

## PEER POWER

*How teen courts are sweeping  
the country and helping to keep  
"bad" kids out of trouble*

**T**rust it to The Most Trusted Man in America to follow up on one of the most important events in recent U.S. history. In his hour-long special TV report *Honor, Duty and a War Called Vietnam*, to be aired Thursday, **Walter Cronkite** revisits the battlefields and prison camps and conducts interviews on

America's only undeclared war. Congressman **John McCain** (R-Ariz.) went along with Cronkite to revisit the infamous North Vietnamese prison camp Plantation, from which the first prisoners were released in 1983. McCain had been a POW when serving as a captain in the Navy in Vietnam. "When he stood in his cell [in the camp, which is

now used as a motion picture center for the military], McCain was clearly uptight — he wanted to get out into the sunlight pretty quickly," recalls Cronkite. "Then the commandant took us to his reception area, which turned out to be the same room in which McCain had been tortured under interrogation. It was a little tough for him to sit there

and be polite." Cronkite was also able to talk with some of the North Vietnamese generals. Were they hostile? "Not hostile, really — not in the sense of obvious hostility," Cronkite says. "But hostility came through, I thought, in a little arrogance and pride (they'd call it pride, I'd call it arrogance) over having defeated us, having driven the

great American army out of their country. One general presented me with a small bud vase made out of the aluminum of what he claimed was the 100th American plane shot down. I thought that was in supreme bad taste." About the formerly war-torn South Vietnamese capital, Saigon, Cronkite observes: "In a way it's rather pleasant in its physical aspect. It's a bicycle economy; nearly everybody's on bicycles. The absence of the military has lowered the noise and pollution levels; Saigon has rather clear, quiet air." Uncle Walter also commented on another change he wasn't so pleased with: "What is missing is the beauty of the girls — their lovely, long-haired beauty is gone. I don't know why, but they've all cut their

# PEER POWER

**To help keep "bad" kids out of trouble, teen courts are springing up around the country. Here's how they can work.**

**F**ifteen-year-old Ronald, an amiable high school student, was arrested by police and charged with theft of bicycle equipment totaling \$8. When his mother saw him at the Odessa, Texas, police station, handcuffed, with tears in his eyes, she too began to cry.

He was released in his mother's custody. "I was so scared," said the boy. "I thought she was going to kill me. But when we got in the car she said, 'Ronald, I had such hopes for you. I trusted you.' I guess I let her down."

Shoplifting is not unusual among adolescents, according to juvenile crime experts. For Ronald, it was his first offense. The motivation was obviously deprivation and need; he never thought of the consequences.

His parents, always mobile, were now divorced, and he was often shuttled between them. Being new to his neighborhood, he had difficulty making friends, got in with the wrong crowd, and drifted into trouble. "I would have done anything to become part of the group," said Ronald.

When it was time for Ronald to face the court, he was apprehensive. He told the state's attorney, "I needed the [bike] parts, and I didn't have the money to pay for them." The jury, led by the bailiff, filed out to decide his sentence.

A familiar scene? Yes... and no. The lawyers, judge and jury Ronald had to face were teenagers, and most of the participants — now jurors, attorneys, bailiffs, clerks — had themselves once been defendants. The Odessa teen court program is designed to help young first-time offenders such as Ronald, who might be developing a pattern of criminal behavior that can be stopped early by promoting a healthy attitude about oneself as well as the law. And teen courts are springing up all over the country. They exist in such places as Denver; Seattle; Portland, Ore.; Scranton and Erie, Penn.; Richardson and Grand Prairie, Texas; Oswego, Oneida, Tarrytown, Ithaca and Newburgh, N.Y. A television movie on the subject will air this Tuesday.

The jury is still out as to whether teen courts are a fad or an important judicial innovation. As Hunter Hurst, executive director of the National Center for Juvenile Justice in Pittsburgh, pointed out, "I don't think their performance has been well measured." But, he added, "without question," their efficiency lies in the fact that they enable young people to have better understanding of, and more respect for, the law.

"We ought to be encouraging innovation [such as youth court programs], but

as we encourage it, we need to have enough healthy skepticism to document it," added Hurst. "Implement them and measure them, and make me wrong, because the answers to juvenile delinquency are so few that I certainly wouldn't want to rule this one out before the fact."

The Odessa teen court has been in existence for a little over a year, and more than 1,000 cases have been heard. Thus far, no teenager found guilty of a misdemeanor and fewer than 15 percent of traffic offenders have been in further trouble. This speaks well for the project when the national average of second-time youthful offenders is now over 50 percent.

Judge Ken G. Spencer, 73, is a veteran jurist and one of two adults involved in the Odessa teen court. He believes the program is invaluable because "the kids learn something about their own rights, and they respect the legal system." Natalie Rothstein is the teen court coordinator. She runs the show, counsels teenagers in trouble, and attempts to channel their negative energy into something constructive. "Before teen court, many kids fell through the cracks in the legal system," she said. "The court dockets were loaded, and less serious offenses were put on a back burner. The youngster got a slap on the wrist and was sent home to sin no more." But in the teen court program, each youngster is quickly tried by his peers and is expected to complete obligations to society.

Teen court deals only with first offenders and handles a wide range of cases, including traffic violations, shoplifting, runaways, criminal trespass, theft, driving while intoxicated, and possession of drugs and alcohol. Young-

sters between ages 10 and 16 must plead guilty (not-guilty pleas and felonies are dealt with at municipal court), and they are accompanied to court by their parents. Teenagers tried on drug- and alcohol-related charges are assigned to a chemical abuse education and prevention class. Parents attend a workshop on behavior modification techniques.

Sentences entail jury duty and community service. Offenders work for institutions such as the Red Cross, hospitals, nursing homes, and libraries, or for the victim to pay damages. Jury members assign the number of hours of service. Upon fulfillment of the sentence, charges are dismissed, and the offender's record is clean. Every defendant must later function as a juror. "This forces them on the justice side of the criminal justice system," Rothstein pointed out. "They're not going to be involved in law-breaking behavior, because they're getting positive reinforcement for positive kinds of behavior."

The maximum hours a defendant may serve is 30. When Ronald was sentenced to 18 hours, he chose to work at the animal shelter. He said he feels good about the program and about himself. "Now I have friends that I work with and friends through the program. And they like me for me. This all made me realize something about myself," he mused. "I'm OK."

The youths who find themselves before the court come from all sorts of families. "They're just ordinary mainline kids," says Rothstein. "They experience a feeling of not belonging. But when they get involved in teen court, they start to shine."

Andy Reeves once felt isolated from

her peers. "They were snobs. Maybe they thought I was snobby, too, but they didn't really know me. I was never asked to go to a party, or a movie, or anyplace," she said. "Maybe they felt that if they could make me feel not as important as them, it would make them feel more important."

But that was a year ago, before she became involved in the teen court program. Andy volunteered for the program and went through training to be a juror. She has alternated between being bailiff and juror, and is now an integral part of the system. Emblazoned on her blouse in bold letters are the words: ANDY. TEEN COURT BAILIFF. Everything has changed for her. "Now I have a place to be. I'm somebody now. I have a bunch of friends, and we go out and have a real good time. I'm more confident about everything, and I'm more positive about myself."

Andy said the teen court works "because kids their own age [as attorneys and jurors] understand their problems better than adults do. Sometimes the kids on the jury can be tough. I think adults [jurors] would kind of ease off of them [defendants] just because they are kids. At teen court they get the sentences they deserve."

Enthusiasm among teens for the program runs high. Debra Bingham, the "attorney" who defended Ronald, believes that "people are taking their sentences more seriously, since it comes from people their own age who know where they're coming from." Said one volunteer juror who considers the court a learning experience: "I see the mistakes other kids make. I won't make those same mistakes."

Parents seem grateful for the program. One enthusiastic parent whose daughter, 15, was arrested while joyriding with three other friends and charged with being a minor in possession of alcohol explained: "It's excellent the way they [the attorneys] asked her if she realized the bad effects alcohol had on her body and questioned her about the kind of reprimand she got at home. Oh, I grounded her. But I know she still drinks. Maybe these people can set my daughter's thinking right. I can't."

Does a teen court offer hope to other cities' struggles with juvenile delinquency? In fact, Odessa has been bombarded with inquiries from cities across the country and around the world. "With the right people, the right philosophy, almost any city can replicate this program," Rothstein said. "But if you don't have the kids to implement the program, you don't have a program."

Added Judge Spencer: "Usually, kids are talked to, talked at, talked about, but never talked with, and they're not part of the system. The biggest lesson I've learned is that you don't crush someone that you're trying to preserve and improve." **FW**

# LEST WE FORGET: THE HORROR OF AUSCHWITZ

**O**SWIECIM, Poland — "I am coming back to this place because it is the beginning of the end. My children have asked me so often, 'What happened?' I don't have the answers."

Diminutive Eva Mozes Kor, 50, of Terre Haute, Ind., bundled up in a bright blue greatcoat, stood alongside her identically dressed twin sister, Miriam Mozes Czaigher of Israel. Blue blotches on a

snow-swept plain near this southern Polish village, they had finally returned on a raw, overcast winter day to the site of some of man's most evil acts.

A shivering group of Nazi death camp survivors silently listened to Eva Kor's plaintive question. They didn't have the answer either. It was Sunday, January 27, 1985 — the 40th anniversary of the liberation of Hitler's most notorious extermination camp: Oswiecim, or Auschwitz, as it is known to the Western world. It was a day for tears, trauma and, yes, nightmares.

Now Eva Kor and Marc Berkowitz of New City in Rockland County, N.Y., another twin who survived this death camp, have formed C.A.N.D.L.E.S. (Children of Auschwitz Nazi's Deadly Lab Experiments Survivors) to rekindle world opinion on the total evil that was Auschwitz-Birkenau.

Specifically, they are attempting once and for all to flush out the infamous Dr. Josef Mengele, a camp doctor here who was their chief tormentor. For it was Mengele, now 73, the world's most

wanted Nazi criminal, who used some 2,000 Jewish twins as guinea pigs in a mad genetic experiment designed to build a new Master Race.

The elusive Mengele, sought by the West German government, which wants to place him on trial, was the infamous Doctor of Death. With a mere flick of the wrist — to the right or to the left — he directed the new arrivals at the Birkenau rail platform. Strikingly handsome, immaculately dressed in his officer's uniform, he would say nothing, only occasionally whistle a phrase from a Wagner opera. It was Mengele's way of selecting who would live and who would die. Twins were always given at least a temporary reprieve.

Between June 14, 1940, when the Nazis sent the first transport of Poles to "Konzentrationslager Auschwitz," and the day of liberation, 4 million people perished here, according to Auschwitz historians.

Organized by C.A.N.D.L.E.S., the recent daylong ceremonies — attended by many of "Mengele's twins" — evoked grim memories of systematic extermination. For Auschwitz was indeed the linchpin for the final "Jewish solution."

But for many of the twins, death would have been a more merciful alternative. Many of them, now scattered throughout the world, are suffering from internal sicknesses that they believe were caused by Mengele's experiments, including injections of unknown substances and endless blood transfusions.

Berkowitz, a tall, heavyset native of Czechoslovakia, said he had fought coming back for the liberation ceremonies. But, he reflected, after being away for so long, he finally had to revisit the spot where, after accompanying her as far as the gas chamber, "I kissed my mother goodbye."

Eva Kor said she is committed to keeping alive the issue of capturing Mengele. Finding him is important, she said, so that "we [the twins] can discover what he did to us."

To underwrite her relentless effort to keep the world's attention riveted on uncovering Mengele, Eva Kor's C.A.N.D.L.E.S. group, which is a non-profit organization, needs private contributions. Its address is 24 Lawrin Blvd., Terre Haute, Ind. 47803.

If Mengele is ever apprehended, said Eva Kor in a quiet but firm voice, "I do not want to see him executed. He should be put in isolation to listen to the screams of his victims for the rest of his life." **FW**

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# WRITE YOU ARE



Whether perfectly plain or simply a scrawl, your handwriting can unveil a wealth of information about who you are and what you're really like.

**T**he handwriting samples on the right were written by personalities whose names are as familiar to you as your own. Take a close look at each. Notice anything revealing? Though you may not be a handwriting analyst, common-sense will tell you that these famous people are as different as can be. The colorful script in sample B and the bold rounded print in sample C point to two diverse people ... it doesn't take an expert to see that.

Now examine the samples more closely. Can you find anything that could clue you in to the authors' identities?

Don't be surprised if you can't begin to figure out who these mystery writers might be. But, if you've studied their script carefully, you'll know more about the writers than you think you do.

