## County Okays Budget, Cuts Jobs of 41

Orange County Supervisors wound up six days of budget hearings Friday by approving a \$510 million county government spending plan for 1978-79.

Falling victim to county government's first post-Proposition 13 budget were 41 county workers whose jobs were eliminated.

But those lay-offs, chiefly in the county Human Services Agency, are far fewer than the 170 once predicted.

The Jarvis Gann initiative called a halt to about \$5 million worth of construction and equipment purchases this year and also canceled any plans for expanding government services.

The 1978-79 budget is \$34 million less than the \$544 million in last year's county government spending package.

It also is slashed from the \$596 million budget proposed before California voters passed Proposition 13, a property tax limitation initiative that chopped county revenue by \$65 million.

In part, the reduced local spending was made possible by the state Legislature's so-called one year "bail out" of \$42.2 million worth of county welfare and medical expenses.

That means state funds will finance some of the county social service programs that otherwise would have been paid for by property taxes.

Proposition 13 settled the property tax question when it was approved by state voters June 6.

The initiative clamped a limit on property taxes of one percent of what the county assessor (See COUNTY, Page A2)

## Judge Denies Mitchell Bid For Freedom

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — Former Attorney General John N. Mitchell has lost the first round in the legal battle to gain his freedom from a federal prison camp where he is serving a sentence for his involvement in the Watergate coverup.

U.S. District Judge Frank M. Johnson Jr. refused Friday to grant Mitchell's request for early release from prison here and denied the former attorney general a hearing on his challenge of the U.S. Parole Commission decision not to release him until next Jan. 19.

Mitchell entered the prison camp 15 months ago but was granted a medical furlough of five months to undergo two separate operations. He became eligible for parole in June.

Regional parole commissioners meeting in Atlanta July 5 recommended either that Mitchell be paroled last Aug. 19 or that his case be considered by the national commissioners as an "original jurisdiction" case.

The national commissioners changed the classification of Mitchell's crimes from "moderate" to "high" severity and granted him parole severely next January.

The convicted Watergate conspirator appealed that decision to the full commission.

## Trial of Diedrich Will Go Elsewhere

Superior Court Judge John Flynn cited pre-trial publicity Friday when he agreed to move Orange County Supervisor Ralph Diedrich's upcoming bribery trial to another county.

Judge Flynn's decision means the trial of Diedrich and co-defendant LeRoy Rose on bribery charges stemming from a 1973 board of supervisors decision on land use in the Anaheim Hills area will not get under way in his courtroom Monday as planned.

Instead, Diedrich and Rose will wait until court administrators find an empty courtroom in another county that will be the setting for what is expected to be a four to six-week trial.

When granting the request for a change of venue, Judge Flynn said, "There is a reasonable likelihood that a fair and impartial trial cannot be had (in Orange County) because of so much publicity."

Judge Flynn also cited the cumulative impact of publicity surrounding other indictments and political scandals in Orange County in recent years.

Assistant Dist. Atty. Michael Capizzi opposed the change of venue request made by the Diedrich-Rose defense lawyers.

## Laguna Area Undermined

More than 200 emergency workers used 20,000 sandbags to fight off the onslaught of a 6.3 foot high tide at El Morro Beach Friday night. No homes were lost in the threatening waves, officials said.

But sandbagging efforts continued through the night and predawn hours in anticipation of a 5.7 foot high tide at 9:41 a.m. today, said emergency command post spokesman John Berger.

More than 40 mobile homes on the ocean at El Morro Beach have been undermined by high tides and crashing waves during the past two days.

Several front porches fell into the water but state convicts and forestry officials successfully prevented any major damage.

Orange County Supervisor Chairman Thomas Riley declared a limited state of emergency Friday afternoon, clearing the way for county sandbagging efforts to save many of the 73 mobile homes lined side by side along the cove at El Morro Beach Mobile Home Park.

Eight state forestry conservation crews, comprising more than 100 state inmates, arrived in green buses by late afternoon, joining local residents in filling more than 10,000 sandbags with the first 100 tons of sand brought to the mobile home community by truck Friday.

Capt. Bruce Turbeville, State Division of Forestry-Orange County Fire Department, had commandeered a mobile home in the middle of the colony as a headquarters by 2:30 p.m.

Nearly 40 mobile homes were undermined in Thursday night's 6.3 foot tides, with many left supported only by metal posts and makeshift braces.

Turbeville said two of the more precariously perched

mobile homes have been moved back from the sheer drop, with one of those homes transported out of the park by late Friday.

The view from the beachfront is awesome, with stairways that used to lead down to the sand left hanging in bizarre angles, 8 to 10 feet over the heads of work crews below.

## Legionnaire Disease Reported

SANTA ANA (AP) — A few isolated cases of Legionnaires Disease have popped up in Orange County hospitals recently, but health officials said Friday there is no fear that an outbreak will occur here.

Although four people in Orange County have been treated for the disease, they had been traveling from other parts of the country, including Las Vegas and New York, said Dr. Thomas Prendergast, chief of epidemiology for the Orange County Health Department.

"They did not get it here," Prendergast said, "so we really don't see any cause for concern."

"The disease invades body tissue and causes infection, but it is not communicable from one person to another," he said.

The National Center for Disease Control in Atlanta has determined that the disease is a type of bacteria-caused pneumonia which can effectively be treated by the antibiotic erythromycin.

There is also a link between the disease and older people who smoke.

At Good Samaritan hospital in Anaheim one confirmed and one suspected case have been reported in the past month. In the confirmed case, a 71-year-old non-smoking Australian tourist was admitted after visits to Las Vegas and to New York City, where at least two people have died in a current outbreak of the disease and 72 others may still have it. The Australian has since been released from the hospital.

In the suspected case, an Anaheim man in his 50s had been in Las Vegas within a month of being admitted to the hospital, and doctors believe he may have picked up the disease there, said administrator Bennett Herring. The case is awaiting confirmation from the center for disease control, but until then the patient is being treated as if he had the disease and is "responding nicely," Herring said. He did not know if the patient smokes.

University of California-Irvine Medical Center reported that an Orange County resident in his middle 50s was released within the past month after being treated for a confirmed case of Legionnaires Disease. A spokeswoman for the hospital said they were unable to determine whether or not the patient had been traveling, or if he smoked.

## HB Official Fined \$250 In Vandalism

A West Orange County Judicial District Court judge Friday sentenced Huntington Beach City Councilman John A. Thomas to two years informal probation following a conviction on one count of misdemeanor vandalism.

Judge John H. Wyatt also fined Thomas \$250 plus about \$65 in penalty assessments and ordered the councilman to give 50 hours in community service to the Huntington Beach Boys Club.

Wyatt also ordered Thomas to return any property belonging to Thomas C. King's petroleum company. King's firm shares the premises of Thomas' trucking and crane yard where the alleged vandalism occurred.

After sentencing, Thomas said the trial was "chicken." Thomas also said he was "upset" and "treated unfairly" by the District Attorney's Office and the Huntington Beach Police Department.

"I was railroaded," he added. King charged that Thomas removed and destroyed about \$20,000 worth of oil derrick equipment between Sept. 25 and Nov. 20, 1977. Thomas asserted he was only cleaning up his property.

In June, an eight-woman, four-man jury acquitted Thomas of theft and trespass charges, but found him guilty of vandalism.

Thomas' attorney, Spencer Alter, said he plans to appeal the verdict.

Judge Wyatt denied Alter's motion for a new trial.

"This is really a civil case," said Thomas, who has denied any wrongdoing. The alleged crimes occurred prior to Thomas' election to the City Council last April.

Alter told the judge Friday Deputy District Attorney Robert Herron "was guilty of prejudicial misconduct" during the six-day trial.

## CIA Mistreatment Of Defector Told

WASHINGTON (AP) — The CIA says it held a Soviet defector who had information on Lee Harvey Oswald in a concrete vault for nearly three years, and one official considered killing him or driving him "to a looney bin."

A spokesman for the Central Intelligence Agency told the House Assassinations Committee on Friday that the agency held Yuri Nosenko in isolation in

the bare vault and abused him with inadequate food and mental harassment.

Rep. Harold Sawyer, R-Mich., called Nosenko's cell a "torture vault" and other committee members expressed disgust with what they termed a violation of human rights.

Hart agreed the operation was "an abomination," the worst handled and "most dismal" CIA operation he knows about during his 24 years with the agency.

Hart said the CIA was not interested in verifying information from the defector that Oswald had no KGB connection.

Oswald, who the Warren Commission concluded was the lone assassin of President John F. Kennedy in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963, resided in the Soviet Union from 1959 until June 1962.

Hart said he now believes Nosenko told the truth as he knew it. But Hart maintained that Nosenko might not have known the truth, making his story useless.

When efforts to get a Nosenko confession failed, Hart testified, a CIA official in charge of the effort wrote a memorandum to himself listing options including:

"Liquidate the man."

"Render him incapable of telling a coherent story (special dose of drug, etc.) Possible air commitment to looney bin."

"Commitment to looney bin without making him nuts."

Hart said the same official, who was deputy director of the CIA's Soviet branch, earlier wrote a memo saying the purpose of lie detector tests was not to get the truth but to get details for possibly fabricating a confession.

The reception will feature a demonstration of painting technique by artist Vincent Farrell. The painting created as well as a landscape by Zulch will be raffled to benefit the chamber.

## Parked Autos To Be Cited

## U.S. Prods Somoza To Halt Shooting

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States urgently appealed Friday to Nicaraguan President Anastasio Somoza to consent to a mediated solution to that country's accelerating political crisis.

State Department spokesman Hodding Carter noted that various opposition movements have issued a unified call on the Nicaraguan government for a cease-fire and a mediated solution.

"Given the mounting bloodshed, violence and suffering and the growing disruption of national life, we believe this appeal should be urgently heeded," he said.

Carter's statement followed the formation of a three-member commission in Nicaragua which can speak for most major opposition factions, ranging from leftist Sandinista guerrillas to conservative industrialists.

The U.S. statement did not address itself to the commission's demands for Somoza's resignation but rather to its expressed willingness to accept a mediation effort by outside countries. According to reports from Managua, the United States would not be invited to take part in any such mediation.

"We urge the government of Nicaragua to accept mediation and seek enduring resolution of the crisis," Carter said. "We urge all concerned to accept a cease-fire and to be prepared to make concessions and sacrifices

## Carter Holiday Costs Itemized

WASHINGTON (AP) — Taxpayers are paying at least \$114,000 — and probably thousands of dollars more — for President Carter's 12-day vacation last month in Plains, Ga., and in the West.

