Steffi Graf: Started earning money on the tennis court 13 years ago

Q How old was Steffi Graf when she played her first professional tennis tournament?

Jolene Hamburg, 13, Cherokee, Iowa

It's hard to pin down. "Professional tennis player" is an American concept. Europeans (Graf, 21, is a West German) don't distinguish clearly between "amateur" and "pro." Graf earned her first paycheck from the sport when she was 8, so in a sense she became a "professional" then. But by American standards, she turned pro when she joined the Women's International Tennis Association tour at 13. Whatever the date, tennis has paid off for Graf, to the tune of \$5 million-plus in earnings. Off the court, she likes music; her favorite group is Simply Red. Watch Graf in the U.S. Open, next week on CBS.

Q Will the "Spider-man" movie ever be a reality?

Sergio Bacazar, 16, Elmwood Park, N.J.

Oh, what a tangled web is weaved. Spider-man, based on the Marvel Comics character, is being kicked around a Hollywood movie company in "pre-production." What's happening? Script-writing and talk. What's not? Casting, production and filming.

Q How long has Don Cornelius been chugging along with "Soul Train"?

Travares Reid, 14, Goldsboro, N.C.

Cornelius has been the host of Soul Train for 20 years, since it got its start in Chicago (it's now done in L.A.). The idea was to give black artists the exposure they couldn't get on other programs. Marvin Gaye, Quincy Jones, the Jackson Five and many others appeared on Soul Train before attracting mainstream attention. And singer Jody Watley got her start as a Soul Train dancer.

Q Was the weather machine "Toto," which measures tornadoes, named for Dorothy's dog in "The Wizard of Oz"?

Who ever said weathermen don't have a sense of humor? "Toto" did take its nickname from Dorothy Gale's doggie, but it's also an acronym for "Tornado Observing Station." Scientists would place the heavy-duty measuring device in the predicted path of a tornado, hoping to measure the twister's pressure, temperature and wind speed. Unfortunately, "Toto" wasn't rugged enough to withstand the 200-mile-an-hour winds that accompany many tornadoes, so it has been retired. In use now is a portable radio set that can withstand and measure the winds but can't measure temperature or pressure.

Q Will there be a miniseries based on Stephen King's best-selling horror novel "It"?

Mike Rubinkam, 17, Harleysville, Pa.

There will. The miniseries was postponed several times, but finally it's a done deal. ABC has just finished production of a four-hour television version of King's 1986 novel about an unspeakable evil in a small town. The miniseries was filmed in Canada with an all-star cast, including Harry Anderson, of *Night Court*; John Ritter; Richard Thomas; and Annette O'Toole. Expect it around Thanksgiving.

Have some sympathy for their letter carriers. Between the official fan club in Boston, managers and CBS records in New York, the New Kids get 50,000 letters a week. The total can reach 100,000 when they're on tour, as they are currently. (This Sunday they're in Dallas.) And when we say "letter," we use the term loosely: When USA WEEKEND did a story on the New Kids a few months back, some girls in Atlanta heard about it and called, asking us to pass along a letter. The "letter" turned out to be a journal of 80-plus pages. The New Kids, the best-selling artists of 1989, also receive handmade gifts like T-shirts, banners, teddy bears (Joe has a thing for them) and quilts inscribed with personal messages. Any gifts of substantial value are donated to children's hospitals.

SCARED SE

26,900 TEENS RESPOND TO OUR

In our exclusive reader survey, 3 of 4 kids ages 12-16 worry they won't find a good job when they grow up. The 'latchkey generation' is knuckling down for the future.

They may shred their jeans with razors, mouth off like sassy Bart Simpson and hoot approvingly when singer Tracy Chapman talks about a revolution. A few daring ones may sport tattoos. But today's teenagers aren't building a counterculture to rival that of the '60s.

Forget those youthquake, generation-gap clichés. The 26,946 adolescents who answered USA WEEKEND's survey are striving for the bottom line. The responses to our full-page questionnaire, which ran in late May, topped the 23,300 mailed in last year.

These future Doogie Howsers and L.A. lawyers want to bank their baby-sitting earnings, enroll in top colleges and land lucrative jobs. They pick pay over satisfaction or challenge when it comes to what they hope for in a career.

But these material girls and boys don't lust after bucks alone. They yearn for security.

True, they're '80s babies. They grew up watching J.R., Alexis and the Rich and Famous consume conspicuously on the tube. But TV also brought them news of drugs, the deficit, homelessness and crime.

Sure, their working parents sprang for \$68 Nikes and \$60 Guess jeans. But two-job families also meant "latchkey" syndrome and stressed-out moms and dads.

Our teenagers of the '90s don't want to get caught in their parents' grind. For them, wealth and success are a refuge in a worrisome world.

As Stephanie Wills, who's pictured on our cover, puts it: "With the homeless situation, I think people are really striving to be rich more these days. Because of all the dangers in the world like drugs, AIDS, the homeless, the starving, we're really waking up and realizing that we have to be more serious about life."

"I want to be rich," says the South Bend, Ind., 16-year-old, who wants to be a doctor. "I want to be rich more than anything in the world. I'd love to be able to

buy myself a pair of jeans, a sweater and shoes that match. I want to be able to buy my mom a house in Connecticut. If I were rich, it would be easier to pay the bills. I want to be rich so that, if someday I get married, I can give my kids all the things they want. I want to be able to support myself, not rely on a husband."

Angie Ho, 13, of North Aurora, Ill., wants to be an architect and is equally blunt: "With pay, I can have more things. It allows you to live more comfortably." How does she define the swell life? "I've always dreamed of living in a six-bedroom house on the beach in North Carolina or California and having a Maltese dog, two children and a Mercedes."

Teens' password: security

Imagine beaded, bell-bottomed teens of the '60s laying this rap on their friends. They would have been branded as squares. How did the flower children's children learn such values?

Joan Anderson, who has written several books on family life, including *Teen Is a Four-Letter Word*, thinks that, when '60s rebels grew into '80s working couples, many abandoned their dreams for the daily grind. And their children took notice. "When the Woodstock generation came out of its coma and collided with the real world, it became more conservative," Anderson says. "The concern about financial security is something these kids are

picking up from their parents. They are growing up in two-income families where there is a lot of concern about whether the bills will be paid."

Teens know it won't be easy holding on to what they have. They've watched their parents struggle to meet mortgages — even with two paychecks.

Particularly troubling is that nearly three of four couples with children in 1988 had two incomes.

One parent worked full time; the other, at least part time. And almost half of the USA's households were making less than \$25,000 in 1988; 13 percent were living under the poverty level of \$12,092 for a family of four.

As Josh Salmons, 12, of Elbert, Colo., explains: "What happened to the homeless might happen to you. You're worried that if you don't get a job right after college, you're going to be in trouble later on."

Aspiring pediatrician Melissa Dubitsky, 15, from Riverdale, Md., exemplifies the new clean-and-sober attitude: "I don't really think college should be fun. College is the next step in your career, so I'm going to take it very seriously." LaMar Byron, 12, of Rochester, N.Y., who has his eye on a career in aeronautics, sums it up: "The more you know, the better you can become."

It fits, then, that traditional professions are top career choices in our survey, with doctor at 11 percent, teacher at 8 percent and lawyer at 8 percent. Still, 10 percent — most of them boys — want to be pro athletes. Pei Lun Shan, 13, from Redmond, Wash., wants to be a professional tennis player or an engineer. Either way, he figures, he'll bring in the bucks. "If I get paid well, then I can support my family and have a lot more vacations."

And although more than a third of our teens choose themselves, their parents or no one in particular as role models, those who do idolize the famous pick stars who are in the money. Favorite heroes include Donald Trump, basketball player Michael Jordan and pop hit-maker Paula Abdul.

'Life is one big test'

While adolescents are materialistic, Judy Blume, author of popular books for teens, believes that underneath it all teenagers would rather have better parenting and fewer possessions. "They'd rather have less and live in a happy, healthy family situation. They certainly wish that their parents would spend

more time with them."

This concern surfaces in the survey. Though 31 percent of our teens plan to raise their children in much the same way they were raised, 19 percent want to spend more time with their kids, and 11 percent want to be parents who listen more.

Anderson, the family-life author, thinks today's conservative, money-oriented teens are insecure. She blames it on the latchkey syndrome. With working moms and dads absent so much of the time, adolescents don't feel like rebelling. They want to get closer. "These children are really the first generation to grow up without a consistent care-giver in the home."

Anderson also sees "a tendency (among parents) to provide things because they cannot provide time. The children get into the habit of equating stuff with love. What does love feel like to these children? Nintendo and tickets to the hockey game."

Teenagers agree that they're playing it safe because they're fearful about the future. They fret about finding a good job (74 percent) and about supporting a family (67 percent), and around half are even worried about dying.

Tracy Zuber, 15, from Troy, Pa., says, "There is a lot more crime and there are drugs — and we have to grow up faster." She is wary of adulthood. "Kids have lots of tests. But as an adult, life is one big test."

Idealism survives

Benjamin Spock, 87, the granddaddy of pediatricians, takes teens' angst in stride. "One of my conclusions is we are a naturally materialistic society ... and, like rubber bands, kids snap back to a materialistic outlook unless something is pulling them away from it."

As Spock remembers it, the boys at the top of his college class (Yale, '25) wanted to be bankers and

brokers. During the Great Depression, young people flirted with radical ideals. In the booming postwar '50s, college grads went for the house, the car and the best job they could find. The late '60s brought back rebels with causes. By the '80s, the pendulum had swung back to a materialistic mood.

Spock is nostalgic for the rebels of the '60s. "I learned a lot from them when they said, 'Why strain all your life to accumulate money and possessions? Why not live simply?'"

Spock should take heart. Despite their doubts and anxieties, kids still cling to ideals. Janice Hansen, 15, of Croton-on-Hudson, N.Y., wants to save the rain forests and oceans of the world as an environmentalist. And they still crave adventure. John Felter, 15, from Arnold, Md., dreams of flying faster than warp speed. "I want to explore the galaxy, see what's out there," says the *Star Trek* fan, who has a 3-foot model of the starship Enterprise on a bedroom shelf.

As for money, that comes second to his quest for excitement. "In my first semester in 10th grade, I was in an English course called 'The American Dream.' The teacher asked, 'What is our American dream?' Most people said it was to be a millionaire. I think a lot of people nowadays want to have that million dollars, be set for life, not have to work. If I can make that million while I'm building a plane that goes Warp 1, that would make me happy. I want it all."

Back to the future

Here's how your high school friends will see you — 20 years down the road

When I was 16, I had a job shelving books at the public library. Not a bad way to spend the summer, since half the town of Danville, Ill., wandered through the building at some time.

One day that summer, a classmate stopped by to shoot the breeze. Eventually, the conversation turned to a former girlfriend of mine. "What's Nancy really like?" Steve wanted to know.

"Watch out," I replied. "Once she gets her hooks in you, you've had it!"

So much for sensitivity, not to mention chivalry.

The fact is, more than two decades later, I don't remember this conversation at all. But Steve sure does. And he repeated it verbatim to me recently, as we both stood clutching drinks at our 20-year high school reunion.

This, of course, was right after he told me that he and Nancy have been married 17 years now.

Open mouth, insert foot. Wincing at my teenage "wisdom" was one side of my reunion experience. But laughing about it with Steve and Nancy — that was the other side, and the thing I think I will remember.

So if you're a kid heading back to high school this month and worrying about your clothes, your cool or your latest gaffe, take heart: In two decades, you and your friends will be eating lousy Swedish meatballs in a crowded room somewhere, laughing about it all.

What does high school look like through the prism of 20 years?

Your actions may have affected others greatly — but you may not recall a thing. Witness my conversation with Steve. Or you may see someone and instantly remember the craziest moment from two decades ago.

Interests nurtured in high school flower in all kinds of ways. I was the newspaper editor, and I made journalism my career. My friend Beverly, a beautiful singer, now works at a children's theater in Omaha and sings as part of her work.

Another friend was a conscientious

objector at the tail end of the Vietnam War, which means he took a stand when he could have just waited things out. Now he works with emotionally disturbed kids. In fact, a great number of classmates are in the "helping" professions: psychiatric nurse, speech therapist and so on. I like to think it's youthful '60s idealism tempered by adult practicality.

Then again, I got a letter after the reunion from a classmate: "The twists and turns that led me to being a dairy farmer in central Minnesota were certainly not in

my high school plans," she wrote.

So be prepared . . . to be surprised.

In 20 years, the girls will look better than the boys. Everyone still looked good at my reunion — perhaps the unhappy and the ungainly stay away from such gatherings. But the women looked best. "The men all have something going on with their hair," one woman said, surveying the Saturday night crowd at the civic center. "Either there's more of it, like a beard or mustache, or there's less, because they're

going bald, or it's turning gray." A couple of men expressed the hope that they would plateau at 40 and have the satisfaction of watching the women catch up.

Time and experience make some faces deeper and more interesting. Two women I'd known fairly well had children with serious health problems. Both were pretty in high school; now there was a depth that I noticed before either had spoken a word.

No matter what tack your life takes, you won't be "the only one." It's easy to feel that way in school, but there's a lot more tolerance, even enjoyment, of differences when you're older. There were couples with kids (one couple had five, and a 4-year-old grandchild), childless couples, single people, office managers, a radio host, an assistant college football coach, homemakers, shoe salesmen. What they were doing wasn't so important as how they were doing, which becomes a pretty broad category as time goes on.

You'll look at your yearbook picture and realize you were a lot younger than you thought at the time. In more ways than one.

Teachers can become friends. The day I left, I had breakfast with one of my English teachers, a favorite who had become a friend. That's one thing you don't really visualize when you're 15: that "Mrs. Kay" will become Martha, someone you look forward to seeing, interested in her life and her reactions to yours.

Your old school will have more stairs. The three sets I climbed when I revisited made much more of an impression on my cardiovascular system than they did 20 years ago. A big addition and renovation was under way, and a new principal, the first woman to hold the job, was in her second week.

I wandered all over, stepping around construction and hunting for old haunts. At the top of the third staircase, I tried the door to what had been our newspaper office. Locked.

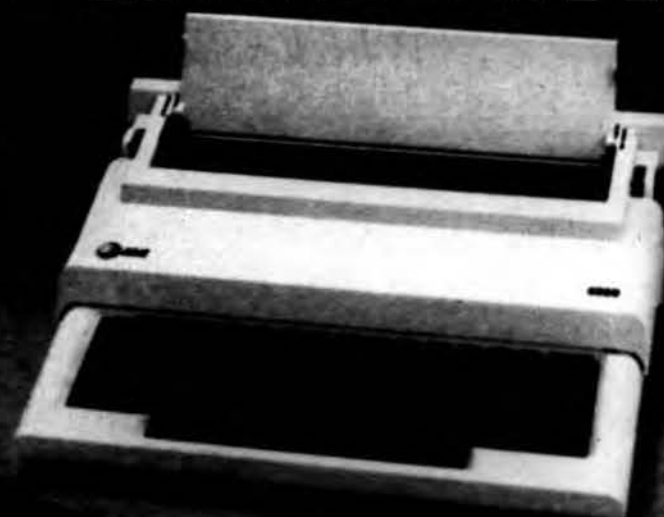
It was probably just as well.

Taking out the 'ouch'

Which school sports can be a pain for children?



Joanna D'Afflitti, 15, of Newton, Mass., who's recovering from a knee injury

'Soccer is very fast and very competitive. I'd be devastated if I couldn't play anymore.'

Any kids' sport can result in injuries. But some are better than others — and most injuries heal well with prompt attention. So says Lyle Micheli, a top sports doctor whose *Sportwise* (Houghton Mifflin, \$19.95) will be in stores next month.

Case in point: Joanna D'Afflitti of Newton, Mass., who sought quick treatment from Micheli for torn ligaments after colliding with another soccer player in '89. After surgery and therapy, she's heading back to soccer camp this month.

Here, Micheli, who is the president of the American College of Sports Medicine, rates six popular sports on their potential for injury — and lifetime fitness.

Basketball

Injury potential: moderate
Lifetime fitness potential: high

"This is a good all-around game, because it involves running and demands quickness and flexibility. Major foot and ankle injuries can occur. I've seen 6-year-olds having fun, shooting garage ball. You need to get the good shoes: We recommend a complete high-top or at least three-quarter height for young players."

Football

Injury potential: high
Lifetime fitness potential: low

"The younger kids, under 14, have a low rate of injury. It's when they get bigger and start to hit harder that they get into injuries. This sport has a great range of positions, so you can get even a child who's non-athletic to enjoy it."

Track and field

Injury potential: moderate
Lifetime fitness potential: low

"A great sport. Almost any kid can find an enjoyable aspect. In certain events, such as pole vault and high jump, there is the potential for catastrophic injury. Overuse injuries are common in throwing events. But the running part is great for conditioning. Kids under age 14 should not be doing any heavy training."

Soccer

Injury potential: moderate
Lifetime fitness potential: high

"This is a near-ideal game, because it has tremendous conditioning and relatively

low injuries. We do see some knee injury; we see foot and ankle injuries. Kids as young as 6 can enjoy soccer. It's growing in all 50 states, for both boys and girls."

Softball/baseball

Injury potential: moderate
Lifetime fitness potential: moderate

"These are sports that you can play for a long time. There's not great conditioning, but they develop hand-eye coordination and balance. For actual pitching, probably age 8 or 9 would be a good time to start. Over-pitching can cause special injuries to the elbow and shoulders."

Volleyball

Injury potential: moderate
Lifetime fitness potential: very high

"Good conditioning. A high enjoyment factor because of the team-play aspect. Once you learn the skills, you can play the rest of your life. We see some hand injuries; very rarely do you see a knee injury. But children younger than age 9 or 10 won't have the ability."

