Firms fail to disclose toxics used

Hazardous materials disclosure law falls short of eliciting full response

Only 450 Irvine-based businesses, about half the companies in the city believed to use toxic materials, have complied with a new hazardous materials disclosure ordinance that is

companies have reported using toxic substances, Sylvan Hersh, Irvine's

And only one unnamed firm took advantage of the law's extra confidentiality clause for trade secrets, which allows a company to describe a toxic

"If a lot had come back with trade secrets, that would have swamped the

integrity of the system," Hersh said.

already requested an extension in providing the information.

The ordinance was adopted in December but was to take affect 60 days following the mailing of surveys, Hersh explained. He refused to name the non-complying firms because the law allows confidentiality, one of the demands by industry.

The new law's intent is to create a bank of data that will give firefighters current information on the location,

The ordinance came in the wake of an escalating number of hazardous materials spills and leaks in Irvine, which is packed with high-tech industries and medical labs that use hazardous substances, such as cor-rosive acids and radiation materials. In 1983, the Orange County Fire

Bergeson stands with Carpenter

Gives up neutrality to endorse candidate in hotly-contested race for 70th district

The race for the 70th Assembly District Republican nomination took another sudden turn Saturday when Assemblywoman Marian Bergeson endorsed Ken Carpenter, one of seven candidates in the hotly con-

Bergeson, who holds the 70th District seat but is giving it up to run for the state Senate, said at the start of the campaign she would not endorse.

Carpenter was the frontrunner for most of the race, but he has fallenbehind in recent weeks after a bitter series of attacks from his opponents.

The 70th District includes Newport Beach, Laguna Beach and much of South County.

Bergeson threw her support to Carpenter, saying the front runner, Gil Ferguson, had made "false and unscrupulous attacks" on Carpenter.
"I abhor these tactics and urge

voters to reject candidates who use such devices," Bergeson said. Ferguson, who was not home to

respond Saturday night, said previously all of the charges against Carpenter were true and that he was simply making the voters aware of

The most serious charge was that Carpenter would be unable to vote on many issues because he would have a conflict of interest. Carpenter's father, former state Senator Dennis Carpenter, is a lobbyist in Sacramen-

In an emotional press conference

Friday, the senior Carpenter said the conflict of interest charge was bogus because Ken Carpenter would have no financial interest in any of the bills the lobbyist worked on.

The Assemblywoman commissioned a poll Friday by DMI, an Orange County polling firm. The poll showed Ferguson had 34 percent of the vote, Carpenter 27 percent Ron Cordova 11 percent and the remain-ing four candidates were far behind.

Although Cordova's political views re close to Bergeson's, she said Carpenter was the candidate with the best chance of beating Ferguson and that Carpenter's politics also closely reflected hers.

"I have watched Ken grow and mature during this contest. He has demonstrated an excellent grasp of the major issues in our state and has dedicated himself to continue my efforts to improve our schools and reduce crime," Bergeson said. Cordova said a poll by Opinion Research, commissioned last week,

showed Ferguson leading with 19.5 percent, Cordova in second with 16.2 percent, Carpenter with 15.1 percent and Ruthelyn Plummer with 8.7

"It is still anybody's ballgame," Cordova said.

The million-dollars-plus collected by the high-powered campaign organization pushing for passage of a countywide transportation sales tax increase came from a wide spectrum of Orange County business, engineering and development firms, according to the campaign's financial state-

The pro-tax Citizens for Better Transportation collected more than

\$1.4 million through May 19, according to financial disclosure statements filed with the Orange County Registrar of Voters' Office - making the campaign the most expensive in county political annals.

While consisting largely of dona-tions in \$1,000, \$5,000 and even \$10,000 and \$25,000 increments from county corporations and development and engineering firms around the state, numerous contributions in the \$25, \$50 and \$100 range

63-year-old faces imminent eviction

A 63-year-old women, claiming she's been victimized by President Reagan's spending cuts and an alleged lack of response by Orange County welfare agencies, is facing eviction from her mobile home at the Huntington By-the-Sea Mobile Home Village in Huntington Beach.

Catherine Aguis asserts the root of her financial problem lies in disability pay and food stamp cuts, welfare cuts and a system that she claims caters to young single mothers and immi-

She also claims that benefits have lagged far behind living costs. She said she receives a total of \$553 in Social Security and Veterans' Administration checks. But she said she pays a monthly rent of \$350 and close to

\$50 for electricity and gas. She also still owes money on her coach, which she's been trying unsuccessfully to

"This country hasn't been the same since Kennedy," she said in the living room of her oceanfront coach. "Ford and Carter weren't bad but they didn't do anything. But Reagan's cuts are cruel to the poor people.

"Everything's happened to me since this administration got in. Reagan claims inflation is down, but the food prices are up again. The basic things I buy cost 10 or 15 cents more for each thing.
"I used to be middle class but now

'm below the poverty line. Every time I go to the market I'm humiliated and embarrassed. I have to wind up taking things out of the shopping

Bitter fight for judgeship will be decided Tuesday

Race has spawned accusations as well as a libel suit

An expensive and bitter fight for a Harbor Muncipal Court judgeship that includes a \$2.5 million libel suit will be decided Tuesday following weeks of charges and counter-

Deputy District Attorney Susanne Shaw, 37, has accused incumbent Judge Stephen Stewart of fixing tickets and falsifying payroll docu-ments and claims he is unfit to hold his office at the Newport' Beach

Stewart said he believes the charges are politically motivated and filed a \$2.5 million libel suit against Shaw in Orange County Superior Court Fri-

Shaw, a Capistrano Beach resident, has spent nearly \$40,000 — all but about \$15,000 of her own money to try and unseat Stewart.

Stewart, who has raised about \$32,000 in campaign funds, claims the charges were "engineered" by Shaw, who he said has set out to run a "vicious campaign" against him.

Stewart, 50, points to an investigation of the payroll document charge by the state attorney general's office, which revealed no evidence against him, as proof that Shaw is running a smear campaign.

At issue is the payroll statements udges sign to get paid.
Under a state constitutional rule adopted in 1966, a judge may not be

paid if any case has been awaiting his decision for more than 90 days. Stewart admits that he spent six

months deciding a Nov. 11, 1983; case, General Capital Resources vs. Radiographic Development Corp. During that time, he signed six affidavits claiming his caseload was

caught up.

The judge said that for years, it has been standard court procedure for the Harbor Court judges to sign the affidavits ahead of time.

Stewart said it was done so the judges could get paid even if they were tick or on vacation. The court has since changed the practice and Stewart admitted it was

Catherine Aguis faces eviction from mobile home park

HB physician joins fellows on peace mission to USSR

A Huntington Beach physician is one of about 50 U.S. citizens leaving on a peace mission to the Soviet, Union this weekend to visit doctors there who share a common concern over preventing nuclear war.

Fred Galluccio, 31, an assistant professor at the UC Irvine Medical Center in Orange, will be an observer next week at the Congress of International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear Warfare.

Following the week-long convention in Helsinki, Finlandehe and the rest of the U.S. delegation will spend a week in Moscow and Leningrad and meet with their Russian counterparts, Galluccio said Friday.

The Russian physicians endorse the same tenets as the Americans, he said. The doctors embrace a nuclear freeze and advocate a halt to the arms

"The only way to prevent this epidemic is prevention of proliferation of nuclear warheads," said Gallucio, chief of in-patient services in family medicine.

"Political leaders aren't communicating. If people communicate and say this is something we don't want, maybe the politicians will listen," said the doctor, a member of the Los Angeles chapter of Physicians for Social Responsibility.

Galluccio said he isn't sure how many doctors are members of the Soviet Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War - whose president, Eugene Chazov, visited the U.S. in March. But Galluccio said he believes the cardiologist to Soviet President Constantin Chernenko is a member.

There is also the remote possibility, he said, that the U.S. group may be able to meet with Soviet dissident Andrei Sakharov, reportedly in exile in the closed city of Gorky.

Officials will meet to settle fair's taxes Jackson at son's graduation

NEW ORLEANS - City officials will meet with world's fair directors this week to settle a tax dispute that almost kept 2,000 fair employees from getting paid, and the fair president said the flap may keep tourists away. The city froze the fair's bank accounts, contending that the fair owes \$3.8 million in amusement, sales and special taxes that should have been paid May 20. Fair officials contended only \$1.5 million was owed and that it doesn't come due until June 20. An agreement was reached Friday night and enough money to cover the paychecks, which went out 3½ hours late, was released by the city. "Nationwide this is going to be a problem" for the exposition's image, said fair president Petr Spurney. Still, he said, despite daily attendance figures that have been lower than expected the fair is making enough money to meet expenses.

