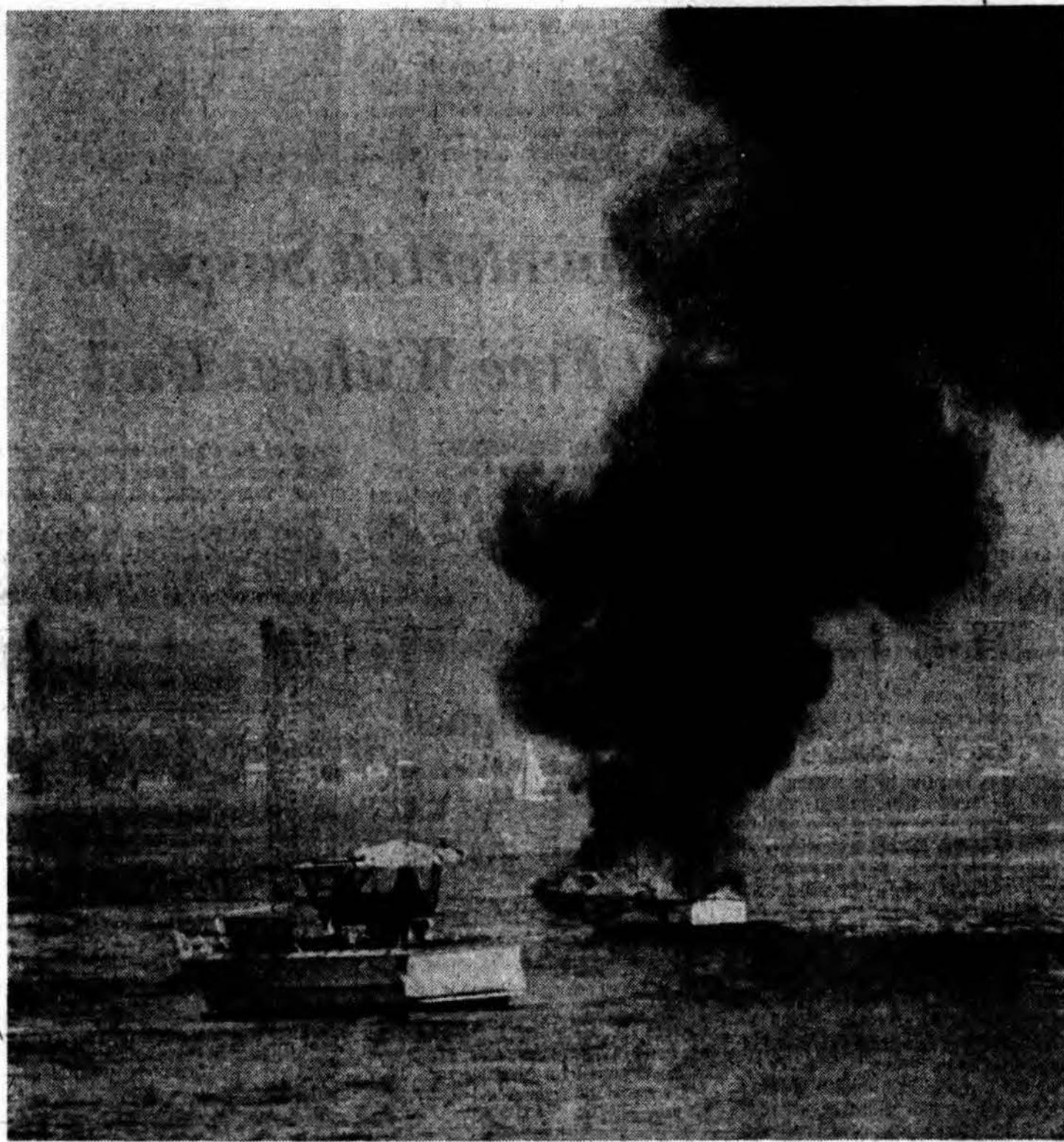
"It has been brought to my attention. It is under review by the department," Chief Schopen said.

## Caspers Asks Ontario Pact

Orange County Supervisor Ronald Caspers will ask fellow board members Tuesday to approve a six-month study of Ontario International Airport as the answer to county air transit needs.

In a report prepared for the board but released today, Caspers said he is convinced jet traffic has no place in Orange County and the current traffic is already almost too much to control.

He said despite all efforts to control jet traffic, curfew violations, noise and other problems persist and have triggered huge lawsuits against the county.

"I do not believe there is another location for a jet airport within the geographic bounds of Orange County," Caspers said.

"Therefore, my office has been investigating the possibility of the use of Ontario to meet the growing jet air transportation needs of Orange County."

Caspers, who vowed in his recent state of the county address to pursue the Ontario plan, said the existing county jetport was never built to handle its current flight load.

"Orange County Airport was not

originally designed for jet traffic and there is an obvious difference in the manner which the two jet operators conduct operations at the facility," Caspers said.

He said that while Air California has complied with curfews, exhaust reduction and takeoff patterns, Hughes Airwest has not.

In his report Caspers lists 16 separate occasions between Dec. 27 and Jan. 7 that Airwest departures or arrivals violated the 10 p.m. curfew at the airport.

One of the arrivals was at 3:08 a.m., he said. Airport Director Robert

Bresnahan confirmed today that violations are occurring all the time, but that most are within a few minutes and can be explained by the airlines.

"Even though Air Cal is not as late as Airwest, they do have some violations," Bresnahan said. "But there is always something such as the weather or mechanical problems that cause it."

Bresnahan said Air Cal has a curfew clause in its lease allowing the county to crack down after the airline is given 30 days to correct the problem. But he said Airwest operates on a month to month pact which has no curfew limit in it.

"If these violations continue to be a problem a drastic step might be necessary such as closing the airport at 10 p.m. and turning off the lights," Bresnahan said.

In Caspers' report to the board he said Orange County Airport may have moved into the number one position in the nation in total takeoffs and landings, ahead of Chicago's O'Hare Airport.

He said the fuel crisis may have caused the switch in position since Orange County continues to set flight records with 632,000 runway movements in 1973.

Caspers also said in his report his contacts with the Marines over use of Camp Pendleton met with dismal

## Admits Lies To FBI On Scandal

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Herbert L. "Bart" Porter of Laguna Niguel, who told the Senate Watergate Committee he kept quiet for fear he would be accused of "not being a team player," pleaded guilty today to one count of lying to the FBI about the scandal.

U.S. District Judge William B. Bryant let Porter go free without bond and postponed sentencing until the court gets a probation report.

At Bryant's request, a prosecuting attorney described briefly what he would have sought to prove in court had there been a trial. Bryant asked Porter if he had any "quarrel" with the government's statement, and Porter said he did not.

The statement related what Porter told the Senate committee in June — that Porter told the FBI on July 19, 1972 that he had a conversation with Jeb Stuart Magruder, deputy director of President Nixon's re-election campaign, about plans to use \$100,000 to finance protection for campaign speakers.

"There was no such conversation and the government is ready to prove it," the prosecuting attorney said.

The actual use of the money was not mentioned during the brief court proceeding, but it was understood that Porter's conversation with Magruder dealt with \$100,000 passed to G. Gordon Liddy to finance the Watergate break-in.

Porter's plea in effect waived a right to jury trial. After getting Porter's assurance that he understood this, Bryant asked him, "Do you understand the penalty?"

"I believe it is five years or \$10,000 or both," Porter said.

Bryant then read the charge and asked Porter how he pleaded.

"I plead guilty, your honor," Porter said.

Porter, former scheduling director for the committee for the Re-election of the President, told the Watergate committee that Magruder asked him to perjure himself.

To do otherwise, Porter said Magruder told him, "could be very embarrassing to the President of the United States," to former Attorney General John N. Mitchell, and to H. R. Haldeman, Nixon's former chief of staff.