Let's start with sample A. The pleasing script with its small flourishes and rounded loops seems to point to a person who is concerned with aesthetics as well as the content of the words.

How about sample B with its large capital letters that sweep across the page? This author's no shrinking violet, that's for sure. With every stroke, the writer conveys a sense of confidence and originality.

Finally, consider sample C. The script is stylish yet clear and authoritative, and points to a person who's strong and distinguished.

Needless to say, the above analyses are elementary at best. But, the writings of Ernest Hemingway (sample A), Walt Disney (sample B) and Princess Grace of Monaco (sample C) do provide insights into the kind of people they are—even to an amateur who's never been trained in graphology (the study and interpretation of handwriting). How can personality and handwriting be so intertwined?

"Writing is simply a set of repressed gestures that reveals what goes on inside of us," explains psychologist/graphologist Dr. Carlos Pedregal, founder of the Experimental Center of Applied Psychology in France and Spain. "The sensations that

we receive—sadness, fear, pleasure or joy—provoke reactions that translate into muscular movement. You see this every day, when a baby smiles or a friend frowns, and even in the way a person walks when depressed or talks when excited. These emotions show up in our handwriting as well. The shape of the letters, the slant of the lines, the pressure of the pen, all point to very specific moods." (Though your handwriting may look different depending on whether you're happy, sad, harried or composed, the essential characteristics remain the same.)

Handwriting, however, shows more than just state of mind ... it reveals personality as well. How you've individualized your script and strayed from the model of penmanship you were taught in school tells the trained eye a lot about who you are. After looking at a sample of your handwriting, an expert can identify character traits that it would take a spouse or friend years to discover. In fact, a graphologist can tell you things about yourself that *you* aren't aware of. For although most of us consider writing to be a simple skill that we take for granted, it's actually such an involved physiological and psychological process that many experts refer to it as "brainwriting". Because the forces that affect your handwriting are so numerous and varied, the odds of someone else writing exactly the same way you do are one chance in sixty-eight trillion according to one statistician.

Actually, the correlation between a person's character and his handwriting is nothing new. Theories about graphology date to when philosophers in ancient Greece noted the relationship between the two. Conclusive research followed centuries later. In the late 1930's, clinical experiments proved the link that had been suspected for so long.

Graphology may have gotten off to a slow start, but it's making up for lost time. More than 1,500 U.S. companies use handwriting analysis to screen job applicants or solve employee problems. In addition, it's used by police departments to uncover criminal tendencies, by banks to determine risk factors, by lawyers to help with jury selections, and by marriage counse-

lors to gain insights into a couple's compatibility.

"In 1974," recalls Dr. Pedregal, "a large manufacturer of office equipment commissioned my services. They needed a new assistant director of marketing, someone who would be able to work with customers, keep track of ongoing promotional campaigns, write the company newsletter and handle the art layouts for their advertisements. They wanted to promote from within the company, but knew that the position would be difficult to fill."

"When I arrived, the head of the personnel department showed me handwriting samples from the six supervisors being considered for the job. After examining the samples, I had to conclude that none of the authors had the combination of qualities required to succeed in the position. Then, I spotted a handwritten note lying on the table in front of me. 'Is this one of the candidates?' I asked, picking it up. 'Absolutely not,' I was told with a laugh. 'The person who wrote this is just a messenger.' I studied the note more carefully. Finally I looked up and said, 'That's too bad, because this is the person who could do that job well!'"

"Everyone laughed and thought I was crazy. Everyone, that is but the head of personnel who'd called me in, and whom I'd worked with before. He had to fight, but he finally convinced management to give the messenger a try. Today, ten years after the fact, that same messenger heads the com-

**W**hat pops into your mind when someone says the word "secretary"? A job that could lead to ulcers? Or to a promotion? I see a great opportunity available to almost



anyone, no matter what their level of education.

Even though 20 million American women are secretaries, many will never admit it. They hide behind titles like "administrative assistant" and "executive aide." Well, it's time for secretaries to realize that being a secretary is important and can lead to higher-paying jobs.

I know, because for 12 years I was a secretary. I worked my way up the corporate ladder. Now I'm a stockbroker.

It wasn't easy. For years I've been waging a personal battle against the way bosses view their secretaries. But bosses aren't the only ones to blame. The media hasn't helped. These days, secretaries are generally portrayed as having less intelligence than their memory typewriters. I'd like to see that change.

Being a secretary gives you a chance to learn the company's business and make yourself indispensable. You can use the job as an apprenticeship for a better position or use it to move up in the secretarial hierarchy. (Some secretaries make over \$30,000!) It is only a dead-end job if you let it be.

If you want to get ahead, you've got to have a game plan and the courage to follow it through. Your game plan involves creating a system that maximizes your chances for success while minimizing the time you waste trying to achieve

your goal. If you follow the plan, you'll also develop the key to success in business: self-confidence.

Here are some do's and don'ts:

**How to be a great secretary.** Being a great secretary has little to do with how many words you can type a minute, but if you have contacts with a ticket broker who can come up with

two tickets to a sold-out concert or hit musical, or if you've stored a bottle of good champagne in your desk that your boss can bring home as a last-minute anniversary gift, you'll be considered a Super Secretary.

**How to get a better job.** I think that some women fail to succeed in their careers because they are unwilling or unable to take risks. If you want to get ahead, the first thing you have to do is tell your boss you want raises, not roses. If you can't get a raise, try to get a more prestigious title. This can help you at your present company and when you initiate a job search.

In the meantime, polish your writing skills. The best way to do that is to find the well-written reports and letters from your own office files and copy that style. Take advantage of opportunities to learn new skills (like word processing).

**Recognizing an opportunity to move up.** Increasingly companies are making a concerted effort to hire women for entry-level executive positions, so now is a great time for women to ascend the corporate ladder. In order to get started, don't be afraid to change jobs. If you have an opportunity to interview, go for it. Interviewing is like typing: You'll always hate it, but the more you do it, the better you'll get.

I have poked fun at many of the frustrations of being a secretary, but some things are too important to make jokes about. For example, there is a very high correlation between executives with stress-related diseases and secretaries who experience similar stress. And even after all the gains women have made, they are still paid only 60 cents for each dollar paid to men.

Being a secretary can be both enjoyable and fulfilling, but remember, the maxim for going from being a low-paid secretary to having one of your own is simple: *Work, work, work!* FW

# WHEN FIDO DOES NEED A SPECIAL DIET, YOU HAVE TO KNOW HOW TO PROVIDE IT

**S**even-year-old Buzzy, a usually uncomplaining brown and white Springer Spaniel, companion to Walter Cronkite, developed kidney disease. Despite this, Buzzy lived happily until the age of 15 with the aid of a special diet prescribed for him.

For an average, healthy adult pet, a prescription diet is unnecessary, as I pointed out in last month's column, but for an animal with a serious medical problem, such a diet can be lifesaving. Prescription diets can be provided in two forms: (1) specialized foods sold at your veterinarian's office or through

a distributor he recommends, and (2) home-cooked recipes prepared strictly according to your vet's instructions.

Of course, dieting isn't easy on either of you; so don't be too hard on your pet. Gradually wean the animal from one diet to another, mixing small amounts of the old food with the new until it has adjusted to the change.

You can make things easier for yourself, too, by understanding the principles behind your pet's diet. Cronkite's Buzzy, for example, could be given only low-protein foods (no eggs, milk or meat), since protein puts stress on the kidney tubules. Buzzy was allowed a canned prescription food (labeled K/D, for Kidney Disease) or high-carbohydrate "people foods" such as candy, doughnuts and cornflakes. An obese animal, on the other hand, should never indulge in these foods. Obesity puts tremendous stress on an animal's bone structure (ligaments, tendons, the muscle support sys-

heart disease necessitates a diet that is low in salt in order to decrease fluid retention in the chest, abdomen and lungs. On the other hand, a high-salt diet is required for an animal with bladder stones. The salt includ-

ed in your pet's daily food intake will force the animal to drink tremendous amounts of water, thereby putting the stones into solution and allowing them to pass in the pet urine.

Five to 15 percent of our population has serious trouble digesting its food. The reason can be either an insufficient supply of enzymes needed for food absorption, or an improperly functioning stomach and intestinal lining. Plain home-cooked foods such as cereal, cottage cheese and eggs, or an intestinal prescription diet (I/D) will be sufficiently soothing and nutritious for the pet with a delicate stomach.

If your cat or dog has itchy skin and is pulling its hair out or biting its feet, it may have developed a food-related allergy. The animal should be put on a canned prescription diet (D/D) consisting of lamb and

mutton. Since most pet foods don't contain lamb, the D/D-dieted pet will stop itching (if in fact pet food ingredients are the source of the problem). Then the old foods can be reintroduced to the diet one at a time to determine which particular one was causing problems.

A proper diet will surely enhance your pet's health — if you follow it closely. Lauren Bacall took excellent care of her close companion Blenheim, a Cavalier King Charles Spaniel, who lived until the age of 12. Sometimes, though, she treated him to bits of "people food," despite the fact that he suffered from heart disease. When I scolded her, Miss Bacall would say in her inimitable style, "Come on, Doctor, the dog has to have a little fun too!" Certainly, but a healthy, properly-fed pet will have more of it. **FW**

## ANIMAL HOUSE?

As many sorority sisters have long suspected, monkeys have a lot in common with fraternity brothers. Dr. Michael Raleigh, of the University of California Medical School, has been studying the differences between leaders and followers in a community of vervet monkeys. He found that the leaders had

## Women teeing off with men

It's a first. Two women — Kathy Whitworth and Mickey Wright — will compete against men in the \$500,000 Liberty Mutual Legends of Golf Tournament at the Onion Creek Club in Austin, Texas. NBC airs the event next Saturday and Sunday.

This is the eighth Legends of Golf tournament, but the first time in the history of the Professional Golfers Association that women are allowed. The two women may surprise a lot of people and take home a lot of money.

Both have been elected to the Ladies PGA Hall of Fame. Both are in the World Golf Hall of Fame. Between 1959 and 1969, Wright averaged 7.9 victories per year. In 1963, she won 13 tournaments. In 1962, in a tournament in Midland, Texas, she fired a 62, still a record.

Whitworth has 85 tournament wins. No one — neither man nor woman — has won more than that. Eight times she took home more money at the end of the year than any other player on the LPGA tour. Seven times she was named player of the year. She was the first LPGA member to win \$1 million.

Among the male golfers who will be competing are Arnold Palmer, Gene Sarazen, Miller Barber, Julius Boros, Don January and last years winners — Billy Casper and Gay Brewer. It won't be an easy two days for the ladies.

The rules should help them. They will be competing against 27 two-member teams on a better-ball basis. The better of the two scores is the one that counts.

Women have been making attempts to be treated as equals in the golfing world for some time. For the most part, they have failed. This tournament, held under an often unkind Texas sun, will help their cause a great deal.

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
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
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

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## Grappling with toxic waste

LOS ANGELES — California is sitting on a toxic-waste timebomb, and officials are scrambling to defuse it before it's too late.

"We're at a critical juncture in history," says Bob Griffith, director of toxic-waste management for Orange County.

"Right now, the problem is big enough to focus our attention, but it's still manageable," he says. "If we wait 10 or 20 years, there may be nothing we can do."

Proposals to clean up the mess dominate Sacramento.

"It's a real motherhood-and-apple pie issue in the Legislature this session," says Elmer Brown, director of governmental relations for the California Trucking Association, some of whose members haul toxic waste.

Ten bills dealing with toxic waste are pending in the Legislature, the state Senate has created a Toxics and Public Safety Management Committee and Gov. George Deukmejian has proposed creating a statewide czar to oversee spending \$100 million to curb toxic contamination.

A new state law makes illegal dumping of toxic waste a felony rather than a misdemeanor.

But it may be easier to make proposals than to come up with workable solutions.

"The fact is, nobody really knows how to clean up these things (toxic dumps) and destroy what's in them so they will be safe in the future," says Jack Jones, a spokesman for Dow Chemical Co., which has its western headquarters in an unincorporated section of Contra Costa County in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Tom Schumacher, executive vice president of the California Trucking Association, adds another caveat.

"The cruelest joke of all may come 50 years from now if we learn the things we are using today to treat the waste are actually more dangerous than the waste itself."

Recently, federal Environmental Protection Agency investigators seeking the source of noxious chemicals being belched into the air of the Bridesburg section of Philadelphia were unnerved by what they found.

The fumes were coming from that city's northeast sewage treatment plant, whose operation is aimed at riding the Schuylkill River of a toxic

## Military pursues its own cleanup

The military marches to a different drumbeat when it comes to toxic waste cleanup, say state and local officials who have no control over chemicals used by the armed forces.