Pressure hurts, too

Is your family a pressure cooker when it comes to competitive sports?

While "athletic families" get high marks for energy, setting goals and motivation, a researcher says, there's a flip side: The parents can get too involved in controlling their kids' direction and end up running — and ruining — things. Of the 30 million kids in organized sports, 15 percent may suffer from negative family influences, says Jon Hellstedt, a psychology professor at Massachusetts' University of Lowell.

Hellstedt, who has studied 100 families of downhill skiers (with kids 13-15), was scheduled to speak last week at the American Psychological Association convention in Boston. According to his research, when parents and children agree on the kids' athletic abilities, everything is fine. But when parents rate their kids' abilities too high, the kids are anxious and have low self-esteem.

Is your athletic family in good psychological shape? Consider:

■ Does the child feel the world revolves around him or her — because the family does? "Kids can develop a sense that they deserve special treatment."

■ Is the child facing burnout? "The earlier burnout comes, usually, the longer it persists."

■ Are the lines of communication open? "You know you're over the edge when your child athlete develops anger or resentment toward you. ... Most kids won't tell their parents they're pushing too hard. That's when a coach or someone else from outside can help."

In fact, the average teen spends nearly two hours each week cooking meals for the family and 2½ hours more preparing meals for himself or herself.

Michael Velasquez, of Aurora, Colo., pitches in on meal preparation to help his working parents. He first became interested in cooking at Boy Scout camps,

where the boys fixed their own meals.

"It's fun to do, and I like to eat," the 12-year-old says of his new-found interest in cooking. "And I like to help out my mom when she's really busy."

Right now, Michael admits that his cooking skills are limited, but he's eager to learn. His specialty is hamburgers. He'd like to expand his repertoire to include more main course dishes. So we asked Bial to offer some expert help.

The best way to learn? "Watching other cooks," the magazine editor says. She recommends that young cooks:

Enroll in home economics classes. Department stores' cooking demonstrations are free and instructive, as are TV cooking programs. City recreation depart-

ments sometimes sponsor cooking classes, and even professional cooking schools cater to children, at various prices.

Find a good cookbook for beginners. Bial likes *After-School Cooking* (Better Homes and Gardens, \$5.95) or *The Essential Cook*, by Charles Delmar (Hill House Publishing, \$24.95).

Start with easy dishes. Choose recipes that call for few ingredients and can be assembled quickly, like the chicken and the couscous salad Bial suggests here. Add rolls and a green vegetable like broccoli or green beans, and serve a fruit salad and cookies for dessert. The chicken gets nice and crisp, just like fried chicken — but instead of frying, it's baked. Couscous is a tiny North African grain that tastes a

Oven-Fried Dill Chicken

1½ cups bite-sized wheat, rice or corn square cereal, crushed into crumbs
3 Tbs. margarine or butter
1 tsp. dried dill
¼ tsp. salt
½ tsp. pepper
2 pounds chicken pieces (drumsticks, thighs or breasts)

Put cereal in a plastic bag and close tightly. Use a rolling pin to crush the cereal. Transfer the crumbs to waxed paper or a pie plate.

In a small saucepan, combine the margarine, dill, salt and pepper. Heat, stirring, until the margarine is melted.

Brush the chicken pieces with the margarine mixture and roll in the cereal crumbs till chicken is coated.

Place chicken, skin side up, in an ungreased shallow baking pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 50 minutes, or until tender and the juices run clear when pricked with a fork. Serves 4.

Couscous Salad

1 small tomato, chopped
1 small carrot, shredded
½ small zucchini or cucumber, cut into thin strips
¾ cup ready-to-cook couscous (or 1½ cups cold cooked rice or pasta)
1 Tb. sliced green onion
1 Tb. sliced black olives
1 Tb. salad oil
1 Tb. vinegar
1 Tb. water
1 tsp. sugar
¼ tsp. dried basil
¼ tsp. Dijon-style mustard
Salt and pepper, to taste

In a medium bowl, combine tomato, carrot, zucchini or cucumber, uncooked couscous, green onion and olives.

Put oil, vinegar, water, sugar, basil, mustard and a dash of salt and pepper in a screw-top jar. Cover and shake well. Pour over couscous-vegetable mixture and toss to coat. Cover and chill before serving. Serves 4.

lot like rice. If you can't find it, substitute long-grain rice or your favorite pasta, such as corkscrews or small shells. Start the salad when the chicken's in the oven.

Plan family cooking events. Assign tasks to get the whole gang involved. Michael's family likes make-your-own tacos. Michael fires up the taco meat while the others chop veggies or grate cheese.

Michael and mom Christine James share KP duty three or four times a week. James thinks it's terrific for both of them that Michael likes to cook. "He's a great help." And Michael's kitchen skills make him much more independent.

James sat on the sidelines while Michael prepared our chicken and couscous salad for a recent Saturday dinner. Michael reports that the food was "easy to make" and his family "loved it."

The video game debate

A teenage Nintendo champion issues his battle cry: 'Let kids play!'

I have played Nintendo for about two years, and the only time it's ever been a problem was when my grades were going down and my mom took it away for a whole quarter of the school year. Actually, it was more my fault than Nintendo's. I really didn't play it all that much — but I didn't study at all.

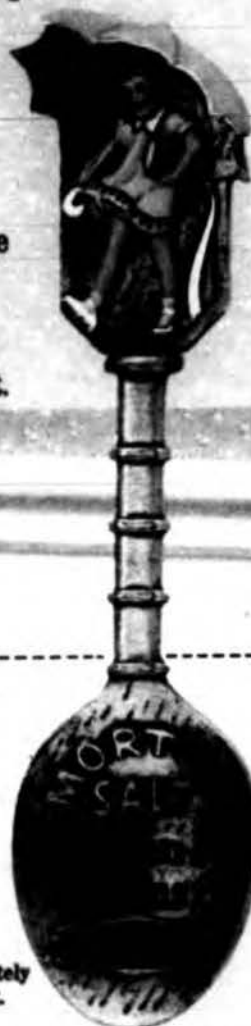

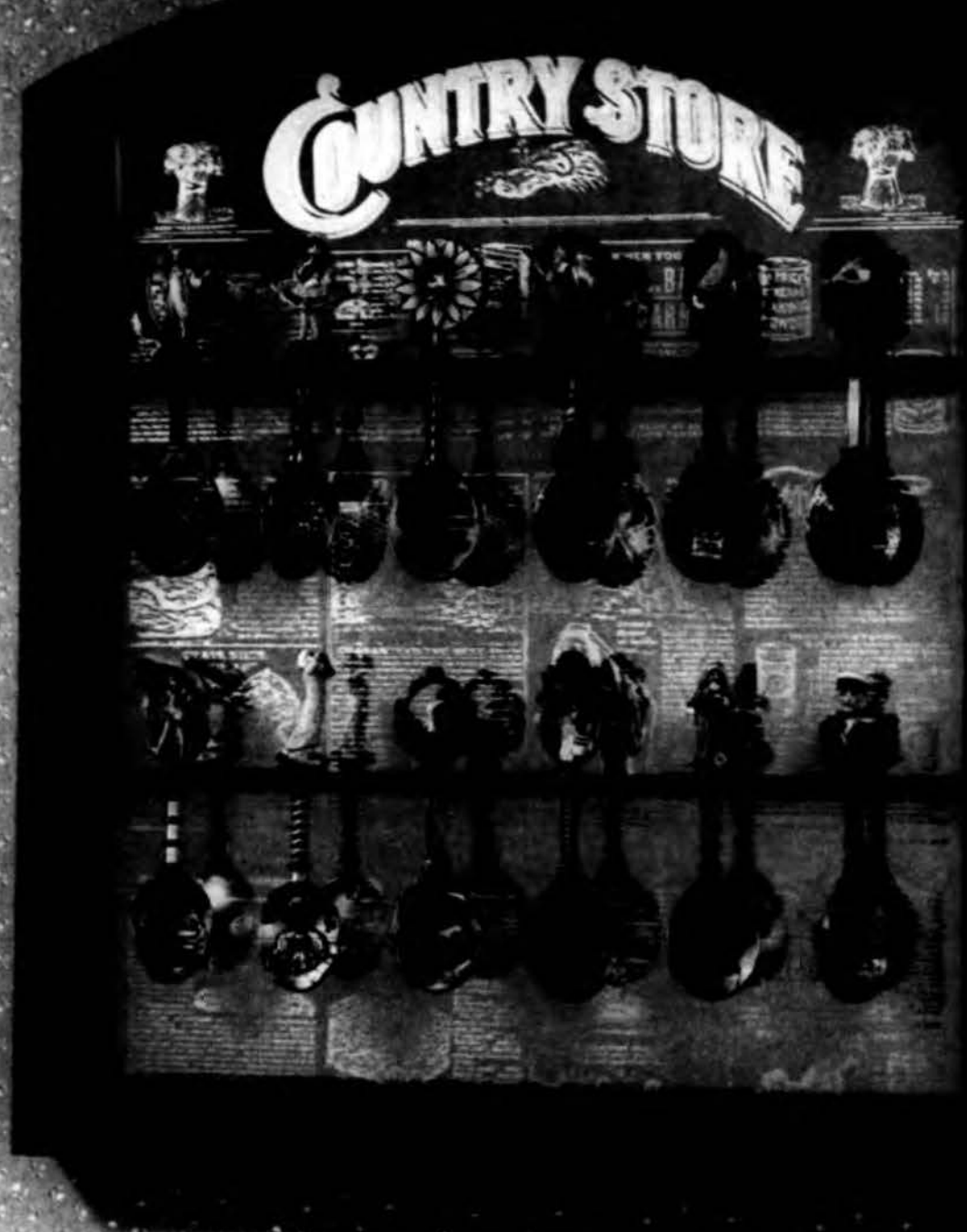

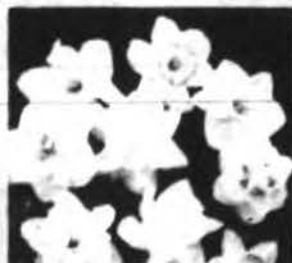

Outstanding Miniseries

"The Thorn Birds," a 10-hour ABC miniseries that aired March 27-30, 1983, earned Chamberlain and the late Barbara Stanwyck Golden

Globe Awards as Best Actor and Actress. Co-stars Richard Kiley and Jean Simmons won in the supporting category. Although Chamberlain received an Emmy nomination as Outstanding Actor, only Stanwyck walked away with an Emmy as Outstanding Actress.

Jingle-Jangle Johnson

I have been a fan of actor Ben Johnson for years. I believe he was born in Oklahoma and was a stunt man before being "discovered." What can you tell me about him? What he is doing now? SALLY MESSIN, ROSEVILLE, CALIF.

Johnson was born June 13 in Foraker, Okla. (some sources, however, list the nearby town of Pawhuska, which has a larger population). Sometime between 1918 and 1920, the son of a rancher and champion rodeo rider, he delivered some horses to Hollywood and ended up staying himself. Johnson worked as a wrangler and stunt man in movies before director John Ford cast him as an actor in "Three Godfathers" in 1946 and gave him featured roles in such film classics as "She Wore a Yellow Ribbon" (1949), "Rio Grande" (1950) and "Wagon Master" (1950). In 1954, Johnson decided to leave Hollywood and ride in rodeos full-time. He lost money by giving up acting roles, but he finished the year with the title of World Champion Calf Roper. He later returned to full-time acting, eventually earning a Best Supporting Actor Oscar for "The Last Picture Show" (1971). His numerous film credits include "The Wild Bunch" (1969), "Junior Bonner" (1972), "The Town that Dreaded Sundown" (1977), "The Hunter" (1980) and "Cherry 2000" (1989). While many consider Ben Johnson filmdom's best movie cowboy, Johnson's own vote goes to Joel McCrea.

ON THE COVER

Dr. Doogie Howser and Neil Patrick Harris have a lot in common: They're 17 and in tough professions.

No one but producer Steven Bochco ("Hill Street Blues," "L.A. Law") could have the clout to get this racy scene in the pilot of a show about a 15-year-old prodigy who was a first-year resident doctor in a hospital. To celebrate the 16th birthday of the young resident (Neil Patrick Harris), his hospital co-workers plotted to give him a "present." On a ruse, they sent the still squeaky-voiced doc into an empty operating room. A waiting nurse began to pull down his pants. As Doogie Howser's eyes popped in embarrassment, his co-workers jumped out just in time to save him and shout "Happy Birthday!"

The success of ABC's "Doogie Howser, M.D." (airing Wednesdays) is rooted in these kinds of moments. After all, it is strange and difficult to have the intellect of an adult genius, and still be trapped in the body and emotions of a teen-ager.

Harris, the now 17-year-old actor who plays Doogie, is the first to see the conflict in being a child-man. In the year since "Doogie Howser" became a hit, he has chatted with Arsenio, posed for the covers of dozens of magazines and accepted the Best Newcomer statuette at the People's Choice Awards. All the while, he was completing his 11th-grade studies.

Harris doesn't claim to have Doogie's intellect, but he easily draws parallels between his child-acting and his character's child-doctoring worlds. "We're both dealing professionally with more adults than kids," he says. "We're both involved in jobs that take up a lot of time. And we're both 17-year-olds going through feelings of that age. But when you hit adolescence, it all boils down to the same thing."

Harris sounds well-grounded. Unlike many adolescent stars, he has been spared the indignity of having a professional stage mother. His parents are both lawyers, and he spent almost all of his early years living quietly in Ruidoso, N.M. During the "Doogie Howser" taping months, he lives with his parents in a tiny apartment in Los Angeles. When he's not working, the family retreats to its New Mexico home.

This summer, Harris even found time

to attend the same drama camp in New Mexico that he has attended for the past three years. "I did a monologue from 'Equus,'" he says. "What a great play! I'd love to get the chance to actually do all of it."

Harris started acting in 1980 when he tagged along with his older brother Brian, who was auditioning for a school production of "The Wizard of Oz." He wound up playing Toto. "I didn't have any lines," he laughs. Later, after acting in grammar-school and junior-high productions, he attended a week-long acting workshop taught by playwright Mark Medoff, who wrote the play "Children of a Lesser God."

Medoff was so impressed with Harris that he recommended him for his then-upcoming movie, "Clara's Heart." That's when Harris came to Hollywood for the first time. He received good reviews and enjoyed working with co-star Whoopi Goldberg. "She's taught me a lot about how to stay cool about becoming famous," he says.

After doing a few episodic guest appearances, Harris faced a huge cattle-call audition for the role of Doogie. Casting such an unusual role must have been a tough call for Bochco, who has said, "I believe that a kid should play a kid." (Doogie's best friend and neighbor, Vinnie Delino, however, is played by 23-year-old Max Casella.)

Harris has opted against heavily researching the medical aspects of his role. "I hesitated before really wanting to go to a hospital, because from what I read it can be pretty scary and upsetting at times," he says. "I mean in TV

it's fake blood. I think I'd be a little intimidated."

It's the teen-age, high-school kid aspect of Doogie that Harris likes playing best. "I can relate to it," he says. Indeed, "Doogie Howser" has attracted a considerable teen audience - ABC Research estimated midseason that 42 percent of all teens watching TV during "Doogie Howser"'s Wednesday-night time slot were tuned in to the show.

In the process, Harris has become a teen idol - with his photos featured on covers of magazines like Teen Beat and Superteen, right beside those of New Kids on the Block.

"That's fine with me for now," he says, "but I honestly don't see my career headed in that direction."

Harris says he loves working with Bochco, who he says is relatively modest about his success. ("Doogie Howser" is the first show of a 10-show deal Bochco has with ABC. His second show, "Cop Rock" premieres this season.) "I remember going into a group meeting with him at the studio," Harris says. "It was very crowded. He got up, gave me his chair and sat on the floor."

Harris reacts to fame more like a teen-age fan than a teen-age star. "At the People's Choice Awards, I couldn't believe how some really famous people came up to me and told me they like my show," he says. "What a thrill!"

But recently he has had to deal with some of the more unfortunate sides of television stardom. He vehemently denies a recent cover story in a national TV magazine that stated that the other kids at his summer camp this year were treating him deferentially because he has his own TV show. "That story was a lie," he says. "I got along with everyone at camp just great as always."

Harris' long-range plans don't even center on TV or the movies. "I like the theater much better," he says. "Some day I'd like to do Broadway."

Harris completes high school this year, but he's postponing college until "Doogie Howser" completes its run.

"I think they're all waiting until I'm 18 (when he's no longer covered under California's child labor laws), so I can work longer hours," he jokes. "But I can wait. I know I'll always have plenty of time to act."

Frankly, we were a little worried about the doves.

There were two sets of them, in a brace of cages suspended above the stage where the stars and producer of HBO's "Women & Men: Stories of Seduction" (premiering Sunday, Aug. 19) were meeting the press. The birds looked a little peaked, to tell you the truth. It was hot in that out-building of a Beverly Hills estate rented by

HBO for the evening. Plus, each cage had red and green spotlights trained on it. The doves' eyes looked a little glassy. And every time they flapped their wings, a few white feathers drifted down like tangible regrets.

Lined up beneath them were Beau Bridges, Elizabeth McGovern, Molly Ringwald and Peter Weller (James Woods and Melanie Griffith also star, but were not there.) If

that sounds impressive, consider the off-screen talent: Ernest Hemingway, Mary McCarty and Dorothy Parker wrote the three stories on which "Women & Men" is based. Ken Russell and Tony Richardson directed two of the stories. Joan Didion and John Gregory Dunne adapted the Hemingway story. Marvin Hamlis wrote the score.

The project was produced by David Brown, whom you may know better as Helen Gurli Brown's husband. She always calling him "sexy" in interviews and in *Cosmopolitan*. This seems unfair, so Brown has a distinguished career. When Betty Friedan when you really need her?

