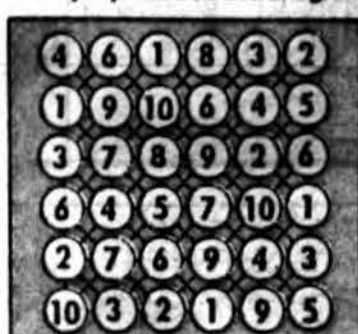

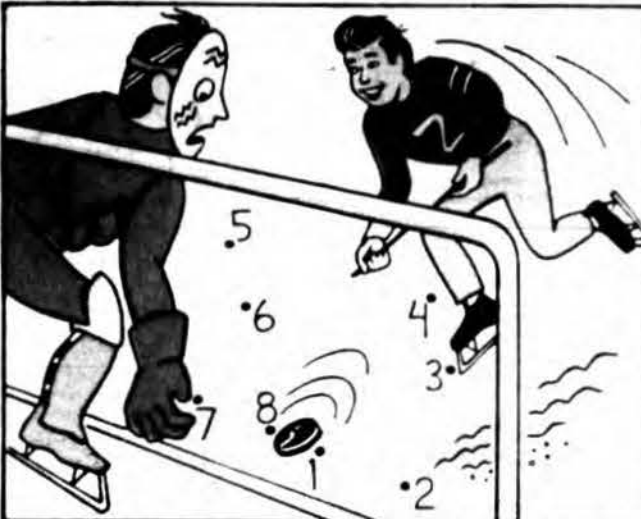

## WHO'S

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Alyssa Milano: Makes at least \$1,440 a week on CBS sitcom

**Q** How much allowance does Alyssa Milano of "Who's the Boss?" get each week?

Katie Bidro, St. Albans, Vt.

Milano doesn't get an allowance because she earns a salary. And you can bet that by starring in a hit TV sitcom, it's a big one — minimum for prime time is either \$414 a day or \$1,440 a week. She does have chores: cleaning her bedroom and bathroom, setting and clearing the table. A chunk of the high school senior's salary goes to savings for college. But, like most 17-year-olds, she spends a lot on clothes.

**Q** Before John D. MacDonald's death, I remember reading he had written a final Travis McGee book to be published after his death. Is there another book, and will it be published?

Hal Carter, Rogers, Arkansas

We're happy to clear up the mystery. The simple answer is: Don't believe everything you

read. MacDonald, who penned 77 books, died Dec. 28, 1986, and so did his famed private eye, McGee. "Anything you've read or heard is a rumor that has been circulating since a month after his death," says Debra LeVeaux, a spokeswoman for MacDonald's literary agent. McGee first appeared in 1964 and was the protagonist of 21 novels. McGee's last appearance: 1985's *The Lonely Silver Rain*.

**Q** Who is the tallest basketball player in the NBA? Who's the shortest?

James Johnson, Lena, Miss.

The National Basketball Association's tallest player still is center Manute Bol of the Golden State Warriors; he's listed as either 7-foot-6 or 7-7. The shortest? Undercutting next-shortest Atlanta Hawk guard Spud Webb and Phoenix Suns guard Greg Grant (both 5-7) is Charlotte Hornets guard Tyrone "Mugsy" Bogues at a minute 5-3.

**Q** This is going to settle a good family argument. In all the years of the "Perry Mason" TV series, did he ever lose a case?

Chris M. Lawrence, Goldsboro, N.C.

Even a legal eagle as great as Mason has his off days. He has lost four cases on the tube: two murder cases — both later reversed — and two civil, says Jim Davidson, founder and president of the fan club the National Association for the Advancement of Perry Mason. Mason was created in print by writer Erle Stanley Gardner in 1933. The character, who has appeared in books, movies and on the radio, was made famous by Raymond Burr, who played the lawyer-sleuth on TV (1957-66). A remake in 1973 without Burr lasted five months. Burr now appears as Mason periodically in high-rated TV movies in which Mason has yet to lose a case.

**Q** I'm intrigued with roller coasters and I'd love to design them in the future. What kind of classes do I need to take in high school and college?

Vincent Villanueva, Kingsburg, Calif.

For 25 years, Ronald Toomer, president of Arrow Dynamics, has designed some of the world's best-known coasters. His advice: "Get a mechanical-engineering degree from an accredited engineering school, work for three to five years in machine design and always be persistent. Only about five people in the world are coaster designers, so you must be really serious to get in there and show your stuff."

**Q** Now that John Travolta is back to acting with "Look Who's Talking," I'm curious: What was he doing all these years? What are his plans?

Travolta moved far from the Hollywood spotlight, all the way to Spruce Creek, Fla., where neighbors see him jogging and dining at the country club. He's doing more jogging than dining these days, as he recently shed the extra pounds you saw on him in *Look Who's Talking*. Next month, the former Sweathog will appear in *Chains of Gold*; *The Tender* follows later in the year. The success of Travolta's *Look Who's Talking* (\$110 million and climbing) has made him bankable again. That's good news for Travolta whose last two films, *The Experts* and *Perfect*, were box-office bombs.

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# MORE THAN JUST A PAYCHECK

**W**orker Lisa Carpenter spends long hours on the production floor, has to wear an unflattering surgical hairnet and mud-colored rubber boots, makes in the neighborhood of \$20,000 a year and never gets two days off in a row. She adores her job.

For Carpenter, 26, the pluses far outweigh the minuses.

Every day, she can choose which production task she'll do. Every day, she runs the risk of getting a free back rub or having a hilarious run-in with the company's Joy Gang. Every day, 7.5 percent of her

company's pretax profits go to a worthy social cause — like the environment — that she helps choose. Not to mention such benefits as free health club memberships, profit sharing and college tuition. Coming soon: day care.

"It's what a job should be," says Carpenter, who persuaded her husband, George, to leave his family's dairy farm and work with her. "It's not just making money, but doing good things."

Where is this workaday nirvana? On a snowy hilltop in Waterbury, Vt., where Ben & Jerry's Homemade Inc. pumps out premium ice cream sold in 38 states. (Another heavy benefit: Each of the plant's 259 workers is entitled to three free pints of ice cream a day.)

Co-founders and hippie holdovers Ben Cohen and Jerry Greenfield, both 38, just might be the ultimate benign bosses in the friendliest of employee-friendly firms. Ben & Jerry's seems the archetype of a growing corporate culture of caring, where workers expect more from their jobs than just a paycheck.

And it's catching on.

"For the first book, we had a very difficult time finding 100 good companies," says Robert Levering, co-author of the 1984 classic *Companies to Work for in America*, a 1984 classic on enlightened workplaces. For the next edition in 1991, "there are so many, we will probably have to eliminate good candidates."

In fact, "there are thousands and thousands of Ben & Jerry's out there," says John Naisbitt, trend tracker and co-author of the new *Megatrends 2000* (\$21.95, William Morrow). Co-author Patricia Aburdene adds: "This most certainly is the new model of the corporate form that we will see created in the 1990s and into the 21st century."

Part of the push comes from the top: Yesterday's flower children have become today's CEOs and they're bringing '60s values into the boardroom.

But mostly, these new feel-good companies are following bottom-line economics. In the '90s, job supply will out-

pace demand as the labor force grows more slowly than at any time since the 1930s. Companies competing for good people will be forced to compete with each other on benefits and work conditions. And the increasing influence of working women is expected to benefit everyone, as things like part-time work, flextime, child care and elder care (day care for elderly parents) become benefits companies must have to land and keep good people.

Essentially, employers are being forced to have a stake in the professional and personal well-being of their employees, realizing single parents and dual-income duos must be able to juggle things at home in order to hack it at work.

**A**ll things may not be equal inside the modest, pastel-painted Ben & Jerry's plant, but they're a lot more equal than in old-fashioned, boss-knows-best companies.

The most tangible example is the pay scale: No one can earn more than five times anyone else. Compare that with the average bloated CEO salary, which is 93 times bigger than the average U.S. factory worker's.

The 5-to-1 pay ratio works out well on the lower end of the scale (about \$16,400), where wages are considered



pretty good, but is crummy on the upper end, \$75,000 for president Fred "Chico" Lager. In fact, Ben and Jerry have had a heck of a time filling two top spots — the heads of marketing and retail operations — because of the relatively low salaries.

Yet a significant segment of today's work force thinks money isn't everything. One-fourth of those in a University of Michigan survey said they'd swap salary for better benefits.

Martin Wedemeyer, 29, is among them, even though he won't say how much he earns as a warehouse supervisor at Patagonia, a 450-worker sporting wear company with headquarters in sunny Ventura, Calif. "Who cares about what kind of money you make when you're working in this kind of environment?" He's 29 and a single father who bikes to work with his year-old daughter strapped to his back and deposits her at the company-subsidized Child Development Center. The center also picks up his two older children from school and delivers them to its after-school program.

Don't care about day-care benefits? How about keeping your own clock?

"There was a swell, so I went surfing today," says Bob McDougall, 33, in charge of Patagonia's products for canoeists and kayakers. "It's totally OK to go take advantage of the swell as long as you get your work done." Surfing may mean staying late or cracking down another day: "People really work hard here."

Patagonia's self-starting, work-hard, play-hard atmosphere, complete with sun-drenched offices, the day-care center and a health food cafeteria, are all in a day's work. Its maverick founder, Yvon Chouinard, 51, spends eight months of the year rock climbing in the Andes or ice fishing in the arctic. Employees are invited to do the same "research." Surfer McDougall, for example, is also a world-class kayaker who plans to spend next spring and summer running rivers.

Encouragement to be creative is an-

other must for jobs in the new Information Era, says trend spotter Naisbitt.

That's where 1,200 workers at a natural gas company in Montgomery, Ala., come in. Alagasco could well serve as the blue-collar model for the high-touch approach. Instead of eating free ice cream or taking surf breaks, Alagasco employees are slaying dinosaurs. President and CEO Mike Warren, 42, pushes the motto, "Don't be a dinosaur." He's posted dinosaur-busting signs all over company offices in hope of breaking old mind-sets and generating new ideas.

"It's beautiful," gushes Walter McCoy, 52, a maintenance worker and union member who's been with the company 22 years. McCoy says he no longer feels like a "common laborer" subject to "the Sergeant Bilko" treatment. He, too, has entered the New Age of Work.

**B**ut don't expect Joy Gangs, dead dinosaurs and day-care centers to crop up on every factory floor and office cubicle. The USA's struggling Rust Belt isn't turning to gold. Indeed, the manufacturing sector faces hard times as we enter full swing into the info-service age.

Studies show a widening wage gap and "trust gap," as *Fortune* magazine coined it, between managers and employees at U.S. companies. Cynicism pervades, says Phil Mirvis, author of *The Cynical Americans*. He found that the lion's share of the work force — 80 percent — doubts the truth of what management tells them.

Says Mark Pastin, director of the Lincoln Center for business ethics at Arizona State University, "Humanistic management programs really haven't paid the benefits that everyone hoped. IBM can't be Ben & Jerry's."

But it does try: Last year, the computer giant started an elder-care referral service for its 216,000 employees. In the next five years, IBM plans to spend \$22 mil-

lion on children's day care. It's experimenting with providing home office equipment for new parents and other workers who are on leave but want to work part time from home. Flextime and adoption assistance are in place.

On the flip side: IBM recently announced plans to trim 10,000 workers.

"I'm inclined to think things are getting worse," says professor Pastin. "We're talking a better game, but probably playing a worse one."

**K**eeping up the good work is a challenge for ice cream entrepreneurs Ben and Jerry. Of the two, Jerry has the reputation as standard-bearer of the laid-back ethic. Ben spends 95 percent of his time traveling around on company business — high-stress work that shows in the sometimes sullen expression on his round, bearded face. Both understand that as the company continues to grow — sales were up 19 percent last year and the work force doubled in the past few years — the family atmosphere will be more difficult to sustain. They no longer know each worker's name. And with \$50 million in ice cream sales, they have to be sure the fun doesn't interrupt the work. They've brought in consultants.

Admits Jerry, with a devilish grin: "We're not quintessentially *with it*."

But they're hip enough for Alice Houghton, a production line worker who's helping make Ben & Jerry's a good place to work. She's on the Day Care Committee, the Safety Committee and the Fruit Feeder Task Force, which studies the fine art of smashing Heath Bars and other goodies and blending them into ice cream. "I'm going to stay here probably until I'm unable to do it," says 38-year-old Houghton. "Until I turn 65, at least."

That'll be the year 2017. By then, Ben & Jerry's enlightened work tactics may be a smash everywhere.

## NICE PERK IF YOU CAN GET IT

If you're one of the USA's 118 million civilian workers, you might have noticed changes:

### Family benefits

More than half of all employers offer some type of family benefit, like paternity leave or flexible working hours.

### Child care

Only 4% of employers offer child care, even though 40% of the USA's 51 million working women have kids under 18.

### Wellness programs

53% of employers sponsor such things as health fairs and cholesterol testing.

### Recreation facilities

25% of employers offer such perks as gyms, softball fields, basketball courts, health club memberships.

### Stock ownership

40% of eligible companies have Employee Stock Ownership Plans, with 10 million workers participating now, 20 million expected to in 10 years.

### Education benefits

74% of employers paid for workers' schooling in 1988, up from 46% in 1978.

### Paid vacations

Were 1.3 days longer in 1988 than in 1978. The new average: 14.3 days a year.

### Personal days

24% of workers took paid time off at their discretion in 1988, up from 19% in 1979.

### Charity

Corporations gave \$4.75 billion to charity in 1988, up from \$2.08 billion in 1978.

### The next big trend:

A "cafeteria plan" of benefits, in which employees choose what's useful to them. For example, if a husband is insured through his wife's job, he might choose more vacation time instead of health insurance.

## Dogs or cats? It's a tie!

10,485 readers give us the scoop

**R**obin and Robert Maxfield of Sun Valley, Calif., own three dogs and a cat. "Cats are fun and our cat Bandit is our oldest pet, but she's not as much fun," says Robin. "Dogs are more responsive and I like walking through the door and getting clobbered and licked by three dogs. I like that instant gratification."

Kip Kirby of Nashville begs to differ. "Cats are really the perfect '90s minimum-care, maximum-return pet. My husband is a busy songwriter, cats are perfect for us because we're so career-oriented."

And so it went, back and forth, as 10,485 readers sounded off in a USA WEEKEND write-in survey on the great pet debate: Which are better, dogs or cats?

There are more pet cats than pet dogs in the USA (57.9 million cats vs. 50.5 million dogs) but more dog owners than cat keepers (33.5 million vs. 27.7 million). The big news from our survey: Dogs and cats tied as the favorite pet. The funniest news: Pets beat out spouses as a person's best friend. Of course, some who answered the survey were unmarried. And most married people ages 21 to 55 picked their spouse over pet.

Still, Robin Maxwell, a 35-year-old actress, chose pets over husband Robert. "I'd trade in my husband for them if I had to. I think he knows that..."

All kidding (we presume) aside, dog aficionados love dogs because they enjoy romping in the yard with bounding pooches and think cats are too aloof. Feline fans like being able to leave home for a few days without a care, and prefer pets who don't slobber on them.

Many respondents weren't content with simply filling out the survey. We received dozens of photos, including one of Puffy the cat drinking from a toilet, and another of a dog named Commander Khomeni, a bulldog who looks as if he's saying "make my day" while leaning back on a set of solid haunches.

Pet owners also attached long letters, some humorous, some poignant.

"I wouldn't trade my cat, Bumm, for a

new Cadillac. His little motor purrs and runs better than any motor," says Anthony Kapusin, 67, of Warren, Ohio.

Writes Linda Weisholtz of Montville, N.J.: "When Eric, age 12, needs someone to complain to about his juvenile diabetes, Eyeslea (a Boston terrier) is always there. She never says the wrong thing, she just nuzzles up to him and listens."

Some perennial pet questions were posed in our survey:

■ Why do we own pets? Women's top reason for having a pet is for unconditional love (55 percent) followed by wanting a nice buddy (31 percent). Men responded in reverse: Nice buddy took 46 percent, and 35 percent cited unconditional love. Only 1 percent have a pet because of pressure from kids.

■ Do pets look like their owners? Most people (59 percent) think not, but "I've seen women who have matching fingernails with their poodles," says Anna Marie Schwind of Freehold, N.J.

■ Do pets act human? Lots of owners treat their pets as if they're human, even deciding they have their favorite TV shows. "She likes *Late Night With David Letterman*," claims dog owner Patricia Ann Pirillo, 23, of Strabane, Pa.

As far as displaying human qualities, older people were much more likely to say their pet understands English, while the younger set tended to claim their pet watch and understand TV.



■ What would owners change about their pets? Twenty-one percent listed behavior and discipline. Right on their heels, at 15 percent, are owners who only wish their pets would live longer.

"I'd like my dogs to be more polite to the good guys, like the paper boy and the mailman," says Raymond St. Pierre, 48, of Coventry, R.I.

"In my place there's cat hair everywhere and in everything," says Ruth Stockenbruck, 28, of Fort Collins, Colo. "I think he (that's Phoenix) has a sensing device for my new and black clothes so he can lie on them and shed."

Don't get her wrong: Phoenix is a No. 1 pal. Being a single working woman, Stockenbruck considers her "low maintenance" cat just right.

So the debate rages on. As dog owner Joanne Fisher of Rochester, N.Y., alliteratively attests: "I firmly favor these fine, furry, funny, faithful, feisty, frisky, forthright friends over finicky, fractious felines!"

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# Ranch retreats

Now is the time to start planning if you want to ride the range this summer

**W**eekend cowboys, listen up: It's time to plan that perfect ranch-style vacation. Whether you're looking for true grit or true relaxation, dude ranches are on the upswing as today's travelers tackle old frontiers — on a horse.

"People used to want to rest and relax," says Arney Grubbs, editor of *The Dude Rancher* magazine. "Now people want to get out and do something physical."

But get a move on — the busiest time for dude ranches is mid-July through mid-August, and many ranches are booked by March, Grubbs says.

What's the attraction? It seems to be hard labor more typical of the 1890s than the 1990s.

Just ask Bob Knepper. An off-season cowboy himself, the San Francisco Giants pitcher bought a 1,000-acre spread near Roseburg, Ore., seven years ago.

The sights and, uh, smells of the place stay with him. "When people think about me owning a ranch, it's always romantic. But they don't think about a ballplayer shoveling manure," he says, laughing. "And there's even an art to shoveling manure. You want to get the manure, not the sawdust."

Knepper's ranch is private, but his experience is universal. Like him, more people are becoming captivated by the hard work of ranching. They're leaving jobs as accountants, lawyers and bus drivers, trading kid gloves for rawhide and paying hard cash to get dirty.

If you don't want to go that far, a simple visit will do. A week at a Western ranch can cost anywhere from \$400 to \$1,200 per person, the average being about \$675. The fee includes room and board.

You can do anything from soak in a hot tub to ride horses on a moonlit night. Or how about overnight backpacking trips, cattle drives, trout fishing or square dancing? Or pitch in with the chores by herding cattle, shoveling manure and fixing fences — not glamorous tasks, but they're necessary to life on a working ranch.

For those tenderfeet venturing out for the first time, Knepper and Grubbs offer advice:

**Don't overestimate your physical condition.** Knepper says. "You're out there to have a good time, not to get in shape." You should either be in shape or just go for a relaxed Western environment.

**Plan ahead.** Grubbs says to read about ranches ahead of time and choose one that best suits your desires. Call a number of ranches and tell the owners what you want. There's enough variety out there for would-be ranchers to choose a place that fits their plans.

**Listen and follow directions.** Trust the cowboys running the ranch and do what you're told. "It's like me going to the stock market and trading stock without listening to the pros," Knepper says. "You can't go to a dude ranch and tell those cowboys how to run the show."

**Know your own limitations.** "If you're scared to death of horses, tell the owners and they'll put you on an old plug that you can put Grandma on," Knepper says. "The

key is to be honest." And even if you've never ridden a horse, don't be intimidated. "Dude ranches like to teach you a new experience," Grubbs says. "You have to remember you're going there to have fun."

**Ride a horse before you go,** to get your muscles used to it. You'll be using muscles you never used before.

**Check what gear you'll need in advance,** and aim for casual comfort. Now's not the time to break in designer jeans and a new, toe-pinching pair of snakeskin cowboy boots. Grubbs suggests bringing old blue jeans, long-sleeved shirts, a hat and boots or shoes with a heel. Be prepared with lotions and lip balms, since the atmosphere probably will be drier than what you're used to.

Visiting a dude ranch does give a person a different perspective on life, Knepper and Grubbs agree.

"I want to raise my kids with country values," Knepper says. "I want them to see the daily life-and-death reality you see on a ranch."

And for a twist on reality, everyone is equal on a dude ranch, says Grubbs. "People are in jeans and shirts and you don't know the corporation president from the bus driver."

"People are overwhelmed by the space and beauty of the surroundings, the scenery, the flowers, the wildlife. Just being a part of it all, it's a very private moment for them. It's a freedom to be with nature."

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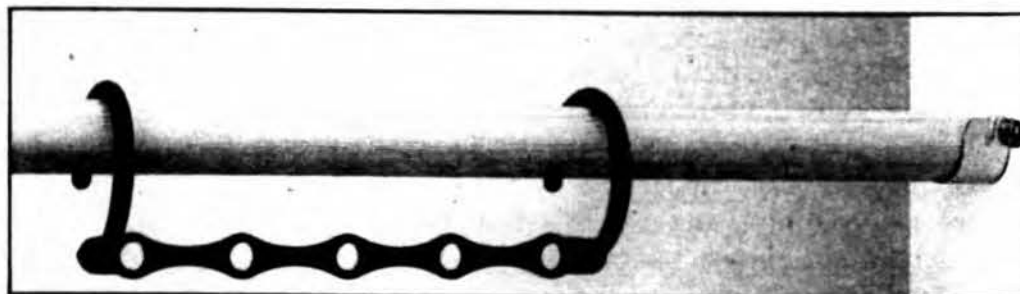


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
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# Feasting, Super Bowl-style

New Orleans' top hosts tell how to feed football fans who can't make it for the game

**N**ext weekend, more than 80,000 football-crazed fans will descend on New Orleans' Superdome for the sport's premier event: Super Bowl XXIV.

They'll do a lot of partying, a little sightseeing and a whole lot of eating.

As for the rest of us, we'll settle for watching the big game on TV. But don't do it with beer and chips — capture that local Super Bowl spirit by staging a New Orleans buffet for your friends.

And who better to coach you than Cindy and Ralph Brennan, the talented brother-sister team behind Mr. B's, one of the French Quarter's most popular eateries.

"Football is almost a religion in Louisiana," says Ralph. "We love to get into the spirit. And Super Bowl Sunday is an exciting day — the perfect reason to throw a party."

Here is a Brennan party planner:

## Plan your menu around foods with holding power

For the most part, you, your guests and your meal are at the mercy of broadcasters when you try to entertain around a televised sporting event. But there are smart menu strategies:

Choose foods that can be made ahead of time or require minimal preparation come party time. After all, no host wants to be stuck in the kitchen.

Ralph and Cindy's winning lineup includes two classic Creole dishes: marinated shrimp with peppers and onions and a sausage and ham jambalaya. Both dishes will stand the test of time on the buffet.

The jambalaya can be prepared the night before or the morning of your party. The marinated shrimp are better if done a day or two ahead to allow time for the flavors to mellow, says Ralph.

What else works: stews and thick soups that can be kept warm in a chafing dish without losing flavor.

Also consider sturdy salads (vegetables, pasta) and other dishes that are best served at room temperature.

To keep food fresh and to minimize the mess, divide each food among two or three serving dishes; bring out a new dish when the guests have finished the first.

## Block out the pacing of your party

This year's kickoff is 5 p.m. EST, practically the dinner hour for the Eastern and Central time zones. The Brennans recommend that revelers in these time zones serve dinner soon after their guests arrive and allow them to "graze" throughout the game. Those in the West might want to hold off until halftime and greet guests with an assortment of hors d'oeuvres.

