SAFE SOLID AND SEXY

The new sex symbols? Men of substance like John Goodman of TV's hit 'Roseanne,' a heartland hunk whose humor keeps things light.

The two sexiest words in the English language. You know them, don't you? Right. "Drywall contractor."

TV actor John Goodman plays Dan Conner, a drywall contractor. A father. A regular guy with a happy, crazy family on this season's hit show *Roseanne*.

He struggles over money. He loves his kids. He loves his wife. He laughs a lot. He helps around the house. He's smart.

John Goodman is the New Improved Sexiest Man Alive — the normal, real, regular guy. He's also a big bear of a man. And while you don't have to be chunky to be a hunk, it doesn't hurt. If you're lucky, you may be one. Or you may have one living at your house.

Roseanne Barr, the ABC show's star, got the early headlines, but it's John Goodman who's causing our collective pantyhose to roll up and down.

"We run a list of the 10 sexiest men in America every September. I wouldn't be surprised to see John Goodman on it this year," says *Playgirl* magazine Editor-in-Chief Nancie S. Martin.

"Women recently seem to prefer bigger guys. They like guys who are broad across the shoulders just because they're solid. We've evolved from Warren Beatty through Alan Alda through Bruce Willis. Women are ready for the next big thing — the rough-hewn image. Women who read *Playgirl* have always liked to look at men who look like lumberjacks, construction types."

Face it, John Goodman's character is a man who's easy to love — lots of laughing and giggling. And in this era of Safe Sex, plenty of us long for some guy who hasn't sown enough wild oats to qualify for a farm loan. Here's a guy, clearly, who wouldn't be on your case if you put on a few pounds.

He's the flip side of *L.A. Law*'s sharpie divorce lawyer Arnie Becker. He's no Archie Bunker slob and he's no Joe Six Pack. But he's no Prince Charming, either. Robert Redford couldn't fill his shoes, let alone his suits (size 54 long). This is a guy who's going to come home every night. When he hits mid-life crisis, he won't crybaby about lost chances or how you held him back. He'll go out and buy a cordless reversible drill and get on with his life.

So how does John Goodman take being a sex symbol? Just the way you'd expect. "I'm embarrassed," he says in that big-guy, self-effacing way of his. And what about mash notes from female fans? "Actually," he says, "the mail I've gotten looks like it's from shut-ins, people who don't get out much."

Well, don't just sit there, ladies, grab the perfumed stationery and get cracking. You can be on the ground floor here.

The John Goodman Fan Club? "It would be a weird cult," he says. "Look at my 8-by-10. I look more like a furni-

ture salesman than an actor."

John Goodman, 36, is not married, never has been and is not dating anyone at the moment. (Are you taking notes here, ladies?) He explains he can play a loving husband and father because "I'm a Peeping Tom."

"Actually, I've had a few live-in relationships. I've seen dirty dishes in the sink first-hand. I know how to stack dirty laundry so that it looks like a sculpture."

This is an important talent on *Roseanne*, whose ring-around-the-blue-collar ambience is more like Beirut than Beverly Hills. It works. But if there's one not-so-true-to-life part of the show, it is the non-stop banter/bickering between Roseanne and Dan. Who could keep up?

Goodman says *Roseanne* could even affect his own chances for eventual domestic bliss: "This thing sets me back about 20 years. I look at it as a sign from God. He's saying, 'Hey buddy, don't try this at home.'"

Actually, Goodman says, some men have complained that he's not more like the old TV shows with the keep-the-little-woman-in-her-place husband. "A lot of guys think I get pushed around too much. They'd like me to stand up to her, to fight back. Yeah, right."

Winning points isn't the answer. What holds *Roseanne*'s family together is that "they really adore each other," says Goodman.

"I don't think anyone else could put up with them. They are each other's life support system."

And they are the center of the show. Not their house or their clothes or their fancy cars. It's what makes John Goodman so sexy — he's an ordinary guy, absolutely approachable.

Roseanne's man has simple plans

John Goodman may do for flannel shirts what *Wall Street* did for the power business suit.

And there are a lot of flannel-shirt lovers out there. Ask Susie Carter. She's the editor and publisher of *Alaska Men* magazine. It's pictures and stories about eligible Alaskan men — a great proportion of them regular guys in flannel shirts. In two years, *AM*'s circulation has jumped from 5,000 to 200,000. And that's at \$5.25 a copy.

"Our centerfolds are husband material. Our last was wearing a plaid shirt, slacks, boots, just standing up against some rocks and smiling," she says.

"Women are starting to look beyond the body. I find on the whole that most men who are very good-looking when they are young, high school age, really don't have to develop their personality and social aspect of life. They're sought after because of their looks. A guy who's ho-hum, average or maybe even ugly has learned to develop a sense of humor or something that makes them acceptable to women."

Take that, Tom Cruise.

Not everyone goes along with the bigger-is-better theory. *Cosmopolitan* honcho and expert man-watcher Helen Gurley Brown says Goodman may cause some to slow their plans to slim down — "John will give solace to many who are chubby — but a trend he's not."

Skinny will always be considered younger and sexier, she says.

Sorry, Helen, not these days. Goodman and Barr are the antidote for the have-it-all yuppie couples who've been trotted out as ideals. "There's nothing wonderful, passionate or soulful about two BMWs," says Encino, Calif., clinical psychologist Marilyn Ruman.

Goodman's Conner "is a man who doesn't eat quiche and certainly doesn't

make it. He's protective and powerful, and in a relationship with a woman who is no wimp herself... and it works." It's about time, says Ruman, for a husband who can "pinch his wife on the rear end and not worry about whether he's encroaching on her space."

Amen.

These are the guys who sign up to be den leaders for Cub Scouts. They're the ones who get sucked into being Little League coaches. They know what to do on a camping trip: Bring food and bug spray in equal amounts. They don't stop at every mirror and reflective object to check themselves out.

In short, they live for things beyond themselves. They are not the center of

the universe. And in the end, they are sexy as all get out.

Women are fed up with trying to find someone who looks good or makes a lot of money, says Washington, D.C., psychologist Karen Shanor. Finally, women are saying, "I want somebody I can depend on, who's a good human being." It shows a growth in women.

"We've reached a maturity where we're demanding that we be treated de-

cently. We don't have to pick the guys who don't talk to us or who treat us badly. It has to do with a sense of self-esteem, sense of growth — 'I'm worth something, too.'"

Women always have been attracted to men who are sensitive, loving, funny, good fathers, and who communicate. "We haven't had a lot of images of those types," says Washington, D.C., family therapist Marianne Walters. "I think it's wonderful that on television there's a man who is vulnerable, warm, open, very involved in parenting."

Interestingly, John Goodman's favorite TV family, the Kramdens, featured TV's original big, big, big guy — Jackie Gleason of *The Honeymooners*. "Gleason was gold. Ralph and Alice were real people. I can listen to Gleason's get-rich-quick schemes all the time. He's the master."

And unlike most guys his size, Gleason's Kramden never had to play, well, the heavy.

Says Barry Glassner, a sociologist at the University of Connecticut and author of a book called *Bodies*: "What makes Goodman's character so appealing is that there are so few regular" — read *large* — "looking men on television. When they do appear as characters in a TV show, they're usually portrayed as bad guys and oddballs."

"This character is portrayed as having a heart as big as his middle. He's simple, he's lovable, he's alive."

Where can you find your own Mr. Regular?

Forget singles bars or clubs on Saturday nights. These men gather at hardware stores on Saturday mornings — the kind that serve coffee and have bolts and screws in bins, not bubble-packs.

These places also have another draw for these new sex symbols — hunting and fishing licenses. These guys are often heavily into H&F or something that gets them outdoors.

And, of course, they're often a notch big for Levi 501s.

John Goodman says he doesn't even know his weight. "I certainly don't want to know it. But it's decreasing. I've been walking every day and laying off just about everything."

"I was fat in college and then I lost about 70 pounds and I stayed that way for five or six years." Then he "discovered the miracle of beer and that was about it. I got tired of battling it all the time. It was just constant and I just let it go. Now I want to get it under control."

But there are plenty of women, John, who don't care where you tip the scales.

"I don't think men with perfect bodies will ever go out, at least I hope not for *Playgirl's* sake," says editor Nancie Martin. "But being a devoted family man in this day and age is very sexy. Being responsible, being there, caring, are very sexy things."

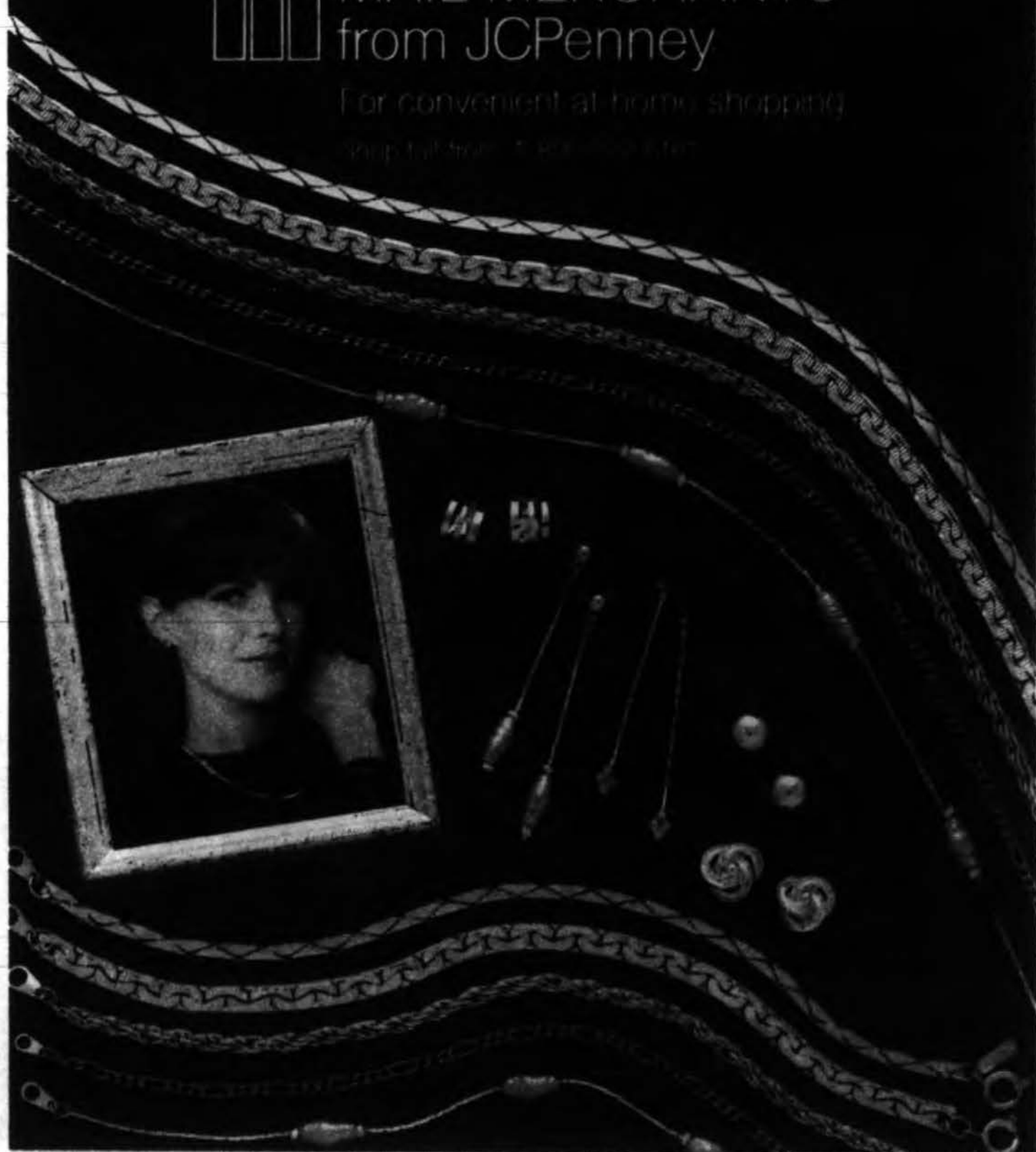

Talking up a win Communication is key in sports

Buddies on the big screen are a hot item, but two of the hottest happen to be for real — tennis partners Ken Flach and Robert Seguso. Pitcher-catcher combinations and

two-man volleyball teams notwithstanding, it's tough to find a

better combo than these two. They'll try to snag their ninth straight Davis Cup win this week in the first round of play in Fort Myers, Fla.

How do they do it? Their first edge: They have complementary strengths.

"I always had the better serve; he's better on returns," Seguso says. "Ken's a fast player with good hands. I put the ball away."

But the key to their success lies beyond tennis ability. "They have that very rare form of communication that comes from playing together for so long. Each almost knows what the other guy is going to do," says Bud Collins, NBC tennis commentator. "They talk more than any other doubles team."

Good communication is a necessary skill in relationships no matter what the field: marriage, business or sports.

"Actually, it's a lot like being married. When you don't talk, your game starts to slide. Somebody's got to say something to break the ice," Flach says.

The players are best known for the hand signals they flash each other just before serving. "If I know Ken is going to serve in on a guy, it gives me half a step, and that can make all the difference," Seguso says.

The signals were inspired in part by his days on the diamond, Flach says. "I played baseball in college, and you've got constant communication between the pitcher and the catcher."

Here's their advice for choosing a compatible doubles partner:

- ▶ If you're serious about the game, find someone who is good under pressure.
- ▶ Assess your own strengths and weaknesses, and pick a partner to complement your playing abilities.
- ▶ If you hit right-handed, find a lefty so the court is covered wide *and* inside.
- ▶ If you play better on the "deuce" side of the court, look for a partner who thrives on the "ad" side.
- ▶ Find someone you can communicate with — someone who can take direction as well as give it.
- ▶ Choose a partner who offers neither false praise nor unwarranted criticism.

Southern New Mexico

For an out-of-this-world family adventure,
explore eerie caves, stark desert dunes —
even a space station for the year 2001

Time to shelve plans for
five-star hotels and fancy
cuisines, and follow USA
WEEKEND Guest Editor
Karen Armitage to Southern
New Mexico.

A 200-mile journey
through the region will take
you into some of the USA's
most awesome landscapes,
from the supernatural stalagmites of Carlsbad Caverns to the black volcanic rocks of The Malpais to the massive dunes of White Sands National Monument.

"There is something so
startling about this landscape that it takes you out of
the everyday world," says
Armitage. "The natural phenomena are surreal and
thought-provoking."

► **Day One.** Carlsbad Caverns National Park is a stalagmite wonderland almost 1,000 feet below the desert hills (\$4, kennels and day-care provided; call [505] 785-2107).

"It's just unbelievable, the physical presence," Armitage says. "You just keep walking down straight into the Earth. It's bizarre."

The caverns were formed
some three million years

ago. First, cracks appeared in an ancient
sea reef. Then rain water slowly dripped
into the earth below, carving caves into
an ice-like fairyland.

► **Day Two.** Drive 146 miles through the
desert until you reach the Space Center in
Alamogordo and catch a show on the
OMNIMAX, a huge, 180-degree screen
(\$2.25 for space hall tour and \$3.75 for
"Seasons" film; call 1-800-545-4021 for
information).

At the space hall you can step inside
Space Station 2001 or learn how an RL-10
rocket works. See what astronauts eat
and wear in space.



GUEST EDITOR

In previous issues of
USA WEEKEND, we invited
readers to be Guest Editors
and tell about their favorite
weekend getaways. Here is
our choice for this month.

► **WHO:** Karen Armitage,
37, a physician from Santa
Fe, N.M. Married, with two
children.

► **WHAT:** Getaway to
Southern New Mexico, natural
wonders, unusual scenery,
hiking, space museum.

► **WHY:** "The trip was so
interesting — almost surreal.
There are a lot of unusual
natural phenomena there.
At White Sands, there is this
pure white sand that turns
colors in shadows. At Carlsbad,
you have this awesome cave;
it's like the Grand Canyon,
but underground."

The gift shop has unusual
space toys and gadgets, including
astronaut's freeze-dried ice cream (\$1.50).
There are more than 100 different
patches of shuttle flights (\$2 to \$5) and an
extensive medallion coin collection (\$3.50 to \$50).

It's a full day at this four-story,
copper-colored glass building and neighboring
theater. But leave at least a couple of hours to catch the
sunset at the world's largest accumulation of gypsum
sand dunes at White Sands National Monument, 15
miles west of Alamogordo on U.S. Highway 70/82 (\$3).

Take along a camera. This is a landscape photographer's paradise. The San Andres Mountains look lavender as a backdrop against the enormous, snowy white sand dunes, and the sky is a flat, cloudless turquoise blue. Someone should film a sci-fi flick here.

"You can see real clean shadows and pure white sand that turns colors in sunset," says Armitage of the scenery. "The sand is so clear and white it almost looks like snow."

► **Day Three.** Bring along your sturdiest boots for your trip to Valley of Fires State Park along U.S. Highway 380 west of Carrizozo. The park is also called The Malpais (meaning badlands). It's a 44-mile stretch of hardened lava rock that was created by a volcanic eruption about 2,000 years ago.