Kissenger warns of oil disaster

WASHINGTON — Former Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger said in a broadcast Saturday the United States should arrange air cover in the Persian Gulf because closing the gulf would trigger a "disastrous" oil shortage that could plunge the world economy back to where it was at the time of the 1973 Arab oil embargo. That could mean a "rapid rise in oil prices, inflationary pressures, and recessions that will affect the stability of all governments and the health of the industrial democracies," Kissinger

Negotiators meet in LV strike

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — Negotiators for striking musicians met with resort officials Saturday in an effort to reach a contract that would put many of the remaining 6,500 striking hotel workers back on the job. The talks came a day after the musicians union and a union representing stagehands agreed on a new pact with the Union Plaza Hotel, clearing the way for some 800 strikers to return to work. About 6,000 Culinary Union workers and bartenders remained on strike against 11 resorts, along with an estimated 500 stagehands and musicians.

Texas repeals evolution rule

- The Texas Board of Education on Saturday repealed a controversial rule that restricted the teaching of evolution. The 10-year-old rule had required references to evolution in textbooks to "identify it as only one of several explanations of the origins of humankind. Critics of the rule have said it influenced the teaching of biology nationwide because the Texas textbook market is so large that publishers sometimes tailor texts to Texas needs. The rule was repealed after Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox had held it was unconstitutional.

Bail fails to free suspects

LOS ANGELES — Despite a ruling which set bail amounts for them, five of seven McMartin Preschool molestation defendants remained in custody Saturday, and prosecutors said only one could possibly be released this weekend. But Betty Raidor would first have to come up with \$750,000 cash. Property equity in that amount would not suffice. The seven defendants have been indicted on more than 200 felony abuse counts, including rape and sodomy.

Fires slowly being contained

LOS ANGELES - One of three stubborn lightning fires was contained Saturday, leaving just two of at least 126 such blazes still burning unconfined four days after a Southern California electrical storm. All told, the fires have blackened 16,450 acres in eight counties, but most were quickly doused Wednesday. The 5,900-acre Saline fire in Death Valley was contained at noon Saturday, and was expected to be controlled by 6 p.m. Sunday. Containment was predicted Saturday evening on the 6,000-acre-Aguanga fire in San Diego and Sunday for an 800-acre fire in the Joshua Tree National Monument.

Army probed writer's politics

SAN JOSE - U.S. Army intelligence once probed whether Pulitzer prize-winning novelist John Steinbeck was a Communist, decided that he was not, but nevertheless recommended that the writer be denied an Army commission, a newspaper reported on Saturday. Steinbeck, who wrote the Pulitzer prize-winning novel, "The Grapes of Wrath," while living a few miles southwest of San Jose in Los Gatos, was seeking a commission as an officer in the Army.

Last of mutilated pelicans die

SAN DIEGO - The last of 23 pelicans whose beaks were hacked off have died despite efforts to keep them alive, Sea World officials said. The California brown pelicans, an endangered species, were the last of a group found mutilated two years ago off Dana Point. The last three surviving birds died last week, two of a vitamin deficiency, the other of an unknown cause. The maimed pelicans were to have been flown to a European bird park later this month to take part in the world's first captive breeding program for the species.

Cable cars back on track

SAN FRANCISCO - This city will put its historic cable car line back in service Sunday - in plenty of time for the Democratic National Convention in July. At 10 a.m., the first paying passengers in 20 months will step aboard the California line and help put back on track the project that included the dismemberment of 100-year-old sewer pipes, crumbling water mains and miles of time-worn track. The Powell Street line will begin service June The Mason Street line reopens June 21

Lebanon will reopen gateways

BEIRUT, Lebanon - The new coalition government said Saturday it will reopen two crossings between Beirut's Moslem and Christian sectors on Monday despite persistent hostilities between rival militias. Lebanese police and French truce observers will take over positions at the two gateways in advance of their opening in order to separate the militias. Prime Minister Karami also announced he had ordered Israel to close its liaison office in the east Beirut Christian suburb of Dbaye.

Pope visits president in Rome

ROME - Pope John Paul II made a formal visit Saturday to President Sandro Pertini in the first trip by a pontiff to the presidential palace in 18 years. The visit, following a trip by Pertini to the Vatican two weeks ago, was timed to coincide with celebrations marking the June 1944 liberation of Rome from the Nazis and the foundation of the Italian republic two years later.

Toll rises as rains continue

18 deaths blamed on storm parked above soggy New England

A rainstorm blamed for 18 deaths on its slow drive across the country made a U-turn over the Atlantic and parked Saturday over soggy New England, where swollen

rivers crested after forcing thousands from their homes. Connecticut Gov. William O'Neill on Saturday formally asked President Reagan for disaster aid because of flooding in the state, where up to 84 inches of rain has fallen since May 27, forcing evacuation of more than 1,000

In Massachusetts, an estimated 4,000 people evacuated at the height of the flooding began returning home, but rain and high winds Saturday forced cancellation of a parade of tall sailing ships in Boston Harbor.

In the South, meanwhile, the approach of summer more closely resembled the beginning of spring, with a dozen cities from Texas to Florida posting record lows for the date. It was 54 degrees in Apalachicola, Fla., the coldest ever this late in the spring; 53 in Jacksonville, Fla., snapping the 55-degree record set in 1889; 47 in Meridian, Miss., dipping under the 1972 record by 2 degrees; and 56 in Houston, breaking the 1976 mark of 59 degrees.

This type of weather is more common in late March or early April," said forceaster Burt Sylvern at the National Hurricane Center in Coral Gables, Fla.

The storm pelting New England had moved 150 miles into the Atlantic on Friday, but then backed up and stalled Saturday over Nantucket with winds gusting past 40 mph and moderate to heavy rain, said Jack Hales at the National Severe Storms Center in Kansas City, Mo. "It's not good," he said. "It's aggravating an already bad situation up there."

However, forecasters expected the storm to move

slowly out to sea again later in the day.

In Connecticut, where the raging Connecticut and Housatonic rivers forced the evacuation of 1,300 people, 23 state roads were closed late Friday and 244 National Guardsmen remained on duty in flood-stricken sections Middletown and New Milford.

More than an inch of rain fell overnight in some parts of the state and "it's not showing any signs of letting up right now," said National Weather Service meteorologist Craig Cannon in Windsor Locks.

The Connecticut crested Saturday at about 21.3 feet — more than 13 feet above flood stage — in Middletown, its highest level since 1938. Mayor Sebastian Garafalo said his "very conservative estimate" of damage in that city alone was \$1 million.

In Portland, Conn., the marina, boatyard and warehouse owned by Harold Orzech was under 10 feet of water. "It's up to the ceiling," he said. "Everything I have out here is under water."

The Housatonic, which crested Friday at 22.4 feet in lew Milford, was expected to drop to 14 feet.

State officials said they hoped some residents could return home over the weekend. O'Neill made a helicopter tour of flooded areas on Friday, and in his letter to Reagan said Connecticut would be "in dire need of assistance" with millions of dollars in damage

In Massachusetts, hundreds of farms, roads and homes remained under water early Saturday after the Merrimack and Connecticut rivers crested late Friday. Damage to crops alone was estimated at \$20 milion.

An estimated 4,000 people were driven from their homes at the peak of the flooding and many have not returned, said Massachusetts Civil Defense Director Tom P. Rodgers. He said about 35 people spent Saturday night at Red Cross shelters in Northampton and Methuen, while others were staying with relatives and friends.

Arabs applaud, Iran protests gulf resolution

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Arab nations in the Persian Gulf region on Saturday applauded a U.N. Security Council resolution demanding that Iran halt attacks on shipping.

Iran responded by saying the "law of the jungle" ruled at the Security Council and its demand was invalid because it failed to condemn Iraqi strikes.

Iranian Prime Minister Hussein Musavi was quoted later by Tehran radio as saying Iran will continue to strike at Iraq despite the U.N. resolution and the delivery of U.S. Stinger antiaircraft missiles to Saudi Arabia. The council resolution, passed in a 13-0 vote on

Friday, called on Iran to halt air attacks on oil tankers in the gulf and emphasized the necessity of keeping gulf sea lanes secure and free. The resolution made no mention of Iraqi attacks against ships in the area.

The six-nation Gulf Cooperation Council, made up of Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, the United Arab Emirates,

Bahrain, Qatar and Oman, had sought the resolution. In Bahrain, Information Minister Tariq al-Moayyed said, "We are quite happy with the outcome of the Security

tagging along. They'll spend their honeymoon in Lincoln.

She suffers from chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, which prevents the brain from receiving enough oxygen. She must be on the oxygen tank during stressful times and when the weather is humid.

Page suffers from sleep apnea, which means he sometimes stops breathing when he is sleeping. He also suffers from back problems, so he occasionally uses a wheel chair. He must be on the respirator all the time.

