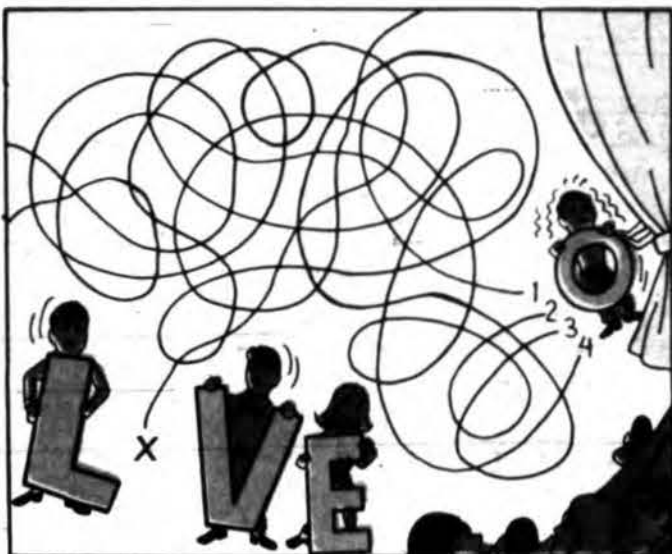

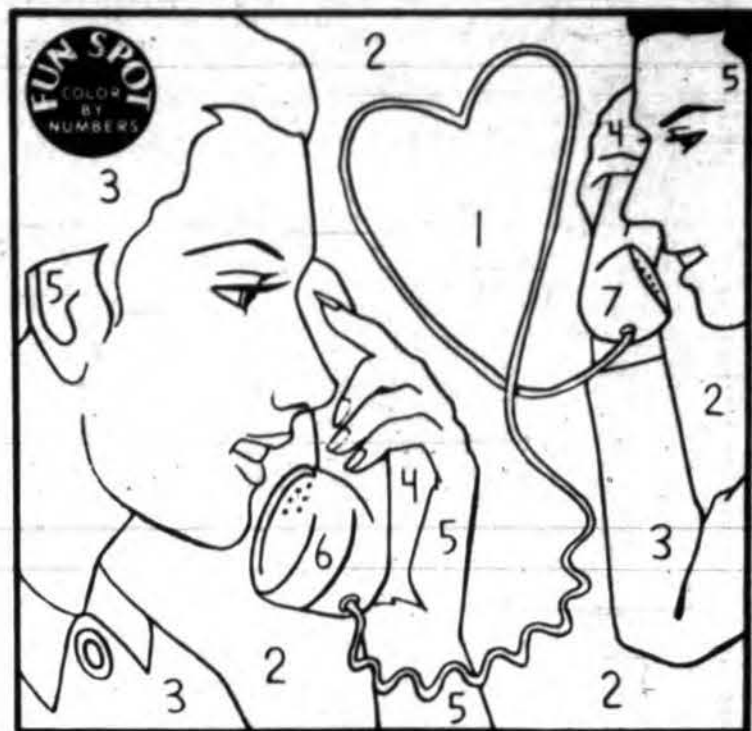

Being a TV cop does have its advantages, as **Betty Thomas** found out on a recent trip to Washington, D.C. The actress, who plays Sergeant Lucy Bates on the acclaimed series *Hill Street Blues*, was desperately trying to flag down a cab outside the posh Madison Hotel just as a large group of Venezuelan diplomats was arriving. "Hill Street... Hill Street," chanted the star-struck South Americans, quickly surrounding Thomas. Just in time, one of D.C.'s own men in blue appeared. "Lucy," he said. "What can I do for you?" Thomas laughed and explained that she was late for a talk-show interview. In less time than it takes to write a parking ticket, the cop ran to the corner, flagged down a taxi, and held the door open for his esteemed colleague. Could Joe Coffey have done any better?

Former Bolshoi Ballet star **Alexander Godunov** seems to have it good enough. His companion for the last three years has been the delectable actress **Jacqueline Bisset**, and he himself

has just made the leap to movies: His first film, *Witness*, starring **Harrison Ford**, will be released next month. But though Godunov, who defected from the Soviet Union in 1979, would like to make more films — no, he and Jackie haven't any immediate plans to collaborate

on a project — his dancing days are not yet over. "It depends on the role, but a male dancer has until his 40s," calculates Godunov, 36. "After that, you lose your jump, your energy. You know from the beginning that if you're lucky, you'll have a 20- or 25-year career. I think I'll be all right. I'm thinking I'll not cry to death when it's over."

While some actors wear their roles from 9 to 5, others, like **Scott Glenn**, take the part home. "It can be hard on family and friends,"

acknowledges Glenn, who stars with **Sissy Spacek** and **Mel Gibson** in *The River*. "My wife, **Carol**, and my kids came to spend two months with me in Houston when I was shooting *Urban Cowboy*, and they ended up staying only five days. Carol hated the character I play so much she had to leave. 'Look, I love you,' she told me. 'But I can't stand that s.o.b. See you back home!'"

Fortunately for the Glens' marriage, Carol liked Scott's character in *The River*. "He's a con man, a charmer, a manipulator, but he likes people," says Glenn. "This time it's been easy for her." Let's just hope no one ever hires Glenn to

LOVE IS ALL YOU NEED

When I was 15, deep in salt-air, summertime California, I had the strangest feeling that there was a dear ghost who kept me in sight, somebody invisible who floated nearby and liked me a lot.

I didn't have a name for it; I never spoke of it to anyone. It was a mirage that drifted just on the edge of knowing, and it disappeared when I had to study fractions or clean my room or mow the lawn.

That warm spirit didn't have the power to stop trolley cars or Packard sedans, or to catch me if I decided to step off the roof. It hovered there because it had something terribly important to tell me. Since it didn't speak in words, though — and since I had forgotten how to listen to anything but — the wraith and I didn't have a very talky friendship.

The friendship that I yearned for then was with a mystical young woman, a dream I had never met. There must exist another half to me, I thought, a loving soul mate, and knowing her would transform my life into everything it was meant to be. That I was impossibly shy, that I would dissolve, dumbstruck, if she appeared and said hello, never stopped me from hoping she might be true.

Somewhere about that time I learned that ghosts don't exist, and neither do soul mates. Dig them their graves, cover them over, and grow up. I went on about my business, which I took to be history and social studies and algebra. But then in the midst of these important new learnings, the ghost struck one last time, hard, with a hammer of light.

The spirit that I had buried had been granted the power to speak, one time only: *Your soul mate, Richard: She lives!*

Was it Valentine's Day, long ago? For the space of 10 seconds I was swept into blinding joy. Then the light faded and the spirit was gone, not bothering to mention, as it left, that I'd have to survive on those words through the desert of the next 25 years.

I believed what it had said, filed it safely away, and before long I was deep



in books again, in studies and plans and experiments for conducting a lifetime... a turn to the right now, or a turn half-left, or should I press on straight ahead for a while and then turn? I was convinced that she was there no matter which turn I took, that we'd be led to meet, and when that happened our lives would be charmed into the happy-ever-after reserved for true lovers everywhere.

It didn't work out that way. The longer I lived, the more I thought that the vision I had seen as a kid must have been wrong. With time, and with a marriage that ended in a vow never to marry again, I learned not only does my soul mate not live, no soul mate can live in this century. Year by year I learned, wrote, talked with others who had learned the same. The childhood myth of the soul mate is a lovely dream, of that there is no question. But so are unicorns and

mermaids and guardian angels — lovely dreams all. We are just too diverse, we humans, our needs are too impossibly shifting and complicated ever to be met in a single Other, no matter how radiant a being she or he might be.

True love? Impossible. Can't we point to marriages going to pieces, exploding over our heads like July rockets in the dark, bright sparks dying into the night? To learn and to grow is to change, and as we change, so we love different qualities, different people along our way. Love, for any growing person, must be temporary, and we must never call it true for more than the moment that we hold it in our hands.

Yet why, every Valentine's Day, do we turn restless with that thought? The one flaw in all we've learned is that some marriages are drenched in color, untouched by black-and-white storms. A few enchanted couples make their

romances last, year after changing year. Now and then we meet two people in love half a century, themselves forever 25, forever strong and beautiful, smiling at us turning old! Isn't it strange how a smile can shatter the security of the most educated cynicism?

The logical data we memorize, that evidence of despair, the sad statistics, are written for those of us who have no

room for myths in our lives; they sustain everyone afraid to hope, afraid to believe that love can last. The magic the enchanted ones have found is reflected in their smiles: Some childhood myths are real. True love cannot die. Soul mates live.

How can we be sure? What does a mystical being made of starlight and destiny... what does a soul mate look like?

One way to find out is to look in a mirror. Look there, and we'll see someone's dearly beloved, someone warm and honest and trusting and human and loving and thoughtful; foolish sometimes, and sometimes wise. There we'll see one who can encourage and coax and inspire another human being to live to her very best, to reach the highest he can dare imagine.

I had never thought about it that way... that in my own mirror I was beholding an image of the soul mate of the woman I would one day love. My mirror image looked awfully ordinary to me.

Sure enough, soul mates most often cover their starlight in common things — denim and polyesters and cottons. In wintertime, they'll be found in jackets and hats, as well. They come dressed the same way that most other men and women dress, they speak the same language, they're happy sometimes, and sometimes they're sad. The gift each of them has to offer is the gift of love, the wish for joy, and the longing to find

someone they've missed for a lifetime to joyfully love them in return.

I had stepped into the lobby elevator, touched the button for three. In the moment the door was closing, a glorious woman ran to me. Golden hair, eyes the color of the sea, blue jeans tucked into leather boots, coat from Navy surplus. "Going up?"

I caught the door. No bells or fireworks, no violins, no memory of the face I had seen in a childhood vision 25 years before.

"Yes," I said. "Where you headed?"

"Three, please."

And so we found each other, Leslie Parrish and I, neither of us knowing two soul mates had touched at last, or that our lives were ever after to be transformed.

What happened between us from that time is a different story from this one. What matters here is that later on we remembered the kids that we were, and the loneliness... how much it would have mattered to us to have known, how much easier it would have been to bear the years until we met!

If only we could find some way to speak across time to the young Leslie, the teen maid working every spare hour to pay for her music lessons; to the young Richard polishing airplanes for flight instruction; to speak across time and say you're a continent apart from each other for now, but don't worry, we promise that you will meet and you will love and it will be a joy to make flight and music pale, comparing.

How we wished we could have given them clues! *If you want to find someone magic, be someone magic yourself! Live to your highest sense of right, bravely. Never settle for second best. What you will find together is worth the years ahead, worth the loneliness before you touch. Take time to be friends before you're lovers. Change is delight when you're changing together, when your path leads always higher.*

If only there were a way to tell an earlier us that soul mates are true! If only we had a way to share what we know today with the doubters we had become.

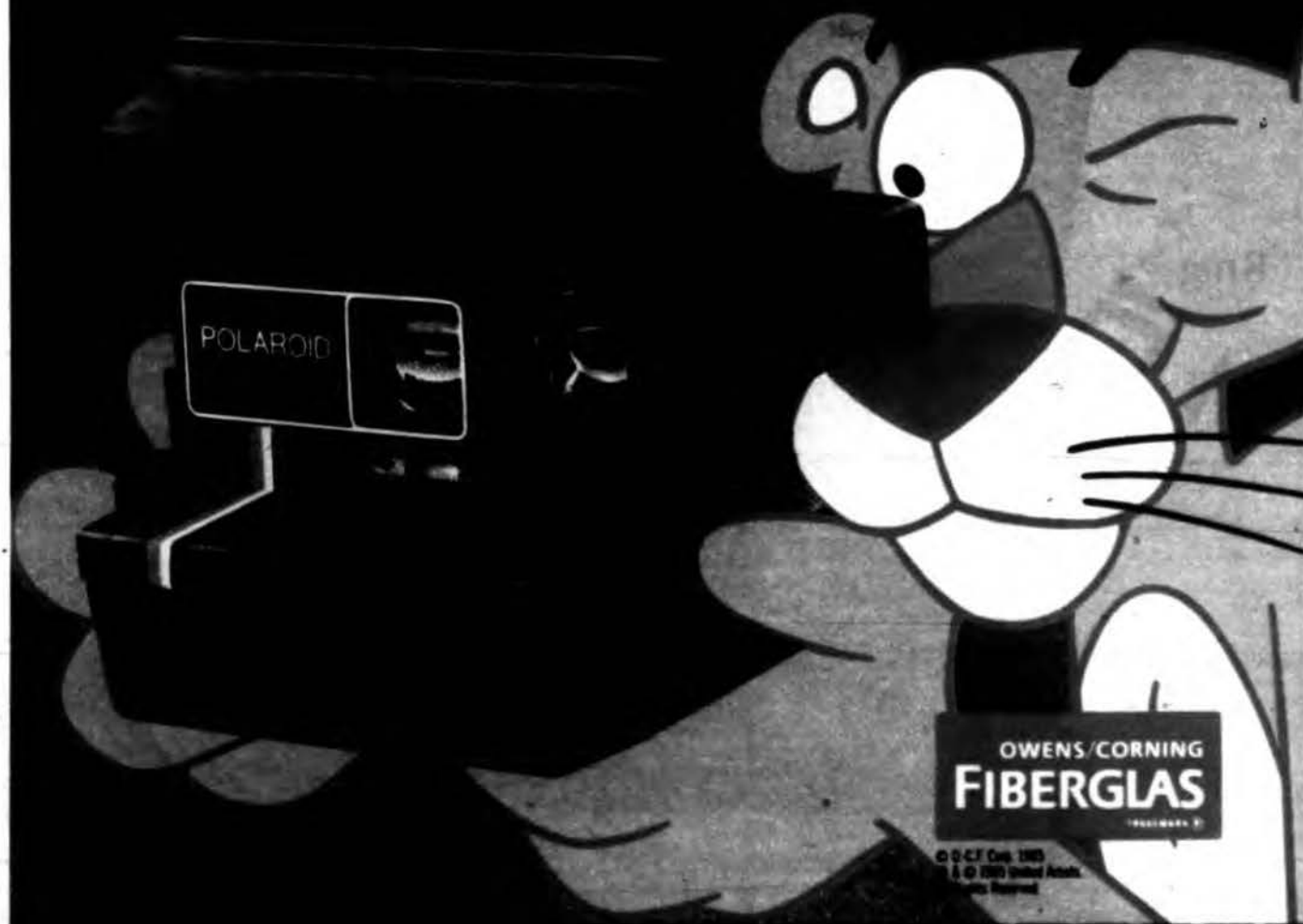
Leslie and I talked of that over and again, together. Are we all so trapped in time that we cannot speak to the people we were? Is there not some door, in this age of psychic discoveries, through which we can fly back years with a message to give us hope, to tell us that beautiful myths come true?

Sometimes, as we talked, it was almost as if we could see us as we were, almost as if we were ghosts floating at our own shoulders, trying to speak. Perhaps it's always been so, we said, in every age. Perhaps a future us, knowing what's true, will always remind the children we were that love exists.

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WHY DOLLS MAKE SUCH GOOD TOYS

The crunch is on. Your brother's youngest is about to turn 5, so you rush to the toy store and buy the flashiest, most sophisticated plaything the new wave of high-

tech toy manufacturers have to offer. Then, after mumbling a few words of thanks and letting the toy show its stuff, the child deposits your present at the bottom of the toy box and shuts the lid. What happened?