Replenish the buffet table frequently. Don't overload the table with huge quantities of any one thing. "There are times when too much food is unappetizing," says Cindy.

Toward the end of the fourth quarter, clear the table of all dishes and set out a coffee service and desserts.

## Be a '90s host and de-emphasize drinking

Make your guests feel at home with a do-it-yourself bar. Plus, people who are fans of mixed drinks consume less alcohol at a self-service bar than one worked by a bartender, research shows. But beer drinkers who serve themselves tend to go overboard. Responsible hosts might want to think twice about getting a keg or stocking the fridge with 12-packs.

Offer your guests plenty of non-alcoholic beverages. The Brennans' checklist includes soft drinks (diet and regular), fruit juices, lemonade, iced tea and bottled water.

Also, serve a mix of high-protein and starchy foods. They not only slow the absorption of alcohol, but they also will fill up your guests so they'll drink less. The Brennans chose jambalaya for just that reason: It's loaded with rice.

"You have to be careful at any party you host," says Ralph. "The key is to give them lots of good, appetizing food."

## Jambalaya

Serve the jambalaya and shrimp with salad and French bread.

2 Tbs. butter  
1 pound pickled pork or pork butt, diced  
2 onions, chopped  
2 bell peppers, chopped  
2 bay leaves  
1 pound andouille sausage, cut into 1/2-inch slices  
1/2 pound ham, diced  
2 garlic cloves, minced  
2 sprigs fresh thyme or 1/2 tsp. dried thyme  
1/4 tsp. ground cloves  
1 tsp. chili powder  
1 10-ounce can plum tomatoes  
1/2 pound small shrimp

2 cups long-grain rice  
2 1/2 qts. chicken stock  
1 Tb. Louisiana or Cajun hot sauce  
Salt, pepper, cayenne pepper, to taste

\* NOTE: You can substitute any good smoked country sausage, kielbasa or venison sausage for andouille.

In a 6-quart heavy saucepan, melt butter and add diced pork, onion, peppers, bay leaves. Sauté until pork is browned and vegetables are soft. Add sausage and ham, sauté briefly. Add garlic, thyme, cloves, chili powder and tomatoes; cook for 5 minutes and then add rice and chicken stock. Bring to a boil, then reduce to a simmer for 15 minutes. Add shrimp, hot sauce and adjust seasoning, continue to cook until rice is done yet still firm; adjust seasoning again. Serves 10-12.

## Be lean in '90

'Tis the season to sweat off holiday sweets

**O**nce on the lips, forever on the hips. Just a myth? As many women enter their 30s and 40s, they're finding out it's true. And men? Well, spare tires aren't just for cars.

As New Year's resolutions prompt many baby boomers to try to huff and puff off pounds, Don Powell, author of the recent *A Year of Health Hints: 365 Practical Ways to Feel Better and Live Longer* (\$21.95, Rodale Press), has helpful tips to nudge you along a nutrition and exercise program. The key: Think of diet and exercise as a game and stick with it.

■ Be creative. For example, visualize yourself eating slowly before you even sit down for dinner.

■ Use thought control. About to binge? Yell "STOP," although, admittedly, this may not be practical in a public place.

■ Brush your teeth after every meal. You'll be less likely to snack.

■ Be inefficient. When you go shopping, park a long way from the entrance and walk; put away the remote control.

■ Refill the cookie jar — with pieces of paper, each with a 20-minute task.

The challenges — and the risks — are different for men and women.

"A fat woman in the lower body is actually healthier than an overweight man in the abdominal region," says Powell. "But she'll have more trouble losing it." That's because, although smaller, fat cells in the hips and thighs are greater in number than in other parts of the body.

In contrast, abdominal fat tends to surround the intestine, kidney and heart and can make a person more susceptible to heart attack, stroke, hypertension and diabetes. As few as 5 to 10 pounds of excess abdominal weight can be harmful.

The good news — for men and women — is that you can shape up.

The best strategy still calls for a proper diet plan, exercise and patience. "We don't put a lot of credibility in spot reduction. You lose fat all over the body at the same rate," says fitness expert Ruth Alexander of the University of Florida.

And remember in your moments of weakness: "People will start a diet and exercise regimen and if they break it, they abandon the whole attempt. Everybody is going to cheat occasionally. That should not dispel the entire program you started on."

## Don't forget exercise

Increasing your movement — by walking or swimming, for example — contributes to better health and helps burn extra calories. You should check with a physician if you are over 35 or have a health concern. Pick something you enjoy; share your exercise with a friend or class. And to attack the main problem areas of men's stomachs and women's hips, try these:

**Men:** Lie on your back, legs bent; touch fingertips together behind your head at base of skull. Keeping lower back pressed to the floor, raise your head and shoulders to a 30-degree angle, keeping your spine, neck and head in a straight line. Breathe in as you raise up; hold for five. Exhale as you return to floor. Repeat 10-15 times a day.

**Women:** There aren't exercises designed specifically for losing fat in the hip area, but there are solutions: stretching and toning exercises; stationary bike or stairmaster; a good brisk walk for 15-20 minutes three times a week; aerobics. "Women always want to start on a program and get it off. It may take until next Christmas to get where you want to be," warns exercise expert Ruth Alexander, an adviser to *Shape* magazine.

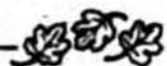

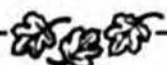

In the guise of a potboiler, the story managed to question the moral arrogance of science, while prefiguring the concept of schizophrenia and Freud's notions of the superego and the id. There's even a little bit of Mary Shelley's "Frankenstein," with Hyde as Jekyll's own monster.

Not surprisingly, "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" has proven to be very durable through the years. The latest version of "Jekyll & Hyde," is a TV movie airing Sunday, Jan. 21, on ABC. It's the brainchild of producer-director-writer David Wickes, the man who last season gave us the speculative miniseries "Jack the Ripper." Like that miniseries, "Jekyll & Hyde" stars Michael Caine, the hard-working Brit who has given more seemingly effortless good film performances than anyone, except perhaps Gene Hackman. The result is enjoyable: Imagine one of those compulsively lurid horror films that used to come out of England's Hammer Studios - toned down a bit for prime-time TV.

This time, the story of transformation and terror is told through the eyes of Sara Crawford, an English rose played by American daisy Cheryl Ladd. It is five years after the events of the novel, and Sara and her son have been in hiding. Through one long flashback that makes up the majority of the drama, we find out why.

A parallel story tells of a series of brutal attacks in London, attacks committed by someone described by witnesses as a virtual monster with an oversized bald head. This being a tale that operates more by suspense than surprise, we are soon shown Dr. Jekyll in his lab, ingesting some of a chemical concoction. Before you can say "split personality," he metamorphoses into the very brute whose lumpy pate has been staring out from a front-page drawing in the local tabloid. The transformation is

a special effects' feat of bulging, rupturing flesh; it's elaborate and labored. We horror fans - who don't get much support from TV movies - will take what we can get.

This ABC melodrama also has some fun with the notion of two divergent aspects of one man in relation to the same woman. Jekyll is a gentleman who loves and respects Sara, while Hyde is a beast who ravages her. Sara, as played by Ladd, is herself a bit of a split personality. A well-bred lady, she thrills to the upstart tactics of Dr. Jekyll. This is quite a transformation for the former Charlie's Angel.

Michael Caine brings a new histrionic quality to his work as Hyde. Except for a few minutes at the end of "Dressed to Kill" (1980), we've been used to seeing Caine in lower-keyed parts. Here he goes hog wild, at one point even letting out a madman's cackle that treads the line between funny-overblown and scary. (It's like a kid's imitation of an evil outburst.)

Observant viewers will notice a link between Wickes' "Jack the Ripper" and his "Jekyll & Hyde." One of the chief suspects in "Ripper" was Richard Mansfield (played by Armand Assante), the flamboyant American actor who galvanized London audiences of the time with his lead role in a stage production of "Jekyll and Hyde." Returning in "Jekyll & Hyde" to a hypocritical Victorian era, Wickes once again proves himself a connoisseur of grisly, gaslit horror.

### A Not-So-Bright Future

A look into the future of automobile manufacturers gives a glimpse of windshields that darken automatically. Eyeglass lenses of similar ability, called photochromic lenses, react too slowly to sunlight to be of use in automobile windows. Instead, cars must be outfitted with "electrochromic" glass that instantly changes color in response to an electric current controlled by a light sensor and control circuit. As electricity is fed through a thin layer of nickel oxide on the glass, it oxidizes and becomes darker. When this new technology becomes available, it should help prevent interior overheating and glare. It may also be used in rear view mirrors to reduce headlight glare from cars approaching from behind.

The windows must be able to change color instantly, because otherwise anyone entering a tunnel or even a parking garage would be temporarily blinded. Until these devices are available, remember that a clean windshield helps reduce glare. Rely on C & F. We're your service headquarters for VW and Audi. 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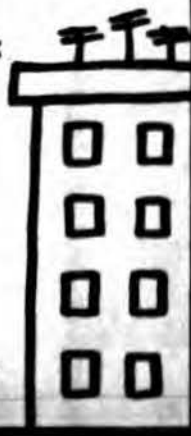

## The great U.S. blackout of 1990

Let's say you're a "M\*A\*S\*H" fan. At 5 p.m. each weekday, you sit down to watch the antics of the 4077th on a cable channel. But one day you turn on the tube and there's a black screen, except for a cryptic message about an FCC ruling.

The reason? Syndex. The syndicated exclusivity rules, as the Federal Communications Commission calls them, went into effect Jan. 1, and broadcasters, cable operators, program syndicators — and more than a few viewers — are baffled.

Syndex requires cable companies to black out movies or programs on non-local stations carried on cable systems if a local broadcaster has bought the rights to the same show. The main blackouts occur on out-of-town "superstations" — such as Chicago's WGN-TV, New York's WWOR-TV and Atlanta's TBS.

An example: An Albany, N.Y., TV station buys exclusive rights to "M\*A\*S\*H." An Albany cable system has been carrying a Boston-based channel that also carries "M\*A\*S\*H." Under syndex, the cable system must now black out Boston's "M\*A\*S\*H," and viewers will be able to watch it only during the time that the local station broadcasts it.

Cable operators con-

fronted by syndex have several options:

- They can black out the program and replace it with a notice that the show has been blacked out by FCC decree.
- They can offer a non-syndex replacement.
- They can drop channels with a high number of syndex conflicts.
- They can cut a deal with the local broadcaster.

There is wide disagreement on what syndex's impact will be.

Those on the pro side argue the ruling will force stations to provide more variety. But skeptics point to a number of potential drawbacks, chief among these viewer confusion. And because of tight production deadlines, TV listings companies will be hard-pressed to produce up-to-date television supplements.

Both sides agree, however, that no one will really know the impact of syndex until well into 1990.

That impact could vary widely. A cable company in Sacramento, Calif., was deluged with blackout requests, for example, but the impact in Chicago has been far less dramatic. And in mid-sized cities such as Evansville, Ind., blackout requests have been nearly non-existent.

# Sweeps month brings miniseries, big movies and network specials

## Fierce competition could mean last-minute changes.

**L**etterman and the Love Boat, Bob Hope and the Hulk, the Grammys and the Kennedys - February sweeps programming is typically diverse. But, truth be told, not especially compelling.

Sweeps, as every couch potato knows, is the term for one of the four four-week periods of comprehensive audience measurement conducted each year. Last February, viewers were captivated by the eight-hour Western "Lonesome Dove." Nothing as enticing awaits viewers this February, though the networks are trying. Because of the competitive nature of this period, the dates listed below might be subject to last-minute changes.

"Family of Spies: The Walker Spy Ring" (Feb. 4 and 6, CBS) casts Powers

Boothe as John Walker Jr., the former Naval officer who was convicted as a Soviet spy, and Lesley Ann Warren as his wife Barbara. The five-hour miniseries recounts Walker's recruitment of his best friend, his own brother and his son in the betrayal of their country.

The four-hour "Blind Faith" (Feb. 11 and 12, NBC) is from the writer and filmmakers of the acclaimed 1984 miniseries "Fatal Vision." Joe McGinniss' book tells the story of Rob Marshall, model husband and father, who was convicted of arranging his wife's murder in New Jersey, in 1984. Robert Urich plays Marshall, Joanna Kerns plays his wife and Dennis Farina plays the prosecutor.

The six-hour "The Kennedys of Massachusetts" (Feb. 18-20, ABC) chronicles 55 years in the family's history and boasts a first-rate cast: Charles Durning as the famous "Honey Fitz" Fitzgerald, Pat Hingle as P.J. Kennedy,

Annette O'Toole as Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy, William Petersen as Joseph Kennedy and Tracy Pollan as Kathleen Kennedy. Doris Kearns Goodwin's best seller, "The Fitzgeralds and the Kennedys," was the basis for the mini, but is the public still sufficiently fascinated with the Massachusetts clan to sustain interest over three nights?

Two TV movies examine events in recent history. "Murder in Mississippi" (Feb. 5, NBC) retells the story of three civil rights workers who were murdered in 1964, the story that was also the basis for the 1988 film "Mississippi Burning." Tom Hulce, Blair Underwood and Jennifer Grey star. The three-hour "Challenger" (Feb. 25, ABC), about the doomed space shuttle, casts Karen Allen as schoolteacher Christa McAuliffe,

Barry Bostwick as astronaut Dick Scobee and Peter Boyle as the engineer who questioned the safety of the O-rings during a cold-weather launch.

Among the other TV movies on the sweeps slate: "The Love Boat: A Valentine Voyage" (Feb. 12, CBS), which reunites Gavin McLeod, Ted Lange and Jill Whelan as the cruise-ship crew in the Caribbean; and "Anything to Survive" (Feb. 5, ABC), starring Robert Conrad in a shipwreck tale.

Other TV movies likely to air during this time include "Daughter of the Streets" (ABC), with Jane Alexander as a woman who discovers that her daughter (Roxana Zal) has become a prostitute; "The Death of the Incredible Hulk" (NBC), with Bill Bixby and Lou Ferrigno; "Hiroshima: Out of the

Ashes" (NBC), with Pat Morita, Max Von Sydow and Judd Nelson in a story of A-bomb survivors; and "Too Young to Die?" (NBC), with Michael Tucker as the defense lawyer of a 15-year-old who faces the death penalty.

Several specials are also scheduled. The first is the eighth-anniversary show for "Late Night With David Letterman" (Feb. 1, NBC), to be taped this week in Los Angeles. "You Don't Look 40, Charlie Brown" (Feb. 2, CBS) celebrates the 40th anniversary of Charles M. Schulz's "Peanuts" comic strip and the many TV specials that followed. And a Bob Hope special (Feb. 17, NBC) focuses on TV.

Tony Danza hosts a celebration of Disneyland's 35th anniversary on "The

"Magical World of Disney" (Feb. 4, NBC). The Grammy Awards are scheduled for Feb. 21 on CBS, and "The Wizard of Oz" is the subject of a 50th-anniversary tribute (Feb. 11, CBS) that will include both the movie and scenes from its production.

The month's most star-studded show may be "Sammy Davis Jr.'s 60th Anniversary Celebration" (Feb. 4, ABC), a two-and-a-half-hour extravaganza featuring host Eddie Murphy and a performing lineup that includes Bill Cosby, Michael Jackson, Frank Sinatra, Ella Fitzgerald, Whitney Houston, Richard Pryor, Stevie Wonder and Bob Hope.

Even Fox Broadcasting gets into the sweeps act with a two-part "Alien Nation" (Feb. 12, 19) that has the Sikes family joining such baby-conscious Monday-night shows as "Designing Women" and "Newhart" with a newly born Newcomer of its own.

# CABLE UPDATE

This week, Albert Finney stars in *The Endless Game* and the electric and superbly cast *The Image*.

It's Albert Finney Week on cable.

Finney, who gave "conspicuous consumption" a whole new meaning in the banquet/seduction scene in 1963's "Tom Jones," stars in two original movies this week on Showtime and HBO of polar extremes: One is so vital it could sap the energies of a neutrino; the other is so depressive that it makes a black hole look like Club Med Cancun.

• Showtime's "The Endless Game" is first up, airing Jan. 21 and 26. It is a British-style espionage drama of the type that admirers call "stylish" and detractors regard as only marginally more interesting than watching a glacier grind out a continent.

As "The Endless Game" begins, an institutionalized woman (Kristin Scott Thomas) receives a lethal injection from a man who pockets a picture from her bedside table. It would be a great beginning for a whodunnit, except that we have already seen whodunnit. "The Endless Game" is aiming to be a more metaphysical animal: a "whydunnit."

British intelligence agent Alec Hillsden (Finney) takes a particular interest in the case, since he once had an affair with the victim, who turns out to be former agent Caroline Oates. The two were stationed in Austria with CIA agent Jock (George Segal), making a merry threesome of it, until "Control" (Ian Holm) learned of Caroline's and Hillsden's affair and separated them. Caroline was sent to Berlin, where she was captured by the KGB who, after some heavy-duty debriefing, released her in a catatonic state.

Hillsden (who, unlike us, has no idea who the murderer might be) asks around. He asks "Control." He asks former agents. He asks so many people that his wife asks him for a divorce. Finally "Control" suggests that he go to Austria, in one stroke getting away from all those questions. Would that we were so lucky.

Hillsden continues to make a pest of himself in Central Europe until he is framed for the murder of a British official and defects to the Russians. Once he's in Moscow, he makes a pest of himself there, until he finds out the truth of Catherine's death - and we find out why Catherine was murdered.

But by this time we don't care why Catherine was murdered. By this time we have developed a question of our own: How can we get this guy to shut up?

A talky affair to begin with, "The Endless Game" is rife with sloppy transitions and blurred expositions. Between the sudden, unexplained flashbacks and the muddy plot line, we were at one point unsure whether a scene was set in London, Vienna or Berlin. It was like a European tour conducted by Timothy Leary.

(Jan. 27 on HBO) is pure adrenaline. Finney plays Jason Cromwell, superstar correspondent for "Here and Now," a TV newsmagazine.

Finney's Cromwell is so hard-boiled that even his wife, Jean (Marsha Mason), calls him by his last name. He moves at such a breakneck speed that he doesn't even have time to learn his intros to stories, let alone investigate those stories properly. He works with producer Irv Mickelson (John Mahoney), with whom he exchanges scattershot and very funny banter that is one of the chief pleasures of "The Image."

When a "Here and Now" segment about an innocent man on death row falls through (it turns out he was guilty), hard-driving producer Joanne Winslow-Darvish (Swoosie Kurtz) needs a replacement fast. Cromwell and Mickelson rush a piece on bank president David Hartzfield (Jim Haynie), who is involved in a savings-and-loan scandal, onto the air.

After it airs, Hartzfield commits suicide. The shaken Cromwell and Mickel-

son at first deal with this news with some very funny black humor. But, after a visit from Hartzfield's wife, Cromwell and Mickelson have a sharp falling-out over the ethics of airing the piece. Mickelson returns to Texas to reopen the story. He dies in a plane crash, but before he does, he mails a video to Cromwell that leads the star back to Texas to complete the story.

Sure, there are echoes of "Broadcast News," "Absence of Malice" and even "Network" (especially when Finney roars about a news audience "with the attention-span of a hummingbird").

here, but so what? What matters to us isn't the originality of the material, but how originally the material is handled. And "The Image" is charged with electric writing and electric performances.

Finney invests his part with all the energy he first brought to "Tom Jones" three decades ago. John Mahoney and Swoosie Kurtz have established themselves as two of our most consistently enjoyable actors since winning Tony Awards for their performances in Broadway's "The House of Blue Leaves." (Mahoney practically steals "The Image" with a scene in which he indulges in some "quiet time" with a Teddy bear.) Kathy Baker, who first came to wide attention as a tragic addict in "Clean and Sober," is excellent as the slightly addled researcher with whom Cromwell engages in a brief, typically harried affair. Spalding Gray is perfectly oily as a news division president, and Marsha Mason is full of spunk and good humor.

"The Image" raises some serious issues, but don't hold that against it. It's one of the most engaging character studies we've seen lately.

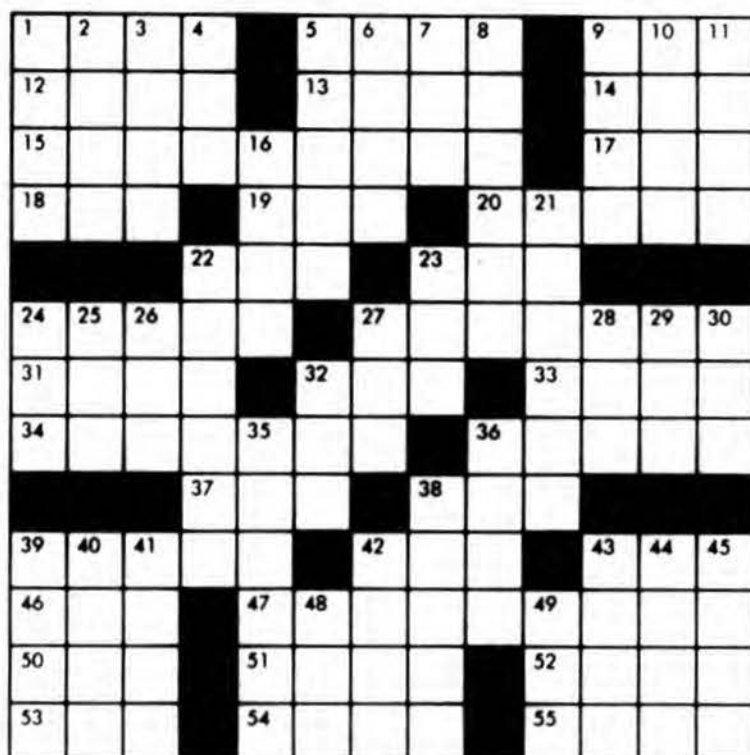

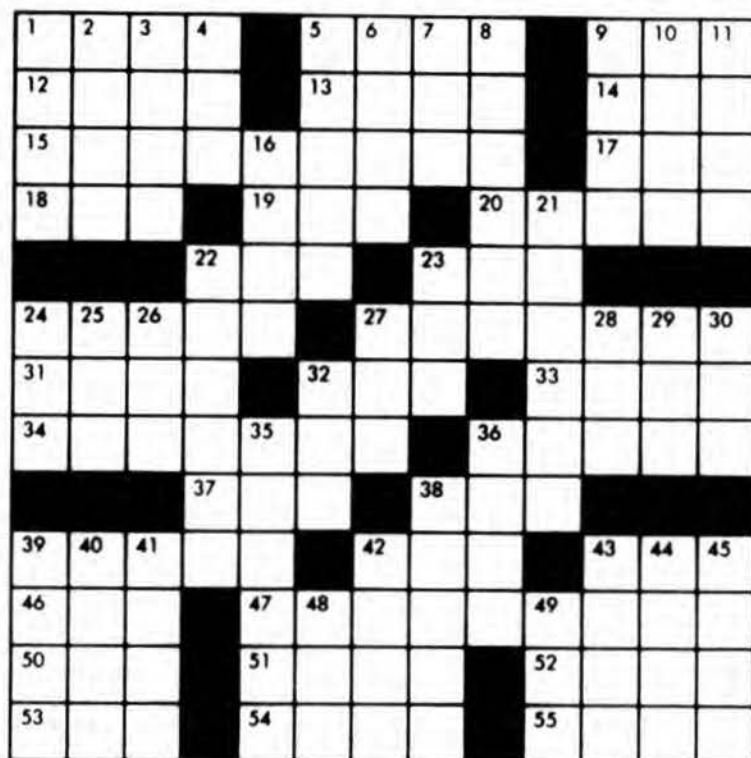

## Candidates scramble to get out vote

Just more than two weeks remain in what may be the shortest campaign on record for a state office, and 31st Senate District candidates are searching hard for ways to get their supporters to the polls.