Guest Editor Armitage offers a graphic description of the black volcanic landscape: "It looks like chocolate pudding poured over the earth."

The vast expanse of blackness is smooth in some areas, bubbly and rippled in others, and extremely rough.

Armitage suggests exploring the numerous caves and taking the one-mile nature trail at the park's entrance. Plant life, though sparse, actually ekes out an existence in this hostile land.

Afterward, it's time to find civilization and head to the little town of Carrizozo, with a population of 1,000. Along the main drag, stop at the Gift Gallery (1200

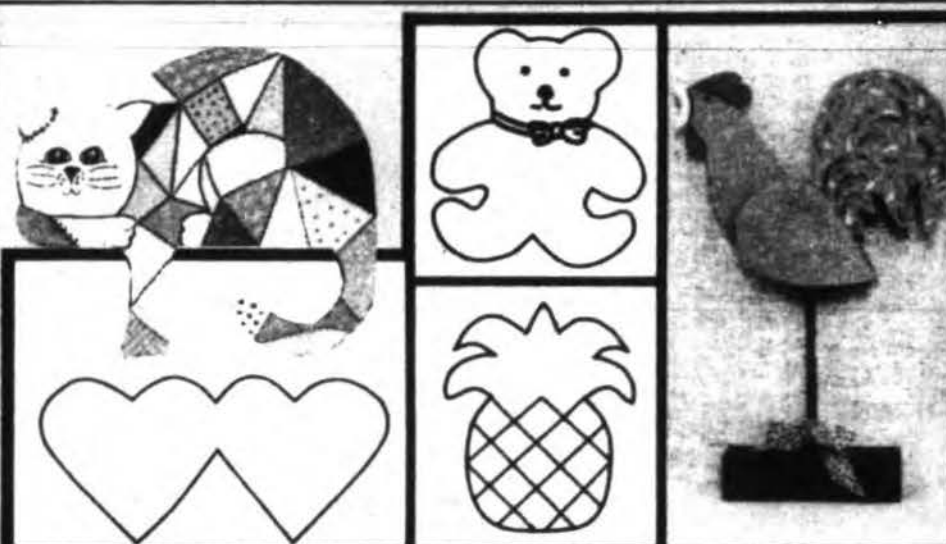

Hail to the pork rind

It's riding high on the hog, thanks to President Bush. We convened a group of GOP stalwarts to rate them.

"Pork rind" has a macho ring to it. After all, it's made from the same material as a football: the skin of a pig. Eat a pork rind, and you're one of the guys. No wimps needed.

And now they're a power munch, thanks to our newly inaugurated president, who enjoys them liberally doused with Tabasco sauce. (There's that darn "L" word again.) George Bush's favorite brand: "Unknown," says his press office diplomatically.

Ever up for a gustatory challenge, we hauled bags of rinds to Red Hot & Blue in Arlington, Va. The Memphis-style barbecue joint is owned in part by Lee Atwater, Bush's campaign manager and now chairman of the Republican National Committee.

Atwater has been a pork rind fanatic "for at least 30 years, since I was a kid going to barbecues in Columbia, S.C." He and five of his RNC colleagues — four Southerners, one Yankee and one Midwesterner — sampled nine popular brands (five plain, and four spicy).

After a spirited passing of the rinds, accompanied by beer for most judges and water or colas for the rest, two winners were declared: Evans

Barbecue Pork Skins (spicy category) and Uncle Will's (regular category).

What swung the judges' votes? Definitely crunch and spice, they declared.

Evans Barbecue "is terrific, good texture, good taste, a real winner," said Alice H. Tausig, Atwater's executive assistant. Press secretary Leslie Goodman found Uncle Will's to have "a nice smoky flavor, and it wasn't too salty." A New Yorker, she vetoed the spicy rinds.

But the other judges clearly preferred the rinds with more kick, even drowning the spicy variety with hot sauce. "The Tabasco clears the palate," claimed Atwater.

His final comment after the judging: "Pork rinds are great, but if you want really good eating, try a pig snout dinner."

We'll take your word for that, Lee.

WEEKEND TASTE TEST

What exactly is a pork rind?

"There's three things you don't want to know: How politics works, what goes into sausage, and how pork rinds are made," says major-league fan Lee Atwater.

Gayle Waddell, manager of Williams Skin Co. in Fayetteville, N.C., makers of Uncle Will's, says they cure the skin and layers of fat from the pig. It is then cut in cubes and fried like bacon. A second frying makes the skins "pop," giving them their distinctive crunchy texture.

Pork rinds have about the same nutritional value as potato chips, says Karen Miller-Kovach, a registered dietitian at the Cleveland Clinic. A 1-ounce serving of rinds has 146 calories, 19.4 grams of protein, 7.8 grams of fat, and 220 mgs. of salt. If the label says "salt added," as most do, expect three times the salt.

Dr. Gail Frank, a New Orleans cardiovascular specialist, says a typical 2-ounce snack pack contains one tablespoon of fat — 12 grams of cholesterol. "Serve them with fruit, veggies and no dips. Eat them in moderation."

What's the buzz? Insect snacks are in

Those on the lookout for the next trend in gourmet cooking may want to check in with Gene DeFoliart, professor of entomology at the University of Wisconsin in Madison.

"In a few years, we could be eating honey bees and crickets at cocktail parties. Insects are nutritious, high in caloric energy, vitamins and minerals.

"We are working on several insects that would be suitable as snack items. The one we are putting the most effort into is honey bee brood, which has sort of a light, nutty flavor. Bees have a good public image, so Americans would have fewer psychological hang-ups on bees than, say, termites.

"My favorite insect as far as flavor is the greater wax moth larvae. It's an off-white, inch-long caterpillar. I just drop them into a deep-fat fryer for 45 seconds, then dip them in salt. They taste like bacon.

"Insects are nutritionally important and are eaten extensively in southern Mexico, northern South America, all over Africa and Southeast Asia. They eat them live, sautéed, rolled in flour. Favorites are caterpillars, ants, grasshoppers and termites.

"We are not trying to talk Americans into putting insects into their diets, but it may come to that one day when we have to become more ecologically efficient."

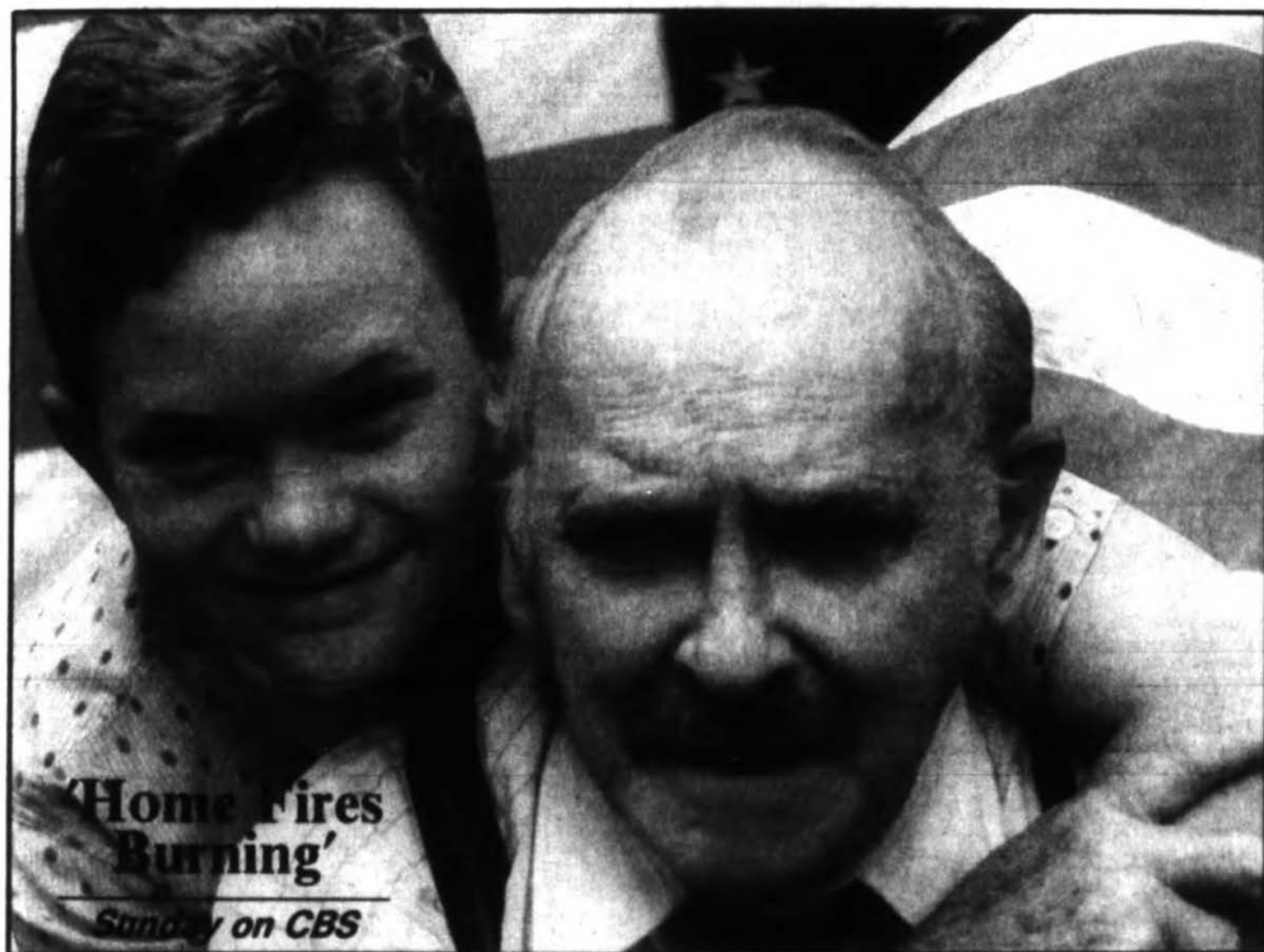

For those of us who spent most of 1945 in Europe, or the South Pacific, we knew little about what life was like back home.

For nearly ten years television programmers have looked for a drama or drama series which would tell what things were like in this country while most of the young men were in Europe or the Pacific. Life was quite different than it had been, and would ever again be.

Two generations kept the home-fires burning. The young and the old made up the bulk of the population who waited for their sons or fathers to return from across the sea.

Drag strip to runways, JW/A's seen it all

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of a three-part series on John Wayne Airport — its history, the people it serves and those it impacts.

It is both ironic and somewhat telling that part of John Wayne Airport was once used as a drag-racing strip.

In the early 1950s, before the commercial airline business had really taken off in Orange County, a group of drag-racing aficionados persuaded the Orange County Board of Supervisors to lease them a short, paved taxiway for weekend use as a race track.

At the time, drag-racing was an extremely popular sport on local highways, much to the chagrin of police and non-racing motorists. By contrast, the airport — then known simply as Orange County Airport — was doing less business than Fullerton Municipal Airport, according to historical accounts.

The airport dragstrip was a hit with race fans, who turned out in droves to watch daredevil drivers race down the quarter-mile strip. Nearby, private planes and a few commercial planes went about their business.

The airport's drag-racing days came to an end in 1958, not because of residents' or pilots' complaints, but because the airport's aviation business was booming and space was at a premium. The dragstrip was converted into a tie-down area for the increasing number of planes that made the airport home.

In retrospect, perhaps residents should have campaigned a little more vigorously for the dragstrip. They certainly didn't take too kindly to the planes.

From humble beginnings as a single dirt strip in the middle of a bean field to its present status as the

nation's sixth busiest airport, John Wayne/Orange County Airport has seen it all. The complaints, congestion and legal turmoil surrounding the facility are legendary. The battle between residents and the county, which owns the airport, is the stuff that legal case studies are made of.

Although residents and the county reached a settlement over noise in 1985, airport scuffles still continue over noise and over where to put an additional airport when John Wayne Airport reaches its capacity.

Forecasts predict an air travel demand of 11 million passengers annually by 1990 when the airport's new 339,700-square-foot terminal is completed; yet the legal settlement limits its capacity to 8.4 million.

"If you look back over the numbers in past years, it's readily apparent that there will always be more demand at the airport than capacity," said airport spokeswoman Kathie Rutherford. "That's just how it is."

Where the remainder of those passengers will book their flights remains to be seen. But if the airport's future is anywhere near as colorful as its past, a lot of exciting history is waiting to be made.

The history of John Wayne Airport must be told within the larger context of Orange County's rich aviation history, which features some of the most legendary names in flying. In 1935, Howard Hughes set an airspeed record of 355 mph over bean fields in Costa Mesa. Amelia Earhart once made an emergency landing at Orange County Airport, then known as Eddie Martin Airport. Famed female aviator Pancho Barnes kept a private airstrip in Laguna Beach.

Only six years after the Wright Brothers' historic flight at Kitty Hawk, a Santa Ana motorcyclist and car salesman named Glenn Martin

Flu bug bites hard on Coast

A wave of influenza-type symptoms and related illnesses, including several deaths, could be signaling a full-blown influenza epidemic, according to Orange County's top contagious illness expert.

At least six convalescent homes have reported outbreaks of respiratory illnesses and six people have died in state-run facilities as a result of what appears to be influenza, according to Orange County epidemiologist Thomas Prendergast.

"We are certainly seeing an increase in activity and this certainly could be the first signs of an epidemic," said Prendergast. "The sense would be that it's not yet peaking."

UCI Medical Center emergency room in Orange has been bulging with patients reeling from influenza-type symptoms, including fevers, body aches, coughing, sore throats and vomiting, according to emergency medicine specialist Michael Burns.

"We're seeing 30 to 40 patients per day with the flu syndrome, which is a great deal," Burns said. "This appears to be a definite epidemic."

Statistics were unavailable since health officials are not required to report influenza cases and county statisticians cannot compile figures until a few months after an outbreak when related deaths have been reported, according to Roberta Maxwell, head of data services for the county.

However, if schools can be considered a gauge, influenza symptoms are taking their toll.

"We have been hit very hard at this school," said Lynn Shields, office

CM merchants threaten suit over street project

A group of merchants on Costa Mesa's 19th Street say they are prepared to sue the city if officials refuse to honor their claims for lost business because of a construction project on the street.

The merchants say they have lost up to 80 percent of their business because access to their parking lot was blocked during the street-widening project in December and January.

"The beer and 7-Up trucks couldn't come in so I'm out of some kinds of

beer for two weeks," said Abraham Matta, owner of A&M Liquor, one of the businesses in the center, which is located at 19th Street and Maple Avenue. "My business is down by about \$700 to \$900 a week since construction began in December. On Christmas Eve, which should be the busiest night of the year, I had almost no business. Nobody could get in because of water blocking the entrances."

Matta's claim is for \$30,000, and three other merchants in the center

Detail on special patrol to reduce accidents in CM

An accident-prone stretch of Harbor Boulevard will be getting some special care from a detail of four Costa Mesa motorcycle cops beginning Monday.

The special detail, dubbed the Critical Accident Suppression team, will be patrolling a three-quarter-mile stretch of Harbor from Adams Street to Baker Street.

Records show there were 31 accidents on the stretch during 1988, 18 of which caused injuries.

"We want to have an impact on that total," said Officer Kevin Lovelady, who organized the accident suppression program for the Costa Mesa Police Department. "If we can reduce the injuries by one, the program will be a success."

The officers won't be sneaking up on anybody, either. There will be large signs on the median strip announcing "Traffic Enforcement Area."

"We want people to be aware of what we're doing and to pay attention to their driving," Lovelady said.

In fact, those who are stopped for violations are likely to be pleasantly surprised by the experience. For relatively minor infractions, drivers may receive warning citations rather than tickets, Lovelady said.

"The idea of the program is to educate the public about their driving practices and try to inform them if they are doing something that is unsafe," he said. "That doesn't mean the officers won't be issuing tickets, but we will be emphasizing the warning citations."

Most accidents occur during the morning and evening rush hours, so those will be the hours for the special enforcement effort.

"Most of them occur when somebody is late for work, or late for that important meeting, or when people are rushing home to start their weekend," Lovelady said. "What we're hoping is that people will take notice that we're out there and take a little extra care. With that many

officers in such a small space, it's pretty likely you're going to get caught if you commit a violation."

Violations which most often cause accidents are speeding, tailgating and unsafe lane changes, Lovelady said.

Pedestrians and bicyclists are often the victims and sometimes the perpetrators of accidents. Violations by walkers and pedalers will also catch the eyes of the enforcement team, Lovelady said.

"A lot of accidents are caused by bicyclists wearing headsets and traveling on the wrong side of the road, so they can't hear traffic and drivers can't see them," he said. "And those almost always involve injuries, so we'd like to cut those down if we can."

After an unspecified period on Harbor Boulevard, the team will move its effort to another accident hot spot on Bristol Street between Sunflower Avenue and the San Diego Freeway. In the summer months, traffic and accidents shift to Newport Boulevard and so will the accident suppression team, Lovelady said.