The couple will live in an apartment in Lincoln. They receive home treatment from a Tabitha respriatory therapist and meals from the facility's Meals on Wheels

Dutch missile delay upsets Western allies

West Germans fear move might be seen as weakness in NATO

FRANKFURT, West Germany (AP) - The government said Saturday it fears Moscow might interpret the Dutch delay in deploying new nuclear missiles as a sign of faltering resolve in NATO, and initial reaction indicated other Western allies also may be worried.

The Dutch Cabinet agreed to accept an undetermined number of medium-range cruise missiles in 1988. It will take 48 missiles if the Soviet Union has not resumed arms control talks with the United States or has increased the number of SS-20 nuclear missiles pointed at Europe.

The North Atlantic Treaty Organization called for the 48 missiles to be stationed on Dutch soil by 1986 as part of the alliance's plan for deploying 572 U.S.-built Pershing 2 and cruise missiles in Western Europe.

Because of the late hour of the Dutch Cabinet vote Friday, there was scant official comment from West European governments. However, some politicians and commentators rebuked the Hague for backing away from the NATO timetable.

The sharpest criticism came from West Germany which is deploying the largest contingent of the NATO

missiles - 204, including all 108 Pershing 2s. Conservative Chancellor Helmut Kohl's coalition government fears "This could lead to a misunderstanding


in Moscow," West German government spokesman Juergen Sudhoff said in a statement.

The federal government regrets that the Dutch government has been unable to make up its mind to help carry out the full 1979 NATO twin-track decision on





Hart shocked by Mondale's 'cold' attacks

But differences are more nuance

than substance

WASHINGTON - To hear Gary Hart tell it, the biggest surprise of the presidential campaign was not his incredible surge after New Hampshire nor his equally incredible collapse two weeks later, but something he simply did not count on: the behavior of Walter F. Mondale. Hart finds it despicable.

"I was unprepared for how negative Mondale would become once he began to lose," Hart told me in a recent interview. He blames the attacks for his loss in both the New York and Pennsylvania primaries. He quotes Mondale as calling him "a cold-hearted wrench" and says he so confused the voters that momentum towards him in New York and Pennsylvania stalled.

That's Hart's view and it's not necessarily gospel. Mondale was entitled to come at Hart where he was weakest — the question of identity (who is this man?) and of character. Hart, after all, was a relatively new face and had, indisputably, changed his name, fudged his age and creatively revised his campaign biography.

Fair enough. But then Mondale became creative himself. Recently, for instance, he accused Hart of being soft on both arms control and the environment. This came as news to both environmental and disarmament groups who have a hard time choosing between the two principal Democratic candidates. As far as these groups go, both Hart and Mondale have admirable records and the differences between them have more to do with nuance than with

On the environment, Mondale has made much of the fact that Hart was absent for the final vote in 1980 on the establishment of the Superfund. That's true. But as a former senator,



Mondale knows there was no need for Hart to be in the Senate that day. The outcome was a foregone conclusion and the Superfund won by a vote of 78 to 9. Hart, according to a spokesman for an environmental group, had been a vigorous proponent of the Superfund in committee and his absence for the Final vote was meaningless.

In April, Mondale criticized Hart for offering only "nominal" support on women's issues — a charge that particularly galled Hart since he had for a time made women's issues the centerpiece of his campaign. Again, Mondale's assessment of his opponent was news to leaders of women's organizations. One of them, Judy Goldsmith of the National Organization for Women, called Hart's voting record "virtually flawless" - an assessment echoed by other feminist leaders. Either Mondale or Hart was okay with them.

The "New Mondale" has had a hard time catching up with the "Old Mondale." For 20 years, Mondale has been known as an exceedingly decent politician. In fact, the "rap" on him was that he lacked the requisite fire in his belly to become President. In 1974, after all, he dropped out of the presidential race, saying he could not face another night in another Holiday Inn. The presidency, he implied, was not worth it.

The fact is that Mondale and Hart differ on very little. Maybe their biggest difference is what they are willing to do to win. Mondale has shown he is willing to do just about anything. For Hart, that was the biggest surprise of the campaign.

publican incumbents running for reelection to the Senate this year enjoy a little-known, gilt-edged advantage over their challengers. Thousands of dollars have been funneled into their personal publicity efforts in the form of "office expenses" paid by the National Republican Senatorial

But for the privileged Republicans, the COMBO fund is a handy supplement to their government-paid office funds. The money helps them keep their names and achievements before the folks back home.

My associate Tony Capaccio did a rundown of the money given by the fund during 1982-83 to the 17 Republicans running for re-election this year. He arrived at a total expenditure of \$331,588 — a figure the committee called "in the

Here are the recipients of COMBO money; Charles Percy, Ill., \$32,498; Mark Hatfield, Ore., \$26,770; Pete Domenici, N.M., \$26,358; Roger Jepsen, Iowa, \$25,264; Rudy Bos-chwitz, Minn., \$24,667; James

Vote 'Yes' on Prop. 18

To the Editor:

California voters will cast their votes June 5 on the California Park and Recreation Facilities Act of 1984 (Proposition 18 on the Primary Election Ballot).

The State Park and Recreation

Commission endorsed this important measure at its May 11, 1984 meeting because there is a great demand for recreation in the state park system, especially in the state's major metropolitan centers where 84 percent of the people live. State and local park development has not kept up with this demand. As a result, there is a critical shortage of beach and ocean recreational opportunities and overnight camping areas. The Department of Parks and Recreation states that beaches in Southern California are filled to capacity by 9 a.m. on weekends from April through September. Many campers cannot get into our parks because of the crowding. Last summer the state park system's most popular campgrounds had to turn people away every night because they were full.

Proposition 18, if successful, will provide \$370 million for local and state parks. More than 80 percent of the bond funds for park purposes are slated for develoment of facilities, with acquisition of new parklands limited to land needed for operation of current parks. The Bond Act will go far toward allowing the state and local

agencies to keep pace, as the state's population increases by an estimated 6.8 million people in the next 20 years. It will mean additional campsites, trails, picnic areas, swimming pools, recreation centers. beaches, tennis courts, nature areas and much more.

Proposition 18 also includes expanded funding for preservation of local historical resources. For the first time in a state Park Bond Act, there is a specific amount for local historic preservation; historic projects can also be funded through Proposition 18's local and state park categories.

The cost to Californians is minimal about \$1.50 per California citizen each year for 20 years, or less than one-half cent per day each year.

In summary, Proposition 18 will provide funds to local and state agencies. These funds will mean recreation facilities for the use of the millions of people who need them at a cost to the people of the state of less than one-half cent per day. Construction of the facilities will provide jobs for thousands. Use of the facilities will result in revenue to state and local agenices, indirectly through tax payments and directly through user

congestion," and "speeds will actually decrease by almost 50 percent with the plan in place." Does Mr. Grossman think that the residents of Orange County are either so stupid or so naive as to believe that doing nothing will provide better freeway conditions, or that more traffic will move faster on fewer roads? That might be the case if there were no growth in the County, but even if the doors to the County were slammed shut, the population would increase by more than 400,000 in 15 years as a result of internal population growth

Only 10 percent of the Proposition A revenues would be used for County-wide special projects and 20 percent for transit systems, not 12 percent and 25 percent as Mr. Grossman erroneously states. He refers to these funding categories as "political slush funds" and states that 'over 1/3 of our tax revenues can be spent on undefined projects.'

Talk about misstatement and twisting of facts!! It is not "over 1/3 of our tax revenues," but 30 percentsof the tax increase which would be used for what is specifically defined as major improvements of County-wide significance. Mr. Grossman makes it sound like a cardinal sin to have "undefined projects" in a 15 year plan. Personally, I am glad that there is enough flexibility in the plan so that major funding is not irrevocably committed now to projects which may be shown to be impractical or uneconomical as time goes on.

If Mr. Grossman is dissatisfied with the integrity or judgement of our politicians in spending the Proposition A revenues, perhaps he should devote more of his efforts to changing politicians, or even running for office himself, rather than fighting the only reasonable solution to our traffic problems to have been developed within the last several years. Throwing the baby out with the bath water has never proven to be a good method of raising kids.

The folks who oppose Proposition A are also kidding themselves if they think that there is adequate money available for all necessary road improvements and that any shortfall can be funded by the revenues from local newspaper drives or the like. The present need to play catch-up on our transportation system is the price we must pay for doing nothing while Jerry Brown's appointee held up new freeway construction in the County for over 7 years. The monies now available from the State and the Federal Government are simply not enough to do the whole job.

he says that Proposition A is not needed since the \$8 billion which will be spent on road improvements without it will solve our problem. On the other hand, he says that the \$15 billion which will be spent with Proposition A "will be no solution." Are we to believe that twice as many improvements will provide only half the solution? Or are we to believe that it is the freeways themselves which cause congestion? (Which is something like saying that firemen cause

One of the things which irritates me most about the anti-Proposition A group is the fact that they propose no constructive alternate solutions. Proposition A is the result of a detailed evaluation of dozens of alternatives. It may not be perfect, but at least it is a step in the right direction. I might be a little more sympathetic to the anti-Proposition A people if they would take their head out of the sand and work actively on a better solution, rather than simply wishing that our traffic congestion problems would go away.