Four Republicans, three Democrats and an American Independent are in the Feb. 6 special election race to replace former Sen. William Campbell. Campbell resigned in December to become president of the California Manufacturers Association.

Although the 31st District is preponderantly Republican, voters are permitted to cross party lines. If no candidate receives more than 50 percent of the vote, a runoff will be held on April 10 between the top vote-getters in each party.

Voters in the district, which stretches from Whittier to Laguna Beach, will have little opportunity to learn about the candidates because of the short campaign period.

That could be a blessing. Early indications are this race won't be much different from traditional

campaigns.

As usual, the top contenders have high name identification and/or money. And, as usual, candidates are trying to focus attention on their opponents, or, more precisely, on

what scalawags those opponents are.

Three Republicans and a Democrat are being touted as the front-runners. Assemblyman Gil Ferguson, R-Laguna Beach, Assemblyman Frank Hill, R-Whittier,

Brea Councilman Ron Isles, and Democratic activist Janice Graham.

Ferguson may have an edge by virtue of his high name identification along the Orange Coast. He is popular in his Assembly district and has the advantage of being the only Republican candidate from the southern part of a Senate district that boasts a 54 percent to 36 percent GOP voter registration lead over the Democrats.

First elected to his 70th Assembly District seat in 1984, Ferguson carries conservative credentials that play well in Orange County but

sometimes put him at odds with party moderates.

But other than his anti-abortion stance, substantive issues aren't getting much attention in the race.

Isles, a pro-choice candidate, has tried to get mileage out of the pro-life positions of Ferguson and Hill, but the issue hasn't traveled far at candidate forums.

Likewise, candidates have broached the ethics issue with mixed results. All three GOP front-runners carry some baggage.

## FBI probes teen's death

The FBI this week confirmed it has opened an investigation into the death of a Fountain Valley teen-ager who died while in police custody following a Grateful Dead concert.

Patrick Shanahan's parents are still waiting for investigation results from the Los Angeles County District Attorney's office, the Inglewood police and their own lawyer. Still, they said, they were glad another agency had taken an interest in finding the truth about their son's death.

"I'm happy they're involved — it's one more thing to make police change their tactics," Bill Shanahan said.

Patrick Shanahan, 19, died Dec. 10 in the back seat of an Inglewood patrol car after he was arrested on suspicion of being under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Witnesses have described the arrest as particularly brutal and claim officers used excessive force.

An autopsy showed Shanahan's death was the result of compression of the neck, caused by a chokehold. He also sustained multiple injuries over his body, particularly on his head, face and back.

Inglewood police admit a chokehold was used to restrain Shanahan, but deny they used excessive force during his arrest. They say he violently resisted arrest.

Special Agent Jim Neilson confirmed the FBI had begun a probe of Shanahan's death. The investigation opened Jan. 10.

"Whenever a person alleges their civil rights have been violated, we investigate," Neilson said.

Neilson would not say who brought them the allegation that

## Haiti under state of siege

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — The military government declared a state of siege Saturday night after the slaying of an army colonel, and police reportedly arrested and beat several opposition leaders.

The government led by Lt. Gen. Prosper Avril said the 30-day decree was needed "to protect democratic accomplishments against terrorism," but opposition leaders said it was an attempt to silence dissent before promised elections in October.

The United States deplored the actions by the government, saying they "put at risk the democratic transition in Haiti."

Government television said under the state of siege four articles of the constitution were suspended,

including one that forbids the deportation of Haitian nationals.

At least one of the opposition leaders, conservative Hubert de Ronceray, later was reported deported. Max Care, a coordinator of de Ronceray's party, said de Ronceray was deported Saturday night to Miami.

The government said it also re-established an entry visa requirement for Haitians returning from abroad "to prevent the infiltration of terrorist agents." The practice, abolished shortly after dictator Jean-Claude Duvalier was ousted in 1986, often was used to screen Haitians returning home.

An earlier statement, also read on the TV, said the

## Uneasy calm in Baku; Red Army controls the city

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet soldiers waged fierce street battles with militants Saturday in the southern republic of Azerbaijan, and at least 57 people were killed, the government said. Witnesses said the death toll could be far higher.

"The street is covered with blood," Vadim Korsh, an editor of Azerbaijan's official news agency, Azerinform, said of the scene at a military garrison in the capital Baku.

One activist said more than 100 local troops at the garrison joined the militants in fighting Soviet soldiers, thousands of which were sent to quell a week of ethnic and separatist violence. It was the first report of rebellion in local ranks.

By evening, residents were reporting that the sound of gunfire had stopped in the barracks and elsewhere in the city center.

Early today, Moscow Radio said Soviet forces were in control of the city, though some gunfire could still be heard. The report, quoted by the British Broadcasting Corp., said the first night of a curfew passed in relative calm, with 18 people arrested for violating the curfew.

Azerbaijani President Elmira Kharrova on Saturday denounced the "gross violation of the republic's sovereignty" by the Kremlin's declaration of a state of emergency without the approval of local authorities.

"The people of Azerbaijan will never forgive anyone for the tragic way their sons and daughters have been killed," she said.

In Moscow, President Mikhail S. Gorbachev went on nationwide TV to appeal for an end to the violence that the government says has killed

### Bush calls for Baku restraint

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration on Saturday called for "restraint in the use of force" in violence-torn Azerbaijan and said officials were watching "carefully and with concern" as Soviet troops fought street battles with militants.

The White House issued a statement saying Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev's dispatch of troops to quell the ethnic violence "should not, however, become a cloak for the abridgment of the exercise of political rights."

A State Department official said there was no evidence of human rights violations in reports of events in Baku, capital of the southern Soviet republic. But the official, speaking on condition of anonymity, added, "Clearly that's going to be a point of attention," by the administration.

Gorbachev made a nationwide television appeal Saturday for an end to the weeklong violence. The White House statement issued afterward said "We regret the already heavy loss of life and call upon all involved to act with restraint in the use of force and to show respect for the rule of law and the right of the individuals involved."

# Martin estate worth less than \$100,000; NB man an executor

BINGHAMTON, N.Y. (AP) — Billy Martin, who died in a Christmas night auto accident in front of his country home, has left an estate that legal papers say is worth less than \$100,000, and a Newport Beach man was named an alternate executor of the will.

Records filed with the Broome County Surrogate's Court show that Martin's will was filed this month and names his wife, Jillann, as both his heir and executrix. The will also names two alternate executors, Paul Tabary of Metairie, La., and Tom Deemer of Newport Beach, Calif.

Deemer, president of the Balboa Bay Club, and Martin were good friends, and the former baseball manager used to stay at the Bay Club.

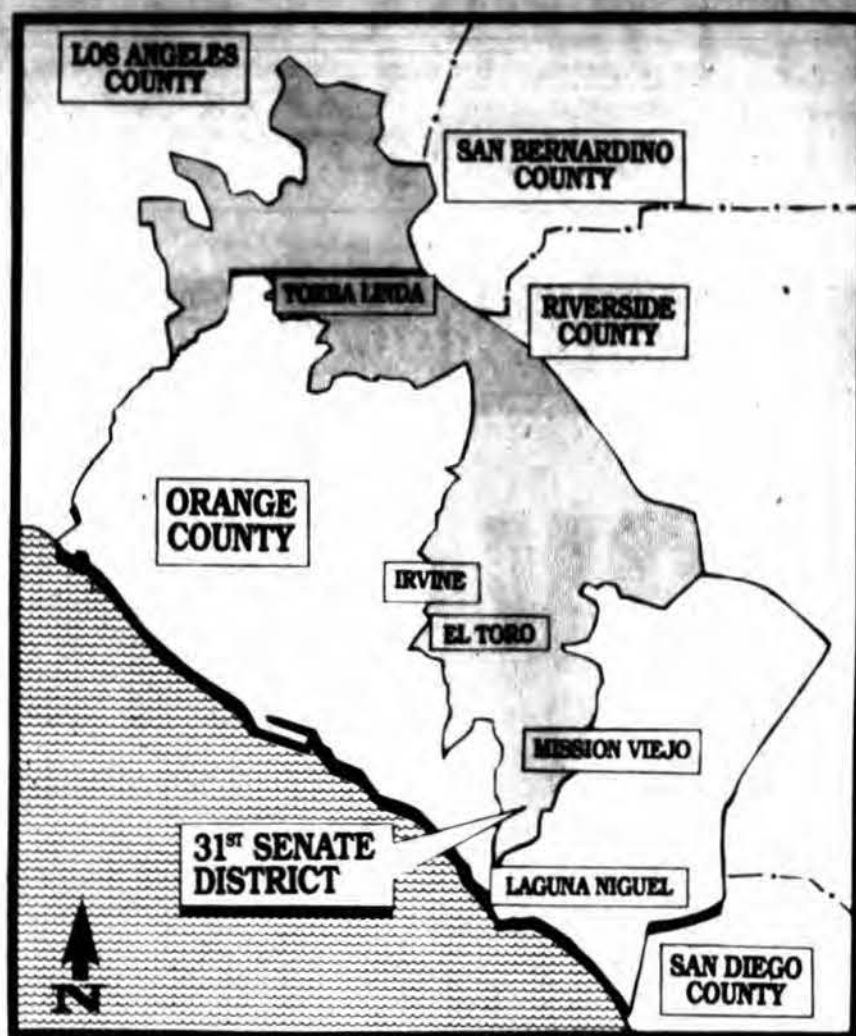
The will, drawn up Feb. 11, 1988, in Danville, Calif., says that Martin's assets are to be entrusted to the Martin Living Trust. The trust's documents were not included with

the will.

Documents do not catalog Martin's assets, but merely declare they are worth between \$50,000 and \$100,000. The will was witnessed by Victoria C. Avery, identified in papers as Martin's California attorney, and two others who were named but not further identified.

Other than naming his heirs and specifying how his assets should be disposed of, the will's only other specific provision is Martin's instruction not to cremate his body. He is buried in Gate of Heaven Cemetery in Hawthorne, N.Y.

Martin, who was 61 when he died, was riding in a pickup truck driven by William Reedy of Detroit when it went out of control and hit a culvert at the foot of the driveway that leads onto Martin's 150-acre farm. Reedy has been charged with driving while intoxicated in the accident but has pleaded innocent to the charge.

## OC wins \$150,000 water appeal

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has reversed itself and decided not to charge the Orange County Water District more than \$150,000 annually for added water conservation at Prado Dam.

Rep. Christopher Cox, R-Newport Beach, received a letter last week

from Assistant Secretary of the Army Robert Page, notifying him of the decision.

In the letter, Page agreed the policy would be inequitable to the OCWD at such a late date, said Cox, who added he was "delighted that the Corps will not be using Orange County as a 'guinea pig' in implementing the new pricing policy."

Desk Officer Steve Balloch said the woman, who he identified as Elizabeth Mosle, 26, had just come to the Orange County area from Brooklyn, N.Y., with a boyfriend.

"I think of my own daughters being in the same circumstances and I shudder."

Shanahan's rights had been infringed upon.

Shanahan's parents said they were unaware the FBI was involved until just recently and had no idea who brought the case to the bureau's attention.

The Shanahans lawyer, Lawrence Trygstad, was equally baffled, but cooperated with the FBI's request for a list of witnesses, the Shanahans said.

At this point, the Shanahans and their lawyer have a list of 30-40 witnesses who've stepped forward, Therese Shanahan said.

A handful of those witnesses are willing to testify to the general mood of police that night; a few others saw Patrick Shanahan just before he was arrested. Trygstad and a private detective are still working through the list.

The Shanahans are hoping to find a witness who actually saw their son arrested — and especially one who

saw the fatal chokehold being applied.

While the Grateful Dead had planned a three-night series of concerts at Inglewood's Great Western Forum — where Shanahan died — next month, those dates were cancelled Thursday.

Concert organizers said they did not have enough time to implement a security plan for concert-goers, and therefore postponed the concert indefinitely.

"I wrote to the Grateful Dead the week after Pat died, asking them not to play the Forum because of the risk their fans were in," Therese Shanahan said.

The teen-ager's mother hopes the band won't play the Forum until a facility is available for taking care of audience members who are in trouble with drugs.

Patrick Shanahan was found to have a moderate level of LSD in his system at the time of his death, and police contend the drug had made him combative.

Hill has been implicated in the corruption trial of state Sen. Joseph Montoya, D-El Monte. He was accused of accepting \$5,000 in exchange for his support of a bill sought by undercover FBI agents.

Hill has denied any wrongdoing. Isles has been either the plaintiff or the defendant in about a dozen court cases over the years, and opponents have been quick to bring up issues such as his alleged illegal use of a city credit card and charges that he collected an advance payment from the city of Brea for a trip he didn't take.

Ferguson is the subject of an investigation by the state Fair Political Practices Commission on charges that he failed to report income from his public relations business in a proper and timely manner. Ferguson said the error was unintentional.

"I'm not sure they're ever going to discuss an issue," Ferguson said of the race. "It's coming down to people bragging about how they can do a better job than anybody else."

Hill, 35, is playing that card, citing his leadership in the party, membership on the powerful Assembly Ways and Means Committee and role in successful legislation to increase education funding and in placing a transportation funding measure on the June primary ballot.

Hill plans to spend about \$300,000 on his campaign.

Isles, 51, lacks voter recognition

outside north Orange County, but is working hard to overcome that with a well-financed campaign. He said he is prepared to spend up to \$500,000 of his own money in the race.

He has a stable of seasoned campaign consultants aiding his cause, and has won endorsements from several pro-choice groups, including Pro-Choice Orange County, that played key roles in recent special election victories for pro-choice candidates in San Diego County.

Ferguson, 66, is behind in fundraising but started his campaign with a built-in army of volunteers. He maintains and nurtures a campaign volunteer organization even during non-election years, an unusual practice that is paying off with the special election.

Ferguson also was endorsed by all eight California Republican Assembly units located in the 31st District, providing him with still more volunteers.

The three GOP leaders also have a dark horse to watch. Diamond Bar Councilman Gary Miller has raised about \$100,000 for his campaign and hopes to raise several times that. He also hired a professional consultant to run his campaign.

A real estate broker, the 41-year-old Miller previously served on the Diamond Bar Municipal Advisory Council before city incorporation in 1988.

Assuming none of the candidates garners more than half the vote in the February election, the top Re-

publican will likely face Democratic candidate Janice Graham in an April runoff.

Graham, 53, of Laguna Hills was the Democratic nominee against Campbell in 1988. Despite the heavy Republican registration advantage, Graham still managed to garner 36 percent of the vote in an underfunded campaign against an incumbent.

Graham was active in efforts to discredit Campbell's handling of the annual Conference On Women he sponsored. The non-profit conference was canceled after investigations showed about a third of the budget was paid to Campbell's wife and an aide.

Graham, a businesswoman and former school teacher, thinks she might have won the February election outright had the Democratic Party offered adequate support.

"It would've been money well spent," she said.

Nevertheless, she believes she has a good chance if she is the Democratic nominee in the runoff because the Republican nominee will be badly bloodied by his own.

"I think the Republicans are going to knock each other so badly that the Democrat can win," Graham said.

Graham hopes to raise at least \$100,000 for her campaign. She said she will focus on the ethics of her GOP counterparts and her pro-

choice stance on the abortion issue. Graham by no means has the Democratic nomination locked up, either. Two other Democrats are in the race, and both have a chance at coming out on top because of the crowded field and cross-over voting.

Bradley McFadden, 34, is a West Covina councilman and attorney who has a small campaign budget and is unknown outside his community. He is running as a moderate who is pro-business, fiscally conservative and supports the death penalty.

Also in the race is Thomas Whaling, an El Toro attorney and director for the Rescue Mission in Santa Ana. Whaling, 56, is a one-time Republican who ran for the Assembly more than 20 years ago before switching parties.

There also is an American Independent Party candidate in the race, Robert Lewis, 39, of Rowland Heights, is another former Republican Assembly candidate.

Lewis, an engineer, switched parties in 1988 and is campaigning for a proposed state constitutional amendment to limit officeholders to two terms.

Turnout predictions are as low as 20 percent for the February special election, prompting several candidates to focus on getting their supporters to mail in absentee ballots.

## Screen legend Stanwyck dead at 82

SANTA MONICA — Emmy-winning actress Barbara Stanwyck, the sultry villainess of the film classic "Double Indemnity" and stern matriarch of television's "The Big Valley," died Saturday. She was 82.

"She died shortly before 5 p.m.," said Larry Kleno, Stanwyck's long-time press agent. "It was congestive heart failure."

Stanwyck, whose career spanned the chorus line, vaudeville, movies, television and won her three Emmys and an honorary Oscar, had been admitted to St. John's Hospital and Health Center about a week ago.

"It's the passing of a great lady of the screen," said actress Angela Lansbury, who learned of Stanwyck's death while attending the Golden Globe awards. "I was very sorry to hear it."

Stanwyck had appeared in more than 80 movies since the 1920s, including four Academy Award-nominated roles: "Stella Dallas" in 1937, "Ball of Fire" in 1942 with Gary Cooper, "Double Indemnity" with Fred MacMurray and Edward G. Robinson in 1944, and "Sorry Wrong Number" in 1948.

Her only Oscar, however, was an honorary statuette presented in 1982 for the body of her work. It was a career that could not be overlooked.

The youngest of five children, Stanwyck was born Ruby Stevens on July 16, 1907 in Brooklyn, N.Y., and was orphaned at age 4.

An older sister, Millie, a chorus girl, was most responsible for raising her, but boarded her with Brooklyn families when she was on the road.

## Suspicion and optimism greet canyon proposal

Laguna Beach activists and county officials were eyeing the proposal of a \$95 million-plus bond issue to buy Laguna Canyon for preservation with a mixture of suspicion and optimism today.

Although the Irvine Co. and Laguna Beach city officials have agreed to take the proposal to the Orange County Board of Supervisors, several issues have yet to be settled.

The measure could go to the November ballot as a countywide general obligation bond or as a local assessment district.

Additionally, the two sides are undecided on whether some improvements expected of The Irvine Co. if it developed the 2,150-acre parcel would still fall to the company.

Those improvements include widening Laguna Canyon Road and refurbishing Laguna Lakes.

"There're a lot of questions that need to be answered," said Carolyn Woods, president of the Laguna Conservancy activist group.

Laguna Greenbelt president Elisabeth Brown said it is too soon to comment on the proposal.

"It isn't something that lends itself to instant analysis," she said.

Second District Supervisor Harriett Wieder said she would support putting the issue on the ballot in any configuration.

"I think it's kind of a refreshing way to try to resolve the controversy," she said.

"I think Proposition M showed us people in different parts of the county don't think the same," she said. "People in the north will probably see this as something that only benefits South Orange County, even though it's really a regional issue."

She added, however, the issue would have a better chance of winning voter approval if the bond is presented as a special assessment district.

## Truck driver gives this columnist his comeuppance

Ian J. Hawkins is a professional truck driver who lives in Santa Ana Heights, and he has taken considerable time to write a detailed response to one of my columns asking for more regulation of big rigs on freeways. His letter is thoughtful, calm and informative, and deserves the same audience that read my column that was critical of truckers.

While Mr. Hawkins skips a number of questions raised in my column, he does contribute some interesting data and a little jab here and there at me. So without changing a word, here is the letter:

"By trade I'm a professional truck driver and have been so for the last 12 years, and while I normally enjoy your column, I feel that I need to comment on this one."

"Regarding your column, 'Attack of the killer devil-may-care macho marauders,' I found it to be more of an attack by the semi-weekly columnist and a somewhat misinformed one at that."

"First of all, the statement about whether or not a jackknife can be prevented at a slower speed, I would say that that depends on the conditions and circumstances of the incident. About 10 years ago I was driving along I-10 just east of LA when a fellow in a car entering the freeway at too high a speed, lost control and went sideways in front of me. I stepped on the brakes and turned the wheel at the same time, and although I was going about 15-20 mph, the truck jackknifed. And that was on a clear sunny day."

"In answer to your second question, 'Should there be a 55 mph speed limit for trucks and trucks as there used to be?' If you had done your research you would have known that has never changed in California. Even when the law was changed for rural interstates to be 65 mph, it was left 55 mph for trucks and cars towing trailers. However, it's still 55 mph for everyone within major population areas (50,000 or more population)."

Which brings me to my next point. When the gravel truck sped by you exceeding 75 mph, why do you feel that he should be arrested but not you, even though you admitted doing 75 mph? In my opinion, both of you should be stopped and cited."

"Your next statement that all trucks should be kept to the right lane is in fact the current law, with the exception of three or more lane roads where you may travel in the right two lanes. However, you are supposed to move to the far right lane to let faster traffic pass. If you kept all trucks in the right lane without being able to pass, no one would ever be able to get on or off the freeway because there would be a solid line of trucks for miles, probably standing still."

"The problems I encounter while driving, even with being able to use the right two lanes, is that a lot of people are either unsure of what they are doing or afraid. Instead of merging with traffic at the speed at which it's flowing, they will enter at 30 mph two or three feet in front of a truck traveling with the flow at 55 mph. This causes the truck driver to have to slam on his brakes or swerve into the other lane, both of which are unsafe acts."

"If you were to keep all trucks off freeways there would be horrendous traffic jams on the surface streets as well as increased pollution from all the stop and go driving. Another problem that already is happening is that a lot of cities ban trucks from certain routes and not just residential streets."

"You question how often brakes are checked at the weigh station. They are checked quite often, in fact the Highway Patrol tries to make sure all trucks are inspected once every three months and sometimes more often if an obvious defect is noted. This is a nationwide program that was actually copied from a program the state of California started years ago that used to include private autos as well. It's called C V S A which stands for Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance and includes about 45 states and three Canadian provinces. When a truck pulls into most any weigh scale for an inspection, they are checked for a variety of things starting with the driver's logs, medical card and driver's license. Next are brakes including drum and shoe thickness and tightness of brakes when applied. Steering play is checked along with tread depth of tires and lug nuts on wheels. Also checked are air lines, warning lights and buzzers and all outside lights including license plate light on the trailer. If after all this and more, you pass, you are issued a colored sticker with the year and state of issue on it and it's good for a three-month period."

"I realize this is a little long, but I felt that it should be said in light of all the negative and somewhat misinformed things that were printed by you. Yours truly, (signed) Ian Hawkins."

Thank you, sir, for your informative letter. If all of us, including me, observed the law, or if there were more highway patrolmen pulling big and little rigs over for law violations, maybe, just maybe, the freeways would be less frightening. But I've never seen a big rig going only 55 mph, and I doubt very many readers have either."

## FV woman makes history in LA

For Fountain Valley resident Lillian Kawasaki, distributing information on ridesharing, recycling and energy conservation to 3.6 million Los Angelenos will soon be all in a day's work.

On Jan. 12, Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley named Kawasaki, 39, head of the city's newly created Department of Environmental Affairs, making Kawasaki the city's first chief public educator on protecting the environment and the first Asian-American department head in the city's history.

"Asian-Americans have served on several levels of management before, but never as a department chief," said Kawasaki. "I'm proud of coming from a Japanese background and being the first Asian-American appointed to such a position."

Kawasaki, who has worked on the environmental staff of the Los An-

geles Harbor Department since 1978, will now direct a staff of 20 administrators and environmental scientists, and will oversee an annual budget of more than \$1 million.

"I'll be getting the message out on how businesses and citizens can improve their environment. I also hope to compliment the work done by environmental staffs in other city departments," said Kawasaki, who has served as Director of Environmental Management for the Harbor Department since April 1988.

Kawasaki, who will earn a salary of \$82,000 per year in her new post, expects to open the new municipal department by early March.

"Right now, we are still in the process of putting the department together. We have to begin hiring a staff and putting together the department's first year's budget," she said.

