Q I have never heard of the Trilateral Commission of which House Speaker Tom Foley, D-Wash., is a member. Does he get paid? Is this a gimmick to make more money, because Congress' plea for a raise was shot down?

It's not the money that draws the members; it's the prestige. The Trilateral Commission is a non-governmental, policy-

oriented think tank of 320 members from Western Europe, North America and Japan. They meet once a year in an attempt to solve common problems. This year's meeting was in Paris; next April's talk-fest is in Washington, D.C. Most of the funding comes from foundations and corporations; the government does not give financial support. Members receive only expense money. Among the 84 members from the USA: Foley, Henry Kissinger, Diane Feinstein, Alexander Haig, Jeane Kirkpatrick, Charles Robb and George Will.

The gum company has used 11 other sets of twins through the years; the current stars are 26-year-old twins Linda Ryan and Lisa Winters.

Q We hear references to the "baby boom" now more than ever. I know it started after World War II. What are the birth years of baby boomers?

Baby boomers are those born between 1946-64. They constitute about one-third of the USA's population — that's about 76 million boomers. According to *100 Predictions for the Baby Boomer* by Cheryl Russell (Plenum Press, \$17.95), nine of 10 baby boomers will marry once with the average marriage lasting 23 years; baby boomers will hold at least 10 different jobs in their lifetimes; children of divorced baby boomers rarely will see their fathers.

Q I read that the new Miss America, Debby Turner, is the third black woman to win the title. If Vanessa Williams wasn't the first, who was?

Vanessa Williams of New York was the first black Miss America winning the title in 1984. After *Penthouse* magazine published nude photos of her, Williams relinquished her crown to New Jersey's Suzette Charles, also black. That makes Debby Turner, the third black woman with a tiara on her tresses. The Mexico Mo., native is in high gear now, traveling across the USA making appearances for pageant sponsors. Average public appearances: 200 a year. Miles she'll travel: 200,000. The biggest surprise so far? "I still feel very normal. I still feel like plain Debby Turner," says the University of Missouri student. After the *Penthouse* controversy, Williams bounced back with a vengeance. Her debut album, *The Right Stuff*, went gold with four top-10 hits, and earned two Grammy nominations. Williams also won the 1988 NAACP Image Award for best new female artist.

HOW TO HAVE

A BLAST ^o in the '90s

... and other seasoned wisdom from the world's funniest 93-year-old, George Burns. Baby boomers take note: Work and love make it all worthwhile. And you DON'T have to know when to quit. **BY PAT HILTON**



He doesn't eat oat bran. He doesn't drink Perrier — in fact, he doesn't drink water at all. He isn't watching his cholesterol. He smokes. A vegetable on his plate gets a cooler reception than Zsa Gabor at a police officers' ball.

Yet today's health-conscious 40-year-old must live on and on and on to the year 2043 to be as old as George Burns, who is 93 and making plans for 100. And 110.

To live long and prosper The George Burns Way means work — not at your gym, but on your job. Because, says Burns, work is what life is all about.

And he's been living it up. Just out: his critically praised book *All My Best Friends*, a memoir with show biz stories of pals Jack Benny, Al Jolson, George Jessel, Eddie Cantor, Jimmy Durante, Walter Matthau. Last year's best seller, *Gracie: A Love Story*, is now in paperback. He has a new comedy video, *George Burns: His Wit and Wisdom*. He's eager to start filming *Oh, God! Book II* — but just turned down a script that didn't suit him. He's popular on Johnny Carson's *Tonight Show* and continues his live stage performances.

Being around George Burns is invigorating for some one half his age. He looks to make sure you're laughing at a punch line. He's really funny in person, not just on stage. He gives you the sense that what matters is a lifetime, not one day's personal crisis or career problem.

And he just keeps getting better.

Fans include preschoolers, teenagers, young marrieds — and anyone old enough to remember the famous "Say good night, Gracie" sign-off on radio.

But, says Burns, "I'm not interested in things I've done. I'm interested in what I'm doing right now and what I'm doing tomorrow."

His young friend Brooke Shields, who will be Burns' age in the year 2059, says he makes old age "not such an abstract, frightening thing. He makes it more attainable and positive." And that makes Burns a joy to be around, says Shields. "I

think old age is very often associated with negativity and grouching. He doesn't have that."

Never is heard a discouraging word, says longtime friend Barry Mirkin. "He never complains. We all have ailments — he never talks about his."

Burns has arthritis, astigmatism and a hearing loss for which he wears one tiny hearing aid. He had a bypass operation at 79 and jokes that the surgeon, not he, has since lied.

Today, Burns is one of 1.1 million people in the USA who are 90 or older. By the year 2040, the figure is expected to leap to 5.4 million as today's baby boomers begin hitting their 90s.

So look at Burns as being on the cutting edge of a trend: growing old sassily.

But just because Burns smokes and drinks doesn't mean youngsters can imitate him and live into their 90s, says Dr. John W. Rowe, a geriatrics specialist and president of Mount Sinai Medical Center in New York City. Because Burns doesn't actually inhale his cigar smoke, "Maybe he's not breaking a rule. Maybe he likes to say he breaks rules he only bends."

As for not letting water or vegetables pass his lips, it's more important that Burns had decades of balanced diets.

Besides, Burns has stretched and grunted through a routine based on Royal Canadian Air Force Exercises every morning since he was a callow youth of 59.

"It's increasingly obvious," the doctor says, "that normal aging results in far less loss of function than we used to think. We now realize that with proper lifestyle and good medical care there is no reason that very large numbers of people will not live to their 90s, fully functional."

Sure, Burns has had to tone some things down. "There are lots of things you can't do when you're 90. Everything gets older — everything I've got is 93. You don't see as well. You can't kick the back of your head. You can't do splits. You need a new finish; you have to have a new exit. It would be great if some part of your body stayed 17. But your mind doesn't get old — your body does."

Ask him a question, and he looks at you through his familiar round-rimmed glasses and answers immediately and to the point. The answer is serious. At first. Somewhere down the line the punch line comes, after which he chuckles and says, "That was a lie. I lie a lot."

Smoking a stogie, he's perched comfortably on a chair in his office in West Hollywood, where he goes every day to work with longtime manager Irving Fein and comedy writer Hal Goldman. The window shutters match the wood paneling; the office is furnished with brown leather chairs and a few plants. It's dominated by a large desk behind which hangs a picture of Gracie, with another on a table below.

Soon he's on his feet to get a new cigar; later he checks his schedule with secretary Jack Langdon and is off to the parking lot, heading for a spartan lunch and a cut-throat bridge game at the Hillcrest Country Club.

Between Burns' reminiscences and humor lies some solid, serious advice for today's baby-boomer youngsters. (When you're 93, everybody is a youngster.)

"I think the most important thing is to fall in love

Love is the key word here. "It's better to be a failure at something you love than a success at something you don't."

He claims to know whereof he speaks, insisting that he was a failure from age 8 to 27. Age 8 was when he and three pals formed the Pee Wee Quartet and he got his first taste of show business by singing in yards and saloons and on the Staten Island Ferry. Age 27 was when he met Gracie Allen, his partner and wife of 38 years, who brilliantly played dumb to his straight man, winning the duo accolades in vaudeville, movies, radio and television.

What Burns has learned through the years is the importance of adjusting his act to his age — which is probably why he still delights audiences, why he never embarrasses. He talks, for example, about doing a dance with Bob Hope at their recent Madison Square Garden performance. "I did a dance that any 93-year-old man could do. Did you see the Fred Astaire picture?" His previous

8 a.m.

Arises, brushes teeth, showers.

8:15

Exercises for 25 minutes, based on Canadian Air Force drills. The stretches are "boring as hell. I hate it, but I do it."

Has breakfast of fruit and coffee.

9:15

Walks laps around his big backyard pool.

10:00

Arrives at modest office; works with comedy writer Hal Goldman. Working on book for 1990.

Noon

credits include Astaire's 1937 movie, *A Damsel in Distress*.

But he refuses to dwell on the past, and relentlessly updates his act to suit his age as well as the year on the calendar. "I talk about what's going to happen to me 10 or 20 years from now.

"Everything I talk about on stage fits my age. I talk about sex. I make fun of it. The kids today use three-letter words — see, I can't spell! — but I don't do that. I let the audience get the joke, the dirty part. The audience gets dirty, not me.

"For instance, when I sit down, there's a microphone there. I put it down and I say, 'Now I won't be able to get it up.'" Burns waits for the audience's mind to go where it will, then says, "You're wrong; I'm talking about the microphone. See, I'm a very nice man. I don't say anything dirty."

It was a lesson he learned years back, he says, when he and Gracie were on radio. They were playing unmarried people, Gracie was flirting with the announcer, and the ratings were dropping.

Desperately trying to stop the drop, George decided to turn them into what they were: a married couple with kids. And the ratings went back up immediately.

Gracie died in 1964.

This year, Burns broke off with his "50 years younger" girlfriend, Cathy Carr, and says they are determined to remain friends. He'll never remarry, he says, because he would make a bad husband. ("I can't get married. I'm lucky if I can get my cigar in my holder.")

He tries to be a good father, available to his son Ronny, daughter Sandy and seven grandchildren "whenever they want to see me." He has left money to his kids, "but not too much" because he thinks it's important for children to succeed on their own.

Other performers create a kind of extended family. Even Bob Hope, who is 86, slips into the universal impulse to act like a son to a father — there's a marvelous feeling of warmth. Testifies his friend Mirkin, when people see Burns, "They don't say, 'Hi, George.' They walk over and kiss him on the cheek."

And he teaches the adoring youngsters his work ethic. Don't ever retire, he says. "If you must cut back, work two hours a day instead of eight."

The hardest part to being 93 is that so many contemporaries are gone. "Sad things happen to you. People dying. My mother dying, my sisters, my brothers, Gracie, Jack Benny, Danny Kaye, George Jessel, the Marx Brothers." Then the twist: "You," he tells me, "are the only one I know who's alive."

He turns serious again — almost. "You can't do anything about dying. I don't think I'm going to die for a long time because I'm busy. I can't afford to die."

The message got through to Brooke Shields: "I will never retire, and it's because of working with people like him. He's proved there's no time to stop."

That's why Burns already is booked for two weeks at the London Palladium in January 1996 to celebrate his 100th birthday. Thinking about it, he grins slyly. "If I don't like my dressing room, I won't show up."

He's kidding, of course. George Burns is not about to miss a chance to have a blast in the '90s — at work.

On marriage

Heavyweights take on light dinners

A guy's gotta keep his figure, especially if he's a boxer. Before he can hop in the ring, he has to hop on the scales. So when we put three leading brands of frozen diet dinners to the taste test, we naturally headed to Philadelphia — *yo, Rocky!* — and rounded up five heavyweights at Joe Frazier's Gym, owned and operated by the former heavyweight champ and his family. We sent them into the ring with three top-selling brands of diet lasagna.

The champ: Lean Cuisine. A real knockout with our tasters.

"A great taste and a great aroma," said taster Rodney Frazier, Joe's nephew. "I would definitely buy this one."

He was joined by tasters Marvis Frazier, prizefighter and Joe's son; Mark Frazier, business manager and Joe's nephew; Louis Frasier, carpenter, no relation; and Dom Starling, contractor and model.

We limited our contenders to three national brands of single entrée offerings: Lean Cuisine, Weight Watchers and Budget Gourmet

How they rated:

Our 5 heavyweights ranked 3 top brands of diet lasagna for texture and taste/aroma.

Ratings 1 (worst) to 10 (best) are averages.

Stouffer's Lean Cuisine

Score: 7.2

Cost per ounce: 28¢

Calories: 270

Comments: Great taste with a rich, hearty aroma.

"Doesn't taste like diet food."

The Budget Gourmet Slim Selects

Score: 6.9

Cost per ounce: 20¢

Calories: 290

Comments: Great taste, but little aroma. Perfect texture.

"Tastes almost like Mom's."

Weight Watchers

Score: 3.4

Cost per ounce: 23¢

Calories: 340

Comments: Not much aroma. Overwhelming tomato flavor and not enough spice.

"This tastes like diet food."

Weight Watchers and Budget Gourmet Slim Selects. For consistency, we chose lasagna with meat sauce, a variety common to all. Each was prepared according to the package's microwave directions; cooking times ranged from six to 14 minutes.

With the exception of Lean Cuisine, our entrées seemed to be lacking in herbs and spices. Our heavyweights pinned them down as "flat and zestless."

"Lasagna is something you should smell as you're walking up the front steps," said Marvis. "My mom is a great cook and she makes terrific lasagna. When I was a kid, I could tell what we were having for dinner before I walked in the door. That aroma led me home."

Sales of diet foods topped \$750 million last year and accounted for one out of every four frozen entrées sold. It's no wonder: On any given day, there are an estimated 65 million to 80 million dieters in the USA. Perpetual weight watchers who think "they're always on a diet," aren't alone: Eighteen percent of the population diet steadily.

While it's true more women diet than men (50 percent of women vs. 25 percent of men), none of our heavyweights considered these lasagna entrées lightweight. "Most diet foods don't taste very good, but I like this," said Starling.

Given their girth, our tasters' appetites tend to be slightly larger than most dieters. Chuckled Mark, "I'd have to eat four or five of these to make a meal."

But do these dinners pack a nutritional punch?

Diet lasagna may be low in calories, compared with about 400 calories a serving for regular lasagna, but can it compete in the nutritional arena? The answer is yes — if it's not all you eat. Daily requirements for dieting women are 1,000-1,200 calories; men need 1,500-1,800. Mindy Hermann of the American Dietetic Association suggests these side dishes: a slice of whole-grain bread, a piece of fruit and a small salad with low-calorie dressing. They would cut the percentage of calories from fat and add fiber, which the dinners lacked. What the dinners contained:

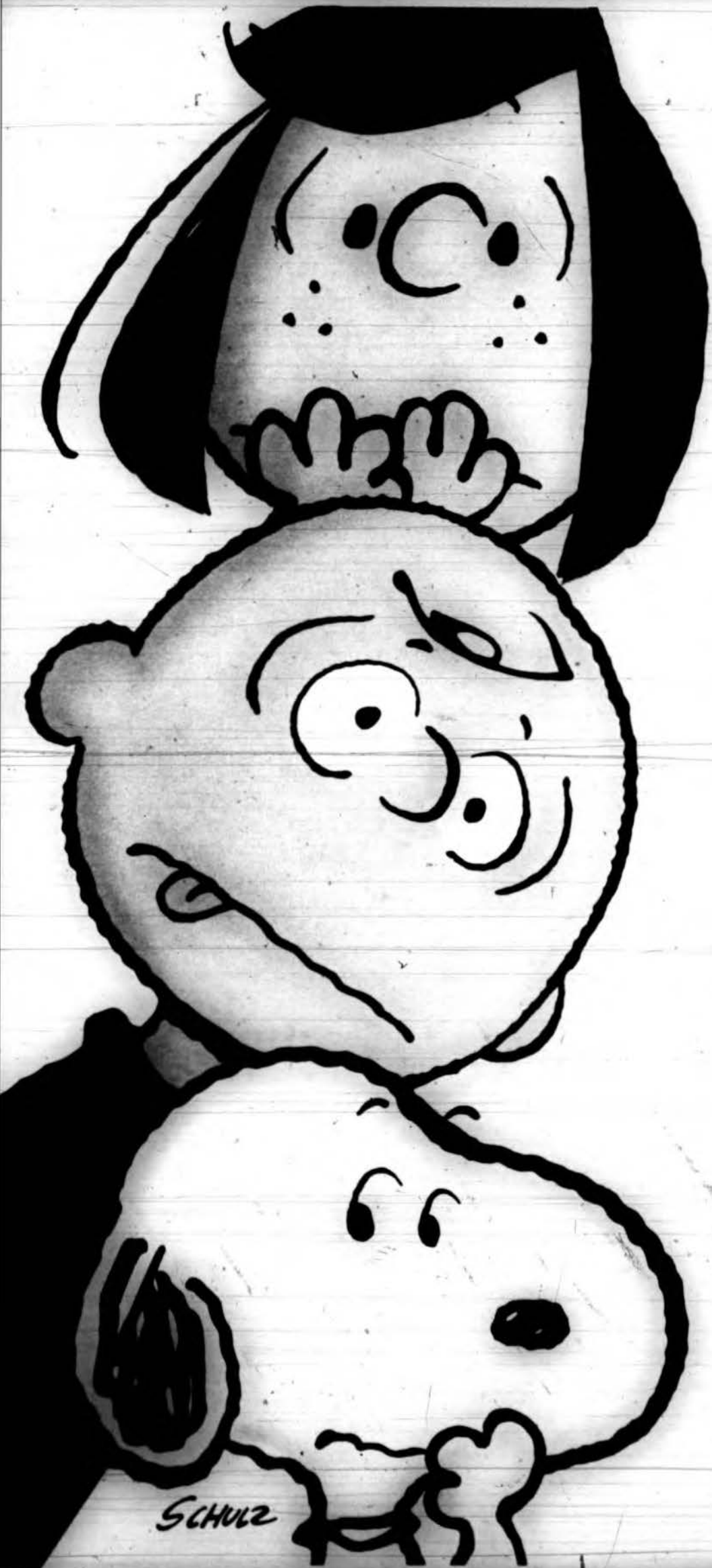
Fat: Lean Cuisine has the lowest, getting 27 percent of its calories from fat. Budget Gourmet follows with 31 percent, and Weight Watchers contains 37 percent. The American Heart Association recommends no more than 30 percent of your total daily calories from fat.

Cholesterol: Budget Gourmet came in at a healthy 25 mgs. Weight Watchers and Lean Cuisine tied with 70 mgs. The AHA recommends a 300 mgs. daily limit.

Sodium: Lean Cuisine was the biggest offender, at 1,070 mgs., followed by Weight Watchers, 1,060, and Budget Gourmet, 890. The AHA recommends no more than 3,000 mgs. of sodium per day. Those on sodium-restricted diets should avoid these entrées, and everyone else should watch what they eat at other meals.

Protein: All were high in protein, with 25-38 percent of the recommended daily allowance.

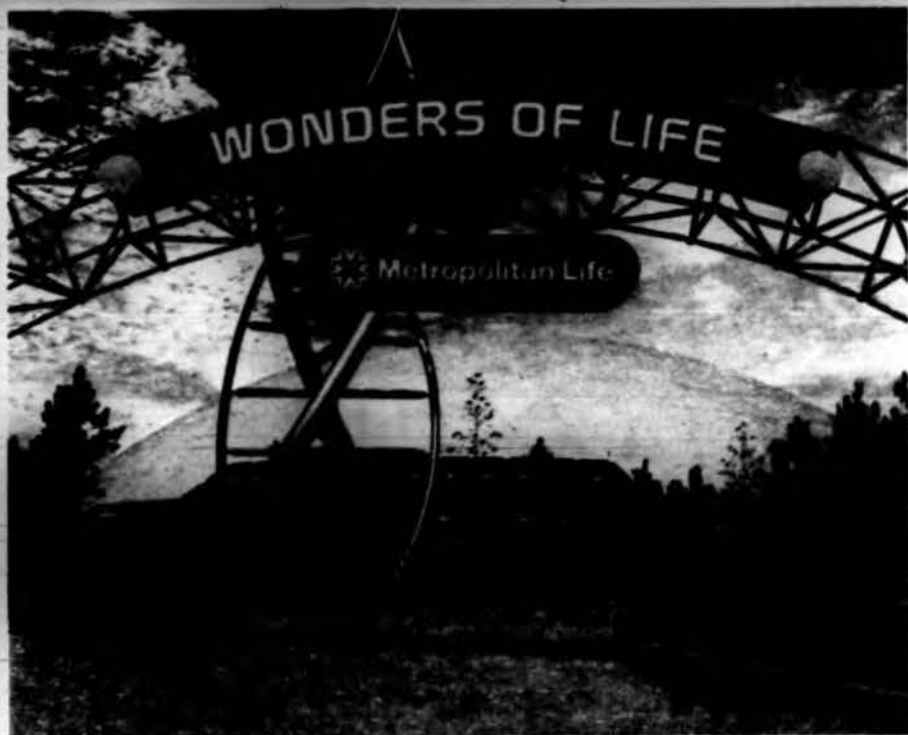


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Midwest flavor's in

From Lake Michigan's trout caviar to Iowa's Maytag blue cheese, the simple pleasures of Midwestern foods are in for some overdue recognition this weekend, as the American Institute of Wine & Food meets in Chicago.

How exactly do you define "Midwestern cooking?" That question is asked and answered — but not resolved — by food writers, producers and notables (Julia Child and Jeff Smith, of PBS's *The Frugal Gourmet*) attending the conference on Midwestern cooking.

Some argue Midwestern cooking is more about superb ingredients and less about a definable "cuisine" or regional cooking style.

"It is less contrived, less adorned," says cooking expert Abby Mandel, who is writing a book on the subject. "We want pork chops, corn and mashed potatoes to taste just like what they are."

"There is good cooking in the Midwest but I'm not sure it's a cuisine like Cajun or Tex-Mex," says Iris Bailin, food editor of the *Cleveland Plain Dealer*. "There are some wonderful foods produced here, and that's what the chefs are discovering and using."

What is clear is that we will continue to hear more about Heartland foods: Swiss, Muenster, and brie cheeses from Illinois and Wisconsin; smoked ham and sausages from Missouri; plus a long list of beers and wines.

One chef who takes Midwestern roots seriously is Stephen Langlois of Chicago's Prairie restaurant. He sampled pies at county fairs and traded recipes with Heartland cooks to find authentic, traditional tastes for his menu: spicy burgoo stew, walleye pike stuffed with wild rice, and roast chicken with chive cream gravy.

Other restaurants that serve good examples of contemporary Midwestern cooking are Foley's and Printer's Row in Chicago, Richard Perry's in St. Louis and Tapawingo in Ellsworth, Mich., says Bill Rice, food columnist for the *Chicago Tribune*.

Terczak's in Chicago also has resurrected family-style dining, a Midwestern tradition. Diners are seated at large tables, and all the food — pot roast, sausage-stuffed roast pork, warm potato salad — is placed in the center to be passed around. John Terczak calls it "gourmet home-style. People are ready for this, and it's starting here in the Midwest."

A holiday away

Holiday togetherness is great, but it can be a major headache if you're host to the family clan.

Solution: Leave the cooking, cleaning and tree-trimming to someone else.

The idea may sound Scrooge-ish, but an increasing number of families aren't going off to Grandma's, says Patricia Carpenter, author of *Away for the Holiday* (PCA Publishing, \$12.95). They're celebrating the season by abandoning home and hearth for a hotel, inn or resort, travel experts say.

Hotels once catering to business travelers now are hot for the family trade, even during holidays. They allow pets, offer day care, and eight in 10 have kids-stay-free packages.

Going away spares holiday hassles and maximizes the merriment for everyone, Carpenter says. She and her family discovered the joys of the holidays in a hotel about 15 years ago, while their house was being remodeled. They've hit the road for Christmas ever since.

Carpenter says you can spend as little or as much as you want traveling with the family. "You can rent a cabin in the woods, a beach house for the long weekend, or b & b's (bed-and-breakfasts) are fairly economical because you are paying by the room, not the person."