Porter also told the committee he kept quiet about his Watergate role for months out of intense loyalty to Nixon and "probably because of the (See PORTER, Page 2)

## Nun Asks Female Priests

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Jesus Christ wasn't a male chauvinist, so male leaders of the Roman Catholic Church shouldn't be either, says an outspoken nun who wants women to become eligible for the priesthood.

Sister Albertus Magnus McGrath says the church should heed "the remarkable fairness and balance Jesus showed in dealing with women and his freedom to rise above the male chauvinism in his culture."

THE REMARKS of the sister, a Dominican nun and chairman of the history department at Chicago's Rosary College, were made in an article published in a nationally distributed Catholic magazine, the "St. Anthony Messenger."

Contending that "women should have an equal claim to the priesthood," she pointed out that Jesus preached and practiced "equality of treatment" for men and women. She said Jesus' "men-related miracles and parables were paralleled with regularity with miracles and parables relating to women."

"Christ loved women," she said. "He befriended them, he cured them, he was served very intimately by women."

"I THINK HE gave a kind of emancipation proclamation to Martha and to all women when he said, in effect, 'Fine, housework's okay, but that's not the end and limit of your being. Mary has chosen the better part.' The better part is for the rest of us women, too — which is not generally what we have been taught."

"I think that women are bound then to follow what Christ gave them," she added. "They must learn to be courageous enough to stand firm, to fight for recognition of their equal human dignity, their equal human worth, their equal right to follow the vocation to which they feel they are called in the church. I think for women not to do this is a betrayal of the dignity and the gifts that God gave them."

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## Avco Plans Drastic Revamp of Two Projects

Avco Community Developers is proposing a drastic revamping in size and design of two major Laguna Niguel projects.

The two housing tracts have been the subject of lengthy controversy and dispute before the regional and state coastal commissions for months.

One tract, 7479, oceanside of Pacific Coast Highway near Crown Valley Parkway, is now being proposed for 900 units.

The project near Salt Creek Beach was originally designed at 7,690 units. It was denied by the Regional Commission even when cut down to 1,218 units and has been held up by the state commission.

The second tract, 7885, inland of Pacific Coast Highway near Niguel Shores Road, would have about the same number of units as originally proposed 917 — under the new compromise.

The state commission reversed a regional approval of that project.

But Avco officials have now agreed to move a commercial site off Pacific Coast Highway to Niguel Shores and

Stonehill Drive, which meets some of the objections by local residents.

The ocean-side tract under the new plan would also include a public promenade on the bluff top instead of housing and would increase access to a grassy park and the beach below, a regional commissioner said today.

The South Coast Regional Zone Conservation Commission today debated

whether to reconsider Avco's renewed request without requiring another permit application.

The commission discussed adopting specific procedures on reconsideration which could accommodate Avco's projects.

Speaking against this action were Ina Bliss of the League of Women Voters in Irvine and Dale Secord of the Orange

County Environmental Coalition.

Secord accused the commission of "eroding the public's right to have a full public hearing on each permit. The case of Avco is no different than the case of San Onofre (nuclear power plant) before the state commission."

"You're only expediting matters," Secord charged, "for a special interest group."

## Demolition Okay Gets Opposition

Laguna Beach writer Arnold Hano, a former member of the city Board of Adjustment, has appealed Regional Coastal Commission approval for demolition of several old structures owned by Laguna Federal Savings and Loan Association.

Hano charges that destruction of Casa de Mandigo and Barbara Weber Studio would be illegal because Laguna Fed

has not submitted an environmental impact report to the city.

The savings and loan association plans to demolish the buildings at 265, 275 and 277 Broadway to make a parking lot and drive-through teller's window.

The South Coast Regional Zone Conservation Commission approved demolition of the old buildings last Monday.

The appeal will take the matter to the State Coastal Commission which must hear the matter within 60 days.

Hano points out that the buildings to be torn down have been judged "architectural rarities" and as such require an EIR before razing.

Several Lagunans also have protested the demolition on social grounds charging that the savings and loan evicted long-time elderly residents from the Casa Mandigo and will be tearing down needed low-cost housing in order to construct a parking lot.

Worried plant owners have besieged the Laguna Beach police department with telephone calls at the news that one man has been arrested in connection with the pirating of potted greenery from Laguna area homes.

"They started calling Friday and called Saturday and Sunday. The girls at the switchboard are about ready to kill me," Detective Alex Jimenez said today.

"We have to water the darn things on top of it all," he added.

Det. Jimenez said eight plants have been seized in connection with suspected crimes. He said persons who believe the plants may be theirs may view them at the police annex in City Hall South, 570 Gleneyre Street.

Police arrested Kirk Woloshyn, 18, of 247 Fairview Street. He was booked for alleged trespassing and petty theft. A second man suspected of involvement in the plant capers has been cleared.

"Tell people not to drop their guard. There are several groups of people involved in this type of theft."

"These are not the main culprits. All cities are suffering this type of crime. We can use any information that the citizen can assist with," Det. Jimenez said.

Jimenez said Woloshyn just liked plants, "it wasn't a matter of acquiring funds from their sale."

"He just fell in love with plants and couldn't afford the habit," Det. Jimenez said following the arrest.

He said the second man was cleared because he appeared not to be actively involved in the thefts.

"He doesn't even like plants," Det. Jimenez said.

## Police Review Laguna Citizen Parking Gripe

Laguna Beach Police Chief Frank Schopen has confirmed that his department is reviewing citizen complaints of police action citing cars parked the wrong way on narrow Laguna residential streets.

In a letter to the city council, Troy Peters of 1121 Coast View Drive charges that although residents of his street have historically parked helter-skelter on the road, citations were given recently in what he called a campaign to line the city coffers.

Peters charges shortly after midnight on Jan. 24, "while most decent law respecting members of this seaside community were sleeping, patrol cars swept through outlying residential streets, some deadend, and some substandard, issuing 50 or more parking citations without any previous warning to citizens."

Peters said that the citations were written for parking on the wrong side of the street (facing the wrong way). He said the area is not posted no parking.

