The science of teaching

Newport-Mesa program shows instructors how to teach math and science, and gives them chance to try out new skills on students

COSTA MESA - Nine-yearold Jack Turner, a Lincoln Elementary School student learned that a jellyfish is a form of plankton. Adams Elementary student Tyler Randolph, also 9, learned that scientists find phosphorescent rocks by using purple lights that cause them to glow in the

Jack and Tyler not only discovered new facts about their world, but they also were among 250 students who helped a group of teachers new ways to teach math

The teachers and students came together at the Newport-Mesa school district's Summer Science/Math Institute, which is in full swing at Davis Elementary School in Costa Mesa. The institute has a dual mission of teaching teachers to teach math and science and giving those teachers opportunities to try out those techniques on students.

The monthlong program started in June, with five "lead" teachers instructing 27 K-6 teachers from around the school district in innovative hands-on science and math teaching methods. Those student teachers then get a chance to apply what they've learned in a three-week science enrichment program for the stu-

"It's designed to refine talents and build skills of teachers," said director Charlene institute Metoyer. "Teaching science can be very time-consuming, but because we use hands-on methods, it shows that it is possible to integrate the instruction into their normal routine."

The program, which costs about \$50,000, receives state and federal funding. Teachers are either paid a one-time stipend of \$750 or receive six university credits for participating.

"Everything is hands-on and everything I learn here I can take back to my own class," said

arents, remember my name because you may not want me to coach your kids' next soccer or baseball season.

On May 10, Jerome Wilhoit, a teacher in the Santa Ana school district, was arrested for the "inappropriate touching" of three students, two ages 7 and one 9. The official charge is. "lewd act upon a child." Two of the kids have recanted their stories but prosecutors say that they have four more kids to replace the two they lost. Wilhoit, whose bail is set at \$100,000, is considered to be a "nice teacher" by a parent of one of the "victims." From the published reports I've read so far, Jerome Wilhoit could be Steve Smith.

The touching incident that . first got Wilhoit reported to the principal of Carl Harvey Elementary School in Santa Ana is described as "trying to tickle a girl by blowing on her leg." In police parlance, this crime is classified as an "attempted rasp-

While report says disciplinary action is down, some still question harshness of Newport-Mesa transfer policy. HUSEIN MASHNI Daily Pllot NEWPORT-MESA - The number of student expulsions, suspensions and transfers are down from last year, according to a school district discipline report released Friday.

But some school board members are hesitant to credit that. drop to what they see as the district's inflexible transfer policy. There were 62 transfers dur-

ing the 1997-98 school year compared with 87 during the 1996-97 school year. There were also fewer expulsions: 30 in 1997-98 compared with 38 the year before.

The number of girls transferred was way down, six in 1997-98 compared with 22 the year before. The number of boys transferred also decreased but not so noticeably: from 65 in 1996-97 to 56 this year.

"I'm glad to see they're going down," said Newport-Mesa board member Judy Franco, "But I continue to have some concerns that they went up so high in the previous years."

The 1996-97 school year had a record number of expulsions largely because there were incidents in which groups of students were transferred.

"We had to transfer the whole Estancia soccer team last year," said Tom Jacobson, the assistant superintendent of secondary education.

But, as rigid as the district's transfer policy is, school board member Martha Fluor said she would have expected to see a

The Costa Mesa Police Department will install new video cameras in each of its 43 marked

squad cars by Oct. 1. Department officials are looking for a company to supply the equipment, esti-mated at \$290,000. The funding comes from part of the state's Citizens' Option for Public Safety allocation to Costa Mesa and a local law enforcement block grant.

Mounted on the dashboards of the patrol cars, the cameras are another tool on the front line to bolster officers' accounts of arrests. The cameras come in handy when police are in pursuit of a vehicle, stop a motorist or conduct a field sobriety test on possible drunken drivers.

But not all incidents can be captured by the camera. Officers also will have microphones attached to their lapels to record

conversations.