Jane Neighbors of Pleasant Valley, N.Y., senior copy editor for *Reader's Digest*, decided bed-and-breakfast would provide a homey, snowy setting for her far-flung family of 11 — and spare her the work. She has reserved a five rooms at the Red Shutter Inn in Wilmington, Vt., for the Christmas weekend. The cost: \$80 a day per double room, \$135 for the inn's suite, all including breakfast.

"We live in a big old farmhouse that sleep 12, which means that every single Thanksgiving and Christmas I do all the work," Neighbors says. "I loved doing it, but I just thought for once it might be nice if I didn't have to."

Robert and Frances Garland of Roanoke, Va., take a more southerly approach. For the past 30 years, the Garlands and their four kids have spent Easter at The Homestead, a grand old resort in Hot Springs, Va. In the past they've had four generations assemble there.

"It's just a place that you really fall in love with and you keep going back as long as you can afford it," says Robert Garland, a pharmacist. "It's a family tradition."

Part of what makes The Homestead a \$135-per-day, per-person cost worthwhile is the food, Garland says. Three meals are included, and Garland rates them five-star. Another big plus: lots to do, from Easter egg hunts to lawn bowling.



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Here are three tips from Carpenter for ensuring a happy holiday away:

Multigenerational clans should be sure there are activities that suit all ages.

Don't forget the food. If your family is accustomed to grand holiday feasts with all the trimmings, make sure the place where you're staying offers festive fixings.

Don't get too radical when making plans. If the family is used to white Christmases around the fireplace, don't head to sunny Florida for your first holiday hiatus. Be sure you select someplace wintry.

"We just do not have the time or the energy to create these wonderful holidays that are pictured on TV," Carpenter says. But by getting away for the holidays, families can focus on the fun — and leave the work to the pros.

Keep the costs down

Going away as a family can be expensive, especially over the holidays. Here are some money-saving tips from travel writer Patricia Carpenter:

■ Regular airlines offer few discounts over the holidays. So if you're flying, check with travel agents to see if less-expensive charter flights are available.

■ Consider selecting a destination within driving distance.

■ Consider vacationing in large cities; hotels often have special weekend rates.



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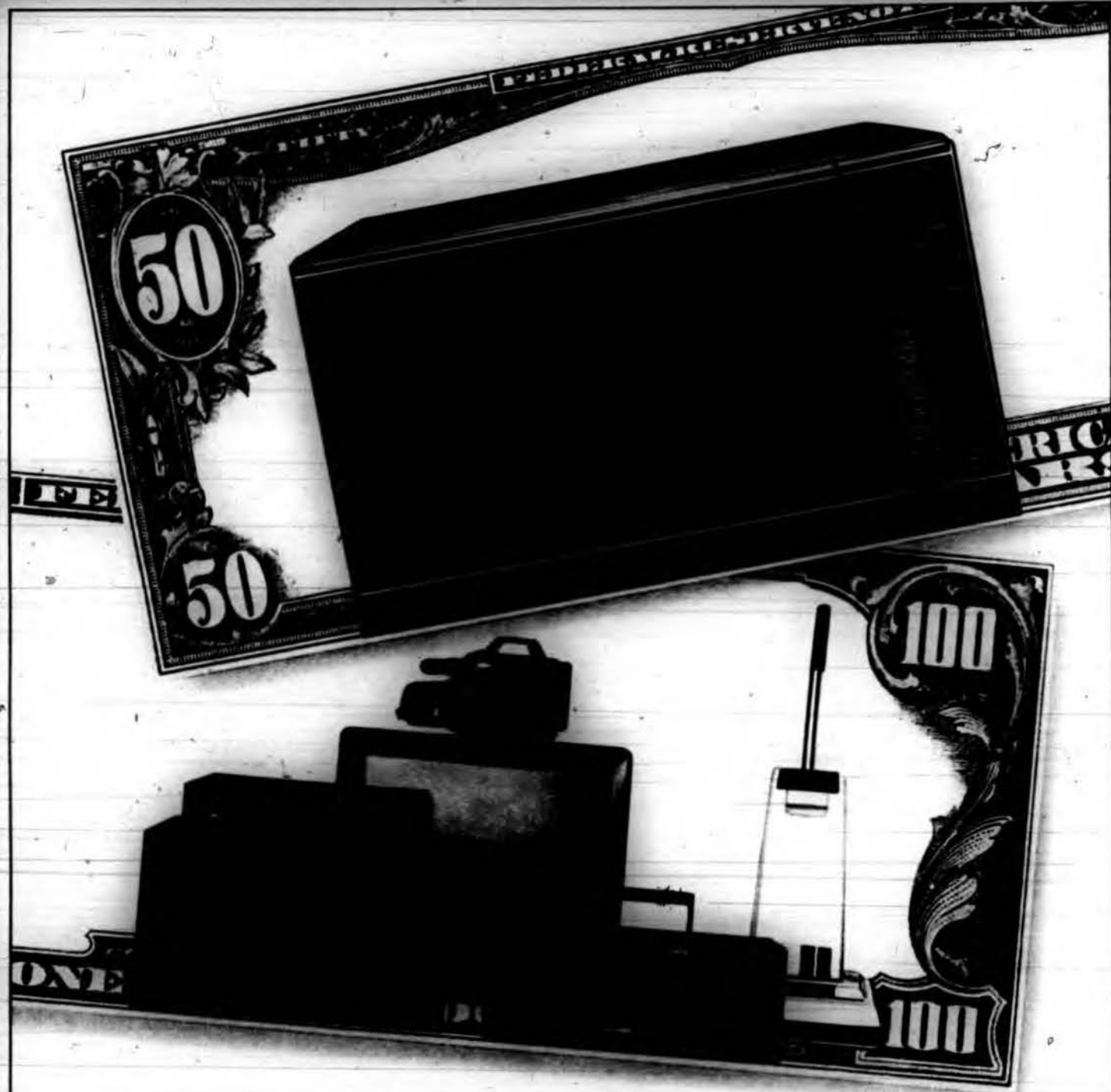

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

Why the best-selling writer is a basketball maniac

I've never been much of a sports fan. I'm the kind of person who watched the Wimbledon tennis tournament once a year and thought I'd accomplished an athletic feat. I used to see my husband, Steve, and our two sons, watching football on TV and think, "What a waste of a glorious weekend afternoon."

About four years ago I began watching basketball with Steve to keep him company. One day I had a revelation — not only did I know what was going on but I cared if our hometown team, the great L.A. Lakers, won.

I realized I was hooked last season when we were at The Forum (in Inglewood, Calif.) watching the Lakers play the Detroit Pistons. As each Detroit player was introduced, the fans booed. "Disgusting," I said to Steve, "Such bad sportsmanship, how can people be so rude?" When Detroit's Bill Laimbeer, a particularly rough player, was introduced, I was astonished to find myself on my feet, booing my heart out. I had crossed the line and become a fanatic.

You can't even answer the phone except during a timeout. When the season is over, we've lost half our friends, and it takes a month to recover from basketball deprivation.

Last word on labeling

If it's true that "you are what you eat," consumers may be having an identity crisis. Food labels are confusing and often misleading, critics say. But courage, consumers.

Congress, U.S. agencies and consumer groups are meeting over simpler, standardized labeling guidelines. Legislation before Congress now could make accurate labeling mandatory by 1990.

The need is there. Diet contributed to 1.5 million of the 2.1 million deaths in the USA in 1987, according to a U.S. surgeon general's report. But the food industry's track record on labeling is less than stellar. Examples:

Alar, a chemical that keeps apples firm and shiny, has been linked to cancer. It was being sprayed over 5 to 15 percent of the USA's crop until consumers forced growers to stop.

Kellogg's Cracklin' Oat Bran trumpeted its oat-bran contents as a way to lower cholesterol. But it also contained coconut oil, a highly saturated fat that raises blood cholesterol. Kellogg's took out the coconut oil.

Sara Lee dropped its "light classics" designation on some desserts after nine state attorneys general protested, using as their example Sara Lee's "Light" French Cheesecake, which had only 30 fewer calories than the original.

"We're told to make changes in our diets, but it's almost impossible to do when looking at today's food label," says Bruce Silverglade of the Center for Science in the Public Interest, one of 22 groups working to enact changes in food labeling. "Today's label either lacks information or provides incomplete data. And in some cases, it's misleading."

What's a consumer to do? Read labels cautiously and be aware many terms lack standard definitions. Some common stumbling points:

"CHOLESTEROL-FREE"

Term is undefined by regulators. Cholesterol is found in animal products. Some products may have no cholesterol at all, but be loaded with saturated fats (such as palm, coconut, palm kernel oils), which raise blood cholesterol levels.

"HIGH-FIBER"

Not defined by regulators; almost any product can claim "high-fiber" content.

"LITE OR LIGHT"

Regulators have an unwritten policy that these foods should contain one-third fewer calories than their full-calorie equivalents, but many firms do not comply. Shoppers interpret this term to mean reduced calories or fat, but it also can mean light color, taste or texture.

If the settlement receives final court approval, no one will be able to pursue a lawsuit based on those claims. All of the settling parties deny all of the claims made against them and also deny that anyone is entitled to any damages.

The proposed settlement established a fund of more than \$21,000,000 from which approximately \$3,500,000 has already been distributed to claimants who filed lawsuits on or before April 21, 1985. After payment of court-approved attorneys fees and costs, the money remaining in the settlement fund will be paid to persons who prove that they are entitled to an award from the settlement fund.

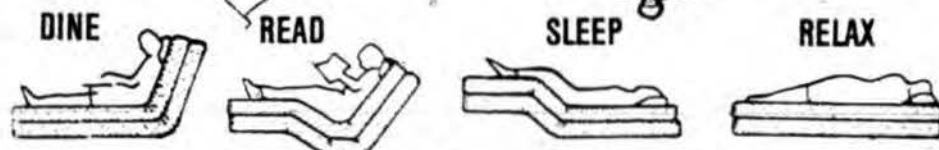

"Consumers should ignore bold claims, turn the product around and see if nutritional information is available," says Silverglade. "If not, call the company and ask for it."

Can controversy

Controversy over labeling has surfaced in the past and, just as quickly, been buried. Hearings held a decade ago produced a long list of proposed changes in food labeling that went nowhere fast.

But today, the food labeling issue is cooking again, thanks to environmental scares and increasing consumer awareness. U.S. officials were meeting last week with food retailers and manufacturers, consumers and others in San Antonio in the second of four hearings on labeling being held across the USA.

Congress also recognizes an issue with populist appeal. The Nutrition Labeling and Education Act of 1989, if passed, would make standardized labeling mandatory for all government-regulated foods.

"We agree that it's time to update the food label," says Roger Coleman of the National Food Processors Association. "Science has moved ahead of what we're providing."

But the food industry wants national laws to replace the crazy quilt of differing, sometimes contradictory, local regulations, "so people in Portland, Maine, get the same information as the folks in Portland, Ore."

When will we see the new laws? Industry and consumer experts disagree. Bruce Silverglade, of the consumer group Center for Science in the Public Interest, expects the labeling legislation to pass in early 1990, but industry experts see a longer fight. Compliance could take 12-18 months after passage.

Games: What's the buzz this fall

Just imagine commanding a tank platoon at war, or going on a POW rescue mission, or traveling the world searching for your missing dad. Well, you don't have to daydream, you can do it all by plugging into the newest wave of electronic games for TVs and PCs — as in personal computers.

The creative rush that has propelled electronic games from Pong to Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles keeps going. Expert Richard Sheffield tells us the latest wrinkles for whiz players — and for those who get dizzy trying to keep up.

NINTENDO SURGE

Three trends are keeping Nintendo's TV video games red hot.

First, a number of games loom as big sellers this fall by cashing in on the technique of converting hot coin-operated arcade games into the TV video game format. Among the games, which are generally \$40-\$50, are *Bad Dudes*, *Operation Wolf*, *P.O.W.* and *Ninja Gaiden*, the missing dad game.

Second, just as in Hollywood, sequels are safe bets. *Double Dragon II*, *Zelda II*, *Mega Man II*, and *Top Gun: The Second Mission* all could be mega-hits. And there are rumors about a December appearance of *Super Mario Brothers III*.

Third, personal computer games are

crossing over to Nintendo's TV format for the first time. Computer classics *Silent Service* and *Ultima* should do well with the 13- to 17-year-old group.

LAND OF LUCAS LOOMS

While still thoroughly dungeoned in the PC fantasy genre, with dragons and quests to prove it, *Loom*, by Lucasfilm Games, (\$59.95) creates its own universe. Designer Brian Moriarty — "I am tired

of dealing with orcs, trolls and glowing rings of power" — has created a mythical era in which a character named Bobbin must outfox evil. A half-hour audio drama on cassette introduces the characters and sets the mood.

The most striking feature is the game's ease of play. Once it's loaded, you're through with heavy keyboard work. Just point with a mouse, joystick or arrow keys and you're off into *Loom's* world.

WOMEN GET A TURN

Until recently, PC gaming starred male characters. But last year's superhit *King's Quest 4: The Perils of Rosella* featured a female lead and sold a rousing 800,000 copies. Creator Roberta Williams — "It just seemed like an obvious thing" to do — follows her success this fall with another female lead in *The Colonel's Bequest* (\$59.95). Set in New Orleans in the 1920s, the heroine is guided through a lighthearted murder mystery.

WORLD WAR 3-D

Just as military techno-thrillers are hot in the book market, military techno-simulations are hot PC games. Tom Clancy's *Red Storm Rising*, a nuclear attack sub game based on his book by the same name, got rave reviews this year — and Clancy has just inked a deal for a game based on his novel *The Cardinal of the Kremlin*. But one of the biggest PC hits for the holidays may be *M1 Tank Platoon* (\$69.95) by MicroProse. The detail and 3-D graphics are super. Four tanks and 16 men are put through a series of missions — and when it gets rough, you can call in air strikes or artillery for a clash with extra flash.

Video: Some offer more than your money's worth

What you get on video isn't always what you see in theaters.

At last count, there were more than 30 "special editions" of movies on videocassette with new footage added, old footage restored and even footage amputated.

The motives usually are commercial. *Angel Heart*, *Thief of Hearts* and the just-released *Scandal*, which did only so-so in theaters, have become hot rentals thanks to additional spicy footage that was cut to bag an R rating in the theaters. Consumers don't want to miss a trick: *Angel Heart* and *Scandal* are out on video in both their theatrical versions and unrated versions. Guess which ones are doing brisk business? Right, the unrated ones.

And then there's *Tom Jones*. Director Tony Richardson has snipped nearly 10 minutes for its home video rerelease

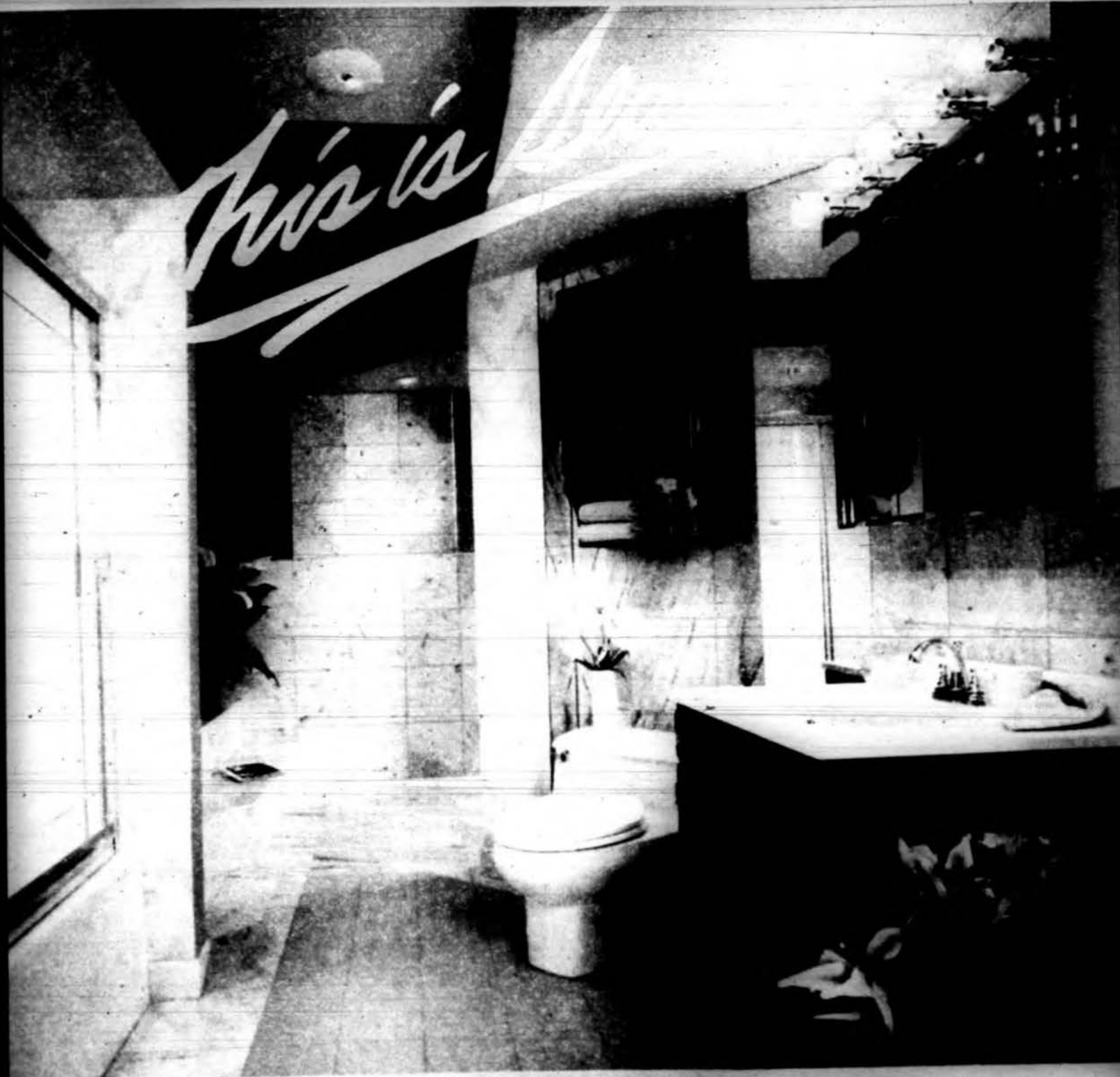

Parker Stevenson, the son of an investment broker and a commercial actress, Sarah Meade, was born June

4, 1952, in Pennsylvania and raised in Rye, N.Y. Princeton-educated Stevenson (class of '76) made his film debut in 1971's "A Separate Peace" and later appeared in "Our Time" (1974) and "Lifeguard" (1976).

It has taken him years to shake off the squeaky-clean, preppy-boy, image that he acquired when he played Frank Hardy in "The Hardy Boys Mysteries" (1977-79). Stevenson credits Burt Reynolds for giving him the chance to change from teen idol to villain Aubrey James in Reynolds' 1983 film "Stroker Ace." The actor, who currently co-stars with David Hasselhoff in the NBC series "Baywatch," was married over the 1983-84 holidays to actress Kirstie Alley ("Cheers"). The couple exchanged vows at the Connecticut home of singer Neil Sedaka.

Prime Foes

Could you please list the names of the guest villains on the series "Batman" and the actors who portrayed them? - ANDY HAINES, McCLURE, PENN.

The dynamic duo battled numerous villains during their two-year

run (1966-68) on ABC. The list is long, but among their many foes you can count The Penguin, played by Burgess Meredith; The Joker, played by Cesar Romero; The Riddler, played by Frank Gorshin and John Astin; King Tut, played by Victor Buono; Egghead, played by Vincent Price; and Catwoman, played by Julie Newmar, Eartha Kitt and Lee Ann Meriwether.

Binge Bust

I just read James Coco's diet book and would like to know which he died. Did his constant dieting contribute to his death? - TERESA WOOD, SELVETRA, CALIF.

James Coco died of a heart attack on Feb. 25, 1987. It is widely acknowledged that the yo-yo effects of gaining and losing weight puts a tremendous strain on the body, and Coco's lifelong struggle with weight problems (his weight was up as high as 315 pounds) resulted in hundreds of pounds gained and lost. Sources close to the late actor, however, claim that he would have died of cancer if his heart hadn't given out. Apparently, Coco had been diagnosed as having inoperable lung cancer just prior to his fatal heart attack and had only six months to a year to live.

Loren won the Best Actress Oscar, as well as the Cannes Film Festival Award and additional kudos, for her powerful portrayal of an Italian mother who is raped along with her daughter by Allied Moroccan soldiers in war-ravaged Italy.

ON THE COVER

Alien Nation is a good mix of sci-fi and social commentary.

In a new TV season full of compromise and caution, the Fox Broadcasting Company's "Alien Nation" (Mondays, following "21 Jump Street") is something different - a nifty blend of sci-fi pulp and pointed social commentary. Along with the free-wheeling and inventive "Tracey Ullman Show," the popular crime-tracking series "America's Most Wanted," and those subversive sitcoms "Married... With Children" and "It's Garry Shandling's Show," this one-hour adventure series furthers Fox's standing as a network to reckon with.

So far, "Alien Nation" is having a lot of fun with its formula. Based on the 1988 feature film of the same name, the series starts with the basic mismatched-cop setup that has long been a staple of movies and TV, but there's a twist. It's set in 1995 Los Angeles, and the city has acquired a new underclass - humanoids bred to work as slave laborers, whose spaceship crashed down in the Mojave Desert. Of these bald-headed newcomers, George Francisco (Eric Pierpoint) has been one of the quickest to assimilate, becoming the partner of tough cop Matthew Sikes (Gary Graham). Since Sikes' former partner was killed by one of the aliens, the veteran detective feels a certain amount of bigotry toward the "slags," the racist epithet for the aliens.

The show strives for the utmost dramatic effect with its sci-fi metaphor for racial and ethnic tension, although it does sometimes lay it on a bit thick. "Alien Nation" is not a subtle venture, but then, subtlety is not part of its action-oriented, police-drama heritage. Besides, the premise is versatile. In the highly-entertaining two-hour pilot episode, Francisco, his wife Susan (Michele Scarabelli), son Buck (Sean Six) and daughter Emily (Lauren Woodland) moved into a new house, and a neighbor woman welcomed them with flowers. With their matching hairless heads, Susan and her daughter stood in the doorway, and the nonplused neighbor said to Emily: "Wow, you sure look like your mom." And then she blushed,

realizing that her remark was another version of, "They all look alike."

The show should also get a lot of mileage out of its ingenious characterization of the Newcomers' habits. Perhaps most intriguing is the humming method of foreplay that precedes the Newcomer ritual of love-making. Their senses are so acute that they can detect pesticides on vegetables. A good stiff drink for a Newcomer is likely to be a glass of sour milk. Since they can't process cooked food, the Newcomers are given to hunting - gulp! - rodents for their meals.

One of the challenges that all TV series face is to figure out how to sustain our interest week after week. For "Alien Nation," the producer has already invoked AIDS in the pilot, where the Newcomers were thought to have brought a rare virus with them to earth. Another plot possibility includes an interspecies romance in the works between Sikes and Cathy Frankel (Terri Treas), a Newcomer biochemist who is single and lives in Sikes' apartment building.

