Saying it big with flowers

The holiday season traditionally is one of the busiest times of the year for local florists. So why are Bill and Virginia Riach absent from their Huntington Beach flower shop?

The Riaches have been summoned 3,000 miles to help decorate a house for the holidays. A big house.

The White House, in fact.

Each year, between 20 and 30 florists from around the nation are selected to help decorate trees and create centerpieces for the holiday season at the presidential mansion.

Traditionally, the president of the Florists Transworld Delivery Association, FTD, is among those invited.

And this year, Bill Riach is president of the

20,000-member cooperative, which promotes flower sales and permits customers to order flowers for loved ones in other cities.

It's not surprising to find Riach is a strong believer in flower power.

"In the depths of the Depression, very few florists went bankrupt," he said. "Some people even gave up bread for a day so they could have a few flowers around."

Riach noted that flowers are traditionally associated with life's most important events, from births, to prom dances, to weddings to funerals.

"This is very much an emotional, sentimental business," he said.

Doing floral work at the White House promises to be a great emotional, sentimental experience for the Riaches. They flew to (See HB FLORIST, Page A2)

Christmas spirit stays afloat

Harbors along the Orange Coast soon will be alive with the Christmas spirit as boats and waterfront homes, decorated to the hilt, are showcased in a series of long-running holiday celebrations.

The oldest is the "Festival of Lights" in Newport Harbor, a parade that started in 1907 when a gondola owner strung lights on his boat and poled around the harbor.

The Newport Harbor Chamber

of Commerce took over the parade in 1919. It has run without interruption since.

The parade, now more elaborate with Christmas lights hooked to computers and animated devices on many of the crafts will run Dec. 17-23. Traditionally, up to 100 boat owners participate in the event and circle the harbor, passing decorated waterfront homes along the way.

Another holiday veteran is the

"Symphony of Lights" in Huntington Harbour, a parade that started 20 years back and is sponsored by the Huntington Harbour Philharmonic.

If the Newport parade leans more toward decorated boats, the Huntington parade spotlights the colorfully dressed homes clustered along the private waterways. It begins Tuesday and runs through Dec. 23.

The newest addition to the holiday lineup in the "Holiday Hi Lights" in Dana Point Harbor, a six-year-old parade that is held one night only, Sunday.

In Huntington Harbour and Newport Harbor, the best vantage spots are from the decks of sightseeing boats that operate nightly. In Huntington, proceeds from boat cruises go toward the Philharmonic's school music program.

In Dana Point, there are no public cruise offerings and spectators are advised to watch from docks, sidewalks or waterfront restaurants.

Newport also has a large selection of restaurants on the harbor as viewing spots.

Air curbs threaten CdM route extension

Construction of the Corona del Mar Freeway extension, scheduled late next year, would top a list of Orange County highway projects that could not be completed if federal clean air sanctions are reimposed on California's urban areas.

The \$10 million project which would extend the freeway from Red Hill Avenue in Costa Mesa to transition to MacArthur Boulevard — would be "held up from going to the construction phase," explained Thomas Jenkins, executive director of the Orange County Transportation Commission.

U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Anne Gorsuch said Thursday in Los Angeles that she may renew federal sanctions on urban areas in the state that fail to meet air quality standards.

Gorsuch said the sanctions might be reimposed because the

South Coast Air Quality Management District — which includes Orange County — is unable to meet 1987 air quality standards for ozone and carbon monoxide in the atmosphere.

It was only two months ago, that Gorsuch lifted federal sanctions in the state after the California Legislature passed a statewide automobile pollution inspection program.

The federal sanctions, which would not go into effect for about six months, could block federal highway dollars as well as the funds for air quality or sewage treatment planning.

Besides the Corona del Mar Freeway extension, Jenkins said other highway projects that could come to a halt along the Orange Coast include widening of Pacific Coast Highway from MacArthur Boulevard in Newport Beach to Golden West Street in Huntington Beach and widening of Laguna Canyon Road in Irvine and Laguna Beach.

But Jenkins said the Corona del Mar project appears to be in greater jeopardy because construction was scheduled to begin there in 1983-84 while construction on Pacific Coast Highway is not set until 1985-86. The Laguna Canyon Road project is not scheduled to begin until 1986-87.

He said other projects endangered by the imposition of federal sanctions would be those that are intended to increase the capacity of a highway, which would affect air quality.

Among projects affected by the sanctions recently lifted was the widening of University Drive in Irvine, on which construction had to be temporarily halted, Jenkins added.

Alarmed by the possibility that sanctions would be reimposed, Bruce Nestande, chairman of the Orange County Board of Supervisors, wrote President Reagan earlier this week urging that the Clean Air Act be amended.

Irvine employees get raise

Salary increases average 6.1 percent throughout city

City employees in Irvine would receive salary increases averaging 6.1 percent under a proposal by City Manager William Woollett Jr.

While the average increase would be 6.1 percent, police lieutenants would receive a 15 percent salary boost. Sergeants and lower rank officers would receive an 11 percent increase under Woollett's proposal.

Employees who make up the rest of the 382-member full-time city work force would receive raises of about 5 percent.

Last year, police officers received a 12.1 percent salary increase. Other city works received 11.6 percent.

Woollett's proposal will be reviewed by the city council Tuesday night.

City administrators had discussed employee layoffs during budget sessions last

summer when the city budget was reduced from the previous year.

But Assistant City Manager Paul Brady Jr., who called a press briefing Thursday to explain the recommendations, said the salary increases were always anticipated.

The raises would cost the city \$568,168 through June 30, the end of the current fiscal year. Attrition would bring the actual cost to around \$483,000, he said.

"I think it's fair to say the city does have the funds for it (the increases)," said Michael McNamara, city administrative services director.

McNamara noted that recent public discussions about five-year deficits relate mainly to new capital expenditures, such as a new civic center.

Actually, city officials have little choice when it comes to giving raises to the 77 sworn police officers. An existing

contract with the Irvine Police Association, the officers' bargaining association, requires that Irvine's lieutenants receive the highest salary scale of any police department in Orange County.

Sergeants' salary scales must be at least third highest and officers' must be sixth, according to the two-year contract.

Brady said city council members agreed to those requirements last year to help retain top-notch officers and to reward them for the type of work, with non-violent methods, they're expected to perform.

However, he said Irvine officials want to begin discussions with other cities to better regulate police rankings and salaries.

"It doesn't seem to make much fiscal sense to keep playing leap frog," he said.

Bullfight fans get Fair shake

Ticket holders who paid to see a canceled bloodless bullfight at the Orange County Fairgrounds in October have been offered free admission to the Orange County summer fair next July.

In a gesture of goodwill, the Orange County Fair Board voted Thursday to offer free fair

tickets to people who can prove they paid to see the Old California Spanish Fiesta Days and Bullfights Oct. 13 and 14.

About 1,500 bullfight fans were turned away both days when promoter Ruben Bohorquez failed to come up with enough cash to pay for the bulls or the matadors.

Bohorquez told 300 spectators on Oct. 13 that the arena was too soft for a bullfight. The next day he told police, summoned to keep order among angry fans, that \$3,350 was missing. Bohorquez said he had no money for refunds.

Claiming no financial responsibility for the canceled bullfight, fair officials said they wanted merely to ease the loss suffered by fans, who paid \$5 to \$30 for tickets.

"I don't think we should give money because that would be giving state funds away," said board member Clint Hoose. "It's a good will gesture on our part."

Anyone wanting a free ticket to the 1983 county fair must send proof of purchase of a bullfight ticket to the Orange County Fairgrounds, 88 Fair Drive, Costa Mesa.

Fairgrounds manager Ken Fulk said he has received numerous inquiries from people who paid for but have not received refunds for bullfight tickets.

BOAT PARADES...

Lights can be viewed from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. from Dec. 17 to 23. Spectators can view the parade from the deck of the Catalina Holiday (644 8211) or from boats provided by Davey's Locker (673 1434). Tickets, for adults, are \$6 on all the boats and \$4 for children.

Huntington Harbour, "Symphony of Lights" can be viewed nightly from 5:30 to 8:30.

There are four cruises each night. Tickets are \$4 for adults and \$2 for children under 12. For reservations, call 840 1777. A special boat parade is held Saturday and Sunday.

Increases, police officers would earn from \$22,104 to \$28,728 per month. Lieutenants would make from \$34,642 to \$46,560.

The salary recommendations apply to all city employees except Woollett and Brady, whose salaries are set by the city council. If approved, the increases would take effect in January.

These raises, however, are not the only ones city employees can get. Irvine also gives merit raises which are awarded individually at workers' anniversary dates with the city.

Up to 30 percent of the workers can qualify for 8 percent increases for exceptional work. Most others can expect to receive from 4 to 6 percent.

Thus, almost all of the city's workers would expect at least a 9 percent salary increase in a year's time. A hard-working police lieutenant could receive a combined 23 percent raise.

Woollett's recommendations also call for an average 2.7 percent increase in the value of medical and dental benefits paid by the city.

Teen helps to nab bank heist suspect

A 19-year-old Christmas tree salesman was praised today in the capture Thursday of a bank robbery suspect in Westminster.

Brian Towne borrowed a young boy's bicycle and chased down the suspect and held him until officers arrived, police said.

Arrested on suspicion of bank robbery was Ralph L. Acosta, 48, of Westminster, police said.

"It's pretty commendable," Lt. David Wiggs said. "Very few get involved. It's damned commendable."

"When somebody says bank robbery to me, I think of a gun," Wiggs said the events took

place Thursday when the California First Bank, 15377 Brookhurst St., was robbed at 1:30 p.m. after a man produced a holdup note.

Towne, of Baldwin Park, was working in the Christmas tree lot adjacent to the bank. When the suspect ran through the lot, police said, Towne borrowed the bicycle and gave chase.

He tackled the suspect when he was trying to climb a fence behind a nearby apartment complex, police said.

Wiggs said \$1,000 was recovered. He said the man was not armed.

HB video game fee hike flayed

A proposal to zap electronic video game machine operators in Huntington Beach has sparked an uproar.

Officials have proposed raising the annual license fee for each machine from \$12 to \$200.

Officials say they want to recapture city costs involved in policing the machines.

But attorney Bud Belsito, representing several operators, claimed that the "1,500 percent increase" is not reasonable.

He also said that the fee might put some small establishments out of business because they usually share the profits from each machine.

Belsito, a former Huntington Beach city administrator, explained that the fee might force some operators to remove their machines, and, thus, lose revenue.

"Some rely on that money to keep going," he said.

City officials met with machine operators this week in efforts to smooth over differences.

Councilman Don MacAllister, a member of the group, said he would recommend to the city council that the fees be halved to \$100.

Belsito indicated that a \$50 fee would be more to the operators' liking.

MacAllister, who had supported the \$200 fee, said that arcades have become "attractive nuisances" that cause extra work for the police department.

He also said he believes that the games and arcades have been a factor in the increase of burglaries by youngsters allegedly stealing money to play the games.

Police Chief Earle Robitaille

said loitering and noise complaints have risen at arcades.

But he said "there is no way of getting a handle" on what part the games play in the problems.

Reagan says no to Santa

What's happened to the Christmas spirit in the Reagan White House?

That question is being posed by Robert George of Anaheim, who as "presidential Santa Claus" claims to have piloted his sleigh unerringly to 1600 N. Pennsylvania Ave., in Washington every year since 1956.

There he says he's posed for pictures, helped light the White House Christmas tree and taken Christmas gift requests for America's First Family ranging from a doll for Amy Carter to a diamond ring for Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis. President John F. Kennedy even drove George's motorized sleigh down Pennsylvania Avenue, George says.

But the 60-year-old George, who claims he was appointed official White House Santa by President Dwight D. Eisenhower, hasn't been able to get through the door — much less the chimney — of the Reagan White House. Reagan aides, George says, decided his yearly Santa visit was a commercial venture.

"They're accusing me of making money off this," said George, who has been a professional Santa for 33 years. "I haven't made a nickel off the White House."

FV gets affordable housing

State allocates bond funds for condominium project

The Fountain Valley Planning Commission has established a new "affordable housing" district that will serve as the site for a 164-unit condominium complex.

The property, located west of the Santa Ana River, south of Edinger Avenue and east of Harbor Boulevard, currently is unincorporated county land. Fountain Valley is in the process of annexing the parcel.

The annexation plan for the 8.5-acre parcel was approved last month by the county's Local Agency Formation Commission, which oversees annexation matters.

Wednesday, the Fountain Valley Planning Commission established an affordable housing zone for the parcel. The commission also approved a conditional use permit and tentative tract map that will allow the Irvine-based Wilma-Shawntana partnership to proceed with construction plans.

City council approval is required. The council indicated it favors the project when it initiated the annexation proceedings.

Bart Hansen, Shawntana president, said his firm wanted the housing to be part of Fountain Valley for marketing purposes and to increase the firm's chances of obtaining state bond money.

He said an allocation in state bond funds has now been awarded to the project. He said the action will permit his firm to offer 30-year mortgages at 12.9 percent interest. Condominium purchasers also may be eligible for Federal Housing Administration or Veterans

Administration loans at lower interest rates, he said.

Hansen said the condominiums will be one and two-bedroom units targeted for first-time home buyers. Prices will range from about \$75,000 to \$95,000, he said.

He said groundbreaking on the first half of the project could take

place as early as February, with completion by September or October.

Hansen said the Wilma-Shawntana partnership behind the project involves local developers and Dutch real estate investors.

Washington Thursday and will stay through Sunday, working under the supervision of White House chief florist Dotty Temple.

"I'm very thrilled at the prospect," Virginia Riach said before her departure. "I don't know if we'll get to meet the President and Mrs. Reagan. But last year, Mrs. Reagan herself worked with the florists."

"Only a chosen few get to go into their living quarters. But who knows."

Bill Riach is no stranger to Washington. As FTD president, he is a member of the Council on Government Affairs, a lobbying organization for small businesses.

The flower industry itself has been pressing Congress to designate the third Sunday in October as "Mother-in-Law's Day." The measure has been approved by the House of Representatives, Riach said, and backers are hoping for Senate approval before the current lame duck session adjourns.

Riach began his career as a florist after a stint in the armed forces during World War II. He learned the trade at a friend's flower shop near USC.

He operated his own shop in Inglewood for two decades. Eleven years ago, he moved the business to Huntington Beach, opening the Fifth Avenue Florist shop at Warner Avenue and Springdale Street. He said his wife has been at his side in the business from the beginning.

The Riaches, son Dave, daughter-in-law Wendy and granddaughter Alison will be featured in a holiday FTD ad scheduled for publication in "Life," "Fortune," and "Travel and Leisure" magazines.

Although the flower business in general has been affected by the nation's economic difficulties, Riach said he's been doing a steady holiday business, selling Christmas poinsettias and floral arrangements for display during the annual boat parade in nearby Huntington Harbour.

Rebels blamed in crash killing 75 children

The Defense Ministers said 75 Indian children plunged to their deaths in a fiery Nicaraguan air force helicopter crash and hinted that anti-government rebels were responsible.

A second helicopter trying to evacuate the seven survivors of Thursday's crash was fired on by "counter-revolutionaries coming from Honduras" and slightly damaged, the ministry said.

There was no independent

confirmation of the government's account.

The children were being taken from San Andres Bocay, near the Honduran border, to the town of Huihuili, outside the border area. Nicaragua declared the border region a closed "military zone" in the wake of numerous clashes between Nicaraguan troops and anti-government rebels based in neighboring Honduras. Three children and a crew were reported to have survived the crash.

Canadian figure freed

CALGARY, Canada — Multimillionaire Hyman Belzberg, who was kidnapped by masked men, has been freed in a police raid on a home in southwest Calgary, police said today.

"The kidnapping of Hyman Belzberg is over," said Police Superintendent Phil Crosby-Jones. "He is safe and with his family. Three persons responsible for the kidnapping have been arrested and the drama now is complete."

No other details were immediately available. Belzberg was kidnapped Thursday.

Law of Sea pact inked

MONTEGO BAY, Jamaica — More than 100 countries signed the Law of the Sea Treaty today, establishing international rules for navigating the seas and mining the ocean floor. The United States, however, was not among the countries signing the treaty.

United Nations Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar and more than 220 envoys gathered at a beach hotel overlooking the Caribbean Sea for the ceremony, which took eight hours because each delegation signs the treaty one by one.