One of the biggest misconceptions which Proposition A opponents keep pushing is that only the developers will benefit. This is another misstatement of facts. Only 9 percent of Proposition A revenues will be spent in the southern portion of the county where new development is taking place, and that money will only cover one-third of the new freeway costs. The developers themselves will pay for two-thirds of the freeways in their newly developing areas and, as always, will pay for all of the local streets and roads. Can the Proposition A opponents name any other place in the Country where developers are willing to put their money where their mouth is and pay for freeways themselves? Let's face it, the developers are not so naive as to think that growth can be stopped, so they have built a business on it.

There is a saying that when a large group is faced with a problem, the members of the group should lead, follow, or get out of the way. Just from reading the newspapers, it appears that the anti-Proposition A folks are incapable of leading (if they had even a reasonable percentage of County residents supporting them, they would not have to beg for media time to air their views), unwilling to follow (they would rather throw stones at the proposed solution than develop a better one) and unable to get out of th way (it is hard to move with your head buried in the sand, which is where they have apparently been for seven

I strongly dislike extra taxes, but I dislike the traffic mess as well, and the facts tell me that Proposition A is the only logical solution.

From the 15th century 1848, squat, humpbacked Goree Island was a vital dispatching point for European Tens of slavetraders. thousands of slaves left Africa from Goree Island

The best-preserved relic of that era is a compact, reminder of one of modern fading rose-colored structure built by the Dutch more than two centuries ago to hold 150 to 200 slaves awaiting passage across the Atlantic.

The series of dank, ground-floor cells with narrow slits that allow a westward glimpse of the rolling, by thousands of tourists a year from Europe, North America and Africa.

. "Forus, for Africans, this is a shrine," said Joseph Ndiaye, the emphatic and energetic curator of the Old Slave House. "For black Americans, it's a pil-grimage to come here."

When crowds of tourists grow large enough, Ndiaye, 61, emerges from his small office that doubles as a

disturbing, 10-minute lecture about what he calls one of the greatest genocides mankind has ever known. The Old Slave House, he

says, was the smallest and last-built of dozens that were used on Goree Island, which was occupied alternately by the Portuguese, Dutch, British and French. (The others have been converted into homes or schools, or were razed.)

"Sometimes entire families were kept in this house, but they were kept apart, in cells reserved for men, women or children,' Ndiaye says. Unruly slaves were

forced into cells with ceilings so low they could not stand, he says. "All who left here left behind their African names. They went under serial numbers. Six million West African

slaves, he says, died from disease or maltreatment before reaching their desti-



Berlin Wall work a peek at Germany's

BERLIN - East German authorities have unintentionally provided a glimpse into the Nazi past by altering the Berlin Wall to reveal the grassy hill, partially hidden for 16 years, where Adolf Hitler's bunker lies.

Hitler and his long-time mistress, Eva Braun, committed suicide together in the bunker April 30, 1945, to escape capture by the Soviet army in the final days of the

Joseph Goebbels, Hitler's propaganda minister, took his life in the bunker shortly afterward.

The hill was almost blocked from view by part of the

Berlin Wall, erected by Communist authorities in 1961.

The wall actually has two parts — a solid barrier directly on the dividing line between East and West Berlin, and a thinner but equally high fence 600 to 900 feet inside East Berlin. Watchtowers, tank traps, fences and border

guards on patrol make the area between the walls a noman's-land

Recently, East German work crews began to put up a third wall in the no-man's-land near the famous Brandenburg Gate, a Berlin landmark. They also began dismantling a section of the inner wall which hid all but the

At the time, West German officials expressed concern that East Berlin was strengthening border fortifications. But the East German Foreign Ministry denied that the additional wall was part of the border, saying the work

was being done in line with "building projects" in East East German officials have declined to say what they

plan to build in an area that once was Germany's main

government district. But this reluctance to comment may have a lot to do with the area's Nazi past.

courtyard of the so-called old Reich Chancellery, whose Hitler was saluted by his Nazi storm troopers after becoming chancellor Jan. 30, 1933.

In 1938, Hitler ordered his chief architect, Albert Speer, to build a new marble chancellery adjoining the old

The new chancellery was completed in 1939 but stood for only six years. It was damaged by bombs during World War II and blown up in 1949 on orders of the Soviet occupation authorities.

Undamaged marble from the structure was transported to East Berlin's Treptow district to be used for a giant Soviet war memorial. Tons of earth covered what remained of the bunker.

Both the old and the new chancelleries were on Berlin's Wilhelmstrasse, the city's prewar equivalent of The bunker was built during World War II in the London's Downing Street and Quai d'Orsay in Paris.



SEARCY, Ark. (AP) — If you have the urge to visit Italy and earn university credit at the same time, Harding University has just the program for you. Harding's International

Study Program in Florence, Italy, begins its fourth year this year. Director Don Shackelford said the program had become so well established that the university had purchased a 16th-century villa just outside Florence.

Shackelford, 49, is a Harding alumnus himself. He came up with the idea after spending 10 years in Florence as a student at the

University of Florence and later as director of a Bible school there.

Students who sign up for the program stay in Florence for three months, taking courses in art, music, history, literature and biblical studies. Four days out of the week are spent in the classroom, Shackelford said. Students can use the remaining three days to go wherever they want.

Shackelford says Florence makes a good location for a study of the humanities. During the Renaissance, the city played host to the likes of Michaelangelo, Leonardo

da Vinci and Dante.

"The response has been great," Shackelford said, noting that the course is usually booked up months in advance. He said two professors from Harding accompanied the 30 students who went each semester. The professors

change with each group. The students take good advantage of their time overseas, Shackelford said. 'Last year, many of the students went to Berlin or Paris or Madrid on their weekends off. And sometimes they'll just stay after the semester is over to travel around some more."

Some float guests may relate more to the visual geological lesions of the Colorado Plateau, or to Indians who vanished mysteriously about 1200 A.D., leaving petroglyphs to arouse their curiosity. The 15-mile trip is offered daily, May through September, and can be arranged October through April with a five-person minimum. It begins with boarding the shuttle bus at 9 a.m. from John Wesley Powell Memorial Museum in Page, and returns there about 4:30 p.m.

Price of the trip, including lunch and shuttle bus, is \$41.95 for adults. Children under 12 pay half the adult fare and are required to wear life preservers while on the water. (Preservers are provided for all passengers by Wilderness River Adventures.)

Comic Tim Reid gets dramatic role

'I turned down a lot of pilots because I didn't want to be stuck in that role ...

LOS ANGELES — Tim Reid's background is comedy, but he has smoothly made the transition to his first dramatic role as the tough police detective on CBS" "Simon & Simon."

Reid was the outrageous and largerthan-life Venus Flytrap in "WKRP in Cincinnati" and was Robert Guillaume's brother on "Benson." He also did 13 weeks on "Teachers Only.

Now he is a no-nonsense cop named Downtown Brown on the series that stars Jameson Parker and Gerald McRaney

"This is my first recognized dra-matic role," says Reid, "although some of the shows on 'WRKP' that centered on my character were dramatic in nature. So when I got the opportunity to do 'Simon & Simon' I was jumping for joy. People could see that I could do more than just be a comic. I turned down a lot of pilots because. I didn't want to be stuck in that role as a comic.'

This is the first time someone has written a role for me and asked me if I would be interested in doing it. Philip DeGuerre, the creator and executive producer, felt my background wouldn't let me be a heavy. Because at times Downtown Brown has to be a heavy. So he looked at film from WKRP' and decided I could do it."

To get in shape for his role as the tough detective, Reid spent two months jogging, playing tennis and lifting weights. He added 20 pounds to his weight and 17 inches of muscle. "I wanted to look the part," he

explains. In his first episode the script called for Brown to throw a man out of a window, "After a few episodes," he says, "they realized I could be a heavy and decided to lighten up."

Reid is equally enthusiastic about his becoming a herbalist seven years ago. "I think it's had a tremendous amount to do with changing me as an individual, with slowing me down. It's opened my awareness to a more spiritual kind of living."

He and his wife, actress Daphne Maxwell, are building a new house that will have its own herb garden.