Although about 15 other city departments maintain their own en-

vironmental staffs, and operate environmental programs, Bradley said the newly created Environmental Affairs Department will complement the efforts of other city offices and help establish Los Angeles as "an environmental trend-setter for the nation and the world."

Kawasaki, who moved to Fountain Valley two years ago from Westminster, received her master's degree in Biology from the California State University in Los Angeles.

As environmental director for the Harbor Department, Kawasaki said she oversaw a staff of 18 scientists and directed research efforts focused on reducing the environmental impact of harbor activities on air quality, ocean water quality and the surrounding area.

And during the past five years, she also managed a program for mitigating the effects of harbor expansions and restoring wetlands habitats.

## Budget crunch puts ranch's future in limbo

At one time, Rancho del Rio was a symbol. The 213-acre hideout of a suspected drug trafficker, it displayed the riches to be gained in drug smuggling and how confiscated wealth could be used by law enforcement agencies.

President Bush made a special trip to the ranch last spring to officially give Orange County its share of the money seized: \$4.4 million, plus another \$6 million to fight the drug war.

Sheriff Brad Gates gave Bush a tour of the sprawling ranch in the hills above Caspers Regional Park and talked about his plans to turn the buildings and grounds into a training facility for officers.

Now it seems, Gates may have to set aside his plans for a countryside training center in the face of a mounting budget deficit.

With the Sheriff's Department budget running more than \$5.5 million in the red, county supervisors are taking a long hard look at Gates' training center. If the land is subdivided into smaller parcels and pre-approved for sales, the county could get as much as \$2 million for the land, according to reports.

The sheriff could not be reached for comment.

Gates had set aside \$150,000 from his budget this fiscal year to develop the ranch, which was designed to attract law-enforcement officials from around the world. Another \$150,000 for the

center was to come from a regional narcotics program the sheriff administers.

Initially, county officials accepted Gates' plans to turn the ranch into a training facility. Supervisor Thomas Riley said. It was Riley's understanding the more than \$10 million was specifically given for drug enforcement and could be used however Gates saw fit.

"Then we found out it was for law enforcement, period, and fell more under the supervisors control," Riley said. "That changed things."

While Riley said he could see the use of training facilities, he's also concerned about financial responsibility in law enforcement.

"The sheriff has not kept within his budget constraints," Riley said.

## Terminal name may honor life of Riley

Airline passengers rushing to catch a flight at the John Wayne Airport of the future may find themselves running into Thomas F. Riley.

Literally. If a proposal made last week by Orange County Board of Supervisors Chairman Don Roth is approved, the new, 338,000-square-foot terminal currently under construction at John Wayne Airport will bear Supervisor Riley's name.

"Thomas Riley has worked diligently to put this expansion of John Wayne Airport together and no other individual deserves more recognition for getting this facility," Roth said.

Roth plans to return the proposal to the board within the next 30 days for final approval.

The new terminal, designed to handle 8.4 million passengers each year, is a part of the county's \$310 million expansion of the airport. The terminal is scheduled to open Sept. 15, six months behind schedule because of design problems and construction delays.

"I was surprised and I feel honored," said Riley, who is currently serving his fourth term as a supervisor. "I've been involved with the airport since before I was appointed to the board, and it has been a significant part of my efforts on the board."

Riley, a retired U.S. Marine Corps brigadier general, was appointed to the Board of Supervisors in 1974 by then-governor Ronald Reagan. His 5th Supervisorial District includes Newport Beach, Costa Mesa, Laguna Beach, San Clemente, Dana Point, parts of Irvine and much of

## Lottery selects Irvine retailer best of month

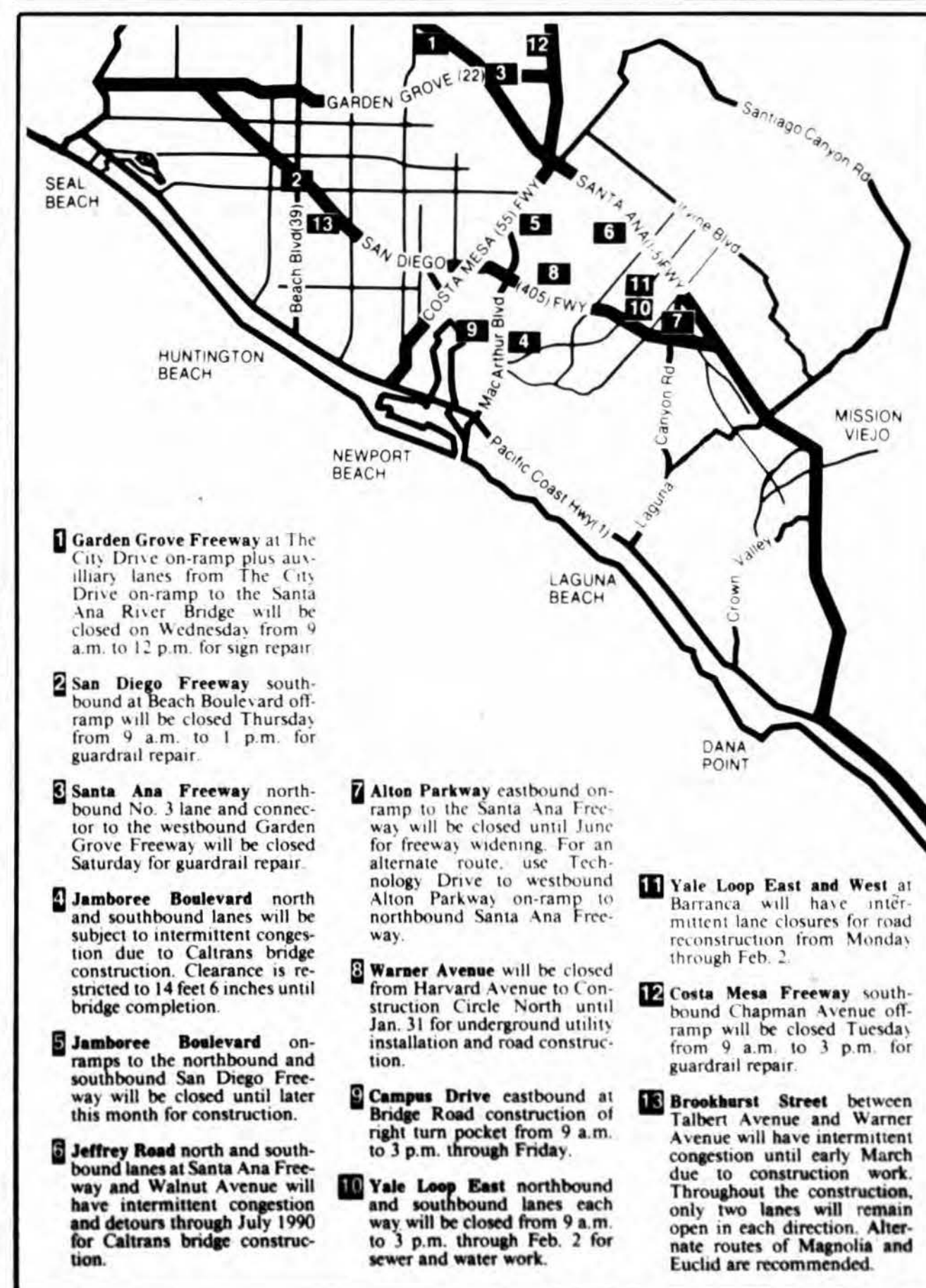
The California State Lottery identified the recipient of its Retailer of the Month award for January.

# New ambassador dies in car wreck

GREENBURGH, N.Y. (AP) — Ruth Washington, the newly appointed ambassador to Gambia, was killed early Saturday in an auto accident involving a drunken driver, police said.

Washington, 67, was killed when a car crossed the center line and struck her car head-on about 2:05 a.m., said Sgt. Robert Brown of this New York City suburb's police. Washington was pronounced dead at the scene, he said.

The driver of the other car, Angela Penness, 23, of Scarsdale, was in critical condition at White Plains Medical Center, a spokeswoman

said. Brown said she was arrested for driving while intoxicated.

Washington was a former U.S. magistrate in New York. She was sworn in as ambassador to Gambia on Dec. 18, succeeding Herbert E. Horowitz as this country's representative to the African country.

Washington was headed for her home in Greenburgh when the accident occurred, Brown said. She had planned to leave for Gambia on Wednesday, said Caroline West-erhof, a family friend.

The Buffalo native, who was black, was one of only two minority women serving as a federal magis-

trate when she was appointed to that post in 1979. She retired in 1987, and returned to private law practice.

Washington also lectured internationally on human rights and labor law, and had been an adjunct professor at Fordham University and Pace University in New York.

"This is a sad day and a tragic way to end a beautiful career," U.S. Rep. Benjamin A. Gilman, R-N.Y., said Saturday.

"She was called the little giant by everyone who knew her. She was small in stature but had a big heart and a bundle of energy," Gilman said.

After her nomination, Washington said the challenge of becoming an ambassador was "the most thrilling yet" in her career. She said her nomination "is a dream come true — to be on the world stage."

Chase Untermeyer, director of presidential personnel at the White House, said she "showed off the best of America."

"I can say that through every stage of the process, culminating in her swearing in, I had never known anybody as thrilled, delighted and overjoyed with the opportunity with which she was presented," Untermeyer said.

## Aide says Barry will enter a drug abuse treatment program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mayor Marion S. Barry, his political career jeopardized by his arrest on a cocaine possession charge, plans to enter a substance abuse treatment program, a close adviser to the mayor said Saturday.

"He knows that he needs help, and that he can't deal with it under the pressure that he now has," said the adviser, who spoke only on condition of anonymity.

"There's political wisdom to it, but also there is his personal condition to think of here."

Barry spokeswoman Lurma Rackley said that the mayor will make a statement on his personal life today, but declined to elaborate. WRC-TV reported on Saturday

that the mayor will postpone making any public statements about his political future for at least 30 days.

Barry, 53, relinquished day-to-day administration of the government Friday to his top aide just hours after he appeared before a federal magistrate to answer charges stemming from his arrest in a downtown hotel Thursday.

Prosecutors say they have audio and video recordings of the mayor purchasing and using drugs in the company of a female acquaintance.

The aide said he did not know whether Barry would seek treatment on an in-patient or out-patient basis or whether the treatment would take place in Washington or another location.

more than 129 people, wounded 500 and chased thousands of Armenians from their homes.

"In the last two years, the central authorities have sought to act in a patient and thoughtful manner, trying to solve difficult problems exclusively by peaceful, political means," Gorbachev said.

But militants had begun threatening to take over the government by force and are killing people, he said.

"This had to stop," said Gorbachev, who also has had to deal with nationalist movements in other republics, including neighboring Georgia, Moldavia and the Baltics.

Iran, which borders Azerbaijan, urged the Soviet government to "resolve the issue by employing peaceful means."

Moscow sent troops to Baku after fighting flared between the Moslem

Azerbaijanis and mainly Christian Armenians. The neighboring republics are locked in a decades-old dispute over the region of Nagorno-Karabakh, which is inside Azerbaijan but populated mainly by Armenians.

Speakers at rallies in Baku were reported to have demanded secession from the Soviet Union and unification with Iran.

Some 5,000 regular army troops and thousands more Interior Ministry soldiers and police have moved in to try to restore order.

Araz Ali-Zade, of the opposition Azerbaijan Social Democratic Group, said 120 Azerbaijani soldiers under the command of a colonel spent the afternoon in a pitched battle with Soviet troops in the Salyanovsky Barracks in downtown Baku.

By evening the shooting stopped, he said in a telephone interview from the city.

## Ethnic unrest at a glance

MOSCOW (AP) — Here is a brief look at the major ethnic problems facing the Soviet Union.

**BALTICS** — The Lithuanian Communist Party in December broke away from Moscow and declared its support for independence. Multiparty elections will be held in February. The other Baltic republics, Latvia and Estonia, have also been pressing the Kremlin for greater autonomy. Latvia and Lithuania have amended their constitutions to allow multiparty systems and end the Communist Party's guarantee of political power. All three republics will serve as laboratories for economic reform and hope to regain the independence they had before being annexed into the Soviet Union in 1940.

**GEORGIA** — The republic neighboring Azerbaijan and Armenia in the Caucasus Mountain region is beset by disputes between minority Abkhazians and Ossetians demanding more autonomy and the majority Georgians. Militant nationalists want to secede from the U.S.S.R.

**FERGANA VALLEY** — One hundred people were killed, homes were set ablaze and thousands of people evacuated from eastern Uzbekistan in June 1989 in a pogrom aimed mostly at minority Meskhetian Turks, who were forcibly resettled from Georgia in the 1940s. Many say overcrowding and lack of jobs caused the situation to explode.

**UKRAINE** — A newly unified grassroots political movement, the Narodni Rukh, seeks to unify groups promoting political reform, religious freedom and preservation of the

Ukrainian language and culture in the country's second-largest republic.

**MOLDAVIA** — Moldavians won the battle to have their language declared the official one and to have the Latin alphabet replace Cyrillic in the republic bordering Romania. The move met stiff resistance from non-Moldavians, who struck factories and offices.

**ETHNIC GERMANS** — Thousands of ethnic Germans who have retained their native language and culture despite having come to Russia in czarist times are being allowed to emigrate to West Germany.

**KAZAKHSTAN** — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's ethnic problems broke into the open in December 1986 when residents rioted over the replacement of Communist Party chief Dinmukhamed Kunayev, a Kazakh, with Russian Gennady Kolbin. A parliamentary committee is looking into claims that many more people died than the two reported.

**CRIMEAN TATARS** — Another group exiled by Stalin from their homeland in the Crimean peninsula are the descendants of the Mongols who terrorized medieval Russia. They are clamoring to return home and carried out a noisy demonstration on Red Square in July 1987.

**NATIONALITIES OF THE FAR NORTH** — Scholars and activists say many very small ethnic groups of the far north are in danger of disappearing or having their cultures ruined by the encroachment of industrial development. Some groups have only a few thousand members.

## Guard who stole thousands gives up

LOS ANGELES (AP) — True to his word, an armored car guard who stole \$651,000 two years ago surrendered to the FBI on Saturday and declared, "America is a great country," as federal agents spirited him away.

Shirtless and wearing only blue jeans and brown leather shoes, Edward Leigh Hunt Jr. walked to the middle of Bixel Street near downtown, raised his arms and surrendered to four FBI agents.

Hunt, 26, showed up as promised at noon in front of the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce. It was the second anniversary of the heist.

"Clear the way," the agents barked at surging reporters and camera crews as they led Hunt, looking pale and frightened beneath wet shoulder-length hair, inside the chamber building.

Several youths who identified themselves only as friends of Hunt applauded and yelled, "Yeah, Lee!" and "Let him speak!" as he was hustled inside.

As he was being hustled away by four FBI agents, Hunt said, "America is a great country."

Hunt wrote in a Dec. 20 letter to his hometown paper, the Wilmington (Del.) News Journal, that he would surrender at noon Saturday at the chamber of commerce and that he had gambled away his take in the Jan. 20, 1988 robbery in Philadelphia.

FBI spokesman Fred Reagan said Hunt was being interviewed by federal agents and would be booked at a U.S. Marshal's office. Hunt was to be arraigned on federal interstate

theft charges on Monday, Reagan said.

"We have indications that he has been in Los Angeles for several months, living in the Hollywood area," Reagan said.

Among the first to stake out the chamber building was a reporter from the News Journal and a camera crew from Fox Television's "America's Most Wanted."

"This is the first time that we've been able to be at the scene of a possible apprehension," said show spokesman Phil Gonzalez. Hunt's story had appeared on the show three times, Gonzalez said.

In his letter, Hunt said he had squandered the money employing a personal "gambling system."

"I stole the money because I thought I could quadruple it through gambling and then I would give half to the company I stole it from," the letter read. "But I lost it all... I screwed up... I'm sorry."

Hunt included a photograph of himself emerging from a swimming pool that was labelled valid by his father, Edward Leigh Hunt, Sr.

On Jan. 20, 1988, Hunt was one of three guards working on a Brooks Armored Car Co. truck in Philadelphia.

Two other guards returned from a bank to the truck to find that Hunt and two bags of cash had disappeared. Millions of dollars in cash, Hunt's gun and a uniform jacket were left behind.

An arrest warrant was issued for Hunt two days later and he was indicted on April 26, 1988, on interstate theft by a Philadelphia grand jury.

### Pro-, anti-abortion protests staged

LOS ANGELES — Demonstrators for and against a woman's right to have an abortion staged protests Saturday to mark the upcoming 17th anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court decision affirming that right.

Pro-choice activists, including Norma McCorvey, the "Jane Roe" who sued the state of Texas in the landmark Roe vs. Wade case, staged a rally at the state building in suburban Van Nuys, 15 miles northwest of downtown Los Angeles.

Participants in the rally sponsored by the National Organization for Women included feminist attorney Gloria Allred, state assembly members Terry Friedman and Tom Bane and musician Ray Manzarek, formerly of The Doors.

About 250 people on both sides of the abortion issue peacefully demonstrated outside a women's clinic in Pacoima, police said. There were no arrests.

### Area air museum to get spy plane

MARCH AIR FORCE BASE — The Lockheed SR-71 "Blackbird" spy planes designed to fly to the edge of space will make their final landings at nine air museums, including one here, the Air Force said.

Edwards, Beale and Castle are the other California Air Force bases to get the SR-71 planes, which are being mothballed because of maintenance and operation costs. Many of their duties have been taken over by satellites and newer planes.

### Bus driver concealed criminal record

LOS ANGELES — A school bus driver charged with drunken driving moments before he picked up schoolchildren used a phony name to get the job and conceal a long history of drunken driving convictions, authorities said.

Harold Keith Lone, 40, of Los Angeles, an employee of Laidlaw Transit Co., was arrested Tuesday outside Lanai Road Elementary after a witness saw the bus he was driving weaving and speeding on the Hollywood Freeway.

Fifty-seven schoolchildren were about to board the bus when Lone was arrested, authorities said.

### Lesbian couple, gay man ordained

SAN FRANCISCO — A lesbian couple and a gay male who refuse to renounce sexual relations were ordained Saturday by two Lutheran congregations defying church policy at the risk of expulsion.

"Our congregation felt this was a social justice issue, that gays are part of the rainbow coalition of God's creation," said the Rev. John Frykman of First United Lutheran Church. His congregation in a working-class San Francisco neighborhood voted last month to hire Jeff Johnson, 26, one of the new ministers. Johnson has refused to take a virtual vow of celibacy, required of homosexual pastors but not normally mandated for heterosexuals.

## NATIONAL BRIEFS

### Navy using strict drug tests

WASHINGTON — The Navy, reversing its forgiving approach to recruits who test positive for marijuana use, has decided that they will be barred from entering the service.

"You test positive for marijuana use — you're gone," said Vice Adm. J. Michael Boorda, the Navy's chief of personnel, in an interview on Friday. "It's an important twist" and shows an increasing lack of tolerance for drug use in the military, Boorda said. "We don't want to lose the battle against drugs."

### Police keep order at King's tomb

ATLANTA — More than 2,500 police and National Guard troops brought their guns Saturday to the tomb of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., the apostle of nonviolence, to protect five white supremacists demonstrating nearby.

"The enemy is at the front door. They want us to hide under the bed," shouted Frankie Johnson, a 20-year-old Atlanta woman among 75 counterdemonstrators who showed up despite suggestions by civil rights groups that they ignore the white supremacists.

Authorities reported no violence at the rally led by Mississippi-based white supremacist Richard Barrett, which was condemned in advance by President Bush.

### Bush's popularity soars in polls

WASHINGTON — President Bush gets a higher approval rating in polls than Ronald Reagan did eight years ago, though only one in five Americans realizes it, a group that studies public awareness of the news said Saturday.

"That perception may prove to be as important to the president as his actual standing in the opinion polls," said Andrew Kohut, director of surveys for Times Mirror Center for People and the Press.

Times Mirror said its latest survey, conducted just after Panamanian dictator Manuel Noriega surrendered to American authorities, showed 81 percent approval of the way Bush is handling his job after a year in office.

### Congress ready to fight red ink battle

WASHINGTON — Reduced east-west tensions are prompting Congress to weigh possible cuts in defense as lawmakers resume their search for ways to turn back a tide of red ink in the federal budget.

Also high on the agenda as lawmakers return to Capitol Hill on Tuesday are ethics legislation, campaign finance reform, President Bush's push to cut the capital gains tax and foreign policy for a rapidly changing world.

But crafting a military budget at a time when Americans perceive a lessening Soviet threat and increased need to reduce the deficit is expected to dominate the 1990 congressional session.

### Report: Israel sold cluster bombs

NEW YORK — The United States suspects that Israel has sent cluster bombs to the Marxist Ethiopian government, The New York Times reported.

Quoting unidentified administration officials, the newspaper said in its Sunday editions there were unconfirmed reports that the Ethiopian government has already used the bombs against rebels in the northern part of the country.

The State Department officials didn't tell the Times when the bombs might have been sent to Ethiopia. Also, it was unclear how many bombs were involved or whether the bombs were made in the United States or Israel.

## WORLD BRIEFS

### U.S. envoys accused of helping rebels

KABUL, Afghanistan — A top military general alleged Saturday that the U.S. ambassador to Pakistan and a State Department envoy directed Moslem rebels in their attack on the eastern city of Jalalabad in March.

Lt. Gen. Abdul Haq Ulumi, a secretary for military forces, also claimed that two Pakistani artillery units participated in the fighting. "The plan to attack Jalalabad was directed under the leadership of Robert Oakley and Peter Thomsen, with the direct participation of two artillery military units of the Pakistan armed forces," Ulumi told foreign journalists. Oakley is the U.S. ambassador to Pakistan, and Thomsen is a State Department envoy.

### Pro-reform demonstrations banned

BEIJING — Mongolia's Communist government banned demonstrations in its capital after a fledgling pro-reform movement staged protests and planned another for today, a foreign source said.

The source, contacted by telephone in the capital, Ulan Bator, said Saturday that the city council placed a temporary ban on demonstrations in squares, main streets, factories and key enterprises. The measure was announced on television and reported in newspapers Friday.

### Pope will visit Czechoslovakia

VATICAN CITY — Pope John Paul II will visit Czechoslovakia before June, accepting the invitation of the new non-Communist government in Prague, a Vatican spokesman said Saturday.

The announcement comes two days after the Czechoslovak government said it wanted to re-establish diplomatic relations with the Vatican, which have been suspended for 40 years.

The Vatican spokesman, Joaquin Navarro, said the date of the visit had not been determined but that it would take place before the Czechoslovak elections scheduled for June 8 and last two or three days. He said the pope generally avoids visiting countries at the time of an election.

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# Economic reality confronts Vietnamese refugees

A freeway sign in Garden Grove reads "Little Saigon," marking one of the enclaves that is home to many of the 250,000 Vietnamese settled in Southern California.

Now the region is receiving the first wave of 100,000 political prisoners allowed to leave Vietnam, and experts are calling on Vietnamese-Americans to help the refugees survive and thrive in America as government funding dwindles.

"My argument to them is look, you've been helped by the American government, the American people and others," said Loc Nguyen, director of the refugee resettlement program for the Catholic Charities of Los Angeles.

"You keep pushing the government to allow more refugees, and say we need more help. I say they are our people ... We have to take care of them," said Nguyen.

The refugees themselves are cautioned about economic realities.

"We explain to them that real life in the United States does not look like on television," said Rev. Bao

Xuan Nguyen. "I ask them, come back with a realistic view. ... If they want to build their own life, everything must start at the beginning."

The Vietnamese community in Los Angeles is estimated at 150,000, with up to 100,000 in adjacent Orange County, officials say, the largest concentration outside of Vietnam.

About 7,000 prisoners of communist Vietnam "re-education" camps — some of whom spent more than a decade imprisoned after the war's end — are expected to be resettled by September.