The first family's Western trip Aug. 18-30 will cost Carter

himself at least \$2,232.82.

The estimate of the taxpayers' cost, compiled by The Associated Press, is extremely conservative because no estimates are available for the expense of many vacation items and services.

A figure of \$114,298.39 was obtained by adding readily identifiable expenses such as hotels, local police assistance, transportation, arrangements by the U.S. Forest Service, and the outfitters who took the Carters rafting down Idaho's Salmon River.

Not included were expenses of reporters, whose news organizations pay their way.

"It would suit the president fine if he could go on a vacation without security and communications personnel and without a press office staff to respond to the needs of the large press contingent," said Rex Granum, deputy press secretary, when given a copy of the AP figures.

Since the nature of the modern presidency makes that impossible, there will always be extra costs associated with his vacations, as with his other travel," he said in a statement. "I would suggest to you that all this does not mean he should not be able to take a vacation."

Estimates were unavailable for such costs as two receptions that Carter and wife, Rosalynn, gave in the Tetons of Wyoming. Also lacking are cost estimates of the elaborate communications system that enabled Carter to maintain contact with the outside world, and commercial airline flights that carried agents and White House aides in and out of Carter vacation sites.

The president's out-of-pocket costs included \$1,800 to outfitters who took the first family on a three-day raft trip down the Middle Fork of the Salmon River in Idaho; \$336 to stay six nights in Brinkerhoff Lodge in Grand Teton National Park, and \$96.82 for a suite and an extra room at the Rodeway Inn in Boise, Idaho, the night before the raft trip.

Government costs included at least \$35,498.83 to put up White House and Secret Service agents at six hotels during the trip. A seventh hotel refused to provide an estimate.

It cost \$37,777.20 for the first family's transportation: operating Air Force One for nine and a quarter hours, and operating two helicopters for almost seven hours each.

rules is a property's legal market value. Property tax bills will be mailed in October.

The 1978-79 budget actually reflects a 600-person reduction in the county's 10,000-member work force.

Since most of those positions were held by county workers, only 41 county workers face the loss of their jobs.

And supervisors paved the way for many of those employees to be placed elsewhere in the county system when they amended standard lay-off procedures.

Rather than the standard 14-day notice, the employees won't be terminated for 60 days. Meanwhile, County Personnel Director Bert Scott is to review vacant county positions and try to place the 41 workers.

Supervisors Chairman Thomas Riley said after Friday's hearing, he was pleased with the budget's outcome.

"I think we started in a negative situation and ended with something positive," he said. "I believe we provided, hopefully, for all of the essential services and for some highly-desirable ones."

During Friday's hearing, supervisors set aside \$352,000 in federal revenue sharing dollars to continue a free bus ride program offered to county senior citizens.

The program, still subject to legal question, provides free rides on both Orange County Transit District and Laguna Beach city buses.

Supervisors also set aside \$1,950,000 in revenue sharing dollars to help finance 58 community-based private social services agencies.

Supervisor Philip Anthony voted against that allocation, calling it too small.

Anthony called for a \$2.3 million allocation, 10 percent less than the 58 agencies used last year.

However, Supervisor Ralph

Diedrich noted the county's federal revenue sharing allocation may be less in coming years and said a reserve should be kept for the future.

Supervisors were chastised on their final day of hearings for serving notice on UCI Medical Center that \$4.1 million worth of dental, elective outpatient and community clinic services might be halted within the year.

Josephine Hernandez of the clinic's advisory board called supervisors' decision "horrendous" and warned it could lead to the spread of disease by needy people unable to seek medical treatment elsewhere.

"I think it would be inhuman to do to the community, not to have a clinic that could ease them out of their pain and misery," she said.

Supervisors said no cuts would be made until negotiations with UCI Medical Center are complete and a public hearing is held.

Capital projects approved for 1978-79 total \$13 million and include \$2.2 million in Orange County Airport improvements.

Also included is \$2.6 million to complete the 10th and 11th floors of Orange County Superior Court and \$3.6 million toward what could become a joint sheriff-fire training academy in El Toro.

The new budget also paves the way for construction of a new San Juan Capistrano fire station and work on new stations in north El Toro, Irvine and North Laguna Niguel.

The package also sets aside funds for building the El Toro branch library and design of libraries in San Juan, San Clemente and Irvine.

## Irvine Blaze Battled

# Test-tube Funds Urged

WASHINGTON (AP) A childless Tennessee couple appealed to the government Friday to resume funding of test-tube fertilization research, while critics charged that it would lead to the laboratory slaughter of embryonic human lives.

The arguments were aired as an Ethics Advisory Board in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare began sifting through the evidence on both the science and morality of the still uncertain techniques that produced a healthy baby in England.

Despite the success of researchers who aided the parents of Louise Joy Brown, "our knowledge of precisely what they did is very limited," said James C. Gaither, a San Francisco lawyer who is chairman of the panel.

Gaither told reporters that the 14-member panel of doctors, lawyers, laymen, academics and a priest is unlikely to take any stand on the issue before January or February at the earliest.

HEW Secretary Joseph A. Califano Jr. must decide after getting the panel's advice whether to allow taxpayers' dollars to be spent on this re-

search for the first time since 1975.

Califano, in a memo read to the 100 persons at the meeting in the National Institutes of Health in suburban Bethesda, Md., said test-tube fertilization holds out "enormous promise" to infertile couples, but also raises serious questions about possible damage to the fetus that could lead to abnormal children.

"Will this research lead to selective breeding, to attempts to control the genetic makeup of offspring or to the use of 'surrogate parents' where... rich women might pay poor women to carry their children?" Califano asked in the memo. He instructed the board to hold public hearings in 10 regions of the country "to stimulate a national debate."

In addition to the broader issues, the board also must decide on an application from Dr. Pierre Soupart of Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn., who wants to do laboratory experiments on fertilized human eggs to search for genetic defects.

Soupart's \$375,000 project already has won backing from scientists at NIH. After six days, he would freeze or destroy the

fertilized human eggs, not transplant them to a woman.

But Dennis and Dianne Grills of Hendersonville, Tenn., are hoping that ultimately their own doctor at Vanderbilt and Soupart will help them have a baby through in vitro fertilization. "In vitro" is Latin for "in a glass."

Grills, a 32-year-old chemical engineer, and his 31-year-old wife have been married for five years. She had one ectopic pregnancy and last October underwent unsuccessful surgery to unblock her Fallopian tubes.

Grills told the panel he does not feel there are ethical problems with research on the fertilized eggs that in their earliest stage are called "blastocysts."

His wife said opponents of the research are being "irrational."

But Princeton University religion professor Paul Ramsey said the government should "stop embryo manipulation as a form of human genesis."

"Millions of U.S. citizens who oppose abortion will bring the same moral objection against in vitro fertilization because of the numerous 'discards' the procedure requires," declared Ramsey.

## PSA Pilot To Run Past Laguna Park

One of 10 PSA pilots will be running past Laguna Beach's Main Beach Park Saturday night en route to San Diego as part of a marathon romp for the Hunger Project.

The 10 airline pilots left Golden Gate Park in San Francisco Wednesday afternoon for the non-stop run to Mission Bay in San Diego.

One of the 10 runners will pass Main Beach Park at approximately 9:30 p.m., according to Joan Falkenberg, a Laguna Beach Hunger Project coordinator.

The runners are alternating every 10 miles, and a pilot is expected to pass a lighted torch to another runner in front of Main Beach Park.

The Hunger Project is designed to eliminate world hunger in 20 years.

Ms. Falkenberg said an earlier torch passing will take place in front of Cano's restaurant in Newport Beach at approximately 8 p.m. Saturday.

The runners expect to reach Mission Bay before noon Sunday. Those who wish to run alongside the pilots for a portion of the route are encouraged to do so, the Hunger Project spokesman said.

## Agent Faces Perjury Rap

WASHINGTON (AP) A federal grand jury in Brooklyn indicted an FBI agent on perjury charges Friday in connection with an alleged gambling payoff from a reputed organized crime figure.

The indictment charged Joseph Stabile, 50, a special agent in the FBI's New York City office, with two counts of perjury for denying he allegedly shared a \$15,000 payoff from John Caputo, a purported member of the Vito Genovese mafia family.

LOS ANGELES (AP) Rodney Christensen is blind and can't drive, so he takes the bus to work where he teaches others how to drive.

Christensen, 32, says he can "sense" whether the students are doing what they should.

"For example, our drivers are supposed to look over their shoulders when changing lanes. I can tell by the direction of their voices whether or not they are doing it," he says.

In the classroom at Pacific Telephone Co., which hired him as a phone worker, he teaches defensive driving techniques. Christensen tells his students: "If you have a question, don't raise your hand because I can't see it."

Blind since infancy, Christensen never has driven. But he gets around pretty well on the bus, making two transfers

daily on his way to the office. His driving course includes morning classroom sessions and afternoon training in cars with Christensen sitting alongside the employee.

The class consists of six to 10 students, lasts one day and is given all employees once every couple years on a rotating basis. It reviews the basics of safe driving, making drivers aware of possible danger situations. Tips include:

- "Always leave yourself space" to get away from problem situations.
- Sound your horn when backing out of a driveway.
- Look to your left first when approaching an intersection.

Christensen, who started his phone company career as a photocopier, eventually transferred to the training department where he became interested in driver education.

"Prior to teaching the class I had to go over some things that would be second nature for someone else," Christensen said.

"For instance, the left turn. After it was explained to me, I had to picture the whole movement of traffic in front of me."

"But other than that sort of thing, I have studied the textbook in Braille and I know it by heart. Besides that, we use slides and movies."

## Smallwood Cited For Water Work

Costa Mesa Vice Mayor Mary Smallwood has been cited for her work in establishing a liaison committee between the city and the Costa Mesa County Water District.

In a unanimous 5-0 vote Thursday night, directors of the water district decided to give a formal "thank you" for her work in smoothing out relations between the two agencies. Mrs. Smallwood will be presented with a plaque from the water district.

# Energy Needs Debated

## Officials Clash in Town Hall Forum

Dr. Richard Maullin, chairman of the State Energy Resources Conservation and Development Commission, and Edward Myers Jr., vice president of the Southern California Edison Company agree on one point:

There has to be electricity available when a switch is flipped on.

In a debate Thursday in Newport Beach, there weren't many other views the two men shared.

Maullin and Myers spoke before the Orange County Forum of Town Hall at the Marriott Hotel.

They were asked to discuss energy and what emerged from their discussion were divergent philosophies on how power is going to be supplied to the state in the future.