"The Department of Defense pursues its own cleanup program without any oversight," says Roger Gwinn, aide to Rep. Vic Fazio, D-Calif. "The EPA doesn't get involved, and the local and state health authorities aren't given the opportunity to respond to cleanup plans."

Fazio of Sacramento and two other congressmen earlier this month proposed legislation that would allow the federal Environmental Protection Agency to oversee military waste

## City hopes to turn methane gas into money

### Four firms interested in producing energy from hazardous gas

Under a state deadline to remove concentrations of methane gas from an old rubbish dump, Huntington Beach officials are exploring the

possibility of getting rid of the potentially hazardous gas and turning a profit while doing it.

Public Works Director Paul Cook said Friday that four private companies have expressed interest in removing and paying the city for the potential energy source, produced by decomposing vegetable materials in a 22-acre field near Golden West Street and Talbert Avenue south of



the Central Library. City Council members have agreed to seek proposals.

The area in question actually is part of the Central Park system, but the fire-producing propensities of the gas have prevented the development of recreation structures to date.

In November 1982 the California Solid Waste Management Board told local officials they were out of compliance with the Federal Resources Conservation and Recovery

Act of 1976 for allowing the methane to accumulate.

And in September of last year, the same Waste Management Board notified local officials that they had one year to reduce "unacceptable" levels of methane gas produced at the former dump site.

A board spokesman said at the time that the buildup of gas could cause an explosion.

At that time, local authorities outlined plans to build collector wells

to allow the methane gas to be burned off or released into the atmosphere.

But money for the project, which is expected to cost about \$150,000, hasn't been made available.

Rubbish was dumped in the 22-acre field for about 20 years when it was an Orange County landfill. It was later turned over to the city, which would be saddled with recovery costs if the gas isn't retrieved by private means.

## Old, beloved trees felled for progress

Oliver and Helen Louise Cox said goodbye to a couple of their best friends the other day.

One of the friends was a "magnificent," sweet-smelling, 50-foot magnolia tree that the Coxes planted in the front of their Fountain Valley home in 1953. The second was even taller and older, a deodar cedar tree. Oliver Cox planted the deodar cedar — a native of the Himalayas —

in the mid-1930s even before there was a house on the lot.

"He bought the property after he got out of the Navy in the 1930s," said Mrs. Cox. "He bought quite a few fruit trees and the nurseryman gave him the deodar cedar. It was already a big tree when we moved the house here in 1953."

The two trees became a favorite place to play for the Cox children — Royce, Fred, Glenn, Dennis and

## Five years in jail already, — and still awaiting trial

### 'Isn't any excuse for making a person rot in jail,' says attorney

For almost five years, William Lee Evins has been behind bars in the Orange County Jail. He hasn't been convicted of any crime — he's still awaiting a trial. He says he's an innocent man.

For more than six years, the slaying of Fountain Valley housewife Joan Virginia Anderson has been a case unresolved. Police and prosecutors say Evins was the one who strangled and fatally beat the 28-year-old woman in her Hemlock Street home. But they haven't had a chance to prove it in court.

The culprit in this unusual delay, says Evins' attorney, is the California Supreme Court, which sat on the case for four years while pondering the reliability of hypnotized witnesses' testimony.

The issue was crucial to the Orange County case. The key prosecution witness was an acquaintance who recalled under hypnosis a conversation in which Evins allegedly admitted killing Joan Anderson. Defense attorneys have believed that without the testimony of the hypnotized witness, there is little chance Evins can be convicted.

The long-delayed trial now appears within sight. In January, the Supreme Court sent the Evins case to the state Court of Appeal in Santa Ana. And last Tuesday, that court ruled that the original murder charge against Evins must be dropped because it hinged on the testimony of a hypnotized witness.

He was released as ordered, but Evins enjoyed only a few minutes of



freedom. On the orders of the Orange County District Attorney's office, officers rearrested Evins in the lobby of the jail on a new murder charge. The prosecutor in the case says there is enough evidence to try Evins even without the testimony of the hypnotized witness.

At an arraignment Thursday morning, Evins pleaded not guilty. Judge Patricia Manoukian ordered him to appear at a May 2 preliminary hearing. At that time, a judge will determine whether there is sufficient evidence to take the case to that long-awaited trial.

Regardless of any jury verdict, Assistant Public Defender William Kopeny believes his client, Evins, has already faced a serious injustice — his five-year wait in Orange County Jail.

"This is not someone who's been convicted of anything," Kopeny said. "He's just been waiting for our criminal justice system to make a decision. There just isn't any excuse for making a person sit and rot in jail for five years before going to trial."

The defense attorney added, "The reason he's served five years in jail is because he's poor."

Although the usual Orange County murder bail is \$250,000, Evins' bail has been lowered to \$30,000 because of the circumstances of his case. A person from a more affluent back-



ground may have been able to pledge property to meet the requirement. But Evins lacks the resources to meet even the reduced bail.

Kopeny claims spending years as an unsentenced inmate at the overcrowded Orange County Jail is worse than doing time in a state prison.

"In prison, at least you know what your maximum release date is," he said. "(Evins) doesn't even know when his trial is."

The defense attorney said Evins, now 30 years old, had no criminal record before he was arrested in Texas by Fountain Valley police. But the lengthy stay in Orange County Jail has taken a toll on his personal life.

soup created by effluent from chemical, plastics and other industries.

Observations such as Jones' and Schumacher's and incidents such as the one in Philadelphia are disquieting, and the public's reaction in general is fear — and a desire to keep the waste as far away from themselves and their communities as possible.

The sheer scope of the problem boggles the mind.

California has more than 25,000 abandoned sites where toxic waste has been deposited since the end of World War II, when the creation of hazardous byproducts mushroomed. Nobody knows how much waste is in them, but Jennifer Tachera of the Toxic Substances Division of the state Department of Health Services estimates it is hundreds of millions of cubic feet.

# Counties ranked by toxins they generate

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Here is a county-by-county breakdown of toxic wastes generated in California. The figures, compiled in 1983 by the state Department of Health Services, were included in a January 1984 report to Gov. George Deukmejian by the California Hazardous Waste Management Council.

Orange County ranks fifth on the list.

The actual volume of wastes has probably increased 10 percent to 15 percent, but the proportion produced by each county has probably remained static, according to Jennifer Tachera of the state Department of Health Services in Sacramento.

Meantime, speculators remain willing to buy the properties near hazardous-waste dumps, hoping to buy in cheap and sell out later for a tidy profit.

"A seller might be trying to sell for less than the market value of the property, and buyers are speculating that sometime a year from now the issue might cool down and the price may go up again," says real estate broker Noel A. Wychico who not long ago sold one of the home's near the controversial BKK landfill in West Covina, about 20 miles east of downtown Los Angeles.

Jones, the Dow Chemical official, doesn't mince words in discussing the issue of residential developments near toxic dumps and toxic-waste producers.

"I don't think it's stupidity on the part of the homeowners. People who buy homes are just looking for the lowest down payment and lowest monthly payments," he says.

"It's stupidity on the part of developers and the zoning commissions that permit it. Zoning rules are being eroded by political pressures, and big developers are able to exert a lot of influence."

A major hotel and condominium development is being proposed in Antioch near Dow's plant if zoning on the land can be changed from industrial to residential.

Dow expects that once the hotels and homes are built, pressure may be brought to curtail Dow's operations.

"It happens all the time," Jones says. "Industry is there first, then homes are built. As soon as people move in, they get mad at industry for being there."

Every year, an estimated 265 million tons of toxic waste are generated nationwide, and the EPA says the figure is increasing 5 percent to 6 percent annually — a rate that would double the volume of hazardous waste by the end of the century.

"That's more than a ton of toxic waste for every man, woman and child in the country," says John Skinner, head of the EPA's toxic-waste programs in Washington.

California churns out more than 10.2 million tons of hazardous waste a year, and about one-seventh of that is trucked to special treatment plants or toxic dumps.

The problem of toxic waste is woven into the fabric of modern industrial society.

"Nobody wants hazardous waste, but nobody stops to think that it doesn't come from 'somewhere out there.' It comes from virtually everything we have — the food we eat, the medicine we take, the clothes we wear, the TV we watch," says California Highway Patrol Capt. Dwight Helmick, who is in charge of routing trucks carrying toxic waste to treatment plants and dumps.

Griffith, the Orange County toxics chief, expands on that idea.

"Hazardous waste is a consequence of industrial society," he says. "The only way to get away from it is to go back to a pre-Industrial Revolution society, and nobody wants that."

The federal government is pursuing a less drastic but extremely costly option.

A new federal law mandates that after 1990, no untreated toxic waste will be able to be legally placed in the ground anywhere in the nation.

Toxic-waste landfills will continue to exist. But they will be able to accept only the heavy sludge that remains after waste has been treated to remove its toxicity or after it has been turned into a goey mass that is less likely than a liquid to seep through the earth and contaminate groundwater.

Skinner estimates this step could reduce by 50 percent to 60 percent the


## Showers may dampen morning

When he was arrested, Kopyev said, Evins had a wife and two young children. Since then, his wife has filed for divorce and remarried. Evins has not seen his children in five years, though they exchange letters and photos, his attorney said.

With the evidence provided by the hypnotized witness excluded, Kopyev is confident a jury will not convict Evins of murdering Joan Anderson.

In late 1980, when Evins faced the original murder charge, he and his attorney decided to appeal the issue of the hypnotized witness directly to the state Supreme Court, hoping for a quick decision.

Deputy District Attorney John Conley, who is prosecuting Evins, is not so sure.

It took four years, however, for the court to rule on two other cases involving hypnotized witnesses. In 1982, the court decided that the testimony of a witness who has been hypnotized is unreliable and cannot be used in a trial. Last November, the court decided this rule could be applied to earlier cases.

Conley acknowledged that his case was weakened by the loss of the hypnotized witness, but he said he would not have filed a new murder charge against Evins if he did not think he had enough evidence to convict him.

tain Valley, a quiet bedroom community with a low crime rate. After Joan Anderson's death, Fountain Valley went almost six years without another homicide.

On March 8, 1979, a neighbor found Anderson's 3-year-old son wandering around the neighborhood. After bringing the child home, the neighbor discovered Anderson's partially clad body at the foot of a bed in a guest room. Police later determined Anderson had been strangled and beaten with a hammer.

Evins was arrested in Texas more than a year later. He had been part of a construction crew building an addition to the Anderson home.

Now, almost five years later and with the long-awaited trial in view, Evins' mood is one of guarded optimism, according to his attorney.

"He knows the case isn't over yet," Kopyev said. "But he hopes the case will soon be over."

disposal, despite President Reagan's executive order exempting the military from federal laws regarding toxic waste.

In Orange County, officials have been trying unsuccessfully for two years to get the Tustin Marine Corps Helicopter Air Station to present a formal cleanup plan, says Nira Yamachika of the county's Environmental Management Agency.

This despite local findings that military fuels and solvents are contaminating creeks that feed the increasingly polluted Upper Newport Bay, and that benzene and five other cancer-causing chemicals have tainted the base's soil and water.

"We have to budget, then it goes through a review of the DOD, then we must get approval from Congress," says Jim Simko, environmental engineer for the Tustin helicopter base.

Traditionally, the military has responded to local cleanup demands only when the public gets irate. Gwinn says. "It depends to a great extent on the public attention given to a particular site."

Yamachika says she agrees with that theory.

The EPA listed 39 military bases nationwide with hazardous waste threats, and seven are in California — including three in Sacramento and others in Sunnyvale, San Bernardino, Lathrop and Merced.

Dr. James Stratton, a toxic expert with the state health department, says that for decades the military took fuels and solvents and "poured it in the ground and let it evaporate without any thought to the impact on the environment."

"They're much more cooperative than they used to be," he says, "but I wouldn't rule out the chance that individual base commanders are less apt to cooperate."

"I don't think there's a military base without an environmental problem," Army Lt. Col. Craig MacNab says in Washington, "but there's not one industry or a municipality without one either."

## Reputed neo-Nazi member arrested without incident

FORSYTH, Mo. — Authorities Saturday arrested a reputed member of a neo-Nazi group, ending an intense manhunt that began five days earlier with the slaying of a state trooper at a random traffic stop. David Laté, 22, linked to the neo-Nazi group called The Order and charged with first-degree murder in the trooper's death, was arrested unarmed and without incident in a city park, said Capt. Lee Thompson of the Missouri Highway Patrol. Hundreds of police using camouflage, helicopters, dogs and road blocks had searched the rugged Ozark Mountains on both sides of the Arkansas-Missouri border since the trooper was killed and another wounded with a silencer-equipped automatic pistol on Monday.