Of the total 100,000 or so eligible to emigrate to the United States in the next five years, the "lion's share"

are expected to settle in Southern California, said William Gayk, demographer for the County of Orange.

The level of federal assistance available for immigrants has fluctuated over the years and now has dipped to less than a third of what it was six years ago, according to one official.

In 1983, the amount of federal money available for an individual's resettlement was \$12,000, according to Dianne Edwards, director of adult and employment services for the Orange County Social Services Agency. In 1989, it was less than \$4,000, she said.

There are government programs in place to help refugees such as the arriving ex-political prisoners, she said, including cash assistance, medical aid and language and job training.

"We are not anticipating a major drain on country resources as a result of the former POWs," she said. "The issue we are seeking to address is that refugee funding has gone down considerably in the last 10 years."

Leaders in the Vietnamese community, faced with that economic reality, are trying to frame it as an opportunity to unite in support of their newly arrived countrymen.

"The local and federal government has been doing a lot of work to resettle the refugees. We feel we should do our part," said Tony Lam, a businessman who has been active in refugee resettlement in Orange County since his arrival 15 years ago.

In Westminster, where restaurants and shops fronting Vietnamese-language signs evoke a foreign flavor, Rev. Nguyen of the Saigon Christian Reformed Church is working to enlist even recent refugees in the cause.

"I say you wanted me to sponsor you, how about when you have a stable life, you sponsor others," Nguyen said he tells his parishioners. "Do for them what people did for you."

Catholic Charities relies on money from the church and donations to supplement the \$535 the Washington-based organization receives in federal funds for each refugee it sponsors, Loc Nguyen said. The group coordinates with county and state agencies.

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## US won't oppose sending refugees back to Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States will no longer oppose Britain's decision to forcibly send back refugees from Hong Kong to Vietnam, officials say.

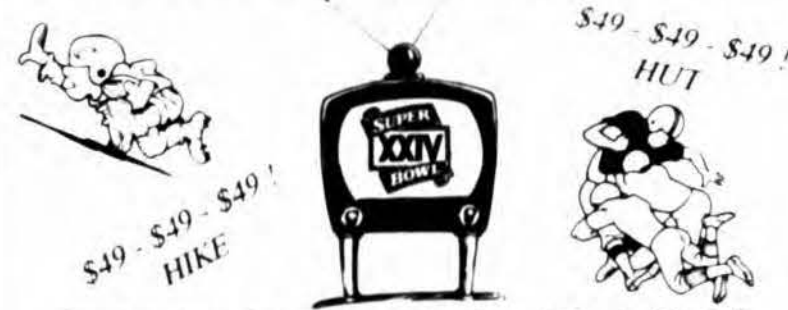
In exchange, the United States is demanding that Britain stop the involuntary repatriation of the refugees for one year. During that time, relief workers will try to convince the "boat people" it is safe for them to go back to Vietnam, said the officials.

The revised U.S. position will be presented at an 18-nation meeting Tuesday in Geneva where a solution will be sought to the growing number of Vietnamese stranded in Hong Kong, Thailand and other Southeast Asian countries.

Britain has indicated it will reject the yearlong moratorium, but a compromise — possibly of six months — is expected to emerge at the two-day meeting, the officials said.

## Pandering wasn't enough to help wealthy developer

SACRAMENTO — The Legislature's most celebrated — nay, notorious — incidence of pandering to special interest pleading in 1989 was a bill that granted a multi-million-dollar tax exemption to one wealthy developer.

The beneficiary was Kenneth Behring, builder of the exclusive Blackhawk residential community in Contra Costa County and the major owner of the Seattle Seahawks football team.

Behring sought the politicians' help to avoid sales taxes on dozens of very valuable, historic autos that he purchased and wanted to donate to a museum he had established in Blackhawk. Eventually, the museum and its cars, which include limousines used by Adolf Hitler, Franklin Roosevelt and Clark Gable, would come under control of the University of California through an arrangement Behring had made with U.C. officials.

Behring had purchased the cars under a dealer's permit that shielded him from paying sales taxes on the assumption that the cars were being held for resale. But if they were to be donated instead of resold, the state Board of Equalization said, the cars would be subject to taxes amounting to several million dollars. The collection's value may be as high as \$100 million.

Behring complained about the tax bite to legislators who were, quite appropriately, assembled for a plush private dinner in his museum. And one of them, state Sen. William Campbell, R-Hacienda Heights, decided to help out his host by introducing legislation that would exempt his automotive donations from state sales taxes.

Because of Behring's wealth and prominence, because the bill arose during the final days of the 1989 legislative session, because there was opposition from the Board of Equalization and some legislators, because it involved Campbell (who had a reputation of bending over backward to help the well-heeled) and because of heightened interest in Capitol influence-peddling, the legislation became a media cause celebre.

Campbell, whose 31st District included parts of Orange County, Behring and university officials who flocked to the Capitol to plug the measure all insisted it was just good government, that whatever benefit the developer received would be more than offset in the long run by the value of the auto collection as it came under U.C. control.

But critics saw it as single-interest legislation of the most blatant sort and wondered aloud whether U.C. was just allowing itself to be used by Behring in an elaborate scheme to obtain tax write-offs while retaining effective control of his rich man's toys.

Ultimately, after much parliamentary maneuvering, the "Behring bill," as it came to be known, was passed and became law.

But, as it turns out, it's not quite the end of the story. Within days of the bill's enactment, the Board of Equalization staff reopened the Behring case and has been auditing the automotive transactions with an eye toward assessing taxes on those cars that he loaned to the museum. The Campbell bill covered only donations and dozens of the cars had been lent for display.

Behring, and in his underlings, immediately contacted Campbell's office and Campbell's staff began leaning on the Board of Equalization staff.

An internal Board of Equalization memorandum dated Nov. 1 describes contacts made by Tom Burns, a Campbell aide, and concludes: "The believed the senator would probably call some of the board members and request that Mr. Behring be given some 'slack' on the tax case."

Burns denies that he was pressuring tax officials to go easy on Behring but says he was angered that the Board of Equalization didn't raise the possibility of taxes on loaned cars when the measure was being drafted. The bill "didn't solve Mr. Behring's problem at all," Burns says.

The matter is still pending in the Board of Equalization bureaucracy with three courses possible. Behring could pay the new tax assessments; the full Board of Equalization could let him off the hook or new legislation could be drafted.

It's unlikely that the board will be overtly lenient because of the notoriety of the situation and the current sensitivity toward special interest influence, especially in a year in which all members of the board will be facing voters. And for that same reason, it will be difficult to win approval of a new tax exemption bill, especially since Campbell himself has now left the Legislature to become president of the California Manufacturers Association.

## HB gets shaft in golf course deal

To the Editor:

The 18-hole golf course currently planned for Central Park is supposedly going to bring the city of Huntington Beach \$40 million in income over the 40-year life of the lease — an average of \$1 million per year. At least that is what City Councilman Wes Bannister and Lynn Shackelford, vice president of American Golf Corp., have said on several occasions.

Assuming these figures to be facts, the gross revenue to American Golf must be at least \$250 million. This number is easy to calculate knowing the proposed lease terms and using the actual financial data from the David L. Baker 18-hole executive course at Mile Square Park. This course, also built and operated by American Golf and very similar to the course proposed for Central Park, has been in operation for 20 months. According to Shackelford, it "has been full from day one."

Wow. That's pretty good. Right? American Golf promises to invest \$4 million in the guaranteed investment

at the David L. Baker course was \$2.5 million and gets a gross return on assets invested of at least one-quarter billion dollars.

Of course \$1 million per year to the city does sound like a lot of money. But is it? Perhaps it would be if the city got \$1 million per year starting with the first year. But it doesn't work that way. The city will first start getting \$1 million per year 25 years from now (around the year 2015). In fact, the city will get even more than that during the balance of the 40-year lease. But the first year income to the city will be \$200,000, and it will only build to \$1 million in the course of the next quarter century.

Just think: In the 40th year of the lease, the income to the city will be nearly \$2.25 million. Actually, Councilman Bannister probably missed a good opportunity here. He could have trumpeted the fact that income to the city will be as high as \$2.25 million dollars per year. Wouldn't that have sounded great?

However, \$2.25 million in the

year 2030 is not quite as impressive as it may sound. The round of golf at David L. Baker course, which costs \$14 today, will then cost \$100. That car you just bought for \$10,750 will then cost \$75,000. The one-half gallon carton of milk which costs \$1.25 now will then cost \$8.75. But that's probably OK, because if you happen to make \$35,000 per year today, you will then be making \$250,000 per year.

Clearly, the \$2.25 million to the city in the last year of the lease (2030) will not buy much more than the \$200,000 provided in the first year of the lease, nor will the \$1 million provided in year 25 of the lease. The simple facts are in terms of today's purchasing power, the yearly income to the city will be around \$200,000 per year for the first five years, \$240,000 per year for the next five years and then about \$335,000 per year for the remaining 30 years of the lease. The jumps in income at years six and 11 result from changes in the revenue sharing arrangement of the proposed lease in those years.

Also, some officials aren't about to question CDEA in other words rock the boat, unless there is some vast outpouring of public opinion on this matter. "Nonsense" You are the leaders in the community, not the followers. As I see it, it's

your duty to both inform and protect the public from potential hazards, and if that involves rocking the boat, well, that's part of your job. At the very least you could publicly announce that the safety of the spraying program is in question and then present both sides of the issue. Following that you can ask the people to express their feelings on the matter. This should be done in the press as well as at city council or other meetings.

Just remember, while you're trying to play it cool, someone is being sprayed with a chemical that may cause cancer, birth defects, learning disabilities, etc. What's next — nuking San Francisco to control AIDS?

## Bank forecast predicts solid job, income gains

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — California will post solid gains in jobs and income in 1990, even though its economy will expand at the slowest rate since the recession years of 1981-82, according to a new forecast.

The state figures will slow because "of a weak national economy," said the Bank of America's annual economic forecast issued on Wednesday.

The report by John Oliver, the bank's chief economist, said a sharp slowing of national economic growth will reduce the market for California goods and services. At the same time, the state will face the challenge of a weakening real estate market and cuts in the defense industry.

"But California will come through this period of difficulty in surprisingly good shape," the forecast said. The state's economy will continue to have essentially full employment and its growth rate will outpace the nation's for the eighth straight year, said Wilson.

"An increase in international trade, business services, and aerospace jobs will more than offset reductions in defense and electronics employment," he said.

Wilson said the number of jobs in the state will increase by 330,000, the smallest increase since 1982. The increase will just match the growth in the labor force in California, keeping unemployment unchanged at about 5.2 percent.

The forecast said both manufacturing and service industries will benefit from "the explosion of international trade through California ports."

The economy will grow at a 2.3 percent annual rate

this year, 0.3 percentage points faster than the nation as a whole. Personal income will grow at 7.6 percent, down from last year's 8.1 percent but still a solid gain.

Turning to real estate, the report forecast that falling interest rates and rising incomes will make California homes more affordable, causing home prices to appreciate about 5 percent this year. Home prices, after increasing rapidly for three years, have leveled off since April 1989. Sales of new and existing homes have declined since March.

The forecast said that "fears of collapsing home prices are unfounded."

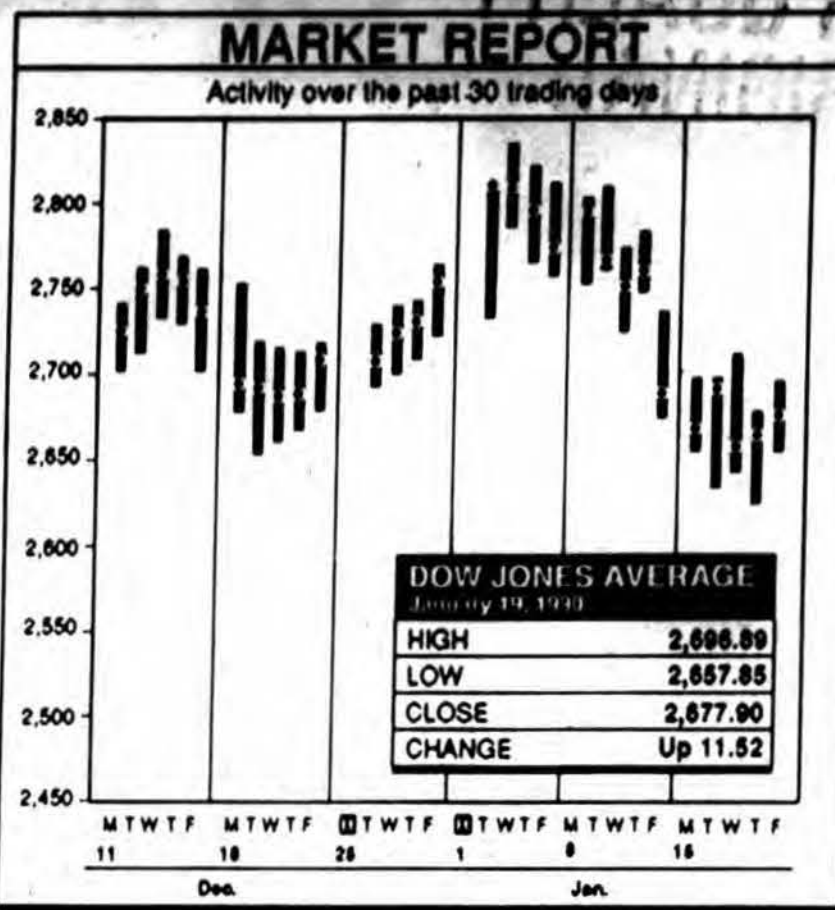
Among other things, it pointed out that the state's population will continue to grow rapidly because of immigration from throughout the world. The forecast also noted that the earthquake that struck Northern California Oct. 17 destroyed billions of dollars worth of real estate and the rebuilding largely will take place in 1990.

The bank's forecast termed "modest" the overall effect of defense cutbacks on California.

"This is because defense spending now accounts for only 7 to 8 percent of the state's output, and much of the money saved by reducing defense spending will be spent on other goods and services in the state," the report said.

The key to economic growth in California in 1990 is the state's industrial diversity, it said.

"This diversity puts California in good shape for continued economic growth in 1990 and beyond," the forecast added.



## Sequoia, Grip-Rite merger complete

The largest independent distributor of building materials in the United States was formed this week when the merger of Sequoia Supply of Irvine and the Grip-Rite Group of White Plains, N.Y. was completed.

The new company, PrimeSource Inc., includes Miller Supply, Metropolitan Wholesale Supply, Guardian Purchasing, Pan American Building Materials and Mid-American Distributing, as well as Sequoia Supply.

In a joint statement, Marvin E. Miller, chairman of Grip-Rite and Paul W. Hylbert, president of Sequoia Supply, said the new company will have sales of over \$450 million and 1,000 employees in 46 distribution centers strategically located throughout the country.

Miller and Hylbert, who will be chairman-chief executive officer and president-chief executive officer, respectively, of PrimeSource also said the key management of the predecessors' companies will form the nucleus of the management team of the new company.

"We are extremely excited about putting these companies together," Miller said. "Combining the strengths of Grip-Rite nails and fasteners with the wood products expertise and geographic coverage of Sequoia will significantly enhance our position in the market," Hylbert added.

Financing for this \$125 million transaction was syndicated by the Bank of New York. The financial structure includes the equity investment of members of management, plus a \$25 million employee stock ownership plan.

Bear Stearns and Mast Resources acted as financial advisers to the transaction.

PrimeSource has distribution centers from coast-to-coast including major markets in Chicago, San Francisco, St. Louis, Dallas-Ft. Worth, Houston, Atlanta, Nashville, Detroit and Seattle.

## Mercury S&L barred from making new loans

Mercury Savings and Loan Association of Huntington Beach has been barred from making investments and new loans, even simple home loans, while regulators decide if it ever can meet tough new rules for thrifts.

Mercury does not meet the regulatory capital requirements imposed by last year's bailout bill for the savings and loan insurance fund — requirements that thrifts set aside more of their own cash as a cushion against risk.

The troubled savings and loan, which has put itself up for sale to raise money to meet those rules, said Friday it had been notified by the federal thrift watchdog agency that it has "substantially insufficient capital."

Similar restrictions on new loans and investments have been imposed

recently at thrifts such as Valley Federal Savings and Imperial Savings. The thrifts' branches can still take deposits and pay interest to customers, and deposits up to \$100,000 are safe because they are federally insured.

Mercury said the Office of Thrift Supervision had barred it from any lending or investment activities except those it had committed to making as of Thursday. Growth restrictions also were imposed, Mercury said.

Leonard Shane, Mercury's chairman and chief executive, said Mercury would appeal some restrictions, hoping for permission to make single-family loans up to \$500,000 that can be sold in the secondary markets.

In a telephone interview, he said Mercury was continuing efforts to "downsize" itself.

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## SF's tourism industry still shaky after quake

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The San Francisco multi-billion dollar tourist industry is still suffering expensive aftershocks three months after the Oct. 17 earthquake.

"We're told the best healer is time — how much time?" asked anxious President Marks of the San Francisco Convention and Visitor Bureau.

Visitors from outside the Bay area spent a \$2.5 billion in the city in 1988, the convention and visitors bureau estimates.

As a result of some recoveries, hotel occupancy rates in the city have shown a slight improvement. While October rates were down 25 percent from a year ago, rates in November were only down 11.5 percent from the previous year, according to a survey by the accounting and consulting firm of Pannell Kerr Forster.

The quake's impact was called impossible to isolate because the city's largest hotel, the 1,500-room San Francisco Marriott, opened its doors the very day of the disaster.

Hotel occupancy rates, however, tell only part of the story. Hotel rooms in the mid-price range —

\$80-\$110 per night — experienced a 27.6 percent drop in business in November against an unusually strong 1988, according to Pannell Kerr Forster.

Part of the reason for the huge slide is the city's other big visitor force, pleasure travel, plunged the first month after the quake, and, observers say, remains off considerably.

To compensate, some tourist-dependent hotels are offering sharp discounts. The Ramada at Fisherman's Wharf has lowered its standard room rate to \$59 a night from \$120, according to San Francisco Reservations, a central booking business for city hotels.

The drop-off in pleasure travel probably prevented San Francisco, which had an estimated record 2.92 million visitors in 1988, from breaking the 3 million mark last year, says Marks.

Experts say that the wharf area is the hardest hit neighborhood. It is the most popular destination for visitors. Their next-favorite business districts are downtown, Chinatown and Union Square.

## Shoe's long ride nearly over

When Bill Shoemaker rode his first winner, Harry Truman was President of the United States.

Shoe had already been riding race horses for 12 years before the Berlin Wall was built. Nine Presidents have served the U.S. during Shoemaker's long and illustrious gallop as the nation's all-time leading jockey.

And did you know there were only 48 states when he began, Alaska and Hawaii? Shoe had already won two Kentucky Derbys before they joined the Union.

Now he's a tiny, silver-haired gentleman of few words who stands about half the size of his wife, Cindy, and can look his nine-year-old daughter, Amanda, square in the eye if she isn't wearing dress-up heels.

However, 58-year-old Shoemaker — once known as Willie but nowadays as "Little Bill" — long ago proved that size doesn't make the man. In a very dangerous sport where strength, courage, talent, touch, split-second timing, and common sense must all meld together for a participant to survive, Shoemaker has been a giant.

Now he's about to take his last ride. Actually, he's been taking it for months and months. Shoe has been touring the world, tipping his cap, listening to the applause, riding "one more time" for racetracks everywhere. If he receives one more piece of engraved silver or china he can open his own gift shop.

This weekend he received another standing ovation at Gulfstream Park in Florida and there is always the outside chance he'll make another appearance somewhere else within the next two weeks. The next-and-final Official Last Ride, however, will really be the last one and it happens on Saturday, Feb. 3, at Santa Anita.

The day Shoe hops out of the irons for the last time will, indeed, be a special day, with TV coverage, a press box clogged with national turf writers, and thousands of customers poised to say, "I was there."

Little Bill will ride one horse that Saturday in the fifth race, a \$100,000 overnight handicap on the turf at one mile, and you can be assured that Shoe's agent, Bill Barsoff, will have him on a live mount.

No, skeptics, the race won't be rigged. But you know the house wants him to win, if not for history, for the fact that people who wager on Shoe may opt to save their winning tickets for souvenirs instead of cashing them.

And if Gentleman Bill wants to cut somebody off on the turn for home on Feb. 3, so be it. What can the stewards do, give him days?

At last count, Bill Shoemaker had ridden more than 40,300 thoroughbreds in races and had finished first 8,829 times. Hey, George Blanda began his career the same year Shoe began riding horses (1949) and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar was a two-year-old toddler!

Amy Zimmerman of Santa Anita's publicity department has done a remarkable job of researching Shoemaker's career and establishing a chronological timeline linking this great athlete to events of racing and the outside world.

Example: The year (1949) that Shoe rode that first winner, Shafter V., at Golden Gate, was the same year jockey Sandy Hawley was born. By the time Gary Stevens rode his

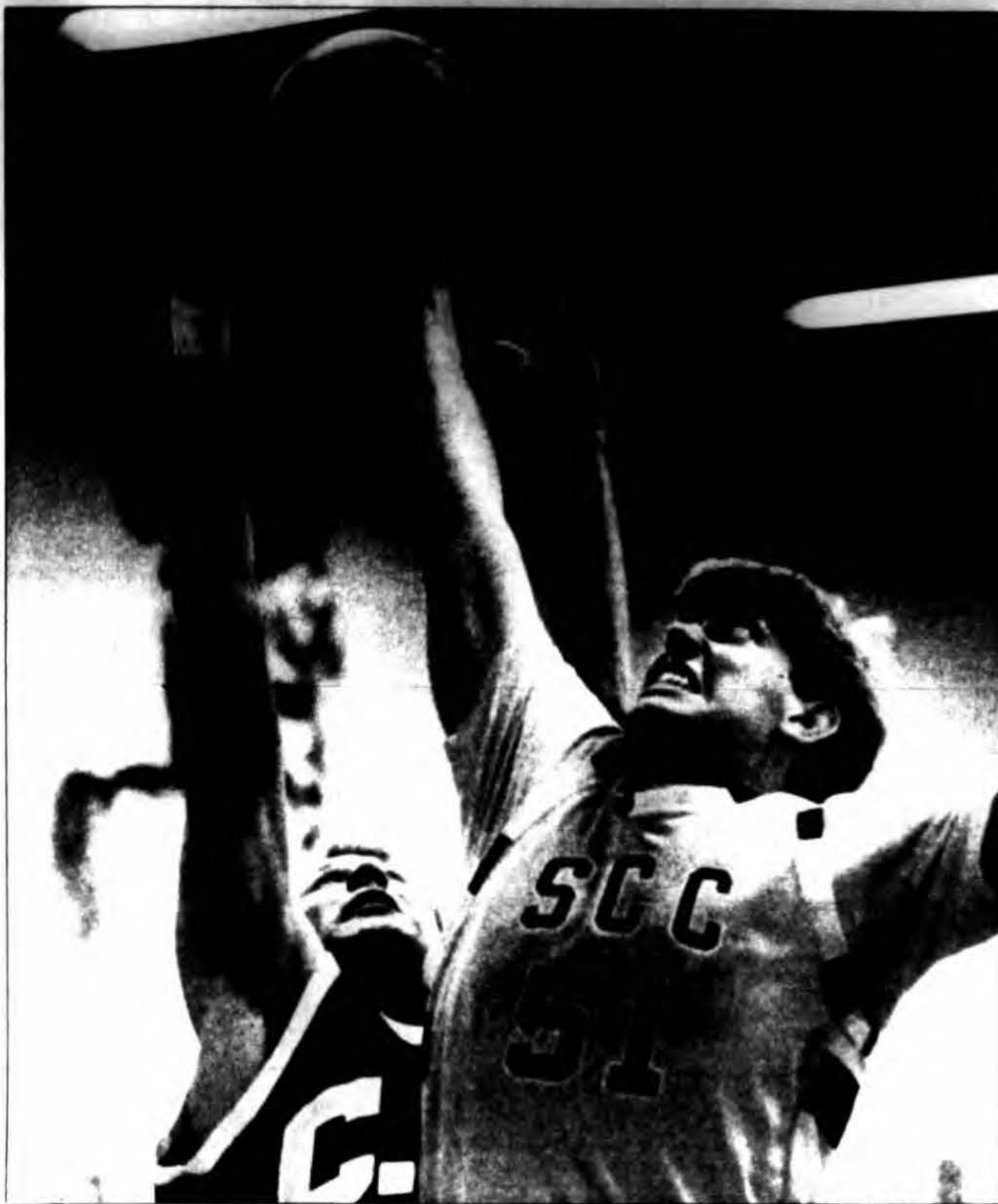
It was UCI's flash of enthusiasm at the end that warrants further mention.