Maullin said he believes that what is needed is a "more frugal use of our resources to avoid the dire consequences if they're used up and at the same time moving with deliberate speed to find new sources."

Myers said the concept voiced by Maullin isn't a bad one, but as a supplier of energy he doesn't think frugality ought to replace "a plant in place."

"I'd rather have too much in

place than not enough when the crunch comes," he said.

Maullin who dotted his talk with political swipes at Evelle Younger, the Republican candidate who is trying to unseat the man who appointed him, said he believes air quality restrictions on industrial production and power generation should be loosened.

He said that relaxation should come at the same time that auto emission standards are tightened, so that overall air quality would not be adversely affected.

He also said the state's refineries also ought to invest hundreds of millions of dollars so that oil refined from California crude would have a lower sulfur content.

## Two Still Missing

A 12-inch downpour paralyzed northeast Louisiana Friday, flooding streets and houses with waters that reached 8 feet deep in some places.

Further to the north, in Little Rock, Ark., two persons were still missing on Friday from flooding two days earlier which claimed 10 lives.

The purpose would be to get California industry to use oil pumped and refined in the state, a move which would boost not only the state economy, but also cut the import of foreign oil.

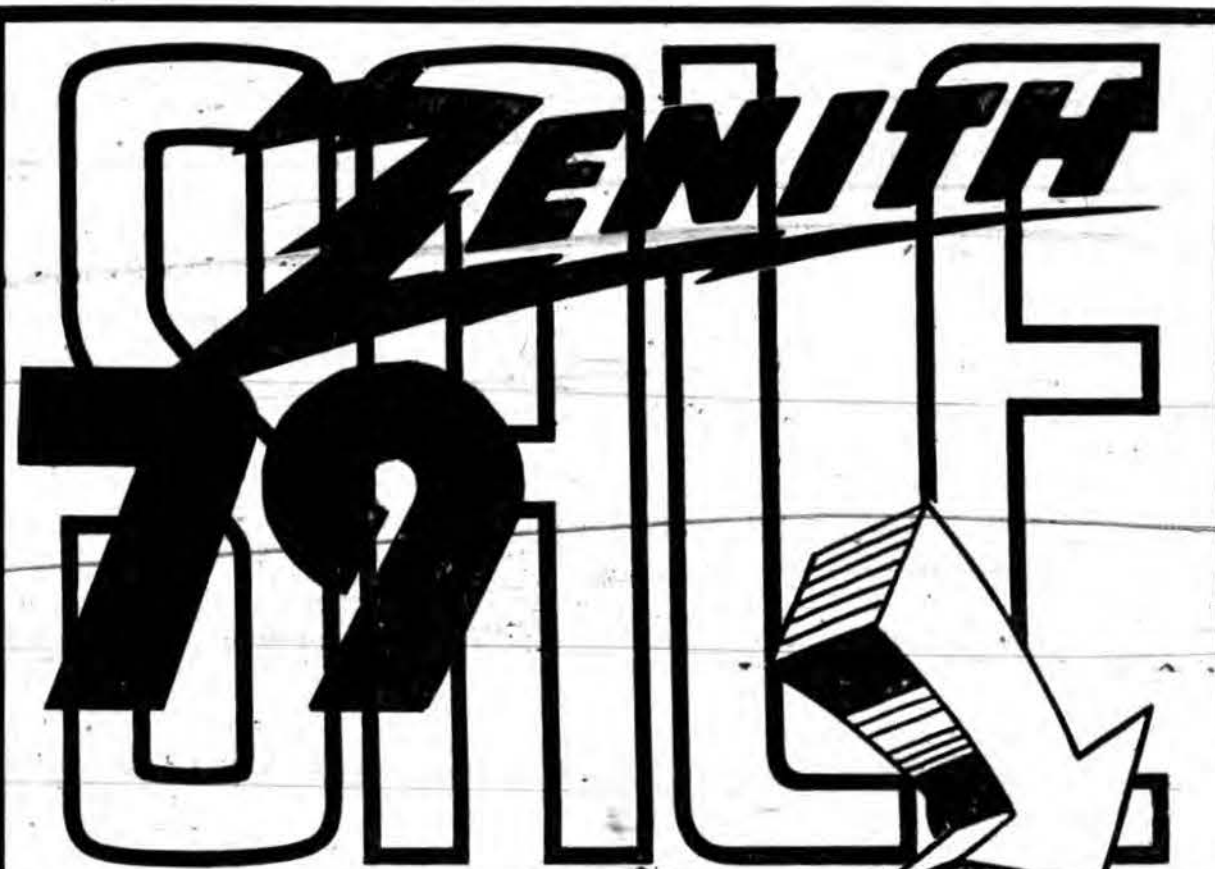
Maullin predicted important strides in producing energy using geo-thermal power plants, solar power, "bio-mass fuels," and gasification of coal. He was critical of continued reliance on nuclear energy and fossil fuels.

Myers' stand was that all those concepts are just fine, but the state energy policy is based on non-use rather than on seeking of ways to promote construction of power plants, regardless of the fuel to be used.

He charged the energy commission staff with overreacting to other state agencies and to advocacy groups with the result being a slowdown in the process of getting new plants built.

"It was difficult enough for the utilities to provide electricity when we didn't have all this help," he said of the commission.

"We lack clearcut guidelines that tell us what we can do," he said. "We've got lots of regulators who can tell us 'no.' What the citizens of California deserve are some regulators who can tell us 'yes.'"



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# Tragedy Shocks Once-placid Town

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich. (AP) -- To a town like this, such a crime is inexplicable.

Mount Clemens is a town of 22,000 some 17 miles down the road from Detroit to Port Huron. It is the Macomb County seat, a place once renowned mostly for mineral baths. Babe Ruth used to visit the spa at the Colonial Hotel. But those days are gone.

MACOMB COUNTY HAS CHANGED. IT includes a number of Detroit's suburbs and houses a population of 672,000.

One of the people who grew up in this once-placid, now-urban world was James Edward Lossing, 23.

Police say he kidnapped 7-year-old Brian Chisholm on Sept. 1, subjected him to homosexual rape, then murdered the boy. Then he killed himself. It was the last afternoon of summer vacation.

LOSSING'S VICTIM WAS A POLICE officer's son, dragged screaming and kicking from a construction site. His playmates watched wide-eyed as Lossing drove away with him.

Less than two hours later, police found the two shot dead in Lossing's cheap hotel room outside Mount Clemens. It was murder-suicide with Lossing's week-old, .22-caliber derringer, police said.

There was a police honor guard at the boy's funeral Mass. More than 250 relatives and friends, including two brothers, a sister and many of Brian's second-grade classmates from St. Mary Catholic School, were at St. Peter's Church. Few people here have ready explanations for the tragedy.

"YOU CAN GIVE REASONS, BUT you can never make sense of the death of a 7-year-old," said Macomb County Detective Sgt. John Hart.

Hart and his partner, Sgt. Jerry Bomber, puzzled over the investigation for a week but came up with nothing in Lossing's background to explain the killer's violent end -- or the boy's.

"That's the frustration of this case," says Bomber. "It could be happening again right now."

Who was Lossing? The local newspaper described him as burly, asthmatic, mentally dull. He had worked in a number of jobs, including one as a security guard. On his right arm he bore a tattoo of a sailing ship with the legend "Homeward Bound" underneath. He was born in Detroit but grew up in Mount Clemens.

HIS MOTHER, HILDEGARDE LOSSING, tearfully offers what may be the only explanation.

She told reporter Linda DiPietro of the Macomb Daily that in his youth, "Jimmy was a good boy, never any trouble at all." Then, one day in Mount Clemens in 1971, he was hit by a car. His skull was fractured, but he recovered.

Mrs. Lossing said that two years later her son inexplicably "started being alone all the time, and he started getting sloppy."

He was sent for counseling, records show, but refused to show up for appointments. Neurological tests showed only "minimal brain dysfunction," and slightly below average IQ.

IT WAS NOT A SITUATION FAR out of the ordinary, Mrs. Lossing was told. But she still worried. Her son found it hard to hold jobs and he barely coped.

"I told everyone he had a problem, and everyone I took him to agreed," she said. "But nobody did anything."

To those who saw him professionally, Lossing's problems including vaguely defined sexual troubles seemed no worse than those confronting many "marginal people," as it was put by one counseling director who knew Lossing.

"The world's full of them -- people who have a hard time coping -- but they don't become killers," said the counselor, Richard Debeck.

But Lossing was different. He did kill.

AND BEFORE THAT, HE APPARENTLY became a child molester. After Brian Chisholm's murder, nearby Clinton Township police announced they identified Lossing as the man who lured two boys into a wooded area Aug. 4 and sexually assaulted them.

It took the frightened boys -- 9 and 14 years old -- two days to reveal the incident, but they reportedly described Lossing exactly, down to the tattoo on his right arm.

Then came the killing and an autopsy on Lossing's body performed by Werner Spitz, medical examiner for Detroit's Wayne County.

What he found was an old, 4-inch scar, not just on Lossing's scalp but in the brain tissue of the frontal lobe.

IT WAS APPARENTLY THE RESULT of Lossing's skull fracture. Could that explain what had happened?

Spitz is cautious, saying there is no way to know how much effect such brain damage had on Lossing's behavior. But he points out that such brain injury can cause sudden changes in behavior. It is the frontal lobe, he said, that governs "the attitude of the individual toward his environment."

So this once isolated town now has what may be the best explanation it will get for the most heinous crime it can remember. According to Spitz, the brain scars "cannot be ignored under the circumstances."

And that still leaves the town wondering why?

### Racing Pigs Bound for Glory?

GALVA, Ill. (AP) — Don't go looking for them at Churchill Downs yet, but Roy Holding says his fleet little pigs are bound for glory.

"They're the fastest racing pigs in the world," he says and as far as he knows, the world's only porcine racers.

"THERE ARE THREE THINGS people feel about pigs all false — that they are dirty, dumb and slow," said Holding, a 52-year-old advertising executive for an Indiana-based agricultural firm.

"A pig is really a smart animal, probably the smartest of all barnyard animals," he said. "How long does it take a kindergarten kid to learn to put on his galoshes? How long does the teacher have to fight that? These kids have come all this way in just two weeks."

He yanked open the starting gate during a regular workout and watched five young pigs on a sub 4-second sprint to the feed bowl 50 feet away. The pigs may be smart, but they've managed to master only one gait, something Holding calls "the forward skeeaddale."

"THIS YEAR WE'RE HOPING FOR one to go the distance under 3.1 seconds," one-tenth of a second better than last year's record performance by a fleet-footed porker named Hedger. "That's equivalent to about a five-minute mile, you know."

