WHO'S NEWS

Q: Georgetown freshman Alonzo Mourning, who came close to being the first high school player on the U.S. Olympic basketball team, is incredible at blocking shots. Who taught him how to do it?

— Darrell Williams, Dallas

A: He was born to block. Mourning, who leads the NCAA's Division I in shot blocking, credits God with his defense ability. And that ability has served him well. Last year, the 6-foot-10 forward was high school player of the year, and he more than doubled his idol Patrick Ewing's record of 13 blocks in a single AAU game with 27 of his own. Friendly yet guarded, Mourning lived in a foster home for much of the time he attended Chesapeake (Va.) Indian River High School. And though many say he could have gone directly from high school into pro ball, he's intent on getting a degree. Georgetown is playing in the Big East Conference Tournament, which heats up this weekend.

Q: I found Lou Diamond Phillips very convincing in the recent film *Young Guns*. What's his heritage?

— Theresa Congelosi, Ontario Center, N.Y.

A: Like his *Young Guns* character, Phillips, 27, is part Native American. He has Cherokee, Filipino and Scotch-Irish blood. Phillips married assistant director Julie Cypher before his *La Bamba* debut and they have a "little cottage" in Laurel Canyon, Calif. His next film: Disney's *Disorganized Crime*. Due April 14, the comedy also stars Corbin Bernsen of *L.A. Law*.

Q: President John F. Kennedy and his brother Robert gave their pay to charity. Does Robert's son Joseph P. Kennedy II, 36, do the same?

— Stacy Harris, Nashville

A: No. In the past few years, the congressman's donations to charity amounted to an average of \$11,000 a year. Favorite cause: homeless shelters. His uncle, Sen. Edward Kennedy, gives his entire salary of \$89,500 to charity.

Q: I heard Todd Bridges, who used to play Gary Coleman's older brother on TV's *Diff'rent Strokes*, was arrested for shooting a man five times, then stabbing him. Is that true? It's such a shame, he's been given so many opportunities. Wasn't he involved in another incident regarding his Porsche?

— Tara Evans, Jackson, Miss.

A: Right on both counts. Last month, Bridges, 23, was charged with attempted murder and held without bond for what police describe as a drug-related assault. It's one of Bridges' many brushes with the law since the show ended in 1985. In 1987,

he got a suspended sentence after pleading no contest to making a bomb threat in a dispute over work done on his car. In an unrelated matter, Coleman filed suit against his parents and former business adviser, claiming they got too much from his earnings.

Q: Where do I know Julia Louis-Dreyfus from? She plays child-hating Eileen Swift on NBC's *Day by Day*. Is she married?

— John Dowdy, Saginaw, Mich.

A: Formerly of NBC's *Saturday Night Live*, the comedian is married to Brad Hall, who worked with her on that show. Louis-Dreyfus, 28, says she loves children, though the kids on the show sometimes take her character's tirades seriously. "Sometimes they ask me if I mean what I say. But as they get to know me apart from the character I play, we're OK." That's not the only way she differs from her career-woman character. "I like to clean my house. I like to do my laundry. I'm not kidding. I don't know, it's sort of mindless, in a way, cathartic. It's fun."

Q: I adored the steamy best seller *Rock Star*. Who

would author Jackie Collins like to see play the lead characters?

— Eve Clare, New Britain, Conn.

A: On her wish list: "I'd like to see Sting or George Michael play the raunchy English rocker, Kris Phoenix," says Collins. "For the black superstar, I could see Mario Van Peebles. He's good looking and I think he'd be terrific." For power monger Marcus Citroen? "It would be great if he were played by a Jack Nicholson type." Actual casting should start soon and filming is expected to begin this summer.

A: Those little-town blues are melting away for the star of *Born Yesterday*, which got mixed reviews on Broadway after touring smaller cities.

In comedy, "You have to really feel as though you have this rod of electricity going through your body to give it a certain edge," says Kahn, in her lilting voice. The actors and audience feed off each other's energy, and New York crowds are especially energetic, says Kahn, who plays a dumb-like-a-fox blonde opposite Ed Asner.

She says doing theater elsewhere can sometimes be "like putting a jewel in the wrong setting. It just doesn't show up right." Also, Kahn makes her home nearby, in Manhattan.

The shy actress, 46, says her comedic talent "is an ability to observe and see what's funny in a situation and be able to forget yourself enough to do it." She considers it "a gift" that was enhanced by a mother who gave her the freedom to express who she was even if it was "odd."

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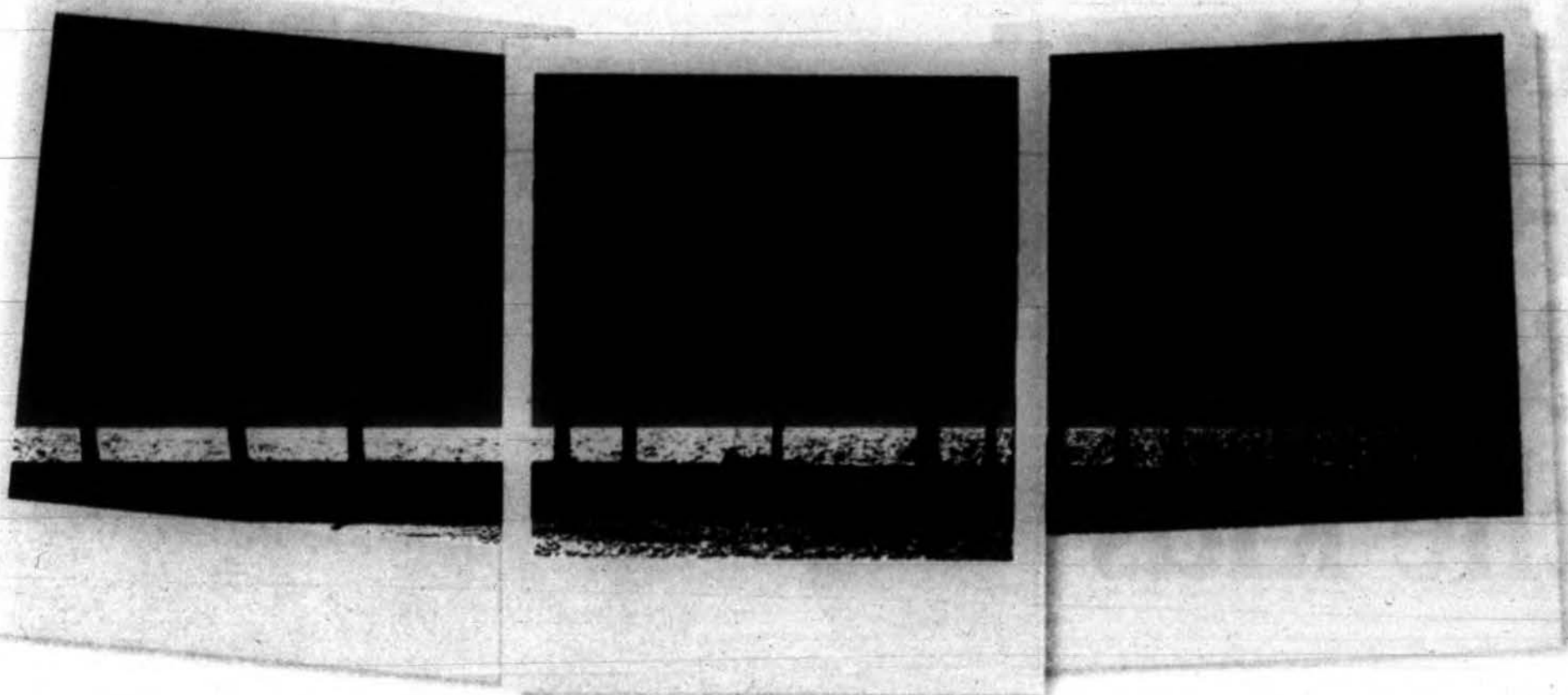
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Ryan, Farrah & the kids

'Our family is always going to attract attention,' says grandpop O'Neal of Farrah and the gang. O'Neal — whose movie 'Chances Are' is just out — talks about his jinxed marriage jaunt with Farrah; his idea to soften up son Griffin's jailers with her posters; and his role as Daddy for Redmond, 4.

RYAN O'NEAL IS LIMPING BADLY. He could say he twisted his knee while punching his heavy bag or pumping iron or smashing a racquetball. But O'Neal gleefully boasts it happened while jumping on a trampoline with his 4-year-old son, Redmond. "Mr. Boing-boing loves me to give him a bounce so he can go higher," O'Neal, 47, laughs between wincing. "I can play with him for hours. That's my life — taking care of my boy. Pretty simple stuff."

Not quite. O'Neal's life is a Jackie Collins novel come true. Branded early as a Hollywood bad boy, he swept *Charlie's Angel* Farrah Fawcett away from her *Six Million Dollar* husband Lee Majors — and even Redmond's arrival didn't make them wed. His Oscar-winning daughter, Tatum, is married to spoil sport tennis great John McEnroe. Son Griffin, whose "reckless boating" caused a friend's death, is trying to pull his life together.

O'Neal has handled the tumult by "turning inside," holing up at home, raising his and Fawcett's baby, refusing interviews. But this weekend, as his new movie *Chances Are* opens across the country, he's ready to talk about "my Farrah" and his work.

"*Chances Are* is a kind, decent picture," says O'Neal, who plays Cybill Shepherd's lovelorn friend in the romantic comedy. "But mostly I'm offered Rambo rip-offs. I'm pretty much semi-retired. I don't want to be in any more bad pictures, so I'm not in a hurry anymore."

Not that there haven't been staggering offers. If he and Fawcett would return to television together, they

could write their own ticket.

"We can do *anything*," he says, almost in disbelief. "One producer would guarantee Farrah and me \$2 million for the first few episodes. Could you imagine what we could do to this house after five years of television?"

The house isn't exactly a fixer-upper now. Perched atop a ridge that offers sweeping views of Los Angeles and the Pacific, adjacent to Wilt Chamberlain's ultimate bachelor's retreat, the white Cape Cod-style home features a black-bottom pool, basement racquetball court, two rooms of exercise equipment for parents and a wooden jungle gym for Redmond.

In the living room is an Andy Warhol portrait of Fawcett and a grand piano. In the den: a train set and an inflated, plastic *Tyrannosaurus rex*. Dozens of framed magazine covers and posters of Fawcett, including the famed *Charlie's Angels* pose, hang in the hallway. Obviously missing: a wedding photo.

"One photo agency offered to put on the biggest wedding ceremony of all time," says O'Neal. "They'd fly in all our friends from anyplace we wanted."

ed. All we had to do was show up — and allow them the photo exclusive.

"We've been offered money to get married lots of times." He pauses, flashing a devilish grin. "But it was never enough."

Actually, they were just one tank of gas away from quickly and quietly marrying while on vacation in Tahoe three years ago.

"We were heading for the church but we ran out of gas," Fawcett says, laughing. "It was a blizzard and no one would stop for us. It took hours to get back to a

warm place and, by that time, we were no longer in the wedding mood."

O'Neal has more than the memory tucked away. "I still have the rings. I don't know what color they are now because I got them for \$30, just to have something to put on her."

They both intend to say "I do" eventually. "Ryan is much more interested in home and family than I am," Fawcett says. "We will definitely get married. We just haven't found the right time. I feel married now. We're together as much as possible."

Ryan and Farrah try to shelter their son, Redmond. "You just have to put a blindfold on him, to get him through his early life," says Ryan, who spends most of his time with the boy.



They met nearly a decade ago, when she was married to Lee Majors and O'Neal was twice divorced, with three kids.

"Lee asked if I played racquetball, which I never did," O'Neal recalls. "I reluctantly agreed to come over to the house and Farrah cooked dinner. She had trouble getting rid of me from then on."

"Looking back, I would have never hesitated. 'Is Farrah up there? Hell, I'll be right over.'"

Recently, all three dined at the same restaurant and Majors sent a bottle of wine to their table. It was the first time Fawcett had seen him in about seven years.

"We sent Redmond over to say thank you," O'Neal says. "Our son has very good manners."

Especially around Fawcett. "I'm the one who is tough with Redmond," she says. "One 'what-did-I-tell-you-about-this' and he knows I mean business. He knows he can get away with more things around Ryan."

In fact, O'Neal thinks it's cute when his 4-year-old says a swear word that begins with an F and in most homes ends in a spanking. "He can say that in front of me and he can't say that in front of Mom. He's such a sweetheart."

O'Neal believes he's a better father with Redmond than with his first kids. "You know, I was 20 years old when I got married and 21 when Tatum was born. I was a young 21. I'd diaper her and then she'd diaper me. Now I feel much more capable. I can handle a lot more diapers."

Thankfully so. In addition to Redmond, he's the grandfather of Tatum's two sons: Kevin, nearly 3, and Sean, 18 months. "As long as they don't call me 'Gramps,' I don't mind. I don't count white chest hairs. I still can move pretty good."

O'Neal, 6-foot-1 and 170 pounds, is a natural athlete

in everything from surfing to fencing. He began in Hollywood as a stuntman on TV's *Tales of the Vikings* before landing bit parts on shows including *Dobie Gillis* and *Bachelor Father*.

He won national attention during five years of shotgun weddings, divorces and murder frame-ups on the evening soap *Peyton Place*. Then came his biggest role: Harvard preppie Oliver Barrett IV opposite Ali MacGraw in the five-hanky *Love Story*.

"My mother said to me at the time, 'Get this part. Fight, wrestle, bite, claw. Get this part,'" O'Neal recalls. "I tested with 47 other guys (including Jon Voight and Beau Bridges). But when Ali gave me this deep kiss, I knew she liked me. Then my friend saw the test and I said, 'How about that kiss?' He said, 'Hey, she kissed every guy like that.' I was very disappointed."

Only temporarily. O'Neal got the role, a 1970 best-actor Oscar nomination and enough momentum to become one of the decade's most-wanted men.

Now O'Neal is seeing that momentum again. But this time the rising star isn't him — it's Fawcett.

The ex-Angel shocked critics and won respect with *The Burning Bed*, a TV drama in 1984. Hollywood hasn't seen such a career turnaround since Sally Field lost her *Flying Nun* habit.

"She's had a lot of work, so I've had things to do," says O'Neal, who likes to coach Fawcett. "We can have acting class 24 hours a day," she says. While she was preparing for *Extremities*, a play and movie in which her character caged a rapist in a fireplace, O'Neal crawled into their fireplace so she could rehearse thoroughly.

O'Neal hopes to direct Fawcett in a film loosely based on the life of Candy Barr, an L.A. stripper of the '50s. And he says, "I'd love to do some comedy with this girl. We've been offered a few plays in London but never a real movie together."

But forget about making Redmond a child actor. "We could pave the way and the kid could probably have his own series," O'Neal says. "But it would be fine

if he didn't act."

He regrets launching Tatum in Hollywood. Father and daughter co-starred in 1973's *Paper Moon* and, at 10, Tatum became the youngest Oscar winner ever.

"I never expected Tatum to be an actress. Had she been paid for *Paper Moon*, that would have been it. After *Paper Moon* she was a student again. She was getting good grades. Movies were fleeting. We were driving and she said, 'With my money, my sixty thousand dollars, I'm going to buy a horse ranch.'"

"I said, 'What SIXTY thousand? It's SIX thousand, honey.'"

"She said, 'But I got the Academy Award.'"

"I told her, 'It's the second movie where you make the money.'"

"She said, 'Oh, I guess I better do another one.' A week later, *Bad News Bears* came in the mail. She made the money — and she was hooked."

O'Neal's son Griffin was hooked on acting, too, but his promising career was crushed by tragedy. First, a teeth-jarring punch-out between father and son in 1983 ended with Griffin in a drug rehab center. In 1986, Griffin was found guilty of "reckless boating" after the death of his friend Gian-Carlo Coppola, son of director Francis Ford Coppola. When Griffin violated his parole, he spent 15 days in a Maryland jail this year. O'Neal, who spent 51 days in jail in 1960 for brawling, wrote Griffin a letter with some money and an interesting offer enclosed: "Maybe some of your jailers would be interested in signed posters from Farrah to make it a little easier for you."

"Poor Griff," O'Neal sighs. "He came for dinner before he surrendered himself. He was ashen. Poor dear. He was so scared. Griffin has a tendency to dig deeper holes for himself. But, I think when he climbs out of this one, he'll have a better sense about himself."

"I was thinking of visiting him but then I said, 'Why? So *Entertainment Tonight* can run up to us?' I didn't want this. I never dreamed of this."

"But our family is always going to attract attention. Under the circumstances, I've learned to take deep breaths — and try to be nice."

RYAN TALKS ABOUT FAMILY

With so many tumultuous relatives around him, it's no wonder that Ryan O'Neal, 47, is content to sit back and be Redmond's Daddy and Farrah's Man. Here's Ryan on Farrah, his four kids and son-in-law:

Companion Farrah Fawcett, 42:

Her next film, *'See You in the Morning,'* is out in April. "I love Farrah, and I'm very supportive of her success. I'm content to step back. But if (Lawrence of Arabia director) David Lean was trying to reach me, I'd step all over Farrah to get to him."

Their son Redmond, 4:

"Whenever he sees someone on television, he says, 'There's Mommy.' It isn't always. Sometimes it's Donna Dixon. I can't wait to tell him Farrah Fawcett is his mother."



His son Griffin, 24:

Out of jail, case closed, in the "reckless boating" that caused a friend's death. "He's a good kid. I just don't know when all this is going to be behind him — if it ever will."



His daughter Tatum, 25, and son-in-law John McEnroe, 29:

She's in a CBS *Schoolbreak Special* March 28; the three-time Wimbledon champ plays tennis with in-laws.

"When Tatum was pregnant, Farrah and I would hit everything to her, but he backed her up. She ducks behind the net and he controls the whole court. He's a great athlete to watch. I have been able to take John in racquetball — he was in jeans and I'm in headband and goggles and body protector. And I've boxed John. He can't fight. Tatum can fight. She has a good left jab. I taught her. And Redmond, too."

His son Patrick, 21:

The quietest of O'Neal's kids.

"Patrick is thinking of becoming an actor rather than finishing college." O'Neal pauses in disgust. "Yeah, isn't that great?"

Dining in silver-screen style

Menus to celebrate the 50th birthday of 1939 Oscar winners

Fifty years ago, a slew of famous films grabbed Oscars and our hearts forever — making 1939 the most golden year in Oscar history.

