

Dial Torgerson: A Lagunan remembers

The woman friend on the phone said, "Have you heard the news?" and I said, "What news?" and she said, "Oh. How awful. I'll have to tell you."

And she told me. Dial Torgerson, whom I'd known since 1960, was dead, killed by a rocket grenade in Honduras, covering Central America for the Los Angeles Times.

I hung up and said to my wife, "Dial Torgerson is dead. He's been killed." And I told her what I knew, and she said, "The poor kids."

She does that, Bonnie does. She sees beyond the immediate moment to its consequences. How awful for the kids. Dial dead. Just two months earlier, Ellen Torgerson Shaw, divorced from Dial, the mother of their two children, Christopher and Jordan, had died of cancer. That time Bonnie had said

"Poor David." David Shaw, Ellen's husband.

I'm slower than that. I can't shake it as quickly. I had thought, two months ago, poor Ellen. Now, poor Dial. An enigmatic man.

I loved him, the way you do your close friends. Yet what I remember most are those moments when Dial Torgerson lost his urbane manner and turned very nearly primitive. Dial was real.

Slender yet deceptively strong. He ran, lifted weights, practiced judo, and kept himself trim and fit. Yes, he was witty, he had a puckish humor. Yes, he shared those tall tales of the old newspapering days at the Valley Times or the Associated Press. Yes, he had a homily for every occasion. He even had one for survival. "Never buy a gold watch from a man on a street corner. Never get into an argument with a man

named Lefty. And never, never, play poker with a man named Doc." That's how to survive.

A funny man and a not-so-funny man. And an elegant man, with that relic of his southern birth and upbringing. One morning when he was a reporter for the Daily Pilot, covering Laguna Beach, he called me to ask a question about a story he was handling. I had no time, so I told him I'd have to get back to him.

"It will take just five minutes," Dial said. "I can't," I said, "I don't have the time," and I hung up.

A few hours later, the story finished, Dial came to the door, white-faced with anger. Hatred, too, I think. I'd never seen him that angry. I'd never seen him angry, period.

How could I have turned him down? (See TO DIAL, Page A5)

Senate okays transit-tax vote

SACRAMENTO (AP) — Orange County voters could approve a one-percent increase in their sales tax to pay for highways and public transit under a bill passed Thursday by the state Senate.

The measure, SB 693 by senate Republican leader William Campbell, R-Hacienda Heights, would allow the Orange County Transportation Commission to levy a tax of up to 1 percent if it's approved by a majority of voters, the county board of supervisors and city councils representing a majority of city residents in the county.

Currently the sales tax is 6 percent in most of the state.

Campbell said the bill was badly needed to help finance county transportation projects.

"Trips to Disneyland are at stake," he quipped, meaning that badly deteriorating roads could keep people from visiting the amusement park.

Balboa Fun Zone project founders

Developer's money woes spark suits

A multi-million-dollar plan to redevelop the historic Balboa Fun Zone as a fancy Cape Cod-style office complex has become snarled in a series of lawsuits which could jeopardize the project's immediate future.

Suits have been filed by investors, a construction company and even the developer's former attorney. All allege they are owed money.

Though rumors abound that the property is for sale, a spokesman for the developer refused either to confirm or deny a sale is in the works.

"I wouldn't be able to tell you even if there was a sale pending," said Bruce Lurie, an attorney representing developer James Salter in his legal challenges.

The Fun Zone, a popular amusement center on Newport Harbor for more than 50 years, was stripped of its arcade games, merry-go-round and Ferris wheel late last year.

It now is little more than a collection of empty sheds and discarded machinery, encircled by a fence. A building which once housed a bumper-car ride remains, as does a miniature boat ride.

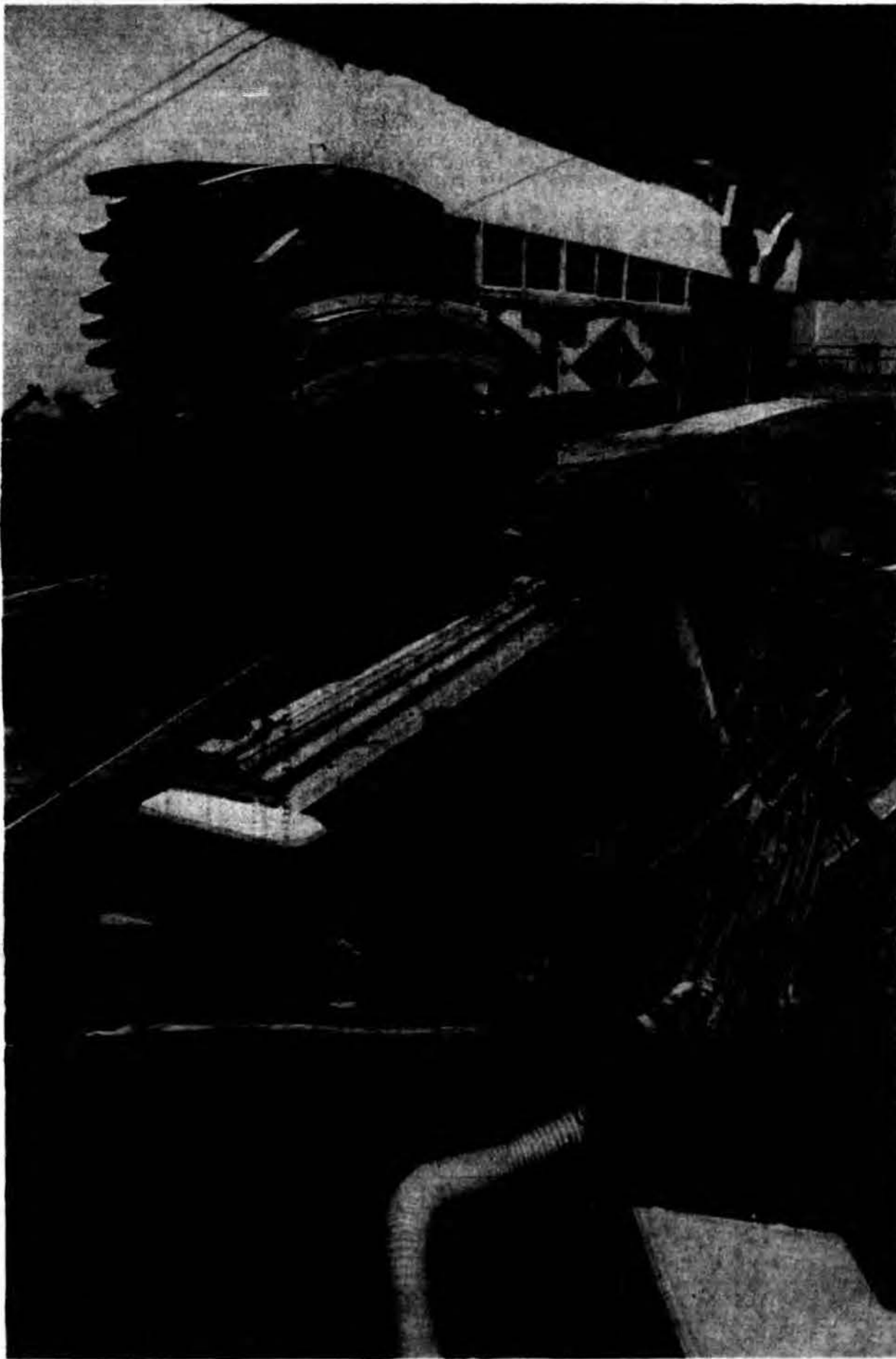
A row of fast-food outlets on the harbor side of the property is still open for business. Operators, though, said they don't know what the future will bring.

"The area's been hurt by this whole thing," said hamburger stand operator Millie Taillon, referring to the redevelopment scheme and media accounts of the arcade's demise.

Salter's ambitious plan for turning the Fun Zone into a complex of offices, restaurants and shops was greeted with enthusiasm last year and won easy approval from the Newport Beach City Council and the state Coastal Commission. City building officials, though, noted it now has been three months since they've heard from the developer.

"They were really pushing on it and then they seemed to just go away," said Ray Schuller, the city's building director.

Bid by AirCal employees to halt American

Claiming they are defending their jobs, an AirCal employees group filed suit in Orange County Superior Court Thursday seeking to block American Airlines from flying out of John Wayne Airport.

The lawsuit, which seeks no monetary damages, names both the Orange County Board of Supervisors and American Airlines as co-defendants. It asks that American's JWA flight operations be halted because the county failed to prepare necessary environmental impact papers before allowing the airline to fly.

A hearing on a preliminary injunction requested by the AirCal group has been set before Judge Bruce Sumner July 11.

"Our position hasn't changed. The more flights we lose, the more

jobs we lose," explained Wolfgang Czaja, a spokesman for AirCal Concerned Employees for Survival. Czaja is a first officer with the airline.

AirCal employees claim American's entrance at the airport jeopardizes jobs because the Newport Beach-based airline is forced to surrender some of its flight slots each quarter under the county's complicated access plan, which allocates flights among competing airlines.

Czaja said the new environmental report is needed because American's flights from JWA expose the public "to situations that can best be described as unsafe and, in extreme cases, may well become extremely hazardous."

Irvine schools to ask voters for tax boost

Members of Irvine's school board decided Thursday to hold a special meeting in 12 days before agreeing to ask voters in November to approve a special \$50-per-parcel tax.

The single-issue meeting, beginning at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 6, at Lakeside Middle School, will offer the public another chance to review the tax proposal, which would raise up to \$1.4 million, board members said.

After an hour of discussion, board members voted 4-1 to support trustee John Nakaoka's motion to call the special meeting. Trustee Buff White said the session wasn't needed.

Board members have until Aug. 12, the deadline for including ballot measures on the Nov. 8 ballot, to make up their minds.

The ballot measure would need two-thirds approval of Irvine voters to pass. If it did, the measure would be in effect for three years. A majority vote of school board members would trigger the tax collection each year.

The Irvine Unified School District's preliminary budget for next fiscal year, beginning in July, calls for spending \$46.9 million. Of-

ficials say the district will spend at least \$1 million of its reserves and may very well end up the year with only \$100,000 left in its operations budget.

Money collected through the tax would be used strictly for (See SCHOOL, Page A2)

representing the AirCal group, denied the lawsuit was filed as a harassment tactic against the competing air carrier. He said the suit was filed in the hope of obtaining a decision that would be just for all and decided on its merits.

David Lobb, an American Airlines spokesman, declined to comment on the new lawsuit. He said

airline executives and company attorneys would have nothing to say until they have had a chance to review the court papers.

American began flying four flights per day from John Wayne June 9 following a see-saw legal battle between the Board of Supervisors and the airline that bounced in and out of a federal courtroom.

The airline and supervisors struck a temporary accord June 14 when both parties agreed to drop all pending legal actions and sign a temporary operating agreement that permits American to fly from the airport through Aug. 31.

Orange County Superior Court records show that in recent months, developer Salter has been hit by lawsuits that, added together, seek in excess of \$2 million in damages. One of the plaintiffs, attorney Keith Fromm, won a preliminary injunction to bar disposal of proceeds from the sale of the property, which the suit alleged was imminent.

Fromm, in his suit, asserted he went to work for Salter on the promise he would earn interest in the Fun Zone and other development projects. The suit says Fromm resigned after coming upon alleged "irregularities and wrong-doings" with the business. It did not specify what these alleged "irregularities" were.

In another suit, San Diego residents Dennis and Nancy Bolger claimed they invested \$27,500 with Salter in a limited partnership. Two other couples in a separate suit claim they invested a total of \$110,000 with Salter.

In both cases, the plaintiffs

say they have been unable to determine if the partnership ever was formed or what became of their money. Each is seeking \$1 million in damages.

Still another suit has been filed by J.A. Stewart Construction Co. alleging Salter reneged on a \$300,000 promissory note.

Salter, listed as a Newport resident with his JBS Development Co. headquarters in Claremont, could not be reached for comment. His business phone number is disconnected and no new number is listed.

Lurie admitted his client faces heavy litigation and described the state of affairs at the Fun Zone as "extremely complicated with a very large cast of characters."

"But the suits don't really affect the development," he added. "He's just facing the kind of claims most developers do in the course of a job."

Lurie says he is certain the development will move forward, but with Salter playing only a minor role at most.

Newport man killed in wreck

A Newport Beach man was killed and a Costa Mesa man critically injured early today when their sports car spun out of control and careened into the center divider of the Riverside Freeway in Anaheim, authorities said.

Bradley Stevens, 22, of Newport Beach, the driver of the 1957-model MG, was thrown from the vehicle and struck by a second car. He was pronounced dead at the scene of the 4:40 a.m. accident, said officer Rick Stevens of the California Highway Patrol.

Robert James Tucciarone, 24, of Costa Mesa, also was thrown from the car and was listed in critical condition at St. Jude's Hospital in Fullerton early this morning.

The pair were traveling westbound on the freeway west of Raymond Avenue "in a reckless manner" at speeds exceeding 90 mph, officer Stevens said.

The driver apparently lost control of the car, which swerved into the center divider and overturned, throwing both men from the vehicle.

Walter Edwin Haverstock, 56, of Sun City, who was driving behind the sports car, swerved to avoid Tucciarone in the fast lane and struck Stevens, who was lying in the center divider, the CHP officer said.

He was pronounced dead at the scene. Tucciarone and Haverstock were taken to St. Jude's Hospital.

A hospital spokeswoman said that Haverstock was in stable condition with minor injuries early this morning.

FV Council bans what isn't there

Fountain Valley's City Council has given preliminary approval to a new law regulating escort bureaus and introductory services, even though no such businesses currently operate in the city.

City Attorney Alan Burns recommended the new law as a preventive measure. He said other Orange County cities have adopted similar regulations, prompting some "adult" businesses to move elsewhere.

Burns said such businesses often reopen in cities that have no regulations. Because Fountain Valley has none, he recommended adoption of the new law.

Escort bureaus are set up to provide social companions to customers for a fee. Some escort services have been linked to prostitution.

Huntington plane crash victims in fair condition

Two people injured in the crash of their single-engine plane Wednesday near Meadlowland Airport in Huntington Beach are in fair condition today at local hospitals.

The pilot, Linda Warren of Pasadena, is reported in fair condition at Humana Hospital in Huntington Beach.

A passenger, Brian Forstall, 28, of Temple City, also is in fair condition at Fountain Valley Community Hospital, where doc-

tors are optimistic over the photographer's chances of recovering completely from injuries to his left eye, according to a spokesman.

Investigators from the National Transportation Safety Board had still not released any information today regarding the cause of the crash. The plane came down in a residential area near the airport and damaged two homes, coming to rest in the backyard of one on Stallion Circle. No one on the ground was injured.

FV trash pickup charge going up

Fountain Valley home and business owners will begin paying more for trash pickups next month. City officials say the increase is related to higher landfill and transfer station charges approved by the Orange County Board of Supervisors.

Beginning July 1, Fountain Valley residents will be billed \$6.78 per month for each residential dwelling unit. Of this, \$6 goes to Rainbow Disposal Co., which contracts with the city for trash pickup, and 78 cents will go to the city for billing and processing costs.

City Comptroller Howard Longballa said this new monthly charge reflects a 71-cent increase attributed to the higher county disposal fees, and a 10-cent hike in the city's processing charge.

Monthly charges for commercial trash pickups in Fountain Valley also will increase in July by \$1 to \$18.25, depending on the size of the containers used and the frequency of pickups.

Additional trash-fee increases in Fountain Valley may be adopted later in the year.