## Jacobsen gets a little help

He leads Hope by two as others falter

LA QUINTA — Peter Jacobsen got some help — unintentional help, but help nevertheless — from his friends in establishing a two-shot lead Saturday in the Bob Hope Classic.

Jacobsen, a noted mimic and sometimes comic — though hardly in the same category as his host — did all he could on his own behalf with a bogey-free 66 at Bermuda Dunes.

That, alone, might have been enough to provide him with the top spot going into today's final round of this unique, four-course, five-day, 90-hole tournament.

But he also got the benefit of the self-inflicted disasters that struck 1989 Player of the Year Tom Kite and Don Pooley, the third-round leader.

Kite and Pooley each led or shared the lead during the round, but neither could stay on top.

Kite stumbled to a bogey-bogey finish and Pooley had a shattering four-putt double bogey from 12 feet on his 16th hole.

"That's two days in a row I've

played awfully well for 16 holes, then couldn't get it to the house," Kite said. "It's very disappointing, a little disturbing."

He missed a two-foot par-saving putt on his 17th hole and hit into the water on the next one. He still salvaged a 69 on the Arnold Palmer course at PGA West and was four shots back at 272.

The late-day problems followed a similar collapse Friday, when he three-putted his last two holes and still ended up with a 64.

"That's two days in a row I've played awfully well for 16 holes, then couldn't get it to the house," Kite said. "It's very disappointing, a little disturbing."

Pooley, once in the lead alone, took himself out of it with his disastrous 16th hole at Tamarisk, where he shot a 73 and dropped six strokes back.

Jacobsen, whose last official PGA Tour triumph came six years ago, completed a circuit of one round on each of four desert courses at 268, 20 under par for 72 holes.

"That's it, isn't it? It's all over, isn't it?"

"Oh, we go another round?" he

jokingly asked and answered himself.

The 72-hole distance is the standard for Tour events. But there's another 18 holes to go, at the Palmer course, in this unique event.

But the tournament, which has been spread over courses separated by 20 miles and featured three-man amateur teams playing for four days, now becomes a little more ordinary.

The amateurs, many of them show-business celebrity friends of the host, concluded their play Saturday. The field was trimmed and only the pros will play the final round at the Arnold Palmer course at PGA West.

With Kite and Pooley self-destructing in the late going, Mike Reid came on to claim second at 270 with a 67 at Indian Wells.

Jacobsen's 6-under-par effort came at Bermuda Dunes.

Australian Steve Elkington had a 69 at Bermuda Dunes and was alone in third place at 271.

Ted Schulz and former U.S. Open winner Scott Simpson were tied with Kite at 16-under. Schulz had a 67 at the Palmer course and Simpson shot 68 at Indian Wells.

Bob Tway was alone at 273 after a 69 at the Palmer course.

## Capitals put brotherly love in Murray clan to stiff test

LANDOVER, Md. — Bryan Murray and Terry Murray had foreseen that this could happen. They had even talked about it.

That didn't make it any easier for either one Monday when Bryan was

replaced by Terry as the head coach of the Washington Capitals. It was the first time in the history of the NHL that one brother had taken over for another as head coach.

"It was always in the back of my mind," Terry Murray said about the

possibility of replacing Bryan.

"Going back four or five years ago, sitting down at dinner we did talk about it, that this scenario could happen."

In that vaguely remembered dinner conversation, it was Bryan Murray who knew what would be best for Terry Murray.

"I remember him saying, 'It would be very, very difficult for me to do it,'" Bryan Murray said. "I said, 'It would be wise for you to accept the job.'"

In an ironic twist, it turns out that Terry Murray has worked the past 7½ years at becoming the best possible replacement for Bryan, who had coached the Capitals for more than

eight years. During that time, Terry had also grown much closer to his older brother than he had been when the two were growing up in a tiny Canadian town of Shawville in the province of Quebec.

Bryan, 47, is the third of 10 children. Terry, 39, is seventh in line.

"Growing up in a very big family, there wasn't a very close relationship, considering the eight-year difference," Terry said.

"Our relationship really blossomed after I turned pro and Bryan got the desire to be a coach," Terry said. "We spent a lot of time talking hockey and then (during the

1980-81 season) when he became the coach at Hershey, Pa., he came and watched me play in Philadelphia and we'd go out and talk."

The next season, Terry was acquired by the Capitals and Bryan became the team's coach after 14 games. A year after that, Terry retired as a player and became Bryan's assistant.

For six seasons, Bryan and Terry worked as coach and assistant coach. There were no doubt hundreds of conversations about hockey, the game and its strategies. The two had grown closer personally, but they were far apart in their views on the game.

"I've had times," said Capitals

General Manager David Poile. "When we've sat down, we've had meetings or what have you, and whether it would be to myself or to somebody else and you'd say, 'You'd never believe these guys are brothers.'"

"If you'd been around some of the discussions we had. These guys would leave and go their separate directions because they didn't agree with what the other said," Poile said. "(Bryan Murray) would say, 'Terry, when you get a chance to run the team you can do it your way, but tonight this is what we're doing.' That happened many times."

So, when Terry got the chance to

## Nicholls vents anger after being dealt from Kings to NY Rangers

PITTSBURGH — Bernie Nicholls was upset and disappointed after being traded by Los Angeles to the New York Rangers on Saturday, one day before he was scheduled to represent the Kings in the NHL All-Star Game.

Nicholls, a 70-goal scorer in 1988-89 and third in the NHL in points this season, was dealt to the Rangers for a pair of right wings, Tomas Sandstrom and Tony Granato.

The 28-year-old center, who had spent his entire career with Los Angeles, was the subject of trade rumors for the past week. He was upset with the deal and the way it was handled.

"I just don't understand why they would make a deal like that," he said. "It just doesn't make any sense. Considering the players involved, I don't think the Kings got fair value for me."

Nicholls also was displeased with the way the deal was handled, saying he felt he should have been told earlier.

"If they knew they were going to make the trade, they should have let me know before I left the West Coast," he said. "I didn't really have to be at the All-Star Game. It would have been easier, under the circumstances, for me to stay home."

Despite the trade, which involves a switch in conferences, Nicholls will skate for the Campbell Conference in today's All-Star Game at the Pittsburgh Civic Arena.

Nicholls said he was "disappointed with the Kings. I have done a lot for the team in nine years and this kind of thing hurts."

"I hoped to end my career in L.A. I really consider it my home now and I thought I'd always be wearing a Kings' jersey. I have a lot of friends there and I love the weather. It's going to be hard finding a golf game in New York next week."

General manager Rogie Vachon said he had to do something to shake up the Kings, who were 0-6-1 before beating Detroit 9-4 on Thursday. Nicholls was scoreless during the seven-game slump before getting three assists against the Red Wings.

"This is the toughest move I've ever made as a general manager," Vachon said in a statement. "Considering my personal friendship with Bernie and all he has done for the Kings during his career makes this very hard."

"I didn't want to make a deal, but at this point, we have little choice. The team lacks chemistry and a change needed to be made."

## North romps in Senior Bowl

MOBILE, Ala. — Coach Buddy Ryan of the Philadelphia Eagles said others would have to explain how the North beat his South team, 41-0, in the 41st Senior Bowl game Saturday.

"They ran the same offense we did," Ryan said. "They ran the same defense we did. They scored 41 points. We scored none. You explain it."

The explanation was simple enough.

LSU's Tommy Hodson passed for 91 yards and two touchdowns in the first quarter and Penn State's Blair Thomas ran for 137 yards on 11 carries and caught two passes for 19.

"I probably shouldn't say this, but the South probably practiced too hard," said Thomas, named the game's most valuable player. "They got a little fatigued."

## McEnroe disqualified

MELBOURNE, Australia — John McEnroe, reverting back to his old behavior by cursing the umpire and throwing rackets, was disqualified today from the Australian Open for conduct code violations.

The action by umpire Gerry Armstrong, with McEnroe leading Mikael Pernfors, 6-1, 4-6, 7-5, 2-4, in a fourth-round match, triggered raucous booing among the crowd of 15,000 at center court.

Meanwhile, defending champions Ivan Lendl and Steffi Graf overcame unusually sloppy play, while American amateur sensation Angelica Gavaldon kept rolling to reach the quarterfinals.

Gavaldon, an effervescent 16-year-old from Coronado, who entered as a qualifier ranked 192nd in the world, upset 15th-seeded Gigi Fernandez, 6-3, 1-6, 6-2.

Gavaldon, who takes high school correspondence courses, is playing her first professional tournament outside the United States and is the youngest player left in the year's first Grand Slam tennis tournament.

Gavaldon, who beat former two-time champion Hana Mandlikova in the third round, next meets West Germany's Claudia Porwik, who beat South African Dinky van Rensburg, 7-6, 3-6, 6-4.

Lendl had 46 errors, yet never was threatened in beating Simon Youl of Australia, 6-1, 6-3, 6-1.

Graf started with an ace and ended with another one to notch her 45th straight victory, 6-2, 6-3, over 13th-seed Raffaella Reggi of Italy.

Helena Sukova, who lost the 1989 final against Graf, ended the surprising surge of Japan's Kimiko Date, 6-4, 6-3.

## Red Sox hoping for Presley

While the Boston Red Sox still hope to trade for Jim Presley, other teams spent Saturday working on their own deals.

Carlton Fisk signed a one-year contract with the Chicago White Sox and the Texas Rangers and Pete Incaviglia reached agreement on a one-year pact. A day after clubs and players exchanged salary arbitration figures, Atlanta and Lonnie Smith also seem close.

Boston and Seattle have been talking about a trade involving Presley and Red Sox general manager Lou Gorman said the deal was "going to get done."

Presley was an All-Star third baseman in 1986 when he hit 27 homers, drove in 107 runs and batted .265. But Presley, 29, has not duplicated those numbers again and last season hit .236 with 12 home runs and 41 RBIs.

Presley lost his starting job last year and Mariners manager Jim Lefebvre said he now considers Darnell Coles the team's No. 1 third baseman.

"The Mariners know I want to be traded and they've said they were working on it," Presley said. "I believe them and I hope something happens soon. I've done everything but rant and rave."

Seattle general manager Woody Woodward said the Mariners have talked to Boston about outfielder Carlos Quintana, 25. Quintana has shown power in the minors and played briefly for the Red Sox last season.

If the trade happens, Presley probably would play first base for Boston, which has Wade Boggs at third base, and also fill in as the designated hitter. The Red Sox lost first baseman Nick Esasky to free agency and have been searching for right-handed power.

## Clemson threatens boycott

Clemson's football team will boycott the 1990 season unless Danny Ford is reinstated as coach or one of his assistants is named as his successor, players said Saturday.

"Until the team is satisfied, until we get an explanation and get what we want, our intentions are to boycott this season," tight end Stacy Fields said during a news conference at Mauldin Hall, the university's athletic dormitory. Fields was joined by teammates Vance Hammond, Eric Harmon and Scott Beville. They said the team voted unanimously for the boycott Friday night.

Ford hasn't explained why he resigned less than two weeks after the NCAA accused Clemson of recruiting and other violations.

## Broncos on schedule with a week to go before game

DENVER — The NFL will undoubtedly subject them to another week of Super Bowl buildup, but the Denver Broncos have the bulk of their game plan installed and could play this weekend if required.

The Broncos wrapped up three days of practices on Saturday with a 90-minute workout under their inflatable "bubble." Special teams and the passing game received heavy emphasis.

"I feel like we've had three really good days of practice," Coach Dan Reeves said. "We're on schedule."

"We've got some finishing touches left, but most of the game plan is in. We've approached this week almost like a regular-season game. We could play Sunday (today) if we had to."

Wide receiver Ricky Nattiel and defensive end Ron Holmes rejoined workouts after sitting out the Thursday and Friday drills, both with tendinitis in their knees.

"Ron really looked good," Reeves said. "He should have no trouble playing."

Tight end Clarence Kay, who has a strained thigh muscle, did not

practice for the third straight day. Running back Bobby Humphrey, who has two cracked ribs and is not scheduled for contact until the Broncos resume workouts in New Orleans, was excused from the workout.

Humphrey is in Washington, D.C., where he will be honored by the Washington Touchdown Club as the AFC Rookie of the Year.

Humphrey will join his teammates today in New Orleans. The Broncos leave Denver on a charter flight at noon Sunday, arriving in New Orleans at about 3:30 p.m.

Reeves joked that he requested he be allowed to bring his team to New Orleans five days late, "but the league wouldn't go for it."

NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue granted the Cleveland Browns a waiver, allowing them to arrive in Denver for the AFC Championship game 24 hours in advance, instead of the required 48 hours. The Broncos had protested that decision.

Reeves noted that his team is altering its preparations for the San Francisco 49ers compared to Super Bowls in January 1987 and 1988, when Denver was blown out by the New York Giants and Washington

Redskins. "Our game plan is already in instead of waiting until Super Bowl week, and we're going on Sunday instead of Monday," he said. "We'll try to keep the players more isolated once we're down there. We'll have a team dinner Saturday night and remain as a group, instead of having people go their own way."

Reeves said he will enforce an 11 p.m. curfew for his players beginning on Tuesday.

Saturday's practice was the final one at the Broncos' Adams County headquarters, ending 25 years there. The team is scheduled to move into a \$10 million facility in Arapahoe County starting March 1.

"I'd forgotten about that," Reeves said when reminded by the media. "This is the last one. It's been a great facility for us, but I think we're all looking forward to moving into the new one. We'll see the bubble again. It will just be in a different location."

The new 13½-acre facility includes a 55,000-square-foot office building. There will be two 100-yard grass practice fields, one of which will have underground heating coils, and a 70-yard artificial turf which will be covered by the "bubble."

## 49ers make final plans for journey to New Orleans

SANTA CLARA (AP) — The San Francisco 49ers held a final, 90-minute light workout at their training facility Saturday and packed to head for New Orleans and the Super Bowl today.

"We've got the foundation of our game plan in," Coach George Seifert said. "We've covered mostly all areas except for short yardage."

Free safety Ronnie Lott (thigh bruise), rookie running back Keith Henderson (pinched neck nerve) and rookie tight end Wesley Walls (flu) did not practice.

Only Henderson is questionable for next Sunday's game against Denver, with special teams captain and backup fullback Harry Sydney in line to replace him.

Seifert's predecessor, Bill Walsh, was a guest at practice for the first time in several weeks. Walsh chatted with the coaches and then joked to reporters that he had "decided to take over" as he headed into the closed locker room.

The players were in an upbeat mood after the practice without pads.

"I'm like a big kid — I'm excited about it," said linebacker Keena Turner, one of five 49ers to play on all three of San Francisco's Super Bowl championship teams. "I don't think you can ever get enough of them."

Comparing the title teams, he said: "This team has really been able to focus. If you'd told me at the start of the season we'd be without Michael Carter for most of the year and without Jeff Fuller and had to survive a tremendous earthquake, I wouldn't have believed it."

Chet Brooks, who took over Fuller's strong safety job when Fuller suffered a serious nerve injury on Oct. 22, is one of the few San Francisco starters who has no Super Bowl experience. Brooks, a second-year player, finished his rookie season on injured reserve with a left knee injury.

"I haven't played in the Super Bowl, so I'm trying to make sure guys stay focused," he said. "I want to play in this and I want to win it."

Cornerback Tim McKyer, who has asked to be traded, might not get another chance to play in the Super Bowl for the 49ers. He said again that he just wants to be judged on how he performs on the field, not on any controversial remarks he might make.

## Clippers win in last three seconds

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Rookie Jeff Martin converted a midcourt inbound pass from teammate Danny Manning into a lay-in with 2.7 seconds left in the game to lift the Los Angeles Clippers to a 97-95 victory over Minnesota Saturday night, the Timberwolves' 18th loss in 20 games.

Manning and Charles Smith each had 24 points for the Clippers, who have won eight of their last 11 games and two in a row since losing leading scorer Ron Harper for the season with a knee injury.

The victory put Los Angeles within one game of the .500 mark, their best start since they moved here from San Diego six seasons ago.

Tony Campbell scored 27 for the

Timberwolves, who were held under 100 points for the 27th time in 37 games. It was Minnesota's sixth straight defeat and 10th in a row on the road.

# 'Born on Fourth...' steals awards show

BEVERLY HILLS — "Born on the Fourth of July," the powerful Vietnam drama, won a leading four Golden Globes at an emotional awards ceremony Saturday night, including best dramatic picture, best dramatic actor for Tom Cruise and best director.

"Driving Miss Daisy," the account of a Southern spinster's relationship with her black chauffeur, collected three awards, including best musical or comic motion picture.

Ron Kovic, the disabled veteran whose story was the basis for "Born on the Fourth of July," received a standing ovation in accepting the film's fourth award — best screenplay for a dramatic picture, an award he shared with co-writer and director Oliver Stone at the 47th Annual Golden Globe Awards.

Injured in the war 22 years ago to the day, Kovic said in his acceptance speech that when he was shot, "I didn't even know if I was going to get off the field and live. This is the happiest day of my life."

The film, a chronicle of Kovic's transformation from a patriotic soldier to a war protester, was 12 years in the making.

Michelle Pfeiffer was named best actress in a dramatic motion picture for "The Fabulous Baker Boys."

In the television competition, the CBS series "Murphy Brown" won as best musical or comic television series, ABC's "China Beach" was named best dramatic TV series and "Lonesome Dove" won for best mini-series or television movie.

The Golden Globe winners in dramatics series for acting were Ken Wahl, the star of "Wiseguy," and Angela Lansbury, who stars in "Murder, She Wrote." Christine Lahti was named best actress in a mini-series or television movie for her performance in "No Place Like Home," a drama about a homeless family in America.

Robert Duvall won for best actor in a mini-series or TV movie for "Lonesome Dove."

Other television awards went to Ted Danson ("Cheers") and Jamie Lee Curtis ("Anything But Love"), named best actor and actress in a television series.

In the movie competition, "Driving Miss Daisy" also captured trophies for best actor and actress in a musical or comic motion picture, for Morgan Freeman and Jessica Tandy.

World premieres are becoming almost commonplace at South Coast Repertory, and the theater's Collaboration Laboratory — along with some important corporate grants — will ensure the continuation of this trend.

Ever since 1965 — when the newborn SCR company included the first-ever production of Mel Shapiro's "The Trial of Gabriel Kapuniak" (with founding director Martin Benson in a rare acting role) in its initial season — the introduction of new works has been a priority with the professional resident theater.

Those early groundbreaking days included Laguna Beach writer Ian Bernard's "Chocolates" and the fabulously successful rock-ecology musical "Mother Earth" by Ron Thronson and Toni Shearer (now known professionally as singer Toni Tennille). But it wasn't until the company moved from downtown Costa Mesa to its present two-theater complex near South Coast Plaza in 1978 that the world premiere ball really began rolling.

Since 1981, the company has produced 30 world premieres, including the current Mainstage production of the black comedy "Search and Destroy" by Howard Korder.

And, while its theme may reflect an anti-establishment hue, its existence is due in part to a very establishment organization: AT&T.

The communications giant has inaugurated a program called its "New Plays for the Nineties Project," under which it produces original works around the country. "Search and Destroy" is one of six plays being presented under grants of \$50,000 from AT&T this year, and was chosen from a field of 35 submissions.

"The commitment of AT&T to this play has not only ensured that the unique, challenging voice of this important playwright will be heard with the clarity and quality it deserves," commented David Emmes, SCR's producing artistic director. "It has allowed SCR to keep moving aggressively to encourage more plays from other distinctive writers."

"Search and Destroy" was developed through SCR's Collaboration Laboratory (Colab), a multi-faceted program that offers playwrights assistance in developing their scripts from conception to production.

It is one of six plays visible this month at various stages of development. Others are "Holy Days," which will receive its American premiere on the Second Stage Jan. 26; "The Russian Teacher," a comedy

by Soviet writer Alexander Buravsky, adapted by playwright Keith Reddin, which will be given a reading Jan. 22 in the theater's NewScripts series; "Gift Rap," a musical by Richard Hellesen and Michael Silbersher for SCR's 1990 Educational Touring Production; and two plays from the theater's Hispanic Playwrights Project, under development after initial readings.

"Search and Destroy" was commissioned by SCR and developed through a NewScripts reading last February. David Chambers, an associate artist with the company, teamed with Korder in the play's development and directed the current production.

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# The Land DOWN UNDER

Australia, the big, sprawling Land Down Under, offers some of the most diverse and unusual sights to be found anywhere.

This island-continent's three million square miles contain tropical rain forests and red deserts, unusual rock formations and sandy beaches, metropolitan cities and the great Outback.

Plus, it is home to countless varieties of indigenous plants and animals, including more than 6,000 species of wildflowers, and, of course, the quaint kingdom of marsupials: kangaroos and koalas, wallabies, wombats, and others who share the bushlands with enormous numbers of imported sheep and cattle.

Roughly equal in size to the U.S., Australia seems a familiar country to Americans — even to first-time visitors, who sense the same kind of pioneering spirit that settled their own country. For that reason, as well as its natural wonders, Americans have been visiting Australia in greater numbers every year.

Vacationing Down Under became more practical with the advent of jet

air travel, which drastically reduced the transit time.

Currently, you can fly from Los Angeles to Australia any day of the year, with seven international airlines (American, Air New Zealand, Continental, Pan Am, Qantas, United, and UTA French Airlines), offering flights for less than \$1,000 roundtrip. Special fares, when available, can make the price tag even lower.

Because of Australia's size, most visitors tailor their itineraries to include the geographical areas most appealing to them, and then hope to return another time to explore still further.

Following are highlights of the sights and attractions available in a number of areas of the country: CAIRNS

Pronounced "Cahns" by the locals, this city on the northeastern tip of the country is a gateway to that eighth wonder of the world, the Great Barrier Reef, a 1,250-mile-long area of shoals, reefs, and coral cays.

Cairns, itself, a popular resort with its year-round sunny climate, and the local port is a major departure point for scuba and snorkeling excursions, black marlin fishing, and trips to

nearby Green, Dunk, and Lizard Islands.

Cairns' international airport is large enough to allow major airlines to make direct flights there from Honolulu and elsewhere.

BRISBANE  
Down the coast from Cairns is subtropical Brisbane, located in the middle of a long stretch of popular beaches and coastal vacationland.

South of the city is the Gold Coast, 19 miles of white sand beaches paralleling resort hotels, restaurants, amusement parks, and shops.

The Sunshine Coast, north of Brisbane, is much less developed. This serene environment boasts an uncrowded sandy shoreline with some excellent stretches for surfing.

Brisbane is also the home of Lone Pine Sanctuary, the first koala sanctuary established in this country, and today still the largest, with over 100 koalas in addition to many other native animals inhabiting the 50-acre reserve next to the Brisbane River. Tour buses are greeted at the gate by a koala named Jockey who rides on the back of an amiable German Shepherd.

Guests are free to roam around the

grounds, feed the kangaroos and wallabies, and hold a cuddly koala. Some unusual species on display include Tasmanian devils, wombats, quokkas, platypuses, and a rare albino koala.