Happily, many of those movies — as well as many other Oscar winners or contenders — are as close as your local video store. So why not invite your favorite film fanatics for dinner, and check out one of these 1939 classics?

Among the Oscar-winners celebrating 50 years this year: *Gone with the Wind*, which got 13 nominations and won 8 Oscars; *The Wizard of Oz*, with 16-year-old Judy Garland singing "Over the Rainbow;" *Mr. Smith Goes to Washington* and *Stagecoach*, in which young Jimmy Stewart and John Wayne each got their first big roles.

While none of these movies is about food — at least not as overtly as *Tom Jones* or *Babette's Feast* — they all suggest certain delectables (the recipes for which can be found in any good, basic cookbook, such as *Joy of Cooking*).

So let's begin with that character of great appetites — Miss Scarlett.

► *Gone With the Wind* (MGM): Well fiddle-dee-dee, fried chicken comes to mind immediately. It's perfectly acceptable — remember Mammy tried to get Scarlett to eat a chicken leg so she wouldn't pig out in front of the Tarleton twins at the neighbor's barbecue.

But for a real Old South treat, think about that bird in another, very comforting guise: creamed chicken over waffles. Add a salad with a few bitter greens — endive, chicory — tossed in to recall Scarlett in the devastated gardens of Tara. End on a bittersweet note: strawberries dipped in chocolate. And leave the dishes — you can think about them tomorrow.

► *The Wizard of Oz* (MGM): This children's fantasy by L. Frank Baum calls for kid-pleasing foods. Start with Witches Brew (grape juice, orange juice and gingerale). Move on to oven-baked drumsticks (Dorothy and friends all had "legs" for the trip down the Yellow Brick Road). Sauté some Kansas corn kernels in a little butter with minced green onions and red bell peppers.

For an Emerald City Fantasy, fill a tall, fancy mold with lime gelatin and fruit; chill lemon gelatin in a shallow pan and cut in small "bricks." Unmold the lime gelatin and surround with the yellow bricks. Dessert: sugar cookies cut like Dorothy's ruby slippers and coated with red sprinkles.

► *Mr. Smith Goes to Washington* (RCA/Columbia): Jimmy Stewart as Jefferson Smith, a country boy and scout leader, ascends to the U.S. Senate and rises above widespread corruption and pork-barrel politics.

Settle in with the adventures of Stewart and his clever secretary Jean Arthur, and serve everyone a big bowl of U.S. Senate Navy Bean Soup — a favorite in Congress today — and biscuits (battered on the right side). Move on to a spinach salad with bacon (the pork-barrel part) in a sweet-tangy dressing (the Jean Arthur part). By the time Smith's 23-hour filibuster starts, serve Mom's apple pie. Hurray for democracy!

► *Stagecoach* (Warner Home Video): John Ford revived the Western, which had sunk to B-movie depths, with this tale of eight strangers on a stagecoach journey. He didn't win the Oscar for direction (Victor Fleming did for *GWTW*), but the New York Film Critics anointed him best director.

Serve your friendly cavalry of eaters an oven-baked brisket, or try barbecuing a London broil, if your grill is in commission. And give them a side of pinto beans, coleslaw and cornbread.

Creative Easter Activities

So if you liked part one of this series, you better not miss Part II, because now we're really hoppin'!

Drawing once again from my yet-unfinished, masterpiece how-to book, "Beyond Jellybeans," I'll use my primary qualification as an eggs-pert on Easter and its celebration: As you can tell by my name, I'm a genuine, furry, floppy-eared bunny! Oh, yes: a tip of my painter's cap to the archivists at Hallmark Cards, Inc. for all of the background help they've given me!

To help you celebrate Easter with your children, my co-horts and I (collectively known to many as E. Bunny and Co.) have come up with another basketful of Easter creativity:

Home Decorating

A superb first hop toward celebrating any holiday, including Easter, is to decorate your home.

- Decorative baskets are my personal favorite for this holiday. Baskets of all sizes, shapes and forms can be used as both centerpieces for your tables and as holders for your children's candy and eggs. Baskets also serve as a keepsake that can be handed down through the years or as creative gifts for family and friends.

- A fun and creative way of involving your children in decorating is to make paper Easter eggs. Easter Egg Hunt

As part of a custom all over the world, children have the opportunity to search for hidden eggs on Easter day. To spice up your Easter egg hunt, we've come up with these new twists:

- Using plastic eggs, you can either give your children varying amounts of dollars and change, or you can give them coupons they can redeem for candy bars and other candies. This way, the children don't know what they are finding until they open the eggs and find the change or read the coupons! A variation on this would be to have a game where you use real or plastic eggs and the children receive prizes based on the number of eggs they find. (Just a reminder: If you're using real eggs, make sure you note where you hide each one so you can avoid finding one four months later...especially if you're hiding them in the house!)

- Here's one to try: Give the children a list of specific directions they can use to find the eggs. Directions like, "Take 13 steps toward the swingset and then five to your right" turns an egg hunt into a treasure hunt! You could give each child a different set of directions and have a stuffed bunny waiting at the end of the trail. This way each child is guaranteed to receive a bunny in addition to any eggs that may be hidden! Make sure you don't make it too hard for the little ones or too easy for the older ones.

- A popular place to hold any and all Easter-egg hunts is at a local park! If the weather is permitting, you can combine your Easter-egg hunt with a family picnic. Parks seem to make perfect grounds for hiding eggs, and if you're lucky, maybe some of my relatives will be watching!

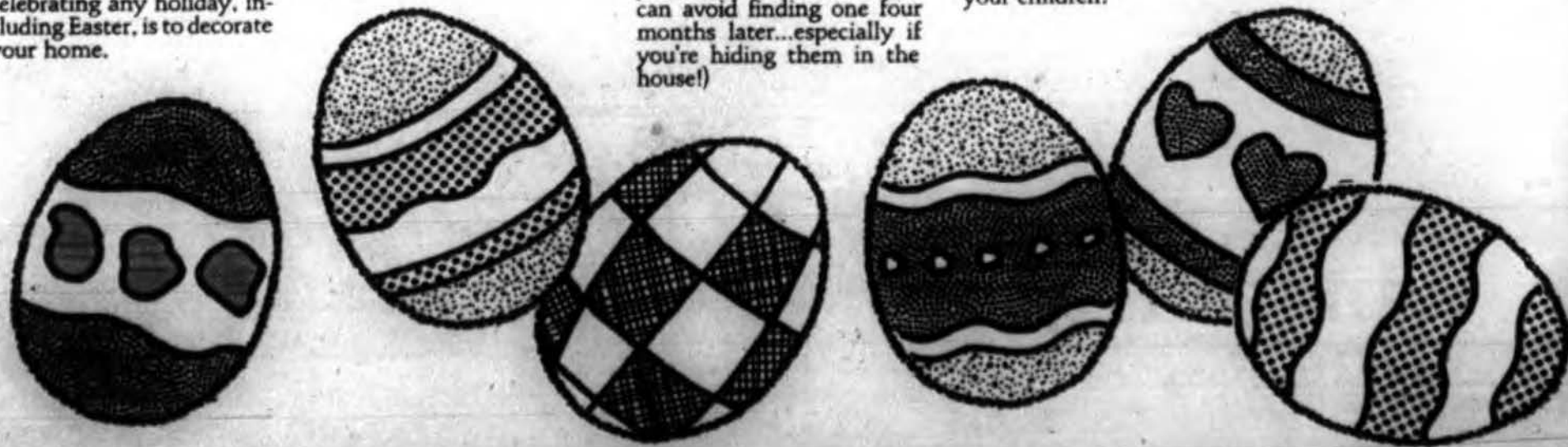
Good luck in making this Easter a hopping good time for you and your children, and I'm sure if you use some of the ideas I've given you, Easter will be something wonderfully personal for your children!

Stride for health: Take a hike

A strolling boom is afoot as more of us take to the trails

"Take a hike" has gone from taunt to trend.

Nearly 20 million people headed into the countryside on leisurely or brisk, hours-long and day-long foot trips last year.

Call it a calorie burner with a view. "We're seeing

a strong trend toward activities that blend being outdoors with getting in shape," says Harvey Lauer of American Sports Data.

Hiking probably will be among the top 10 leisure activities in a few years, joining golf and aerobics, says Lauer.

"It's something everyone can do: old, young and families," adds Susan Henley of the American Hiking Society, whose membership doubled to 3,600 in the past year.

But hiking shouldn't be confused with backpacking, where you load your back with half your possessions and head out for several days of camping.

"Hiking is a great way to get and stay in shape," says Mary Hart, hostess of *Entertainment Tonight*, and an avid hiker since age 8. "Plus, it gives you peace of mind." She should know: She

has hiked trails in Arizona, Utah, Colorado, Montana, the Black Hills of South Dakota, California and Canada.

"When we lived in Sweden, Denmark and France, my mother would pack a big lunch, hot chocolate, the works, and we'd go out into the mountains on all-day hikes."

And for those who don't think of her as the down-and-sweaty type, Hart cheerfully reports she heads out with no makeup — just sunscreen — and sweats away. "This is not vanity hiking," she laughs. What do you get for the sweat? A brisk hike can burn 600 calories and up per hour.

To stay in shape between

treks, Hart walks around town and does aerobics — her exercise videotape, *Shape Up With Mary Hart* (Avon, \$19.95), is out this week.

With 12,000-plus miles of trails in national and state park systems, hiking is for everyone.

Some of the more offbeat, lesser-known sites:

► **Bandelier National Monument:** 30 miles of trails in north-central New Mexico; runs through canyons of the Pajarito Plateau and 13th-century Pueblo Indian cliff houses.

► **The Ozark Highlands Trail** starts in northwestern Arkansas and runs 168 miles to Tennessee with spectacular ridge-top views and waterfalls.

► **Sheltowee Trace** in Kentucky's Daniel Boone National Forest cuts 254 miles north-to-south across the state, through hardwood forest and gorges, past lakes and waterfalls.

► **The North Country Trail** runs from the lakes and mountains of

New York's Adirondacks to the plains of North Dakota. When finished, it will be the USA's longest scenic trail.

All the parks offer hikes that can last hours or days. Pick up maps or design your own. The trick is to know your limit.

For beginners, start out with hikes of less than six miles on relatively easy terrain. Once you

have the hang of it and have broken in your boots, tackle the steep grades and 20-milers.

Finding trails can be as easy as contacting your local parks department or the National Park Service.

Says Hart: "It's a great way to sort out problems or just enjoy natural beauty."

Where to take a hike on the not-so-wild side . . .

If you want outdoor trips with some indoor pampering, Vermont Hiking Holidays in Bristol, Vt., offers hikes that go from inn to inn. During weekend and five-day hikes, you'll travel in six- to eight-mile increments. Cost: \$200 and up. A sampling:

- Walk along stretches of the Appalachian Trail in Massachusetts on the Berkshires ramble, with a detour up Mount Greylock for a three-state view. May through September.
- Antique-filled inns punctuate wan-

derings through Vermont's lush Green Mountains on the Blueberry Hill hike. May through October.

► Meander through the southern end of the Blue Ridge Mountains on this North Carolina hike. Pass waterfalls and gorges, with inns nestled in valleys with spectacular views. April through October.

For information about hikes in general or in your area, contact the American Hiking Society, 1015 31st St. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20007.

. . . and what to bring along with you

One of the attractions of hiking is that it's simple. You don't need hundreds of dollars of high-tech equipment, fancy clothes or lessons.

What you do need:

- **Footgear:** Tennis shoes usually are fine for short hikes. Hiking shoes (\$40-\$70) should be big enough so you can wear thick socks, but not so big your foot slides on downhill walks.
- **Daypack:** lightweight with padded straps. \$20-\$30.
- **Water:** Take at least a quart per per-

son for hikes over 10 miles.

► **Munchies.** Bring a sandwich and some candy bars. Trail mix is a great constant-flow energy builder; make your own out of equal parts of raisins, peanuts and chocolate chips.

► **Summer hiking:** Wear a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen.

► **For cold weather:** Layer a turtle-neck, one or two wool shirts and a windbreaker-type jacket.

► **First aid:** bandages, moleskins (for blisters), antiseptic cream.

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Tampa: Pro's hometown is a vacation hit

Baseball's rising star Tino Martinez is a big fan of Florida's spring-training fun

Baseball's spring training is in full swing, which means it's time to pack your sunscreen and head to Florida.

At least that's how baseball player Tino Martinez, Olympic gold-medalist at the 1988 World Championships, sees it. Martinez, 21, thinks his hometown of Tampa is the perfect prospect for the traveling fan. If you haven't time to get there this year for spring training, try next spring — or even the "off season."

"People who come to Tampa will find there's lots to do," says Martinez. A first-round draft choice, he will play first base for the Seattle Mariners, who hold spring training in Tempe, Ariz.

Martinez, who lives with his parents and brother Tony in the off-season, calls Tampa "a great place to grow up. It's a family kind of town."

Visitors will find it's a big small town with a Latin heart. An old cigar-making city, it dishes up everything from Cuban sandwiches and seafood paella to museums, baseball and barefooting on the beach — all with a Spanish flavor.

Eighteen of baseball's 26 teams train in Florida, seven within an hour's drive of Tampa (see box below for details).

Watching the greats at bat was a childhood ritual in the Martinez family. "My dad would take my brothers and me out of school for the afternoon if the Yankees were in town."

Afternoons away from the ballparks can easily be filled with food and sight-seeing: Shop in restored Hyde Park. Take the monorail to Harbour Island, with its trendy shops and eateries, and cruise the harbor in paddleboats or gondolas; evenings, dance in a '50s atmosphere at

Blueberry Hill, a waterfront café with outdoor seating where the waitresses dress like cheerleaders.

At the hub of Tampa's tourist action is Busch Gardens, 10 minutes north of downtown. The 300-acre park features thrill rides, live entertainment, animal shows and a vast, safari-style zoo.

For lunch, don't leave town without munching a landmark Cuban sandwich — smoked ham, roast pork, salami, Swiss cheese and pickles on crunchy Cu-

ban bread. It's available in many eateries, but the Silver Ring in Ybor City, Tampa's Latin Quarter, ranks with the best. Martinez also recommends Ybor City's Columbia Restaurant, with its elaborate tile work and flamenco dinner shows.

For visitors who want to mix culture with their baseball, Tampa now boasts one of the world's best acoustically designed concert halls, the new Tampa Bay Performing Arts Center. Its theaters attract top talent, but without New York's

skyscraper prices.

Also off the field, warm spring temperatures may lure fans to neighboring Pinellas County, bordered with 28 miles of white sand beaches, from St. Petersburg to Tarpon Springs.

"Clearwater Beach is the best for action," Martinez suggests, though it's not the warm waters that attract him. "It's the place to go for girl-watching."

Game's rained out? "You could tour the cigar factories for free and see how they make them by hand," Martinez should know. His family has been in the business for years and co-owns Villazon & Co. in West Tampa, makers of hand-rolled cigars.

For something on the surreal side, the Salvador Dali Museum in St. Petersburg houses the world's largest collection of the late artist's work.

For get-involved exhibits, take the kids to the Great Explorations: Hands-On-Museum, also in St. Petersburg.

Which restaurants does Tino consider a home run? "If I want good Spanish food, I go to Café Pépe. I almost always get the trout or grouper Russian-style" (broiled or fried fish topped with egg, peppers and onions).

For award-winning Northern Italian cuisine, try Lauro Ristorante, downtown in the new Ashley Tower. A Tampa landmark, Bern's Steak House, whose motto is "art in steaks," has a wine list the size of a big-city phone book, plus the fancy after-hours Harry Wagh Dessert Room. The Macadamia Nut Fudge sundae (\$3.50) is a grand slam.

Yes, but I dropped out. I didn't feel a strong rapport with the troop leader and I came back to my parents and said, "Hey, I'm out of there." I liked my time with the Brownies. 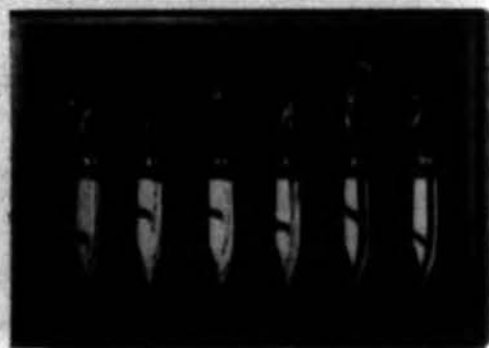

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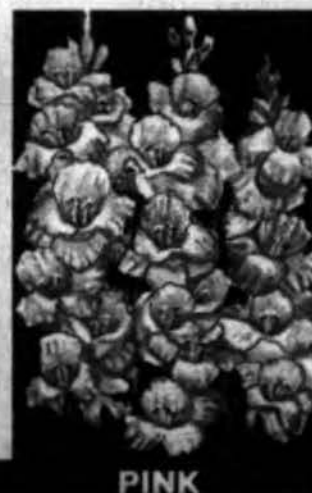
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'Matlock' enjoying a third successful season on NBC

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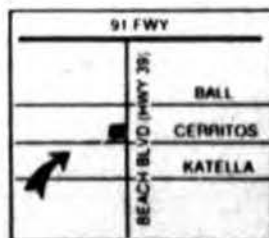

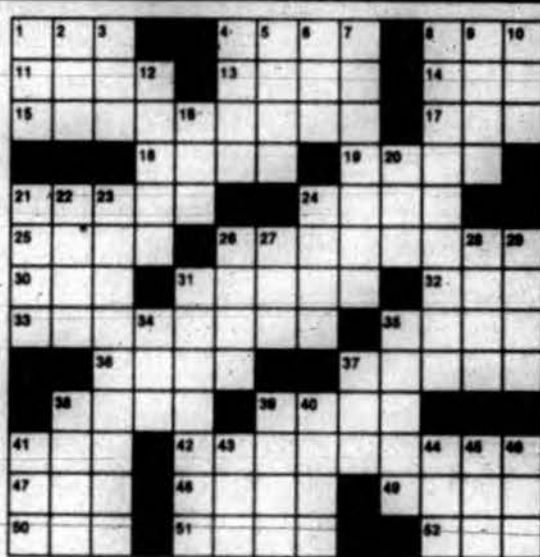

\$1.3 million in computer chips taken

Computer chips and circuit boards valued at more than \$1.3 million were stolen over a six-month period from a computer manufacturer in Irvine, according to police reports.