One recent estimate projected that the county faced an \$8.1 billion shortfall in transportation funds over the next 15 years. A one percent sales tax hike would raise about \$5.7 billion in that period.

Sen. John Seymour, R-Anaheim, said he would vote for the bill. But he criticized the fact that it did not require a two-thirds vote of the people to take effect and that the tax did not have an expiration date.

Sen. Gary Hart, D-Santa Barbara, chided Campbell for proposing a majority-vote tax increase for streets when Republicans on a two-house conference committee were opposing giving taxing authority to school districts.

A 32-2 vote sent the measure to the Assembly.

\$859 billion budget plan calls for more high taxes

WASHINGTON — An \$859 billion budget blueprint approved by Congress calls for more taxes, more domestic spending and less military spending than sought by President Reagan. The House and Senate on Thursday OK'd the budget plan completed by congressional negotiators on Monday. Reagan says the compromise could stall economic recovery and weaken national defense because it calls for \$73 billion in higher taxes over the next three years, multibillion-dollar increases in domestic spending and half the military spending boost he wanted.

NRC urges firing of TMI officials

WASHINGTON — The owner of the Three Mile Island nuclear plant closed four years ago should fire its three top officials as a condition for reopening the facility, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission says. Commissioner Victor Gilinsky said Thursday that continued shortcomings in the performance of General Public Utilities Corp. "make it apparent that the conditions that led to the accident at TMI Unit 2 have not been cured."

U.S. to withhold U.N. financing share

WASHINGTON — The State Department says the United States will withhold its share of the financing of a United Nations conference on Palestine because the conference likely will be biased against Israel. "We regret that the prestige of the United Nations is being exploited for this ill-considered purpose, which does nothing for the cause of peace or indeed for the Palestinian people," a department statement said Thursday.

Combat pay asked for conflict areas

WASHINGTON — Rep. Pat Schroeder, D-Colo., and 34 other House members are asking President Reagan to provide combat pay for U.S. military and civilian personnel in El Salvador and Lebanon. The \$65 per month stipend for military personnel and the allowances for the civilians would cost the government less than \$2 million a year, she said.

State rejects jobless pay extension

SACRAMENTO — The state Assembly has rejected a bill to loosen requirements for a state program of 12 weeks of additional unemployment benefits during the first half of next year. The vote Thursday was 39-35, with 41 votes needed for passage. The program, called Cal-Ed, pays unemployed workers who have used up their regular unemployment benefits.

Gays to get damages for attacks

SACRAMENTO — In the second victory for gay rights in two days, the state Assembly has voted to allow \$10,000 in damages for victims of violence based on sexual preference.

The measure went to the Senate Thursday on a 42-29 vote, without debate. It would allow a victim of physical injury or property damage inflicted because of sexual orientation, age or disability, to sue the attacker for \$10,000, in addition to actual losses.

Teens 'should be tried as adults'

LOS ANGELES — More teen-agers should be prosecuted and sentenced as adults, says District Attorney Robert H. Philibosian. Under current state law, no one under 16 can be prosecuted as an adult. Juvenile Court judges are empowered to refer some 16- and 17-year-olds to adult courts. Philibosian told the Juvenile Court Law Revision Commission Thursday that the age limit should be lowered to include 14- and 15-year-olds. He said his proposal would apply to youngsters who have committed "certain very serious felonies such as murder, arson with bodily injury or gang rape."

Dairy drops \$80 million lawsuit

POMONA — Alta-Dena Dairy says it has dropped an \$80 million suit against the state in exchange for a new test that should end frequent recalls of the dairy's raw milk products. State officials say the new process, if it proves effective, can determine "almost instantaneously" if salmonella bacteria exists in products. Salmonella organisms can cause death in some rare instances.

Severe quake hits China-Viet area

HONG KONG — A severe earthquake measuring 7.6 on the Richter scale occurred along the China-Vietnam border today, the Hong Kong Observatory reported. A spokesman said preliminary analysis of seismograph readings indicates that the center of the quake was near the border between Vietnam and China's Yunnan province.

Syrian government expels Arafat

DAMASCUS, Syria — The Syrian government expelled PLO chief Yasser Arafat today, a Palestinian official said, and a grim-looking Arafat immediately left Damascus for an undisclosed destination. The ouster came after Palestinian officials reported that rebel Palestine Liberation Organization forces ambushed and killed an undetermined number of Arafat's men during the night.

Pope's visit may lift martial law

WARSAW, Poland — High-ranking Polish officials say Pope John Paul II's pilgrimage could prompt a full lifting of martial law, perhaps as early as July 22, Poland's post-war Independence Day. Martial law, declared on Dec. 13, 1981, was suspended conditionally last Dec. 31 under legislation that left about 200 factories and plants "militarized" and imposed tight new social controls to prevent a fresh challenge to Communist authorities.

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Challenger is home safely

Shuttle does it perfectly — except in California

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE (AP) — Space shuttle Challenger, rerouted on its 96th orbit, went around the world two extra revolutions today and glided without fanfare to a sunrise landing on the familiar bed of Rogers Dry Lake in the California desert.

Florida's overcast skies, and traditional agency caution, foiled NASA's plan to send the shuttle to its first Florida landing.

"Challenger, wheels down," reported commander Robert Crippen as the 100-ton winged shuttle touched the centerline. After six days in space, four men and America's first lady of space, Sally K. Ride, were back on Earth.

"The good news is the beer is very, very cold this morning. The bad news is that it is 3,000 miles away," ground controller Guy Gardner told the flight crew as Challenger rolled to a stop.

"That's what I was afraid of," Crippen replied.

His crew included pilot Rick Hauck and mission specialists Ride, John Fabian and Dr. Norman Thagard. Their boss said Flight 7 was the shuttle's best yet.

President Reagan telephoned his congratulations from the White House, calling it a "wonder-

ful mission," and telling the astronauts, "All of America was watching you up there and what you accomplished."

Ride cited the crew's pride in deploying two satellites and re-landing and retrieving a third, but added, "The thing that I'll remember most about the flight is that it was fun. In fact I'm sure it was the most fun I'll ever have in my life."

Challenger pierced clear skies onto runway 15, a hard-sand strip on the Mojave Desert, at 6:57 a.m. Pacific time.

By any measure, the flight had been a success and Ride's performance — the first American woman to fly in space was a workhorse on scientific and mechanical tests — had to be a powerful endorsement for female astronauts.

"It was a superb mission in every way, and Sally's role was a history-making role," said NASA's shuttle director, James A. Abrahamson. He said the mission was the best so far.

"I imagine the most disappointed person of all is Bob Crippen," he said. "He had practiced long and hard to accomplish this (landing) milestone."

Kayoed veto rule riles Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court, by striking Congress' authority to veto executive decisions, lobbed a shell across the street into the Capitol that people on both sides agreed will set off a historic revision of the way government works.

The decision "reflects a profoundly different conception of the Constitution than that held by the courts which sanctioned the modern administrative state," Justice Byron White said of the 6-3 decision.

The court decision, which brings the checks and balances features of the Constitution into focus more clearly than most rulings do, deals with the so-called legislative veto.

Under that procedure, Congress delegates to the president and executive branch agencies authority to carry out certain laws with the proviso that one or both houses will get a look at specific decisions and rules and countermand any they don't like.

The court majority, led by Chief Justice Warren E. Burger, held that the procedure short-circuits the way the Constitution says laws must become law: by passing both houses and being subject to presidential veto unless both houses subsequently muster a two-thirds majority to override the president.

In essence, the court said once Congress delegates authority to the executive branch it relinquishes its power to ride herd by any short-cut oversight devices.

Ban on mail condom ads overturned

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court ruled today that the government may not ban the mailing of unsolicited advertisements for condoms and other contraceptives.

The ruling frees drug companies to promote contraceptive products by mailing brochures to homes throughout the country.

In the 8-0 decision, the court said a federal law restricting the ads that sprung from a morals crusade more than a century ago violates constitutional protections of free expression.

The court rejected the Reagan administration's position that the law prevents material on contraception from "falling into the hands of children against their parents' wishes."

court decision that Congress lost any of its basic right to make law, only that it can't use the legislative veto as a technique. Congress began using such vetoes in 1932 and the practice has become increasingly popular in recent years.

Many suggested the ultimate result of the ruling will be that Congress will put even more constraints on the executive branch by writing laws with less flexibility.

The court opinion contained an appendix which outlined 56 active laws that have provisions affected by the ruling.

They include the War Powers Resolution, under which the president may be instructed by concurrent resolution to remove U.S. forces engaged in foreign hostilities, and restrictions that make the Defense Department gain congressional approval for major arms sales to foreign countries.

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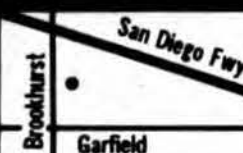
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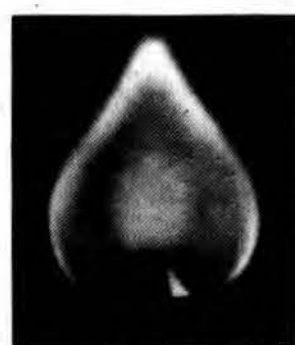
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To Dial Torgerson getting the story was important thing

That wasn't what friends did. I apologized, told him I would have got back later. But that didn't help. He wanted to punch me out, I think, except my wife was standing there, and she would interrupt every so often. He had to turn to her, in his best southern manner, and speak respectfully to her, deferentially, before he again turned to me, in his white heat. It passed, though from that moment I was aware there was more to Dial Torgerson than pookish humor. He was a man suited to war.

I was to see his anger a few other times. Once very unimportantly. He called one day and said he had two tickets for the Angels game; did I want to join him? We went. When the game ended, we left the stadium and got into Dial's VW bug, and I watched the anger again. He drove the bug into a tiny opening in the slowly departing crowd, his face very intent. He was a competitive driver. When we drove through the Canyon, he never bothered to flick off his high beams, even in the face of oncoming traffic.

Then when he dropped me off, he said, "Thanks for coming along. That was fun, wasn't it?" He smiled his full boyish smile. My knuckles were still white when I went inside.

The other moment was important, terrible, tragic. After their son Chris was born, Dial and Ellen had another child, a little boy named Hunter, after Dial's brother. One day Ellen went into the bedroom and the infant Hunter lay dead, victim of sudden crib death. That evening, in one of those macabre scenes out of a bad southern novel, the Torgersons' cat, a tiny, misshapen animal, wandered outside where a pack of dogs cornered the dwarfed cat and tore it to shreds.

For Dial, trying to hold in the pain, this was too much. He picked up a loaded pistol and ran outside, ostensibly to find and kill the dogs. He raced to the corner, in the night, and then helplessly shook his hands and the loaded pistol at the sky.

He came back, shaking, and he said, "I didn't want to kill those dogs. I realized that I wanted to kill God. But I didn't know how."

And so my wife said the other night, when we learned of Dial's sudden violent death in Honduras, "At least he died doing what he loved doing. If he could have picked a way to die, this is what he would have chosen."

Yes. Not just covering a war. But doing a story. Any story. Being in the middle of something happening. Getting it down. Getting it right. He was a wonderful reporter, an even better writer, and an even-better-than-that thinker. Get the story. That was what counted. More than friendships, more even than marriage. More than anything. Get the story. It ruled him.

When Dial worked for the Associated Press, he would commute from Laguna in that tiny VW bug, driving up in the morning rush-hour traffic, driving home in the evening rush-hour traffic, and he would arrive exhausted, slowly being eaten alive by the commute. But he had to do it, because that is how he could then do his stories. He and Ellen loved Laguna, didn't want to leave. That's why Dial went to work for the Pilot; it was handy. But he really wanted a job in the city. So when the Times called, he went to work in

Los Angeles, and the Torgersons moved out of Laguna.

Even when he moved, it was an assignment he had to do perfectly. He didn't just move into a house, he either built the house (he drew plans as well as an architect and did much of the physical building himself) or he would buy an old house and then tear it apart and re-do it. When it was redone, he'd sell. Ellen would suffer silently, and then not so silently; she wanted a place she could call home. Dial never understood. He built a house in Laguna, so they'd have someplace to live while he built a bigger house. He bought a great old house in Echo Park, and then had to fix it over, and of course sold it, and built another house in Silver Lake. Houses were like stories. You did one, so you could get to the next.

Lest you get the idea Dial was inconsiderate, you read him (and me) wrong. He needed a big house, for instance, because two families lived there. An upstairs, downstairs situation. Dial and Ellen had taken in a young woman from Mexico, to take care of the house and the kids, while Dial went off to work, and later, Ellen too. The housekeeper's ne'er-do-well husband would show up once a year or so, just long enough to impregnate his wife. It would be Dial who would take the woman to the hospital when it was time to deliver her child, and it was Dial who saw that she was comfortable, and who paid the bills. When one of the two boys came down with tuberculosis, Dial took care of the bills again, and it was Dial who made the woman and her boys as much a part of the family as his southern upbringing could.

But when he heard about the opening for a bureau chief in Kenya — his first overseas assignment — Dial said yes before he and Ellen even had a chance to discuss it. Everybody packed in a minute, Dial, Ellen, the two children.

Ellen had nothing to do in Kenya; she'd left behind a very good job with Mayor Bradley. Now she grew bored; she went home; the marriage began to come apart. Who knows how Dial felt? He went from Kenya to Jerusalem, from there to Mexico. He followed war. He wrote about Idi Amin. About Begin, and then, about El Salvador, Nicaragua, Honduras.

His news stories were perfectly even-handed, the most lucid of writers. Sometimes on Sundays or on other days on the Op-Ed page, he would speak out more subjectively. Yet even then his opinions were weighted with fact, not frenzy.

He was the coolest man I ever knew. And perhaps the hottest. Enigmatic. He had his homilies for survival. Naturally he ignored them.

Police still hunting escaped rape suspect

A man accused of rape, who eluded a police dragnet on Balboa Island Wednesday, escaped earlier this month from a minimum-security facility outside Los Angeles, where authorities admit he never should have been lodged.

The sought-after man, Michael Eric Gonzales, escaped June 3 from an honor ranch in Saugus where he was serving a 28-day sentence on drug, drunken driving and theft charges, according to Lt. Lee Davenport of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

Davenport said authorities had no idea Gonzales, 23, had been charged with raping a Balboa Island woman earlier this year.

Police in Newport Beach said they believe Gonzales returned to Balboa Island this week, possibly looking for the 24-year-old woman who alleges he raped her. Several island residents reported seeing a suspicious person wandering the island and later identified the person as Gonzales after being shown police photographs.

Newport officers sealed off the island Wednesday, checking cars and going house-to-house on several streets. The man thought to be Gonzales was not found and the search was ultimately called off, police said.

The Peter J. Pitchess Honor Rancho, where Gonzales had been placed, was described as a working ranch with cattle and barracks for prisoners. A fence circles the ranch.

Pesticide date should be public

After the first disclosures in 1978 that the lab results of hundreds of pesticide safety tests submitted to state and federal agencies were invalid—often because they were based on fraudulent data—federal law was amended to require EPA, the Environmental Protection Agency, to release safety and efficacy data to the public on request, provided the manufacturing processes and other genuine trade secrets are not compromised. EPA itself obtains the data from manufacturers of such products when they apply for registration for their products.

To protect manufacturers, the law states that where data regarding manufacturing processes are included with safety studies—which is rarely the case—it must be purged from the information EPA makes publicly available. The law also requires applicants for such information to certify by affidavit that they are not agents of multinational companies (which might be able to use it in seeking registration for their own competing products in foreign countries) and will not submit the data to them.

