

'Cuts shouldn't hurt classroom'

Sharing services and eliminating jobs is recommended by Newport-Mesa Unified School District committee as some of the ways to come up with \$3.2 million in budget savings.

NEWPORT-MESA - Share secretaries, eliminate positions and stop duplicating services.



This is the message the Citizens' **Budget Committee has for school** district administrators.

In an effort to find \$3.2 million in savings and revenue to fund 7% and subsequent 2% raises for

district employees, the 14-member citizens' group has metweekly to recommend how the school board uses its scissors.

"The consensus I heard last night is that the cuts need to be away from the classroom," said Alesia Erickson, chairwoman of the committee.

Yet when committee members met with district administrators last week, some found that trimming district overhead costs isn't as easy as it sounds.

Erickson said some district department heads seemed more interested in defending their departments than working toward budget savings.

"When we sit there with staff who is not supportive, it's a tough game to play," Erickson said. "Many of the budget committee members were faced with very defensive staff."

In talking about jobs and classrooms, it was easy for both staff and committee members to get emotionally involved.

Hot topics discussed around the tables at the Sanborn Instructional Media Center have included adding one student to district classrooms, eliminating entire departments and getting rid of

the very center where they met. The idea of adding more students to district classrooms angered committee member Linda Safran.

COSTA MESA - The closing of Camarillo State Hospital has infuriated numerous relatives of Fairview Developmental Center clients who are concerned their loved ones might be forced out to make room for 156 to 177 new resi-

Lou Sarrao, Fairview's clinical director, spoke earlier this week to more than 50 concerned relatives and others at a meeting held by Fairview Family and Friends, an organization of patients' family members.

The discussion focused on the pending transfer of patients from Camarillo beginning in late April.

Coffin, 43, had a previous commitment to her parents that she would look after her little sister for the rest of her

"When we were first married, [David] gave up his bed when she visited and he slept on the couch," Coffin said. "But we've been through some rough periods with her." Until the age of 3, Debbie developed just like any other child. She was later diagnosed as severely retarded and

City tries to dig up funds for dredging

NEWPORT BEACH - City officials, looking to dig up funding to dredge the years of muck build-up in the Back Bay, took a trip this week to speak to state legislators on wetland restora-

Councilman Dennis O'Neil, City Manager Kevin Murphy, City Attorney Robert Burnham and Assistant City Manager Peggy Ducey — along with Holly Veale, an aide to county Supervisor Tom Wilson - trekked upstate to testify before the Assembly's budget subcommittee. The subcommittee is now reviewing Gov. Pete Wilson's proposal to earmark \$5.75 million toward restoring Southern California wetlands.

They spoke in favor of that proposal, emphasizing the Upper Bay project in particular. "We stressed its importance to

the region, not just to Newport Beach," Ducey said. "The most important thing, when you want something like this from the state, is visibility and education so that when it comes up they can place a name and a face."

The Newport Beach contingent also met with individual legislators, showing them pictures and passing out fliers. One Assembly member they don't need to convince is Marilyn Brewer, who's based locally.

"The dredging needs to occur," said Brewer chief of staff Floreine Cahn, "She's attempting

CORONA DEL MAR - Elizabeth Donnelly rescued her dog, Max, once from death's door but for the second time around, she needed a little help.

Donnelly picked up Max three years ago from the pound, where he was scheduled to die if he didn't find an owner. But recently the dog has been suffering a long list of chronic health problems that come with medical bills Donnelly just can't handle on her own.

And without surgery, Max would have to be put to sleep, his veterinarian said.

Donnelly's neighbors in Corona del Mar - where Max's effervescent personality has won him fervent admirers - wouldn't hear

of it. So they've pooled their resources to hold a garage sale today to raise money for the ailing

big yellow dog.

"He's just a happy fellow,"

Donnelly said. "His tail wags and
his eyes sparkle and people just love to see him.

Max, who Donnelly estimates is about 7, has undergone tests and back operations. He's

endured spinal disc problems and a hip tumor. And now he needs surgery to fix his worsening back condition.