Someone asked Brown why TV doesn't do more projects like this adaptation of works by arguably three of our finest American writers.

Brown hadn't fallen off a wagon of turnips. He saw a pitfall here. He didn't spin "One of the seats that HBO was, 'Please don't give us a "cultural event." As much as we're PBS, this is intended to be entertainment. Writers are wonderful storytellers. These stories, when they were published, were published in literary publications, necessarily. You don't have to be a member of the intelligentsia to get it."

It was close, but the bullet was dodged. No one need fear being exposed to *literature*. School's out, OK?

The doves fluttered and a few more feathers wafted down.

We hope they're right. They really did belong in Hollywood.

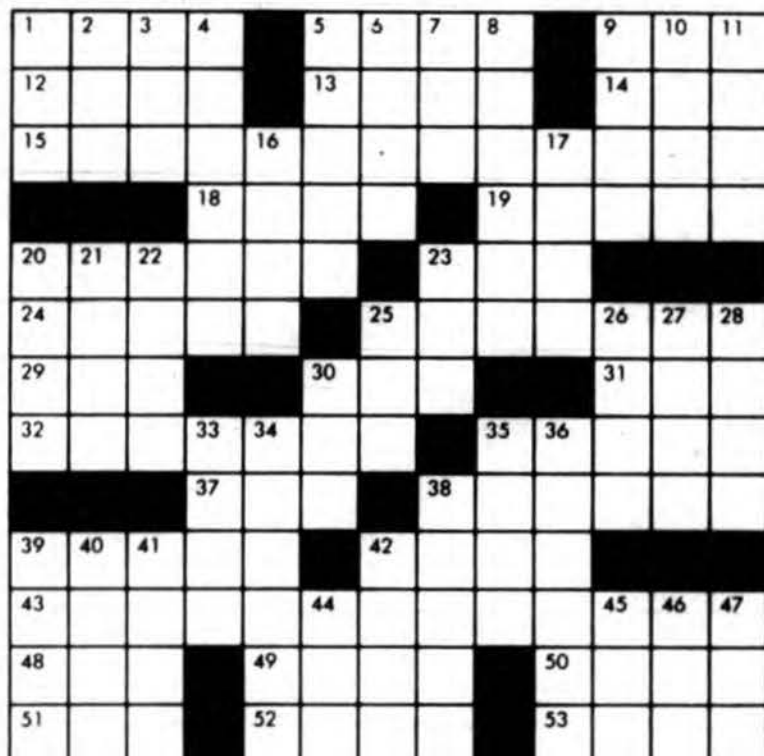

NEWPORT BEACH — The sale of gas masks to Orange Coast residents is booming, a military surplus store here reported Saturday.

"Most are afraid that Iraq is going to send terrorists over to this country and they want to be prepared for any chemical warfare," said Michael Sherman, owner of South Coast Army and Navy Surplus in Newport Beach.

People buying the gas masks come from all walks of life, he added. One couple in their 40s walked into the surplus store and bought masks simply for survival in case of terrorist attacks.

The masks are Israeli army issue, sell for \$9.95 — and don't come with any guarantees of effectiveness against poison gas, he said.

U.S. warships fire on 2 Iraqi tankers

About 10 members of ACT UP/Orange County waited with fellow constituents for nearly an hour to speak with their congressman, Rep. Christopher Cox (R-40th), whose voting record on AIDS-related issues they hope to improve.

"We're protesting his support of the Chapman Amendment of the (Americans With) Disabilities Act," said ACT UP member Jan Speller. "We feel he is promoting misinformation that HIV can be transmitted through casual contact."

Speller said the amendment, though not passed with the bill, would have given employers the right to take away the jobs of food handlers with communicable diseases as long as they gave them a substitute position with equal pay. Speller said the term "communicable diseases" was not well enough defined, and could include AIDS.

"He tried to say the amendment wasn't about HIV or AIDS," Speller said of the group's gathering with Cox. "Basically, we just wanted to hold him accountable for that. (But) he skirted the issue. He wanted to argue semantics."

"We're here to say that his routine about sex is a form of bigotry and is homophobic," Barton said. "Dice embodies a national mindset that fears

women and fears ideologies of homosexuals."

"I feel he (Clay) embodies crimes of violence against women. He makes fun of gays and (I) feel that he fosters hatred," said Bhairavi Guss of the Bayview Chapter of NOW serving Corona del Mar.

The City Council will decide at its Monday meeting whether to accept Riedel's \$8.9 million bid, which was \$2.5 million lower than the city's estimate and \$2.8 million below the second-lowest bid.

Riedel engineers said they would be able to save a substantial amount on the project by pre-casting deck sections on land, rather than casting in place over the water.

In his recommendation to the council, Public Works Director Louis Sandoval said the city's design consultant, management consultant and staff engineers agreed Portland-based Riedel could meet construction specifications with its method.

"It was concluded that Riedel's construction method, although somewhat unorthodox, has been used successfully before, is an innovative way to reduce construction costs and conforms to the project plans and specifications," Sandoval said in his report.

However, General Construction Co., which submitted the second-lowest bid of \$11.4 million, is protesting Riedel's bid.

people's fishing poles and pulled the poles into the ocean.

"The poles just flipped over the side and sank to the bottom," Shannon said.

The poles were lost when the strong rip tides pulled them down into the depths, Marine Safety Chief Kendall Jacobsen said. The city even sent divers out the next day to try to retrieve the poles, but with no luck, Jacobsen said.

Shannon and the others were directed to file a claim with the city for reimbursement.

The city's adjuster will investigate Shannon's claim and decide if the youth should be paid. "This is a different claim, since they're not suing the city," Jacobsen noted. "They're just trying to get reimbursement."

Shannon said he had caught 40- to 80-pound bat rays in the past with the pole, which he estimated was worth about \$200.

"It was a real nice pole," the youth said. "It was about a year old. My dad in Atlanta sent it to me as a Christmas present."

Orange Coast Week in Review

Murder charges dropped, wife released

NEWPORT BEACH — A 49-year-old woman who ended a rocky relationship with a man she married in 1984 by shooting him to death was arrested on suspicion of murder Tuesday, then freed two days later after the District Attorney's Office decided not to file charges against her.

Part of the reason Helen Susan Parser wasn't charged in the shooting death of Roger Hughes was the revelation that Hughes had attacked her before, including once with a fireplace poker, the District Attorney Office reported.

Hughes had also violated a restraining order Parser obtained against him, raising the possibility that self-defense was the motive for the shooting at Parser's Newport Crest condominium. It could not be confirmed if the couple were still married.

Traffic stop results in dead suspect

HUNTINGTON BEACH — A routine traffic stop erupted into a shootout at Huntington State Beach early Tuesday, leaving a former Montebello physician with a history of mental illness and heroin addiction dead at the hands of a park ranger.

It was the eighth time this year that an Orange County peace officer has killed a suspect, and only the second time a state park ranger has fatally shot someone.

Nicholas Joseph Caliri Jr., 36, was pronounced dead of gunshot wounds to the face and neck shortly after the 12:25 a.m. shootout, which started when Caliri fired two shots at the ranger, who had stopped Caliri's swerving vehicle at the park exit at the intersection of Pacific Coast Highway and Newland Street. The ranger drew his own gun, fired and killed the suspect.

City sued in police shooting death

FOUNTAIN VALLEY — When two Fountain Valley police officers opened fire on Cameron C. Rogers in Newport Beach last month, one or both of them had obviously "lost it," the lawyer representing Rogers' family said Tuesday.

On behalf of Rogers' widow and 2-month-old son, Farrar filed a claim against the city of Fountain Valley this week, asserting the officers used excessive force. The claim will eventually lead to a wrongful death suit against the city, Farrar said.

On July 25, Rogers, 27, of San Dimas, led police on a 100 mph chase from Huntington Beach to Newport Beach, where Rogers' stolen Chevrolet Blazer became jammed between a car and a low wall as he tried to turn around. Two Fountain Valley officers fired into the car 11 times after Rogers continued to move after he was ordered to freeze, police said.

Investigation of UCI finds no proof of fraud

IRVINE — University of California officials investigated allegations of MediCal and Medicare fraud by staff members at the UCI Medical Center school of psychiatry, a spokeswoman said Tuesday.

But by Thursday, officials said the internal investigation had turned up no proof that psychiatrists at the medical center had defrauded the state and federal governments by passing off research work as treatment.

According to a series of memoranda obtained by the Orange Coast Daily Pilot, unnamed psychiatrists at the medical center billed the federal and state governments for experimental drugs and procedures that are not approved for reimbursement.

Surrogate wants custody of unborn child

SANTA ANA — A surrogate mother filed suit Monday in Superior Court asking for custody of the unborn child she carries — a baby that began with the sperm and egg of a couple who agreed to pay her \$10,000 to bear their child.

Although the woman has no genetic ties with the child, she has asked the court to grant her custody, arrange visitation rights for the biological parents and set up child support payments.

News of the weird Nebraska town plants banana trees

OXFORD, Neb. — It was a town looking for appeal and no monkey business.

Civic boosters on Thursday bought the makings for 50 banana plants in a campaign to make this community of 1,100 the "Banana City" in the Cornbelt of America.

"This is the beginning of the big banana groves in the central region of the United States," said businessman Gene Brooks Sr. "The Banana Belt has come to the Republican Valley."

The banana belt idea took root about a year ago when Brooks began running radio ads for his car dealership, attempting to draw attention by advising listeners to "Come to Banana City."

One person called and asked if he was actually going to grow bananas. "I said, 'We certainly are,'" Brooks said, "even though the idea had not occurred to me yet."

Brooks researched bananas and ordered the banana "corms," or starts, from Mexico. The corms, planted in half whiskey barrels, will grow to 8 feet.

Anna Johnson, seven months pregnant with the baby that Mark and Crispina Calvert claim is theirs, also asked to be named a biological mother of the boy she carries. The Calverts insist they've kept their end of the bargain and accuse Johnson of holding their baby hostage. All three adults are Orange County residents.

Meanwhile, it was revealed last week that welfare fraud charges are pending against Johnson, who was charged in July for accepting welfare benefits while receiving income from a nursing registry and Western Medical Center in Santa Ana.

Hotel operators compete for tourist dollars

COSTA MESA — Hotel operators, frustrated with having to explain to potential visitors where Costa Mesa is, have proposed a joint-marketing system with better-known Newport Beach and neighboring Irvine aimed at drawing more tourism to the area.

But joining forces comes at a price. Advocates of a joint bureau want each city to raise by 1 percent its bed tax charged to guests at motels and hotels.

Richard Gartrell, president of the Newport Beach Conference and Visitors Bureau, said a joint effort is needed to compete with major marketing programs already in place in the Palm Springs and San Diego areas.

Irvine's premier hospital opens for business

IRVINE — After years of planning and months of delays, this city finally has a hospital, and Fred Fuller, Kitona Porter and Adam James Hartley couldn't be happier.

Fuller wound up at the hospital he never knew existed after winding up on his back. He had a whole floor of the Sand Canyon facility to himself and became a media star on opening day.

Porter became the 177-bed private hospital's first patient after her car flipped several times at the El Toro "Y."

And the 8-pound, 7-ounce Hartley got \$5,000 for his college education Wednesday for being the first boy born at the medical center. The first girl got the same treatment, and the next 98 newborns will receive United States Savings Bonds.

Surgeon meets the press during surgery

NEWPORT BEACH — In a back room of his opulent Newport Center offices, Dr. Michael Elam was busily cutting away at the eyelids of a sedated man. With a small flick of a bloody instrument, he waved a reporter into the room Monday.

It was the cosmetic surgeon's first day back at work after the state Medical Board revoked his license the previous week, and he was busy.

While the usually gregarious doctor couldn't say much about his current legal problems, he happily invited a reporter into his surgical suite to chat. His license revocation goes into effect Sept. 6 unless a Superior Court judge grants him a temporary stay. Elam plans to fight his case in court until he is completely vindicated, he said. He never discussed the possibility he could lose.

Lesbian & Gay Pride Celebration peaceful

IRVINE — Contrary to last year's violence-marred festival in Santa Ana, Orange County Cultural Pride's 1990 Lesbian & Gay Pride Celebration received a warm reception at UCI on Sunday.

Thousands of onlookers cheered participants, including Grand Marshall Robert Gentry, a Laguna Beach city councilman, who headed the parade in a gold Cadillac convertible.

As they passed onlookers, several marchers chanted, "Two, four, six, eight — UC Irvine ain't so straight" and "Hey, hey, ho, ho — homophobia's got to go."

But a group of about 15 men had some chants of their own. Waving banners in a roped-off area along the route, they shouted biblical slogans as the parade marchers went by.

Memories of those special little things add up to a grand old time

There wasn't any need for a sweater; it's been that kind of summer.

Usually around 6:30 in the evening, I'd go out and sit on the front patio. It would still be bright in the afternoon and plenty warm. Often my daughter and son-in-law would walk by with their 2 year-old and we'd talk about the duplex being built next door.

Nikki would come out and maybe a friend would walk by and we'd have a glass of wine. And we'd gab about the county fair or the warm water or high surf or the recent run on sunny mornings. Eventually we'd talk about what to do for dinner.

One evening, while the sun was setting in a pink and orange sky, my son-in-law yelled from his pickup, "This has been the best summer." Then he left to play in a twilight slow-pitch softball game at Lincoln School.

A week or so later, Nikki and I walked to Oysters for dinner. We saw Don Clement, the contractor rebuilding the yellow date shake stand above Crystal Cove. He said people from all over kept stopping even though the stand wasn't open.

He shared a story about a couple in their late 40s who arrived one afternoon in separate cars. At first they seemed embarrassed. They explained to Don they were separately married but, for 14 years, had been meeting once a year at the date shake stand. Then they left in one car for a special hotel in San Clemente. We all agreed it sounded like the movie, "Same Time, Next Year," with Alan Alda and Ellen Burstyn.

A moment later, Don's wife Stephanie walked into Oysters and said, "This has been the best summer." Then the two of them left for Edward's Newport Cinema to see "Pretty Woman."

The next week, one muggy morning, I was in Fashion Island to buy a book on Richard Nixon. A stage was set up and there were stacks of chairs and special lighting. I asked a tall brunette in a red business suit what was going on. She said Gary and Company was having a fashion show, open house and an outdoor grille. She invited my wife and me.

By seven o'clock that evening the I, Magnin wing of Fashion Island was lost in white clouds of appetizing smoke. Tables were loaded with platters of sweet and spicy sausages and fried eggplant and waiters were passing trays of shiitake mushrooms and buffalo mozzarella mini-pizzas. Nikki and I saw friends and I talked with Dick Braeger, the owner of Gary's who's been a pal since UCLA days back in the 50's.

On the way out we saw the young brunette who invited us. She was still smart looking in her red business suit. Her name was Laura Winger, a marketing manager of Fashion Island and partly responsible for the evening's affair.

We talked about food, people and the wonderful weather. In parting Laura said, "This has been the best summer." We said goodbye and she headed back to do her job.

One hot Thursday afternoon in July, I couldn't work at my desk. The house was being ant-proofed and no one was allowed inside. I did some repairs on the car, straightened the garage and, for some reason, felt restless. There wasn't anything to do. The sun was brilliant, the sea was sparkling and the sky was solid blue. But I couldn't think of a thing to do.

Then I found an old pair of running shoes in the garage and put them on. I took off my shirt and decided to run a mile or more in the hot afternoon sun, maybe head for the beach. When I reached the beach I took off the shoes and ran on into the surf.

That first wave washed away sweat and with it my boredom. The foam was frothy and fresh and I could see my feet and a few shells on the sandy bottom. I hadn't been body surfing in two summers but caught a few and swaggered up to the beach and picked up the old shoes.

The sand was hot so I ran across it. Near the parking lot was a row of fresh water showers. I stood under one for awhile, all the time thinking, "This has been the best summer." Then I stepped out from under the cool, fresh water and headed for home.

There wasn't any need for a towel; it's been that kind of a summer.

Part of the past gets a new look

Huntington Beach still has iron hitching rings

HUNTINGTON BEACH — Most of the time, customers walking in and out of the surfboard shop at Walnut and 6th probably don't even notice the iron rings anchored to the sidewalk. If people do spot them, few can probably guess why the rings are there.

After all, there's no need to tie up a 120-horsepower Pinto, or even a 280-horse Mustang. Once the ignition is turned off, those metal ponies generally stay put.

On the other hand, 87 years ago there was every reason to tie up a one-horsepower buggy.

That's when the rings were in-

stalled, back when a horse and buggy — rather than a Bronco — was a common mode of transportation.

Matthew E. Helme had the rings set in the sidewalk when the commercial building and adjacent family home were built in 1903.

Oldtimers know the site as the Worthy property. According to Guy Guzzardo of the Huntington Beach Historical Resources Board, Helme's daughter married Lawrence Worthy, and the couple lived in the home next door to the commercial building.

Both buildings and a handful of outbuildings to the rear have remained in the Worthy family ever since.

The furniture store gave way to a

plumbing service and other enterprises before the current surfboard shop opened.

Guzzardo said the entire corner might have gone the way of the wrecking ball along with much of the downtown during the current redevelopment phase.

But in 1987, the property was listed in the National Register of Historical Places, based on its local significance and as a classic example of early western commercial architecture.

In fact, because of the national listing, builders of the new pier will have to replicate the original as much as possible. Even the buildings on the pier are going to be stored for possible reuse.

And plans are under way to restore the entire Worthy property to its former grandeur.

Guzzardo said the Worthy family plans to open a bed & breakfast operation in the next few years.

And, while few expect guests will be tying up their horses outside, restorers felt the hitching rings were unique mementos of those bygone days.

Unfortunately, two of the original three had been removed in the early 80s and were lost.

One remained, and when city crews began tearing up the sidewalk a few weeks ago for sewer and street repairs, it was rescued from the scrap pile.