Now, for similar reasons, Assemblyman Lloyd Connelly, D-Sacramento, is carrying legislation, AB 2033, requiring CDFA, the California Department of Food and Agriculture, to make safety and efficacy studies submitted to it under California law available to the public under the same conditions.

CDFA opposes the bill, saying its implementation would be administratively difficult and legally risky, since disclosure of certain kinds of information could subject it to damage suits by manufacturers. But the federal law has been upheld by the courts against challenges by manufacturers and appears to be working well. In addition, the Connelly bill gives CDFA more reliable standards on which to base disclosure than it has now.

Most important, the risks of which CDFA warns hardly offset the advantages of a system in which the public—and particularly independent scientists—have an opportunity to check safety studies submitted by manufacturers. Since CDFA frequently requires data pertaining to pesticide use in California on California crops—data not submitted to EPA—a good deal of the data CDFA possesses is not available elsewhere.

It would, of course, be easier simply to assume that whenever a public agency like CDFA certifies a certain product as safe, it is in fact safe under the conditions for which it was approved. But experience in the past generation—most dramatic, the scandalous episode in which some 1,600 studies submitted by one of the nation's largest testing laboratories, now closed, turned out to be invalid—has indicated that that assumption is not always justified. Safety studies are required precisely so that the public can be assured that toxic materials are used safely. Disclosure, subject to limits protecting trade secrets, insures that the information supporting that assurance is, in fact, accurate information accurately used. Connelly's bill is scheduled to come up on the Assembly floor Monday. It deserves to pass.

The trunk of a car has many of the same kind of items in it that

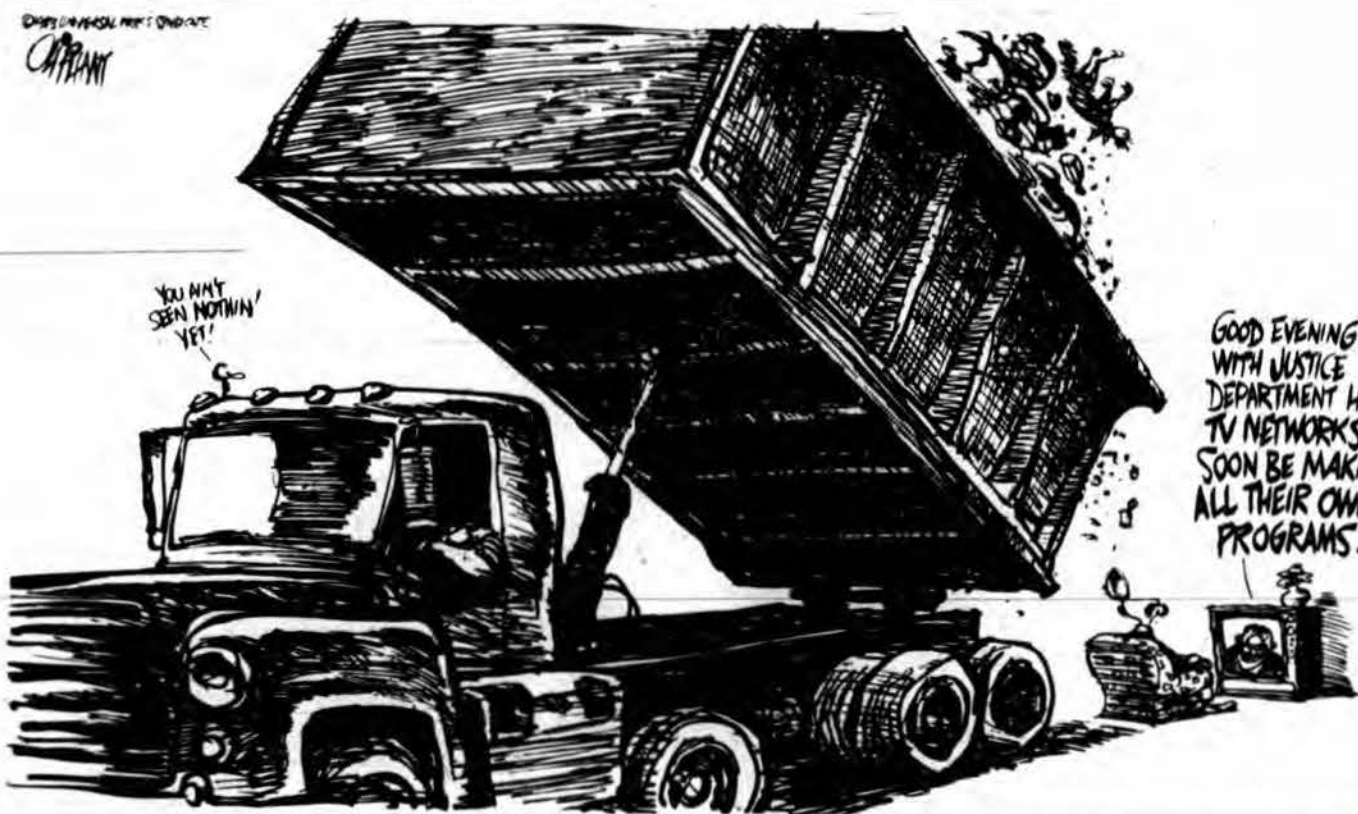

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New ideas on glacial history of Antarctica

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new look at some old rocks has produced a surprising cache of small fossils that scientists say could redefine the glacial history of Antarctica.

The wide variety of ancient marine fossils were discovered in rock samples from throughout the longest mountain range in Antarctica and scientists said Wednesday that the find may change current thinking about ice movement on that continent.

The microscopic fossils, which range in age from 2 million years to 70 million years old, were in sediments gathered along 1,000 miles of the 1,900-mile-long Transantarctic Mountain range, the National Science Foundation announced.

Researchers from Ohio State University told the foundation, which sponsors the research, that the fossils show that glacial movement on the continent has been more frequent than previously believed.

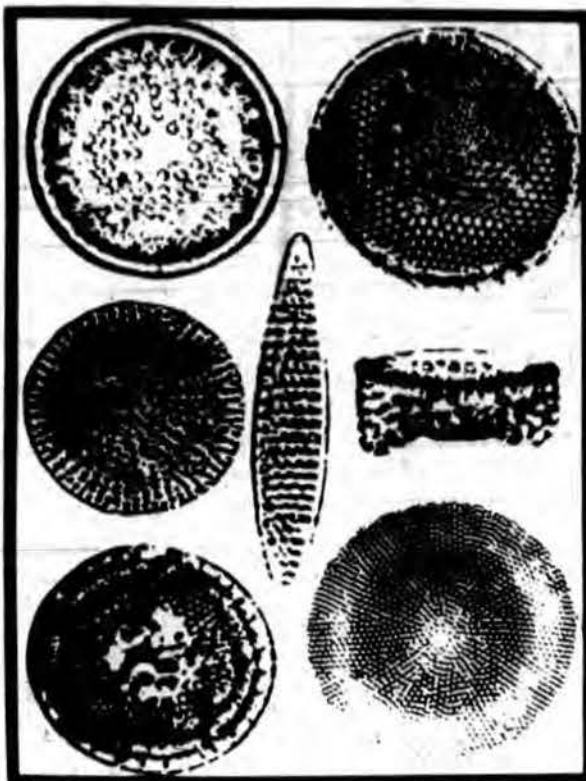
Dr. Peter N. Webb said the fossils apparently were carried up the mountains by advancing ice sheets and left there when the ice receded. The fossils mostly represent the remains of single-cell plants such as diatoms and tiny animals known as plankton.

The microfossils were found in areas between 7,000 and 9,000 feet above sea level along the mountain range, which divides the frozen continent into East and West Antarctica.

The sediment samples in which the fossils were found were brought back from Antarctica in 1964 by Dr. John H. Mercer of Ohio State. But the samples were studied for geological purposes and the small fossils were not noticed until a recent re-examination, Webb said in a telephone interview.

"We've had the samples for 20 years, I'm embarrassed to say," he continued, "but we only recently looked at them for microfossils and were amazed by what we found."

"The presence of these microfossils suggest that over many millions of years, large areas of the vast East Antarctic Ice Sheet expanded across the East Antarctic land mass, overlapped major mountain

chains and extended across the continental shelves," Webb said.

During periods of glacial recession, he said, shallow seas apparently were formed across large areas of the continent.

Webb said most of the fossils probably were carried up the mountains in the bottom few hundred feet of glaciers thousands of feet thick. These fossils probably were scooped up from faraway interior basins as the ice sheets passed by.

Housing bills get state OK

Balloon payment warning, \$4 million for homeless in package

SACRAMENTO (AP) — Bills to require advance warnings when "balloon payments" for mortgages are due, and to provide \$4 million to house "the new homeless," were approved Thursday by the state Assembly.

The bills were part of a seven-bill Assembly Democratic housing package. All bills were sent to the state Senate.

A squabble broke out between two Democrats over the bills, which backers said would boost the housing industry.

The balloon warning bill, introduced by Assemblyman Tom Hayden, D-Santa Monica, was amended by Assemblyman Tom Bane, D-Tarzana, on behalf of the lending industry.

Bane said the bill was not needed, and accused Hayden of sponsoring it only for political gain.

The bill, AB1600, is aimed at helping home buyers who use "creative financing" to solve the problems of high interest rates and large monthly payments. Creative financing often leads short-term loans with low monthly payments but giant final payments of all or nearly all the principal, called balloons.

Before Bane's amendment, the bill would have required a lender to disclose in the note the due date and size of the balloon payment and explain that it might not be refinanced or extended, and then send out a notice 60 to 150 days before the payment was due.

Ford out of surgery

RANCHO MIRAGE (AP) — Former President Gerald Ford is resting comfortably after undergoing urologic surgery at Eisenhower Medical Center, his spokeswoman says.

"He's just fine. The operation was routine and accomplished without incident," staff assistant Terri Ms. Rocovich said Thursday after the operation by Ford's physician, Dr. Don Wasserman.

Ford, 69, will remain at the center for four to five days of recuperation following the elective surgery which lasted less than an hour, she said.

But the amendment, approved 42-19, would eliminate the disclosure of the due date in the note, and require a notice to be sent out 90 to 120 days before the due date.

Bane said banks, savings and loan associations and other lenders needed the time change because Hayden's 60 to 150 days conflicted with federal law and would subject lenders to lawsuits. Hayden agreed to that change.

Bane said the initial notice was already in current law. Hayden disagreed and said its removal would "water down the consumer protection aspects of the bill."

Later, Bane said Hayden wanted to sponsor the bill to gain political points with consumers.

After adoption of the amendment, Hayden said, "I would have preferred a stronger bill. I'm new around here. I don't like to see us so closely following the concerns of the industry. I'd rather see us follow the concerns of consumers."

The amended bill was approved 60-13.

Another bill, AB1363 by Assemblyman Byron Sher, D-Palo Alto, would give local governments and experienced non-profit groups like the Salvation Army \$4 million to help people who have become jobless and homeless because of the recession.

Sher said thousands of people, many of them young and educated, are living under highway overpasses, along riverbanks and in cars and campers, as they search for work.

But Assemblyman Nolan Frizzelle, R-Huntington Beach, opposed the bill because he said some of the help might go to aliens.

The bill was approved 54-24.

Another bill would require cities and counties to allow more housing if the region or state needed it, overruling "no-growth" plans or initiatives. The bill, AB1597 by Assemblyman Jim Costa, D-Fresno, was approved 44-26.

Costa said that cities and counties were no longer opposed to his bill.

But Assemblyman Tom McClintock, R-Thousand Oaks, said it was "the latest effort to usurp local control."

Rowland also recently was one of three researchers to share the \$150,000 Tyler Prize in ecology and energy.

Calathea the 2nd chance plant

They call the Calathea "The Second Chance Plant" because it will struggle back to its attractive self after neglect or mistreatment. "They" are Steve and Susan Griffiths, a husband-and-wife team who founded and operate Griffith Greenhouses at Plymouth, Fla., specializing in Calathea, with its bright leaves. "Calathea will adapt to your care," says Griffiths. "Should you forget to water your plant and the leaves turn brown, just trim the damaged areas. New shoots will develop in about a month." But remember, cautions his wife, a registered nurse, "Plants are living things and if neglected completely will not survive. But, if given a chance, with minimal

water, light and fertilizer, they will fight to survive—just like you and me."

At the original 3,000-square-foot greenhouse opened in 1975 and now grown to 51,000 square feet, they "are bringing the little known tropical Calathea into the world of home and office decorating as it has never been before—in new leaf shapes and coloration." Recently they bought 22 additional acres for possible expansion.

But they are content to stay with Calathea for now, saying, "We are the only volume producer in the U.S."

The plant is native to African jungles. There are 40 or more varieties. The Griffiths consider many of them for propagation, and concentrate on a few they believe

will be popular with householders and for offices.

The Calatheas spread through the greenhouses have bright, elongated green leaves with white, darker green and brown stripes. Many of the leaves have burgundy or light green back sides. The Griffiths are working to develop tough, leathery leaves.

A veteran fisherman, Steve turned from marine biology to the land because he likes it. He has searched South and Central America for Calathea varieties and found one leaf pattern on one side of a mountain, with another pattern on the other side. He is working on a miniature series with leaves only 2-to-3 inches long. Regular plants have leaves up to a foot long.

Although the Ornamental Horticulture Department has been part of Orange Coast College for more than a decade, few people are aware of its diverse aspects.

It probably is best recognized for its educational excellence in the field.

The courses offered are well versed and detailed, and range from such topics as landscape design to plant propagation and plant diseases.

However, what has gone unrecognized in this department is the simplistic beauty and tranquility of the landscaping.

The flowers and foliage are raised and maintained entirely by the horticulture students, and such

annuals as petunias, coleus, impatiens and camillias flourish in vibrant colors on the Costa Mesa campus.

Also on the premise is a California native plant garden, comprising a variety of species of plant life native to our golden state and is compacted into a distinguished outdoor display.

The sidewalks are unique as well. Each section is paved with a distinctly different type and texture of paving, which illustrates the various forms of landscaping design.

Two temperature controlled greenhouses store numerous student projects, with a third greenhouse, constructed entirely by the students, proposed to be completed by September.

Surrounding this is what seems like acres of grass with picnic tables and a barbecue pit.

"To our knowledge," says John Lenanton, assistant division chairman and associate professor of ornamental horticulture, "there is nothing like it (the department) in the city of Costa Mesa."

The Ornamental Horticulture Department welcomes visitors. Gates are open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and are closed weekends and holidays.

Submerge pots

If you want better than average results from potted plants, try submerging the pots in water every so often to let the root ball get thoroughly saturated.

With only top watering, the root ball is apt to dry out slightly and shrink away from the walls of the pot. This permits water to run down the root ball and out the drain hole before it really has much of a chance to do any good. You might think such plants are getting all the water they need, but actually they are dying of thirst.

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Kentia ideal for indoors

The Kentia palm is a graceful indoor plant that can evoke thoughts of the tropics.

As a houseplant, it can be enjoyed at any height from 6 inches to 6 feet or more. It prefers a bright but indirect light and normal home temperatures. Avoid setting it in a cold, drafty corner.

Watering should never be over done, and the saucer should not remain full of water for any length of time. A barely moist soil that is maintained on a constant basis is ideal for the Kentia.

The palm is a slow grower, gaining about 6 inches a year under ideal conditions. It is well known for its hardiness and its unique vase-shaped growing pattern.

Remember to feed this palm once a month with a well-balanced houseplant food from early spring to early fall.