## Formula for Coca-Cola to change

ATLANTA — The 99-year-old, top-secret formula used to make Coca-Cola soon will be changed, according to a report published Saturday. The new formula was developed in a secret project launched in January. The Atlanta Journal and The Atlanta Constitution said in their combined Saturday edition. The newspapers, which quoted no sources and said the company would not comment, said a possible reason for the new formula was a drop in Coke's market-leading share last year. Coca-Cola Co. spokesman Carlton Curtis declined comment except to say there would be a news conference Tuesday at which "the most significant soft drink marketing development in the company's nearly 100-year history will be announced."

## Officials will recreate fatal flight

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Safety officials Monday are to fly a Lockheed Electra airliner with a small wing hatch left open, hoping to simulate conditions that led to an Electra crash that killed 70 people. The National Transportation Safety Board, which will conduct the test, believes the open hatch may have produced vibrations that contributed to the Jan. 21 crash in Reno, Nev. The four-engine turboprop will be rigged with two cameras to record what happens to the open hatch, said NTSB investigator Paul Turner.

## Greenpeace divers plug pipeline

DOVER TOWNSHIP, N.J. — Divers for the environmental group Greenpeace on Saturday sealed part of a pipeline that discharges about 4 million gallons of chemical wastes daily into the Atlantic Ocean, a spokesman said. The six divers plugged 15 of the 50 outlets in the pipeline with cement and metal bowls before chugging waters and wind forced them to stop, said Russ Wild, a spokesman for the group. He said they would return Sunday. No arrests were made, said police Sgt. Robert Fitzpatrick.

## Trucks involved in far more accidents

WASHINGTON — Interstate trucks are involved in twice as many fatal accidents per mile traveled as automobiles and often operate with defective brakes or other equipment, the Knight-Ridder Newspapers reported in Sunday's edition. The report culminated a four-month investigation based on numerous interviews with government and industry experts as well as detailed computer analyses of tens of thousands of government truck safety reports.

## 260 lab animals 'rescued'

RIVERSIDE — The Animal Liberation Front claimed the "rescue" Saturday of 260 laboratory animals from a University of California research center, the latest in a series of raids by the anti-vivisection group in this country, Canada and Britain. Campus spokesman Jack Chappell on Saturday said university police and scientists were counting the number of animals missing from 25 to 30 laboratories in the basement of the four-floor campus life sciences building, but the number claimed by the anti-vivisectionists "is approximately correct." The raiders "pried open doors to laboratories and removed doors from their hinges," he said. "They spray-painted slogans. I understand computers were vandalized. In some of the labs, test tubes and other paraphernalia were swept off counters and smashed on the floor."

## Convict runs, deputy tackles him

WESTMINSTER — A man sprinted out of a courtroom moments after he was handed a six-month sentence for receiving stolen property, then yelled "No go to jail" as he was tackled by a deputy after a 100-yard dash. "I guess he thought my sentence was too harsh," West Orange County Municipal Judge Daniel Dutcher said of the escape attempt by Dai Tran Nguyen, 19, of Garden Grove. Dutcher continued calling his court calendar while his bailiff chased Nguyen, finally tackling him on the lawn outside the building.

## Attorney defends J. David's girlfriend

SAN DIEGO — Court documents filed by the trustee in the J. David & Co. bankruptcy case give the erroneous impression that former J. David executive Nancy Hoover benefited from \$8.57 million in company funds, her attorney says. "This creates a false impression that she siphoned off \$8 million bucks," attorney D. Dwight Worden said Friday. "It didn't happen that way." The simple fact is that when J. David went up in flames, Nancy Hoover lost all her own money. She had left it in accounts and so had her kids and so had her relatives.

## LA council joins protest against Reagan

LOS ANGELES — The City Council has voted unanimously to protest what it called President Reagan's deplorable plan to visit a German military cemetery next month. "There are many in my district who suffered atrocities in the Nazi regime," said Councilman John Ferraro, who sponsored the motion. He said the Bitberg, West Germany, cemetery with graves of many Nazi SS troopers, "evokes horrible memories to many people."

## Mob sets fire to woman, home

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — A mob of blacks set fire to a woman of mixed race Saturday and then burned her home, killing her and her 3-year-old son and badly burning her two other young children, police said. Arsonists elsewhere in the eastern Cape Province poured gasoline on a garbage truck Saturday and tried to set it on fire, but soldiers arrived and fired on the crowd, wounding one black man, a spokesman at police headquarters in Pretoria said.

## China bans obscene material

PEKING — China outlawed, under new regulations published Saturday, pornographic videos, aphrodisiacs and obscene materials that "poison people's minds." The State Council ban, which appeared in all leading newspapers, follows official complaints that pornography is now readily available in Canton and other Chinese cities. According to the Chinese press, smuggled and home-produced obscene videos and films are being shown to paying audiences and racy publications are multiplying. "To protect the mental health of the people and especially youth, safeguard social harmony and ensure smooth progress in socialist modernization, various kinds of salacious material must be strictly banned."

## Second Nazi linked to royal family

LONDON — A brother-in-law of Prince Philip, Queen Elizabeth II's husband, was a high-ranking officer in the Nazi SS, London newspapers said Sunday. In new reports of links between the elite Nazi unit and members of the royal family, the Sunday Times and the Mail on Sunday identified the officer as Prince Christoph of Hesse, who married Prince Philip's sister Sophie in 1930. Prince Christoph was killed in an air crash in 1943 after reaching a rank senior to colonel and "was a close aide of Heinrich Himmler, head of the SS and the Gestapo," the Sunday Times said.

## Indian troops raid Sikh Golden Temple

AMRITSAR, India — Police raided the Golden Temple in this sacred Sikh city before dawn Saturday in an attempt to arrest Sikh militants who officials fear are once again using the complex as a hideout. Local officials said three men were arrested and police confiscated a shotgun, a hand grenade and a homemade pistol at the 17th century complex, considered the holiest shrine of the Sikh sect. Police sources said many of the militants the police sought escaped. Sikh leaders claimed six people were taken away.

## New Sudan leader appeals for more aid

KHARTOUM, Sudan — Sudan's new military leader appealed Saturday for additional food aid, saying more than 1 million children would starve to death unless emergency supplies were rushed to his country. Gen. Abdul-Rahman Swaredahab made the plea at a meeting with foreign ambassadors and representatives of international relief organizations. He said pledges of additional aid were still insufficient to cope with the country's food crisis.

# Crime down 3% across nation

But FBI report reveals rapes, assaults in '84 rose at fastest pace since 1980

WASHINGTON (AP) — Reported crime decreased 3 percent last year, including a 4 percent drop in murders, but rapes and aggravated assaults rose at the fastest pace since 1980, the FBI said Saturday.

The bureau's Uniform Crime Report, based on preliminary figures, said the overall decline in reported crime last year, compared to 1983, continued a downward trend that started in 1982.

But during the fourth quarter, from

Oct. 1 to Dec. 31, reported crime rose 2 percent compared to the same three-month period in 1983, the FBI said. The quarterly increase was the first since 1981.

The figures are based on a compilation of crimes reported by nearly 13,000 state and local police agencies around the country.

Among the findings contained in the FBI report:

• Murders plunged by 11 percent in cities with populations over a

million, including a decreased incidence of homicide in Los Angeles, as well as New York, Detroit, Philadelphia, San Francisco and Washington, D.C.

• Property crimes of burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft decreased 3 percent.

• Arsons held at approximately the same level as in 1983.

Attorney General Edwin Meese III said "the drop in crime over the past three years is a significant achievement."

But Meese also said in a statement that "this is no time, however, to rest on our laurels. Neither the president nor I accept crime as an unavoidable fact of life."

FBI Director William H. Webster said: "The overall downward trend is encouraging, but the increase noted in the fourth quarter demonstrates that crime in our society must remain a concern of the general public and a high priority of the criminal justice community."

The 3 percent decrease in overall crime from 1983 to 1984 followed a 7 percent drop from 1982 to 1983 and a 3 percent decline from 1981 to 1982. But forcible rapes and aggravated assaults rose at the faster pace than at any other time since 1980.

Declines in the overall Uniform Crime Index, however, were recorded by each of the nation's four geographic regions, the bureau said.

# 4,000 protest Reagan polices in LA

Downtown traffic brought nearly to a standstill by march

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Opposition to President Reagan's polices united 4,000 demonstrators who marched through downtown Los Angeles on Saturday, representing diverse interests and snarling traffic for blocks.

Pro- and anti-abortion groups and supporters and foes of Israel yelled chants and carried banners during the march that stretched about 10 blocks on Broadway, ending at City Hall for a rally.

"What brings us here is the need to reverse the policies of the Reagan administration — the inhumane treatment of the U.S. public, especially the poor, and of people in Third World countries such as El Salvador," said Joel Koplitz, 25, who wore a yellow arm band as a march monitor.

The marchers included those opposed to U.S. involvement in Nicaragua, the Philippines and the Middle East, foes of the draft, Iran's Ayatollah Khomeini and South African apartheid, and advocates of homosexual and women's rights and a freeze on nuclear weapons.

Police Sgt. Bryce Houchin estimated the demonstration drew 4,000 marchers, with thousands more taking a break from shopping to watch on the sidelines. The protesters had predicted 5,000 to 8,000 marchers. Houchin said there were no arrests.

Traffic was almost at a standstill on many nearby streets, despite the efforts of traffic control officers and horseback-riding police. Some motorists leaned out of car windows and screamed at drivers who were blocking intersections.

The peaceful "March for Jobs, Peace and Justice" was sponsored by

more than 100 political, religious, labor and civil rights groups as part of a series of Saturday protests in the United States and Canada.

One group carried a sign reading "No U.S. Tax for Israeli Aggression." A block ahead of them, pro-Israeli marchers carried a banner reading "Coalition of Jews for Peace and

Justice."

The demonstrators chanted slogans such as "No Draft, No War, U.S. Out of El Salvador."

Among the banners and signs were those reading "No More Vietnams, Stop Central American Intervention," "Stop Attacks on the Gay Community,"

## Vietnam war's end marked by march

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thousands of protesters marched outside the White House on Saturday to start three days of demonstrations against President Reagan's military buildup and policies on South Africa and Central America.

Protesters massed on the Ellipse, the park outside the White House grounds, then swung up Pennsylvania Avenue toward the Capitol for a rally.

As they passed the White House, the Rev. Jesse Jackson dropped to the pavement and uttered a prayer that referred to Reagan's planned visit next month to a military cemetery in Bitburg, West Germany.

"Touch our president in some special way," the kneeling civil rights leader said. "Some place between Bitburg and Johannesburg, let him choose another way."

The demonstration, marking the 10th anniversary of the end of the Vietnam war, was echoed on the West Coast, where 4,000 protesters marched in downtown Los Angeles and others rallied in Seattle.

"What brings us here is the need to reverse the policies of the Reagan administration — the inhumane treatment of the U.S. public, especially the poor, and of people in Third World countries such as El Salvador," said Joel Koplitz, 25, a protester in Los Angeles.

U.S. Park Police estimated the size of the crowd in Washington at 26,000. March organizers claimed 60,000.

Viewed from the Capitol, Pennsylvania Avenue was packed solid with demonstrators for more than 12 blocks. The steadily moving crowd took an hour to pass the White House, park police said.

## Marchers hold rally for peace

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Thousands of banner-waving, sign-toting demonstrators marched peacefully through the city Saturday to a rally where protesters spoke out against nuclear weapons, U.S. military intervention in Central America and apartheid in South Africa.

The demonstration, called the "Spring Mobilization for Peace, Jobs & Justice," was sponsored by a coalition of hundreds of Northern California labor, church, peace, student and community groups.

Police estimates for the crowd ranged from about 10,000 to 50,000, but observers placed it at closer to 5,000.

Contingents carried signs and banners calling for an end to U.S. intervention in Central America and the Caribbean, freeze and reversal of the nuclear arms race, and an end to U.S. support for South African apartheid.

## Design flaws cited in Bhopal tragedy

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — A government investigator said Saturday there were major design flaws at the Union Carbide Corp. plant in Bhopal that leaked a deadly gas last December, killing more than 2,000 people.

"There are indications that serious design flaws were there. The plant was not made to handle such a calamity," a senior official of the Central Bureau of Investigation told The Associated Press.

The official, who spoke with the condition that he not be identified by name, said the bureau would issue a report after it has completed its investigation.

He said the plant "apparently was badly constructed because everything seemed to have failed" when the leak occurred.

But a report from Union Carbide's management in India to a one-man judicial commission in Bhopal disputed the official's account.