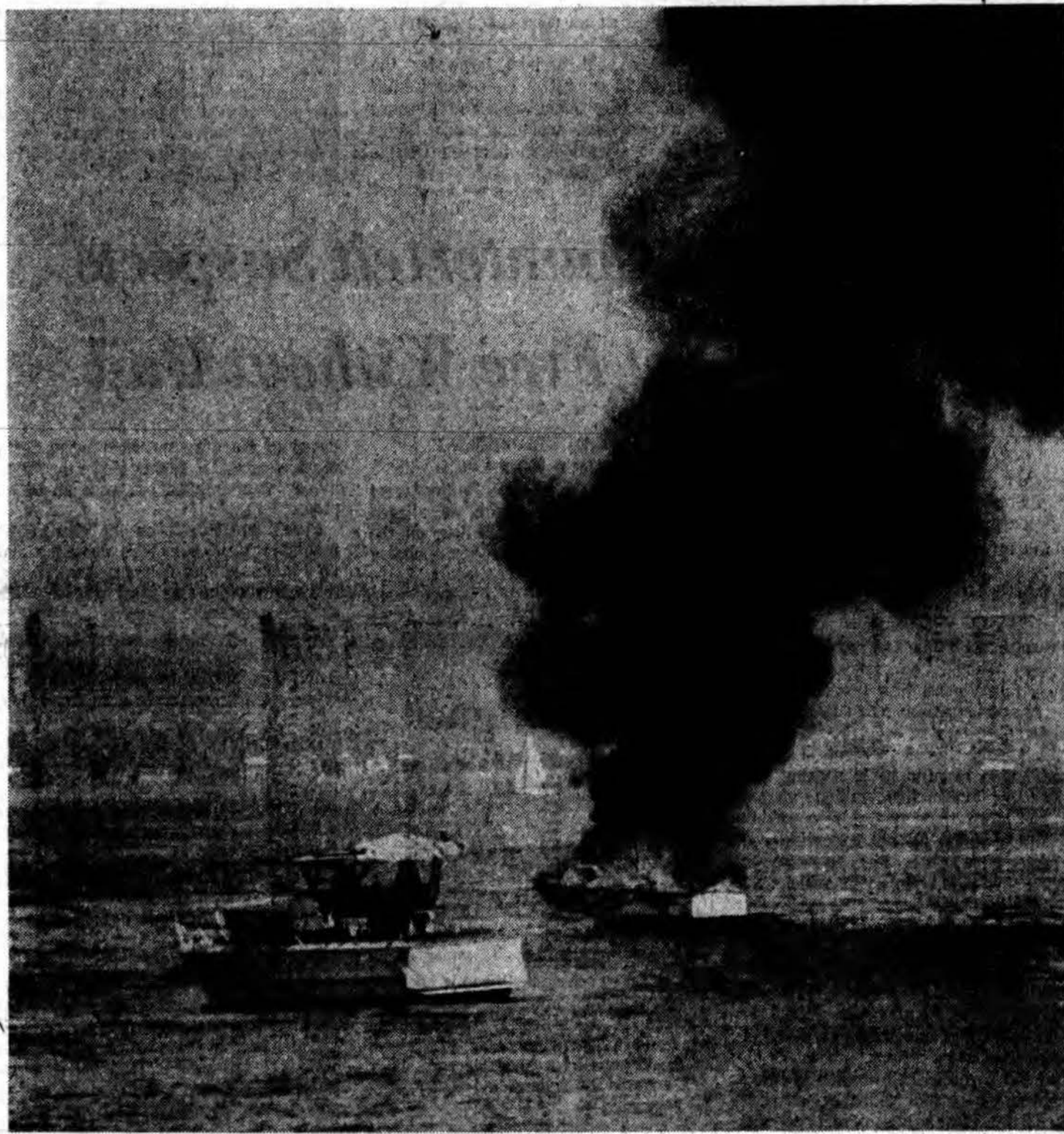
The chief said he was looking into the complaints and could not confirm the number of tickets issued.

## Caspers Asks Ontario Pact

He said despite all efforts to control jet traffic, curfew violations, noise and other problems persist and have triggered huge lawsuits against the county.

"I do not believe there is another location for a jet airport within the geographic bounds of Orange County," Caspers said.

"Therefore, my office has been investigating the possibility of the use of Ontario to meet the growing jet air transportation needs of Orange County."

Caspers, who vowed in his recent state of the county address to pursue the Ontario plan, said the existing county jetport was never built to handle its current flight load.

"Orange County Airport was not

originally designed for jet traffic and there is an obvious difference in the manner which the two jet operators conduct operations at the facility," Caspers said.

He said that while Air California has complied with curfews, exhaust reduction and takeoff patterns, Hughes Airwest has not.

In his report Caspers lists 16 separate occasions between Dec. 27 and Jan. 7 that Airwest departures or arrivals violated the 10 p.m. curfew at the airport.

One of the arrivals was at 3:08 a.m., he said. Airport Director Robert

Bresnahan confirmed today that violations are occurring all the time, but that most are within a few minutes and can be explained by the airlines.

"Even though Air Cal is not as late as Airwest, they do have some violations," Bresnahan said. "But there is always something such as the weather or mechanical problems that cause it."

Bresnahan said Air Cal has a curfew clause in its lease allowing the county to crack down after the airline is given 30 days to correct the problem. But he said Airwest operates on a month to month pact which has no curfew limit in it.

"If these violations continue to be a problem a drastic step might be necessary such as closing the airport at 10 p.m. and turning off the lights," Bresnahan said.

In Caspers' report to the board he said Orange County Airport may have moved into the number one position in the nation in total takeoffs and landings, ahead of Chicago's O'Hare Airport.

He said the fuel crisis may have caused the switch in position since Orange County continues to set flight records with 632,000 runway movements in 1973.

Caspers also said in his report his contacts with the Marines over use of Camp Pendleton met with dismal

## Admits Lies To FBI On Scandal

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Herbert L. "Bart" Porter of Laguna Niguel, who told the Senate Watergate Committee he kept quiet for fear he would be accused of "not being a team player," pleaded guilty today to one count of lying to the FBI about the scandal.

U.S. District Judge William B. Bryant let Porter go free without bond and postponed sentencing until the court gets a probation report.

At Bryant's request, a prosecuting attorney described briefly what he would have sought to prove in court had there been a trial. Bryant asked Porter if he had any "quarrel" with the government's statement, and Porter said he did not.

The statement related what Porter told the Senate committee in June — that Porter told the FBI on July 19, 1972 that he had a conversation with Jeb Stuart Magruder, deputy director of President Nixon's re-election campaign, about plans to use \$100,000 to finance protection for campaign speakers.

"There was no such conversation and the government is ready to prove it," the prosecuting attorney said.

The actual use of the money was not mentioned during the brief court proceeding, but it was understood that Porter's conversation with Magruder dealt with \$100,000 passed to G. Gordon Liddy to finance the Watergate break-in.

Porter's plea in effect waived a right to jury trial. After getting Porter's assurance that he understood this, Bryant asked him, "Do you understand the penalty?"

"I believe it is five years or \$10,000 or both," Porter said.

Bryant then read the charge and asked Porter how he pleaded.

"I plead guilty, your honor," Porter said.

Porter, former scheduling director for the committee for the Re-election of the President, told the Watergate committee that Magruder asked him to perjure himself.

To do otherwise, Porter said Magruder told him, "could be very embarrassing to the President of the United States," to former Attorney General John N. Mitchell, and to H. R. Haldeman, Nixon's former chief of staff.