GARDENERS CHECKLIST

•Delete garden hot spots. Plant deciduous trees that will provide shade in summer and allow the warmth of the sun's rays to filter through the window in winter.

•By all means plant more dahlia tubers now. These will give you fall bloom when others set out earlier are dying back.

•Be sure to hit the undersides of the leaves when spraying plants. If you don't, some insects and diseases may escape the spray.

•When planting tomatoes, set them deeper in the ground than they were in the nursery containers. This will prevent weak, leggy plants.

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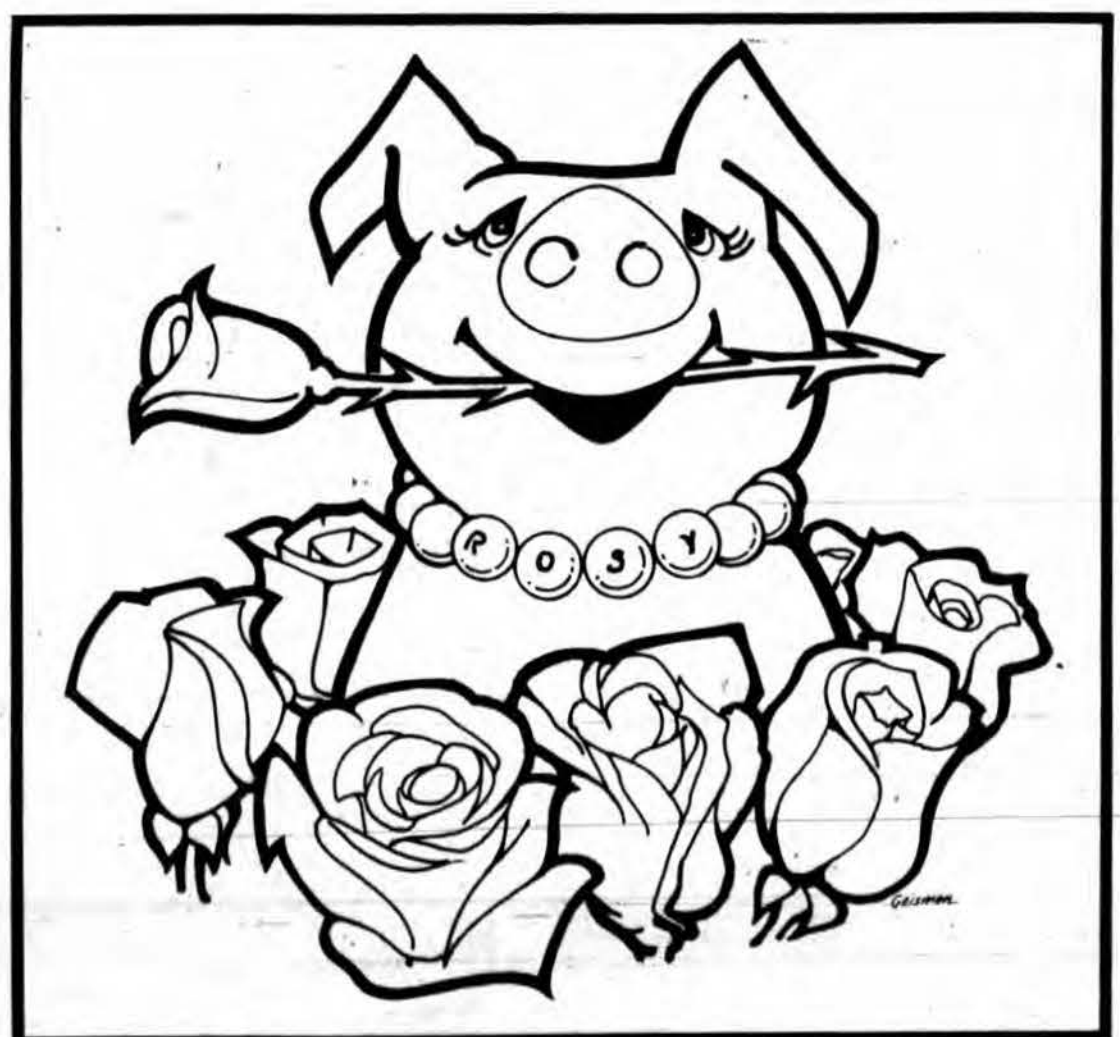

Olympics preview on tap at Coliseum

LOS ANGELES — Members of the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee will watch with great interest when some of the top track and field athletes in the world test Coliseum's new running surface this weekend at the Times/T.A.C. Summer Games.

The International Summer Games are being held in conjunction with the U.S. vs. German Democratic Republic meet. Events are scheduled for Saturday and Sunday for both meets. Action actually began today with finals in the International Summer Games in the women's discus and javelin throw and the men's long jump, hammer throw and 10,000-meter run.

But the bulk of the action begins Saturday with the U.S.-GDR meet, starting with the pole vault at 2 p.m.

Both meets have lured some of the top athletes in the world to the site of the 1984 Olympic Games. Among the U.S. participants facing the GDR are former UC Irvine distance runner Steve Scott, Mary Decker, Carl Lewis, Evelyn Ashford, Edwin Moses and Ben Plucknett. Besides the U.S. standouts, world class athletes from no less than 31 countries will be on hand for the International Games, which begin after the meet with the East Germans on Saturday at 5:45 p.m.

H.D. Thoreau, commissioner of athletics for the LAOOC is predicting big things on the new running surface. "We feel this track will be as good or better

than any track in the world. It is similar to the track that was installed in Munich in 1972 and they established 31 world and Olympic track and field marks that year," says Thoreau, a Laguna Beach resident.

Among the athletes hoping to take advantage of the new surface is Edwin Moses, who comes into the international meet unbeaten in 75 straight 400-meter hurdle races. The world record holder says he wants to break the 47-second mark. His world mark, incidentally, is 47.13.

The last time Moses suffered a defeat was back on Aug. 26, 1977 when West Germany's Harald Schmid beat him.

Joining Scott, Decker, Ashford, Moses and Plucknett in the meet against the East Germans are

Tom Petranoff and Dave Laut, among others.

The U.S. team will be looking to avenge a 207½-172½ loss at the hands of the GDR last year in Europe, the only time the two nations competed in a dual meet.

In that meet, the U.S. men won their portion, 120½-102½, but the U.S. women fell, 105-52.

U.S. women's coach Terry Crawford has a solid squad joining Ashford and Decker, including quarter-miler Denean Howard, sprinter Chandra Cheeseborough, hurdler Sharrieffa Barksdale, long jumper Carol Lewis and high jumpers Louise Ritter and Pam Spencer.

Sunday's action begins with the continuation of the U.S.-GDR meet at 9 a.m. and the conclusion of the international competition at 3:25 p.m.

Remember: Last is still in the race

Remember your early school days when they used to pick teams during physical education?

Remember how embarrassing it was for the person who was selected last?

Well, if you can relate to that experience, then you can empathize with John Tuggle.

A National Football League selection in April's college draft, Tuggle had the disconcerting distinction of being the last player picked.

There were 334 players chosen before the Cal running back. The New York Giants were the culprits who made Tuggle No. 335.

Actually, when you think about it, we're talking about a double-edged sword here. On the one hand, it is a considered honor to be drafted. Just ask the thousands of college football players who weren't as fortunate.

On the other, though, how can someone justifiably be proud of the fact, or boast about for that matter, the fact he was overlooked by a total of 28 teams on 334 separate occasions. "Yeah, for a short time there I was embarrassed," says Tuggle frankly, who is in town this week celebrating Irrelevant Week, a spoof originated by the demented mind of Paul Salata (only kidding about the demented part Paul) which annually honors (or is it dishonors?) the NFL's bottom selection.

"But I've kind of gotten used to it now. I'm not really disgusted about it or anything. The way I see it it's better late than never. I mean I'm only 335 out

Tuggle is the first to admit he might as well enjoy it while he can because there's certainly no advantage in the NFL to players who come to camp with triple-digit draft numbers.

"I've got my back against the wall," acknowledges Tuggle of his task ahead. "I know I've got to come out scratching and fighting. But hopefully I'll be able to impress some people a little bit."

"I actually feel I have the same shot as anybody else. It's just a matter of capitalizing on the opportunity." (See REMEMBER, Page B4)

Evert-Lloyd upset, shocked by Jordan

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Kathy Jordan, playing the match of her career, shocked Chris Evert Lloyd 6-1, 7-6 today, knocking the three-time Wimbledon champion out of the famed grass courts tennis championships.

It was the first time in Lloyd's career that she had failed to reach at least the semifinals of a Grand Slam event.

The victory, her first ever over the second-seeded Lloyd in six career meetings, sends Jordan into the fourth round at the All-England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club.

Jordan rode her strong serve-and-volley game to an easy first-set destruction of Lloyd, who was attempting to win her fourth consecutive Grand Slam event. Then, in the second set, Lloyd appeared to regain her form, rushing out to a 4-0 lead, breaking Jordan in the first and third games.

Is the first step taken for Orange County's emergence into NBA?

Jim McDaniels has a long-range vision. The former Los Angeles Lakers center, now living in Huntington Beach, truly believes Orange County will house an NBA franchise one day.

"This area is certainly big enough," he rationalizes. So as a small, very small step toward that direction, McDaniels has formed a summer basketball league.

"I've always wanted to start a league," says McDaniels, who last played in the NBA with Buffalo in 1977-78 (the year before the club moved to San Diego). "There used to be a league here, but it folded (in 1980)."

"I just felt we needed one, so I decided to try it." The league, which plays every Wednesday and Thursday nights (8:45 and 8:15), and all day Saturday (starting at 10 a.m.), consists of eight teams.

Some of the participants include Gig Sims (former UCLA center who spent last season in Italy), Ron Knight (last with Portland), Irv Kiffin (formerly with San Antonio), Billy Pauls (currently with San Antonio, Mark Eaton (currently with Utah) and, of course, McDaniels. There are 80 players in all.

"Hopefully, we'll have something here so that this can go on every summer," says McDaniels. "This year, our first, we have eight teams. I originally planned for six."

And the cost to get into the league wasn't cheap, either, as teams had to fork up \$850 (or \$1,000 if they wanted the league to furnish uniforms).

"We don't charge admission to the games," notes McDaniels, adding that the contests are played at Jerome Recreational (See FIRST STEP, Page B8)

Despite the slump, Dodgers' lead hefty

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Former Los Angeles Dodger Steve Garvey thinks maybe his new club, the San Diego Padres, have "turned a corner," as he put it.

The Padres completed a four-game sweep of their series with the rival Dodgers with a 7-5 victory Thursday.

Even with the losses, the Dodgers are still hanging on to the National League West lead by four games, but they're hardly playing like a team in first place.

Another error, the Dodgers' ninth in the four-game series, is what did them in, not Garry Templeton's home run, or Garvey's either. And the error, by third baseman Pedro Guerrero, helped overshadow Ron Roenicke's biggest day in the majors: two home runs and four RBI.

"It was nice, but it would have been better if we'd won," said Roenicke.

It marked the third time over the years the Padres have swept a four-game series from the Dodgers, but the first time they've done it in Dodger Stadium. In fact, the Dodgers hadn't been swept in a four-game series at home in seven years,

since Cincinnati did it in August of 1976.

That was in the days of The Big Red Machine.

Now, what about a Big Brown Machine?

"This is another plateau for us," Garvey said after the Padres extended their longest win streak of the season to six. "This was something special, beating the Dodgers, and now we've got to keep it going in San Francisco."

This isn't the same Padre club the Dodgers won three of four from last month in San Diego.

"Now," explains Manager Dick Williams, "we're healthy."

The Padres are also considerably healthier in the standings than they were when they arrived Monday, as Dodgers Manager Tom Lasorda admitted.

Asked how much the Padres have improved, Lasorda replied, "They must be improved. They beat us four in a row. They came in here 12 games behind and now they're eight behind. Yeah, I'd say they've improved."

Dave Dravecky, at 11-4 the winningest pitcher in the majors, earned the win, but needed help from relievers Luis DeLeon and Gary Lucas.

NHL adds overtime to regular season

QUEBEC — The National Hockey League's Board of Governors voted Thursday, to use a five-minute overtime period to break ties during regular-season games.

By a 14-5 vote, the governors approved a resolution presented by Quebec Nordiques President Marcel Aubut for the extra period that will commence as soon as the teams have changed ends following the end of regulation play.

On the final day of the two-day meeting, NHL Commissioner John Ziegler also announced that the 1984 all-star game will be held in the Meadowlands, home of the New Jersey Devils. The Calgary Flames will play host to the 1985 game, while the 1986 game will be held in Hartford, home of the Whalers.

Ziegler said the governors spent most of the four-hour meeting discussing the legal tangle surrounding the St. Louis Blues, the league's ownerless franchise. He declined to comment on what was discussed but said the board will meet again on July 21 to examine proposals to purchase the club.

Aubut said overtime was important for the fans.

"The main point of the motion was that this is the fans' wish; they're the kings — they pay the players' salaries and they pay our salaries," said Aubut, who had lobbied vigorously for the proposal. "The essence of sport is to have a winner and a loser."

The turbocharged engine, which displaces 1487 cc, produces 100 bhp at 5200 rpm and 114 ft-lbs of torque at 3600 rpm. In comparison, the standard 1600 cc Pulsar NX engine develops 69 bhp at 5200 rpm and 92 ft-lbs of torque at 3600 rpm.

The engine uses Nissan's fuel-injected ECCS (Electronic Engine Control System). The system measures the temperature of the engine coolant and the ambient air, the position of the number-one piston in relationship to top-dead-center, vehicle speed, throttle valve position, intake air flow, and composition of the exhaust gas to determine optimal fuel mixture and spark advance settings for the operating conditions.

The system includes a three-way catalytic converter, a knock sensor and an automatic idle speed control. The computer that controls the ECCS system is roughly the size of a cigar box and is located under the driver's seat.

The general upgrading of the car has been carried into the suspension and brake systems, with firmer shock absorber valving and damping, higher spring rates and enlarged rear brake drums. Special tires help put the NX Turbo's power and handling onto the pavement.

In the dance, favorites Carol Fox of Westland, Mich., and Richard Dalley of Wilmington, Del., took first place.

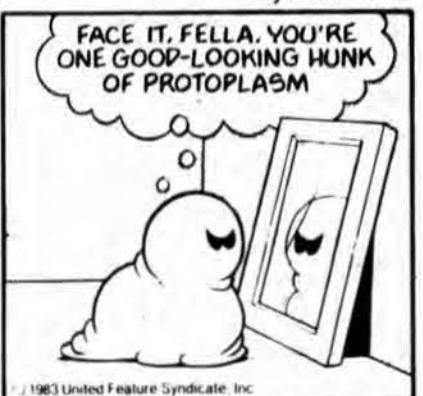

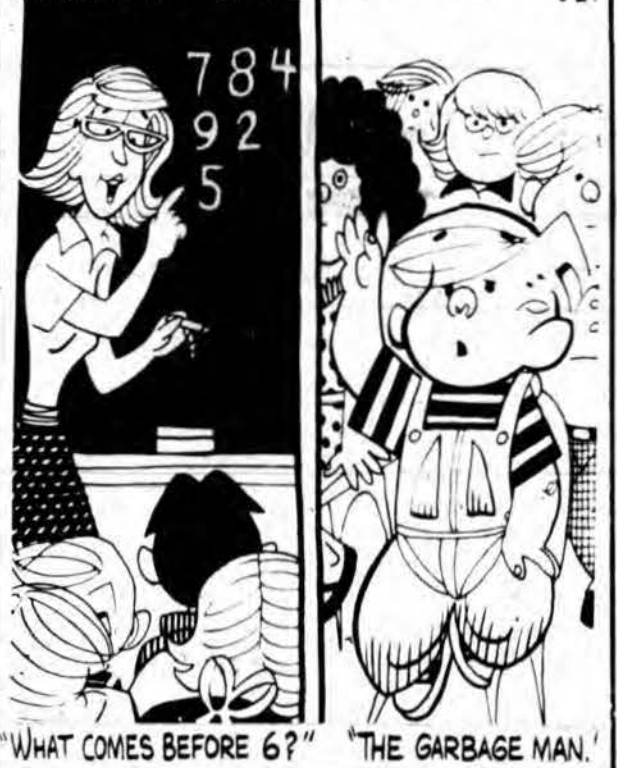

As you might guess from its name, an end play usually

occurs late in the play of a hand, after considerable groundwork has been laid. But sometimes an opening leader might, in effect, be end played at trick one. Or declarer might even maneuver an end play at such an early stage.