He was introduced to herbs "in a roundabout way" by his doctor, "I was having incipient stomach ulcers and he put me on a bland diet," he recalls. "He recommended herbs and spices to give it some taste. And it's my nature to really get into something. As I read, I found herbs have medicinal value and were the root of all medicine. My friends now call me the witch doctor."

He has recommended herbs and herbal teas to friends, but says, "I don't get carried away with it. Herbs can help you but some have harmful side effects."

Reid admits he has been a student of mysticism and ancient history for some time.

He and his wife wear wedding medallions that feature the yin and the yang. "It's a symbol for balance and union," he says. "That's why we used it." After a moment, he adds, "If I had the money I'd take off for a few years and study and then teach the mysticism of life and ancient cul-

In a moment he's talking about the show again. He says, "It's a light drama. Nobody takes it too seriously, We have a lot of fun. I find that I go home tired but happy, as opposed to going home full of stress."

He says, "I think the relationship between the Simon brothers and Brown is one of respect. 'I'll help you, you help me.' But he'll never let them violate the rules.

"We don't go in for the stereotype

stuff. You know, 'Listen, private eye, if you don't do this I'll have your badge! I don't want their badge. They're too valuable to me for getting around the rules."



phone company said. Dave Carroll, Pacific Bell area manager, said some Los Angeles firms will close down completely turing the two-week period of the games to cut down on work-related road congestion. He said he is encouraging persons to "attend" meetings via conference telephone calls and make business calls from

He also suggested personal computers be used to transfer information from home to office.

He said if people used these systems effectively, they could cash in on the estimated \$3.3 billion in sales revenue generated by the Games, to

be held July 28 through Aug. 11. He said such home-based business dealings will improve productivity and service, increase revenue and cut down on road congestion, leaving the freeways free for the approximately 625,000 out-of-town visitors expected for the Olympics.

He added that more than 300 miles of high-capacity laser-powered telèphone cables have been installed by the company in Southern California to accommodate heavy telephone use, TV image and data transmission

during the Games. Pacific Bell will conduct seminars through June 15 to teach costefficient ways to deal with busy signals and late-arriving workers. Carroll said the practices to be discussed at the seminar can be carried over after the Games to simplify at-home and in-office com-

LOS ANGELES - They played the Olympic theme often, the Olympic torch burned high above and outside they even simulated a typical day of traffic in anticipation of the 1984 Summer Games at the Col-

North Korea joins boycott

TOKYO (AP) - North Korea on Saturday became the 14th nation to join the Soviet-led boycott of the Los Angeles Olympics, citing concern for its athletes' safety and the failure to form a joint Olympic team with non-Communist rival South Korea.

Pyongyang's official Korean Central News Agency, monitored in Tokyo, carried a statement from the North Korean Olympic Committee which "Anti-Communist, anti-Socialist maneuvers are being committed open-ly in the United States with the approach of the 23rd Olympiad, contrary to our expectations."

The Soviet Union has said it is boycotting the Games because the U.S. government is encouraging anti-Communist organizations to harass athletes from Communist countries and coerce them into defecting. The United States has rejected the charges.

Track crown to Ducks

Florida State captures women's title in NCAA meet

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Joaquim Cruz, a durable middle-distance runner, led Oregon to its first outright men's title in 20 years in the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Cham-pionships, while sprinter Randy Givens sparked Florida State to the women's crown Saturday.

The powerful Cruz, a sophomore, added the 1,500-meter title to the 800championship he had won Friday night with a victory in 3 minutes, 36.48 seconds, the fourth time this year he has broken his personal best and a Brazilian record.

The victory was the first by an-Oregon runner in the NCAA 1,500 since Dyrol Burleson won the event for the third straight time in 1962. The Ducks' only other NCAA 1,500 winner was Bill Dellinger, now the Oregon coach, in 1954.

Cruz, the first to complete the 800-1,500 double in the NCAA Championships since Villanova's Don Paige in 1979 and only the fourth such double in meet history, went to the front immediately and never was seriously challenged.

Villanova's Marcus O'Sullivan finished second in 3:37.40, and Dub Myers of Oregon rallied to place third in 3:38,94.

"I needed to run in front and I tried to kill them (the other runners) off in the first lap because I knew there were some runners with strong kicks," said Cruz, "If I killed them off early, I didn't think I would have that much trouble."

The 1-3 finish gave Oregon 25 points in the event and pulled the Ducks safely ahead of Washington State, the Pac-10 Conference champion and NCAA favorite. Before the 1,500, Oregon had a precarious 76-741/2 advantage over the Cougars. Washington State's only entrant in the 1,500, Omar Ortega, finished last in the 14-man field and did not score.

Oregon, in winning its fifth NCAA title, compiled 113 points in the 21 events contested over six days. The Ducks won the title outright in 1962 and 1964, shared the crown with Southern California in 1965, and tied

Real estate's delayed trade facing revision

A number of proposals have been made in recent weeks to restrict an increasingly popular form of real estate transaction - the delayed

Briefly, delayed exchanging offers favorable tax treatment for those who exchange investment

Although the technique is not recognized officially by the Internal Revenue Service, it has been successfully used, and upheld in the courts. Here's how it works:

One party deeds out his property in exchange for a yet-to-be-located property, which must be of like-kind.

At some future date, the replacement property is located, and the exchange is completed.

Only at this point can the tax consequences of the transaction be assessed. For reasons beyond the scope of this article, the taxes payable on the transaction range from none to much less than if it had been a straight sale.

Currently, the period in which the replacement of like-kind property can be located has not been defined. In a landmark 1979 case, two years was taken to locate the replacement property.

Now the Reagan administration has come up with a recommendation to limit the time allowed for completion of a delayed exchange to 90 days.

Congress has countered with a proposal for a 180-day limit, while a third proposal - from the Senate Finance Committee - would disallow exchange treatment to any transaction where the replacement property is not identified at the time

the first property is deeded out.
Officially, IRS disavows non-simultaneous exchanges. Thus, there are no official forms for reporting delayed exchanges.

By contrast, the IRS provides a form in which

taxpayers can enter the date of sale of their former residence, and allows a 24-month replacement period before tax consequences are determined.

Exchange experts feel the Reagan proposal for a 90-day limit on delayed exchanges is too harsh, and would kill most deals at birth.

The longer, six-month period is felt to make better sense, but would still call for risky scrambles to complete deals on time.

Why impose a limit at all? The administration and Congress cite "administrative problems" as the reason for their proposals.

Exchangers may welcome the setting of limits for one reason. By enacting either proposal, Congress would legitimize the delayed exchange, presumably much to the consternation of the IRS.







Nonresidential construction surges to fore

As housing starts begin to fade, building industry moves to adju NEW YORK, N.Y. - Contracts for new co

struction edged up a seasonally adjusted 1 perce in April, according to the F. W. Dodge division McGraw-Hill Information Systems Co.

Through the first four months of 1984, t value of all new construction started was \$63 billion, a gain of 15 percent over the same period

April's \$17.4 billion of newly-started constru tion revealed modest gains in housing a commercial/industrial building, which were large offset by a decline of public works construction. a consequence, the seasonally adjusted Dod Index advanced only one percentage point to 1 (It was 100 in 1977). The Dodge Index, which is t advance indicator of on-site requirements building products and labor, has been drifti sideways in the 140 to 150 range for the past twe

"In April, the construction market was aga unable to break through the 150 ceiling which reached a year ago, and rising interest rates v make it still tougher to do in the future commented George A. Christie, vice president a chief economist for F. W. Dodge.

'After a strong recovery, followed by a year high level output which was concentrated heavily the housing sector, the building industry is no depending on nonresidential markets to susta volume as housing starts begin to fade," the Dod economist said. "Prospects for a trade-off between housing and commercial/industrial building a good for the near future."

April contracts for nonresidential build totaled \$5.4 billion, advancing one percent af adjustment for seasonality Commercial and Indu trial building rose 12 percent in the latest mon largely on the strength of another surge of off projects. Meanwhile, institutional buildi (schools, hospitals, public administration bui ings, etc.) fell sharply to its lowest rate in over

According to Christie, "The office build boom, which reached its peak in 1981 as a sunb phenomenon, is now being sustained in the mo traditional commercial centers. Boston, New Yo and Chicago - each with a major new start in A - headed the latest month's list of projects."

Residential building, as tabulated by F. Dodge, remained at variance with the Comme Department measure of housing activity, w Dodge reporting a seasonally adjusted rate of 1 million dwelling units in April vs. Commerce's 1 million. Both sources indicate an average leve homebuilding at close to 1.8 million units dur March and April, but Dodge data show building both months at a steady level, in contrast to decline/rebound pattern of the Governm statistics. Most of the variance results fr different methods of seasonal adjustment, it v explained.