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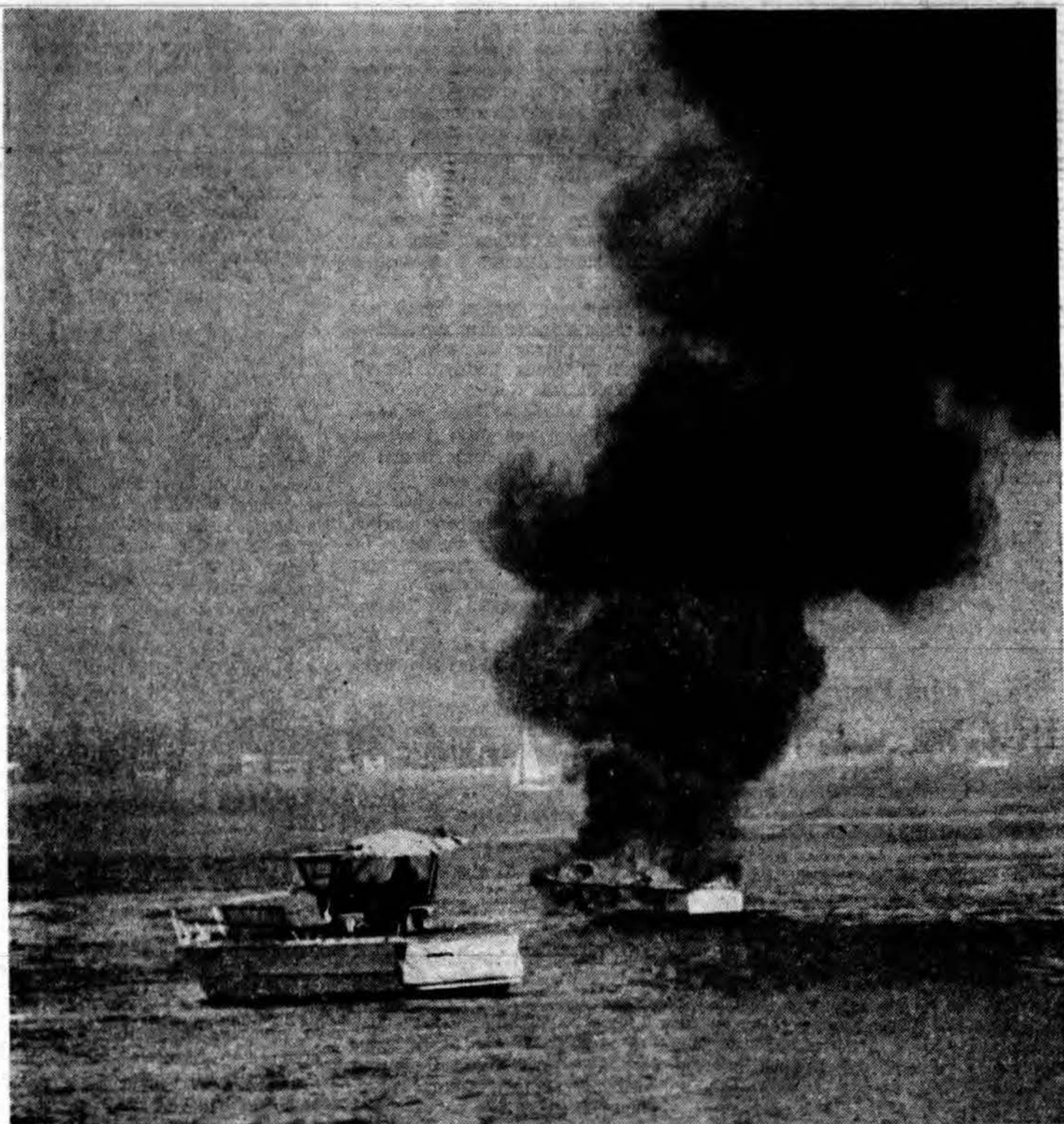
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**Chopper Down**  
**Crashes, Burns Near School**

A helicopter crashed at mid-day today in a Westminster street near John Marshall Elementary School. No children were injured in the incident but spectators feared for the lives of the aircraft occupants.

A school employee said, "I don't see how anyone could have gotten out of that alive. It's just burning something awful."

"There are police and firemen all over the place," the witness said. The witness said it appeared two persons were aboard.

The school, at 15791 Bushard St., Westminster, was not damaged in the incident.

Precise information on the type of helicopter was unavailable. "It is burning too hard to tell," witnesses said.

Shortly after the mid-day crash, ambulances arrived and an official from the Orange County Coroner's Office was dispatched to the Westminster scene.

Westminster police were declining to issue any specific information pending a formal report from the scene. But they indicated they did not believe the downed craft was either a military or police model.

"As near as we can determine, we believe it is civilian," she said.

Orange County Airport Tower reported that two civilian helicopters took off this morning and only one has returned.

A spokesman for the tower said a transient craft had used the Santa Ana training school pad this morning.

"No records of transient helicopters are kept by us and there's no way of knowing who might have been flying it," the tower spokesman said.

"I was traveling in my car under the copter when it started to sputter around and it threw off a part," said Mrs. Priscilla Schoch, who lives in the Westhaven tract where the helicopter fell.

"It started to tumble and burst into a ball of fire and then fell straight down," said Mrs. Schoch after the horrifying spectacle.

"I started to scream because I knew there were two men inside on fire..."

A youth, Chris Mermanski, 18, was one of the first on the scene after witnessing the crash from his car.

"I was the first one to stop and I ran over and tried to help one of the men who was on fire," said Mermanski. "Another man pulled me away, saying the copter would explode again."

The downed craft did not.

"In a matter of minutes, both men were burned alive."

One boy, Lorne Law, 11, said he and other children were out doing pull-ups on the playground when they looked up and saw the rear of the helicopter explode and heard two booms.

He said some pieces of the craft fell onto the playground and school building, causing a few small flames in the grassy area, but they quickly went out.

The boy said he saw one of the victims thrown out when the helicopter shattered on impact.

**Of 'Stresses'**  
**Of Sauna Lady**

Maria Parsons' sex-hungry psychiatric condition was molded from childhood and was ripe for explosion on the day she was trapped in the sauna room at the Holiday Health Spa in Orange. A Beverly Hills psychoanalyst testified today.

Dr. Samuel Sperling told an Orange County Superior Court Jury that Mrs. Parson, 50, of Anaheim is a classic example of the "fertile soil" concept in psychiatry—the theory that one single traumatic event can trigger a mental condition in persons suffering from previous stresses.

Among Mrs. Parson's stresses, he testified in the "three faces of Eve" trial, is the fact that she and her parents and seven brothers and sisters were forced to flee from Mexico to Los Angeles nearly 50 years ago because of attacks by Pancho Villa's guerrillas on the family store.

Dr. Sperling described as "especially significant" the severe scalding of Betty, a childhood friend of Mrs. Parson.

He said the young Maria Parson idealized Betty and practically forced her own family from that day to address her by that name. She is today known to her own husband and family as Betty.

Sperling agreed with Dr. Deane Benton, the Santa Ana psychiatrist who has previously testified in the sauna bath trial, that Betty is the remorseful member of the trio of personalities who now dominate Mrs. Parson.

The psychiatrists, described the other two projections as Maria, the sex-hungry redhead who seeks extramarital mates in local bars and Marie, described as being midway between the two other personalities.

It is alleged in her \$1 million lawsuit against the spa that the three personalities finally emerged when Mrs. Parson was trapped in the sauna room on March 2, 1970, after the door jammed (See SAUNA, Page 2)

**Nixon Asks \$13.6 Billion**  
**In Benefits for Veterans**

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon today proposed cost-of-living increases in veterans' pensions and an 8 percent boost in GI benefits as part of a \$13.6 billion legislative package for veterans.

Nixon also urged that Congress restore Nov. 11 as Veterans Day, repealing part of a 1968 law which switched the holiday to the fourth Monday in October.

The proposals were contained in a special message to Congress, one of a series Nixon is sending to Capitol Hill before his State of the Union address Wednesday night.

At a White House briefing, Veterans Administrator Donald Johnson said the \$13.6 billion being sought by Nixon is \$400 million more than is being spent this year.

Most of the increase is ticketed for medical programs, he said. Even with the proposed boost in monthly checks for veterans under the GI bill, VA spending for education is expected to decline from \$3.2 billion this year to \$2.6 billion for next year because of declining enrollment in the program, Johnson said.

The Administration also is proposing, Johnson said, that a veterans cemetery be designated in each of the 10 standard federal regions and that Arlington Cemetery near Washington be expanded. (See VETERANS, Page 2)

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## Utilities Will Have Enough Oil

Federal energy Chief William E. Simon today guaranteed that most of the nation's utilities would have enough residual fuel oil to meet 95 percent of power needs in February.

Simon said, however, that utilities are expected to conserve fuel by reducing power loads at least 5 percent below normal trends next month.

The 148 utilities in 39 states covered by the announcement were urged by Simon "to impose stringent methods to achieve even more power conservation so that inventory drawdowns can be kept to a minimum."

Under the plan, each utility would receive enough fuel deliveries to provide power for the month and to have at least a 12-day oil inventory by March 1. Simon's action will allow power growth for utilities using residual fuel oil of 2 to 4 percent over 1973 levels.

Simon, director of the Federal Energy Office, said the allocation will be

changed monthly as the supply-demand situation warrants.

Meanwhile, Saudi Arabian oil minister Ahmed Zaki warned in Tokyo today against the United States, Europe and Japan uniting in a confrontation over oil.

He said the interests of countries lacking their own petroleum supplies are best served by bilateral deals, in which they help oil-rich countries develop their own industry in return for assured supplies.