The auction was routine. North had intended jumping to two no trump had South responded in a suit. So when South chose one no trump as his initial action, North jumped to game.

West's choice of opening lead cannot be described as a stroke of genius. While North might hold a four-card major suit, South had denied having one. East was therefore an odds-on favorite to have at least one four-card or longer major suit, and

West might have tried to hit partner's suit rather than attack a suit in which the opponents had to have length.

The careless declarer might win the first trick and try finesses in both majors and in clubs for his contract. While the club finesse would succeed and declarer would make three tricks in the suit, both major-suit finesses would fail and declarer would end a trick short.

The thoughtful declarer realizes that, if West's lead is fourth-best (and there is no reason to doubt it), he can claim his contract. All he need do is allow East's jack of clubs to win the first trick. East is end played there and then. If he returns a major suit, he gives declarer a free finesse and an extra trick in

that suit. If he leads a diamond, he gives declarer a second trick in diamonds. That, along with three clubs via a finesse, and two in each major suit, proves to be just enough to land the no trump game.

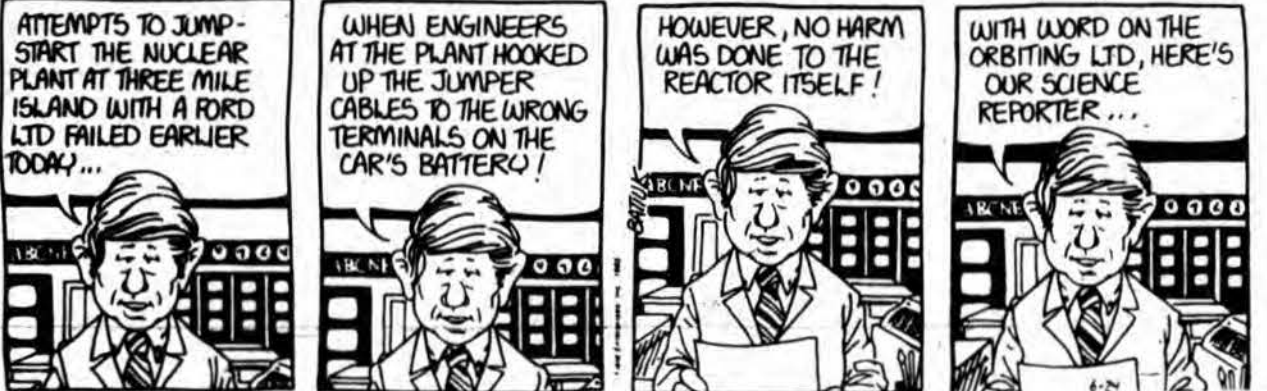

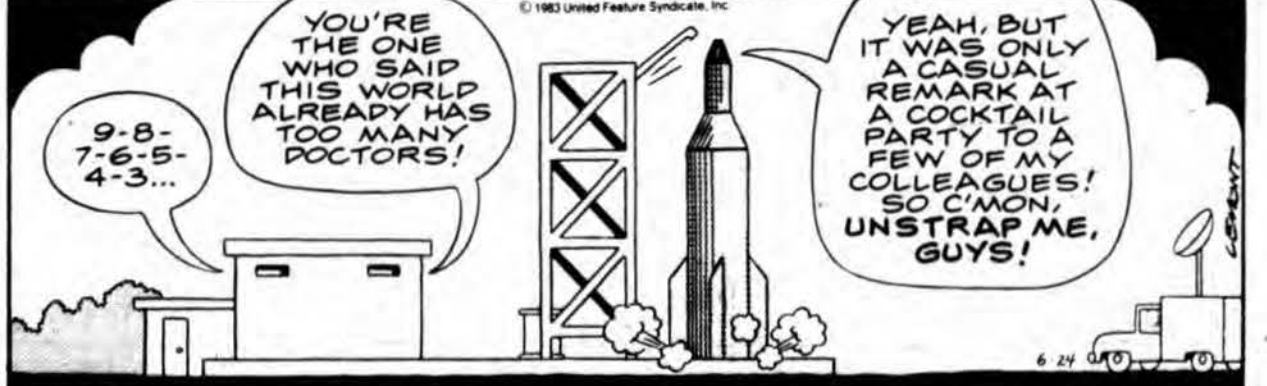

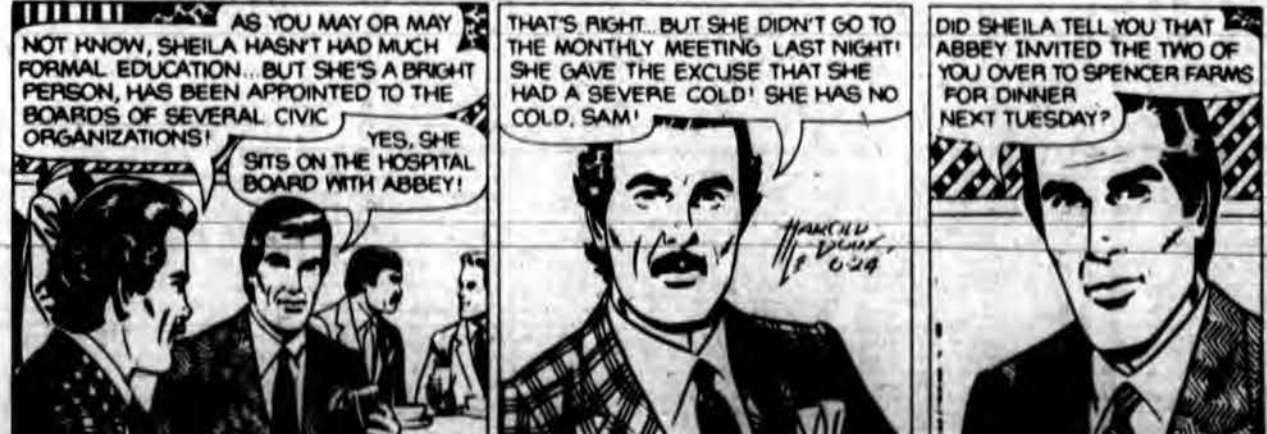

'Tough love...' Mother shouldn't control adult daughter

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I was greatly upset by your response to the woman whose mother telephoned all over town looking for her and then raised the roof because she hadn't told mama where she was going. That daughter was a grown woman with children.

I, too, had a controlling mother — so controlling that she made suicide attempts when I couldn't visit her because of my own family's needs. After several years of therapy I realized that my mother's pathology was not my problem, and I did not have to be a part of her sick game-playing.

An adult woman is under no obligation to tell her mother where she is going whenever she leaves the house. When her mother calls to scold her for being inconsiderate and thoughtless, she should say, "I refuse to allow you to treat me like a child," and hang up on her. That woman was not responsible for her mother's sickness and you should not have advised her to play along so Mom could have "peace of mind." Sometimes grown children have to use "tough love" on their parents.

DEAR DENVER: Your approach to the problem was better than mine. Sick people should not be allowed to manipulate others just because they are unwell. Thanks for saying it so well.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: In August I will be a bride. It should be the happiest day of my life, but I am dreading one part of it and desperately looking for a way out.

My husband and I will stand on the steps of the church and more than 100 relatives and friends will plant kisses of congratulations on our faces. The thought of all those mouths slobbering makes me sick.

Must I paste a smile on my face and go through with it? Is there a tactful way to keep well-wishers from kissing me? Please be sensitive to my anxiety. It's real.—TERROR UNDER THE VEIL

DEAR TERROR: I know of no gracious way for a bride to avoid being kissed by well-wishers on her wedding day. Keep a pretty lace handkerchief in readiness to wipe up the sloppy ones, although I doubt that there will be many. If you become increasingly anxious, see a counselor.



YOUR HEALTH

DR. PETER J. STEINCROHN

DEAR DR. STEINCROHN: I appreciate the need for preventive medicine. I've reached my 40th birthday. Like many, I'm celebrating a birthday party, plus a recent physical checkup to make certain that the "old man" is in pretty good shape. My doctor gave me a welcome report with one exception. He says that I have borderline high blood pressure.

I asked him what that meant. Would I need special treatment? He said that my pressure varied within normal limits. That made it borderline. He didn't believe, under the circumstances, that he should prescribe anti-hypertensive medicines. My question is this: Isn't it safer to take medicine for hypertension at the beginning rather than wait until it's real high? My doctor is somewhat of a drug nihilist so I wonder: am I losing valuable time by not taking the blood pressure pills? Mrs. L.

DEAR MRS. L.: If there were no questions about your diagnosis, I'd agree that the earlier you began treatment the better off you'd be, but there's a question here that must be answered first. Just what does your doctor mean by "borderline" hypertension? Doctors don't always agree on when high blood pressure is actually present.

Has your blood pressure been fluctuating? Is it sometimes 140-160 systolic and 90-95 diastolic? And then down again? This might be called borderline. About one in five adults at any age fall into this group. According to Steve Julius, M.D., of the University of Michigan Medical School, we're not justified in treating borderline cases routinely because only a few develop true hypertension. What's important is to take repeated readings, preferably under normal conditions such as in the home. Even when relaxed at home, one-third will average out normal readings; one-third will remain borderline, and one-third will show truly elevated pressure that requires treatment.

Your doctor seems to agree with the treatment suggestions of Dr. Julius and many other physicians. Be thankful that your blood pressure is within normal limits.

FOR MR. S: Opinion about what is the normal level of cholesterol varies. Some doctors are satisfied if it isn't higher than 250. Other are satisfied with readings around 225. A recent

meeting of cardiology experts came to the conclusion that the optimum level should be somewhere between 160-190. They believe that such levels would reduce heart disease.

However, others disagree. For example, Basel Rifkind, M.D., Chief of Lipid Metabolism Branch of the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute says, "To date, no study has actually shown that lowering cholesterol is of benefit in preventing heart attack." The point I'd like to make is this: don't be too proud about having a cholesterol level of 250 and therefore feel safe in smoking two packs a day. Perhaps tobacco is a greater enemy than your cholesterol level.

DEAR DR. STEINCROHN: This is a comment for Miss X., the miserable short girl. I am 5 feet, 1 1/2 inches and yet I am a very happy person. I think it's great to be short. My advice is accept your height. Why spend your one life upset about your height? Wouldn't it be a boring world if all of us were the same height? Mr. W.

Marines shot in hostage drama

Incident is triggered when alleged gunman goes 'berserk'

CAMP PENDLETON (AP)—A Marine began shooting wildly at 350 fellow Marines during target practice and wounded a private before he was overpowered and shot by three Marines he had taken hostage in an abortive escape attempt, authorities say.

None of the hostages were hurt.

The alleged gunman, identified as Lance Cpl. Jay D. Jackson, was taken to the Naval Regional Medical Center at Camp Pendleton Marine Corps base, where he was reported in stable but guarded condition early today.

Jackson, 18, of Indianapolis, apparently went "berserk" Thursday and opened fire with his M-16 rifle while a Marine infantry unit was on a base rifle range,

said 1st Lt. Russ Thurman, a base spokesman.

Pfc. Denny E. Bailey, 19, of Bearfield, Ohio, was hit in the lower left leg during the initial barrage of bullets as other Marines engaged in the requalification training dove for cover, Thurman said.

Bailey was treated at the base medical center and later released.

Thurman said the gunman apparently went "berserk" and suddenly began firing. "Any Marine who would open fire like that on his fellow Marines is not normal," Thurman said.

Immediately after the shooting, the gunman forced the hostages — a Marine driver, the officer in charge of the rifle range and the officer in charge of the requalification detail — into the

van, Thurman said.

But military police converged on the scene and blocked the escape route, Thurman said. At that point, one of the hostages, 2nd Lt. Kevin P. Murphy, grabbed the Marine's loaded rifle. During the struggle over the weapon, Chief Warrant Officer-2 James A. Craig shot the abductor in the upper body with a .38-caliber pistol, said Thurman.

Requalification training is a regular course that all Marines go through once a year to maintain their shooting proficiency, Thurman said.

He said Jackson was assigned to the 2nd battalion, 7th Marines, 1st Marine division, based at Camp Pendleton, which is located halfway between Los Angeles and San Diego.

Murphy was the officer in charge of the requalification detail and Craig was the officer in charge of the rifle range. The driver was identified as Cpl. Anthony S. Trout, also a member of the 2nd battalion, 7th Marines.