United News of India quoted the 20-page report as saying the plant's tank storing the deadly methyl isocyanate had been designed "in accordance with established international standards."

In its own report, released March 20, the Danbury, Conn.-based corporation said the leak was caused by the entry into the tank of about 240 gallons of water, and blamed workers in Bhopal.

Union Carbide chairman Warren Anderson has said he did not rule out sabotage in the leak, which also seriously affected the health of an estimated 200,000 people in the world's worst industrial accident.

## Halt called in sales of growth hormone

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal health officials are ordering a temporary halt in the sale of a natural growth hormone for young people pending a new safety evaluation of the substance, a spokesman said Saturday.

Doctors at the National Institutes of Health recommended the halt following the death of three youngsters who took the pituitary gland extract several years ago, NIH spokesman Mark Stern said.

One victim contracted a rare, fatal

disease known as Creutzfeldt-Jakob. The two others also are believed to have had the degenerative illness, which attacks the central nervous system.

Because the disease normally strikes those between the ages of 40 and 80, "it is of special concern when it is seen in young people," Stern said.

Doctors want to determine whether there is a link between the disease and the natural hormone.

Stern said he did not know how long the tests will take.

## NATO affiliate bombed

BRI SSEL, Belgium (AP) — A bomb with the force of about 220 pounds of TNT exploded Saturday at the headquarters of a NATO affiliate, slightly injuring three people, police said.

A previously unknown leftist group, the Revolutionary Front for Proletarian Action, claimed responsibility.

The bomb was placed on a window sill at the offices of the North Atlantic Assembly and detonated around daybreak. It ripped away part of a wall at the back of the 19th-century building and touched off a fire in the archives room. The fire was quickly controlled, police said.

# Teen-ager explains reasons for suicides

Dear Ann Landers: As an upper-middle-class suburban teen-ager, I hope I can offer some insight into the growing number of teen-age suicides, especially among those who live in the more affluent suburbs.

I have known some teen-agers who took their own lives and I believe the major causes are as follows:

- The pressure to succeed academically and later financially is really heavy. These teens are forced to strive for acceptance to Ivy League schools. If they don't get into Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Brown, Stanford or Amherst they feel like failures. (It's especially tough if their fathers went to these schools.)
- Life in the affluent suburbs is often lonely and depressing. The

parents are involved in demanding careers, travel a lot and leave the mothering and fathering to paid help. They almost never do things together as a family.

The fact that the majority of teen-age suicides occur in affluent areas such as Westchester County and Long Island rather than in the working and lower middle-class neighborhoods like Brooklyn, Queens and Staten Island must mean that most rich kids, who appear to have everything, enjoy life a lot less than poor kids.


I don't know any of the answers (I'm only 17) but I just thought I'd put some of my thoughts down on paper for whatever they might be worth. — No Name In Winnetka

**Dear N.N.:** I believe you are right

about some rich kids not having much fun. The greatest pleasures in life come from the inside — what we do for ourselves. Achieving something makes young people feel good about themselves. It builds confidence and self-esteem. Money, expensive gifts, cars, trips and credit cards handed over by parents have little value after a while. In fact, they become boring.

And now about suicide: It is the second biggest killer among the 15- to 24-year-old group in this country. (Accidents are first.) It has not always been this way. Something has changed.

Your letter suggests teenage suicide is the fault of the parents. I disagree. In my opinion easy access to drugs is a major factor. Many teens



often death is glamorized and made to seem exciting and adventurous. Young people who are emotionally unstable have a tendency to imitate what they see portrayed.

We are learning more about this subject, the symptoms, how to recognize them and possibly save potential victims.

There are no sure-fire answers, but of this I am certain: There always have been and always will be people who are emotionally fragile and break under the strain of life's challenges, while others are able to live through anything. You might call it "the survival quotient." Why some people fall into one category and not the other is still a mystery. I don't pretend to know the answer.

### Radio affected by turf battle?

WASHINGTON — Bureaucratic turf battles and ideological warfare among officials are threatening the effectiveness of two government-funded radio stations, a team of congressional investigators has concluded. The stations are supposed to broadcast objective news and fair commentary to the propaganda-drenched millions in the Soviet bloc.

Their recent survey of programs broadcast to Eastern Europe by Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty in Munich showed "increasing hard-line rhetoric" and extreme anti-Soviet views that insulted the intended audiences, the team stated in a report obtained by our associate Indy Badwar.

Specifically, they found "excessive intrusion into the daily operation of the radios" by the Board for International Broadcasting in Washington. This led to erosion of the authority of the stations' top management in Munich, with the result that the program content suffered, said the report prepared by Rep. Larry Smith, D-Fla.

As we reported earlier, many programs were found to have blatantly anti-Semitic content; others were insulting to ethnic and religious groups, still others were critical of the United States and its allies.

One reason for the breakdown in program control appears to be a power struggle between James Buckley, a former conservative Republican senator and president of Radio Free Europe-Radio Liberty, and Frank Shakespeare, a former Nixon White House aide, who is chairman of the board.

The two directors of the radio stations are ultraconservatives more attuned to Shakespeare's views than Buckley's, according to the report.

The station directors believe that "the situation in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union is so tenuous that the Soviet Union could be on the verge of collapse," the report states, adding "There is evidence that the two directors have attempted to move the radios in that direction with (Shakespeare's) obvious implicit approval."

The congressional report continued: "Currently, (Radio Free Europe-Radio Liberty) is, to a large degree, 'run' from Washington by chairman Shakespeare. We found that if it was not (Shakespeare) who went over Buckley's head to the radios, the directors were going directly to the chairman in Washington."

The investigators were told that the two directors were hired by Shakespeare, in one case over the opposition of Buckley. Munich employees told the investigators that "as a result, both directors of the radios 'beat up' on Buckley."

Buckley's inability to exercise firm control has led to "intensive competition and infighting" among the two stations' personnel, which the report characterizes as a "continual boiling pot of various intellectual emigres from the East." Some editors favor programs prepared by their friends and try to keep political opponents' programs off the air, the report states.

Lack of authority at the top means that the stations depend "on the vigilance of the editors of each of the 21 language services to identify unacceptable material," the report explains, adding "This is reminiscent of the fox guarding the henhouse."

Shakespeare has tried to politicize the radio stations, the report charges. Late last year, it notes, Shakespeare met with the news staff and predicted "the coming of the conservative millennium." Some editors, "offended by this sermon, questioned his motives and wondered why he would attempt to influence news editors whose sole responsibility is to report the news as it is, not to produce commentary."

Shakespeare said reports of a feud with Buckley are "totally untrue." He said, "Jim and I are pals from way back." Buckley could not be reached, but board member Ben Wattenberg said: "Jim has told me in private that the reports about the infighting are not true. And I can tell you that we have always backed Jim up."

REALLY COVERT AID: When the CIA's not-so-secret aid to anti-Sandinista Nicaraguan rebels was cut off by Congress, the Reagan administration finally went underground in its effort to help the contras. That's the claim of Argentine pilots interviewed recently in Bolivia, at any rate.

They said a colleague, a veteran of the Falklands War named Orlando, was recruited to fly for the contras by a "roving American military attache" from the U.S. Embassy in La Paz.

### Let Latins run own affairs if they don't threaten U.S.

In return for hands-off approach, they must agree to leave neighbors alone

(Editor's note: This is the second of two columns on Central America.)

What should the U.S. do in Central America? For the past six years, since a revolution toppled the government of Nicaraguan dictator Anastasio Somoza, that question has dominated American foreign policy. Yet neither the American people nor their leaders can agree on an answer.

The biggest stumbling block is the confusion of American interests with American ideals. We all like to believe the two are synonymous: It spares us unpleasant choices. But on the Central American isthmus they often are incompatible. The U.S. cannot withdraw from the region without serious risks to its strategic interests. Nor can it impose its democratic ideals without high costs and excessive involvement.

Recognizing these facts is the beginning of wisdom about Central America. Fortunately, there is a way to protect U.S. security while minimizing its direct interference in the region.

The approach has been called "Finlandization," mirroring as it does the Soviet approach to its non-communist neighbor. But the policy is no different from the established U.S. posture toward Mexico. It means insisting that the nations of Central America take no measures that directly threaten American security — while promising to let them run their other affairs as they choose.


Just as we ignore the Mexican government's corruption, one-party

rule and habitual anti-American rhetoric, we would ignore left-wing repression in Nicaragua and right-wing repression in Guatemala. In exchange, we would expect Central American governments to follow the Mexican example, keeping a prudent distance from the Soviets and leaving their neighbors alone — under penalty of prompt and vigorous U.S. military intervention.

That doesn't mean abandoning the hope of encouraging democracy. The right approach is to leave undemocratic governments alone — but to provide help to those countries that want to cultivate popular rule. Military and economic aid to El Salvador, if such aid is helpful, would be maintained as long as the government demonstrates progress. But aid to prop up despotic regimes would be ended.

What about Nicaragua? U.S. assistance to the contras would be cut off if Managua agrees to send home its Soviet and Cuban advisers, stop buying arms from the Eastern bloc and quit supporting the Salvadoran rebels. The Sandinistas would be allowed to pursue Marxist policies — subject to the tolerance of their own people — but not to become a Soviet military outpost.

This approach won't guarantee enlightened, humane governments throughout Central America, as many Americans on either end of the political spectrum would like. But this country doesn't have the resources, the will or the ability to do that. To succeed, U.S. policy must

have realistic limits.

If Central Americans are discontented with authoritarian governments, of whatever tinge, they will have to take responsibility for changing them. Unlike in the past, the U.S. shouldn't stand in their way. Right-wing dictatorships around the globe have proven highly vulnerable to popular resentment. If left-wing regimes have been more durable, as in Eastern Europe, it is only because they can count on the Red Army. Marxist governments in Central America wouldn't have that luxury.

"Mexicanizing" Central America would require both the administration and its opponents to lower their expectations. The president would have to give up his dream of overthrowing the Sandinistas. Congress would have to accept a permanent military role in the region.

But these concessions are the only way to bring clarity and coherence to a policy hopelessly tangled by divergent goals. This approach would maximize American security while minimizing American costs. It would also grant the nations of the isthmus a greater measure of independence and self-determination than they have ever had. For both the U.S. and Central America, it offers the best hope of escaping the region's endless violence.

### Abolishing basketball not proper solution for Tulane


Limiting players' height might be preferable concept

The Tulane scandal is hugely interesting, inviting radical thought, even from those not intimately conversant with basketball.

The scandal was of two levels, one more or less conventional, the other extraordinary. The idea of paying players to go to a college because they are good at basketball (or football, or ice hockey; whatever) is frowned on, but the furrows on American brows don't run all that deep, any more than we get excited when we discover that Joe Hotshot, who won the Olympic medal for downhill ski racing, had all his expenses met, as also those of his sweetheart, by the Gelandesprung Ski Co.

The tendency is to frown and change the subject. But point shaving, as they call it, is something else. Cheating in sport is the kind of thing that breeds national traumas of the kind that cause little children to say, "Say it isn't so." Well, it was apparently so in Tulane, but what is most interesting about the sequence of events isn't one more cheater caught up (cheating will never, unlike smallpox, be extirpated from the planet), but the reaction to it of Mr. Eamon Kelly, the president of Tulane, which is certainly out of the ordinary. He didn't suspend this set of players and bring in another team. He didn't suspend the sport for one or two years. He simply recommended that the sport be abolished. If Mr. Kelly has his way, from now on, Tulane will never see basketball.

Now, Christianity has a convention formally asserted in The Lord's

Prayer when we say, "lead us not into temptation," and appearing in Catholic catechisms as the injunction to "avoid occasions of sin." Thus, if you are an alcoholic, you would avoid a bar. If you are a satyr you would avoid a brothel (I guess the catechism would urge you to avoid a brothel even if you weren't a satyr). Mr. Kelly seems to be affirming the proposition that basketball is an occasion of sin.

It taxes the imagination why this should be said of basketball, and not, say, of football. Surely a football player who has sold out to Las Vegas can fumble the ball? Or a baseball player a catch, a hockey player a puck — whatever. Mr. Kelly seems to be telling us that there is something distinctive about basketball.

Well as a matter of fact, there is. Tallness. My sports mentor informs me that what made the match between Villanova and Georgetown so especially interesting was that in order to beat Georgetown, the underdogs had to play conventional basketball. By conventional basketball, one means actually tossing the ball, which, before it drops down through the basket, has a trajectory to travel through. The phenomenon of the past generation, in that sport, evidently is that we seem to be breeding taller and taller young men, with the result that for prized players, dropping a ball through the basket requires nothing much more than fully stretching the body. From tiptoe to outstretched arm, you just about make it to the top

of the net; and from there, all you need do is depend on gravity to let the ball score your points.