Referring to President Nixon's call for a Feb. 11 meeting in Washington of oil consuming nations, Yamani told a news conference, "If the idea is to unite them for a confrontation, it will be a serious matter for both consumer and producer nations."

"It will be an especially serious matter for Japan, which depends almost 100 percent on imported oil."

Earlier, the architect of the Arab "oil weapon" promised eventual cuts in fuel prices, but petroleum sources saw no end in sight to the boycott of shipments to the United States.

Yamani said his country favored reductions in recent oil price hikes in view of their adverse impact on the world economy.

Yamani, the man most responsible for designing the Arab oil cutbacks and boycotts imposed during last October's Middle East war, said however, the price drops would not take place immediately.

In Beirut, diplomatic sources predicted Arab oil producers — with Saudi Arabia taking the lead — would turn down an appeal by Egyptian President Anwar Sadat for lifting the fuel embargo of the United States.

## Ministers Oppose Recall Of Huntington Trustees

Eleven local ministers have signed a statement opposing the proposed recall of two trustees in the Huntington Beach Union High School District in the "Deep Throat" controversy.

The recall movement is directed against Trustees Dennis Mangers and Ron Shenkman because some parents feel they did not respond properly when it was learned the x-rated sex film had been shown last summer during a district administrators' conference in San Diego.

Both trustees will appear in Superior Court Wednesday seeking a court order to prevent recall backers from circulating petitions.

The ministers who signed a statement against the recall movement are all active members of the Huntington Beach Fountain Valley Ministerial Association.

The Rev. James DeLange, pastor of the Faith Lutheran Church and president of the association, said the signatures were obtained over the weekend as a result of considerable discussion about the "Deep Throat" incident.

The statement reads: "The showing of the 'Deep Throat' film... was a most unfortunate and regrettable incident and we express our strong protest against this kind of activity."

"We believe it to be both proper and to be expected that the district Board of Trustees should take appropriate action to correct this kind of conduct and to deal forthrightly to improve the moral values under which our school system operates."

"At the present time conflicting courses of action are being proposed to our school board and community. After a number of conversations in recent weeks with individual school board members, and with one another, we do not believe that the movement to recall Trustees Dennis Mangers and Ron Shenkman is justified, nor will it serve the best interests of our district and communities."

"We do believe that every effort should be made as rapidly as possible by our school board to make such changes as they deem advisable in the top administrative personnel of the district which will provide new leadership, that will bring a greater awareness of and appreciation for moral values along with academic and professional skills."

"We urge the citizens of our communities to give their support to our entire school board at this difficult time."

## Laguna Niguel Judge Will Rule On Smut Arrest

Gordon and Evelyn Wilson, owners of Fahrenheit 451 bookstore in Laguna Beach, will get a ruling Friday on whether or not they were legally arrested on charges of selling dirty comic books.

Laguna Niguel Municipal Court Judge Richard D. Hamilton is scheduled to hand down the ruling on the arrest of the Wilsons by a court warrant. They are accused of selling and distributing pornography.

A police detective purchased several copies of underground comic books at the bookstore. The action came after a determination by Deputy District Attorney John Anderson that in his view the books were obscene.

The arrests have raised a furor in the community, and the City Council has even held a special public hearing on the matter.

The ACLU attorneys representing the Wilsons charged last Friday that because of various legal technicalities, the arrests were not proper.

Judge Hamilton took the arguments under submission and will rule at 9 a.m. Friday on the question.

In addition to the Wilsons, Jerry Walden owner of the Funk Factory, was arrested on smut charges. All have said they will fight the allegations.

## Avco Proposing Major Revamp On Two Projects

Avco Community Developers is proposing a drastic revamping in size and design of two major Laguna Niguel projects.

The two housing tracts have been the subject of lengthy controversy and dispute before the regional and state coastal commissions for months.

One tract, 7479, ocean side of Pacific Coast Highway near Crown Valley Parkway, is now being proposed for 900 units.

The project near Salt Creek Beach was originally designed at 7,690 units. It was denied by the Regional Commission even when cut down to 1,218 units and has been held up by the state commission.

The second tract, 7885, inland of Pacific Coast Highway near Niguel Shores Road, would have about the same number of units as originally proposed 917 — under the new compromise.

The state commission reversed a regional approval of that project.

But Avco officials have now agreed to move a commercial site off Pacific Coast Highway to Niguel Shores and Stonehill Drive, which meets some of the objections by local residents.

The ocean-side tract under the new plan would also include a public promenade on the bluff top instead of housing and would increase access to a grassy park and the beach below, a regional commissioner said today.

The South Coast Regional Zone Conservation Commission today debated whether to reconsider Avco's renewed request without requiring another permit application.

The commission discussed adopting specific procedures on reconsideration which could accommodate Avco's projects.

Speaking against this action were Ina Bliss of the League of Women Voters in Irvine and Dale Secord of the Orange County Environmental Coalition.

Secord accused the commission of "eroding the public's right to have a full public hearing on each permit. The case of Avco is no different than the case of San Onofre (nuclear power plant) before the state commission."

"You're only expediting matters," Secord charged, "for a special interest group."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite reports to the contrary, President Nixon is "sleeping very well, very well indeed," a spokesman said today.

Both Nixon's daughter, Julie, and his chief physician, Dr. Walter Tkach, indicated recently that President had difficulty getting a full night's sleep.

— 63 acres in "linear" open space — bike, hiking and horse trails and proposed greenbelt flood control channel.

— 70 acres of water and shoreline trails, beaches and boat launches resulting from two central village lakes.

— The 69 acres of conventional neighborhood parks.

— Plus, another 50 acres of city community-level parks and 22 acres of landscaped "village edge" treatment and buffers.

Together, the various types of open space amount to 10.5 acres per 1,000 persons, the Irvine Company contends.

Then, to meet the city's 4.5 acre per 1,000 people park standard, the company asks that nearly 30 acres of the linear open space and 26 acres of the lakes be counted.

## Court Evicts Daily Pilot News Reporter

Reitano was indicted by the Grand Jury on multiple acts of sex perversion, sodomy and lewd conduct with children under 14 years of age after complaints were made to Costa Mesa police by the parents of four children—two 11-year-old girls, a 10-year-old girl and her 8-year-old brother.

All four reportedly have testified about the alleged incidents that led to the filing of 18 felony counts against the defendant.

It is alleged that Reitano gave one victim money before engaging with the child in lewd conduct and on another occasion ran a pornographic movie in the presence of another female victim.

Reitano, who has earlier been involved in several court actions stemming from his alleged distribution of pornographic books and movies, is being held in custody during his trial with bail set at \$25,000.

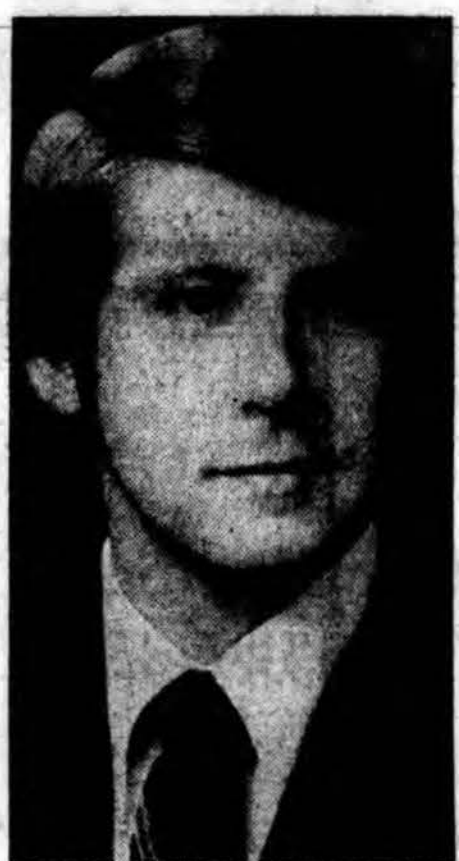

## Pair Burn Alive In County Crash

A helicopter crashed at mid-day today in a Westminster street near John Marshall Elementary School. No children were injured in the incident but spectators feared for the lives of the aircraft occupants.