"I think the cameras will make things more safe for police officers and the general public," said Police Chief Dave Snowden, who indicated the department has been contemplating adding cam-

eras for the last four years. "It may put some criminals on their best

behavior." Snowden added that the cameras may save taxpayers money. Law enforcement agencies have seen an increase in civil lawsuits over the last several years that have resulted in added court costs. Costa Mesa is no exception, defending itself against a handful of claims.

"It can save us bundles in legal fees because the vast majority of complaints are about officers' behavior that just aren't true," Snowden said.

Officers also say the video cameras give them the ability to review and correct possible



COSTA MESA — For his part in saving the life of a Costa Mesa woman in November, Costa Mesa police Officer Eric Wisener was awarded the 1998 Life Saving Award at the 35th annual Public Safety Awards luncheon held at the Westin South Coast Plaza on Friday, Wisener was one of seven public safe-

ty personnel honored at a banquet attended by Costa Mesa Mayor Peter Buffa, Police Chief Dave Snowden and about 100 other local dignitaries.

Snowden presented the award to Wisener for his quick action and discretion in handling a situation in which Cos-ta Mesa resident, Orrin Dale Hudson, 40, held a 12-inch kitchen knife to the throat of a woman threatening to kill her.

With his gun drawn, Wisener talked Hudson into dropping the serrated butcher knife without injuring the woman, Wendy Lynn Echard.

Eric got there and managed to diffuse the crowd and after a short confrontation talked him out of the knife," Snowden

Swallow your fear and hold on to your lunch, the rides on the Orange County Fair midway pack a real punch

should have known my quest to find the most gut-wrenching ride at the Orange County Fair would be a real challenge

> trusty reporter's notebook flew out of my back pocket on the first ride, never to be seen

From that point on, I staggered my way through 10 of the midway rides, taking on everything from high-tech newer models like Spin Out and the Rocket Launcher to good oldfashioned mind-bogglers such as Tilt-A-Whirl and the Zipper.

In a little more than an hour of back-to-back rides, I found some exciting ones that no brave fairgoer should miss, plus a few duds that aren't worth the ticket price.

To get the most bang for your buck, I recommend you swallow your fear, shold on to your lunch and get on board Evolution.

After riding it, I think this ride could effectively be used by the U.S. military to torture hostages or by

out of the most hardened killer. Imagine a large circle where riders sit around the outside with their backs facing the middle. Now attach that circle to one end of a 100-foot-tall pole, flip the pole over, spinning the circle at the same time, and you have Evolution.

police to coerce a confession

The result is a few minutes of hairraising fun and at least four revolutions with the circle completely upside down, leaving riders clinging to their chest straps while staring either' straight down at the ground or out at the inverted horizon.

One note: This ride is not recommended after ingesting any amount of cotton candy, bratwurst or funnel

A close runner-up in the lose-mylunch contest was the Rocket Launcher, the fair's new bungee-cord ride, which flings a single person about 100 feet into the air in less than a second.

Starting on the ground and strapped to two long bungee cords by a parachute harness, the ride - which costs \$40 per launch -- is a blast, I rode it for free on Media Day before the fair began but with much cheaper thrills available just a short walk away in the fair Midway, the Rocket Launcher may not be worth its high price.

Amid the sea of newer and fancier rides are many of the same carnival standards that, despite their older design, still pack a heck of a punch.

For a ride that spins you around in small circles for a few minutes, the Tilt-A-Whirl remains a fair classic. Up to four people can ride in one cart at a time and the added weight only lends to more severe spins.

Another one from the oldie-butgoodie file is the Zipper, a fine example of classic carnival fun. Strap yourself and a friend into a tiny metal cage that does complete flips while climbing a vertical conveyer belt and you get quite a ride.

There will be several chances during the fair to test the carnival rides without paying full price.

Every Tuesday through Friday, wristbands good for any 10 rides are sold for \$10 and \$15 unlimited ride wristbands will be available every Monday.

Fire damages two vehicles

A 1988 Jeep convertible was totaled and a 1991 Mercedes-Benz was damaged after the Jeep caught fire early Thursday in a Via Lido parking garage, authorities said.