Holding admits feeling more at home behind a desk than in the barn, but says those days are gone forever. "I'll spend more than a month this year preparing the pigs to race." A promotional idea he hit upon last year and tried at the Farm Progress Show, an annual Midwest agribusiness exhibition. It proved a success. More than 45,000 people jammed the tent during three days of racing.

The racing pigs will be back at this year's show this month in Taylorville, Ill., an event complete with bugle, lighted tote board and racing silks.

THE YOUNG PIGS WERE PURCHASED from a farmer about a month ago, transported to a barn in the middle of Illinois corn country, given a special diet and put through the paces. Holding uses a bell and the Pavlovian principles of repetition and reward to train the 25 females.

Twice a day, he herds them into a five-pig chute at one end of the hog barn, then rings the bell, opens the gate and releases them to run head-long toward the feed. Holding says the porkers eventually develop a keen competitive spirit. He even cut out one daily workout.

"Don't want to peak too soon," he said. "They're just like any athlete. They reach a point where they get stale."

# Rabbit Wins Best Rating

## Diesel-powered Model Most Economic on Fuel

WASHINGTON (AP) — With a top performance of 41 miles per gallon, the diesel-powered Volkswagen Rabbit provides the best fuel economy of any automobile sold in the United States, the Environmental Protection Agency announced Friday.

The No. 1-ranked German-made Rabbit, equipped with a five-speed manual transmission, was followed by a diesel-powered Volkswagen Rabbit with a four-speed manual transmission, which gets an estimated 40 mpg. Placing third was the diesel-fueled Volkswagen Dasher, which gets 36 mpg.

"CONSISTENT WITH THE trend in past years, the average miles per gallon for all 1979 models thus far tested is slightly higher than last year's," EPA administrator Douglas Costle said of the agency's annual fuel economy ratings.

Costle said the 1979 models are averaging 19.9 miles per gallon compared to 19.6 on 1978 models.

The VW Rabbit also won top honors last year when the EPA estimated its fuel economy at 40 mpg.

THE AVERAGE ANNUAL fuel cost for the top-rated 1979 Rabbit was estimated at \$220, a figure based on a car driven 15,000 miles and an average diesel fuel cost of 60 cents per gallon. For gasoline-powered cars, the cost is based on a 70-cent per gallon price.

The Datsun 210, a Japanese-made car, ranked No. 4 with 35 mpg, the highest ranking for a gasoline-powered car.

At the bottom of the list was the Aston Martin V-8, which the EPA said gets only 8 mpg. Just above that were four cars listed as getting 10 mpg. They are the Cadillac limousine, the Cadillac with the commercial

## 2 Ambulance Services Ask Rate Increase

The cost of being sick or injured in Costa Mesa and Newport Beach could be going up.

Two ambulance companies that operate in the Harbor Area, Seal's and Schaefer, are seeking permission to raise base rates to \$60 for each ambulance call.

The current rate is \$40 in Costa Mesa, and \$50 in Newport Beach. The firms also want to add another \$1 to a present \$2 per mile transportation fee.

It may also cost more for such extras as oxygen, night calls and ambulance waiting time. The firms contend that the higher rates would bring the cities into accordance with fees now charged in county territory and in other Orange County cities.

The requests will come before the Newport City Council in late October and before the Costa Mesa City Council on Nov. 20.

chassis, Jaguar XJ and Jaguar XJS.

ALL THE TOP 10 cars are classified as subcompacts and were either of foreign make or largely manufactured abroad by subsidiaries of U.S. automakers, the EPA said.

The agency changed its mileage ratings this year in response to criticism that few persons could achieve the EPA mileage estimates. In the past, the agency issued estimates for city driving, highway driving and combined city-highway driving. This year, it issued only one figure.

Costle said the estimated fuel efficiency listed for 1979 models is "equivalent to the old city miles per gallon number for each car." The city mileage has traditionally been the lowest of the three ratings.

"OUR TESTS SHOW that most people, in day to day driving situations, achieve fuel economy ratings closest to this number," Costle added.

Nevertheless, he advised that consumers should use the figures only for comparison shopping purposes.

If Car A is estimated to get 25 mpg and Car B is listed as 15 mpg, for instance, the consumer should expect to get 10 mpg more from Car A, even if under actual driving conditions a consumer only gets 20 mpg from Car A, Costle said.

THE LATEST LISTS include 96 percent of all new cars and trucks expected to be sold in the United States during the coming year, Costle said. He said an updated list will be published early next year to include the remaining autos.

The highest-ranked auto from an American manufacturer was the Dodge Colt Hatchback with a four-speed manual transmission. The EPA estimated its fuel performance at 34 mpg.

The EPA traditionally publishes two lists. One is for cars that are sold in 49 states. The second is for cars sold in California, which requires more stringent emission controls to combat air pollution. Such emission controls generally reduce fuel economy.

BY SIZE CLASS, the EPA said new car purchasers in the other 49 states can expect fuel economy in the following ranges: two-seaters, 12-22 mpg; subcompacts, 8-41 mpg; compacts, 10-22 mpg; mid-size cars, 12-25 mpg; large cars, 10-21 mpg.

Some autos were not included in Friday's listing because the new models have not yet been tested. These cars will be included in an updated fuel economy list to be published early next year.

## Peachey Party On Tap

CICERO, Ind. (P) — Newcomer James Peachey wanted to meet some fellow townfolk, so he decided to throw a little dinner party.

Well, hardly little.

PEACHEY INVITED the entire town, with personal invitations sent to 1,300 families.

The event is set Sunday in the town park of this lakefront suburb about 25 miles north of Indianapolis, where Peachey had been a long-time resident until he moved last year.

WHAT'S IN store for Peachey's fellow townfolk? For starters, there'll be chickens. 1,200 of them, cut to serve 8,000 to 10,000 pieces.

There also will be deep-fried homemade biscuits with apple butter, potato salad, green beans, corn-on-the-cob and "whatever comes to mind at the last minute," he said.

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# Taxpayer Group Shares Cutting Ideas

**SACRAMENTO** The California Taxpayers Association is trying to do everyone a favor, including government officials and taxpayers. We hope people are listening or looking, and will take heed.

What the CTA has done is produce a list of 75 suggestions as to how to cut costs in California government. These are old, new and mostly common sense ways to cut costs of government at all levels. Since it is impossible to list them all in this space, we'll hit the highlights.

**PENSIONS** increase the vesting provision from five to 10 years for future employees, as is done in the private sector. Place a cap on the total amount of retirement income a person may receive (as a percentage of final salary), graduating the percentage so higher-salaried persons receive a lower percentage of the final pay. Base benefits on a five-year salary average rather than the highest one year or highest three years of pay. Increase the minimum retirement age to 60, offering safety members non-safety employment instead of deferred retirement.

Safety formulas should be downgraded, permitting the Public Employee Retirement System (PERS) to terminate the California Highway Patrol safety member formula for new employees and offer the standard safety formula.

Reduce or eliminate special treatment for police and firemen, who are protected under a provision of the labor code so that if they suffer heart ailment, tuberculosis, hernia or cumulative trauma within five years of service, they are given special benefits on the assumption that such illnesses are job-related.

**PEOPLE** receiving disability benefits should be subject to a periodic earnings test so that benefits may be offset by other earned income. Such benefits should not be considered as a lifetimes supplement.

Many local jurisdictions, surprisingly, do not require entrance

physicals for police and fire personnel. This should be a requirement, with minimum standards set. Any person who does not meet entrance physical requirements should have to sign a waiver of job-connected disability rights. An ongoing fitness program should be required, with safety members subject to periodic fitness testing and examination.

Disability benefits should be limited to no more than ordinary retirement benefits projected to a normal retirement age. The law should be changed which allows the receipt of one year of salary before regular disability benefits begin.

School districts and teachers should be allowed to contract privately for disability insurance. This could mean a savings of \$90 million a year, with minimum coverage available for fewer dollars.

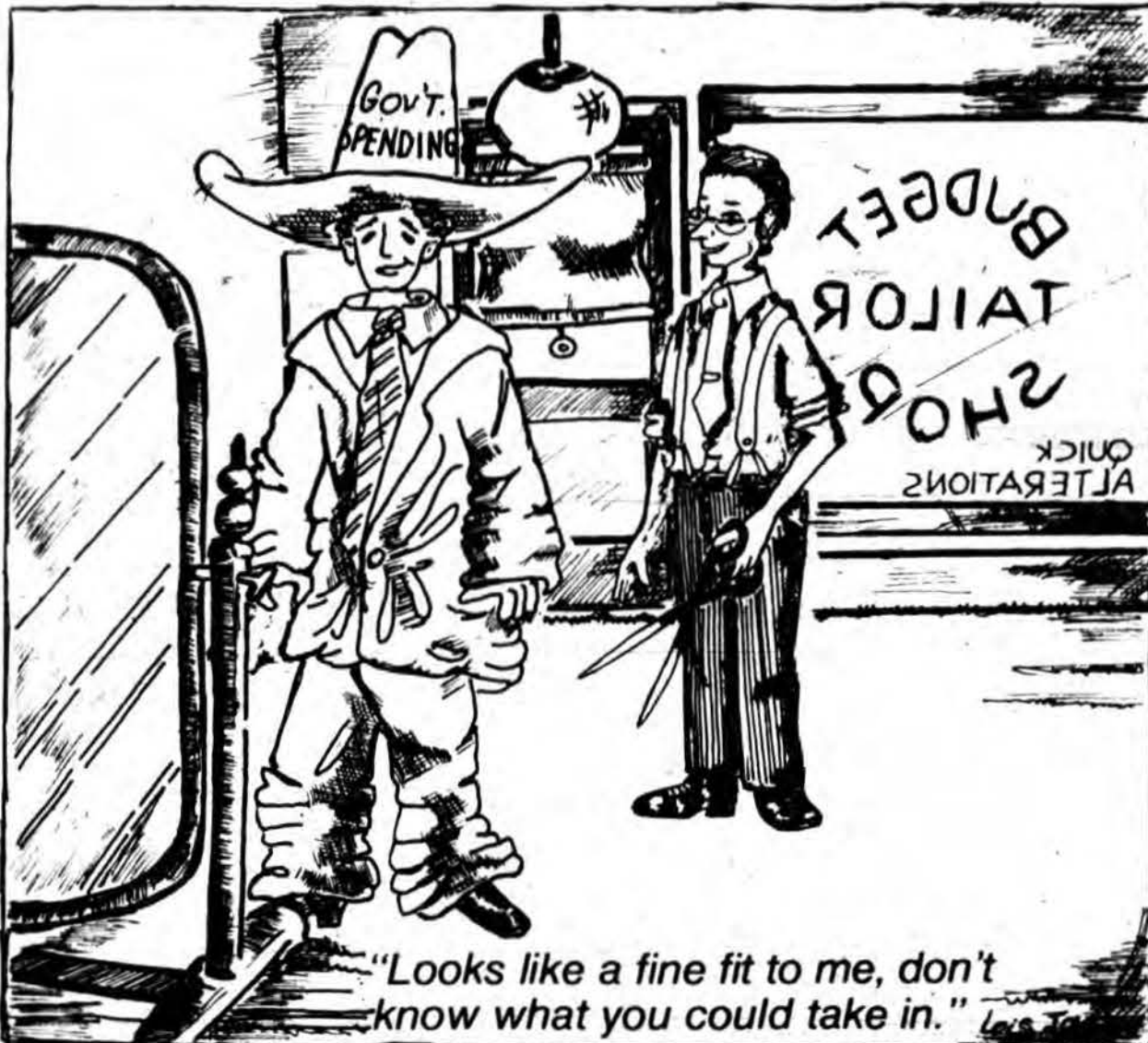
**THE STATE** Teachers Retirement System (STRS) needs evaluation to see if a combination of Social Security and STRS benefits would equal current STRS benefits and still be cheaper for taxpayers.