"I don't know yet how long we'll stay at one location before moving on," he said. "We want to stay long enough to have a serious impact."

Lovelady said he got the idea for the program from the Huntington Beach Police Department, which recently initiated a similar accident reduction program that has been successful in reducing accident rates at several problem areas.

If the effort proves successful in Costa Mesa, Lovelady said he plans to promote it to other police agencies in Orange County.

"Departments are always interested in hearing what's working in other cities," he said. "As far as traffic enforcement goes, accidents have been going up every year. We've been using essentially the same techniques for the past 15 years. As we approach 1990, maybe it's time to look at some new approaches."

Realty agents receive annoying calls from inmate

An Orange County Jail inmate used a pay telephone at the jail to make a series of annoying — and collect — phone calls to three female sales agents at a real estate firm in Newport Beach, police said.

Prudential Lido Realty received at least six calls between September and last Tuesday from a pay phone in a recreation room at the jail, according to records and information from Newport police and a jailer. Two other non-collect calls, one of which was obscene, were made Friday to the same business.

The caller's identity remains a mystery, although he has identified himself during conversations as Ted Simpson, Mike Jones and Mike Johnson and has often asked for information about property in the Lake Arrowhead area.

Most of the collect calls were made from the number

973-9732, the victims told Newport police. A watch commander at the jail, located in Santa Ana, said the number corresponds to one of several pay phones in an inmate day room.

The watch commander, who asked that his name not be used, said it will be hard to trace who made the calls because hundreds of inmates have access to the phones. "It could have been anyone in here. We'll try to go backward and find out who the inmate was," he said.

But the two calls made Friday were not collect. That leaves the possibility that the caller may now be free.

"The one day was not collect, and that made me nervous," said the woman who talked to the man Friday. "It's a little scary."

The victims' names are not being released.

During the first call Friday, the caller said he was looking for an apartment in the \$600-\$800 range. The woman said she had nothing available for that price, the

man paused, "and then he came forth with his obscene phone call."

The remark had nothing to do with the price of rents but was of a sexual nature, according to the police report.

Ten minutes later, at 11:40 a.m., the man called back and affected a deep voice for a four-bedroom house. The woman put him on hold and waited until he hung up.

The woman who spoke to him Friday was doing so for the first time. On previous occasions, the man talked to two other saleswomen, although the police report did not make clear which woman received which calls. The remaining two women refused to discuss the case and the police investigator could not be reached for comment.

The man made his first collect call at 3:52 p.m., Sept. 13, when he introduced himself as Ted Simpson and asked for one of the sales agents by name, according to the police report. He told the saleswoman he was interested in property in the Lake Arrowhead area and that he had been

referred to her by a woman named Kathy in Huntington Beach.

The saleswoman's monthly phone bill later revealed that the call had come from 973-9732, as did at least three other calls.

A man identifying himself as Mike Jones called collect on Sept. 20 at 1:13 p.m. and once again asked the saleswoman about Lake Arrowhead property. The woman told police that both callers had the same voice.

On Dec. 27 a man with the same voice called to say he wanted to buy a house and then hung up. He left a message on the company's answering machine Jan. 5 and identified himself as Mike Johnson.

The man called collect twice on Tuesday. The second time the saleswoman asked the operator where the call was coming from. The operator said, "The jail," in Santa Ana, according to a police report. The caller hung up both times before saying anything.

He made his last calls on Friday.

made a 12-second flight over a portion of the Irvine Ranch in a plane he built. Martin made a number of such flights, earning the nickname of the "Flying Fool of Santa Ana."

Martin was one of the nation's early flying heroes, and put Orange County on the national map with his exploits. His barnstorming escapades were famous throughout the west, and in 1912 he set a record for the longest over-water flight, taking off from a landslip later known as Balboa Island and setting the plane — also of his own design — down in Avalon Bay. He then flew back.

Martin later turned his full attention to airplane design and construction and built one of the nation's largest aircraft companies, the Martin Co., which turned out thousands of fighters and bombers during World War II, including the B-29 that dropped the atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan.

Martin's fame and successes drew many young Orange County men and women into aviation, including three brothers named Eddie, Floyd and Johnny Martin (who were not related to Glenn).

In 1921, the Martin brothers decided they needed a central location from which to operate their flight instruction business. They established the first commercial airport in Orange County.

What they created was an airfield in the most literal sense of the word, just two strips of dirt cleared from an open field. They selected a site at South Main Street and Newport Avenue, located in Santa Ana. Were it not for the plans of certain engineers to extend what was then Main Street south to Corona del Mar, the airport might still be there.

According to Vi Smith's book "From Jennies to Jets: The Aviation History of Orange County," the Irvine Co. and the county Board of Supervisors tried to pressure Eddie Martin, for whom the airport was named, to vacate the property. They hoped to build a roadway that would allow inland residents easier access to the beach while also giving beach residents a more convenient route to Santa Ana stores.

Martin, however, wouldn't budge. He and the county eventually struck a deal for a 17-year lease on a 141-acre site just east of Martin's airport. The site was originally purchased as the potential permanent location of a county fairgrounds (which opened in 1949 off Newport Boulevard). The deal never materialized.

That would-be fairgrounds site is where John Wayne Airport now sits. Construction on the new airport

was completed in the fall of 1941 and the old Martin airport was mowed over. The new facility included a 2,500-foot paved runway and taxi strip, runway lights and a federal beacon, administration building and two hangars.

The new airport was the most modern in the county, but its civilian use was short-lived. Three months after it opened, the attack on Pearl Harbor plunged the United States into World War II and the airport was commissioned for military duty. By the beginning of 1942, all civilian flights were banned within 150 miles of the coast.

During the war, the airport became the headquarters for a squadron of P-38 fighters stationed as a coastal defense unit. To accommodate the fighters, the Army extended the existing runway, added a shorter strip, installed full runway lighting and placed a control tower on top of the administration building.

Following the war, the government reluctantly turned the airport over to the county of Orange. The Martin brothers, who had moved their flight training business to the desert for the duration of the war, claimed they still had several years left on their lease, but the county won out. Instead of an exclusive lease, the Martins eventually settled for sharing the airport with other aviation businesses.

The growth of the airport paced the full-throttle development of Orange County in the 1960s. In 1962, five years before the existing terminal was built, the airport ranked 35th in the nation in takeoffs and landings, averaging between 15,000 and 18,000 per month. By 1964, it had jumped to 12th place with 284,000 takeoffs and landings per month.

On May 6, 1967, the airport's "space-age" terminal was dedicated by then-Gov. Ronald Reagan. The facility encompassed 15,247 square feet and was built at a cost of \$705,000.

The dedication of the new terminal was an all-stops-pulled event. The Blue Angels streaked overhead to the cheers of 75,000 who turned out to celebrate the festivities. Demonstration sky divers drew "ooohs" and "aahs" and airplane and helicopter rides were offered at a penny per pound.

But the revelry would be short-lived. Less than one year after the dedication of the terminal, more than 1,000 residents filed lawsuits against the airport totaling nearly \$40 million.

The war had begun.

also have filed claims for between \$6,000 and \$30,000.

Fred Caraballo, a distributor for Villa Victoria Foods, who delivers to Mattia's shop, agreed that there had been serious problems with access to the center.

"At times it was almost impossible to get in," he said.

Because of the inconvenience, regular customers have drifted away, destroying business that has been built up over three years, said Cathy DiDomenico, co-owner of Chicago Beef Station.

"It only took the city two months to break down what we'd built up over three years," she said. "I've lost 80 percent of my business. It's going to take some major expense for advertising to get those customers back."

DiDomenico is only asking for \$6,000, which she said will not come close to compensating for lost business. But she said it would help defray the added advertising costs she expects.

This year's construction project, which included a storm drain and the installation of decorative brick tiles at intersections, is only one of many to have hit the merchants at the center, said Connie Vespignani, owner of Fashion Fair Laundry.

"They've dug up this lousy street every year since 1985, and every year when they do it kills our business," she said. "Why couldn't they do it all at one time and then leave us alone?"

Vespignani said her business had declined by about \$300 to \$400 a week since construction began in December.

She said she did not know how much she had asked for in her claim against the city. But she said she expected the claim to be rejected.

"We're all getting a lawyer to take it to court if we get rejected," she said.

An official with Whittier-based Fecit Strata Construction, which

performed the \$368,000 project, said the merchants' claims of lost business were exaggerated.

"I think those kinds of losses are going to be pretty hard to substantiate," said Mike Samarin, field foreman for the company. "The parking lot was full before construction began and it was full during construction. In fact, I think there may have been a few more people in there eating lunch on construction days because of the guys there working."

Samarin said he believed the 19th Street entrances to the shopping center parking lot were only blocked for one week during the two-month construction period and that the Maple Avenue was kept open during those times.

DiDomenico said, however, that the Maple Avenue entrance did not do any good because access to Maple from 19th Street was blocked.

"And Maple is not a through street," she said.

Costa Mesa City Manager Allan Roeder said at a recent City Council meeting that Fecit Strata had allowed several unexplained delays in the 19th Street project.

"I expect we're going to wind up in court over that one," he said.

But Samarin said the project was now virtually completed, on schedule, and that any delays had been caused by weather or other factors beyond the company's control.

Four countians killed in hit-run, shootings

Gunshots claimed the lives of three people in Placentia this weekend and a 7-year-old boy was killed by a hit-and-run driver in Garden Grove.

Tam Nguyen of Garden Grove was pronounced dead Saturday afternoon at Fountain Valley Regional Medical Center after being struck by a car while crossing Westminster Avenue with his older brother, police said.

The boy was hit by a car that had pulled out of slow-moving traffic and sped past the other vehicles in a right-hand turn lane, said Sandra Fenley, a Fountain Valley resident who witnessed the accident.

"He (the motorist) just pulled out and gunned the motor," Fenley said. "He didn't travel four feet before he hit that kid. He (the boy) lay there in the street and his ... brother had to drag him to the side."

The car drove off after hitting the boy. It was described as a 1985-87 black Toyota Celica, possibly a hatchback model. It may also have been equipped with a black bra across the hood, Fenley said the paint was faded.

The driver was described as a white male in his 30s with sandy blond hair and moustache. There was a female passenger in the car.

The victim and his 10-year-old brother, whose name was not available, were holding hands as they crossed Westminster near Kerry Street. They were not in a crosswalk, Fenley said.

Midway through the street, the

younger boy broke away from his brother, ran ahead and was struck by the suspect's vehicle, Garden Grove Police Lt. John Woods said.

Woods said police are asking anyone who saw the accident to contact police at 741-5704.

Two separate shootings in Placentia on Friday and Saturday claimed the lives of three men.

The first incident occurred at about 11:50 p.m. Friday at the Azteca bar, 310 W. Santa Fe. Evarado Morales, 26, of El Monte and Jose Camarena, 23, of Fullerton got into an argument for an unknown reason and ended up shooting each other, Lt. Darryl Thomann said.

"We understand they were friends and had been out drinking together," Thomann said.

Morales was shot in the head and was pronounced dead at 5 p.m. Saturday at UCI Medical Center in Orange. A spokeswoman at the hospital said the hospital will use some of Morales's organs for transplants if his family gives permission. The spokeswoman had no information on who might get what organs.

Camarena was shot in the stomach and died at Western Medical Center in Santa Ana at 7:44 a.m. Saturday, Thomann said.

A 23-year-old man from Placentia, whose name was not released, died at Placentia-Linda Hospital at 8:30 p.m. after being shot at the Bird Cage bar, 642 Chapman Ave., 40 minutes earlier. Two suspects sped off in a car, Thomann said.

El Toro Marine freed from brig; murder charge may be dropped

A Marine accused of killing his wife and faking her suicide by hanging was freed after a military prosecutor recommended that charges be dropped because the woman probably had killed herself.

Gunnery Sgt. Murray Payne, arrested Dec. 1, was released Friday from the brig at El Toro Marine Corps Air Station after a two-week hearing into the May 10, 1988, death of Ella

Mae Payne at the couple's Corona home.

"Barring discovery of some new information, there is insufficient evidence to proceed at this point," the prosecutor, Capt. Paul McBride, told Maj. R.W.J. Grove, who presided over the hearing.

McBride acknowledged the defense showed the woman probably took her own life.

killing the sea mammals. They could have died from disease, gunshots or may have been caught in a fisherman's net, said wildlife biologist Joe Cordaro of the National Marine Fisheries Service at Terminal Island.

Cordaro said he couldn't "point to any factor causing the death," but said he suspects the marine mammals may have been tangled in gill nets.

Others have suggested that commercial fishermen may have shot the animals to keep them away from their catches and out of their nets. Some fishermen complain that sea lions have become too numerous.

Beckman receives presidential medal

Newport Beach resident and philanthropist Arnold O. Beckman has been honored with the Presidential Citizens Medal in Washington D.C. in a ceremony decorating approximately 30 participants.

Beckman, 88, founder of the Fullerton-based Beckman Instruments Inc. received his medal from President Ronald Reagan in a mid-morning ceremony on Jan. 18, in the Oval office.

Beckman was inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame in 1987 for his invention of the small pH meter on which he founded his business. Beckman has made numerous financial contributions to the sciences, including the establishment of the National Academy of Sciences building at UCI.

Attitudes in West given low marks

Reactions of Cdm students over her essay are mixed

Call it culture shock, call it a language barrier, call it whatever you like, but Tara Lofstrom is suffering from it.

Tara Lofstrom has been suffering from the condition since she and her family moved from Oakton, Va., to Corona del Mar last summer.

Lofstrom is a 17-year-old senior at Corona del Mar High School. She was so struck by the language, dress and attitude differences between East and West Coast students, she wrote an article about it for the school newspaper.

Unfortunately, not too many of her peers found the article very entertaining. In fact, some felt as if they had been verbally attacked.

"Back East everyone talks normal," Lofstrom said. "When I came out here I found the kids had their own lingo."

She used some examples in the article to prove her point. "The term 'bail on me' always was a phrase used only in reference to prison," she said. "That's a real popular expression at school. And then I found myself diving to save this golden

retriever one day when someone yelled, 'killer dog,' only later to find out that's another expression," she said.

She also said the words "totally and

fully" are a major part of the California teen-ager's dialect.

Lofstrom poked fun at hoop earrings large enough to throw a basketball through. Simple gold posts are preferred by Easteners. Fluorescent shorts, flip-flops and sandals worn with lace socks were just as much a surprise to her as her wardrobe of knee-socks and L.L. Bean loafers were to her classmates.

"I tried to poke fun at both lifestyles," she said. "Back East there are the blizzards and constant rain and California has the earthquakes."

"I originally wrote it under an assumed name of Wellington D. Barnes III, but at the last minute the byline was changed to my name," she said.

Lofstrom said she found it interesting that badminton was really a sport and art is the most popular elective while drama and choir aren't as "cool."

To Lofstrom's dismay, her entertaining thought piece became a cause of grief to her.

"A lot of people took offense and thought I was culturally imbalanced," she said. "They wrote a letter to the editor and told me if I'm interested in making friends, I shouldn't insult my new school — or go back East. It really caused an uproar. I have never had to have so much inner-strength."

Part of Lofstrom's difficulty in dealing with laid-back California attitudes may be a result of her background.

Her father is a businessman and the family has moved many times. She has lived in New York, where she attended Broadway plays, and experienced the other extreme of poverty when she and her family lived in a tiny apartment in Puerto Rico for a year.

Lofstrom said she usually makes friends easily, carries a 4.0 grade-point average and loves to sing and act. She carried the title of Miss Teen 1987 for the state of Virginia.

She had worked her way up and was elected senior class president of her high school during her junior year in Virginia. To her dismay, she couldn't accept the position because of the move to California.

Now the controversy over her article has left her feeling alienated in California even more than before. But at least she has found a handful of students who were also from other states who read her article and said they felt the same way.

Some good fortune did come from her journalistic experience when a weekly paper took notice of her work, wrote a supportive letter to the editor and offered her a correspondent's position.

Lofstrom said she entertained the idea of writing an explanation in the school newspaper, but instead wants to feel at home at her new school and accomplish the things she did at her other high school.

"I know I'll 'shred' at the end of this year, I will like 'totally,' 'fully,' to be a part of Corona del Mar," she said.

Mesa's water bill: Much ado over \$1.33

Wilma Feeney isn't backing down, and neither is the Mesa Consolidated Water District.

So there it will stay, possibly indefinitely, the \$1.33 Feeney refuses to pay from her October water bill.

It all began when the district, which serves Costa Mesa, announced it was raising its rates. The decision was made last March, after several public hearings.

Then, with its October billings, the district sent out a newsletter informing customers that they would "experience an increase in their water bills," effective that month.

But Feeney said she experienced the increase earlier than that and felt the district had misled her.

Like most residential customers, Feeney receives bimonthly bills so, for her, the increase began in September.

Since district officials had said the increase would be effective in October, Feeney decided they should have prorated her bill so that she paid the lower rate in September and the higher rate in October.

Since the district didn't prorate, she did it herself, subtracting \$1.33.

"It wasn't the amount that mattered," she said. "I feel I was representing the interest of the thousands of residential customers who had gotten shafted."