It's all a bit much - which is probably why it works. A straightforward sober portrait of racial/ethnic discrimination would draw only a limited audience, as would straightforward futuristic fluff. The mixture of the two is what gives the series its cachet. And though it will have to continue to walk a fine line between normally conflicting genres, this lively addition to Fox's lineup should be a winner - the show is anything but alienating.

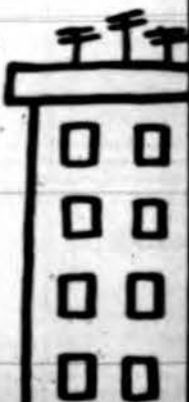

never harmed anyone.

Not much is known about Marge Oberholtzer, who is played by Mel Harris (thirty-something). In 1925, she was 28 years old, single, and had a job in the office of the Indiana State Superintendent of Public Instruction. But Harris feels that elements of her personality can be gleaned from those bare facts.

"Having a job, being independent, being unmarried at her age and in that time. Those are very unusual things for a woman of the '20s," says Harris.

The reason her name is known today is that her path crossed that of

Ku Klux Klan Grand Dragon David C. Stephenson, who controlled the state of Indiana in the early 1920s, when the Klan was at the height of its power.

Stephenson's downfall came when, with the help of some henchmen, he forced Oberholtzer aboard a train, where he raped and brutally assaulted her. When he wouldn't release her after the assault, she got hold of some poison and took it. Stephenson kept her prisoner another few days, and when he released her, she was beyond medical help. She died several weeks later, but before she did, she dictated the full story of what had happened to a prosecuting attorney, William H. Remy. After her death, Stephenson was charged with murder.

He was convicted and when the governor — his governor — refused him a pardon, he released the contents of his "black box," which sent a congressman, a mayor and a sheriff to jail.

The miniseries leaves behind a disturbing impression. Are we forced, in retrospect, to be glad that Oberholtzer was victimized, since her death led to the exposure of an extremely dangerous man? Or would Stephenson's character flaws have eventually become apparent to everyone — even if Oberholtzer had never crossed his path?

"The few people who knew that of him were prepared to protect him, to the nth degree," says Mel Harris, who identifies with Oberholtzer as much as anyone. "So I don't know. I find it very scary, and I'm glad it happened as it did."

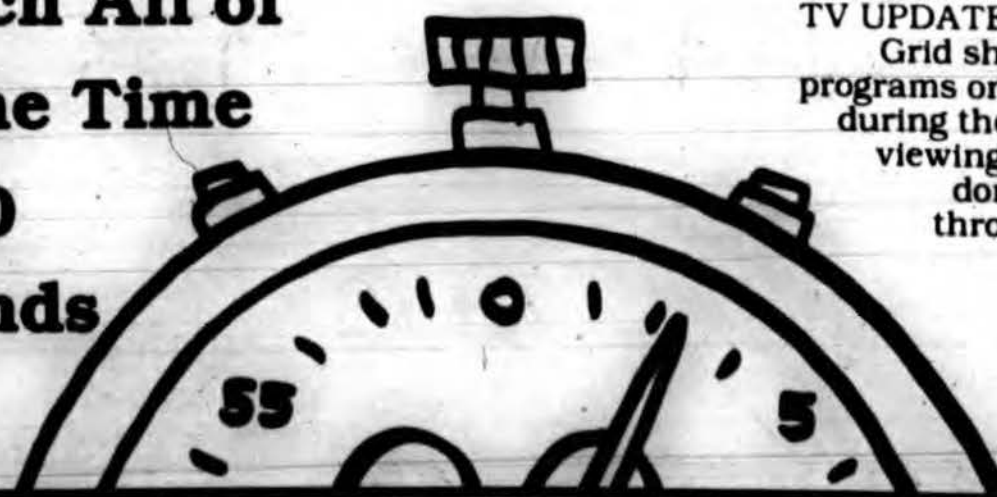

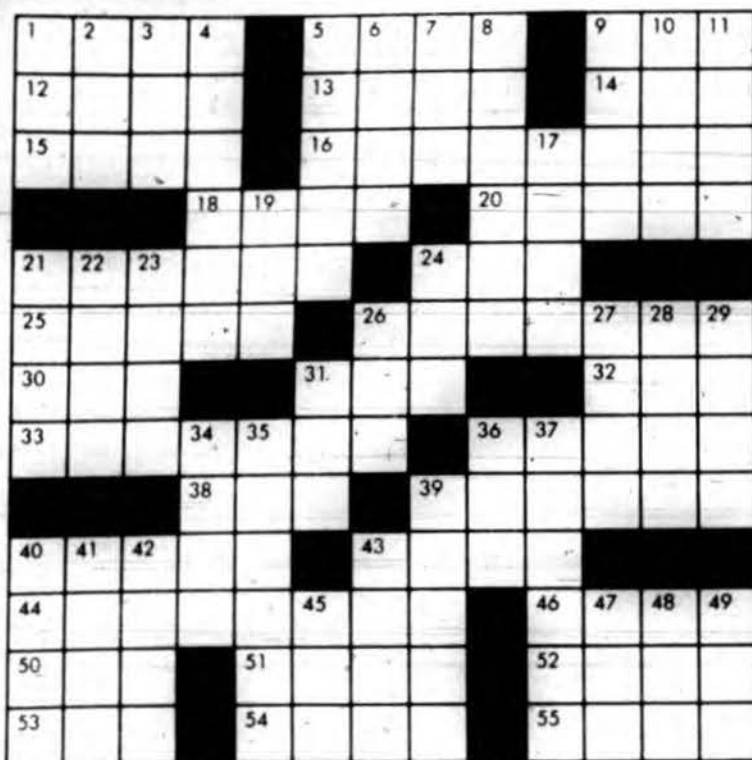

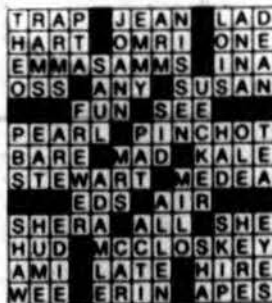

Tax hike OK'd

SACRAMENTO (AP) — California legislators on Saturday approved a temporary quarter-percent sales tax increase to raise \$800 million to help provide relief and repair for the earthquake-stricken San Francisco area.

Overwhelming majorities in both houses rejected claims that the boost was insufficient or premature.

"It's a reasonable response — but not my favored response — to a tragedy," said state Senate leader David Roberti, D-Los Angeles, adding that lawmakers who wanted a higher tax increase had to compromise with Republican Gov. George Deukmejian.

Orange County Assemblymen Nolan Frizzelle, R-Fountain Valley, and Gil Ferguson, R-Newport Beach, voted against the state sales tax increase, according to The Associated Press.

In the state Senate, Marian Bergeson, R-Newport Beach, and John Seymour, R-Anaheim, voted to increase the tax.

The tax increase, part of a 12-measure relief package drafted by Deukmejian and legislative leaders, will raise the statewide sales tax a quarter cent per dollar of sales starting Dec. 1. The increase will remain in effect through December 1990.

Assembly Speaker Willie Brown, D-San Francisco strongly backed the tax hike, calling opposition to the proposal by Republican members of the lower house "highly irresponsible."

Assemblyman William Baker, R-Walnut Creek, said the increase would "make this tragedy worse by going out and reaching into the pockets of the people of the state of California."

In the upper house, Sen. Don Rogers, R-Bakersfield, called the tax plan "premature. Now is not the time to deal with this," he said, suggesting that the state spend its budget reserve and then see if a tax

Mystery illness kills 4th horse at fairgrounds

Another horse died Saturday morning inside the quarantined stables at the Orange County Fairgrounds, bringing the sudden and still-unexplained death toll to four within the past week.

The deaths have left trainers, veterinarians and owners edgy as they search for a reason why two more horses became sick Saturday. Symptoms of the mystery illness that each horse has shown include quivering legs, low temperature and dull eyes.

Feed and bedding at the stables have been changed. Water buckets have been sterilized. Still, more horses become ill and collapse in their stalls, said Pam Gimple, manager of the Equestrian Center.

A necropsy performed on one of the horses late Friday night only told veterinarians what the illness was not. Gimple suspected some kind of toxin in the food, but the examination revealed none of the typical signs of poison or bad feed.

Although the malady's origin is still unknown, veterinarians feel quite certain no foul play was involved. That's a relief to Gimple, who originally feared the Halloween season had brought a vicious prankster to her 13 barns and approximately 200 horses.

But an unknown and possibly airborne virus doesn't offer Gimple much comfort. Looking drawn after

Laguna balking at Irvine Co.'s offer

Mayor Robert Gentry will ask for a counter proposal to The Irvine Co.'s offer to sell part of the Laguna Laurel project to Laguna Beach. Gentry will make the request at Tuesday's City Council meeting.

The proposal, made by Irvine Co. Chairman Don Bren, would reduce the size of the proposed 3,200-home development in Laguna Canyon. Bren offered to sell 250 acres of the development to the city for about \$38 million, pending an appraisal.

In exchange, the city would have to reverse its long-held position and support other plans for the canyon, including widening of Laguna Canyon Road and the development of the San Joaquin Hills tollway.

The city has opposed any development in the canyon.

Tuesday night, Gentry said, residents who have called him and urged that Bren's proposal be rejected will have their say.

"I think, frankly, the people of

Laguna Beach are going to ask us not to accept that offer," Gentry said. "Many people have been rather outraged at the offer. Most people are urging us not to take it but to continue discussions with The Irvine Co. and to craft a counter offer."

Gentry said he may again raise the possibility of having all or part of the development moved out of the canyon and into the city of Irvine, a suggestion Laguna officials have made repeatedly.

Another option would be to ask the Irvine Co. to consider selling the city a larger portion of the land and decreasing the number of planned homes, Gentry said.

A counter offer could also include decreasing the concessions the city would have to make, such as eliminating the requirement that the city support the tollway, he said.

An Irvine Co. spokeswoman said late last week that the company would rather not comment on

Gay-rights advocates join fight against Measure N

About 90 people turned out Saturday evening in Irvine with candles in hand to demonstrate their support for the city's human rights ordinance, including the contentious words "sexual orientation."

The largely silent protest, begun at the corner of Campus Drive and Bridge near UCI, was held in order to gather support for the "No on Measure N" campaign, which will be decided in voting booths Tuesday. Measure N asks voters whether or not the words "sexual orien-

ation" should be stricken from Irvine's anti-discrimination law.

The gathering and march was organized by the Orange County Visibility League, a gay and lesbian organization which has been involved in several fights for homosexual civil rights throughout the county.

While the Visibility League was backing the position of Irvine Citizens United, which has led the battle to strike down Measure N, Irvine Citizens United did not participate in the candlelight vigil, nor did they agree with the League's

decision to hold the demonstration.

Throughout the heated campaign, members of Irvine Citizens United have tried to distance their ordinance and the fight to keep it intact from the homosexual rights arena. Instead, group leaders concentrated on discrimination issues.

But that strategy hasn't always worked. Irvine Citizens United supporter Dr. Donald Jagan said "They (the Irvine Values Coalition, proponents of N) have made it a gay issue by being so blatantly anti-gay."

Clash over 'family values' enlivens school board race

Teacher contracts, student-instructor ratios and bilingual education have little place in this year's Newport-Mesa Unified School District race.

Unlike other elections, the campaign has garnered headlines and sparked debates over one central issue — sex.

Sex education — how much and what kind children should receive — has become the new political football among the six school board candidates.

The campaign, which will be decided by voters on Tuesday, has become a holy war of sorts, involving on one side a fundamentalist Christian, an arch conservative and a call for a return to "traditional family values."

In the other camp, incumbents have squared off against the three challengers whom they have labeled extremists bent on winning a war. They claim such a victory would mean censorship and a lack of diversity in curriculum at the district's 26 schools.

In the past, Newport-Mesa board of education races were somewhat

parochial, attracting few voters. But this year's heated campaign has caught the attention of some local political big-names, including Sen. Marian Bergeson, R-Newport Beach, a former school board member who admits she is concerned about the outcome. It also has spurred the first-ever endorsement of candidates by the teachers' union.

Sherry Looftbourrow, an eight-year board member, is being challenged by Wendy Leece, who educates two of her five children at home and sends her oldest son to a Christian high school. Judy Franco, who has been with the board since 1980, faces Karen Everts, a Newport Beach library board member. And Rod MacMillan, a 24-year board veteran, is challenged by Jo Ellen Allen, a political science professor at USC.

Two of the challengers, Allen, 43, and Leece, 41, have based their campaigns on the type of sex education offered at the district's schools. Everts, 48, has centered her campaign on getting rid of the district's superintendent.

All three, who claim the current board merely acts as a "rubber stamp" for Superintendent John

Nicoll, said they want parents more involved in decision making on sensitive issues.

Looftbourrow, 48, Franco, 52, and MacMillan, 62, have come under fire as members of the board for its policy on a controversial psychology class program in which homosexuals speak to students about their lifestyle.

The board has held firm, maintaining the program encourages tolerance, compromise and freedom of thought.

But what makes this campaign different is the involvement of a group known as the Committee to Restore Ethical and Traditional Education, or CREATE.

The group has lambasted the district for its sex education program, which includes discussion of birth control, abortion and homosexuality. CREATE members want an abstinence-based curriculum.

"Our present program assumes that our children will be promiscuous and sexually active," CREATE organizer Shannon Gustafson said. "We need to teach refusal skills and how to say 'no.'"

While Allen and Leece denied (Please see RACE/A2)

Experts predict growth wars escalation

California, a state of dreams where people came — and are still flocking — is hurtling toward a population of 50 million early in the next century and an increasingly fractious debate over what to do about it.

"Nobody wants to sacrifice any power at the local level, and there has been a stalemate over growth," Julie Froeberg, chief of staff to state Sen. Marian Bergeson, R-Newport Beach, told a growth issues conference in Costa Mesa on Friday. "We are heading toward a show-

down that is only three or four years away, and it will be a pivotal struggle for the state's future."

Froeberg took Bergeson's place as a luncheon speaker because the Orange County legislator had to stay in Sacramento for a special session on earthquake relief. The American Society for Public Administration suffered several such casualties among those who were to address or attend the two-day conference on Limits to Growth.

Froeberg referred to a "gridlock over growth" and blamed it on "too much demand to preserve home rule and too little interest in the Legis-

lature." "It is a crisis over governance, the quality of leadership, not just growth," she said.

Bergeson has called for the appointment of a "high-powered task force" of 30 or 40 leaders from various statewide interest groups and for a technical working group of experts to formulate a package of bills to remedy mounting problems for a growth rate unseen since the postwar boom.

Alan Kreditor, dean of the School of Urban and Regional Planning at the University of Southern California, reinforced an earlier con-

ference theme, warning that the growth backlash "is not on the wane, despite a few recent defeats."

Although they create more problems than they solve, Kreditor said, ballot initiatives to slow growth "are here to stay," because "they are an increasingly popular political strategy to deal with the issue."

He told conference participants that most Californians "have a keen sense of discontent" over growth-spawned problems, foremost among them a worsening environment and quality of life.

"There are higher expectations here," said Kreditor. "Californians

still have a vision of their state as a utopian model, a place to make it... or die, but now people are reacting strongly to shrinking environmental quality; there is a growing distrust in the way we allocate our resources."

Kreditor urged those "who want both a better environment and continuing economic opportunity to be willing to pay for it" or run the risk of losing both.

The late Frank Lloyd Wright's memorable quote about investments in beauty remaining with you all your life "is just a metaphor for quality of life," said Kreditor. "If we don't heed that," he warned, "we

will wind up impoverished."

Laura Lake, a proponent of slower and more carefully managed growth and founder of the Los Angeles citizens group Not Yet New York, called the debate about no-growth "a red herring."

"The underlying cause is not growth but a demand by citizens for an accountable government, an equitable, effective government," said the recently unsuccessful City Council candidate.

"The challenge of the '90s will be channeling and directing development where it is wanted and needed and in a form that is acceptable," she said.

increase is needed. Sen. John Garamendi, D-Walnut Grove, predicted that the 13-month increase would fall far short of dealing with the massive destruction caused by the Oct. 17 quake and said lawmakers could be facing "very severe budget reductions" next year to make up the difference.

"We know today that we must do more," he said. "This is not the time for us to be timid, not the time to try to rebuild on the cheap. This is the time for bold leadership."

Santa Cruz County Supervisor Fred Keeley said counties hit by the quake regarded the relief package as a "modest beginning toward full recovery."

"We expect to be back to the Legislature in January with additional requests for assistance," he said.

The Assembly approved the increase on a 56-17 vote. It passed the Senate, 34-2. Deukmejian said he would sign the legislation early next week.

Lawmakers recessed their special earthquake session Saturday evening, postponing action until January on more than 90 other earthquake-related measures introduced this week.

California's statewide sales tax is currently 6 cents per dollar, although the tax is as high as 7 cents in parts of the state where local voters have approved higher levies.

The quarter percent tax hike will raise \$800 million to aid rebuilding from the 7.1 magnitude quake, which struck Northern California Oct. 17, killing 66 people and injuring more than 3,000. State authorities have estimated the damages at more than \$7 billion, including some \$1.7 billion to state and

county roads.

Other quake-related bills in the governor's package that was approved Saturday would earmark money to strengthen roads and bridges, give immediate aid to people displaced by the quake and provide tax breaks for owners of quake-damaged property.

State Finance Department Director Jess Huff said earlier that the administration estimates the cost of state quake repair and relief programs at more than \$1 billion, but noted that the tax increase would raise only about \$800 million.

Huff said the administration plans to tap the state reserve for about \$200 million to make up the difference. Some lawmakers predicted that tapping an already depleted reserve would worsen the state budget picture next year.

The federal government has already approved a \$3.45 billion quake-aid package.

they are running on CREATE's slate, they said they are proud to have the group's support.

Similarities between their campaigns, however, are evident. Allen and Leece have the same treasurer, the same printer and some of the same contributors, many of whom are CREATE members.

According to campaign statements through Oct. 21, CREATE members have donated \$4,315, or 62 percent, of Leece's contributions. That figure for Allen was \$2,390, or 38 percent. They have raised a total of \$6,935 and \$6,250, respectively.

The candidates said those similarities are a coincidence. "Remember, CREATE doesn't give anything to anyone, the individuals do," Allen said.

Everts, who some observers painted as a chameleon depending on which group she's speaking to, has done her best to distance herself from CREATE. She said she has refused contributions from the group because she doesn't agree with their views on sex education.

She has raised \$12,231, the most of any of the candidates.

Contributions in this campaign are the biggest in the district's history, officials said. MacMillan, who did not raise any money, could not be reached for comment for this story.

Everts said children should be educated about sex, and prefers to err on the side of too much knowledge rather than too little. But the homemaker said she was angry with the board for not calling a forum for parent input on the issue.

That, she said, is the difference between her and CREATE members. She advocates separation of church and state and supports the teaching of evolution rather than creationism.

"I have appeared, it's true, at their coffees, but I've been honest with them that I defend the need for strong sex education," said Everts, who said she hasn't yet read the curriculum.

"The three of us challengers do share a theme and that's letting parents into the curriculum," she said.

Leece has been the most outspoken of any of the candidates on the issue of sex education. Discussion of such issues as homosexuality and birth control leads to sexual experimentation, she said.

"To send this message to a group of impressionable young people searching for their identity is a form of legitimizing the homosexual lifestyle," Leece said.

"At their age, when they're depressed and going through a lot of changes, physically and emotionally, you take the risk that one of them might become a homosexual by the information they obtained observing that panel."

She claimed such classroom visits are a plot by gays to recruit school children.

Classroom materials that do not stress abstinence should be "thrown out," Leece said. Teachers should focus on reading, writing and arithmetic, she added.

"It's better for them to write an essay on the importance of abstinence than to sit through a demonstration of putting a condom on a banana," she said.

The focus on the sex education issue by Leece and Allen, incumbent Loofbourrow claimed, is because they don't have their base of knowledge in any other areas.

Loofbourrow has accused Allen of being an extremist, partly because she is president of the California chapter of Eagle Forum, founded by Phyllis Schlafly in 1972.

The group, which stresses, among other things, that a woman's place is in the home rather than the workplace, has been identified by the state Parent-Teacher Association as an extremist organization.

The Eagle Forum has tried to ban John Steinbeck's "Of Mice and Men," as well as Zeffirelli's film of Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet," according to the PTA.

"It's a lot more interesting school board race, but it's a lot more scary in terms of the impact this election can have on the minds of the children in the community," Loofbourrow said.

Allen said she resents the ultra-conservative and extremist labels. She denied distorting issues, quoting her opponent out of context or encouraging censorship.

"There's nothing extremist about me or the organization I head in California. I have never attempted to remove (ban) a book out of California," Allen said. "It's name-calling at its lowest."

Allen, well known in local GOP circles, has garnered the endorsement of former Rep. Robert Badham, Anita Ferguson, the wife of Assemblyman Gil Ferguson, R-Newport Beach, and Dorothy Hughes, the head of Ferguson's reelection committee.

The assemblyman said he earlier warned Hughes that her participation in the campaign could reflect badly on him. She has donated \$100 to Allen and loaned the campaign \$1,100.

Ferguson, who has not endorsed any candidates, denied allegations that Hughes was using resources, such as computers and support lists, at his political office to help in the Newport-Mesa race.

As for Allen's support from CREATE, it's purely a side effect of her candidacy, she said.

"There are a lot of people I don't agree with but my obligation as a candidate is to listen to everyone, not just those people I agree with," she said.

CREATE formed during the early days of the controversy over a Corona del Mar High School psychology class taught by Mike Marino. The brouhaha was sparked by a frank

discussion last year about the stereotypes and myths of the homosexual lifestyle.

The offshoot was a change in policy by the board allowing parental supervision of materials and more restrictions on controversial topics.

CREATE founder Gustafson said she sees strong parallels between the Newport-Mesa contest and the fight in Irvine over Measure N, a campaign to exclude homosexuals from the city's human rights ordinance.

"A vote for the incumbents is a move toward what you have in Measure N," she said.

Gustafson scoffed at the notion that the challengers are extreme fundamentalists brought together under CREATE's banner. "That's a distortion of the truth, a scare tactic... it's the system we have that's extreme," she said.

The prevalence of such outrageous statements in this race has prompted more-than-usual involvement from the community.

The executive board of the Newport-Mesa Federation of Teachers, for the first time in its 12-year history, endorsed candidates in the school board race.

The union recommended its 500 members vote for the three incumbents because of some candidates' affiliation with CREATE and Eagle Forum, board member Dave Brees said.

The campaign also sparked a panel discussion on fundamentalism at the Temple Bat Yahm of Newport-Irvine. The panel, on which Loofbourrow participated, did not include any fundamentalists.

Rabbi Mark Miller equated the "traditional family values" push to the 1933 book burning in Berlin. Proponents are seeking to be the moral arbiters and make clones of their fellow citizens, he contended.

"These people are good people, but it's precisely the lesson of history that arises when good people try to make other people good," Miller said. "It's one thing to say you disagree but another to say those who disagree with you are evil."