The new rings were anchored in fresh concrete last week.

Donations save school choir director

FOUNTAIN VALLEY — It was a little more than a year ago when Fountain Valley High School Choir Director Ted Reid faced the possibility that he might no longer have a job.

My, how things change.

Not only has the Huntington Beach Union High School District decided to rehire Reid, but he is currently preparing his students for a 1991 date in Vienna, Austria at the 20th annual Youth and Music Festival.

But it was no easy task keeping Reid aboard.

When the district told Reid last

year that it would not have the funds to rehire him as choir director it was like a bombshell was dropped on the community.

Faced with the possibility of losing a talented director, a group of parents decided to take matters in their own hands; the Vocal Music Foundation was born.

"The foundation was formed a year ago in June when the district decided the cutbacks would include Ted Reid," said Pat Harney, president of the foundation and an elementary school teacher in the Fountain Valley School District.

"They said 'If you want to pay his salary you can keep him,'" Harney said. So with a \$2,000 donation

from the Fountain Valley Rotary Club, they formed the non-profit foundation and worked with the district to pay Reid's salary.

"Nobody quite knew what was going to happen," Reid said. "But that made me feel good that the cause I felt was worthwhile was also felt by the community to be worthwhile."

"We feel if we hadn't done that, we don't know where he would be now," Harney said. "He was worth saving."

With the district's rehiring of Reid this June, Harney said the foundation can now focus its energy on fundraising, and the first item on the docket is the Youth and Music

Festival.

"It's a very exciting and special invitation," Reid said of the invitation to sing at the festival. "And I'm proud that it came as a result of the choir's reputation."

The theme for this year's choir is Musical Odyssey: Vienna 91, and the foundation is now looking for monetary donations from the community to help with the approximately \$2,000 per student price tag for the trip.

"We're seeking community support because we think it's an honor that has been bestowed upon the community," said Robin Einstein, a choir member parent and foundation member.

12 arrested after cocaine probe

ANAHEIM

Twelve people from both the East and West coasts including one man from Huntington Beach were in custody Saturday after being indicted by a federal grand jury for distributing cocaine nationwide out of a Southland warehouse.

The indictment ended a 10-month investigation led by Anaheim police in cooperation with other Southern California law enforcement agencies and the Drug Enforcement Administration.

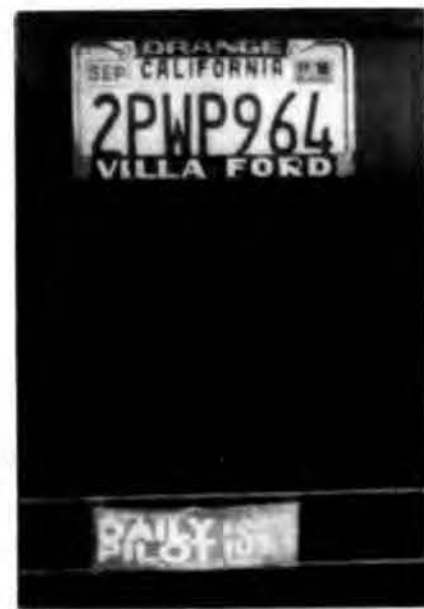

Editorial

Art Institute's stand brave, but not wisest move

In refusing a \$15,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, there is little doubt that the Art Institute of Southern California, in Laguna Beach, has shown courage.

But has it shown wisdom? No matter what standard is used, \$15,000 is hard to come by these days. The institute probably could have used that money. It had to be hard to give it up.

We are not quarreling with the reason behind the decision. It is noble. Far be it for us to say institute President Russell Lewis was guilty of faulty reasoning when he recommended to the board that the grant be turned down.

The debate, after all rages, through not only the art community but the general community as well.

Simply stated, by accepting the grant the school would have had to agree not to use the funds to "promote, disseminate or produce materials which in the judgment of the National Endowment for the Arts or the National Endowment for the Humanities may be considered obscene."

Lewis said that by accepting the grant, it "would be taking the first step down the dangerous path of censorship."

He may be right. But it should be pointed out that five Orange County art groups have accepted NEA funds and have signed the pledge.

They include the Laguna Art Museum, the Pacific Symphony Association, the Pacific Chorale, Opera Pacific and the Orange County Philharmonic Society.

They, too, are concerned with censorship. Apparently, they feel that what they have to offer would in no way skirt the NEA rules, as distasteful as those rules may be to some.

We are sure the same could be said about the art institute. There is no reason to believe that the school was planning anything that would contravene the agreement with NEA.

In other words, we can't help but wonder if the school really didn't cut off its nose to spite its face.

It is a brave stand the school and its new president are taking.

It probably, at this point in time, is not the wisest thing to do.

It raises a few questions, however. For example, just who was holding that seat? Her brochure says she has "16 years of direct legislative experience." It also shows a bit of, shall we say, cockiness, on John's part in his race against Republican Wes Bannister. In a supposed question-and-answer interview with Patti, there is a flat-out statement about John leaving the Senate "to become state insurance commissioner."

Just say neigh

Assemblyman Richard Floyd, D-Hawthorne, has been carrying a bill that in its original form would have prohibited race horses from receiving drugs 48 hours before races. The measure, Assembly Bill 216, has been weakened and languishes in the Senate Appropriations Committee. Nonetheless, you've got to love the name: It's been dubbed "Just Say Neigh."

Name recognition

More name recognition — This is the last thing that former San Fran-

cisco Mayor Dianne Feinstein, the Democratic candidate for governor, needs in her campaign. Pro-choice activists used a recent meeting of the National Conference of State Legislatures in Nashville, Tenn., to release what they said was a list of 450 legislators nationwide who support federal legislation to outlaw any state ban on abortions. Among the Californians they listed was "Assemblywoman Dianne Feinstein."

Feinstein's overkill

Under the heading of saturation bombing, we have the Dianne Feinstein campaign's efforts to back up her blasting of Pete Wilson for what she called "intervention" with federal regulators on behalf of the savings and loan industry. Days after the two clashed over her TV commercial and his counter ad involving savings and loan problems, Feinstein's campaign sent — by Federal Express, no less — full binders thick with letters and replies between Wilson and federal officials. In 1951, the owner of the St. Louis Browns, Bill Veeck, sent in Eddie Gaedel, a 3-foot-7 midget, to pinch-hit in a game against Detroit. Gaedel, whose function was to draw walks, was later barred from play by American League president Will Harridge.

In 1955, severe flooding in the Northeast caused by the remnants of Hurricane Diane claimed some 200 lives.

In 1960, a tribunal in Moscow convicted American U2 pilot Francis Gary Powers of espionage, and sentenced him to ten years in prison.

In 1976, President Ford won the Republican presidential nomination at the party's convention in Kansas City.

In 1981, two U.S. Navy F-14 jet fighters shot down a pair of Soviet-built Libyan SU-22's in a dogfight over the Gulf of Sidra.

Chasing fires is a young reporter's job

It was 11 p.m. Thursday. I was just about to pack it in for the night. I had just finished writing a scathing "Inside the Newsroom," our daily little front-page article, about one of our photographers going off on a wild goose chase.

Then the phone rang.

"Hey, there's a fire at 19th and Balboa," said the caller. "There are flames, must be, 200 feet in the air. It's borderline Costa Mesa-Newport Beach. You better hurry, they're about to block off the road."

The caller obviously didn't know his city borders. I reckoned, because everyone knows Balboa Boulevard and 19th Street is deep in the heart of Balboa. But I didn't have time to worry about that. The night reporter and night photographer had gone home. I could call them in, but there was a huge fire on the Peninsula — NOW!

Summer rentals were being turned into barbecue pits. Million-dollar homes were being swallowed up in the conflagration, rendering hundreds homeless — and everyone knows there's nothing worse than homeless millionaires.

This was big, really big.

I grabbed a note pad and swung by the photo lab. There were two cameras on a counter. One obviously had no film inside, but the other's film counter had been clicked off to number eight. I picked it up and was off.

In no time at all my LTD station wagon with the peeling tinted windows and flopping baby seat was zooming down Newport Boulevard. After crossing the bridge, I cut across to Balboa Boulevard. I rolled down the windows and hung my head out like a slobbering canine. But I didn't smell smoke until long past Balboa and 19th, past Main Street, down to where I could breathe in the odor from the beach fire pits.

Then I thought back to what the caller said, "borderline Costa Mesa-

Newport Beach." I drove back to 19th Street in Costa Mesa and headed east, thinking one of those side streets on the Newport border might be called Balboa. No luck.

I'd been bamboozled. What a rookie mistake I'd made. You always call the fire department to check these things out.

Dejectedly, I headed back to the office. But as I approached, two fire trucks were screaming down Newport Boulevard, then west onto Victoria Street. I was in this deep. I thought, might as well follow them. As soon as I turned onto Victoria, I could see huge, billowing clouds of white smoke, seemingly reaching for the Hubble telescope.

My adrenalin started pumping again. Just past Valley, cars were lined on both sides of Victoria. People were standing around, lazily watching the flames engulfing the canyon below. Four fire trucks were parked on a dirt road north of the fire, to protect the expensive homes on the ridge. I walked down there, talked to a couple firefighters and went on ahead to within some 100 yards of the flames.

Through the brush, I could see there was a street south of the fire that was much closer to the action. So I dashed back to my car, hung a right the first place I could and spent the next 15 minutes driving in and out of dead-end streets like a rat in a maze.

By now, I thought to myself, I was getting too old for this.

Eventually, I wound up on the road leading to the Newport Terrace condominiums, where I was met by a Newport Beach policeman who had set up some flares to halt traffic. I could park and walk inside, he told me, but the fire had pretty much died down. I forged ahead anyway. I had come this far. I was going to get near a damn fire if I had to start one myself.

There were people everywhere on

the small strip of street and condo path way facing the blaze. What a party. This would be a great place to have a beer concession.

"We were wondering when the news people would get here," said Jackie Kerr, who was checking out the flames with Larry Popp and Tim Oestmann. By now the fire was within spitting distance of the condos but so weak the firefighters could practically blow it out.

Kerr was standing on the bumper of a car. Popp and Oestmann were leaning against the front of a car parked behind Kerr's perch.

"I heard the helicopters and came out," said Oestmann, 36, who has lived at Newport Terrace about five years.

Popp, 33, said fires in the canyon are pretty common. Usually kids playing or transients living in the thick brush start them, he said.

The frequency of fires doesn't bother him. He's lived in five different units during the six years he's rented at Newport Terrace because his landlords keep selling his condos out from under him. He's used to fires.

"We get a lot of helicopters flying over here," Popp said. "The helicopters usually see it (the fires) and then call in the trucks."

That didn't reassure Kerr.

"I just moved here a few months ago, and it was scary," said the 37-year-old woman, "especially since I don't have renter's insurance."

But the fire did have a positive side.

"This was a good way to meet my neighbors," she said.

We then discussed the small strip of street we were standing on. It was indeed Balboa Boulevard.

I bid the trio adieu and moved closer to shoot some photos. I found a young couple hugging, staring at the blaze like it was their personal fireplace. I sneaked into the bushes behind them and set up to take

silhouette shots. I had no idea how to take silhouette shots. I know as much about lighting as Stevie Wonder does.

Little did I know the camera had a loud automatic winder. It sounded like a duck with postnasal drip. After having taken a bunch of shots of the couple from all angles and with and without the flash, the girl sorta looked at me, whispered into the guy's ear and then they sat on the ground, out of my view.

They must have figured I was a pervert or something.

I drove back to the office, thinking I'd done a pretty good job — all things considered. I didn't get the big multi-million dollar fire I had imagined, but I got some eyewitness quotes that a day-side reporter could dump in the story. Perhaps I even got some photos.

By the time I walked up the stairs to the newsroom, I was beat. It was 1 a.m. — my bedtime. I was ready to drop off the film, leave behind some notes and go home to melt into my Sealy mattress. I pressed the camera's rewind button, heard what sounded like film spinning and waited. And waited. And waited. Something was very wrong. I decided to take my chances and open the camera door to take out the film. Guess what? No film.

Army wants reserve doctors to volunteer

LOS ANGELES — The Army is asking reserve doctors and other medical personnel to work in military hospitals around the nation in place of active-duty staffers who have been sent to the Middle East, officials said.

A severe shortage of medical personnel in U.S.-based Army hospitals around the country prompted the offer, a newspaper, quoting an unidentified source in Washington, D.C., reported Saturday.

"Critical shortages do exist at numerous military health care facilities around the U.S. because of the mobilization," the source said.

The offer allows reservists to list three hospitals where they would prefer to work, although officials will not guarantee where they would be sent.

By volunteering to work for three months to a year in a U.S. hospital, the doctors, nurses and other medical workers could avoid going to the Middle East if President Bush calls up medical reserves later.

Army Reserve administrators in Santa Ana, San Bernardino and Riverside began calling about 120 medical personnel on Thursday, asking them to decide within 24 hours if they would work at an Army hospital in the U.S.

"What we're doing is developing a contingency plan in the event that the Army medical staff is used up and moved out to the Middle East," said Walter Shelton, staff administrator at the 6252nd Army Hospital in Ventura, which oversees local medical reserve units.

Shelton said the response has been positive so far, but he declined to say how many people have taken up the offer.

One Orange County nurse who asked that she not be identified, said she decided to accept rather than risk being sent overseas later.

"The thought of winding up somewhere far away, far from my family, is a real fear, and I'm just not sure I'm willing to take that chance," said the nurse, an Army reservist for 17 years.

But Southern California urologist Michael Norris said he would take his chances on going overseas later rather than leaving his practice now.

"It'll be rough if they call everyone in and I have to do duty, but I just can't afford now to volunteer that much time and devastate my practice," said Norris, a reserve colonel since 1983.

Suicide machine may be used again

DETROIT — The creator of a suicide device who gained national attention when he used it to help an Alzheimer's disease patient end her own life said Saturday that he may defy a court ban and help others die.

"If a person is beyond hope, what do I care about any court injunction?" Dr. Jack Kevorkian said in a telephone interview from his Royal Oak apartment, about 15 miles north of Detroit. "If a patient is really needing it, I may have to act. If nothing else, out of human compassion."

His statement Saturday appears to reverse what he has maintained since the injunction June 8 when he said, "I'm out of business."

He said he's talked with two Michigan women who want to die — one he described only as "crippled," the other has an extreme case of emphysema.

Kevorkian said he has checked with their doctors on the diagnoses, and he has met with the family of one of the women.

He had met with the family of Janet Adkins before deciding to use his device in his van at a county park on June 4. The machine and his 1968 Volkswagen van were confiscated after Adkins, 54, of Portland, Ore., pressed a button that released lethal chemicals into her system.

Kevorkian said it would take a few days to build another device if he decided to use it.

"I wouldn't do it just to get arrested. It would be to help a patient," Kevorkian said.

Kevorkian was in Oakland County Circuit Court on Friday to respond to a temporary injunction issued after Adkins' death.

Judge Alice Gilbert had ordered him to stop using the device and also enjoined the 62-year-old retired pathologist from helping people use any other means to kill themselves.

Kevorkian didn't answer the injunction, and Assistant County Prosecutor Michael Modelski said default papers were filed Friday. Instead of ruling on a permanent injunction, Gilbert gave

Kevorkian 21 days to answer the default ruling. Modelski said Saturday that Kevorkian could be in contempt of court if he uses the machine.

"He basically is saying that he's above anybody's rules, and that's the problem," Modelski said. "It could trigger a possible second criminal investigation if he uses it again."

He said that after the current investigation, if no criminal charges are filed, "we're going to have people flying in from all over to use this machine."

Michigan has no specific law against suicide or assisting in it. The case is under investigation by the county prosecutor, state police and state medical association.

Gilbert suggested to Kevorkian that he get a lawyer, but Kevorkian said he has no intentions of doing that because he said he hasn't broken any laws.

Three teens convicted in jogger trial

NEW YORK — Three teen-agers were convicted Saturday of raping and assaulting a woman jogger who was brutalized and left for dead in Central Park by a marauding gang of youths.

The defendants — Antron McCray, 16, Yusuf Salaam, 16 and Raymond Santana, 15 — were found innocent of sodomy and of attempted murder, the most serious charge in the much-publicized case. They also were convicted of riot.

The 30-year-old jogger was found lying senseless in a pool of blood after the April 19, 1989, attack. In a

coma for two weeks, she later recovered and returned to her job as an investment banker.

The case engendered enormous local concern for the victim, who hasn't been publicly named. The defendants' supporters demonstrated outside the courthouse regularly, charging racism because the victim was white and wealthy, the youths black.

Prosecutors said the three defendants were part of a gang of as many as 30 youths who rampaged through the park, harassing at least nine people. Three other teen-agers

charged in the assault on the woman are free on bond.

Salaam, McCray and Santana also were convicted of assault and robbery for attacks on two male joggers, John Loughlin and David Lewis.

The three teen-agers were ordered remanded to jail without bail. As juveniles, they faced a maximum of 10 years in prison at sentencing Sept. 11.

The woman was jogging through the northern end of the park when she was attacked. She was dragged about 70 feet into the woods, gang-raped and bashed repeatedly with a

brick and pipe.

She battled back from her near-fatal injuries, returned to work and to jogging within eight months of the attack, and is currently a vice president for Salomon Brothers, a Wall Street firm.