Like millions of other adults caught up in the excitement of the computer age, you've expected a child to mirror that enthusiasm. The biggest concern for young children is figuring out how they fit in with the complex group of people around them. To do that, they need help.

Enter a time-honored playmate, the doll. For as long as man has been creating dolls, they have been furnishing children with a means of imaginative play. Currently experiencing a new surge in popularity epitomized by the Cabbage Patch craze, doll sales jumped 19 percent in 1983 over the previous year, making dolls a \$1.4 billion baby.

Dr. Janice Gibson, professor of developmental psychology at the University of Pittsburgh, explains that dolls allow children the necessary freedom to fantasize and role play, two essential ingredients for social development. "This is a reaction to humanity," Gibson says of the doll boom. "There is a need for the old social interactions and more contact stimulation because we're becoming a mechanized society."

Experts agree that little girls don't, and indeed shouldn't, have a monopoly on the doll market. Yet many parents continue to be uneasy with the notion that it's all right for boys to have dolls. Gibson feels that by discouraging boys from playing with dolls, society deprives them of a major means of socializing. Dr. Sally Provence, a child development specialist at Yale's Child Study Center, concurs. "Children of both sexes are interested in dolls because they're interested in people," she states. "Playing with dolls prepares them to be the nurturer of other children, to be able to understand what's involved in protecting and nurturing the next generation."

When choosing a doll, should you look for sophisticated high fashion or the homely but lovable variety? Gibson suggests keeping a few things in mind:

1. *Consider the child's age.* Keep the doll in proportion to the child.

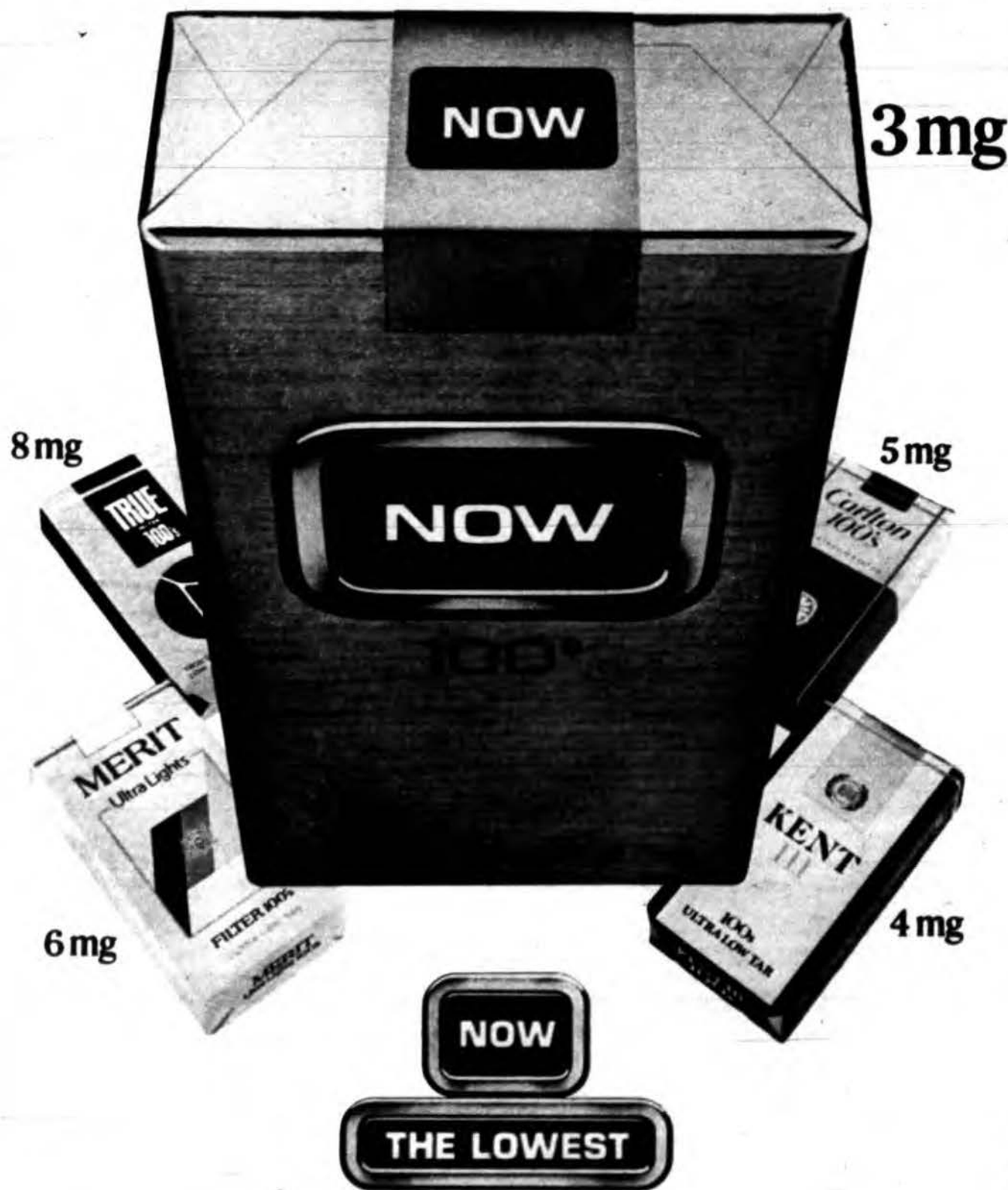
2. *Look for bright, colorful dolls that a child will want to touch and hug.* "Kids learn from their senses and are excited by colors," Gibson says.

3. *Buy safe.* Make sure the doll is made by a reputable manufacturer and meets federal safety standards. Don't give a young child a doll with small parts, like eyes, that could easily drop off and be dangerous.

Any toy must initially grab a child's imagination, stimulate it, and be able to hold it before it can be proven a success. That's one of the nicest things about dolls — when it comes to entertaining children, they seem to have staying power.

WRITE YOU ARE



Whether perfectly plain or simply a scrawl, your handwriting can unveil a wealth of information about who you are and what you're really like.

The handwriting samples on the right were written by personalities whose names are as familiar to you as your own. Take a close look at each. Notice anything revealing? Though you may not be a handwriting analyst, common-sense will tell you that these famous people are as different as can be. The colorful script in sample B and the bold rounded print in sample C point to two diverse people... it doesn't take an expert to see that.

Now examine the samples more closely. Can you find anything that could clue you in to the authors' identities?

Don't be surprised if you can't begin to figure out who these mystery writers might be. But, if you've studied their script carefully, you'll know more about the writers than you think you do.

Let's start with sample A. The pleasing script with its small flourishes and rounded loops seems to point to a person who is concerned with aesthetics as well as the content of the words.

How about sample B with its large capital letters that sweep across the page? This author's no shrinking violet, that's for sure. With every stroke, the writer conveys a sense of confidence and originality.

Finally, consider sample C. The script is stylish yet clear and authoritative, and points to a person who's strong and distinguished.

Needless to say, the above analyses are elementary at best. But, the writings of Ernest Hemingway (sample A), Walt Disney (sample B) and Princess Grace of Monaco (sample C) do provide insights into the kind of people they are—even to an amateur who's never been trained in graphology (the study and interpretation of handwriting). How can personality and handwriting be so intertwined?

"Writing is simply a set of repressed gestures that reveals what goes on inside of us," explains psychologist graphologist Dr. Carlos Pedregal, founder of the Experimental Center of Applied Psychology in France and Spain. "The sensations that

we receive—sadness, fear, pleasure or joy—provoke reactions that translate into muscular movement. You see this every day, when a baby smiles or a friend frowns, and even in the way a person walks when depressed or talks when excited. These emotions show up in our handwriting as well. The shape of the letters, the slant of the lines, the pressure of the pen, all point to very specific moods." (Though your handwriting may look different depending on whether you're happy, sad, harried or composed, the essential characteristics remain the same.)

Handwriting, however, shows more than just state of mind... it reveals personality as well. How you've individualized your script and strayed from the model of penmanship you were taught in school tells the trained eye a lot about who you are. After looking at a sample of your handwriting, an expert can identify character traits that it would take a spouse or friend years to discover. In fact, a graphologist can tell you things about yourself that you aren't aware of. For although most of us consider writing to be a simple skill that we take for granted, it's actually such an involved physiological and psychological process that many experts refer to it as "brainwriting". Because the forces that affect your handwriting are so numerous and varied, the odds of someone else writing exactly the same way you do are one chance in sixty-eight trillion according to one statistician.

Actually, the correlation between a person's character and his handwriting is nothing new. Theories about graphology date to when philosophers in ancient Greece noted the relationship between the two. Conclusive research followed centuries later. In the late 1930's, clinical experiments proved the link that had been suspected for so long.

Graphology may have gotten off to a slow start, but it's making up for lost time. More than 1,500 U.S. companies use handwriting analysis to screen job applicants or solve employee problems. In addition, it's used by police departments to uncover criminal tendencies, by banks to determine risk factors, by lawyers to help with jury selections, and by marriage counse-

lors to gain insights into a couple's compatibility.

"In 1974," recalls Dr. Pedregal, "a large manufacturer of office equipment commissioned my services. They needed a new assistant director of marketing, someone who would be able to work with customers, keep track of ongoing promotional campaigns, write the company newsletter and handle the art layouts for their advertisements. They wanted to promote from within the company, but knew that the position would be difficult to fill."

"When I arrived, the head of the personnel department showed me handwriting samples from the six supervisors being considered for the job. After examining the samples, I had to conclude that none of the authors had the combination of qualities required to succeed in the position. Then, I spotted a handwritten note lying on the table in front of me. 'Is this one of the candidates?' I asked, picking it up. 'Absolutely not,' I was told with a laugh. 'The person who wrote this is just a messenger.' I studied the note more carefully. Finally I looked up and said, 'That's too bad, because this is the person who could do that job well.'"

"Everyone laughed and thought I was crazy. Everyone, that is but the head of personnel who'd called me in, and whom I'd worked with before. He had to fight, but he finally convinced management to give the messenger a try. Today, ten years after the fact, that same messenger heads the com-

pany's entire marketing division."

Dr. Pedregal has also applied his expertise to solve problems of a different nature. "At one point," a large multi-national corporation began to receive anonymous letters which slandered the company's executives. For a time these letters were ignored. But, eventually, they began to take their toll. The letter writer had been clever enough to couch his lies amongst facts about the company which only an insider would know. This mix of fact and fiction made the lies seem more believable than they might have otherwise. The letters kept coming and soon the executives began to suspect one another. The tension was tremendous. So, they requested my assistance instead."

"I didn't have much to work with—the anonymous letters had all been printed in large block capital letters. In spite of that impediment however, I was able to describe certain aspects of the writer's personality and anticipate various actions and reactions that would typify him. I was even able to deduce certain physical characteristics about him."

"Based on my evaluation, the president of the company asked three workers who fit the profile to submit print and longhand writing samples. Those were then analyzed by a handwriting expert who'd been trained to

detect forgeries. The culprit, it turned out, was indeed one of the suspects my analysis had pointed to."

SOUP AND SALAD, JAPANESE-STYLE

Even in February, a main dish salad can be a welcome change of pace from a steady diet of heavier foods. Mr. Nobuyoshi Kuraoka, innovative owner of the Nippon Restaurant in New York City, says, "I try to keep ahead of the game — seeing what people like to eat and those American dishes that can be adapted to Japanese cuisine. I had my chef create a main dish salad with a Japanese touch. The resulting recipe has proved to be an immensely popular menu entry for us, both for lunch and as a light dinner item."

The Nippon Salad is very easy to make and fits in beautifully with The 30-Minute Chef schedule. Mr. Kuraoka's Eggplant Soup is an intriguing and pleasing first course.

CHICKEN YAKITORI

8 ounces boneless chicken leg meat or chicken breast
Teriyaki Sauce*

1. Cut chicken into 1-inch squares (about 1/2 oz. each).

2. Skewer four pieces of chicken each onto 8-inch bamboo skewers.
3. Broil over charcoal or place on rack and broil 4 inches from heating element in oven for 8-10 minutes, or until cooked through. Turn once or twice. Coat with Teriyaki Sauce (recipe follows). *Makes 4 servings*

*TERIYAKI SAUCE

1/2 cup soy sauce
1/2 cup sake or dry sherry
1/4 cup mirin (Japanese cooking wine) or pineapple juice
3 teaspoons cornstarch or katakuriko (potato starch)
3 tablespoons water

1. In 1-quart saucepan, mix soy sauce, sake and mirin; cook until boiling. Boil for a minute or two.

2. Mix cornstarch with water; blend until smooth. Add to soy-sake combination and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture boils and sauce thickens. *Makes 1 1/2 cups*

EGGPLANT SOUP

(Nasu-Nioroshi)

1 (8-oz.) eggplant
Vegetable oil
3 cups Dashi (stock made from dried bonito flakes)*
4 tablespoons soy sauce

4 tablespoons mirin (Japanese cooking wine) or pineapple juice
1 cup grated Daikon (cicely) radish or red radishes
2 tablespoons grated fresh ginger
1. Cut eggplant into 1/2-inch-thick slices and then into sticks 2 inches long.
2. Heat about 1/4 cup vegetable oil in skillet



and fry eggplant sticks in oil over medium heat, turning gently, just until tender. Keep warm.

3. In medium-sized saucepan, mix Dashi, soy sauce, and mirin wine. Heat mixture to boiling, reduce heat, add grated radish, and cook 1 or 2 minutes without boiling.

4. Place eggplant in soup tureen or individual serving bowls. Pour hot soup over eggplant. Sprinkle with grated ginger. *Makes 4 servings*

*If Dashi is not available, use chicken or vegetable broth.

NIPPON BEEF SALAD

1 lb. boneless filet, rib eye beef, or round
1 head iceberg lettuce

1/2 head red cabbage
1 cup (2 oz.) spinach leaves, torn into bite-sized pieces
1 small carrot, julienned
1 small green bell pepper, julienned
1/2 cup (2 oz.) mushrooms, sliced
1/4 cup radish sprouts or chopped watercress
1/2 cup rice vinegar
1/2 cup soy sauce
2 teaspoons Oriental sesame oil
1/4 cup vegetable oil
Freshly ground white pepper, to taste
2 teaspoons sesame seeds, toasted

1. Place well-trimmed filet into freezer until partially frozen. Using a very sharp knife or meat slicer, cut meat into 1/8-inch-thick slices; set aside.

2. Use food processor or sharp knife to finely shred lettuce and cabbage. Shreds should be no more than 1/8-inch thick.

3. Place lettuce, cabbage and spinach into serving bowl. Arrange carrots, green pepper and mushrooms separately on top. Place radish sprouts down the center of the arrangement.

4. In small saucepan heat rice vinegar, soy sauce, sesame oil, vegetable oil and ground white pepper to boiling.

5. Place slices of meat quickly into boiling liquid to cook medium rare or as desired. Place meat on salad in an overlapping row. Pour hot dressing over all. Sprinkle with sesame seeds. Toss just before serving. *Makes 4 servings*

Note: Additional salad ingredients could include sliced water chestnuts, thinly sliced scallions, drained smoked clams or oysters, salted peanuts, or fresh mung or alfalfa sprouts.