Regardless of who wins the board race, the issues of sex education and parent participation in curriculum likely won't be solved that quickly.

Incumbents and challengers alike said they are anxious to confront more important, pressing issues facing the district. Those include reopening schools to accommodate a budding population and absorbing the diversity of the student body, candidates said.

"Instead of the community joining together to confront these issues, the community is remaining polarized over sex education," Franco said.

Visibility League, said it was time for the gay community to come forward and help the No on N campaign because the attack on Irvine's human rights ordinance was really part of an assault on homosexuals everywhere.

"This is just one more in a long history of attacks by right-wing fundamentalists on homosexuals," LeTourneau told those at the candlelight gathering before they walked across the Campus footbridge to the university's administration building.

While on a set of steps outside the building, LeTourneau mentioned

few of the groups in attendance, including members of Act Up (another group known for its homosexual rights protests), the National Organization of Women and Irvine's St. Andrews Episcopalian Church.

Then the group was off to the on-campus dormitories, where they serenaded students with "We Are Gentle, Loving People," originally performed by folk singer Bonnie Raitt.

The gathering at the dorms was especially important, LeTourneau said, because for the first time there would be no polling place in on-campus housing this Tuesday. Instead, students will have to find their way off university grounds to a

different site. Although an Anaheim resident, LeTourneau believes the way Irvine votes Tuesday will be absolutely critical to the fight for gay civil rights throughout the county.

If Measure N passes and the words "sexual orientation" are stricken from the ordinance, a clear message will be sent to cities that "people such as Scott Peotter (leader of the Irvine Values Coalition) and (the Rev. Lou) Sheldon have the power to mandate discrimination," LeTourneau said.

On the other hand, if Measure N fails, LeTourneau said, other cities may find the courage to enact similar ordinances.

"As Irvine goes, so goes the rest of Orange County," LeTourneau said.

11 hours sleep Friday night, Gimple walked from stall to stall Saturday afternoon, checking on the animals and talking with trainers and owners.

One of the horses that died Saturday was worth \$50,000. Some of the animals lodged at the center are thoroughbred show horses and worth as much as \$400,000, Gimple said.

The dusty-exercise rings outside the stables were empty Saturday, although it was a sunny, warm day. Instead, trainers such as Lynne Dennis, who care for 30 of the animals, were watching their horses, having veterinarians check any animal that

seemed remotely ill.

Dr. John Byrd of San Juan Capistrano was up most of Friday night too, but he didn't complain as Dennis held the head of a golden brown 8-year-old named Sassy so Byrd could give the animal an injection in the neck.

Luckily, Sassy didn't seem to have the illness, only a slight case of colic, Byrd said. At least three other animals weren't so lucky.

One glossy mare, reddish brown with a white diamond on her forehead, looked out of her stall with painfully large eyes. Her forelegs had just begun to quiver uncontrollably, Gimple said. Soon her back legs would begin shaking and she would fall, suffering from partial paralysis. No one knew whether she would

survive the night.

Until veterinarians discover through post-mortem examinations exactly what is wrong, there is little more they can do but try and make the mare comfortable.

In her six years as manager of the Equestrian Center, Gimple says she hasn't seen anything like this sudden spreading infirmity and death in Costa Mesa.

For every disease she could think of, with symptoms that matched the horses', there was a reason it couldn't be that ailment. All the horses had been vaccinated against Rhin disease, the symptoms were wrong for others.

"It's all speculation at this point," Gimple said. "We're just hoping it doesn't go any further."

Football game turns into melee, canceled

About 19 high school sophomores gave contact sport a new meaning when they threw over a football game Friday in favor of a fistfight on the playing field.

The sophomore game between Westminster and Huntington Beach High Schools was in the third quarter at the Huntington Beach stadium when a fistfight broke out on the field about 4:30 p.m., causing the referees to cease the game and send the players home.

Both sides were equally responsible for the outbreak, coaches agreed, which came after three quarters filled with fouls and verbal taunts from both teams.

Before the fighting began, several players had been ejected from the

game for fouling and bad behavior, H.B. Oiler Coach Dave Vanhoorebeke said.

"In 33 years of coaching I've never seen this happen," Westminster Coach Bill Boswell said. "I'm just sick."

The score was 34 to 6 in favor of Huntington Beach when a foul was called on the Oilers for taunting or gloating over their impending victory.

A fistfight between players on the field snowballed until a large part of each team was slugging it out and referees and coaches were wading into the fracas, prying the players apart.

"At this point, we have to go back and educate those kids," Boswell said. "The value of education has got to supersede the emotions of the sport."

Reagan, Spielberg honored

BEVERLY HILLS, (AP) — The American Jewish Committee bestowed its highest award on Ronald Reagan Saturday for the former president's commitment to Israel and Soviet Jews.

The committee also honored film maker Steven Spielberg for "bringing film-making to new heights, while maintaining 'faith in human values,'" according to a committee statement.

Reagan received the committee's American Liberties Medallion for establishing "new heights of warmth and friendship" between Israel and the United States during his eight years as president.

The committee frequently criticized Reagan administration cuts in domestic social programs. But on

Saturday, the New York-based organization cited Reagan's "exemplary leadership in support of the State of Israel and lifetime commitment to the freedom of Soviet Jewry."

Past recipients of the award include President Lyndon B. Johnson, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, Nobel Peace prize laureate Elie Wiesel and West German President Richard von Weizsaecker.

Producer-director Spielberg, whose motion pictures include "E.T., the Extra-terrestrial" and "The Color Purple," received the Mass Media Award.

possible counter offer until it is actually drafted.

The prospect of having a planned community built in the canyon between El Toro Road and the San Diego Freeway has stirred considerable interest since the environmental reports on the development and the accompanying widening of Laguna Canyon Road were released in August.

A protest walk has been scheduled in the canyon Nov. 11. Caltrans has agreed to allow partial closure of Laguna Canyon Road for the protest.

Officials have solicited support from celebrities. Actresses Bette Midler and Julie Harris have both issued statements endorsing efforts to stop development in the canyon.

Sen. Alan Cranston has also expressed interest in the development plans on several occasions, Gentry said. Cranston has not offered an opinion about Bren's offer, Gentry said.

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TIME OF MY LIFE

Math competition put Pacific Mutual's young CEO on path

When Tom Sutton agreed to take a competitive math exam during his senior year in high school, he never dreamed the circumstance he would set in motion would lead him to become chairman of the board and chief executive officer of a \$30 billion insurance conglomerate.

On Jan. 1, Thomas C. Sutton will become the chairman and CEO of Newport Beach-based Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Co. At age 47, he will be one of the youngest top executives in the insurance industry, and quite possibly, the youngest CEO in the long and illustrious history of Pacific Mutual.

The other day, I dropped by the inverted pyramid headquarters of Pacific Mutual to learn how this native of Atlanta, Ga., followed in the corporate footsteps of such industry giants as Asa Call, Walter Gerken and the soon-to-retire Harry Bubb.

"I was pretty good at math and physics," Sutton recalled. "I hoped to become a researcher in theoretical physics, but my instructor said I should take a competitive math exam offered to high school seniors in the United States and Canada. So I did."

The two-nation math competition was sponsored by the American Mathematical Association, and the Society of Actuaries. Those scoring high — including Sutton — were invited to tour the offices of Confederation Life Insurance Company to Toronto, Canada, where Sutton had been living since he was an eighth grader. His father was a credit manager for General Fire and had been transferred from Atlanta to Toronto with a subsidiary of the fire company.

"When I toured the insurance offices, I was offered a summer job in their actuarial department," Sutton recalled. "I knew little about the insurance business, and I'm afraid I really didn't know what an actuary was. But it beat pumping gas, which is what I had been doing." He was 19.

Another torturous event occurred while he was in high school. He met Marilyn Buckley.

He also met a man named Bill Cunningham of Pacific Mutual, and since Sutton's parents had moved to California — to Arcadia — Cunningham suggested that Sutton work summers at Pacific Mutual in Los Angeles, which he did, as an actuarial trainee, in 1963 and 1964.

"I really didn't want to be an actuary, but the more I got involved, and the more I learned about it, the more I found it to be an exciting and challenging field."

Then came 1965.

"That was some year," he said. "I graduated from the University of Toronto with a bachelor's degree in mathematics and physics. Marilyn and I got married, we packed up everything and took our honeymoon to California where I went to work full-time for Pacific Mutual, and I passed the actuarial exam."

After an interim residence in the Los Angeles area, while Tom learned his way around the Pacific Mutual and Marilyn taught English at Marymont College, the young newlyweds moved to Duarte.

"Marilyn decided to take graduate work at the Claremont colleges, and I was working in downtown Los Angeles, and Duarte seemed to be about halfway between Claremont and L.A."

Tom began his quick climb up the corporate ladder and Marilyn pursued her doctorate, with a thesis on medieval English. She is much in demand and currently is professor of English at Dominican Hills College.

With all this feverish activity, it's a wonder they had time and inclination to raise a family, but they did — three boys and a girl. Stephen, 23, is a political science major at Chapman College, Paul, 19, is an environmentalist studying at Humboldt College, Matthew is a sophomore at Corona del Mar High, and Meagan, 6, is in second grade at Anderson School.

"With three much older brothers, it's almost as if Meagan had three additional parents," Sutton said, "and they spoil her rotten."

Sutton is an activist with his family as well as his community. Two years ago he took the boys fishing in Prince William Sound, Alaska, and they frequently go back-packing in the High Sierra or kayaking in northern California and Oregon. Confined to Newport Beach, as he is now and will become increasingly so, Tom finds time to play tennis often at the Balboa Bay Club Raquet Club. His community activities include being a trustee of South Coast Repertory, a director of Independent Colleges of Southern California, the corporate fund director of the Marian Bergeson Aquatic Center, and a member of the Affiliates Advisory Board, UC Irvine.

Only a well-organized actuary could handle all these activities without letting some of them fall through the net. And it was this talent that may have won the attention of Walter Gerken and Harry Bubb, the most recent PM CEOs.

"I owe both of them a great deal," Sutton said. "They made opportunities available to me, encouraged me to pursue new education that might help me develop." One of these was the Harvard Business School Advanced Management course, which Sutton took. He was a Pacific Mutual vice president then, and soon after completing the Harvard program, he was promoted to senior vice president, corporate development. In 1984, he became executive vice president, and in 1987, he was elected president.

From his fifth floor executive office, Sutton has a commanding view of Newport Center and the harbor. He also has a commanding view of a roof ledge of his elegant building, now looking like the Nimitz freeway after the quake. "The roof has been leaking so we have to tear it up and replace it." Beyond are the two Pacific Mutual 8-story towers. "We had planned to expand into those buildings, but real estate became too expensive, so we sold the twin towers. Now, about 40 percent of our operation is in Fountain Valley."

Pacific Mutual ranks among the top 25 insurance companies in the U.S. Its over \$30 billion in assets are divided between three major segments — employee benefits insurance, personal financial service (ordinary life insurance) and asset management such as pension funds.

It's a far cry from pumping gas in Toronto.

Air district restricts foam makers

EL MONTE (AP) — The agency that regulates air pollutants in Southern California ordered makers of plastic foam products to reduce by 84 percent the emission of ozone-destroying chemicals used in manufacturing.

The law approved Friday by the South Coast Air Quality Management District board is one of the first regulations in the country directed at controlling chlorofluorocarbons in foam plastic products, said air quality district spokesman Bill Kelly.

However, most major producers of chlorofluorocarbons, including automobile air conditioners and industrial solvents, are not affected by the regulations.

Chlorofluorocarbons, commonly called CFCs, have been linked to a

hole above Antarctica in the protective ozone layer that protects the Earth's surface from harmful ultraviolet rays from the sun.

The law by the district, which regulates Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino counties, affects about 45 companies in the region that make plastic foam used in packing materials, insulation, furniture cushioning and food containers.

The plants must cut emissions of CFCs by 40 percent by Jan. 1, 1991, and by 84 percent by 1994. The also must reduce emission of pentane, a chemical that forms smog, and methylene chloride, a toxic substance, by about 85 percent.

The companies will have to meet the standard by either finding safer chemicals, or installing pollution-

control equipment.

Companies said they will have a hard time meeting the deadlines set by the panel because effective substitute chemicals have not been found for CFCs, which are used as blowing agents in manufacturing.

"There is no reasonable substitute for CFCs with our products. At this point, we're up in the air. But we have 14 months to resolve it," said Jim Ammerman, plant manager at Future Foam in Anaheim. "We're going to be scrambling," he said. Future Foam employs 300.

The regulation should cut CFC emission by almost six tons a day, or 2,100 tons a year.

That is just a fraction of the estimated global emissions of CFCs put at 800,000 tons a year, said Donald Blake, a chemist at the UCL

who specializes in ozone-layer and greenhouse effect research.

"Every little bit helps," said Blake. "This is almost trivial if nothing else happens. But it sends a signal that it can work here, so it can work in every community," he said.

Earlier this year, the city of Irvine in Orange County banned most uses of CFCs, and the state of Vermont also has adopted its own regulations.

The AQMD said that if industries fail to find substitute chemicals by 1991, they will have to install expensive carbon-filtration scrubbing systems. A large plant would spend about \$555,000 in capital outlay and \$118,000 a year in upkeep, AQMD staff estimated.

The district board said it would consider extending the period for compliance of pentane, regulations when it meets next month.

Students to win cash for essays on Constitution

High school students in the Newport Beach-Costa Mesa area can compete for \$1,000 in cash prizes in an essay contest being held in conjunction with the bicentennial celebration of the United States Constitution.

The Newport Beach Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution Committee, The Irvine Co. and the Daily Pilot are sponsoring the essay contest in association with the Newport-Mesa Unified School District to focus attention on the historic document.

Lynn Turner, chairwoman of the committee, said activities spotlighting the Constitution began in 1987 to coincide with the signing of the document on Sept. 17, 1787, and will continue through Dec. 15, 1991, to mark the 200-year anniversary of the Bill of Rights being ratified.

The sponsors of the essay contest selected the topic "What the American Flag Means to Me."

The contest organizers thought it was appropriate to pick a current topic with constitutional applications.

Students can participate in the contest by writing an essay of 500 words or less and delivering the article to their history or English teachers. Entries may either be typed or neatly handwritten. The deadline is Dec. 15.

Teachers in the Newport-Mesa district will initially screen the entries and forward finalists to a panel of judges who will select the top three entries and announce the winners in January.

The top essay will be awarded a cash prize of \$500. Second place is

worth \$300 and the third place essay will win \$200. Each winner will receive a 1987 Silver Dollar commemorating the Constitution's bicentennial. The winning entries will be published in the Daily Pilot.

"During my seven years on the board I have had the opportunity to work with an exceptional board of directors and staff," she said. "The learning experience has been tremendous."

The board will appoint a director to serve out her term.

Board members spend from 10 to 20 hours per month in formal meetings and informal discussion with members of the public, others in the water and sewage business and their counterparts in other agencies, she said. Reimbursement is \$144 per day of service, not to exceed ten days of service per month.

The board will consider resumes and written statements of those interested in the interim appointment. The deadline is Nov. 27.

A physical fitness program in the Newport-Mesa Unified School District received first place honors in the annual Golden Bell awards competition of the California School Boards Foundation.

The program was designed for grades four, five and six. It blends a personalized physical fitness program with wellness by offering student experiences in developing psychomotor skills, positive self-image, and an appreciation of good sportsmanship and self-discipline.

Among 325 entries, 25 schools were selected for first place. Another 21 programs were chosen for second place awards.

Golden Bell first place awards will be presented at the annual banquet and awards ceremony Dec. 2.

Scientists search for quake trigger

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Some researchers say changes in atmospheric pressure and the tidal pull of the sun and moon may have triggered California's disastrous earthquake, and many scientists call the theory plausible but still unproven.

A few studies have suggested quakes happen more often during very high ocean tides — when solar and lunar gravity also tug at solid ground — and when shifting masses of heavier air create certain high-pressure systems and related winds that press down on and rub against the ground.

The government warned Oct. 12 of the highest Pacific tides in years during the week of the Oct. 17 quake on the San Andreas Fault. The jolt measured 7.1 on the Richter scale, killed at least 66 people in the San Francisco Bay area, and happened during breezy, warm and dry conditions dubbed "earthquake weather" in California folklore.

Quakes aren't caused by such weather, but might be triggered by the same atmospheric pressure conditions that create warm winds, said meteorologist Jerome Namias, of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography in La Jolla.

Abnormal pressures and wind systems operating on the fault could encourage slipping motion along the San Andreas, which if other conditions were right, would then trigger this quake, said Namias, who headed the National Weather Service's extended forecast division for 30 years. "It's conceivable the high tide added to this condition."

"I would say it is at least 90 percent likely there was some (tidal) influence on the timing of this quake," said astronomer Stephen Kilston of Lockheed Palo Alto Research Laboratory.

Many seismologists remain skeptical. "The idea of triggering earthquakes by tidal or atmospheric forces is at least physically plausible," said seismologist Lucile Jones of the U.S. Geological Survey. "The problem is that none of the studies have been very convincing."

Tidal and atmospheric stresses "are not trivial. It's reasonable they might be able to set off a fault that's ready to go anyway," said Don Anderson, director of the California Institute of Technology's seismological laboratory.

"I'm prepared to accept it if somebody makes a good case, but I haven't seen a good case yet."

Advocates of the tidal and atmospheric theories don't claim such forces cause quakes, only that they might be the last straws needed to set off a quake on a section of fault already about to snap under accumulated stress caused by movement of giant plates of rock that make up Earth's crust.

Namias published a study last year showing summertime quakes in Southern California happened more often when low pressure covered the West and high pressure hovered over the eastern Pacific. He speculated winds flowing from high to low pressure might trigger quakes by piling seawater against the coast.

Kilston said killer quakes that rocked California in 1857, 1933, 1952 and 1987 all happened within two years of the peak of the 18.6-year lunar cycle and near full or new moons and sunrises or sunsets.

Jones said such timing is coincidental. A much more thorough Geological Survey study found no link between tides and quakes, she said. Santa Clara County geologist James Berkland infuriates other scientists by claiming 78 percent success in using the tidal theory to make public predictions of quakes within 70 miles of San Jose.

Berkland predicts quakes are most likely during a monthly eight-day "window." Four days before the Oct. 17 quake, a newspaper quoted Berkland predicting a magnitude-3.5 to 6 quake would hit the Bay Area between Oct. 14 and 21.

"There is enough earthquake activity within 70 miles of San Jose to have quakes within those eight-day windows often — just through random chance," Jones said.

Jones and others said statistical analyses failed to convince them correlations between quakes and tidal or atmospheric forces are more than coincidence.

"Just like a poker player can think his royal flushes are caused by his rabbit's foot, some people find what they think are patterns in the random distribution of earthquakes," she said.

Namias said his unfinished preliminary study shows that during autumns since 1947 quakes were more frequent when high pressure hovered above western Canada.

The study covers only Southern California. But Namias said "amazingly high" pressure was centered over Canada during the recent quake, when winds rotating clockwise around the high brought warm southeast winds to Northern California.

A 1983 study found Southern California quakes of magnitude-6 and larger were most likely when tidal forces were strongest: near full or new moons, within a couple of hours of sunrise or sunset, and within two years of when the moon is farthest north of Earth — a point reached every 18.6 years.

Each of those conditions can pull faults apart to trigger quakes, suggested the study published in Nature by Kilston and UCLA geophysicist Leon Knopoff.

Three days before the Oct. 17 quake, the moon was full and was closer to Earth than it had been in three years, Kilston said. The quake happened an hour before sunset. Two days later, the moon was at its northernmost point in its monthly cycle.

Tidal forces are stronger than atmospheric forces. But no one has been able to show tidal gravity actually created stress on a fault during an earthquake, said Bruce Bolt, a seismologist at the University of California, Berkeley.

Bolt said he doubts atmospheric forces extend deep enough underground to trigger fault movement.

'Most Wanted' helps snare convict

WEST COVINA — An armed escapee from a Massachusetts treatment center for violent sexual criminals was arrested Saturday at a motel after he was recognized from a television show, police said.

Christopher Rambert, 23, was one of three inmates who escaped Oct. 1 from the facility in Bridgewater, Mass. He had been serving a life sentence for multiple rapes and other violent crimes, officers said. After he arrived at the police station, Rambert agreed to put on a red T-shirt furnished by an FBI agent, emblazoned with the "America's Most Wanted," logo of the program that had publicized his escape.

"He did not try to escape. He was taken into custody while he was still in bed, so I suspect that he was surprised," police Lt. Lee Rossman said of the repeat sexual offender's arrest Saturday at about 9 a.m.

Rap booms through telephones, TVs

LOS ANGELES — A powerful rap format radio station is pumping its heavy beat through its neighborhood locale, with songs like "Bust A Move" coursing through plumbing, televisions, and even chain-link fences.

Station KDAY-AM's 50,000-watt signal in the Silver Lake and Echo Park districts can even get downright eerie at times, neighbors say. "You can walk in my yard when it rains and hear the 'rap, rap, rap' music on the chain link fence," said Tanya Busko, a 27-year Silver Lake resident. "It's awful. It's unbelievable. At night it's unbearable," she said.

Complaints keep piling up, but station officials say they're doing everything possible to tame The Beastie Boys and tone down Tone Loc.

Reagan library seeking donations

LOS ANGELES — The Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation asked Sony Corp. and other firms worldwide for donations to the former president's \$45 million library, a Reagan spokesman has confirmed.

"Representatives of the foundation have had contact with a number of American and foreign businesses about donating to the library and Sony is one of them," Reagan spokesman Mark Weinberg said Friday.

The Washington Post said Reagan aides discussed with Sony a \$1 million bequest from the corporate giant for the library, but Weinberg declined comment on the dollar amount or specifics.

52 abortion protesters arrested

SAN BERNARDINO — About 150 Operation Rescue anti-abortion protesters blocked the entrances to a medical clinic Saturday, and police arrested 52 of them.

No injuries were reported during the 5½-hour protest, and officers said there were no counter-demonstrators at the Family Planning Association Medical Group.

A spokesperson from Operation Rescue reported the gathering of protesters at about 150, but could not be reached again later in the day for more details.

NATIONAL BRIEFS

Talks between Boeing, union break off

SEATTLE — Talks between the Machinists union and the Boeing Co. broke off Saturday with a union official calling the aerospace giant's offer to end the month-old strike and restart production an "insult."

Mediator Douglas Hammond said he decided to end the latest round of talks Saturday afternoon, but he refused to say what had happened. No further talks were scheduled after sixth straight days of face-to-face meetings, he said.

Hammond said both sides had worked hard to reach an agreement, but ultimately they "continued to disagree."

Threats postpone certification tests

LANSING, MICH. — Certifying exams for at least 2,000 emergency room doctors across the country have been postponed because of threats to the physicians and to those who were to give the test, authorities said.

Doctors who were to travel to eight cities for the tests today and Monday were notified there would be no exam, the American Board of Medical Specialties announced from its headquarters in East Lansing, Mich. A date for a re-test hasn't been set.

The organization, as well as participants and the FBI, said threatening letters were mailed to participants.

"This decision was based on the possibility of harm to individuals related to the examinations and concerns for security at all examination sites," the board said in a news release Friday.