Jobless bill proposed

WASHINGTON — House Democrats are proposing a \$5.4 billion package of assistance for the unemployed that includes emergency public works jobs, food and shelter.

The new Democratic jobs proposal was to be added to a stopgap spending bill drafted today by the House Appropriations Committee. A copy of the proposal was obtained by The Associated Press on Thursday.

The package would be in addition to President Reagan's proposed nickel-a-gallon gasoline tax increase, which is supposed to raise \$5.5 billion to finance highway, bridge and mass transit repairs. That work was expected to create an estimated 170,000 construction jobs and another 150,000 jobs in related fields.

Reagan pushes for MX

WASHINGTON — President Reagan said today that a Senate vote against producing the MX missile would be "a vote against arms control tomorrow," and said he would welcome vigorous debate next year on the way the missiles are based, so long as he gets the go-ahead to build them now.

The House has rejected production funds for the MX, and the Senate is to vote in its lame-duck session, which ends Dec. 17. Reagan told an Oval Office session with reporters that the congressional debate has distorted the issue by concentrating on the way the weapons are to be deployed.

Senate sources said the \$231 billion military spending bill, which includes money to buy the first five missiles, was to be discussed on the Senate floor today. But no vote on the MX will come before Monday, said the sources, who requested anonymity.

Chrysler pact OK seen

HIGHLAND PARK, Mich. — United Auto Workers leaders expect easy ratification of proposed contracts with Chrysler Corp. that would give union members their first pay raise for a year and put striking Canadians back on the job before Christmas.

The two sides announced Thursday they had reached tentative agreement on an immediate pay raise and quarterly cost-of-living adjustments for UAW members in both countries.

"I'm sure the membership will ratify it without any problem," said Ken Gerard, president of the Canadian UAW bargaining committee.

Flooding damage heavy

OCOTILLO — Floodwaters subsided from the Imperial County community today as residents surveyed the extent of damage from heavy rains that turned dry washes into 4-foot deep rivers.

Most of the residents of the tiny desert community returned to their homes during the night after being forced to flee Thursday.

There were no reports of injury during the fierce storm. Highway 98, from Ocotillo to Arizona, was still closed today. But Interstate 8, the major east-west traffic artery, had one lane open.

Leon Jaworski, 77, dies

WIMBERLEY, Texas (AP) — Leon Jaworski, who began his career as the youngest lawyer in Texas and capped it by obtaining the Watergate tapes that forced President Richard M. Nixon to resign, is dead at age 77.

Jaworski died Thursday of a heart attack on his 440-acre Circle J ranch "doing what he liked to do best" — chopping wood, said ranch foreman John Clayton, who was with Jaworski when he collapsed in a grove of Spanish oak trees in the rolling Texas hill country.

Jaworski had not been in a courtroom since his dramatic argument before the U.S. Supreme Court in 1974 when, as Watergate special prosecutor, he

successfully secured tape recordings linking Nixon to the Watergate scandal.

"You just don't argue another case after you've argued 'the United States versus Nixon' before the Supreme Court," he once said.

Jaworski was about two miles from the ranch house when he collapsed about 3:30 p.m. He was pronounced dead at 5 p.m.

When Jaworski accepted the job as Watergate special prosecutor, replacing Archibald Cox, who was fired in November 1973, "my friends thought that my mental health had failed me, that my head should be examined," he once said.

Cox said Jaworski's death

"was a shame. Leon was a great warrior and leader of the bar and he performed great service as special prosecutor."

Jaworski said he voted for Nixon and "shuddered" when he heard the White House tapes and realized Nixon "was right in the middle" of a coverup of the break-in at Democratic National Committee headquarters at Washington's Watergate apartment complex in 1972.

"For a moment, I wished I'd never been asked to take the job," he said.

Jaworski called his successful battle for the Nixon tapes the pinnacle of his varied legal career, but said he never considered fully retiring afterward.

Jews mark Hanukkah

It is called the Festival of Lights, an eight-day celebration — commencing tonight — of the Jewish people's victory 2,000 years ago over their Syrian enemies.

Little, it seems, has changed over two millennia.

With continued turbulence in the Middle East, and with the sting of anti-Semitic acts in Western Europe fresh on their minds, Jews may be looking toward Hanukkah more than ever this year as a statement of their emancipation from tyranny and a reiteration of the vow,

"never again."

Ironically, considering that many rabbis admit Hanukkah has little or none of the spiritual significance attached to holidays such as Passover and Yom Kippur.

Yet as a celebration of political freedom, it has considerable application in strife-torn 1982.

"Hanukkah represents a willingness on the part of a minority to stand up for its own identity," said Rabbi Bernard King of Newport Beach's Harbor Reform Temple.

Historically, said another rabbi, Dr. Joseph Kalir, "it is the first holiday in commemoration

of the fight for religious freedom in the world."

Kalir, professor of religious studies at Cal State Fullerton, said Hanukkah represents pride — pride in the accomplishments of the Jewish people and for the freedom which allowed those achievements.

"It is a joyous festival," said Kalir. It is also Judaism's youngest holiday.

Hanukkah itself means "dedication." It refers to the Jews who reclaimed the temple in Jerusalem in 165 BC after defeating the armies of the Syrian king Antiochus.

Heating costs hit for price surge

WASHINGTON (AP) — Skyrocketing natural gas and home heating oil costs pushed wholesale prices up 0.6 percent in November, the government said today. The gain was up slightly from October's increase and meant that, for the year, inflation at the wholesale level is running at an annual rate of 3.7 percent.

If the 11-month figure holds through December, the nation would have its smallest full-year wholesale price rise since 1976. Last year, wholesale prices rose 7 percent.

In November, the beginning of the winter heating season in many parts of the country, the wholesale price index recorded the sharpest rises in home heating costs since the summer.

Fuel oil costs rose 6.4 percent at wholesale, up from a rise of one percent in October and a decline of 1.6 percent the previous month.

Natural gas prices were up 5 percent last month, a dramatic turnaround from a drop of 0.9 percent in October and a moderate gain of 2.7 percent in September.

Not since February 1980 have natural gas prices risen so

sharply in a single month.

The General Accounting Office said in a report that retail natural gas customers are now paying more than twice what

they did in 1978, when Congress began removing price controls. The report also said that in the last decade the producers' share of industry revenues has more

than doubled, while the pipelines' share has fallen.

Gasoline costs also climbed in November, rising 1.1 percent after falling 1.3 percent in October and 0.9 percent in September.

For the third straight month, food prices were down, falling 0.2 percent, the same as in October. Food prices had fallen 0.5 percent in September. Those declines reflect the bountiful harvests.

Besides the plentiful crops, economists have attributed the general slowing of prices this year to the persistent recession and a world oil surplus.

Meanwhile, the Reagan administration's top economist says unemployment, now 10.8 percent of the work force, is "near a peak," but warns that the jobless rate won't fall below 7 percent for five or six years.

Martin S. Feldstein, chairman of President Reagan's Council of Economic Advisers, also told the congressional Joint Economic Committee that Democratic proposals for major public works jobs would only put the economy in worse shape. (See related story in Nation's briefs.)

Food drive for needy has 1 need left — food

The people at Ultrasystems, an Irvine engineering and construction firm, thought they had everything they needed to conduct a successful Christmas food drive: needy families, generous employees, even the Marines.

It turns out they're short only one thing — food.

Much more food is needed if they are to be able to provide Christmas dinners to all the American Indian families in Orange County identified as needy.

Phil Stevens, Ultrasystems president, came up with the idea of holding the food drive early in the year, partly he said, because of his own Indian heritage.

Stevens bought one ton of turkey to go into the package dinners which will also include flour, sugar, cranberries, yams, stuffing and lollipops for the kids, he said. At 9 a.m. Dec. 22, 15 Marines in full-dress uniform will home deliver the dinners to 226 Indian families throughout Orange County.

Until then, Stevens is hoping people will bring canned goods and staples to the distribution center at 2400 Michelson Dr., Irvine.

Any monetary donations will be presented to the Orange County Indian Center. Any leftover food will be given to a food drive in Costa Mesa, Stevens said.

Gays target mayor after live-in veto

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The city's politically powerful homosexual community, vowing to begin a campaign to "dump" Mayor Dianne Feinstein, has accused her of capitulating to the Catholic Church in vetoing a bill that would aid unmarried live-in lovers.

Some 300 protesters on the steps of City Hall Thursday evening heard gay leaders condemn Feinstein's veto of legislation that would enable "principal domestic partners" of city workers to receive the same health and fringe benefits as married spouses.

The speakers were especially critical of Archbishop John R. Quinn, who had urged the mayor to veto the proposal, calling it a "radical repudiation of fundamental values and institutions."

Quinn said he "raised a moral

voice where there was none. I saw it as my role and responsibility to speak for the traditional values of the family and the marriage in church and society."

Feinstein said she vetoed the ordinance because it was inequitable, poorly drafted and confusing.

Asked about Quinn's influence, she said she respected him but added, "No moral statement had any overwhelming sway with me."

Randy Stallings of the Coalition for Human Rights was one of several speakers at the protest rally to urge gay voters to oppose the mayor if she runs for

re-election in 1984. The crowd responded with chants of "Dump Dianne."

"Now she tells us that the heterosexual majority that forbids us the right to marry says we're irresponsible for not marrying. It's a Catch-22 that we're sick of hearing in our lives," Stallings said.

when the king ordered that Jews no longer pray in the Great Temple, light Sabbath candles or study the Torah, the body of Jewish religious literature.

Those who challenged him came to be known as the Maccabees, which means "hammers."

After three years of warfare, the Maccabees recaptured the temple, but found that it had been damaged by the Syrians.

According to Kalir, the Jews set to work immediately repairing the great structure for its re-dedication. A cruse of oil was lit. And though there was little oil to sustain it, the flame burned for eight days.

Thus was born the tradition of lighting a candle to represent each day of Hanukkah. A nine-branched candlestick called the Hanukkiya was created. Eight of the branches represent the eight days of Hanukkah. The ninth represents the "Shamash," Hebrew for caretaker.

This evening, Hanukkah eve,

the first candle will be lit with the Shamash. On the second night, two candles will be lit. This continues until on the eighth night, all the candles burn brightly.

In addition to dancing, reading and games, gifts also are exchanged each evening, which makes Hanukkah the commercial equivalent of Christmas.

The similarities between the two December holidays needless

to say, end there.

Spiritually, Hanukkah is a rather unimportant holiday, unlike Christmas. "It is very minor, a very minor holiday," said Kalir.

Rabbi King of Newport Beach said Hanukkah was primarily a military-political celebration in its early years. Exchanging gifts, though a custom for hundreds of years, became more popular in America's commercial culture.

Though to children today it satisfies the joy of receiving gifts, Hanukkah means far more to their parents.

Today, Kalir and King said, Hanukkah symbolizes the successful battle for religious freedom. "The idea of the holiday is really a sublime one, a great one," said Kalir, a former Harvard University professor.

The success of the Maccabees, he said, is meaningful to all.

OCC president heads fund for scholars

Orange Coast College president Dr. Bernard J. Luskin has been appointed chairman of the board of the Hazel Cubbon Greenleaf Educational Fund.

The foundation, established in 1977, is supported through the estate of Hazel Greenleaf, a native of Santa Ana who served as a teacher and administrator in Newport Beach schools.

The fund presents scholarships to four high school seniors per year, allowing them to finance their entire collegiate careers through graduate school. Eighteen students currently receive Greenleaf scholarships.

Luskin, who became OCC's president last July, will serve as the foundation's chairman as long as he is the Orange Coast president.



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

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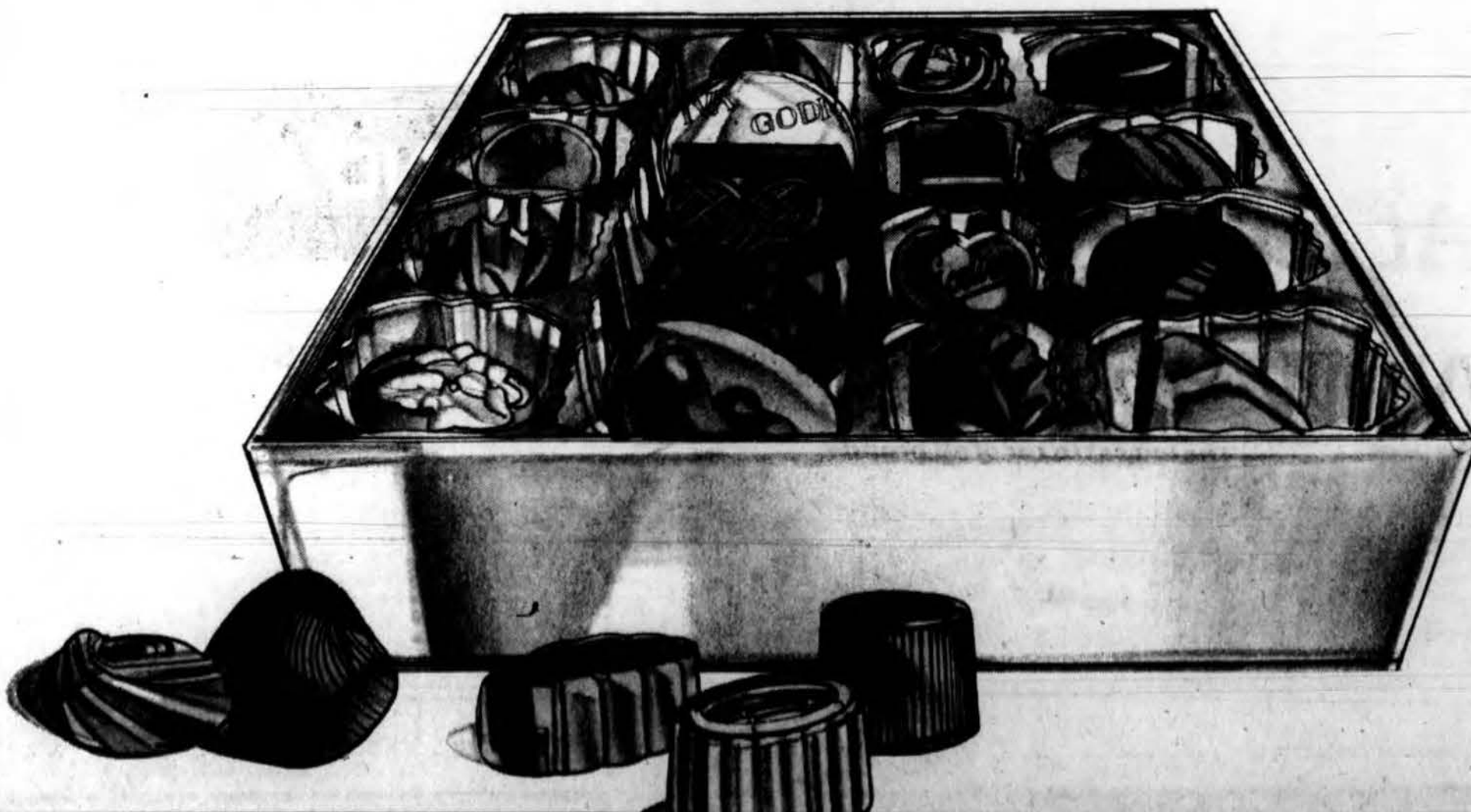

Huntington condos nixed by planners

Plans by former Iranian resident Ferydoun Ahadpour and his wife, Doris, to construct 48 condominium units at the Huntington Harbour Bay and Racquet Club have been dealt a setback.

The Huntington Beach Planning Commission turned down the proposal this week, voicing concern over density.

The majority of the commission also cited possible parking problems and expressed concern about access to the 150-slip marina.

But Ahadpour, who formerly operated a diving and salvage business in Iran, said Wednesday he would appeal the decision, to the city council. A hearing is expected in January.

"I won't give up," Ahadpour, 49, said. "I'll stay with the project until it's finished. It might be all my life."

The Ahadpours claim they need to find additional sources of

income to meet rising maintenance and repair costs for the 20-year-old facility on Warner Avenue, about 1½ miles east of Pacific Coast Highway.

They said they have spent more than \$1 million in refurbishing a second-story restaurant. They estimate it will cost an additional \$2 million to complete the desired revamping.