Feeney told the district's board of directors about her problem during the public comment section two weeks ago. District officials agreed to put the matter on the agenda Thursday, and Feeney again made her case before the board.

Board members listened, but took no action, letting the billing policy stand.

"It was the proper thing to do to listen and consider the issue," said

Karl Kemp, the district's general manager. "But to effect any change in retrospect would have cost us about \$75,000, if you include the cost of the software to prorate the bills, the cost of going back and changing all those

bills, and the lost revenue we'd incur."

Kemp said the issue of whether to prorate had been discussed at public hearings prior to the decision last spring to effect the rate increase.

He said the date when the rate increase would become effective had

been made clear at the public hearings and in official notices sent out before the newsletter.

Feeney said she was disappointed that the district had not agreed to prorate its bills for the fee increase.

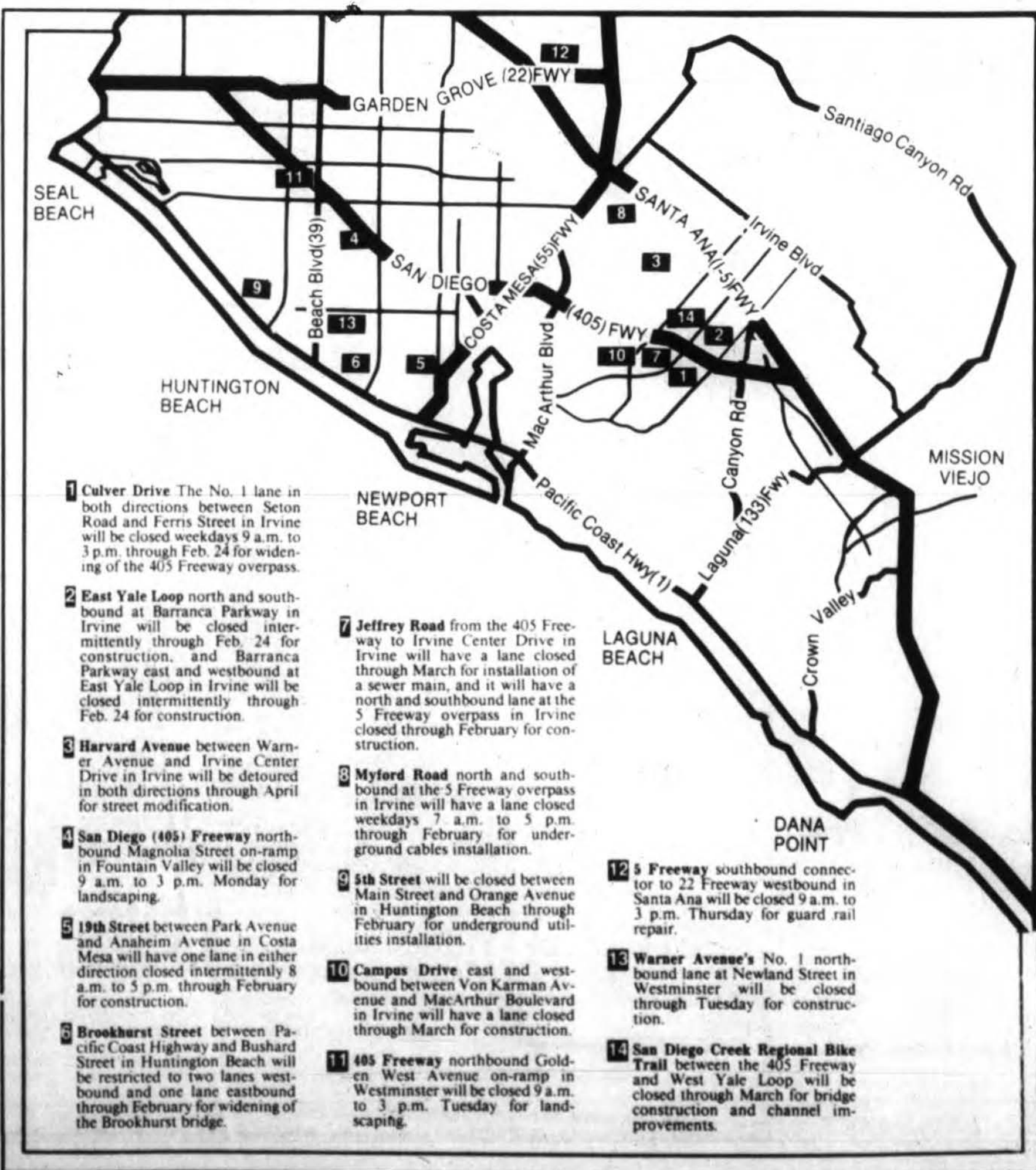
"I thought maybe they'd agree with me, but I'm not surprised they didn't," she said. "I do question that figure that Mr. Kemp... quoted, \$75,000 to fix the problem."

She said she would not pay the \$1.33, even though it continued to appear as a delinquent payment on her bill.

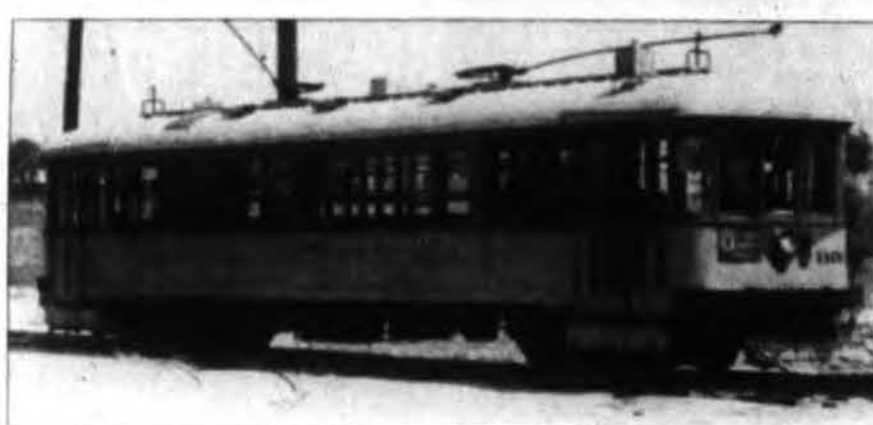
Kemp said the district wouldn't do anything about the disputed sum.

"With amounts of \$3.50 or more, we'll turn them over to a collection agency if necessary," he said. "But for \$1.33, it would not be worth the trouble of sending it to a collection agency, or shutting off the water. We'll probably just leave it there, unless we decide to forgive it and just remove the \$1.33 altogether."

Lead paragraphs from the Daily Pilot and its predecessors to articles in past years for the coming week:

Jan. 31, 1939 — Fulfillment of a young man's dream marked the culmination of one of the largest realty deals to transpire in the Harbor Area in some time when Weston Jay, whose family were pioneers in this city, completed negotiations today for the purchase of Fred A. Storey's Balboa Marine Hardware store at 816 E. Central Ave., Balboa, for a reported consideration of \$25,000 cash.

For a number of years, Jay has dreamed of owning the business and becoming a part of the business life of the community in which he was raised and has many friends. Two years ago he seriously considered the purchase, but delayed action until recently. He takes possession of the business today.

Feb. 2, 1949 — The single Pacific Electric car which takes Newport passengers to Los Angeles in the morning and brings them back at night may be discontinued.

H.O. Marler, passenger traffic manager of the utility, said this morning that engineers are studying the operation of the Newport Beach rail line in addition to several others, and it is probable that an application will be made to the State Utilities commission for abandonment of passenger service.

At present the one round trip per day is completely unprofitable from the Pacific Electric standpoint, and there are insufficient passengers to warrant more frequent service, he said.

Feb. 2, 1949 — The Newport Harbor Board of Realtors is undertaking a survey of rental vacancies in the Harbor Area to determine whether or not this section should be excluded from provisions of the federal rent control act, it was announced this morning following the weekly breakfast meeting of the board at Rington's cafe.

Hadd Rong, board president, said that the organization is approaching the problem from a purely impartial standpoint so that factual information concerning the status of rental

property here can be collected for presentation to the Rent Advisory Board at Santa Ana.

Feb. 4, 1959 — Authority was given by the high school board of trustees Monday afternoon to submit preliminary drawings to the State Division of School House Planning for the third unit of Costa Mesa High School.

The new section includes a cafeteria, agriculture unit and bus garage combination and classrooms for physics and science.

Architects on the unit are Plegier Blurock, Hougans and Ellerbroek and George Lund, associate.

The board also signed a contract form for the new unit.

Jan. 30, 1969 — Raw sewage dumped into the Santa Ana River today forced a quarantine of beaches in West Newport and Huntington Beach.

Orange County Health Officer J. R. Philp said the beaches would remain closed for at least one week, perhaps two.

The sewage effluent, estimated at 10 million gallons a day, is pouring into the river from Riverside. That city's main sewer line was washed out Saturday night by raging floods.

Jan. 31, 1979 — Huntington Beach City Attorney Gail Hutton has been accused of "reckless and grossly unprofessional" conduct in a letter signed by the seven members of the city's Planning Commission.

The charges were made in a blistering exchange of letters between Hutton's office and the Planning Commission over a permit for an existing adult discotheque in Huntington Harbor.

Hutton's letter, which initiated the fiery war of words, accused commissioners of overstepping their bounds and becoming involved in legal matters.

Jan. 31, 1979 — A winter storm that left hundreds of motorists snowbound, power knocked out and roads blocked by mudslides was expected to dump at least another inch of rain on Southern California cities today and two feet of snow in the mountains, the National Weather Service said.

'Working Girl' wins 4 Golden Globes

BEVERLY HILLS (AP) — The corporate Cinderella story, "Working Girl," won four film awards and the ABC miniseries "War and Remembrance" won three TV awards Saturday night during the 46th annual Golden Globes.

"Rain Man," the chronicle of a scheming car salesman who learns to understand his autistic brother, won two film awards, as best dramatic motion picture and for best dramatic actor, Dustin Hoffman.

Actress Sigourney Weaver won two acting awards, as best supporting actress in "Working Girl" and tying for best dramatic actress in "Gonillas in the Mist: The Adventure of Dian Fossey."

Hoffman who played a gifted autistic in "Rain Man" gave an emotional acceptance speech, and paid special thanks to the film's director, Barry Levinson.

"You are everything an actor could ever hope for," Hoffman said haltingly.

Because only 77 journalists voted in the Golden Globes competition, there were several ties, including an embarrassing three-way split for best actress in a dramatic motion picture.

Weaver split the prize with Shirley MacLaine of "Madame Sousatzka" and Jodi Foster of "The Accused."

In the best director category, veteran actor Clint Eastwood beat out "Working Girl's" Mike Nichols and "Rain Man's" Levinson for his work on "Bird," a film about the troubled life of jazz saxophonist great Charlie "Yardbird" Parker.

The best foreign-language film went to Denmark's "Pelle the Conqueror."

Naomi Foner won a trophy for best screenplay for "Running on Empty," her examination of two 1970s activists coming to terms with their criminal past.

Tom Hanks, who played a teenager whose body grows up overnight, captured a Golden Globe for best performance by an actor in a musical

or comic motion picture.

Griffith, who plays a savvy secretary yearning for a better job in "Working Girl," won as best actress in a musical or comedy film and co-star Weaver won for her supporting role as a shrewish Wall Street executive.

For Griffith, the daughter of actress Tippi Hedren, her award marked a milestone in what she has described as an arduous career.

Veteran actor Martin Landau took the trophy for best performance by an actor in a supporting role for his appearance, "Tucker: The Man and His Dream," Francis Ford Coppola's study of American car maker Preston Tucker.

In the Golden Globe television competition, ABC's miniseries "War and Remembrance" won three trophies: The epic itself won as best TV miniseries, and John Gielgud and Barry Bostwick tied for best supporting actor in a miniseries.

More than 200 of Hollywood's

biggest stars turned out for the event, given for notable achievements in film and television in 1988 by the Hollywood Foreign Press Association.

The awards, seen as a precursor to the Academy Awards in March, makes both "Rain Man" and "Working Girl" Oscar favorites.

The event, hosted by Joan Collins and George Hamilton, presented awards in 24 categories for film and television achievement. Though not considered as prestigious as the Academy Awards, the Golden Globes play a crucial role in film advertising campaigns and in setting the stage for the Oscars.

The honorary Cecil B. DeMille Award for outstanding contribution to the industry, announced before the program, went to actress Doris Day, star of such films "The Pajama Game," "The Man Who Knew Too Much" and "Pillow Talk" and the television program "The Doris Day Show."

Letter opposing pay raise called mistake

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Republican fund-raising letter signed by party chairman Lee Atwater criticizes a 50 percent congressional pay raise endorsed by former President Reagan and President Bush, but a spokeswoman says it was all a mistake.

Atwater is "not opposed" to the pay raise, according to Republican National Committee spokeswoman Leslie Goodman, who blamed the mistake on Republican National Committee staffers.

She said Atwater had ordered changes in the letter, including deletion of the two paragraphs of pay raise criticism, but staff members failed to follow the directions.

The five-page letter was mailed to prospective contributors, and found its way into the hands of the Democratic leaders.

The letter, which appeals for donations and attacks Democratic liberals,

went out before President Bush endorsed the raise last Friday, calling it "overdue." But it apparently was written after former President Reagan formally proposed the large raise in the budget he submitted to Congress.

It also was mailed before the House Republican leadership began negotiations with House Democratic leaders last week to allow the raise to become law Feb. 8.

The letter tells prospective contributors: "There's also a move afoot to let congressmen enjoy yet another whopping pay raise. In this kind of atmosphere, how can President Bush hope to keep your taxes low, cut the budget deficit and keep prosperity growing across the land?"

Goodman said the letter was written while Atwater was still heading the Bush transition team and had not yet been formally inaugurated as RNC chairman.

Soviet bombing near Kabul kills hundreds

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Rebels fired rockets into Kabul on Saturday as more Soviet soldiers left the country, and a guerrilla leader said warplanes bombed villages and killed hundreds to clear a path for the Red Army's withdrawal.

Soviet Defense Minister Dmitry Yazov discussed Moscow's withdrawal plans with President Najib and other Afghan officials on Friday and Saturday in Kabul, the official Soviet news agency Tass reported.

Under a United Nations accord, the Soviets have until Feb. 15 to end their nine-year intervention in Afghanistan, but diplomats who requested anonymity told The Associated Press the withdrawal should be completed within a week.

Iran, which serves as a refuge for more than 1 million Afghans, said its embassy will remain open, and workers on Saturday erected half-inch-thick steel plates around the embassy's eight-foot walls.

Alaskan cold snap stalls delivery of food and fuel

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Supplies in outlying Alaskan villages dwindled Saturday when delivery trucks were idled by flat tires caused by a brutal cold snap that prompted the governor to declare a state of emergency.

The low reading Saturday morning was 69 degrees below zero at Tanana. The weather service said it also received an unofficial reading of 86 degrees below zero at a lodge near McGrath. The record low for the date was 80 degrees below zero, set at Prospect Creek in 1971.

Overnight lows elsewhere included minus 24 at Anchorage and minus 49 at Fairbanks. No serious injuries have been reported.

Gov. Steve Cowper issued a declaration of emergency on Saturday to help make state funds available for emergency services.

Delivery systems have been disrupted to rural villages statewide, causing shortages of essential items, Cowper said. Other villages were experiencing cold weather-related

problems in the operation of water, sewer, power and heating systems, he said.

In Tanana, the driver of a truck that picks up groceries and mail at the airport was unable to make his rounds. Pete Platten said the record cold flattened three of the truck's tires.

"There's no give to the tires at this temperature," Platten said. "They get a flat spot from sitting and they pop the bead from around the rim or crack at the base of the valve stem when you go to drive."

The operator of a store at Tanana, about 150 miles west of Fairbanks, predicted supplies would last only a few days longer.

"Then we'll be running out of things — bread, eggs and milk," Dale Erickson said. The store already was out of Blazo, a fuel for portable heaters, he said.

Because small planes cannot fly in extremely cold weather, many of Alaska's 200 villages have been without mail and food delivery for two weeks.

On-duty officer joins abortion protest, arrested with others

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — A uniformed, on-duty police officer joined an abortion protest at a clinic Saturday, and was arrested with 91 other protesters, authorities said.

"One of the persons arrested was a Metro Police officer who was on duty at the time and in uniform," said Lt. Steve Gammell. "He chose to join the protest and became one of the protesters in an unlawful assembly."

"He refused to remove himself and he was arrested like everyone else," Gammell said. The traffic officer was assigned to duty elsewhere, but rode a police motorcycle to the site and joined the group following a roll call briefing.

The officer has been placed on paid leave until an internal investigation determines whether disciplinary ac-

tion should be taken.

"He has been relieved of active duty and will be on paid leave until some finding comes out at some later time," Gammell said.

The protest was staged by the Southern Nevada Operation Rescue. Gammell said. Officers arrested 45 men and 47 women, including the officer, whose name was not released.

The arrested protesters were booked for investigation of misdemeanor unlawful assembly, said Gammell.