So when Donnelly's friends planned to have a joint garage sale at her place, the event quickly evolved into a way to cover the treatment he needs. The sale is set for 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. today at 211 Heliotrope, Corona del Mar. The five or so contributors hope to raise about \$1,000.

"It was their way of being able to help me because I wouldn't take their money," said Donnelly, a four-year Corona del Mar resident. "He's so important to me dogs are unconditional love.

Mary Sakioka honored by women's group

Sakioka Farm founder and Costa Mesa resident Mary Sakioka was honored Thursday evening at an awards dinner held

at the Sutton Place Hotel. Hosted by the Orange County Chapter of the National Association of Women Business Owners, the dinner was given to celebrate five women who "have allowed other women to achieve more in their businesses and communities," said association president Karen Herb in a prepared state-

Sakioka, a first generation Japanese American, was placed in an internment camp during World War II. There, she met her husband, Roy, and also learned how to farm.

After the war, Sakioka and her husband moved to Orange County and bought some land. The couple then started a farm with Sakioka's in-laws, and it was mostly she

and her mother-in-law who raised the crops, while her husband and father-in-law sold them.

Roy Sakioka, who died in 1995, went on to become one of the richest men in the county. The farm remains today as one of the largest in the county, and the Sakiokas are among the top twenty most affluent families in Costa Mesa.

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

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

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

Twitching at Matetsi while on safari in Zimbabwe

fter our excellent train adventure from Pretoria to Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe, we were picked up along with another couple, Tony and Liz (who happen to be the owners of a guest house in South Africa), and taken to the Water Lodge inthe Matetsi Game Reserve.

The reserve, which is comprised of two subcamps - the

Water Lodge and the Safari Camp - is owned by Africa's largest eco-tourism group, Conservation Corporation Africa, which endeavors to create sustainable conservation areas

through low-impact eco-tourism. Upon arriving at a "camp" that seemed to emerge suddenly from out of the bush - the "reception desk" was a table out in the open overlooking the magnificent Zambezi river — we checked in with a glass of iced tea and were given a brief introduction to the camp by Dumisani, who was to be our ranger during our stay.

The Water Lodge is situated on the Zambezi River and comprises three individual camps of six suites each (with air-conditioning, no less) which each have a private deck and plunge pool overlooking the river. The suites are beautiful with two large luxurious rooms decorated in Zimbabwean motifs in blue slate and teak with huge doors opening up to the view of the River.

In addition to the plunge pool there is a bathtub on a raised platform inside the very large bathroom, a shower area all in slate, and an outdoor shower that looks out to the river and the "bush." Mosquito netting over the large bed complements it all

and makes for a romantic "cocoon."

It was the most amazing feeling to be splashing about in our plunge pool, looking about at the monkeys in the trees and seeing the Zambezi River flowing by, just a few meters away

The next morning, five of us left for our game drive.

The game drive did not produce a lot of "game" per se, although we did see baboons, wildebeest, zebra, warthogs, side-striped jackal, kudu, and lots of impala. The highlight was when we stumbled upon a lion who was none to happy with us and let us know it.

Matetsi is set on 50,000 hectares of land that used to be hunting concessions so the animals are all still very wary of humans, as one can well understand. It was during this trip that Arie and I began our transforma-

tion from mere bird-watchers into genuine "twitchers."

Both Tony and Liz were familiar with and interested in the Southern Africa bird life and Dumisani and his tracker, December, were excellent at finding and identifying them so we got caught up in the excitement as well.

Some of the more interesting and/or rare birds that we identified were the paradise whydah, kori bustard, red-billed woodhoopoe, narina trogon (particularly rare to see), lilac-breasted roller, grey lourie, African jacana, paradise flycatcher, European bee eater and tropical boubou.