AST Research Inc. reported its biannual inventory showed the loss had occurred between July 5, 1988, and Jan. 4, 1989, said Irvine Police Lt. Mike White. The company filed the report with Irvine police this week.

Joel Don, public relations supervisor for the international firm that is headquartered in Irvine, said the theft totaled more than \$1.3 million.

An internal investigation revealed employees were

behind the theft and several have been fired. Don could not say how many.

The investigation is continuing, and Don suggested charges could be filed.

"We haven't charged anyone at this date," he said. Parts stolen included microprocessor chips, which are the basic brain of personal computers. The chips were manufactured by the Intel Corp. and worth an estimated \$550,000.

The remainder of the stolen items were mother boards, which include a personal computer's main circuits and microprocessor, and memory expansion boards that plug into the mother board. The mother boards measure 14-by-14 inches.

Don said the internal thefts were the first to plague the firm.

When the losses were first discovered, AST security began monitoring and investigating, which resulted in the firings.

In addition, Don said the firm has tightened control of computer parts and instituted new security measures.

AST manufactures personal computers and software. The international firm has corporate headquarters, engineering and manufacturing divisions in Irvine. It also owns manufacturing plants in Taiwan and Hong Kong.

Consistently profitable, AST was listed by Business Month magazine as 24th among the top 200 fastest growing large public companies.

It reported sales of \$442 million in 1988 and a \$15.3 million profit.

However, it announced an \$8.9 million loss for the last quarter. Don said it was the result of a one-time "write down" from the planned sale of Camintonn, a manufacturing division also located in Irvine.

While the employee theft was the largest to hit AST, the firm's warehouse at 16700 Aston was the scene of an armed robbery in January when three machine gun-toting men stole an estimated \$9,000 worth of computer chips.

Officials say memory chips have been in tight supply in recent months, prompting some computer firms to turn to the black market where they pay inflated prices and don't ask questions.

Optimism key ally of Irvine teen with reattached hand

Irvine teen-ager Jason Pinches has lost some body muscle and his ever-precious tan, but none of his optimism since he severed his hand three months ago.

The 15-year-old's left hand successfully reattached by Orange County surgeons, is looking "great," according to Jason, but still doesn't have much feeling.

Yet the freak accident with a miter saw hasn't held the active teen back from school, swimming (his favorite pastime) or planning an upcoming trip to Germany.

"The scar's looking real good — it really blends in," the upbeat teen said in a recent interview.

Jason's hand was severed from just below the thumb to the base of the little finger. The accident happened on Dec. 10 when he was helping his father work on the family's recently purchased second home in Newport Beach.

The miter saw Jason was using to cut a piece of door molding shipped and sliced off the hand. He was airlifted to UCI Medical Center in Orange and underwent about 11 hours of microsurgery conducted by a team of surgeons led by replantation pioneer Dr. Bruce Achauer.

The doctors reattached all of the hand except the badly damaged little finger and predicted the youth would recover 90 percent use after a year of therapy.

Praised by his father as being extremely positive and very much in control after the accident, Jason spent less than a week in the hospital.

Luckily, winter vacation came up immediately after his release, allowing the youth to rest at home before going back to class.

Since then, he has gone to therapy for an hour each day and has his hand checked by Achauer once a week. "They really worked my hand, moved it back and forth," he said.

He has attended his classes at University High School as usual — he's right-handed, fortunately — and has continued almost all of his athletic activities, with one exception.

"I can't ski — that's the only thing that kinda depressed me because I love to ski," he said. "But that's only one season."

He has, however, continued swimming and plans to be back on the University High water polo team when the season starts in the fall. He said he could have returned to the school's swimming team this season, but a second surgery on his left hand interrupted.

That surgery, conducted by Achauer several weeks ago, involved transplanting nerves from Jason's ankle into his hand.

"It went pretty well," Jason said. "It took six hours. I was only in the hospital (UCI Medical Center) one day."

The nerve graft was necessary because of continued stiffness and lack of feeling in his injured fingers and joints, Achauer said. The doctor has also prescribed additional therapy.

"We expect he will get some return of feeling there," Achauer said. "It'll take more than a year to get the final

results."

The hand is progressing as expected, Achauer said. Around spring or early summer, Jason will probably undergo a final surgery to loosen up his tendons and joints, the doctor said.

All should be well enough for Jason to go overseas at the end of July. He plans to accompany a friend and his mother on a month trip to Germany.

The cheerful youth said he has not experienced any pain throughout this ordeal. He said his hand has simply felt "tingly" at times.

"They had me on codeine, but I

didn't need it," he said. "There's really no pain... a lot of discomfort, but really no pain. So I don't have to be drugged up."

What's more painful for him is that he hasn't been able to be in the pool daily, as he used to. The reduction in swimming time has caused him some problems, he said.

"I am really skinny (from the loss of muscle)," the tall youth said with a laugh. "And I'm losing my tan. It scares me. I hope as soon as possible, I can get back in the water and get my tan back."

Report says tab for OC toll roads now at \$2 billion

The projected cost for three proposed Orange County toll roads has risen to \$2 billion, nearly double the original estimates, and could climb still higher, according to a private consultant's report to the Transportation Corridor Agency.

However, a spokesperson for the agency — which represents the San Joaquin Hills, Foothill and Eastern transportation corridors — said the estimates have expanded partly because the concept for the roads has changed over the past five years.

"The scope has expanded dramatically on all three," said Donna Stubbs, manager of public affairs for the agency. "Today's transportation corridors are not what they were making estimates on before. They've changed considerably."

For example, the roads, which are expected to be built by 1992, were all smaller when they were first planned and none were envisioned as toll roads, according to Stubbs. In addition, original estimates did not include design costs, she said.

The report was delivered to the corridor boards last week by a private consulting firm, Corridor Design Management Group.

At the same time, board members unanimously agreed to allow a \$10,000 pay raise to the executive director of the Transportation Corridor Agencies, John Meyer.

Meyer, who has headed the agency for 2½ years, will now be paid \$95,000 a year, a 12 percent increase over his previous salary. The raise represents a cost-of-living adjustment and a bonus, Stubbs said. It is his second raise since taking the job.

Meyer had been criticized for construction delays on the San Joaquin Hills corridor, which Stubbs said were caused by the need to respond to more than 1,100 comments received regarding the environmental impact report, a process which took nine months.

When Meyer first joined the agency in 1986, official estimates on the cost for the three roads was \$1.3 billion. From the beginning, Meyers has maintained the roads would cost from \$1.5 billion to \$2 billion, Stubbs said.

Although some have projected the cost will rise still higher, Stubbs said \$2 billion — in 1988 dollars — is a reasonable estimate.

"Two billion at this point is certainly realistic," she said. "We're working on really nailing down some cost estimates in the next 30 days."

Administrators say emergency medical care suffering

DENVER (AP) — Emergency medical care at public hospitals is suffering due to increases in AIDS patients, drug overdose cases and elderly patients, as well as cuts in government funding, according to hospital administrators.

The problem is so severe that patients requiring emergency treatment face up to a three-day wait for hospital beds in the New York City area, and waits of up to 18 hours in Los Angeles and 12 hours in Miami, said Larry S. Gage, president of the National Association of Public Hospitals.

Gage said hospitals in Boston, Chicago, St. Louis, Washington, D.C. and even Memphis, Tenn., are severely strained. Doctors are facing a challenge to their

Hippocratic oath — to give patients bad treatment in some cases or no treatment at all, he said.

"We are rationing health care for the poor in a necessary, aggressive way," he said.

Gage was one of more than a dozen speakers at an emergency conference Friday on indigent care sponsored by the public hospitals association. The association serves 85 public and non-profit hospitals.

"We know what to do, we just don't have the resources," said Arthur Kellerman, medical director of the emergency department at Regional Medical Center in Memphis. "We are being put in the position of having to give inadequate care to our patients. We have situations where we have one doctor, two nurses and 30 patients in

the emergency room."

Kellerman said a crisis has occurred in the past two years because hospitals have reduced total beds under pressure from the federal and state governments. Medicare funding has been cut, and more and more people are without adequate hospital insurance.

In addition, many hospitals have instituted cost-containment programs at government urging at a time when victims of acquired immune deficiency syndrome are increasing.

Hospitals also are seeing more drug overdoses as a result of rising crack cocaine use, and more elderly are being sent to hospitals rather than nursing homes, he said.

In Denver, the problem was so severe Thursday night

that five of nine hospitals were on "ambulance diversion" — not accepting any new emergency patients — because there were no critical care beds available, said Kellerman.

Charity Hospital in New Orleans lost its certification in part because of a staffing shortage as a result of budget cuts, he said.

Kellerman said some hospitals have worsened the situation by phasing out their emergency rooms.

In Los Angeles, for example, most central public hospitals have closed their emergency rooms, and people have to travel 30 minutes to a suburban hospital for treatment, he said. Besides endangering patients' lives, this also hurts the community by taking ambulances out of service for long periods of time, he said.

children's theaters.

"When you have six children and have come from that type of environment, it was just a normal thing to be involved in."

Ebsen said she studied at a very unusual school in Illinois that taught the John Dewey and Maria Montessori's methods of using the arts in education.

"We translated social studies into live productions," she said. "I can remember at the age 7, performing 'Cinderella,' 'The three Bears' and 'Little Red Riding Hood' — all in French."

Ebsen is a witty woman who has a lust for life. She smiled as she recalled her college days at Vassar, her close relationship with the Roosevelts, and joining the Coast Guard during the World War II — not to mention her career in radio.

Ebsen said after she graduated from college, a group of eight men and eight women got together and formed the Valley Vagabonds, where she met her first husband. The group toured the Hudson Valley, presenting plays.

Eleanor Roosevelt attended one of the plays.

"Afterward Roosevelt wrote about

the performance in her column called, 'My Day.'

Ebsen said Roosevelt decided to do a benefit for the American Association of University Women and invited the company to perform at Hyde Park where the Roosevelts lived. A stage for the performance was built in their back yard.

"We dressed in their laundry room. I'll never stop regretting not stealing one of F.D.R.'s handkerchiefs," she said. "Then she took us back to her cottage where she was going to give us beer. We hadn't eaten since the day before, so one of the guys asked if she had anything for sandwiches. She did."

"One of my last visions of Mrs. Roosevelt is her running down the road carrying four bottles of milk for us — we never drank the beer."

Ebsen married her first husband who soon afterward joined the Navy. She said she wanted to join, too, but couldn't because the Navy didn't allow a husband and wife to serve together. So she joined the Coast Guard and became a communications officer.

Because of lengthy separations from her husband, the marriage ended in divorce.

Later, she toured Seattle with eight women Coast Guard officers, who decided it would be fun to entertain

other officers who arrived in port. They found an estate that they rented from Anna Roosevelt Boettger, Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt's daughter.

It was at this time she met a young actor, Buddy Ebsen. Shortly afterward they married. They had four girls and a boy and a daughter from Buddy's previous marriage. They lived on a ranch in Agoura, and in 1960 they purchased a second home in Balboa.

After many moves, theater productions and raising children, Buddy and Nancy divorced.

She joined the support group of LADIES, founded by Lynn Landon, Michael Landon's ex-wife.

"We work with displaced homemakers giving information to women who didn't know how to manage money, and help them get back on their feet," she said. "We never talk about the 'old men,'" she joked. We also are a support group for each other."

Ebsen says she is leading a full life, and she looked forward to the Girls Club event, which also was attended by members of the Costa Mesa-Newport Harbor Lions Club, who presented the club with a \$10,000 check.

HB scuba diver dies of apparent heart attack

A scuba diver from Huntington Beach passed out and subsequently died after struggling unsuccessfully to get back into his boat Saturday morning while it was anchored off the coast of Laguna Beach, authorities said.

An autopsy scheduled for today will determine the official cause of death, but Orange County Sheriff's deputies suspect that Edward Clyde Barrett, 50, died of a heart attack.

Barrett was scuba diving about 1/4 mile off Emerald Bay with two friends when he swam back to his 30-foot cabin cruiser, Jack Pot. Weighing 270 pounds at 5 feet 11 inches tall and loaded down with scuba gear, Barrett apparently didn't have the energy to hoist himself onto a platform on the rear of the boat. Sheriff's Sgt. John Holani said.

One of Barrett's companions — William Olson, 38, of Mission Viejo — tried to push Barrett onto the swim step four times and was in the process of trying again when he noticed the man had lost consciousness, Holani said.

"His friend just couldn't get him back in," the sergeant said.

Olson pulled Barrett's face mask off, loosened his wet suit and gave him mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, but to no avail.

So Olson removed Barrett's weight belt and air tank and began swimming Barrett to shore. They were between 20 and 30 yards from the boat when a third diver — Larry Ricci, 38, of Capistrano Beach — surfaced nearby. Together, the men were able to push Barrett onto the swim step, Holani said.

Sheriff's deputies stationed in Newport Harbor and paramedics responded to a May Day call issued by Olson.

Barrett was transported by boat to Newport Harbor and then taken to Hoag Memorial Hospital in Newport, where he pronounced dead at 12:58 p.m.

Barrett's companions were returned to Peter's Landing at Huntington Harbour, where the diving expedition had originated earlier that day. Holani was not sure if the boat, manufactured by Sea Ray, was kept at the harbor or merely launched there.

Authorities had little information about Barrett's background other than that he was a self-employed businessman.

Moving day finally arrives for Irvine Police Department

The Irvine Police Department has been planning its relocation to new headquarters since August but this weekend, moving day finally arrived.

Moving 125 officers, 70 work stations, and all kinds of delicate communications equipment around the corner to Alton and Harvard avenues could be an organizer's nightmare, but most officers seemed fairly confident.

Lt. Mike Smith gestured to the boxes strewn around his office and said, "Well, all of these boxes are color-coded and they'll be there in the offices when we get there. I hope."

According to Smith, the biggest logistical problem was moving the property section. With an escort, the police themselves moved a truckload of boxes containing everything from guns and drugs to important court evidence.

The remainder of department para-

phenalia, such as files, reports, forms computer equipment and coffee makers, was the job of Lido Van and Storage of Irvine. Using 20 workers and four vans, Lido completed the move in about 10 hours Saturday night — at a cost to the city of around \$20,000.

Nick Koravos, owner of Lido, said that the real work will come next week when they move City Hall's 310 work stations, a job requiring 30 workers and six trucks. But Koravos is looking forward to the job.

"I feel kind of honored to be moving City Hall into its first real location."

Beginning today, all police operations will be conducted out of the huge neo-classical structure where the amenities must make the trauma of moving wholly worthwhile.

Instead of taking offenders to Orange County Jail, which results in about three hours of lost transit time for an officer, Irvine police can now

lock away miscreants in their own cells.

Ten new white cinderblock cells, each furnished with its own cement bench, have been built as a holding area for suspected criminals and a dry-out area for drunks. One cell has padded walls for problem cases.

Compared to the cramped box-strewn hallways of the old building, the new quarters — which contain 55,000 square feet of forest-green carpeted halls and offices — seem more appropriate to a public relations firm than a police department.

Besides the corporate air of muffled floors, gray textured walls and padded chairs of a dusty rose color, the new building contains a state-of-the-art emergency operations center, a crime-scene investigations area with its own darkroom and built-in light table, a shoe shine machine in the spacious gray tiled locker room and an exercise room, and spa called "The Wellness Center" for city employee use only.

Car-truck collision kills three

Three men from the San Fernando Valley area were killed and a fourth was critically injured early Saturday when their car collided with the rear end of a tractor-trailer truck parked on the shoulder of the San Diego Freeway in San Clemente.

California Highway Patrol officers had no idea why the 1979 Pontiac drifted onto the shoulder of the southbound freeway south of Camino de Estrella and hit the rear of the truck shortly before 4 a.m.

Pronounced dead at the scene were Samuel Gonzalez, 24, and Juan Cardenas, 26, both of Arleta, and Vicente Letes, 26, of North Hollywood.

Esteban Delgado, 33, of Arleta was taken to Mission Hospital Regional Medical Center in critical condition.

The trucker, who was not injured, had pulled to the side of the road to check his load, said a CHP dispatcher who identified herself only as Ms. Edwards.

Power outage hits 2,200 customers

About 2,200 customers in Costa Mesa were without power for about an hour Saturday. Southern California Edison spokesman Steve Sullivan said.

The outage began at 2:03 p.m. and was caused by an equipment failure on a power pole. Power was restored to some areas by 2:30 p.m., with the remainder back on line by 3:09 p.m., Sullivan said.

Costa Mesa Police reported no serious accidents as a result of traffic signals losing power.

Coastline College enrollment up 4%

Enrollment at Coastline Community College for the spring semester has increased 4 percent above the fall 1988 semester and 6 percent over last spring, Coastline president William M. Vega said.

By the fifth week of the semester, Coastline's enrollment was 17,230 students, Vega said, noting that in recent years the college has attracted greater numbers of new students as well as retaining continuing students.

Vega also reported a 13 percent enrollment increase in its telecourses carried by KOCE-TV and local cable channels. Coastline is offering 25 such courses this spring.

Fund-raisers named for UCI programs

Five development directors have been appointed by UCI to create fund-raising programs for such academic concerns as chairs, research, instruction, scholarships and fellowships. John Miltner, the college's vice chancellor for university advancement, said.

The new directors include Ann Egan for the School of Biological Sciences, Clifford Ochser for the School of Engineering, Richard Rodner for the Graduate School of Management, Cynthia Kramarz for the School of Humanities and Carol Blanchard for the Women's Opportunities Center.

"By communicating with the dean and faculty, the development directors ascertain academic priorities and develop fund-raising programs to support them," Miltner said. "In so doing, they contribute to the growing quality of research and education in the academic units and to the excellence of the university as a whole."

Bill proposes to aid child care expansion

A bill that would expand the number of child-care facilities

eligible for state licensing has been proposed by Assemblyman Gil Ferguson, R-Newport Beach.

An increase in facilities, Ferguson said, will be achieved by "allowing alternate ways for day-care teachers to meet state educational requirements."

Ferguson said the bill would enable future teachers to use an additional six months of experience as six units of college credits.

Currently, the state requires child-care teachers to complete 12 additional college units in early childhood education or child development. Six months of experience in a licensed, day-care center is also mandatory.