"The arrestees offered passive resistance, each and everyone was carried from their positions to the paddy wagon and once there they entered and cooperated," Gammell said.

"There was no resisting arrest, no violence," Gammell said.

Residents wants explosives removed

SAN DIEGO — Residents of the community of Tierrasanta say they're sitting atop a ticking bomb — literally.

The 2,600-acre neighborhood is resting atop part of Camp Elliott, a 13,000-acre World War II Marine Corps base used for artillery and tank training. In 1983, three boys found a World War II mortar round while playing. The round detonated, killing two of the playmates and injuring a third.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers estimates that there are 263 devices that could explode and another 66,000 that are not hazardous.

It was only last November that the city posted 81 signs warning residents that they live in an explosive neighborhood.

"We want sweeps every year, forever," said Deanna Spehn, chairwoman of the community council ordinance committee.

Fliers killed in jet crash identified

ARIZONA CITY — The two Navy fliers from San Diego killed when their F-14 jet fighter crashed in a cotton field during a training flight were identified Saturday, a military spokesman said Saturday.

The pilot was Lt. Thomas L. Gibson, 27, of Atlanta, and the radar-intercept officer was Lt. Richard E. Dempsey Jr., 29, of Clearwater, Fla., said Lt. Cmdr. Bob Pritchard, a Navy spokesman in San Diego.

The plane was assigned to squadron VF-114 at Miramar Naval Air Station in San Diego, which had gone five years without an accident. Pritchard said.

USC student drive-by shooting victim

LOS ANGELES — A University of Southern California student was critically wounded when she was shot in the back by a drive-by gunman as she stood outside her apartment near the downtown campus, police said.

The 20-year-old engineering student, whose name was being withheld pending notification of relatives, was wounded shortly after 10 p.m. Friday as she stood in front of her 27th Street apartment just a block from the school's fraternity-sorority row, said police Officer Joe Turek.

NATIONAL BRIEFS

Challenger remembered with silence

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Space workers and tourists stood silently Saturday for 73 seconds, the length of the fatal Challenger flight, to remember the seven astronauts who died in the fiery shuttle explosion three years ago.

Hundreds of peace activists marked the anniversary with a rally outside a Kennedy Space Center gate to protest the launch of Defense Department payloads aboard space shuttles.

Four buses stopped in their tracks, and engineers, technicians and support crews halted activity as flags at the Kennedy Space Center were lowered to half-staff at 11:38 a.m. the moment when Challenger lifted off on Jan. 28, 1986.

Only about 1,000 of the center's 17,000 employees were at work Saturday, but hundreds of tourists joined them in the tribute.

Space shuttle launch delay possible

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — NASA said Saturday it probably will replace at least two of the three liquid oxygen turbopumps on Discovery's main engines, a move that could delay the shuttle's late February launch until March.

A decision will be made before Discovery is rolled out to the launch pad, a move scheduled for Thursday, National Aeronautics and Space Administration spokeswoman Lisa Malone said.

Reagan's fee for speech is \$50,000

LOS ANGELES — Former President Ronald Reagan will charge \$50,000 for each speech he delivers on what he has called the "mashed potato circuit," it was reported Saturday.

Both Reagan and his wife, Nancy, plan to speak at dinner gatherings, with the former first lady charging \$30,000 a speech.

More than 25 corporations, associations and conventions already have inquired about booking the popular ex-president despite the cost, according to Bernie Swain, of the Washington Speakers Bureau Inc.

Judge grants delay in Bakker trial

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — A federal judge has delayed the trial of former PTL leaders Jim Bakker and Richard Dortch from February until April to give defense lawyers more time to prepare their cases.

Bakker and Dortch were indicted Dec. 5 on charges of mail fraud, wire fraud and conspiracy to commit mail and wire fraud. They are accused of diverting more than \$4 million in PTL money for their own benefit and conspiring to defraud followers to support lavish lifestyles.

Children used in train robbery ring

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — They may not rank with Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid, but authorities say they've uncovered perhaps the youngest group of train robbers — a ring involving 42 children between the ages of 9 and 18.

Gadsden County officials said they had identified the children and six adults from the Panhandle community of Chattahoochee accused of robbing idle boxcars of everything from hog livers to car tires.

"The thefts mainly took place after school and during vacations," said Deputy Jimmy Hindman. "Once the adults showed the kids what to do, it became easy for them."

WORLD BRIEFS

Bombing, fighting rage in Lebanon

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Despite attempts by Syria and Iran to stop the violence in Lebanon, two bombs exploded Saturday and Shiite Moslem militias battled once again. Two people were reported killed and 20 injured.

Police said one person was killed and 11 people injured, including a Syrian soldier, when a car exploded in the Bekaa town of Barr Elias.

In a separate attack, a bomb exploded at a building in Moslem west Beirut near a Syrian army checkpoint, wounding six people, police said.

A 90-minute firefight between the pro-Syrian Amal militia and the Iranian-backed Hezbollah, or Party of God, in the slums of south Beirut killed one person and wounded three, according to police.

Israeli official wants Arafat dead

JERUSALEM — Industry Minister Ariel Sharon said Saturday there will be no peace in the Middle East as long as Yasser Arafat "runs around alive" and that Israel must do more to counteract the PLO leader's peace initiative.

Sharon's comments in an interview with Israeli radio reflected "a personal opinion that Arafat should be killed," his spokesman, Moshe Behagion, told The Associated Press in a telephone interview. "He says many times that if it were possible, he would want to kill him."

10th Sri Lanka candidate killed

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka — Sinhalese extremists shot and killed a candidate for next month's Parliament election, bringing to 10 the number of candidates slain this month, officials said Saturday.

Punchibanda Ratnayake was shot to death Friday night in Welimadu, about 75 miles east of Colombo, police said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Ratnayake, a Sinhalese, was a member of the opposition Sri Lanka Freedom Party.

Victims packed in truck like animals

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic — A hundred Haitian cane cutters were crammed "like animals" into a truck driven by a drunken man who drove the vehicle off a cliff, survivors said Saturday. The crash killed 48 people.

The Central Workers Union and the Majority Workers Center denounced the brutal treatment of Haitian cane cutters and accused the government of "practicing slavery."

Officials said it was the worst traffic accident ever in the Dominican Republic, which shares the Caribbean island of Hispaniola with Haiti.

The truck plunged from a cliff early Friday about 22 miles north of Santo Domingo. Those killed included six children and three women.

Capt. Robert Kelly, subject of best-selling book on PT boats

Robert B. Kelly, a retired Navy captain whose combat experience as a PT boat commander in the Pacific during World War II became the basis for the best-selling book and movie "They Were Expendable," has died of pneumonia. He was 75.

The former naval officer died Monday at Howard County General Hospital in Columbus, Md.

Kelly was executive officer of the famed Motor Torpedo Boat Squadron 3. He won a Navy Cross, the Navy's highest decoration after the Medal of Honor, for sinking a Japanese light cruiser off the island of Luzon in the Philippines on the night of April 8, 1942.

He was commander of the lead boat in the four-craft PT boat squadron that evacuated Gen. Douglas MacArthur, his family and staff by night from the island of Corregidor, where the U.S. forces were trapped by the Japanese army, on March 11, 1942. He was awarded a Silver Star for that effort.

Later in the war, Kelly was com-

mander of a PT boat squadron in the Solomon Islands, where he won a second Silver Star for action in combat against the Japanese. One of the men serving under him was Lt. John F. Kennedy, whose boat, PT 109, sank after it was rammed by a Japanese destroyer on the night of Aug. 2, 1943.

Kelly was a native of New York City and a 1935 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis.

Author William L. White based "They Were Expendable" on the experience of Squadron 3 in the Philippines, and actor John Wayne played the part of Kelly in the 1945 movie.

His wife, Barbara Lee Benedict Kelly, said her husband called the Pacific fleet "expendable" because the Navy could get few supplies to it around the Japanese forces.

"There was very little support for the Pacific fleet at the time. He said, 'We were expendable.' Human lives didn't mean that much at the time," she said.

Hole mistake ends career for robber

DERIDDER, La. (AP) — It was a simple oversight that ended the career of habitual robber J. Douglas Creswell, a Louisiana prosecutor says.

Creswell, 51, forgot to cut eyeholes in the plastic garbage bag he wore in a botched motel holdup last year, according to Keith Milam, assistant district attorney for Beauregard Parish.

State District Judge Homer L. Colthorpe gave Creswell concurrent 25-year prison sentences Friday for two clothing store holdups a week before the botched robbery at the Park Motel, Milam said.

Creswell, armed with a knife, walked into the motel last May and began pulling a garbage bag over his head, according to a statement by

Creswell suddenly realized he had forgotten to make eyeholes in the bag, the clerk told police.

"So he started pulling on the bag to try to put some holes in it," Milam said. "And then he asked for the money. Well, she said she wasn't going to give him any money and he left."

The clerk called police and Creswell admitted to the botched holdup when he was arrested minutes later, Milam said. Authorities said Creswell previously had been convicted of four armed robberies.

The projected \$38.3 million surplus could translate into a windfall for property owners. The owner of a \$200,000 home would save about \$1,000 on his property taxes with other property owners reaping similar savings.

But following that rather pleasant prediction came a worrisome revelation.

The city may raise fees for services. Costa Mesa is considering new user fees, such as charging drunken drivers for the trouble of arresting them, as well as increasing fees for such diverse services as safety inspections or animal control services.

It seems the year after the city anticipates a \$38.3 million surplus, it forecasts a \$6 million deficit. From the penthouse, to the poorhouse in 12 months time.

Go figure.

I can't help but feel the city is missing part of the point of the Gann limit. That was to force government to put a lid on adding expenses, not simply to look for other ways to raise money. After all, why shouldn't government limit its spending growth by 6.5 percent per year? Most citizens do.

Of course, neither are probably accurate observations but it made for interesting reading.

Speaking of winners and losers...

Our friends over at The Irvine Co. are more than a bit worried about being cast as the losers when the judgment is rendered on Joan Irvine Smith's lawsuit to determine the value of her stock shares. With as much as \$500 million of Mr. Bren's money at stake, I would worry about losing, too.

But with the legal costs for both sides estimated at \$15 million for the marathon Michigan case, the only sure winners are the lawyers.

Mesa Verde streets a sacrifice to traffic

To the Editor:

At the Dec. 19 Costa Mesa Council meeting the Mesa Verde/Country Club Drive/Neighborhood Traffic Control study was presented. The council rejected the engineering recommendations based on a study lasting over a year and costing over \$35,000. The council also rejected a recommendation to put up a monument stating that Mesa Verde is (was?) a residential area.

Mesa Verde families who have students at Estancia, TeWinkle or California schools as well as bicyclists and pedestrians who regularly cross Adams at Mesa Verde East or Mesa Verde West better be aware of the following.

The City Council has approved the removal of the crosswalks across Adams on the West side of Mesa Verde East and on the West side of Mesa Verde West. Visualize what this means!

If you are on the northwest corner of Adams and Mesa Verde West and want to reach the southwest corner you must, by use of electric signals, first cross Mesa Verde West to the east side, cross Adams to the south side, then cross Placentia to the southwest corner. You are exposed to the risks of crossing three major thoroughfares instead of one.

The same analogy applies to Mesa Verde East. The piece makers will be raising "H" at that intersection when they find out about this change.

Pedestrians will be exposed to three times the previous risks of crossing Adams as well as being delayed three to five times as long as a single crossing would require.

From a safety standpoint, what is proposed for these two intersections is a major blunder in traffic control and engineering.

The third "kicker" in the staff report is to evaluate posted speed limits on streets where multiway stop signs are to be analyzed.

The current posted speed limits on the Mesa Verde streets are: Giesler and Mesa Verde Drive — 35 mph; Baker — 30 mph; and Country Club Drive — 25 mph. It is not likely the intent is to lower the speed limits, rather it is quite certain they will be increased. So long as safety is ignored, speed limits can be set to increase the volume of traffic through the Mesa Verde area.

It is obvious that streets in the Mesa Verde area are being arterIALIZED for the benefit of those who want a shortcut to and from the 405 Freeway.

Increase gas tax to change driving habits

To the Editor:

Taxes discourage behavior, and subsidies encourage behavior. We are all concerned about the traffic congestion, smog and pollution. A significant gasoline tax would discourage wasteful driving, encourage car pooling and driving more fuel-efficient automobiles. It would reduce pollution and reduce our dependency on foreign oil.

I think we ought to increase the gasoline tax 25 cents a gallon for eight years and then index the tax to inflation. The federal government should set the tax and provide portions of it to states and local governments.

It is fair for motorists who are causing the pollution and congestion problems to pay the extra taxes to contribute to the solution of some of our serious problems. There is only an average of 1.1 persons per vehicle, so all would have the opportunity to reduce their taxes by changing their behavior.

The increased gasoline tax would also provide revenues with which we can encourage other behavior:

- Subsidize mass transit.
- Improve existing roads and build new ones.
- Purchase open space to prevent overdevelopment.

The costs inefficient driving is not being covered by the present gasoline tax. The price of gasoline — adjusted for inflation — is less than it was in 1959.

We should not discourage income by increasing those taxes, but those driving gas guzzlers should bear the costs to solve the problems that they are creating.

Do you think Costa Mesa should return tax money it can't spend because of the Gann limit, or give homeowners a rebate?



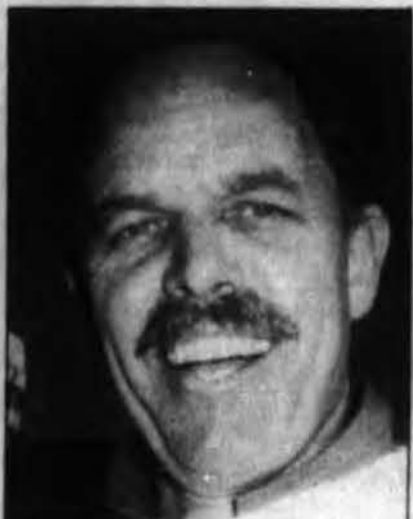

Hatten, Long Beach send UCI to 75-70 defeat

His 37 points, 49ers' defense enough to hold off mistake-ridden Anteaters

LONG BEACH — Long Beach State center John Hatten has been building toward a big night, and Saturday night at University Gym he met up with a defense which couldn't contain him.

No matter what UCI tried, it couldn't control the 6-foot-9, 235-pound bullworker inside or out and Hatten broke loose for the finest game of his career — a 37-point effort which keyed a 75-70 Big West Conference victory for the 49ers.

"I think Hatten had a great game," said UCI Coach Bill Mulligan. "Long

Beach played really hard and deserved to win. We tried to play Hatten different ways. We three-quartered him in the post, and the last 10 minutes with different people we tried to play behind him and get help, and he hits the turnaround jumper."

Hatten missed his first three shots of the game but finished with 17 field goals in 31 attempts, eclipsing his previous career high of 25 points two games ago at New Mexico State. Rudy Harvey added 16 points on the inside, nine points over his average.

Hatten has led the 49ers in scoring 10 of the past 11 games, including 20-plus performances the past three.

"I was really pleased to see John Hatten break through and score so many points," said Long Beach Coach Joe Harrington. "I know he took a lot of shots, but I know he's been capable of having a night like this. He can do it again, and now I think he has the confidence."

The defeat dropped UCI to 3-5 in conference games and 6-11 overall, while Long Beach State improved to 5-4 for fourth place in the Big West and 8-10 overall.

Equally fatal for the Anteaters' was their decision-making process, under the pressure of Long Beach's full-court press in the first half and in the

heat of the stretch run.

"We made very poor decisions," Mulligan said. "We did real good against the press the second half. Well, I don't know if we did anything really good. Another game down the tubes. We didn't play that badly, though."

From the opening tip, when Kevin Floyd took control and drove wildly over a defender to lose the ball, to the closing seconds when he didn't react according to design while down by three, UCI made its errors.

Among the 23 turnovers were several off the press in the first half, when UCI made 14. Mike

Doktorczyk, who led UCI with 20 points and 11 rebounds, had five turnovers, several while inbounding the ball against the press. And the Anteaters made four in a row during one first-half stretch when Long Beach took early control.

Still, UCI was in the game to the final minute after scoring seven straight to cut the deficit to one, 69-68, with 46 seconds left. Ricky Butler's 3-point play, inside spin move and drop-in and Floyd's 14-foot baseline jumper with Tyrone Mitchell in his mug drew UCI close.

After Jeff Eastin hit a pair of free (Please see UCI/B2)

Some Superdome fans forced to settle for birds-eye view of game

NEW ORLEANS — They couldn't read the names on the uniforms or even see the numbers without binoculars, but for the fans watching No. 2 Georgetown and Louisiana State in the Superdome on Saturday, a birds-eye view of the action was better than nothing.

"This is great," said Leo J. McGovern Jr., 39. "Being part of a record like this makes up for what we can't see real well. Besides, I used to sit at about the same level for the Jazz games. Once you acclimate yourself you have no trouble."