That afternoon we transferred over to the other Matetsi camp, the Safari Lodge, where our room was just as stunning as at the Water Lodge, but completely different. It was a psuedo-tent

with a deck overlooking the "vlei" where we often saw groups of zebra and wildebeest

gathering. In another drive, we again saw the lion, this time with his lioness and we found the "kill" that unbeknownst to us they had been looking after (that's why

the morning). It was a young zebra, or the remains of one really, with the mauled head and forearms all intact, but ending at the ribcage, which was completely cleaned out. A bit gruesome, but really interesting to see.

A few meters away we found a hoof and bits and pieces, but the next morning when we went back to look - everything was completely cleaned up. Nature has a very efficient garbage/recycling system.

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

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

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

moved into Fairview Developmental Center in 1965 at the age of 9.

Coffin, a member of a Fairview support group called Fairview Family and Friends, is among many relatives who fear their loved ones could be transferred to smaller group homes that they say are ill-equipped to handle certain disabilities.

"I sleep at night because I know she is being taken care of at Fairview," Coffin said.

Debbie Lynn Pratt, now 41, is among the higher functioning residents at the state institution that houses about 735 residents. She is among those clients being targeted by legislation that allows state institutions to transfer some residents into community group homes.

Fairview is one of six state institutions for the developmentally disabled that began downsizing following a 1993 court settlement; Camarillo is closing in June.

About 2,000 residents have been transferred from state hospitals to group homes during the past four population Fairview's dropped from about 1,000 residents in 1993 to 735 in 1997.

The Coffins decided not to have children of her own and bought their Costa Mesa townhouse just a few blocks from Fairview to be close to

Although Debbie has her own room and visits for several days at a time, she requires constant supervision in the home.

"I do all the fun things with her and Carol does all the discipline and toilets her," said David, who says Debbie loves motorcycle rides.

Before a home visit, Coffin must "Debbie-proof" her place. Anything that can be picked up and shredded is put out of sight. Cardboard is taped to book shelves and the toilet is turned off so Debbie won't flush things down it.

Despite it all, Coffin said her sister is no burden.

"She's enriched my life more than she's taken from it," Coffin

Besides watching Richard Simmons workout videos, looking at pictures in fashion magazines and playing with toys that talk to her when she pulls a string, Debbie likes picking out her own clothes. But she cannot speak and makes bird-like chirping noises to attract attention. In the 1980s, Debbie was trans-

ferred into a smaller 100-bed group home, the Good Shepherd Lutheran home. But the facility cared for much higher-functioning residents than Debbie. She was just too difficult for them to handle, Coffin said. In 1985, Debbie was sent to Camarillo where she stayed until 1988.

"It's not on the caliber you find at Fairview," Coffin said. "When she started her behavior problems they didn't want her.

After Debbie spent three years in Camarillo, Coffin had her moved back to Fairview

"When I was little I used to say I would marry her and take care of her the rest of my life," Coffin said. "After I drop her off, I cry all the way home.

"Between now and June 30 there could be about 40 residents from Fairview that may be returning to the community (to private group homes)," Sarrao conceded.

Sarrao said he expects a certain amount of chaos at the Harbor Boulevard facility as staff scrambles to reopen three dormitory-like residences to accommodate the new population.

Since 1993, six of Fairview's residences have been closed and about 200 clients moved out into community group homes, he said. Critics of California's system that

cares for the developmentally disabled say the state's recent efforts to downsize its six remaining institutions - including Fairview - is at the expense of patients' well being. One lawsuit, in fact, alleged that one patient moved to a group home died after walking through a plate glass window and another drowned in a bathtub.

The state, which will have only five hospitals after Camarillo closes in June, began a swift exodus of patients from developmental centers following a 1990 lawsuit settled in 1993. In that class-action lawsuit, triggered by an assault incident among patients at a state hospital, some parents claimed their children could be better served in smaller home-like settings.

Since then, about 2,000 patients have been transferred from these state institutions to smaller group

Matt Gugilelmo, who heads the family organization, is among those concerned that state-operated facilities are sending residents to homes that are ill-equipped to handle the needs of some clients. Members of Fairview Family and Friends believe their relatives need the 24hour care and on-site doctors provided at the state hospital.