Counties which operate under the 1937 Retirement Act have seven optional retirement formulas from which to choose. Counties should choose lower-cost retirement formulas for future employees.

There is no need for an elected state treasurer, who is really the state's banker. That job could be filled by gubernatorial appointment to operate within the Department of Finance or within the controller's office, with significant savings.

**REDUCE THE** number of field offices operated by the Department of Motor Vehicles. Each year a few more offices are opened, but rarely is an office closed.

State printing costs could be reduced if agencies were required to request bids from private printers as well as the state printer when planning out-of-agency printing jobs. The state printer generally bills at a much higher rate than private printers and then often subcontracts the work

out to a private printer anyway. Also, State Printer shop wages should be based on the prevailing wage paid to all printers, union and nonunion alike.

All proposed contracts for outside consultants should be approved by the Department of Finance. Also, the Department of General Services should be required to accept the low bid for leases for government offices. And there are too many departmental deputy directors, public information officers and lobbyists.

Legislative mailing costs

run about \$3.2 billion for newsletters. This could be cut in half by allowing only one district-wide newsletter mailing per year for each lawmaker.

**LEGISLATURE** should be required to return unused funds to the state general fund.

State government should cut back personal use of the state's long-distance telephone network by requiring departments to make monthly checks at random on selected telephones.

Many state employees and teachers receive retirement credits for unused sick leave ac-

cumulated during their years of public employment.

There should be an end to double payments to public employees while they are on military leave. Merit pay should be made for meritorious work, not for just time on the job.

**DISMISSAL** procedures need to be streamlined, so that legal and administrative costs of trying to fire an unproductive teacher or civil servant won't run several times the employee's annual salary.

Grade creep should be

eliminated. Some of the 10 percent of the state work force promotions each year are unwarranted. This costs about \$19 million a year.

Personal, home-to-office overnight use of government vehicles should be eliminated. Out-of-town or out-of-state meetings should be eliminated, except where absolutely essential to the conduct of government. Public spending for personal membership in professional associations should be eliminated.

A voucher system for lodging of public employees who must travel should be instituted, rather than the \$40 per day per diem.

Productivity clauses should become part of labor agreements with public employees under collective bargaining.

**LOCAL MANAGERS** should have more freedom to economize. The state should have a comprehensive local government employee relations statute that restores balance to local government labor relations.

Local government discretion should be increased in the granting of state licensing requirements. State statute should eliminate prevailing wage agreements in city charters.

Persons seeking welfare assistance should first be aimed at someone with a list of jobs and other employment information.

Publicly funded legal aid organizations should be barred from obtaining court-awarded legal fees.

**STATE COLLEGE** and university administrative costs should be cut. Low-use campuses should be closed. Excess land should be sold. The office of county superintendent of schools should be eliminated.

Consolidate police and fire departments, if possible. Limit damage claims against government. Unify court administration. Speed up jury selection. Modernize court reporting.

You may not agree with all of these or other suggestions we haven't had the space to mention. But all of the ideas merit some study, if we are really serious about cutting the cost of government at all levels in California.

## Oil Money Inflates Land

### State Feels Effect of Arab Dollar Glut

A Saudi Arabian oil sheik drew national headlines this summer when he bought a large mansion on Sunset Boulevard in Beverly Hills and had hair painted onto the nude statues all around it.

But the excesses of Arabs and Iranians buying residential real estate in California are only the tip of a more serious iceberg — foreign interests buying up large amounts of choice American properties, with prices driven so high that most Americans can't even bid on them.

**THE SHEIK** and his statues are but one example. In the nearby neighborhood of Trousdale Estates, an estimated 60 percent of the homeowners are now foreigners.

More serious may be the problem of foreign investors buying up agricultural land.

Escalating land values may squeeze small U.S. farmers out of the land market and prevent young farmers from setting up their first farm or ranch, says Democratic U.S. Sen. Alan Cranston. "And the chances of a financially successful farm operation are reduced by the heavy burden of loans that must be carried to purchase agricultural land inflated by overseas currency."

Cranston and Rep. John Krebs, D-Fresno, seek to cut down on the problem by forcing all foreign and foreign-owned interests to register their agricultural land holdings and the prices paid for them.

**THEY SEEK** national legislation because the problem is not confined to California. Legislatures in states as diverse as Wisconsin and Wyoming have held hearings on the issue in the last two months. But foreign investment in farmland appears strongest in California, the nation's leading agricultural state.

Overall, reports Cranston,

foreign investors have spent an estimated \$800 million on U.S. farmland in the last year. Over 17,000 acres in the San Joaquin Delta alone have been bought up since mid-1976.

It's not just the oil-rich Middle Easterners doing the buying either. The steadily worsening status of the dollar on foreign exchanges has made American land an attractive investment for Japanese and Europeans as well.

Among recent California purchases were 5,500 acres for \$6.8 million by a French group and 5,000 acres for \$12 million by Italian interests.

**CRANSTON NOTED** that the Italians paid about \$2,400 per acre, more than \$600 above the current market price.

Foreign purchases of this kind contribute to a 13 percent overall increase in the price of California farmland last year. Some agricultural real estate dealers report as much as 40 percent of their sales are to foreigners.

But the full extent of the foreign buying is still unknown. Since corporations now don't have to report fully on their ownership, it is easy for foreign interests to escape detection.

Cranston eventually would like to clamp down on the purchases themselves, but can't do much until a reliable index of foreign ownership exists. That's what he and Krebs seek to create.

**BUT THEIR** measure would apply only to agricultural real estate. It would leave the residential market still at the inflationary mercy of the same foreign interests buying up big chunks of farmland.

Just as they often bid above asking prices to make sure of getting the farmland they want, the foreigners frequently raise the prices on homes they buy. No statistics are kept on how often this happens, but real estate experts say it is a factor in the seemingly limitless California housing price spiral.

That area is the logical next one for federal and state officials to look at as they attempt to keep U.S. citizens in the real estate market.

## Cal Expo Scandals Cloud Its Fun Zone

**SACRAMENTO** — The last time we looked, the California State Fair (Cal Expo) still was decidedly second in size and fun to the Los Angeles County Fair, but it seems destined to remain in first place in scandal.

To be fair, the Brown administration has worked hard to improve the operation.

**THE FAIR'S** problems continue to plague the governor and Legislature, and the people should be concerned because millions of dollars are involved. In the latest incident, which could mushroom into a full-blown scandal, an auditor investigating Cal Expo charged there was a cover-up after he was relieved of his duties.

Making the charge was Don Truitt, who was working for the state auditor general, John Williams, at the time. Williams immediately denied any cover-up, apparently fired Truitt and said the investigation ordered by the Legislature would continue.

The main problem has been the carnival-midway operation, which was in the hands of Alan Alevy. Expo visitors found the area unkempt and more like a sideshow than family entertainment.

**RIDES BROKE** down frequently and weren't very inviting or safe. So there was unanimity behind a buy out of the Alevy contract, and that's what was sold to the Legislature, who Alevy contract, for \$2.3 million.

But on opening day, there he was, managing the carnival operation. Truitt contends the Department of General Services questioning of the new contract violated legislative intent in approving the buyout. He also claims "bogus accusations" were allowed by Williams to intimidate auditors and kill the investigation.

It is hoped all this will be sorted out to the benefit of the taxpayers and those who attend Cal Expo.

## Species Vegetarians

**DEAR ELLIE:** Would you please tell me about prairie dogs. What are some of the animals related to them?

**KATHYK:** Prairie dogs belong to the rodents, the largest order of all mammals. Some rodents are more closely related than others, for the large group is divided into sub-orders, each of which has "families" composed as a rule of a number of different species.

Prairie dogs belong to the squirrel-like rodents, and in this particular family there are over 200 species. Some of their better-known relatives are chipmunks, tree squirrels, ground squirrels, flying squirrels and marmots.

Prairie dogs live in large colonies in huge networks of tunnels called "towns." Each town is divided into groups of "families," consisting of an adult male, about three adult females and a variety of offspring. Each family has its own tun-

nels and boundaries which they defend from intruders.

A SET OF BURROWS has several entrances, each looking like a small volcanic cone. This mound serves two purposes: a look-out point and a barrier against water. Each adult female has one litter a year. When the little ones are able to run around, they often go into other burrows and appear to be always welcomed. Sometimes they stay for awhile with another mother who feeds them and cares for them with her own.

These animals are vegetarians, eating seeds, grasses and tender roots. They seem to cut down any tall weeds in their areas, and eventually low, fast-growing cover takes over, and the tall plants disappear. As a result, there is no place for large predators to hide and the prairie dogs have a good view of any approaching danger.

Still, many fall prey to a



variety of predators, such as coyotes and large birds of prey. A sharp "bark" from a prairie dog on its mound sends all within hearing rushing for cover. When all is clear, another call brings the animals back out.

The prairie dogs' greatest enemy is man, who has destroyed many of the towns because they were a threat to his pasture lands. There are scattered colonies, but the large ones are now within the boundaries of national parks.