There has been talk, but never conclusive, about raising the height of the basket so as to cause even the tallest players to need to toss the ball again, restoring to the sport that which is sport. But the trouble with going in that direction is that you end up putting a greater and greater premium on sheer height, and that, surely, is to do aesthetic damage to the game. One hates to think of breeding farms for baseball players. The effect would be the equivalent of lowering the permissible weight of jockeys by, say, 15 pounds.

I am not qualified to give expert advice to President Kelly on how to have basketball and also avoid scandal. But why doesn't he try limiting the size of basketball players to, say, 6 feet? Obviously he would need to persuade another few colleges to do the same thing, in order that inter-collegiate exchanges should be made possible. But the idea is attractive. For one thing, it would assure that any points made be scored by actually tossing the ball. For another, it would assure that the temptation to gamble would be removed, in that the impulse to gamble would diminish when the betting public is made aware that you are truly dealing with amateurs. It is unlikely that you would pay someone under the table to go to Tulane to play basketball if Tulane was one of those colleges that denied the sport to oversized players.

Just a suggestion. But the alternative — no basketball, ever — is surely the defeatist's alternative — like taking a pledge to abolish fraternities because some people make animal houses out of them.

# Television Hall of Fame realization of a dream

LOS ANGELES — John H. Mitchell, a tall, rangy, nearly bald television executive and nonstop talker, doesn't look like a dreamer.

But he is. "I had a dream," he said. "I began to believe it could take shape and form and come alive."

His dream was the Television Academy Hall of Fame, which is now in its second year and will induct seven more legendary figures in a two-hour telecast Monday on NBC.

Those being honored this year are Carol Burnett, Sid Caesar, Walter Cronkite, Joyce Hall (chief booster of the "Hallmark Hall of Fame"), Rod Serling, Ed Sullivan and Sylvester L. "Pat" Weaver, father of the "Today" show, "The Tonight Show" and the TV special.

The first inductees were Lucille Ball, Milton Berle, Paddy Chayefsky, Norman Lear, Edward R. Murrow, CBS founder William S. Paley and David Sarnoff, the founder of NBC.

many ways that people can contribute to the fabric that makes up television.

"I knew it would take somebody to drive this through. I made up my mind I wanted to accomplish this and I set about doing it. One thing that helped was the support of NBC and its chairman, Grant Tinker. He said it was a good idea and he would put it on the air."

Mitchell is the chairman of the Hall of Fame. The idea came to him when he was president of the Television Academy of Arts & Sciences. He is also a former president of Columbia Pictures Television who now runs a consulting company.

This year's Hall of Fame presentations were made during ceremonies at the Santa Monica Civic Auditorium March 24. They were taped for later telecast. Among the guest stars were Woody Allen, Mel Brooks, Mike Wallace, Elizabeth Taylor, Julie Harris, Alan King, Garry Moore and Neil Simon.

Mitchell set up a committee to lay down the rules for the Hall of Fame and the selection of its honorees. "I wanted something that was prestigious and tamper proof," he said.

The number of inductees each year was arbitrarily set at seven. That allows 14 minutes for the presentation of each honoree in a two-hour program.

"The mechanism of the selection is that each of the 46 members of the board of governors of the academy has the opportunity to nominate 10 people," he said. "That would be 460 people but because of duplicate nominations it comes out to about 150 candidates for nomination."

"The honorees are picked by a selection committee of 12 persons. They represent a cross section of the industry. These are people who have no axes to grind, who've been around a long time and are well qualified to judge their peers. They discuss the candidates and vote and then discuss some more and vote again and keep doing it until they've whittled it down to seven. The nominees are then announced on the Emmy show in September."

Mitchell sits in on the discussions but does not cast a vote, which is by secret ballot. Representatives of NBC's standards and practices division also monitor the discussions to see that everything is strictly by the rules.

"The selection committee takes this very seriously," Mitchell said. "I thought they'd have a lot of fun, that there'd be some byplay. But they are very, very serious."

He said he did not know if the Hall of Fame telecasts would rotate among the networks in the future, as the Emmy Awards show does.

Five more local stage productions — plus a special event at UC Irvine today — join an already burgeoning Orange County theatrical calendar this week.



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

## Somewhere between a stock and a tax shelter

In the late 70s, a handful of shrewd oilmen elected to turn their companies into trusts. Oil trusts enabled the oilmen to assign the responsibilities of management and production to third parties at a time when the industry's go-go years were nearing an end. More importantly, the trusts enabled investors to directly share in the company's earnings and receive the customary tax benefits attributed to oil and gas royalty income. The end result was a hybrid investment vehicle which is a cross between a common stock and tax shelter.

An oil trust issues units of beneficial interest as opposed to shares of common stock. Also, they pay a variable monthly "distribution" instead of a fixed quarterly dividend. The distributions vary because the trusts rarely make exactly the same amount of money every month. **Houston Oil Trust** falls into this classification and has one of the most interesting histories of any stock listed on the American Exchange (symbol HO).

The trust was formed by the old Houston Oil and Minerals Corp. in 1981. Back then the oils were still popular and Houston Oil Trust was the darling of the market. But, the trust has done a submarine act ever since, plunging from \$35 per unit to its current level of \$3 1/2.

Houston Oil Trust has been plagued by a series of annual reductions in their oil and gas reserve estimates. The first reduction of 14 percent came in March of 1982 and prompted an investor lawsuit which is still in the courts. Another 12 percent reduction on March 21st of this year sent the units 24 percent

lower. Recently, insult was added to injury when the IRS hit the Trust with a claim for \$1.28 per unit in back taxes. Houston Oil is contesting the audit but concurrently escrowing a portion of their monthly income in the event that they lose the case.

Even though Houston Oil Trust is battling a soft oil market, disgruntled unitholders, and the IRS, some investors believe the units are grossly undervalued. Even after allowing for the reductions in reserve estimates, each unit is backed by approximately \$7.75 in oil and gas — double what the units are now selling for. The trust's holdings are vast and far reaching. Their properties encompass some 2 million acres in North America and another 2 million acres on various foreign continents. Three of the trust's 4 million acres are exploratory and periodically new oil and gas discoveries are made, so there is a possibility that the value of those reserves will increase.

Tenneco manages the properties world wide on behalf of the trust's unitholders in return for 25 percent of the net profits. The remaining 75 percent is then distributed to the unitholders at the end of each month. Because the distributions vary, it isn't possible to say exactly what they amount to, but it usually works out to about 20 percent per annum.

There are tax advantages also. Generally, only 20 to 25 percent of the monthly distributions are taxable as ordinary income. The rest is completely tax deferred due to depletion allowances, exploratory tax credits, etc., and can be deducted from the investor's original cost bases.

Investors who favor Houston Oil Trust fall into one of two basic

## BankAmerica buying Oregon Bank

SAN FRANCISCO — BankAmerica Corp. and Orbanco Financial Services Corp. Friday announced that they have agreed in principle to an acquisition of Orbanco's subsidiary, The Oregon Bank, and certain related subsidiaries by BankAmerica Corp.

The Oregon Bank is the third-largest bank headquartered in Oregon, with a statewide network of 49 offices, concentrated in Portland, Salem, and Eugene.

The agreement represents the first acquisition of an Oregon bank under recent Oregon legislation authorizing banking institutions in other states to own Oregon banks beginning July 1, 1986.

In the transaction, Orbanco will receive \$57 million in cash at the time

## No one swings through the trees in Tarzana

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The primordial, chest-thumping yodel does not echo across suburban Tarzana and no one swings through the walnut trees, but the community's ties to the mythical lord of the jungle nevertheless exist.

Edgar Rice Burroughs, who created Tarzan in 1912, even mentioned it in a letter he wrote to a friend after a Tarzan enthusiast visited his 550-acre goat ranch just north of Los Angeles.

"A guy bobbed up day before yesterday," Burroughs wrote in 1919, "with the plan of a whole village he wished to plant in my front yard — school, city hall, banks, business houses, motion picture theater — and it was labeled City of Tarzana."

The unidentified visitor's imagination was too much for Burroughs, who earned a fortune writing 97 novels and dozens of short stories that ranged from the jungles of Africa to dying empires on Mars.

The farfetched City of Tarzana, he remarked acerbically, "sounds like a steamboat."

Of course, 66 years ago the rolling countryside surrounding Burroughs' ranch was mostly a collection of small farms and ranch land. The fledgling city of Los Angeles was 20 miles to the southeast, on the other side of the Santa Monica Mountains.

As things turned out, the unknown visionary was on to something — and contemporary Tarzana modestly does what it can to preserve the heritage of its namesake.

For example, a Tarzana branch of Valley Federal Savings & Loan maintains a small museum of memorabilia. Displayed there are Tarzan movie posters, photos of almost all of the actors who have played the English nobleman raised in the jungle by apes, new and old editions of Burroughs' books and a variety of other items.

A branch of the Bank of America has a smaller exhibit of Tarzan

paintings. And then there are the corporate offices of Edgar Rice Burroughs Inc., the company the writer formed to market the Tarzan trademark and other products of his imagination.

The corporation is "a multi-million-dollar corporation," said Danton Burroughs, 40, corporate director and the writer's grandson. "But we don't tell anyone exactly how much money is involved. It's a privately held corporation and we like to keep a low profile."

All of the stockholders and two of the corporation's seven employees are the writer's children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, Danton Burroughs said.

The corporation gets a percentage of virtually anything associated with Tarzan, ranging from T-shirts, comic strips and video games to the 47 Tarzan movies, including the latest, "Greystroke: The Legend of Tarzan, Lord of the Apes."

Danton Burroughs said the family has been delighted by "Greystroke," not only because the film currently is listed in the top 10 for both sales and rentals of videotape cassettes, but also because the script is mostly faithful to the original story.

Although Edgar Rice Burroughs was initially skeptical about the City of Tarzana, by 1924 he had set out to convert his ranch into suburban subdivisions.

By 1930, the U.S. Post Office ended a seven-year dispute with a rival subdivision, Runnymede, by naming the postal district after Tarzana.

Although the family moved often, they returned to the San Fernando Valley after Burroughs served as a war correspondent during most of World War II. He died in 1950 at the age of 74, but Tarzan lives on.

"He's a timeless, ageless character," Danton Burroughs said, "— natural man at peace with himself, living in the jungle in total freedom."

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

Morrison, who had cleaned Orange County of most of its talent in 1980 (El Toro's Ron Holmes and Los Amigos' Clayton Olivier), then Ocean View's Wayne Carlander in 1981, went to the well again with hopes that Lewis can maintain a role recently established by Carlander as the Pac-10's Player of the Year.

Lewis said Carlander played a big part in his decision, but it wasn't the fact Carlander was a four-year starter or that he finished as the Pac-10's No. 1 player.

"He told me Morrison would make sure I'd get my degree," said Lewis. "It means more than one from Nevada-Las Vegas or Arizona State. A degree at USC gives me a chance for a better job (after basketball). I didn't sign for basketball, I signed for the security of a degree."

Lewis signed in the presence of his mother, Judy Yanover, and Morrison, at her Phoenix home.

The 6-7½ All-American, the subject of affection from coaches from every corner of the country, narrowed his choices to five toward the end of the basketball season — and there was an attraction at each of the locales.

"We played very well and took the lead, then I looked up at the scoreboard and we're suddenly down 10 points," MacLeod said. "We had momentum, but it switched in a hurry."

Bob McAdoo added 22 points for Los Angeles, as the Laker reserve corps again got a lot of playing time in what turned into a one-sided contest.

Byron Scott had 21 points for the winners, and Earvin "Magic" Johnson had 19 points and 12 assists.

Alvan Adams led the Suns with 23 points and Jay Humphries had 21.

## Time, light, Witt fade away in Angels' loss

Seattle's Langston gets glowing review after strong performance in 3-2 victory

Although the Anaheim Stadium lights were switched on because of a gloomy, overcast sky Saturday afternoon, Seattle left-hander Mark Langston spent most of his time dimming them on the Angels.

The Angels realized a little too late — after 7½ innings — they could get to him. Two relievers after Langston, the door slammed on the Angels, 3-2, before a crowd of 23,861.

If the glare of the loss was too much for the Angels, imagine the irritation of Mike Witt.

The Angel starter is now the owner of an 0-3 record. The same Witt who tossed a season-ending perfect game

last September has yet to turn the switch to the on position.

This isn't the way the season was supposed to start for the 24-year-old right-hander who made history by becoming the 13th pitcher in the big leagues to throw such a gem. Witt had a little polish Saturday, but Langston had the flame.