"Let us keep our children here," said Gugilelmo, who volunteers his time to help other relatives understand legislation affecting the facility. "Every year I have to go to court

to keep my child here." Dr. William Cable, Fairview's chief of medical staff, filed a lawsuit in December against the institution and the state, claiming administrators punished him for challenging patient transfers to community group homes.

Additionally, a second classaction lawsuit was filed Thursday on behalf of three individuals and 800 current and former Fairview residents fighting the state's release

of patients to group homes, said Santa Ana attorney Francis X. Hardiman.

A hearing on the class-action lawsuit is scheduled March 31.

"Dr. Cable was my [two] daughters' doctor," Marian Snow told other parents at the recent meeting. "I support him. He definitely cares about the people here and has backbone enough to speak up

Doug Van Meter, deputy director for developmental centers, said he is unable to comment on either lawsuit.

Van Meter did say he knows of no immediate plans to move current Fairview residents. He also said decisions about transfers are made on an individual basis.

"We have adequate room for the people to come and are not going to put any pressure on the people who reside there," Van Meter said.

Relatives and guardians of mentally ill and developmentally disabled residents at both Fairview and Camarillo said they fear their loved ones could be among those who might be placed into group homes.

All Fairview clients are reviewed annually to determine whether they are capable of living outside the state institution.

But even if a client's doctor and

parents believe the patient should remain at the hospital, a regional center case worker assigned to the client could make a determination otherwise. Ultimately, the courts

decide the fate of an individual. Snow, who has two daughters at Fairview, asked Sarrao whether Fairview staff could intervene and prevent clients from being trans-

ferred into group homes. Sarrao said 99% of staff would suggest keeping clients at Fairview, but regional centers that have authority over the developmental center ultimately put on pressure to transfer a certain number of clients out.

"We are service providers, but we are also human beings," he said. "Many of us have known your sons and daughters for 25-plus years ... but we have to maintain a degree of objectivity."

Among those who attended the meeting were several family mem-bers of Camarillo clients. Debra and Dennis Tisdale of Long Beach said their 17-year-old daughter Melissa nearly died after being transferred from Camarillo to a community group home last year. But her condition has improved since she was moved recently to Fairview.

"She's not been sick since she's been here," Debra said.

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



Bureacrats' thirst for tax money is endless

any people rightly complain that policies are enacted and laws made without their knowing. Even more people don't realize elected representatives many times are unaware of changing laws and policies.

Changes often take the form of "clarifications" involving existing law or regulations that implement new laws and ordi-

City Council members received a memo last week stating "the Orange County City Managers Association has taken up the issue of problems with the Assessor's Office over the last several months.

Apparently, city managers are complaining of "major problems with the lack of information ind involvement cities have in ecisions the county assessor

akes on appeals of valuation." The managers were respondg to an association survey sent l Orange County cities. A twopage synopsis, stunning in its vagueness, yearned that "the county and cities need to work cooperatively on pending appeals to potentially reduce the impact of reassessments."

A letter distributed to the city managers made five recommendations based on the "survey," but without its supporting raw results. The recommendations include requiring the county to give cities a rogues' list of citizens who pursue property tax assessment appeals.

Recommendation two proposes to "actively involve cities on developing the case on a pend-ing appeal. Cities would be involved in not only developing the appeal case, but also included in the actual appeal hearing and any settlement meetings.

City governments would actively oppose its citizens trying to reduce their property tax.

County Executive Officer Jan Mittermeier has "offered ... to resolve some of these concerns." Neither the Orange County

Board of Supervisors nor any Orange County city have held public hearings or votes on the proposals.

The bare consequence would have public employees fighting taxpayers who appeal property tax levies. Citizens whose only desire is to try to ease their tax burden in a declining real estate market would face the full

weight of city powers in active opposition before a supposedly impartial assessment appeals hearing officer.

The memo makes no mention of any desire by city bureaucrats to stem property tax increases in rising markets or when properties change hands.