The exams — for doctors who have finished specialty training in emergency medicine — were scheduled in Arlington, Va.; Atlanta, Chicago, Dallas, Dearborn, Mich.; Los Angeles, Philadelphia, and San Francisco.

Man in wheelchair hit-and-run victim

TAMPA, Fla. — A man who has used a wheelchair since being hit by a vehicle six years ago was in critical condition Saturday after being struck by a hit-and-run driver on a suburban highway.

Joseph Kelly Crook, 25, was crossing the busy six-lane highway between intersections about 3:30 a.m. Friday when a car hit him and threw him 60 feet, Hillsborough County Sheriff's spokesman Jack Espinosa said.

"He's got massive internal injuries, and it looks pretty bad," Espinosa said. "He's on a life-support system."

Crook was in critical condition after at least two operations for internal injuries, broken ribs and multiple leg fractures, officials at St. Joseph's Hospital said.

Voters endorse casino gambling

GARY, Ind. — Voters endorsed legalized gambling in hotel-casino resorts in balloting Saturday in this economically depressed steel town.

Voters supported gambling by 13,309 votes, or 60.4 percent, to 8,733 votes, or 39.6 percent, against. Only 32.3 percent of the registered voters cast ballots on the non-binding referendum.

Despite the results, Gov. Evan Bayh said late Saturday that he will not support gambling in Gary. "The results of the referendum are of course important, but with such a low turnout, I don't find them to be compelling," Bayh said in Indianapolis.

More than 5 tons of cocaine seized

NEW YORK — An estimated 5½ tons of cocaine inside hundreds of 10-gallon drums was discovered by agents who had to call in hazardous waste specialists for help because a toxic chemical was packed around the drug, authorities said Saturday.

The find, which followed a three-month investigation, occurred at about 9 p.m. Friday in a two-story warehouse in the borough of Queens, said Capt. James Rogers of the city Fire Department's hazardous materials division.

There were no arrests made as of early Saturday afternoon, authorities said.

Most Iranians ignore anniversary

TEHRAN, Iran — Iran marked the 10th anniversary of the seizure of the U.S. Embassy on Saturday by opening the compound to the public and displaying seven alleged CIA spies. Most Iranians ignored the event.

The apparent disinterest was a blow to radicals who hoped to use the occasion to stir up anti-American passion. It was a victory for President Hashemi Rafsanjani, who wants to improve Iran's relations with the West and end his country's isolation.

1 million E. Germans chant 'freedom'

BERLIN — As many as 1 million East Germans chanting "Freedom! Freedom!" filled the streets of the capital Saturday for an emotional pro-democracy rally that was the largest in the Communist nation's 40-year history.

The crowd jeered Communist Party leaders and cheered opposition speakers. Scores of people draped pro-democracy banners from their apartment balconies and several elderly East Berliners wept with emotion as demonstrators marched past.

The three-hour rally, sanctioned by authorities, came a day after Communist leader Egon Krenz announced the dismissal of five Politburo members, promised broad political and economic reforms and urged East Germans to be patient and stay in their homeland.

Mother holds son hostage

HOUSTON (AP) — A 15-month-old boy held at knifepoint by his mother was rescued when police distracted the woman with a small explosion, smashed the windows of her car and snatched the child to safety.

Tracy Diane Levis, 24, was in the Harris County Jail Saturday on \$300,000 bond on two charges of aggravated assault and one charge of injury to a child, Police Sgt. A.D. Moore said.

She was taken into custody just after 4 a.m., 13 hours after she locked herself in the car with her son, Brandon Duke, on a street in southwest Houston.

The boy suffered a minor 2-inch laceration on his back and some dehydration but was in good condition at Ben Taub Hospital, Moore said. Police believe he was cut by broken glass during the rescue.

Ms. Levis, whose face was smeared with makeup, has a history of psychiatric problems and once made a public suicide attempt, police said. She was in a psychiatric holding cell at the jail and will undergo testing, Sgt. Michael McGinty said.

She held a 6-to-8-inch hunting knife near Brandon's throat during the standoff and appeared to be hallucinating, police said. She made no demands and

did not give any explanation of her actions during the ordeal, they said.

The police moved in because of concerns about the child's health after being locked inside a vehicle for so long.

Police threw a grenade in front of the car to distract the woman, and a team of officers stormed the car and broke the windows. One officer grabbed the child and bolted to a waiting ambulance.

"By the time the mother knew what was going on, we had already secured the little boy," police spokesman Dan Turner said. "His safety was our top priority."

The incident began about 3 p.m. Friday when Levis' mother, Barbara Levis, apparently was trying to take her daughter to a psychiatric hospital. The two women got into an argument, and Barbara Levis fled from the car, police said.

"I thought it was an accident," said Keith Lampton, who saw the commotion and called police. "I looked over and I saw her face was all painted up like Halloween. She was yelling at her mother and waving a knife toward her."

FBI agrees to get rid of protest files

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI says it will purge its files of thousands of names of people and organizations collected during its controversial investigation of Americans who protested U.S. policy in Central America.

FBI Director William S. Sessions disclosed the plan to transfer records of the bureau's 1983-85 investigation of the Coalition in Solidarity with the People of El Salvador (CISPES) to the National Archives and Records Administration in letter to Congress released last week.

Sessions' decision was hailed as a victory for CISPES by the Center for Constitutional Rights, which had represented the group in a lawsuit that obtained documents disclosing the domestic spying operation.

In a separate case, The National Security Archive, a private not-for-profit group, said Saturday that a new batch of FBI documents it received last week showed the agency ran background checks on people whose names surfaced during its "Library Awareness Program."

The FBI memo said the checks, conducted after the library program was already under public attack, were "to determine whether a Soviet active measures campaign had been initiated to discredit — the controversial operation."

The document said all but eight of the 266 checks "were either negative or of no significance to this study." The names of the eight individuals who did not fit the "negative or of no significance" category were blacked out in the once-secret memo made public.

Men who died in hostage rescue attempt are honored

ARLINGTON, Va. (AP) — Three former Iran hostages and a wreath Saturday at Arlington National Cemetery to honor the eight U.S. servicemen who died in the 1980 attempt to rescue Americans being held captive in Tehran.

Taking part in the ceremony were former hostages Richard Queen, William Royer and retired Air Force Col. David Roeder.

"It's a very humbling thing, for someone to volunteer to give his life... to regain freedom for, as far as I know, people they didn't know personally," Roeder said at the ceremony.

"I felt very proud of this country, in the way that they didn't abandon us," he said.

Royer called it a day of reflection. "My heart goes out to the families of the hostages still being held in Beirut, the anguish and uncertainty that they're experiencing, and to the families of the service personnel who were lost in the rescue attempt," Royer said.

The wreath-laying at the Iran Rescue Mission Plaque in the cemetery was followed by the playing of taps.

The tribute was sponsored by No Greater Love, a humanitarian organization which promoted the yellow ribbon campaign during the Iran hostage crisis and now seeks to assist the families of Americans being held in Lebanon.

Bruce Laingen, a board member of No Greater Love, said in a statement: "As a former hostage in Iran, I fervently appeal to those who hold hostage our eight countrymen and others in Beirut today, and to those who can influence them, to restore these men to freedom and their families."

Election '89 Newport-Mesa endorsements

If this year's Newport-Mesa school board election is a trend setter, it is a healthy one. Tuesday's election offers a choice between candidates who presented a lively and sometimes discordant campaign. It generated interest, money and community involvement.

Anyone who studied the candidates and objectively listened to the point-counterpoint came away better informed. Voters had ample opportunity to meet the candidates and more importantly to develop a better understanding of how our schools operate. That is the essence of politics.

Some complain too much money was spent, bemoaning the encroachment of high-pressure politics. We see it differently. Granted, candidates spent more money, but there were more forums and more dialogue. Sometimes the cost of better government is intensity.

If no-holds barred politics results in more qualified candidates, better informed voters and, ultimately, in improved education for our children, the price is worth it.

The Daily Pilot endorses the three incumbents for re-election because we don't believe the school board needs an overhaul. That does not mean we think the board isn't need of some repair.

Sex education dominated this campaign and that's unfortunate. It is a small part of what the district does. We disagree with challengers Wendy Leece and Jo Ellen Allen that immediate and drastic changes are needed. Yes, mistakes were made. One teacher worked without adequate guidelines in a class dealing with sex that resulted in a major controversy. But we believe the situation has been corrected.

Much of the sex education controversy comes from a lack of knowledge of the total curriculum. Abstinence is part of that curriculum. So are elements of other school district's innovative programs, which were held up as examples during the campaign. To understand the curriculum, look at the entire course of study, the process from which it evolved and the procedure that is upgrading it. Singling out a class, or part of a class, is unrepresentative and unfair.

We believe there is an adequate sex education curriculum in our schools and a plan to improve it. If there is a lesson in this campaign, it is more public participation and understanding are needed.

The transfer of two principals also sparked controversy. The district's top administrator did a sloppy job of handling that transfer. The board, which was aware of the transfer, later addressed the situation with a new policy. But its early response to the public outcry only kindled the controversy as it closed ranks behind the administration without a public explanation of what went wrong and why. The result was a split in the community that exists today.

In the future, the board should deal openly and honestly with the community as opposed to well-intended solidarity that can be interpreted as autocratic.

This campaign also emphasized that future school board members must do a better job of involving parents in the schools. In many ways, parental involvement in Newport-Mesa's schools is excellent, but it is largely structured and formal. One challenger recommends a regular poll of parents to involve those who do not routinely involve themselves. It's an excellent idea.

How schools respond to minorities and educate a broader ethnic mix of students are concerns. State law requires all children be treated and educated equally. Two challengers, Leece and Allen, have disturbing leanings toward either using the schools to help identify illegal aliens or giving the opinions of longtime residents preference over newcomers. Even the slightest tendency to involve schools in this volatile issue or placing the opinion of one group over another is unthinkable and unacceptable.

In the race between incumbent Roderick MacMillian and Leece our endorsement goes to MacMillian, who has been criticized for his 30-year tenure on the board. There is truth in the concept that fresh faces bring fresh ideas to an organization, but that is not enough to warrant voting against the incumbent. We believe MacMillian is a man of integrity whose primary concern is for children and in this race that is the main concern.

MacMillian's opponent offers simplistic solutions to complex issues and has a tendency to quote what others say rather than what she thinks. Leece says she offers parents a change, that she will listen to them, but we believe her allegiance rests more with a vocal minority than the often silent majority.

We also urge re-election of Sherry Loofbourrow. She is an advocate of mediation and moderation. Loofbourrow is a master at working with parents. Those attributes worked against her since she favors the low-key approach and is often in the background. We think she is preoccupied with the board presenting a united front, but there is no question about her effectiveness, dedication and ability to continue improving Newport-Mesa's schools.

Allen offers fresh ideas and valuable experience in the classroom. But she, like Leece, has a disturbing way of talking more about what parents want rather than what children need. Much of her approach is too strident for our taste and the perception exists that she places too much emphasis on pragmatic politics.

The race between incumbent Judith Franco and Karen Evarts offers the most difficult, yet pleasant choice. Voters can't lose with either candidate. Both women have much to offer.

Evarts has a proven record of community service and involvement and has children in the local schools. We believe she would be an asset to any board, committee or council. In some ways, it is regrettable her opponent was determined by geography rather than personality or ability.

However, our endorsement goes to Franco, who is a master technician in the working of school boards and administrations. The challenges of replacing the district's top administrator in the not-too-distant future, realignment of some school boundaries and other complex changes in the district must be weighed in this race. That process requires a calm and knowledgeable hand on the district's helm. Franco, we believe, is the best choice considering those challenges.

Herald Examiner's death ends era

As this is written, the last copies of the last edition of the Los Angeles Herald Examiner have disappeared from the newsracks, which now stand empty on street corners from Calabasas to San Clemente like tombstones marking the final resting place of true, old-fashioned, roll-up-the-sleeves journalism in Southern California.

The Herald Examiner was the last of its breed: hard-bitten, hustling, irreverent and eminently readable. It embodied a style of journalism that now can only be seen in grainy, black-and-white films from the '30s and '40s, the journalism of "The Front Page" and "Deadline USA."

I never had the privilege of working for the Her-Ex; now, sadly, I never will. So, I'm writing not as a former employee but as a former reader. And as a former reader I want to thank all the writers, editors and photographers who have worked there over the past 15 years or so for repeatedly inspiring me with their guts, their wit and their dedication to getting the real story. I don't know all your names, but some have stuck in my mind:

Gordon Dillow, Joel Schwada, Andy Furillo, Allan Malamud, various Page Two scribes, Mikal Gilmore, and the dreaded Ken Gurnick, the man we Dodger fans loved to hate but the one we all would read to find out what was really going on with the Boys in Blue.

It was a paper that could make you laugh while tweaking powerful noses and make you cry with its brutally honest reportage from the barrio or South-Central L.A. — often on the same page.

In just the past year, the understaffed and poorly equipped Her-Ex singlehandedly exposed mismanagement and safety shenanigans at the RTD and brought the most popular mayor in the city's history to his

knees with revelations of questionable financial dealings. At the same time, the Herald had the wit and style to put the Jim Bakker and Zsa Zsa Gabor sentencing stories together under the single banner: "Jail cells of the rich and famous." Page one, 72 point.

It was a paper that tackled serious issues, yet refused to take itself seriously — to the very end. The final edition featured an almost cheery "So Long, L.A.!" banner headline on page one. The banner on the sports page was similarly spirited: "We're Outta Here!"

This was a paper that held on to some of the stuff of journalism's former Golden Age — the age of Sinclair Lewis, H. L. Mencken, William Randolph Hearst, Grantland Rice and the fictional Hildy Johnson and Perry White. It was an era in which newspapers had personalities, in which writers were allowed to write and creativity was encouraged, not buried under endless rewrites on the copy desk. Back then, if you wanted to get the real story, you hit the streets, not the phone, or the computer. The Herald was the only

contemporary paper I've seen that still had that spirit and style.

Yet it was doomed in the end to succumb to journalism's present Gray Age. Today's major papers all have personality, too — the same one. And it's often deadly dull.

You could call the Herald a lot of things — a scandal sheet, maulin, cops-and-robbers, smartass — but you could never call it dull. It was an entertaining read, but not in the shallow and inane way that is mostly identified with broadcast journalism today and is creeping into the print realm. There was always meat to the Herald. There was real, hard-nosed journalism being practiced there, ask Tom Bradley.

Sometimes, reading the Her-Ex you could almost smell the hot type and hear the harried writers yelling "Copy!" as they tore smeared pages from their Underwoods. In reality, of course, they used computers just like the rest. But, unlike the rest, they didn't become computer programmers and junior bureaucrats in the process — they remained journalists first, last and always.

Unfortunately for us, always wasn't forever.

Genesis evolves into more debate

To the Editor: RE: "Right Is Wrong On Evolution" column by Tom Clanin, Daily Pilot News Editor: I have taught science in California's public schools for over 20 years. I graduated from the University of Redlands with a degree in biology and chemistry. My years of post-graduate work have been at UCLA.

You see, the scientific method demands that we begin with an experiment that produces observable results. This experiment must be repeatable by another scientist in another place with the same observable results. From those results scientists can draw their conclusion, propose their theories and devise other experiments to test these theories.

I must say that I view with much amusement the current debate over whether or not creationism should be taught in the science classrooms of our public schools.

The problem with evolution as scientific theory, let alone fact, is that there have never been any experiments with observed results that even approximate the creation of life processes. In other words, to the scientist who proposes evolution, the mechanisms which started the life processes are events which happened in the past, which he cannot duplicate today, but which he accepts by faith even though he cannot scientifically prove it by experiment. I propose to you that this satisfies all the definitions of religion, not science. The existence of fossil bones, of giant beasts, trilobites, shark's teeth in Kern County, and other geologic artifacts are mentioned in both the religion of evolution and the religion of the Bible.

Bill Honig and the science subcommittee of the state Curriculum Commission wants all mention of creationism removed from textbooks and to leave evolution as the only theory for the origin of life.

These do nothing in themselves to sway the argument either way, but the particulars of their structure and environmental detail provide interesting observable data which fuels the vigorous, healthy, intellectually stimulating debate which we see taking place in the scientific community today.

Other concerned citizens such as Tom Clanin, declare that any attempt to teach creationism would be to spread religious dogma and that science demands that only evolution be taught for the sake of our children.

Recently, Mark Hartwig, Executive Director of Students For Origins Research, P.O. Box 3869, Colorado Springs, Colorado, 80937, stated, "The American Association for the Advancement of Science has embarked on an ambitious reform

This attempt to only teach one view on the origins of life seems to me to be quite dogmatic and ignores the fact that there is, in reality, a lively and vigorous debate taking place at this time over how life started with brilliant scientists representing both sides. Despite massive attempts at reform in the past, science education as a whole remains largely unchanged: instructional methods that emphasize memorizing vocabulary lists and disconnected scientific facts are still the rule, while inquiry and critical thinking skills are still exceptions ... "It is one thing to extol the virtues of an inquiry-based approach to science education, it is another thing entirely to implement such an approach — especially when it comes to letting students question facts and theories that science educators appear very reluctant to encourage genuine inquiry into things they themselves consider as beyond dispute ..."

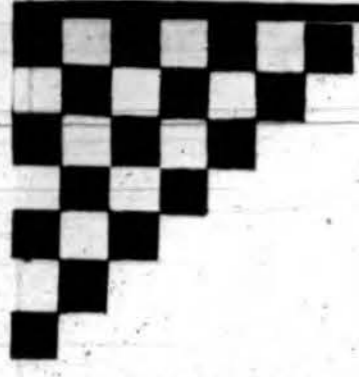

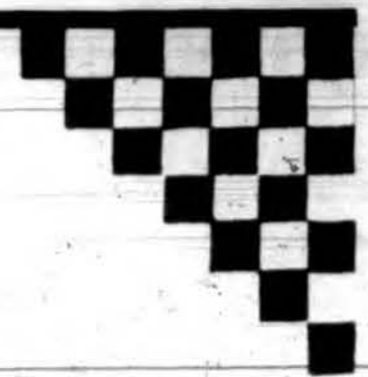

In a relentless search for restaurants serving dinner for under five dollars, these five gems shone out from under the glare of the zillions of fast food franchises competing for our cheap eating dollars. From Huntington Beach to Laguna, each spot is unique in either atmosphere or cuisine or both. Some are suitable for family dining while others are more fully enjoyed with friends, by the romantic couple, or a cheap date.

Be Bop Burgers

It's Friday night. The booths are full of baby-boomers and their 5-to-12-year-olds. A 1955 Select-o-matic near the entrance spits out the oldies, three for a quarter.

Three Grilled Chili-cheese Wipeouts (\$1.85) for the kids, and uh, one La Bamba Chili Fries (\$2.10), a uh, Sea Cruise Tuna Salad (\$2.95), three milks,

At Be Bop Burgers in Huntington Beach, manager Roger DeMond and Tanya Taylor take your order from behind a gleaming countertop (center) and you dine in a '50s atmosphere accented by the tabletop jukeboxes (right) and other memorabilia (below).

a vanilla shake made with real ice cream." I say to Betty Booper who is patiently taking my order at oh-so-cool Be Bop Burgers in Huntington Beach.

The old album covers and posters on the walls and the red vinyl tuck-and-roll booth seats have inspired me to order an All American grease-out.

Tab total for family of five, \$19.10.

Who wouldn't want to slurp on a thick old strawberry shake while a-gazin' at Dick Dale and his Del-Tones, Chubby Checker, and the Fabulous Fabian? Who wouldn't be inspired to increase their American cholesterol levels to 350 for a chance to remember

"The James Dean Story" or "Muscle Beach Party" with Annette and Frankie.

Chili and American cheese drips out of the bottom of the sandwiches. There's a tabletop juke box in our booth, under the board listing top hits of 1955-65. The kids want to put in a quarter for Elvis. They love Elvis. Bee-bop-a-lu-bop, she's my baby.

The kids think the Bazooka bubble gum (complete with comics) that

came under their dippy, crispy sandwich was outta-sight. Husband wonders if the chili is Hormel or Dennison's and if he's going to die from eating so many french fries in one sitting. I wish they hadn't put pickle-relish in the tuna salad, but we're happily stuffing the food into our faces faster than speeding bullets, trying to hide the stuff from that great surgeon general in the sky.

Find Be Bop Burgers at

18575 Beach Blvd. in Huntington Beach, just south of where Main and Ellis meet. That's Ellis not Elvis.

Be Bop Burgers is fun. The food is palatable, music's rockin', and the busboys—not the Beach Boys! keep the white Formica table tops clean as a newly-polished '57 Chevy. But go for the atmosphere. Go to see Meet the Beetles: The first album by England's phenomenal pop combo.

Ho Sum Bistro

Clean and bright, Ho Sum's draws a decidedly yuppie crowd. A young man with a hip hair cut and pressed white collared shirt gazes nonchalantly over the top of the Wall Street Journal at the girls that sit next to us. Our waitress, Olivia, is from Kula, Maui, here going to college.

The restaurant seats only 30 or 40, but the small

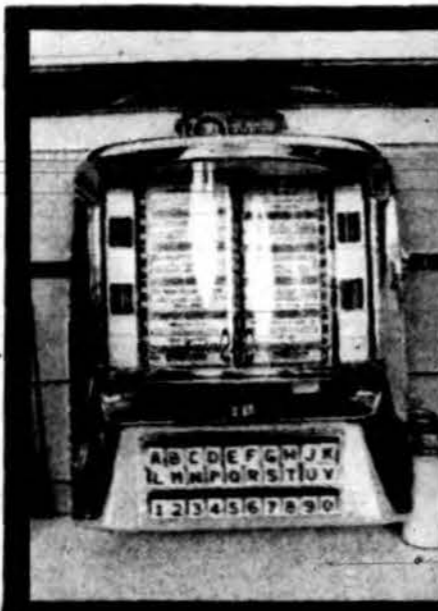
floor space is immediately made up for by the vaulted ceiling. Indoor planters and the white-with-pastel accents give the restaurant a patio feeling.

For less than \$5 you can fill up on the popular Ho Sum Chicken Salad, shredded chicken breast, lettuce, crispy won ton, with a spice ginger dressing \$4.75 or Village Fried Rice \$4.00. The jasmine tea is a delightful beverage bargain. At 75 cents a pot, it warms your tummy and soothes your nerves.

We tried the Pot Stickers, five poached Chinese pork dumplings, tried crispy on one side, sprinkled with freshly grated ginger, served with two excellent dipping sauces, sweet sour and apricot.

Although everything on the menu is less than \$5, we found it difficult not to order more. The flavors are

Theresa Fernald paints from the heart

"You have to make a living one way or another, so you might as well do something that you're good at and that you enjoy," said artist Theresa Fernald, recalling career advice from her parents. Those wise words of parental concern coupled with intensive art education have propelled Fernald to a career which culminated in her recent nomination for the Dewar's Young Artists Recognition Awards, the largest artistic talent competition of its kind in California.

Though she didn't win the award, the nomination alone marks an impressive footnote to Fernald's career, since it enabled her work to be viewed by a panel of judges consisting of California's leading artists, educators, critics, and museum curators.