The value of newly-started residential buildi at \$9.3 billion in April, was up a seasonally adjus 3 percent from March. Multi-family building gair in the latest month, while one-family hous declined. Contracting for hotels/motels rose sha ly in April, due to the start of a \$90 million project

Contracting for nonbuilding construction, \$2.7 billion in April, declined 11 percent at seasonal adjustment.

NBC whistling past graveyard?

Affiliates assured new series will make peacock proud again

Imagine you're-an executive from the one of the 209 NBC-affiliated stations across the country.

Sure, NBC has picked up a wagonload of Emmys and critical kudos the past few years for shows like "Hill Street Blues," "Cheers" and "St. Elsewhere."

But where it really counts — in the Nielsen ratings — NBC has remained mired in third place behind CBS and ABC for nine consecutive years. Emmys are fine for a network's prestige, but ratings

for a network's prestige, but ratings determine how much a show can charge for advertising and thus are crucial to the profit picture.

So as a station executive, you might have attended NBC's annual affliates convention last month with low expectations.

But what you heard was a sunny prediction that next year will be the season when NBC finally climbs out of the cellar.

Affiliates conventions give local stations executives a chance to meet the network brass and some TV stars. The network also provides a sneak preview of the new programs planned for next fall. NBC's convention was held at the Century Plaza Hotel in Los Angeles.

Addressing the affiliate representatives, NBC Board Chairman Grant Tinker focused on entertainment programming "because it's the first time I've been able to get up here with real optimism. It may seem like an odd time — given the Nielsen results of this season — to be so upbeat, but

Tinker admitted the network made some pretty poor choices for new series last fall. Not one of the fall 1983 entries was renewed.

"Just when we were gathering speed through last spring and summer, we ran smack into a wall, a wall of our own

making," he said.

But Tinker said NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff and his staff have made "some solid course corrections." Regarding the coming year, Tinker said, "...Finally, we will enjoy, all of us, the kind of season that's been much too long in

Programming chief Tartikoff said the 14½ hours of returning NBC prime-time shows had an average rating higher than the network's returning programs last year. He then gave the affiliates a night-by-night rundown of NBC's strategy for climbing out third place:

MONDAY: The network is sticking with "TV's Bloopers and Practical Jokes," a midseason entry that has garnered high ratings. NBC will battle ABC's football

broadcasts and CBS' late Monday night series ("Kate and Allie," "Newhart" and "Cagney and Lacey") with its Monday night movies. Tartikoff promised more made-for-TV movies and miniseries in this slot.

TUESDAY: This has been NBC's strongest night, and the network doesn't plan to change a thing. It starts with "The A-Team," proceeds to the popular midseason entry "Riptide" and concludes with "Remington Steele." The Steele series will open in the fall with four episodes filmed in Europe

WEDNESDAY: To do battle against Lee Majors' popular "Fall Guy" series on ABC, NBC will send Michael Landon, who has proved equally popular in "Bonanza" and "Little House on the Prairie." Landon will portray an angel assigned to help troubled folks on Earth. Tartikoff called this "a breakthrough show" that will help NBC improve its ratings over "The Fall Guy." (CBS will air two new sitcoms in this time period.)

At 9 p.m., "The Facts of Life" returns, followed by a "compatible" new sitcom, "It's Your Move." This one stars Jason Bateman as a conniving young man who matches wits with his mother's boyfriend. At 10 p.m., the network expects continued improvement from "St. Elsewhere."

THURSDAY: Tartikoff acknowledged the network has had some problems on this night. (The major one is a powerhouse CBS lineup of "Magnum," "Simon and Simon" and "Knots Landing.") NBC hopes to snare more viewers by opening with a new sitcom, "The Bill Cosby Show." Cosby portrays a New York doctor who also has to cope with family problems. This will lead in to the returning "Family Ties," providing what Tartikoff called a one-hour "nuclear family block."

"Cheers," returning at 9 p.m. will be paired with "Night Court," a sitcom introduced at midseason. Then, to fight the eroding audience for "Hill Street Blues," the series will air more new episodes and begin them earlier in the season.

FRIDAY: This has been a terrible night for NBC — two different lineups last season failed to make a dent. Tartikoff said the network plans to begin the night next fall with its "trump card." That's "V," a weekly spinoff from two highly successful miniseries. Tartikoff expects it to win viewers away from "The Dukes of Hazzard" and "Benson."

Against CBS' dynamic soap duo, "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest," NBC will launch two new action-adventure police series. "Hunter" features a detective from the "Dirty Harry" mold, portrayed by exfootball star Fred Dryer. It's followed by "Miami Vice," another police show with a "Hill Street Blues" flavor and music video influence.

SATURDAY: Tartikoff hopes for a strong opening with the returning sitcoms, "Diff rent Strokes" and "Gimme a Break."


"Imagine having all that 4 Sunday, June 3, 1984 money - and never even

Then the network plays its "wild card," the new series "Partners in Crime," featuring two popular actresses, Loni Anderson and Lynda Carter. Tartikoff believes this detective series will win viewers from "The Love Boat" on ABC and "Mike Hammer"

All three networks have scheduled new programs at 10 p.m. NBC hopes "Hot Pursuit," a husband and wife variation on the old "Fugitive" series, will prove more popular than CBS' "Cover Up" and ABC's Finder of Lost Loves."

SUNDAY: CBS' "60 Minutes" has had a virtually unbreakable hold on the 7-8 p.m. slot. NBC had no luck last year throwing a rival news magazine, "First Camera," against it. Next fall, the network will try again with two sitcoms aimed at attracting

kids — and perhaps their parents.
"Silver Spoons" begins the night. At 7:30, the network will introduce "Punky Brewster," featuring a cute 7-year-old actress in the title role. The series concerns an abandoned girl who warms the heart of a crusty apartment manager played by George Gaynes of "Tootsie" and "Police Academy."

The network also expects the popularity of "Knight Rider" to grow, leading to a higher audience for NBC's Sunday Night Movie. Tartikoff predicted the movie will make inroads against a weakening CBS lineup of "The Jeffersons," "Alice" and 'Trapper John.'

Perhaps, these optimistic predictions came as no surprise to NBC's affiliate representatives. And it's a safe bet that CBS and ABC executives made equally rosy forecasts to their affiliates.

But as always, the real hits and misses won't be known until the mighty Nielsen ratings are delivered next fall.

TV TIDBITS: Actor-comedian Richard Pryor will host "Pryor's Place," a new liveaction comedy series for children that is set to debut at 10 a.m. on Saturday, Sept. 15 on CBS. 



COULD JEAN HARRIS BE INNOCENT?

BY THOMAS T. NOGUCHI, M.D. WITH JOSEPH DIMONA

When the jury handed down its verdict of guilty three years ago in the trial of Jean Hamis, it seemed to be the final chapter in a murder mystery that had made headlines for months. But now one man is saying that the book should not be closed. He is Dr. Thomas T. Noguchi, who for 15 years was the controversial chief medical examiner for Los Angeles, supervising the investigations of such cases as the deaths of Manlyn Monroe, Robert F. Kennedy, Natalie Wood and John Belushi. In this exclusive report, Noguchi, currently chairman of the National Association of Medical Examiners, and author of the recently published book Coroner gives the reasons why he feels justice may not have been served.

n the early afternoon of March 10, 1980, Jean Harris, headmistress of Virginia's posh Madiera School, drew up her will and had it witnessed and notarized. Then, on a chair in her living room, she left several notes, one asking that her body be cremated. When later that day she began a drive north to Purchase, N.Y., to see her lover, Dr. Herman Tarnower, she clearly expected that she would not come back alive.

Tarnower's house was dark as Jean Harris stood in the driveway five hours later at about 10:30 p.m., looking up at his bedroom window. Harris's romance with Tarnower, author of the best-selling *The Complete Scarsdale Medical Diet*, had lasted more than 14 years. But now the 56-year-old Harris was being pushed aside by a younger woman, Lynne Tryforos. Rejected, Jean Harris was in despair. She was also feels

Haldeman, of The Ends of Power and, with Naguchi, of Coroner (Simon & Schuster) ing pressure from her school's board of directors, and felt, in her words, that she was no longer a human being, that she had become a "person sitting in an empty chair."

She decided, she says, to commit suicide. But first she had to say farewell to the one person who had brightened her life for so many years, Herman Tarnower. She entered the house through the garage and climbed up a spiral staircase in the dark to his bedroom. The events that subsequently exploded became the climax of a mystery story that would hypnotize the nation. On Feb. 25, 1981, Jean Harris was convicted of second-degree murder and sentenced to a minimum of 15 years to life in prison. She is now in the Bedford Hills (N.Y.) Correctional Facility.

But did Harris, as the prosecution contended, deliberately use the weapon to kill Tarnower? Or did she, as she claimed, attempt to commit suicide in that room, only to have the doctor seize her gun as it fired?