"These unreasonable requirements have naturally caused a severe shortage of day-care teachers and driven costs beyond what some facilities seeking a license can afford," Ferguson said. "The net effect is to reduce child-care options for parents."

Measure would give schools more control

The establishment of school-based management and teacher career ladder programs in selected school districts has been proposed in a bill by state Sen. Marian Bergeson, R-Newport Beach.

Sponsored by Bill Honig, superintendent of public instruction, the bill is scheduled for a formal hearing in the Senate Education Committee in April.

School-based management would give greater control and authority of educational resources and programs to individual schools, and increase the involvement of teachers in school site decisions.

The career ladder portion of the bill would allow district governing boards and teachers to restructure salary levels according to teacher experience, level of responsibility, demonstrated competence and performance.

Ministry founded to fight against hate

Frank Eiklor knows about hate. He spent his childhood years in a home scarred by hate. He wrestled with his own hate while serving in the military. And now, he's helping to fight against hate.

As president of the Costa Mesa-based Shalom International, an interdenominational ministry, he is leading a coalition of Christians and Jews in a campaign against anti-Semitism in Orange County.

"It has never disappeared," he said. "It lays dormant. Anti-Semites wait for moments that are conducive to hate ... then crawl out of the woodwork."

His newly established Orange County task force against anti-Semitism, "Project Stop Hate," solidified less than a month ago at a rally in Fullerton with the help of clergy members such as the Revs. Tim Timmons, David Hocking, Robert Schuller, Chuck Smith and Rabbi Haim Asa.

More than 1,500 church members also vowed to oppose anti-Semitic acts and help rebuild any damage inflicted by hate organizations.

Eiklor's trek to Shalom International reads like a curious mix of a soap opera and murder-mystery script. It is riddled with tragedy, irony, love, hate and death threats.

He grew up in a home he described as "bitten with bigotry."

"I remember during World War II my dad said, 'We gotta get Hitler (into power) because of what he's doing to the Jews,'" he recalled.

"They say every failure has a scapegoat. Our scapegoat was the Jews," Eiklor said.

When he joined the Marine Corps at 20, his drill sergeant handed him a rifle and a Bible. "The Bible was a good luck charm," Eiklor said.

But while stationed on Okinawa, Eiklor's Bible became more than a book carried in the breast pocket to stop stray bullets. He was changed by Christ, ironically, without knowing that Christ was Jewish.

"Jesus, to us, was a blue-eyed Swede," he joked.

Eiklor then entered the Christian ministry, serving most recently as vice president of Christians in Action. Twenty years after his conversion, when, as he put it, "I liked to play the game of 'I know it all,'" his work hit a low point: "I reached my crisis," he said.

Then he noticed the anti-Semitic acts.

"I was on the East Coast at that time, and I became aware of something happening. Swastikas were appearing on seawalls. Synagogues were being torched."

More shocking to him, though, was the lack of Christian response.

"Lord," I said, "let all the Christian ministers answer." They never did.

To add to his dismay, Eiklor heard of the emergence of the Costa Mesa-based Institute for Historical Review,

which claims the Holocaust is a hoax.

"That's an interesting name for Jew-haters," he said. "They deny the Holocaust. To deny the Holocaust is like denying your own name."

"I looked in the mirror, and I heard the voice of the Lord say: 'You're part of the problem,'" Eiklor said. "I couldn't continue my ministry until I resolved this."

Having earned a doctorate of philosophy in Holocaust studies, Eiklor, now 52, knows better. His proof for the wartime genocide is

renewed every day when he interviews concentration camp survivors on his radio show, "Assignment: Frontlines."

He launched the first task force against anti-Semitism in Boston five years ago. Eiklor challenged ministers to oppose the spray-painted swastikas and denounce the threatening letters rabbis were receiving.

"What really set me off was that the Jewish Journal of the North Shore got a letter saying, 'Hi, Joe Mengele here. Didn't get enough of you Yids last time. Next time no mistake.'"

"I asked (ministers), 'Did you ever wonder what you would have done 40 years ago during the Holocaust? You don't have to wonder. It's happening now,'" he said.

His campaign, which Eiklor brought to Orange County only months before a synagogue was burned, is part of a goal to establish such task forces in every major city in the U.S. It includes holding press conferences after attacks against Jews and cleaning up and helping pay for damages.

"Any attack against the Jewish community is an attack on Christians," Eiklor said.

With more than 75 identified hate organizations in Southern California, the violence and death threats inevitably followed soon after Eiklor made his intentions known. Only days after the coalition of clergy met in Fullerton, he received a death threat from a militant anti-Semitic organization.

The skinheads, which have been linked to racist crimes, are gaining in numbers also, drawing their hate from literature that includes letters that refer to Hitler as a diety and portraits of Hitler to "hang over your bed to draw sustenance from," Eiklor said.

"I believe today the skinhead, neo-Nazi movement ought to outrage every decent human being, certainly every Christian," he said. "Maybe that's what drives me."

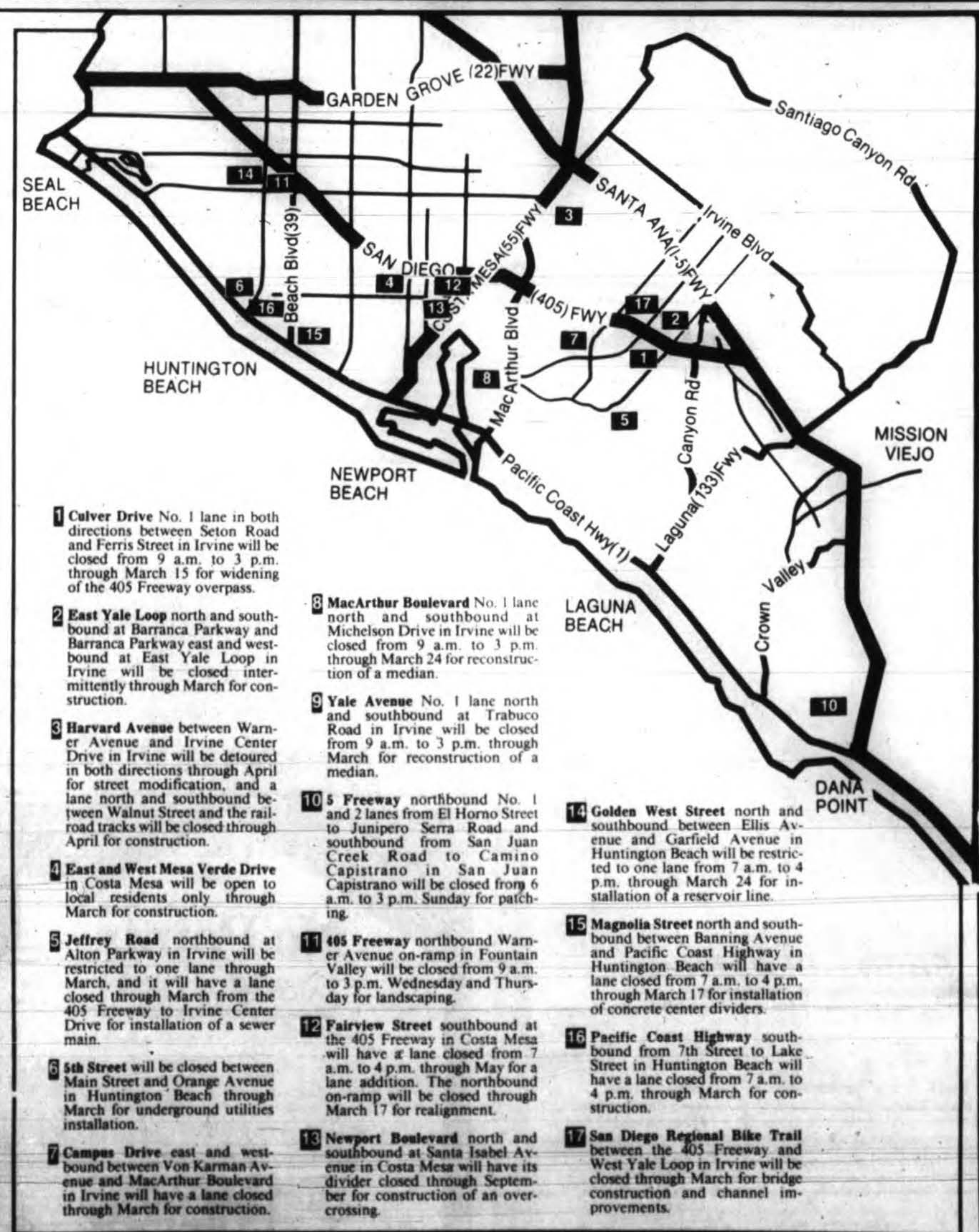
"Unchallenged anti-Semitism is a disgrace to the Christian church and flies in the face of us claiming to be moral," he said.

It isn't likely Eiklor will stop fighting against the rising tide of racial hate. In May, he is planning to establish a similar task force in Los Angeles.

"We want to light a candle that will be seen," he said.

"I don't hate the hater," he said. "I love the hater. I hate the hate."

March 14, 1939 — First step to obtain underpasses along the Coast Highway to insure protection of pedestrians crossing the high speed thoroughfare was taken by the Newport Beach City Council Monday night when it authorized City Engineer R.L. Patterson to request the State Division of Highways to include three such underpasses for "Corona Del Mar" in preparing plans for the proposed project to widen and eliminate dangerous curves in the highway in that area.

Should the state grant the request to install underpasses at Corona Del Mar, they will be among the first such safety factors afforded for pedestrians along the southern division of the Coast Highway, it was said.

March 17, 1949 — Orange County supervisors have postponed the decision as to whether the new township courthouse will be located in Newport Beach or Costa Mesa until a study determines if the township is of a size to qualify for a class A justice court. Meanwhile, the board may seek to rent temporary quarters at Costa Mesa, possibly at the Legion hall where all jury trials of the justice court are held at present.

Supervisor Irvin George Gordon of Newport Beach, the district's representative on the board, indicated this morning that the members desire to make a definite finding as to whether Newport township has the 30,000 people required to qualify for a class A court. That information, when forthcoming, will have a bearing on the board's decision.

March 13, 1959 — Flat opposition to location of "heavy industry and, more specifically, oil industries" in the southern half of Orange County was expressed today by the Irvine Co. in support of the stand of the Harbor areas chambers of commerce fighting location of a Signal Oil & Gas Co. refinery in Huntington Beach.

In a letter addressed to Jack Barnett, secretary-manager of the Newport Harbor Chamber of Commerce, Irvine Co. Assistant Vice President William H. Spurgeon III, said it is the company's policy "to eliminate the heavy industry from our properties as they develop."

March 18, 1969 — The cities of Costa Mesa and Newport Beach today are solidly aligned against any shifting of the adopted routing of the Corona Del Mar Freeway near Orange County Airport.

Orange Aviation Director Robert J. Bresnahan wants the re-routing in order to make room for extended runways. But Monday night, the city councils of the two Harbor Area cities unanimously assailed the plan.

March 15, 1979 — A self-described minister who received his credentials by mail order is hiring area children to sell lottery tickets to benefit the expansion of a church that doesn't exist, Irvine police said today.

A drawing is supposed to be held at "St. John's Church" in the ministry of the Universal Life Church, at noon on Saturday at 23331 El Toro Road in El Toro.

If someone shows up for it, police detective Paul Jessup said he will be disappointed.

There is no church at the address. There is, however, a professional office building there, and among tenants is an answering machine which the "minister" used.

March 13, 1979 — A recall drive against Huntington Beach Mayor Ron Pattinson, City Attorney Gail Hutton and Councilman John Thomas got under way Monday when residents began circulating petitions.

The recall proponents need to collect 11,867 signatures by Aug. 7 to force an election in which residents would decide whether the three officials should be recalled from office or not.

Federal agents probe San Diego bombing as possible terrorist attack

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Federal agents with brooms and metal detectors focused Saturday on the burned-out wreckage of a van driven by the wife of the Navy captain who mistakenly ordered the destruction of an Iranian passenger jet.

Officials said the case was being investigated as a possible terrorist attack.

The home of Capt. Will Rogers III, commander of the USS Vincennes, was sealed off and he and his wife, Sharon, were in hiding. Officials confirmed the couple received at least one threatening call about the missile strike on the airliner.

The van, which had remained cordoned off in an intersection since the Friday morning blast, was hauled away on a flatbed truck Saturday evening and the road opened after a search for evidence at the scene ended.

There also was increased security at the several military facilities in San Diego, the nation's largest Navy complex.

The van was the center of intense scrutiny Saturday by investigators

from the FBI and other federal agencies, who had a command post set up nearby.

"We are into an exhaustive, painstaking, lengthy investigation to determine what type of bomb it was, what was used in it, how it was detonated," said Thomas Hughes, agent in charge of the San Diego FBI office. "There are fragments ... that would lead one to believe this was a pipe bomb."

However, he said at a briefing that it had still not been determined whether it was a pipe bomb.

Investigators set up barrels covered with sieves and sifted through debris collected from the area shortly after Friday's explosion. Other investigators swept beds of plants lining the avenue with metal detectors.

The debris will be taken to a lab in Washington. Bomb analysts from the Los Angeles FBI office and the Washington FBI explosives unit were at the scene.

The roofs of buildings in the area also were being searched for any kind of evidence, Hughes said.

"Teams of investigators are run-

ning out just hundreds and hundreds of leads," Hughes said.

He said the Rogerses were being kept in a secure location. Their son, who attends school in upstate New York, was notified and offered protection, the FBI said.

Hughes declined to comment when asked about a report that a red car was seen behind Mrs. Rogers' van and made a quick U-turn after the explosion.

White House refers bombing queries to FBI

WASHINGTON (AP) — Administration officials were close-mouthed about the San Diego car bombing that triggered speculation about possible terrorism, as President Bush monitored developments through news accounts, a source said Saturday.

While FBI headquarters dispatched a special explosive team to California, Bush headed to the presidential retreat at Camp David, Md., for the weekend. He was briefed on the explosion Friday before he left Washington, said Andrew Card, deputy to the chief of staff.

"He's monitoring the news accounts. He's concerned about it," said another White House official who spoke on condition of anonymity.

"Proper agencies of the government are playing their role. There's not any reason for the White House to become involved," because the case is under investigation by the FBI, the source added.

"We're obviously watching it and concerned about it," the source said.

Officially, the White House was mum on the situation, referring all calls to the FBI.

"We don't have any information on it ... We won't have any comment until the FBI completes its investiga-

tion," said White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater.

FBI headquarters in the capital sent its explosive team to San Diego Friday night to help investigators looking into the explosion, which destroyed a car driven by the wife of Navy Capt. Will Rogers III, said FBI duty officer Kathy Kennedy.

"When anything like this happens we're not going to rule terrorism out, that perhaps this might be a retribution," said Kennedy. "But we're going to look at all the angles."

"Obviously ... we investigate terrorism."

The explosion engulfed the van in flames moments after Mrs. Rogers, 50, got out.

Two days before the San Diego explosion, FBI official Oliver "Buck" Revell told Congress that thousands of "zealous" Iranian students in the United States pose a threat of violence against publishers and others over the controversial novel, "The Satanic Verses."

Revell, testifying about Ayatollah Khomeini's death threat against the book's author, Salman Rushdie, said some Iranians are "zealous adherents to the Khomeini rhetoric ... and pursuit of violence."

Governor names woman to high court

SACRAMENTO — Gov. George Deukmejian named Joyce Luther Kennard of Sherman Oaks to the California Supreme Court on Saturday, making her the first Asian-born nominee and second woman nominee in the court's history.

No woman has sat on the state's highest court since voters ousted former Chief Justice Rose Bird in 1986. Kennard, who is part Chinese, has been named to fill a vacancy created by the retirement of Justice John A. Arguelles, the court's only Hispanic member.

A justice of the Court of Appeal in Los Angeles and former prosecutor for the state Justice Department, Kennard, 47, is viewed as a likely conservative. As a trial judge, she was known as a tough sentencer. As an appellate justice, she has given the prosecution significant victories.

But her judicial career has been too brief to make her entirely predictable, legal scholars said in response to the governor's unexpected choice.

Northrop negotiating to plea bargain

LOS ANGELES — Northrop Corp., the target of a number of defense fraud investigations, was negotiating Saturday with the government about a possible plea bargain to handle all the charges.

Citing unnamed sources, news reports said that if an agreement isn't reached soon, the U.S. Justice Department is expected to seek a criminal indictment.

Officials at Northrop and the U.S. Attorney's offices declined to say whether negotiations were taking place.

"The timing is very sensitive right now," one government attorney said.

A federal grand jury in Los Angeles is investigating allegations of defense fraud at Northrop in at least five different cases, including falsification of testing missile parts and questionable purchasing procedures related to the MX missile.

Kidnap try likely a random attack

SAN FRANCISCO — Despite an unsuccessful kidnap attempt, both police and the parents of 12-year-old Abiah Folger, heir to the Folger Coffee Co. fortune, said it likely was a random attack.

As police continued their search on Saturday for the man who tried to abduct the girl, Peter M. Folger and his wife, Barbara Folger, indicated the incident was not connected to the family name.

"I'm sure it's not," responded Barbara Folger when asked whether the girl's family status was behind the attack. She also said that the family received no threats before the incident.

The parents declined to comment further on the incident, except to relate that their daughter was "fine."

Trucker gets 4 years for collisions

LOS ANGELES — A trucker characterized by his family as a gentle man driven to desperation by personal problems was sentenced to four years in prison for a car-ramming rampage that terrorized motorists for 40 miles.

Charley Tom Lee, who smashed one car after another with his 18-wheel big rig last May, stood impassively as he was sentenced Friday in Superior Court.

However, his mother tearfully told Judge Judith Chirlin his freeway outburst may have been spurred in part by his father's attempted suicide several months before.

"I think he blamed himself because he wasn't there for him," said Billie Lee.

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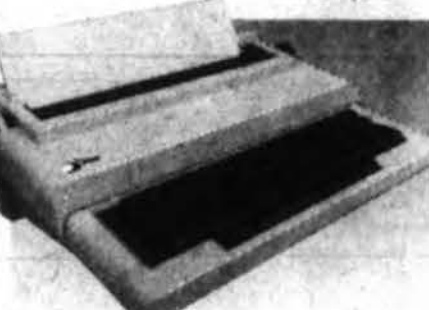
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Urban poverty grows more persistent

Ex-Mr. Universe held in steroids case

COLUMBUS, Ohio — A former Mr. Universe who busted of his "natural training" techniques, was arrested on charges of conspiracy and trafficking in illegal steroids, the U.S. Customs Service announced Saturday.