"He pitched a four-hit ball game," Angel Manager Gene Mauch said about Witt, who turned in a complete-game effort.

"Obviously he didn't pitch as strong as he did the last day of last season. But all I want to say is that Witt pitched good enough to win."

So did Langston. The Mariners' American League Rookie Pitcher of

the Year last summer had the Angels thoroughly stymied for most of seven innings, yielding just three singles before departing in the eighth inning.

The chilled crowd became restless for the first time when the Angels had two base-runners and nobody out in the eighth. That was Langston's worst jam of the afternoon.

After the Seattle starter allowed Doug DeCinces' double down the left-field line that scored both Dick Schofield and Gary Pettis, he was relieved by stopper Ed Nunez. Nunez ended the Angels' quick scoring spurt by forcing pinch-hitter Rod Carew to ground out, but the Mariners ended the inning still holding a 3-2 lead.

"Doug is a great hitter," Langston said about DeCinces' double that put an end to the sophomore's shutout bid. "It was a slider over the plate. I'm just glad it didn't go out of the park."


Williams chose to use the right-hand hitting Bevacqua against Dodger righty Ken Howell with two out and runners on second and third.

LAS VEGAS — Alice Miller pulled what may be a fatal faux pas on the 18th hole Saturday and it may cost her a shot at winning \$1 million dollars.

Miller, winner of the Dinah Shore Invitational two weeks ago, was tied with J&B Scotch Pro-Am leader Patty Sheehan after 10 holes of the third round on a cold day at the Desert Inn Country Club Saturday.  
 She bogeyed No. 11 and Sheehan posted a birdie to go two in front. But she was still in the hunt. Miller is the only player with a chance to win the \$1 million for capturing both the Dinah Shore and Las Vegas events.  
 She posted a string of pars and appeared to have No. 18 in her pocket with another when a bogey was posted and Sheehan finished with a five-stroke advantage over Miller in second place.

"In this tournament you are supposed to mark your ball with a tee when you are longest off the tee," Miller explained. The two amateur partners can then hit their second shot from that position in the scramble format. But the pro is only supposed to mark her ball several inches one side or the other, then hit her ball before the amateurs.  
 "I made a stupid mistake, a real bad mental error," she said. "I put the tee down and picked the ball up but kept my eye on the spot. As soon as I picked it up I realized I wasn't supposed to so I put it back down. First I was thinking it was a two-stroke penalty but it was only one."

Sheehan had a 71 Saturday, 1-under-par for a 54-hole total of 203. Miller finished at 1-over-par 73 for a 208 total with Vicki Ferguson, Nancy Lopez, Pat Bradley and Beth Solomon all in at 7-under-par, 210. That put Miller five strokes behind Sheehan.

"My chances are a lot less than before the costly mistake," Miller continued. "I feel a lot worse than I did two hours ago. But my whole back nine was costly."  
 "Patty is a good front-runner and will be hard to catch. All I can do is go out and play my game and if I finish, second, third or 10th, be happy."

"We don't play this type of pro-am format during tournaments at any other time. I should have been paying attention."

**Express ripped by Gold, 51-0**

**Morrison beats the odds again with his coup**

Stan Morrison — he's a man who visited Pat Ewing in 1981 and told him "You know Pat, I know I don't have a chance to get you, but you're never going to forget me."  
 He proceeded to jump on a table and do a tap dance.

That's Morrison's way — although he seldom displays his comic ability to the general public.

It was that personality, straightforwardness and personal touch of the 43-year-old USC coach that helped shape the decision of Mater Dei High's Tom Lewis, the 6-7 1/2 All-American basketball star who signed with Morrison and the Trojans Saturday afternoon.

"I knew I only had a one-in-10 chance," quipped Morrison via telephone after returning from Phoenix, alluding to a Los Angeles Examiner item recently which handicapped the Run for Lewis, citing Syracuse as the favorite at 2-1, followed by Nevada-Las Vegas at 5-2, UCLA at 7-1, Arizona State at 8-1 and USC at 10-1.

UNLV Coach Jerry Tarkenton said he felt Lewis, the No. 1 prep basketball recruit on the West Coast, was all but delivered to his Runnin' Rebels "unless something bizarre happens," on Friday.

Friday's bizarre became Saturday's fact as Morrison completed a two-player coup.

It's the second double-punch on rival UCLA. The Trojans bested the Bruins twice on the court this past season, now it's twice off the court with Lewis added to the stable, where Glendale High guard Rich Grande was secured earlier.

"Just keep reading the papers," said Morrison. "It's not over yet."  
 Others signed for the Trojans, who have 7-1 Ivan Verberc and six other two-year lettermen returning, among others, are 6-9 Mike Canada from Omaha and 6-4 Jeffery Connelly from Santa Cruz.

Lewis says Morrison leaves for Italy Monday evening where it is expected he'll visit Marco Baldi, the 7-1 giant who prepped at Irvine's Woodbridge High during his junior season.

Morrison, who has gone 192-166 over a 13-year span with the University of Pacific and USC, really caught the attention of Lewis and his No. 1 adviser, Pat Barrett, at the McDonalds All-American Game in Dallas recently.  
 "He flew there and had to wait 45

minutes in line to buy a ticket," said Barrett. "Afterward he was able to talk with me for about two minutes, and he wasn't able to talk to Tom at all. That was after everyone had been telling him he didn't have a chance."

It had been widely speculated that wherever Lewis went, Barrett would follow in a package deal, but Barrett, and Morrison, deny any coaching ties.

"Of course he'll be involved," said Morrison of Barrett. "He's been a surrogate father, a coach and a best friend and I know he'll be very supportive as a fan."

"He's not a quitter and he never gave up," Lewis said of Morrison. "And it was never his assistants that came, it was always him."

"I've always been intimately involved and make all the house visits," said Morrison. "I told him the first time we met, and that was some time ago, that I'm committed one time and one time only. I don't hover over them. And if the decision was to go elsewhere I'd be the first to congratulate him."

Morrison's way won out in a six-team race.

The others failed and this is how Lewis summed it up:  
 "UCLA was just a different approach and I didn't know how I'd fit in at Arizona State. UC Irvine just came in too late. I probably just didn't want to go to school in that town (Las Vegas) and I didn't want to go back east (Syracuse)."

There was the glitter of Las Vegas, the prestige of the Big East at Syracuse, the jingering tradition of UCLA and the possibility of playing within earshot of his parents at Arizona State.

But when it was all said and done, Morrison, who brought the Trojans into the national spectrum with a co-championship and the first such title in 24 years, won out.

"I like to get it and go," says Lewis, who averaged 32.0 points and 11.6 rebounds a game as a senior in pacing the Monarchs to a 29-0 season and the CIF 5-A championship.

Pat Barrett, a former Mater Dei assistant and his chief adviser, says "I think Tom will enjoy the game more. Everything in high school has been geared to stop Tom. His game will get better."

"They won't be able to cheat," predicts Lewis. "I haven't seen one-on-one defense very much in high school. Of course, there's a lot of zone in college, too."

The 18-year-old native of Boston was a subject of controversy since he arrived at Mater Dei as a sophomore after his freshman year at Capistrano Valley where he played for Barrett on the sophomore team.

The past three years found the Monarchs as the most sensational, most publicized and most envied prep basketball team in Southern California with an 86-5 record, three trips to the CIF finals and twice culminating with CIF championships.

Morrison is hopeful, of course, that the catalyst which Lewis became at Mater Dei will carry over.

## Decorator's work 'lowers' ceilings of model homes

Coordination of model alcove, hallway relieves disproportionate appearance

Proportion — balance, symmetry, harmony — is what we all hope for in decorating our homes. It's not easy to put it all together, but the results can do only look good, they can solve built-in size and scale problems.

Sometimes high ceilings, much as we like them, can create difficulties in themselves. That's just what designer Kristi West found when she first saw the entrance hall and adjacent living room of a small, relatively narrow but potentially charming house.

The ceilings were 12 feet high, but the living room started right from the front wall, with an alcove only eight feet wide. In the original construction of the house, an attempt had been made to open up this space by turning the hallway wall into a two-foot-high divider, but this

was only partially successful in relieving the essentially disproportionate look.

West set herself two inter-related goals: to "lower" the ceilings visually, and coordinate the alcove and hallway into one flowing and continuous design. She decided to use wallcoverings and fabrics related in design, color, and scale to accomplish both, and choose three patterns from James Seaman Studios' new "It's Today" Collection — a floral, a diagonal stripe, and an abstract small print — each effective on its own, and in harmony with its partners.

Color relationships were of vital importance, with all three patterns in seafoam, russet, peanut and white on a sand-toned background, and all de-

signed in a flowing brushstroke technique.

As her first impression, West chose the diagonal stripe, "Sway," for the hallways walls and low divider, establishing an easy ceiling/floor visual contact. The open, airy blossoms of "Floret" were set on the alcove wall, and the living room beyond, to a height of eight feet. On the ceiling, and descending four feet down the wall to a slim molding, she placed the smaller-scales "Splash," creating a canopy-like effect and subtly changing the area's dimensions.

The three fabrics also contributed to the overall look. The low, wicker-based sectional sofa is topped with "Sway" pillows, and throw pillows are covered in both "Splash" and "Floret." With a russet rag rug on the parquet hall floor, and beige raffia carpeting in the alcove, the informal, welcoming, people-proportioned result is a lasting delight.

# Catalina's Historical Inn restored by Mesa company

Restoration and conversion work has commenced at Catalina Island's Historical Inn at Mt. Ada, the former summer residence of chewing gum magnate William Wrigley Jr.

Wrigley purchased Catalina Island — sight unseen — in 1919. The home, named for his wife, was built there in 1921.

"Conversion of the main house is expected to be complete by mid-June," according to Bill Warkentin, principal of Warkentin Cox Architects of Costa Mesa and partner-in-charge of the fragile historical project.

Among the details being designed and directed by WCA are the installation of additional bathrooms and of fireplaces in several of the sleeping rooms and suites.

The suite makes up the largest

portion of the master wing on the second level of the Inn. It overlooks Avalon's picturesque harbor as well as the adjoining courtyard, lawns and gardens in the interior of the property. From its "sleeping porch," guests will have a bird's eye view of the practice field area once used for spring training by the Chicago Cubs.

Both sitting room and terrace are spectacular vantage points for looking back toward mainland California's coastline.

Davcon, Inc., of Tustin is the general contractor for construction on the project.

A second WCA project under construction, the Promontory condominium project on Scripps Ranch in San Diego County, won the Gold Nugget Grand Award — the building industry's highest

honor — for its site plan.

The Promontory, an 80-unit condominium project on 20.9 acres of Scripps Ranch in San Diego County, displays WCA's expertise in hillside adaptive construction.

The firm was able to design 10 separate clusters of eight condominiums each on a small but highly visible site, and to respond to local concerns by retaining the grandeur of the natural ridgeline.

The WCA plan required removal of only 10,000 cubic yards of earth from the site; a previously approved tract on the site called for removal of 350,000 cubic yards of earth.

The entry to the community features a unique bridge/tunnel, and the buildings themselves are constructed in a stacked design to accommodate the slope.

Manufacturer's claim — That the saw has a lateral lock-off button that works easily for right or left-handed operators ... that it has a blade wrench storage place so the wrench stays with the tool ... that it has a 2 1/4-horsepower motor ... that it is of ball bearing construction ... that it has textured front and rear handles ... that it has die cast aluminum blade guards ... that it has a zero

adjustment foot plate ... that its specially wound field coil motor provides more horsepower per cubic inch than conventional motors ... that it is double insulated ... that it is designed for continuous use by do-it-yourselfers who have a wide range of applications, including metal and masonry cutting ... and that it has a two-wire cord and plug.

The product — A press-in-place window glazing.

Manufacturer's claim — That it is not necessary to use a putty knife to put this glazing in place ...

# Property managers cite improvements in value, services

Property managers are offering greater services to their clients today because of changes in the profession over the past 15 years, says the head of the Institute of Real Estate Management (IREM).

"Intensified focus on overall value is what differentiates today's property manager from the past," explained Ronald A. Harris, IREM president. "Contemporary property managers cannot limit their professional practice to the efficient technical management of property. Rather, they will be encouraged and expected to expand the scope of their services to their clients in the form of responsible real estate advice."

Harris told a group of professional managers in Virginia that property management was viewed as a task-oriented business. Managers, he said, were concerned with basic chores such as rent collection and cost cutting.

It was not until the early '70s, when outside forces (including rising inflation and energy costs) had a tremendous impact on real estate investments, that the need for awareness of management as a practice in real estate reached the "critical point," Harris said.