"My paintings visually record the ordinary configurations of urban existence," explained Fernald, adding that "within these mundane

subjects a dynamic life force of mass/energy occurs."

The serious overtones in her art work match the intensity of her love for painting.

"The physicality of the paint and the presence of color within each painting strike a vibration of symbolic reference alluding to the intrinsic life essence in all forms," said Fernald.

An art instructor at both Golden West Community College and Coastline Community College, Fernald resides in Costa Mesa with her husband and two children. She also finds time to work as assistant to the director of the Golden West College Art Gallery, site of her participation in a group exhibition last year. But it was her affiliation with the Orange County Center For Contemporary Art in Santa Ana that brought Fernald the nomination for the Dewar's Award.

unusual, delicate and sensuous.

While the Dim and Sum (pork dumpling, won ton, spring rolls) are delightful, they won't make a dinner. If you're on budget, Olivia says stick to the large salads, rice and noodle dishes, sip some jasmine tea, and enjoy the best gourmet bargain in Newport Beach.

Zinc Cafe
Imagine a thick piece of Italian sourdough topped with mozzarella, mounds of savory Ratatouille (eggplant, zucchini, tomato, garlic, and onion) sprinkled with more mozzarella and a dash of dill. You have this lovely meal that cost \$4.95 in front of you, on a small square table on the brick under a grapevine trellis, in front of a charming sidewalk cafe hidden away on a Laguna side street.

We went on a Sunday afternoon. Most people there had ordered Cafe au lait, coffee with steamed foamy milk, served in huge espresso mugs. They sat and sipped and ate great looking cake.

For dinner, go to Zinc Cafe at 5 o'clock because they close at 6 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday, and at 4 p.m. on Sundays and we are closed on Mondays.

From a vegetarian menu (with eggs), the choice is limited, which makes ordering easy, except they were out of what I really wanted to try, the Croque Monsieur (\$4.55): a grilled french sandwich with Jarlsberg cheese tomato, red onion, Ortega chili and oregano. Sounds fabulous doesn't it?

We ordered a few dishes. The Zinc House Salad (\$4.95) is lovely, with a vinaigrette, Greek olives, goat's-milk cheese, pine nuts and several lettuces, but too small for dinner. The ginger carrot soup is excellent! And for \$2.50 they give you quite a bit. Flavored with curry, it's spicy. To make a meal round it off with a side order of filolef bread for 65 cents.

For fun, don't miss the large serving of rice pudding with fresh raspberry puree (\$2.75). I could have eaten that and nothing else. It is full of golden raisins and tastes remarkably like cheese cake.

According to Zinc the best dishes for dinner are the Ratatouille sandwich (also the most popular) and the mixed vegetable sandwich with

egg. Unfortunately the pizzas are just over budget at \$5.25-5.75, and while they may satisfy your hunger at lunch, they're on the small side for dinner.

Enjoy the attention to detail, the lion-head fountain, the tile floors inside, the featured artist's works on the walls, and for those sitting inside, french windows open onto the courtyard.

Find Zinc Cafe at 350 Ocean Avenue in Laguna Beach. Above the grape vines, the sign simply reads CAFE.

Wahoo's Fish Tacos

On Placentia Avenue in Costa Mesa, between 18th and 19th streets, is a great restaurant, Wahoo's Fish Tacos. A turquoise lattice crisscrosses the building. A wahoo (an excellent eating, firm-fleshed, fierce-fighting, Pacific ocean fish, called ono in Hawaii) jumps out of a pink and blue pastel sign out front. Humble yet colorful in appearance, Wahoo's is reminiscent of the Baja seafood.

Inside the tables are white. Bright surf posters and fish paintings decorate the walls. A slick pink surf board hangs above the order counter.

Take a paper menu from the counter and choose a table, or order first then sit down. Prices on the menu range from \$1.55 to \$5.65, from fish tacos to teriyaki steak. My favorite is Number 2: Any Two Tacos (fish, chicken, pork, beef) with ahi beans and rice, \$3.95. The tacos are double wrapped in corn tortillas, filled with fresh pieces of steamed (not fried) fish, cabbage, tomato, and salsa. Quite different from the Ensenada especial, deep fried fish and white sauce. Fresh salsa tops the steamed white rice and mound of black beans, Peruvian style. Lime is served on the side. The portions are large, but not too big. I stuff myself to the gills and then hope no one is looking while I lick my plate. You will not leave wishing you had ordered more.

According to owner Wing Lam, the most popular dishes are the Number 4 (Kahuna): Any one taco and burrito; Number 6 (Maui Bowl): Teriyaki steak with rice, and my fave Number 2: Any Two Tacos.

Sit inside where the action is, or outside at one of the larger, quieter, tiled patio tables. Wahoo's is comfortable with your loud kids, your babies, your grandparents (or parents). It's also a cool place to bring your friends, to see and be

seen under the gnarly poster of bikini-clad-wahine-with-surfboard signed by Joe Kealoha. Marbella with the lovely gold rimmed smile, or Wing the owner, or Howard, Wing's friend, will bring your dinner to you. I've never known it to take longer than 10 minutes.

If you like beer, split the 21-oz. bottle of Asahi Dry or Suntory.

Tacos and burritos here are meatier and drier than the usual, not filled with beans or lots of cheese. The food is fresh and simple and, quite on purpose, low in salt and fat. Wahoo's serves familiar foods, and a bit of the unusual. Got there just because the food is so-o-o-o good!

Mu-Shu Port

Hidden away in the Balboa Fun Zone, next to Penguins and the Merry-Go-Round, is a little Chinese joint called Mu-Shu Port. You can get a complete dinner consisting of a main dish, fried rice or chow mein, and a spring roll, for \$3.95-4.50.

To make ordering easy for the dinner unfamiliar with chinese food, a labeled photograph of each dish is on the wall. We tried the Cashew Chicken and the Hot Garlic Shrimp, both were very good and the servings generous.

The Cashew Chicken is chunks of chicken, celery, water chestnuts in a savory sauce. Hot Garlic Shrimp is hot indeed, served with assorted vegetables and garlic. Th fried rice is preferable to the chow mein with both meals, as the noodles are a bit greasy. Besides it's wonderful to soak up the sauces with the rice. We went so far as to substitute plain steamed white rice for the fried. It simplifies the meal, enhances the flavor.

Fair, of the family-run business, emphasizes that they use no MSG in their cooking. If you are sensitive to the substance check with them again.

While eating, enjoy the decor. Red vinyl tablecloths are stapled to round tables. Lovely bouquets of roses and falling ferns of plastic origin adorn the walls. Count the neon signs in the windows. Wonder where you can order the flamboyant ceiling tile with intricate Chinese artwork, or the tiled roof mounted on the wall.

Mu-Shu Port is not for the chic at heart. But you can take your loved one down to Balboa Main Street, park in a metered stall, go for a sunset ride on the Ferry, and eat a delicious and filling Chinese dinner in comfortable surroundings for less than \$10. Can't beat that for entertainment value.

a long process of study and dedication beginning with her first oil painting class when she was 11 years old.

"My parents were instrumental in my decision to become an artist because they always supported that option," recalled Fernald. A resident of Orange County since 1959, Fernald's first solo exhibition was arranged by the Newport Beach City Arts Commission and held at the Corona del Mar Library while she was attending Newport Harbor High School. This public showing was featured in the Daily Pilot in 1967 when Fernald was just 14 years old.

"My art teacher and my mother noticed my talent very early on in my life and decided to encourage that direction," remembered Fernald. After receiving her Master of Fine Arts Degree from California State University in Long Beach, Fernald submitted an application for acceptance to the Orange County Center for Contemporary Art. Fernald calls her membership a "great career move" because the affiliated artists get the chance to show some of their work in monthly exhibitions. The members are also expected to work at the center in order to learn how a gallery operates.

"Our major mandate is to nurture the emerging artist by providing a healthy, positive, intellectual environment, giving access to the larger art community, relating information about career development and providing an understanding of how a gallery works and how shows are developed and presented," explained director Bardene Allen. Besides the professional benefits of her membership, Fernald sees a more important aspect of her as-

sociation with the organization.

"You need the support of other artists," said Fernald, adding, "we have to come together and add our own to society."

It's clear that Fernald is adding her own vision to those who have seen her art.

"She's a young painter so there's no telling what's ahead, but I've seen a lot of painters in my life and she's extraordinary," said Paul Donaldson, director of the Golden West College Gallery. Among her attributes, Donaldson noted that it is the honesty in her work that sets Fernald apart from her peers.

"She paints from the heart and her work reflects that," stated Donaldson, adding, "she has to be the most honest person I know."

Along with candor, another integral part of Fernald's work is her own philosophy and concern for the environment. An active member of American Indian Unity Church in Garden Grove, Fernald feels that the cohesiveness of her personal beliefs set the foundation for the expressions in her work.

"I believe you don't just live for yourself, you become part of a group," said Fernald, adding, "and I can express these things because I've been painting so long, it's like breathing to me."

Future plans include the desire to become "a fully employed instructor" and to have one gallery handle all of her work.

"The aim of most artists is to work on your art all year long and then have one place to show it to the public," stated Fernald. But until then, Fernald is content to keep working hard and making sacrifices for her art.

"Everything costs you something," stated Fernald, adding, "but it's worth it because eventually it comes back to you."

'The Music of Andrew Lloyd Webber' comes to OC

When "The Music of Andrew Lloyd Webber — In Concert," starring Sarah Brightman, opens at the Orange County Performing Arts Center for its premiere Southern California engagement Nov. 7 through 18, Southland audience will have their first opportunity to hear the combined creative output of an artist who will soon be known — officially — as a "Living Legend."

That lofty title will be conferred upon Andrew Lloyd Webber by the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (the organization which founded the Grammy Awards), which will present to Lloyd Webber as inaugural "Grammy Living Legend" award on Nov. 21.

For millions of theatergoers, however, the legendary status of Andrew Lloyd Webber has been building since the early 1970s, when the budding composer followed two striking successes — "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" and "Jesus Christ Superstar" — with a string of musical megahits that continues today with "The Phantom of the Opera" and "Aspects of Love."

Indeed, for more than two decades Andrew Lloyd Webber has been the source of many of Broadway's most popular musicals, including "Evita," "Starlight Express," and the feline phenomenon "Cats," which broke box office records during each of three visits to the Arts Center. The tally of awards presented to Lloyd Webber includes four Tonys, four Drama Desk awards and three Grammys. He is also the only composer in musical history who has had three hits running simultaneously in London and New York — a feat he has accomplished twice.

Now, with "The Music of Andrew Lloyd Webber," the most significant compositions from Webber's entire body of work are showcased for the first time in a full-scale concert format that features a choral ensemble, special soloists and a full orchestra of more than 60 musicians.

All performances at the Arts Center will also star Sarah Brightman, the critically acclaimed singer and actress who — as Mrs. Andrew Lloyd Webber — enjoys unique insight into the famed composer's music.

It was for Brightman's soaring lyric soprano voice that Lloyd Webber wrote the role of Christine, the female lead in "The Phantom of the Opera." Brightman premiered the role in London and New York, receiving a Drama Desk nomination for the latter.

Brightman began her close association with Lloyd Webber's music when she was cast in the original production of "Cats," where she first met her future husband. She later performed in the premier of Lloyd Webber's "Requiem," earning a Grammy nomination for her recording of that work.

One accomplishment that Brightman and Lloyd Webber have in common is success on the pop charts, collectively and individually. Beyond her stage career, Brightman is a well-known British recording artist with four top-ten singles: "I Lost My Heart to a Starship Trooper," "Pie Jesu," "The Phantom of the Opera" and "All I Ask of You." Her newest album, "The Songs that Got Away," is a collection of songs from lesser-known musical theater productions, including a selection from "Jeeves" — the only Lloyd Webber musical that did not attain mythical proportions at the box office.

Lloyd Webber's songs — "I Don't Know How to Love Him," "Memory" and "Don't Cry for Me Argentina," for example — have often achieved the same kind of success on the charts that the productions

have enjoyed on stage, giving Lloyd Webber audiences the rare opportunity to hum a show's tunes before they enter the theater.

In fact, Lloyd Webber originally conceived of "The Music of Andrew Lloyd Webber" as a way of bringing his music to audiences in Britain who were familiar with his recordings, but — because of the limited touring of his full-scale musical theater productions — had never heard his compositions performed live.

Five sell-out performances were presented in England in October and November of 1988. Lloyd Webber later revised and expanded the concert for Canadian audiences in Vancouver and Toronto, where sold-out performances broke box office records in both houses. The show is now on an extended tour that will take it to some 25 cities across North America.

The Orange County Performing Arts Center has extended its engagement of "The Music of Andrew Lloyd Webber," adding a second week that includes four non-subscription performances with seating availability in all locations.

Tickets for all performances are on sale now, and may be purchased at The Center's box office or at any TicketMaster outlet, including May Company and Music Plus. To charge tickets by phone, call 740-2000. For more information, call 556-ARTS.

Amiel's 'Queen of Hearts' is not a 'Moonstruck,' but it has its moments

Jon Amiel's pixilated "Queen of Hearts" — now playing at the Balboa Cinema in Newport Beach — is so many things that I'm surprised it works at all. If you can imagine "Moonstruck" being done as a folksy operetta, only without the music and seen through the eyes of a child (a la "Hope and Glory"), then you'll have some idea of exactly how awkward, yet enormously engaging, this bit of whimsy is.

It's a bedtime story that's been told to Eddie Luca (Ian Hawkes) over and over again by his father Danilo (Joseph Long) and is now being told to us by little Eddie — the story of how Danilo married Eddie's mother, Rosa (Anita Zagaria), and how they fled from their native Gimignano, a town near Florence, and relocated in the Italian quarter of London, where they opened a tiny cappuccino/espresso cafe and raised four children in the cozy apartment on top of the cozy cafe.

The story is true — Eddie swears — but it's probably been told so many times over that it's become fictionalized and distorted and more fanciful than the truth. It's become a fantasy. It plays like a fairy tale replete with hero and heroine, a seemingly wicked mother and a villain.

Rosa, it seems, was promised in marriage to the town butcher, the brutal Barbariccia (Vittorio Amandola), by her mother, Mama Sibilla (Eileen Way), even though Rosa's heart really belongs to

the poor Danilo. There's something of a lifelong family feud going on here as Mama Sibilla hates Danilo's father, named Nonno (Vittorio Duse). We know she hates him because she spits at him.

Anyway, during the opening, which Amiel ("The Singing Detective") actually stages as an operetta, Danilo rescues Rosa and they try to run off. But when the evil Barbariccia traps them on top of a building, the two would-be lovers decide to jump to their deaths. A well-timed horse-drawn wagon of hay catches them, however, and before we know it, Danilo and Rosa — and Mama Sibilla — are on a boat and en route to England, where Danilo gets work as a waiter.

His family growing by one, two and then three children, Danilo is still something of a failure. One day, while serving a couple of customers, the pig's head on the table begins to talk, advising Danilo to "trust the coins." Danilo decides to take the pig's advice and gamble his savings.

He wins, of course, and with his winnings, he opens the Lucky Cafe. By now, his fourth child — Eddie — has been born and everything is, as I've said, cozy.

This opening, filled with excess, is just about perfect, but Amiel can't sustain his brand of fluff and "Queen of Hearts" begins to bog down when too much plot is introduced in the film's second half. First, Nonno shows up, much to Mama Sibilla's chagrin, and then Barbariccia, now wealthy, arrives in London, opens a shady business and steals away Danilo and Rosa's oldest

child, Bruno (Jimmy Lambert). Twenty years have gone by, but Barbariccia still pines for Rosa and, to get even, is bent on destroying Danilo.

This being a child's-eyed fantasy, little Eddie saves the day.

"Queen of Hearts" is smooth-flowing and easy to watch. Except for the talking pig, it has no real high points. About the funniest bit in the movie is when Mama Sibilla goes to confession — and confesses the sins of Danilo and Rosa! "My daughter and her husband are using family planning," she tells the young priest. "You can only confess your own sins," he tells her.

The cast, which is largely British but looks Italian, is fine, although it requires something of a stretch to swallow Anita Zagaria as a young, virginal woman at the beginning. Way, who is British through and through, is uncanny as Mama Sibilla, but Joseph Long is a disaster as Danilo, his British accent popping through his pidgin Italian in just about every other line of dialogue.

I've seen an ad for "Queen of Hearts" where one of the critics quoted says this is what "Moonstruck" would have been like if "Moonstruck" had been about "real people." Hogwash! The people here aren't real, they're idealistic figments of a child's imagination. And the movie itself, although more specialized and self-consciously arty, is hardly the better of the two.

"Queen of Hearts" can't compare with "Moonstruck" at all.

PSO, Kord present a mournful show

Kazimierz Kord, music adviser and principal guest conductor of the Pacific Symphony Orchestra brought forth program this week that was a who's who of symphonies written in pathos.

First, Kord offered Franz Schubert's Symphony No. 8 in B minor, "Unfinished," which the Viennese composer failed to complete after writing the first two movements and a bit of the third. Some say it was a confrontation with the great symphonies Beethoven was composing at the time.

The ensemble offered a passable reading of No. 8. It was beautiful but not inspiring. The horns played bright and mellow in the first movement, but the violins tended to be a bit screechy. The second movement was played with equal lack of magic, however, it could be said that James Kantor's clarinet solo was notable.

The second piece featured mezzo-soprano Sondra Gelb, who sang Mahler's Kindertotenlieder ("Songs on the Death of Children") which she used in her first performance in 1979. The piece was composed by Mahler from the poems of Friedrich Ruckert. While the ensemble's accompaniment and Gelb's singing were about on an equal level dynamically, it was nevertheless a bit difficult to hear her sing. The music called for piano and pianissimo for the most part and an occasional mezzo-forte, but no more. The subject matter could also be blamed for the solemn delivery. One would not sing otherwise to poetry on the death of children.

The evening was finally brightened by the final two movements of Schumann's work, as did the woodwinds and horns. But if there was actually a solo spot of note, it would have to have been that played by principal cellist Stephen Erdody.

Robert Schumann's Symphony No. 4 in D minor. The violins became mellow and played well through the demanding intricacies of

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Parker casts aside 'all-beach,' turns all-star

GWC product anchors Arizona's offensive line after 3½ years in football

The only time Glenn Parker saw Edison High football during his high school days generally came while riding his bike by the practice field after school on his way to the beach.

That's why it's so unusual that Parker is now considered one of the best senior linemen in the Pac-10 and may very well find himself as an early round pick in next April's NFL draft. Arizona Coach Dick Tomey told him he was a blue chip all-beach player.

The only place Parker went twice a day during those summers was the beach to surf or play volleyball or spend time with friends.

"That's one of the things we joke about now," Parker said. "Most of (my teammates) are in their 11th or 13th year. They played Pop Warner, high school and college ball. I'm

really only in my third year. I'm like a senior in high school really. I'm just having a great time out there."

It's a major reason why Parker feels so lucky.

"I feel really happy as a matter of fact," Parker said. "Friends asked if I had any regrets. I got to lead the life of a beach bum all through high school. Then I picked it up after one year of JC, and to get to where I am now, I really got to lead the best of both worlds."

It's obviously not your average player who can take that trail. But Parker is not your average man. The 6-foot-6, 305-pounder who runs the 40-yard dash in 5.16 seconds spent a year learning the game under Golden West College's respected offensive line coach Dennis Dixon and has never been anything but a starter since.

While Arizona watched its Rose Bowl hopes slip into doubt after

Saturday's loss to California, Parker has enjoyed some great moments this season, like a 6-3 victory over Oklahoma and a 42-7 win over UCLA.

"We had a fourth quarter drive against Oklahoma of about 57 yards, all on the ground, to get a field goal," Parker said. "On the final drive... in short yardage situations, they'd move me to tight end and run out my end. I was gratified that they felt the confidence in me the last series to run over my back, John Brandom and I team up on the right side."

Oklahoma and Arizona have a rivalry of sorts with basketball and football, and we went there last year and lost a tough one. It was a great way to win it."

The Wildcats need a win over USC, a UCLA win over USC and a victory over Arizona State to still make the Rose Bowl.

Shortly after Parker arrived in Tucson, Ariz., for spring semester in 1988, he earned the starting right tackle job in spring drills and never missed a start since. He said he was surprised to earn the starting position by his fourth day in practice.

"It was due to Dennis Dixon at Golden West," Parker said. "He was an excellent coach and he prepared me pretty well."

"I didn't even understand the game except from the viewpoint of a spectator, and definitely not a player, especially the offensive line. Coach Dixon taught me so much in such a short time. By the end of that freshman year, I really understood football."

It was the following spring when he pushed himself on the weights, but not until he arrived at Arizona that he made it a hobby. Once there, the proximity of the weight room on campus and a full time strength

coach led to an increased workout schedule.

Before his freshman year at Golden West, he maxed at 205 pounds on the bench press.

"For me, that was incredible that I went over 200," Parker said. "Once you start lifting, you really see strides at first, so you really get motivated that way."

Entering his sophomore season, he was benching 300 to 315 pounds and by 1988 had increased to 340. Parker said he benches 385 to 400 now, squads 550 and power cleans 315.

Parker's friend Andy Sinclair, an Edison High and Stanford standout who was drafted by the San Francisco 49ers last spring, wasn't successful in coaxing Parker to initially take the same route as a freshman in high school.

Parker graduated from Edison in

USC pounds Oregon State, 48-6

LOS ANGELES — The ninth-ranked USC Trojans moved within one step of their third consecutive Rose Bowl appearance, trouncing Pacific-10 Conference foe Oregon State, 48-6, Saturday.

The Trojans, 7-2 overall and 5-0 in conference play, also got a helping hand from the California Bears, who upset Arizona, 29-28, earlier in the day.

Going into Saturday's Pac-10 slate, Arizona was second in the race for the Rose Bowl with a 4-1 conference mark and Oregon State was third at 3-1-1.

The Trojans' victory assures them of at least a tie for the Pac-10 championship.

The only way they could be knocked out of the Rose Bowl berth would be if they lose their final two games, against Arizona and UCLA, and Arizona beats both USC and Arizona State.

Any other combination, including ties, puts the Trojans into the Rose Bowl.

Coach Larry Smith said the Trojans, who completely dominated Oregon State, got a boost when they heard the Cal-Arizona score over the Coliseum public address system early in the game against the Beavers.

"It gave us a big emotional lift," Smith said. "I think the score was about 14-0 (in favor of the Trojans) at the time and everybody cranked it up."

"We wanted to make sure we put this game in our pocket."

It didn't take the Trojans long to put the game in their pocket — they scored the first three times they had

the ball and Todd Marinovich threw for three touchdowns in the first half as USC led 34-0 at halftime.

"We played an almost-perfect game," said Marinovich, who completed 14 of 18 passes for 226 yards while playing slightly more than half the game.

"The offensive line just dominated the game. That's why we connected on the big pass plays, because I had so much time to throw."

The Trojans also dominated on defense, holding the Beavers to a minus 13 yards rushing.

Junior Seau had 3½ sacks to lead the Trojans' charge.