A school employee said, "I don't see how anyone could have gotten out of that alive. It's just burning something awful.

"There are police and firemen all over the place," the witness said. The witness said it appeared two persons were aboard.

The school, at 15791 Bushard St., Westminster, was not damaged in the incident.

Precise information on the type of helicopter was unavailable. "It is burning too hard to tell," witnesses said.

Shortly after the mid-day crash, ambulances arrived and an official from the Orange County Coroner's Office was dispatched to the Westminster scene.

Westminster police were declining to issue any specific information pending a formal report from the scene. But they indicated they did not believe the downed craft was either a military or police model.

"As near as we can determine, we believe it is civilian," she said.

Orange County Airport Tower reported that two civilian helicopters took off this morning and only one has returned.

A spokesman for the tower said a transient craft had used the Santa Ana training school pad this morning.

"No records of transient helicopters are kept by us and there's no way of knowing who might have been flying it," the tower spokesman said.

"I was traveling in my car under the copter when it started to sputter around and it threw off a part," said Mrs. Priscilla Schoch, who lives in the Westhaven tract where the helicopter fell.

"It started to tumble and burst into a ball of fire and then fell straight down," said Mrs. Schoch after the horrifying spectacle. "I started to scream because I knew there were two men inside on fire..."

A youth, Chris Mermanski, 18, was one of the first on the scene after witnessing the crash from his car.

"I was the first one to stop and I ran over and tried to help one of the men who was on fire," said Mermanski. "Another man pulled me away, saying the copter would explode again."

The downed craft did not.

"In a matter of minutes, both men were burned alive."

One boy, Lorne Law, 11, said he and other children were out doing pull-ups on the playground when they looked up and saw the rear of the helicopter explode and heard two booms.

He said some pieces of the craft fell onto the playground and school building, causing a few small flames in the grassy area, but they quickly went out.

The boy said he saw one of the victims thrown out when the helicopter shattered on impact.

Phil Petty and Robert Green, attorneys for Mrs. Popeil and John Yzardiaga gave a short brief on their motion to Judge Litwin today.

According to Sheldon, the trio has cited two cases — one involving abortion and the other a murder in Switzerland — in which charges were dropped for lack of jurisdiction.

Judge Litwin suspended the hearing approximately one hour after the resumption of testimony from Bob Peeler, one of the men allegedly hired to kill Popeil.

Contents of that testimony like that of the two previous witnesses remains a secret today as the result of two motions from defense attorneys.

When the hearing into the charges of conspiracy to commit murder against the pair opened Thursday, Mrs. Popeil and Ayers waived their rights to a public hearing and the court was barred to the public and press.

Late Friday a further avenue of information was closed when defense attorneys Petty and Green successfully sought an order to seal the transcript

of the hearing.

Long Beach Municipal Court Judge Litwin ordered the transcript sealed until Tuesday but Green said they will attempt to get a Los Angeles Superior Court order to continue the seal some time this week.

The hearing is expected to conclude today and Petty said there were likely to be some "interesting developments" but he did not specify what those developments would be.

Mrs. Popeil, 48, and Ayers, 37, are accused of hiring two acquaintances, Don Reed of Long Beach and Peeler of Cerritos to kill her multi-millionaire husband so she could inherit one third of his \$200 million estate.

Most of the three-day hearing has been occupied with testimony from Reed and Peeler although a local jeweler appeared briefly on the stand Friday to verify the authenticity of \$90,000 worth of diamond jewelry allegedly given the two men as a security deposit on the murder contract.

## Gun Smuggling Plot Revealed

LONDON (UPI) — Guns smuggled into Britain in the falsebottomed suitcase of Californian Allison Thompson in late December were for use in a plot to kidnap a high-ranking French government official, a government prosecutor said today.

Prosecutor Doiran Williams said in a court hearing that Moroccan Abdelkber El-Hakkaoui wanted to move the guns to France to kidnap the unnamed French official and back a subsequent demand for the release of 30 Moroccan prisoners.

# Niguel's Porter Admits Guilt In Watergate

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Herbert L. "Bart" Porter of Laguna Niguel, who told the Senate Watergate Committee he kept quiet for fear he would be accused of "not being a team player," pleaded guilty today to one count of lying to the FBI about the scandal.

U.S. District Judge William B. Bryant let Porter go free without bond and postponed sentencing until the court gets a probation report.

At Bryant's request, a prosecuting attorney described briefly what he would have sought to prove in court had there been a trial. Bryant asked Porter if he had any "qualms" with the government's statement, and Porter said he did not.

The statement related what Porter told the Senate committee in June — that Porter told the FBI on July 19, 1972 that he had a conversation with Jeb Stuart Magruder, deputy director of President Nixon's re-election campaign, about plans to use \$100,000 to finance protection for campaign speakers.

"There was no such conversation and the government is ready to prove it," the prosecuting attorney said.

The actual use of the money was not mentioned during the brief court proceeding, but it was understood that Porter's conversation with Magruder dealt with \$100,000 passed to G. Gordon Liddy to finance the Watergate break-in.

# Doctor Tells Of Maria's Sex Hunger

Maria Parsons' sex-hungry psychiatric condition was molded from childhood and was ripe for explosion on the day she was trapped in the sauna room at the Holiday Health Spa in Orange, a Beverly Hills psychoanalyst testified today.

Dr. Samuel Sperling told an Orange County Superior Court Jury that Mrs. Parson, 50, of Anaheim is a classic example of the "fertile soil" concept in psychiatry—the theory that one single traumatic event can trigger a mental condition in persons suffering from previous stresses.

Among Mrs. Parson's stresses, he testified in the "three faces of Eve" trial, is the fact that she and her parents and seven brothers and sisters were forced to flee from Mexico to Los Angeles nearly 50 years ago because of attacks by Pancho Villa's guerrillas on the family store.

Dr. Sperling described as "especially significant" the severe scalding of Betty, a childhood friend of Mrs. Parson.

He said the young Maria Parson idealized Betty and practically forced her own family from that day to address her by that name. She is today known to her own husband and family as Betty.

Sperling agreed with Dr. Deane Benton, the Santa Ana psychiatrist who has previously testified in the sauna bath trial, that Betty is the remorseful member of the trio of personalities who now dominate Mrs. Parson.

The psychiatrists, described the other two projections as Maria, the sex-hungry redhead who seeks extramarital mates in local bars and Marie, described as being midway between the two other personalities.

It is alleged in her \$1 million lawsuit against the spa that the three personalities finally emerged when Mrs. Parson was trapped in the sauna room on March 2, 1970, after the door jammed and the door handle broke off.

Dr. Sperling told the jury that the fact that Mrs. Parson preferred to play with boys rather than girls in her childhood and that she did not achieve womanhood until the age of 18 were other significant factors in her psychiatric condition.

Sperling said the influence of the Spanish "duenna" system and the close guarding of Maria Parson and her sisters by her parents undoubtedly helped to form the "fertile soil" condition.

Attorney Marvin Lewis Sr. argues that the agency responsible for the triggering of a psychiatric condition in a "fertile soil" situation is fully liable in the legal sense despite any pre-existing indications.

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# Caspers Urges Ontario Site for County Jets

Orange County Supervisor Ronald Caspers will ask fellow board members Tuesday to approve a six-month study of Ontario International Airport as the answer to county air transit needs.