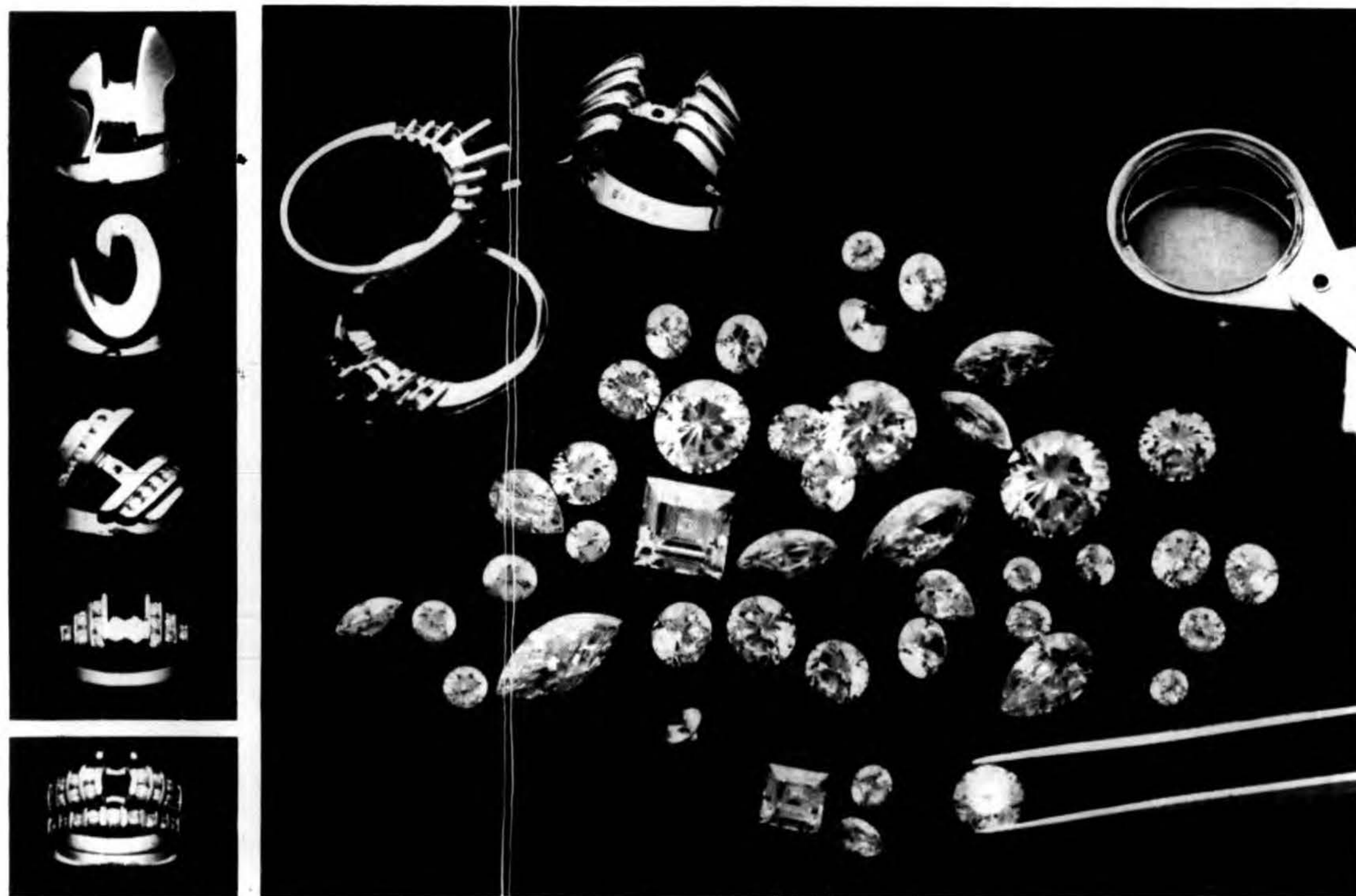
The jogger trial had become controversial for unexpected reasons.

While the woman's recovery from near-total paralysis was inspirational to some New Yorkers, a few activists, including the Rev. Al Sharpton, claimed police had arrested the youths because they were black.

across the bow of the Iraqi ship Khanaqin in the Gulf of Oman after it refused repeated requests to halt. The shots were the first fired in the 2-day-old interdiction effort ordered by President Bush to halt goods leaving and entering Iraq.

Also, the USS Bradley fired three warning shots across the bow of another Iraqi tanker to the north in the Persian Gulf and headed toward the Gulf of Oman, the Pentagon said.

The Persian Gulf, which connects with the Gulf of Oman, is Iraq's outlet to the sea. "Both tankers are currently under way, but are under close U.S. Navy surveillance," the Pentagon said. A Pentagon source

who spoke on condition of anonymity said Navy ships were unlikely to take further action against the ships during nighttime hours.

The Pentagon said the Iraqi vessels, which were heading out of the Persian Gulf area, were believed to be carrying Iraqi oil.

Baghdad said the tankers were not hit and continued on their way, but that a similar act in the future will have "grave consequences."

Iraq's foreign minister, Tariq Aziz, said he did not consider the Iraqi treatment of foreigners an act of war, merely an attempt to prevent U.S. forces massing in Saudi Arabia from attacking Iraq or Kuwait.

"Foreigners would live with the Iraqis in some places that are the target of probable American

aggression," Aziz said in an interview with CBS News in Baghdad. "That might deter the American government from committing the crime that the Iraqi people would like to avoid."

In an interview Saturday with Britain's Independent Television News, Iraqi Ambassador to France Abdul Razzak al-Hachimi said in Paris: "Some of them (the foreigners) ... have been distributed in strategic installations in Iraq starting all the way from north of Iraq to the south."

Thomas R. Pickering, the U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, said later Saturday that Iraq's actions over the past 24 hours make it clear that Iraqi President Saddam Hussein is "going to hold hostage all foreigners."

guys called up (for duty in the Middle East) are scurrying down here to the get uniforms and canteens," Sherman added.

Sherman added that he also received an order for 10,000 dog tags from the Marine Corps.

A more serious, and expensive, gas mask model is available at Orange Army Navy store. The \$115 mask is chemical resistant and is the same type the military uses, said store manager Dave Tipple.

Tipple said sales jumped immediately after Iraq, which has used poison gas in the past, invaded Kuwait on Aug. 2 and the United States stepped into the conflict. But demand is starting to taper off, he said.

The market for masks may be a regional phenomenon, Sherman said.

"I just got back from a convention in Las Vegas, and I asked other Army surplus dealers about it and they aren't selling as many," he said.

An employee of Long Beach Surplus in Westminster said his store has hundreds of masks in stock, but only a few have sold.

However, his supply of canteens and desert fatigues has been depleted, mostly by Marines shipping out to Saudi Arabia.

ing punch. Seller said two plainclothes policemen accompanied ACT UP members into Cox's office.

"We are his constituents and I think it's nice that he's receiving us," ACT UP member Dennis Zaborowski said.

Speller said Cox was amenable to the visit, but objected to the notices the group used to publicize the protest, which she called a "parody" of his own invitation.

"When we spoke to him today he wasn't upset about it," she said. "He said, 'Other than you're having forged my signature I'm really glad to see you.'"

Speller said she believed Cox's signature was taken from his own literature.

"It's my understanding that we haven't done anything illegal," she said.

Cox, who was holding a three-hour open house at his MacArthur Boulevard offices, said he didn't expect to start an investigation without seeing the flier, adding that he was surprised at the conduct of ACT UP members.

"Unlike the advance publicity, they were very well managed and expressed their arguments very reasonably," Cox said.

Cox said he supported the Chapman Amendment because he believed it should be up to the Surgeon General to determine what constituted a communicable disease. As for AIDS issues, Cox said he has voted to support AIDS funding, but was noncommittal about the group's request for reallocation of funds.

The demonstration drew various reactions from passers-by, ranging from the finger to mooning the group. Not all the drivers were critical of the protest and honked and waved in support of ACT UP's message.

Some drivers jeered the protesters, yelling comments such as "go home" and "relax — life is not so stressful." Others shouted profanities and derogatory names for homosexuals.

When a driver laughed at the group, one activist said "Do you think what Dice has to say is funny?" One activist calls a BMW driver a bigot.

The protesters did not get into any physical fights with the crowd entering the concert, but a small group of ACT UP members argued across the fence with two men wearing anti-homosexual T-shirts.

One of the men, Ritchie Blade of Torrance, said his T-shirt and the Clay concert was not offensive.

"I think they are taking this far too seriously. I think a lot of Catholics roar at good Catholic jokes. I don't think it's bigotry at all," he said.

Cancer group's members thrive

They say that's better than merely surviving, and mean it

The oldest member of the Flying Fish Society — a support group for young cancer patients — is 39 years old, and therein lies the tale.

Largely comprised of Orange County members — currently about 40 — the Society plans to expand into San Diego and Los Angeles.

Its motto, "We Don't Just Survive; We Thrive," hints at a certain zest for living.

The Flying Fish hold their monthly meetings in restaurants, even though some in the group must adhere to strict diets.

Some can't have alcohol; others are unable to digest red meat. They enjoy practical jokes — like the one where a blonde turns into a brunette in the bathroom and goes out to pick up her car from the unsuspecting parking attendant looking quite different from the "original" driver.

It's easy enough to do when you're wearing a wig. Flying Fish have a wealth of stories to share with each other. Young cancer patients have a lot in common.

They've endured "chemo" and extensive surgeries — and the loneliness and isolation that come from being abandoned by friends who don't know what to say.

The fear of death is a constant reality.

"Social acceptance is vitally important," says Costa Mesan Cheryl Henderson, co-founder (with San Diego resident Dani Grady) of the Flying Fish Society.

"Cancer patients need to know that they can lead normal lives." On May 17, 1989, Henderson woke up from a biopsy performed under general anesthesia in Hoag Hospital's James Irvine Surgical Center.

"The tumor in your left breast is benign," her doctor told her. "But the one in the right breast is malignant."

Henderson, who had just turned 31, was a full-time student, the single mother of a five-year-old daughter and a part-time waitress at Josh Slocum's.

A divorcee, she was completely without health insurance. "You can't imagine," says Henderson, "the nightmare of red tape that exists for someone who needs to obtain government assistance."

Advised to have an emergency mastectomy, Henderson began a race against time that included a desperate wait to be approved by Medi-Cal, a process she calls "extensive and time-consuming."

She applied for unemployment insurance, the first step in the qualifying procedure.

She had to obtain a Social Security number for her daughter — which meant waiting for a duplicate birth certificate to arrive from Illinois. She also needed to replace her own lost Social Security Card.

Frustrated and terrified, she stood in the lines and cried...even resorted to begging, anything that would help expedite the process. "I got pushy and aggressive," says Henderson, "and it worked."

The Medi-Cal coverage was approved in five days. Unable to locate a qualified, accessible doctor who would accept Medi-Cal payments, Henderson frantically contacted a hospital that allows patients to be admitted without orders from a private physician.

She says that the person who answered the telephone advised her there would be a six-month wait for the necessary new mammogram.

"The woman told me, 'What do you expect; this is where all the people come with no money,'" Henderson recalls.

"I eventually wound up having both breasts removed," says Henderson. "All of my hair fell out from the chemotherapy, and I was unable to work."

"But the worst agony of all was thinking I might die because I was at the mercy of a government system that wasn't adequately prepared to deal with life-threatening situations."

"It sounds funny now," Henderson says, "but I've heard so many people voice self-pity because they had to have a cancerous breast removed."

"With no insurance," she says, "my only concern was trying to find someone who would take mine out."

And then a miracle happened. "Three wonderful, caring Newport Beach physicians refused to allow me to die," she says.

Thanks to the kindness and generosity of the doctors, her prognosis is good.

A fourth doctor is providing breast reconstruction on a reduced payment schedule.

The desire to share her experiences with other cancer patients led Henderson to seek out support groups.

"It's not uncommon for older people to have — or be recovering from — cancer," says Henderson. "But young people have different situations to deal with."

"We worry about dying before our kids ever know who we are." Putting her feelings out, Henderson found a "surprising number of cancer patients under 40" who wanted to meet on a regular basis and compare notes.

"Meeting over dinner in restaurants is far more interesting than sitting around drinking coffee and eating donuts — and feeling sorry for ourselves," says Henderson.

"We're always on the lookout for restaurants with private spaces big enough to accommodate our group."

Henderson says she's fortunate to have a supportive fiancé, Kirk Parish, 36, the bar manager at Yankee Tavern.

"We've been together for four years," she beams, "and he hasn't abandoned me just because I don't have breasts."

Monthly Flying Fish Society meetings help. Cancer, like anything else, Henderson points out, needs to be tackled with a positive attitude.

Today, Henderson is back in school, full time, studying to become a court reporter.

Her lovely light brown hair has grown out — and Henderson wears it in a short, fluffy style.

"It's an extra benefit," she says, "that my hair is naturally curly now."

"Before the chemo, it was stick-straight."

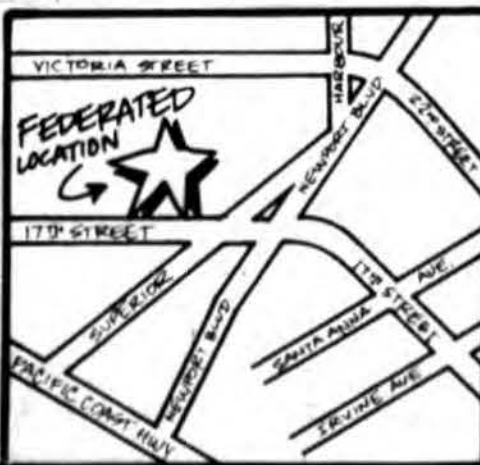

"The purpose of competitive bidding is to guard against favoritism, improvidence, extravagance, and fraud and corruption, and to prevent the waste of public funds and obtain the best economic result for the public," McKellar said.

He said that any decision other than awarding the contract to his firm could lead to legal action.

In reply, City Engineer Robert Eichblatt told McKellar, "We resent the implication that the city of Huntington Beach might have participated in favoritism, fraud or corruption on this project."

"We are aware of no one in our office that has ever done business with any of the six firms bidding on the project."

Eichblatt also said accepting a bid that was \$2.8 million lower than the next bid seemed like a perfect example of how to "prevent the waste of public funds."

Eichblatt said Friday that everyone connected with the pier project agreed Riedel's bid conformed with the city's requirements.

Just when you thought you knew the players without a scorecard, along came Kevin Maas and Dave Justice.

Neither was on the 40-man major league roster of their respective teams, the New York Yankees and Atlanta Braves, when this baseball season finally began.

But look at what they've done. Maas started first. When Don Mattingly went out of the Yankee lineup with a bad back, left-handed hitting Maas stepped forward and hit 10 home runs in his first 77 at-bats.

Nobody else in major league history had ever hit that many dingers so quickly.

Just to make sure you noticed, the 25-year-old rookie, a Cal graduate with a degree in mechanical engineering, tied another record by hitting 12 homers in 100 at-bats and 13 in 110. At last look, he still had 13 HRs in 124 at-bats with a slugging percentage of .605 and a batting average of .266.

Mattingly, meanwhile, was still nursing a sore back and wondering if Wally Pipp spelled his name with one or two p's.

Justice's story is just as amazing. He didn't even have spring training with the Braves because he suffered a fractured cheekbone during an early intrasquad game.

Then, when he was finally called up in mid-May, the 24-year-old natural right-fielder was platooned at first base. He couldn't play right field because Dale Murphy was there.

After Atlanta hero Murphy was traded to the Phillies, though, Justice was shifted into right field and caught fire.

Like smoking hot fire.

He hit 10 home runs in 12 games with 20 RBIs prior to his 0-for-3 performance on Friday against Mike Harkey of the Cubs. During that same span he hit .404 and was named National League Player of the Week.

During one three-day stretch he hit five home runs and he now has 18 for the season. And this is the same left-handed hitter who never hit more than 22 home runs in a single minor league season (Sumpter and Durham, 1986).

Now he is no longer being platooned and if ever a young player had a Billy Williams-look-a-like swing, it's Dave Justice.

For the record, Dale Long of the Cubs once hit eight home runs in eight days back in the early 1950's, and Mattingly once had 10 homers over an eight-game span.

But what Maas and Justice are doing is more than a changing of the guard. It's downright disrespectful. Don't these kids have any sense of tradition of roisserie leagues? Who would have thought Maas and Justice for Mattingly and Murphy?

I'm still not sure if this explosion of unknown southpaw power illustrates (a) how talented so many young athletes can be if given an opportunity to play, or (b) how diluted the talent at all levels of professional baseball, or (c) how mediocre the pitchers.

Future historians, of course, will look back on 1990 as the bizarre year of the No-Hitter (eight to date) and wonder if somebody was putting foreign substance on the baseballs.

Then somebody will notice the achievements of Kevin Maas and Dave Justice and wonder what ever happened to them.

You figure it out. I'm still working on why Shoeless Joe Jackson batted right-handed in *Field of Dreams* and if I ever run into Kevin Costner, who built the ball field, I'll ask him.

ANAHEIM — Gaston Green isn't doing anything different these days than he did his first two years in the NFL — nothing, except gaining considerable yardage.

Green, the UCLA grad who gained a combined 190 yards his first two seasons, has rushed for 186 yards on 35 carries in two exhibition games.

After rambling for 115 yards against the Chiefs a week ago in Berlin, he carried the ball 14 times for 71 yards and three touchdowns in Saturday's 30-27 loss to the San Diego Chargers before 45,684 at Anaheim Stadium.

"I've been doing the same things I've been doing in the past," Green said. "It think it's being relaxed back there."

"I'm a little more comfortable, I understand the offense. I'm real comfortable in the offense and confident in myself carrying the ball, so I feel a lot better than in the past."

Green's first two touchdowns capped a six-minute stretch from late in the third quarter to early in the fourth quarter when the Rams scored three touchdowns to rally from a 17-0 halftime deficit for a 21-17 lead.

The game saw-sawed until San Diego's Nate Lewis, a rookie from Oregon Tech, returned a kickoff 87 yards for a touchdown with 5:02 remaining in the game.

"I'm glad tonight I got to show some of the people what I can do,"

Lewis said. "All I want is to be a part of this team. I knew I wasn't going to get touched. I saw the opening and took it."