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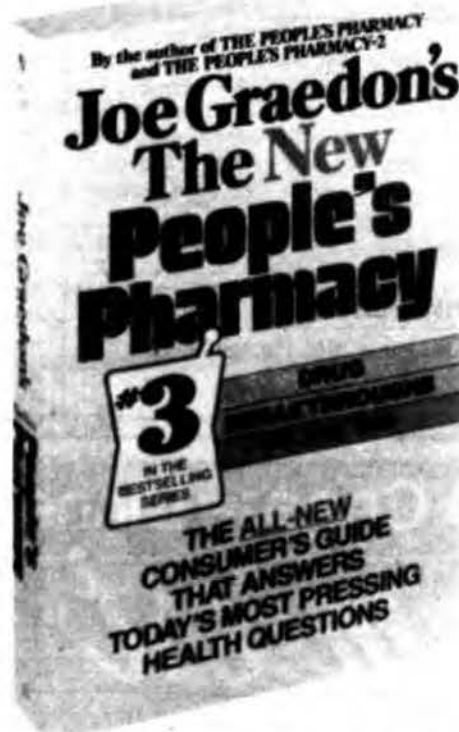
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GETTING PERSONAL WITH

A POET OF THE HEART

WITH HER HUSBAND, SHE REACHES OUT TO MILLIONS

In the late 1960s, recently married, Susan Polis Schutz and her husband, Stephen, spent a year traveling the country in a homemade camper. They supported themselves by selling silk-screened posters of Stephen's artwork and Susan's poetry. Their work had an immediate popular appeal, and their first book, *Come Into the Mountains, Dear Friend*, was published in 1972. They soon developed a solid following of readers, and Susan's fan club today numbers over 14,000 members in the United States. Her eight books, including her latest work, *Don't Be Afraid to Love* (Blue Mountain Press), have sold over 10 million copies; sales for the greeting cards of her husband's artwork and her poetry have passed the 100 million mark. This Valentine's Day, her reflections will be read by lovers around the world in a dozen different languages.

The Schutzes and their three children live in the mountains of Colorado, where Susan draws much of her inspiration.

On a rare trip to New York City, Schutz took time to discuss her work with FAMILY WEEKLY Copy Editor Abbie Countryman.

Countryman: Why are people afraid to love?

Schutz: I think they're afraid of showing their real selves and opening themselves up to being hurt. You're very vulnerable when you expose yourself.

Q: Do you think people are afraid to be themselves?

Schutz: Yeah, maybe they're afraid that they're not quite as good as they may appear. Everybody has a confidence problem.

Q: Where do people get the strength to overcome that?

Schutz: The strength [comes from] knowing how rewarding a good love relationship is. It's the most important part of life. A love relationship gives people confidence to really be themselves.

Q: How important is it for people to be able to express their emotions?

Schutz: I think it's very, very important. Keeping it all inside is a very lonely thing. It's so much easier to share your feelings than to keep them inside. . . . You need to know what you want to do in life. What do you want to achieve, what are you good at? Follow that course. What kind of person are you looking for to share your life? I think just map out a little chart of what you expect out of life. Not to take away spontaneity, but just approximately what you like and what you want to do, what you want to accomplish, and then do it.



Q: What makes a good poet?

Schutz: One who can be understood; who expresses an emotion that can be felt by people; whose words sound like a song, where it all fits together and sounds kind of pretty. A poem should sound really nice; it should flow nicely.

Q: Why are your poems read by so many people?

Schutz: I have no idea. I write strictly as a release of my own emotions. My fan letters say I'm expressing what other people feel, too.

Q: Has success changed your life?

Schutz: Well, sure. Mainly in the fact that I don't have to do things that I don't want to do. I'm exactly the same, except for that. I still love nature, and we're happiest in the mountains.

Q: Do you feel you've been unfairly criticized for being, as you say in one of your poems, too "light and soppy"?

Schutz: I don't know if I've been criticized; I haven't read anything, but people often, if you say the word "love," they immediately draw back and think of it as that type of thing. I've met a lot of people like that who have really put up a wall against anything beautiful.

Q: Do you and your husband ever get sick of each other?

Schutz: No, never. We're very, very different, and we have totally different areas of talent. I criticize his artwork, he criticizes my writing, but we both have the last word on our own work. But there's always someone to bounce ideas off of. It's fabulous.

Q: All of your work is so positive. Don't you ever have any negative feelings?

Schutz: Yeah, I do, but somehow I just don't write about those. I write very little when something is really sad in my life. My philosophy really is to move on to more positive things. FW

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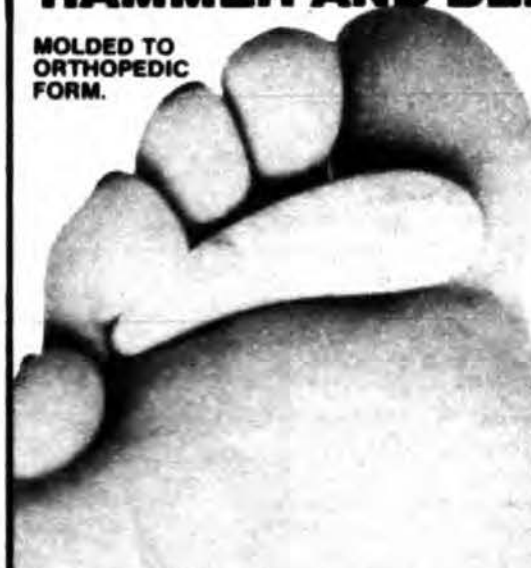

GASSING UP

The news from the frozen reaches of the earth is that the world is becoming more gaseous. Reinhold Rasmussen and Aslam Khalil, two researchers at the Oregon Graduate Center, tapped into glaciers in Antarctica and Greenland to measure methane gas through the ages. They found that methane in the atmosphere has been increasing rapidly: It has doubled in the past 200 years.

According to Rasmussen, "You just can't get away from making methane in the ordinary humdrum of human existence." Or animal existence. Methane, he explains, is produced by all animal life, via burping and, well, related activity.

What's the environmental

effect? Depends on where you live. The "greenhouse effect" to which methane contributes may warm some cold regions of the earth and overheat the already hot areas. Don't throw away the down vest yet, though. This will take a while. As in centuries.

FROM MARYLAND

CAN A HEALTHY ECONOMY MAKE YOU SICK?

There may be some truth to the old saying that people "can't stand prosperity." M. Harvey Brenner, Ph.D., of the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health, proposes the sobering theory that "economic decisions, whether they lead to recession or growth, always have health implications."

A report prepared by Brenner and issued by the Congressional Joint Economic Committee asserts that "deaths from heart attacks peak three years after a recession and again at 10 years. If this last recession is similar to the recessions of the past 30 years, the

result could be 400,000 early deaths in the next 10 years."

Brenner has been comparing economic trends with trends in mortality between 1950 and 1980. Based on this work, he predicts a rise in heart attacks, cirrhosis of the liver, suicides and murders. One of these years, we hope our accountant and our doctor will both have good news.

WHY WAS MONA LISA SMILING?

California physicist John Asmus has a new explanation for the Mona Lisa's sly smile: Da Vinci's beauty may originally have been only partially clothed.

Uncovering this story has been a painstaking process. Asmus had to wait three years for the Louvre in Paris to send him a high-quality photograph. He is using high-tech equipment to try to "identify areas of unusual pigment that might indicate whether

the dress was painted on later."

Asmus assures us this is not an "electronic striptease" but a serious attempt "to add a new layer to the lore that surrounds this masterpiece." And to subtract a layer of clothes?

FROM CALIFORNIA

GROWING UP IS HARD TO DO

When it comes to explaining about the birds and the bees, girls are far more likely than boys to get the buzz from their parents, according to health educator Lynda Madaras. "It seems to be a part of the male mystique that boys are assumed to know everything about sex," she observes. "Parents rationalize that only girls are anxious or embarrassed."

To address this problem, Madaras has penned the *What's Happening to My Body? Book for Boys: A Growing Up Guide for Parents and Sons* (Newmarket Press).

Madaras has the following advice for parents: (1) Don't start off with, "Got any questions?" Try something like, "When I was your age I really felt..." Fill in with some less-than-golden moment from your youth. (2) Don't try to go from birth to death in one Big Talk. (3) Let your child know if you feel a little less than supremely at ease discussing the matter. (4) Don't be afraid to teach a set of values to your child. "With a little extra effort, your kids' growing pains may be less acute than your own were."

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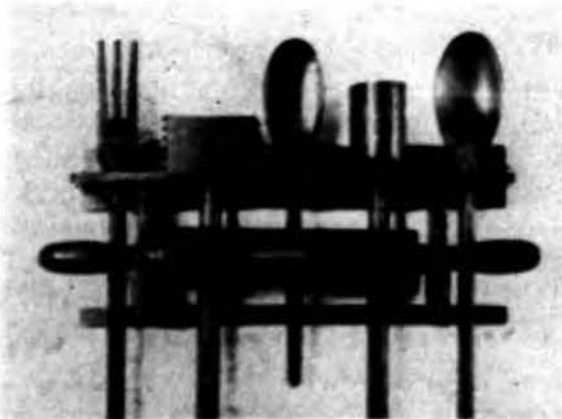

Mancini in crucial rematch

It was supposed to be easy. A quick, painless pay-check. A tuner until the big money matches with Aaron Pryor and Hector Camacho could be arranged.

All Ray "Boom Boom" Mancini had to do was win. But, on June 1, 1984, against a bobbing, weaving, hungry young fighter named Livingstone Bramble, Mancini could not win. Bramble was crowned the new World Boxing Association light-weight champion.

This week in Reno (and on HBO screens), Mancini and Bramble meet again and this time Mancini knows that, at age 23, he's in for the fight of his life.

The 23 years have been crammed with a lot of living. He grew up watching his boxer father, Lenny "Boom Boom" Mancini, denied a title fight. Young Ray became a fighter for that very reason. He's got a lot at stake.

There's a two-hour CBS movie in the works, produced by Sylvester Stallone, which will detail Mancini's life up to the night he first won the title. It will not involve itself with the death in the ring of a young Korean fighter killed by Mancini's fists in 1983.

For Bramble, life is not a B movie. It has been a difficult struggle from day one until the first day of last June when he showed he was more than just another opponent.

He's tough, quiet and punches with the force of a moving van. He's not stylish, isn't loved by the media and Stallone has yet to ask to film his life. He is, however, the lightweight champion, a title Mancini desperately needs in order to earn the \$8 million or so he's likely to make fighting the likes of Pryor and Camacho.

Robards for the defense

Veteran actor stars in TV docudrama on Atlanta child killings

LOS ANGELES — Jason Robards said no when his agent first called about a role in a miniseries on the multiple child murders in Atlanta.

"I didn't want to get involved in murders," Robards says. But his agent persisted.

"They wanted me to play the defense lawyer," Robards says. "I read the script and found it very interesting. It wasn't a depiction of murder at all. It's a social docudrama. It's what our justice system is all about."

The five-hour production called "The Atlanta Child Murders," which CBS will telecast in two parts tonight and Tuesday, tells of the series of murders that terrorized Atlanta's black community from the summer of 1979 through the late spring of 1981. Wayne Williams, 26, a free-lance photographer and talent promoter, was convicted in 1982 of the murders of two of the youths.

Williams was never charged with any other crimes, but during the trial the judge allowed the introduction of evidence establishing a pattern in the deaths of 10 of the children. Two days after the jury returned its verdict the special police task force was disbanded and no formal charges were made in the 27 remaining cases.

Robards stars as Alvin Binder, the man who headed the defense team for Williams.

"Virtually all of my dialogue came straight out of the trial transcript," says Robards, sipping coffee in his Beverly Hills hotel suite. Robards, who lives in Connecticut, is here to promote the miniseries.

"If I had any questions about the dialogue, maybe something didn't add up, we'd go straight to the original transcript. Boy, that was a tough shoot. As soon as I got off work I'd come to the hotel, order dinner, then start in learning my lines for the next day. You couldn't make a mistake. They watched us like hawks."

The miniseries, which has an all-star cast, was filmed in Los Angeles and Sacramento. Abby Mann ("Judgment at Nuremberg," "The Marcus-Nelson Murders") wrote the screenplay and John Erman ("Roots") directed.

Robards says he never met Binder, who is about 20 years younger than he is.

"I tried to get a Southern accent and not sound like 'Amos and Andy,'" he says. "There was little time for rehearsal and you had to get it right. I put myself in John Erman's hands. Ralph Richardson said

acting is dreaming. I go to the theater and dream. You learn your lines and that gives you the security to allow the imagination and heart to come out.

"I look at the script and I say this guy is presenting the viewpoint that the law and public opinion can be miscarried... This was a historic case because it allowed patterns in."

"Binder is the catalyst, he's the agent for making the audience doubt. In his closing summation he reminds the jury that although it seems Williams is being tried for all the murders he is only on trial for two murders."

After he completed the miniseries, Robards went to Tennessee to film "Johnny Bull."

"It was written by an English woman who married an American soldier and came over here," he says. "She thought she was going to be Doris Day. But she married a man from the coal mines. I play the father of the boy, but the core is the relationship between the girl and her mother-in-law."

Robards, 64, grew up in Hollywood, the son of actor Jason Robards Sr. After school he joined the Navy and was stationed at Pearl Harbor when the Japanese struck on Dec. 7, 1941.

He began his acting career on Broadway, appearing in such plays as "Stalag 17" and "The Chase." His film roles include "The Journey," "Tender Is the Night," and "A Long Day's Journey into Night."

NEW YORK — It's 1 a.m. ... Do you know where your college kids are?

They're probably watching David Letterman, who's become a television piper to the collegiate crowd — a young, hip audience that doesn't just watch TV, but drinks with it, dresses up to it and throw parties around it.

Champagne parties are the exception. Beer is the more standard TV chaser, and it's become the staple of many video rituals around the country.

Whenever a character on the old "Bob Newhart Show" welcomes Newhart with the familiar "Hi, Bob," game-players at the Showdown bar near the University of Texas-Austin gleefully toss back their suds. Bartender Mike Smith's favorite episodes have lots of greetings. "Sometimes you get

lucky," he said.

The game is the same at Butler University's Schwitzer Hall, the magic words are just different.

These kids raise their glasses to the "bats" on "Batman." "I think there are 20-some 'bats' in the opening song alone," said Patti Bundy, a junior.

Watching NBC's "Late Night With David Letterman" is a more passive activity, but at least it ranks above

swallowing goldfish or cramming bodies into phone booths. It's also a lot funnier, and America's current campus crop takes its humor seriously.

"His humor is not too sophisticated and not too lowlife," said Ryan P. Murphy, arts-entertainment editor at the Indiana University student newspaper. "He performs on their level."

Most campus libraries close by midnight, and college kids have more flexible schedules than the work-a-day world, so students are able to tune in more late-night television than the average viewer.

According to a 1983 survey by the Simmons Market Research Bureau, 24.5 percent of all college students will watch TV in a given half hour from 11:30 p.m. to 1 a.m. on weeknights. For all adults, 10.2 percent watched in that time period, said Ed Barz, Simmons' senior vice president.

But Nielsen figures show college-age people watch less television overall than the rest of the population. Last October, men aged 18-24 averaged 19.5 hours a week and women in the same age group averaged 27.8 hours. The typical American viewer was tuned in for 28.8 hours a week.

For the "Letterman" show specifically (12:30-1:30), Nielsen numbers from last October showed that 2.5 percent of all men 18-24 and 2.2 percent of all women 18-24 were watching. The average for all age groups tuned to "Letterman" was 1.4 percent.