Lone Pine, open daily, can be reached by bus or river ferry from downtown Brisbane.

SYDNEY  
There is much to see and do in Sydney, a city larger than Los Angeles.

One of the must-see attractions is the internationally famous Opera House, perched at the edge of the harbor like a large ship with eight white sails.

Aussie humorists have dubbed the structure "Operasaurus" and describe it colorfully as resembling eight French nuns playing football, or an opera house eight sheets to the wind. Nevertheless, the building's innovative design and perfect acoustics have received top marks from architects, engineers, and musicians around the world. The building is open for tours daily except Saturday.

Another worthwhile activity in Sydney is a cruise around the city's harbor. Please see DOWN UNDER C2.

## AUSTRALIAN Travel Tips

The following are some travel tips for first-time visitors to Australia:

**TRAVEL DOCUMENTS:** You will need both a passport and a visa to enter Australia. Two pictures are required for the passport, one for the visa.

**VACCINATIONS:** These are not required of travelers from the U.S. or Canada.

**QUARANTINES:** In order to keep the country free from outside insect pests and diseases, the bringing in of any food, animal, or plant items is strictly controlled and must be declared. If in doubt, inquire before you leave home.

Also, the interiors of all aircraft arriving in Australia are sprayed after landing, to exterminate any disease-carrying, flying insects. The spraying takes just a few minutes, and the odor is not unpleasant.

**CURRENCY:** Australia deals in dollars and cents, but there are no dimes or quarters. There is a one dollar coin, plus one-, two-, five-, 20-, and 50-cent pieces. Notes come in two-, five-, 10-, 20-, 50-, and 100-dollar denominations.

**CURRENCY EXCHANGE:** The best rate of exchange is available at city banks. Airport exchange facilities and most hotels also provide this service but at a higher service charge. Traveler's checks are easily cashed at any of the foregoing.

**CLIMATE:** Australia's seasons are the opposite of those in the Northern Hemisphere. September to November is spring; December to February, summer; March to May, autumn; and June to August, winter. The country's tropical regions are in the north, while the temperate zones are in the south. Thus, it's generally warm all year in the north, whereas winter days can sometimes be cool and rainy in the south.

**TIME:** Traveling to Australia takes you across the International Date Line and involves an 18-hour time difference between Pacific Standard Time and Sydney's time. When it is 10 a.m. one day in Sydney, it is 4 p.m. the previous day in Los Angeles.

**METRICS:** Fourteen years ago, the country converted to the metric system, which means that you will see

## Wildlife Across the Water

Where else but in Australia can you have a picnic lunch and find that you have a whole family of wallabies eager to join in and share everything with you?

The friendly marsupials hop alongside as you walk from your car to a picnic enclosure (tables are inside a low-fenced area, so that you don't have to share any more of your lunch than you choose to).

After you've closed the gate, the wallabies patiently wait outside, peering through the fence and hoping for a handout.

Here, it is the humans who are on the inside, looking out at the animals — a scene that takes place daily in Flinders Chase National Park on Kangaroo Island, 70 miles offshore from Adelaide.

As part of our visit to eastern and southern Australia, we reserved several days for this island, as a place where we could experience some of rural Australia.

Most of Kangaroo Island's population (about 4,000) lives at the eastern end, around the towns of Kingscote, American River, and Penneshaw, while much of the western end (about a one-and-a-half hour drive from Kingscote) is national parkland and wildlife preserves — a perfect home for the island's kangaroos, wallabies, and various other animals.

On the morning after our arrival, we drove to Seal Bay, one of the largest known breeding colonies of the Australian sea lion, with a seal population of about 500. The bay's central beach provides a rare opportunity to observe families of sea lions at very close range. Exceptionally tolerant of humans, these creatures allowed us to walk among them as the older ones basked in the sun and the babies played in the sand.

The next day, we explored the island's Kelly Hill Caves. Local tradition credits the caves' discovery in

1880 to a stockman whose horse (named Kelly) fell into a sinkhole and was never found. The cave system contains a spectacular display of all kinds of calcite formations. Tours, conducted by park rangers, are available throughout each morning and afternoon.

It was after our morning tour of the caves that we drove to Flinders Chase National Park, where the wallabies joined us for lunch. Then we headed out to the park's coastline to see the Remarkable Rocks, giant boulders sculpted by wind and water into very unusual shapes.

We spent part of our final day at Vivonne Bay. In addition to its long, sandy beach — excellent for beachcombing — this area also offers some striking views of the island's southern coastline.

IF YOU GO

Accommodations on Kangaroo Island include hotels, motels, and lodges in a range of prices from inexpensive to deluxe. The Ozone, Kingscote's main hotel, has both a formal dining room and a bistro for casual dining.

Transportation from Adelaide to the island can be arranged by air (50 minutes) from Adelaide International Airport or by ferry (about six and a half hours). Also, the Hydro Flite H33 operates a three-hour shuttle between North Haven Marina and Kingscote.

While on the island, you can rent a car, use your own car if you come via ferry, or join one of several bus or package tours.

# New fashion soft and sexy

PARIS — Soft and alluringly sexy are the way couturiers see women and their clothes for next summer in early sneak previews of haute couture shows.

Designers are frantically stitching up hems — very short — for the shows that get under way this week-end. Luxury clothes are more feminine than ever: softer shoulders, deeper décolletés, flounces and embroideries.

The shows will be more Italian than ever, with Gianfranco Ferré now haute couturier for Dior, and Angelo Tarlazzi designing for Guy Laroche's couture house, following Laroche's death last winter.

Gianni Versace also is giving a show of his "Atelier" styles and a gala dinner at the Hotel Ritz on Saturday night.

"Paris is the best showcase," said Versace, who displayed his furred and fussy clothes on mannequins at a museum last season but considers this show with live models his real Paris couture debut.

But Italians won't be grabbing all the headlines.

Fashion-watchers are looking forward to the Lanvin show with French designer Claude Montana at the design helm. Will the avant-garde creator produce the kind of opulent elegance usually seen at this venerable house? They'll find out on Tuesday with the Lanvin show near the Ecole Militaire.

As the first French couturier to breach the Iron Curtain, Pierre Cardin has manufactured and sold clothes in the Soviet Union for several years. He was instrumental in helping set up a French model agency, "Glamour," there last fall,

and he encouraged the Soviet government to accord professional status to models.

Besides higher hemlines, the upcoming 25 couture shows include billowy organzas by Ferré for Dior, and sexy, draped and structured shapes in silk at Givenchy.

Hanae Mori, celebrating her 35th year in fashion, is kicking up her heels with some shorter, knee-revealing styles, which is new for this usually conservative Japanese designer.

Louis Feraud plans to show off garden-party girls in fluid dresses with appliqued leaves, but also revealed a bit of bare midriff in a little silk suit with graphic striped bows in a preview photo session.

Jean-Louis Scherrer is apparently still inspired by his all-time favorite theme of the rich Raj looks from India: turbans, silk braid and all.

Colors will be hot and spicy, starting with a shocking pink suit by Erik Mortensen at Balmain. Karl Lagerfeld is going for some warm corals in his collection of abbreviated styles for Chanel.

Ungaro previewed an intriguing silk suit of pink and lavender piped in fanciful swirls of tangerine around the asymmetric décolleté jacket.

Philippe Venet uses mandarin orange and plum to advantage in a short raw silk suit with trapeze jacket.

After his Sunday couture show, Christian Lacroix's big moment will be the Sunday night launch of his first perfume with a musical show at the Opéra Comique. Named "C'est la Vie," the scent will be presented in an elaborate bottle sculpted with a handprint and a little coral branch — a Lacroix signature.

# Toning is a vital step in your daily makeup routine

The second step in the makeup procedure is often ignored by many women. They leap right on to the third step.

"After cleansing their skin, a lot of women skip the toning and go right on with the moisturizing. They don't feel that toning is really necessary. But, toning is such an important step to good skin," said makeup artist Joan Mazzei.

She said the toning procedure makes the pores contract faster and cuts down on the possibility of enlarged pores.

"After toning, the skin is then ready to accept the moisturizer ... to have it glide over the skin," added the artist, who has 20 years of experience in the makeup field. Coloring fun comes next.

The toning step or the lack of it hit home as we discussed skin care and makeup trends, especially for the mature woman, at Mazzei's area of Images for Hair in Corona del Mar. Everything in the way of color and implements were available to make the face a better place.

Our conversation came about because of a previous Looking Good quoting a New York makeup artist who said mature women (over 40) should wear only moisturizer and powder, maybe a little foundation, cream lipstick and blush and powdered eyebrows and liner. Less is better the NYer said.

Mazzei has a different opinion, and I love differences of opinion, because you always learn something from both sides. (In makeup there are hundreds of different opinions so there is great opportunity to learn.)

"As women get older they need to apply more makeup and learn to apply it skillfully," said Mazzei. "Young women can get away from using makeup, but not the mature woman. You cannot wear your makeup the same way you did back in college."

"I believe a woman needs to re-evaluate her makeup routine every two years. A good idea is to find a makeup artist who is in your general age range. A young makeup artist without a line on her face may not be able to empathize with a mature woman. The younger one may not realize that with age the skin, hair and tone of the eyes fade."

There are steps that can help with the changes that age brings, according to Mazzei, and a number of her hints focused on the eye.

"Eyebrows will be darker and thicker this year and their shape is so important. The angling of the brow can

lift and draw attention away from existing facial lines.

The shaping to frame the eye can even change your expression and make you more approachable," explained Mazzei as she pencilled in a pleasing new look to my brows. (Within the next few months she will be doing the permanent eyebrows with tattooing.)

She likes pencils for coloring and shaping the brows, but not as eyeliner.

"The pencils contain wax that can melt from a person's body heat. I don't think the look is good even for a young woman, and if you are older, people will think that you just can't see well," laughed Mazzei. "I like cake eyeliner applied with a small brush and then slightly smudged. It is so important to learn to do your eyes."

Some might consider it the height of foolishness to bid a slam off two cashing aces. However, when the aces are split between the defenders, it is not always easy to get them.

East-West almost did well on this hand. Their preemptive tactics forced South to guess at a high level, and he went wrong. Unfortunately, the defenders "forgot" to cash their tricks. Obviously, South would have done better to double five hearts (North-South can inflict a four-trick defeat if the defense is accurate), but South was sure he would find one ace with partner for his opening bid, and he didn't want to lose a vulnerable slam.

West led the ace of hearts and East, anxious to get a shift, followed with a discouraging two. West gazed long and hard at his cards, but found no inspiration there. Eventually, he shrugged and shifted to a club, and declarer heaved a sigh of relief. He drew trumps, discarded his diamond on the king of hearts and chalked up his small slam.

Put the blame for the debacle on East. Since it was obvious to all that there were no more tricks for the defense in hearts, East should have taken the opportunity to signal he wanted a diamond, not a club.

How could he do that? By playing a high heart, preferably the queen, to ask for the higher of the other two side suits. But wouldn't that be begging for a heart continuation? Normally, yes. But when a particular defense is known to be futile, the card played becomes a suit-preference signal!

DEAR ANN LANDERS: Last year's response to your Ann Landers-Valentine Vet program was overwhelming. More than 1.5 million valentines arrived at Hines VA Hospital, the designated mailing point. There, 100 volunteers worked around the clock to rebox the valentines and ship them to 171 medical centers around the country. Thousands of volunteers helped distribute the valentines once they reached the medical centers.

Cards and letters were received from individuals, schools, churches, community organizations and businesses. They came from 50 states, Puerto Rico, Mexico City, Canada, Taiwan and Germany.

People sent not only cards but candy, quilts, pictures and toys. The Chocolate House in Milwaukee donated 6,000 boxes of heart-shaped candies. Employees at the North Shore Hilton Hotel in Chicago put up a giant valentine in the lobby for guests to sign and brought it to Hines VA Hospital.

As you suggested, many teachers made it a class project. The brightly colored handmade cards thanking the veterans for "fighting for our freedom" brought both smiles and tears. The children's messages ranged from sentimental to funny. One second grader's note began "Dear Vegetarian." Another wrote "Dear Veterinarian."

Many cards came from children (and adults) with disabilities. Since they too had been hospitalized, they knew firsthand what a lovely place a hospital can be.

The Ann Landers-Valentine Vet project created many pen pals. One

veteran, a 75-year-old man from Michigan, sent a World War II medal to the kindergarten student who had sent a valentine. Most medical centers had a special ceremony during which they presented the valentines to the vets. Local celebrities and political leaders made the presentations.

A vet from Grand Island, Neb., wrote "It was wonderful to know that people still remember us." Another from Mount Home, Tenn., wrote, "I was feeling blue and then this lady handed me a lovely valentine made by a sixth-grader. Inside was a message that read: 'Thanks for serving our country and fighting for freedom.' This made me feel so proud. It meant more than the medal I received 45 years ago."

So dear Ann, will you do it again? It would once more shine a spotlight on the VA's National Salute to Hospitalized Veterans Week.

## TOURNAMENT HISTORY



The Newport Classic Pro-Am Golf Tournament held each year at the picturesque Newport Beach Country Club is indeed a classic in its own right. Although this event is no longer called the Crosby Southern, we will always fondly remember our namesake Bing Crosby.

Back in 1974, Crosby was looking for a place to hold a satellite tournament for all the pros who missed the cut at his famous Pebble Beach event. As fate would have it, former USC football star Marshall Duffield heard about Crosby's needs. He passed the news on to his friend Charles Hester and the two Hoag Hospital supporters put their heads together and decided to stage a golf tournament for the benefit of the hospital.

Bing Crosby sent his brother Larry to Newport Beach to investigate and then decided to donate \$10,000 as prize money, with Crosby's approval. Hester and Duffield found themselves with only one month to put the inaugural Pro-Am together. "It was a lot of work," Hester recalls, "and a lot of fun."

Back then, amateurs were charged only \$350, but few signed up. In order to provide a complete field, golf team members from UCI and Santa Ana College were recruited. The initial event was a success with 72 amateurs, plus the added attraction of Fred MacMurray as a celebrity player.

It's no secret that the Newport Classic is much more

than just a fund raising event — we've helped produce some real winners. To name a few — Chip Beck, Mark Calcavecchia, Al Geiberger, Mark McCumber, Gil Morgan, Payne Stewart and Fuzzy Zoeller.

Today the Newport Classic continues on in the proud tradition which Crosby, Duffield, Hester and many others started and nurtured through the years. Proceeds from the 1990 Newport Classic will pass the \$1 million in net proceeds raised for Hoag Hospital.

# Newport Classic boosted many PGA stars

There have been a large number of PGA Tour stars who gained at least a portion of their start in the Newport Classic Pro-Am/ Crosby Southern golf tournament at the Newport Beach Country Club in the 15 years since its humble beginning in 1975.

In this, the 16th edition of the tournament, three former champions and at least five former stars of the PGA Tour will be participating in the event that benefits Hoag Memorial Hospital, Presbyterian.

Sponsored by the 552 Club, a support organization for the hospital, they hope to go over the \$1 million mark in money raised for the hospital from the golf tournament in this year's event, which pits 74 pros with a like number of amateurs.

A purse of \$50,000 — including the largest first place prize ever of \$10,000 — is being offered to the young professionals and veterans alike who will compete in the 36-hole, two-day event. Last year's winner, Perry Parker of Costa Mesa, picked up a check for \$7,000, at the time the largest in the history of the tournament.

Included in the array of talent for this year's event are Parker,

the defending champion, Mike Gove of the Southern California PGA, who won here in 1983, and John McComish, a twotime winner in 1985 and again in 1987. McComish also won the pro-am competition with his partner James Gianulus of the Big Canyon Country Club in 1988. Jon Chaffee, the 1988 winner, and Tony Grimes (1986) complete the list of past winners.

Five former stars of the PGA Tour are included in the early entry list to give the tournament a mixture of young, budding stars and veterans of the circuit.

Bud Allin won five PGA Tour events during his time on the circuit with his best year coming in 1974 when he finished ninth with \$137,950 in earnings. His career total of \$558,944 was surpassed by 13 players on the Tour this past year for a single season total including two who won more than \$1 million for the

year.

Tommy Jacobs, now a member of the Senior PGA Tour and head pro at the Ranch Golf Course in Rancho Santa Fe, won four tour events including the Palm Springs Golf Classic, the Denver Open, San Diego Open and Utah Open. However, his best year was in 1964 when he won \$37,072 after winning in Palm Springs. His career total of \$227,376 was surpassed by 62 players on the tour in 1989 for a single season.

Jack Renner, winner of three tour events, Tom Pernice and Alan Tapie are among the former PGA Tour stars who will be competing in this year's tournament.

Among the budding young stars are several from the Golden State Tour including John Burckle of Laguna Beach.

"We feel we have another outstanding group of players coming to Newport Beach in

1990 to begin a third decade of competition here," this year's general chairman Paul Nyquist says. And the bottom line is that we are helping the hospital each year and are proud of the fact that we will be going over the \$1 million mark this year in money raised for the hospital.

Another feature of the tournament this year is the fact that 17 of the amateurs will be competing for a chance to play in the Tournament of Champions pro-am event next January at the La Costa Country Club.

The 17 players will represent the 17 tournament sponsors who pay \$5,552 each to finance the tournament. The player on the low scoring team from this group will win the coveted spot at La Costa next January.

There are a number of outstanding players on the PGA Tour who have played in the tournament here in past years. Included in this group is Fuzzy Zoeller who has 10 victories on the tour. Payne Stewart, who went over the \$1 million mark for a single season in earnings in 1989 and has five tour victories, and Al Geiberger who plays on the Senior Tour now and has 11 PGA Tour victories to go with five on the senior circuit.

# McComish only player to repeat as Classic champ

John McComish of Santa Maria is the only player to repeat as champion of the Newport Classic Pro-Am golf tournament in the 15 years of play at Newport Beach Country Club. McComish did not repeat on successive years but won the event in 1985 and again in 1987. Rains caused him to drop out of the shortened 1986 event which was won by Tony Grimes.

Perry Parker of Costa Mesa will be attempting to become the first to win successive titles in the event that was originally the Crosby Southern when he plays here on Friday and Saturday, January 26 and 27.

McComish could also be in the field for the fourth time.

Here's a capsule rundown on the past winners.

**1989 — PERRY PARKER.** Finishing the final day with a five-under-par score for the final four holes. Parker won by two strokes over former PGA Tour regular Alan Tapie of Laguna Niguel and Jeff Hart of Solano Beach. The UC Irvine graduate had an eagle on the par-5 15th hole, a par on No. 16, a birdie on No. 17 and another eagle on the 18th for an incredible finish.

Parker is ready to defend his title and has spent considerable time on the course recently preparing himself for the event. He picked up a check for \$7,000 for his victory last year.

**1988 — JON CHAFFEE.** The Austin, Texas, resident made his seventh appearance in the tournament a winning effort with a wire-to-wire victory. He was the leader after the first round on Saturday with a 64 and finished the final day with a 66 for 130, the lowest two-day total in the history of the tournament. He won by five strokes over previous winner (1986) Tony Grimes and picked up a check for \$5,600 for his efforts.

Chaffee played on the PGA Tour for four years but has turned to the insurance business following his victory at Newport Beach CC two years ago.

**1987 — JOHN MCCOMISH.** A former national long-drive champion from Santa Maria, McComish fired a final round 68 for a two-day total of 138, two under par. He won a playoff from Gary McCord of TV fame and Billy Tuten on the first extra hole with an iron off the tee. He then sank an eight-foot birdie putt for the victory. McComish picked up the first place check of \$4,500 and said "I'm just happy to win. I didn't think two under would do it and I was in the clubhouse for an hour before the playoff started. I hit an iron to 100 yards from the green and used a pitching wedge for my second shot. I feel fortunate to win. The course

isn't long but the greens were tough today." McComish had previously won the event in 1985.

**1986 — TONY GRIMES.** In a rain-shortened tournament (18 holes were played following heavy rains on the first day that canceled that round), Grimes fired a 34-33—67 to win by one stroke over 14 other players who were tied at 68. Grimes played at Arizona State and lives in Alexandria, Minn. He fired birdies on 4, 14, 17 and 18 and had no bogeys to finish four under par. First round play was washed out on Saturday and the event was shortened to 18 holes Sunday because most players had other commitments Monday.

**1985 — JOHN MCCOMISH.** Rain was the big story again when the first round was delayed and finally got under way with a shotgun start on Saturday. McComish fired a 64 on the final round to win by a stroke. Rod Curl, a PGA Tour veteran, had to settle for a runner-up position behind McComish. He tied with Tom Lamore, one stroke behind the winner. McComish had a 135 total for the two rounds to tie the then tournament record of 133 for the event. He was the 1978 national long-drive champion as an amateur. He also won the 1983 PGA Tour distance driving championship.

**1984 — BILL BRITTON.** The Staten Island, N.Y., native won by two strokes with a 69-64—133 total. He also tied the tournament scoring record set by Bruce Fleisher in 1977. Playing in the same foursome as 1986 winner Tony Grimes on the final day, Britton felt it helped him to gain the victory. When Tony birdied the first hole, I just decided to play my own game. Britton had only one bogey in two days, that on the par-3 fourth hole when he three-putted.

**1983 — MIKE GOVE.** The Seattle resident, who attended Weber State University in Utah, fired a final round 68 to go with his first-day 67 for a 135 total. He defeated Jeff Thomsen by one stroke for the title. "I only missed three greens in two days over 36 holes and had only one bogey and eight birdies," he explained about his two-day play. His best finish on the PGA Tour was fourth place in the Pensacola Open in 1980.

**1982 — ED DOUGHERTY.** Taking the lead on the first day, he held on to win by three strokes over Jim Booros and Larry Mize, a pair of tour veterans. The winner fired a 66 on opening day and a 69 on the final day for a 135 total. Dougherty hails from Linwood, Pa. Rain caused some problems but no postponement or

Will be playing the Ben Hogan Tour this year after finishing 21st on the list from the regular PGA Tour qualifying school.

Lives in Santa Maria with wife Linda. He has played in the tournament here four times, being in the winner's circle on three occasions. In 1987, when the event was shortened to 18 holes because of heavy rains on opening day, he had to cancel out when the weather prevented him from reaching the course on the first day.

He is the only player to win the tournament here two times.

cancellation of a round. "I just tried to hit the fairways and make the greens in regulation and I almost had a hole-in-one on No. 4," he said. He put the title away when he birdied the 15th and 16th holes to move three in front of his nearest rival.

**1981 — MITCH MOONEY.** It took three extra playoff holes to bring a victory to Mooney. He defeated Tom Jones on the third playoff hole after both finished regulation play at 135 for the 36-hole event. The winner had rounds of 69-66 before making a two-foot putt for a birdie on the final playoff hole.

**1980 — BOB MANN.** The winner was thinking about quitting the tour the year before until he and Wayne Levi won the Walt Disney World National Team championship. First round leader Ron Milanovich, who fired a course record 63 during the first round, had trouble on the final day. He took a double-bogey six on the second hole after his ball disappeared in a gopher hole and was never found. It cost him a two-stroke penalty. Mann lives in Pensacola, Fla.

**1979 — BOBBY BAKER.** After a one-day delay because of heavy rains, the tournament was completed Sunday with Baker winning over Barney Thompson and Roger Calvin with a birdie on the final hole. He had a final round 69 with 16 pars and two birdies. He has had to regain his PGA card several times to continue on the pro tour.

**1978 — GARY GROH.** The native of Chicago won his fifth second tour event at the Crosby Southern. He had rounds of 65-68 for a 133 total to tie the then tournament record. In 1975, he was the winner of the Hawaiian Open on the major PGA Tour.