His 10-year-old son, Leo III, agreed. "You just have to be sure to get your snacks and stuff before you climb up here, because they don't send them up to sell stuff a lot," he said.

The new attendance record for an NCAA basketball game was set Thursday when Superdome officials announced a sellout, with 65,913 tickets distributed, topping the 64,959 sold for the 1987 NCAA championship game. The record single-game attendance, 52,693, was for UCLA-Houston at the Astrodome in 1968.

Those who showed up for the game stretched from court side to the last row of seats, 19 stories and 100 yards away from the action.

"There's nothing wrong with these seats," said Lance Jordan, 16. "They look a little small down here, but I can see them good enough."

Jordan, his left leg in a cast, had negotiated three

escalators and "about 10 miles" of winding ramps on crutches to reach his seat in the upper deck.

"Yeah, it was worth it. I'm a part of history," he said.

Perched in the last row of seats, 10-year-olds Jeff Mendow and Steve Wright and Patrick Mendow, 8, delighted in being as far from the action as they could get.

"Our tickets were for down there further," Jeff said. "We wanted to be in the last row though."

"They look like ants, don't they?" Patrick said.

"It's not that bad, we can always see it on the big screens on the end there," Steve said pointing at the two Diamond Vision screens that carried the televised action in each end zone.

Merrill and Lisette Vitter joined those around them in the end zone in watching with binoculars.

"It's about the only way to really watch the plays," Merrill said. "Our son Paul played basketball with Dwayne Bryant and Dennis Tracy in high school so it's an extra thrill to see this game."

Bryant is one of three Georgetown players from New Orleans.

"I think having LSU and so many local kids on the Georgetown team is one reason there is such a big crowd. It's a bad time of year to get this many people here. Don't forget it's the Mardi Gras. A lot of people don't want to miss the parades," Lisette Vitter said.

Four Mardi Gras parades were held in the New Orleans area Saturday afternoon.

"It's an event," Frances St. Pierre said of the game. "You know New Orleans, any excuse for a party."

Lewis extends streak to 57

Carl Lewis won his 57th straight long jump competition Saturday night with a leap of 26 feet 9 inches in the Houston Indoor Games. Lewis, the world record-holder at 28-10 1/4, beat University of Houston junior Leroy Burrell, who jumped 26-6 1/4. Burrell was a surprise winner of the men's 55-meter dash with a time of 6.09 seconds in a field that included world record-holder Lee McRae and 200-meter Olympic gold medal winner Joe DeLoach, who finished third in the race. The games also featured an appearance by gold medal winner Jackie Joyner-Kersey, who won the women's 55-meter hurdles in 7.46 seconds. Randy Barnes, Olympic silver medalist in the shot put, won his specialty with a throw of 70 feet 2 1/2 inches. The effort of the former Texas A&M star was off his U.S. record of 74-6. Kevin Robinson, who won an Olympic gold medal as part of the 4x400 relay, finished third in the 400-meter race, an event that Mark Rowe won in 47.86 seconds. Other winners were Jim Howard of the Mazda Track Club in the high jump with a leap of 7-5 1/4 and Brian Abshire of Athletics West in the mile run with a time of 4:03.55. In women's competition, Dale Devers of the World Class Track Club won the 55-meter dash in 6.74 seconds. Sandra Farmer-Patrick won the 400-meter run in 55.06, and Essie Washington won the 800-meter run in 2:04.91.

Olympian Vicki Huber of Villanova beat 1984 gold medalist Marileca Puica of Romania to win the 3,000-meter run in an invitational meet in Johnson City, Tenn. Huber won in a time of 8 minutes and 54.48 seconds, five seconds off Brenda Webb's meet record of 8:49.90 set last year. Huber, who finished sixth in the 3,000 at Seoul, held fourth place for most of the first mile, behind Puica. Lisa Breiding of Kentucky and Joan Nesbit of North Carolina. She moved into the lead when Puica's pace slowed, and widened her lead to win by 15 seconds over Breiding. Puica faded to third.

Lopez ties Daniel for lead

BOCA RATON, Fla. — Defending champion Nancy Lopez was a model of consistency Saturday, en route to a bogey-free 69 to overcome a three-shot deficit and tie Beth Daniel for the lead after three rounds of an LPGA tournament.

Lopez birdied the 17th hole with a 12-foot putt to pull even with Daniel, who shot even par 72 for a 54-hole total of 7-under-par 209 on the 6,333-yard Stonebridge Golf and Country Club course.

A hole-in-one and four birdies helped Dottie Mochrie come from six strokes off the pace to gain a brief share of the lead. But the second-year pro, looking for her first tour victory, bogeyed the No. 18 to fall a shot behind Lopez and Daniel.

Mochrie, who shot 67, will carry a three-day total of 6-under-par 210 into today's final round. Jane Geddes and Jody Rosenthal will resume the chase for the \$45,000 first-place check two shots behind the co-leaders after rounds of 69 and 71, respectively, left them at 5-under-par 211.

Lopez, with husband Ray Knight standing in for her regular caddy and helping her with yardage and club selections, birdied the first hole to move within two shots of Daniel. She also birdied No. 8 to take a share of the lead Daniel built by shooting 69 and 68 in the first two rounds.

Daniel's birdie on No. 12 broke a four-way tie with Lopez, Mochrie and Rosenthal and the 14-time LPGA winner shot par the rest of the way to stay in position to pursue her first tour victory in more than three years.

Pair suspended for fighting

NEW YORK — Bill Laimbeer of the Detroit Pistons and Brad Daugherty of the Cleveland Cavaliers were each suspended one game without pay by the NBA on Saturday for fighting.

Laimbeer and Daugherty fought Friday night in the fourth quarter of Cleveland's 80-79 victory over the Pistons.

"The NBA will not, under any circumstances, tolerate fighting," Rod Thorn, the NBA's vice president of operations, said in a statement. "If an incident is serious enough, we will not hesitate to suspend those at fault."

Laimbeer will sit out tonight's home contest against Sacramento after playing in 685 consecutive games, currently the longest such streak in the league and fourth on the all-time list.

The nine-year NBA veteran last sat out a game during the 1981-82 season, when he was with Cleveland. The longest streak of consecutive games, 906, belongs to Randy Smith, who played from 1972-83 with Buffalo, San Diego, Cleveland and New York.

Daugherty will miss today's game against Washington.

In addition to the suspensions, the NBA said it would announce fines for Laimbeer, Daugherty and other players on Monday.

The incident occurred early in the fourth quarter as Laimbeer and Daugherty battled under the basket. Several punches were thrown by each player, and each landed at least one punch. Both were ejected.

For Laimbeer, who is paid \$600,000 a year, a game without pay amounts to \$7,317.07.

Sooners nip Rebels, 90-88; Georgetown falls to LSU

At halftime of Saturday's game with Oklahoma, Nevada-Las Vegas Coach Jerry Tarkanian huddled with his son in a hallway, trying to figure how to stop Stacey King, who already had 28 points.

"He's awesome, he's impossible to stop," Tarkanian finally told Danny Tarkanian, his former point guard.

Tarkanian turned out to be a prophet as King scored 20 more in the second half, including his team's last seven points, as No. 4 Oklahoma beat No. 13 UNLV, 90-88.

King ended the game with a career-high 48 points, but it took a steal of an Anderson Hunt pass by Mookie Blaylock with two seconds left to secure the win. It was only the second steal of the game for Blaylock, who is leading the country in thefts with nearly five a game.

Blaylock also had 23 points for the Sooners, as he and King combined for 71 of the team's 90 points.

It was the second win of the season by Oklahoma over UNLV, which fell to 14-4 on the year. The Sooners, now 17-2, beat UNLV, 83-81, in the semifinals of the Maui Classic in November.

In other games involving top 20 teams: **LSU 82, Georgetown 80:** Ricky Blanton scored during a scramble at the buzzer, giving Louisiana State, 14-5, the victory over second-ranked Georgetown, 15-2, before the largest crowd ever to watch a regular-season college basketball game.

The pregame ticket sale was 65,913, largest ever for any college game. The actual attendance was 54,321, second to the turnstile count of 57,607 for the 1987 Final Four, which was also played at the Louisiana Superdome.

Illinois 75, Indiana 65: Kenny Battle scored 22 points and led a second-half rally as No. 1 Illinois beat No. 16 Indiana in the Big Ten. The Illini, upset by Minnesota, 69-62, Thursday, improved to 18-1, 5-1, while Indiana is 16-5, 6-1.

Missouri 89, Nebraska 72: Byron Irvin scored 15 of his 22 points in the second half to help No. 5 Missouri, 18-3, 4-0, remain undefeated in the Big Eight with a victory over Nebraska, 12-8, 0-4.

North Carolina 92, Georgia Tech 85: Kevin Madden scored 16 points to lead six players in double figures as seventh-ranked North Carolina, 18-3, 5-1, beat Georgia Tech, 12-6, 2-2, in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Seton Hall 103, Boston College 79: John Morton scored 19 of his career high 30 points in the first half as ninth-ranked Seton Hall, 18-2, 5-2, hit 14 of its first 18 shots and defeated Boston College, 8-9, 1-6, in the Big East.

Minton, 4-5 last season with seven saves and a 2.85 earned-run average in 44 games, made \$525,000 in 1988.

The 37-year-old right-hander gave up only one home run last season and has allowed only five home runs in 155 career innings with the Angels.

He signed with California as a free agent in 1987. Since then, he is 9-9 with 17 saves and a 2.96 ERA.

There are 76 players remaining in salary arbitration, including Wally Joyner, Chili Davis and Dick Schofield of the Angels.

The first hearings are scheduled for Wednesday — left-hander Juan Nieves of the Milwaukee Brewers and infielder Dion James of the Atlanta Braves.

Alysheba Horse of Year

ARCADIA — Alysheba, history's richest thoroughbred racehorse, was named Horse of the Year for 1988 Saturday.

In winning his third Eclipse Award, Alysheba beat the filly, Personal Ensign, who won all of her 13 career starts and become the first major American horse to retire unbeaten since Colin in 1908.

The award announced at Santa Anita was the result of voting by the National Turf Writers Association, Daily Racing Form and racing secretaries of Thoroughbred Racing Associations' member tracks.

Earlier, Alysheba, the 3-year-old champion of 1987 when he was the Kentucky Derby, was voted best older male horse of 1988. Personal Ensign was named best older filly or mare.

Alysheba, who raced at seven different tracks, lost two of nine starts in 1988, but eight of the starts and six of the victories were in Grade I stakes.

Four of those Grade I wins were in his last four starts and they included 1 1/4-mile track-record performances of 1:59.2/5 in the Woodward Handicap at Belmont Park and of 1:58.4/5 in the Meadowlands Cup Handicap.

The son of Alydar, ridden by Chris McCarron, capped his campaign with a patented stretch run for a half-length victory over Seeking the Gold in the \$3 million Breeders' Cup Classic Nov. 5 at Churchill Downs.

That victory, worth \$1.35 million, gave Alysheba a single-year earnings record of \$3,808,600 and made him the all-time money-winning leader with a bankroll of \$6,679,242. He surpassed the gelding, John Henry, who retired in 1984 at age 9 with earnings of \$6,597,947.

Price's rally gives him share of lead

O'Meara slips into tie at Pebble Beach after shooting 73

PEBBLE BEACH (AP) — Nick Price didn't expect to be leading the Pebble Beach National Pro-Am after three rounds.

"I'm surprising myself," Price said Saturday after he made up six strokes with a 5-under-par 67 at Pebble Beach and tied Mark O'Meara for the lead in the \$1 million tournament. "I was pretty rough around the edges last week."

Price missed the cut last week in the Phoenix Open, his first start since injuring his thumb last October.

"This was as solid a round as I've played, not the best I've ever played but as solid as any," Price said. "I'm hitting the ball very well. That's one reason I'm so confident." Price said.

He didn't seem so, however. Price was asked about his thoughts going into today's final round at Pebble Beach.

"I'm a bit confused at the moment," he said. "I've had a lot of seconds..." he said, letting the sentence trail off unfinished.

One of them was last year in the British Open. From the third-round lead, Price shot 69 and was overwhelmed by Seve Ballesteros' 65.

And then there was the 1986

Masters. Price set a tournament record with a 64 and took the third-round lead. But a closing 71 dropped him well back.

His only American victory was in the 1983 World Series of Golf. And his only victory of any kind since then was in the 1985 Lancome Trophy in Paris.

"I'm trying not to think about it," he said. "If I win, I win. That's all I want to say."

O'Meara retained a piece of the lead with a one-over-par 73 at Pebble Beach.

"I guess you could say it was an uneventful day," O'Meara said. "Two three-putts (for his two bogeys) and one one-putt (for his only birdie)."

It was considerably more eventful for Jack Nicklaus, who shot a pair of 69s in the first two rounds. The 49-year-old Nicklaus, who won the 1972 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach, hit a shot out of bounds on the second hole at Pebble Beach and went on to shoot an 80, including 42 on the back nine. He just made the cut, shooting a 218.

Nicklaus' bad back was bothered by the cold. He appeared to be attempting to disguise a slight limp.

"I played two good rounds," Nicklaus said. "So this just kind of averaged out my game."

Tom Watson, who won the 1982 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach, also had 42 over the back nine.

Lendl regains top ranking with win

Mecir goes down in straight sets at Australian Open

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Ivan Lendl overpowered Miloslav Mecir of Czechoslovakia, 6-2, 6-2, 6-2, today to win his first Australian Open and regain the No. 1 ranking in men's tennis.

Lendl took only two hours to defeat Mecir for the second time in a Grand Slam final. He also defeated his countryman in straight sets at the 1986 U.S. Open.

Mecir, ranked 13th in the world, broke to take a 2-1 lead in the first set, but that was his high point of the match. Lendl broke right back at love and never trailed again on another 100-degree day at the National Tennis Center.

Mecir, known as the "Big Cat" for his quickness and court coverage, was a step slower throughout the match. He tried to keep Lendl off balance by hitting short offspeed shots, but Lendl teed off on them like a home-run hitter taking batting practice.

Both players wore caps to shade themselves from the searing heat on Center Court, where the temperature on the cushioned-hardcourt surface reached 135 degrees.

With the victory, Lendl regained the No. 1 ranking he lost to Mats Wilander at the U.S. Open last

September. Lendl held the top spot for three years before that.

The Australian Open was one of two major titles that had eluded Lendl. He has won three French Opens and three U.S. Opens, but is still seeking his first Wimbledon championship.

"I don't think I have to tell you how badly I wanted to win this tournament," said Lendl, who was beaten by Wilander in the 1983 Australian Open. "It's one of the four greatest tournaments in the world and the last four or five years I've bent over backwards trying to win it."

"Winning the tournament means more to me than being No. 1. I didn't come here to be No. 1. I came here to win."

Mecir, who is 1-5 against Lendl, praised the victory.

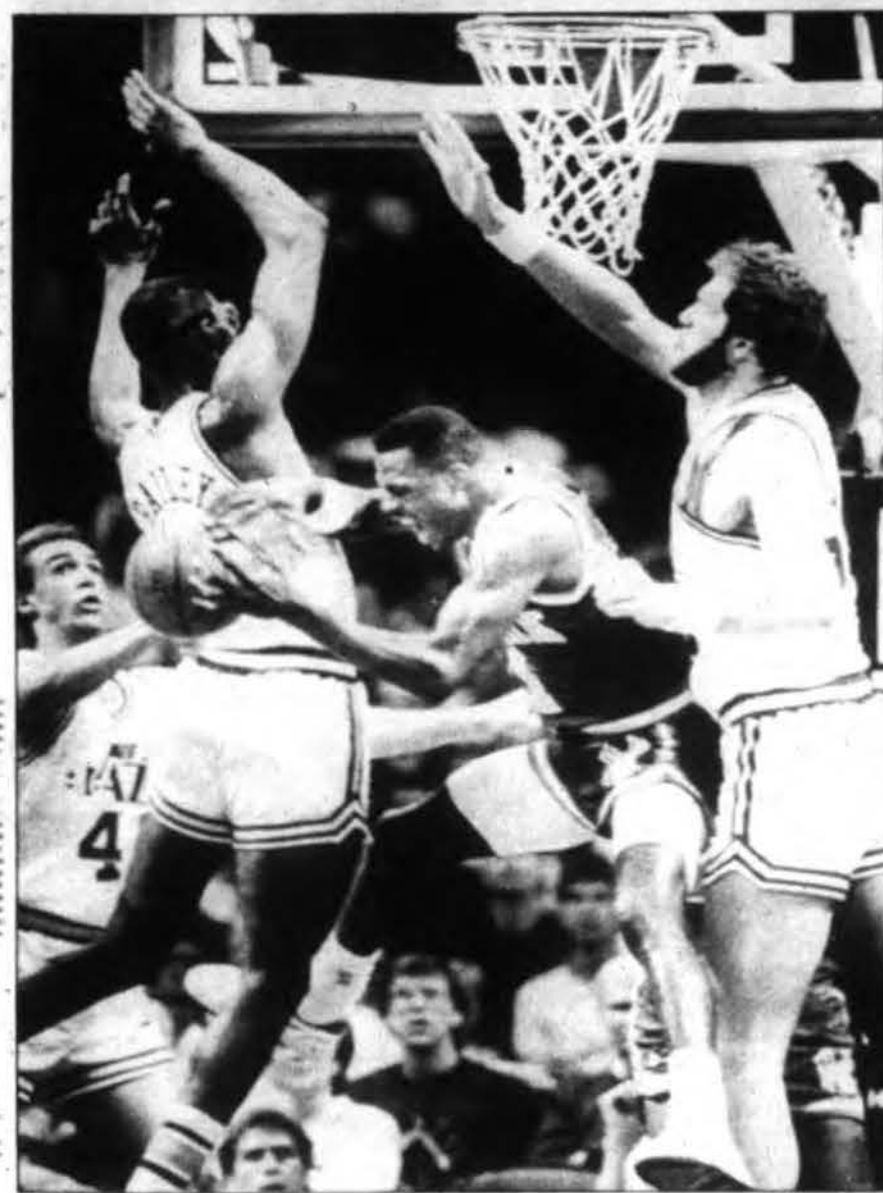
"I think he played very well, not only against me, but against all the other players here," Mecir said. "He deserved to win the tournament."