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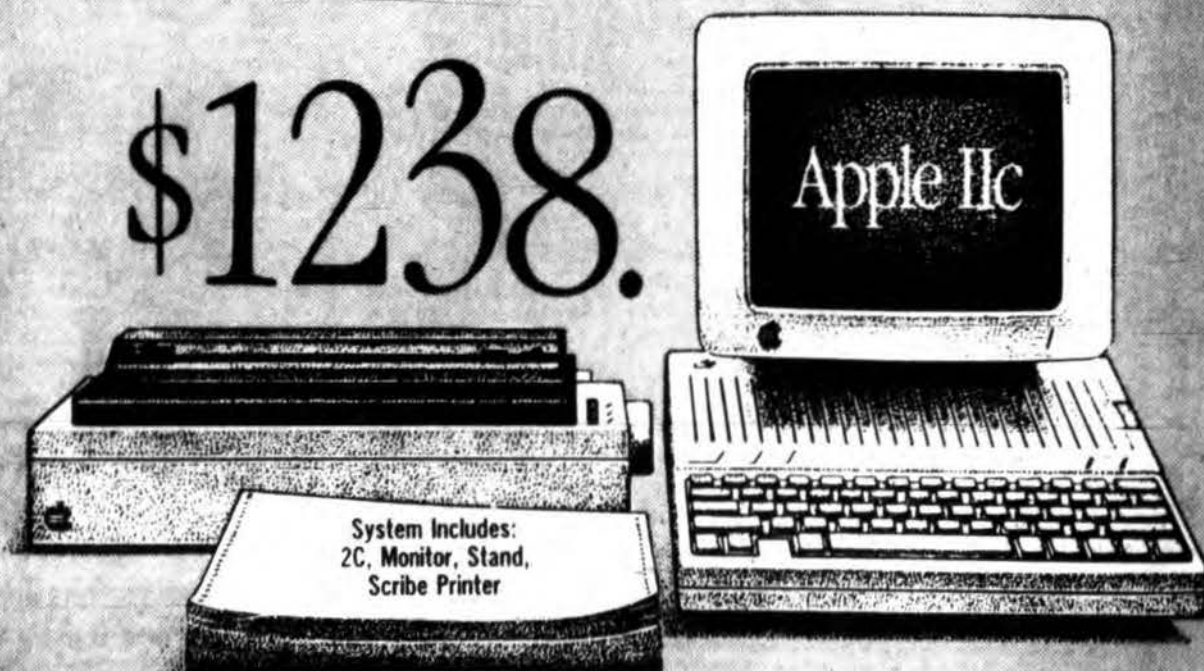
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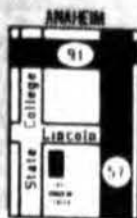
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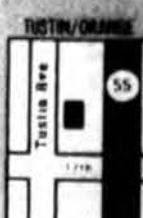

Coast has burglars on the run

Cops cite Neighborhood Watch groups for significant declines in 'silent rape'

There are growing signs that police and residents on the Orange Coast are gaining in the war on burglary, the Coast's most acute and persistent crime problem.

And if the war is being won, police say it's because residents — sick and tired of being victimized by a crime that some liken to rape — got out of

their homes, met their neighbors and agreed to do something about it.

"I felt violated," said Aaron Burke, a Huntington Beach resident whose home was burglarized two years ago.

"Your house is the one place where you're supposed to feel safe, where you can put some distance between you and the rest of the world.

"There was almost a feeling of contamination afterward," he added.

"I realized how vulnerable I was," Burke joined a local Neighborhood Watch chapter. He credits the organization with giving him a place to vent his anger and a way to fight back.

Huntington Beach has one of the oldest and largest Neighborhood Watch programs in Orange County. In the past four years, the burglary rate has fallen more than 25 percent.

"Burglary is the silent rape," suggested Lourann Cook, whose Fountain Valley home was burglarized in

1980 while she and her family were spending a day at Disneyland.

"It's a repulsive feeling to know that a stranger has been going through your things. You don't know what they've touched," she said. "Every time you open the front door you wonder, 'What am I going to find now?'"

Cook has been president of the Fountain Valley Neighborhood Watch for two years. She is convinced there is a correlation between the

growth of Neighborhood Watch and the gradual reduction in burglary in her city.

"The numbers really show it," she claimed. "And when our membership gets complacent, it shows. Burglaries go up. It happened last year."

Since the formation of Neighborhood Watch in Newport Beach four years ago, the burglary rate in the city has been slashed nearly 50 percent.

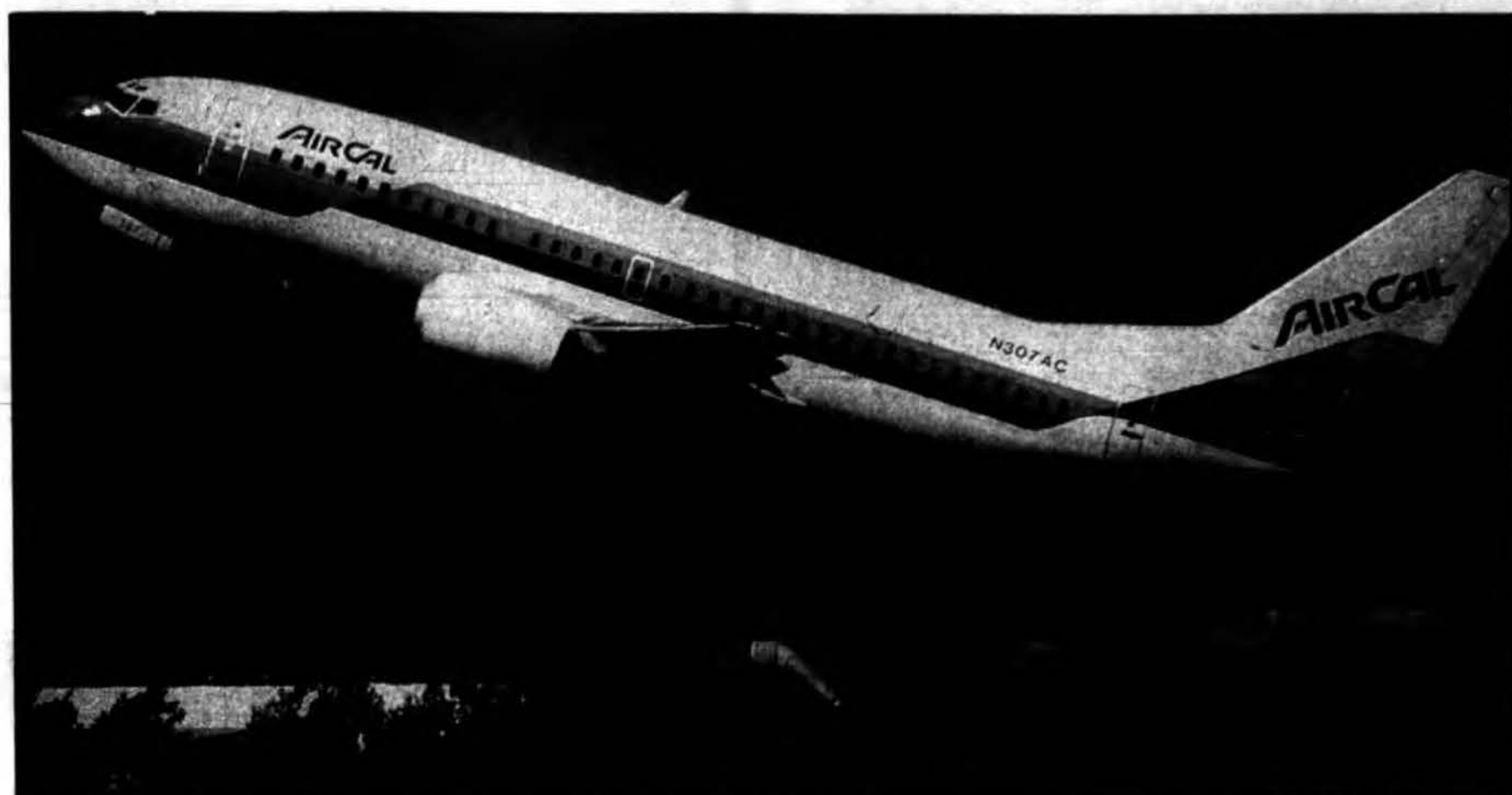

'Quieter' jet goes through its paces

But results of noise tests on new breed of jet won't be completely analyzed until Tuesday

John Wayne Airport officials monitored the sound levels generated Saturday by a redesigned Boeing jetliner, but results of the noise testing are not expected to be fully analyzed until Tuesday.

However, William J. Martin, the airport's senior noise control specialist, said Saturday afternoon that preliminary figures indicate the new

Boeing 737-300, heavily promoted as a quieter aircraft, will qualify under conventional Class A plane guidelines but may not pass under stricter Class AA noise standards at maximum takeoff weight.

Under a plan approved by county supervisors, airlines can qualify for additional John Wayne flights if they fly quieter jets within the Class AA noise limits. The takeoff noise cannot exceed 89.5 decibels in this class.

The supervisors' plan has a tradeout provision that allows airlines flying jets at the stricter standard to exchange one noisier flight for two quieter ones. Under the plan, tentatively scheduled to take effect April 1, total daily flights at John Wayne can increase from 41 to no more than 55, even with the tradeout offer.

Airport noise specialist Martin said early figures indicate the new Boeing jet might qualify under Class AA standards with less than maximum weight on board. A heavier load requires more power and produces more takeoff noise.

The airport noise expert stressed

that additional analysis of the test data is needed and said final results will not be available until Tuesday.

Martin said independent tests of the jet's noise levels were conducted Saturday by representatives of the city of Newport Beach, which has fought to limit flights at John Wayne, and by Boeing, the manufacturer.

The Boeing 737-300 tested Saturday was the first received by Newport Beach-based AirCal. The airline has purchased a dozen of the 140-seat jetliners, to be delivered over the next four years. With spare parts, the cost

NB super salesman sold self into prison

LEWISBURG, Pa. — His book, "Why Winners Win," told companies how to sell products. Now John Torquato Jr., the reputed "mastermind" of a scheme to bribe public officials, will spend up to four years in jail for taking his sales techniques too far.

U.S. District Judge Malcolm Muir imposed the four-year sentence on the Newport Beach resident Friday and fined Torquato \$10,000. The judge said a two-year term recommended by the U.S. attorney was "completely inadequate."

Torquato told Muir, "I am definitely sorry that I have to stand before you today and I recognize that I have done wrong. ... I can tell you I will never be before a judge again."

"It's very ironic that two years after I wrote a book on successful selling ... I crossed the line for the first time in a sales situation and did something illegal," he said.

Torquato, 48, wrote "Why Winners Win: Techniques of Advocate Selling," published by American Management Associations.

An Oct. 22 indictment charged him

Irvine teachers back at bargaining table

Irvine teachers, who staged a one-day protest strike over a deadlock in contract talks, have resumed negotiations with the Irvine Unified School District.

District spokeswoman Fran Morton said representatives of the two sides met Friday morning. She said no announcement was made after the meeting.

But Morton said negotiators did agree to meet again at 9 a.m. Wednesday.

More than 500 Irvine teachers walked picket lines Tuesday, demonstrating against the 25-campus school district's "last and best" contract

proposal. The teachers returned to the classroom Wednesday.

The district has offered teachers a 3 percent raise retroactive to July 1, 1984, and provided a formula for an additional raise next year.

The Irvine Teachers Association, which bargains for the district's 750 faculty members, has asked for a 2 percent raise retroactive to July and another 2 percent increase this spring.

Disagreement also exists over insurance provisions, grievance procedures, teacher discipline and "agency fee," which would require all teachers to pay association dues or an equivalent fee.

'Refugee' goats reach mainland sanctuaries

Officials optimistic that all 200 will be adopted this weekend

RAMONA — Patricia Nelson watched with no particular concern as a truckload of 63 goat refugees from San Clemente Island was left in her front yard here last week.

She simply added them to the tally of other animals she cares for until adopted — 97 dogs, 40 cats, 35 rabbits, a horse, a donkey and, now, a total of 77 goats.

From her four-acre ranch in this rural community in northern San Diego County, Nelson runs the Animal Trust Sanctuary, a 13-year-old project to care for unwanted animals until they find homes.

But unlike people at many animal shelters, she pledged to care for them until they are adopted — even if it takes 13 years, as in the case of some dogs who have been with her since she opened the sanctuary.

"I didn't want to sit around and do

nothing, so I took this venture on," said Nelson, who operated a San Diego nursery school for more than 30 years before retiring and turning her attention to animals. "And this is rougher than a nursery school because at the end of the day, these don't go home."

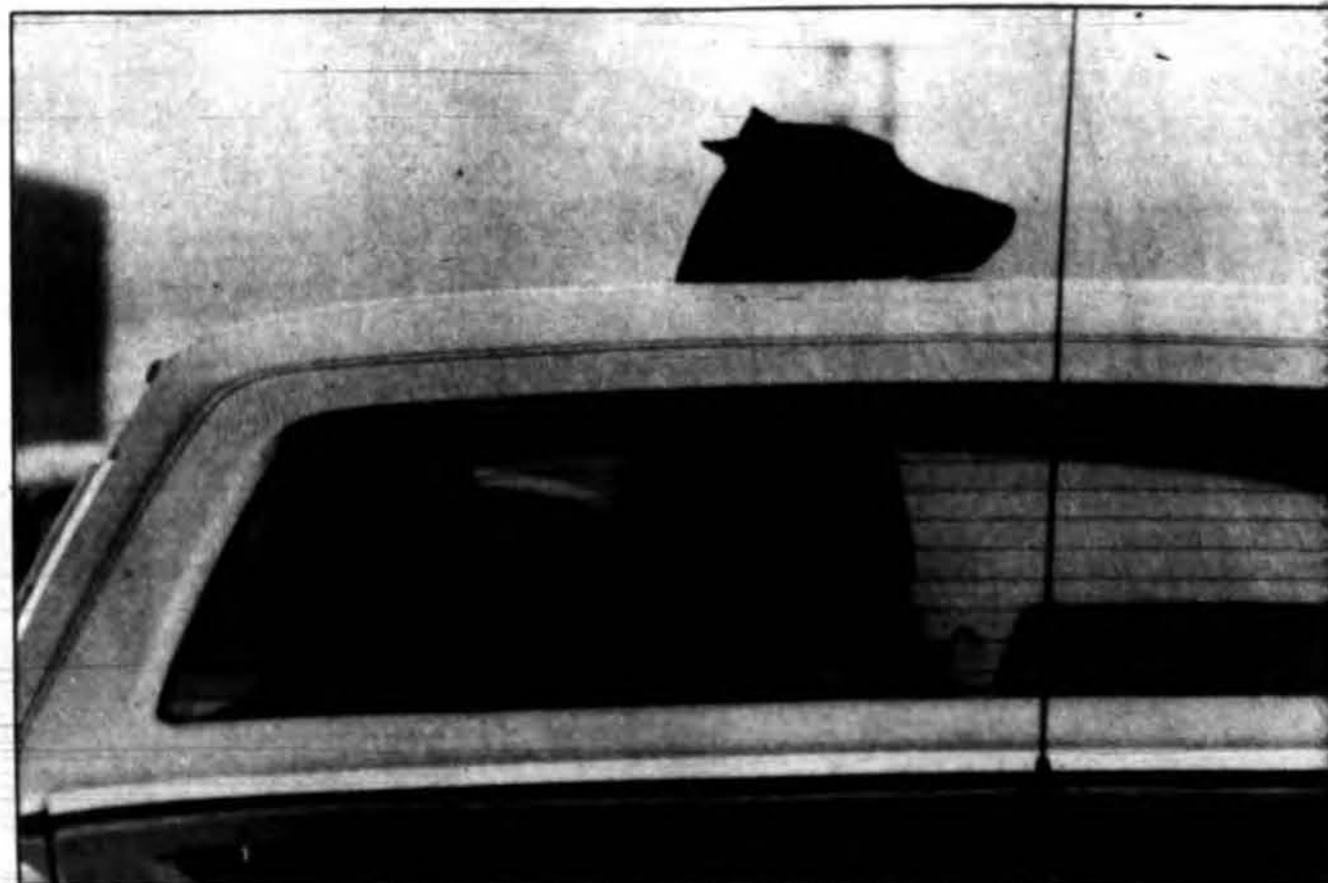
The goats had been targeted for death by Navy marksmen because they are believed to be destroying the habitats of some island plants, birds and animals that appear on the national endangered species list.