Expansion plans, in addition to three three-story condominium buildings, included a subterranean parking structure, a gym, a sauna and pool repairs.

The 700-member Huntington Harbour Property Owners Association endorsed the development plan in the belief that it could provide an upgraded facility while also preserving open space and recreational activities.

But other residents claim that the three-story structures would block their view of the ocean and of the Bolsa Chica marshlands.

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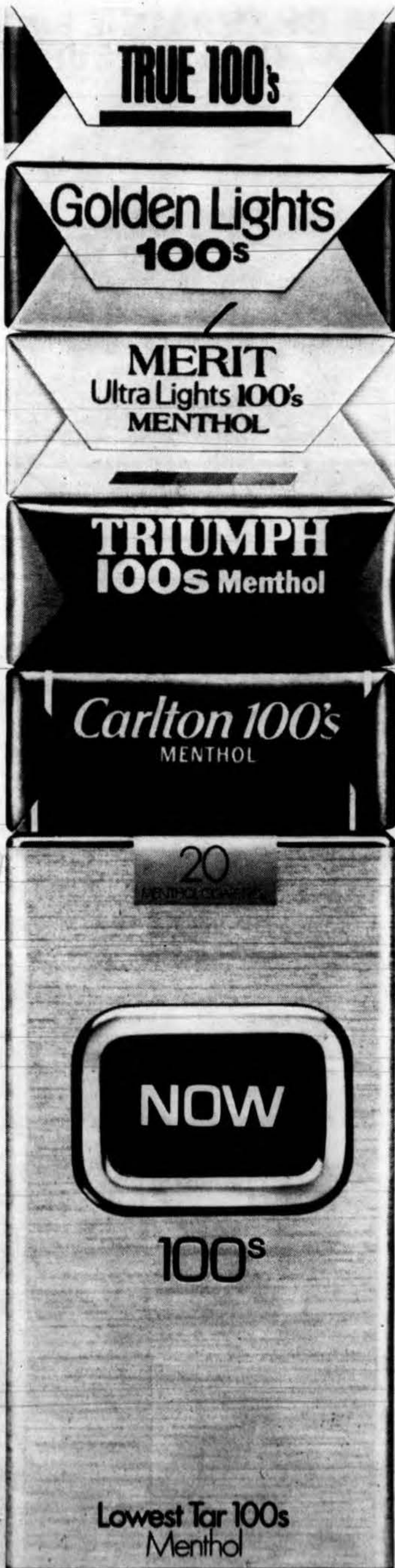

Tax laws on child care outlined

DEAR READERS: Changes in tax law affecting child care services, the growing number of employers supporting such services, and the increased variety of care programs across the United States are featured in an updated publication by the U.S. Department of Labor's Women's Bureau.

"Employers and Child Care: Establishing Services Through the Workplace" explains employer benefits from programs that support working parents, subsidies for child care, personnel policies, donations to community programs, and the actual planning and funding of a child care service.

The publication notes that by March 1982, half (7.4 million) of all mothers of children under 6 years of age were in the labor force and approximately 66 percent (11.4 million) of all mothers of school-age children

were working or looking for work.

In addition to guidelines on program designs, the publication includes extensive listings of published resources, recent survey reports and statistical data. An appendix contains names and addresses of employer-sponsored child care programs operating throughout the country.

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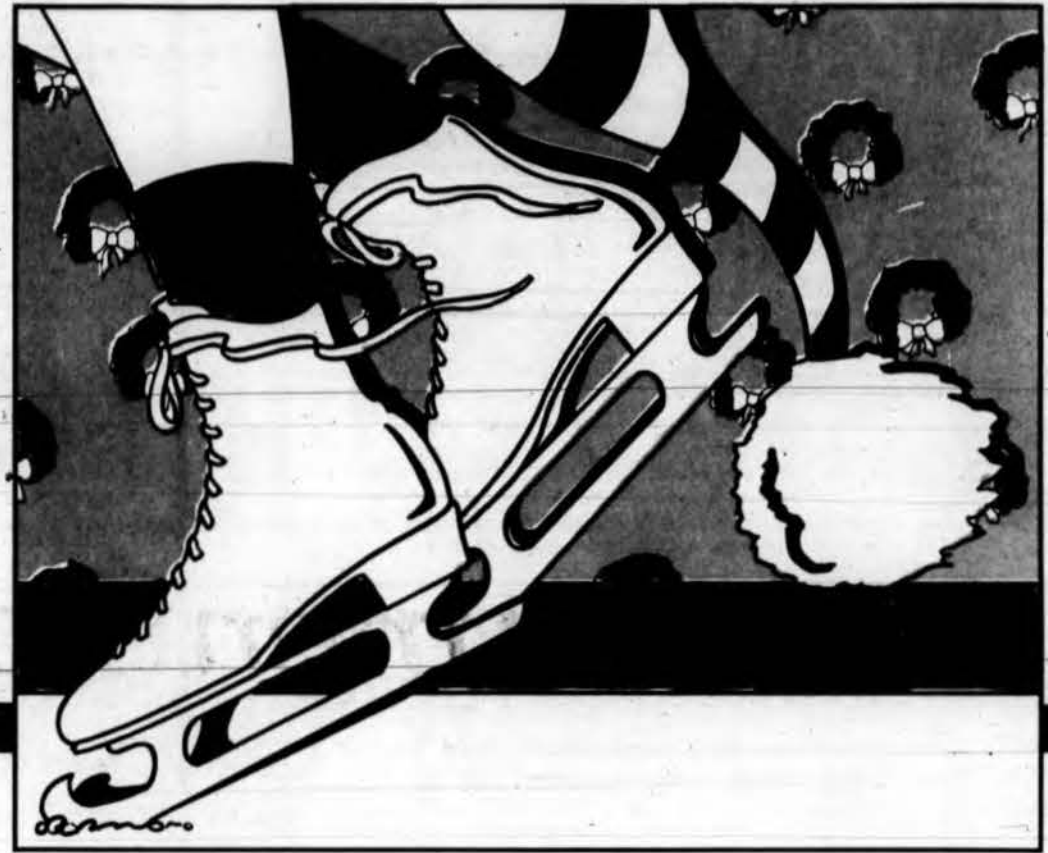

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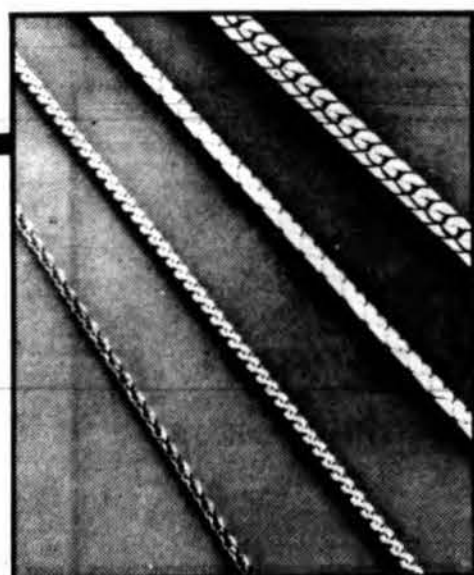

to guide formation of a sister-city tie.

Meanwhile, Rigby said the same type of committee will be formed in Scotland.

Finance has been a primary topic so far. Both sides seem to agree that the world economy doesn't dictate the use of public funds for such arrangements.

Rickets said the meeting with Agran emphasized the need to raise any funds for exchange programs from private donations. He noted that the district council in Irvine, Scotland, has the same fiscal problems affecting its California counterpart.

Added Schroeder: "We're not looking for big expenditures of money. We're looking a year down the road before we'd need any money at all."

Caltrans 'ditch' still blights growing Mesa

In some cities, you have to hunt for the blight. Not in Costa Mesa. It keeps its urban blight out in full view, right down the middle of the main route into town.

The subject in question is, of course, the infamous ditch in the middle of Newport Boulevard between Mesa Drive and Fairview Road. The 180-by 30-foot hole was dug in 1975 by Caltrans officials looking for cheap dirt to use on an interchange of the Corona del Mar freeway. It didn't seem to matter back then, because everyone knew the Costa Mesa Freeway would be finished shortly.

Eight years later, the ditch still exists, the freeway doesn't and Caltrans and the city are fighting over who should maintain the strip. Meanwhile, the residents of Costa Mesa must live with their eyesore. A hawk has recently taken up residence on powerlines over the ditch near 23rd Street. Presumably, something good to eat lives in the ditch.

This whole mess was brought before the public eye once again this week with a request by Lloyd Shaver of Lloyd's Nursery to allow him to store firewood on a leased section of the median between 19th and Bay streets.

Shaver already grows nursery stock on the land. Pacific Federal has taken exception to adding the firewood to the median. Mark Letter, senior vice-president of Pacific Federal, says the median has a negative impact on those inspecting the city's new redevelopment area.

That may be. But seeing plants and firewood neatly stacked beats the wild patch of weeds and rusted fence prevalent further out. The point is not what is stored in the median. The point is that it

shouldn't be there anymore.

But we are stuck with it for awhile. A freeway route was adopted in 1969. A few political, financial and planning problems — and 13 years — later, a draft environmental impact statement is being readied by Caltrans. Presuming the present route is okayed, the earliest construction could start is 1990. That means at least seven years of living with the ditch.

So let's make the best of it. If part of it can be leased for something inoffensive, such as the nursery stock, it should be leased and the city should watchdog the lessor's upkeep of the property.

In addition, the city should bring pressure to bear on the state to do something to clean up the mess on the north end of the ditch. Attractive ground cover could be planted and maintained. Most anything is better than the neglect now bestowed on it.

If a freeway is to be built there but not until 1990, there is no reason the state couldn't fill in the ditch and let the city use the land in the meantime for something worthwhile. Two suggestions are additional parking for the Orange County Fairgrounds or an urban gardening project where residents could rent or lease plots of ground.

The city has said in the past it is helpless to act because the ditch is state land. That may be, but Los Angeles officials note that a similar situation exists on Venice Boulevard in West Los Angeles, and the city moved in, landscaped the area and is maintaining it. In a council meeting this week, the city indicated it might be willing to do just that. Good.

Costa Mesa is fast becoming a cultural hub for the county. It's time the city put a permanent end to the battle of the ditch.

Whose responsibility?

Winter after winter it happens. High tides batter the beach at the El Morro Mobile Home Park north of Laguna Beach, the oceanfront trailers and their decks over the sand are threatened, some decks crumble, residents are evacuated, round-the-clock sandbagging rescues most of the 72 units, and residents move back in.

In the most recent storm, more than 200 firemen, state parks officials, Orange County Jail inmates and volunteers from the California Conservation Corps worked all night, alongside some residents, to place 24,000 sandbags under 35 of the most threatened trailers.

The Red Cross set up a shelter at nearby El Morro School to provide food and coffee for the rescue workers and residents.

When a 6.9-foot tide hit in the morning, the sandbags held, but half a dozen of the trailers were found to be in danger of tumbling and condemned and several more were still insecure.

So far there is no precise estimate of the cost to taxpayers of the last El Morro rescue effort, but it involved hundreds of man hours, large amounts of material — and of course traffic problems on nearby Coast Highway.

The mobile home park now rests on California state park land, part of the Crystal Cove State Park for which the state paid \$32 million in 1979 and has allocated another \$5 million for park development.

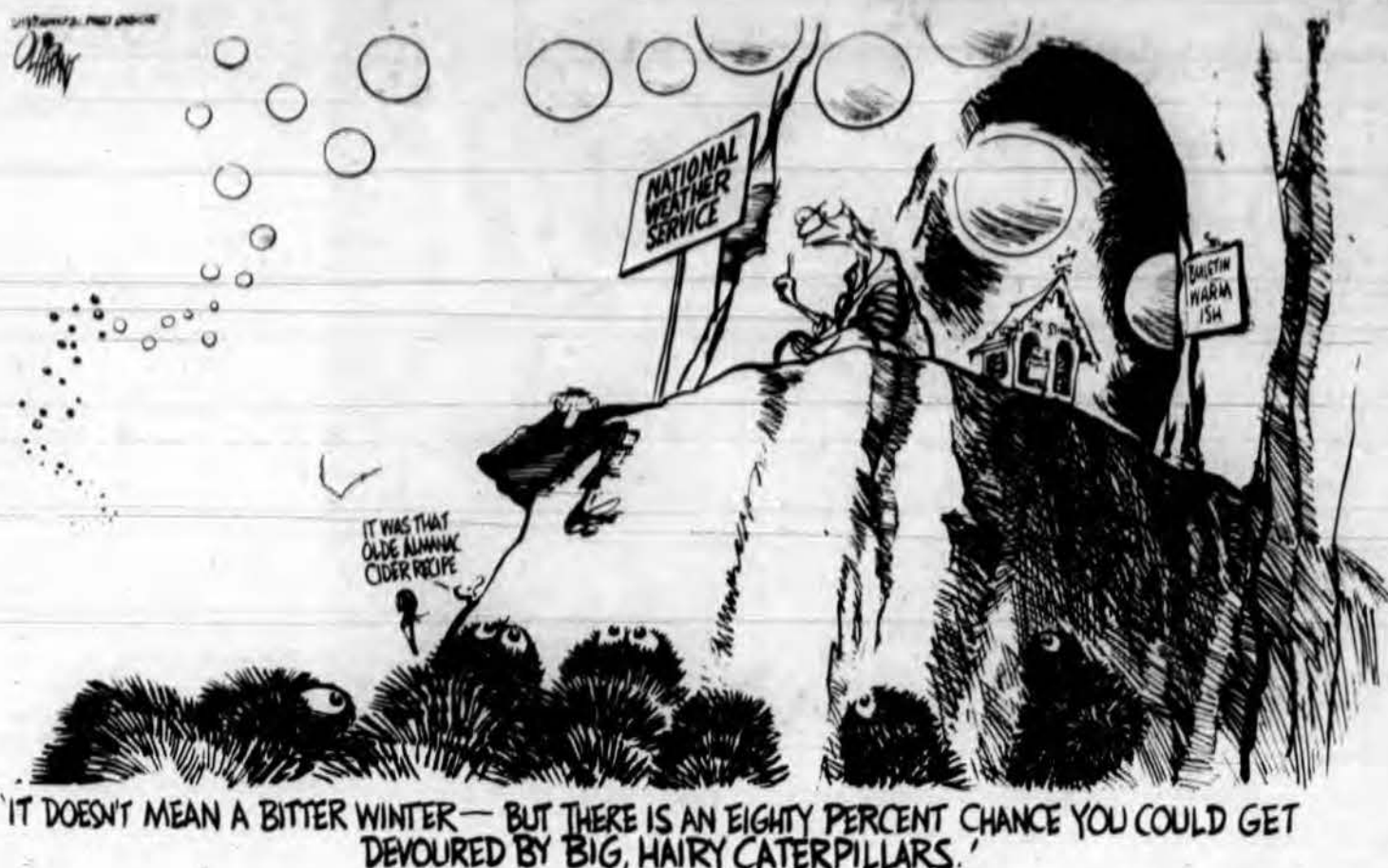

Clues to bureaucrats' power

WASHINGTON — A visitor to Washington, wandering through the corridors of bureaucratic power, may be understandably confused trying to figure out an official's true importance just from the job title. Who has more clout, a deputy or an assistant, a deputy assistant or an assistant deputy? Take heart. There is a surefire way of telling the big shots from the merely pushy peasantry:

—CHECK THE official's wastebasket. If it's made of wood, he or she is a V.I.P. of impeccable credentials. If it's made of steel, forget it.

—Is there a water carafe? A dictionary stand? A hat tree? A rug on the floor? All these items are marks of distinction in the federal bureaucracy.

—Ask to check the plumbing. Then pull out your tape measure. If the bathroom is 45 square feet and includes toilet, washbowl, vanity and shower, you're dealing with the top of the pecking order. If it's only 25 square feet and has nothing more than a toilet and washbowl, you may be wasting your time on a nebbish.

—If you can manage it, try pacing off the brass hat's office: 750 square feet is top drawer, especially if there's a 500-square-foot conference room next door; 400 square feet denotes a definitely lower level of power.

—Bring the conversation around to gourmet cooking. The really top-grade potentate will have a 50-square-foot kitchen, with four-burner, double-oven electric range, refrigerator, dishwasher,

sink and built-in cabinets, and probably a 300-square-foot dining area to boot.