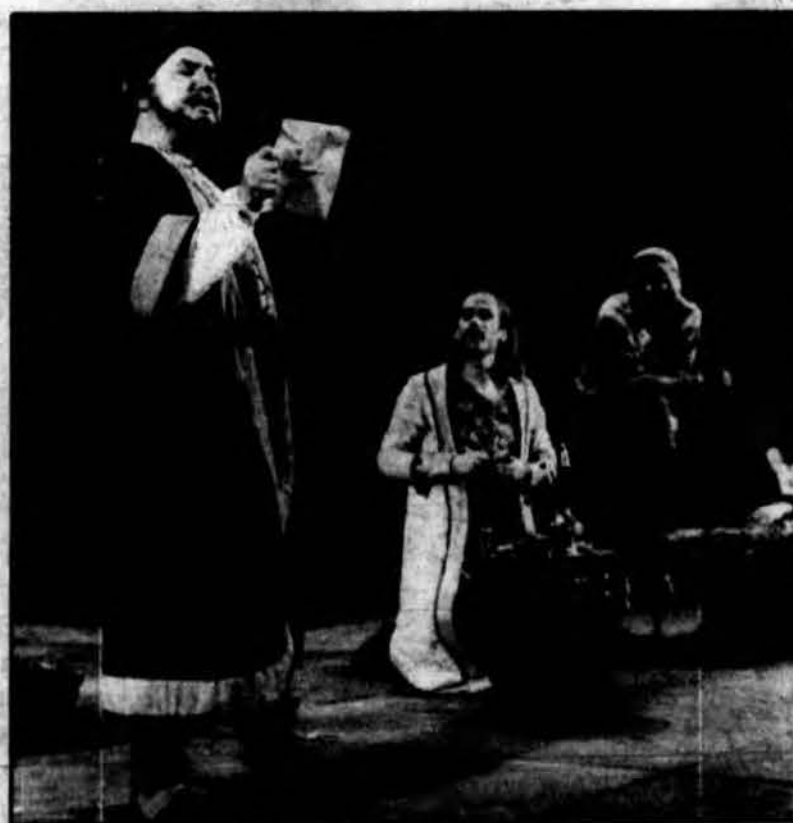

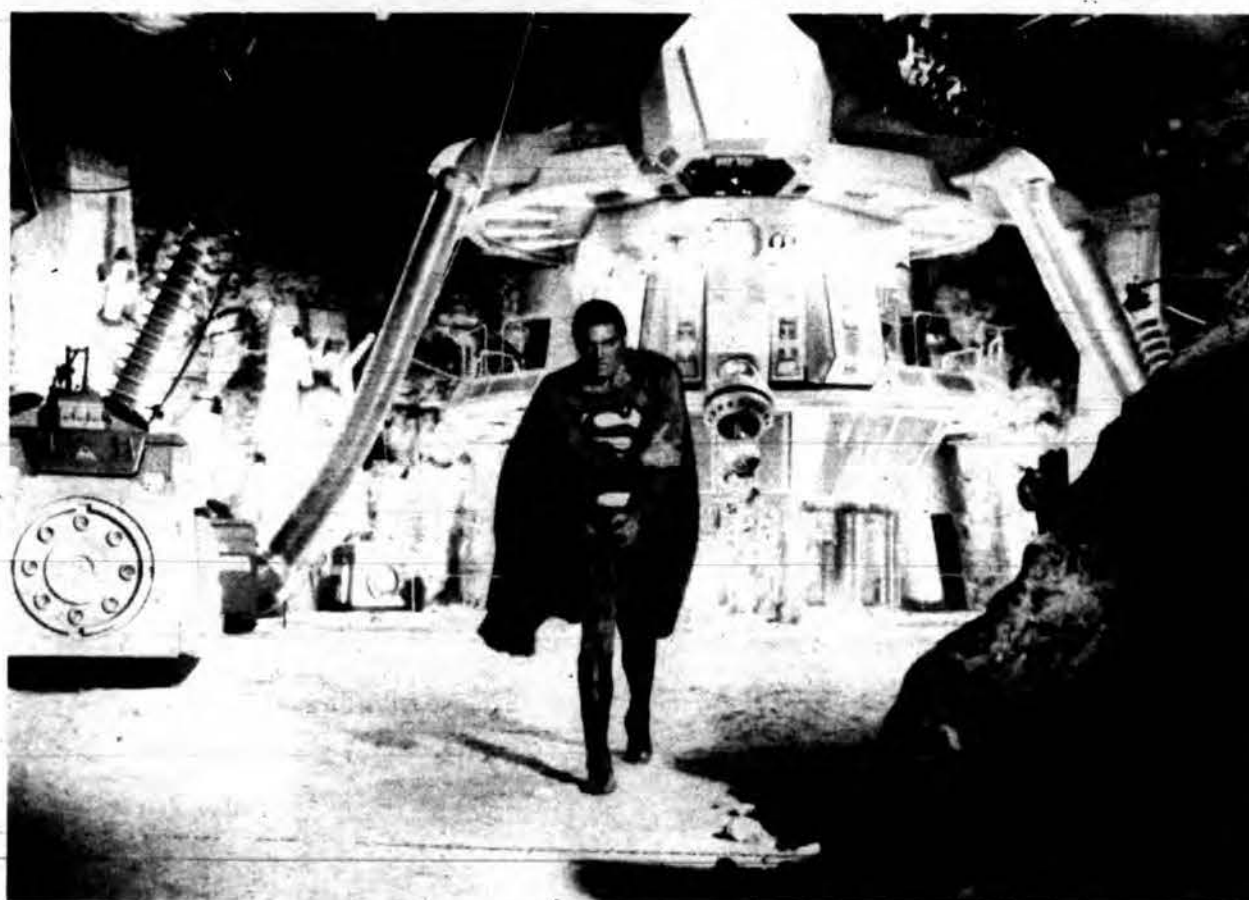

The Man of Steel shows an 'evil' side

"Superman III" is a super-disappointment.

The world's most popular flying hero is grounded in this outing by a witless script full of misguided ideas on how to inject fresh sparkle into the series. After all, the super do-gooder has already saved the planet twice. Where does he go from here?

The "Superman III" script, by David and Leslie Newman, is a catalogue of bad screenwriting decisions. The Newmans' worst offense was to make Superman a secondary character in his own movie. They have shifted the emphasis here to a villain portrayed by Richard Pryor.

This might not have been such a deadly decision had the Newmans had come up with an interesting, original bad guy for Pryor to have fun with, the way Gene Hackman did with Lex Luthor. Unfortunately, Pryor's Gus Gorman, an unemployed dishwasher who discovers he's a computer genius, is little more than a bumbling wimp. He never presents a very grave threat to the Man of Steel.

The Newmans' other mistake involves Superman's new romance with Lana Lang, the girl Clark Kent grew with in Smallville. (They become reacquainted at a class reunion.)

One of the more delightful elements of the first two "Superman" films was the edgy love affair between the hero and Margot Kidder's quirky, assertive Lois Lane. The tension — and humor — was generated by Lois' infatuation with the Man of Steel and her utter disinterest in Clark Kent. At the same time, Superman had to weigh his attraction to a mortal woman against his responsibilities to the world.

In "Superman III," Lois departs almost immediately on a "vacation."

The hero's romance in this film is, alas, super-ordinary. The talented Annette O'Toole ("48 Hours," "Cat People") once again is given a role that hardly taxes her skills. Lana Lang is now a small-town secretary, divorced with a young son. She's attracted to Kent this time, but it's her boy who is enthralled by "Superman."

There's no friction in this romance — they like each other instantly. Kent takes a fatherly interest in the boy, and everyone seems destined to live happily ever after. Yawn. It all plays like the sappy subplot of a TV movie-of-the-week about divorced mothers.

With a hammy opponent in Pryor and a subdued

every pulse of this year's festival, which kicked off with "Tintypes," (June 10 to July 9) a musical set around the time of World War I. The festival's other musical at the Gem will be, "Rodgers and Hart: a Musical Celebration," July 29 to Aug. 27 (directed by John Lee).

For Tabori, who has performed Shakespeare across the country and last year staged "Romeo and Juliet" for the Grove, directing Two Gentleman has presented some interesting challenges. For one, although it's a comedy about the lessons of love, it's not an "obvious" comedy to contemporary theatergoers because Shakespeare wrote it assuming his 16th century audience understood the humor directed toward that period's romantic school of literature.

"If I put a bunch of people in tights and have them walk around King Arthur's court, the audience won't connect," Tabori said. "So finally I chose a close equivalent to the Medieval setting; the 1830s. That

was the age of romance. When I think of that time, I think of writers like Byron, Jane Austen, all the romantic poets. In dress, the men wore long sideburns and dressed in dashing suits. The period also fits the language (of Shakespeare's era). You have to remember, that period had everything to do with 19th century verse, not the Elizabethan stuff."

At the same time, Tabori emphasized with a medley of gestures, his cast must do this in a manner which is neither high-blown nor phoney. "I want to create a period that will allow people to forget about what's going on in their own lives."

For the second year in a row, Santa Ana College has given its expertise and funds to the festival. Faculty member Richard Rossi is festival associate producer, while Theater Arts Chairman Sheryl Donchey is directing "Tintypes." The college also joined the city and the Village Green Fine Arts Assn. to cover the \$300,000 festival cost.

"As Village Green becomes more self-sufficient, we hope we can take over the 20 percent the city is contributing," Bradac said. "I think we'll realize that

The exhibit, titled "Through Indian Eyes," consists of 180 photographs, some hand-painted in color. The show is being underwritten by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, a federal agency, and support from Air India.

A 198-page book on the photos is available at the museum.

love interest in O'Toole, what strong presence does Superman have to play against? Well, it's not Robert Vaughn, who, as Pryor's boss, does yet another of the nasty, greedy businessmen he's been playing time and again since "The Man from U.N.C.L.E." was cancelled.

There's a potential interesting character in Lorelei Ambrosia (Pamela Stephenson), Vaughn's shapely, "dumb" mistress who is in fact a closet intellectual. But aside from a brief scene in which she seduces a confused Superman, nothing is really done with the character.

In fact, the most intriguing character Superman must confront in this film is — Clark Kent! Pryor's computer has produced flawed, synthetic Kryptonite that causes Superman to turn rotten.

The fun is in seeing the Man of Steel's sexual come-on to Lana Lang. Later, he punches a hole in an oil tanker. There's a potentially great movie idea here in exploring a Jekyll and Hyde Superman. But the

film makers give it disgracefully little attention. Instead, they cut to footage of Richard Pryor skiing off the edge of a skyscraper.

The "bad" Man of Steel subplot does come to a skillfully staged climax in which his evil side, in a

Superman costume, battles his good side, dressed as Clark Kent. The titanic struggle takes place in a grimy auto wrecking yard filled with nasty cutting and crushing machines.

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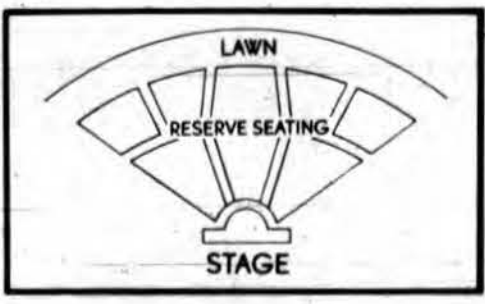

Yet even here the dialogue that could have illuminated the inner conflict between Superman and Clark Kent is strangely absent.

The movie does have a few delightful scenes. An opening slapstick slice of life in Metropolis is superbly unfolded by director Richard Lester. Lester, best known for "A Hard Day's Night," the 1970s version of "The Three Musketeers" and "Superman II," is a master at filming physical comedy and offbeat, slightly surrealistic humor.

Likewise, Christopher Reeve gives another exceptional performance as the Man of Steel — and as Clark Kent (he plays the superhero and his meek alter ego as two distinct characters). Reeve takes Superman seriously, despite the temptation to play up the camp aspects of the character. In this film, he's so good at bringing the "evil" Superman to life that we're left wishing the bad hero been given more screen time.

But Reeve's acting and Lester's directing skill aren't enough to lift the Newmans' leaden script off the ground.

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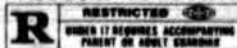

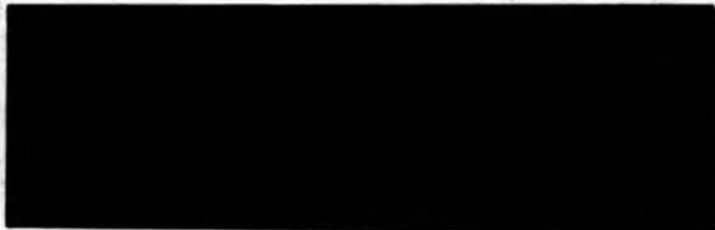

'Inside Orange County' an award-winner

Last October, KOCE Channel 50 in Huntington Beach launched a weekly lifestyle program designed to echo the format and production quality of Los Angeles-based shows such as "2 on the Town" and "Eye on L.A." The key difference would be that the KOCE would focus exclusively on its on backyard — Orange County.

The need for such a show was undisputed. As mentioned time and again, Orange County's two million residents are often woefully neglected by the large LA-based television stations. In addition, funding problems had forced KOCE to discontinue its highly praised "Newscheck," which had covered breaking events in Orange County twice weekly.

The team responsible for the new "Inside Orange County" never promised to fill the void in breaking news coverage, but the question remained: Could KOCE, with a small staff and limited resources, come up with a respectable Orange County magazine show?

That query was answered in part earlier this month when "Inside Orange County" producers Rob Sharkey and Nicole Pierce stepped forward at the Century Plaza Hotel to accept the Los Angeles Area Emmy Award for "Information Series -- Independent Stations." (In this category, KOCE competed against other independent LA area stations, but not against the wealthier network-owned outlets, KNXT, KNBC and KABC.)

"I don't think the station needed the Emmy to know that we were doing it right," said Pierce in an interview. "But it sure helped me."

She said it was especially rewarding to pick up the award in front of many of the Los Angeles television personalities with whom she had worked in past years. "I must have been kissed 45 times," she laughed.

But putting together almost 30 half-hour "Inside Orange County" shows since last fall has not always been a laughing matter. Producers Sharkey and Pierce also appear as on-camera reporters. They organize each segment in the field, supervise the editing and use of music for each story and write the "bridges" that connect the four segments making up most programs.

"We don't have any leeway here," admitted Pierce. "It's a lot of pressure. We don't feel as though either of us can afford to become ill. If either of us has a problem, who's going to do the show?"

Indeed, at one point in the season, Pierce broke two toes when a horse stepped on her left foot. She hobbled a bit but didn't miss a show.

"This is not just a labor of love," said Wayne Godwin, KOCE's senior vice president of programming. "Nicole and Rob put in 60 to 70 hours a week on the show. It's a labor of blood, sweat and tears."

But Godwin said some relief may be on the way. Beginning in July, the producers will get a break when the station begins rerunning some of the best programs from the past season of "Inside Orange County." And for next season, a third field producer will probably be added to take some of the load off Sharkey and Pierce.

Initially, "Inside Orange County" was funded for a single season. But Godwin said sponsors have been lined up to finance the program at least through the end of 1983, and additional funding is expected to be announced soon.

He said KOCE is pleased with the content and format of

the program, and viewers seem to be satisfied as well. In its schedule, the station decided to pair "Inside Orange County" with the PBS movie review program "Sneak Previews" because both appeal to wide, general audiences. When the season began, "Sneak Previews" aired at 8 p.m. Thursdays, followed by "Inside Orange County" at 8:30.

But the ratings soon indicated that the "Inside Orange County" was drawing even more viewers than "Sneak Previews," which is considered one of the most popular programs on PBS. So the two programs switched places on Thursdays nights.

Godwin conceded that this is a very competitive time period, dominated by "Magnum, P.I." on CBS. But he said the station is locked into the Thursday slot because that's the earliest time "Sneak Previews" is available each week from PBS. ("Inside Orange County" is also being repeated now at 7 p.m. Mondays.)

At about \$10,000 per episode, "Inside Orange County" costs about half as much to produce as "Newscheck," Godwin said. He said there is little likelihood that a hard news program will be revived at KOCE.

"'Inside Orange County' is definitely not a news show," Godwin said. "It is an information show. And it's designed to be an 'upper,' an uplifting show. Even when we showed a segment on battered women, we tried to put in a ray of hope, telling people where they could turn to get help."

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Dial Torgerson: A Lagunan remembers

The woman friend on the phone said, "Have you heard the news?" and I said, "What news?" and she said, "Oh. How awful. I'll have to tell you."

And she told me, Dial Torgerson, whom I'd known since 1960, was dead, killed by a rocket grenade in Honduras, covering Central America for the Los Angeles Times.

I hung up and said to my wife, "Dial Torgerson is dead. He's been killed." And I told her what I knew, and she said, "The poor kids."

She does that, Bonnie does. She sees beyond the immediate moment to its consequences. How awful for the kids. Dial dead. Just two months earlier, Ellen Torgerson Shaw, divorced from Dial, the mother of their two children, Christopher and Jordan, had died of cancer. That time Bonnie had said

"Poor David." David Shaw, Ellen's husband.

I'm slower than that. I can't shake it as quickly. I had thought, two months ago, poor Ellen. Now, poor Dial. An enigmatic man.

I loved him, the way you do your close friends. Yet what I remember most are those moments when Dial Torgerson lost his urbane manner and turned very nearly primitive. Dial was real.