Luiz, Brazilian bodybuilder, who was named Mr. Universe in 1987 by the International Federation of Body Builders, was arrested by Customs agents at a downtown hotel Friday, officials said.

Freitas, 33, a Brazilian national who lives in Marina Del Rey was in Columbus to attend the Arnold Schwarzenegger Classic bodybuilding contest.

Shuttle launch back on schedule

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — The space shuttle Discovery's countdown was running smoothly Saturday and back on schedule for Monday's launch, after high wind stalled the countdown for seven hours during the night.

There were no reasons to believe the launch would not go as scheduled, said Robert Crippen, NASA's deputy director of shuttle operations.

Quick confirmation of Cheney likely

WASHINGTON — The Senate, burned by the bitter partisan struggle over the nomination of John Tower as defense secretary, is moving with lightning speed on the selection of Dick Cheney with both Democrats and Republicans predicting quick confirmation.

Almost as soon as President Bush announced his choice Friday, Sen. John Warner, ranking Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee, consulted with Sen. Sam Nunn, the chairman, and told reporters hearings on the nomination would begin this week.

"They will probably be related to policy issues and thereafter the issues of background and financial data will follow and as soon as that material is completed, the committee will complete its actions and send the nomination to the floor," said the Virginia senator.

Solar flare may be biggest recorded

HOLLOMAN AIR FORCE BASE, N.M. — The latest in a series of solar flares was 36 times the size of Earth — possibly the largest ever recorded — with the potential to disrupt radio and telephone transmissions, astronomers said.

The solar flare extended some 70,000 miles into space Thursday, said researchers at Sacramento Peak, just east of Holloman and Alamogordo.

"The report I got from Sacramento Peak ... is it's the largest one they've seen — ever," said astronomer Tom Duvall at Kitt Peak National Observatory near Tucson, Ariz. "This is pretty exciting for us up here."

It was the fourth solar flare since Monday.

Afrikaner church condemns apartheid

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — The main church of ruling Afrikaners has declared apartheid a sin and asked forgiveness for its long support of the racially discriminatory system.

"We confess with humility and sorrow the participation of our church in the introduction and legitimization of the ideology of apartheid and the subsequent suffering of people," said the white Dutch Reformed Church.

The black and mixed-race Dutch Reformed Churches welcomed the most explicit condemnation of apartheid made by their white mother church but said it also must work to destroy the system it helped create.

Crews recovering bodies from crash

DRYDEN, Ontario — Work crews using snowmobiles and snowplows recovered bodies from a woods and looked for clues Saturday to the cause of an Air Ontario jet crash in central Canada that killed 24 people.

Officials on Saturday found the voice and flight data recorders, or black boxes. While they were badly burned in Friday's crash, they could still be used, said Chief inspector Joe Jackson of the Canadian Aviation Safety Board.

Scores of Afghans die in fierce fighting

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — A week of fierce fighting between Moslem insurgents and Afghan government forces holding a strategic city has killed scores of Afghans and injured hundreds, a guerrilla spokesman said Saturday. Thousands of guerrillas blasted Jalalabad in a relentless attack with long-range rockets and heavy artillery, said Mohammad Shoaib of the Jamiat-e-Islami insurgent group.

The city, Afghanistan's fifth-largest, is seen by the guerrillas as a stepping stone to the capital of Kabul, 75 miles to the west.

U.S. bishops say church won't change

VATICAN CITY — U.S. Roman Catholic leaders ended a special meeting with the pope Saturday acknowledging differences with the Vatican but predicting the session won't "change the shape of the American Catholic Church."

Pope John Paul II called the extraordinary meeting to discuss how bishops can spread Catholic teaching in an American society strongly influenced by such secular trends as divorce, sexual promiscuity and materialism.

Tension in China erupts into violence

CHENGDU, China — Weeks of small-scale Tibetan protests, arrests, tightened security and wild anti-Chinese rumors built up to last week's violent clashes in Lhasa, according to Western and Tibetan sources.

They painted a picture of steadily mounting tension in Tibet's capital and persistent acts of defiance by Buddhist monks and nuns who have initiated most protests since Chinese troops entered Tibet in 1950. The sources' identity and whereabouts cannot be revealed for fear of reprisals.

Tensions burst last week, they said, when Tibetans tried to commemorate two anniversaries: a March 5, 1988, clash with police that left 24 people dead, and a March 10, 1959, uprising against Chinese rule in which hundreds died and Tibet's spiritual and temporal ruler, the Dalai Lama, fled to India.

The commemorations brought more bloodshed: 16 dead and more than 100 wounded by official count, many more by Tibetan count.

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WASHINGTON (AP) — Poverty in America's cities has grown more persistent and concentrated over the last two decades and its victims have less chance of escape, according to a report by the National League of Cities.

The study describes a changing face of poverty since 1970, with the nation's poor more likely now to live in metropolitan areas and concentrate in low-income neighborhoods.

It said the proportion of children living in poverty has increased and the likelihood of people climbing above the poverty level has declined.

"Poverty in cities is changing in quality and intensity," the report said. "It is more persistent among particular households, more concentrated

within particular neighborhoods, and more isolated from traditional avenues of escape."

The league released its report, "Poverty in Cities," as nearly 3,000 municipal leaders gathered in Washington for the organization's annual winter meeting, which runs through Tuesday.

"Both the figures and the trends are alarming," Alan Beals, executive director of the National League of Cities, said in releasing the report. "Such conditions are devastating for those caught up in it, especially children."

The report, an analysis and compilation of previous research, said poverty in America declined through much of the 1970s, to a rate of under 12 percent at the end of the decade. But a

resurgence brought the rate to more than 15 percent by 1985, and the average rate for the years 1980 through 1987 was over 14 percent, the league said.

The portion of the nation's poor living in metropolitan areas grew from 62 percent in 1979 to 70 percent in 1985 — an increase of 7.6 million people, with the majority living in central cities, it said.

The report said the persistence of poverty — that is, the length of time a person remains poor — has grown. It cited previous studies of the proportion of urban poor in a given year who escaped poverty the following year and said in the late 1960s, that figure was 32 out of 100.

Abortion case attracts intense lobbying campaigns

In theory, the Supreme Court is insulated from politics. But that isn't stopping the opposing sides on the abortion issue from mounting intense lobbying campaigns as the justices prepare to hear a controversial case that could end the country's current era of legal abortions.

The Supreme Court is expected to hear the appeal, Webster vs. Reproductive Health Services, in late April. Meanwhile, both the "pro-life" and "pro-choice" movements have prepared dozens of "friends of the court" legal briefs.

Beyond that, both sides also have begun to launch a series of calculated moves — marches, sit-ins and newspaper and magazine ads as well as letter-writing blitzes aimed at the Supreme Court, the attorney general and the White House — that will build in intensity over the next six weeks.

The underlying design is to put pressure on the Supreme Court: the activists are convinced the court's decision can be swayed by public opinion.

"As far as we're concerned there's no tomorrow. Everybody knows the question is about to be called," said Sheri O'Dell, vice president of the National Organization for Women, which favors abortion on demand.

"Our people want the Supreme Court and President Bush, who's pushing the court on this issue, to know just how they feel," she said. "We are co-sponsoring what promises to be a massive march in Washington on April 9th and I won't be surprised if a quarter of a million demonstrators show up; our people are furious."

O'Dell, who is coordinating NOW's role in the march, said she thinks a big turnout won't go unnoticed at the court.

"Whatever the decision is," she said, "it will be couched in legal terms but, in fact, it is a political question that, like Prohibition, ultimately will be decided by public opinion."

Judie Brown, president of the American Life League which opposes legalized abortions, said she, too, thinks political considerations will weigh heavily in the Supreme Court's decision.

"Public opinion means everything to the court," said Brown, who says her organization includes 200,000 families around the country. "We feel all forms of expression will impact on the court."

The American Life League's most expensive form of expression will be a series of full-page advertisements in USA Today, The Washington Post and The Washington Times. The ads will run during the week before the opposition's April march and will cost \$150,000.

"They will include just-released information we've taken from the file of the late Justice William O. Douglas during the debate on Roe vs. Wade," she said. "It's clear from these files that a small but very vocal minority was able to influence the decision which made abortion legal in this country."

In Roe vs. Wade, the court held that while a woman's right to privacy gives her the right to have an abortion, the state may regulate or prohibit abortions once the fetus is viable.

Since the 1973 decision, there have been relatively few third-trimester abortions even though that same court, in Doe vs. Bolton, said the mother's life or health should be an overriding factor in the decision of whether to permit an abortion even after the fetus is viable.

In case to be heard in April, the Missouri Legislature passed a 1986 statute banning abortions at public hospitals or any other public facilities unless the woman's life is in danger. The act, whose preamble states that viability begins at conception, also forbids public funds from being used for abortions or for abortion counseling except when the mother's life is threatened.

The statute was challenged immediately by two abortion clinics, Reproductive Health Services of St. Louis and Planned Parenthood in Kansas City.

In March 1987, a federal district judge in Kansas City declared the major sections of the statute to be unconstitutional infringements of Roe vs. Wade. In July 1987, the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals upheld the bulk of the lower court's decision.

Hundreds clash during protests over abortion

Hundreds of people on both sides of the abortion issue clashed on Saturday throughout Northern and Central California, but there were no immediate reports of arrests, police said.

Anti-abortion protesters and pro-choice counter-protesters gathered at family planning clinics in Oakland, Fresno and Chico. The protests are part of a coordinated series of anti-abortion demonstrations in the region.

"The purpose is to close the clinics for the day and provide alternatives to women," said Sue Connelly, spokeswoman for Operation Rescue, an anti-abortion group.

About 500 people gathered Saturday morning at a planned parenthood clinic in Oakland, but no arrests were made, according to police Sgt. Larry Krupp.

The demonstration — which was about evenly split among the anti-abortion and pro-life groups — reportedly blocked the entrance to the clinic.

Last year, William Webster, Missouri's attorney general, asked the Supreme Court to review the case. He also asked the court, if it should side with the appeals courts, to then consider whether Roe vs. Wade itself is constitutional.

The Supreme Court announced in January it would consider the case, setting off a flurry of planning and activity on both sides of the issue.

"We've already raised most of the \$150,000 for our upcoming newspaper ads," Brown said, adding that \$150,000 is an exceptionally large expenditure for the American Life League.

The National Abortion Rights

Action League already has spent more than \$500,000 on newspaper advertising. The full-page ads, which feature a coat hanger, a reminder of the days of back-alley abortions, first ran on Jan. 22.

"We're running them in some of the major newspapers across the country," said Kate Michelman, NARAL's executive director. "We're also doing radio and TV ads and making ourselves available to the media for interviews and talk shows and the like."

So far, she said, there has been a tremendous response to the ads, which ask for pledges of support.

"We've had more than 30,000

responses to the January ads," she said. "The ads cost \$300,000 and we took in \$350,000."

Michelman said while NARAL sees a drawn-out fight over the abortion issue, she feels the Supreme Court can be influenced.

"There's no doubt we're in trouble, given the changes in the court since Roe vs. Wade," she said. "But the Supreme Court doesn't act in a vacuum; it is sensitive to the political and social climate of the country."

Because of this, said David Andrews, acting president of the Planned Parenthood Federation of America, his group is trying to mobilize mainstream Americans.

"There's no question this is a political issue and, while the Supreme Court can't be lobbied directly, it can be influenced by a great outpouring of voices," he said.

Barbara MacGear of Operation Rescue, a Binghamton, N.Y.-based, pro-life group which has helped stage protests at abortion clinics around the country, said, "We plan keeping with our agenda" of demonstrations and civil disobedience.

"Frankly," she added, "I don't know whether the Supreme Court can be swayed by what happens in the streets but we're watching closely. What we're really hoping for, though, is a right-to-life amendment to the

U.S. Constitution."

Douglas Johnson, legal director of the National Right-To-Life Committee, acknowledged that the court's acceptance of the Missouri case and the resulting news media focus have "provided an unusual forum."

He said he has been "kind of amused" by some of the efforts to get the Supreme Court's attention.

"In our view," he said, "these efforts are unlikely to influence the case. Our legal brief certainly isn't going to talk about the Harris Poll, it talks about the Constitution."

Then, he added, "but Roe vs. Wade was a political decision, an act of judicial lawmaking."

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Stocks and lunar cycles may follow rhythm of the world

The path of the moon shows that panic will sweep the investment industry and the stock market will crash in 1992.

But maybe not.

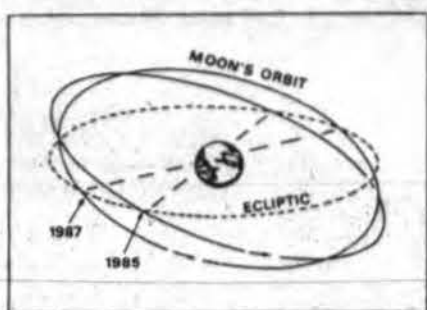
Scientists and part-time stock players gathered together Friday to Sunday at a conference put on by Irvine's Foundation for the Study of Cycles to share their thoughts about whether predictable cycles exist in nature that simultaneously affect biology, behavior — and stocks.

Researchers from the foundation suspect those cycles can be documented, and that they possibly follow solar and lunar patterns. Some scientists have predicted economic crashes based on their own cycles well before the market collapsed.

Part-timers have been lured by the idea of finding world patterns. Fred Werner of Santa Monica attended the conference for a couple reasons. As a composer for TV episodes such as "Dynasty," he wants to know if musical overtones are related to other cycles.

He said the research also helps him fare better in the stock market. Before he looked at cycles, he lost big in the crash of 1974.

Richard Moge, director of the agency's Market Research Institute, opened the conference by explaining his own project. Moge has studied Dow Jones Industrial Averages from 1978 on to look for a pattern. Based on grant research done by the institute, a 40-month cycle seems to run through the market.



Some analysts say the stock market crashes every 18.6 years, when the moon hits a certain point in its cycle.

The pattern says 1989 marks the beginning of an upturn for stocks. By 1991, the wave peaks and descends through 1992.

But Moge warns wave watchers not to turn probability into belief. Scientists still have a way to go before the future can be accurately forecast.

"There's an incredible mystery behind it all."

The mystery of cycles has been pondered for centuries, dating back as far as the Western Roman Empire.

After a lapse in the Middle Ages, demand for cycles studies increased with the rise of agrarian economies. Just as the Babylonians tried to chart the future centuries before, farmers at the brink of the Industrial Revolution searched for ways to plan the highest yields for their crops.

The 19th century scientist Clement Juglar, one of the first modern

scholars of cycles studies, discovered a nine- to 11-year interest rates cycle that was named after him.

The panic and crash that devastated the United States beginning on Black Tuesday 1929 intensified the search for causes of financial collapse. E.R. Dewey, who was hired by President Herbert Hoover to track down the cycles, later started the Foundation for the Study of Cycles.

Dewey is said to have glanced at information on Canadian conference on biological cycles and was startled to find that the patterns followed the same patterns he had drawn for the economy. Shortly thereafter, Dewey formed an agency to investigate the rhythm of the world.

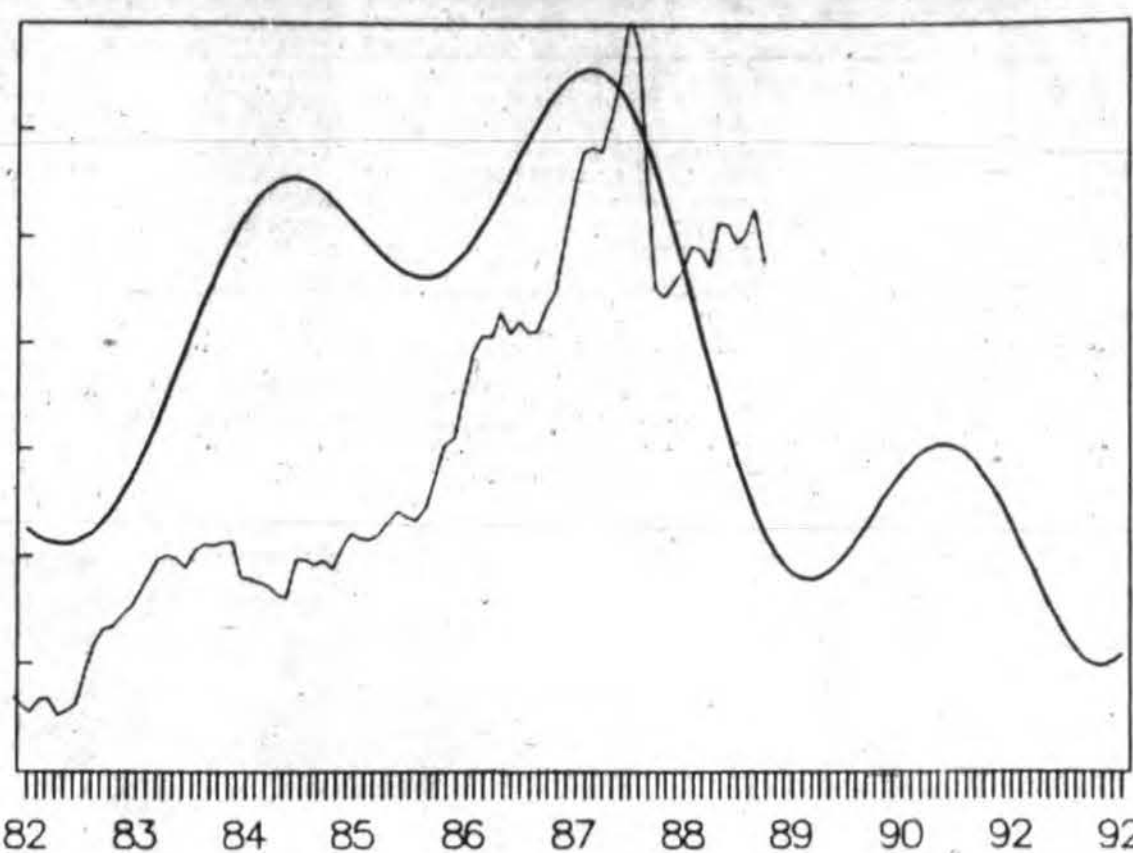
As economic conditions changed and markets became increasingly volatile, scientists searched for shorter and shorter cycles.