## Lens Magnifies Objects

Andy sends the respected two-volume World Book Dictionary to Michelle Kastner, age 11, of Gig Harbor, Wash., for her question:

### HOW DOES A MAGNIFYING GLASS WORK?

A magnifying glass is a lens which makes close objects appear even larger than they actually are. Both sides of the lens are usually curved to form a double convex lens.

You will be able to see two different kinds of images with a magnifying glass. If the glass is held close to a sheet of paper on your desk, you will see a virtual image.

The light rays which produce this image spread out, or diverge, as they pass through the lens and seem to originate on the same side of the lens as the page. The virtual image appears upright and larger than the object.

A REAL IMAGE, is seen when rays of light from an object pass through the lens and are focused on the other side. The real image appears inverted, or upside down. The size of the real image depends on the distance of the



object from the lens.

The distance from the center of the lens to the point where parallel light rays are focused is called the focal length. If the object is more than twice the focal length away from the lens, the image will be smaller. If the object is less than twice the focal length away, the image will be larger.

The focal length of a lens determines the magnifying power it will have. The greater the curve of a lens, the shorter its focal length. It bends the rays more, and they meet at a smaller distance from the lens.

THE FOCAL LENGTH of most magnifying glasses is about 10 inches.

Did you know that you can actually start a fire with a magnifying glass? Use great care if you try this experiment, since

any flame can be dangerous.

### WHAT IS EINSTEIN'S THEORY OF RELATIVITY?

It would take a lot of complicated mathematical formulas and thousands of words to fully explain Einstein's famous theory of relativity.

The theory deals with the most fundamental ideas which we use to describe natural happenings such as time, space, mass, motion and gravitation. The theory gives new meaning to the old ideas that these words represent.

In the special relativity theory published in 1905, Einstein refers to a special kind of motion. Among the profound findings was that no material body can move with a velocity greater than that of light.

A general relativity theory was published by Einstein in 1915. One phase of this theory predicts the existence of waves that "carry" the force of gravity, just as electromagnetic waves carry light.

valid tax legislation.

**THE FAILURE OF** George III and Parliament to apply that principle to the American colonies gave rise to the Boston Tea Party and the rebellion without which this republic might not exist.

Perceptions of the fairness of taxes also play a part in effective tax policy.

In 1791, George Washington's administration persuaded Congress to impose a whiskey excise tax. Many western Pennsylvania distillers considered their product a necessity for the poor rather than a taxable luxury, the "Whiskey Rebellion" broke out in 1794.

Quickly suppressed by the militia, the event, nevertheless, reminds us that a combined sense of injustice and self-interest can create substantial tax-compliance problems, and, occasionally, much more.

**TODAY, INCREASING** land values and housing construction costs often cause high assessed values and, consequently, higher property taxes. This pattern, compounded by inflation, has generated property owner protest and action, especially in California and Maryland, that amounts to a homeowners' revolt.

The adoption of Proposition 13 in California and its offshoots

elsewhere, limiting the property tax, demonstrates real limits to taxpayer patience.

If and when our large middle class comes to see itself as a net contributor to, rather than beneficiary of, increasing public expenditure programs, and it regards the price as too high, major permanent tax policy changes may result. Such emergent attitudes require consideration of taxing and spending limits at all levels of government.

## Premature Tots To Get 'E' Shots

BOSTON (AP)

Vitamin E shots may be able to protect babies from a dangerous complication of respiratory distress syndrome, the biggest killer of premature infants, a Yale Medical School study says.

The lungs of premature babies often are not fully developed, and the infants must be kept alive on respirators. But the rich oxygen pumped into their bodies can damage the lining of their lungs. This complication, called bronchopulmonary dysplasia, can itself be fatal.

**THE YALE** research, published in the New England Journal of Medicine, found that injections of vitamin E can trap a damaging form of oxygen before it harms the lungs.

Respiratory distress syndrome takes the lives of at least 25,000 premature babies in the United States each year. Infants born with this disorder lack a substance that keeps the air sacs in their lungs inflated.

**TO OFFSET** this until their lungs mature, doctors pump nearly pure oxygen into their

lungs. However, a form of the oxygen attacks the cells of the lungs' lining, causing inflammation, the growth of fibrous tissue and leaks in the lungs.

**"WE HAVE TO** give these babies oxygen to maintain their vital functions, but at the same time, the oxygen in the lung itself may cause lung damage," said Joseph B. Warshaw, who directed the study.

## Fencing Grows Up Tough

One of the most effective barriers you can place around private areas in your yard is one of the most economical, and best looking, too. It's a natural hedge of spiny shrubs, small prickly trees, or other thorny plants.

Climbing through or over this sort of wall is just too much trouble and takes too much time for children or trespassers, even neighborhood pets. Penetrating it is more difficult than, for example, getting through a chain link fence which can be breached by anybody with a pair of strong wire cutters.

A hedge of hawthorns or similar plants or trees is less costly to install initially than other effective fences, according to the American Association of Nurserymen.

It lasts far longer with no painting or maintenance required.

## Look Ahead to Spring

### Now's the Time to Plant Perennials

The wise gardener, while enjoying the colors of fall in his garden, starts planning ahead for spring, and the time to plant perennials for color next year is now.

After you have thought out your color scheme, a trip to your nursery will reveal all sorts of choices — English primrose, candy tuft, sweet violet, phlox, coral bells.

IT'S LESS EXPENSIVE to plant primroses now rather than wait for blooming size clumps that will be available next spring.

Other favorites are delphinium, sweet williams, pinks (dianthus) and carnations, and you can be assured of bloom sooner if you plant now rather than wait for spring.

Often overlooked by non-hobbyist gardeners, the unusual and characteristic beauty of such favorites as columbine, Canterbury bells, penstemon and foxglove that are easy to grow.

THE WHITE CANDYTUFT and white or lavender-pink trailing African daisies are excellent ground covers available for planting this fall. Gazanias are another thought —

they are hardy and drought resistant and seem to bloom almost all the time. However, they do need lots of sun. Chrysanthemums are tops for fall color.

NURSERIES HAVE blooming plants in various sizes of containers, and in myriad color and flower forms. Whether planted in the garden or grown in pots to decorate a patio, mums brighten surroundings and since they are perennials, they will recreate the color carnival again next year.

The garden phlox is the backbone of most summer gardens. They bear huge clusters of sweetly scented disk-shaped flowers an inch or more across, in colors ranging from snowy white through every shade of pink to red and from pale blue to deep purple.

## Colorful Face Lift Yielded by Bulbs

Now is the time to plant ranunculus and anemones to give your garden a facelift of color.

Ranunculus and anemones are two of the most popular bulb plants in the entire western garden world, and these California grown bulbs are exported to flower corners around the world.

WAITING FOR YOU AT your local garden center, ranunculus bulbs are available in many shades, red, yellow, pink, gold, rose, white and orange as well as a picotee bi-color mixture which is new to the garden scene.

To create a colorful border, plant bulbs 1 inch deep and 8 inches apart. These plants reach a height up to 18 to 24 inches and will produce armloads of blooms over a six-week period.

IN THE SAME FAMILY, only lower growing, are anemones — a perfect companion plant. Since they are more compact, anemones should be planted in front of the ranunculus to give wide bands of color.

Anemones bloom over a five-to-eight-week period and make excellent cut flowers. The spectrum of colors range from blue, violet, red, pink and white, both as color accents in your garden and as a focal point in your flower arrangements.

GROWING BOTH species is easy, especially in the West and Southwest where winters are mild. Plant the bulbs in the fall, watch and water in the winter.

## Weekend Gardening Checklist

• Bring "vacationing" houseplants back indoors and pinch and trim plants back for their new environment. Check for pests and either give the plants a bath using a mild soap and plenty of rinse water, or use one of the systemic insecticides.

• Plant iris, day lilies, phlox and other spring and summer blooming perennials. Water well and cover with a light mulch to prevent damages from freezing.

• Still overwhelmed by your vegetable garden? You can still preserve, can, freeze, pickle or dry surplus crops for enjoyment throughout the winter.

• Knock weeds out right now because they are setting seeds. If you live near untended fields, this is especially important so they can't spread to your yard.

## Pesticide, Herbicide Differs

What is the difference between herbicide and pesticide?

Home gardeners and farmers often use pesticides to protect their plants and animals from insects. Fruit trees must be sprayed regularly to prevent moth larvae from making the ripe fruit wormy. Many cattlemen spray their livestock

to protect them from flies, ticks, mites and lice. Insects cause more than \$5.5 billion in crop and livestock losses each year in the United States alone.

A pesticide, which is usually called an insecticide, is a substance used to kill insects. Classified according to the way they are made, there are organic, inorganic, botanical and bacterial insecticides.

HERBICIDES, in the same pest-control business as insecticides, are chemical preparations used to kill weeds.

So the difference between a herbicide and a pesticide is clear: both are pest fighters with one specializing in weeds and the other in insects.

Most herbicides are selective,

which means they will not harm the crop on which they are sprayed but they will get rid of the weeds. Many are made in the form of gas or liquid and contain carbon, hydrogen and oxygen.

One of the first major herbicides developed is called 2-4-D, and it kills broadleaf weeds. Other types include simazine, diuron and trifluralin. Most of the various types of herbicides benefit man greatly.

ALTHOUGH MOST herbicides are not highly poisonous, they certainly should be stored where pets and small children cannot get to them.

All insecticides, on the other hand, should be considered as poisonous. They should be stored

with great care and protective clothing should be worn when the insecticides are used.

Organic insecticides are the type most widely used. Like herbicides, most contain carbon, hydrogen and oxygen atoms. Some also include chlorine, lindane and other chemicals.

ORGANIC INSECTICIDES are used on food crops because they do not leave harmful deposits on the food. Inorganic insecticides, which are usually made from minerals, are usually used to protect cotton and livestock, although many are safe enough to also be used on fruit trees.

Insecticides are often sprayed or dusted when used on plants. For animals, various types are available that can be put into tanks for dipping or mixed with insect food.

Both herbicides and insecticides should be chosen carefully and used with great care. Wrong types can kill or injure the plants and animals being treated.

### ABOUT YOUR SOIL

Generally, soil is a mass of mineral particles mixed with living and dead organic matter and incorporating quantities of air and water. Size of mineral particles determines the texture of the soil. Small, flat particles of clay fit closely together, with little air space between them. When clay soils get wet, they dry out slowly because downward movement of water (drainage) is slow. Since air content is limited, root growth is inhibited. Clay soils warm up slowly in spring and delay plant growth. On the other hand, the small particles of clay may be well supplied with nutrients, and the slow drainage prevents the loss of these nutrients by leaching.