In a report prepared for the board but released today, Caspers said he is convinced jet traffic has no place in Orange County and the current traffic is already almost too much to control.

He said despite all efforts to control jet traffic, curfew violations, noise and other problems persist and have triggered huge lawsuits against the county.

"I do not believe there is another location for a jet airport within the geographic bounds of Orange County," Caspers said.

"Therefore, my office has been investigating the possibility of the use of Ontario to meet the growing jet

air transportation needs of Orange County."

Caspers, who vowed in his recent state of the county address to pursue

the Ontario plan, said the existing county jetport was never built to handle its current flight load.

"Orange County Airport was not

originally designed for jet traffic and there is an obvious difference in the manner which the two jet operators conduct operations at the facility," Caspers said.

He said that while Air California has complied with curfews, exhaust reduction and takeoff patterns, Hughes Airwest has not.

In his report Caspers lists 16 separate occasions between Dec. 27 and Jan. 7 that Airwest departures or arrivals

# Two Killed in Copter Crash

## Explosion Witnessed Over School

A two-man helicopter suddenly faltered and exploded over a Westminster elementary school today, plummeting into the street in front of the campus in a shower of debris.

Investigators at the scene confirmed that both occupants of the chopper were incinerated in the crash.

One witness tried to help pull one of the victims from the blazing wreckage after he was thrown partially clear, but others intervened, fearing a second explosion.

Identity of the dead men was withheld, but the two-seat Bell helicopter was known to be operated by Santana Helicopter Service, 18300 Ike Jones Road, at Orange County Airport.

Emergency rescue and salvage crews working the scene at John Marshall Elementary School, 15791 Bushard St. on the Westminster-Huntington Beach city limit, were shocked at the narrow escape, considering the area.

"It's amazing," said an unidentified Westminster Police Department sergeant, "that it didn't hit the homes or the school."

"We think he may have tried to steer it down into the street. If so...he did a fantastic job..."

Children playing at recess and passing motorists witnessed the horrifying crash shortly before noon, when the helicopter suddenly backfired, faltered and fell.

"I was traveling in my car under the copter when it started to sputter around and then threw off a part," said Mrs. Priscilla Schoch, who lives in the Westhaven tract, where it went down.

"It started to tumble and burst into a ball of fire, then fell... straight down," said Mrs. Schoch, clearly shaken by what she witnessed.

"I started to scream, because I knew there were two men inside on fire..." Crowds of youngsters stood around, either hushed or excited, depending upon their understanding of what occurred in the ending of two lives.

One, Lorne Law, 11, said he and other Marshall School pupils were out doing pull-up exercises in the playground when they looked up and saw the rear of the helicopter exploded and heard two (See EXPLOSION, Page 2)

## Pilot Reporter Ejected From Reitano Trial

# Nixon Proposes Boosts for Vets

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon today proposed cost-of-living increases in veterans' pensions and an 8 percent boost in GI benefits as part of a \$13.6 billion legislative package for veterans.

Nixon also urged that Congress restore Nov. 11 as Veterans Day, repealing part of a 1968 law which switched the holiday to the fourth Monday in October.

The proposals were contained in a special message to Congress, one of a series Nixon is sending to Capitol Hill before his State of the Union address Wednesday night.

At a White House briefing, Veterans Administrator Donald Johnson said the \$13.6 billion being sought by Nixon is \$400 million more than is being spent this year.

Most of the increase is ticketed for medical programs, he said. Even with the proposed boost in monthly checks for veterans under the GI bill, VA spending for education is expected to decline from \$3.2 billion this year to \$2.6 billion for next year because of declining enrollment in the program, Johnson said.

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# 4 Counterfeit Suspects Free Without Bond

All four persons arrested by the Secret Service in connection with an alleged \$500,000 counterfeiting operation on the Orange Coast are free today, pending their appearance in federal court.

Picquelle, 39, faces a charge of manufacturing counterfeit currency and his roommate Sam Warren, 33, a printer, a charge of aiding and abetting the sale of counterfeit money.

Pacific Avenue the agents claim to have found \$100,000 of the counterfeit currency, will also appear in court Feb. 14.

DeMeuse, 42, is survived by his wife, Nola, two daughters, Leslie, 16, and Diana, 15, a son, Mark 12, all of Alameda and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jules DeMeuse of Oakland.

His son, Gregory, 19, who perished in the crash was a student at Chabot College in Hayward. His daughter, Shannon, 16, who also died, attended the University of the Pacific in Stockton.

DeMeuse, a developer, was well known in local and international yachting circles for his participation in numerous major races in the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

The memorial high Mass of the Resurrection will be celebrated at 11 a.m. Tuesday at St. Joseph's Basilica in Alameda. Interment will be private.

training allowances. The increase is needed, he said, "to keep pace with inflation."

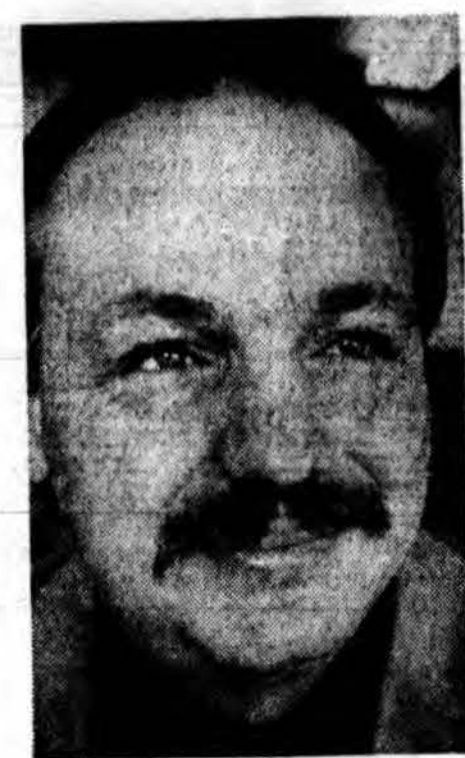
Legislation is pending in both House and Senate to provide for a 13.6 percent increase.

The President reported that the Veterans Administration is embarking on the greatest program of hospital construction in its history.

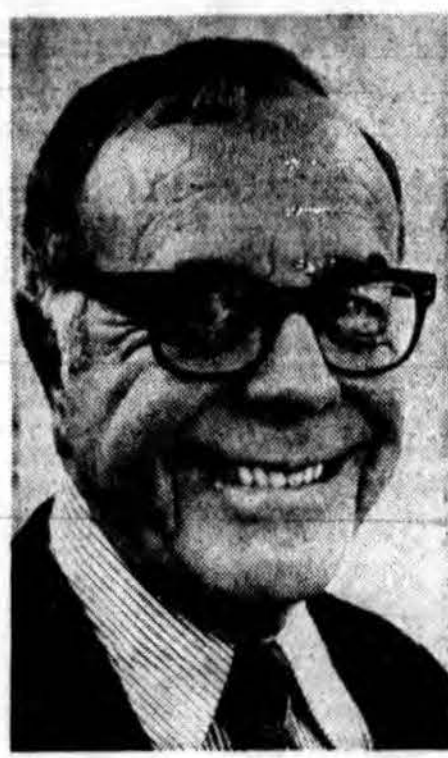

## Two Announce Intentions For Newport Council Race

Two political newcomers today announced they intend to file for the April 9 city council elections in Newport Beach.

Lyn Geronimi, a teacher at Lincoln Middle School, said he will oppose Councilman Milan Dostal in District 4, which covers Westcliff, Dover Shores, Baycrest, Bayside Village and Linda Isle.

And John V. Baker Jr., a former aircraft dealer now in

the insurance business, said he will seek the District 6 seat to be vacated by Councilman Richard Croul. It covers Big Canyon, Irvine Terrace and parts of Balboa Island and old Corona del Mar.