Earlier, Martina Navratilova and Pam Shriver scored their seventh straight Australian Open doubles victory.

Navratilova and Shriver, the top seeds, shrugged off a dropped first set to beat Jill Hetherington of Canada and American Patty Fendick, 3-6, 6-3, 6-2, in the women's doubles final. The pair have now recorded 20 Grand Slam wins as a team.

For Navratilova, 32, it was her 51st Grand Slam title. She has won 29 in doubles.

Milwaukee hands Clippers 14th straight loss, 105-84

Casey remains winless since taking over for Shue as coach

Jay Humphries scored a season-high 24 points and Terry Cummings added 21 Saturday night as the Milwaukee Bucks beat Los Angeles at the Sports Arena, 105-84, the Clippers' 14th straight loss.

Reserve forward Fred Roberts added a season-high 16 points for the Bucks, who never trailed en route to their sixth straight win over Los Angeles and fourth consecutive victory overall.

Quintin Dailey scored 28 points for the Clippers, who have dropped three straight since Don Casey replaced Gene Shue as head coach on Jan. 19.

Los Angeles trimmed a 15-point deficit late in the third quarter to 79-71 on Reggie Williams' 20-footer with 10:37 left in the game. But Milwaukee responded with a 14-2 run to extend its lead to 93-73 with 5:45 left, and the Clippers never got closer than 16 after that.

Los Angeles, trailing by as many as 15 points in the second quarter, reduced a seven-point halftime deficit to 51-48 just 50 seconds into the third period on consecutive layins by Dailey.

But despite Dailey's 14 points in the quarter, that was as close as Los Angeles came as Cummings and Humphries led the Bucks on a 22-10 run that put them ahead 75-60 with 2½ minutes left in the quarter.

In other NBA games:

Trail Blazers 110, Hawks 94: Clyde Drexler had 31 points and 12 rebounds, while Kiki Vandeweghe and Kevin Duckworth scored important baskets in the fourth quarter, helping Portland snap a five-game losing streak.

The Trail Blazers, who lost their four previous games at home, outscored Atlanta 18-8 early in the fourth period, taking a 92-82 lead after the Hawks tied the score 74-74.

Vandeweghe had five of his 13 fourth-quarter points during the spurt and Duckworth added six. Vandeweghe

and Duckworth both finished with 16 points.

76ers 123, Nets 105: Ron Anderson scored eight of 25 points during a 17-5 run at the start of the fourth quarter and Philadelphia overcame the absence of Charles Barkley and defeated New Jersey in East Rutherford.

The victory was the third straight and eighth in 11 games for the 76ers, who learned earlier in the day they would be without their leading scorer and rebounder.

Barkley suffered a sprained right ankle on Friday night in the final two minutes of a 113-112 win over Golden State. The ankle was placed in cast earlier in the day and Barkley might return Tuesday.

IRS joins FBI in commodities investigation, paper says

CHICAGO (AP) — The Internal Revenue Service has joined the FBI in an investigation of illegal trading at the nation's two largest commodities exchanges, a newspaper reported Saturday.

A squad of 15 IRS agents will look for possible income tax fraud, including the skimming of profits and concealment of income, the Chicago Tribune reported.

Citing unidentified sources, the newspaper said the agents had joined the FBI in examining documents

obtained by federal subpoenas.

One investigator said some subjects of the inquiry face a dilemma in filling out 1988 federal tax returns, the newspaper reported.

They must decide whether to record possibly illegal earnings that were documented by undercover operatives who investigated the exchanges, or face charges of income tax evasion, the source told the Tribune.

The Chicago Mercantile Exchange and the Chicago Board of Trade were targeted by a two-year federal in-

vestigation in which FBI agents posed as traders and secretly tape-recorded conversations on the trading floor.

The FBI and U.S. Attorney Anton Valukas' office refused again Friday to confirm or deny the investigation was under way.

But published reports say some 200 subpoenas to appear before a grand jury have been served on more than 200 prominent brokers, traders and trading firms. Some witnesses are expected to cooperate, broadening the scope of the investigation.

Despite the wide-ranging investigation, the Mercantile Exchange and its European partners are moving ahead with plans for a worldwide trading system.

Globex — a project of the Mercantile Exchange and Reuters America Inc. — would link investors in North America, Europe and Asia via an all-night electronic system for trading futures and options contracts on currency futures, including the British pound, the West German mark, the Swiss and French francs, Austral-

ian and Canadian dollars, and the Japanese yen.

Full trading worldwide is expected to begin in 1990, exchange spokesman Andrew Yemma said Friday.

The system would kick in at 6 p.m. — after the Mercantile Exchange closes at 3:15 p.m. — and trade electronically with futures markets on other continents until 6 a.m. — before the exchange reopens at 7:20 a.m., meaning Mercantile Exchange trading would be conducted nearly 20 hours a day.

Yemma labeled "completely erroneous" reports that several European financial institutions backed away from the project because of the federal investigation.

The New York Mercantile Exchange voted Thursday to join the venture.

The Commodity Futures Trading Commission, the federal agency that regulates the industry, must approve Globex before it can begin operations.

The contract covers only the distribution of food and related products handled by REG's GRS Restaurant Services department. REG will continue to distribute

food to its Carrows restaurants through its Food Distributing Corp., to selected El Toritos through its Cal Pacific operation, and liquor to all restaurants. Additionally, REG will continue to operate its manufacturing facilities which produce soups, dressings, tortillas, bakery products and ice cream for its restaurants.

Kraft Foodservice will purchase some inventory from Restaurant Enterprises as part of the distribution agreement.

REG operates 600 restaurants including El Torito, Charley Brown's, Reuben's, Coco's and Carrows.

Kraft Foodservice is an operating unit of Kraft Inc., a multinational food company.

In Irvine Western Digital Corp. has adopted a "poison pill" rights agreement designed to make a hostile takeover too expensive to attempt, according to a filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

When the anti-takeover measure is triggered,

Western Digital's shareholders may buy two common shares in the company for the price of one, causing substantial dilution of the company's stock, according to the filing.

The rights become exercisable after a person or group has acquired a 25 percent stake or group makes a tender or exchange offer for more than 25 percent of Western Digital's common stock. The rights will be distributed to shareholders on record as of Dec. 13, 1988.

Tustin-based MAI Basic Four Inc. has filed a supplement to its \$20-a-share tender offer for Natick, Mass.-based Prime Computer Inc., according to a filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Also, Bennett S. LeBow, chairman of MAI Basic, has sent a letter to Prime's chairman and president claiming that Prime's board had disregarded the "demonstrated wishes" of the company's shareholders and had used money and other resources to "prevent Prime share-

holders from accepting MAI Basic's offer."

LeBow wrote that, although more than 60 percent of its shares have been tendered to MAI Basic, Prime still refuses to negotiate and continues to make personal attacks.

In a separate action, MAI Basic will ask the Delaware Chancery Court to schedule a hearing on its renewed motion to invalidate certain anti-takeover defenses adopted by Prime.

Environmental Diagnostics Inc. has decreased its stake in Disease Detection International Inc. to 23 percent, according to a filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Environmental sold 1.5 million shares on Dec. 22 at 22 cents each and now holds 35.5 million common shares. Irvine-based Environmental manufactures diagnostic test kits for detection of infectious and parasitic diseases.

Use of rubber shock absorbers urged to save offices, economy

ONTARIO, Calif. — Some of America's major corporations were urged last week to protect the economy as well as human lives from earthquake disasters by constructing new buildings on rubber shock absorbers.

"It's not adequate anymore to just think about stopping building collapse," said Robert J. Kuntz, president of the California Engineering Foundation, a nonprofit education group that sponsored a two-day conference on new anti-quake technology.

"You've got to protect the hundreds of millions of dollars of equipment inside these buildings and allow the enterprise to remain functional," he said Thursday. "We want to get people to start recognizing the necessity of protecting the economy of California. This goes beyond protecting life and limb."

Kuntz and others urged companies in quake-prone areas nationwide to consider building new low- and medium-rise buildings — and even refurbishing old ones — using "seismic base isolation," which involves placing large, flexible shock absorbers between a building and its foundation.

The conference, sponsored by Kuntz's group, the National Science Foundation, the California Manufacturers Association and others, drew about 100 engineers and officials from major corporations and institutions.

Those represented at the meeting included Hughes Aircraft, Chevron Corp., FMC, Hewlett-Packard Co., Bechtel National Inc., Rockwell In-

ternational, Digital Equipment Corp., Pacific Bell, GTE California Inc., Union Oil Co., TRW, numerous engineering firms, the U.S. Geological Survey, the Air Force, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, the Library of Congress and the Army Corps of Engineers.

U.S. Rep. George Brown Jr., D-Calif., criticized the American con-

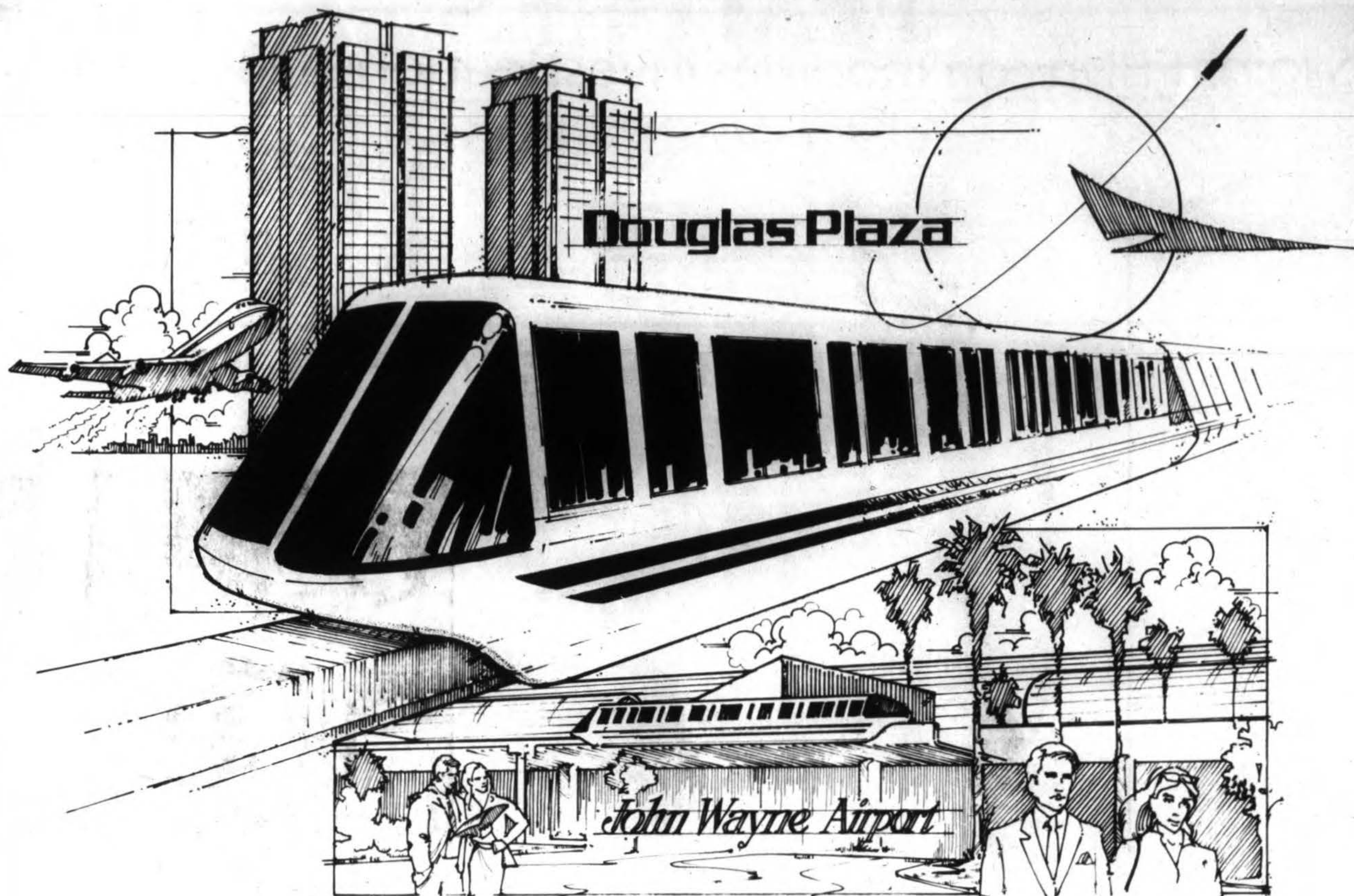
struction industry for failing to keep competitive with Japanese builders in using base isolation on new buildings and nuclear power plants.

"The United States has done quite well in making new advances in earthquake engineering. We have not done as well in using this new knowledge to make buildings safer," Brown said.

He added that if the situation doesn't improve, in 20 years "we'll just buy earthquake-resistant buildings from Japan. The bad news is that our construction industry may be in shambles."

When buildings are constructed on the shock absorbers, monitors to measure ground shaking also should be installed to test and demonstrate the effectiveness of the devices, said Bruce Bolt, director of the Seis-

Preschoolers learn the ABCs of snow

Take 34 blocks of ice weighing in at 300 pounds each, combine them with 96 preschoolers and what have you got?

- A. Wet teachers
- B. Exploding snow missiles
- C. Runny noses
- D. All of the above.

If your answer was D, give yourself a cookie and a nap — which the children of the Assistance League of Newport Beach's Child Care Center certainly got after their romp in the snow this week.

Staged in the parking lot of the center's Costa Mesa facility, the pile of melting ice was a reason to play outdoors all day and teach the children, who range from 2 to 5 years of age, about snow.

The ice would melt in three days, and turn a uniform gray long before that, but Child Care Center Director Rita Jameson says the snow day is worth the trouble.

"Not many of these kids have ever seen real snow," said Jameson as a well-aimed snowball hit her knee. "This is very exciting and new for the kids."

At times it seemed as though snow was just as exciting and new for the teachers and staff as it was for the children. The snow mound was covered with teachers helping children pelt other teachers with snowballs. In the end, the adults were just as wet and chilled as the children.

This is known as hands-on teaching.

"After the third day, when the snow is just an ice patch in the parking lot, we'll do science experiments with salt and food coloring," Jameson said.

The snow pile might not seem very large to an adult, but for a person under 3 feet tall it's enough for a quick sled ride, three miniature snow angels and a snowball battle involving almost all of the 4-year-olds.

Jameson said she wasn't concerned about the children getting hurt. "And that's because I know kids will get hurt."

The snow was created by the Orange County Ice Company, who trucked in huge

blocks of ice which was crushed and blown onto the asphalt in a circle approximately 15 feet in diameter and 3 feet high.

Janitors Jerrey and Ruth Huddleston spent \$500 on this year's snow day. The Huddlestons, whose JR Services provides cleaning and maintenance services for the center, said the company footed the bill for the snow because "this was one way we felt we could participate."

The center tries to have one snow day every year for the children who attend, and has succeeded in offering this

special event for the last five years.

Parents whose children are enrolled at the center count themselves lucky for more than the snow days. The preschool is for children of low-income families with parents who work full time. Tuition is charged on a sliding scale based on the parents' ability to pay.

Funded by proceeds from the Newport Beach Assistance League's Thrift Store and private donations, the school's capacity is 96 students and always runs at maximum capacity with a six month to one-year waiting for enrollment.

Sir Eldon Griffiths: UCI's man about the world

While the Orange Coast boasts its share of influential men and women, knights and their ladies are in short supply. So it wouldn't surprise Sir Eldon and Lady Betty Griffiths if they ran into someone who wasn't up on the proper way to meet, greet and address a Sir and his Lady.

"Sir Eldon is just fine," said Griffiths with a slight smile on his lips and a large twinkle in his eye.