The advent of the personal computer boosted research. Before PCs, scientists labored by using rote methods and then with large and expensive computers.

Computerization of data has enabled researchers to study long and short ranges of cycles, anywhere from a hundred years, to months, to ticks — five minutes and less.

Modern developments in technology has allowed the institute to study about 13,000 cycles. The Tudor Group of New York City awarded a \$150,000 grant to the foundation to continue studying the market. All work is available to the public. Brokers and newsletter writers take advantage of the foundation's vast library, Moge said.

Labor rallies boost strikers' spirits; travelers flock to bargain shuttle

MIAMI (AP) — Labor rallies boosted the spirits of striking Eastern Airlines workers Saturday while the struggling carrier attracted travelers "like gangbusters" to its bargain Northeast shuttle and worked to restore routes.

Aircraft were again reported flying near capacity on the second day of \$12 fares on the Northeast shuttle linking New York with Washington and Boston, once Eastern's most profitable service. The pre-strike fare was \$99.

"The shuttle's going like gangbusters," said Eastern spokesman Robin Matell. "This (\$12 fare) has just created a tremendous groundswell of interest in traveling between the cities."

Joe Scott, an Eastern spokesman in New York, said the shuttle remained popular Saturday, but ticket lines at LaGuardia Airport were not as long as they were Friday.

Many flights were crowded with college students heading home for spring break. Because the hourly shuttle works on a first-come, first-serve basis, many passengers waited for hours before getting on a flight.

Matell suggested the solidarity of pilots honoring machinists union picket lines might be cracking. "We have more than 200 pilots now, and yesterday we had inquiries from about 300 pilots inquiring about procedures for returning to work," he said.

But Air Line Pilots Association spokesman Jim Bost, an Eastern pilot for four years, discounted that report, saying, "So far they are still hanging tight with us. As far as we can tell the line is still holding solid."

Machinists leader Frank Ortis said the pickets' resolve was unwavering, despite urgings from Eastern to return to work.

"Management is calling people to

go to work, saying it's all over," Ortis said. "This is company rhetoric, and we're telling members disregard that — we're still on strike."

Meanwhile, corporate shuffling by Eastern parent Texas Air Corp. continued as Eastern Express, a non-union commuter carrier that fed Eastern flights, was renamed Continental Express. Non-union Continental Airlines, another Texas Air company, has picked up some Eastern routes since the strike began March 4.

Picketing continued at airports in Miami, New York, Washington and other cities.

At Chicago's O'Hare International Airport, civil rights leader Jesse Jackson joined machinists, pilots and flight attendants on picket lines for about 10 minutes, donning pilots' caps, shaking hands and kissing babies. About 1,000 people attended a related rally.

Fluor's net earnings advance 140%

Fluor Corp. has announced net earnings of \$21.6 million, or 27 cents per share, for its first quarter ended Jan. 31, 1989, a 140 percent increase compared with \$9 million, or 11 cents per share, for the same quarter in 1988. Revenues for the quarter advanced 37 percent to \$1.4 billion, compared with \$1 billion in the first quarter of 1988.

David S. Tappan Jr., chairman and chief executive officer, said, "The positive trend in our earnings reflects an accelerating contribution by Fluor Daniel, the company's principal engineering and construction operation. Business conditions in Fluor Daniel's worldwide markets remain strong, and we are emphasizing our diversified experience and strength to

enhance profit margins and to gain market share."

Investments in coal and lead also achieved improved earnings over last year, lending support to the company's overall profitability.

New awards for the first quarter were \$1.6 billion, up 22 percent from \$1.3 billion from a year ago. Backlog rose to \$7 billion.

Revisionists waiting for Holocaust debate

Your editorial "Truth, democracy lose as JDL bullies the revisionists," from Feb. 21, was somewhat misleading.

The readers of a newspaper assume that the editor, in his written opinion is in possession of all the facts about the subject he editorializes. Such was not the case here. The editor called the revisionists liars, racists, vile, ignorant and hateful, out of sheer ignorance.

Who are the real hatemongers here?

These terms are simply incorrect as far as the Institute for Historical Review is concerned and reveal a lack of knowledge. However, they fit the Jewish Defense League, which is known to the FBI as a terrorist organization, like a glove. They also fit the Daily Pilot, in part, as well.

A few films soar while some others stay grounded

Here are some capsule reviews of recent movie releases:

THE ADVENTURES OF BARON MUNCHHAUSEN: Terry Gilliam is a fantasist's fantasist, a man who makes movies unlike anyone else's. "Jabberwocky," "Time Bandits," "Brazil," and now "The Adventures of Baron Munchausen" all have a raw, almost primitive feel to them that demands your attention and a wildly imaginative look that commands respect. The \$40-million-plus "Munchausen" depicts fantasy locked in mortal combat with soul-numbing reality, with the baron of the title, a legendary 18th-century teller of tale tales (English stage actor John Neville plays the part) being fantasy's champion, and a smirking bureaucrat (Jonathan Pryce) being its chief opponent. The action careens boisterously from a magical city on the moon (ruled by a manic, headless Robin Williams) to the belly of a sea serpent to the accompaniment of lusty shouts and deafening pyrotechnics. An astonishing picture from a filmmaker with unique gifts. (PG)

CHANCES ARE: Blandness reigns in this comedy about a husband reincarnated as a callow law-school grad (Robert Downey Jr.) who then romances his own widow (Cybill Shepherd). The couple's college-age daughter (Mary Stuart Masterson) falls for her recycled father (not knowing, of course, that the young man is really her old man). Confusing enough for you? Apparently it is for Ryan O'Neal, who wears a look of pained incomprehension throughout most of the movie. He plays the departed husband's best buddy, who's been nursing an unrequited love for his pal's widow for a decade, a circumstance that adds yet another layer of confusion to the story. O'Neal, Masterson and Shepherd smile prettily and frown becomingly, but never really establish themselves on screen. It's left to Downey to carry the picture's freight, which he does, with a winning innocent eagerness. (PG)

FAREWELL TO THE KING: Director John Milius attempts to combine macho and mysticism in this drama about a World War II deserter (Nick Nolte) who goes native in the jungles of Borneo and becomes king of a tribe of headhunters. The Nolte character is supposed to be the Milius ideal: a natural man who turns his back on civilization and its lies and compromises and finds his soul in a primitive Eden. But the symbolism is laid on with a trowel, and Nolte seems distracted and just a little self-conscious as a modern-day Tarzan in sarong and tangled leonine coiffure. Milius' dialogue is also more

than a bit much. It strains for epic majesty but sounds pretentious at best, silly at worst. (PG-13)

OUT COLD: With a goodly share of the action taking

bargained for in Blake Edwards' "Skin Deep."

place in a meat locker, it's probably no surprise that "Out Cold" turned out to be as chilly and bleak as it is. It's supposed to be a comedy about a money-grubbing wife

(Teri Garr) who kills her philandering boor of a husband (Bruce McGill) in the aforesaid meat locker and hopes that his dim-bulb business partner (John Lithgow) will take the rap. A sleazy private eye (Randy Quaid) who can blow the widow's scheme to pieces is lurking around. The characters haven't an ounce of charm among them, and director Malcolm Mowbray moves the action forward at a plod. There isn't one genuine laugh to be had in the entire course of this dreary little picture. (R)

PHYSICAL EVIDENCE: The red herrings come in schools in this hopelessly convoluted murder mystery. It stars Burt Reynolds as a hot-tempered cop charged with murder, and Theresa Russell as a filthy-rich altruist from the public defender's office who takes it upon herself to try to keep him out of the slammer. Burt seems so self-contained and basically decent that you don't for a minute believe he really could be the killer. All that remains is for him and Russell to sift through a bewildering array of ill-defined secondary characters to discover who really did the deed. Reynolds' performance is competent, but Russell's is a thing of awkward line readings punctuated by bursts of hysteria. Occasional graphic violence. (R)

TAP: The dancing is fine but the story is trite in this musical about an ex-con tap dancer (Gregory Hines), who must decide whether to go back to his old crooked ways or try to make a living with his tap shoes. Along one path lies riches and danger, along the other lies the respect of his friends and the love of a good woman. Bet you can't guess which he chooses. Okay, okay, the plots of most musicals are tissue-thin, and this movie, like its antecedents, must be judged on its terpsichorean displays. The dance numbers are exciting if somewhat overproduced, but you wish there were more of them and less exposition. The sleepy-eyed Hines is very engaging in the lead role. (PG-13)

TRUE BELIEVER: After a string of self-indulgent performances in trash like "Cop" and "The Boost," James Woods relocates his old energy and intensity with his portrayal of a one-time crusading lawyer who now makes his living defending drug dealers. He regains his principles and self-respect when he takes on the case of a man railroaded to prison for a murder he didn't commit. Woods' specialty is characters at once attracted and repelled by smarm and brutality, and he's seldom been better at showing that conflict than he is here. Robert Downey Jr., playing a starry-eyed young attorney who reminds Woods of his own youthful idealism, does the best work of his career, and director Joseph Ruben ("The Stepfather") moves the story along with tautness and precision. A satisfying picture on every level. (R)

Laguna rates top billing

Artists defeat Uni in Orange County Championships final

All the teams at the Orange County Volleyball Championships were looking to defeat the county's No. 1-ranked Laguna Beach High squad.

But they could only look on as the Artists swept through the tournament to capture the championship by defeating University High, 15-2, 15-4, in the finals held at Estancia High Saturday night.

"Everyone's gunning for you when you're No. 1," said Laguna Beach Coach Lance Stewart. "It's a lot of pressure for this early in the season, but our boys were in great condition and they were ready to play."

The Artists had no problem dominating the Trojans as tournament Most Valuable Player Sean Stafford led his team with good defensive plays and strong hitting. Also contributing on offense were quick hitter Jonathan Cummings and Dain Blanton in the swing position.

"We played very well as a team," Stewart said. "Our kids realize the game's a team effort. We have a strong bunch of guys out there, and we get great support from the bench."

The Artists were able to nullify University and high scoring Stefan Mumaw with the strong front line of Stafford, Cummings, and John McKeown. University was only able to muster a two-point rally during the match.

"We executed how we wanted to that last match," Stewart said. "We split their blockers and served where we wanted to."

The toughest match for the Artists was in the semifinals against a tough Edison team. The Artists, who were down 14-9 in the first game, had to stage a spectacular comeback to beat the Chargers 16-14, 15-13.

"We really stress conditioning," Stewart said. "We practice as if we're playing a five-game match, which really pays off in tournament play as we demonstrated tonight. We never got tired, and the same six guys practically played through the whole tournament."

While the Artists appeared to get stronger as the tournament progressed, the Trojans seemed a bit more exhausted, coming into the final with only a 15-minute rest after defeating Corona del Mar in a semifinal match, 16-14, 15-13.

"We had a great day, nonetheless," said University High Coach Lar Salness. "This was the first time we beat both Corona and Newport Harbor, so our kids were a little spent by the time we got in the final."

"The kids gave their all in the Corona match," Salness said. "They used up all their emotion in that match. It's hard to maintain that level of intensity throughout a tournament. We still have a lot to learn, but we're quite satisfied with our overall performance."

Thirty-seven crack ocean sailing yachts got off to a breezy start off the Newport Pier Saturday in the 10th bi-annual Newport Harbor Yacht Club Cabo San Lucas race, but they were faced with possible fog as they close-reached offshore seeking better winds.

The southwest wind was about 8-10 knots at the start, but within a few minutes it increased to 12-13 as the yachts eased sheets to take advantage of the increasing wind.

The Rachel-Pugh 68 sloop Taxi Dancer, skippered by Mitchell Rouse of California Yacht Club, got the best start and the leeward end of the line and soon appeared to be leading the

14-boat fleet of ultra-light displacement sleds.

The International Offshore Rule (IOR) Class A was comprised entirely of the big sleds, all competing for line honors of first to finish in the 790-mile race.

Eight of the 10 boats in IOR Class B were Santa Cruz-50s, promising a spirited boat-for-boat race for handicapped honors.

For the first time, there was a fleet of eight boats sailing under the International Measurement (IMS) system. Six of them were fully outfitted Swan Class sloops, several of them grooming for the Transpac race to Honolulu which is accepting IMS ratings for the first time this year.

Southern California College's Kyle Lundy hit a pair of free throws with 11 seconds remaining to lift the Vanguards to an 89-88 victory over visiting Christian Heritage College Saturday in the Western Regional final of the National Christian College Athletic Association Tournament at The Pit.

With the score tied at 85, Christian Heritage's Mark Kraatz hit a 3-point shot with 40 seconds remaining for the Hawks' first lead of the second half after trailing by 11 with 10:30 to play. But SCC's Phil Hill hit a layup with 27 seconds left and Brad Soucie missed the front end of a one-and-one for the Hawks.

Lundy, who scored 10 points including two 3-pointers, got wide

open underneath the basket and pump faked to draw the foul despite missing the shot.

After Lundy hit the pair, Christian Heritage's Mark Kraatz missed a 15-foot jumper and Lundy swatted the rebound out of bounds with one second remaining and the Hawks could not get another shot off.

The victory sends the Vanguards, 29-4 and ranked No. 1 in the NCCAA computer rankings, into Thursday's first round of the eight-team finals at Chattanooga, Tenn., for the first time in school history. Christian Heritage finishes its season at 24-9.

"With this type of year, they deserve a trip to a national tournament," said SCC Coach Bill Re-

'At-large eaters' create problems for NCAA selection committee

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Nine men meeting behind locked doors and protected by armed guards this weekend have a word for teams like Rutgers.

They call them at-large eaters. And if very many of them appear this year, they will have a big impact on who makes the 64-team NCAA Tournament and where they're sent when the field is unveiled this afternoon.

Coming out of nowhere, at-large eaters grab one of the NCAA's 30 automatic bids by pulling off an upset in a conference postseason tournament, as Rutgers did Friday in the Atlantic 10. With an 18-12 record, Rutgers would merit small consideration for one of the 34 at-large berths that fill out the field.

But by locking up their league's automatic, they may force the selection committee to spend an at-large on somebody who would ordinarily figure to get in with an automatic — such as the Atlantic 10's Temple Owls.

"The at-large eaters provide us with an entrant that otherwise wouldn't be there," said Jim Delany, Ohio Valley Commissioner and chairman-designate of the committee. "It means there is one fewer at-large position. And it can put more pressure on the committee."

The committee does not necessarily scorn at-large eaters. The NCAA's steadfast policy has been to encourage growing interest in college basketball by guaranteeing lesser conferences and teams a place in the

tournament. And going from a 7-22 record last year to this year's NCAA field is certain to excite interest on the Rutgers campus in New Jersey.

"Upsets are part of the beauty of basketball," said Delany. "We've had as many as five or six conference tournament upsets in a year, and we've had years when there was none."

With no way of knowing how many at-large eaters would rise up to complicate things, the committee sequestered itself Friday morning, beginning marathon deliberations.

Befitting its hard-won stature among the country's premier sporting events, the NCAA Tournament is taking on even more the trappings of importance. For the first time, the committee blocked off the entire top floor of Kansas City's Hyatt Regency Hotel for the weekend and posted armed guards at the elevator door.

"I don't know if we'll need the security, but we'll need the time," said Tom Jernstedt, an associate NCAA executive director and chairman of the tournament. "I think this year it could be more difficult than ever to seed teams at the higher levels and to assign them to the various sites."

Another complicating new twist is a rule that outlaws the home-court advantage. This could work to the disadvantage of top-ranked Arizona since the Wildcats can't play on their home court in Tucson in the first round of the West Regional.

Stringfellow Superfund Hazardous Waste Site
DHS AND EPA RELEASE PROPOSED PLAN FOR STRINGFELLOW SITE CLEANUP

The California Department of Health Services (DHS) and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) have released a Proposed Plan that addresses contamination problems posed by the Stringfellow Hazardous Waste Site in Riverside County, near the community of Glen Avon. The joint DHS/EPA plan identifies the agencies' preferred alternative and summarizes all alternatives evaluated for cleaning up site-related contamination.

The preferred alternative proposes to:

- dewater the on-site area with an extensive well system to remove a significant portion of heavily contaminated groundwater present on-site;
- conduct soil-gas extraction to remove volatile organic contaminants from on-site soil, if field tests prove favorable;
- conduct concurrent treatability studies to determine whether there is a feasible method for addressing on-site soil and bedrock contamination.

In addition, ongoing groundwater management activities would be continued to remove and treat the plume of contaminated groundwater that extends from the site into the community of Glen Avon. Existing extraction wells and the pretreatment plant would continue to operate in the on-site and mid-canyon areas, and new extraction well systems would be installed just north and south of Highway 60 in Glen Avon.

UNLV's win becomes secondary

Close friend of Tarkanian suffers heart attack, dies

LONG BEACH — Although Nevada-Las Vegas earned its seventh straight NCAA berth, coach Jerry Tarkanian was downcast Saturday after his Runnin' Rebels beat New Mexico State, 68-62, in the championship game of the Big West Conference tournament.

Armen Sarafian, the former Pasadena City College president who hired Tarkanian as coach in 1966, suffered a heart attack in the bleachers near the end of the game and died about three hours later.

The post-game awards ceremony was delayed for several minutes while paramedics attempted to revive Sarafian, who was taken to St. Mary Medical Center. Tarkanian was at the hospital when Sarafian died.

"He was like a second father to me," Tarkanian said of his friend, who was chancellor of the Peralta Community College District in Oakland, Calif. "He said he would see us after the game. It's a really shocking thing."

Big West commissioner James Haney said a prayer for Sarafian before beginning the awards ceremony, then told the crowd, "I know there is a balance between what is happening to this man's life and the deserving recognition for these players."

David Butler scored 17 points and Anderson Hunt 12 for UNLV, 26-7. Stacey Augmon, who was named tournament MVP, had 11 points and 12 rebounds for the Rebels.

UNLV blew most of a 17-point lead in the last 10 minutes.

"I'm just glad we got the win," Tarkanian said. "We played cautiously in the second half, and we're not

good when we play cautiously."

UNLV was outscored 29-24 in the second half after leading 44-33 at halftime.

"I thought at times today we really played well, but to play well in the next tournament we have to play well for longer," Tarkanian said.