They are thought to be descendants of a small herd of Andalusian goats put on the island as many as 200 years ago to provide food for passing sailors, and once numbered almost 30,000, according to Navy biologists.

Since the early 1970s, all but the 1,200 to 1,500 now on the island have been shot by hunters or trapped. The Navy, which uses the island for target practice, has shipped 15,000 of the animals off it.

But because of their ability to reproduce rapidly, the goats' population again became troublesome, and the Navy planned a wholesale

Crash victims in stable condition at area hospitals

Orange County Fire Department dispatcher Dave Kinneberg said the blaze was reported at 5:51 p.m. in a single-family residence at 22632 Ancona, owned by Rita and Dwight Flowers.

Kinneberg said Mrs. Flowers was

home at the time and suffered a slight burn on her hand. No other injuries were reported.

The kitchen and living room areas were damaged by the fire and additional smoke damage was reported throughout the house, he said.

The blaze was extinguished within 22 minutes, the fire department spokesman added.

goat shoot last month. The Fund for Animals won approval from Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger for one more trapping effort, which is under way.

Author Cleveland Amory, who heads the group, hopes to save 800 of the doomed animals before his allotted time runs out in the first week of March.

The first batch of 200 wild goats arrived by Navy supply barge at the North Island Air Station on Coronado about dawn last Thursday. Of those, 103 were brought here, and the other 97 were trucked to a Los Angeles County animal shelter in Castaic.

Of the goats brought to Ramona, 63 were left at Nelson's sanctuary and

the other 40 were taken to temporary holding pens down the road.

The Fund for Animals was to begin processing adoptions for the wild goats this weekend, and officials say that based on the amount of interest already generated, all the goats may be claimed before this evening.

If not, the adoptions will resume next Friday for another weekend.

and four others with scheming to win millions of dollars in government contracts for a data processing firm, Computer Technology Associates, with cash, travel, jobs and stock.

Torquato began cooperating with prosecutors in their ongoing investigation in November and pleaded guilty to one conspiracy count. In return, 15 other counts against him were dropped.

The conspiracy charge carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. U.S. Attorney James West had rec-

ommended a two-year sentence for Torquato.

"Mr. Torquato has started down the road to rehabilitation in two ways — one, by joining an alcohol abuse clinic ... and two, by his cooperation showing a distinct break with the ways of the past," West told Muir.

But Muir rejected the request, noting that Torquato's cooperation only came after the indictment and a co-defendant's guilty plea. The judge also said a stiff sentence would deter others from similar crimes.

"It appears to me that you were the

mastermind of a major scheme to bribe public officials," Muir said.

The computer firm scheme involved attempts to win contracts with the state, Allegheny County and Pittsburgh for the recovery of Social Security tax overpayments.

To win the state contract, Torquato targeted the re-election campaign of Attorney General LeRoy Zimmerman for a \$100,000 payment and state Treasurer R. Budd Dwyer for a \$300,000 kickback, according to the indictment and prosecutors.

The story's the same in Laguna Beach, where the burglary rate has declined every year since the formation of Neighborhood Watch in 1980.

"I think people got bold," suggests Charles Bauman, who lives on the tip of Balboa Peninsula and is active in a Neighborhood Watch chapter. "They broke out of their shells and started paying attention."

In Irvine, where the Neighborhood Watch program is still being shaped, the scale runs the opposite way of most Orange Coast cities.

"We really got killed last year by burglaries," admitted Mike Weiss, the city's crime prevention officer. "And we're not really sure why."

Still, Weiss points out that the city is growing much faster than its neighbors. Its Neighborhood Watch program didn't start keeping track of members until 1982 and there are only four Neighborhood Watch signs in the entire community, while most cities claim hundreds.

Irvine received a state grant last year to bolster the community program and to fund a study in University Park that is expected to measure the successes or failings of Neighborhood Watch.

"It's a good target area because it's built out and we can really measure crime without having to stop and consider population growth and things of that sort," Weiss said.

"But the evidence from other communities is that with a real effort by Neighborhood Watch, you can make some tremendous inroads (preventing burglary)," he added.

Neighborhood Watch programs vary greatly from city to city and there appears to be a certain amount of one-upmanship involved.

Huntington Beach, for instance, has a Neighborhood Watch coordinator on the city payroll while Fountain Valley boasts that its program is strictly volunteer.

"When a neighborhood sign is needed, they take up a collection," observed Fountain Valley Capt. Bill

DeNisi. "We have a newsletter that comes out monthly that's hand-delivered by volunteers."

Newport Beach has a very structured program where residents forming a chapter must conduct three meetings before the Police Department will place a Neighborhood Watch sign in their neighborhood.

Officer Tom Little, who coordinates Neighborhood Watch in Newport, said Police Chief Charles Gross has even threatened to remove signs in neighborhoods where interest has flagged.

"I don't believe we've removed any, though," he added.

By contrast, Costa Mesa does not have a Neighborhood Watch president nor does it keep track of members. Unlike other cities, Costa Mesa Neighborhood Watch does not distribute a newsletter or ask chapters to hold regular meetings.

Instead, police conduct meeting after meeting, driving home the basic philosophy of Neighborhood Watch.

"It gets passed on by word of mouth," explained Linda Fowler, a Neighborhood Watch coordinator in Costa Mesa.

The Neighborhood Watch philosophy is not a complicated one: Lock up, know your neighbors, keep an eye out for suspicious or strange people in the neighborhood and contact police when something doesn't look right.

"That's often the biggest problem," Little said. "People feel inhibited to call the police. But how else are we going to know if something's going on that shouldn't be going on?"

In its early going, Neighborhood Watch was viewed by some, including members, as a vigilante group, an organization that would be taking an active role in fighting crime.

When Huntington Beach police were first learning how to cope with punk rockers, several Neighborhood Watch members said they planned to patrol their streets — with guns.

In Balboa the same thing threaten-

ed to occur when residents feared violence from surfers.

"At one meeting, a man wanted to know when his shift would be, like he was expected to stay up nights and watch guard," Little said. "That's not what Neighborhood Watch is at all. It's an awareness of your community and your neighbors."

Cook said there was an initial misunderstanding of Neighborhood Watch in Fountain Valley, too.

"We're not police," she said. "We don't encourage patrols and we certainly don't advocate carrying weapons."

Despite what appears to be steady gains in many coastal cities, burglary is still the No. 1 crime from Seal Beach to San Clemente. And even with the groundwork fashioned by Neighborhood Watch, burglars are still doing their work the old-fashioned way.

"Unlocked door and windows," said Huntington Beach Sgt. Tris Swan. "Almost 50 percent of time, burglars enter through unlocked doors or windows."

A career burglar can be in and out of a residence in four minutes flat, given an advantage like an unlocked door or window, Swan said.

"Any burglar will tell you that if it's going to take too much effort to get into your house, he won't do it," said Swan. "He will pass."

The success of Neighborhood Watch can be measured best by numbers, police claim. The burglary rate should go down and the number of information calls received by police should go up if the program is working.

"There's really no other tangible way to tell if it's working," Little said. "A person may see a suspicious person in their neighborhood and call us. We would go out there, contact him before he commits a crime and then he leaves."

"There's no way of measuring that sort of thing," Little said. "But we believe Neighborhood Watch works as long as citizens put in the effort."

Fair weather to reign after rain

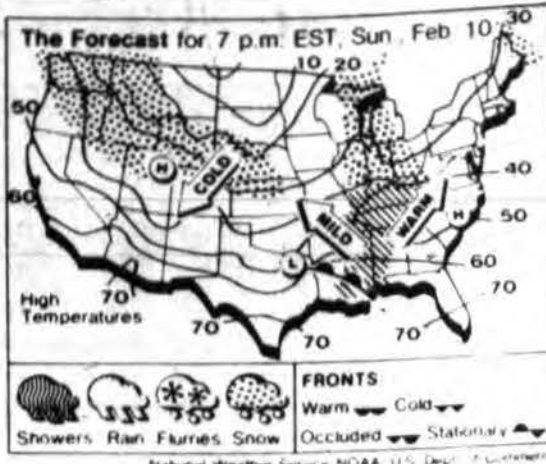
LOS ANGELES (AP) — A slow-moving storm dumped the heaviest rain of the season over much of Southern California early Saturday, triggering scores of accidents and causing part of a road in suburban Hawthorne to collapse. At least two traffic deaths were attributed to the storm.

Skies began clearing over most coastal areas as the storm moved south through San Diego County and east across the deserts, the National Weather Service said, predicting fair weather today.

The NWS said 1.27 inches of rain fell in downtown Los Angeles between Friday afternoon and 5 a.m. Saturday when the rain moved out of the region.

It was the heaviest rainfall since the season began in July, NWS forecaster Stan Massey said.

Temperatures today were expected to reach a high in the low to mid 60s, with low in the 40s and 50s.

of the planes approaches \$300 million, said Frantz Lipsey, AirCal's vice president for corporate services.

for some time and in some ways it's been doomed for years," added the supervisor, whose district includes the area.

"There are a variety of potential alignments, all of which have either substantial adverse environmental impacts or intrude on established residential areas," explained Peter Herman, an aide to Riley on land-use matters.

He said Riley remains hopeful that other board members will go along with the proposal to drop the new road. "I have not run into anyone yet who strongly endorses University Drive, and I'm not familiar with any board office that supports University Drive," Herman said.

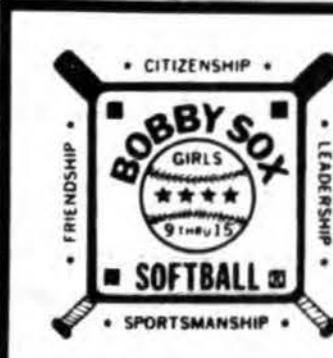
He explained that before the proposed extension could be removed from the master plan, the county would have to complete an environmental impact report assessing what effect deleting the

project might have on the community. Then, a public hearing on the matter would have to be scheduled.

On the related question of a land-use plan for Santa Ana Heights, intended to bring the community nestled at the foot of John Wayne Airport's main runway into compliance with state noise standards,

Riley said he still is working toward a compromise plan for presentation at the board's Wednesday meeting.

PALM BEACH, Fla. — High tides, rough seas and the steady pull of heavy-duty winches helped tug a rusty freighter another 55 feet from a millionaire's back yard Friday, and salvors said it was "a matter of days" before the ship would be out to sea. Friday's effort, coupled with previous pulls this week, left the bow of the Mercedes I about 170 feet from the sea wall behind Mollie Wilmoth's estate, where it had rested since it went ashore during a Thanksgiving storm.

Millions confiscated from Costa Rican

LOS ANGELES — A Costa Rican man arrested at a Texas airport with \$5.8 million in well-worn bills is a fund raiser and associate of right-wing Salvadoran leader Roberto D'Aubuisson, according to a published account in a Los Angeles newspaper. The man, Francisco Guirola, 34, had flown to Texas from John Wayne Airport. A federal magistrate in Corpus Christi, Tex., ordered Guirola and two others held without bond Thursday on charges of conspiring to violate U.S. currency laws, which require notifying the government when more than \$10,000 is taken out of the country.

Schroeder may have the flu

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — If artificial heart recipient William Schroeder has the flu, and doctors think he has, he could have caught it from almost anyone — even his surgeon, a hospital spokeswoman said Saturday. The possibility that Schroeder was infected by Dr. William DeVries cannot be ruled out because DeVries has had the flu recently, said a Humana Hospital Audubon spokeswoman. Schroeder, 52, "could have gotten it from a family member or visitor, or he could have gotten it from one of the medical staff," she said.

Pilot killed in Air Force jet crash

SEDONA, Ariz. — An Air Force A-10 jet fighter on a low-level training mission crashed into cliffs in a canyon Saturday, killing its pilot and forcing the closure of a highway, authorities said. The single-seat, twin-engine plane crashed at 10:10 a.m. in Oak Creek Canyon, said a spokeswoman for Luke Air Force Base. Coconino County sheriff's Lt. Sam Whitted said it was raining, or raining with snow mixed in, when the crash occurred. No cars were involved in the crash.

Officials celebrate falling welfare rate

BOSTON — Massachusetts officials, reveling in a 12-year low of welfare cases, celebrated Saturday as the 13,000th person to leave the rolls by landing a job through a state employment training program addressed her classmates. "The program has given us not only the ability but also the confidence to go out with our resumes in hand and look for a job," said Cheryl Liberatore, Liberatore, 22, said she completed the 16-week clerical and office skills training program because "I couldn't afford not to." She begins work Monday at Massachusetts General Hospital as a senior secretary.

4 dead, man held in board and care fire

LOS ANGELES — A fire swept through a turn-of-the-century house converted into a board-and-care home Saturday, killing four elderly women and injuring three other people. Several hours later, police arrested Walter Evans Jr., 34, a live-in custodian at the building, for investigation of murder in the four deaths, said police Detective John Bunch. Bunch said Evans, who was burned on the arms and hands, was arrested after telling investigators that he had previously set other fires in the neighborhood.

Paraplegic wins fortune in road design suit

RIVERSIDE — A 24-year-old man left a paraplegic after his car plunged over an embankment on an unmarked curve will receive \$2 million in cash plus \$100,000 a year from Riverside County, his attorney said. The structured settlement for Kevin Drozd of Los Angeles could amount to at least \$18.36 million over 40 years, said attorney Thomas V. Girardi. The award is believed to be the largest settlement of a civil suit for improper road design in California history, Girardi said. The settlement was reached moments prior to the start of jury trial on the case. The accident occurred on Oct. 12, 1982, on Skyline Drive near Corona.

Soviet doctor says Chernenko isn't dying

LOS ANGELES — A prominent Soviet heart specialist on Saturday sought to dispel speculation about Konstantin Chernenko's health, saying the Soviet president has been working and "that means he's not dying." Dr. Evgueni Chasov, director-general of the USSR Cardiology Research Center and deputy minister of public health, spoke at a news conference at the Physicians for Social Responsibility convention here. Chasov repeated a recent statement by industrialist Armand Hammer, who has long had business relations with the Soviets. "If you think Dr. Chasov is Mr. Chernenko's physician, and if he (Chasov) is here (in the United States), that means everything is all right," Hammer said last week.

Boozy birds crashing into cars on route 101

MOUNTAIN VIEW — An unusual hazard has surfaced — crashed, rather — on U.S. Highway 101 in Mountain View. Birds, happily drunk on fermented berries, have been flying beak-on into cars. Although no human injuries have been reported, the birds, mostly robins, have been dying by the hundreds, smashing into cars. At least one multi-car accident has been reported in a boozed-bird incident.