"The quality of the manager emerged as an obvious and significant factor in calculating the property's value. It is this evolution of emphasis on value that commands our attention in the 1980s," Harris said.

Today's real estate market scarcely resembles the market of the past, he said. Dominating the market now are a new breed of property owner: institutional investors, pension funds and foreign investors. They are "sophisticated, careful, knowledgeable clients who require detailed periodic reports and who specify definite objectives," Harris said.

Another innovation in today's market is a new emphasis on rehabilitation.

# Lyon's share of home market again the biggest

Newport developer listed number one among Southland builders fourth consecutive year

For an unprecedented fourth consecutive year, the William Lyon Company is ranked "number one" among Southern California homebuilders, according to an annual residential building survey conducted by the Los Angeles Times.

While concentrating the majority of its efforts on entry-level housing, the William Lyon Company reported a record \$182.7 million in sales in 1984. The total number of homes completed for the year, 1,710 was also a record.

Single-family residences comprised 54 percent of Lyon's homes in 1984, with the balance attributed to attached condominiums and townhomes.

Ten projects are currently on the market in Southern California. They are located in Irvine (Northwood Courtside, Woodbridge Parklane and Woodbridge Parkview); Fullerton (American Classics); Yorba Linda (Travis Country); Orange (Cowan

Hills); Mission Viejo (Ridgmont); Laguna Hills (Rancho Monterey); Sunnymead (California Classics); and Rancho Cucamonga (Victoria).

New developments are scheduled for Diamond Bar, Dana Point and Lake Forest.

"We built just over 600 more homes in Southern California in 1984 than we did in 1983," said Maj. Gen. William Lyon, USAF (ret), chairman of the board and chief executive officer. "Much of the increase for our company in the past year was attributed to the development of our master-planned community, Victoria, which opened in April."

Located in Rancho Cucamonga, Victoria will be developed over the next 10 years. When completed, it will provide more than 8,000 homes for an estimated 25,000 people.

By building both detached and attached housing, the company has successfully penetrated all market segments. Although much of Lyon's emphasis has been on entry-level housing, it is also recording an impressive impact on the middle, upper middle and luxury homes market.

"We are experiencing excellent sales volumes in all market segments, from the so-called 'affordable' level, up to and including the \$300,000 level," said Dick Randall, president and chief operating officer for The William Lyon Company.

"For a long time, people thought we could only build in one price range...the low side of the market," said Gen. Lyon. "We did that on purpose because we really believed that was where the market was. However, special situations and demands have come up over the past five years."

"As an example, last year we opened Woodbridge Parklane, a project featuring 101 single-fam-

ily homes, four separate models and priced in the \$186,000 to \$222,000 range. We opened with 20 homes on Oct. 6 and sold 13 the first weekend.

The William Lyon Company's commitment to building entry-level housing will continue in 1985, according to Randall.

"When the demand and opportunity arise, we will keep building 'move-up' and executive-style residences," said Randall. "However, the main thrust of our activity will continue to be geared to the 'first-home' market."

"Builders must always be extremely sensitive to the needs of the market. That's what determines where and what we decide to build each year. Today's buyers are looking for homes that are well-designed, in good locations, affordably priced and attractively financed."

"When a builder can provide what the consumer wants and can afford to purchase, that's when you sell homes."

The "number one" title for 1984 is the most recent in a continuing series of honors awarded to the William Lyon Company. The firm's achievements have also captured the attention of the national media. In 1982, Lyon was named "Builder of the Year" by Professional Builder Magazine.



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# Unresolved issues raise tensions over world trade

## Full-fledged fight among heavyweights of world trade would harm all countries

BRUSSELS, Belgium — When the United States, Japan and nations of Western Europe gather to talk business in early May, they'll do so against a tangle of unanswered questions that are heightening tensions over world trade.

Among the unresolved issues:

• Will U.S. businesses be rescued by a slide in the dollar before Congress erects barriers to protect American industries from imports?

• Can the U.S. economy stay healthy long enough to hold back the protectionists and avert retaliation from Japan and Europe?

• Will Japan start buying more from abroad before one of its trading partners throws a protectionist punch?

• "It's a race against time," Martin Wolf, director of studies at the Trade Policy Research Center, a private institute in London, said in a recent interview.

No one can be sure of the outcome, but just about everyone seems to agree that if a full-fledged fight breaks out among the heavyweights of world trade, all countries — big and small — will get hurt.

"It would mean the start of a kind of jungle regime," says Willy de Clercq, commissioner for foreign relations for the Common Market, Western Europe's 10-nation trading bloc.

The growing fear of chaos in trade will make protectionism a central topic at the economic summit of the seven largest industrial democracies, to be held May 2-4 in Bonn, the capital of West Germany.

President Reagan is expected to press the other participants — Britain, Canada, France, Italy, Japan and West Germany — for a commit-

ment to open negotiations in 1986 to liberalize trade rules.

The only resistance may come from France and Italy, which also want a commitment from Washington to discuss reforming the international monetary system.

Despite a recent proliferation of national trade barriers, few economists believe the rules that have

governed the world trading system since World War II are about to unravel.

"There are a number of irritants in trade, but they are the sort of irritants which people can live with," Wolf said.

Many Americans may believe their country is already in a trade war with Japan.

The Reagan administration has been twisting Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone's arm, urging him to make the Japanese market more open to American products or face protectionist backlash in Congress.

U.S. tensions with Japan have heightened dramatically in recent years as the Japanese trade surplus has widened. Last year Japan's exports outran imports by \$44 billion, and nearly \$37 billion of the record surplus was in trade with the United States.

Japan contends it should not be penalized for outperforming other exporters, and points to a huge overall U.S. trade deficit. That deficit is expected to hit a record \$140 billion this year.

Economists say the poor U.S. trade record is explained in part by the

staggering rise in the value of the dollar, which makes American exports harder to sell while making imports cheaper.

From 1980 to its peak last February, the dollar's value rose 90 percent in relation to currencies of major U.S. trading partners. Since then, it has slumped.

The Common Market, which does about \$90 billion in business with the United States each year, has major trade disputes of its own with the Reagan administration:

• The United States has accused

Common Market countries of skirting a 1982 agreement limiting European carbon steel exports. Last fall, the United States temporarily closed its borders to European steel pipes and tubes after failing to reach agreement on new limits for those products.

• The Common Market has protested U.S. legislation that allows American grape growers to file unfair trade practice complaints against European wine exporters. The Common Market contends this is in violation of accepted trading rules.

• The most divisive debate may come in agricultural trade. The Reagan administration says it wants to reduce government support for U.S. farming, putting more pressure on the Common Market to dismantle its own agricultural export subsidies, which, the United States says, distorts competition.

The Common Market also has complaints about Japan's trading practices.

Norman Tebbit, the British trade secretary, said during an official visit to Tokyo on April 18 that the Common Market "would be forced" to follow suit if the United States took protectionist measures against Japan.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Lowell Katz believes in keeping his readers in stitches: after all, they are doctors who have to plod through the serious fare in "Louisville Medicine."

In the April issue, Katz's column, sandwiched between articles on malpractice insurance and the new 911 emergency telephone system, comprises capsule reviews of improbable films:

• The story of a scalp transplantee who dies in an industrial accident, titled "From Hair to Eternity."

Katz, a 36-year-old colo-rectal surgeon, said he started his column because he thought the journal "was too stodgy and boring" and he wanted to show that "doctors have a sense of humor, too."

In school, Katz said he became a class joker out of a need to cover his self-consciousness about having buck teeth.

"My teeth were so buck they were \$1.50," he quips. "The happiest day of my life was when I got braces."

He admitted that his is not everyone's brand of humor — in particular, his wife's.

"Martha hates it," he said. "So I have to be careful."

### Disabled man uses skateboard to keep himself on the move

DALLAS (AP) — Richard Matlock has no legs and a severely deformed right arm from the drug thalidomide, which was prescribed to his mother during her pregnancy, but he hasn't let the handicaps slow him down.

Matlock, 25, learned at age 2 that by using a skateboard he could get around better than many people not handicapped.

He became so expert at maneuvering his skateboard that his friends soon nicknamed him "Big Wheel," and he now feels comfortable getting around on a street or in a shopping mall, he said.

"I've been riding one for so long, I could take it apart and put it back together blindfolded," Matlock told the Dallas Times Herald.

He and Ginger Jackson have two sons, 2-year-old Shane and 3-month-old Joey, whom he described as healthy and very active. Despite his handicaps, he delights in helping care for them at their home in suburban Pleasant Grove.

Supplemental Security Income checks have helped the family get by while he is out of a job, he said. Despite his unemployment, he remains optimistic about the future.

His sons keep him going, he said. "In the morning, I tell myself, 'Come on, Richard, you can do it for those babies.'"

## Security-conscious capital puts premium on bodyguards

### Inspectors general taking on the job despite controversy over whether it should be theirs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Who are those men guarding the secretary of Agriculture?

Or the secretary of Health and Human Services? The secretary of Housing and Urban Development? The secretary of Energy?

Although bodyguards for Cabinet officials predate the Reagan administration, they have become more noticeable in a city that is increasingly security conscious because of terrorist threats.

In most cases it isn't the Secret Service — the president's bodyguards — doing the protecting. Many departments have put employees in their inspector general offices through Secret Service training and use them to provide personal security for top officials.

The inspectors general, or IGs as they're called, were established within most departments seven years ago as agency watchdogs responsible for doing audits and watching for waste and fraud.

One of the authors of the law setting up those offices says he's troubled to see them perform security or even servant tasks.

"The IGs were never intended to provide police services, servants or bodyguards," said Rep. Jack Brooks, D-Texas, the chairman of the Government Operations Committee.

"Use of the already limited resources of the IGs for those functions detracts from their ability to combat waste, fraud and abuse in the expenditure of government funds."

Brooks said he and his panel intend "to take a close look at the extent to which IG personnel are being used as bodyguards and to perform other inappropriate functions."

Secret Service spokesman Robert Snow attributes the rise in use of bodyguards to a changing climate for

public officials brought on by terrorism, assassination attempts and other violence.

"In both foreign service and domestic, we've seen U.S. officials become targets," he said. "It's a subjective thing. It has to be a decision by the Cabinet people themselves ... Many corporate executives are getting protection they never had before. It's a growing business."

The agencies say security is a natural job for the inspectors general, even if it's not specifically written into the law.

"This is not time or money wasted by a cadre of personal agents," said John Ochs, spokesman for Agriculture Secretary John Block. "The agent that accompanies Secretary Block is a criminal investigator from the Office of Inspector General who spends the bulk of his time on various department investigations."

The White House's Office of Management and Budget did a survey recently to determine to what extent inspectors general are being used as bodyguards.

Besides Block, it found them in use by HHS Secretary Margaret Heckler, who often takes two bodyguards, by HUD Secretary Samuel Pierce; and to varying degrees by other secretaries.

Former Labor Secretary Raymond Donovan had them until leaving office under indictment; former Education Secretary T.H. Bell used them as did former Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Anne Burford.

Energy Secretary John S. Herrington even brought a security agent to a news conference last month.

The Treasury secretary is guarded by the Secret Service; the Defense Department provides security for its secretary; the State Department provides protection for its secretary and for other officials traveling

abroad. At Justice, FBI agents known as the "bow and arrow squad" by department insiders protect Attorney General Ed Meese, and before him William French Smith, who revived the protection after it was halted under President Carter.

Former Interior Secretary James Watt had bodyguards routinely, provided by the U.S. Park Police. Spokesman Alan Levitt said the department won't reveal the security measures taken for the new secretary, Donald Hodel.

Secretary Elizabeth Dole has bodyguards provided by the Transportation Department, a practice spokesman Dick Burdette says predated the Reagan administration.

At the Supreme Court, Chief Justice Warren E. Burger and Justice Harry A. Blackmun, who received a death threat last fall, often are accompanied by at least one court police officer when in public portions of the court building or when venturing outside. After a 1982 attack against Justice Byron R. White, when a man punched him in the head and face, Congress passed a law allowing armed court police to accompany the justices anywhere in the country.

The justices also have asked Congress for authority to have court employees drive them to and from work, service the chief justice now is entitled to.

"What does all this security cost? The budget office says it doesn't have an overall figure but estimates about \$2 million of the \$408 million spent last year by the inspectors general went to security, with more spent on security by various other agencies.

The Secret Service spent \$286 million last year. Some of their money also went for criminal investigations not relating to security.

At HHS, the government spent \$27,541 last year for bodyguards to travel with Mrs. Heckler; their salaries amounted to another \$58,194.