With newcomers arriving every four hours or so, steps have naturally been taken to see that government officials don't stray beyond the bounds of

elegance appropriate to their rank. The General Services Administration, which provides the office furnishings, has codified the whole thing according to the levels of official position.

The uncertain appointee will first want to check the "use standards" listed in the GSA's Federal Property Management Regulations, to avoid the embarrassment of ordering the wrong kind of desk or perhaps a valet rack when he's entitled to nothing more than a coathook.

The regs state that Level A (executive) may have "executive" wood furniture; Level B (middle management) are allowed "united" wood furniture, and Level C (all the rest) must make do with contemporary steel, general steel or general wood furniture.

Once he has found his proper niche, the official turns to the GSA supply catalog or the Federal Supply Schedule. They list hundreds of items that the GSA either has in stock or can order from suppliers.

Included in the bureaucrats' wish book are such necessities as drapes, bedspreads, shower curtains, artificial plants, planters, urns and wall art. Among the furniture styles to choose from are Danish, Traditional, Modern, Early American, 18th-century English and American (reproductions), Ranch Style, Rattan and Indoor-Outdoor Metal.

THE GSA REGULATIONS even pinpoint the space allowances for each item. For example, four square feet are allowed for a dictionary stand or hat tree, but a valet rack can take up as much as eight square feet.

Not all the furniture perks are necessarily codified; some have grown up by informal tradition, but are no less accurate clues to an official's status. The business about the wastebasket, for example — wood or steel — was told to my reporter Carolyn Farrar by a former Transportation Department official. He also provided the tip on water carafes and rugs, and said that television sets are another excellent indicator of rank.

The whole incredible system has apparently grown up out of a single justifying phrase in the GSA regulations on assignment and utilization of government office space. It states that a bureaucrat's private office should be just large enough to allow him to "conduct his normal business in an efficient manner and with a reasonable degree of dignity."

And dignity, as everyone knows, is very important in Washington.

Pitfalls of the presidential trail

In recent weeks I've given careful thought to the possibility of seeking the presidency in 1984. I have discussed this prospect with a great many people and I feel I have an obligation at this time to announce that I shall not run.

There are some overriding reasons why I have reluctantly come to this decision . . . in addition to the fact, of course, that I wouldn't have a chance of winning.

Let me mention some of the reasons for my decision.

FIRST, many of you know that I've been married to the same woman for more than 30 years. My advisers tell me that this can only hurt me at the polls. It gives people the impression that I am out of the main stream in America, where divorce has become a way of life. While I realize that neither the church nor the state considers it morally wrong to stay married under certain circumstances, it is highly unusual behavior which might attract a lot of unfavorable comment.

To tell you the truth, this is not a political decision but a personal one. The decision of my wife, Marge, and me to stay together has been very difficult for both of us. I simply don't want to expose

myself to a barrage of questions at every whistle-stop I make:

"Do you think your marriage will hurt your chances?"

"If Mrs. Rooney thought it would help

you get elected, would she sue you for divorce?"

"Can you give us any valid reason for staying married to the same woman all this time?"

The other issue, of course, is the matter of the children. I simply can't stand the idea of spending any more time with our kids than I already do. We have four grown offspring and we see plenty of them the way things are. In the summer we see them almost every weekend, and we see them often in the winter, too. Thanksgiving and Christmas, with maybe a weekend in between, does it for me. If I run for the presidency, everyone will be after me to spend more time with the children so

they can take pictures of us. I'm simply not going to do it. Once the children are grown, there's just so much time you want to hang around together. And it would be as tough on them as it would be on me. How much time do grown children want to spend with their parents? How many pictures of us all having a good time together can they take?

To allay any suspicions you might have about the support I am getting from my family in my decision not to run, let me say that I have their complete support. When I mentioned the possibility of running for the presidency to my son, the newspaperman, several weeks ago, he said, "You crazy or something?"

All of them agree I'd be out of my mind to run for the presidency and their opinion gives me a great deal of confidence. Two of them said I'd also be crazy to run in 1988 or 1992.

SOME OF YOU may wonder if the negative stories about me have had anything to do with this decision. I would be less than honest with you if I told you they did not. A recent poll indicated many people think I have a certain weakness of character. It's true. I have used ice cream for more than 50 years. I am an ice cream addict. When my adviser told me that I'd have to give up ice cream and lose weight if I were to run, I knew then what my decision had to be. There's just so much you can expect a man to do for his country.

One further admission. I can't end this announcement without admitting to you that I've been paying all my income tax. I know this makes me seem like a financial incompetent and I can only say that I'm sorry about paying as much as I have. It was mistake anyone might have made.

Thank you for listening to me . . . and if I change my mind next week, I hope I can count on your support.

Fair theater vowed by July

Buoyed by assurances that a long overdue \$10 million amphitheater will be built at the Orange County Fairgrounds by July, fair board members voted Thursday to spend \$40,000 on parking lot drawings for the Costa Mesa theater.

In a surprise appearance Tuesday before a special fair board committee, James Nederlander of the Nederlander Organization said construction of the 15,000-seat facility will begin by Feb. 1.

At the meeting Thursday morning, board members expressed guarded optimism over the news that construction will begin soon.

Relations between the board and Nederlander have been strained after ground breaking July, 1981 failed to produce more than repeated promises that further construction would begin any day.

"I got the distinct feeling that the amphitheater would be built,

but I've had that distinct feeling many times before," said board member Clint Hoose, who has been instrumental in negotiating the amphitheater agreement with Nederlander.

"It would be a miracle if it were open by July," he added. "I haven't seen any miracle on this project."

Already four years behind schedule, Nederlander officials blamed the construction delay on legal and financial setbacks.

The Nederlander company, which owns and operates major theaters across the country, including the Greek Theater in Los Angeles, signed a construction contract with C.L. Peck of Irvine last June to build the bowl-shaped theater.

Frustrated by the delays, Fair board members ordered Nederlander attorney Rick Witte to appear at Tuesday's committee meeting. Instead, Nederlander showed up, saying Witte was no longer in charge of the project.

"I'm beginning to feel like Clint," said board president Burr Williams at Thursday's meeting.

"Maybe it won't be started Feb. 1. I'm a little bit skeptical about Mr. Nederlander."

The board authorized the expenditure of \$40,000 for working drawings on a \$1.6 million parking lot and upgrading of 33 acres that would surround the theater.

Even if the theater is not built the parking lot at Fair Drive and Merrimac Road eventually will be needed by the fairgrounds, officials said.

Meanwhile, fair board members moved ahead Thursday on plans for a hotel on the fairgrounds at the corner of Newport Boulevard and Fair Drive.

Consultants submitted a report concluding the Costa Mesa site as an excellent location for a hotel.

The consultants said the fairgrounds' proximity to South Coast Plaza and the John Wayne Airport made it a choice site for a hotel.

Hoose said the fair board expects to solicit bids in 1983.

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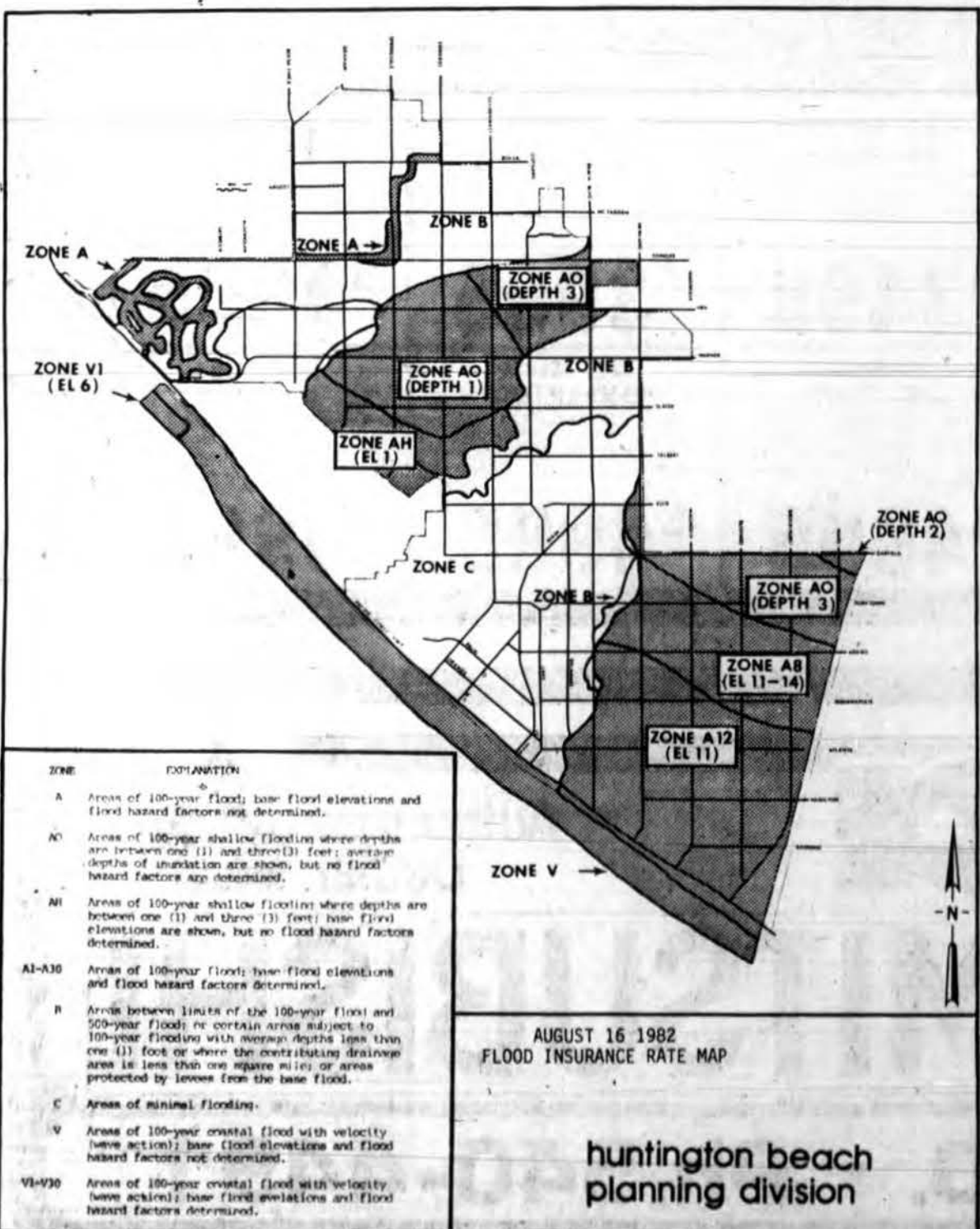

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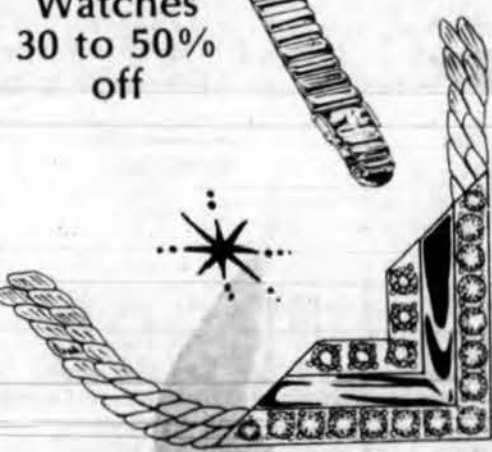

"It took every weekend in September just to sand them," the woman laughed.

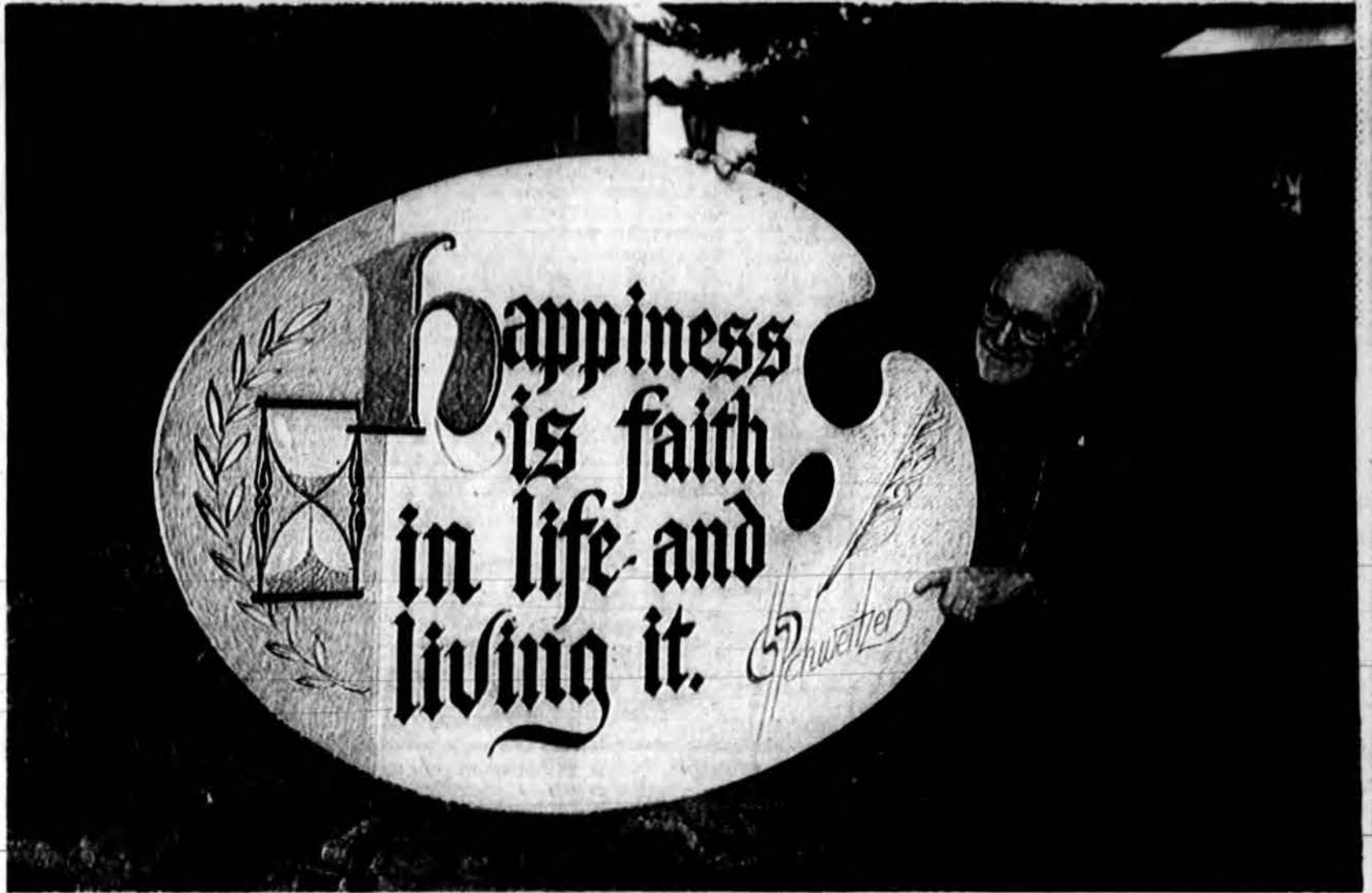
Then the volunteers applied three coats of base paint and distributed the wooden palettes to local artists.

"I think people would come from all over to see an original display of holiday designs by our artists," Purcell said.