UNLV took its biggest lead, 63-46, on Barry Young's third 3-pointer of the game with 10:12 left. But Keith Hill made two 3-pointers and had eight points during a 10-2 run that cut the Rebels' advantage to 66-59.

Butler then made two free throws, but Willie Joseph hit a 3-pointer at 3:24 as New Mexico State pulled to within 68-62.

Hill missed the front end of a one-and-one with 54 seconds left, and Hunt did the same six seconds later. Hill threw up an air ball from 3-point range, and Augmon blocked a 3-point try by Jeff McCool in the closing seconds.

"We let up and they came back," Hunt said. "Usually we run and gun and don't play slowdown. We had to adjust. We had a lot of careless passes — Stacey had one and I had one. We were out of sync."

"We got a little sloppy, but this was a big win for us," Butler said. "In the Big West Conference, teams get jacked up to play us. When the game was close they were pumped up. We made some mistakes but we held on."

Hill had 22 points for New Mexico State, 21-10, which is hoping for its first postseason bid in a decade.

Stanford turns back UCLA

INGLEWOOD — Stanford outshot, outrebounded and outran UCLA in the semifinals of the

Pacific-10 Conference tournament.

Todd Lichti scored 23 points and reserve freshman Adam Keefe, a Woodbridge High product, had 22 points and 11 rebounds as the 12th-ranked Cardinal took command early and went on to beat the Bruins, 95-86, to move into the championship game.

Stanford led by 22 points with six minutes left before UCLA rallied to make the final score respectable.

"We came ready to play mentally and did the things we wanted to do," Stanford Coach Mike Montgomery said. "We boarded them well, we ran the break and we played the type of game we needed to beat a team like UCLA."

"It was a tremendous effort on our part. It's been a while since we've played this well."

Stanford outrebounded the Bruins, 39-30, and outshot them from the field, 65-49 percent.

"They shot the ball extremely well and they rebounded exceptionally well," UCLA Coach Jim Harrick said. "They're a lot stronger than we are and they probably played as well as they have all season. They beat us in every phase of the game."

The win was the 11th straight and 21st in the last 23 games for Stanford, which is 26-5 overall. UCLA fell to 20-9.

Stanford will meet top-ranked Arizona in today's championship game. Stanford has beaten Arizona in each of the last two seasons. The Cardinal's 83-78 win over the Wildcats on Jan. 5 is the only Arizona loss to a Pac-10 team this season.

"We're pretty confident we can beat them if we can do the things we can do," said Lichti, who had eight rebounds and five assists Saturday.

"A lot of the game will depend on what kind of start we get. If we start off even with them, I think we have a chance. If we start off faster than them, I think we have a very good chance."

Pooh Richardson scored 24 points for UCLA, while Trevor Wilson added 22 points and eight rebounds. Freshman Don MacLean, the Bruins' leading scorer, got all of his 14 points in the second half.

Harrick said Stanford "took us out of our game with their physical play, pushing and shoving, and we don't respond well to that because we're a finesse team. They made us play the way we played and that's a tribute to their team. It's hard to envision a bigger and stronger team in the country than Stanford."

In the other Pac-10 semifinal: Arizona 98, Oregon State 87: Sean Elliott scored 21 of his 29 points in the first half as top-ranked Arizona overpowered Oregon State.

Anthony Cook had 15 of his 24 points in the opening 20 minutes for the Wildcats, who stretched their winning streak to eight games and earned their 18th victory in their last 19 games.

The Wildcats, 26-3, made 20 of 28 field goal attempts in the first half and built a 52-38 lead.

Cook scored seven points in the first 1:35 of the second half as the Wildcats stretched their lead to 59-40. Oregon State couldn't cut the lead under 12 points until the final minute of the game.

Gary Payton scored 25 points for Oregon State, 22-7, while Eric Knox added 23.

Elliott, limited to five points in the first 33 minutes of Arizona's quarterfinal win over Washington State, surpassed that total in the first 7:28 against Oregon State.

Oklahoma survives another close call

Last-second shot lifts Sooners past Iowa State, 76-74

If winning close games late in the season is good preparation for the NCAA Tournament, Oklahoma may be the team to beat.

Tyrone Jones' 3-point shot with one second left Saturday gave the second-ranked Sooners a 76-74 victory over Iowa State in the semifinals of the Big Eight tournament at Kansas City, Mo. On Friday, the Sooners, 28-4, beat Colorado in double overtime.

Victor Alexander, whose basket with 35 seconds left put the Cyclones, 17-11, ahead 74-73, had a chance to extend the lead after being fouled with eight seconds remaining. But he missed the front end of the 1-and-1. Oklahoma rebounded and Mookie Blaylock got the ball to Jones for the winning shot from the left corner.

Missouri 88, Kansas State 83: Anthony Peeler and Doug Smith keyed an 11-3 run at the start of the second half as No. 10 Missouri, 26-7 overall and 6-4 under interim coach Rich Daly, advanced to the title game.

In the Atlantic Coast Conference:

North Carolina 88, Maryland 58: J.R. Reid scored 17 points as the ninth-ranked Tar Heels, 26-7, reached the finals of the ACC tournament for the 17th time in 36 years. Maryland, which played without hospitalized coach Bob Wade, finished the season at 9-20 and suffered the worst loss ever in an ACC tournament semifinal.

Duke 69, Virginia 58: Danny Ferry scored 23 points after going scoreless in the first 16½ minutes as the No. 7 Blue Devils, 24-6, beat Virginia, 19-10, for the 15th straight time.

In the Big East Conference:

Georgetown 85, Pittsburgh 62: Charles Smith scored 26 points to lead No. 3 Georgetown, 25-4, which broke the game open with a 20-0 run in the first half. Pittsburgh, with a 17-12 record and four victories over Top 10 teams this season, is hoping for an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament.

Syracuse 81, Seton Hall 78: Sherman Douglas scored 27 points and fifth-ranked Syracuse, 27-6, made 12 of its last 14 free throws to beat No. 11 Seton Hall, 26-6, for the 17th straight time. John Morton led Seton Hall with 27 points.

In the Southeastern Conference:

Florida 76, Tennessee 71: Livingston Chatman, who scored 25 points, broke a 61-all tie with a free throw and added a field goal 18 seconds later. The Gators then stretched the lead with free throws in

the final minutes.

Alabama 83, Vanderbilt 79: Alvin Lee scored 24 points, including three straight 3-pointers during one stretch, as Alabama moved into the championship game. Vanderbilt hit 11 of 19 from 3-point range, including a tournament-record six by Barry Booker.

In the Metro Conference:

Louisville 71, Memphis State 70: No. 16 Louisville scored the final 10 points of the game to advance to the tournament final for the fourth straight year. Freshman Everick Sullivan hit the front end of a 1-and-1 with two seconds left to give the Cardinals, 21-8, the winning margin. Memphis State is 21-10.

Florida State 80, South Carolina 63: Derrick Mitchell scored 20 points and Tony Dawson 17 as No. 14 Florida State, 22-6, downed South Carolina, 19-10, for the third time this season.

A few veterans hoping to hang on one more year

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — In the autumn of their careers, a few major leaguers arrived in Florida and Arizona this year looking for one more spring.

Ron Guidry and Tommy John, a part of the New York Yankees' past, would like another chance at the future.

Darrell Evans, 41, is back in West Palm Beach with the Atlanta Braves. In Plant City, Pete Rose is the manager and Tony Perez a coach for Cincinnati. One of their old teammates on the Big Red Machine, Ken Griffey, wants to play one more year at the age of 39.

Shortstop Dave Concepcion, another part of the Big Red Machine, is trying to make it with the California Angels at 40.

"What will I do if I don't make it?" John, 45, said in response to a question. "I'll probably go home and play with my kids. I haven't had a summer free for a long time."

Last week, Ben Oglivie got his chance to go home sooner than expected.

His comeback with the Milwaukee Brewers ended with a knee injury and arthroscopic surgery.

John, Guidry, Evans and Griffey have survived the first full week of spring training. They hope to make it to another opening day, but there are no regrets if they don't.

They have made their mark in baseball and have the numbers to prove it.

Evans, a non-roster player with the Braves, has been a major leaguer since 1970 with Atlanta, San Francisco and Detroit. He has 403 career home runs, including 40 in 1985 with the Tigers at the age of 38.

"I just wasn't ready to say I couldn't play anymore," Evans said. "I had 22 home runs and 64 RBI last season."

On Tuesday, Evans stood behind home plate talking to New York Mets Manager Dave Johnson.

As teammates with Atlanta in 1973, Evans hit 41 home runs and Johnson had 43.

"I never really put a timetable on playing," Evans said. "When it ends it ends."

If the Reds keep Griffey, he could be part of history. His son, Ken Griffey Jr., has a shot at making the Seattle Mariners.

If they both stick, it would be the first time in baseball history a father and son have played in the majors at the same time.

"I must be old if my son is about to become a major leaguer," Griffey joked. "I'm not the only old guy here."

Also trying to win a spot on the Reds are Manny Trillo, 38, Joel Youngblood, 37, and Kent Tekulve, 42.

After the Yankees acquired Dave LaPoint, Andy Hawkins and Jimmy Jones, it seemed unlikely John and

Guidry would be back.

New Manager Dallas Green thought the Yankees needed to go with younger pitchers, but agreed to give them a chance this spring at George Steinbrenner's behest.

"I know I can throw," Guidry, 38, said. "But I have to find out if I can still pitch."

In a 'B' game last weekend, Guidry pitched two scoreless innings against Baltimore.

If Guidry makes it, the left-hander will be used as a middle-inning reliever.

In the same game, John also pitched two shutout innings.

"People know what I can do," John said. "I know I throw the ball well enough to still pitch in this league."

John needs 14 victories for 300 in his career.

Angels turn back Brewers

CHANDLER, Ariz. (AP) — Lance Parrish drove in three runs with a pair of doubles Saturday as the California Angels defeated the Milwaukee Brewers 9-5.

Devon White also provided three runs for the Angels, two of them in the fourth inning and another on a grounder to second during a five-run outburst in the seventh.

Parrish doubled home a run in the sixth and added two RBI in the seventh.

Johnny Ray singled three times and had two RBI for California, whose exhibition record is 5-5.

Don August started for Milwaukee, 6-4, giving up four hits and two runs in four innings. Leo Perez took the loss, going two innings and allowing four runs on four hits.

Angels rookie Jim Abbott pitched three innings in relief. He retired the first six batters he faced before the Brewers collected two hits and two runs.

Abbott took the mound for his second regulation stint of the spring more relaxed than he had been for his debut against Oakland on Tuesday, and it showed.

He couldn't have had a scoreless outing, if not for his own wild pitch, which set up Milwaukee's two run-scoring grounders.

"I wasn't nervous. I feel I'm getting comfortable with all the people around me," he said. "Maybe that's a sign that I'm getting more confident."

"I'm just becoming more used to being in a major league uniform. The novelty is starting to wear off."

Counting "B" games, the Angels have won a total of six exhibitions and Abbott has figured in three of them, with two wins and a save.

"The last time, I was trying to rush everything," Abbott said. "This time I slowed everything down, keeping my mechanics in order."

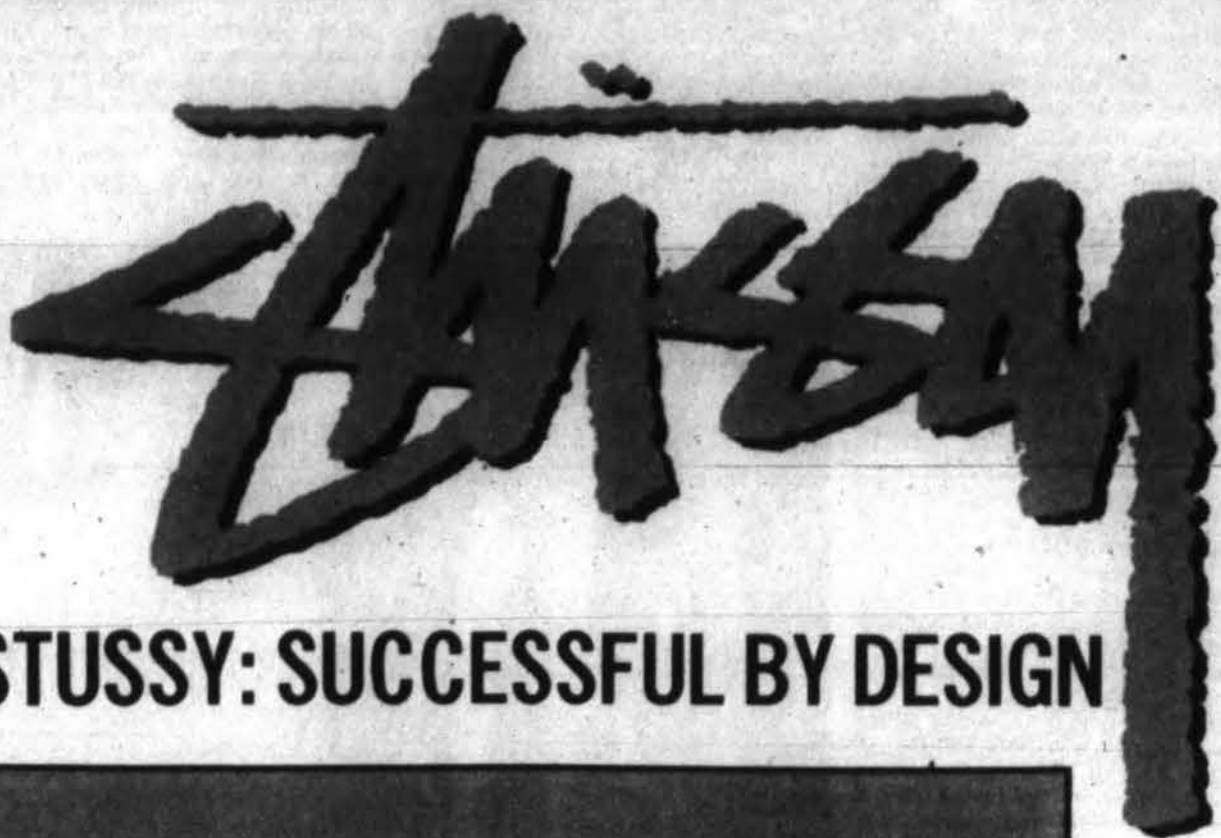

STUSSY: SUCCESSFUL BY DESIGN

At 13 years old he taught himself how to make surfboards and ruined his parents' garage floor.

After a high school career in Garden Grove which concentrated more on surf reports than book reports, he left Orange County to become a ski instructor in Mammoth.

While this might not sound like the typical beginning of an entrepreneurial success story, the plot has worked for popular clothing designer Shawn Stussy to the tune of \$5 million a year in sales nationwide.

At 34 years old Stussy still surfs, but with his dark hair worn slicked-back and a soul patch under his lip threatening to become a full goatee, Stussy looks about as much like a typical surfer as he does a successful businessman.

If this young designer is beginning to sound something like an anomaly, you've got a good idea of what a Stussy original looks like. There are shirts which button first one way and then the other, sweat

pants that aren't gathered at the bottom and graphic designs which Stussy describes as "reggae and Rastafarian influenced."

In the garage studio of the Laguna Nigel home he shares with his wife, Stussy — dressed in the thrift store chic of a true bohemian — worked on his designs for next season's T-shirts while he talked.

Now, most sportswear designers put out T-shirts with logos or slogans, but Stussy's T-shirts are in a category of their own.

Last year a T-shirt was introduced displaying a fluorescent Marilyn Monroe holding down her skirt and yelling "Skate tough you little boys!!"

Next season, look for a shirt featuring four kids — each in a black and white photograph looking like it dates from the 1940s — with these words wrapped around the graphic: "Stussy Youth Brigade / You Don't Know Your Past, You Can't Know Your Future! Live Clean!! Stay Young!!"

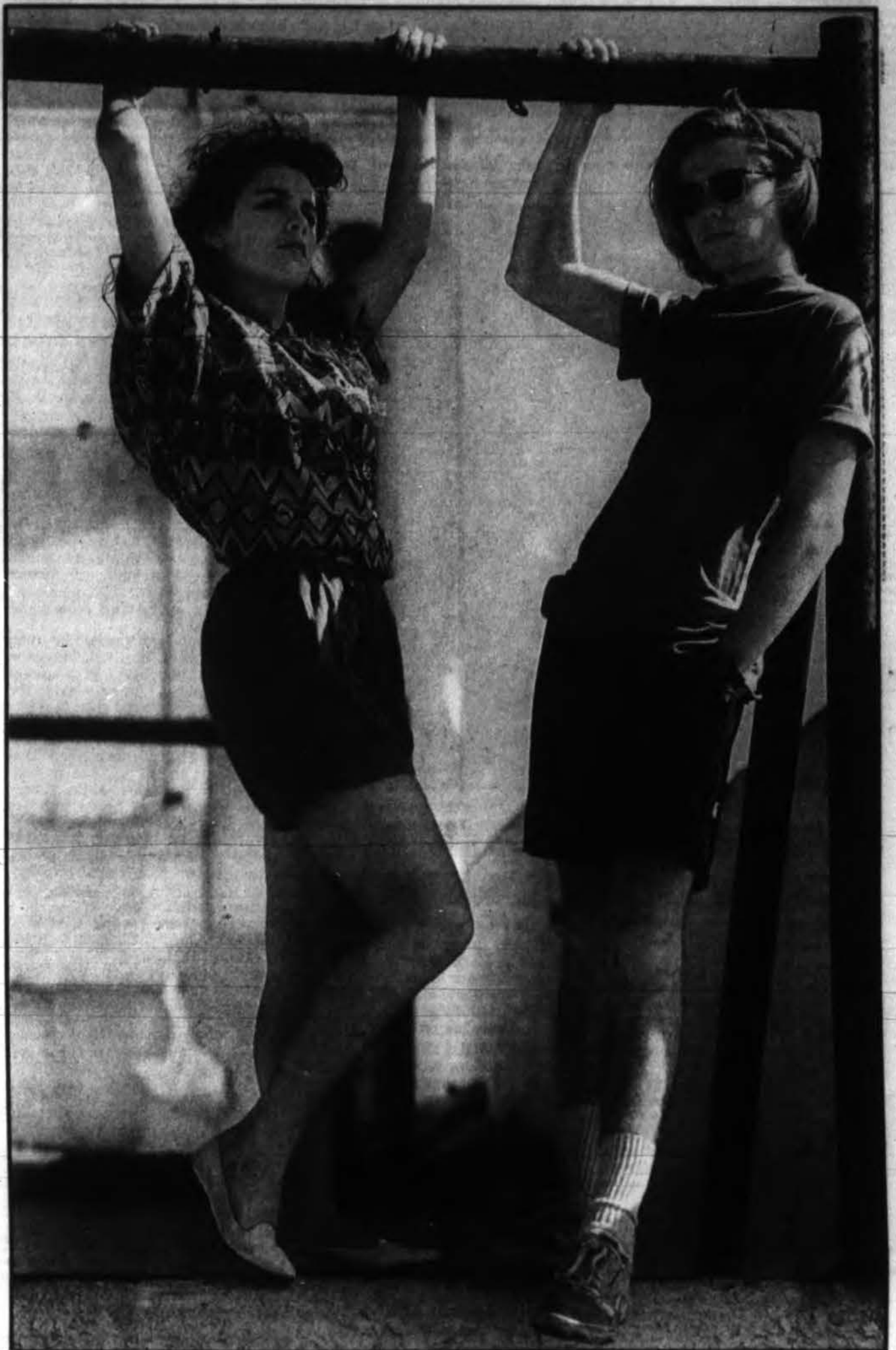
Although he admits that a

positive statement such as "Live Clean!" might attract a credit card wielding parent more so than a shirt with, say, "Anarchy" emblazoned across the front, Stussy denies any particular marketing philosophy. "I design for myself and my friends," he said, "it's the skate kids who interpret it correctly."