Taughner recommended for drug diversion

SACRAMENTO — Brian Taughner, the state Justice Department official who was acquitted of child molestation charges, has been recommended for drug rehabilitation classes for possession of marijuana. The misdemeanor marijuana possession charge resulted when detectives investigating the molestation charge last Aug. 1 said they found a small quantity of marijuana. Taughner, who was not in court Friday, issued a statement through Sands apologizing for "the embarrassment I have caused to my office, my boss and myself." "The marijuana was left in my home long ago and I had forgotten it was there," he said.

Ethiopia announces austerity measures

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia — Mengistu Haile Mariam, Ethiopia's Marxist leader, announced stiff austerity measures Saturday, including fuel rationing and a ban on some imports to combat a famine that has affected millions of people. He said in a nationwide radio and television address that all able Ethiopians would be organized to work in drought relief camps and in the controversial resettlement program.

Soviet newspaper blasts Pope's tour

MOSCOW — The government newspaper Izvestia on Saturday criticized Pope John Paul II, saying that on his Latin American tour he characterized leftist revolutionary support as "an anti-Christian deed." It also said the pontiff called for "Christian humility," but did not condemn the "predatory policy of U.S. transnational corporations," the repressions of some Latin American governments and "the outright imperialist siege of Nicaragua by the United States and Central American puppets obedient to it."

Bolivia devalues peso, raises prices

LA PAZ, Bolivia — Bolivia sharply devalued its currency and raised the price of food, gasoline and other commodities Saturday in a bid to stem the threat of an economic collapse. In the sweeping restructuring plan, the official peso exchange rate jumped from 9,000 per U.S. dollar to 50,000 per dollar. On the black market, one U.S. dollar still fetches 120,000 pesos. A series of small devaluations in the future will bring the official and black market rates closer together, Planning Minister Freddy Justiniano told reporters.

English soldiers defused WWII bomb

SHEFFIELD, England — Soldiers defused a 2,200-pound World War II bomb today that had been unearthed by construction workers in this north England steel city. But officers said the bomb, one of the heaviest dropped by the Germans in the 1939-45 conflict, was still unstable and 300 evacuated families were ordered to remain in community hall shelters where they had spent the night on makeshift beds. A workman driving a mechanical digger on the site near Sheffield's Bramhall Lane soccer stadium hit the 6-foot-long bomb Friday. He made several attempts to scrape up what he thought was a lump of metal before the foreman, an army veteran, realized it was a bomb, police said.

24 feared dead as freighter sinks

One rescued after cargo of steel shifts and Polish ship rolls over in North Sea

BREMEN, West Germany (AP) — Rescue ships and helicopters searched icy North Sea waters off the West German coast today for 16 Polish sailors missing after their freighter rolled over and sank rapidly, a German maritime agency said.

The bodies of eight drowned crewmen have been recovered and officials of the West German Society for Ships in Distress said they feared all but one member of the Busko Zdroj's 25-man crew had drowned

Friday night.

The private agency said helicopter patrols had lifted one sailor from a drifting lifeboat and recovered the bodies of eight others.

The German rescue agency said the "Busko Zdroj" sank in 15 minutes late Friday, when its cargo of steel shifted during a severe winter storm, causing the ship to roll over into the North Sea.

The agency said it received a distress call from the Polish freighter

at 9:39 p.m. and immediately dispatched a rescue ship.

Agency officials said the freighter was about 100 miles northwest of the German island of Helgoland when it sent its distress signal, reporting that it was sinking rapidly in rough seas and gale-force winds.

Helicopters and rescue planes from the West German Navy joined the search early today, according to an agency official who asked not to be identified.

He said the surviving sailor was taken to a West German hospital on the island of Sylt, but there was no immediate word on the man's condition or identity.

In Poland, Warsaw Radio reported the accident and said the bodies of six sailors had been found by rescue workers. The radio said it feared the missing crew members had drowned.

The accident was the second-worst shipping catastrophe in Polish history, according to Walery Sitnicki, director of the cabinet at the Shipping Ministry in Warsaw. "It is an enormous mishap," he said.

Radio Warsaw reported that a snowstorm was hampering rescue efforts. It said the water temperature in the area of the catastrophe was about 39 degrees and the air temperature about 32 degrees.

FBI hopes it has solved mystery of missing child

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — A 5-year-old girl found living with a 58-year-old man in a camper park was tentatively identified as a child who disappeared in Venice in 1981, the FBI said Friday.

The child was found more than two weeks ago living in an Anchorage camper park with John R. Altig, authorities said.

On Friday, an Alaska grand jury indicted Altig on three counts of sexual abuse of a minor, and he is being held in lieu of \$250,000 bail.

FBI agent-in-charge Lawrence Nelson said police had contacted a Venice couple whose 18-month-old daughter disappeared from a municipal park in the seaside section of Los Angeles on Aug. 25, 1981.

Nelson said the child had never been finger- or foot-printed, nor had she been to a dentist, so teeth records were not available. But exchanges of photographs produced "some positive response" as to her identity.

A positive identification should be made within 2½ weeks based on

blood tests, he said.

The child, under care of a state-appointed foster parent, "seems to be as happy as a clam" Nelson said.

Authorities said the girl has been able to tell them little about her past except that she had been on a beach when a man came to her and told her that she would be staying with him because her mother was dying.

Officers said the bearded, heavy-set Altig had no satisfactory explanation for how the child came to be in his custody.

Police arrested Altig after the manager of the Anchorage camper park called authorities to say the sight of a 58-year-old man living alone with a small child in a camper trailer "didn't look right."

The state-appointed foster parent later took the child to a physician, who said there was evidence she had been sexually abused, said detective Frank Feightinger.

The FBI is still investigating the possibility of filing kidnap charges against him, he said.

Koreans violated Kim agreements

U.S. ambassador says details were arranged in advance to ensure Kim a safe homecoming

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — The U.S. ambassador accused the Seoul government Saturday of not honoring "firm agreements" about the homecoming of dissident politician Kim Dae-jung, which ended with police dragging Kim and his wife away from their U.S. escorts at the airport.

The South Korean government still had not responded to an earlier "stern note" from the U.S. Embassy demanding an explanation, but it said Kim provoked the Friday confronta-

tion at Seoul's Kimpo International Airport.

Kim, 59, a longtime opposition leader who spent the past two years in self-imposed exile in the United States, remained confined to his western Seoul home. Although he could not leave, authorities insisted he was not under house arrest. They said he was being "protected" by security forces.

Ambassador Richard L. Walker said U.S. authorities "had firm agreements and scenarios worked out with

the Korean government in advance" to ensure Kim's safe and smooth arrival with a group of American supporters, including two congressmen, Reps. Edward Feighan, D-Ohio, and Thomas Foglietta, D-Pa.

"We had an agreement from the Korean government that our embassy personnel would be allowed to go to the ramp to meet the two congressmen and other leaders of the entourage," Walker said in a telephone interview with The Associated Press.

"That agreement was not honored by the government," the ambassador said.

But government spokesman Choi Tae-soon told a Saturday news con-

ference that Seoul had not agreed to allow Kim's U.S. backers to follow him through customs. "I understand there was no agreement for them to go out with Mr. Kim hand in hand, but the government would exert (itself) to facilitate the process of exit for these visitors and take them to Mr. Kim's house," Choi said.

In the encounter at Kimpo, police forcibly separated Kim and his wife from their American escorts shortly after they got off the plane.

The incident drew fire from U.S. officials, two months before South Korean President Chun Doo-hwan is scheduled to meet President Reagan in Washington.

Coughing up twist on twinkie defense

DENVER (AP) — It began as a big-game hunting trip in the Rockies for a group of friends, but ended with gun threats, a stabbing and Robert Eugene Low's arrest while raving about the devil. His lawyer blamed the altitude and cough drops, and a judge agreed.

The lawyer, Michael Miller, said Thursday the case, which he calls the "Cough Drop Caper," was one of the most bizarre he's seen.

"This man came to me saying, 'Hey, I've done this. I don't know why I did it,'" Miller said of Low, who lives in Springfield, Mo.

"He had no history of emotional breakdown. He was under stress at work and started taking Hold cough drops in large amounts, amounts far exceeding the dosage."

The case is currently on appeal to the Colorado Supreme Court by prosecutors challenging the cough drop defense.

In addition, McCowan — who recovered from his stab wound and attended the trial — is suing Low for \$1.5 million.

Dr. Robert Huffaker of the Colorado State Hospital examined Low shortly after the attack and decided Low was suffering from an organic delusional syndrome.

Hold cough drops are produced by Beecham Products Inc., and each lozenge contains 5 milligrams of the chemical dextromethorphan, described as non-narcotic and not habit-forming.

During the trial, Huffaker and Dr. Frederick Lewis of Denver, who had been hired by Miller to examine Low, testified that the dextromethorphan, perhaps aggravated by the rise to mountain elevation, had caused the delusions.

The claim was comparable to the "Twinkie defense," which resulted in a manslaughter verdict for Dan White, charged with killing the mayor of San Francisco and a San Francisco County supervisor. White's lawyers claimed he suffered severe mental depression caused in part by a high-sugar diet of junk food.

Inventions unveiled at expo absent any better mousetraps

WASHINGTON (AP) — There was a better hair dryer, a better fireplace grate, a better snow plow, a better ear wax remover, even a better back washer at the opening Saturday of the 13th annual National Inventors Exposition.

But, for better or worse, there was not a single better mousetrap.

With inventions competing for space, "I don't think there would be one interesting enough to make it," said Bruce Gray of the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office, which sponsored the event.

The fair included about 70 exhibits chosen by the trademark office, 20 by major companies and the rest by individual inventors.

General Motors, Hughes Aircraft,

Dupont, Black and Decker and other firms showed off their latest plastics, satellite launchers and electronic devices.

The small inventors had more down-to-earth creations, including a hidden carport that automatically unfurls itself over a parked car and an artificial Christmas tree that snows on itself.

The new ear wax remover was said to pose less risk of infection than other methods, but its working seemed somewhat complicated and mysterious.

The "Kelley Amazing Grate," a Canadian import, saves enough wood to pay for itself in one wood-burning season, its inventors said.

Also on display were a beer-can

crusher, heart valves, a barrel dumper and heart valves.

Some inventions bordered on the sublime, like the 3M Cochlear Implant, an artificial hearing device approved by the Food and Drug Administration as the first invention to replace one of the body's five senses.

Other inventions bordered on the well, curious.

Rollie W. Paulson showed his record player, on which the tonearm stays still while the turntable platter moves sideways to keep up with the grooves. Paulson says he so far has been unable to convince a company to mass produce it.

"It plays records like they should be played," he said.

Social kissing is not all it's smacked up to be

Impersonal bussing is replacing handshake, and that, my dear, debases the value of same

Social kissing is replacing the handshake as the polite way to say hello and goodbye at Hollywood cocktail lounges, New York social events and a lot of places in between. No one is safe from social kissing, according to an article in the February issue of Harper's Bazaar, although not everybody approves of it.

Judith Martin, who writes on etiquette as Miss Manners, acknowledges the popularity of the social kiss but yearns for a return to the handshake.

"The handshake," she said, "has been devalued by the social kiss, which no two people perform alike and which leaves a lot of lipstick and other confusion in its wake."

The social kiss can extend to anybody from your best friend to

total strangers, according to some social arbiters. Others disagree.

"I know in Los Angeles they kiss everyone, whether they know the person or not," said Virginia Depew, who edits the Washington "Green Book" social registry. "In Washington, it happens, too."

"But we're a protocol service (as well as a registry), and we would advise you not to kiss everyone. I just don't think it's proper. Kissing should be between very, very close friends, not mere acquaintances, and certainly not strangers. We frown on it, yes."

Los Angeles society writer Jean-

nine Stein counters with the view that it's always safe to kiss "your favorite designer and your hairdresser" because "it's the thing to do — and because you're so glad to see them, darling."

"Top models always air kiss each other," Stein added. "They peck the air near each other's cheek's and then go back to doing their nails."

Hollywood columnist James Bacon said of the local custom, "Cheek kissing is a greeting for best friends as well as for hostesses you never met before. Bogart and Wayne and all those big macho guys did it."

There was nothing sissy about it."

There's a right way to perform the social kissing rite, according to John Duka, fashion columnist for The New York Times.

"There is only one proper way to do it," he said. "Hold each other's right hand by the fingers. Twist your

mouth as far to the left as possible and touch each other lightly on the right side of the jaw. That's the kiss that counts. Anything else is too personal."

The social kiss has been around for centuries and at one point was so common in ancient Rome that it was banned by Emperor Tiberius.

Post office mascot stamped 'cancelled'

RYE, N.Y. (AP) — Dogs and mail carriers are often not the best of friends. But Zipcode, the mascot at this town's post office, is another matter.

Postal officials who evicted the dog after nine years at the post office have responded to protests by workers there by saying they will hold a ceremony to retire the mutt and erect a plaque in her honor, says Gordon Hensley, a spokesman for U.S. Rep. Joseph DioGuardi.

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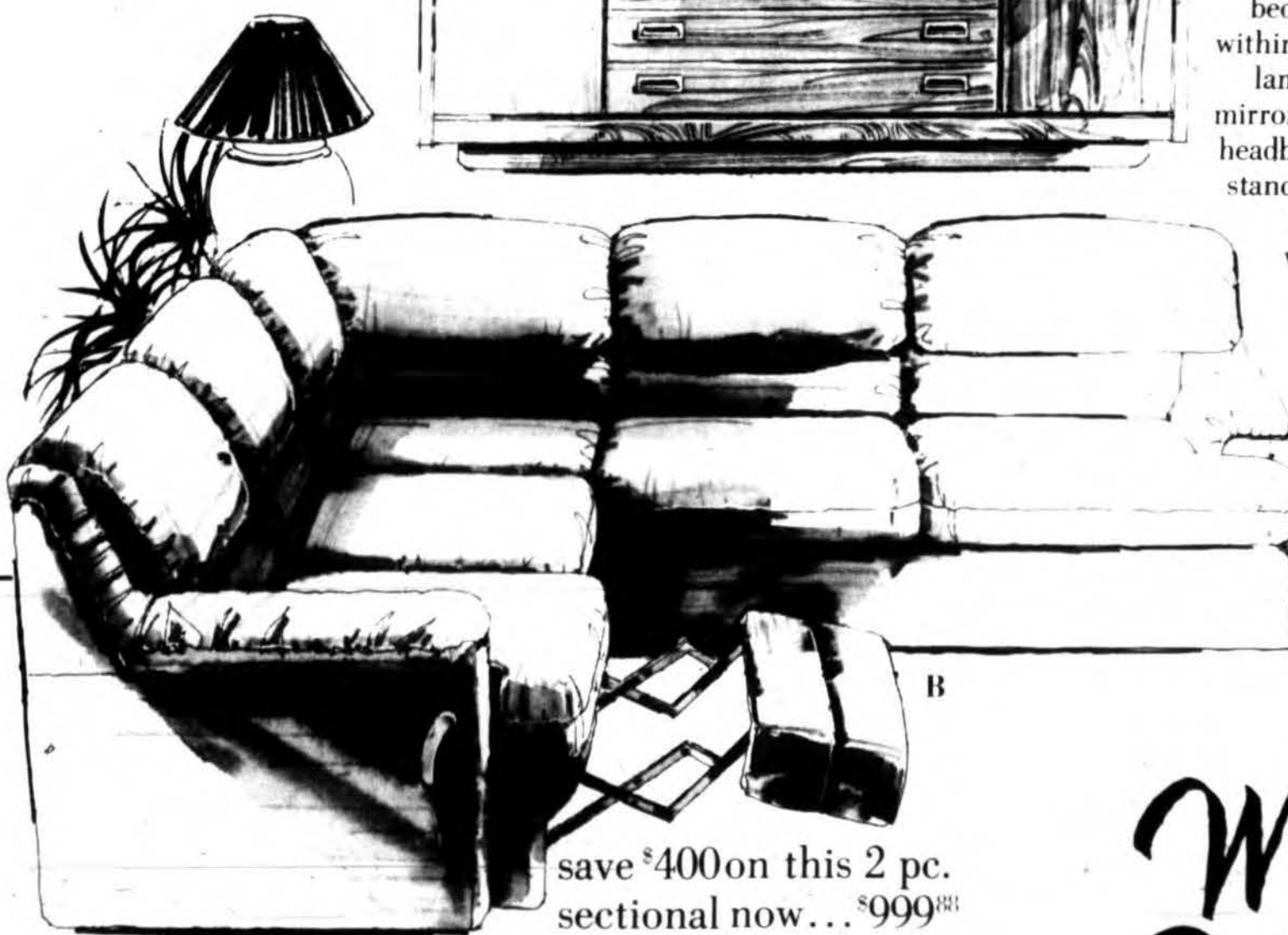

Reagan address another triumph

Traditional, liberal philosophies blend via political genius

Stephen Chapman, columnist and editorial writer for the Chicago Tribune, is taking the place of columnist Patrick Buchanan, who has taken a post as chief of communications for the Reagan administration.