"I was very surprised that there was no double-team," said Seau, who has a school record 13½ sacks this season, bettering Jack Del Rio's 13 in 1983.

"I felt that the defense reached a new level of play today."

Oregon State Coach Dave Kragthorpe was at a loss to explain the lopsided defeat.

"I don't know what happened," he said. "We just didn't play well at all from the very beginning."

"Everything that could go wrong went wrong in every sense. It was a triple-header — offense, defense and special teams did not play well."

Oregon State, beaten by USC for the 18th straight time, dropped to 4-4-1 overall.

Marinovich, a redshirt freshman who already ranks ninth on the Trojans' all-time completions list after only nine games, played just 3:47 of the third quarter and left with the Trojans ahead, 41-0.

America's Team has become America's Joke. The Silver Stretch hasn't reached out and touched anyone yet. The "Joe Must Go" chants grow louder and come earlier and more frequently each week. Welcome to life at the bottom of the NFL. That's where the Dallas Cowboys, New York Jets and Detroit Lions reside. It's also where the Atlanta Falcons and San Diego Chargers live. Except for the Jets, who never have been world-beaters but never have been this bad in nearly a decade, these teams have been through this before. The most notable flop has been in Big D. Tom Landry remains the only Cowboys' coach to win a game. He might still own that distinction at the end of this season. "It's going to be an added challenge for us to play teams a second time," Coach Jimmy Johnson says. "They handled us the first time. "We're doing everything we can to turn this around. I'm not embarrassed because I've been doing everything I can do. I don't know many people who thought we'd win every game we played. "There was a reason the team went 3-13 last year.

Coach Landry was a fantastic coach but it was unrealistic to think we could win right away with the talent we inherited."

One fan is so distressed by the way the franchise has been handled by new owner Jerry Jones that he has threatened a lawsuit.

Attorney Robert Goodwin is demanding refunds for disgruntled fans or he may go to court under Texas deceptive trade act.

"They'll be mad, but if they're smart — and they haven't shown any such signs of that to this point — they will do what I've asked," Goodwin said.

The Jets show no signs of doing what the fans ask for at every home game: Fire Coach Joe Walton. Leon Hess, the oil baron who owns the team, said as much earlier this week, declaring it serves no purpose to make changes during the season.

The Jets' offense has died, ravaged by injuries as well as ineptitude. During the current five-game slide, Walton has made two panic moves. First, he benched Ken O'Brien before the game at New Orleans for Kyle Mackey, whose NFL starting experience was as Miami's quarterback during the 1987 players' strike. New York lost, 29-14.

In the Becker-McEnroe semifinal, Becker blasted aces and service winners at key points in the match that had brilliant displays of tennis throughout. Spurs turn back Lakers

Robinson's strong debut paces 106-98 victory

David Robinson launched a new season for the San Antonio Spurs in an old way — with a victory over the Los Angeles Lakers.

But Robinson and a new crew of players hope it doesn't mean another sinking to the bottom of the NBA standings.

Robinson had 23 points and 17 rebounds in a 106-98 victory over the Lakers on Saturday night in San Antonio. Last year, the Spurs finished 21-61 after a similar season-opening victory over Los Angeles.

"We don't want the Spurs to go through a season like that again," said Robinson, making his NBA debut after two years of active duty in the Navy. "We thought before the game that maybe it's not a good idea to win. But, of course, we want to win all we can."

Spurs Coach Larry Brown said Robinson was brilliant despite having an upset stomach during the game.

"I was thrilled with the way David played," Brown said. "He wasn't feeling well, so I had to keep running him in and out and giving him rest. He did well against a team that thrives in this kind of hostile environment."

"My stomach was churning," Robinson said. "Maybe it was just jitters."

The Lakers, who started their season with a 102-94 win at Dallas on Friday night, made several determined bids to catch the Spurs after falling behind by 11 points in the third quarter.

But with a sellout crowd of 15,868 at HemisFair Arena cheering them on, the Spurs — with only three players from last year's team on the roster — met every challenge.

Robinson, who spent two years on active duty after the Spurs made him the first pick in the 1987 college draft, was one of four new Spurs scoring in double figures.

All-Star Terry Cummings, acquired in a trade with Milwaukee, had 22 points and 12 rebounds. Rookie Sean Elliott scored 16 and veteran Maurice Cheeks, added in a trade with Philadelphia, had 14.

Elsewhere in the NBA Saturday:

Pistons 95, Bullets 93: Isiah Thomas scored 20 of his 28 points in the second half and made a last-second steal as Detroit held off Washington in Landover, Md., 95-93. It was the Pistons' eighth consecutive victory over the Bullets dating back to March 20, 1988.

Joe Dumars scored six of his 17 points in the final 3:43 for the defending NBA champion Pistons, who won their second straight game. Washington got 19 points from Jeff Malone and 18 from Harvey Grant. The Bullets' Bernard King was ejected with 1:59 left in the first quarter for a flagrant elbow foul against Dennis Rodman.

Pacers 106, Cavaliers 98: Chuck Person scored 15 of his 19 points in the final quarter and Reggie Miller added 31, giving host Indiana victories in its first two games for the first time since 1981.

Person scored nine of Indiana's last 12 points, starting with an 18-foot jumper and free throw that put the Pacers ahead 97-89 with 4:12 to play. John Williams led Cleveland with 30 points and 14 rebounds.

Knicks 119, Heat 99: Patrick Ewing scored 12 of his game-high 35 points in the fourth quarter. New York pulled away to win its home opener. Johnny Newman, who made two key three-point plays in the final quarter, added 20 points while Charles Oakley had 18 points and 16 rebounds.

The Knicks, who lost their season opener in Detroit Friday, led by as many as 22 points in the first quarter

but allowed the Heat to tie the game late in the third quarter. Terry Davis topped Miami with 17 points and Sherman Douglas had 15.

A 3-point goal by Sikma, his third of the game, gave the Bucks a 98-94 lead with 1:06 left. Charles Barkley made two free throws for Philadelphia with 45 seconds left but Milwaukee's Fred Roberts made a pair 12 seconds later and Sikma hit two more with 15 seconds left.

Nets 111, Magic 106: Sam Bowie hit three free throws and grabbed two key rebounds in the final 36 seconds to help New Jersey ruin Orlando's NBA debut. Dennis Hopson scored 24 points and the Nets held the Magic scoreless in the final 2:17 before a sellout crowd of 15,077 in Orlando.

Rockets 132, Warriors 105: Mitchell Wiggins scored 29 of his 31 points in the second half in Oakland as Houston handed Golden State its second blowout loss in as many nights despite 30 points by Chris Mullin.

Wiggins hit 12 of 18 shots to lead seven Rockets in double figures. Otis Thorpe scored 19 and Akeem Olatunwo 16 for Houston.

Celtics 102, Bulls 100: Larry Bird capped a 27-point performance by sinking the winning, a 15-foot jumper with four seconds remaining in Chicago.

Bird's winning shot came after Chicago's John Paxson tied the score with 19 seconds remaining. Bird, coming back from surgery on both heels, celebrated his return to action with 32 points against Milwaukee on Friday night.

Nuggets 135, Suns 132: Michael Adams scored 30 points and reserve Bill Hanzlik had all eight of his in the final eight minutes as Denver won its seventh straight home opener.

Kings 107, SuperSonics 100: Wayman Tisdale scored 30 points and grabbed 11 rebounds in leading Sacramento past visiting Seattle.

Goer, the giant, Shug McGaughey-trained, 3-year-old chestnut which won the Belmont last June. If the Breeders' Cup Classic had also been contested at one mile and one-half, as was the Belmont, perhaps Easy Goer would again have won. But it wasn't, he didn't, and there were no legitimate excuses, even though NBC-TV analysts gave some weak comments about the eastern colt "starting slowly."

East vs. West has always stirred the passions of racing fans but this year's matchup between Sunday Silence and Easy Goer has been especially satisfying for Californians because of the incredible media hype given Easy Goer, a colt who has won only one race outside New York.

One would assume, however, that in New York racing circles on this Sunday there should be a quiet acceptance of what has transpired. Indeed, almost a silence.

Consider, too, the politics of racing which brings a threat of foul weather every year the Breeders' Cup is held away from California. On two previous occasions, in New York and Kentucky, rain and cold

weather affected the outcome of the races. And on Saturday morning it rained hard in Florida, again threatening the event.

If the races are to be held in November, and apparently that is the best logical time, certainly Breeders' Cup officials should consider holding them in California, where a fast track is predictable, every year.

But the Kentucky breeders and eastern writers would never stand for it. They hate the LA traffic and can't stand our race courses, which they insist are sloped downhill.

Elsewhere from this year's Breeders' Cup:

Congrats to racing writer Jeff Siegel, part-owner of Prized, the three-year-old who stunned (\$19,600 in Florida) with his victory in the mile and one-half Turf Classic worth \$2 million. It was the first venture onto the lawn for trainer Neil Drysdale's colt and Eddie Delahoussaye gave him a perfect trip.

Jockey Angel Cordero, Jr. continues to ride with a delightful zest and won again in the Sprint aboard Dancing Spruce (\$35,200).

The wonder mare, Bayakoa, proved her mettle by burying all of the Wayne Lukas/Gene Klein "rab-

bites" to capture the \$1 million Distaff event.

Trainer Lukas, though, continued his Breeders' Cup success by finally winning a turf event, the \$1 million Mile, with Steimlen.

Did anyone miss Harvey Pack or Pete Athelm's off-the-wall observations on NBC-TV?

Even though Saturday's response from racing fans was impressive, it still didn't equal the all-time Oak Tree meeting handle of \$15,410,409, established when Breeders' Cup races were held at Santa Anita in 1986. Nevertheless, LA bankers had to wonder if all the ready-tellers were on tilt on Saturday morning.

Finally, there was also some football-playing being done on Saturday and can get it get worse for UCLA, loser to Stanford? Sure it can. The Bruins could lose to USC by 10 touchdowns.

And what of Colorado, conqueror of Nebraska? The Bulls are set now for that Orange Bowl meeting against Notre Dame and it says here they'll end up No. 1.

the spring of 1984, attended Golden West as a part-time student in the fall of 1984 to see what he wanted to do but later dropped out.

The next year, he enrolled as a full-time student, came out for the team at the urging of Huntington Beach High friends Mike Ray and Kevin Woodman.

"Seeing that Andy (Sinclair) had gotten a scholarship to a major university, and I had some friends that went out that had been friends at Huntington Beach," said Parker of his reasons for giving football another try.

"They were going to go out for the team and talked me into going out for it. The first time I went out, I was 6-5 or 6-6, about 285, and a little fat, I had never worked out, and I was 20 years old."

Dixon said, "He came out and talked to me about it. I said come out and practice for a while, and I'll give you my opinion on whether I think you can play or not. He came out for a week, and I could see he was an aggressive guy."

"He came out for three or four weeks, practiced a little bit, and I told him if he was willing to put the time in, eventually he could be a real good football player. He was going to have to decide if he wanted to put the time in. He dropped out, but he came out and practiced with me again the next year."

With a red-shirt year gone after attending school full-time in 1985-86, Parker spent the 1986 season practicing to learn the game

and playing occasionally as a backup to two other Golden West standouts, Darren Grudt (Texas A&M starter) and Mike Foust (Fresno State starter).

Dixon remembers when Parker and Rob Flory — a 6-foot-5, 291-pound Huntington Beach High product who practiced with Parker during 1986, earned third-team JC All-America as a sophomore and also went on to Arizona — were at a crossroads during that freshman year of college.

"He made the decision in the middle of the year," Dixon said. "He was up and down, and then one day, he and Flory skipped practice. They went off and talked about it, and came back and said, 'Coach, we talked about it, and we want to be great football players. We want to work to become better.'"

From then on, Parker worked diligently in the weightroom and to improve his technique.

"He picked things up just by him being a hard worker," Dixon said. "What helped him was to be able to see Bobby Sims starting at Florida and Grudt being recruited by Texas A&M, and he saw, 'Hey, I'm a better athlete and if I get things down at practice, the same things are going to happen to me.'"

"Washington State, Texas A&M and Arizona were watching Grudt and Foust one day, and after practice, I said 'What do you think of Grudt and Foust. Several of them said they're pretty good, but both of your freshmen are better. By the end of their freshman year, they were better, just because they were better athletes.'"

Parker said he didn't begin lifting weights diligently on his own until the spring before his sophomore year. "I was still just getting by on size."

The work ethic toward football which Parker developed is pretty ironic considering his attitude toward football while in high school.

During his freshman year, Sinclair lured him into trying out for football, but he lasted only a week as an "average-sized" kid trying out for defensive lineman. I never even went out again in high school.

"Andy and his father were always trying to talk me into going out," Parker said. "I just didn't have much interest. I didn't go out at all after that. At best, I said, 'No, it just wasn't for me.'"

Parker said the Sinclair's weren't the only ones trying to convince him. While his mother didn't want him to suffer injuries playing football, he

"I think in (my father's) heart, he would have liked me to play in high school," Parker said. "But he never pushed me. I think he was happy when I played at Golden West. He's never missed a game of mine."

"I was lucky to have a chance to go to school, to have a coach like Dennis Dixon, and then to have a family that was so supportive."

"Pretty much, I was just going to the beach (in high school). Maybe I was too immature or afraid of going out, but I just didn't like the idea of working that hard. I'd drive my bike to the beach each day and see Andy and the rest sweating, and I thought I like what I'm doing a little better."

UCLA's slim bowl hopes dashed after 17-14 loss

STANFORD — Terry Donahue, the only coach in college football history to win a bowl game in seven consecutive years, won't get a chance for an eighth straight this season.

Donahue's UCLA Bruins, beaten 17-14 by a Stanford team that had lost five straight, saw their slim chances for a bowl bid vanish Saturday along with hopes for a winning season.

"It has been a tremendous disappointment of a season," Donahue said. "The program has fallen to rock bottom, but it can be rebuilt... and will be rebuilt."

UCLA literally fumbled this one away — two of its four fumbles came late in the fourth quarter — as the Bruins extended a losing streak to four for the first time since 1971 and guaranteed their first losing season since 1979.

John Hopkins' 44-yard field goal in the fourth quarter provided the margin of victory for Stanford (2-8 and 2-4 in the Pacific-10).

UCLA, which had a 37-yard field-goal attempt blocked in the third quarter, fell to 3-6 overall and 2-4 in the Pac-10 with two games left.

Stanford's new head coach, Denny Green, enjoyed his team's best effort of the year.

"We've been in five of these games that have come down to the last series... and we've won two of them," he said. "I was impressed with our running game. We're getting there."

The final UCLA fumble came with 55 seconds left when Stanford cornerback Albert Richardson recovered a ball dropped by tight end Charles Arbuckle on the Bruins 27.

That halted a last-minute comeback attempt by UCLA, which had stopped a Stanford drive on the Bruins' 5-yard line.

Brian Johnson, returning from a shoulder sprain,

completed 18 of 28 passes for Stanford, and Cardinal running back Scott Eschelmann ran for 73 yards.

UCLA starting quarterback Bret Johnson completed only 6 of 15 passes for 101 yards. Jim Bonds, who played parts of the game, completed seven of eight passes for 77 yards. Brian Brown led UCLA with 81 yards rushing.

Stanford scored the first time it got the ball, driving 80 yards in 14 plays, capped by a 12-yard touchdown pass from Brian Johnson to split end Ed McCaffrey.

McCaffrey, a 6-foot-6, 220-pounder, earlier kept the drive alive with a superb left-handed grab of pass on third-and-7, barely making a first down on UCLA's 39. Johnson also had a key play when he ran for 13 to UCLA's 27 on third-and-11.

The Bruins stopped in their first two possessions, evened the game the third time with two passes in 37 seconds after starting from Stanford's 48 following a punt.

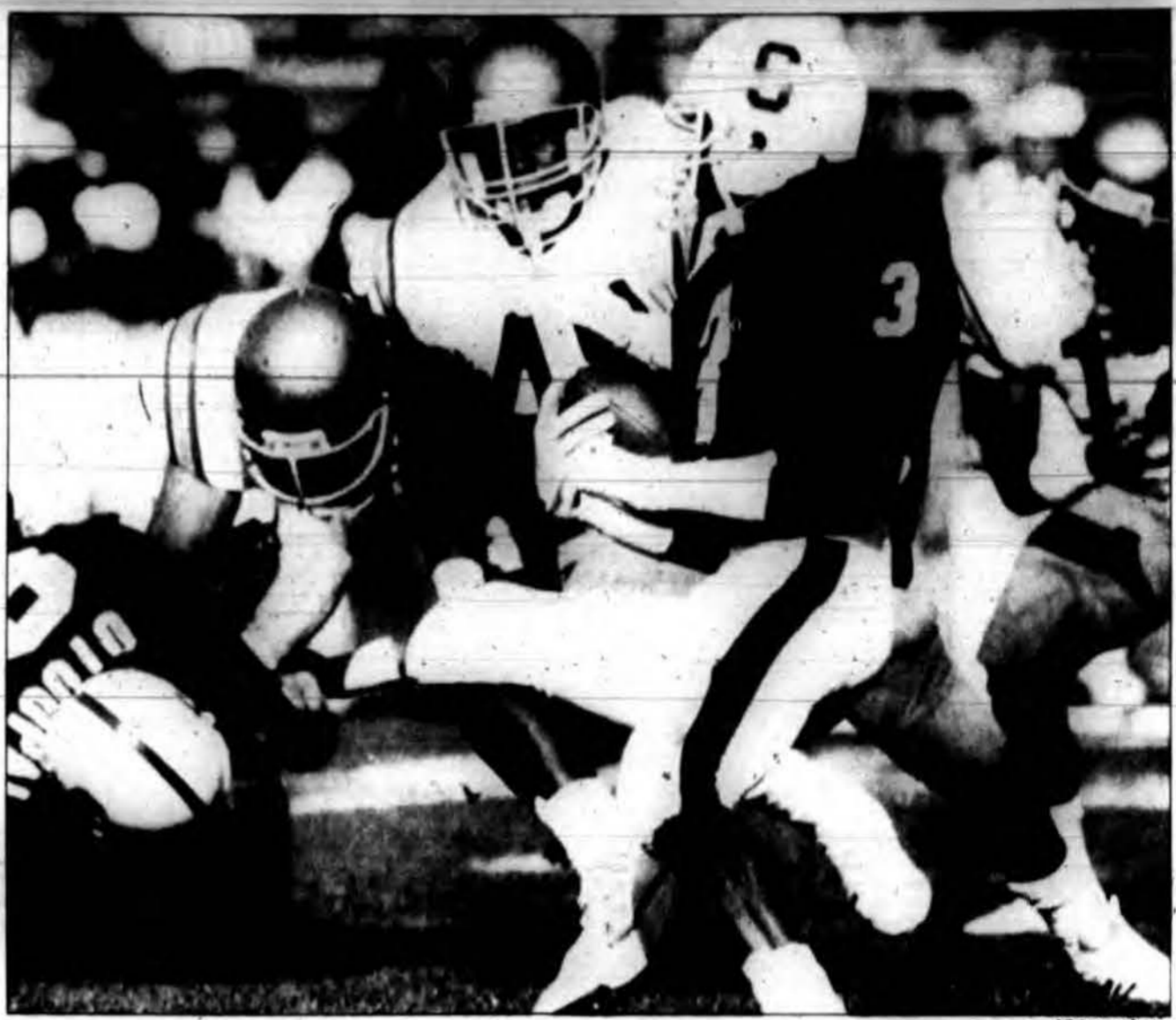
Bret Johnson threw a 15-yarder to Mike Farr, then found Scott Miller with a 33-yarder in the end zone that Scott caught while falling down.

McCaffrey made another spectacular catching to spark a 37-yard touchdown drive that gave Stanford a 14-0 lead in the second quarter. Johnson was scrambling when he spotted McCaffrey alone in the middle but on the ground.

McCaffrey tipped the low pass up to himself just above the turf and pulled it in for a 17-yard gain to the 17. Two plays later, Tom Vardell ran 7 yards up the middle for the touchdown.

Bonds, who came in at a quarterback midway through the second quarter for UCLA, tied the game, 14-14, on a 32-yard touchdown throw to Miller.

Miller, who leaped over Stanford cornerback Alan Grant to make the catch, appeared on TV replay to go out of bounds short of the goal line but was credited with the touchdown.

Colorado virtually sews up Orange Bowl berth

Buffaloes top Nebraska in Big Eight showdown

The Colorado Buffaloes are paying tribute to Sal Aunese in a truly special way. Aunese, the team's former quarterback, died of cancer Sept. 23 and his teammates have dedicated the season to him.

They couldn't be doing a better job. On Saturday, the second-ranked Buffaloes virtually clinched an Orange Bowl berth and the Big Eight title as they stopped two late drives by No. 3 Nebraska to beat the Cornhuskers, 27-21.

Colorado is 5-0 in the Big Eight (9-0 overall), with games remaining at Oklahoma State and Kansas State. The Buffaloes will be heavily favored to win both and make their first trip to Miami since the 1976 season.

Elsewhere Saturday, Cal State Fullerton 45, New Mexico State 10: Mike Pringle ran for a Big West Conference record 352 yards — five short of the NCAA record — and three touchdowns to lead Cal State Fullerton (4-4-1, 3-2).

Pringle gained 67 yards to the New Mexico State 5-yard line on his 31st and final carry, with about five minutes left in the game. That broke the school record of 291 yards set by Obie Graves in 1978 against Long Beach State and the conference mark of 310 by Mitchell True of Pacific against UC Davis in 1972.

Nebraska-Las Vegas 43, Long Beach State 21: Derek Stott completed 18 of 23 passes for 326 yards and three touchdowns to rally the Rebels (4-4, 3-2) to a Big West victory over the 49ers (3-7, 1-4). UNLV rebounded from a 14-7 halftime deficit by scoring 26 straight points in the second half.

California 29, Arizona 28: Troy Taylor's career-high 372 yards passing lifted California from a 21-0 deficit and set up Greg Zomati's winning touchdown run with 8:56 to play as the Bears stunned 15th-ranked Arizona (6-3, 4-2). The senior quarterback threw for two touchdowns, both to Michael Smith, as Cal (3-6, 1-5) recorded its first Pacific 10 victory and dampened Arizona's hopes for its first conference championship.

Arizona State 34, Washington 32: Arizona State's Paul Justin won a high-voltage passing duel against Washington's Cary Conklin and the Sun Devils (5-3-1, 2-2-1) beat the Huskies (5-4, 3-3) in a Pacific-10 Conference game.

Brigham Young 45, Oregon 41: Ty Detmer passed for 470 yards and three touchdowns to Jeff Frandsen, including a 15-yard game-winner with 1:01 left, leading No. 23 Brigham Young (7-2).

Fresno State 31, San Jose State 30: Mark Barsotti threw two touchdown passes and Marquez Pope stopped a 2-point conversion pass with 2:33 left to give No. 25 Fresno State (9-0, 6-0) a berth in the California Raisin Bowl.

Utah State 38, Pacific 10: Kirk Johnson rushed for two touchdowns and passed for another to pace Utah State (3-6, 3-1) to a Big West victory over Pacific (1-9, 1-5).