Tall, lean, silver-haired and clothed in the best British tailoring, the UCI Regent's Professor has a voice that sweeps listeners into his logic and holds them at attention waiting for his next pronouncement. And Griffiths has the resume to lend a lot of credibility to those utterances.

For instance, he currently holds a seat in the British House of Commons and is the president of the Orange County World Affairs Council. He has had a distinguished career as a journalist who wrote for Life, Time and Newsweek magazines, and has advised governments on environmental

policy and the British police forces on terrorism.

Griffiths, who was knighted by Queen Elizabeth in 1987, first came to the United States after World War II. He was "standing in the midst of a Berlin that was rubble" when he received offers of graduate fellowships from both Yale and Princeton. He flipped a coin and Yale won.

He was the first non-American domestic correspondent for Time and Life magazines. Later he wrote for Newsweek and served as a war correspondent. He was taken prisoner by the Red Army in Hungary and covered the ill-fated Bay of Pigs invasion in Cuba.

Griffiths first came to Southern California when he visited Camp Pendleton as a correspondent during the Korean War. As he began his long journey to the battlefield with a Marine unit, he thought to himself that he'd like to come back here someday.

Now a part-time resident of Mission Viejo, Griffiths and his wife are enjoying the excitement and the challenges of life along the Pacific Rim. The (Please see SIR/C2)

The abuse stopped when they got into a fight on a neighbor's porch. His wife reached in her purse. He thought she was going for a gun so he shot her.

After I read this story I decided to look into the subject of husband abuse and I learned plenty.

Every year at least 250,000 men are battered so severely that they have to get medical attention. Most men who get beat up by their wives are too ashamed to tell anyone, so they keep it to themselves instead of going to the police.

Abused husbands stay in hellish

marriages for the same reasons abused wives do. They don't want to lose their kids. They can't afford two residences, and they want to believe things will get better and the beatings will stop.

I hope you will print my letter and let the world know that sometimes the husband gets the raw deal, and for him there are no shelters and darned little sympathy. — Patrick G. in Baltimore

DEAR PAT: The world knows that men sometimes get beat up by their wives; in fact I have written about it in the column.

Abused husbands can call domestic violence hotlines. They can also get counseling. The person who tolerates physical abuse is just as sick as the one who dishes it out. Both need help, and for years I've been urging them to get it.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: My husband and I recently ate lunch at a restaurant we enjoy very much. We noticed a man at the next table with no arms. He proceeded to use his foot to get the food from his plate to his mouth.

Although we had sympathy for this handicapped person, we felt that the patrons of this lovely restaurant should not have been subjected to this bizarre sight.

Femininity, and the unexpected, already prevail in Paris, where Italy's favorite fashion son, Valentino, will ensure the surprise ending this year. Abandoning Rome, at least this season, he capped the week of French collections with his first haute couture showing in Paris.

The move, which has unsettled Roman fashion lords, serves to confirm the pre-eminence of French haute couture, which can set trends for the entire fashion industry.

Romance, sometimes smoldering, is clearly the word for summer from Paris, and chiffon or crepe is the language of love, even in pants. Sexy sheaths make sure the romance is enticing.

Hem lengths traveled from the floor to above the knee with no minis yet in sight. Exaggerated shoulders also disappeared.

Gold was the prevailing accent, from buttons to loafers at Lacroix, along with ruffles and wide-brimmed hats.

Torrente, opening the season, used chiffon dramatically, in capes, trains or simply as long scarves carressing the neck.

Sailor themes cropped up as a counterpoint to softness, with clean marine lines in navy or black and white.

Leaving Provencal behind for exotic Saharan climes, Lacroix draped reams of chiffon in flowing pants-skirts reminiscent of a gust of sand, embroidered and bejeweled raw silk, used lace almost relentlessly and gathered organza into sumptuous mountains.

His palette was above all the beige-tones and exotic pastels like melon and pistachio, mixed with bright poppy, Persian blue and black, white and navy.

Lacroix made good his gift for surprise, mixing rustic and fine fabrics in his 57 outfits, introducing the fringe and occasionally poking a hole in his pastel clouds with rhythmic lines and splashes of loud color.

Minimizing the waist, the "trapezium" and "pyramid" shapes prevailed for day wear at Lacroix.

It was pure charm in a powder pink shantung tunic which flared over cocoa-colored, silk linen "pencil" pants.

A pyramid coat-dress in verbenalinen, flared above the waist, or a Persian blue silk trapezium raincoat also had that demure charm.

Body-skimming softness or smoldering black lace, organza and raffia took over for after-hours when feminine turns female.

Lacroix revealed his knack for the spectacular with a few fringes. For daywear, he dressed up a khaki linen outfit with black embroidery on top and black fringes dancing on the skirt. A dramatic after-dark version featured gold and thread woven pajamas with a beaded floor-length fringe.

Pants-skirts or strapless jumpsuits, as elegant as gowns, were often topped with intricate embroidery or lace and worn under sumptuous jackets.

Typifying the mood of wistful romance was his number aptly entitled "Je t'aime" (I love you), a driftily vanilla-colored poncho of organza decorated with hand-painted flowers and collared with lace, worn over a sandy-colored chiffon pants-skirt.

PARIS (AP) — Pierre Cardin solved the problem of hemlines, showing splits that soar beyond the thigh in a spring-summer haute couture collection that is leggy, relaxed and refined.

The mood remained strictly feminine in six showings dominated by tender, wispy fabrics, bias cuts, body-hugging sheaths, oversized pants and plenty of pleats.

Balmain excelled in suits, and Nina Ricci turned out beautiful dresses for a quiet summer night.

Christian Dior went to the sari to achieve the draped look, using pyramid-shaped jackets for contrast in his less exotic fare.

But it was Cardin who proved the most daring with his "long-short" style. Refusing to say no to the "mini," he made it even tinier then covered it up — almost.

Suit skirts and dresses were slit front and back to the top of the thigh revealing a mini or little shorts. In a more elegant version, minis were covered with long flowing wraps fastened at the bodice or printed, accordion-pleated skirts.

In another variation, he covered some tight sheaths with cloak-like jackets, showing one particularly sultry version in a black slipper satin.

 Bidding at contract bridge is designed primarily to locate an eight-card major-suit fit. While there are times when a 4-3 fit proves adequate for game, usually, if you don't have a major fit, you investigate the possibilities at no trump and, as a last resort, a minor suit contract. But once in a while you find a strange trump suit, like this one from a recent pair event.

South's two-club opening bid was artificial and strong, and West's double, especially at this vulnerability, was naive—it was highly unlikely that his side had a profitable minor-suit sacrifice with his broken suit. By partnership agreement,

North's redouble showed a balanced hand with values, and South decided that he would take his chances at that contract!

There was little to the play. Declarer won the opening spade lead in hand, cashed two high diamonds and the ace of spades, then tried a third round of diamonds. West ruffed and exited with a low heart. Declarer ducked that round to his jack, cashed the ace and tried a third spade. West ruffed and was forced to lead a trump into declarer's ma-

nor tenace, so South ended up with eight tricks and a duplicate score of 760. (In tournament competition, the redoubled insult bonus is now worth 100 points.)

That turned out to be an absolute top. Left to their own devices, all the North-South pairs ended in a spade contract, making 11 tricks. Those that bid a slam were down one; the others scored 650.

Malkovich plays Valmont as mean, not evil

LOS ANGELES (AP) — You might expect an intensely serious actor such as John Malkovich to delve into 18th century French history in order to play a decadent aristocrat in "Dangerous Liaisons." Wrong.

"Mostly you just play the part as written," he admits. "People's behavior and the way they view the world and their very actions are just in the writing. Study the character's motivations and history? Not for me. Afraid not."

"Dangerous Liaisons" is based on Choderlos De Laclos' scandalous 1782 novel and Christopher Hampton's modern play "Les Liaisons Dangereuses." Malkovich as the unscrupulous Valmont connives with Glenn Close, another sex-obsessed aristocrat, in bedroom games that ruin the lives of several people.

"I wouldn't really describe Valmont as evil," the actor mused. "He has a lot of suspiciousness to him, and he does a lot of things that are really mean. But I don't think in the end that he is really evil."

"One of the things the picture is about is that he is unaware that he is capable of love, unaware that he is capable of feeling, unaware that he is capable of provoking that emotion in someone else. Once he discovers that he can do that, it goes against everything he has ever believed about himself. Finally it destroys him."

Malkovich seemed a reluctant recruit to Warner Bros.' hoopla for "Dangerous Liaisons." Although highly visible on the screen since his 1984 debut as the combat photographer in "The Killing Fields," he has maintained a low profile in the media. But he considered the selling of "Dangerous Liaisons" to be part of his job.

A soft-spoken man, he carefully chooses his words, as if wary of being misinterpreted. He bristled somewhat at the intimation that he was not exactly type-cast as the dashing, amorous Valmont.

"Any character I play is not like me, so it doesn't really matter what the differences are," he said. "If you're intimating that I'm not sex-charged or romantic, you may be completely

correct. I'm also not a psychopath or a robot or blind or anything else I play."

The stars of "Dangerous Liaisons" — Malkovich, Close, Michelle Pfeiffer — are American, and their speech is Americanized. This is part of the plan by the original producer,

Malkovich. "We tried to make a more or less concerted effort to sound not too American. Also we didn't want to sound English at all."

No chance of John Malkovich sounding English. He was born in the American heartland, in the small town of Benton, Ill. His life changed in 1973 when he happened into a drama class at Eastern Illinois University.

"I had a girlfriend who was an actress, and I knew absolutely nothing about theater or films," he said. "We didn't have theater within hundreds of miles of my hometown."

"So she was an actress, and I started following her around, watching rehearsals. Eventually, I started doing it myself. I kept doing it the last two years in school, then I met the people who started the Steppenwolf theater in Chicago. In '76 when we all left school, I went with them."

Malkovich became one of the pillars of Steppenwolf, with which he is still associated. He attracted rave reviews when the company played in New York, and he won an Obie in Sam Shepard's "True West." His

second film, "Places in the Heart," won him an Academy Award nomination as supporting actor, and he has followed with "Eleni," "Making Mr. Right," "The Glass Menagerie" and "Empire of the Sun."

He played Biff to Dustin Hoffman's Willy Loman in "Death of a Salesman" on Broadway and won an Emmy for the television version.

Were movies an early ambition? "No, it's not something I gave a lot of thought to."

Did it happen by accident? "I think we could say that. I did some plays and people asked me to do this film and that film and it sort of mushroomed and spiraled out of control."

Is film work as fulfilling as the theater?

"Rarely. This particular one, yes, because it was a particularly good part. I enjoyed the people I worked with, and I really cared about the story. Plus I worked a lot. Usually on films that doesn't happen. That's the thing that usually drives me nuts. There's so much waiting around. It's too long between times of working."

Yanni, 'E.T.' host Tesh team for don't-call-it-new-age tour

SAN FERNANDO, Calif. (AP) — A sudden gust of wind swirled through the courtyard of a rehearsal studio, stirring a set of chimes.

The two musician-composers sitting nearby had just been asked whether they liked the label "new age music" applied to their work.

"That," laughed John Tesh, referring to the tinkling wind chimes, "is new age music."

"And it puts me to sleep," said Yanni.

Tesh, the smooth-voiced co-host of TV's "Entertainment Tonight," and Yanni, a Greek-born composer and musician, were discussing their shared interest in so-called new age music. They also were discussing their continual struggle to overcome new age's lightweight reputation as music for crystal gazers.

The meditative quality and unchallenging melodies of some music labeled new age, has given it a deserved distinction as pretentious and boring, the two agreed.

"There is no real definition for new age music, and anytime you ask someone what new age music is, they talk for half an hour," said Yanni, 34, a native of Kalamata, Greece, who was a swimming champ in his country before coming to the United

States in 1973.

The classically trained pianist, who uses only one name, settled with his brother in Minneapolis. He learned English, and attended the University of Minnesota, majoring in psychology, before abandoning swimming and academics when he was first introduced to a synthesizer and saw the possibilities.

New York native Tesh, 36, has won two Emmys, but not for his work on the syndicated "Entertainment Tonight." The awards were for scores he composed for the televised coverage of the Pan American Games in 1983, and the Tour de France earlier this year. For "Tour de France," some of the compositions were completed minutes before airtime.

Tesh joined Yanni's band as a keyboard player for a recent national tour to promote Yanni's "Chameleon Days" LP. The "E.T." host worked his rehearsals around the TV show chores for a grueling month before the band, including bassist Joyce Imbesi and drummer Charlie Adams, hit the road.

Their record label, Private Music, uses the term "new music" — deleting "age" — to describe the output of its artists, and that may be closer to the mark. The National

Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences this year placed its new age award under the fusion category for the 1989 Grammy Awards.

New, new age, or jazz fusion — whatever you call it, the music is a product of 20 years' evolution in electronic keyboards, samplers, synthesizers and special equipment packages which can link several instruments at once.

Thus a car door slamming can be turned into a snare drum sound, as Tesh used in "You Are Here" from his "Tour de France" album. And Yanni's dextrous use of several keyboards, which he has programmed for each tune, has made him one of the premier performers of electronic music.

"It's the revolution of sound available to composers," said Yanni. "These years are very important. We've heard what a violin sounds like blended with a cello, blended with a French horn, blended with a grand piano. We have been doing this for hundreds of years. Now the sounds available have increased not 10 times but a billion times."

One artist can control several interfaced keyboards and program them for each song, sometimes playing sustained strings with one hand

while performing a fast piano break with the other, and all the while engineering the sounds.

"The attitude by which you play the keyboard has to change," said Yanni. "You have to be very flexible. You don't play the keyboard like a piano. If you have a French horn up as a sound, you don't go like this," he said, striking an imaginary piano key. "The mannerisms of a violin or harmonica and all that are very crucial. ... If you want a certain sound, you can't hit it hard, even if you're excited. And that can be very difficult when you are playing live."

Artists can, and do, cheat on this kind of music, with digital audio tapes or memory chips running part of the tune while they tend to other keyboard chores.

Minor leaguers, charges Tesh. "This is important, because when you hear these albums, people say 'Oh, great, they spent forever in a studio and the computers did it,' Tesh said. "I think it's safe to say that even the record company was blown away to see an artist they had known for three years stand up on stage and create the music live."

"We play music the old-fashioned way, with our hands and our feet," said Yanni's drummer Adams.

Stars flock to 'last' Jackson concert

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Singer Michael Jackson has apparently forsaken the concert stage at age 30, giving what was billed as his last performance.

Jackson, appearing an hour late after being mobbed backstage by celebrity well-wishers, took the stage Friday night amid a vapor mist and the deafening roar of a capacity crowd at the Los Angeles Sports Arena.

"Since this is the last concert there was a big mob scene backstage," publicist Lee Solters said early today. "A lot of people were wishing him well."

Dozens of stretch limousines were on hand, carrying stars such as actors Elizabeth Taylor, Jane Fonda, Raquel Welch and Michael Landon and singers Phil Collins, Dionne Warwick, Tiffany and members of the heavy metal group Motley Crue.

Many fans said they had waited weeks to see Jackson, who canceled December shows in Los Angeles because of strained vocal cords. Tickets for the farewell show were fetching prices well beyond their face value.

Sylvia Smith, 35, who attended the concert with her 9-year-old daughter, Barika, said she was offered \$100 for her \$27.50 loge seat but turned it

down. "It was tempting since I could've let Barika go in with her aunt and uncle," Smith said. "But she said, 'No Mommy, you gotta go.' And I figured it's Michael's last concert. I may as well be part of history."

Although Friday's show was billed as a farewell performance, Jackson's manager backed off from saying the reclusive performer would never appear in concert again.

"I'm not saying he's not going to perform live again, but I don't think we'll ever go out on tour like this," Frank Dileo said.

The show marked the end of Jackson's "Bad" tour, a grueling, 16-month effort that took him around the world.

Jackson, celebrated as widely for his eccentricities as for his songs, vocals and choreography, intends to keep recording and is considering film roles, Solters said.

Jackson, who hasn't granted an interview since 1984, is said to be interested in movies, writing, producing and directing.

Taking the stage accompanied by bodyguards, Jackson sang and danced his way through a number of his hits Friday night, backed by dancers dressed as punk rockers, monsters and street gang members.

He used his signature "moonwalk" movements to glide across stage, singing such songs as "Starting Something," "The Way You Make Me Feel" and "Man in the Mirror," as the audience howled and stomped in approval.

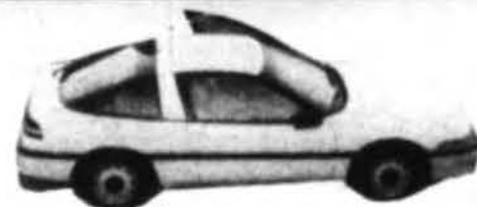

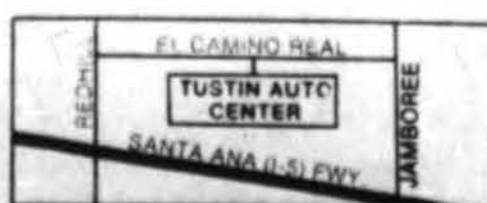