Firefighters arrived at the scene at 5 a.m. to find the Jeep engulfed in flames so hot that tires were popping and the Jeep's roof was melting, said Lt. John Blauer of the Newport Beach Fire and Marine Department.

"It was pretfy well cooked by the time we got there," he said. The firefighters were able to put out the fire within minutes, Blauer said,

Officials estimated the Jeep's value at \$5,000, but did not have an estimate for the damage to the Mercedes-Benz, which is worth \$40,000. The Jeep was impounded by the Fire and Marine Department and the Newport Beach Police Department pending investigation of the fire, Blauer said.

Damage to the four-story parking structure, at 3421 Via Lido, was estimated at \$3,000, Blauer said.

Arraignment delayed for accused robbers

The arraignment of four men accused of burglarizing Winston's Jewelry Store in June has been postponed to Aug. 7 in Harbor Municipal Court.

The four men — Edwin Kizzee, 30, of Palmdale; Ron Simmons, 28, of Los Angeles; Robert

Charles Tillett, 21, of Los Angeles; and Tramaine Howard Cooper, 28, of Los Angeles — face charges of armed robbery and carjacking.

The other two were arrested in a nearby fabric store, where most of the stolen property was found.

Programs make after-school hours count

few weeks ago, I concluded that it would take more Athan posting "Do not kill" signs in the classrooms to stop kirds from being violent to each other. My suggestions take a lot more work than that. But given the alternative, I think they are

Provide after-school and summer programs for kids at their schools. This suggestion is going to require reallocating some of our tax dollars. In the past few years, we have decided the way to make our communities safe and crime-free is to hire more and more police and spend our tax dollars on courts and pris-

it costs more to lock up a twenile for a year than to send him or her to Harvard. The problem is after four years at arvard, you've got a young adult who will contribute greatly to society and our tax base for the next 50 years. After four years in the prison system, You've got a young adult likely to commit more crimes and be a terrible parent.

So we have to decide. Do we vant to live in gated communities and drive in bulletproof cars, while spending more of our income to pay for tax-supported prison systems to lock up the kids we are ignoring right now? Or do we want to divert tax dollars to fund some programs for kids right now?

We have the facilities to house the after-school and summer programs. These buildings are our schools, which our tax dollars built. They should be used to improve kids in any way possible, whether the school district sponsors it.

At the Costa Mesa elementary schools, we have a citysponsored after-school and summer playground program. It provides adult supervision for kids who would otherwise go home to an empty house. It's free to parents and is a drop-in program, so kids can take advantage of it when they need to.

But there could be so much more. There could be reading rooms, where kids could get help with their reading and homework. Music classes could be offered, because we know kids who study music at an early age do much better in math.

How about having computer classes after school? That way, children who don't have computers at home can practice typing, play an educational game or do research for a report? What if we taught a second language in the after-school program? We need hands-on art, math, and science projects and an elementary school news-

Statistically, the time when kids commit the most crimes is between 2 and 6 p.m., the time between when school lets out and parents arrive home. Why

do we think a seventh-grader is able to make the right choices during this crucial four-hour period each day if we provide them with no positive adult role models or activities? Is it wise to have a 12-year-old watching talk shows about the most shocking subjects imaginable to formulate their views on life?

he city of Santa Ana just I received a \$1.8 million federal grant to assign police and recreational leaders to work with kids before they get into trouble. Their school attendance and grades are improving. The teens are learning people care how they are doing, and they are learning about responsibility. Would you shrug off a police officer if he asked you if your homework was done?

The city of Costa Mesa is considering shifting the DARE program from elementary school to fifth or sixth grade, and again in seventh or eighth grade. I liken this to the "Do not kill" rule. I don't think kids have forgotten tobacco, alcohol and drugs are bad for their health. They know they can go to jail for drugs and gang activity. But kids of this age have fragile egos, where a best friend can be a worst enemy in the blink of an eye. If they don't have a strong network of support to make them feel good about themselves, the drug-and-alcohol path to obliteration looks most attractive.