I became interested in the Jean Harris case recently when I was on a nationwide TV tour for my book. Time and again, interviewers and on-the-air callers would ask me if I had formed any opinion on the Harris mystery.

Out of curiosity, I decided to do some

extensive reading on her case when I returned to Los Angeles. After I finished, I knew that it was my mission to continue with my investigation. As chief medical examiner of Los Angeles County, I had a lifetime of experience in analyzing forensic evidence, which includes everything from blood stains to nitrite (gunpowder) residue to bullet tracks to ballistics.

The scenario drawn by the prosecution contains a major flaw right at its core.

My preliminary review of the forensic evidence given at the trial indicates that Jean Harris is probably not guilty of murder. I believe the jury did not really comprehend the evidence, and that a miscarriage of justice may have occurred. In this article I will reexamine some of the evidence and discuss its meaning.

During the trial the prosecution denied over and over again that the gun was fired during a struggle, as Jean Harris claimed. They had to do this because, if a struggle had occurred, the question of control of the gun, as well as Harris's intent when she pulled the trigger, would have become important. If Harris was pointing the weapon at herself, and the victim seized it and diverted the muzzle as she was firing, then it was not murder. Though the existence of a struggle would hardly prove her innocence, it would raise serious and disturbing questions about the prosecution's version of what happened that night.

All the forensic data (and all my experience as a medical examiner) tell me there was such a struggle as Harris described. The gun was moving. Further, all the bullet tracks in the body were at different angles. And, finally, as happens in a close struggle for control of a gun, the bullets that did hit were all bunched in one area of Tarnower's body.

And yet, the prosecution's summation to the jury described a deliberate murder without a struggle. It included these vivid phrases:

"She confronts the doctor. She gets the gun. She is in control now. She has power....The doctor....[is] seated on his bed....The defendant [points her gun] and shoots it....The bullet goes through Herman Tarnower's outstretched [right] hand and enters his chest."

According to the prosecution's scenario, Harris shot him a second time; in the shoulder, as he lunged toward her. Falling back, he brushed the gun, causing her to fire a third bullet into the cabinet. He recovered, went to the bathroom, and when he returned, pushed Harris onto the bed, causing her to fire another wild bullet. Finally, as he telephoned his house-keeper, Harris shot him once again, in the arm, and he collapsed.

This version of the events strained so hard to accommodate the contrary evidence that the judge rebuked the prosecutor at one point. ("I think we are getting fairly far away from the evidence now.") My own analysis not only indicates that the scenario drawn by the prosecution is inaccurate, but also shows that it contains a major flaw right at its core. That flaw eoncerns Tarnower's strange visit to the bathroom.

According to the prosecution, the shot that went through Tarnower's hand entered his chest, fracturing the right collarbone, cutting a major vein to the heart, and piercing the lung. The

second shot was even more devastating, traversing the body from the shoulder downward for 17 inches, fractional fractions and the diaphragm, and tearing into the right kidney. Massive internal hemorrhaging followed. According to the deputy medical examiner, the wound meant that Tarnower passed into inveversible shock within 15 minutes, then death occurred.

And yet, according to the prosecution, after sustaining these catastrophic wounds, Tarnower walked to the bathroom, examined his injuries, then returned to the bedroom and telephoned the housekeeper. I don't believe a victim could have crawled such a distance, let alone walked, while so near death.

Further, if Jean Harris was a murderess intending to kill, why did she allow Tarnower to walk, untouched, to the bathroom?

If Tarnower was at this point in time

shot in three places — the hand, the chest, and the shoulder — there should be three separate trails of blood on the carpet that was between the bed and the bathroom, and three returning: a total of six individual — and identifiable — trails.

Jean Harris testified that the

bathroom visit occurred after Tarnower was accidentally shot in the hand with her first should be gun which she says she had pointed at her head. In that case, there should be only one trail of blood each way. Police photographs of the area should be re-

examined.

Tarnower's blood reveals another flaw in the prosecution's theory. So much of his blood was on the gun that it seeped into the inner mechanism, and drops of it were found inside the cylinder. Such an abundant amount of blood is important because it means that Tarnower did not just brush aside the gun on one occasion, as the prosecution claimed, but gripped the weapon in a struggle as Harris testified.

The prosecution alleged that Jean Harris shot Tarnower for the last time as he telephoned the housekeeper, shattering the humerus bone of his upper right arm. But my analysis of the bullet track of the wound — from reading the testimony about the official autopsy — disputes this; the track runs upward and from right to left. This angle is consistent with a shot during a struggle, with Tarnower's body above her — not a shot by her from a standing position, which would have caused a downward angle.

Also, when Harris was physically examined after her arrest, bruises were found on the inside of her upper left arm. Such bruises on the gun arm almost always indicate a struggle.

The defense's version of events, which described the battle for the weapon, indicates that the first shot occurred when Harris placed the gun to her temple and Tarnower grabbed it. The shot went through his hand, then out a glass door. Farnower walked to the bathroom to examine the wound, and when he returned, he retrieved the

(2,3,4) were fired. Harris then stood up, placed the gun to her temple, and squeezed the trigger. The fifth bullet chamber was empty. She aimed the

All the forensic evidence - the two wild shots, the different and the locawild shots, the different angles of the body, the upward angle of the arm

shot. Tarnower's blood inside the gun cylinder, the bruises on Harris's inside upper left arm - support the truth of

Harris's story.

So why was she charged with murder? I believe the prosecution may have been mesmerized by the fact that Harris could not remember firing three shots in the struggle on the bed, only one. Therefore they honestly believed she was lying, and sought to interpret the forensic evidence to fit a story of their own. However, the only such evidence on their side concerned the shot in the hand.

And also, the prosecution developed a scenario of deliberate murder in its description of that first shot: Tarnower with outstretched hand, and Harris, a killer, deliberately firing right through the hand into his chest. For evidence, they said the entrance wound in the chest was cylindrical, not round, indicating to them that the bullet was "tumbling" after going through the hand. Also, there was no powder residue around that wound, supporting their theory of an intervening object. the hand.


The tragedy for Mrs. Harris was, I believe, that this evidence was not analyzed correctly by the prosecution.

First, the very location of the wound tends to disprove the prosecution's theory of an outstretched hand. The bullet passed through the fleshy area of the skin between the thumb and the index finger. In a struggle, this is one of the most common locations for a hand wound. The victim grasps the muzzle to push the gun away, it fires, and the bullet goes through that fleshy area of the semi-closed fist as it slips off.

To me, the wound's location indicates that Tarnower's right hand was almost certainly on the gun. But I believe the prosecution version was wrong for another reason. From my experience I've learned that right-handed men (as I'm told Dr. Tarnower was) do not throw up their right arm to ward off danger. Instinctively, they put up their left arm, reserving their stronger arm for further use.

As to the chest wound, almost all medical examiners know from experience why the entrance hole would appear cylindrical, not round. The deputy medical examiner testified that Tarnower was "bent over" when this shotstruck him. In such cases, when the body is laid out on the autopsy table later, the skin is stretched, and the round hole that had been made by the bullet when the individual was bent over now appears cylindrical in shape.

The absence of nitrite residue around the wound is even easier to ex-(continued on page 9)

plain. At a distance beyond 15 inches, gunpowder residue is often absent from wounds. When Tarnower was struggling with Harris for possession of the gun, his body was more than 15 inches away from the weapon when that shot was fired.

This is more than speculation. I recreated the struggle recently, based on the nitrite residue evidence. I believe I now know the exact sequence

of shots in that battle on the bed, which took place after the doctor was shot in the hand and had returned from the bathroom. The first shot in the sequence (no residue) struck Tarnower's chest as he seized the gun. As he began to collapse, the second shot (some residue, indicating the muzzle was closer) struck his arm, upward and right to left. The third shot (more residue, indicating the muzzle was even nearer) traversed his shoulder as he fell upon Harris.

Nevertheless, a glaring gap in Harris's story hypnotized everyone not only the prosecution, but also, I believe, millions of Americans in-terested in the case. Why could Jean Harris remember only one shot in that struggle on the bed, but not the next two? Didn't that mean she was lying?

For expert advice on this subject 1 consulted Dr. Robert E. Litman, codirector and chief psychiatrist of the famed Suicide Prevention Center in Los Angeles. I don't believe anyone in this nation knows more about the psychology and circumstances of potential suicides than Dr. Litman, whom I first worked with in 1962 on the Marilyn Monroe case.

I asked him two key questions: Why were there multiple shots if this was an attempted suicide? And is it possible Jean Harris could not remember two of those shots?