Then the Chargers' defense, which had yielded four touchdowns in Mark Herrmann's four drives at the helm of the Rams' offense, tightened and did not allow a first down.

"I liked Mark Herrmann's performance and I liked Gaston Green's performance," Rams Coach John Robinson said. "They've got a defense that's hard to handle. They did eight or 10 different blitzes. If you don't get prepared for it, they can hurt you. San Diego has good players. They're a good team."

Robinson was not so pleased in his appraisal of most other facets of the Rams' play.

The Rams missed an extra point and punters Hank Ilesic and Kent Elmore punted six times for an average of 38.5 yards.

Quarterbacks Jim Everett and Chuck Long were ineffective as the Rams completed only 4 of 15 passes and six first downs. Everett was zero for six and Long was four of nine for 73 yards.

"It just proves we have a lot of work left to be done," Everett said. "It is the second exhibition game. (The Chargers' blitzing patterns) do take time to get used to. I'm glad it's only the second exhibition game, and we can come back and work on these things. I'm glad it came early."

Robinson was also displeased with the team's mental preparation for the game.

Herrmann steps up and makes a hefty bid

ANAHEIM — Though there is little doubt who will start at quarterback in the Rams' opener against Green Bay on Sept. 9, there's still quite a battle going on for the backup position.

Barring injury, it will be Jim Everett behind center in the opener, but with Mark Herrmann's performance in San Diego's 30-27 exhibition win over the Rams at Anaheim Stadium on Saturday night, the nine-year veteran made a strong bid to be No. 2.

Herrmann led the Rams to four second-half touchdowns to rally the team from a 17-0 first half deficit.

In all, Herrmann completed eight of 16 passes for 122 yards and a touchdown.

"I felt pretty good tonight," Herrmann said. "We got some points on the board after we gained some confidence at the beginning of the half. Once the confidence came, we started moving the ball."

Coach John Robinson wouldn't comment on whether Herrmann had solidified his position as the No. 2 man, but did say that the veteran had a fine game.

"I liked Herrmann's performance tonight," Robinson said. "I think he played well and had a good game."

It was a different situation for Chuck Long, who's vying with Herrmann for the back-up role.

Long, who was obtained from Detroit as a back-up to Everett as well, played most of the first and second quarters. For the second straight week, however, Long had a lackluster performance, completing just

four of nine passes for 73 yards. He says his biggest problems are the Rams' quick drop and release offense which is a world of difference from Detroit's run-and-shoot.

"I'm still having a hard time getting my game rhythm," Long said. "In the past year, I've gone from a regular offense to the run-and-shoot and now this. It's been a real challenge for me and I think once the rhythm comes back, I'll start having fun again."

Robinson conceded that the Rams may keep three quarterbacks on the roster when the season opens, but if it's two, Herrmann says he's made a strong case to make the team.

"I don't think I really have much to prove," Herrmann said. "I think the team should keep three quarterbacks and I think that I've merited a job."

"I know I can play in this league I hope they (the coaches) know it too."

Long admitted that the Charger defense did an excellent job of keeping the Rams' offense off-balanced while he was in the game.

"They did some things that you don't expect from a defense in the second exhibition game of the season," Long said. "But I'm not making any excuses. I think I'm throwing the ball well and it will just take some time."

Herrmann did benefit from two interference calls that gave the Rams the ball on the Charger one-yard line twice, but in both possessions, he completed key passes to keep the drives alive.

His most impressive drive came on the Rams' opening possession of the second half when he completed five passes

Angels continue strong run

Boston absorbs

BOSTON — As a former All-American hockey player at the University of Vermont, Kirk McCaskill knows what it's like to play in pain.

And that's what he's doing with the California Angels, taking a regular turn in the pitching rotation despite a bone chip floating in his right elbow.

McCaskill made a joke of his trouble Saturday after he blanked Boston on two hits for six innings and was the winning pitcher in the Angels' 4-3 victory over the Red Sox — the Angels' seventh victory in

their last eight starts.

"The severity of injuries on a pain scale don't compare in baseball and hockey," McCaskill (9-8) said. "If you talked to a hockey player about having a bone spur or a bone chip, he'd laugh. It's just the nature of the two sports."

Staked to a 4-0 lead, McCaskill turned in another gutsy effort, striking out five and walking two, before he needed relief help in the seventh.

"We were ready in the bullpen," said Bryan Harvey, who recorded his 15th save as the fourth California pitcher. "We know that McCaskill will pitch six or seven outstanding innings before his arm begins to bother him."

LOS ANGELES — Los Angeles Raiders officials and coaches aren't quite ready to hit the panic button yet.

But they do admit that something has to be done about the offense.

This despite the fact the Raiders won their second exhibition game of 1990, a 16-14 win over the Dallas Cowboys in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum before a comfortable crowd of 28,273.

It was the first time the Raiders have won two exhibition games since the summer of 1982. It was also the first time the Raiders had played three exhibition games this early in the year.

Passing the bread and butter of the Raiders offense, was another story. Evans, who played the second half, completed six of 18 for 66 yards, including a 18 for 66 yards, Schroeder, who started the game, completed four of 12 for 53 yards.

It was far from impressive. And Shell said as much without saying so.

Woman files suit against Tyson for alleged assault

NEWARK, N.J. — A former publicist for Mike Tyson's ex-wife is suing the boxer for sexually assaulting and threatening to kill her, her attorney said Saturday.

Phyllis C. Polaner of West Orange, N.J., filed the lawsuit Friday in Superior Court, seeking unspecified compensatory and punitive damages from Tyson, his ex-wife, Robin Givens, and Givens' mother, Ruth Roper, attorney Howard E. Brechner said.

The 25-page lawsuit accuses Tyson of abusing the three women between Aug. 28 and Oct. 2, 1988, while Tyson and Givens were involved in a divorce case.

The suit alleges that Givens and Roper "maliciously failed" to stop the abuse, which the former publicist says caused "severe temporary and permanent personal and emotional injuries."

Polaner also claims Tyson sexually assaulted and threatened to kill her.

The suit also refers to a Sept. 20, 1988 incident in Moscow in which an angry Tyson chased the three women from their hotel suite and held them in a glass-enclosed elevator against their will.

Polaner contends that on that day, Tyson "assaulted, battered, menaced, threatened and detained her against her will."

Tyson's lawyer, Howard Weitzman of Los Angeles, was quoted in Friday's editions of The Star-Ledger of Newark as saying the allegations were "absolutely false."

Weitzman said Polaner was only after money from the former heavyweight champion.

LOS ANGELES — Top-seeded Martina Navratilova suffered a second-set collapse but came back to defeat No. 4 seed Zina Garrison 6-0, 6-7, 6-4 in the semifinals of the Virginia Slims of Los Angeles tournament Saturday.

"This is one of the highlights of my career. Even though it wasn't for the gold, it was for the bronze and that meant it was for pride. I'm close friends with Kenny Smith and he had a gold from the last World Championships (1986) and I had to make sure I got something to bring home."

Any award for the United States looked out of the question with 1:34 left in regulation when Raymond Gausse's 3-pointer gave Puerto Rico a 96-88 lead.

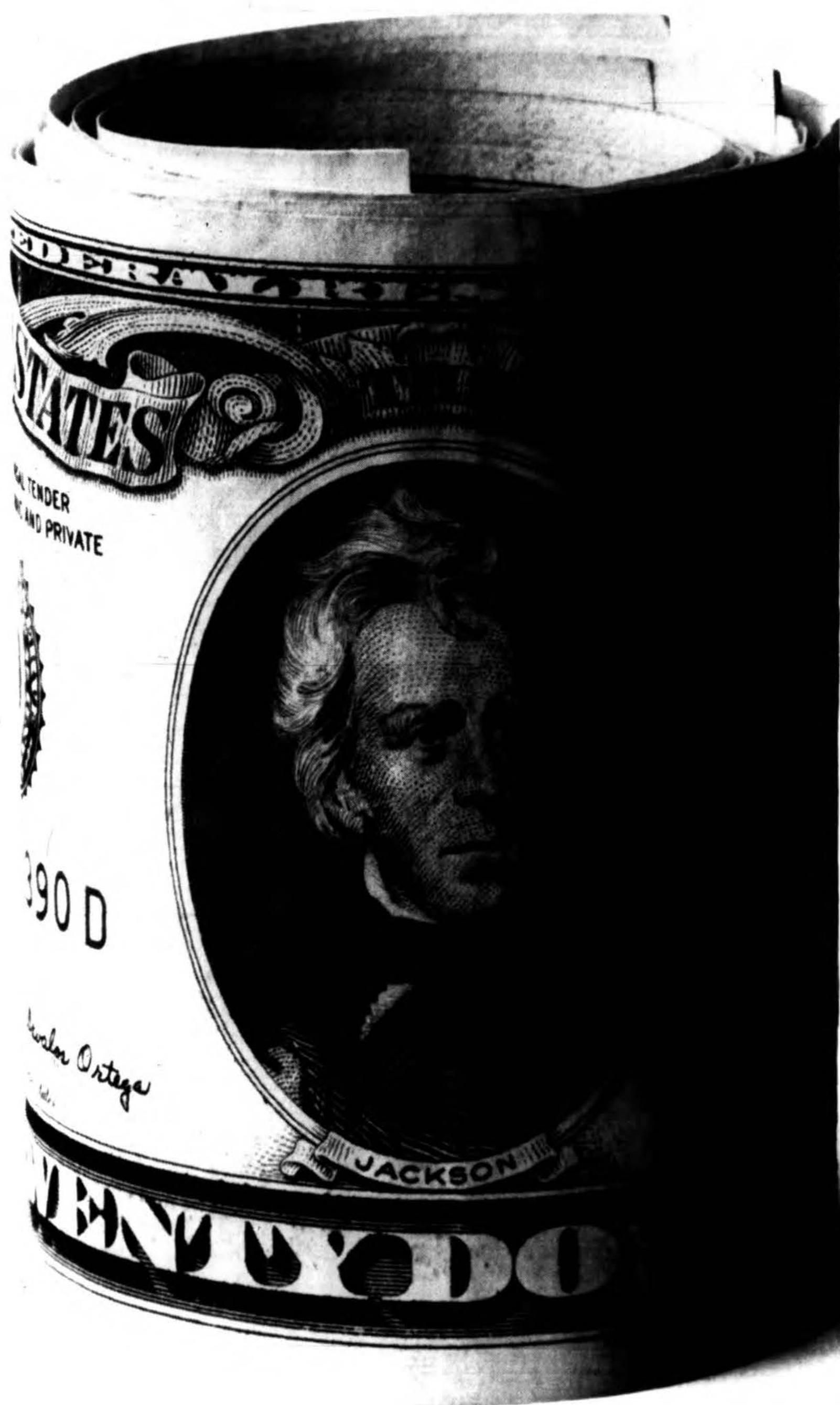

Huntington Beach builds toward the future

Redevelopment: Builders' welfare or city's rebirth?

In 1920 there was a pier, a dance hall and a pavilion — but no city. In 1990 there is a city, but no pier, dance hall or pavilion — but not for long.

Huntington Beach is undergoing a major facelift that supporters say will boost city revenues, expand tourism and upgrade the quality of life for the average resident.

As plans for redevelopment came and went over the last two decades, the quality of life in Huntington Beach fell precipitously, according to Mayor Tom Mays. The city was plagued by high crime rates, prostitution, major drug deals and a heavy transient population, according to Mays.

"It was an atmosphere that our residents wanted to see changed," he said. "Attracting tourists is only part of it. The real motivation behind redevelopment is to make downtown a safer environment so our residents can come downtown and go shopping, walk on the pier, go to the beach and just have a good time with their families."

Over a 30-year period, Mays said redevelopment will generate up to \$400 million in new revenues from the Waterfront Project alone in addition to generating a healthy climate for small businesses.

But some residents are not so sure that the profits will be as big as promised and question the way redevelopment came about.

"Some development has to take place and all of us agree with that," said Bob Biddle, president of Huntington Beach Tomorrow, the main organized opposition to city redevelopment plans. "The city has taken prime real estate and turned it into a redevelopment area. Private enterprise could have done that with their own money. Huntington Beach is becoming a welfare state for developers."

Dave Garofalo, a member of the original redevelopment committee in 1978, argues with the notion that developers were waiting in line to take advantage of the city. He said phase one developer Uri Gati deserves much credit for committing substantial financial resources to the project after a number of other developers backed out.

"What Uri Gati represents is the first entrepreneur that belied up to the bar, put his hard cash on the barrelhead and said, 'OK, tell me what to build. I'll build it that way and when it's over, I think you'll like it.'"

City Councilman Peter Green said years of scrutiny by concerned citizens has helped shape a reason-

able redevelopment plan.

"In 1984, we were going to build a hotel and convention center on Pacific Coast Highway and Main. There were also plans for 11-story buildings on Pacific Coast Highway," Green said. "Now we're down to four stories. Redevelopment plans have become more realistic in recent years and more acceptable to the people that live here."

Green said he does not believe the upcoming city council election in November, with four council seats up for grabs, will have any major effect on continued redevelopment of the city.

City Councilwoman Grace Winchell, who is running for reelection, said she would have preferred private development over city-sponsored redevelopment, and fears the city may be forced to

condemn property as the process continues.

"There are still some real issues and problems that need to be solved," she said. "We speak in terms of a village concept, but it's not really coming out that way. It's coming out more intense than what I had envisioned. I had hoped the city would get out of it and let private enterprise take over — but that's not happening."

Former mayor and current council candidate Jack Kelly, publisher of the Huntington Beach News, said dissenting voices are valuable and have helped bring the city a more balanced redevelopment plan than was first proposed.

"We can't overlook the value of those people's voices," he said. "We need an amalgamation of the cry for (Please see REDEVELOP/B6)

Walk down Main Street in Huntington Beach today and everywhere are the sounds and sights of change.

You can hear it in the sharp rattle of steel cable as men in hard hats put muscle and sweat into the construction of a new downtown retail center and parking garage.

You can see it all along Main Street as a small army of construction workers and supervisors walk in and out of gutted stores, shouting instructions, studying plans.

Blueprints labeled "structural improvements" sit inside the front window of one empty storefront. Workmen stack lumber near where the old store that is still emblazoned with the slogan of its last tenants: "Lord Jesus Christ Our Hope." Taped on the front window below the painted slogan is a public notice of "Application to Sell Alcoholic Beverages."

Workers meticulously apply finishing touches to a checkered, tile floor in what will become a polished, upscale bakery near where the old Hotel Avalon once stood. Back in the late 1960s, a single man could rent a room with small kitchen for \$85 a month at the hotel — cockroaches included.

Where once the likes of comedian Steve Martin and guitarist Eric Clapton entertained at the legendary Golden Bear, on the corner of Pacific Coast Highway and Main, now stands the nearly complete Pierside Pavilion retail and entertainment complex. And four years after the city closed it down, the hibernating Bear will come back to life next Saturday as the revitalized Peppers Golden Bear.

"They're waking up to the '90s," said Ken Moon, co-owner and senior vice president of marketing and entertainment for the Golden Bear.

Bringing the city back to life has been the long-time ambition of a legion of city planners and politicians, private entrepreneurs and residents who have wrestled with a host of redevelopment plans over the last 20 years. Now the big push is on. And the opening of the 335-room Waterfront Hilton, the initial explosion of sales at nearby Pier Colony condominiums still under construction and the \$23 million Pierside Pavilion retail showcase are only the first pieces of the city's redevelopment puzzle.

City officials will soon decide the size and scope of the beachfront Pierside Village project, and phase one developer Uri Gati said he is considering coming in to help get phase two of the downtown redevelopment project off the ground.

"Now that I'm finished here, when the city goes out for proposals — I will be interested," Gati said.

Gati is president of Huntington Beach-based California Resorts International which joined with (Please see BUILD/B6)



New anti-job bias law expands grounds for suits

When the new disabilities law takes effect in 1992, employers will be faced with a whole new way of doing business.

Under provisions of the new law, employers could be sued for discriminating against a recovering drug addict, a former alcoholic or a manic depressive.

The Americans with Disabilities Act is being viewed by some employers as an unfair encroachment into business, says Bob Naeve, a Newport Beach attorney with Shepard, Mullin Richter & Hampton. But the impact, he said, is difficult to determine.

The law adds four new categories of disabilities, going beyond the California Fair Housing and Employment Act to outlaw discrimination against employees with histories of mental illness, mental retardation, alcohol or drug abuse.

According to Lawrence Ball, regional manager for the Merchants and Manufacturers Association (M&M), employers could be liable for punitive damages in wrongful discharge suits involving former addicts and alcoholics.

Currently, the courts are guided by *Foley v. Interactive Data*, a 1978 case ruling that punitive damages could not be awarded except in matters of "public policy," an area

that includes the handicapped. Thus, any extension of the definition of handicapped could result in additional awards, he explained.

To Naeve, a Newport attorney who's offering seminars this month, the law virtually "creates litigation." Not only does it have many gray areas, he said, but it will encourage lawsuits by people who should not have been hired in the first place.

"You don't want the guy driving your fork-lift to be an alcoholic," he remarked.

Under the new law, anyone with a handicap — either mental or physical — cannot be excluded from a job they are otherwise "qualified" to fill. The list could include everyone from former heroin addicts to schizophrenics, said Naeve, but the courts will be left to decide whether employees are otherwise qualified for the jobs they seek.

To comply with the law, employers are expected to avoid using information picked up in a reference check if it has to do with any past additions or any other "disability."

The law hits mom and pop businesses especially hard, Naeve said.

Going beyond hiring and firing practices, the law also requires special accommodations for handicapped employees, replacing a patchwork of county and city laws now in effect.

Companies of 15 or more employees may have to add ramps, restrooms and even set-aside time for their employees' drug abuse programs, he explained. But it's still too early to say what constitutes a "reasonable accommodation" of those employees.