**1977 — BRUCE FLEISHER.** Winning by four strokes over Bobby Walzel, Dennis Meyer and Marty Fleckman, Fleisher set a tournament record. His score of 64-69—133 stood until 1988 when Jon Chaffee had a sizzling 64-66—130 score in winning. Three others tied the record before Chaffee broke it. In winning, Fleisher picked up a check for \$1,700. This year's winner will receive \$10,000, the largest in the history of the event. Fleisher was the 1968 U.S. amateur champion and was a member of the 1969 Walker Cup team.

**1976 — BOB EASTWOOD.** It took him eight years after winning the second Crosby Southern to capture his first of three victories on the PGA Tour in 1984. His three wins are the most for any previous champion of the tournament that is now the Newport Classic Pro-Am. After firing a first-round 64, Eastwood went to 75 on the final day but managed to win with a 139 total. His three major tour titles came in the 1984 USF&G Classic and the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic along with the 1985 Byron Nelson Classic. He is the only player in the history of the tournament here to win both the pro purse and be on the first place pro-am team the same year.

**1975 — BILLY ZIOBRO.** A four-stroke victory over Bunky Henry, Perry Leslie, Ken Mersheim, Pat Fitzsimons, Mike Shea and Eddie Merrins gave Ziobro the inaugural Crosby Southern title. He had rounds of 71-67 for a 36-hole total of 138 and in addition to winning \$1,700, gained a spot in the next year's Crosby Clambake at Pebble Beach. Eastwood and Fleisher also benefitted from the early tie-in with Bing Crosby's event that gave the winner here a spot in the next Crosby Pro-Am at Pebble Beach.

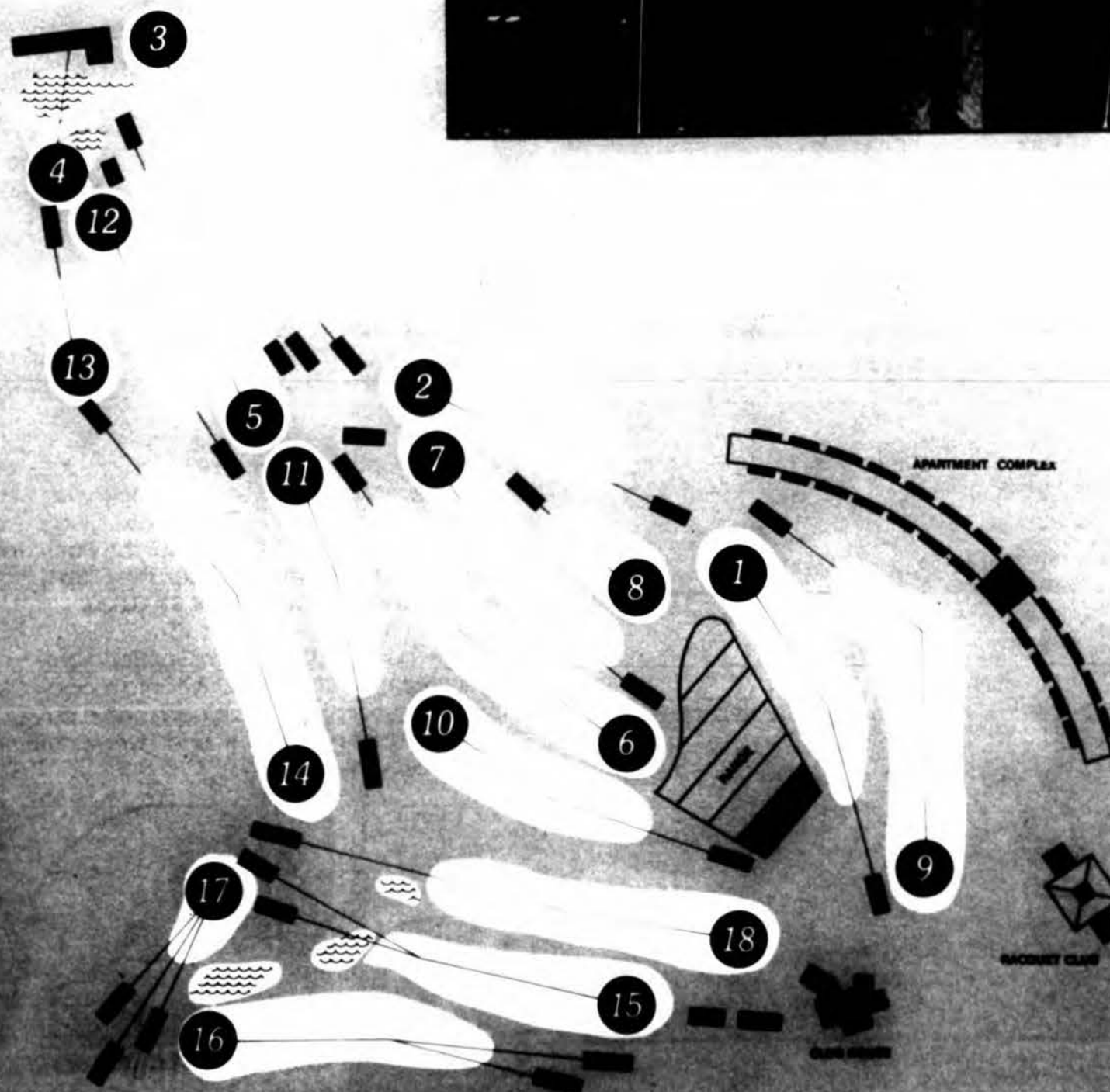

# A hole-by-hole view of Newport Classic

A new, automatic irrigation system is near completion at the Newport Beach Country Club and doesn't figure to give players any trouble during the Newport Classic Pro-Am Jan. 26 and 27.

The course has had two 3-par holes refinished in recent years. Nos. 13 and 17, and both are in excellent shape for this year's event, according to course officials.

The course will play to 6,546 yards from the long blue tees which the pros will use.

Jerry Anderson, director of golf, recently outlined the course with yardage, par and handicap for each hole. Here's how he presents the 18 holes:

## FRONT NINE (3,217 Yards, Par 35)

**HOLE NO. 1 — 339 Yards, Par 4, No. 13 handicap.** A slight dogleg to the left, the first hole puts a premium on the location of the drive. The long hitter may elect to use a long iron to better position his second shot to a deceptive green. There are large trees on both sides of the fairway. The second shot demands hitting to a small, two-tier green where you want to avoid being above the hole.

**HOLE NO. 2 — 390 yards, Par 4, No. 9 handicap.** A slightly uphill hole that requires the tee shot be worked from left to right. A drive hit to the right side

of the fairway sets up the opening of the green. A large bunker fronts the left side of the green.

**HOLE NO. 3 — 549 yards, Par 5, No. 7 handicap.** After teeing off from an elevated tee, the longer hitters are confronted with the choice of trying to reach the green with a fairway wood or a long iron. There is a small pond in front of the green. The green is also protected by bunkers on the left and the right sides.

**HOLE NO. 4 — 143 yards, Par 3, No. 17 handicap.** A short but tricky hole which is normally played upwind with a lake covering the front and the left sides of the green. The green has a large undulation which adds to the challenge and for those who overshoot there is a large bunker behind the green.

**HOLE NO. 5 — 455 yards, Par 4, No. 1 handicap.** A straightaway uphill hole which is usually played upwind. A wide fairway lets you open up on the tee shot but the second shot is played to a well-bunkered green.

**HOLE NO. 6 — 418 yards, Par 4, No. 3 handicap.** A dogleg left with large trees on both sides of the fairway. A drive down the right center of the fairway will give you an un-

blocked shot to a well-guarded, subtle rolling green. The tee area has been shifted more to the left for this one.

**HOLE NO. 7 — 324 yards, Par 4, No. 11 handicap.** This hole can be played with the driver or a mid-iron from the tee. If you elect the driver and can hit it over the large tree on the right side of the fairway, you then have a very short shot to the green. This is one of the larger greens on the course and has a huge undulation. Good judgment will tell you not to hit

the ball above the pin.

**HOLE NO. 8 — 192 yards, Par 3, No. 15 handicap.** A very strong par-3 that normally plays upwind. The bank to the right of the green slopes down and away making a difficult pitch to get the ball up and down for par.

**HOLE NO. 9 — 407 yards, Par 4, No. 5 handicap.** A really fine driving hole. Large trees left and right of the fairway demand a well-positioned tee shot. A dogleg right but the hole sets up from the left center of the fairway. The second shot is uphill and rather deceptive. Out of bounds guard the left and rear of the green.

## BACK NINE (3,329 Yards, Par 36)

**HOLE NO. 10 — 429 yards, Par 4, No. 4 handicap.** A straightaway hole that has two bunkers looking at you as you tee off. The tee shot between them leaves you with a mid-iron to a small, tightly bunkered green.

**HOLE NO. 11 — 344 yards, Par 4, No. 16 handicap.** Plenty of driving room off the tee. The second shot into a small, elevated green with bunkers located both left and right makes the hole a little tougher than it looks.

**HOLE NO. 12 — 370 yards, Par 4, No. 1 handicap.** This hole has two important characteristics the player must overcome. The landing area for your tee shot is narrow and there is a large eucalyptus tree in front of the green on the right side. The left side of the green is well guarded by bunkers.

**HOLE NO. 13 — 165 yards, Par 3, No. 18 handicap.** This hole has been revamped during the past year with the green moved to the left, away from the out-of-bounds area on Jam-boree Road. This hole presents the major change from last at

Newport Beach CC.

**HOLE NO. 14 — 397 yards, Par 4, No. 6 handicap.** This is one of the tougher holes on the course. It has length and you need a well placed tee shot. Large trees on the left side of the fairway and large, deep bunkers on the right side. The green is very small and well bunkered.

**HOLE NO. 15 — 492 yards, Par 5, No. 8 handicap.** A challenging hole that rewards you but will make you pay the penalty if you make a mistake. A good drive sets you up to see the green and all the trouble that surrounds it. Bunkers surround the left side of the green with a pot bunker positioned on the right side. The green is two-tiered with mounds and swales around the outer side. Some 30 palm trees surround the green and offer a challenge if you tend to stray just a little.

**HOLE NO. 16 — 437 yards, Par 4, No. 2 handicap.** Perhaps the best par four on the course. It requires a long tee shot avoiding out-of-bounds left and trees right, leaving a long iron to a large, rolling green that has well-placed bunkers guarding the front.

**HOLE NO. 17 — 185 yards, Par 3, No. 12 handicap.** This is one of the prettiest holes on the course and was changed completely two years ago. A large lake sits in front of the elevated tee and runs to the edge of the green. A two-tiered, rolling green with a large bunker to the left side. Mounds and swales will present a challenge if you miss the green.

**HOLE NO. 18 — 510 yards, Par 5, No. 14 handicap.** An uphill finishing hole that presents an opportunity for the long hitter to reach the green in two shots. A wide fairway with large trees both right and left and a bunker covering the green's front right side.

## A \$10,000 check awaits the winner

A change in money distribution for the 1990 Newport Classic Pro-Am golf tournament Jan. 26 and 27 will find the winner picking up a check for \$10,000, the largest by \$3,000 in the 15-year history of the event.

Winners in each of the first four years of the tournament picked up \$1,700 with the purse gradually ascending to \$7,000 paid to Perry Parker last year.

A total of 15 places will be paid this year with each professional who completes 36 holes also receiving \$200 for their efforts. The low pro for the

final 18 holes of play will pick up an additional \$400.

Money to be distributed includes the following: 1st — \$10,000; 2nd — \$6,000; 3rd — \$4,000; 4th — \$3,000; 5th — \$2,000; 6th — \$1,500; 7th — \$1,100; 8th — \$900; 9th — \$800; 10th — \$700; 11th — \$600; 12th — \$500; 13th — \$400; 14th — \$300, and 15th — \$350.

In addition, pro winners in the pro-am competition will receive the following: 1st — \$1,000; 2nd — \$700; 3rd — \$500; 4th — \$300, and 5th — \$250.

## How players are picked

The field of 74 professional golfers participating in the 1990 Newport Classic Pro-Am will be picked from the following categories according to general chairman Paul Nyquist:

From the Crosby Southern-Newport Classic: Top five pro finishers and ties in 1989; pro-am pro winner in 1989; professional winners, 1985-89.

Top 50 finishers and ties from

the 1990 PGA Tour Qualifying Tournament.

Top 50 Ben Hogan Tour qualifiers.

Top three 'point' winners from the SCGA in 1989.

From the Golden State Tour — Top five money winners on the 1989 players tour and top three money winners on the 1989 Golden State Series.

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# Struggling years pay off for winner Steve Jones

Steve Jones knows full well the price young, aspiring golf professionals have to pay to get to the top and he recently recalled his early days of struggling to make it on the PGA Tour where he won \$745,578 in 1989.

"I remember the Little Crosby well," he said while playing at the MONY Tournament of Champions at La Costa CC. "It's a great tournament and it is a good one to play in when you are not on the regular tour."

"It gives a lot of young players a chance to make some money and I think it's a great place to start. When you are starting out or struggling to keep your card, you play in all of these events you can."

Jones played in Newport Beach in 1982 and again in 1984. He missed 1983 after surgery on a jammed thumb, then came back in 1984, starting the year in Newport Beach. He spent that year on the mini-tour circuits then went back to the PGA Tour after qualifying in the fall of 1984.

His first PGA Tour victory came in 1988 when he captured the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am. This qualified him for the MONY Tournament of Champions and he opened 1989 with victories in the first two events of the year, the T of C and the Bob Hope Desert Classic. He

also captured the Canadian Open for his third title during the year in which he finished eighth on the money list.

Jones gives credit for his rise to the top to his firm religious beliefs. "I relate everything back to my faith in Jesus Christ. That's the most important thing for me. I thoroughly believe in

the Bible."

He had a good year with the putter in 1989, finishing first among the pros on the statistics sheets in putting with a 1.734 average per green for the entire campaign. When he won the T of C last year, he required only 29, 28, 28 and 25 putts to negotiate the 72 holes, an average of 1.527 per green, lower than his season average.

While he is near the top of the ladder these days, he also remembers his early years of struggling.

"I've been on both sides," he says. "I've had three or four years of my eight-year career when I didn't make anything for the year. Those were struggling years and I remember them well."

"I don't have the swing or technique that a lot of these guys do, but a lot of times I can persevere through bad times. That's a big plus for me."

Jones has persevered well to get to the top of the PGA Tour ladder — a great symbol of success for others who play here to follow.

## Classic golfers on Hogan tour

Many of the players in this year's Newport Classic Pro-Am will be playing on the newly formed Ben Hogan Tour during the coming year.

Like the PGA Tour, however, it hasn't been an easy row to hoe to get to play on the second tour sponsored by the PGA.

Almost 700 players sent in entry fees and applications to register at one of four scheduled Ben Hogan Tour regional qualifying sites.

The response was so overwhelming that two more regional qualifying sites were added to handle the overflow of players interested.

A field of 132 players participated in the finals of the qualifying tournament early this month in Florida and the top 25 players in the school received full exemption on the 1990 Ben Hogan Tour with the next 10 receiving player cards as alternates.

Also exempt from qualifying for 1990 is a list of 81 players from the regular PGA Tour qualifying school. Included on this list are 20 former participants in the Newport Beach event, two of them former winners here.

John McComish (1985 and 1987) along with Tony Grimes (1986) are in the group. Others include: Tom Pernice, Greg Ladehoff, Dan Halldorson, Brian Mogg, Kelly Gibson, Brad Bell, Scott Bess, Kim Young, Rick Dalpos, Brandel Chamblee, Bobby Strobe, Greg Powers, Dennis Trixler, Charlie Bolling, Ernie Gonzalez, Tom Lehman, Jim Chancey and Rick Cramer.

### Britton shone on tour

Bill Britton, winner of the Newport Classic in 1984, became only the second victor here to capture a PGA Tour title when he won the Centel Classic in 1989. Britton played here three times and won \$307,978 in 1989 on the PGA Tour for 34th place. Bob Eastwood, winner of the Crosby Southern in 1976, is the only other previous winner in Newport Beach to also win on the PGA Tour.

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# Stewart topped \$1 million in '89

Payne Stewart gained his PGA Tour playing privileges in the spring of 1981, then earned the mammoth sum of \$13,400 for the balance of the year.

His first try to gain a card in 1979 had failed. He moved to the Asian tour for two years before returning to this country to try again in 1981.

He came to Newport Beach to play in the Crosby Southern in January of 1982 and had to go through Monday qualifying to play on the tour that year.

His first victory came in 1982 at the Quad Cities Open. He earned \$98,686 for his efforts in 1982 to finish 38th on the money list and has been a tour regular ever since.

Curtis Strange became the first player to win over \$1 million in a year when he took home \$1,147,644 in 1988.

Stewart topped that figure in 1989 with \$1,201,301 in earn-

ings but had to settle for second place behind Tom Kite who won \$1,395,278 for the year.

Stewart won over \$500,000 each of the three previous years and in 1987 surprised a number of people who think the pros are out to grab every dollar available.

When he won the Hertz-Bay Hill Classic in 1987, he donated his entire purse of \$108,000 to the Florida Hospital Golden Circle of Friends Home — "in memory of my father," William L. Stewart, who died of cancer two years previous to the day.

"I had set a goal of winning," Stewart said, "and I wanted to do something special in my father's name. He was the man who helped me more than anyone else to play this game."

He has become one of the most colorful dressers on the tour. His usual outfit consists of pastel plus-fours, socks and cap and he frequently is asked what he plans to wear the next day by admiring fans.

Stewart is another of the success stories to be found among the archives.

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## Jacobs most frequent NB player

There are six players who have participated in seven previous tournaments including Rafe Botts, Peter Brown, Jon Chaffee, Tim Graham, Art Schilling and Paul Wise. Only Graham and Wise participated in 1989 from this group.

There have been two name changes in the history of the Newport Classic Pro-Am golf tournament since its inception in 1975.

The original tournament was known as the Crosby Southern, a second PGA Tour event for players unable to qualify for the Crosby Clambake in Pebble Beach. The Crosby tournament in Newport Beach ran for 12

years (1975-1986) before changing to the Newport Classic in 1987.

The Newport Beach Country Club where the tournament has been held every year since its inception, also underwent a name change when the Balboa Bay Club purchased the layout in 1987. It was previously known as the Irvine Coast Country Club.

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# Parker has tough act to follow—his own

Perry Parker had one of the most incredible finishes in the 1989 Newport Classic Pro-Am golf tournament of any player in the 15-year history of the event that was originally known as the Crosby Southern.

Parker had an eagle 3 on the par-5 15th hole, parred the par-4 16th and birdied the par-3 17th. He finished with a second eagle on the par-5 18th hole to conclude a round of 65, 6-under-par.

he was the No. 1 player on the Anteater team for three years. In his spare time now, he serves as an assistant coach at his alma mater.

During his time since winning the Newport event, he has participated on the Golden State tour, played in Canada and tried for his card on either the PGA Tour or the Hogan Tour that starts this year.

He considers the best part of his game to be his putting.

"I think a great deal of putting is in your attitude," he says.

That was early in 1989 at Newport Beach Country Club while he was participating in the tournament that benefits Hoag Memorial Hospital through the sponsoring 552 Club.

The hospital has benefitted by nearly \$1 million dollars during the first 15 years of its existence and expects to go over that mark this time around Jan. 26-27.

His finish in January brought back memories of a quarterfinal round in the California state amateur championships in 1986.

"I birdied the final three holes in the quarters at Pebble Beach, then lost in the semis, 2-1, to Mike Springer," Parker recalled recently.

The Tustin native played high school golf at Foothill High and then matriculated to UCI where

"I've worked on my putting a great deal. Just as much, if not more, than the rest of my game. I have some drills from three, five and 10 feet. First I hit with my left hand only, then my right hand and finally both together. This gets my hands to working together and gives me a steady stroke and rhythm. After I finish this, I do some lag putting to get the feel of the green."

"Good putters have to adjust to the different types of grass on greens. During a practice round, I will hit putts from different places on each green to get to know them."

"I'm also working on hitting the ball straighter with more consistency. I feel I hit it long

enough but I need more consistency in my irons and my driver. My short game is just about where I want it right now."

"I also study video tapes of different players and then develop my own swing. I watch (Seve) Ballesteros and (Tom) Kite. I see what they do and incorporate some of their good points into my swing. I also study video tapes on my own swing. I want to know my swing so I can make adjustments on the golf course."

Parker took home a check for \$7,000 last January for his victory. This year the winner will pocket a check for \$10,000, the largest ever in the tournament at Newport Beach Country Club.

He isn't complaining about the fact that the larger purse will not allow payment to more places in the finishing field.

"I think it's great and it definitely makes the tournament more attractive to the players," he said. "They treat you real well here and I'm glad to be a part of it. I'm looking forward to defending my title."

"Obviously, the players would rather see a four-day tournament but this one is an exciting event. If you are playing well, you can win a two-day tournament just like a four-day event."

His father, Pete Parker, was a teacher and coach at El Modena High in football and baseball but confines his activities to the classroom these days at Villa Park High. It was his dad who started him playing golf, although he tried other sports while in high school.

Parker now lives in Costa Mesa after marrying Lori (Tripodi) in August. He represents Santa Ana Country Club

and made 13 of 14 cuts while on the Golden State tour in 1989.

He had one victory other than his win at Newport Beach.

He has two brothers, both more interested in baseball than golf. Stacy is playing center field in the Texas Rangers system while Corey is a freshman at Orange Coast College and plays first base and the outfield for the Pirates. Both play golf "but just for fun," Perry says. Mother Joan also plays golf.

Perry finished fourth in the City of Costa Mesa championships as an amateur.

He feels the Newport Beach course is in good shape these days and he has played there three or four times a month since he won in January. He will increase this amount prior to the tournament and feels he will know the course as well as anyone playing in the tournament this year.

Golf is his life the 1987 UCI graduate in economics and political science says.

"I'll pursue the PGA tour as long as my game is improving and I feel this is the case right now," Parker adds. "Then I'll go to coaching or teaching." He is assisting his former UCI coach, Steve Ainsley, when time permits and is looking forward to playing either the Hogan Tour or in Canada this coming summer.

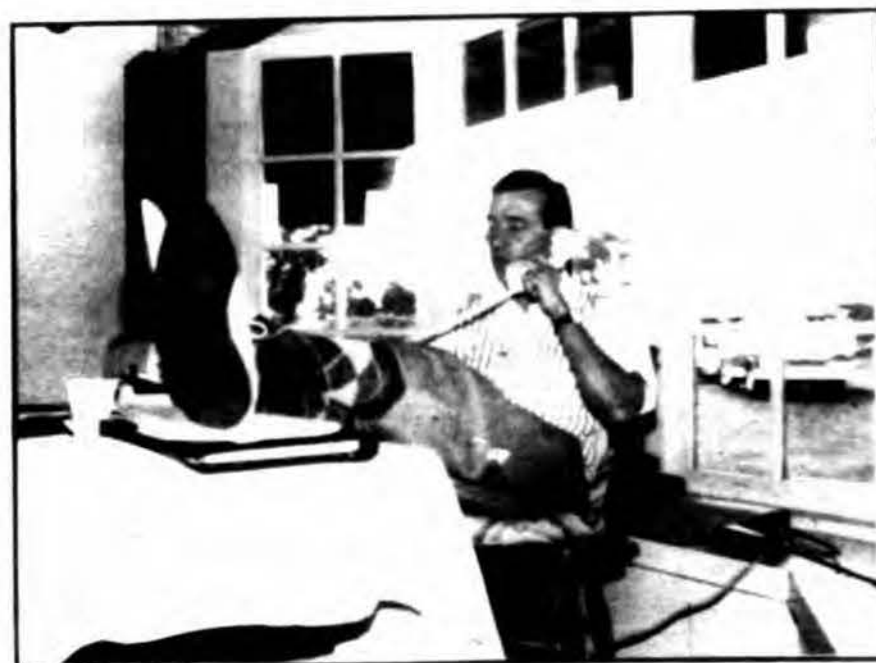