Dr. Litman's experience encompassed both phenomena. As for the multiple shots, he said that sometimes a person's attempt at suicide fails because the gun misfires, or he pulls it away at the last minute. Almost always the individual pulls the trigger again until he, or she, gets it right.

In Harris's case, she remembers the muzzle at her stomach. She fired - but nothing happened. Impulsively, she could have pulled the trigger again, As to a lack of memory of certain

shots, this is even more common, Dr. Litman said. In this particular case, Jean Harris expected the first gunshot

to be latal. Ir was not. Her mind ceased to function as shock and excitement overwhelmed her senses, and all she recalls is that first shot which should have brought her death.

And the rest of her story, detail by detail, matches the forensic truth while the prosecution's version does not. That's why I believe a miscarriage of justice may have been done. FW



osalynn Carter has never been one to turn down a challenge. Back when her husband, Jimmy, was a peanut farmer in Plains, Ga., Rosalynn ran the financial end of the business, and later she campaigned vigorously during his races for the governorship of Georgia and the presidency. But she faced her greatest test when Jimmy Carter became the 39th president of the United States in 1976. Dubbed the "steel magnolia" by the press, Rosalynn was occasionally criticized for sitting in on Cabinet meetings and having too much influence over the chief executive. But she was also lauded for her political savvy. After returning to private life, Rosalynn, now 56, began writing her memoir, First Lady From Plains (Houghton Mifflin), which has just been published. She candidly discussed her views with FAMILY WEEKLY Associate Editor Mary Ellin Bruns.

Bruns: What do you miss the most about politics?

Carter: I think the people. You get so close to people during a campaign. It doesn't matter who they are - you love them. And I miss the intrigue. I couldn't stand for the New Hampshire primary to go by without me.

Q: Do you feel bitter?

Carter: I never felt bitter toward the American people. I thought they ought to know how brave Jimmy was . . . ! really believe Jimmy suffered because of his strength rather than his weakness. He could have given in to pressure. I believe if we had bombed Teheran he would have been reelected, because people like you to be macho. It takes a lot of discipline and a lot of courage not to do something that you're being pressured to do.

Q: You and the president used to hold hands in public. How have you managed to stay so close?

Carter: It started with each of us being very independent and respecting each other for it. Holding hands is something I never even noticed. I mean, it just comes naturally.

Q: Does being in the White House put stress on a marriage?

Carter: If I had been at home, bored to death, while Jimmy was out campaigning, I think I would really have resented it. But I never felt like that because I was always a part of his activities.

Q: How did your daughter Amy react to leaving Washington?

Carter: She was heartbroken when she had to leave all her friends. But now she's at boarding school in Atlanta, and she loves it. I'm proud of her. I think she's a well-adjusted child.

Q: Was it difficult for you to deal with criticism?

Carter: People thought I should have been really upset about being called a "steel magnolia." Well, steel is tough and magnolia is genteel and Southern. What's so bad about that?

Q: How much influence did you really have?

Carter: I went to Cabinet meetings, Jimmy didn't want to have me screaming at him in private: "Why did you do this? Why didn't you do that?" He just said, "Come to the Cabinet meetings, and you'll see." It was so ridiculous when people started saying, "She's helping make decisions." When I gave advice it was usually if I thought something was going to hurt him politically. I was not involved in other types of decisions. I had no input except to just talk to him about issues.

Q: If you disagreed with him would you hide your feelings?

Carter: Oh no, we argued. We argued about things like capital punishment. We still do because I am against it, and he's for it. We talk about all these things at the dinner table.

Q: It's been said that the Carter administration was a failure. What do you think?

Carter: I think that my husband was a great leader. It's easy to be a leader when the things that you're doing are popular. But when your actions are unpopular, like an energy program, it is very difficult to be a leader. But look how the whole attitude toward energy changed under Jimmy Carter's administration. Our country was beginning to stand, under Jimmy's leadership, for what was right in the eyes of the world. That has totally changed now. We're a big bully again with big military might, and that's not respected in the world. I never brooded about Jimmy losing, but I was sorry, because he was a great president - history will show that. PW





EALING WITH SINESS MEALS

here are three ways to close a deal," one successful business exec is supposed to have said. 'Breakfast, lunch and dinner.' There are also at least three good ways to put on unneeded pounds: breakfast, lunch and dinner. So what do you do to keep the pounds away if part of your business is business lunches? To get the skinny on staying trim while inking the big deal, we talked to Covert Bailey, author of the recent Fit-or-Fat Target Diet (Houghton Mifflin).

To start, skip anything that is called a "dieter's plate." It's usually something like ground sirloin and cottage cheese, which usually "adds up to 730 calories and is 70 percent fat.

Bailey's second course of advice concerns condiments. Or the lack thereof. Order everything "dry." No butter or mayonnaise on sandwiches, no sauces on the entrees, no dressings on the salads. Or, if you absolutely must dress your dish, do it lightly. Try a little hot milk or mustard instead of sour cream to moisten a baked potato. And instead of putting fattening creamy dressings on your salad, you can order oil and vinegar or just plain lemon juice.

Drink lite, Bailey continues. Have a light beer or a glass of wine instead of liquor. If you do order a cocktail, add bottled water or soda water to reduce the calorie count per ounce. As for dessert, forget it. The best way to finish off the meal is with a cup of coffee (no cream) and your signature on the bottom of the check.



A FAIR OF THE HEART

Day, Paul McCartney, Stevie Nicks, and even Lawrence Welk renting booths in a sprawling convention center, and manning the counters several hours each day for more than a week — just to show how much they appreciate their fans. For \$55 apiece, visitors receive more than 24 hours of concerts, meals, tickets to athletic exhibitions and — probably the most important attraction — the chance to reach out and touch (sometimes even hug and kiss) the singers and pickers they idolize. Here's a partial list of exhibitors who've attended the event; Willie Nelson, Conway Twitty, Janie Fricke, Crystal Gayle, Ricky Skaggs, Lee Greenwood, Johnny Cash, Tom T. Hall, Merle Haggard, Loretta Lynn and Hank Williams Jr.

Why do the stars do it? Conway Twitty has a straightforward explanation.

"It's like any other relationship." he





dle of adoring audiences when her recording career took off, and quickly understood the obligation she had to them.

When I'm up there on the stage I'm always saying thank you for your support - because I wouldn't be there without it," says Fricke. "And because of the kind of songs I sing, the storytelling songs about people's lives, there's a great deal of deep-feeling contact with the audience, physically, too. I lean over and touch fingers or go into the audience and we hug and dance."

Jeff Cook of the group Alabama ex-plains that, as far as he's concerned, Fan Fair and the work it entails isn't that much out of the ordinary. "At every concert we give, if crowd control and security are adequate, we'll sign autographs afterward. So for us, Fan Fair is just an extension of that.'

California-born Lee Greenwood, the Country Music Association's hottest young male singer, considers appearing at events like Fan Fair and performing at benefits part of everyday business.

"I'll do them for as long as people want to see me." He pauses, and then talks more California than Alabama. "I get spiritual growth out of the relationship with my fans. I want to give them an image they can look up to. I don't drink, I don't smoke, I don't do drugs."

It seems that country stars have nothing but praise for their followers. "I helped start Fan Fair," says Loretta Lynn, "when so many fans began showing up for an annual event we had in November in Nashville [for out of town dee-jays] that we couldn't tell them from the radio people...We separated the fans from the dee-jays by giving them their own event in June.

Loretta recounts how at one Fan Fair she made it clear just how ordinary she herself is. She became so caught up in the spirit of the event that she walked out in front of the TV cameras at an awards ceremony with pink plastic curlers in her hair. "The fans loved that: Country fans got more soul. They feel every song we sing is for them . . . !

love those people."

Country music enthusiasts are not only willing to demonstrate their feelings for their idols by attending Fan Fair; they're willing to back those feelings with cash. And nowhere is this more apparent than on the northern border of Nashville's "Music City," the guitar ghetto where most of country music's recording studios and record company offices stand. Along this halfblock strip sit such emporiums as Conway Twitty's in-town souvenir shop, Barbara Mandrell's One Hour Photo, and Hank Williams Jr.'s General Store.

As one van full of tourists drives off, another pulls up. Out of the van spill farmers from lowa, who will buy "Hello Darlin" trucker caps, satin Conway jackets, key chains and plastic gewgaws. Conway is more than a star to



t had to happen sooner or later. First in transportable music there was the transistor radio, which you held next to your ear. Then came the Walkman, which you slipped on over your ears. And now, let's hear it for what may be the smallest radio ever sold: The Out-a Site, which fits right into your ear.

Curtis Technologies Inc., of North Salt Lake, Utah, developed the wee wireless, which is powered by a watch battery. The Out-a Site only picks up AM radio signals now, but is being fine-tuned to receive all kinds of public broadcasts, including citizen's band signals.