Michigan State 51, Indiana 20: Anthony Thompson of Indiana became the NCAA's all-time touchdown leader in the loss. Thompson's 1-yard touchdown run in the second quarter was his 60th, breaking the career record of 59 he shared with Glenn Davis of Army and Tony Dorsett of Pittsburgh.

Air Force 29, Army 3: Dee Dowis set the NCAA career record for rushing yards by a quarterback as Air Force overwhelmed Army to win the Commander-in-Chief's Trophy. Dowis rushed for 141 yards on 24 carries, giving him 3,336 yards. The previous record of 3,299 was held by Tampa's Freddie Solomon.

Notre Dame 41, Purdue 27: No. 1 Notre Dame tied a school record with its 21st consecutive victory and recorded its first shutout in six years. The Irish (9-0) beat Navy for the 26th consecutive time since 1963.

Michigan 42, Purdue 27: No. 4 Michigan (7-1, 5-0) became the second school in NCAA history to win 700 games as Tony Boles scored three touchdowns, one on an 85-yard kickoff return.

Alabama 23, Mississippi State 10: Siran Stacy ran for 149 yards and Gary Hollingsworth passed for 151 as No. 5 Alabama (8-0, 5-0) moved closer to its first Southeastern Conference title since 1981.

Florida State 35, South Carolina 10: Peter Tom Willis passed for a career-high 362 yards and three touchdowns and Paul Moore ran for two more as No. 6 Florida State (7-2) won its seventh straight game.

Miami, Fla. 40, East Carolina 10: Quarterbacks Craig Erickson and Gino Torretta, helped by a strong running game, directed three scoring drives apiece for No. 7 Miami (7-1).

Illinois 31, Iowa 7: Wagner Lester scored two touchdowns and quarterback Jeff George shredded Iowa's defense for 302 yards and a touchdown to lead No. 8 Illinois (7-1, 5-0) to a Big Ten victory. Illinois faces co-Big Ten leader Michigan next week.

Arkansas 38, Rice 17: Derek Russell scored two 15-yard touchdowns and James Rouse broke a third-quarter tie with an 11-yard run to lead No. 11 Arkansas (7-1, 4-1) to a Southwest Conference victory. Arkansas defeated the Owls (1-7-1, 1-5) for the ninth consecutive year.

Auburn 10, Florida 7: Reggie Slack threw a fourth-down 25-yard touchdown pass to Shayne Warden with 26 seconds left and 12th-ranked Auburn (6-2, 3-2) escaped with a Southeastern Conference victory over 19th-ranked Florida (6-2, 3-2).

Penn State 16, West Virginia 9: No. 16 Penn State (6-2) converted four fumble recoveries and an intercepted pass into four field goals by Ray Tarasi and Tony Sacca's 31-yard touchdown pass to knock off No. 13 West Virginia (6-2-1).

Houston 55, TCU 10: Andre Ware passed for six touchdowns and safety Chris Ellison intercepted three passes as No. 17 Houston (6-2, 3-2) coasted to a Southwest Conference victory.

Virginia 20, North Carolina State 9: Jason Wallace returned an interception 40 yards for a touchdown and Jake McInerney extended his consecutive field goal streak to 14 as No. 24 Virginia (8-2, 5-1) upset 18th-ranked North Carolina State (7-2, 4-2) in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Texas A&M 63, SMU 14: Darren Lewis rushed for 126 yards, scored two touchdowns and lofted a halfback scoring pass, all in the first half, as No. 20 Texas A&M (7-2, 5-1) rolled over outmanned Southern Methodist (2-6, 0-6) in a Southwest Conference game.

Clemson 35, North Carolina 3: Tailback Joe Henderson ran for a career-high 163 yards and three touchdowns as No. 21 Clemson (8-2, 5-2) used the Atlantic Coast Conference's leading rushing offense to defeat league rival North Carolina.

Sunday Silence sews up Horse of Year honors

HALLANDALE, Fla. — Sunday Silence barely beat Easy Goer and nightfall, winning the \$3 million Breeders' Cup Classic and clinching Horse of Year honors Saturday.

It was a sweet victory for 76-year-old optimist Charlie Whittingham, who trains and co-owns Sunday Silence.

On the other hand, it cast a pall over victories in two previous Cup races on the program for Shug McGaughey, who trains Easy Goer.

"Three out of four — what more can I say?" Whittingham said after Sunday Silence added the Classic to his victories over Easy Goer in the Kentucky Derby and Preakness.

Then the trainer who has won more than 500 stakes paid Sunday Silence the ultimate compliment.

"Sunday Silence is much the best horse I've trained so far, and he's just getting going," Whittingham said.

Whittingham said the colt, who couldn't be unloaded at sales as a yearling and as a 2-year-old, would probably race again next year. Easy Goer will race next year.

"They'll run the Breeders' Cup again next year," Whittingham said. "So maybe we'll come back and try for another \$3 million."

Sunday Silence's victory in the richest event on the seven-race, \$10 million card was worth \$1.35 million and made him the richest 3-year-old in history with earnings of \$4,578,454.

The sixth Breeders' Cup day turned out to be just like the previous five — wild and wacky.

Prized, a 3-year-old making his debut on grass, won the \$2 million Turf. Jeff Siegel, one of his four owners who is a syndicated newspaper handicapper, admitted

he picked another horse.

McGaughey's two victories were with Rhythm, generally considered the weaker half of an entry with Adjudicating, who won the \$1 million Juvenile, and Dancing Spree, overlooked to the point that he paid \$35.20, when he won the \$1 million Sprint.

Trainer D. Wayne Lukas, who went into the day with nine Cup victories in 21 races and earnings of \$6,847,000, sent out 11 horses in six races. He picked up his 10th victory with Steinen in the Mile on the grass and earned another \$1,041,000.

The other winners were Go for Wand in the \$1 million Juvenile Fillies and Bayakoa, an Argentine-bred mare, in the \$1 million Distaff.

The sixth Breeders' Cup was the last hurrah for Eugene V. Klein as an owner. He is getting out of racing and will sell about 120 head of racing and breeding stock Monday at Keeneland in Lexington, Ky.

Klein had won five Cup races before this year. But Saturday, the best he could do with five starters was a third by Open Mind in the Distaff. His earnings for the day were \$178,000. He had earned more than \$3 million in the five previous Cups.

While some of the best horses on both sides of the Atlantic were on display, and while there were enough thrills to satisfy any sports fan, it was the anticipated duel between Sunday Silence and Easy Goer that attracted a record crowd of 51,342 to Gulfstream Park.

The two 3-year-olds didn't disappoint in a race that had shades of the 1988 classic when Alysheba barely beat the darkness in winning by a half-length over the McGaughey-trained Seeking the Gold at Churchill Downs.

On that day, Easy Goer was upset in the Juvenile. That defeat however could not be nearly as crushing for McGaughey as the one Saturday.

Measure M is both logical, necessary

Why would I, one of the most conservative members of the Legislature — one who believes that the public is generally overtaxed and underserved — nonetheless urge the support of Measure M to increase the county's sales tax?

Because Measure M will raise the sales tax by a modest one-half cent and yet produce some \$1 billion over the next 20 years, for our local use alone; money which can only be spent where it is desperately needed — to relieve traffic gridlock throughout our county.

Believe me, I would never recommend this measure if there were any other or better way to improve the worsening transportation problems we all endure. I have come to this conclusion after studying the problem at close hand for the past five years as lead Republican on the State Assembly Transportation Committee.

Let me first share some simple facts with you.

First, we have a big and growing problem. Intermittent gridlock is costing our county's economy over \$1 million every day. Moreover, the traffic accidents caused in part by our failing systems are costing us in higher insurance premiums and increased government pay outs to settle lawsuits. We also suffer from the loss of quality in our lifestyle, as we spend more and more time sitting in traffic, dodging other frustrated drivers.

There isn't enough state or federal money to solve our problems. State funds are so short that we will be unable to get or qualify for special federal highway matching funds until early 1990.

In 1984, I urged a no vote on Prop. A, in part because I believed there was sufficient money in the state budget and in gasoline taxes to meet our needs. There is. But, we can't get it for transportation. The Legislature is unwilling to meet our huge transportation needs by taking money away from education, health or welfare. And, when voters were given the opportunity to do so in 1986, they too voted against it.

So, unless we approve this local tax, we simply won't have the funds to improve our system, which worsens each day.

In Sacramento, every time the subject of allocating transportation money comes up, legislators from other parts of the state chide Orange County lawmakers because all the other big counties have already passed measures to help themselves:

they've increased local taxes to improve transportation while we have not. Their representatives are not about to give our county priority of a bigger share of state monies contributed by all taxpayers.

Now, let me deal with some of the myths and wrong ideas spread by those who oppose Measure M. First, they say, if we don't address the problem, it will go away, because people will stop coming here.

That's akin to saying that people will stop having babies if we don't allow additional diapers to be made. Over 60 percent of our county's expected growth in new drivers are sitting in our high schools right this moment.

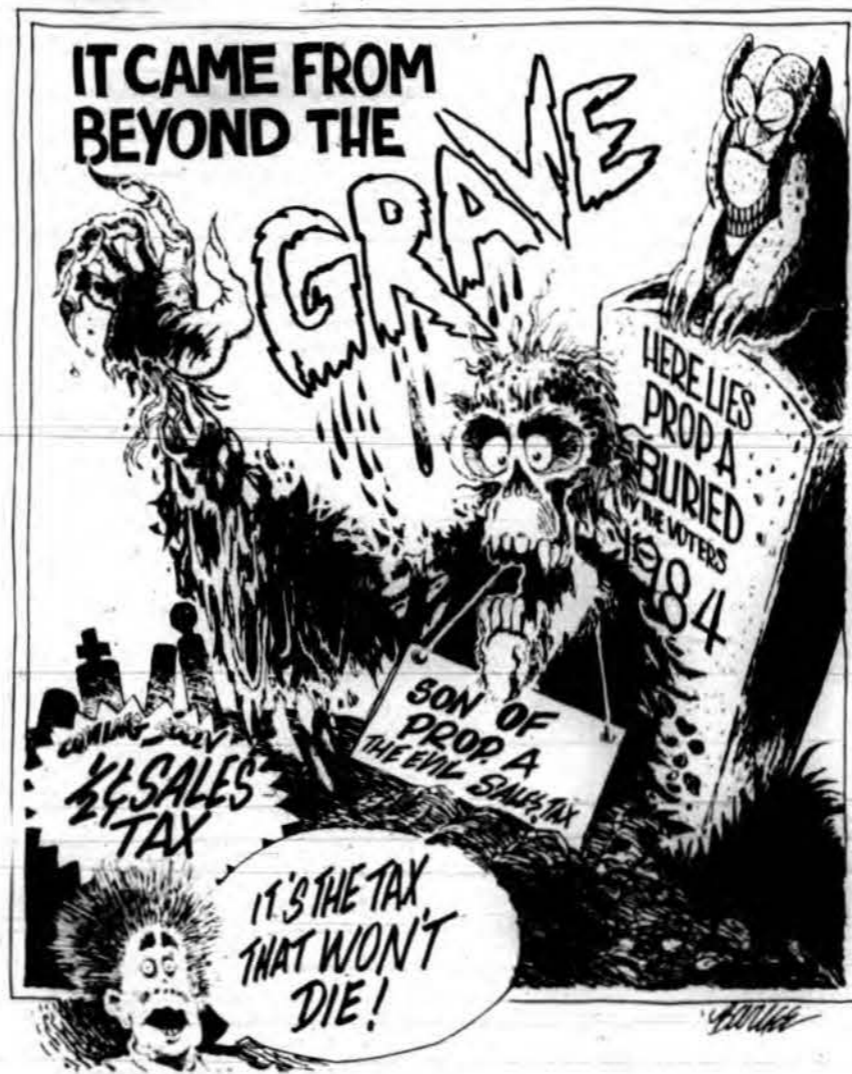
Second, they say our transportation crisis is getting worse but we shouldn't try to build our way out of it. That will "only" make it easier for more people to come here. That claim, is also a non-solution. The predicated increase in growth from outsiders isn't based on their knowledge of our transportation system, good or bad. Believe me, they are coming regardless.

Third, the problem will "solve" itself. This one is not a misstatement or myth. It's true. Doing nothing will reduce gridlock — after our economy ceases to grow, fails to attract new industry, loses many existing jobs and our property values fall as people begin to move elsewhere in search of the prosperity they once enjoyed here!

I hate the idea of more taxes and I'm terribly disappointed in our political leaders who allowed this transportation mess to grow. But we can't change those facts. And, we must accept the fact that no one else is going to come to our rescue.

We can't put our collective heads in the sand like the "no-growthers" and hope the problem will go away; it won't. I urge you to join me in voting for Measure M. Let's get on with ensuring that this county continues to be the very best place in America to live, work and enjoy our lives.

M in Measure M is for misleading

Experience has shown that deceptive advertising works. So it is being used heavily to promote Measure M on Tuesday's ballot.

To begin with, Measure M is a tax increase, but the title doesn't tell you so. You have to read the fine print rather carefully to find out. Secondly, Measure M authorizes billions of dollars of bonded indebtedness. That is even harder to find.

As a result of the Jarvis and Gann initiatives, the people have to vote on any tax increase. But the backers of Measure M found a way around that: Don't tell them what they are voting on!

Then there is the matter of the voter's pamphlet that came with your sample ballot: It doesn't contain the text of Measure M. Instead, it contains many pages of salesmanship and pretty diagrams telling you how great Measure M will be. The argument against Measure M is hidden at the back, where you aren't likely to find it.

The title of Measure M is misleading. The real purpose of Measure M is to increase the overcrowding of Orange County. But the title says "Traffic Improvement and Growth Control." The traffic improvement part isn't there: The county's own figures show that intersections will be more congested afterward. The growth control part is there, but backward. What it does is let the county hold back tax money to punish any city that doesn't go along with county plans for more growth. Maybe "M" stands for "misleading."

The ballyhoo for Measure M tries to make you believe it was developed by citizens and environmentalists. Actually it is the pet of the developers, and they have put up millions of dollars for the slick advertising campaign you have seen. By making a deal, they have even been able to win the support of three environmentalists. That's right, three. Count them: Tom Rogers, Norm Grossman, Elizabeth Brown. They were promised no official opposition to an open-space bond election next year if Measure M passes.

This is typical of the attempt being made to sell Measure M by putting something in it for everyone. Some money will be spent on a super street. The map shows super streets all over the county, but the money is just about enough for one. Some will be spent on rail transit studies. Just studies, no trains. Some will be spent on buying busses. Operating and maintaining them will be left to the taxpayers. And of the

money spent on freeways, the majority will go for car-pool lanes.

Why would anyone think of using sales taxes, which fall most heavily on poor people, as a way to pay for making developers richer? Simple: It sounds small. A mere one-half percent increase in the sales tax. But it takes lots of money out of the taxpayer's pocket. As much as a 20-cents-per-gallon tax on gasoline. That idea was quickly dropped, because it sounds big.

My position against Measure M is opposite to the Daily Pilot's official position in favor of it. The Pilot reasons that when you have gridlock, the thing to do is build streets. To me, that is like saying that if a gambling spouse make you broke, the thing to do is earn more money. It won't do any good. More money will only make a compulsive gambler worse. It has shown it in Orange County is compulsive about gridlock. It has shown it has the power and the will to approve more growth than the streets can handle, regardless of how many streets and freeways we have. If Measure M passes, it will be a clear signal to continue the policies that have brought us to where we are.

The only solution to compulsive spending, whether of money or of streets, is a change in behavior. And how do you change the behavior of your government? Tell them no. No more of the same thing. We want the compulsive spending stopped.

If they will stop making the problem worse, we can solve it. We'd all be happy to pay an extra 20 cents per gallon, if we know it was really going to be used to solve the problem rather than to justify more growth. But until our government stops pouring gasoline on the fire, there is no point in trying. They have always approved new developments faster than we could pay for new streets.

You are being asked for a vote of confidence. If you like the way Orange County has been run, and want more of the same, vote "yes." If you think current policies are a failure, and want to see a change, vote "no."

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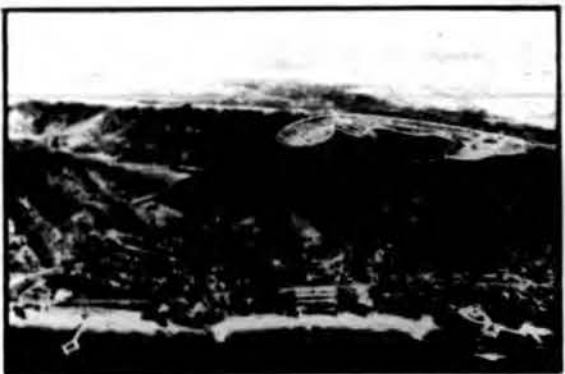

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Meeting lifestyle demands key to county's future

The new bottom line in Orange County's business future is people...

Experts forecast increasing competition from abroad and employees' demand for better living conditions...

In a panel discussion on "Doing Business in Orange County," panelists focused on human concerns such as training, housing, driving time and child care...

Panelists were Allen J. Scott, professor of Urban and economic geography at UCLA; Christopher B. Leinberger, managing partner and owner of Robert Charles Lesser & Co.; Allan Halcrow, editor, "Recruitment Today" magazine; and Sheri A. Senter, president and founder, National Pediatric Support Services...

Overseas competition

Scott warned of the increasing competition with other nations, especially in the aerospace arena.

While Americans are used to looking over their shoulders for Japanese

technology and business competition, Scott said the new competition will be emerging from Western European countries such as Germany and Italy.

These countries are focusing more and more of their resources on aerospace technology and will become a greater force in that market, Scott said. A likely side effect is the improved technology in supporting industries, similar to growth in the United States in the 1950s.

Business involvement

Scott and Leinberger agreed businesses must take a more active role in planning for growth and future business and living conditions.

Scott suggested industry should form some type of superagency to mediate in the event of a market crash or business disaster in given fields of technology, similar to cooperative efforts at regulating industry among European nations.

"There is a need for policy institutions to manipulate the market in failures owing to technology," he said, adding whether the regulation comes from the public or private sector is not important.

Leinberger focused on the idea of creating regional government and regulatory agencies on a broader scale than municipalities. The several hamlets that have grown into the cities in Orange County operate within "artificial boundaries" — city lines — and need to attack regional problems from a regional

perspective to avoid doubling some efforts and neglecting others.

More than one observer noted Leinberger's ideas are parallel to the controversial management plan proposed by the South Coast Air Quality Management District.

The plan provides some strategies for improving the region's quality of life, such as balancing jobs and housing within areas, telecommuting, corporate ridesharing and child care, to reduce employee commuting and improve air quality and traffic conditions.

"After 40 or 50 years of these regional (issue-based) agencies, some MBA will come along and say, 'Hey, why don't we make this a regional government,'" he said.

He advised businesses to become proactive rather than reactive in their strategies for corporate and regional growth, citing a group of developers in Atlanta, Ga., that has joined forces with local legislators to plan for that city's growth. Together, the public and private sector agencies will draft a land-use plan.

Recruitment a problem

Such efforts, the scholars agreed, will help in recruiting the kind of talent Southern California businesses will need in the face of a growing shortage of white collar and professional employees.

Recruitment efforts in the Orange County business community are sagging, said "Recruitment Today" editor Halcrow, partly because of time

and distance of commuting from Orange County businesses to affordable housing.

Other issues facing area recruiters are the widening "skills gap," a resulting scarcity of employees for high-skill positions, rising costs tied to recruiting and hiring the right employees, and missed recruitment opportunities.

To solve skills and scarcity problems, employers need to offer more training and advancement programs and even subsidize college education

for employees on the lower rungs of the corporate ladder, Halcrow said. Battling rising recruitment costs means shifting recruitment from an administrative function to a marketing effort, he said. In a survey of business recruitment practices on campuses, only 5 percent of employers gave specific information on job titles and descriptions — the information potential employees most want, he added.

Innovative approaches to recruitment, such as direct queries in billing statements, advertising in leisure and special interest publications and job fairs are increasingly more successful, he said. He cited two unusual examples of companies pursuing quality of life issues in recruitment. A Florida hospital near world-class fishing spots got a better response by advertising for nurses in "Bassmaster" than in professional journals, he said, and a computer firm sent graduates in computer fields an interactive disk that allowed them to try their hands and, in effect, sample the type of work they would be doing.

Halcrow also cited corporate transportation to and from the workplace, development of affordable housing near jobs and development of on-site or nearby child-care facilities as major incentives for potential employees.

Child care needs

Child care, recognized for the first

time at the annual conference as an issue unto itself, is increasingly important because of changes in the work force, said Pediatric Support Services founder Sheri Senter.

She pointed to the rise in two-income families, single working parents and women entering the work force as the impetus for child care concerns. In the coming years, half of the employees at small businesses will be women, she said, and that adds up to two-thirds of tomorrow's work force.

"If you're looking at growth in your business, child care is critical," Senter said.

Types of child care benefits employers may offer range from on-site child care centers to subsidizing day care for the mildly ill child to assistance plans that may be paid in pre-tax dollars, she said.

Surveys of companies with on-site or nearby child care centers sponsored by a business or consortium of businesses show those companies employees are happier and more productive. The same companies show lower rates of turnover, absenteeism, tardiness and lower recruitment costs after providing employee child care, Senter said.

Changes in child care benefits, Senter said, are no different from the other concerns discussed in their need for a commitment from top-level management in order to succeed.

State joblessness down as nation's rate holds steady

WASHINGTON — Unemployment held steady at 5.3 percent last month as the economy added 233,000 jobs, the government said in a report that stifled talk of an imminent drop in interest rates.

In California, the October unemployment rate stood at 4.8 percent, down from 5.1 percent in September.

The surprising economic strength to begin the fourth quarter — which came despite the seventh consecutive monthly decline in manufacturing — was largely attributed to continued local government hiring for the school year.

Automobile manufacturing led the overall decline in the industrial sector.

Analysts interpreted the data as proof no recession would come this year although some said the economy would flirt with one early next year if the manufacturing slump spills over into related services industries.

And they said the unexpected job growth and fresh evidence of persistent wage inflation would keep the Federal Reserve immediately from easing its hold on credit, which in turn would have triggered lower interest rates for consumers.

The Labor Department said aver-

age hourly earnings rose 0.7 percent in October. Most analysts had anticipated job-growth of about 150,000 and a 0.4 percent boost in hourly earnings.

The civilian unemployment rate remained at 5.3 percent as the civilian labor force grew by 65,000 Americans last month to 124 million and the number of them who had jobs rose to 117.5 million.

Virtually all of the growth came in services. Underscoring manufacturing's weakness, the department said the average factory workweek fell from 41.1 hours to 40.8 hours and overtime was virtually non-existent after averaging just under four hours a week for several months.

The department said some of that decline was because of the Machinists strike against Boeing Corp.

The department said unemployment rates among major demographic groups were:

- Adult white men, 4.5 percent, down from 4.8 percent in September.
• Adult white women, 4.7 percent, up from 4.5 percent.
• Black-adult men, 10.3 percent, up from 10 percent.
• Black adult women, 10 percent, up from 9.6 percent.
• Hispanics, 7.9 percent, down from 8.3 percent.