According to Ball at M&M, California employers know what those words mean under state law, as they have been hammered out by the courts. But the federal requirements will be more burdensome, he said.

Under state law, for example, a

company with 15 employees would not be asked to hire an extra person as a reader for the blind. Only a large company such as General Motors would be expected to do so, since one reader could aid many employees. That could change under federal law, he said.

In addition, the new law could require architects to change building designs, ignoring customer preference.

The Manufacturers and Merchants Association is currently holding seminars on the topic for employers.

Haseko Associates of Japan to redevelop downtown Huntington Beach with a total investment of \$50 million, Gati, born in Israel, sees the redevelopment project as a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

"As a guy who spent his whole life in architecture and construction, to be able to design a project of this kind of quality in a location such as

this is every developer's fantasy," Gati said. "I couldn't ask for a better opportunity."

Redevelopment will surely spread beyond the new movie theaters, restaurants, and hotels. The old Huntington Beach pier will be demolished after Labor Day and a new \$8.9 million pier will be erected in its place, with completion expected in 1992. Residential development of 137 townhouses and 159 condominiums is planned, and if a

proposed Heritage Square is approved, some historic buildings from the downtown area will be preserved and relocated to the new area.

The heritage of Huntington Beach is an important aspect of redevelopment, according to former Mayor Jack Kelly, publisher of the Huntington Beach News and a city council candidate.

"This city will never lose the individual character it has."

Florida gets nod for magnet lab

WASHINGTON — Florida State University will become the national center of high-magnetic field research after edging out the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in a competition for federal funds.

The selection Friday of FSU by the National Science Foundation will make the Tallahassee-based institution eligible for a grant of up to \$60 million over five years.

Research related to production and use of magnetic fields can lead to new devices for the computer industry, new materials with exceptional strengths and major advances in medicine. Europe and Japan have made strides in such research while U.S. capabilities have lagged.

Huntington Beach Mayor Mays, a Republican candidate for the 38th state assembly district, said a recent city poll shows that 67 percent of Huntington Beach residents are in favor of redevelopment.

"The opposition to redevelopment is from a small group of people who have taken issue with specific projects in Huntington Beach — not the overall concept," he said.

Rates to, in Bay Area economical now

A trip to San Francisco is more economical than ever these days, with the current low rates on airfare and hotel rooms.

If you're able to abide by certain restrictions, including at least three weeks' advance purchase, you can fly roundtrip from Orange County to the City by the Bay for as low as \$58. Without the three-week advance, the cost is \$98, still an improvement over earlier rates. Among the carriers departing from John Wayne Airport, USAir has the most frequent service, with nine flights daily.

When it comes to choosing one of the city's approximately 22,000 hotel rooms, some of the best values are found in the small, European-style inns that provide quality surroundings at reasonable prices.

Rates generally range from \$85 to \$149, single or double (30 to 40 percent lower than the rates at the city's large hotels) and include many of the same amenities (such as laundry service, room service, and adjoining restaurants) as the higher priced properties.

Newest among the smaller hotels is the 199-room Tuscan Inn, which opened last month at Fisherman's Wharf.

Named for Italy's Tuscany region, the inn carries out an Old World theme, with antique chests, alabaster chandeliers, and a marble, wood-burning fireplace in the lobby, where guests are served complimentary coffee and tea during the day and wine in the evening. On display here are unusual artifacts dating back to the Gold Rush which were unearthed during the hotel's construction. They include old bottles, pieces of porcelain, and opium pipes.

Special features for guests include an on-site parking garage, complimentary limo service to the Financial District, and room service from the adjacent Cafe Pescatore, a trattoria with moderately-priced pastas, pizza, and fresh fish.

The Tuscan (800-648-4626), 425 Northpoint St., is one block from the Powell Street cable car turn-around and two blocks from Pier 39, Ghirardelli Square, and the Cannery. Introductory rates are \$115 per night, single or double occupancy, and \$195 for suites.

In addition to the Tuscan, following are some other small hotels offering late summer/fall specials (with rates subject to room availability):



Tourists can enjoy the Palace of Fine Arts in San Francisco.

The Galleria Park Hotel (800-792-9855), 191 Sutter St., has an "Autumn Celebration" rate of \$79 per night, Aug. 24 through Sept. 9. Located near Union Square, this 177-room inn has an innovative roof-top park and jogging track, plus room service provided by Bentley's Seafood Grill.

Hotel Vintage Court (800-654-1100), 650 Bush St., offers a summer rate of \$94 per night through August, but its Labor Day Week rate, available Sept. 2-9, is better yet: \$69 per night. Complimentary features are coffee, tea, and wine in the lobby, and limo service to the Financial District. The adjacent restaurant is

Masa's, acclaimed for its French cuisine.

The Carlton Hotel (800-227-4496), 1075 Sutter St., has a new Family Plan Package, offered through Dec. 31, which provides a family (up to six people) with two adjoining or adjacent rooms for \$130 per night, subject to availability. (Regular rates are \$85 per room.) This recently refurbished hotel has 165 rooms with twin or queen beds, room service from the Ritz Cafe off the lobby, and a tour desk staff to assist with city reservations.

Ann Miller casts a spell at Round Table West

Ann Miller is known to millions at the bright and bouncy tap-dancing star of such films as "Easter Parade" and "Kiss Me Kate" and the Broadway hits "Mame" and "Sugar Babies."

But, her incredible dancing and singing talents were not the only special abilities she was born with, she told a capacity crowd at the monthly Round Table West luncheon Thursday at the Balboa Bay Club.

"I don't want to come off like your friendly local nut," she began, "but ..."

What followed was a fascinating recounting by Miller of her heretofore hidden life as a woman with

psychic abilities. Her revelations form the basis for her new book, "Tapping Into the Source," co-written with Dr. Maxine Asher.

"I never talked about it. I made my living being Ann Miller the dancer," she told the local literati. "But I thought it was time, with Shirley MacLaine having written her books and opened the door, for me to go through the door, too."

She then related how her extrasensory abilities first showed themselves at age 4, when she innocently blew the whistle on her father's infidelity. As a teen, a premonition of danger saved her life as she left a rehearsal stage just before an arc light came plummeting down. She foresaw the surprise closing of the London production of "Sugar Babies." Her sensitivity to "the

force" led her to resist doctors' urgings that she consent to ending life support for her comatose mother, who later regained consciousness.

"If any of you out there have this," she concluded, "just know that you are not bonkers. Just tap into the force."

Miller's appearance was the highlight of the luncheon meeting, which attracted many of her fans and well-wishers (about 40 more than had RSVP'd, in fact, necessitating some fancy footwork by Round Table West organizers Margaret Burk and Marilyn Hudson and the BBC kitchen). But memorable moments were also provided by the other three authors on the program.

Mystery writer Elizabeth George regaled the crowd with her account of traveling through Britain, gather-

ing background information and atmosphere for her latest book, "Well-Schooled in Murder," the story of the killing of an English schoolboy.

George, herself a former high school English teacher and county Teacher of the Year in 1981, remarked that one of her schoolteacher-hosts "was particularly interested in the idea of killing a 13-year-old boy. You can only understand that if you've taught 13-year-old boys."

Jeraldine Saunders — the first female cruise director in history, whose reminiscences inspired the series "The Love Boat" — had several hilarious anecdotes to relate about her experiences and advice for seaborne travelers, drawn from her books "The Love Boats" and "Cruise Diary."

Actor Brett Halsey, fresh from filming a TV miniseries with Omar Sharif in Morocco, told tales of Tinseltown with a focus on the soap operas which form the backdrop for his new book, "Yesterday's Children."

Halsey, who was raised in Newport Beach but left "to become the child of Ma and Pa Kettle" (a joking reference to his first acting job) drew on his own experiences as an actor in four daytime series, including "Search for Tomorrow" and "General Hospital," in writing his new book.

Wild Horse boasts a stable of real winners

This past week, Le Meridian Hotel in Newport Beach was the site of "trade tasting," hosted by Wilson-Daniels Ltd., which handles marketing for a number of California wineries nationwide.

One of the stellar attractions in Wilson-Daniels' portfolio is Wild Horse Winery and Vineyards of

Templeton, which is about four hours up the coast. Although a relative newcomer to the wine scene, Wild Horse already boasts a stable of real winners — Chardonnay, Cabernet, Merlot, Zinfandel and a superlative series of Pinot Noirs.

The owner/winemaker is a shy, articulate 33-year-old with bright red

hair by the name of Ken Volk. A native of the Pasadena/San Marino area, he attended Orange Coast College and later graduated from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo in 1981. It was during this time that Ken, an avid home winemaker, became entranced with the vision of establishing his own commercial winery in the Cen-

tral Coast region.

After apprenticing at wineries such as Edna Valley and Rancho Siquoc, a family partnership was formed and vineyards were planted during 1982. The following year Ken produced only 650 cases of Pinot Noir and Cabernet Sauvignon, but Wild Horse was off and running toward stardom.

How is it that after only seven years annual production has risen 22,000+ cases in a very tough, competitive market? The reason is that this committed young winemaker has become a master of his craft: His wines have won 22 medals in the first six months of 1990 alone. These wines are so spectacular that they have been served at The White House (even if Ken hasn't). Assisted by wife Tricia, a Cordon Bleu chef who manages the culinary events at the winery, Ken has learned the fine art of dealing with this most temperamental of vintages — Pinot Noir.

Ken's 25-acre vineyard produces only 20 percent of the required grape crop, so he purchases the remainder from top-notch growers in the Santa Maria Valley and Paso Robles. Without question, the key factor to the success of Wild Horse is Ken's ability to expertly blend the small lots of wine made from these various vineyards.

Asked if he planned to keep growing and expand the winery, Ken revealed some serious reservations. Even though his winemaking skills have been recognized nationwide, highly restrictive state and federal legislation is Ken's greatest concern. California's Prop. 134 would increase taxes on wine by 1,200 percent, and Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas (a dry state), is proposing a 2,100 percent increase in federal excise taxes. The Kennedy/Gore bill will institute yet another bureaucratic

nightmare by requiring a never-ending series of costly wine label changes and advertising restrictions.

The last straw, however, is the Hayden/Van de Kamp "environmental" initiative which would limit the use of simple sulfur, used in the vineyards to control mildew. If you aren't allowed to control vineyard pests and grow good grapes, you will not be able to make good wine, says Volk. (Methinks wine lovers should pay more attention to controlling the pests in Sacramento and Washington ...)

Although Ken is confident of his winemaking skills and of the winery's survival in a fiercely competitive free market, expansion in the face of these financial and legislative burdens is not prudent, burdens that may cause the demise of many small wineries — even a winner like Wild Horse SALUD!

CURRENT WINE PICK: 1988 Wild Horse Pinot Noir (Santa Barbara County).

Made from grapes grown in four different vineyards, this masterpiece is comparable to the great reds of bourgogne. Medium bodied and complex, it is fruity without being "jammy," and finishes surprisingly soft considering its youth. Available locally after Sept. 1, it should retail for about \$14/bottle. Stock up!

Just about when I couldn't stand it any longer — I had to know who he was! — Roger Luby put me out of my misery.

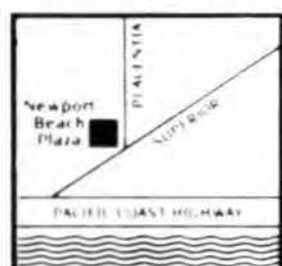

Driver's grief over death goes on and on

DEAR ANN LANDERS: May I address this plea to everyone who reads your column? It is the most difficult letter I have ever written in my life.

Two bicycle riders were traveling at a good speed. My car approached. One rider stayed on the side while the other cut across the road. Then my personal nightmare began. Even though it happened three years ago, it is never out of my mind.

It was almost dark — light enough for a bicycle rider to see the cars, but difficult for the drivers to see him. Suddenly there was a bicycle in front of me. I hit my brakes. I pulled to the right. THUD. What was that? Oh, God! Could it be that kid on the bicycle? It's not possible! He was over there. I saw him cross over. What did I hit then? Lord, don't let it be another bicycle rider! But it was!

I prayed all night he would live. I asked God to take me in his place. I very nearly passed out when I saw his parents at the hospital. I stayed for hours, hoping for an encouraging report. But there was none. I wanted to tell them how sorry I was, but I couldn't get the words out. My grief was no match for theirs. My parents had to drag me away from the hospital at dawn. I wanted to be here in case there was some good news. But the good news never came. The boy died the following day.

The funeral was something I will never forget. My parents felt it would be best if I didn't attend, but I couldn't stay away. I had never seen so many good-looking teenagers, both boys and girls, with tears streaming down their faces. The boy must have had a thousand friends. I heard the teachers talking. What a fine student! A leader! He'd never caused anyone a moment's trouble. He was the kind of young man every parent hopes his son will be.

The witnesses all said it wasn't my fault, but, nevertheless, I will carry the burden of guilt forever. Every time I see a bicycle rider I remember

that face in the casket. I see his parents outside his room in the hospital corridor.

I see his young weeping friends. I see that interminable funeral procession. My life will never be the same.

I know you can't print all of this letter, but I hope you will print enough of it to let bicycle riders know that one careless moment can snuff out their lives and cause endless grief for family, friends and the person who caused the death. It will never go away — GRAND RAPIDS, MICH.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: Your advice to the wife whose husband cheated on her stank. She wanted to go see the woman and tell her off. You advised her to leave well enough alone and not cheapen herself.

Why should the wife be denied the satisfaction of telling that tramp off? Her husband had his fun, now it's her turn. When people do dirt, they should be made to pay for it. When my husband had a quickie affair with a friend of mine, I went over to her house and gave her a black eye. It made me feel terrific for a week. You should retire, kiddo. A quirky, enjoyable love story

Who says kids these days don't care about world affairs?

Whoever it was never met 17-year-old Audry Hugo (Adrienne Shelley), a pretty Long Island high school student with apocalyptic on her mind. Lately, Audry's been reading the papers and doing a lot of thinking about what she's read and has concluded that "the world is going to blow up any day."

"We'll all be lucky if we're alive in September," she earnestly informs her father, Victor Hugo (Christopher Cooke).

Victor isn't having any of it. He's got a nice little auto repair business in town, he's making a comfortable living and as far as matters global go, he's strictly a "What? Me Worry?" kind of guy. The world, he assures his only daughter, is not teetering on the edge of the atomic abyss, "not with so many people making so much money." Relax, it's the '80s.

With the Air Force grounding its Doomsday flights and with every fat cat from Donald Trump to Leona Helmsley to the board of directors of the Silverado Savings and Loan suddenly finding themselves riding a greased rail to ignominy, recent events have conspired to turn "The Unbelievable Truth," now playing at the Balboa Cinema, into something of a period piece. Audry's doomy preoccupations and her father's greed-baited envies seem like relics of a time that's daily growing more distant in our past.

In a way, though, the feeling that the picture is slightly out of time only reinforces the whimsically off-kilter nature of the whole piece. Made on Long Island for a minuscule \$200,000 over a period of 11½ days by writer-director Hal Hartley, "The Unbelievable Truth" is a quirky character study that compensates for its very apparent technical limitations with inventive writing and two engaging central performances.

With her end-of-the-world obsession, the self-dramatizing Audry revels in her role of self-made small-town outcast. Nobody understands her, and that's just the way she likes it. Dressed all in black like a beatnik throwback, she walks the streets of

her town, the teenage Cassandra. Everyone else thinks of her more as Chicken Little.

That includes her dad and her boyfriend Emmet (Gary Sauer), an insufferable adolescent yuppie with a bad case of consumeritis and a worse case of jealousy, which metastasizes when Audry dumps him early on. Emmet sees rivals everywhere and picks fights at the drop of a hat with anyone who even glances at her. Because she's a knockout and because he's the world's worst fighter (actually, he doesn't really fight, he just shoves), he spends a lot of time sprawled on his dignity in the street.

Only another outcast could truly understand her, Audry thinks, and

sure enough along comes Josh (Robert Burke). He's the real thing, an ex-con, no less, fresh out of Sing Sing after serving a long stretch for killing a man. And maybe killing his daughter. Or maybe the daughter killed herself. The townsfolk are unclear exactly who killed whom, and why. It happened a long time ago, and memories have gotten fuzzy. The only person who knows the true story is the dead girl's sister, Pearl (Julia McNeal), and as the townspeople repeat like a mantra, Pearl won't talk about it.

Sounds ominous, but Josh is really a good sort. A little moody maybe, and he keeps to himself, but he's a crackjack mechanic, and before long Audry's dad has given him a job in his garage.

Audry, fascinated, tries to get to know him better. Josh, a prisoner of his secret sorrows and mindful also that Audry's dad wouldn't take too kindly to a romance between the boss' daughter and an ex-con (and a much older man besides), keeps her at arm's length — for a while.

The picture's charm arises from a gentle sort of deadpan goofiness that underlies all its characters' actions and statements. When Pearl faints in the street at her first sight of the returned Josh, Josh just picks her up with a cool matter-of-factness and lugs her into the local diner where he drapes her across the counter until she revives. The patrons react with only mild surprise, almost as though they see this kind of thing every day.

Similarly, when talk turns to Josh's notorious crime, everyone seems mildly fascinated rather than fearful of having a convicted killer in their midst. In the benign cuckoldland imagined by Hartley, an odd bird like Josh hardly stands out.

There isn't a straight line or an entirely predictable situation in the picture. From small quirks, like Audry's decision to carry Josh's Crescent wrench around in her purse as a love token, to such major matters as the issue of Josh's guilt — did he in fact kill anyone at all? — an atmosphere of pixilation reigns. The love story in "The Unbelievable Truth" takes its sweet time developing, but it also takes so much whimsical and enjoyable turns along the way you don't mind the fact that the picture dawdles to its conclusion.