Sandy soils have comparatively larger particles which permit good aeration, quick passage of water, and quick warming. They also permit rapid leaching away of valuable nutrients under necessary frequent watering. Both types of soils can be improved by the same means — the addition of organic materials that have the capacity to hold both air and water.

### SOIL PREPARATION

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# Taxes: Most Gripe but Want Projects They Fund

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** This is the first in a series of 15 articles exploring "Taxation: Myths and Realities." Arthur D. Lynn Jr., professor of economics and adjunct professor of law at Ohio State University, traces the evolving scope of government and the development of the tax system that finances it.

This series was written for Courses by Newspaper, a program developed by University Extension, UC San Diego, and funded by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

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Like most humans, Americans prefer pleasure to pain. That fact explains the paradox that while we seek and enjoy government benefits, we grudgingly compute and pay the taxes that finance them. Doubtful about governmental effectiveness but jealously retentive of direct benefits, we accept the inevitability of taxes.

**NEVERTHELESS, AS** Supreme Court Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes suggested in 1904, taxes compulsory payments to government are the price that must be paid now or later, directly or indirectly, for that part of civilization fostered by society's public sector.

At the outset of the series "Taxation: Myths and Realities" we will consider the evolving scope of government and the nature and functions of taxation—matters that concern us all.

Despite current disenchantment with big, liberal spending government, some form of government is an essential precondition for high civilization and a complex industrial society. And government must be paid for.

IN 1776, ADAM Smith, the father of economics, recognized police, justice, and defense as basic state functions. At

minimum, he argued, government must provide for external defense and internal justice.

During the two centuries since Smith, the public, acting through democratic government, has added many now familiar, sometimes controversial, functions, including welfare, education and economic development. They are designed to do collectively what is unlikely to be well-performed individually.

American reaction to the increased scope of government and its cost in taxes is complex and seemingly schizoid. Tax burdens are much discussed, and public opinion registers discontent with both politicians and how they arrange program delivery. Yet, surveys by a variety of researchers note that Americans often favor increased spending on major public programs.

**ACCORDINGLY, DESPITE** flamboyant rhetoric and argument pro and con, it seems a broad consensus favors public action over a wide spectrum ranging from national defense to some social services. In spite of resistance to high taxes, there is little effective support for a cut in expenditures.

At the same time, however, hope for improved operating efficiency springs eternal. Dis-

satisfaction with both cost and performance is frequent and strongly vocal.

In fiscal year 1976, governments in the United States spent \$626 billion. Combined general expenditures clustered on education (22 percent), defense (21 percent), and welfare (10 percent). The total included a variety of other public functions and the interest on our public debts, since taxes do not always pay for current governmental activity.

**ALTHOUGH DEFENSE** spending has decreased as a percentage of federal budget outlays (from 58 percent in 1955 to 25 percent in 1976), it is probable that defense outlays will increase absolutely and relatively.

At the same time, expenditures for social service programs have increased. Even without balancing the budget or considering such factors as inflation and trade balances, budget pressures will remain acute.

In part, this reflects the fact that in the last half-century we have given government more jobs to do. In 1950, expenditures were about 25 percent of the nation's total output of goods and services; in 1960, 30 percent, and in 1975, 35 percent.

While government expenditures are high in the perspective of our history, expenditures in some European democracies (Norway, Sweden, and the

Netherlands, for example), exceed 40 percent. However, one cannot accurately specify a relationship between the level of taxes and either economic growth or national happiness. In a democracy, the government sector is a matter of national public choice.

**SINCE PUBLIC** expenditures (hence, taxes) are likely to remain high, both the public interest and our collective private interests urge development of the best tax system possible.

But, asks the reluctant tax-

payer, can't government cut waste, hold the line on spending, and reduce our taxes?

Certainly effective public management and prudent expenditure decisions are desirable. However, experience suggests that eliminating waste offers only a limited basis for reducing expenditures and taxes. The myth appeals; harsh reality offers little prospect of help.

**TAXES ARE ALSO** much more than just a mechanism for transferring resources from the private to the public sector. They inevitably affect the relation of individuals and groups to the state; indeed, they may condition the very right of government to govern.

The history of taxation is, in large part, the story of the development of constitutional democracy and due process of law.

Modest incomes were taxed at about 40 percent in Palestine at the time of Christ. The term "publican" (tax collector) was virtually synonymous with "robber" and "sinner."

English history reminds us that citizen-taxpayers often responded forcefully to what they considered excessive and unfair taxation. Both Magna Carta (1215) and the English Bill of Rights (1689) illustrated these ancient conflicts and established the principle that consent of the governed is a prerequisite of (See TAX MYTHS, Page A8)

# Property Tax Has Its Roots Deep in History

**By W. ELLIOT BROWNLEE.** Measured against the history of property taxes in the United States, passage of Proposition 13 is highly unusual. American state and local taxation, especially the property tax component, has been remarkably stable until now.

Since the Colonial period, the property tax has served as the primary source of local tax revenues. Even today, it accounts for more than 75 percent of local tax revenues.

**ONE FACTOR** in the stability of property taxation is the depth of its roots in agricultural society. A majority of Americans lived close to the land, on farms or in small towns, until the 1920s.

They found the tax to be highly appropriate to farming communities. Most wealth was held in the form of tangible property; the benefits received from government bore a close relationship to these holdings; and local and state government had modest needs.

Hence, the property tax ap-

peared clearly equitable and generated adequate revenues at low rates. In addition, leaving property assessment in the hands of local governments squared with democratic ideals and gave local communities flexibility in setting tax policy.

**THE INDUSTRIAL** revolution of the 19th century, however, made it increasingly difficult for the property tax to live up to its egalitarian image or to generate adequate revenues. Industrialization meant that more property was held in forms that escaped assessment: money, mortgages, stocks and bonds.

Moreover, urban governments needed larger tax revenues than the old property tax could produce to pay for new water works, transit systems, sewers, parks and schools.

The needs of state governments were especially difficult to meet because the imposition of higher state tax rates on locally assessed property caused localities to undervalue the property in their districts and thus attempt to shift state tax obligations to other localities.

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**FROM THE** 1870s through the 1930s, pressures of industrialization led to a restructuring of state and local taxes. State governments withdrew altogether from property taxation, with California doing so in 1910. Local governments made assessment procedures fairer and more predictable and concentrated the property tax on real estate. They assumed that real estate holdings even in urban societies tend to reflect a family's overall wealth and ability to pay taxes.

The improvements in property taxation allowed local governments to become even more dependent on the tax. By end of the 1920s, local governments raised more than 95 percent of

their tax revenues from property taxes.

**TO REPLACE** the state property tax, state governments developed new taxes: sales taxes, user charges (especially for highway uses), and income taxes. California followed the national trend, imposing taxes similar to income taxes on corporations in 1910, reforming highway finance during the 1920s, adopting sales taxation in 1933, and adding the personal income tax in 1935.

Considerations of equity as well as practicality had much to do with the adoption of all these taxes. The sales tax was valued in part for its horizontal equity (taxing everyone with the same

consumption levels at the same rate) and for its effectiveness in reaching some of the personal property (automobiles, refrigerators, radios, etc.) which had eluded assessors. Automobile fees and gasoline taxes were designed to allocate the rapidly rising costs of new highways to their users.

**THE INCOME** tax, however, never received much support as a state-level tax because urban interest groups, including organized labor, were concerned that a state might incur economic losses by adopting higher income taxes than did other states and that the losses would offset any equity gains.

By the 1930s, a clear division had become established. The federal government relied on income taxes, state governments most heavily on sales taxes, and local governments almost exclusively on property taxes.

This division has remained largely intact the last 40 years. The only significant change has been the rise of federal revenue-sharing and grants-in-aid; devices to use federal income tax revenues for meeting local needs.

**PREVAILING** THROUGH that period have been views that the state and local tax system was a practical source of new revenues; that the system was, on balance, reasonably equitable; and that shifting responsibilities for raising revenue to higher levels of government (to state taxes, or particularly to the federal income tax) tended to result in a loss of democratic participation and local control over revenue raising and spending.

This consensus has weakened during the 1970s as inequities in property taxation. Whether the consensus breaks down will depend on the strength of the public's attachment to democratic participation and local control.

If the passage of Proposition 13 indicates that the attachment has diminished, significant changes in the way Americans finance state and local government lie ahead.

# Witnesses Appeal Ban

Jehovah's Witnesses in the Newport Beach area will be writing letters of appeal to government officials in Argentina, where their Christian society is currently under ban.

Joe Elmer, presiding overseer of the Newport-Mesa congregation, explained that a concerted effort in sending letters of appeal was being instituted. "This is because all efforts of legal recourse to return freedom of worship to Jehovah's Witnesses in Argentina have failed," he said.

"IN SEPTEMBER OF 1976," Elmer explained, "the Argentine government announced that Jehovah's Witnesses were banned from practicing their religion. Time-consuming legal proceedings followed as Witnesses appealed the ban through the Argentine court system. Finally, though, in February 1978, news sources in Argentina declared: 'Supreme Court Upholds Executive Decree Banning Jehovah's Witnesses.' The ban has continued ever since," he said.

Elmer said that a report from the New York Headquarters indicated that the ban has resulted in persecution of Jehovah's Witnesses in Argentina.

ELMER EXPLAINED THE NATURE of the letters would be an appeal for justice. "We are trying to encourage the existing authorities in Argentina to take the necessary steps to restore freedom to the Christian minority, Jehovah's Witnesses."

## Two Old Rivals Vie Again Today at OCIR

This has been a banner year for Tom McEwen of Fountain Valley on the drag racing front.

It has also been an emotional summer for the U.S. Nationals champion involving the loss of his 15-year-old son Jamie to leukemia.

"Jamie was looking forward to going to Indianapolis and watching the U.S. Nationals this summer," McEwen says. "But it didn't happen that way. Instead, it has been a very emotional summer and I spent a lot of time coming back to Southern California to see him before he died."

**JAMIE WOULD HAVE** been proud of his dad at Indianapolis. McEwen defeated Don Prudhomme in the finals with his fastest-ever run in the funny car competition.

McEwen and Prudhomme once were teammates and were known as the Mongoose and the Snake. But they parted company and have gone their separate ways.

Since that time, there hasn't been a lot of good will between the two. They are fierce competitors on the track as they will be tonight at Orange County International Raceway in the Dr Pepper Parade of Champions.

**HOWEVER, AT INDY,** when the race was over, Prudhomme was the first to reach McEwen.

"Even though he wanted to win, he came to me and said: 'It was nice that you could do for your son,'" McEwen's run was a 6.05 elapsed time at 237 miles per hour.