Two previously announced candidates, Mrs. Al Forgit and John J. McKerran, have also filed their nomination papers for Districts 1 and 3, respectively.

Geronimi said he is the lone challenger for the District 1 seat Vice Mayor Howard Rogers has said he wants again. District 1 covers the Balboa Peninsula and Lido Isle.

There are three candidates in District 3, which includes Newport Heights, Cliff Haven and Bayshores. They are McKerran, Dr. Ellis Glazier and realtor Peter Barrett.

There may be as many as four candidates in District 6. Besides Baker, Planning Commission Chairman William Agee, Mrs. Lucille Kuehn and Paul Hummel have so far expressed interest in one degree or another. Agee is the only one who has filed papers.

Baker said he is running because he wants to give back to Newport Beach some of what he has gotten out of it.

He said he's a strong opponent of jet flights at Orange County Airport and thinks if enough pressure is put on Washington, the flights could be moved to the El Toro Marine base immediately.

He declined to take a stand on the proposed Corona del Mar bypass route. He said he has an unabiding concern for young people and endorses the ecology movement.

Geronimi, too, said he has learned from youth and feels their environmental concerns should not go unheeded.

He criticized the existing council for constantly delaying decisions on controversial issues.

He picked the proposed Lido Isle beach lease as an example. He predicted a decision on the proposal renewal will be delayed until after the elections.

He said the lease should be renewed at a "fair price."

Geronimi said he tends to oppose use of the former freeway corridor in Corona del Mar for a bypass road around the business district.

He said he would refrain from attacking incumbent Dostal during the campaign, although he said he strongly opposes any form of regional government, such as the Intergovernmental Coordinating Council, of which Dostal is chairman.

That made Dostal furious. "It bothers me that there are some people who have the misconception that the ICC should be equated to regional government," Dostal said.

"That shows an absolute lack of knowledge about it. The ICC was set up to avoid regional government by having a voluntary, cooperative effort on part of cities and other taxing agencies so they can lower taxes by being more efficient in delivering government services," he said.

Dostal pointed out the ICC has no taxing powers and anything it does must be approved by the local governments involved.

Baker said he thinks he owes Newport Beach a debt which he'll try to repay as a councilman.

"I think she is the greatest city anywhere," he said.

McKerran, in a statement made when filing his nomination papers, also talked about how much he thinks of Newport Beach.

He also pledged his opposition to the airport, and to a revival of the Pacific Coast Freeway. He said he supports "a limited, orderly growth." He said density should be controlled and property rights should be protected. He did not pinpoint where he feels density controls should end and property rights begin.

## Mangers Set For Assembly Campaigning

Dennis Mangers, 33, a trustee of the Huntington Beach Union High School district, Sunday night announced his intention to run for the State Assembly seat now held by Republican Robert Burke.

Burke, a Huntington Beach resident, has not officially announced his intention to seek re-election, but an aide said today he would take out nomination papers.

Mangers, vice president of a Long Beach educational firm, announced his entry into the Assembly race during a dinner at Murdy Community Center. He will seek the Democratic nomination during the June 4 primary election. He hopes to face Burke in the general election Nov. 5.

Both men will be competing in the newly reorganized 73rd Assembly District which covers Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley, Costa Mesa, Seal Beach and Rossmore.

In the past, the district was known as the 70th and covered a slightly larger area, including portions of Westminster.

In announcing his candidacy, Mangers said, "I believe the incumbent represents only the small minority of the community that happens to agree with his own ultra-conservative philosophy."

"I believe strongly that the moderate citizens in the 73rd District generally go unheeded and unrepresented."

p.m. and turning off the lights," Bresnahan said.

In Caspers' report to the board he said Orange County Airport may have moved into the number one position in the nation in total takeoffs and landings, ahead of Chicago's O'Hare Airport.

He said the fuel crisis may have caused the switch in position since Orange County continues to set flight records with 632,000 runway movements in 1973.

Caspers also said in his report his contacts with the Marines over use of Camp Pendleton met with dismal rejection and that the possible use of the Chino Hills for a new airport is also an apparent impossibility.

"While the Ontario idea may provide a real answer to the airport question, it also warrants investigation because of its superior possibility for actualization in contrast to the proposal for Chino Hills, which has been designated as an open space preserve," Caspers said.

Caspers said a task force for the study could consist of both county staff members who would explore all avenues of airport use, including such things as rapid transit links between Orange County and Ontario.

Mesa's policy of allowing churches in residential neighborhoods, according to Arnold F. Hamala, chief of advanced planning.

Hamala said the church is short on required parking spaces but could meet its parking commitment by using the parking lot at nearby Lindbergh School. The Newport-Mesa Unified School District has not yet given its approval to a parking agreement.

City Councilman Alvin Pinkley said he would vote against the church proposal when the variance request comes before the council next month.

He said he was "diametrically opposed" to allowing any kind of church in a residential zone. "It's not permitted except under a variance. I concede their right to ask for one," Pinkley explained.

Pinkley insists that the church has been in operation for some time without the benefit of an ordinance and therefore been open illegally.

The city councilman added that his objections are centered on building and zoning code violations and have nothing to do with its homosexual orientation.

## Union Pacific Train Derailed

CASTLE ROCK, Wash. (AP)—Amtrak passengers played musical trains to bypass wreckage and broken track from the derailment of a Union Pacific freight nine miles north of Castle Rock.

Two diesel engines and 25 cars jumped a Burlington Northern track Sunday, blocking the railroad's main Seattle-Portland line. No one was injured.

A Burlington Northern dispatcher said Amtrak trains going opposite directions were halted on either side of the derailment.

## Niguel Man Admits Lie On Watergate

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Herbert L. "Bart" Porter of Laguna Niguel, who told the Senate Watergate Committee he kept quiet for fear he would be accused of "not being a team player," pleaded guilty today to one count of lying to the FBI about the scandal.

U.S. District Judge William B. Bryant let Porter go free without bond and postponed sentencing until the court gets a probation report.

At Bryant's request, a prosecuting attorney described briefly what he would have sought to prove in court had there been a trial. Bryant asked Porter if he had any "quarrel" with the government's statement, and Porter said he did not.

The statement related what Porter told the Senate committee in June — that Porter told the FBI on July 19, 1972 that he had a conversation with Jeb Stuart Magruder, deputy director of President Nixon's re-election campaign, about plans to use \$100,000 to finance protection for campaign speakers.

"There was no such conversation and the government is ready to prove it," the prosecuting attorney said.

The actual use of the money was not mentioned during the brief court proceeding, but it was understood that Porter's conversation with Magruder dealt with \$100,000 passed to G. Gordon Liddy to finance the Watergate break-in.

Porter's plea in effect waived a right to jury trial. After getting Porter's assurance that he understood this, Bryant asked him, "Do you understand the penalty?"

"I believe it is five years or \$10,000 or both," Porter said.

Bryant then read the charge and asked Porter how he pleaded.

"I plead guilty, your honor," Porter said.

Porter, former scheduling director for the committee for the re-election of the President, told the Watergate committee that Magruder asked him to perjure himself.

To do otherwise, Porter said Magruder told him, "could be very embarrassing to the President of the United States," to former Attorney General John N. Mitchell, and to H. R. Haldeman, Nixon's former chief of staff.

Porter also told the committee he kept quiet about his Watergate role for months out of intense loyalty to Nixon and "probably because of the fear of group pressure that would ensue — of not being a team player."

## Officer Kills Man

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A man killed by an off-duty police officer after he allegedly grabbed for the policeman's gun may have been a ski mask bandit who is wanted for at least 12 recent robberies, authorities said Sunday. Donn A. Degani, 23, Studio City, was killed shortly after being taken into custody while wearing a ski mask and carrying a 9mm automatic pistol wrapped in a newspaper.

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