Make the teen and preteen after-school and summer programs both fun and educational. Offer intramural sports that don't require kids to possess superior coordination to play.

Offer folk, swing or squaredancing classes. But make homework the ticket to these, require that a half-hour of homework be completed and checked before the fun begins.

Work with the school district's sister city in Australia and schools in other parts of the world to set up e-mail pen pals for the discussion of political and cultural ideas. Set up peer tutoring, where older kids help their fellow schoolmates.

et's kill three birds with one Lastone. Have after-school programs where police officers visit, so that kids know and can relate to the police, and the police can keep a pipeline open to hear about potential trouble. By providing a safe learning environment, we will raise test scores and learning, causing our population to be a valuable work force. Busy kids don't have as much time or inclination to get into trouble.

It's time for city government and the school district to join hands and provide these obvious solutions to our future, our kids.



many of them are not getting at home the kind of hugs and pats they require. Many of the kids I've coached respond to the hugs and pats as a thirsty man in the desert would to a glass of water. Most of these kids hug back, either because it is something missing from their lives, or because they were raised in home such as ours, where it is not given a second thought.

In one baseball game, a very quiet girl, a 10-year-old with great potential, but underachieving on the field, smacked the ball deep into left field in a close game. As her hit sailed over the head of the outfielder, I knew

that the ball had home run written all over it. As she crossed home plate and was mobbed by her team, everyone else on our side was screaming and jumping and hugging. Everyone that is, except her father, who sat stoically in his chair.

I don't know whether Wilhoit is guilty of "inappropriate touching," or lewd acts, whatever those may be. I hope for the kids' sake, that none of the charges are true. It's also quite possible that if it were a "Mrs." Wilhoit attempting the raspberry, this would not even be a story. But for many coaches and teachers, it doesn't matter.

A defense fund for Wilhoit has been established and hundreds of signatures attesting to the strength of his character have been turned in. But, again, it

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doesn't matter. As much as I hope or pray that the accusations are nothing more than a teacher being playful and friendly with students, it won't matter. The sad fact is that guilty or innocent, the incident has raised the bar on the level of contact between kids and non-parents and, once again, kids will suffer.

Teachers and coaches will think twice about pats, hugs and other incidental or innocent contact. Overprotective parents and zealous prosecutors who enjoy the challenge of shooting fish in a barrel will help ruin what for many kids is the kind of adult contact they crave.



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


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

Newport police using new camera system to create 3-D images of crime scenes

NEWPORT BEACH - George Reis snaps crime-scene investigation photographs at different angles, but the "flat," one-dimensional shots don't have the same effect as those in virtual reality.

Reis, a photo technician for the Newport Beach Police Department, now can use a high-tech system that enables him to stitch

together still photographs from a digital camera. The visual images are downloaded into a computer and a 3-D, 360-degree panoramic view of the crime scene is created.

For example, investigators now are able to see exactly where evidence lies in relation to a body at a murder scene. Officers can zoom in or out and scroll in either direction to create a better view of the site.

"It helps us more in telling the story," Reis said. "It requires me to

visualize a crime scene differently. Other industries have used this technology, but more law enforcement agencies are showing interest." Crime-scene investigator Don Gage said juries may better understand evidence because of the new technology. "People don't think in 3-D," he said. "Digital imaging has changed the way we look at things in the traditional sense. It puts you in the scene instead of being told about it."



Looking forward to a rematch with the defending state champion Rustlers in the finals, the Pirates were tripped up in the semifinals by Santa Barbara.

The Pirates won the first two games, 15-7 and 15-8, but let the Vagueros back into the match by not taking advantage of matchpoint opportunities in the third and fourth games.

OCC lost the final games, 15-17, 14-16 and 12-15.

Josh Richardson ended his two-year career at OCC second on the all-time kill leader list with 626 kills. Richardson only trails former Pirate teammate Kevin Reid who had 657 in the 1996-1997 season.

Ironically, Richardson, a product of Newport Harbor High, will play for UCI in the fall and will once again be playing alongside Reid. Richardson also finished third on the all-time blocks list with 106.