What appears to be a morality statement is, according to Stussy, "just fun words." He did admit, however, that he prefers the positive message. "It's easy to be harsh," Stussy said, "it's harder to be positive with an edge."

With business partner Frank Sinatra — not the singer, of course, but another old surfing buddy — Stussy spends a chunk of each year traveling around the world in search of new ideas. Much of that time is spent in Japan because "Tokyo's the best for the coolest new designs," he said.

Stussy has spent so much time studying the works of Japanese designers that he has found himself emulating some of the best. "I'm like the Yoshi

Yamamoto of the beach," Stussy laughed.

"Some designers, their stuff looks the same all the time. I like trying really different things," he said. Some of the different things Stussy is trying include two new T-shirts that can best be described as gothic surf-wear: black and white images of the Stussy family crest — admittedly altered somewhat in this generation — dating back to the 15th century.

Like the four kids pictured in the "Youth Brigade" shirt, most of Stussy's cut and sew designs lean toward the whimsical — and even the goofy. One dress shirt created by Stussy begins with an oversize top button, with each succeeding button diminishing in size. The reason Stussy gives for this inventive choice is that, perceptually, this is the way your buttons appear, looking down.

The playful quality displayed in Stussy clothing can also be found in the company he created. Besides working on last-minute designs, on this day Stussy was also making final preparations for a company ski trip — including 22 employees and their families.

The clothing business began in 1978 with a few T-shirts

imprinted with Stussy logos and sold in surf shops to promote the boards Stussy made by hand.

In 1984, Stussy saw a market for the shorts he and his friends wore made of cut-off Air Force chinos, so he got a bolt of cotton twill and went to work on the first of his "cut and sew" line.

The business remained small, almost grass roots, for a number of years. Twenty-one-year-old assistant Emmy Sinatra, sister of the business manager, said that she first started working for Stussy as a teenager, "selling his clothes

out of the back of my car after school."

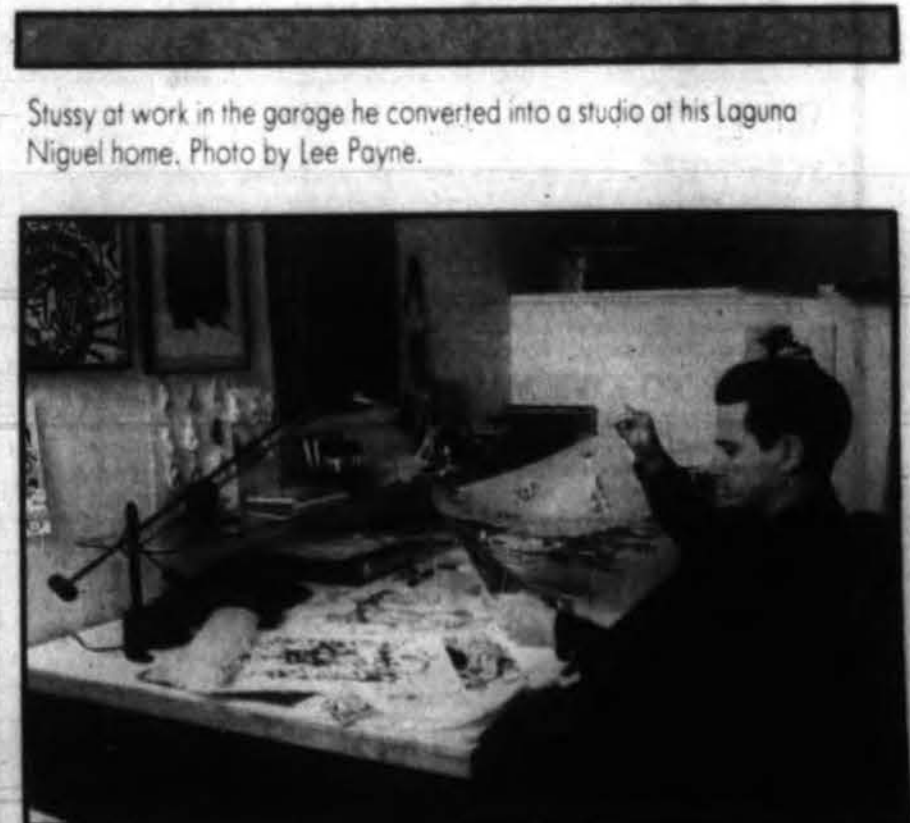
By 1987, Stussy's "sophisticated street wear" was appearing in some of the trendier stores in Southern California. Although basically a men's line of clothing, Stussy found that one half of all sales were going to women and so now describes his creations as unisex.

Now that Stussy's designs appear in retail stores nationwide, his fondest hope is that the business will somehow "level out."

After all, even a successful businessman would like to take a little time off to surf.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I live in Stockton, Calif. A great many people who had never heard of Stockton became aware of us recently when a psychopath shot five little children to death and wounded 29 others. He then turned the gun on himself, which seems to be the style these days.

The drifter responsible for this carnage bought an AK-47 rifle in Oregon last summer for \$300. In case you don't know much about weapons, I will tell you that it can fire 600 rounds in one minute.

How can a mentally deranged person like that get to own such a weapon? It's simple. The National Rifle Association has one of the richest and most powerful lobbies in Washington and they say it is the right of every American to "bear arms." Never mind that some of these Americans are high on drugs or just plain crazy.

A spokesman for the National Rifle Association appeared on NBC's

"Today" show after the shooting. He sounded like an escapee from the loony bin. I could not believe my ears when I heard him blame the judges and law-enforcement officers. He said that if they had done their jobs, the killer would have been in jail instead of running around loose killing children.

It seems as if we are becoming an increasingly violent, gun-happy society and I fear for the future. Do you see any answers out there, Ann? What can we do about this horrendous problem? — A.D., STOCKTON, CA

Dear A.D.: You can write your senators and congressman and put the heat on. Let them know that you will not vote to re-elect them if they support the National Rifle Association. Sign your name.

Joseph Cosco, a staff writer of the Virginian-Pilot in Norfolk, brought home the severity of the problem when he published this list:

Dec. 3 — A man driving home with his wife after celebrating their 29th wedding anniversary was shot and killed by a motorist on the Nimitz Freeway near downtown Oakland. The assailant said he wanted the traffic to go faster because a passenger in his car had to go to the bathroom.

Dec. 16 — A distraught 15-year-old student killed one teacher and wounded another at Atlantic Shores Christian School in Virginia Beach.

Jan. 17 — A drifter in combat gear opens fire on a schoolyard in Stockton, Calif., killing five and wounding 29.

Jan. 20 — Gunfire erupts outside the Old Dominion University fieldhouse after a high school basketball game. Two are wounded.

Jan. 23 — A disgruntled employee wounds the body shop manager and another worker at a Norfolk car dealership before killing himself.

Jan. 24 — An 8-year-old boy shot his 6-year-old sister in the head. Police said the boy did it deliberately. The child has been declared brain dead and is on a life-support system in a Fairfax (Va.) hospital.

The experts, Cosco said, blame increased violence on a number of factors, including more stress, the glorification of brute force in the media, and the erosion of moderating influences such as family and religion.

Dr. Abbot L. Granoff, a Norfolk psychiatrist, blames stress and the messages conveyed by movies and TV. He said, "People are feeling less and less in control of their lives. The ultimate way to deal with frustration is to blow somebody away with a gun. That's the way to assert complete control. Movies such as 'Rambo' send the message that might makes right. To be decent and tolerant these days is to be labeled a wimp." To all of the above, I say, Amen.

Opening lead: King of ♦
We wrote a book some years ago entitled "Go With the Odds." But to do so when that odds is an exercise in futility is sheer stubbornness on your part.

The auction was quite simple. With the equivalent of an opening bid facing an opener, South bounced right into game as soon as a fit had been located.

West led the king of diamonds,

and East signalled with the jack. There followed in quick order the ace of diamonds and ace of clubs to complete the defensive book, then a low diamond. Declarer ruffed in dummy with the seven, came to hand with the ace of hearts and then had to decide how to play the trump suit for no loser.

Anyone with only a rudimentary knowledge of the probabilities should be aware that the percentage play with 10 cards missing the king is to take the finesse. So declarer led the jack of spades and, when West produced the two, flew up with the ace to drop the king! Making four-odd.

What made South abandon the probabilities? Had he seen the king of spades in the East hand?

To all intents and purposes, yes! West, who was a passed hand, had already shown up with 11 points in the minors. Had he held the king of spades as well, he would certainly have opened the bidding. Therefore, East was marked with the king.

Incidentally, if West doesn't cash the ace of clubs, declarer should play on clubs before he touches spades. When he discovers West has the ace of clubs, he can't go wrong in trumps.

Treatment can cure co-dependency

This preoccupation leads to a rigid pattern of behaviors which imprisons the uniqueness of the individual. Instead one functions in a state of distorted thinking or delusion resulting in a narrow view of what one sees, and a blinding from all helpful information.

A common symptom of co-dependency is physical illness. The distorted thinking and repression of feeling leads to physical problems such as headaches, colitis, back pain and shoulder tension. Excessive preoccupation with a problem may result in

frequent accidents.

Treatment of co-dependency focuses on helping the individual see the big picture. By breaking through the delusional thinking and experiencing the feelings in a safe environment the co-dependent is more apt to stop the medications they have been using. Through taking risks and making new choices the bad feelings begin to heal, leaving behind shame which was felt in the past. And finally the co-dependent learns to appreciate their uniqueness rather

than imprison it.

How does one accomplish this? By joining a 12 step support group such as Co-dependents Anonymous or Adult Children of Alcoholics, as well as seeking treatment with children of alcoholic work.

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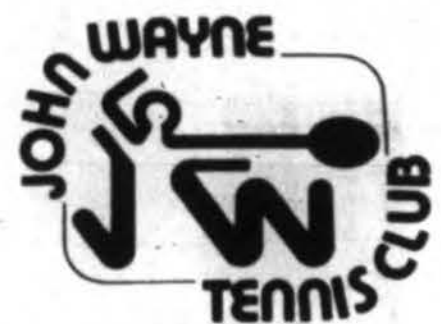
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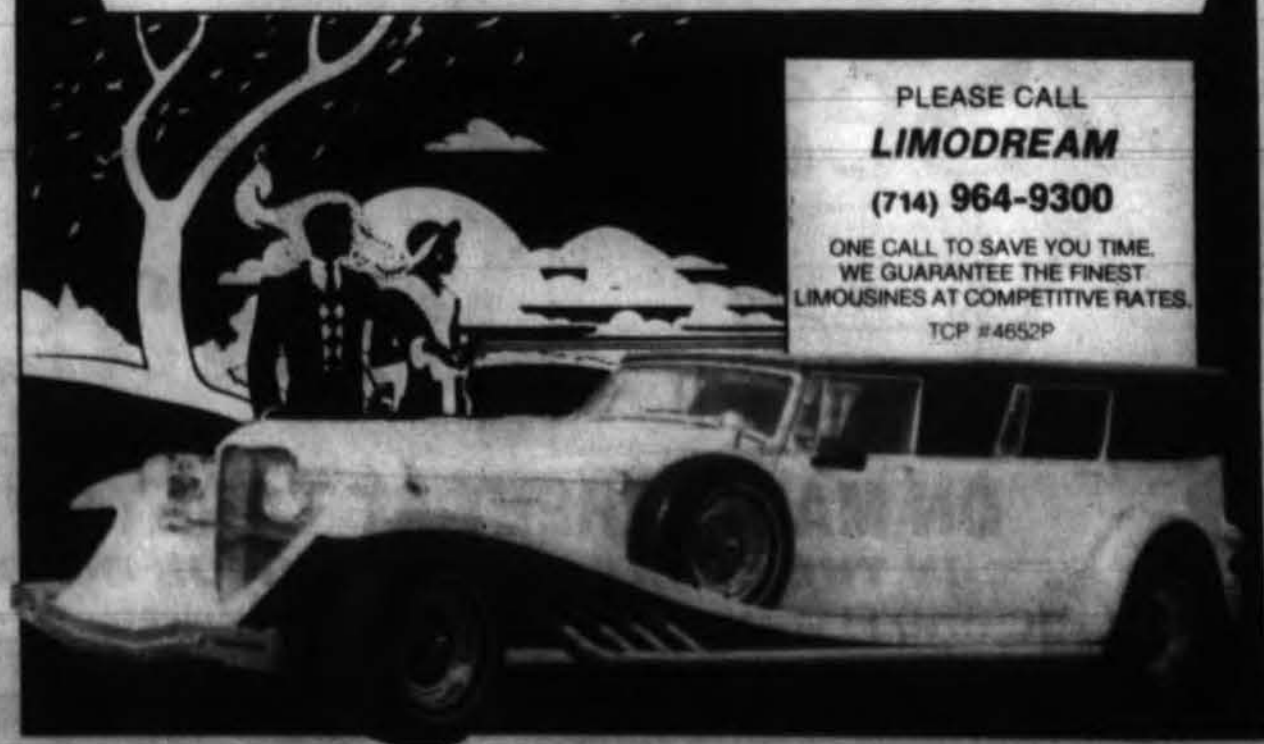

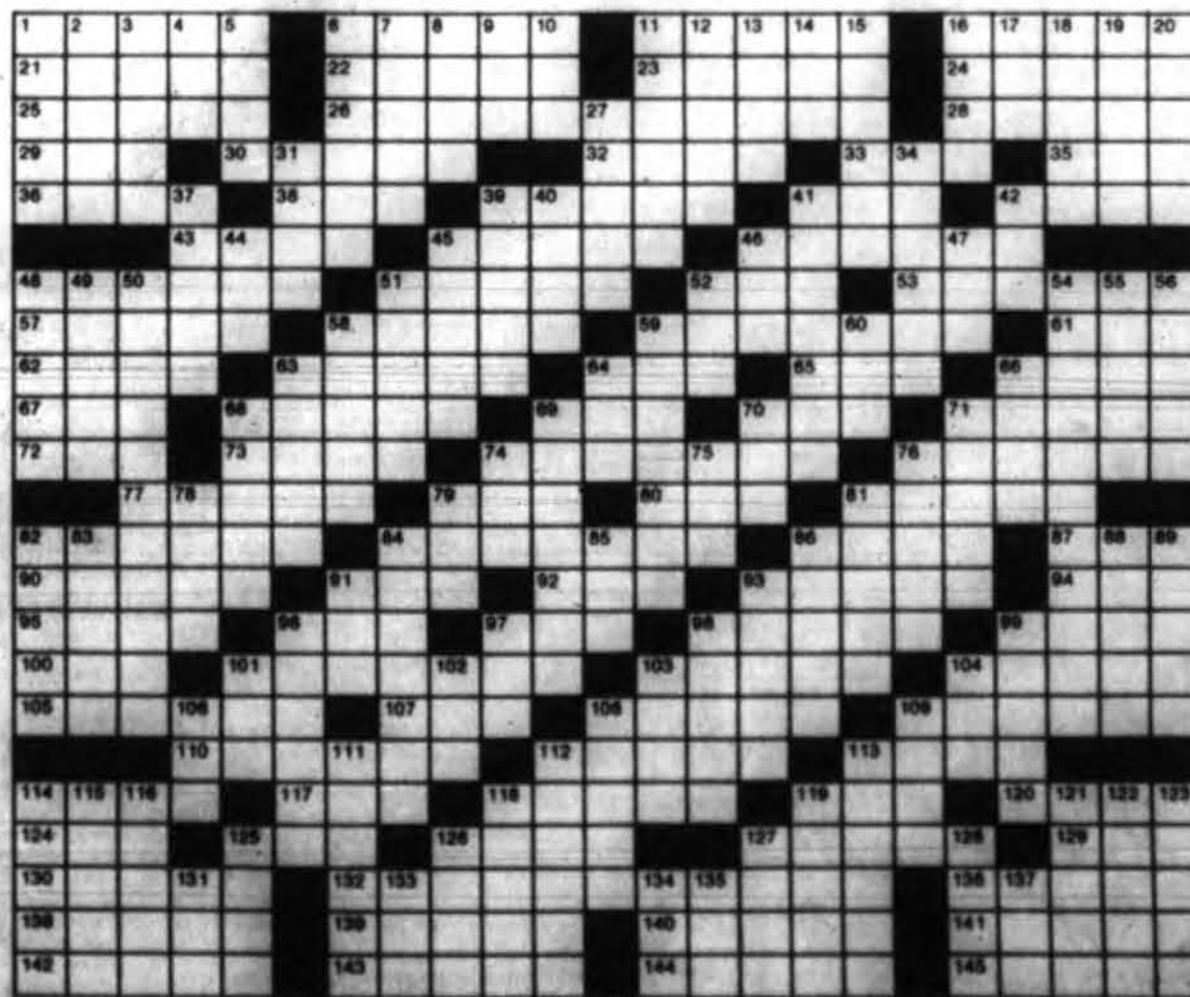