"We ran it a little harder than we normally do in the finals," McEwen says. "We figured we had to win for Jamie and everybody on our team cooperated."

**McEWEN IS SECOND** to Prudhomme in world points and has four victories over the point leader this summer.

Both will compete at Seattle and Ontario in national races and then return to OCIR to wrap up the season in the Manufacturer's championships Nov. 4.

In the meantime, both are slated to drive in a celebrity race preceding the Watkins Glen U.S. Grand Prix race in identically prepared Toyotas.

**"I'VE NEVER DRIVEN** in a race of this type before," McEwen says. "But Prudhomme and I were out at

Willow Springs this week practicing. He's had a couple of races already, though."

McEwen says the Indy race is like the 500-mile championship car event. It is the biggest drag racing event there is and McEwen says it "put the topping on the season for me," to defeat Prudhomme in the finals.

Gates at OCIR open at 11 with bracket racing and time trials in the afternoon. The 16 top funny cars will go to the line beginning at 7 with each car making two rounds. The two lowest elapsed time runners return for the finals.

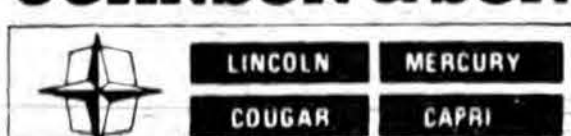

## Aussie Band Seeks Stardom

HOLLYWOOD (AP) The continent of Australia, it is safe to say, has had no profound effect on the evolution of American-style rock 'n' roll.

The wellsprings of early rock were hillbilly juke joints and black jazz and blues dives, and it wasn't until the British invasion of the '60s that aliens had much say in the American art form. But even when English mopheads were invading our shores by the boatload, the Aussies never really got in on the doings.

To Australian rockers aiming at the big time, success in America was just a faraway dream too awesome to imagine. The bulk of the ambitious, Aussies set their sights on Britain; some succeeded, some washed out, but few even tried America.

IN THE PAST FEW years, though, there has been a sort of mini-invasion from Australia. Olivia Newton-John has found a broad American audience, the Bee Gees have been reborn since discovering disco, and the Bee Gees' little brother, Andy Gibb, has found consistent commercial success since coming to America two years ago.

The Aussies have found success with pleasant, commercial pop, but none has shaken rock to its foundations with innovation or challenged the mainstream with spirited rendition. One Aussie band does come close.

The Little River Band, the latest Australian rock act to break big in America, displays much of the gloss and sweet harmonies Americans have come to expect from down-under artists, but the band tries hard to be something more. In 2½ years, on and off, in America, the seven-member group has earned a reputation as a hard-working road band that seemed destined to transcend its role of supporting act.

LITTLE RIVER LACKS the hard edge of Bruce Springsteen or the Tom Robinson Band, but urgency and tension are not what they're after. Their specialty is smooth, commercial-hook pop with a tinge of country, and of that ilk, few of the newer bands compare.

Their "Sleeper Catcher" album is progressing steadily up the charts, and a single from the record, "Reminiscing," is one of the big hits of the summer—at last look still gaining momentum.

Three of the band's seven members write songs, which is one of the reasons Little River stands apart—they care about lyrics. Not all of their songs are compelling, but at least you get the feeling these guys are serious about their work and try to go beyond the superficial formula writing that characterizes so much of the stuff on the market.

"BECAUSE WE HAVE three writers in the band, we come up with a lot of varied material," says guitarist-songwriter Beeb Birtles. "It's a matter of getting acclimated to each other's musical styles," adds Graham Goble, another writer picker, "absorbing it all, then being able to pull your own stuff out of that."

"But we do the stuff we like and we write from the heart. We don't write to a formula. We're very conscious of the lyrics and we spend a lot of time on them."

# Movie Exiles Reunite for 'Passion'

HOLLYWOOD (AP) Both have been exiles, she from her native Greece, he from his adopted Hollywood. They have remained indomitable, uncompromising in art as well as politics.

Melina Mercouri and Jules Dassin have been visiting the United States to call attention to their new film, "A Dream of Passion," which Avco-Embassy is releasing next month. Both admit the film needs sellings since it is not exactly surefire entertainment.

"A Dream of Passion" reflects the artistic integrity of the married pair, whose collaboration has produced "Never on Sunday," "Phaedra" and "Topkapi." The new film is an unrelenting study of two women: a Greek actress (Mercouri) returned from exile for a production of "Medea," an American army wife (Ellen Burstyn) who killed her three children as revenge on her unfaithful husband.

DASSIN'S INSPIRATION for the story began 25 years ago when he witnessed the sentencing of a Milan woman who had murdered her lover's three children. In "A Dream of Passion," he interweaves the real infanticide with an onstage version of "Medea," some of it in English, some in Greek.

The film often focuses on the antagonism between the actress and the play's director. Is this taken from life?

"There are superficial parallels," the director-writer smiled. "Absolutely not," the actress corrected. "I love working with Julie."

The film's most controversial scene comes when the actress accepts the challenge of a BBC camera crew to speak the truth on tape in the manner of Marlon Brando's soliloquy in "Last Tango in Paris." It is a harrowing piece of self-revelation.

"BUT I HAD NO INTENTION of writing about Melina," Dassin explained. "The speech was written for her, in fact, I rewrote it many times. She did the four minute scene in one take. Five seconds before it happened, I knew she was going up. She did, and I simply calmed her from behind the camera. She continued, never losing her intensity and concentration."

"I was lost," she admitted. "It was like being under an anesthetic, like moving in a dream. I heard a voice and I saw Julie mouthing words behind the camera. I knew I couldn't do the scene twice. I'm sure Brando didn't."

The lives of both Jules Dassin and Melina

Mercouri could make absorbing films. He grew up in Harlem, came to Hollywood in the late 1930s as an actor, directed films like "Brute Force" and "Naked City" that created a new sense of realism in the American film.

HE WAS BLACKLISTED during the McCarthy era, moved to Europe and established a new career with "Rififi" and "Never on Sunday." He co-starred with Mercouri in the latter movie, "because I couldn't afford to hire a better actor."

Melina Mercouri was born to an influential Athens family, did her first film "Stella" with Michael Cacoyannis in 1955, started with Dassin in 1960 with "He Who Must Die." She was appearing on Broadway in "Illya, Darling" when the military junta seized control of Greece in 1967. Her bitter opposition to the regime cost her citizenship and possessions.

She returned to Greece after the junta's collapse in 1974 and now serves as a Socialist member in the Greek parliament.

"MY AREAS OF INTEREST" are sewers, schools, child care and pollution," she remarked. "Pollution is a very serious problem in my area, which is Piraeus. We have many problems, because the people are poor and there are many refugees from Asia Minor."

She and Dassin live in Athens but her party chose Piraeus as her district "because that's where 'Never on Sunday' took place and because it had been a difficult area for the Socialist Party."

No dilettante deputy, she said she often spends from 8 a.m. to 4 the next morning at her chores. She receives \$2,000 a month but must pay for an office in Piraeus and other expenses. "And I pay more, because I am considered to be rich."

## Tune In WKRP for Laughs

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Set your dial for "WKRP in Cincinnati" and stay tuned for what looks like the funniest new show of the season.

It's about the folks at a fictional Cincinnati radio station that suddenly switches its musical format from geriatric tunes to rock 'n' roll. The disc jockey, Dr. Johnny Fever, played by Howard Hesseman, manages the shift in mid-record, and it's a hilarious sequence.

Gary Sandy stars as Andy Travis, the newly hired program manager who orders the change. Gordon Jump is station manager Arthur Carlson, whose most fervent hope is that his mother, who owns the station, doesn't find out and kill him. Or worse, fire him.

"WKRP" COULD DO for local radio what "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" did for television news. It's also from MTM Enterprises.

The show premieres on CBS, Channel 2, at 8 p.m. Monday, and though it looks like a hit, the going could be rough. It's up against two winners in the ratings, NBC's "Little House on the Prairie," and ABC's "Welcome Back, Kotter," which has been shifted to Monday. The series also stars Loni Anderson, Richard Sanders, Tim Reid, Frank Bonner and Jan Smithers.

Sandy, 32, comes to "WKRP" after three soap operas and a regular role in the syndicated series "All That Glitters." This is his first starring role.

"I did a lot of guest shots on television," he said, "ranging from crazies to whatever. This is one of my first likeable roles. I wasn't too likeable in 'Glitters.' I was pushy and trying to get to the top."

SANDY, A TALL, slender man with longish blond hair, said he audi-

tioned for the role in "WKRP." "It came so quickly. More than any time in my career, I realized you don't know what's going to happen next."

"Three days before I had auditioned for the second time for another pilot at CBS. Another guy got it. I really wanted that part, it was a great role. The pilot didn't sell."

"On the strength of that screen test, CBS called MTM and told them about me. They were down to the wire and I think they must have lost somebody for the part. I went in, read on Friday, tested on Saturday, was told I had the part on Sunday and started rehearsals on Monday." Like Mary Tyler Moore in her show, Sandy is the straight man in "WKRP," the oasis of sanity amidst all the craziness.

"That's a challenge for me because they want me to be laid back and easy going and still keep the pace go-

ing," he said. "There's a fine line between laid back and boring."

IN AN UPCOMING show, Sandy has to cancel a preacher on the early Sunday morning religious program because he's hawking things like "New Testament steak knives." He's the Rev. Ed "Little" Pembroke of the Toe-to-Toe With Satan Church of the Mighty Struggle. No one's ever seen him because of the early morning hour, so when Sandy shows up to fire him, "Little" turns out to be a 280-pound ex-wrestler.

Sandy said he was also impressed with the respectful way people on the show treated each other.

"When we came back after the pilot to start the series, the producers gave us all of the scripts for the series. That's unheard of. Usually, you don't get the scripts until the day before you start a show. I think that's respectful to give the actors the scripts ahead of time so they'll know where their characters are going."

Sandy, unmarried and a native of Dayton, Ohio, moved here from New York three years ago. He had worked on three soap operas, "As the World Turns," "Somerset," and "Secret Storm," and had appeared in more than 40 plays in stock and summer theater.

"I LEFT NEW York just when things were starting to happen for me," he said. "Producers were starting to ask for me for roles. It probably wasn't the best time to leave, but it seemed right to me."

"I'm drawn to the theater. I saw a lot of people coming from LA with television and film names and getting all the good parts. I knew I was going to have to have a name to get anything good. That's what I want to accomplish here, make a name so I can go back and star on Broadway."

"I want some prestige. I don't want to be thought of as just a TV personality."