Only in America can a conservative president go before the nation and issue a call for revolution.

Elsewhere, revolution is the dream of the left, and conservatism the staunch ally of tradition. Here, Ronald Reagan, in his State of the Union address, pays homage to established values while extolling an economic philosophy whose central purpose is to generate ceaseless change.

That is his political genius: He appeals both to respect for permanence and authority and to the dynamic individualism that has marked America since its founding. Almost anywhere else in the world, those ideals would be at war with one another. Reagan weaves them into a seamless cloth.

The president may place the perceived good of the community first when it comes to school prayer or constitutional rights, but he cloaks it all in appeals to the freedom of the individual. His policies may be conservative, but his words are undiluted libertarianism. The contradictions are unacknowledged and, politically speaking, irrelevant.

It is the libertarian strain that often produces words approaching eloquence. "There are no constraints on the human mind, no walls around the human spirit, no barriers to progress except those we ourselves erect," Reagan declared at one point. "Every dollar the federal government does not take from us, every decision it does not make for us, will make our economy stronger, our lives more abundant, our future more free," he said at another.

Like most political rhetoric, this shouldn't be taken too seriously. Reagan may say he wants no constraints on ideas, but his casual regard for First Amendment guarantees belies the claim. The same president who wants to constrain the American government's power at home will spare no expense to expand it abroad. But his inconsistencies, perhaps by design, match those of most Americans. None of them create insurmountable political problems.

Neither, to judge by their televised response to his address, will the Democrats. Walter Mondale got the votes of 41 percent of Americans last November and his party easily retained control of the House of Representatives — a split decision, at worst. But the Democrats' reply to the State of the Union message sounded like a funeral dirge.

It was defensive, apologetic and lacking in any theme beyond the limp one offered by its narrator, Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton: "This is a party that knows it has to change." Franklin Roosevelt's political success produced that odd phenomenon, the "me-too Republican." Reagan has spawned me-too Democrats — not a choice but an echo.

Not that the opposition has no appealing ideas. Their 1984 presidential nominee gave a perfunctory endorsement to a hard-headed tax simplification plan drafted by Democratic Sen. Bill Bradley of New Jersey and Rep. Richard Gephardt of Missouri. Too bad it was Walter Mondale's vow of a tax increase that became the centerpiece of his economic policy. Now thoroughgoing tax reform is Ronald Reagan's cause.

Likewise, the Democrats bring a needed skepticism to the debate about the role and makeup of the American military machine. Trouble is, any money they might save would be squandered in Great Society-style handouts.

The Democrats unfortunately are hobbled by an unshakable attachment to welfareism, a distrust of economic competition and an obsequious posture toward every group that can fashion a claim to be discriminated against. And their televised response suggests that even when they point out the problems created by Reagan's policies — say, the budget deficit — they lack bold remedies. The Democrats often sound like sheep in wolves' clothing.

Reagan's forceful address dramatized once more his flair for seizing the nation's imagination. The lackluster Democrats only made it hard to imagine their resurgence.

Thatcher degree withheld; nation reacts with outrage

Oxford dons deny traditional degree for prime minister

LONDON — Forget the U.S. budget, forget the pope, forget Geneva, it is the dons at Oxford who are the center of attention. And what they have done has focused not only on themselves, but on Oxford; and not only on Oxford, but on the role of the university; and not only in Great Britain, but also elsewhere: including the United States.

Here is the narrative. The tradition, quite regular, has been for Oxford to vote an honorary degree to any of its graduates who attain the position of prime minister. Accordingly, it has been bizarre that years went by and no honorary degree was offered to Margaret Thatcher. But finally, this time around, she was nominated. What then happened — a withdrawal of her nomination brought on by the action of what they call there a "congregation" of Oxford dons, reinforced by noisy students — is the cause of consternation.

The distinguished scholar Max Beloff, formerly Gladstone Professor of government and public administration, was dismayed on learning that his successor to that august chair was one of the two ringleaders of the movement to dishonor Mrs. Thatcher. About the other ringleader, Sir Kenneth Dover, Max Beloff writes (in the Daily Telegraph) merely that he has been "hitherto only known to the public as the author of the standard work on Greek homosexuality." This is eyebrow-raising Professor Beloff's initial observation that the withdrawal of the honor is especially galling given that Mrs. Thatcher is the first Oxford woman to have become prime minister.

But what is happening in Oxford, Professor Beloff says, is of great national concern. "The simplest way to express a complicated process is to say that the university has been employing itself in eradicating its primary purpose, and that in so doing it has alienated itself from society at large."

In England, as in America, universities were founded to serve church and state. To this end, in England, the state picks up most of the bills of the great national universities.

Now Beloff's point is that a national university has got to think of itself as a part of the national culture, not merely as an enclave from which, without umbilical cord to that culture, it can go its atomistic way. "Of course," he adds, "it is possible to caricature this relationship to see Oxford as a pillar of the 'establishment,' yet can one think of any great university in any country that is, or could be, anything else?"

That is a profound and provocative assertion, but Professor Beloff thinks of it not merely in cultural terms but in economic terms. "What did not change, and what was enhanced by the great Victorian reforms, was the view that Oxford existed to serve the nation, not the nation to give sustenance to the university. Indeed its funding, public or private, could not be justified, cannot be justified, on any other grounds." I wrote a book asserting that thesis 35 years ago.

Of course, a college is also a sanctuary against philistinism and totalitarianism, and one would hope

that if a Cromwell reappeared in Great Britain, let alone that it should spawn a Hitler, the university would go out of business before being defunct. But however controversial Mrs. Thatcher, she is not a political mutation against which the healthy antibodies of British tradition might be expected to react.

And indeed, her rejection has attracted far more attention than any honorary degree conventionally bestowed would do. Politicians and editors are wryly observing that the ostensible cause for denying her a degree — that she cut the scientific appropriation for the universities (disputed, by the way, in the House of Commons) — is ill-served by both dons and students, the former spoiled, the latter taken far too seriously. "If the behavior of the majority in Congress has been deplorable, what are we to make of the impertinence of grant-fed post-graduates putting their feeble treble into the chorus against the prime minister?" Professor Beloff asks.

As for Mrs. Thatcher, her conduct has been provocatively sweet and tolerant. She has no desire for any degree not enthusiastically awarded to her. ... Oxford has the undisputed right to make up its own mind in these matters.

She knows how to get the people with her, and they are pouring in. "Oxford University is traditionally the home of the lost cause," writes in one reader to the Telegraph. "Thank goodness it does not consider Mrs. Thatcher one." And then — inevitably — the historical precedent is found. "In the 1790s a group of Oxford dons exercised their right and their prejudices by stopping an honorary degree for Edmund Burke." That one must really have hurt the dons.

Soccer balls, subtle threats new weapons in Latin war

Duarte tries new means of winning peasants' hearts

WASHINGTON — Can soccer balls and subtle threats succeed where military might and death squads have failed to win the hearts and minds of El Salvador's peasants?

The government of President Jose Napoleon Duarte evidently thinks it's worth a try.

My reporter Jon Lee Anderson accompanied a Salvadoran army unit on a helicopter "drop-in" on a village deep in territory under the influence of leftist guerrillas.

The commander of this airborne propaganda mission was Col. Domingo Monterrosa, who was killed not long after when his gunship was downed.

The high point of Monterrosa's visit — as far as the younger villagers were concerned, at least — was when he handed out spanking new, red-and-black-checked Spaulding soccer balls to the assembled crowd. The balls were distributed directly out of their factory boxes, whose labels clearly showed that they had reached the colonel by way of a political officer in the U.S. Embassy in San Salvador.

Monterrosa had been guaranteed an attentive audience for his psychological warfare experiment. An advance party of soldiers had been sent

in to the jungle hilltop the day before and shooed away the rebel sentinels posted outside the village in a brief exchange of gunfire.

The thrust of the colonel's message to the villagers was that the army wanted their support — or else.

"Tell me I'm not lying," he shouted to the peasants. "Isn't it true what I hear, that the guerrillas have been here among you?"

Voices in the crowd shouted confirmation. "I knew it," cried Monterrosa. "But even so, I haven't called on the air force to bomb here, nor the artillery either, have I?"

He then sweetened his veiled threat with an emotional proclamation of solidarity. "We are your true brothers," he shouted. "We are giving our blood to the earth. But it's up to you to make the earth produce."

Monterrosa turned the podium over to a female "social worker" and a male psychologist, members of a "psy-ops" team, who expanded on his theme of cooperation between village and army.

By the time the morning speeches closed with a three-minute prayer, the crowd was solidly in the colonel's

pocket. Several women approached Monterrosa and began whispering to him. He stationed himself at the podium — a table set in the meadow. "If, like these people here," he called to the crowd, "you have things to denounce, come and tell me and we will investigate what you say."

The colonel got more than whispers. Within an hour, a cache of rebel propaganda (including caricatures of Monterrosa) and some grenades were turned over to him. And a villager led soldiers to a hiding place where the "subversivos" had buried automatic weapons.

Monterrosa learned his psy-ops basics in Taiwan. In 1978 he was one of about 20 high-ranking Salvadoran army officers who took the two-month course. His classmates included ex-Maj. Roberto d'Aubuisson, the right-wing politician, and Col. Reyes Mena, chief of staff of the Salvadoran armed forces.

Monterrosa was critical of his colleagues for not having put what they learned from the Taiwanese into practice when they got home. "We'd have won against the expansion of communism," he said. Instead, he said, the army's repressive tactics had alienated the peasants.

Did the colonel think his day's effort to win over the villagers had been worth it? Monterrosa pointed to a group of young men. "Look for yourself," he said. "They're playing with the balls, aren't they?"

UCI tops Pacific, 70-65

Lee ignites rally, Anteaters hold on for PCAA victory

STOCKTON — With the San Diego Chicken among the 3,820 in attendance at the Alex G. Spanos Center here Saturday night, the UC Irvine basketball team hit the break-even mark in PCAA play with a 70-65 victory over the University of Pacific.

The Anteaters struggled early in the game, as the Tigers used a 22-10 rebounding advantage in the first half to help them build a 31-28 lead at halftime.

But UCI, behind Jerome Lee's 10 second-half points, quickly came back. The Anteaters outscored Pacific, 17-9, in the first eight minutes of the period to assume a 45-40 lead.

Anteater Coach Bill Mulligan shrugged off his team's lethargic play in the first half.

"We really played well at the start of the second half," he explained. "I thought Jerome Lee really took over at that point. I'm more easily contented these days even when we win ugly."

UCI's biggest lead was nine points at 48-39 and 50-41, but the Tigers made sure it wasn't going to be easy for the Anteaters. Pacific climbed back into contention at 59-58 with 6:04 remaining in the game.

Irvine regained a six-point advantage moments later at 66-60, but when Domingo Rosario scored for Pacific with 44 seconds remaining, it was 68-65. UCI kept Pacific in the game in the latter stages by missing four straight bonus opportunities at the free-throw line.

Ex-Arizona State coach treated media shabbily in his dealings with the Lions

A journalist shed a personal tear and embraced his colleagues at the performance of Darryl Rogers as he departed Arizona State to become head coach of the Detroit Lions.

Recap the series of events:

On Tuesday night, Rogers was reported by the Arizona media to be leaving the Sun Devils to take over as coach of the Lions. Rogers angrily denied that he was leaving and said the reports were absurd.

The media further said that Rogers had signed a contract calling for five years with the Lions. Rogers screamed bloody murder and said he had not so much as been contacted by the Detroit people.

The Arizona reporters suggested that Rogers had been in Detroit talking to the Lions. Rogers vehemently denied this, saying that the trip he was on was to San Francisco and Chicago for recruiting purposes.

All of this on Tuesday night. On Wednesday, Rogers announced that he was leaving ASU to become head coach of the Detroit Lions. The call and subsequent job offer came out of the blue on Wednesday morning.

Journalists and sports fans around the country scratched their scalps and searched their memories for the last time they were subjected to this sort of hogwash.

It was enough that the intelligence

of the media and general public was insulted, indeed abused. The implication by Rogers was that the media was distorting facts and manufacturing items and, in effect, it was the reporters who were the liars.

OK. Now you search this rubble for some scrap of justification.

It would be obvious that this sort of upheaval at the time colleges sign their recruits would be damaging to ASU and Rogers could only be commended for protecting the school. In which case, it would behoove the coach to keep his mouth shut and implore the Lions to do the same.

It is significant that the leak was in Arizona.

Even the old "no comment" dodge would have shown more respect to the inquiring media. This game is played all the time and generally ends

pleasantly enough with little or no resentment.

Rogers' implication that the gentlemen of the press were playing games, however, was inexcusable.

The media guys will rebound. Not to worry. The journalistic forces live daily with individuals who will not speak the truth — or utter any sort of sound — unless it is to their advantage.

A case in point is that of four-time Olympic gold medal winner Carl Lewis. During the summer Games in Los Angeles, Lewis and his inconsiderate manager treated the media very shabbily and would grant no interviews.

The most memorable statement came from the manager: "Carl Lewis will be bigger than Michael Jackson."

He meant in terms of demand and money earned, of course. When this did not develop and the money men were not breaking down Lewis' door, the athlete and his camp said they could not understand the media.

The unhappy truth was the media could not understand the Lewis attitude from the outset and still don't.

Erving and Gervin both have been All-Stars for all nine of their years in the NBA, and Gervin played in three ABA All-Star games.

Elizabeth replaces 'mirror, mirror on the wall'

Elizabeth is quite a "lady." She can clean your face three times and follow up with as many makeover looks and never lay a hand on you.

Elizabeth is the new beauty makeover computer developed by Elizabeth Arden research.

On her recent trip to Bullock's South Coast Plaza (she's the traveling type and will be off to San Francisco today) she was making some fantasies come true — women saw themselves on a screen. In fact, they saw four images.