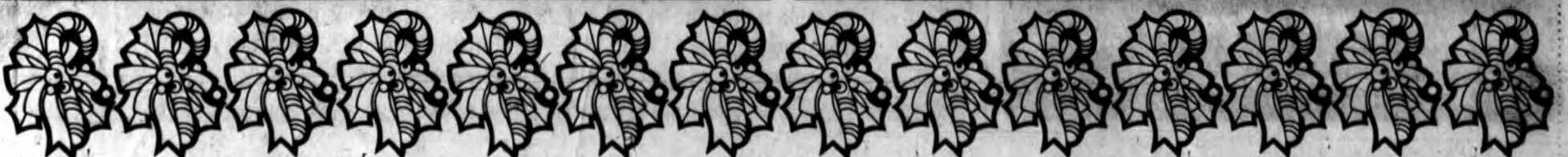
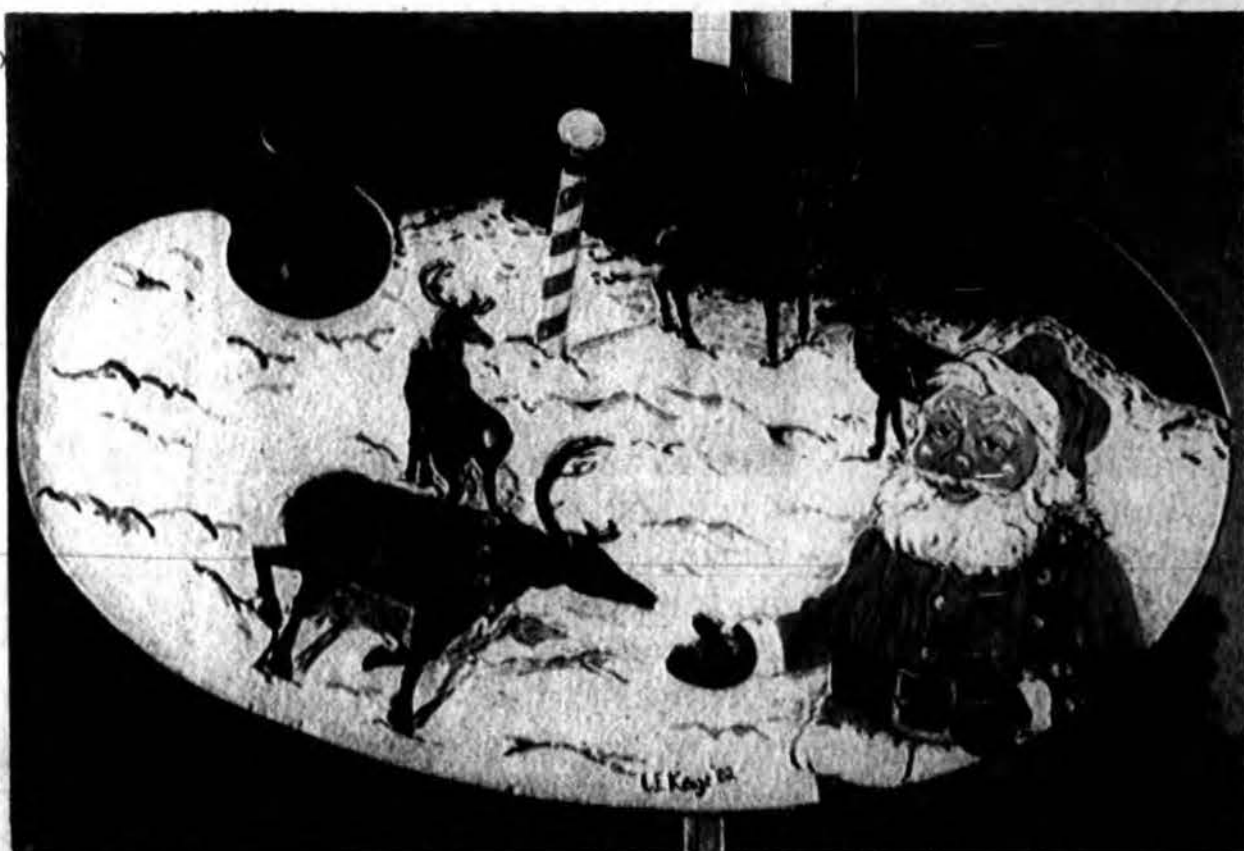
She envisions a popular holiday tradition that could draw Christmas shoppers and visitors to Laguna Beach — the art colony.

It is all very well to draw inferences from the bidding. However, don't let your imagination take the place of sound technique.
East's three diamond preempt is somewhat unorthodox. However, since his partner had passed in first seat, the chances of game were remote. It seemed wiser to try to interfere with the opponents' auction. This tactic backfired because, without the preempt, North-South might not have been able to reach an excellent four spade contract on their own steam. North had the ideal hand for a takeout double in the balancing seat, and

South deemed that his hand warranted a shot at game even-opposite a hand that could not open. South's bidding judgment was excellent. Unfortunately, he judged the play of the hand less well.
West led a diamond. East won the king and continued with the ace. Declarer ruffed and cashed the king and ace of trumps. When East showed out, it was obvious that the defenders had their book — West had two high trumps to go with the diamond trick in the bank. Therefore it seemed that declarer would have to guess the location of the queen of clubs for this contract.
Since East had preempted,

declarer elected to play him for the shorter clubs. So he ruffed a diamond, crossed to the king of clubs and led a club to the ten for down one.
Had declarer taken time out to count the hand, he would have realized that he might have ten tricks without having to rely on the location of the queen of clubs. After learning of the trump break declarer should ruff his last diamond on the table. Next he cashes the ace-king of hearts and ruffs a heart.
When both defenders follow, the contract is assured. Declarer returns to dummy with the ace of clubs and ruffs another heart. If the ruff stands up, declarer

cashes the king of clubs for his tenth trick. If West overruffs, he is down to nothing but clubs and must lead a club into declarer's king-jack tenace, giving declarer two more tricks in the suit for a total of ten.

We have argued about this so much these past few months that we now know a third party must help us decide what is right. You're the one we chose. Please help. — MASSACHUSETTS MISERIES

DEAR M.M.: I'm with you, mom, and here are my reasons: The two younger boys couldn't have a better model of what happens to people who break the law. They see their brother locked up behind bars, denied the freedom of living a normal life. Pleasant, no. But useful.

The younger ones will also have the opportunity to learn that even though someone they love has done something terribly wrong, they should "hate the sin but love the sinner."

That 20-year-old is still your son — no matter what. To deny him the pleasure of seeing his brothers would be cruel. Visiting with them is one of the few humanizing experiences he will have inside those concrete walls. The visits may be heart-wrenching, but they do far more good than harm. Please continue to take the boys to see their brother.

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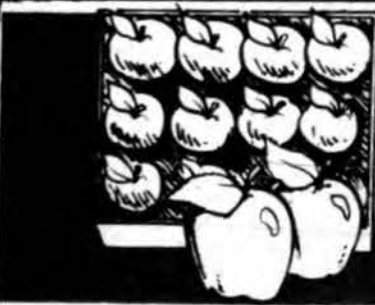
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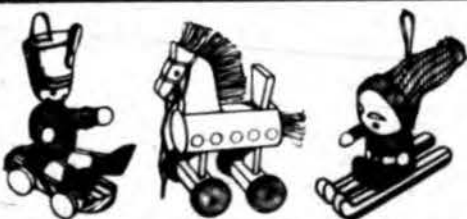
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Uninspired UCI (yawn)... 4-0

LOS ANGELES — UC Irvine's Bill Mulligan saw it coming all week long. The frustrating part is that a coach is usually helpless in such matters.

A natural letdown following a big win; quarter exams that interfered with practice time; the knowledge of playing an obviously weak opponent — they all played a part in UCI's listless performance Thursday night.

Fortunately, the Anteaters were playing a Loyola Marymount team that would be hard-pressed to give USC's women's squad a tough contest and as a result UCI was allowed to sleepwalk to an 85-73 victory before 1,656 in the Lions' gym.

"There was no spring in their legs. You could see it during warmups," offered UCI assistant coach Herb Livsey of the players. "We had the better team

... that's the only reason we won."

UCI, in running its early-season record to 4-0, seemed to have a tougher time dealing with itself than it did Loyola.

The Anteaters' biggest problem was psyching up for the Lions, who were picked this season to finish last in the West Coast Athletic Conference while Pepperdine, the team UCI staged its stunning comeback against only five days earlier, was the consensus No. 1 choice.

Add to that the fact UCI practiced only two of four days because of final exams, with one of those workouts featuring an extremely sparse attendance, and you can see why Mulligan foresaw nothing but disaster.

"I tried to tell people, but nobody would believe me," said Mulligan of his fears. "But I don't want to be too hard on them. It was their first time away from

home and we won the game, that's the main thing."

UCI spent the first 10 minutes of the game going through the motions and trading baskets with the Lions (1-3) whose only victory this year was against Hardin-Simmons.

The Anteaters' only spark seemed to come during the final 10:43 of the first half when they changed a 20-18 deficit into a 42-30 halftime lead by outscoring their opponents, 24-10.

"I think we had a tough time getting up after Pepperdine," admitted guard Mike Lopez. "Plus, we had a day off the following day (Sunday), a lousy practice on Monday, Tuesday off and we didn't have a good practice Wednesday either because of finals."

"All you can do in a situation like that is go out and play as hard as you can and whatever happens, happens. If things

don't come out right, they don't come out right."

In the second half the Anteaters again played just hard enough to keep the Lions at a safe distance. Loyola did get as close as seven on five separate occasions, the last time being 78-71 with 1:22 to play, but to UCI's credit, every time the Anteaters needed a big play on offense or defense they turned it.

"I don't think we were lethargic. We just didn't execute well," added freshman Tod Murphy. "I don't think we looked at this team as being low. That wasn't the case. I think we were more worried about having a letdown than actually having one."

Indicative of how the game went was the fact Murphy, who came off the bench and played only 22 minutes, tied for team-high honors, along with Jud Beardsley, at 22 points. Just as (See UCI, Page C2)

The Rams got Jones, Ferragamo got out of his contract, and both Haden and Rutledge recovered.

The Rams' fortunes haven't been very good lately.

Anyway, Haden, seeing the writing on the wall, called it quits, while Rutledge was shipped to the New York Giants (See BERT, Page C2)

Thompson the catalyst as Huntington Beach holds off stubborn Barons

Unbeaten Huntington Beach High goes for its seventh straight victory and second basketball tournament championship in a row tonight against tall and talented La Quinta in the finals of the Sea Baron Classic at Fountain Valley High with tipoff scheduled for 8:15.

Coach Roy Miller's Huntington Beach Oilers qualified for a showdown with a tough, 55-46 decision over host Fountain Valley Thursday night, while La Quinta breezed, taking an 85-70 decision from Los Alamitos in the other half of the

semis at Ocean View High.

"La Quinta has size and is agile," says Miller. "And (Mark) Moses is a tremendous ball player."

La Quinta enters with Moses and J.T. Debbs, a pair of 6-4 juniors as the Aztecs' mainstays while compiling a 3-1 record, losing only to heralded Riverside Poly.

"Billy Thompson," says La Quinta Coach Jim Perry, "he's the man we have to keep under control."

The Barons of Fountain Valley did everything they were asked to do Thursday — stopping the Oilers' fast breaks, limiting the front line to just 20

points, refusing the Oilers penetration of the key and clearly rattling the Oilers' sophomore sensation, Jamel Garner, with a roughhouse style.

Against most that would have been enough, but the Oilers had that ace-in-the-hole — Billy Thompson, and the slick, 6-0 senior guard pulled Huntington Beach out of one tight spot after another, leading all scorers with 18 points, picking off eight rebounds and knifing through with key steals time and again.

"Billy's a compensator," said Miller following the victory, which was ignited by a third quarter when the Barons suddenly went cold from the field,

Dodgers await Hooton's approval of trade

HONOLULU (AP) — Major league baseball teams started the final day of their annual winter meetings headed for a record low in trades, despite a flurry of activity that saw Philadelphia trade away Manny Trillo and the New York Yankees sign free agent Steve Kemp.

A total of 11 trades were made during the 1979 meetings in Toronto. This year, though, only five deals had been made through Thursday.

The Los Angeles Dodgers reportedly were ready to part with veteran pitcher Burt Hooton and a pair of minor leaguers for Texas catcher Jim Sundberg.

But both Hooton and Sundberg have to approve the move since they're both 10-year major leaguers with at least five

years on their present teams.

The day's activity began when the Yankees announced the signing of Kemp to a reported \$5.5-million, plus incentives, contract. That move triggered the few trades that were made.

The Phillies put together a 5-for-1 deal with the Cleveland Indians that, in addition to Trillo, included highly regarded rookie shortstop Julio Franco, outfielder George Vukovich, catcher Jerry Willard and pitcher Jay Baller for outfielder Von Hayes.

Earlier Thursday, Cleveland Manager Mike Ferraro said the Phillies had a 40-percent chance of prying Hayes loose from the Indians.

"They'd have to overwhelm us," said Ferraro.

The Phillies obtained the left-handed power hitter they feel will balance their attack.

Then, the Yankees came along with another deal. They sent outfielder Dave Collins, right-handed pitcher Mike Morgan, first baseman Fred McGriff and an unannounced amount of cash to Toronto for right-handed reliever Dale Murray and outfielder-catcher Tom Dodd.

There were two more minor moves as Cleveland gave the Phillies shortstop Larry Milbourne for a player to be named later, and the Seattle Mariners traded young right-handed pitcher Rich

Bordi to the Chicago Cubs for outfielder Steve Henderson.

Philadelphia may not be through, either. The Phillies still want a reliever, and he could be Al Holland of the San Francisco Giants. The deal could be pitcher John Denny and a minor leaguer for Holland and second baseman Joe Morgan.

And the Yankees intimated they still were wheeling and dealing.

With Kemp in the fold, the main free agents still unsigned were pitcher Floyd Bannister, formerly of Seattle; Steve Garvey, the ex-Dodgers first baseman, and Pittsburgh outfielder Omar Moreno.

Rimington recipient of Lombardi Award

HOUSTON — Highly decorated Dave Rimington, a two-time All-America center from Nebraska and double Outland trophy winner, won the 13th Lombardi Award Thursday night as the nation's top collegiate lineman.

Rimington, 6-3 and 290 pounds, beat three other finalists for the award, including Arkansas defensive end Billy Ray Smith, Arizona State linebacker Vernon Maxwell and Southern California noseguard George Achica.

Rimington also was a two-time academic All-America selection with a 3.18 grade point average in business administration.

Smith was a finalist for the honor last year and became the first player not to win the honor after being selected runnerup as a junior.

The Lombardi Award, a 40-pound block of granite, is named in honor of Vince Lombardi, former coach of Green Bay and Washington who died of cancer in 1970.

Rimington spearheaded the Cornhusker offense that led the nation in total offense and rushing offense this season. Nebraska averaged 518 yards per game in total offense last season en route to its New Year's Day berth in the Orange Bowl.