Neither is a suggestion made to curb spending to coincide with the level of tax revenues granted by the citizenry.

Modern governments are driven by the desire to increase their share of the public take, rather than by a disciplined stewardship of public resources.

The managers' memo is illustrative of the commitment of public revenues in the quest for increased public revenues - an oppressive spiral of spending meant to inflate the take while ignoring the deleterious effects of the squandering of public resources in the first place.

The \$1.6 million that Newport Beach was ordered to pay in the

Central Library construction case could have been avoided by better management of the contract. Instead, we are told the city needs more money, and, therefore, needs to be more "active" in its collection. No formal "recommendations" are forthcoming on how to avoid future litigation losses or contract mismanagement.

Local governments are notorious for accepting the "staff recommendation," thereby rubber stamping the desires of bureaucrats. Most staff reports supporting their recommended decisions do not contain alternatives - even for citizen

appeals. Modifications generally take the form of minor adjustments to the staff recommendation. To do otherwise requires a willingness to risk failure. The result is that independent policy initiatives by elected politicians are

few and far between. So the intellectual heavy lifting of policy making is left to professional staff who identify such "problems" as people trying to reduce their taxes.

Elected people are cut out of the democratic process, handshake agreements are made with other agency bureaucrats, and the hapless citizen finds himself squaring off alone against the full force of a government unit paid for with his

That is not democratic policy making as contemplated in city charters and the California constitution and it is something that no elected official should toler-

The community of private wealth is not a bottomless tax lake meant to be drained by thirsty cities after they carelessly trip over the bucketful of

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


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

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

NBTC is simply going along with a universal plan among private tennis club owners in Orange County. What management at NBTC is doing is actually a trickle-down effect from 1995, when Ken Stuart purchased the former John Wayne Tennis Club and renamed it Palisades, a time when Stuart also urged the importance of privacy to his members at a fee-paying nonpublic club.

NBTC, along with 23 other privately owned facilities in the county, is becoming part of a new association, headed by Stuart, that will, among other things, tighten the owners' clamp on guest policies, which will force some organizations to find another home.





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
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Depth means more potential

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

CORONA DEL MAR - In a seven-inning Sea View League baseball opener that only seemed like extra innings, Corona del Mar High attempted new ways to rally Friday against Irvine.

Problem is, those means resuscitated an opponent, not its own sticks. In this case, Irvine stole four straight bases in the last inning alone without a throw, then stole a fifth (third base) even though CdM's shortstop was holding the runner on.

The Vaqueros ended the suspense of possible extra innings and darkness when they scored four runs in the seventh, an inning that started with walks to three of their first four batters.

"We have to score 20 runs to win a ball game," Koh said. "I knew an 8-2 lead wasn't enough.

Even after Irvine's fifth stolen base (and fourth run) of the seventh inning, the Sea Kings were fortunate in yielding just that, because one of the hardest hit balls of the inning resulted in a 1-2 double-play, when Jared Flint ripped a fastball back to reliever Tim Thurman.

CdM starter Paul MacMillan, a grinder, left the game in the sixth with nobody out, two runners aboard and an 8-6 lead. One run had already crossed when Eric Wiethorn picked up. Both runners Wiethorn inherited would score.

CdM's bats rocked Flint, Irvine's mound starter, for 11 hits and eight runs in less





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
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A HIT, IS A HIT, IS A HIT

This is a good launching pad for that sort of thing," Jörgensen confirmed.

Most of the athletes that show up on the doorsteps of OCC's immaculate rowing facility at 1801 Pacific Coast Highway aren't looking to spring into the shell of the national team, but are seasoned athletes burned out on football, basketball or swimming, or just competitors who need a change.

Walking by the boathouse to the dock, you hear the grunts coming from a weight room, the slam of barbells crashing to the ground, the whiz of the rowing machines, the shouts of encouragement from teammates, but they aren't the first sounds you notice. Hardly do you ever hear a splash, but rather the creak of the cocks as the oars move, the slide of the rail as the seats move, and the soft, gentle whir of the oars through the water.