"The Beauty Makeover Computer, lets a woman instantly have access to new ideas, and with the assistance of a makeup consultant, objectively recognize which new trends enhance her individual fashion outlook," said Jerry Hamilton-Catty, national makeup artist for Elizabeth Arden.

Jerry and a team of five consultants were on hand to assist clients with their makeovers.

The computer technology in the process is absolutely amazing — but, then I'm still in awe of electricity.

"We have been using Elizabeth since July and the response has been great as we travel about the country with her. The women like seeing themselves on the screen, husbands and children are fascinated by the computer," said Hamilton-Catty.

Eventually, smaller versions of the computer will be available in stores where the product line is sold.

"It will be able to save women money because they can see how they look in a color before they buy," Jerry added. "A woman's makeup, like her personality and lifestyle, should be a constantly evolving process. The dawn of the high-tech era in beauty is a giant leap forward."

A makeover on Elizabeth begins with a client's video image projected on a screen. The computer scans this image to define average skin color and stores this information in its memory to use as the basis for color

recommendations.

I sat with Consultant Bobbie Pedersen at a console in front of the screen. By using an electric stylus (a tool that looked like a pencil) she selected and "applied" colors to a second image that had been stripped by the computer of the makeup I had on. (The original image stays on the screen so you can compare).

The computer suggests a range of makeup colors after it checks out your skin tones, but it does not select the exact colors. Pedersen was doing this after we chatted about colors with which I felt comfortable.

Although the foundation stayed basically the same in all images, she changed the look with blushes, lipsticks and eyeshadows.

Amazing...fascinating...really mind-boggling...there should be other words to describe what Elizabeth can do. For instance, you would see the blush being stroked on the cheekbones and then see a "brush" smoothe it out. Or see the lip liner making its marks and then the lipstick being applied.

All the while the consultant was discussing the methods she was using and why. As she reshaped my

eyebrows, she explained where the arch should be, where they should start and end. "Eyebrows should look like sisters, not identical twins," Pedersen said.

By the conclusion of the 45-minute session, I was on the screen four times — the way I went in plus once with green eyeshadow and nude lipstick; again in blue shadows and Arden Red lipstick and then in grey shadows with sunny coral lipstick.

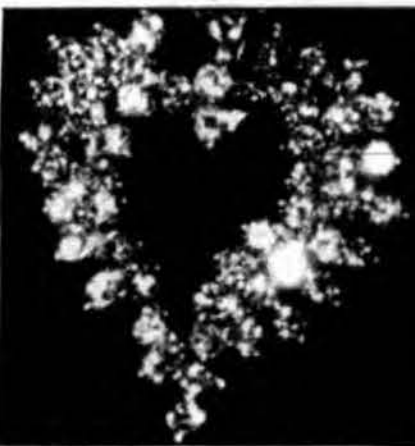
I was given a complete print out of all the colors used in each look. The one I had chosen as my favorite had been circled, and there was a folder which listed products needed for skin care and tips for using.

The latter product suggestions were based on my answers to a consultant's queries on skin type, etc.

Pretty soon a woman won't have to answer questions like "Is your skin dry?" Elizabeth Arden has developed a skin-imaging machine. When it is readily available in the stores, you will simply put your face against it and let its computer do a read-out on type and texture.

Modern technology — isn't it wonderful? Still your friendly clerk has to reach on the shelf to get the products you want to buy and ring up the sales! (I don't want to hear about robots.)

Diamonds, lovers well suited

And amethysts gain popularity as the gem for heart-shaped gift

February is for sweethearts. And things heart-shaped are most appropriate as gifts.

Amethyst, the birthstone for the month, has become a tradition, said David Stith, of Nathan Alan Jewelers in South Coast Plaza, "to give as a special valentine, especially if the person was born in February. Currently, amethyst is the most popular semi-precious stone."

"Puffed gold hearts, cut-out hearts, diamond hearts and floating hearts are the most popular kinds of fine jewelry given on Valentine's Day."

A floating heart is thicker on one side. The chain passes through the center of the heart allowing the heart to "float" freely along the chain.

"A trendy one would be either a Mizpah or a Best Friend charm," he said. "Mizpah is a heart-shaped piece of gold, about one inch long with a zig-zag break down the center. Each piece of the heart has a bale for a chain. When the two pieces of the heart are put together, a prayer on the back reads, 'The Lord watch between me and thee when we are sent one from another.' Cost is about \$185."

The Best Friend charm is much smaller and costs under \$25. "It's actually two pendants that can be broken in half with a little ceremony," Stith said. "Each 'friend' receives a piece of the pendant with the word 'best' on one side and 'friend' on the other side."

At Jewels by Joseph in South Coast Plaza, James T. Hartstein said diamond hearts, colored hearts, and heart lockets are traditional Valentine's Day jewelry.

Trendy, he said, would be something such as pearls, strung with gold or silver hearts. Or a heart-shaped connector that would hold together

several strands of beads creating a twisted rope effect.

Looking for extravagance? Present your best valentine with a heart-shaped diamond solitaire pendant inside a gold and diamond mount. "A mere \$9,000," Hartstein said.

Traditional channel set hearts (a heart within a heart) in solid gold or gold with diamonds are also attractive choices for someone special.

"Jewelry is a very personal gift," said Hartstein.

Men like star sapphires and star rubies the best, said jeweler Russ Hind of Laguna Beach. With Cabochon cut, either stone shows a 6-ray star (rarely, 12-rays) in reflected light, due to a phenomenon known as asterism.

Hind claims men prefer their stones in heavy settings. Although it's expensive, Hind says, Chrysoberyl cat's-eye (characteristically yellow)

could be very special for a man on Valentine's Day.

"A less expensive choice would be either a garnet star or a tiger's-eye in a heavy gold setting," Hind said.

"Although some men do like diamonds, it is still debatable whether they have really accepted diamonds as a man's stone," said Hind. "The only acceptable pearl design for men would be a pearl as a part of a tie tack."

A case in Hind's shop at 1273 South Coast Highway, holds some unusual heart shapes in different sizes made from yellow moonstones, black jade, sagittic quartz, plumb agate, and moss agate (moss is clearly visible inside the agate). Each has a gold bale and is priced between \$16 and \$50.

No matter what the choice or extravagance of the gift, your valentine will always cherish the golden heart that remembered.

ROMANTIC? TIE TELLS

One of the traditional Valentine's Day gifts for "him" has now become a welcome gift for "her" as well. The necktie is provocative, functional, colorful, appealing and revealing, flamboyant and conservative — a key to a man's or woman's personality on Valentine's Day or anytime.

The Neckwear Association of America has put together a trivia quiz with a Valentine's Day slant. Try your luck with these questions.

If you're at a Happy Hour cocktail spot, what color ties will clue you to the most romantic type?

Blue. Psychologists say the romantically inclined will choose blues more than any other color. If you want excitement, look for Valentine's Day Red.

Raccoon coats and T-shirts have been symbols for very visible "groups" in earlier times. What group will the tie be a symbol for in the mid-1980s?

Yuppies! Young Urban Professionals are very aware of the "dressing for success" trend. As you walk through retail stores with first-floor tie departments, note the colorful displays aimed at the younger careerist.

Do ties get wider or narrower during times of prosperity?

Wider! (It happened in both the post-World War II times and again in the boom period of the

late 1960s.)

Today men and women need to know four basic ways to knot a tie. How many did the well-dressed man need to know in the early 1800s?

declining to take credit for her own involvement in numerous charitable efforts.

"The Glass Slipper Award is really for Charley," she said. "He's the one that does everything, not me."

But Nora's own contributions include affiliation with the Orange County Philharmonic Society, Fashionables support group of Chapman College, the National Charity League, Research Associates of UC Irvine, and Assessment Treatment and Services Center's Sophisticates. She is on the advisory boards of the Salvation Army and Laguna Beach Museum of Art and on the board of the Angels of Orange County Performing Arts Center plus serving as an associate of some 20 groups including the Cinderella Guild.

More than 100 underwriters of the April 17 "Designs for Dining" were on hand to see them accept the octagonal lucite award.

Childrens Hospital is a subject that makes Charley's eyes light up as he talks about the expansion and the successful fund-raising campaign.

In the case of Orangewood, the

He's a director for Boy Scouts of America, Newport Harbor Art Museum, Business Committee for the Arts and Providence Speech and Hearing. Also he is on the advisory board of Boys Club of Santa Ana and Sherman Library and Gardens.

Although Nora says: "they never pushed their three daughters to get involved in charitable causes, all are civic-minded."

"Seeing my parents so involved during the last 10 or 15 years did set an example," said daughter Marilyn Gianulias. "I feel we all owe something to the community and have been so blessed. I enjoy the camaraderie of other people working for the same interest."

"Joining groups probably started back in high school. My mother was always at home when we returned from school and encouraged us in our efforts," added Marilyn, wife of developer Jim Gianulias. "She's my best friend and is so supportive of my father."

Daughters Charlene and Janet are married to attorneys Mike Immell and Phil Hamilton. There are six... almost seven grandchildren.

Besides fun with their family, (they are often seen at benefits as a group) the Hesters love to travel although they haven't toured much during the last seven and a half months.

"We have been remodeling and redecorating the house. It should all be done next week," Nora said as we toured their lovely waterfront home of 28 years located in an area Charley developed.

Also, during leisure hours she enjoys gardening and needlepoint and they both like to play bridge with friends. Charley can be seen at Santa Ana Country Club with his "lunch and bridge" friends and on the links of Big Canyon several times a week.

And likely as not, if someone mentions a campaign that needs his help, Charley will probably take out his note pad and start figuring.

City of Hope lauds Beckman, guilds gather auction prizes

Dr. Arnold Beckman, who rarely takes center stage, was the man of the hour as City of Hope National Medical Center honored the internationally known scientist and philanthropist on the 50th anniversary of his founding of Beckman Instruments.

City of Hope president Abe Bolsky (president of Tishman Construction Corp. of California) and executive medical director Dr. Charles Mittman hosted the dinner honoring Beckman and his wife Mabel at the Newport Beach Marriott Hotel.

Bolsky noted that Beckman's many contributions included establishing the Beckman Research Institute at the City of Hope in 1983, highlighting the family's long record of support for the medical center.

Beckman, who traditionally shuns the spotlight, said, "Too often I am given credit for more than I have done, but I am very gratified to contribute to the research effort at the City of Hope."

Joining in applause for the Beckmans were 300 civic and social leaders and members of academic and scientific communities including the E.H. (Hubie) Clarks of Newport Beach (chairman of Baker International, Orange); H. Russell Smith (chairman of Avery International, Pasadena) and Rudy J. Munzer (chairman of Petrolane, Long Beach).

Also in the crowd were Beckman Instruments president Louis T. Rosso; Dr. Robert Gallo of the National Institutes of Health, Bethesda, Md.; Dr. Bryce Douglas, vice president of corporate affairs, SmithKline Beckman (Beckman merged with SmithKline Corp. in Philadelphia in 1982); Dr. Howard Schachman, department of molecular biology, UC Berkeley; Orange County supervisors Thomas Riley and Bruce Nestande, City of Hope executive director Ben and Beverly Horowitz, City of Hope associate executive director Dr. Sanford and Evelyn Shapiro, City of Hope honorary president Emanuel H. and Fran Fineman; Mrs. Lee Graff and Judge Bernard and Mildred Selber.

The Beckman success story literally started on a sour note: His first development was the Beckman pH meter, first used to measure the acidity of lemon juice in a Southern California citrus processing plant. To date millions of these meters have been used in medicine, sci-

The Six of Diamonds was fuming as he strutted around the lobby of the hotel. "It was disgraceful," he thundered. "He made a laughing stock of me in front of my peers."

The incident that had provoked this outburst occurred during the Life Master Pair Championship for the Von Zedtwitz Gold Cup. The hand is shown above. The Six of Diamonds was in the hand of one of the world's great players, and he and his partner reached six clubs on the 43rd trick. The problem was how to handle the hand should the minor suits follow the probabilities and split 4-2. Obviously, communications to the South hand were going to be a problem.

"I must say I have seen better contracts," continued the Six. "The hand could not be played along crossruff lines because it was unlikely that my nephew, the Six of Clubs, would stand up as a ruff. And for the life of me I couldn't see how we were going to make the contract if we cashed a high diamond and then ruffed a couple of diamonds in dummy, because the closed hand was an entry short."

"My expert won the opening lead in dummy, led the singleton diamond and, after East produced the five he announced: 'Time for a deep finesse,' and played me to the trick. Of course, I lost the trick. After all, the opponents held four cards higher than me and none lower."

"The rest was easy. Declarer won the heart continuation, came to hand with a trump and ruffed a low diamond. Then he returned to hand with a trump and drew trumps. When they split 4-2, declarer claimed the rest of the tricks."

"At no other table did declarer lose a diamond trick. What I can't understand is why then did no other declarer succeed in making 12 tricks at a club contract?"

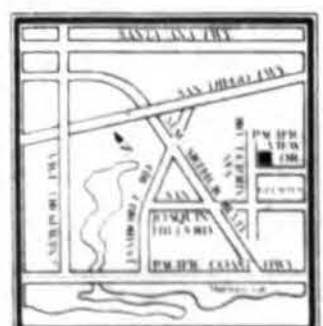

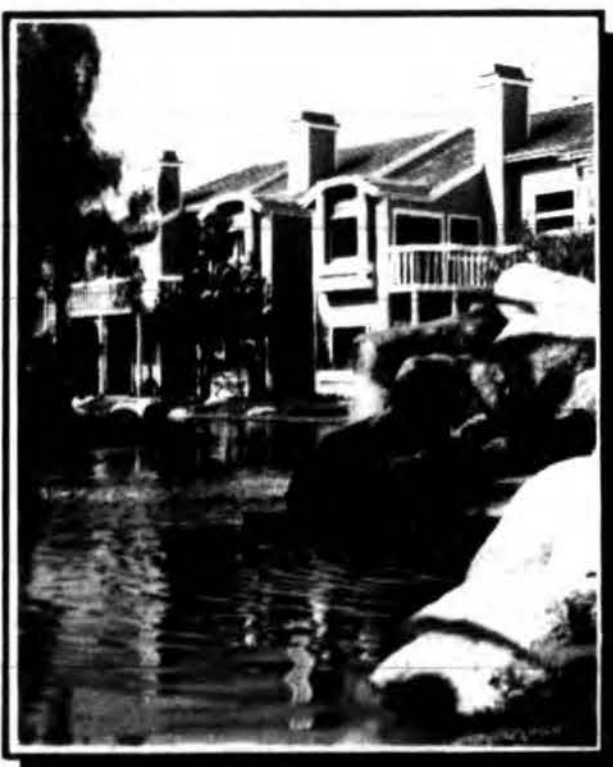

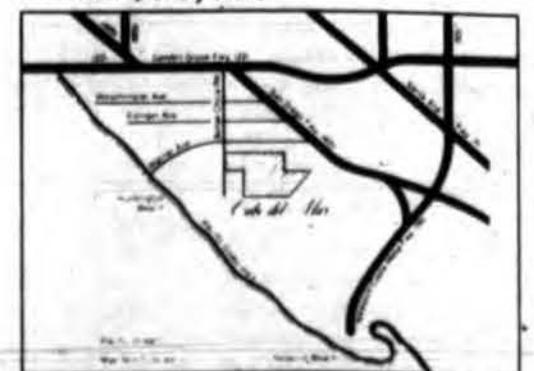