Jeff Ruland scored 23 points and helped snap Denver's National Basketball Association record 100-point-game streak at 136 games as Washington downed the Nuggets, 98-90 Thursday night. Denver, after scoring 36 points in the third quarter, managed only 13 in the final period in failing to score at least 100 points in a game for the first time in nearly two years. Jim Paxson sent Portland ahead with a 15-foot jump shot with five minutes remaining and the Trail Blazers pulled away to a 107-98 victory over Golden State. 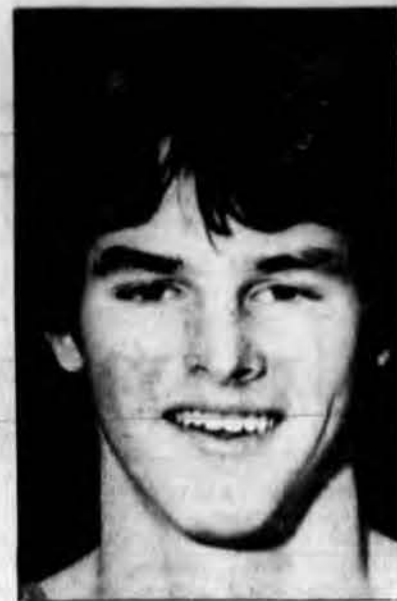

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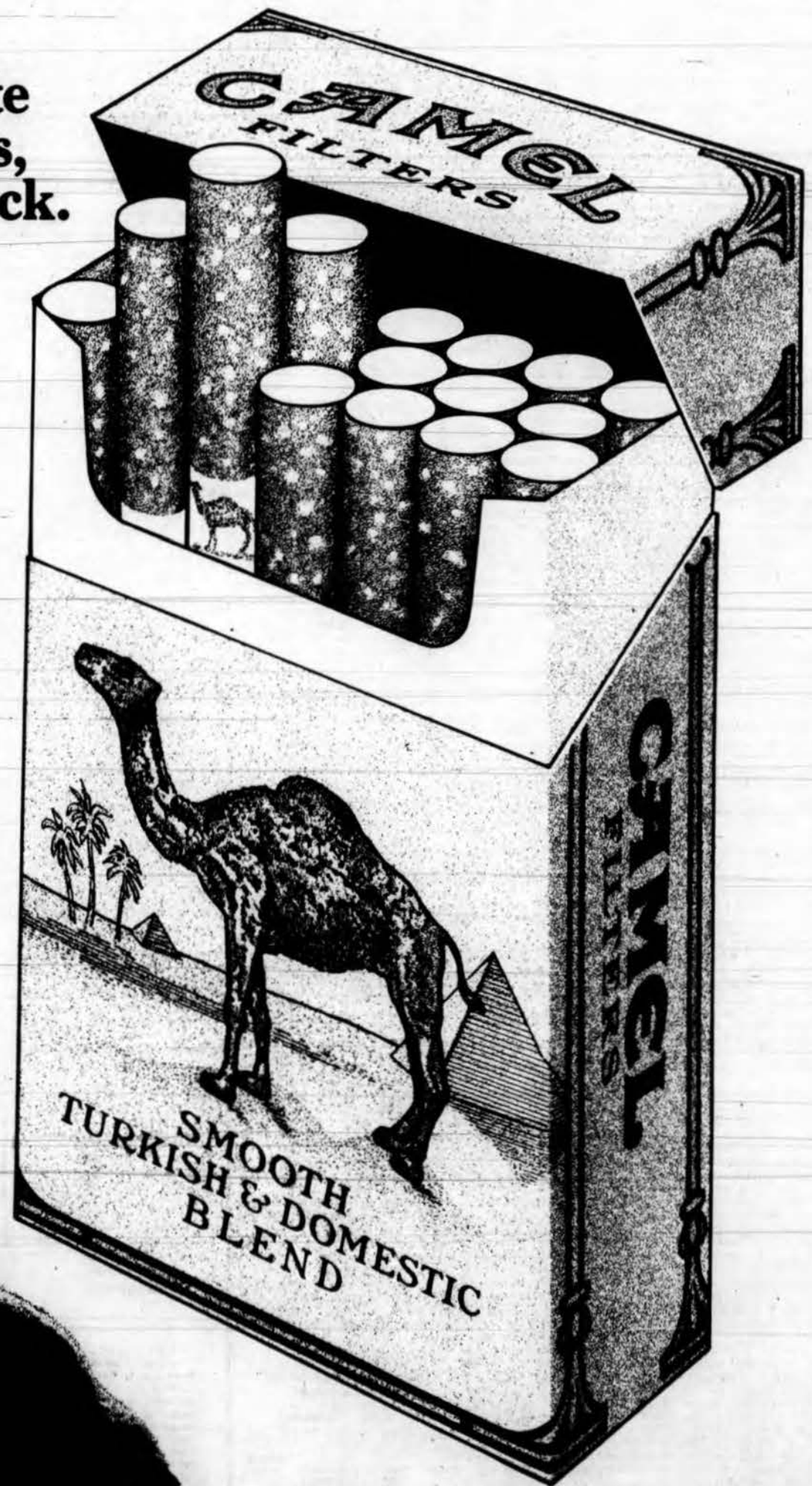
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Irvine works overtime to top Uni

TV kids learn Big Lesson of the Week

Television seems to have a rule of thumb when it comes to series focusing on youngsters. TV kids can make reckless choices and get themselves into all sorts of trouble. But by the end of each episode, they had better learn the Big Lesson of the Week.

Consider that classic old kids' show, "Leave it to Beaver." Each week, the good-natured but naive, Beaver let Eddie Haskell or some other young person talk him into playing hookey from school or driving dad's car without a license.

But you could always depend on one thing: The Beav was going to get caught. By the end of the show, stern but fair Hugh Beaumont would talk about the consequences of lying or stealing and deliver the Big Lesson. The Beav would show remorse, and everyone would live happily ever after.

There's a new generation of Beavers populating the tube these days, but the Big Lesson rule is still in effect. At least that's the conclusion one could draw from watching a week's worth of youth-oriented shows.

First, there's "Father Murphy," the NBC series that puts Merlin Olsen in charge of a house full of orphans. Last week's episode delivered its lessons not with a sledgehammer but with a trip-hammer — one after another.

In this episode, innocent young Lizette (Lisa Trusel) got her first job working at a dress shop and was charmed by a handsome rich kid named T.J.

Before the hour was up, Lizette learned the following lessons:

- Don't smoke. (She was pressured into taking a puff and she promptly lost her lunch.)
- Don't play hookey from work. (She almost lost her job after skipping to go on a picnic.)
- Don't race your wagon. (She and T.J. were injured when their speeding buckboard crashed.)

And there were lessons for other young people on the show about the hazards of gossiping and about not wishing you were taller than you are.

To make sure we all got the point, Lizette uttered this little speech near the end of the episode: "I'm just a spoiled little child. I was trying to be like them (the rich kids), but I'm glad I'm not. I've learned my lesson."

By the time the credits rolled, the episode's snobby rich girl had turned over a new leaf, the short kid wasn't trying to be tall anymore, the teens involved in the wagon crash were okay, everyone had learned their Big Lesson.

And after an overload of moral instruction, this viewer, at least, was close to losing his own lunch.

On NBC's Saturday night comedies, "Different Strokes" and "Silver Spoons," the lessons are slipped in between the wisecracks. These series feature two of the biggest ham actors still on the shy side of 15: Gary Coleman and Ricky Schroder. (Does anyone know any real life children who act like these two?)

On last week's "Different Strokes," Arnold (Coleman) tripped the new building manager's son after the boy called him a runt. His dad (Conrad Bain) proceeded to lecture him on the evils of violence.

Moments later, in a twist on the Big Lesson approach, Arnold's father then turned around and slugged the nasty building manager.

Of course, everyone learned their lesson that violence doesn't pay by the end of the episode, when the building

owner agreed to drop all charges against dad — as long as he agreed to a new lease at triple the current rent.

On "Silver Spoons," the writers used an old plot gimmick about a half-overheard conversation to make Ricky believe his dad's secretary (Erin Gray) was in love with him.

"I've heard this thing about older women chasing younger men," he told her. "But I guess I don't go for the new morality. I'm an old-fashioned guy."

He soon realized his mistake and decided instead to arrange a romantic dinner for the secretary and his dad. Sure enough, the two adults were kissing on cue as the "To Be Continued" sign flashed on the screen.

Do you want to bet that the romance cools down next week, and Ricky learns a Big Lesson about meddling in his dad's love life?

Of the new shows, two feature young people who at least bear some resemblance to real life teens.

"Family Ties" is about two former-hippie parents raising three ultra-conservative children. The format isn't always believable, and the liberal lessons are often forced, but when the series goes for some gentle middle of the road domestic humor, it can be quite good.

One of the best things about the series is Michael J. Fox, who portrays eldest son Alex. Last week's episode was heavy-handed, as Alex learned a Big Lesson about why it's better to work in a friendly neighborhood grocery than in a huge, ultra-modern supermarket where he's called by a number, not a name.

Equally uneven is "Square Pegs," on CBS. Some episodes have been complete duds, but last week's show, revolving around a snobby student's New Wave Bat Mitzvah dance, was hilarious.

Though it has its shortcomings, "Square Pegs" at least looks like it's populated by real life high school kids.

If NBC really wants to teach Father Murphy's kids a few Big Lessons about life, they ought to send the whole orphanage to one of those New Wave Bat Mitzvahs.

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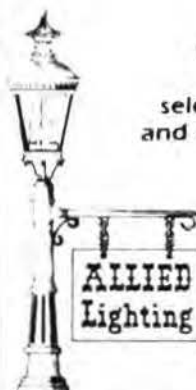

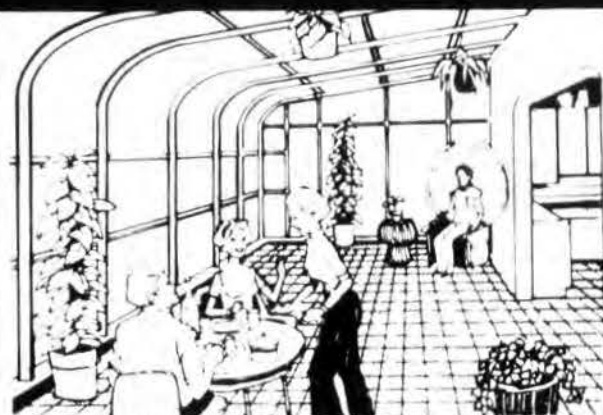

Don Tuche addicted to Mexican food, theater

Don Tuche wasn't eating. He eyed the foot long sandwich that was loaded with everything but the shredded manuscripts of the Watergate hearings.

"That looks good," he chuckled, "but I haven't had my Mexican food fix for the day, so I think I'll pass on lunch. I haven't long been up from the breakfast table."

Tuche openly admits he is addicted to Mexican food. If he doesn't get it at least once a day he immediately goes into withdrawal.

"A day without Mexican food for me," he said, "is like

Christmas without (Charles) Dickens."

The Dickens holiday classic, "A Christmas Carol," is the hottest item on South Coast Repertory's menu during the festive season. And as usual, Tuche has one of the choice parts. He plays the ghost of Marley and the ghost of Christmas future.

"Marley is the sugarplum," Tuche said. "If you aren't going to be Scrooge, then be Marley. He's a monster and fun to do. The kids love the part."

"The way we do it scares the hell out of them, but they love it."

"A Christmas Carol" will continue on the mainstage at the fourth step theater through Dec. 26. Joining Tuche in the cast is a

long list of South Coast Rep. regulars, including Hal Landon Jr. as Scrooge, John Ellington as Bob Cratchit, Norcen Hennessey as Mrs. Cratchit, Art Koustik as Fezziwig, Martha McFarland as Mrs. Fezziwig, Richard Doyle as the spirit of Christmas past.

Tuche recently completed "The Diviners," a play that had its West Coast premiere on the mainstage at South Coast. In it he played a folksy Indiana farmer, which gave him a chance to draw some from his family roots.

"The Diviners" was a lot of fun," he said. "Although I never lived there, my parents came from Missouri. I know a lot about Missouri folklore and since 'The Diviners' was a folksy piece of work about a rural American family, I was able to draw from my family background for my part.

"My dad was a country doctor who moved from Missouri to Northern California," the friendly actor continued. "He was a doctor during the Big Depression and I recall him talking about taking chickens and can goods for his services. I guess there wasn't any money around back then.

"I was born in Redding, that's up in the northern part of the state—but my family moved to the Bay Area when I was 7. I grew up in Oakland.

"There was a time back in the silent '50s when I thought I would follow in my dad's footsteps. I went to the University of California at Berkeley, jumped around in my studies and finally bottomed out. I just lost interest."

Tuche had shown an interest

in acting since attending junior high school. He first discovered that interest when as a kid about 12 or 13 his father took him to see "Death of a Salesman" at San Francisco's Actors Workshop.

"I was deeply moved," he recalled, "and I guess that's when I made up my mind to be an actor."

Tuche searched around and discovered the best drama classes were being taught at San Francisco State. He enrolled and while there met a group of actors who would later become the backbone to what is now the best repertory company in the state. At San Francisco State his roommate was Martin Benson. Attending the drama program there at the time were David Emmes, John-David Keller, Martha McFarland, David Clements, John Arthur Davis and Richard Rekow.

"We all met during the golden age of theater at San Francisco State," Tuche recalled. "It was a good time to be there. Most of us are now working in professional theater."

"Right out of school David and Martin came south to Long Beach and with a small wardrobe of costumes, while working out of an old station wagon, what we all know as South Coast Repertory was born. I'm amazed at the tenacity they showed in keeping this all together. They had foresight and could see what was down the road."

In the meanwhile, Tuche had stayed in San Francisco upon graduation, joining the Actors Workshop. After a year of hard labor back stage he had done only one bit part, so it was no surprise that he jumped at the

chance to join Emmes and Benson at SCR.

"We did it all on grass roots and local support," Tuche smiled. "That's why we are so strong and healthy today. We don't have to depend on outside help."

"At one time Actors Workshop was the model for good theater, but we've now surpassed them. We've come to full fruition. We had the spirit of youth building a theater and it has paid off."

Tuche openly admits he enjoys the lifestyle of an actor. He is convinced a regular 9 to 5 job would drive him bonkers.

"It's not easy to make plans in this business," he offered, "because you never know when or from where the next job will come—but I wouldn't want it any other way. I'm just happy to be working because the unemployment in this business is staggering. We have up to 80 percent unemployment, so it's the kind of business you have to be able to relax and enjoy, otherwise you will die of an anxiety attack."

From time to time Tuche likes to get away and do different things. Just this past summer he was up at Lake Tahoe helping organize a small summer stock group. He called it getting away to recharge.

"It was a new group just getting started so I had a chance to do everything," he said. "I did some directing and teaching. It was tough—just like summer camp, but I loved it. It was good for me."

"I'm scheduled to go back up this summer and direct a show. I think I would like to do more directing, because I'm looking

forward to this summer. I'd like to do it all. I guess that's my fondest dream. I never seem to get enough of this business."

The business never seems to get enough of Don Tuche either. He has played major roles in such plays as "The Birthday Party," "Time of Your Life," "Pueblo," and "That Championship Season."

The actor continued to toy with the sandwich as he spoke compassionately of his career, never taking the wrappings off.

"I am an extremely lucky man to be able to make a living doing what I want," he emphasized. "When I look around and see people trying to escape through drugs, alcohol and video games, I feel blessed."

"And that's usually when I head for the barrio for my daily Mexican food fix. I love the stuff—just like I love this business."

What's Happening

OC Master Chorale. . . Provides Christmas spirit

If the Orange County Master Chorale concerts last weekend didn't leave you with a heavy dose of Christmas spirit, then bah humbug.

Who wouldn't feel like mistletoe and hollyberries after a thoroughly enjoyable evening of the likes of "We Need a Little Christmas," and "Joy to the World?"

The Chorale's first concert of the season, entitled "The Glory of Christmas," provided a good mixture of classic and popular works, and combined traditional and modern carols.

Music Director Maurice Allard conducted the chorale at last Friday's concert with the quick professionalism that comes after a five-year association with one group. Admirably, Allard is able to lead the singers powerfully without letting his personality interfere with the performance.

The first half of the evening's concert, to a nearly full house at Orange Coast College, began with selections from Handel's "Messiah," concluding with the traditional "Hallelujah Chorus" and the audience on its feet.

The second half of the program featured Christmas tunes, both old favorites with new arrangements and unusual holiday fare.

The "Messiah" selections were best when the entire chorus got involved, since none of the three soloists proved to be exceptional.

Regrettably, a weak chamber orchestra

dragged down the chorale during this first half, scraping along at a slow and faltering pace.

But the "Hallelujah Chorus" came off well, as it almost always does just because of its familiarity, and the audience was obviously pleased with the performance.

The Californians, a 19-member group-within-a-group, performed a series of Christmas favorites after intermission. Each of the familiar tunes, like "Jingle Bells" and "What Child is This?" sported a new arrangement, so that the evening never slipped into the worn groove of tired familiarity that is always a danger for a Christmas program.

The Californians, mainly a public relations and fund-raising arm of the chorale, according to business manager Donna Bunce, perform about 16 times a year.

The modified version of "The Twelve Days of Christmas" the group sang, with the words changed to biting sarcasm, was probably the biggest hit of the set.

After the Californians' portion of the program, the entire chorale returned to the stage for more Christmas tunes.

Most memorable was "The Shepherds Had an

Angel—an unusual arrangement with Lynn Larson doing a nice soprano solo and Jane Green on the English horn.

Especially good was Jan Holcolm's solo on "A Christmas Medley," which concluded the program.

The Master Chorale is the oldest continuing performing arts group in the county, Bunce said. It was founded in 1956 when the city of Anaheim celebrated its centennial.

Allard has been with the chorale for five seasons, and before that spent 11 years as a professor of music at UC Irvine.

Except for the hired-in soloists, chorale members are amateurs, receiving no pay for their average of three hours a week rehearsal time. During the week before a performance, Bunce said, there may be up to 25 hours of rehearsal expected.

Rehearsal time is increased by the fact that the chorale performs all over the county rather than sticking with a home auditorium for its performances. But the chorale strives for a county-wide appeal, and thus it tries to put each of its concerts on in several locations, Bunce said. Beside OCC, "The Glory of Christmas" appeared in Fullerton and Santa Ana.