Slender yet deceptively strong. He ran, lifted weights, practiced judo, and kept himself trim and fit. Yes, he was witty, he had a puckish humor. Yes, he shared those tall tales of the old newspapering days at the Valley Times or the Associated Press. Yes, he had a homily for every occasion. He even had one for survival. "Never buy a gold watch from a man on a street corner. Never get into an argument with a man

named Lefty. And never, never, play poker with a man named Doc." That's how to survive.

A funny man and a not-so-funny man. And an elegant man, with that relic of his southern birth and upbringing. One morning when he was a reporter for the Daily Pilot, covering Laguna Beach, he called me to ask a question about a story he was handling. I had no time, so I told him I'd have to get back to him.

"It will take just five minutes," Dial said.

"I can't," I said, "I don't have the time," and I hung up.

A few hours later, the story finished, Dial came to the door, white-faced with anger. Hatred, too, I think. I'd never seen him that angry. I'd never seen him angry, period.

How could I have turned him down? (See TO DIAL, Page A5)

Senate okays transit-tax vote

SACRAMENTO (AP) — Orange County voters could approve a one-percent increase in their sales tax to pay for highways and public transit under a bill passed Thursday by the state Senate.

The measure, SB 693 by senate Republican leader William Campbell, R-Hacienda Heights, would allow the Orange County Transportation Commission to levy a tax of up to 1 percent if it's approved by a majority of voters, the county board of supervisors and city councils representing a majority of city residents in the county.

Currently the sales tax is 6 percent in most of the state.

Campbell said the bill was badly needed to help finance county transportation projects.

"Trips to Disneyland are at stake," he quipped, meaning that badly deteriorating roads could keep people from visiting the amusement park. (See TRANSIT, Page A2)

Balboa Fun Zone project founders

Developer's money woes spark suits

A multi-million-dollar plan to redevelop the historic Balboa Fun Zone as a fancy Cape Cod-style office complex has become snarled in a series of lawsuits which could jeopardize the project's immediate future.

Suits have been filed by investors, a construction company and even the developer's former attorney. All allege they are owed money.

Though rumors abound that the property is for sale, a spokesman for the developer refused either to confirm or deny a sale is in the works.

"I wouldn't be able to tell you even if there was a sale pending," said Bruce Lurie, an attorney representing developer James Salter in his legal challenges.

The Fun Zone, a popular amusement center on Newport Harbor for more than 50 years, was stripped of its arcade games, merry-go-round and Ferris wheel late last year.

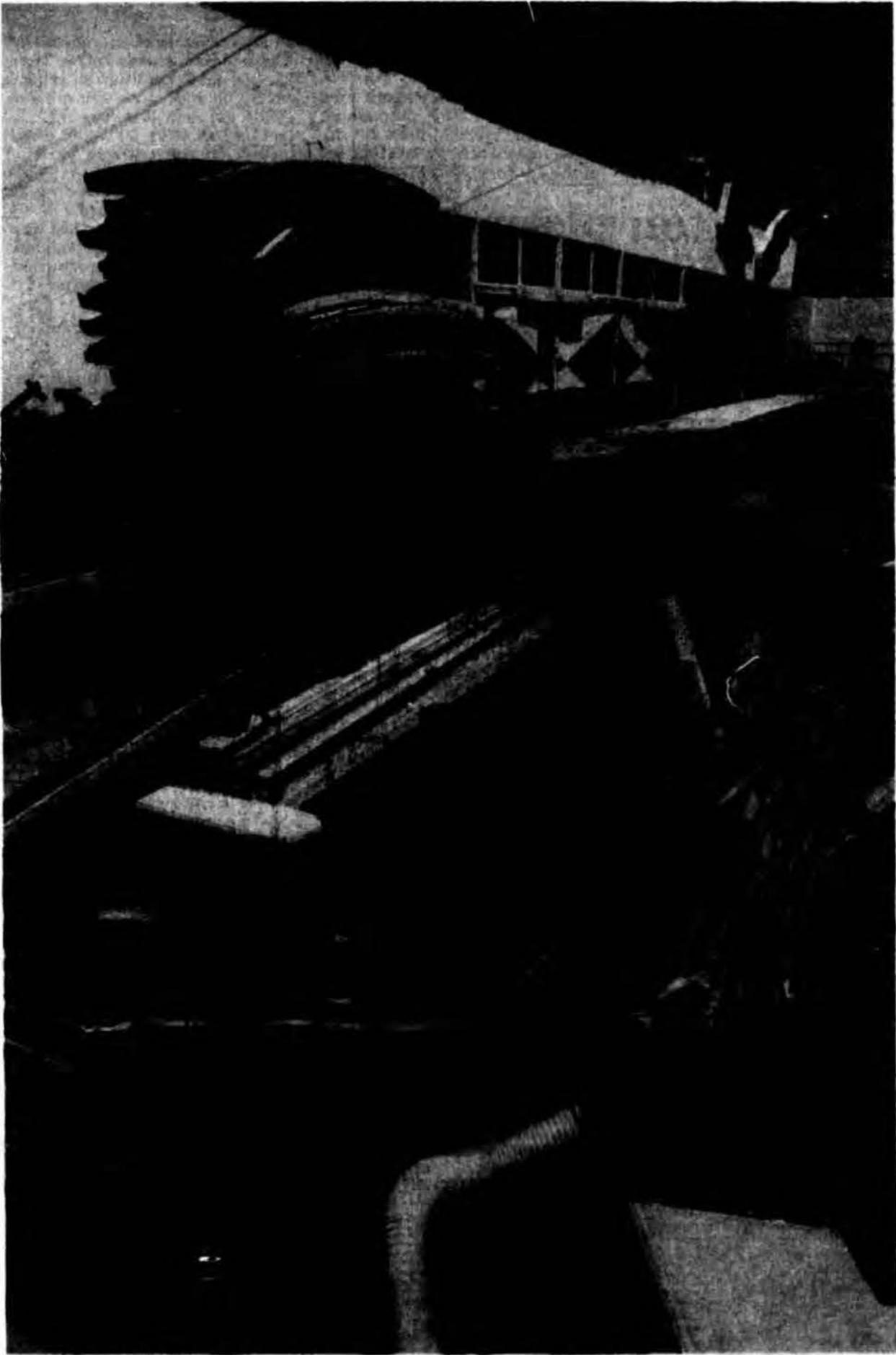
It now is little more than a collection of empty sheds and discarded machinery, encircled by a fence. A building which once housed a bumper-car ride remains, as does a miniature boat ride.

A row of fast-food outlets on the harbor side of the property is still open for business. Operators, though, said they don't know what the future will bring.

"The area's been hurt by this whole thing," said hamburger stand operator Millie Taillon, referring to the redevelopment scheme and media accounts of the arcade's demise.

Salter's ambitious plan for turning the Fun Zone into a complex of offices, restaurants and shops was greeted with enthusiasm last year and won easy approval from the Newport Beach City Council and the state Coastal Commission. City building officials, though, noted it now has been three months since they've heard from the developer.

"They were really pushing on it and then they seemed to just go away," said Ray Schuller, the city's building director. (See FUN ZONE, Page A2)

Bid by AirCal employees to halt American

Claiming they are defending their jobs, an AirCal employees group filed suit in Orange County Superior Court Thursday seeking to block American Airlines from flying out of John Wayne Airport.

The lawsuit, which seeks no monetary damages, names both the Orange County Board of Supervisors and American Airlines as co-defendants. It asks that American's JWA flight operations be halted because the county failed to prepare necessary environmental impact papers before allowing the airline to fly.

A hearing on a preliminary injunction requested by the AirCal group has been set before Judge Bruce Sumner July 11.

"Our position hasn't changed. The more flights we lose, the more

jobs we lose," explained Wolfgang Czaia, a spokesman for AirCal Concerned Employees for Survival. Czaia is a first officer with the airline.

AirCal employees claim American's entrance at the airport jeopardizes jobs because the Newport Beach-based airline is forced to surrender some of its flight slots each quarter under the county's complicated access plan, which allocates flights among competing airlines.

Czaia said the new environmental report is needed because American's flights from JWA expose the public "to situations that can best be described as unsafe and, in extreme cases, may well become extremely hazardous."

Accused NB rapist captured by police

An accused rapist, who eluded a police dragnet on Balboa Island Wednesday, was arrested in Huntington Park today by Newport Beach detectives who drove up to the Los Angeles suburb early this morning.

Michael Eric Gonzales, who escaped earlier this month from a minimum-security facility outside Los Angeles, where authorities admit he never should have been lodged, was being escorted back to Newport Beach by detectives late this morning.

"We just received word that he has been arrested and we have no other details at this time," said Newport Beach officer Tom Little. The police spokesman said he believed the arrest was the result of a tip to detectives, but had no other details. He did not know if the suspect put up a fight or was taken peaceably.

Gonzales escaped June 3 from an honor ranch in Saugus, where he was serving a 28-day sentence on drug, drunken driving and theft charges, according to Lt. Lee Davenport of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.

Davenport said authorities had

no idea Gonzales, 23, had been charged with raping a Balboa Island woman earlier this year.

Police in Newport Beach said they believe Gonzales returned to Balboa Island this week, possibly looking for the 24-year-old woman who alleges he raped her. Several island residents reported seeing a suspicious person wandering the island and later identified the person as Gonzales after being shown police photographs.

Newport officers sealed off the island Wednesday, checking cars. (See NB RAPIST, Page A2)

representing the AirCal group, denied the lawsuit was filed as a harassment tactic against the competing air carrier. He said the suit was filed in the hope of obtaining a decision that would be just for all and decided on its merits.

David Lobb, an American Airlines spokesman, declined to comment on the new lawsuit. He said airline executives and company attorneys would have nothing to say until they have had a chance to review the court papers.

American began flying four flights per day from John Wayne June 9 following a see-saw legal battle between the Board of Supervisors and the airline that bounced in and out of a federal courtroom.

The airline and supervisors struck a temporary accord June 14 when both parties agreed to drop all pending legal actions and sign a temporary operating agreement that permits American to fly from the airport through Aug. 31.

and going house-to-house on several streets. The man thought to be Gonzales was not found and the search was ultimately called off, police said.

The Peter J. Pitchess Honor Ranch, where Gonzales had been placed, was described as a working ranch with cattle and barracks for prisoners. A fence circles the ranch.

"It's guarded, but if an inmate

wants to get away, it's not hard to do," said Davenport. "Immunes, though, are people who are not a threat to the public."

He noted Gonzales technically was a free man in Orange County, having posted bail after his arrest. What Davenport said Los Angeles authorities didn't know was that Gonzales had failed to appear for a court hearing and his bail had been raised to \$100,000.

Orange County Superior Court records show that in recent months, developer Salter has been hit by lawsuits that, added together, seek in excess of \$2 million in damages. One of the plaintiffs, attorney Keith Fromm, won a preliminary injunction to bar disposal of proceeds from the sale of the property, which the suit alleged was imminent.

Fromm, in his suit, asserted he went to work for Salter on the promise he would earn interest in the Fun Zone and other development projects. The suit says Fromm resigned after coming upon alleged "irregularities and wrong-doings" with the business. It did not specify what these alleged "irregularities" were.

In another suit, San Diego residents Dennis and Nancy Bolger claimed they invested \$27,500 with Salter in a limited partnership. Two other couples in a separate suit claim they invested a total of \$110,000 with Salter.

In both cases, the plaintiffs

say they have been unable to determine if the partnership ever was formed or what became of their money. Each is seeking \$1 million in damages.

Still another suit has been filed by J.A. Stewart Construction Co. alleging Salter reneged on a \$300,000 promissory note.

Salter, listed as a Newport resident with his JBS Development Co. headquarters in Claremont, could not be reached for comment. His business phone number is disconnected and no new number is listed.

Lurie admitted his client faces heavy litigation and described the state of affairs at the Fun Zone as "extremely complicated with a very large cast of characters."

"But the suits don't really affect the development," he added. "He's just facing the kind of claims most developers do in the course of a job."

Lurie says he is certain the development will move forward, but with Salter playing only a minor role at most.

Newport man killed in wreck

A Newport Beach man was killed and a Costa Mesa man critically injured early today when their sports car spun out of control and careened into the center divider of the Riverside Freeway in Anaheim, authorities said.

Bradley Stevens, 22, of Newport Beach, the driver of the 1957-model MG, was thrown from the vehicle and struck by a second car. He was pronounced dead at the scene of the 4:40 a.m. accident, said officer Rick Stevens of the California Highway Patrol.

Robert James Tucciarone, 24, of Costa Mesa, also was thrown from the car and was listed in critical condition at St. Jude's Hospital in Fullerton early this morning.

The pair were traveling westbound on the freeway west of Raymond Avenue "in a reckless manner" at speeds exceeding 90 mph, officer Stevens said.

The driver apparently lost control of the car, which swerved into the center divider and overturned, throwing both men from the vehicle.

Walter Edwin Haverstock, 56, of Sun City, who was driving behind the sports car, swerved to avoid Tucciarone in the fast lane and struck Stevens, who was lying in the center divider, the CHP officer said.

He was pronounced dead at the scene. Tucciarone and Haverstock were taken to St. Jude's Hospital.

A hospital spokeswoman said that Haverstock was in stable condition with minor injuries early this morning.

The public is invited to a public hearing at 7:30 p.m. June 29 by the California Department of Transportation to discuss alternatives for the completion of the Costa Mesa Freeway (Route 55). The hearing will be held at the Costa Mesa Neighborhood Community Center, 1845 Park Ave.

Earlier this month, the Costa Mesa City Council endorsed an easterly route which swings east of Newport Boulevard from Bay to 17th streets and bypasses downtown businesses.

The easterly bypass, estimated at \$93 million, is one of eight alternatives discussed in a lengthy Caltrans draft Environmental Impact Statement released earlier this year.

Remarks made at the meeting June 29 will be included in the final environmental report.

Huntington plane crash victims in fair condition

Two people injured in the crash of their single-engine plane Wednesday near Meadowlark Airport in Huntington Beach are in fair condition today at local hospitals.

The pilot, Linda Warren of Pasadena, is reported in fair condition at Humana Hospital in Huntington Beach.

A passenger, Brian Forstall, 28, of Temple City, also is in fair condition at Fountain Valley Community Hospital, where doc-

tors are optimistic over the photographer's chances of recovering completely from injuries to his left eye, according to a spokesman.

Investigators from the National Transportation Safety Board had still not released any information today regarding the cause of the crash. The plane came down in a residential area near the airport and damaged two homes, coming to rest in the backyard of one on Stallion Circle. No one on the ground was injured.

HB pair's death probed by police

Police are investigating the apparent murder-suicide of a Huntington Beach couple, 46-year-old Frances J. Bunch and her husband, James, 52, officers said today.

Their bodies were found in their apartment at 7301 Elk Circle by police, who had received a frantic call from the couple's daughter in Fountain Valley.

Lt. Bruce Young said Mrs. Bunch telephoned her daughter shortly after 10 p.m. Thursday and said she was despondent and was going to commit suicide.

The daughter, described as being extremely upset, told police she then heard a shot.

Police rushed to the apartment, in the vicinity of Goldenwest Street and Warner Avenue, but both victims reportedly were dead on arrival.

Young said both suffered fatal gunshot wounds. A .38-caliber handgun, believed used in the double deaths, has been recovered.

No motives were disclosed by police. The daughter's identity was withheld because of her emotional condition, Young said.

\$859 billion budget plan calls for more high taxes

WASHINGTON — An \$859 billion budget blueprint approved by Congress calls for more taxes, more domestic spending and less military spending than sought by President Reagan. The House and Senate on Thursday OK'd the budget plan completed by congressional negotiators on Monday. Reagan says the compromise could stall economic recovery and weaken national defense because it calls for \$73 billion in higher taxes over the next three years, multibillion-dollar increases in domestic spending and half the military spending boost he wanted.