Good staging of 'Bad Seed' in Irvine

The Irvine Community Theater is closing out its 20th anniversary season with Maxwell Anderson's play "The Bad Seed," skillfully directed by Tom Titus, who recreates in a limited stage production the chilling tale of a pre-teen murderer, Rhoda Penmark. The story examines the anguish felt by young Rhoda's mother, Christine Penmark, and also delves into the emotional toll that murder takes on a community.

The irony is that the angelic-looking child, Rhoda, is the cause of such agony and that this production is being staged in a community, Turtle Rock, full of such angelic-looking children. This creates an interesting and intriguing ambience, which adds to the depth of the on-stage drama. Titus is to be congratulated for such an artistic approach to modern social commentary.

Anderson's intent to focus on the anguish of Christine Penmark's realizations about her own child sharply parallel the worst fears and struggles contemporary parents increasingly face. More than a psychological study of a child murderer, "The Bad Seed" remains relevant to modern audiences.

Staged at the Turtle Rock Community Park auditorium, this production of "The Bad Seed" showcases a strong, capable cast of veteran actors. Many of these actors have been with the Irvine Community Theater since its beginnings, and have successfully performed in several of the troupe's productions.

Christine Penmark, perhaps the play's single most demanding role, is dramatically recreated by Marcia Berthoff. As Rhoda's mother, Christine Penmark's maternal instincts are to protect her child from being harmed by others. As the play unfolds, however, the audience comes to understand Christine Penmark, and the source of her deep-seated emotional conflict. Berthoff's believable portrayal of a mother faced with the awful truth of her own mysterious past and of her little girl's deeds is riveting.

The pivotal role of Rhoda Penmark, cherubic pre-teen murderer, features the talents of Mindy Titus. W.C. Fields once said he preferred not to work with children or animals because they would steal the scene. Judging from Mindy's performance as Rhoda Penmark, Fields' comments seem to retain their validity. This is Mindy's first leading role, and while she is only 11 years of age, it looks as if she has a bright future ahead of her before the footlights.

Mary Benton and her husband, Chuck, play the distraught parents of Claude Daigle, one of Rhoda's victims. The apparent pain and confusion suffered by the Daigles over the sudden and tragic loss of their son is eloquently presented in Mary Benton's characterization of the grieving mother.

Tracy Godfre brings life to the role of the janitor, Leroy, and his on-stage interaction with young Rhoda creates an unexpected source of tension which contributes to the overall success of the production.

As the climactic production of the Irvine Community theater's 20th anniversary season, "The Bad Seed" is a stimulating evening's worth of entertainment. It is a thriller that should not be missed.

"The Bad Seed" will spin its chilling web over Turtle Rock Community Park — on Sunnyside Road just off of Turtle Rock Drive — Fridays and Saturdays through Aug. 25 at 8 p.m., with a matinee performance Aug. 19 at 2 p.m. Ticket prices are \$5 general admission, \$4 for seniors and children under 16. DeFeo leaves her mark in Laguna Art Museum show

One of the more macabre aspects of the visual arts is the way artists are deprived of validation for their career during their lifetimes. In all but a few cases — Picasso, de Kooning — the recognition the artist strives for eludes him or her until after death.

The graphic (that's medium, not content) "Works on Paper" of Jay DeFeo currently on a national tour is ironic in timing. DeFeo, a major force in the Bay Area art community for three decades, died as the "Works on Paper" catalogue was going to press last November.

Currently on display at the Laguna Art Museum through Oct. 7, the exhibit is the first major museum survey of her life's work. The brilliantly curated and catalogued show — by Sidra Stich, chief curator at Berkeley's University Art Museum, and Brigid Doherty — assures DeFeo of her niche in art history.

Composed of more than 50 pieces in various media — graphite, charcoal, oil, pastel and collage — the retrospective covers more than 30 years of work, from the early '50s through last year. DeFeo is set apart from the typical graphic

artist by the visceral impact of her work in the paper medium. Usually thought of as a mild medium, paper becomes to DeFeo what canvas was to Pollock: a dynamic congruence of elements.

In "Doctor Jazz" (1958) the paper is covered in oils, painted in an abstract and highly gestural format that retains elements of an object, albeit an unidentifiable one. In what appears as a giant beaker or bottle object thrusting skyward, the artist captures elements of man and woman in suggestive and integrated shapings of monochromatic values. The base of the piece is suggestive of a Jim Dine painted heart with a tonality resembling Stella. A collage effect is subtly achieved by the peculiar inclusion of silver tinsel.

In fact, that is the prowess of DeFeo: her use of very uncustomary elements in her graphic work. Graphics for most artists are steps in the formulation of their important canvas or sculptural works. Not for DeFeo. For her they are the end result in and of themselves.

She was born Mary Joan DeFeo in 1929, as her father completed his medical studies at Dartmouth College in New Hampshire. Three years later the family moved to California. A

sickly child, she showed a propensity for art which her family encouraged. Thus began a lifelong fascination with design, especially "perfect circles," triangles, and cruciforms which formed the basis for her "Florence" and "One O'Clock Jump" series. Among those is her most famous work, "The Rose."

Ironically, it was her high school nickname of Jay — a non-gender-specific nomenclature — which afforded her a chance at a career few women have had access to. When she won Berkeley's highly competitive Sigmund Martin Heller Traveling Fellowship, she learned later, supportive faculty members deliberately obscured her gender identity to secure her the award. Though she never intentionally cultivated the male persona, she was aware of the gender ambiguity of her name and often exhibited as J. DeFeo.

DeFeo broke many of the rules in the fine arts game: the gender rules, the rule of attaining recognition within one's lifetime, and the law of "Medium Hierarchy," that oil on canvas is better than pastel on paper.

May more breakers of tradition rise to the fray!

Parodists singing songs of Saddam

BOSTON — Chill out, Madonna and Janet Jackson. Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein is catching heavy play on rock 'n' roll radio these days.

Disc jockeys across the country are dubbing over pop songs to produce parodies aimed at Saddam. It evoked memories of the time when radio stations blasted Iran's taking of American hostages with the song "Born in Iran" set to the Beach Boys' "Barbara Ann."

The results are often more popular than the top 40. To the strains of the Marvelettes' "Please Mr. Postman," WZLX-FM in Boston lambasted Saddam on Wednesday for his country's march into neighboring Kuwait.

The song changes the original lyrics from "Stop, oh yes, wait a minute Mr. Postman, wa-a-a-a Mr. Postman," to "Oh yeah, wait a minute Mr. Hussein, Kuwait isn't yours Mr. Hussein."

The song continues: "Saddam Hussein is cut off at sea. Our troops are poised so patiently. We're gonna be there for a long, long time."

"You'll have nothing but an empty pipeline...."

In Philadelphia, WMGK-FM aired "I Am Iraq," to the tune of Simon and Garfunkel's "I Am a Rock," on its show "Harvey in the Morning."

The song blasts Saddam with the lyrics: "I am the chosen leader, no I'm not insane, it's right and just because I am Hussein, I am Iraq. I am a tyrant...."

"It's our biggest hit," said Julie Roberts, the show's producer. "People want to know where they can buy copies, and there are a lot of requests. We've gotten a few dozen calls."

Saddam has chosen to be known by his first name, but the songwriters are generally calling him Hussein.

WTIC-FM in Hartford, Conn., played "Blame it on Hussein" to the tune of Milli Vanilli's "Blame it on the Rain."

The song was part of a station promotion Wednesday in which disc jockeys dressed as Arab sheiks and a service station offered drivers premium gasoline for 96 cents a gallon. Traffic tie-ups forced an early end to the event.

WHYY-FM in Montgomery, Ala., caused a traffic jam Tuesday when it held an "Insane Hussein" party. There were no song parodies. But the station gave away five gallons of gas to the first 102 cars in line and had a dunking booth with a person dressed as the Iraqi leader.

Following in the footsteps of history, Rush Limbaugh's nationally syndicated radio talk show set "Bomb Iraq" to "Barbara Ann."

"We had a guy call up who said, 'let's go in there and take Hussein out,'" Limbaugh said. "I said, 'here's a song for you,' and we played it."

In Dallas, KMGC-FM dubbed over the Fine Young Cannibals' "She Drives Me Crazy" with the lyrics:

"Hussein is crazy, ooh, ooh. So call his bluff, ooh, ooh. Hussein is crazy, and things could really get rough. Ooh, ooh."

KLZX AM & FM in Salt Lake City serenaded its listeners with "Iraq, Iraq," based on "New York, New York," and "Hussein," sung to Eric Clapton's "Cocaine."

Country and western stations are also getting into the act. Disc jockey

Ken Cooper at KZLA in Burbank, Calif., came up with several parodies, such as a twist on Hank Williams Jr.'s "All My Rowdy Friends Are Coming Over Tonight," that goes "All My Saudi Friends Are Coming Over Tonight."

Michael Coleman, production director of Boston's WZLX, said the station's first parody got such a response he decided to produce several others.

One, to the tune of "End of the Line" by the Traveling Wilburys, goes:

"Well it's an oil fight, 'Riding in the Middle East. Well it's an oil fight. Iraq is acting like a beast.'"

Others in the works for national airwaves include "One More in the Name of Allah" to U2's "Pride, in the Name of Love," "Me and Hussein Down by the Oil Field" to Paul Simon's "Me and Julio Down by the Schoolyard," and "Who'll Stop Hussein" to Creedence Clearwater Revival's "Who'll Stop the Rain."

"I don't want to make a joke of this," Coleman said. "This is just tongue-in-cheek, but we have to be careful."

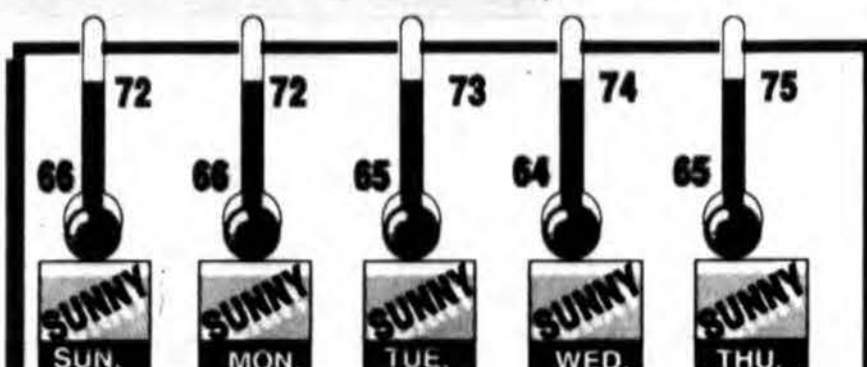

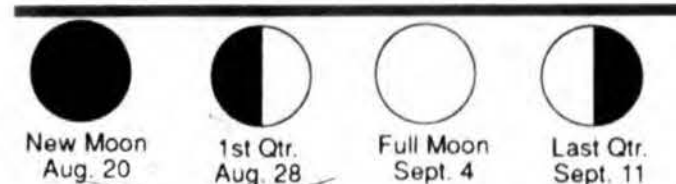

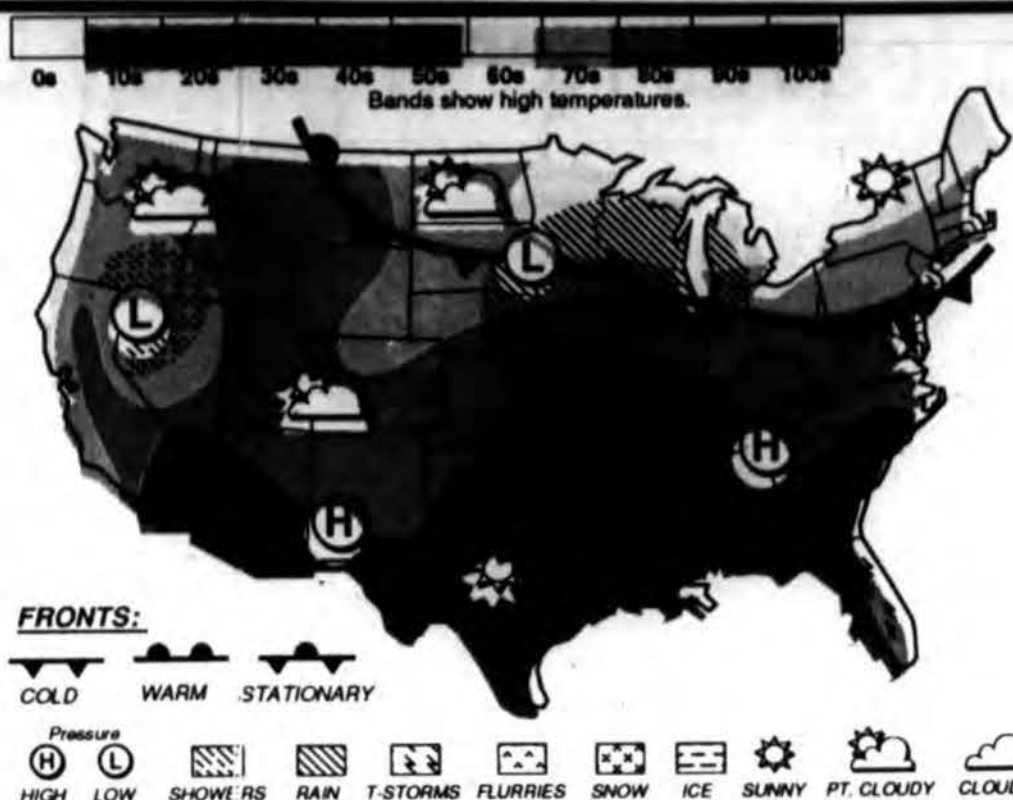

Born in New Brighton, Pa., Marta Peluso earned a B.A. in art and English from Allegheny College and an M.F.A. in studio art from UC Davis. She attended the prestigious Panopticon Photography Workshop in Nafplion, Greece.

Marta Peluso worked as a photographer/reporter for the Davis Daily Democrat in Davis, Calif., and was an art lecturer at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. She's currently a fine arts instructor at Cuesta College in San Luis Obispo and also serves as director of Cuesta's art gallery.

She has had one-person exhibits at the Eye Gallery in San Francisco, the College of the Siskiyous Art Gallery, The Art Center in San Luis Obispo, the No Nothing Cinema in San Francisco, and the Pence Gallery in Davis.

'The Beer Hunter:' The tale of the ale

NEW YORK — There have been shows about the hunt for elephants, submarines, bad guys, lost tykes and even the elusive butterfly of love. And now, for something completely different: "The Beer Hunter."

It's a six-part serenade to suds, written and hosted by Michael Jackson, a British writer and beer expert. A man of firm views, he believes beer is far more than a belch propellant.

"It is as varied as wine, it is as noble as wine, it is as complex as wine," says Jackson, whose seven books on the subject include "The New World Guide to Beer."

His series, premiering Aug. 23 on cable's Discovery Channel, studies beer varieties in Holland, Germany, Belgium, Great Britain, Canada and the United States. His American visit reports on San Francisco's famed Anchor Steam beer.

Jackson, who lives in London, said he's been writing about beer for 16 years. He began in journalism 14 years earlier. He noted in passing that "in those days, newspaper journalists drank a lot of beer."

There are rumors that some still do, he was told. "Not so many now," he said, a bit wistfully. "It worries me sometimes when I see these non-drinking journalists. I don't see how they can function."

Jackson took up the cause of beer when he noticed how people partook of and talked about beer. Yet they only wrote about wine, no doubt considering beer one of the lesser grogs, suitable only for drinking.

"I felt right from square one that beer didn't get the respect it deserved," said the writer.

He dedicated himself to raising beer criticism and reportage to the high, indeed mystical level devoted to the world of Grappa Stompa, which is Italian for Grapes That Have Been Stomped On.

There are a variety of wines, such as chardonnay, cabernet, sauterne and port, he noted. But beer is equally diverse. There are Belgian brews with winy tartness; fruity-tasting ales; soft, spicy dark lagers, and so on.

Jackson's crusade to make this known and enlighten minds and palates has not been without controversy in England, where there is an organization called The Campaign for Real Ale.

There is debate within that group, he said, "whether some of the writers — i.e., me — are making beer too elitist."

Sometimes no help is needed. In New York and Los Angeles, for example, some citizens — they are called yuppies — try to be beer elitists. They invariably cause snickers because, no matter where they are, they always ask barkeeps:

"Eh, what kinds of beer do you have?"

But New York and Los Angeles "are very unsophisticated cities in terms of beer," Jackson contends. "If you want to see people who know about beer, you have to go to Seattle or Portland or San Francisco."

In those cities, he said, "there's been a renaissance of serious interest in beer" that started in the mid-'70s with the opening of several small breweries in Northern California and then spread to the Pacific Northwest.

Jackson may well be envied by many journalists, particularly those who after work like to knock back a round or two of Old Frothingshlosh.

A few who take aboard more have been known to propose marriage, confide dark secrets, weep, fall off a bar stool or even sing. "The Beer That Made Milwaukee Famous Has Made a Loser Out of Me."

But for Jackson, moderation is all. His tipping is purely professional. He does admit that getting sloshed "is a hazard. But I don't think I've ever fallen prey to it when I've been tasting."

He did have a small problem when filming the German part of "The Beer Hunter" at a beer festival, he said. His director said things like, "Can we do that again? Where you swallow that pint of beer, can we just do it again?"

By 9 p.m., Jackson still was being asked for another take. The script called for him to conclude things with a cosmic statement on beer. But he noticed he was approaching a condition known as Unclear.

"I said, 'Hey, John, I'm just too drunk to do this.' And he said, 'You don't seem drunk to me.' I said, 'That's because you're drunk.'"

Jackson gave it a try, though. He succeeded this time. "I saw it on the rushes and thought I looked terrible," he said. "But nobody's commented on it."