Open auditions for the group will be held Jan. 8. Chorale members must be able to read music. Those interested in auditioning may call Anthea Kjerulff at 524-5279 for more information.

Orange Coast theater . . . More daring this year

(This is the first in a series of five columns reviewing the year 1982 in theater along the Orange Coast.)

More and more, professional theaters along the Orange Coast are veering away from the certified audience grabbers and taking a chance with material far from the tried and true.

This was particularly true at South Coast Repertory this past year as premieres of both the world and West Coast variety abounded on the mainstage and the smaller Second Stage. In fact, the latter theater unveiled a plan to produce an entire season of world premieres in 1982-83.

The two dinner playhouses, Sebastian's West and the Harlequin, weren't quite so daring, but each managed to mount one new show during 1982. They also assembled the umpteenth versions of "South Pacific" and "Norman, Is That You?" on a county stage.

Costa Mesa's SCR continued to stand as the theater by which others are measured. A prime example was the thundering production of Shakespeare's "Henry IV, Part 1," probably the most ambitious work yet on the mainstage, though the more down-to-earth plays like "Da" and "The Diviners" proved equally impressive and ultimately more involving.

On the Second Stage, the world premiere season got off to an impressive start with George Sibbald's "Brothers," probably the most involving play mounted on either stage in 1982. The introspective "Bodies" and the musical social satire "Coming Attractions" also scored high in their impact.

Distinguished performances were in abundance on both stages, but a handful stood out — Jeffrey

Combs in "The Diviners," Thomas Hill in "Henry IV," Christina Pickles in "Bodies" and Linda Purl in "The Man Who Could See Through Time" in the leading role category and, in support, Wayne Grace in "The Diviners," Dennis Franz in "Brothers," Patricia Fraser in "All in Favor Said No" and Tandy Cronyn in "Bodies."

The old ("South Pacific") and the new ("On Golden Pond") competed for top honors at

Sebastian's West Dinner Playhouse in 1982. The San Clemente theater also unveiled a world premiere, "What Are You Doing in My Life?" which, to be polite, needed work.

Most impressive individually was Howard Goodwin in both "South Pacific" (as Billis) and "Cheaters." Pat and Eloise O'Brien warmed our hearts in "Golden Pond" while Ira Denmark made a sprightly "George M" and Lisa Cutler was a memorable Nellie in "South Pacific."

"Sugar" is sweet, and so was the Harlequin Dinner Playhouse's summer show of the same name. The Santa Ana showplace also impressed with Neil Simon's "I Ought to be in Pictures" and the current nostalgia fare, "Meet Me in St. Louis."

Among the performances that stand out are those of Bryan Freed as the Streisandish teen in "Pictures," William Kirby Cullen as the young man with old ideas in "Forty Carats," Bruce Winant tending musical comedy a drag in "Sugar" and Lee Wilson delightfully trying to pass for 6 in "St. Louis."

For South Coast Repertory, nearing its 20th anniversary on the Orange Coast, consistency continued to be the byword. Audiences could count on first-rate performances even when the plays themselves failed to completely satisfy.

On the dinner theater circuit, changes were effected in both operations. The guest star format at Sebastian's West seemed to disappear after Vivian Blaine's rocky run in "My Life."

Next Friday's column, the second part of this series, will dissect community theater in 1982 along the Orange Coast. Then, during Christmas week, we'll take a look at the top 10 non-professional productions, some outstanding actors and actresses, and the Daily Pilot's ninth annual man and woman of the year in theater.

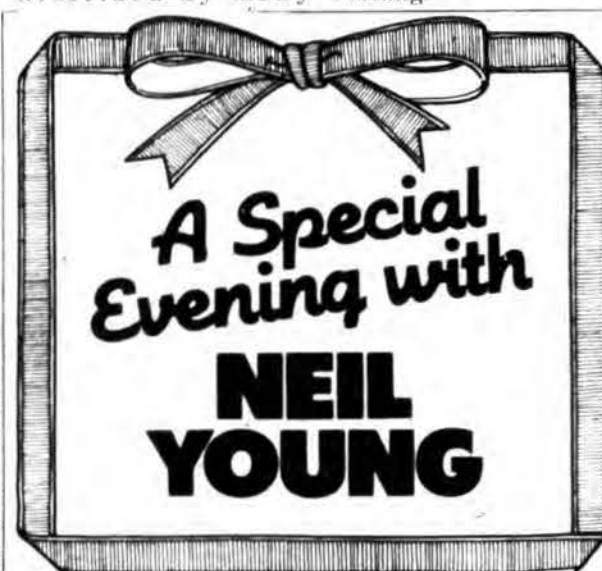

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'Cats . . . Dancer-actor Harry Groener has first hit on Broadway

NEW YORK — The lean, keen tabby, jumping around, introducing characters and songs, keeping the pace brisk — the veritable master of ceremonies of Act One of "Cats" — is, under that gray, elastic skin, really mild-mannered, dancer-actor Harry Groener.

Groener has been on Broadway before, in the short-lived "Oh, Brother!" and "Is There Life After High School?" and, for eight months, as Ado Annie's long-suffering feller, Will Parker, in a revival of "Oklahoma!"

"Cats" was his first hit Broadway opening. The Winter Garden Theater box office opened Aug. 23 and had sold nearly \$8 million worth of tickets, two-thirds of that before the opening Oct. 7. Backstage stairwells were lined with flowers on opening night. There were cases of champagne, tons of telegrams and gifts galore.

While talking with a reporter between matinee and evening shows, Groener leaves on his cat face and puts on shirt and jeans and one treasured gift — a gold pendant with Cats written on it. He can't wear it during the show because it would interfere with his wiring for sound.

Another opening-night gift was a Cats carrybag with a Cats sweatshirt inside. There was cat food and litter boxes with fans inside to air them out.

The two cats — Rum Tum Tugger and Alonzo, known as Terrence V. Mann and Hector Jaime Mercado in the human world — who share a tiny dressing room with Groener don't

have cats at home and gave him all their cat equipment. Groener and his wife, partly inspired by the show, have acquired a kitten, Blissit.

Groener met his wife, actress Dawn Didawick, when both were in "The Matchmaker" at the Actors Theater of Louisville in 1976. She's

performing there this season again but came to the big opening night. In "Cats," Groener's name is Munkustrap. The audience doesn't identify him with that name because he doesn't have a solo with his name on it as do some of the others. But he's listed as Munkustrap in the

program.

All the cats are named and director Trevor Nunn told each one his personal history. "That's primarily for the actor's own purpose," Groener says, "so you're not just a cat. It helps you be an individual cat. But the audience doesn't know. I'm second in

command to Old Deuteronomy, the leader and protector of the pack. I fight when need be. And I will take over when Old Deuteronomy leaves us forever.

"That's why I'm the one keeping things going, rounding up all the cats to perform their numbers, so that Old

Deuteronomy can choose one to go the Heavyside Layer, which is the best place to be."

Though Broadway has seen him only in musicals, Groener has played Shakespeare in Seattle and modern drama in Los Angeles.

Brunch \$9.25. Reservations recommended.

Japanese restaurants usually offer one of three styles of cuisine: hibachi cookery on gas-fired grills, raw fish and sweetened rice combinations at the sushi bar and the more standard tempura-teriyaki-sukiyaki fare.

At Newport's Koto, diners have the opportunity to sample any of the three sumptuous worlds of Oriental food. The teppan yaki room houses hibachi grills, where guests can watch food prepared at their tables by the flashy cutlery work of skillful chefs. If you don't prefer the communal dining of the teppan room, the main dining area menu offers an equally abundant selection of vegetable and seafood tempura, chicken and beef teriyaki and other assorted dinners.

Finally, there's a complete sushi bar with a somewhat slim 14 seats. It's first come, first served at the bar but reservations, a must on weekends, can be made for the main dining area or teppan room.

The lunch menus, by the way, are trimmed-down versions of the dinner menus, with slimmer portions and prices.

We opted for the main dining room, since we had already sampled the lunch and dinner fare in the teppan room on previous visits. Teppan dinners include soup, salad, rice and tea. Combinations of shrimp, lobster, chicken, scallops and different cuts of prime beef are prepared on the grill with seasoned vegetables including mushrooms, onions, bean sprouts and zucchini.

First-timers may wish to select the chicken and shrimp teppan (\$9.95) or the beef teriyaki steak and shrimp combination (\$12.50). Seafood aficionados can feast on a special combination of lobster, scallops, shrimp and tempura (\$32 for two) or the hearty appetite may find its way to lobster, New York steak and shrimp, the top-priced individual selection at \$25.50.

Koto was opened in 1975 by two Japanese corporations that also have started a similar

restaurant called Tozai in Minneapolis. (Tozai doesn't offer a sushi bar, however.)

The main dining room affords diners an expansive view of sculptured gardens, a carp pool and a park-like area in the heart of a major business center. High wood-beam ceilings rely on earth tones and the room is accented by hanging paper lamps and a few indoor plants. Beige napery adds the final touch of elegance and tables include both chopsticks, for the traditionalist, and a full silverware place setting.

You may also request, by reservation, to dine Japanese-style in a tatami room, where shoes are removed and you sit on plush floor chairs before low tables.

Combinations of shrimp, lobster, chicken, scallops and different cuts of prime beef are prepared on the grill with seasoned vegetables including mushrooms, onions, bean sprouts and zucchini.

Service is generally quick and helpful, especially when considering some of the more exotic menu offerings. The main dining room can get a bit noisy, though the tables, with cushioned rattan chairs, are appropriately spaced to allow casual conversation.

We found prices to be most appreciated. Our dinner included two drinks, two appetizers and complete combination dinners, all for about \$35.

The appetizer list, which is also included on the teppan room menu, is an international assortment of delicacies such as egg rolls, steamed clams,

escargots, spare ribs, frog legs, raw oysters, shrimp and vegetable tempura and barbecued chicken on a skewer.

We decided to try the frog legs (\$3.95), fried with a tempura batter that was crispy yet not greasy. The portion was petite, with two medium-sized legs. Yakitori (\$2.95), two skewers of chicken barbecued in a teriyaki sauce, was a tasty complement to the frog legs.

There are 25 dinner selections to choose from, each of which includes soup, pickled cucumbers or sunomono, choice of fried or white rice and green tea.

Koto sets itself apart from other Japanese restaurants with soup offerings other than the standard miso or light broth. On our recent visit, we were served a creamy cauliflower soup and on other evenings you may be offered cream of potato, clam chowder or corn soup. Miso is served on Sunday and Monday only.

My guest selected the top sirloin, tempura and yakitori combination (\$11.50), which arrived on a seeming gargantuan platter brimming with tender slices of teriyaki-seasoned beef and chicken, vegetables and shrimp tempura as well as a corn cob hunk and salad with French dressing. The feast was quite overwhelming as my companion remarked that the dinner could have served two.

The sukiyaki and tempura dinner (\$11.25) was deemed an equally splendid offering. Take advantage of two or more people on this selection, as it will then be prepared at your table. The sukiyaki bowl was filled with a generous portion of sliced beef as well as hunks of tofu, yam noodles, onions, scallions, mushrooms, eggplant and bamboo shoots, all in a savory broth. The tempura included shrimp, carrot slices, squash and broccoli with a light sweetened soy dipping sauce.

If you'd like to sample a little bit of everything from the dinner menu, the Koto Golden Combination (\$27.50 for two) includes shrimp tempura, beef teriyaki, lobster and vegetables. Ishiyaki steak (\$23.75 for two) is a meal with pizzazz as slices of New York steak and vegetables are cooked at your table on a superheated special stone.

Those searching for more traditional Japanese fare should turn to the back of the menu, where side orders include dried seaweed with wasabi (green horseradish), tuna filets with poi, broiled eel; tofu with soy sauce and a host of other delicacies.

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'Open Windows. . . ' Theater group gets audience involved

You know the feeling. You've just seen a play and you're exiting the theater feeling empty and unfulfilled. The production had no impact on your life; you're the same Joe that walked in the place a couple of hours ago. Happens all the time, right?

Probably not. But if you're looking to get a little more out of your theater life, say, a heavy dose of "global inter-dependence," or hands on experience with "creative group problem solving," Terry May and Richard Yorba just may have the dinner show for you.

They direct "Open Windows," a participatory theater company bent on getting the audience members to experience some sort of self-realization — to take something home other than the usual aching back and beat-up hands.

"We've done a lot of acting together," May explained. "We noticed that the audience wasn't coming away with the same intensity we had felt on stage."

So during an excursion through Caspers' Regional Park near Mission Viejo one afternoon a year and a half ago, May and Yorba came up with the idea of writing and producing plays in which the audience could passively participate. But don't confuse this "reach out and touch someone" brand of theater with the 1960s' type that thrust spectators into the spotlight, forcing them to interact with some wound-up performer they had never seen before in their life.

The idea here is to provide a harmless activity for audience members, who may choose whether to participate. For instance, the latest May-Yorba collaboration, "The Way Home," playing next

Thursday night at the Old World Restaurant in Huntington Beach, is the usual story about a group of people leaving their homeland in search of new surroundings. During the course of the journey, the migrants share memories through song and dance. Then at one point during the show, audience members are invited to share a personal memory with the person sitting next to them.

"We hope that people feel the atmosphere is safe enough to share experiences they may not otherwise share," Yorba said.

Each participant writes down the memory of his partner, rolls it up, ties it with a piece of ribbon and drops it into a central box. By the end of the play, it becomes clear that what's most important about creating a new home are the memories and traditions people bring to it. In celebration, the scrolls are hung on a Christmas tree by audience members, bringing the show to a close.

"In developing a show for the holidays, we wanted to do something to allow people to share joy with the ones they love," May said.

Other "Open Windows" projects include a nature walk through the woods and along hillcrests, with periodic stops to play games and interact with performers and musicians. In another piece, "Story of Hoops, Story of Fishes," Yorba and May use games, dance and drama and a variety of props to get participants involved in group communication and problem solving.

The productions are deliberately non-controversial, allowing for the broadest range of interpretation by participants.

"Every interpretation is right," Yorba stressed. "Whatever the audience creates is 100 percent theirs and magnificent."

\$200 Million Movie Giant Locks Out Projectionists, Forces Janitors to Strike

--WHY?

No matter what the marquee says, what's now playing at United Artists Communications theaters is a real horror show.

UAC, the second largest movie chain in the U.S., has embarked on a national policy of eliminating jobs, fostering unemployment in city after city where they own and manage theaters. In California, UAC employees who chose union representation are the primary targets of the company's greedy, crass "profits before people" corporate philosophy.

Within the last few weeks, UAC has locked out many of its southern California projectionists (members of the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees and Moving Picture Operators) rather than engage in good-faith bargaining. Management taunted these highly skilled and dedicated workers with a preposterous "final offer" that would mean:

- eliminating 50 to 75% of the projectionists' jobs
- cutting wages for many of the remaining employees
- arbitrary reassignments and changes in working conditions (i.e., forcing one projectionist to service up to 18 movie screens in two or three buildings that may be 24 miles apart).

Janitors in UAC's San Francisco-area theaters who belong to the Service Employees union have also been victimized by management. Forced out on strike more than a year ago because UAC won't budge from its demand for a total wage freeze, the janitors, too, are confronted with a hostile and inflexible attitude on the company's part.

UAC wants unconditional surrender, no matter what the consequences for workers, the industry or the area's economy. "Take it or leave it" is their basic "negotiating" stance.

UAC gives its employees no real choice. But moviegoers do have a choice of where to spend their entertainment dollars.

Carole Farley... Becomes widow for third time

PARIS (AP) — American soprano Carole Farley is a widow again — for the third time this year.

Her appearance in the lead role of Franz Lehar's "The Merry Widow," now previewing at the Theatre Musical de Paris, not only marks the third production of

the operetta in which she has appeared this year, but also the third language.

With so many thirds, one almost overlooks an important first: She is the first American ever to sing the role in France. She is also the only American in the cast.

To simplify matters,

Argentine director Alfredo Arias has jiggered things around a bit. The character of the widow is usually from the fictitious central European country of Marsovia. In the Paris production, however, she is from the United States.