NRC urges firing of TMI officials

WASHINGTON — The owner of the Three Mile Island nuclear plant closed four years ago should fire its three top officials as a condition for reopening the facility, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission says. Commissioner Victor Gilinsky said Thursday that continued shortcomings in the performance of General Public Utilities Corp. "make it apparent that the conditions that led to the accident at TMI Unit 2 have not been cured."

U.S. to withhold U.N. financing share

WASHINGTON — The State Department says the United States will withhold its share of the financing of a United Nations conference on Palestine because the conference likely will be biased against Israel. "We regret that the prestige of the United Nations is being exploited for this ill-considered purpose, which does nothing for the cause of peace or indeed for the Palestinian people," a department statement said Thursday.

Combat pay asked for conflict areas

WASHINGTON — Rep. Pat Schroeder, D-Colo., and 34 other House members are asking President Reagan to provide combat pay for U.S. military and civilian personnel in El Salvador and Lebanon. The \$65 per month stipend for military personnel and the allowances for the civilians would cost the government less than \$2 million a year, she said.

STATE

State rejects jobless pay extension

SACRAMENTO — The state Assembly has rejected a bill to loosen requirements for a state program of 12 weeks of additional unemployment benefits during the first half of next year. The vote Thursday was 39-35, with 41 votes needed for passage. The program, called Cal-Ed, pays unemployed workers who have used up their regular unemployment benefits.

Gays to get damages for attacks

SACRAMENTO — In the second victory for gay rights in two days, the state Assembly has voted to allow \$10,000 in damages for victims of violence based on sexual preference.

The measure went to the Senate Thursday on a 42-29 vote, without debate. It would allow a victim of physical injury or property damage inflicted because of sexual orientation, age or disability, to sue the attacker for \$10,000, in addition to actual losses.

Teens 'should be tried as adults'

LOS ANGELES — More teen-agers should be prosecuted and sentenced as adults, says District Attorney Robert H. Philibosian. Under current state law, no one under 16 can be prosecuted as an adult. Juvenile Court judges are empowered to refer some 16- and 17-year-olds to adult courts. Philibosian told the Juvenile Court Law Revision Commission Thursday that the age limit should be lowered to include 14- and 15-year-olds. He said his proposal would apply to youngsters who have committed "certain very serious felonies such as murder, arson with bodily injury or gang rape."

Dairy drops \$80 million lawsuit

POMONA — Alta-Dena Dairy says it has dropped an \$80 million suit against the state in exchange for a new test that should end frequent recalls of the dairy's raw milk products. State officials say the new process, if it proves effective, can determine "almost instantaneously" if salmonella bacteria exists in products. Salmonella organisms can cause death in some rare instances.

WORLD

Severe quake hits China-Viet area

HONG KONG — A severe earthquake measuring 7.6 on the Richter scale occurred along the China-Vietnam border today, the Hong Kong Observatory reported. A spokesman said preliminary analysis of seismograph readings indicates that the center of the quake was near the border between Vietnam and China's Yunnan province.

Syrian government expels Arafat

DAMASCUS, Syria — The Syrian government expelled PLO chief Yasser Arafat today, a Palestinian official said, and a grim-looking Arafat immediately left Damascus for an undisclosed destination. The ouster came after Palestinian officials reported that rebel Palestine Liberation Organization forces ambushed and killed an undetermined number of Arafat's men during the night.

Pope's visit may lift martial law

WARSAW, Poland — High-ranking Polish officials say Pope John Paul II's pilgrimage could prompt a full lifting of martial law, perhaps as early as July 22, Poland's post-war Independence Day. Martial law, declared on Dec. 13, 1981, was suspended conditionally last Dec. 31 under legislation that left about 200 factories and plants "militarized" and imposed tight new social controls to prevent a fresh challenge to Communist authorities.

Shuttle does it perfectly — except in California

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE (AP) — Space shuttle Challenger, rerouted on its 96th orbit, went around the world two extra revolutions today and glided without fanfare to a sunrise landing on the familiar bed of Rogers Dry Lake in the California desert.

Florida's overcast skies, and traditional agency caution, foiled NASA's plan to send the shuttle to its first Florida landing.

"Challenger, wheels down," reported commander Robert Crippen as the 100-ton winged shuttle touched the centerline. After six days in space, four men and America's first lady of space, Sally K. Ride, were back on Earth.

"The good news is the beer is very, very cold this morning. The bad news is that it is 3,000 miles away," ground controller Guy Gardner told the flight crew as Challenger rolled to a stop.

"That's what I was afraid of," Crippen replied.

His crew included pilot Rick Hauck and mission specialists Ride, John Fabian and Dr. Norman Thagard. Their boss said Flight 7 was the shuttle's best yet.

President Reagan telephoned his congratulations from the White House, calling it a "wonder-

ful mission," and telling the astronauts, "All of America was watching you up there and what you accomplished."

Ride cited the crew's pride in deploying two satellites and releasing and retrieving a third, but added, "The thing that I'll remember most about the flight is that it was fun. In fact I'm sure it was the most fun I'll ever have in my life."

Challenger pierced clear skies onto runway 15, a hard-sand strip on the Mojave Desert, at 6:57 a.m. Pacific time.

By any measure, the flight had been a success and Ride's performance — the first American woman to fly in space was a workhorse on scientific and mechanical tests — had to be a powerful endorsement for female astronauts.

"It was a superb mission in every way, and Sally's role was a history-making role," said NASA's shuttle director, James A. Abrahamson. He said the mission was the best so far.

"I imagine the most disappointed person of all is Bob Crippen," he said. "He had practiced long and hard to accomplish this (landing) milestone."

Kayoed veto rule riles Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court, by striking Congress' authority to veto executive decisions, lobbed a shell across the street into the Capitol that people on both sides agreed will set off a historic revision of the way government works.

The decision "reflects a profoundly different conception of the Constitution than that held by the courts which sanctioned the modern administrative state," Justice Byron White said of the 6-3 decision.

The court decision, which brings the checks and balances features of the Constitution into focus more clearly, than most rulings do, deals with the so-called legislative veto.

Under that procedure, Congress delegates to the president and executive branch agencies authority to carry out certain laws with the proviso that one or both houses will get a look at specific decisions and rules and countermand any they don't like.

The court majority, led by Chief Justice Warren E. Burger, held that the procedure short-circuits the way the Constitution says laws must become law: by passing both houses and being subject to presidential veto unless both houses subsequently muster a two-thirds majority to override the president.

In essence, the court said once Congress delegates authority to the executive branch it relinquishes its power to ride herd by any short-cut oversight devices.

There was no suggestion in the

court decision that Congress lost any of its basic right to make law, only that it can't use the legislative veto as a technique. Congress began using such vetoes in 1932 and the practice has become increasingly popular in recent years.

Many suggested the ultimate result of the ruling will be that Congress will put even more constraints on the executive branch by writing laws with less flexibility.

The court opinion contained an appendix which outlined 56 active laws that have provisions affected by the ruling.

They include the War Powers Resolution, under which the president may be instructed by concurrent resolution to remove U.S. forces engaged in foreign hostilities, and restrictions that make the Defense Department gain congressional approval for major arms sales to foreign countries.

Death penalty possible in slaying of LA girl

PASADENA (AP) — "Special circumstances" surrounding the savage molestation-murder of a 9-year-old girl will either send Daniel Ray Barrera to the gas chamber or ensure he is never paroled, a jury has ruled.

The same Superior Court jury on Tuesday will begin the penalty phase — to decide whether to spare the 20-year-old Barrera's life — after convicting him Thursday of first-degree murder and the special circumstance of murder committed during a molestation. The special circumstance carries

either the death penalty or life in prison without possibility of parole.

The crushed body of Jenny Kao of the Los Angeles County community of Monterey Park was found in a Glendale trash dump eight days after she disappeared March 11 from the Pasadena Plaza shopping mall, where she had been selling candy as part of a school project near her aunt and uncle's shop.

Barrera worked at a fast-food shop in the mall.

Ban on mail condom ads overturned

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court ruled today that the government may not ban the mailing of unsolicited advertisements for condoms and other contraceptives.

The ruling frees drug companies to promote contraceptive products by mailing brochures to homes throughout the country.

In the 8-0 decision, the court said a federal law restricting the ads that sprung from a morals crusade more than a century ago violates constitutional protections of free expression.

The court rejected the Reagan administration's position that the law prevents material on contraception from "falling into the hands of children against their parents' wishes."

That wasn't what friends did. I apologized, told him I would have got back later. But that didn't help. He wanted to punch me out, I think, except my wife was standing there, and she would interrupt every so often. He had to turn to her, in his best southern manner, and speak respectfully to her, deferentially, before he again turned to me, in his white heat. It passed, though from that moment I was aware there was more to Dial Torgerson than puckish humor. He was a man suited to war.

I was to see his anger a few other times. Once very unimportantly. He called one day and said he had two tickets for the Angels game; did I want to join him? We went. When the game ended, we left the stadium and got into Dial's VW bug, and I watched the anger again. He drove the bug into a tiny opening in the slowly departing crowd, his face very intent. He was a competitive driver. When we drove through the Canyon, he never bothered to flick off his high beams, even in the face of oncoming traffic.

Then when he dropped me off, he said, "Thanks for coming along. That was fun, wasn't it?" He smiled his full boyish smile. My knuckles were still white when I went inside.

The other moment was important, terrible, tragic. After their son Chris was born, Dial and Ellen had another child, a little boy named Hunter, after Dial's brother. One day Ellen went into the bedroom and the infant Hunter lay dead, victim of sudden crib death. That evening, in one of those macabre scenes out of a bad southern novel, the Torgersons' cat, a tiny, misshapen animal, wandered outside where a pack of dogs cornered the dwarfed cat and tore it to shreds.

For Dial, trying to hold in the pain, this was too much. He picked up a loaded pistol and ran outside, ostensibly to find and kill the dogs. He raced to the corner, in the night, and then helplessly shook his hands and the loaded pistol at the sky.

He came back, shaking, and he said, "I didn't want to kill those dogs. I realized that I wanted to kill God. But I didn't know how."

And so my wife said the other night, when we learned of Dial's sudden violent death in Honduras, "At least he died doing what he loved doing. If he could have picked a way to die, this is what he would have chosen."

Yes. Not just covering a war. But doing a story. Any story. Being in the middle of something happening. Getting it down. Getting it right. He was a wonderful reporter, an even better writer, and an even-better-than-thattinker. Get the story. That was what counted. More than friendships, more even than marriage. More than anything. Get the story. It ruled him.

When Dial worked for the Associated Press, he would commute from Laguna in that tiny VW bug, driving up in the morning rush-hour traffic, driving home in the evening rush-hour traffic, and he would arrive exhausted, slowly being eaten alive by the commute. But he had to do it, because that is how he could then do his stories. He and Ellen loved Laguna, didn't want to leave. That's why Dial went to work for the Pilot; it was handy. But he really wanted a job in the city. So when the Times called, he went to work in

Los Angeles, and the Torgersons moved out of Laguna.

Even when he moved, it was an assignment he had to do perfectly. He didn't just move into a house, he either built the house (he drew plans as well as an architect and did much of the physical building himself) or he would buy an old house and then tear it apart and re-do it. When it was redone, he'd sell. Ellen would suffer silently, and then not so silently; she wanted a place she could call home. Dial never understood. He built a house in Laguna, so they'd have someplace to live while he built a bigger house. He bought a great old house in Echo Park, and then had to fix it over, and of course sold it, and built another house in Silver Lake. Houses were like stories. You did one, so you could get to the next.

Lest you get the idea Dial was inconsiderate, you read him (and me) wrong. He needed a big house, for instance, because two families lived there. An upstairs, downstairs situation. Dial and Ellen had taken in a young woman from Mexico, to take care of the house and the kids, while Dial went off to work, and later, Ellen too. The housekeeper's ne'er-do-well husband would show up once a year or so, just long enough to impregnate his wife. It would be Dial who would take the woman to the hospital when it was time to deliver her child, and it was Dial who saw that she was comfortable, and who paid the bills. When one of the two boys came down with tuberculosis, Dial took care of the bills again, and it was Dial who made the woman and her boys as much a part of the family as his southern upbringing could.

But when he heard about the opening for a bureau chief in Kenya — his first overseas assignment — Dial said yes before he and Ellen even had a chance to discuss it. Everybody packed in a minute, Dial, Ellen, the two children.

Ellen had nothing to do in Kenya; she'd left behind a very good job with Mayor Bradley. Now she grew bored; she went home; the marriage began to come apart. Who knows how Dial felt? He went from Kenya to Jerusalem, from there to Mexico. He followed war. He wrote about Idi Amin. About Begin, and then, about El Salvador, Nicaragua, Honduras.

His news stories were perfectly even-handed, the most lucid of writers. Sometimes on Sundays or on other days on the Op-Ed page, he would speak out more subjectively. Yet even then his opinions were weighted with fact, not frenzy.

He was the coolest man I ever knew. And perhaps the hottest. Enigmatic. He had his homilies for survival. Naturally he ignored them.

Way cleared for banks to merge

WASHINGTON — The government has cleared the way for a merger between BankAmerica Corp. and the financially troubled Seafirst Corp. The merger, approved by the Federal Reserve Board on Wednesday, still requires approval from stockholders of Seafirst, the Seattle bank-holding company that would become a subsidiary of the San Francisco-based BankAmerica. BankAmerica, with assets of \$119.7 billion, is the nation's second-largest bank holding company. It already operates one subsidiary bank, Bank of America, which is the nation's largest commercial bank with domestic deposits of \$55.5 billion. Seafirst, with total assets of \$9.6 billion, is the largest commercial banking organization in Washington state.

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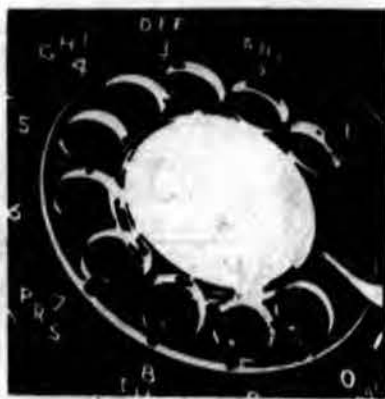
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Dispatch center dedicated in CM

A new communications center — described as the first of its kind in the United States — was dedicated today in Costa Mesa. Mayor Donn Hall presided over the opening of the center, which will dispatch emergency calls directly to city police and fire departments.

"All 911 or regular telephone calls are automatically inter-phased (programmed into) our computer dispatch," Communications Director Orville Amburgey said. "No one else in the U.S. has calls inter-phased into computer dispatches."

The computerized aid-dispatch system, which directs 911 emergency calls, has been used extensively throughout the county since its introduction in 1982. Amburgey said a 911 call can be dispatched to fire or police departments in 8 seconds, while calls made directly to the department take 60 seconds or longer.

"And citizens don't have to remember the (station) number," he added.

The unique, direct-dispatch system has gained world-wide attention. Los Angeles, Long Beach and other California cities have already started designs for similar programs and city officials from Houston, Anchorage, Salt Lake City and Fort Collins, Co. Representatives from Scotland are expected to tour the building in August.

Located behind City Hall on Fair Drive, the new center includes a repair workshop and cost \$890,000 (\$175,000 of which went toward buying new radio dispatch consoles).