In 1977, Miss Farley made her debut at the Metropolitan

Opera, singing the lead role in Alban Berg's "Lulu." It is one of the most difficult operas for sopranos, demanding much coloratura.

Her last American performance was in September at New York's Lincoln Center. She sang Mahler's Symphony No. 2.

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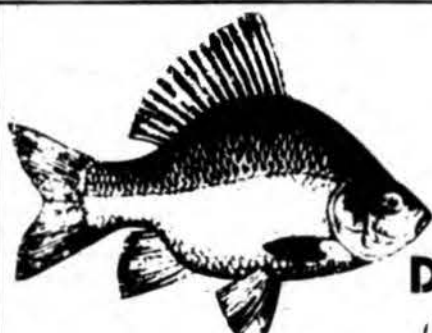
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Kim Carnes... 'Bette Davis Eyes' inspired album

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Kim Carnes cast few backward glances at her Grammy-winning "Bette Davis Eyes" when she went into the studio to make her next album.

"We were never in competition with that record," says Carnes, a slim blonde with sculptured features and a sandpaper-edged voice.

In fact, the singer-songwriter says the magnitude of her success with "Bette Davis Eyes" and the

"Mistaken Identity" album was inspiring rather than intimidating.

"We all had so much confidence from the success, and were so up from what happened last year, that we could hardly wait to get into the studio and make a better album," she said.

The result is an album called "Voyeur." It is a collection of songs that consolidate Miss Carnes' switch from the softer pop of

the five albums that preceded "Mistaken Identity," to a distinctive blend of rock 'n' roll and high-tech arrangements that she developed with producer Val Garay.

"Bette Davis Eyes," a ditty about a femme fatale who, like Miss Carnes, has hair of "Harlow gold" — platinum, like the late actress Jean Harlow — won song of the year and record of the year Grammys and dominated the

airwaves last year. "Mistaken Identity" was nominated for an album of the year Grammy, but lost to the John Lennon-Yoko Ono opus, "Double Fantasy."

With the possible exception of her 7-year-old son, there are few people in Miss Carnes' life who aren't involved in her recording career — a career that began two decades ago when she and a teen-age girlfriend rented a Sunset Strip studio to make a record.

Saying it big with flowers

The holiday season traditionally is one of the busiest times of the year for local florists. So why are Bill and Virginia Riach absent from their Huntington Beach flower shop?

The Riaches have been summoned 3,000 miles to help decorate a house for the holidays. A big house.

The White House, in fact.

Each year, between 20 and 30 florists from around the nation are selected to help decorate trees and create centerpieces for the holiday season at the presidential mansion.

Traditionally, the president of the Florists Transworld Delivery Association, FTD, is among those invited.

And this year, Bill Riach is president of the

20,000-member cooperative, which promotes flower sales and permits customers to order flowers for loved ones in other cities.

It's not surprising to find Riach is a strong believer in flower power.

"In the depths of the Depression, very few florists went bankrupt," he said. "Some people even gave up bread for a day so they could have a few flowers around."

Riach noted that flowers are traditionally associated with life's most important events, from births, to prom dances, to weddings to funerals.

"This is very much an emotional, sentimental business," he said.

Doing floral work at the White House promises to be a great emotional, sentimental experience for the Riaches. They flew to (See HB FLORIST, Page A2)

Christmas spirit stays afloat

Harbors along the Orange Coast soon will be alive with the Christmas spirit as boats and waterfront homes, decorated to the hilt, are showcased in a series of long-running holiday celebrations.

The oldest is the "Festival of Lights" in Newport Harbor, a parade that started in 1907 when a gondola owner strung lights on his boat and poled around the harbor.

The Newport Harbor Chamber

of Commerce took over the parade in 1919. It has run without interruption since.

The parade, now more elaborate with Christmas lights hooked to computers and animated devices on many of the crafts will run Dec. 17-23. Traditionally, up to 100 boat owners participate in the event and circle the harbor, passing decorated waterfront homes along the way.

Another holiday veteran is the

"Symphony of Lights" in Huntington Harbour, a parade that started 20 years back and is sponsored by the Huntington Harbour Philharmonic.

If the Newport parade leans more toward decorated boats, the Huntington parade spotlights the colorfully dressed homes clustered along the private waterways. It begins Tuesday and runs through Dec. 23.

The newest addition to the holiday lineup in the "Holiday Hi Lights" in Dana Point Harbor, a six-year-old parade that is held one night only, Sunday.

In Huntington Harbour and Newport Harbor, the best vantage spots are from the decks of sightseeing boats that operate nightly. In Huntington, proceeds from boat cruises go toward the Philharmonic's school music program.

In Dana Point, there are no public cruise offerings and spectators are advised to watch from docks, sidewalks or waterfront restaurants.

Newport also has a large selection of restaurants on the harbor as viewing spots.

Air curbs threaten CdM route extension

Construction of the Corona del Mar Freeway extension, scheduled late next year, would top a list of Orange County highway projects that could not be completed if federal clean air sanctions are reimposed on California's urban areas.

The \$10 million project — which would extend the freeway from Red Hill Avenue in Costa Mesa to transition to MacArthur Boulevard — would be "held up from going to the construction phase," explained Thomas Jenkins, executive director of the Orange County Transportation Commission.

U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Anne Gorsuch said Thursday in Los Angeles that she may renew federal sanctions on urban areas in the state that fail to meet air quality standards.

Gorsuch said the sanctions might be reimposed because the South Coast Air Quality Management District — which includes Orange County — is unable to meet 1987 air quality

standards for ozone and carbon monoxide in the atmosphere.

It was only two months ago, that Gorsuch lifted federal sanctions in the state after the California Legislature passed a statewide automobile pollution inspection program.

The federal sanctions, which would not go into effect for about six months, could block federal highway dollars as well as the funds for air quality or sewage treatment planning.

Besides the Corona del Mar Freeway extension, Jenkins said other highway projects that could come to a halt along the Orange Coast include widening of Pacific Coast Highway from MacArthur Boulevard in Newport Beach to Golden West Street in Huntington Beach and widening of Laguna Canyon Road in Irvine and Laguna Beach.

But Jenkins said the Corona del Mar project appears to be in greater jeopardy because construction was scheduled to begin there in 1983-84 while construction on Pacific Coast

Highway is not set until 1985-86. The Laguna Canyon Road project is not scheduled to begin until 1986-87.

He said other projects endangered by the imposition of federal sanctions would be those that are intended to increase the capacity of a highway, which would affect air quality.

Among projects affected by the sanctions recently lifted was the widening of University Drive in Irvine, on which construction had to be temporarily halted, Jenkins added.

Alarmed by the possibility that sanctions would be reimposed, Bruce Nestande, chairman of the Orange County Board of Supervisors, wrote President Reagan earlier this week urging that the Clean Air Act be amended.

Nestande alerted Reagan that California and Orange County could lose federal highway dollars generated by the proposed five-cent increase in the federal gasoline tax if the EPA sanctions are levied. (See FREEWAY, Page A2)

Marriott expansion gains

Newport planners OK new version of once-thwarted project

Plans for a 15-story addition to the Marriott Hotel in Newport Center have cleared a major hurdle with unexpected ease.

Newport Beach planning commissioners, meeting Thursday, unanimously recommended the city council approve the multi-million-dollar expansion.

City council public hearings on the proposal likely will begin early in 1983.

The plan to add 234 rooms to the hotel — a new and larger version of a project that was turned back a year ago — has met with little resistance.

However, Jean Watt, president of Stop Polluting Our Newport, said traffic studies for the project are lacking.

Watt, a leader in two recent referendums aimed at turning

back major developments, said she was not attacking the hotel plan and was not asking commissioners to deny or delay the project.

"I'm just questioning our planning process," she said. Watt claimed the city approves developments without taking into account traffic that will be generated by future projects in and outside the city.

The Newport Center Marriott, if expanded, would become the largest hotel on the Orange Coast at 611 rooms. The expanded facility would also include a ballroom, a video game room, a subterranean parking lot and a rooftop lounge.

In recommending approval, commissioners agreed that the Marriott should fund at least \$412,000 worth of street improvements.

City officials said the figure

could increase substantially if Marriott is asked to help fund widening a section of Pacific Coast Highway between Bayside Drive and Jamboree Road.

The widening project could result in eliminating 10 mobile homes at the DeAnza Bayside Village or a portion of Bobby McGee's, a popular restaurant on the other side of the highway.

The widening project would cost up to \$4 million, said Don Webb, assistant city engineer. The Marriott could be required to pay a portion of that amount.

The Marriott last year lost in its effort to expand the Newport Center hotel. At the time, the Marriott proposal was tied to the Irvine Company's master plan for enlarging Newport Center — a plan that was hit with a referendum and ultimately shelved by the Irvine Company.

In a gesture of goodwill, the Orange County Fair Board voted Thursday to offer free fair

tickets to people who can prove they paid to see the Old California Spanish Fiesta Days and Bullfights Oct. 13 and 14.

About 1,500 bullfight fans were turned away both days when promoter Ruben Bohorquez failed to come up with enough cash to pay for the bulls or the matadors.

Bohorquez told 300 spectators on Oct. 13 that the arena was too soft for a bullfight. The next day he told police, summoned to keep order among angry fans, that \$3,350 was missing. Bohorquez said he had no money for refunds.

Claiming no financial responsibility for the canceled bullfight, fair officials said they wanted merely to ease the loss suffered by fans, who paid \$5 to \$30 for tickets.

"I don't think we should give money because that would be giving state funds away," said board member Clint Hoose. "It's a good will gesture on our part."

Anyone wanting a free ticket to the 1983 county fair must send proof of purchase of a bullfight ticket to the Orange County Fairgrounds, 88 Fair Drive, Costa Mesa.

Fairgrounds manager Ken Fulk said he has received numerous inquiries from people who paid for but have not received refunds for bullfight tickets.

"Why have a gas tax increase if we can't take advantage of it?" Nestande asked this morning.

"They have written a law with standards there is no way we can attain — short of economic collapse," said the supervisor, a member of both the AQMD

board and the state Transportation Commission.

Nestande and other state officials have said the clean air standards are unfair because California, and 17 other states facing similar sanctions, cannot ever realistically meet them.

"Let's draft a law we can live with. We've made continuous progress for 10 years in cleaning the air. No one supports dirty air. Let's continue to pressure the auto makers to make cars that are more smog-free," Nestande said.

Bandit gets \$48,000 at Newport gem store

Police continued their search today for a sharply dressed gunman who left the owner of a Newport Beach jewelry store

handcuffed and gagged and strolled off with \$48,000 in jewelry.

The middle-age bandit, police said, entered the jewelry shop at the Newporter resort, 1107 Jamboree Rd., Wednesday afternoon, posing as a customer.

The robber pulled out a gun, handcuffed shop owner Shields Krutzh, 58, and stuffed a cloth in his mouth. The owner said the gunman then cleaned out all the display cases.

Krutzh was able to draw the attention of several hotel guests who notified police. Several persons said they saw a man matching the description of the bandit walking casually from the store.

Newport mobile home war grows

A bitter dispute between tenants and owners of a Newport Beach mobile home park escalated this week as residents filed legal documents seeking more than \$49 million in damages.

Renters at DeAnza Bayside Village allege owners are frightening existing tenants and scaring off prospective tenants with threats that the park soon will be redeveloped.

The legal documents, in the form of amendments to an existing lawsuit, claim owners also are gouging residents with excessive rent hikes, unreasonable tax bills and an annual surcharge.

The two sides have been wrangling for more than a year

and the activity has brought city officials into the fray several times.

Tom Peckenpaugh, an attorney representing the DeAnza Corp., said he has seen neither the amended complaint nor the original lawsuit filed last September. He declined to comment on the action.

The suit — in which class action status is sought — names 11 plaintiffs including Newport Planning Commissioner John Kurlander, a resident of the park.

The mobile home park, a neatly groomed facility with some waterfront spaces on the east side of the Upper Newport Bay, is on land owned by the Irvine Company but leased through 2013 to the DeAnza Corp.

Tenant spokesman Art Sullivan, who claimed his monthly space rent has gone from \$381 to \$730 in six months, said he is particularly angered by disclosure statements he said tenants are forced to show prospective buyers.

The disclosure, Sullivan said, quotes park owners as saying they want to redevelop the park by 1985. Sullivan said original leases signed by many tenants call for preservation of the park until 2013.

The amended complaint, filed by attorney Paul Morgan, city attorney in Westminster, seeks a preliminary injunction to halt the disclosure policy.

Sullivan, named as a plaintiff in the suit, charged that the

disclosures are not only "spoiling" sales but run against the grain of a new city law.

The city council recently imposed new zoning provisions on the 29-space park which prevents owners from redeveloping the park without first obtaining city permission. The zoning change also calls for owners to relocate some residents even if redevelopment is permitted.

Peckenpaugh, last summer, blasted the zoning change as an abuse and misuse of the city's zoning powers and said it deprives his client of constitutional rights.

Although it was widely predicted, the DeAnza Corp. has not taken legal action against the city.

Whaling Wall holds up

Laguna Beach airbrush artist Robert Wyland did a little touch up work this week on his Whaling Wall adjacent to the Hotel Laguna.

The mural maintenance was prompted by nearly two years of exposure to the salt air and an occasional chipping caused by automobile bumpers.

"Actually, it's holding up very well," Wyland said of his 200-foot long creation.

The 26-year-old artist, who specializes in realistic airbrush renderings of sea life, said he inspects the concrete "canvas" about once a year.

The wall painting has a protective coating of clear epoxy, but it is still subject to the environment, errant motorists and an occasional tossed rock.

The "Whaling Wall" was Wyland's first major wall project. Earlier this year he created a 45-foot long whale mural on a wall inside the Orange County Marine Institute in Dana Point.

Compensation for both projects came in the form of meager donations from passersby and supporters.

More lucrative are his sales of posters and original paintings of sea mammals he sells at the summer Sawdust Festival in Laguna Beach and several arts and crafts shows.

The wall murals were works of love and Wyland vowed to keep them in good condition.

Wyland said he'll have to recoat the wall with more epoxy in a few years.

when the king ordered that Jews no longer pray in the Great Temple, light Sabbath candles or study the Torah, the body of Jewish religious literature.

Those who challenged him came to be known as the Maccabees, which means "hammers."

After three years of warfare, the Maccabees recaptured the temple, but found that it had been damaged by the Syrians.

According to Kalir, the Jews set to work immediately repairing the great structure for its re-dedication. A cruse of oil was lit. And though there was little oil to sustain it, the flame burned for eight days.

Thus was born the tradition of lighting a candle to represent each day of Hanukkah. A nine-branched candlestick called the Hanukkiya was created. Eight of the branches represent the eight days of Hanukkah. The ninth represents the "Shamash," Hebrew for caretaker.

This evening, Hanukkah eve,

the first candle will be lit with the Shamash. On the second night, two candles will be lit. This continues until on the eighth night, all the candles burn brightly.

In addition to dancing, reading and games, gifts also are exchanged each evening, which makes Hanukkah the commercial equivalent of Christmas.

The similarities between the two December holidays needless

to say, end there.

Spiritually, Hanukkah is a rather unimportant holiday, unlike Christmas. "It is very minor, a very minor holiday," said Kalir.

Rabbi King of Newport Beach said Hanukkah was primarily a military-political celebration in its early years. Exchanging gifts, though a custom for hundreds of years, became more popular in America's commercial culture.

Though to children today it satisfies the joy of receiving gifts, Hanukkah means far more to their parents.

Today, Kalir and King said, Hanukkah symbolizes the successful battle for religious freedom. "The idea of the holiday is really a sublime one, a great one," said Kalir, a former Harvard University professor.

The success of the Maccabees, he said, is meaningful to all.

OCC president heads fund for scholars

Orange Coast College president Dr. Bernard J. Luskin has been appointed chairman of the board of the Hazel Cubbon Greenleaf Educational Fund.

The foundation, established in 1977, is supported through the estate of Hazel Greenleaf, a native of Santa Ana who served as a teacher and administrator in Newport Beach schools.

The fund presents scholarships to four high school seniors per year, allowing them to finance their entire collegiate careers through graduate school. Eighteen students currently receive Greenleaf scholarships.

Luskin, who became OCC's president last July, will serve as the foundation's chairman as long as he is the Orange Coast president.


